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

Kentucky Sodomy law struck down

Frankfort, KY - On September 25, the Supreme Court of Kentucky ruled the state's sodomy law unconstitutional because it infringes on the rights to privacy and to equal protection under the law as guaranteed in the Kentucky constitution. The decision came in a 4-3 vote of the justices.

"We need not sympathize, agree with or even understand the sexual preference of homosexuals in order to recognize their right to equal treatment before the bar of criminal justice." wrote Justice Charles Leibson in the majority opinion. Just because some citizens may find certain acts of extramarital intercourse objectionable, that "does not provide a rational basis for criminalizing the sexual preference of homosexuals."

Justice Leibson noted that the state of Kentucky no longer criminalized adultery, fornication or "deviate" sexual intercourse between heterosexuals. Therefore, maintaining a law which criminalizes sexual behavior between consenting adults of the same sex is intended to impose moral values and is clearly discriminatory, according to the court.

Kentucky's law, like that of seven other states, specifically forbade homosexual sodomy. Sixteen more states and the District of Columbia criminalize both homosexual and heterosexual sodomy. Earlier this year, an appeals court in Texas voided that state's sodomy law. A decision by the Texas Supreme Court is expected early next year.

The US Supreme Court in its 1986 Bowers v. Hardwick decision rejected the argument that Georgia's sodomy law was an infringement of the right to privacy under the US Constitution. State courts, however, have the right to interpret their state constitutions differently.

Local trials of Salk vaccine not confirmed

Milwaukee [In Step] - In Step has learned that contrary to reports in the mainstream press, clinical trials by Wisconsin residents of the new Salk vaccine for HIV infection have not yet been confirmed.

AIDS service organizations have been flooded with phone calls from people wanting to participate in clinical trials of the experimental vaccine developed by Jonas Salk, inventor of the polio vaccine.

But while personnel at the Wisconsin Community-Based Research Consortium have met with Salk researchers to inquire about the vaccine, no date has been set to actually begin clinical trials. Tim Kennedy, spokesman for the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), told In Step that AIDS service groups in Wisconsin expect to receive official notice about use of the Salk vaccine by the end of this year.

The Wisconsin Community-Based Research Consortium, which is affiliated with ARCW, is the central group coordinating clinical trials of all new HIV/AIDS drugs in the state. The Consortium maintains the most comprehensive database of potential participants for such clinical trials. Anyone unsure of whether they are included in the database may call the Consortium at (414) 273-1991

The Salk vaccine, unlike other vaccines administered to prevent diseases like polio and influenza, is given to those already infected with HIV. Early tests on animals and a few human patients indicate the vaccine may help reduce the level of HIV in the bloodstream by triggering a stronger reaction by the immune system.

Kennedy said that when and if clinical trials with the Salk vaccine are confirmed for Wisconsinites with HIV, an announcement will be made and potential participants registered with the Consortium's database will be informed.

United Way votes on Scout funding Oct. 13

Milwaukee [In Step] - Queer Scouts plans to make its presence felt on October 13 when the Board of Directors of the United Way of Greater Milwaukee votes on a resolution to continue funding area Boy Scout troops.

The Board meeting itself is closed to the public, but members of Queer Scouts plan to be outside United Way headquarters at 225 W. Vine Street at 7am that morning, a half hour prior to the beginning of the meeting. Dan Fons, a spokesman for Queer Scouts, said those present would "greet" Board members as they arrive.

Queer Scouts/Milwaukee was formed to lobby United Way to reconsider channeling hundreds of thousands of dollars in charity funds to local Boy Scout troops because the Boy Scouts of America excludes Gays from membership and from leadership positions. In a meeting with United Way officials September 10, Queer Scouts outlined many legal and ethical reasons why the Boy Scouts policy is untenable and why it should not be tacitly endorsed by United Way.

Despite this appeal, the Executive Committee of the United Way Board voted to recommend continued funding of the Boy Scouts. The full board will vote on that recommendation October 13. Queer Scouts is sending informational packets about the controversy to individual members of the 36-person board to "make sure they are well-informed if they vote to continue funding.'

Fons told In Step that if the full board approves Boy Scout funding, Queer Scouts "will keep the pressure on United Way all through its Fall campaign." They will seek the support of other community groups, organize a boycott of donations to United Way and encourage people to support other charities which do not endorse discrimination. Queer Scouts also plans to closely monitor programs and policies of the Boy Scouts over the next vear.

House guts D.C. partnership law

Washington - Responding to a 235-173 vote in the House. Congress on Sept. 24 acted to postpone enactment of the District of Columbia's domestic partners law until at least next year.

The action bars the District from using any federal or locally generated funds this coming fiscal year to implement its domestic partnership ordinance, formally called the Health Benefits Expansion Act of 1992.

The district act, approved by the city council and signed by Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly last spring, would allow unmarried same-and opposite-sex couples to register with the city as 'domestic partners' and would allow partners of city employees to qualify for the city's health insurance benefits. It also offers tax breaks to private employers following the city's example.

Earlier this year, Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) successfully placed the amendment gutting the local law on the district's fiscal 1993 appropriations bill. But after a House/ Senate conference committee struck the Helms proposal, the House voted 235-173 Sept. 24 to put the Helms language back in.

The Helms amendment will now effectively block any implementation of the local law for the coming fiscal year. The District, fearing such an action, had announced earlier this year that it would not begin registering couples until January 1993. That action will now be postponed indefinitely.

The House vote came during debate on the D.C. appropriations bill when Rep. Tom DeLay (R.Texas) won on his motion to send the bill back to the conference committee with instructions that the Helms language be reinserted.

Somewhat surprisingly, the action was

taken with little of the vitriol that usually fills the chamber when matters affecting Gays and Lesbians are debated. Before the House vote. DeLay only questioned the District's non-voting Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton (D) about the local law's provisions for registration and 'de-registration' and the potential cost to D.C. taxpayers.

When the vote came down, backers of the District's home rule and of Gay and Lesbian rights — predominantly Democrats with a handful of Republicans tossed in — started out leading the vote. They began losing ground, however, as more and more Democratic lawmakers, including nine who had already voted, began defecting to the other side, securing the 62-vote victory for the motion. After it became clear that the Helms language would be part of the final bill, Rep. Barney Frank (D- Mass.), who had not earlier taken to the floor, delivered an impassioned, somewhat lengthy speech to the chamber. He noted that Gay rights backers had been told to keep a low profile before the vote so as to ensure the law's survival. That strategy, he insisted, had failed because of the continued skittishness of wavering Democrats. LET'S DO IT

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In his pointed speech, Frank expressed disappointment with colleagues who had told him privately that they supported the D.C. law, but were fearful that in this election season support for what conservatives were tagging 'homosexual marriages' could cost them re-election in the fall. Had the vote been taken by secret ballot, or had it been closer, the law would have survived, he argued.

Magic quits AIDS panel; Bush inaction attacked

Washington, DC – Basketball star Magic Johnson resigned from the National Commission on AIDS September 25, charging that the Bush administration has "utterly ignored" the Commission's proposals and that Bush himself has "dropped the ball" in the fight against AIDS.

Word of Johnson's dissatisfaction had circulated for some time, but the vehemence of his attack on Bush surprised everyone. The day after resigning, Johnson publicly threw his support to Democratic Presidential candidate Bill Clinton.

Johnson's letter to Bush read: "As I think you know, along with my fellow commission members, I have been increasingly frustrated by the lack of support, and even opposition, of your Administration to our recommendations... I cannot in good conscience continue to serve on a commission whose important work is so utterly ignored by your Administration."

"No matter how good the team may be," Johnson wrote Bush, "I said it won't win the championship without the owner fully in the game. I am disappointed that you dropped the ball, and your Administration is not doing everything that it must to fight this disease."

A week after resigning from the AIDS Commission, Johnson announced his intention to rejoin the Los Angeles Lakers. He assured the press that his AIDS activism would continue, however, citing the video about AIDS he recently made with his friend Arsenio Hall. He plans to focus on efforts he believes can really make a difference. Johnson said he expects no federal action on AIDS for at least the next four months, an obvious reference to Bush's remaining time in office.

"COOKING THE BOOKS"

Judy Smith, a White House press secretary, immediately set about doing damage control, telling the media that the Bush administration had spent \$4.3 billion on AIDS this year alone. But an analysis of federal AIDS spending released by the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) contradicts that claim.

Tim McFeeley, Executive Director of HRCF, accused the Bush administration of "cooking the books." He said: "In fact, only \$841 million is budgeted for AIDS research this year at the National Institutes of Health... Only \$480 million is spent on AIDS prevention at the Centers for Disease Control."

"George Bush creates the impression of billions of dollars in AIDS spending by including the funding levels for entitlement spending on AIDS care, spending for programs such as veteran's benefits, Medicare and Medicaid," said McFeeley. "This funding is not included in the totals for any other disease. It is not AIDS research and prevention spending. It is a ruse to mislead Congress and the public, a blatant deception that has cost American lives."

McFeeley does not deny that spending for AIDS under entitlement programs is skyrocketing: "This is the legacy of Reagan, Bush and Quayle," he charged. "Hundreds of thousands of poor Americans have been infected with HIV during the last twelve years while our leaders have distorted their records and denied the funds needed for research and effective treatments and a cure."

COMMISSION CRICIZES BUSH TOO

The AIDS Commission as a whole has also been sharply critical of Bush. The bipartisan panel issued a report in June charging that Bush and the Department of Health and Human Services "have failed to fully meet their responsibilities in leading the national response to the monumental human suffering and economic loss from the HIV/AIDS epidemic." The Commission labeled the Bush response "tragically insufficient."

Commission members are particularly angry that none of their many recommendations for meeting the AIDS crisis have been implemented. In its own report, the Commission charged that:

 the Bush administration has failed to create a mechanism for coordinating and implementing a national anti-AIDS plan;

• it has reduced money allocated for prevention at a time when infection rates

continue to rise;

• it has denied requests for increased funding for drug treatment programs and refused even to consider the distribution of clean needles as a prevention measure;

• it has retained the ban on immigrants and visitors who may have HIV/AIDS; and

• it has stymied any efforts at a more candid discussion of sexual matters in AIDS education programs.

The Commission also faulted President Bush personally for failing to convey a sense of urgency about AIDS to the American public or to his own domestic policy staff and administrators.

Some people resented all the attention Magic Johnson received when he announced to the world he was HIV-positive and was appointed to the AIDS Commission. But because of his celebrity status, Johnson's resignation and his open criticism of Bush may induce many people to look closer at the Bush administration's record on AIDS.

California gets rights

Sacramento, CA – California became the seventh state in the union to pass legislation protecting Gays from discrimination on the job when Republican Governor Pete Wilson signed the bill into law on September 25.

Wilson's action took Gays and Lesbians in California by surprise because the governor had vetoed a similar bill one year ago. Activists expected a veto of this year's bill as well and had planned major protests in Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles. But the protests were converted into joyful celebrations instead.

California now joins Wisconsin, Massachusetts, Hawaii, Connecticut, New Jersey and Vermont as states which prohibit job discrimination based on sexual orientation. Some of the other states also prohibit such discrimination in housing, credit, government contracts and public accommodations, but the California bill is limited to employment. California is by far the largest, most populous contd. on page 10

jurisdiction to prohibit Gay-related job bias.

WHAT IT SAYS

The California law covers all state and private workers but it exempts churches, non-profit corporations and businesses with less than five employees.

The new law differs from the bill Wilson vetoed last year in this way: complaints will be registered as violations of the state's labor code, which mandates civil action and penalties, rather than as violations of the Fair Employment and Housing Act, which mandates criminal prosecution and penalties.

Wilson argued that civil action on complaints would be more efficient and prevent costly litigation for all parties. The chief sponsor of the bill, Assemblyman Terry Friedman, agreed and said he was confident the new enforcement mechanism would be as effective as the original proposal.

While California Gays and Lesbians savored their unexpected victory, the Rev. Lou Sheldon, leader of the anti-Gay Traditional Values Coalition based in Anaheim, said that Gov. Wilson had "opened the door for all kinds of special rights for perverted, sexually addicted people." Sheldon claimed the law would "protect sex with animals and the rape of children as forms of political expression."

The California law, signed one day after the Kentucky Supreme Court voided that state's homosexual sodomy statute (see related story), brought renewed hope to Gay activists.

"I'm very optimistic," said Tom Stoddard, a Gay rights attorney who headed the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund. "This development, in combination with yesterday's development, in combination with the political signs that the Republicans are throwing aside the family values message, suggests that the Gay rights movement has finally tipped the scales."

AIDS Walk raises stunning \$404,000

Milwaukee – More than \$404,000 was raised by almost 4,500 people who gathered along the shore of Lake Michigan September 20 for the 3rd Annual Wisconsin AIDS Walk. The record amount raised to benefit AIDS care and education throughout the state far exceeded the original goal of \$300,000.

Ninety-six percent of all contributions pledged had been turned in by the end of the AIDS Walk that day. For the second year in a row, Linda Molitor raised the most money of any individual walker with over \$5,000 pledged. But the "Scream Team" was the Walk's top money raiser, bringing in almost \$10,000 in pledges.

Honorary Co-Chair of this year's AIDS Walk, Brewers' star Paul Molitor, set the tone for the day at a Leadership Breakfast held before the Walk.

"AIDS touches all of our lives," Molitor said. "More than 12,000 people throughout Wisconsin have been infected with HIV...And each year, many more men, women and children witness first hand the devastation of AIDS. Across the country, someone becomes infected with HIV every eleven minutes. We are losing people to this disease in the prime of their life who are making important contributions to business, labor, the arts, and yes, even professional sports. There can no longer be any doubt that AIDS affects us all."

"We desperately need organizations like the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin and the Madison AIDS Support Network to develop innovative and aggressive HIV prevention programs," said Molitor. "We must continue to build support services for people living with HIV disease as well. Today, through the Wisconsin AIDS Walk, we will be directly helping 15 agencies throughout Wisconsin deliver vital support services."



As Northeast Wisconsin's AIDS Service Organization, Center Project of Green Bay has provided Anonymous HIV Testing & Counseling, Education and Life Care Services for nine counties. Since 1985, we have expanded our operation to include the Fox Valley AIDS Project of Appleton, and a Life Care Services outreach at the Manitowoc County Public Health Dept. During the last 12 month period, our on-site clinic has provided free HIV antibody tests to approximately 1,833 individuals. In addition, our mobile testing program has provided testing & counseling to approximately 305 individuals at various locations throughout our service area. If you would like to make an appointment to be tested, please call one of our offices.

Center Project will also provide education for any group or organization upon request. During the last 12 months, our educators have given more than 360 presentations with over 12,000 participants. The local television stations and newspapers often request our educators to address AIDS related issues in the news. Center Project employs four case managers in the Life Care Services (LCS) program. This program is currently managing about 100 HIV positive individuals in the area. In the last three month period, the LCS program has made more than 500 referrals. As a part of the LCS program, CPI also offers a support group for HIV positive persons, another for women, and a third group for family and friends. MASSACHUSETTS GOVERNOR EXTENDS BENEFITS TO GAYS

Boston, MA — Republican Governor William Weld has signed an executive order giving Gay state employees in Massachusetts the same spousal bereavement rights that are available to married employees. It entitles Gay workers to take up to four days paid leave in case of the death of a partner. Weld also signed a measure giving Gays and Lesbians throughout the state the right to visit their partners in hospitals or prisons.

Weld, a moderate Republican, has proved to be a staunch supporter of Gay and Lesbian rights. He is the first governor to set up a state commission to investigate the problems of Gay and Lesbian youth.

NEW JERSEY COURT VOIDS HATE SPEECH LAW

New Brunswick, NJ — State Superior Court Judge Joseph E. Sadofski ruled September 25 that New Jersey's hate crime law is unconstitutional because it infringes on the right of free speech. The law adds extra penalties to those found guilty of crimes that are motivated by

speeches. Then, the seemingly endless line of people exited the park and began the 6.2 mile route along the lakefront. The last participants re-entered the park three hours later when entertainment by Gerard and Modern Art was in full swing.

Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, thanked the many volunteers and corporate sponsors whose assistance made the 3rd Annual AIDS Walk such a success. Among the sponsors were the Miller Brewing Company, Bank One, Aurora Health Care, WTMJ-TV (whose weathercaster, Paul Joseph, along with wife Judy, were Masters of Ceremony in the park) and Time Insurance.

An emotional rendering of Dionne Warwicke's song "That's What Friends Are For" concluded the afternoon. bias. The New Jersey Attorney General will appeal the ruling to the state Supreme Court.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court made a similar ruling against Wisconsin's hate crime law in June. Attorney General Jim Doyle is appealing that decision to the US Supreme Court. However, the US Supreme Court itself overturned a St. Paul, Minnesota hate crime ordinance on free speech grounds last June.

U.S. PARK SERVICE WON'T PROTECT GAY WORKERS

Washington, DC — The National Park Service, which guards and operates many of America's civil rights monuments, has refused to extend its anti-discrimination guidelines to include the category of sexual orientation. This conflicts with recent statements by President Bush who claims that his administration would not tolerate anti-Gay discrimination.

Current Park Service policy prohibits job bias based on sex, age, race, religion, national origin or disability. A move by the agency's western regional office, based in San Francisco, to add both sexual harassment and sexual orientation to the policy was rebuffed by the National Park Service in Washington, DC.


CAMBRIDGE APPROVES DOMESTIC PARTNERS LAW

Cambridge, MA – Cambridge, Massachusetts recently became the 19th municipality in the U.S. to enact a domestic partners registration ordinance. Unmarried couples, whether straight or Gay, can register with the city as partners and gain certain legal rights previously limited only to married couples.

The registered domestic partners of city employees will be eligible to obtain coverage under the employee's health insurance plan. The law also guarantees unmarried Gay and straight couples visitation rights to their partners in hospitals and prisons.



a weeklong videotape surveillance sting allegedly caught the men engaging in homosexual acts in restrooms on the post. Both officers and noncommissioned officers were discharged. Some of those dismissed plan legal action.

Miriam Ben-Shalom, President of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual veterans of America, expressed outrage at the discharges: "I cannot believe that the Army has nothing better to do with its time and resources than to set up a sting operation in a latrine...I certainly can't endorse such public sex, but because we are desperately close to eliminating this ban [against Gays in the military], I think they are trying to ferret out as many Gay men...ås they possibly can now."

GUS VAN SANT JOINS OREGON BATTLE

Salem, OR — Gay film director Gus Van Sant, currently shooting Even Cowgirls. Get the Blues in Oregon, has entered the debate over the anti-Gay referendum, Measure 9, on the November ballot. The measure defines homosexuality as "abnormal and perverse" and prohibits any state agencies from "promoting" or "facilitating" it in any way.

"It might get to the point where people like me can't shoot their films," said Van Sant, whose movies like **Cowgirls** and **My Own Private Idaho** contain Gay characters and themes. He said the referendum was worded so broadly that government bodies could potentially deny work and business permits to filmmakers like himself. "I think it would give us a poor image that might affect people coming here," said Van Sant, who is a native Oregonian.

The Oregon Film and Video Office reports that a record 15 feature length films have been shot in Oregon just this year, bringing \$60 million into the state economy. Tourism and convention officials report that some large groups are warning they may withdraw their conventions from Oregon if Measure 9 is passed. Anti-Gay proponents of Measure 9 say the threats amount to economic blackmail.

LESBIAN BILLBOARD CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED

San Francisco, CA – The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation in San Francisco is about to launch a statewide billboard campaign highlighting a Lesbian couple, one of whom is pregnant, with the tag line: "Another Traditional Family." The effort is intended to increase public awareness of Lesbians while challenging the traditional definition of family. The project is being co-sponsored by the Los Angeles Lesbian Visibility Task Force.

GAY EMPLOYEES AT AT&T ORGANIZING

In August, delegates from 18 chapters of Lesbian and Gay United Employees of AT&T (LEAGUE) nationwide voted Kathleen Dermody and Arturo Nava to be co-chairs of their organization. LEAGUE's goal is to foster an inclusive and supportive work environment for Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals at AT&T.

Helms loses on two issues

Washington — Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), for the first time, has been defeated on his annual bid to bar federal funds from being used in HIV_{*} prevention programs allowing the distribution of clean needles to intravenous drug users.

The surprising 69-29 vote came during debate on the Labor, Health and Human Services Appropriation bill Sept. 17 when the Senate passed a substitute amendment from Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-Mass.) which gutted Helms' needle proposal.

The North Carolina conservative had argued that the use of needle distribution contd. on page 16




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

programs to stem the spread of HIV among IV drug users only promoted drug use and addiction. In previous years, Helms has repeatedly won similar amendments by overwhelming margins.

BOY SCOUTS AMENDMENT

He was also defeated by a 49-49 tie vote in the Senate Sept. 22 on an eleventh-hour attempt to bar federal assistance to charities attempting to change the Boy Scouts of America's prohibition of Gay Scouts and counselors.

The Helms amendment, introduced to the Defense Appropriations bill, would have prohibited federal assistance to any charity seeking to change the Boy Scouts policy. The proposal was aimed at the United Way of America, which has seen several local chapters, including branches in San Francisco and Chicago, vote to withhold donations to the Boy Scouts until the organization removes its ban on Gay scouts and counselors.

The United Way of America opposed the Helms Amendment, saying in a letter. to Sen. Edward Kennedy (D- Mass.) that the charity "and the 1,400 local United Ways nationwide are committed to nondiscrimination."

An identical Helms amendment was approved by a voice vote in the Senate Sept. 17 during debate on a different appropriations bill, but is expected to be rejected by a House/Senate conference ironing out a final version of the proposal.

Sensing that his anti-Gay amendment would be killed in the conference – as has become customary with his other riders over the past few years – Helms had threatened to attach the measure to every appropriations bill passing through the Senate until he was granted a roll call vote on his amendment. Had it passed by a wide margin, the Helms proposal would have had a better chance of making it onto the final version of the bill.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell (D-Maine) agreed to give Helms the straight up- or-down vote on the Defense bill if he agreed to abide by the outcome of that vote. With the 49-49 tie, the porposal was effectively killed for this appropriations season, much to the delight of Gay and Lesbian activists.

During debate on the proposal, Helms trotted out what he characterized as evidence that Gays and Lesbians 'recruit' children into homosexuality, quoting from several Gay and Lesbian publications and making repeated reference to the North American Man/Boy Love Association and how it is allowed to march in the San Francisco Gay and Lesbian Freedom Day Parade.

"With so many in the homosexual community advocating sex with children," he said, "do we really want the taxpayers' money being used to force the Boy Scouts to allow homosexuals to serve as role models for our children, or to give them the opportunity to develop trusting relationships with young, impressionable little boys?"







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Gay & Lesbian Vote '92; Congress in the sights

An Election Year Series By Cliff O'Neill

The writing is on the wall. Come January, Gay and Lesbian Americans will have significantly more support in Congress than ever before. More, perhaps, then some imagined possible.

While dozens of races for the House and Senate are still keeping both supporters and opponents of Gay rights glued to their pollsters through election day, Gay political onlookers already have reasons to be cheerful.

"Overall," says Kevin Layton, associate political director for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, "this is a tremendous year of opportunity for Gay and Lesbian Americans."

Regardless of the outcome of the presidential election and several of the closer congressional contests, more backers of Gay and Lesbian rights will likely be swept into office this year than in any single election before.

In large measure this is due to the decennial redistricting process which this year saw the creation of a record number of congressional seats especially carved out for minority representation. Thanks to the implementation of the voting Rights Act this year, the Congressional Black and Hispanic caucuses will each double in size in the 103rd Congress.

And, as virtually all the minority members of the House are staunch supporters of Gay and Lesbian equality, the number of names on the Gay and Lesbian rights bill will likely swell as a result.

With few exceptions, one doesn't have to look very hard to understand why the influx of these members will have the added impact of bolstering support for Gays and Lesbians on the Hill.

"We are adding members who have experienced discrimination first hand," says Layton. "These legislators understand what we're talking about."

MINORITY POWER

The statistics are remarkable. Presently, of the 26 African Americans in the House, all but three are co-sponsors of the federal Gay and Lesbian rights bill. And of those, only one has what would be considered an anti-Gay voting record, Rep. Gary Franks (R-Conn.), the caucus' only Republican.

Factoring in retirements and primary defeats, that number is expected to grow by at least 21 members, of which 98 percent have long-standing records of support for Gay and lesbian rights and have pledged to co-sponsor the bill upon its reintroduction next year.

While not as uniformly supportive, members of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus likewise have a history of supporting Gay and Lesbian Americans with word and deed, and they too will see an increase in their numbers in the next Congress.

Presently, there are 13 representatives in the Hispanic Caucus, eight of which are Gay rights bill co-sponsors. Of the remaining five, two are non-voting delegates from Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands and two others have generally pro-Gay voting records. The sole anti-Gay vote in the bunch, Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (R-Fla.), is also the group's only Republican and its only Cuban American.

The new Congress likely will see seven new members of the Hispanic caucus, of which six will either become bill co-sponsors or generally pro-Gay votes in the chamber. The sole hold out is expected to come again from Miami's conservative Cuban American community, Florida state Sen. Lincoln Diaz-Balart (R).

These incoming Hispanic and Black House members, plus a handful more shoo-ins for office among Asian and Native Americans, will result in a fortification of support for Gay and Lesbian Americans in the halls of Congress next year.

Act's new minority seats alone will bring in a bare minimum of 20 new minority co-sponsors above and beyond those on the bill now.

Considering that Gay and Lesbian political activists are looking at a realistic scenario of coming out of the elections with a net gain of 30 new House co-sponsors — assuming some key incumbents win their races — the broad impact minorities in Congress will have on the future of Gay rights is clear.

"Right now we have 109 members on the bill." adds Layton. "Come Jan. 4, 1993, we could be only 58 votes away from a simple majority in the House... and that doesn't even count the supportive members who for one reason or another haven't co-sponsored the bill, despite the fact that they support it."

As the House bill gains support and state legislatures pass Gay and Lesbian rights laws, movement is also expected on the -Senate side, where presently 17 senators are co-sponsors. In the new Congress, if polls hold steady, Gays can reasonably expect somewhere in the vicinity of 23 Senate co- sponsors next year.

And while still far from the 60 votes that would be needed to overcome a Senate filibuster, that puts Gay activists well on the road to what by 1994 will be a 20-year goal; equal civil rights protections for Gay and Lesbian Americans by the year 2000.

National 'Get Out the Vote' campaign

Washington, DC — 'Come Out Voting,' the ground breaking 30 second television spot urging Lesbian and Gay young adults to register and vote was seen by millions of Americans on September 23rd Cable News Network broadcast of ''Crossfire,'' the nightly public affairs program.

The spot features young Lesbians and Gay men in a variety of social settings urging their peers to vote. At the beginning of the spot, written copy appears on the screen which reads, "Because of who we love, the world calls us Queer." Then, various participants in the spot say: "Our rights, our lives, are being challenged every day. As Americans, we can do something about it – Vote! If we don't vote, others will decide our futures for us. Voting equals power, power equals change. Your vote will make a difference. Come Out Voting. Register today.''

"The ad has been accepted as a public service spot by over 50 stations around the country." reports Tim McCarthy, national coordinator of the Come Out Voting Coalition. "In addition, millions of viewers have seen the spot during the CNN program, and on a Fox television network news broadcast concerning the increasing impact of Lesbian and Gay issues in the presidential campaign."

The ad was produced for the Come Out Voting Coalition, a group organized by several national organizations, including the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, NGLTF, ACT UP and Queer Nation. The Triangle

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Institute, an educational organization, along with Terry Watanabe and Stonewall Community Foundation, funded the project, in memory of Randy Klose, the late Co-Chair of the Board of the Human Rights Campaign Fund.

"This is a critical election for all Lesbian and Gay Americans," Tim McFeeley of the Human Rights Campaign Fund noted. "At the Presidential level and Congressional level, and at the state and local level, decisions are being made that affect all of our lives. We need to do everything possible to make sure that our community is registered and that it votes."

The ad is part of a multi- program effort underway to increase the Lesbian and Gay vote in November's election — including a grassroots distribution plan for the 'Come Out Voting' public service ad, a 'Come Out Voting' poster, and an action kit for registering and delivering Lesbian and Gay votes. The poster was conceived and photographed by Kevin Kendall of Impact Studios and designed by Thomas Drymon.

The coalition is encouraging individuals



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
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and groups around the country to sponsor the ad and encourage local stations around the country to sponsor the ad and encourage local stations to air it. "One radio station in Arizona, an ABC affiliate, is airing the audio portion of the video," notes Gregory King, Communications Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund.

McCarthy noted that local activists around the country can play a critical role in placing the 'Come Out Voting' ad. "We will provide copies of the ad, the poster, and the Action Kit to any groups that want them and are willing to demand that local stations carry them." Telegenics, a company that supplies Lesbian and Gay bars and clubs with music videos, has agreed to send the television spot to hundreds of Lesbian and Gay establishments before the election. The 'Come out Voting' poster will be distributed widely as well.

The non-partisan ad does not refer to any specific candidate, party or referendum. McCarthy indicated that Columbus was chosen because of the critical role Ohio is playing in the national election — both the Bush and Clinton campaigns have targeted the state — and the emerging strength of the Lesbian and Gay community there.



LILY TOMLIN FEATURED ON "IN THE LIFE"

Comedian Lily Tomlin and the a cappella singing group the Flirtations will be featured in the second installment of the new Gay/Lesbian variety program, In the Life, WMVS, the PBS affiliate in Milwaukee, has scheduled the show for November 18 at 11:30p.m. WHA in Madison has not yet scheduled the program.

In the show, Tomlin recalls her friendship with Gay film historian Vito Russo, author of The Celluloid Closet, and the Flirtations sing several songs. Kate Clinton is the host. The program's format has been reduced to a half hour. In January, producers plan to make the show a monthly series. Dick Sargent, the Gay actor who played Darrin Stevens on Bewitched, will be featured.

IN STEP JOINS GAY MEDIA EFFORT

The Fall, 1992 issue includes profiles on Gay historian and novelist Gore Vidal, on outgoing Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Urvashi Vaid, and on David Mixner, an openly Gay man who is a major political strategist for the Clinton-Gore campaign.

The cover story is an interview with actor Rupert Everett and dozens of features on the arts, health and other lifestyle issues are featured. Out costs \$4.95.

GAY NEWSPAPER IN EUROPE TO FOLD

According to the Outlines News Service, the Paris based **Gay Pied Hebdo** will shut down in late October after fifteen years as one of Europe's best known Gay publications.

Newsstand sales have fallen in recent years and "We have not been able to turn this trend around or maintain a sufficient level of sales to ensure a balance," Managing Editor Gerard Vappereau told the paper's employees in September.

Staff members wrote in one of the final issues that the paper's demise will "deal an irreversible blow" to the rights and visibility of Gays and Lesbians in European society. **Gay Pied** was particularly valuable in publishing crucial news about AIDS that is not available elsewhere.





I am also optimistic when I think about how many incredibly wonderful and supportive straight people I know. It used to be that, really, the only people I was close to were Lesbians. And now, not only have I acquired some Gay male friends (which is harder than it might seem in an all-encompassingly segregated town like Chicago), but I know numerous totally cool heteros - of both sexes and of ages ranging from early 20s to early 70s women who aren't afraid of me and men who don't think of me as a challenge or as an affront to their masculinity. This is very exciting, to my way of thinking: bridges are being built, diversity is being embraced, we are being accepted and cherished for who we are - sometimes even by our families! My grandmother, my girlfriend's siblings, my sister and brother-in- law - they all seem perfectly comfortable not only with both my girlfriend and I as individuals but also with the two of us as a couple, showing us the same sorts of considerations they would any other committed couple. Even those members of Kathy's family who are still a little 'willified,' and adjective meaning: to be given the 'willies' by something - in this case by Kathy's Lesbianism and the tangible evidence of its existence (me) - regularly welcome us into their homes and treat us like the couple we are. This, if nothing else, shows tolerance. And that's a damn good start.

AND don't tell me you don't find it hopeful that for the first time in our history we have a presidential candidate who has made Gay and Lesbian rights a part of his platform and who made a real statement by having PWAs and Gays and Lesbians be a visible presence at the Democratic Convention. OK, the guy's not perfect, but its a whole lot more respect and more of a gesture than we're



getting from those other guys. I also find myself buoyed by the likelihood that the first African-American woman elected to the U.S. Senate will be from the state of Illinois this fall.

Maybe I'm overstating my case, but it strikes tat, indeed, these are the days of miracle and wonder (to quote Paul Simon - or is it George Bush?); when a gal like me from the projects can become a writer: when several major corporations grant benefits to the domestic partners of their Gay and Lesbian employees; when my lover and I can be welcomed into straight people's homes as a couple; when Kate Clinton's name and face can be on "Entertainment Tonight," The Wall Street Journal, and Publisher's Weekly. all within a week or so; when a Gay novel (David Leavitt's The Lost Language of Cranes) and a hot true- life lesbian love story (between Vita Sackville-West and Violet Trefusis) can be adapted for TV. Not cable, but TV; when the Gay and Lesbian vote is actively courted by high profile candidates in a high profile way.



October's selection features James Baldwin and his controversial 1950's novel **Giovanni's Room**, one of the first books of its kind to openly address the topic of homosexuality during that era.



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all of that, my own experience shows clearly what is possible: you can make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. I am living proof. And if you we can just get some structures in place to give other kids a few breaks... well, who knows what would be possible.

What also gives me hope is the way in which I, a most clearly and decidedly out Lesbian, have risen in the ranks of what is generally perceived as a rather stuffy and prestigious publishing house. It wasn't many years ago when the only way a Gay or Lesbian could rise in the ranks of any respectable business was to keep their so-called life-style a dirty little well-kept secret. And now, people in every walk of life – medicine, law enforcement, teaching, retail, law, and even politics, to give a few examples – have found that it is possible to pursue their careers, to keep their jobs, without horribly compromising themselves. Again, I'm not kidding myself; I know that their are still all too many people who are fearful that they would lose their jobs if they revealed their true selves. But there has definitely been progress on this front and that, to me, seems a hopeful sign.



Inside Out A place called hope

Sometimes - when I read about two women being shot to death by their 25 year long neighbor for being Lesbians, when I see people pushing their entire lives along down the street in front of them in a shopping cart, when I hear about white cops getting off scott-free after blatantly and brutally beating a black suspect - I get discouraged about the state of the world. I start feeling, in fact, hopeless.

Homophobia, poverty, racism, sexism - they're around us all the time, of course, but we generally don't hear about particular incidences unless they are sensational - or sensationalized. In the world I regularly inhabit - my place of work, my circle of friends and chosen family - it's decidedly not OK to be racist or homophobic or misanthropic. As a consequence, when I am not being bombarded with horror stories about man's inhumanity to man and woman (and, statistically, it is predominantly men who commit violent actions). I can sometimes get lulled into a false sense of things being, overall, right and good in this country. It's a rude awakening when I find out that they're not. Some people would say that that's because I'm not living in the real world. But I would argue that the world I inhabit is every bit as real as it's evil twin. What I mean is, who is to say that the world that is full of violence and hatred and poverty is more real than one peopled by those who are caring and tolerant and just and working toward change? What I believe is that even though this country is, in many ways, really screwed up, there is still reason to have optimism. Like Bill Clinton, I too believe in a place called hope.

My hope, of course, is not a town. Nevertheless, it is a place where I grew up. In my own life, I have found many, many reasons to hope that we stupid humans can maybe, just maybe, someday get our collective act together. For instance, when I think about poverty and

how it is all too frequently a legacy that gets handed down from parent to child. I then think of my own climb from a blue. blue collar background to a white collar job, from the housing projects of Milwaukee to owning my own home and I know it's possible to break the cycle. On the other hand, I'm not kidding myself: I also know that, in addition to the hard work that went into bettering my life, there was also a lot of luck. Luck, first of all, to be born into a family that hadn't been completely downtrodden by a society which hadn't given it a break in generations, a family that was still capable of believing that with a lot of hard work and a good education you could lift yourself up out of the mire of poverty. Lucky, too, to be born white in a country where the color of your skin - the color white in particular - still gets a lot of doors opened for you that remain either firmly locked or very hard to find if you're a person of color. Even so, even knowing





Film premiere to benefit Pride

Milwaukee — "Queer New Wave" cinema hits Milwaukee Thursday, October 29 with the premiere of "The Living End," at the Downer Theatre in a benefit for the Milwaukee Lesbian Gay Pride Committee (MLGPC). The benefit is sponsored by Wisconsin Light and In Step Magazine.

In this third benefit screening sponsored by the two publications, audiences get to form their own opinions on the controversial film that has broke house records in some of the theatres it has played in. The Gay-themed film is about HIV positive lovers, in what the **Village Voice** called "a queers on the lam portrait that deserves a place in movie history."

The punkish tale of the odyssey of two guys with nothing to lose comes from Gregg Araki, who is stunned by the success of his film. He commented to USA **Today** on the upcoming proliferation of "small" Gay films: "The work is all personal response... It is young Gay artists being much more vocal and in-your-face in terms of their queer identity."

Araki refers to Todd Hayne's "Poison," Gus van Sant's "My Own Private Idaho," and the up- coming "Swoon," and "An All American Story."

Our community, stunned by un-ending AIDS deaths, first created films like "Longtime Companion," and "Common Threads: Stories from the Quilt." Now, 12 years into the epidemic, comes the New Queer Cinema — full of anger, disgust, and activism to replace the mourning in American AIDS films.

The Guide comments, "Transgression, anger, sex, AIDS, response to anti-Gay violence – you name it, Araki's film has it."

Luke, one of the two main characters, in the beginning of the film encounters three

men with baseball bats who tell him, "You're going to die, faggot," Luke replies, "Guess again, three stooges," whips out his revolver and blows them away.

Once Luke and Jon hook up and hit the road, they come up with a vague plan, of shooting George Bush, or at least holding a gun to his head, while they inject him with their HIV infected blood.

The film completely rejects society's rules of behavior. It has the basic concept that society at large is inherently horrible – to work within the system has obviously failed so now it's time to create a Queer society that says "fuck 'em'' and makes up the rules as we go along.


If you agree or not will determine your reaction to "The Living End." Araki himself calls it an "irresponsible movie" because it trashes both the right wing and politically correct Gay ideals.

The Guide quotes Araki, who said the film "is an expression of the uncertainty, dislocation, and seize- the- day urgency that have become an integral part of Gay consciousness in the post AIDS era... in the back of my mind, I was sort of hoping that by the time 'The Living End' was finally released, the AIDS holocaust would be over and the movie would be something of an anachronism. Unfortunately, given our present-day sociocultural climate of right-wing oppression and rampant Gay bashing, it seems even more relevant now than when it was written over three years ago."

While some audiences may complain the film doesn't show a "good side" of Gay life, Araki portrays his Gay male characters as an oppressed minority being pushed to dangerous extremes. He told the **Chicago Sun Times** "The film should not be taken on a literal level. I do not condone violence or unsafe sex. This film is very metaphorical. The essential message is seize the day, live life and do whatever you are going to do, but do it today because you might not be here tomorrow. It is not a call for everybody who is HIV positive to go out and start killing people."

Among the crazed characters in his film



'AIDS Quilt Songbook' performance benefits MASN

Madison – Noted American baritone William Parker will be featured in a benefit concert for the Madison AIDS Support Network on Thursday, October 22, at 8pm in Mills Concert Hall. Presented in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Music, the performance is a 90-minute song cycle for baritone voice composed to poetry by or about people with AIDS.

This past June in New York's Alice Tully Hall the songcycle received its premiere by Parker and three other baritones. The Madison concert will feature New York-based Parker, who has AIDS, and pianist William Huckaby.

Organized and conceived by William Parker, the song cycle consists of eighteen songs written by some of America's most renowned composers and poets. Meet the Composer, a national composer service organization, assisted with the development of the cycle. The 'AIDS Quilt Songbook' is dated '1992' so that in future years more musical settings to the poetry of people with HIV/AIDS will be composed until a day when this dreaded disease is arrested.

Parker has long been a champion of contemporary music for voice, and many of the composers who contributed works to the Songbook are those whose works have been premiered by Parker. He began his operatic career at the Volksoper, in Vienna, and has since appeared in major roles with the New York City Opera, and the opera companies of Pittsburgh, Boston, Washington, Baltimore, and Santa Fe. He has appeared as soloist with the New York Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, and Pittsburgh Symphony. Among his many international prizes and awards, he was the first vocalist to win the International Music American Competition.

Mr. Parker last appeared in Madison in July of 1981 for a recital at the UW-Madison School of Music.




