





Gay bashing reigns at GOP convention

Houston, TX [In Step] — Dozens of Gay rights and AIDS activists were arrested outside the Houston Astrodome while the Republican Party, meeting in its quadrennial convention, enshrined opposition to Gay rights in its platform and speaker after speaker voiced fears that homosexuality was undermining "traditional family values."

Many mainstream reporters covering the August 17-20 convention, including Tom Brokaw of NBC and Peter Jennings of ABC, commented that an appeal to anti-Gay prejudices was likely to be a major theme in the campaign to re-elect President George Bush.

The 1992 Republican platform states: "We oppose efforts by the Democratic Party to include sexual preference as a protected minority receiving preferential status under civil rights statutes at the federal, state and local levels."

Reflecting the obvious takeover of the party by right wing elements, the GOP even refused to allow representatives of Gay groups to speak before platform hearings held in May. The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), the Human Rights Campaign Fund and the Log Cabin Federation, a coalition of Gay Republican clubs, were all prevented from testifying.

SPEAKERS DENOUNCE GAY RIGHTS

The anti-Gay sentiments of the GOP were on full display the first night of the convention when former Presidential hopeful Pat Buchanan spoke. In a voice reeking with sarcasm and contempt, he repeatedly denounced Gay rights as a threat to "family values."

Buchanan's very first comment criticizing the Democrats contained a coded anti- Gay slur. He called the Democratic convention, "where 20,000 radicals and liberals came dressed up as moderates and centrists... the greatest single exhibition of cross-dressing in American political history." He went on to condemn the "amoral idea that Gay and Lesbian couples should have the same standing in law as married men and women."

Two nights later, in an evening devoted to "Family Values," Rev. Pat Robertson and former Education Secretary William Bennett continued the attack. Robertson called the liberal agenda of the Democrats "an instidious plague" undermining American families. He played on people's fears by warning that Bill Clinton would appoint homosexuals to cabinet positions.

Bennett declared that "decent" Americans were engaged in a "cultural war" against the principles of "radical feminism" and Gay rights. In an apparent reference to the National Endowment for the Arts, Bennett, in outraged tones, said that no taxpayer money should be used to subsidize "filth" or "alternative lifestyles."

Urvashi Vaid, Executive Director of NGLTF told the New York Times: "This is the most explicitly anti-Gay campaign we've ever seen. It's hateful... We're the only ones left to attack. Commmunism is gone. The Los Angeles riots make it impossible to attack blacks... That leaves us as the ones to beat on to divert attention from the economy and other failings."

Bush campaign officials acknowledge that Bill Clinton is vulnerable to charges that he supports Gay rights. They plan to continue to press the issue to discredit the Democrat throughout the campaign.

FEW WORDS OF COMPASSION

About the only words of moderation and compassion came from Mary Fisher, an HIV-positive woman, who spoke of her struggle against the disease. "AIDS is not a political creature," she said. "It

does not care whether you are Democrat or Republican. It does not ask whether you are black or white, male or female, Gay or straight, young or old." Fisher mildly chastized her listeners: "We have killed each other with our ignorance, our prejudice and our silence. We may take refuge in our stereotypes, but we cannot hide there long. Because HIV asks only one thing of those it attacks: 'Are you human?'"

Fisher and Barbara Bush were conspicuous as the only people who appeared on the podium in the Houston Astrodome wearing a red ribbon, a symbol of solidarity with people with AIDS. Barbara wore hers for part of the last night of the convention — but it was removed before joining her husband on stage for the finale.

In contrast, at July's Democratic convention, virtually every speaker and delegate wore a red ribbon. Also in stark contrast is the fact that at least 110 openly Gay delegates attended the Democratic convention. In Houston, only two Gay people served as alternates.

And in an ironic twist that many Gay and Lesbian observers picked up on, when President Bush entered the Astrodome after his wife, Barbara's, speech, the band broke into "The Best of Times," a song from the Gay comedy/romance La Cage Aux Folles.

ACT UP LEADS PROTESTS

Meanwhile, throughout the convention, Gay and AIDS activists kept the pressure on George Bush and the Republicans. Bush, Vice President Quayle and Rev. Robertson were heckled at a number of press conferences and meetings with GOP caucuses during the convention.

The largest protest involved 2,000 AIDS activists marching on the Astrodome the convention's opening night. They chanted "We're here, we're queer, and we're not going to go!" and burned effigies of Bush. When they sat down to block a street and when some began throwing barricades onto a bonfire, they were violently dispersed by Houston's mounted police. ACT UP was the primary sponsor of the demonstrations and disruptions. Also during the convention, the Log Cabin Federation, representing 6,000 Gay and Lesbian Republicans, voted not to endorse George Bush. Most Log Cabin leaders expressed support for Clinton, but the group's bylaws prohibit it from endorsing a Democrat.

Gay/Lesbian volunteers to take police complaints

Milwaukee — Starting on Tuesday, August 18, volunteers will be available twice a week to assist members of the Gay and Lesbian community who wish to file complaints about Milwaukee police misconduct.

As an outgrowth of the work of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMM) Police Relations Task Group, ten volunteers have been trained by staff of the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission to help individuals through the process of filing complaints. "We are not trying to generate complaints," says Ronald Johnson, Community Relations Specialist with the Milwaukee Fire and Police commission. "Rather, we are trying to facilitate the filing of legitimate complaints by aggrieved individuals."

Anyone who wishes to file a complaint about Milwaukee police misconduct can do so at the local precinct or at the offices of the Fire and Police Commission, 749 West State Street, Room 706, during business hours Monday through Friday. Trained volunteers from the Lesbian and Gay community will be available Tuesday evenings from 6-8pm and Saturdays from 10am-12 noon at the LAMM office, 264-2600, to answer questions and assist in the process of filing citizen complaints. The LAMM office is located at 2821 North Fourth Street, room 315.

"In the past, the relationship between the police and Lesbians and Gays has not been the best. We are very happy with the steps the Fire and Police Commission are taking to improve that relationship." says Dr. Margaret Snow, volunteer coordinator.

LAMM announces choices for primary

Milwaukee — After extensive surveys of all the candidates, the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMM) has announced its choices for the major races in the September 8 primary election.

In the Democratic primary for the U.S. Senate, LAMM has endorsed Congressman Jim Moody. LAMM reports that Moody has a 100% voting record on LAMM-supported issues and is a sponsor of the federal Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights Bill (the only such sponsor among Wisconsin's Congressional delegation). LAMM believes Moody has a good chance of winning the primary and defeating Republican Sen. Bob Kasten in November.

Out of a large field of Democratic hopefuls in the race for Moody's seat in the 5th Congressional District, LAMM recommends either State Sen. Thomas Barrett or former Judge Fred Kessler. Both Barrett and Kessler sought the LAMM endorsement and LAMM believes either man will make "an excellent Congressional representative."

According to LAMM, Tom Barrett has an excellent pro-civil rights, pro-woman and pro-choice record in the state legislature. Barrett authored the bill to strengthen Wisconsin's hate crimes law in the past session. He was a major supporter of Senate Bill 1, the civil rights bill that sought to broaden the scope of civil rights litigation, and successfully amended an anti-choice bill to protect a minor's right to choose safe, legal abortion. Barrett was also the driving force behind the creation of two courts in Milwaukee that specialize in the prosecution of sexual offenses.

Fred Kessler is well known to many Gays and Lesbians for his longtime support of civil rights. As President of the Milwaukee chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, Kessler helped pursue several Gay and Lesbian civil rights cases in the state. He is pro-choice and helped protect clinics from anti-choice demonstrators this summer. Kessler has pledged to exert leadership in Congress in support of Gay and Lesbian rights. Reapportionment has created a new 4th Senate District in Milwaukee. Two State Representatives, Gwendolynne Moore and Lou Fortis are vying for the seat. While both candidates have good records on Gay and Lesbian rights and women's rights, LAMM has endorsed Gwen Moore.


LAMM believes Gwen Moore, a former welfare mother, understands the issues of health care, day care and education from her own experience. She worked as a counselor at Bread and Roses Women's Health Center and has been a capable and compassionate legislator. LAMM also notes that Moore's election would make her the only African American woman in the State Senate.

Second unprovoked attack in East Town

Milwaukee [In Step] — In the second such violent attack in the last month, a patron leaving the This Is It bar on Milwaukee's east side around midnite on August 17-18 was shot in the foot by an assailant who was lurking on the Kilbourn Avenue median strip. Police have a suspect in custody.

The 28-year-old victim, who wished to remain anonymous, told **In Step** she was walking home along Kilbourn Avenue with a friend after an evening at This Is It. As they approached the intersection of Marshall Street, they heard shouts of "Stop!" from two men on the median strip and, almost simultaneously, several gunshots rang out. Realizing they were being fired upon, the victims ran as fast as they could to their apartment building several blocks away.

As they arrived home, they alerted a police officer who happened to be writing a ticket near their building. He immediately called for police back-up and an ambulance. It was only upon arrival at their apartment that the woman realized she had been shot in the heel: "I couldn't believe it. I couldn't believe I'd been shot. It didn't hurt right away. I just knew we had to get out of there." contd. on page 8



The victim was treated at the Milwaukee County Medical Complex where doctors made the initial determination that the bullet should not be removed. The victim, who is without insurance, is not fully satisfied with that decision and will closely monitor the injury and its side effects to see whether extraction of the bullet is necessary.

Meanwhile, police called to the scene of the crime chased down one of the suspects, a black male in his 20's. They brought him to the hospital where he was identified by the victims and then booked for reckless endangerment.

The shooting victim told **In Step** that the assailants, who remained quite a distance away, never demanded money or made any anti-Gay comments before they started firing. However, she asked the police to log it in as a possible hate crime because of her own sexual status and because of the July 31 attack against a Gay man who had also left This Is It.

In that incident, Robert Keirsey, 43, was robbed and taunted with anti-Gay slurs before the attackers smashed his face through a window of the Nantucket Shores restaurant at the Astor Hotel. Keirsey described the assailants as two black males in their 20's. No suspects in that case have been apprehended but police officials told **In Step** that they are investigating whether the two east side attacks and several recent armed robberies in the downtown area are connected.

The August 18 shooting victim said that First District Police Officers Delores Strong and Gary Raymond "handled everything fine" and treated her with respect. She and her friend plan to cooperate with the District Attorney's Office to see that justice is done.

The victim is also availing herself of the state's Crime Victim Compensation law. This law financially compensates crime victims for any hospital bills, lost wages, damaged property, etc. It is administered through the Wisconsin Department of Justice.

Kenosha rest stop target of police sting

Kenosha [In Step] – The Travel Information Center, located along Interstate 94 at Highway 165 in Kenosha County, has been subject to heavy police patrols and a sting operation intended to rid the tourist center of increasing sexual activity among men who cruise there at night.

But the Kenosha News reports that the District Attorney's Office has been unsuccessful in prosecuting those arrested because of lack of evidence of either prostitution or disorderly conduct. In most cases, the District Attorney found that money for sex did not change hands. Lieutenant Louis Vena of the Kenosha Sheriff's Department told the News: "They're giving freebies out there."

Lt. Vena said that police patrols of the travel center have increased dramatically in response to public complaints. Sheriff's deputies, state troopers and Pleasant Prairie police all patrol the area aggressively. Vena said the high profile of police has curbed the activity somewhat.

Lt. Vena also told the News: "We're just determined to ensure the safety and well-being of valid travelers. We know they [homosexuals] go out there. They know we go out there. They're paranoid. And that's good. Look at it this way, would you want to walk into a restroom along an interstate somewhere in the middle of the night and have some guy say to your 12-year-old son 'Hey buddy, you want to have a good time?'"

The Kenosha News article of August 13 was headlined: "Whole Different World at Tourist Stop After Dark — Deputies Patrol Area for Criminal Activity." It lumped men seeking consensual sex together with drug dealers and con artists who allegedly congregate there. It described the site as "a magnet for partner-seeking homosexuals, big-time drug dealers and scam artists who rip off truckers."





The protest will begin at the Library Mall on the UW campus at 11:30am. The demonstration will proceed up State Street to Governor Tommy Thompson's office at the Capitol and then to the Department of Corrections building.

The protest is scheduled on the second anniversary of the death of Donald Woods, who was an HIV-positive inmate at the Waupun Correctional facility. Woods died of asphyxiation while being retrained and gagged with a towel by prison guards. A special prosecutor who investigated the incident exonerated the guards of any wrongdoing.

The ACT UP chapters charge that the Department of Corrections (DOC) has

"been dragging its feet' in implementing many of the recommendations of Gov. Thompson's Task Force on Prisoners with AIDS. The key issue still not resolved is the distribution of safe sex materials (condoms and dental dams) and clean needle technology among inmates. The DOC acknowledges that both sex and IV drug use occur in the state's prisons, but insists that distributing materials to facilitate such practices is "against the rules."



Anti- Gay forces advance in Oregon

Springfield, OR [In Step] - Gays and Lesbians in the state of Oregon recently suffered two harsh blows when they failed to gain enough signatures to place a local anti-Gay law on a referendum and when the right wing Oregon Citizen's Alliance succeeded in its attempt to place an anti-Gay initiative on the statewide ballot this November.

United Springfield, a pro-Gay group hoping to repeal the city of Springfield's anti-Gay ordinance, learned on August 10 that it had failed to collect enough signatures to place the issue on the ballot. Springfield had passed the anti-Gay measure by a 55% majority vote of its citizens in May, making it the first municipality in the United States to pass a law actually endorsing anti-Gay discrimination. The failure of the repeal effort means that the law still stands.

Meanwhile, in a political battle with even wider ramifications, the Oregon Citizens Alliance (OCA) has succeeded in collecting more than 115,000 signatures to place its anti-Gay initiative on the statewide ballot in November. Ballot Measure 9 would severely limit the civil rights of Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals. If passed, the measure would be the first time in United States history that a state constitution has been amended to take certain rights away from American citizens.

Measure 9 requires state, regional and local governments to set a standard for Oregon's youth that declares homosexuality to be "abnormal, wrong, unnatural and perverse." It lumps homosexuality together with bestiality, pedophilia and necrophilia and forbids government from using either public funds or facilities to "promote, encourage or facilitate homosexuality."

WHAT MEASURE 9 WILL DO

Under Measure 9, Gay and Lesbian teachers and teachers perceived to be supportive of homosexuality could be fired or reassigned. Schools and universities would be required to teach that homosexuality is "perverse," Public libraries and public television would be required to remove all books, materials and programs which portray homosexuality in a positive light.

Measure 9 would void municipal ordinances (in Eugene, Portland and Corvallis) which protect the housing and employment rights of Gay people. In addition, state business licenses could be denied to establishments which cater to Gay or Lesbian clientele.

The "No on 9" campaign, a coalition of Gay rights and other progressive groups, warns that if Measure 9 is adopted by Oregonians in November it will fuel the efforts of other right wing groups around the country. A similar statewide measure is on the ballot in Colorado where a group called Colorado for Family Values is spearheading the anti- Gay drive.

The "No on 9" campaign has the support of the Oregon Library Association, the Oregon Medical Association, Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon, the state American Civil Liberties Union, and feminist and civil rights groups. Hollywood stars like Roseanne and Tom Arnold, Faye Dunaway and Gay film director Gus Van Sant have contributed to the campaign. On August 22. the rock band Nirvana held a fundraising concert for the pro-Gay forces.

Leaders of the "No on 9" campaign, who have received death threats (and whose office was broken into and ransacked earlier this summer), are asking for support from Gay groups and individuals nationwide.







UW Bookstore boycott gains support

Madison [In Step] — The University of Wisconsin Student Association has endorsed a boycott of the University Bookstore, 711 State Street, because the store has allegedly discriminated against its Gay and Lesbian employees.

The action by UW's student government is in support of a boycott call made by the Ten Percent Society, the school's Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual student organization. The Ten Percent Society called for the boycott after Lois Corcoran, a Lesbian employee of more than four years' standing, was fired by University Bookstore May 30. Corcoran is appealing her firing to Madison's Equal Opportunities Commission.

An article in the June 19 Isthmus, an alternative paper in Madison, chronicled the history of the bookstore's alleged anti-Gay practices. Current and former employees testified to the anti-Gay and anti-woman bias exhibited by some of the store's managers. Other discrimination complaints against University Bookstore have been filed previously. At least one was settled with a monetary award to the plaintiff. The Ten Percent Society and other supportive groups will be picketing the University Bookstore when the Fall semester begins September 2. They also plan to encourage UW professors to order textbooks for the Spring semester through other stores.

Management at University Bookstore has said the store currently sells almost 80% of all texts required for UW-Madison classes. If the Ten Percent Society is able to mount a successful boycott this semester (books have already been purchased) and is able to convince faculty to make future orders through other Madison stores, the pressure factics could significantly reduce sales at University Bookstore.

Charles Squires of the Ten Percent Society told **In Step** that the boycott would draw attention to the store's discriminatory policies and to state and local laws which prohibit such discrimination.

Clarenbach announces agenda

David Clarenbach, Democratic candidate for Congress in Wisconsin's Second District, has released 'The Clarenbach Agenda,' a point by point plan of the issues that will drive his bid for the United States Congress.

Among the important issues he addresses is the need to confront honestly and fight vigorously the AIDS epidemic at the federal level.

"Far too many of our friends and loved ones have died waiting for George Bush and his cohorts to devise and implement a national plan to adequately deal with the AIDS crisis," Clarenbach said.

"At a time when this nation needs to take bold action on one of the most important issues in our history, the federal government has been completely silent. I do not accept this, and that's why I dedicate myself to changing America's priorities and addressing the needs of people living with AIDS and HIV,'' Clarenbach said.

'The Clarenbach Agenda' calls for a national bill of rights for people with AIDS and HIV. It would be similar to the current Wisconsin law Clarenbach crafted which prohibits health care providers, hospitals, and nursing homes from discriminating, refusing to treat, or providing lower standard of care to an individual based on HIV status.

The agenda covers 6 major areas:

• Tax Fairness And Balanced Budgets — "I have never voted for a budget deficit and, as a Member of Congress, I will vote to reject any budget proposal that increases our deficit. We need to cut up the national credit card and reduce the deficit by making the wealthy pay their fair share in taxes, cutting waste in







In addition to the four nights and three days filled with square dancing, round dancing, country western dancing and educational seminars, the IAGSDC held their annual meeting.

Adding to the 46 member clubs already a part of the IAGSDC, the Board also voted to allow into its membership roster six new clubs: Cotton Pickin' Squares, Memphis, TN; Cream City Squares, Milwaukee, WI; Neon Squares, Las Vegas, NV; Minnesota Wild Roses, Minneapolis, MN; Sun Coast Wranglers, Tampa, FL; and Mountain Laurel Squares, Hartford, CT).

The first Gay and Lesbian square dance club was the South Florida Mustangs, founded in Miami in the late 1970's. Currently, clubs can be found in 23 states and three Canadian provinces, with several cities having more than one club. CCF scholarships

Milwaukee's Cream City Foundation has announced the availability of applications for the third annual John M. Cowles Memorial Scholarships. Once again, two \$500 scholarships will be awarded for the upcoming (1992-1993) academic year, which may be used by the recipients for tuition and other academic expenses.

One previous recipient of the award, Jason Dietenberger, referred to the CCF's scholarship program in this way: "(the) commitment of assisting the Gay youth of our community sends two messages. The first of which is a communication to our youth that established (Gay and Lesbian) persons are there to help them in times of need;" and second, that "without education, we have no defense against the oppression that we face as a disenfranchised group."

The scholarships were initiated by the CCF as a memorial to the late John M. Cowles, a community leader who died in January 1990. John had been an active

member of GAMMA (Milwaukee's Gay sports and social organization, and the driving force behind its popular volleyball league), as well as serving on the Board of Directors of the Cream City Foundation, providing his unique energy and drive to the Foundation's community center and other causes.

The Foundation will award the scholarships in two \$250 awards for each of the two primary semesters of the academic year (Fall 1992 and Spring 1993). Applicants must be entering their Junior or Senior year at an accredited college or university in the Metro Milwaukee area. Applicants must have a 3.0 GPA, have a demonstrated interest in the Gay/ Lesbian community, and be a U.S. citizen and Wisconsin resident.

'Teen Connections' looks at Gay youth

The 60- minute Teen Connection program on Sexual Orientation: Issues Facing Gay & Lesbian Youth will be rebroadcast statewide on Wisconsin Public Television on Tuesday, September 15th at 8pm. Gay and Lesbian counselors will be taking phone calls statewide on a toll-free number (1) 800-999- TEEN, but those calls will not be aired because the program is being rebroadcast.

A great many teen-agers feel uncomfortable discussing their sexuality, and talking about it can be even harder for youths who are discovering an attraction to members of the same sex.

Besides risking rejection by family members and friends, Gay and Lesbian teens also face an increasing amount of resentment, hatred and violence from heterosexuals acting out of fear bred by

ignorance.

The hour-long show features counselors and homosexual teens in an effort to give Gay youth direction they may not find in their communities.

One of the counselors on the program, Michael Lisowski, director of Gay Youth Milwaukee and a member of the Milwaukee AIDS Project says "In some cities there's a lot of support for Gay and Lesbian teens. Each teen has to go through his or her own type of coping, dealing with the issue of 'Well, I might be Gay...'''







Sex in the parks and police decoys: Entrapment?

There has been an unprecedented increase this summer in the use of undercover police decoys in the Milwaukee County Parks and in public washrooms throughout Milwaukee. As a result of police 'sting' operations, over 83 arrests have occurred at U.W.M. where police decoys loitered in a public washroom. The City of Wauwatosa and City of Cudahy have requested that the District Attorney issue criminal charges where undercover cops, who appear to be available for sex, make arrests in the parks. The District Attorney is reviewing numerous criminal charges issued as a result of a vice squad undercover 'sting' operation in public washrooms at a Milwaukee shopping mall.

What follows is only one example of several cases where a client is shocked to find himself arrested, in custody and facing criminal charges in the D.A.'s office.

My client (who I will call Carl) was about to leave a park when he spotted a handsome young man on the top of a bluff along the lake. Carl had seen the same young man in the park twenty minutes earlier. The man was in his mid-twenties with short black hair slicked back, wearing tight black spandex shorts, a revealing tank top muscle shirt, coordinated black sports shoes and carrying a small duffel bag. Carl cruises this area of the park to pick up guys and tries to get them to go to his house. He feels that sex is less dangerous (and more fun) at home. Twenty minutes later Carl learned that this young man was an undercover cop of a suburban police department.

Carl made eye contact with the officer, then walked down a wooded path about 50 feet. The cop followed. Carl walked further and the cop continued to follow. Then Carl stopped. The cop stopped and now they were close enough to talk. Carl was excited because he thought the guy was interested.

Carl: "How's it going?" The cop smiled and nodded. "What's your name?" Cop: "Frank." Carl: "Are you working, Frank?" Cop: "No. I'm unemployed." Carl: "Where do you live?" Cop: "Greenfield." Carl: "Greenfield? What are you doing here?" Cop: "I like to come down here to have a little fun."

Carl: "Do you feel like messing around?"

The cop nodded his head, which Carl took to mean, sure.

Carl: "There're too many people around here. Let's get out of here."

Carl walked for about three or four minutes down another wooded path to a secluded area where he thought no one would be around. Carl sat on a large rock, but the cop wanted to stand so Carl stood up.

Carl: "Are you Gay?" Cop: "Bisexual" Carl: "Do you have a girlfriend?" Cop: "No."

Now Carl made his move, with his outstretched hand he grazed the side and the hip of the cop, then touched lightly the cop's crotch. The cop touched Carl lightly on Carl's side at his belt. Carl touched the cop's chest above the drop of the tank top, then the waist and again the crotch, but this time more firmly.

Now the cop froze and dropped his hands to his side. Carl wondered if the guy was really bisexual. At first the guy seemed excited and now he seemed to freeze. Carl asked the cop, "Do you do this very often?" the cop said, "Not really too often." Carl asked, "We can go somewhere else if you're uncomfortable."

This time the cop didn't reply, but reached for his duffel bag and told Carl he was under arrest.

Carl was so shocked that, to this day, he does not remember whether the officer displayed his badge or showed any identification before Carl was told to put both hands behind his back and was hand cuffed.

When Carl regained his ability to speak he all but shouted, "For what?" Cop: "4th Degree Sexual Assault." Carl: "What?!" Cop: "4th Degree Sexual Assault. I didn't give you the consent." -Carl: "You did too give me the consent." Cop: "I did not."

Carl: "Did too!"

Cop: (No Answer.)

After releasing Carl from custody, Carl was ordered to appear in the office of the District Attorney of Milwaukee County where the matter was reviewed for the issuance of criminal charges. The next day, and after waiting from 8:30am to after 3pm, one of the few available Assistant District Attorney in the Sensitive Crimes Unit reviewed the case. A decision was made not to file criminal charges, but on the condition that Carl would plead no contest to a non- criminal civil forfeiture at the Suburban Municipal Court and pay a fine of approximately \$200.

Is this entrapment? In my opinion, definitely. Did Carl make the wrong decision by deciding not to fight it? In my opinion, definitely not.

If Carl had not gone for the 'deal,' criminal charges would have been issued. Fighting for his 'day in court' would cost Carl substantial attorney's fees. Carl would also experience substantial emotional trauma and stress while the case was processed through the criminal justice system of Milwaukee County that contains thousands of other pending cases. This would affect Carl at his place of work and in his friendships with others. Perhaps eighteen months later, the case might come to trial and a 'jury of his peers' would listen to Carl's word weighed against the testimony of the police officer. The police officer would testify in a professional monotone, now in full uniform (not spandex shorts). Perhaps Carl would remember precisely what happened eighteen months ago, but more likely than not he might become confused and verbally stumble under the cross examination of the D.A. because he has never testified in court before.


Carl's 'jury of his peers' (and probably some Judges) might find Carl's testimony to be incomprehensible if not detestable. Carl's chances of 'winning' are less than 50/50. Even if the jury returned a verdict of not guilty, Carl loses. After the glow of Carl's not guilty 'victory' fades, Carl would realize that this ordeal has cost him eighteen months of emotional hell, substantial attorney's fees, and a grave injustice to go through what he did to obtain justice. This assumes he wins in court.

Carl made the right decision. If Carl decided to fight this case in Court, he faced an uphill battle. His common sense understanding of the law of 'entrapment' is quite different from the legal definition of 'entrapment.' There are two questions of fact when the defense of entrapment is raised. First, did the police officer induce the accused to commit the offense as charged; and second, if so, was the accused ready and willing without persuasion to commit the offense? The accused must produce some evidence that the inducement occurred. The burden of the prosecution is to then show beyond a reasonable doubt the accused had a prior disposition to commit the offense. In short, an entrapment defense requires the joining of police initiation of criminal activity and the absence of a predisposition on the part of the defendant to engage in the activity prior to the entrapment.

Can you imagine talking to a jury and trying to explain that your were engaging the police officer in small talk and foreplay because you really wanted to get him to come home with you where you could really 'get it on'? Would you want to explain to a Judge in a public court of law because the cop wore tight spandex shorts

The Gay Bands of America also will meet in San Francisco over the same weekend, and will present a 'Battle of the Swing Bands' concert as part of the Gay Games anniversary celebration.

The Gay Games were founded by the late Tom Waddell, M.D. — who competed in the decathlon for the United States at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City — as a celebration of Lesbians and Gay men and as a 'peoples olympics' open to everybody regardless of sexual orientation. The theme of the inaugural Games, which was held from August 28 through September 5, 1982, was 'Challenge '82.' The Gay Games IV theme, 'Unity '94', is an expression of the founder's dream that inclusion be a cornerstone of the Games.

Gay Games IV will take place in New York City during the third week of June, 1994. Gay Games IV is an Olympic- style event featuring 15,000 athletes from 40 countries participating in over 25 individual and team competitions, ranging from track & field, swimming, diving, basketball, softball and cycling to triathlon, volleyball and wrestling. Five hundred thousand spectators are expected to view the Games, which will be held in various facilities throughout New York City. 'Unity '94' will also feature 5,000 artists in a simultaneous Cultural Festival. Gay Games IV is expected to generate \$111 million in economic activity for the City of New York, according to the City's Office of the Deputy Mayor for Finance and Economic Development.



Vancouver, British Columbia was the host city for Gay Games III in 1990. Some 1,300 athletes from 12 nations competed in Gay Games I; 3,500 from 16 nations in Gay Games II; and 7,250 from 30 nations in Gay Games III.

and coordinated his shoes, duffel bag and tank top, that he was 'signaling' that he consented to 'get it on'? Do you think most jurors would be sympathetic to your attorney's claim that the cops are "creating crime" not "solving crimes" by using undercover police decoys in the parks, when the D.A. argues that citizens have every right to enjoy our public parks without risking coming upon homosexuals engaging in sex in public? Do you think that the average juror will identify with the parent who walks with a child in the park and might come upon sex in public? Or do you think that the average juror will identify with the person who cruises the parks for pickups?

In my experience, it is unlikely that the police officer touches a defendant in the groin or that the police officer exposes himself in the park. The undercover cop will wear provocative clothing, make eye contact, engage in small talk, and in every other way signal that he is available. The arrests usually follow immediately after the defendant touches the cop in the groin or after the defendant exposes himself.

In many cases, the police conduct may be awful, but most juries are likely to conclude that the police conduct was lawful. I have seen many clients' marriages and relationships disrupted and end after they spend 12 hours and more in police custody. I have seen men lose their jobs and ruin their careers after an arrest on a "morals charge." Most are emotionally scarred, and some carry with them the stigma of a criminal conviction for life.

The public is offended by sex in public. Polls indicate that the public is becoming more accepting of Gay sexual orientation and that citizens should not suffer discrimination as a result. Polls do not indicate that the public consents to sex in public "in their face," – homosexual or heterosexual.

In my opinion, if you are not clear where the line is drawn between lawfully cruising the parks and unlawfully initiating sex in public, you are best advised to stay as far away from the line as possible. Or you may find your claim of 'entrapment' weighed against the testimony of a professional witness and uniformed police officer before a jury not of your peers.

Postscript: Carl's wrists were hand cuffed so tightly that the cuffs drew blood. After Carl's arrest and release, the officer left to go back out into the field to make more arrests. The handcuffs were not sterilized or even wiped. Fortunately, Carl has tested HIV negative in the past, but now he is scared that he could possible be infected if prior men who were arrested were hand cuffed as tightly as he was. He's paid his \$200 fine, but he plans to get tested a couple times over the next year.

Don't let Labor Day work your last Gay nerve

Ah, Labor Day, when America reflects on a job well done (working hard or hardly working??), when burnt-out career queers escape to Gay get-a-ways for the weekend to NOT think about the very thing they're memorializing, LABOR, or as Maynard G. Krebbs says cringingly, WORK!!! Or they go to an amusement park and do the wild thing with their lover in the dark rides, go up (and down!) on the roller coaster, and carouse on the carousel. Drag queens will flock to the Hall of Mirrors. Urban cowboys will hang out at the pony rides.

Now it's time for your history lesson, kids; take notes, because there will be a pop quiz later: In 1881, Peter McGuire founded the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners. In 1882 he became known as the Father of Labor Day when he proposed, "a day which shall be labor's... an occasion devoted to the industrial spirit, the great vital force of every nation." Inspired by McGuire, on Sept. 5, 1882, 10,000 union members marched in New York City in a display of solidarity. "We honor the toilers of the earth and pay homage to those who from rude nature have delved and carved all the comfort and grandeur we behold," said McGuire guite grandly. And in 1894 Congress recognized Labor Day as a national holiday. But nearly a century later, do we carefree queers care about all this? Absolutely not. 

Finally, danceworks plans to operate as an independent body producing the works of as many dance companies and independent choreographers from the area as possible.





different way with moon madness and full moon contests.




