

Aspin Sends Military Proposal to Joint Chiefs

Clinton To Announce Decision Soon

Washington, DC — As In Step went to press, Secretary of Defense Les Aspin had forwarded his proposal for a executive order modifying the ban on Gays in the military to the Joint Chiefs of Staff for their consideration. The Joint Chiefs will convey their opinions to President Clinton, and Clinton is expected to announce his final decision by July 15.

The past few weeks have been filled with aggressive lobbying by all sides in the debate and a flurry of press leaks which may or may not be trial balloons by the powers that be to gauge Congressional and public sentiment about the upcoming

executive order.

The proposal Aspin sent to the Joint Chiefs is said to be a version of the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" approach favored by Sen. Sam Nunn, Chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Aspin's plan must pass muster by the Joint Chiefs and be able to withstand any challenge by Congress, whose conservative members have threatened to codify the current ban.

The proposal is said to fall short of an outright repeal of the military ban, and military leaders are apparently insisting that whatever compromise is adopted must include the statement, already enshrined in Pentagon policy, that "homosexuality is incompatible with military service."

That statement is crucial to the Pentagon as its last defense against the full integration of Gays and Lesbians into the services. Military leaders have dismissed previous arguments that Gays are security risks and have admitted that Gay and Lesbian soldiers have served with distinction. If the statement about incompatibility remains, Gay leaders say, the Pentagon will continue to have a legal foundation for discharging Gay service members.

Agreement seems to exist on the concept of "Don't Ask." Following Clinton's January directive, recruiters no longer ask

inductees about their sexual orientation. In addition, commanding officers would be prohibited from investigating rumors of alleged homosexuality in the absence of any blatant misconduct. This directive would halt the aggressive withhunt-like investigations of Gay soldiers who are otherwise innocent of any infractions.

But debate is still raging about exactly what "Don't Tell" means. Sen. Nunn has said Gay soldiers would have to be silent about their sexual orientation both on and off base, requiring them to be celibate, uninvolved in Gay rights, and barring them from attending any Gay events or meeting places. Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA) says the "Don't Tell" provision should only apply to soldiers while on duty.

Sen. Dan Coats (R-IN), a leading opponent of lifting the ban, said on the Today show: "Defining what 'Don't Tell' means, whether it's actually saying 'I'm a homosexual' or something far different than that — holding hands, kissing at a nightclub or whatever — all of that has yet

to be defined."

"We can accept some formulation that might include some very limited restrictions while on base," Tom Stoddard of the Campaign for Military Service told the New York Times. "But the basic right of self-acknowledgement has to be maintained."

Former Sen. Barry Goldwater, one of the nation's leading conservatives, lent his prestige to the debate on the side of Gays and Lesbians. In a nationally syndicated column, Goldwater said that bedrock conservative principles require that government stay out of people's personal lives. "You don't need to be 'straight' to fight for your country," the elder statesman wrote. "You just need to shoot straight."

National Gay groups are urging activists to continue to call and write their representatives, Secretary Aspin, Gen Colin Powell and President Clinton. Aspin's nuber is (703) 697-5261. Gen. Powell's

number is (703) 545-6700.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has also planned a last minute "National Mobilization Against the Ban." The kick-off action is scheduled for July 4 with a gathering in Lafayette Park across from the White House. The rally will be led by Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual veterans and will be supported by leaders of Gay, women's and civil rights organizations.

On July 15, the date President



LAMM To Present Report To Aspin

Milwaukee - The Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMM) will be presenting an updated report in support of removing the ban on Lesbians and Gays in the military to Defense Secretary Les

Several Lamm members presented an earlier version of this report to Mr. Aspin during their visit to Washington, D.C. for the March on Washington in late April. In light of the recent discussions on a possible compromise, the updated report reemphasizes the organization's commitment to a complete lifting of the ban.

The report points out the weaknesses in the arguments for keeping the ban, in addition to outlining arguments for its removal. It states that a nondiscrimination policy must include the following:

 No discrimination based solely on acknowledgement of sexual orientation. No inquiries or investigations of

a person's sexual orientation.

· Rules on sexual conduct and misconduct must be applied evenhandedly to all military personnel: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and heterosexual.

The report also includes the views of Lesbian/Gay and heterosexual veterans and active duty military personnel

who oppose the ban.

As the July 15 deadline approaches, LAMM hopes that this report. which will also be distributed to the Milwaukee media, will help put the focus back on the real issue surrounding the lifting of the ban - discrimination based on status is unjust. LAMM also encourages the Lesbian and Gay community to continue contacting their elected officials, including President Clinton, and ask them to lift the ban without compromise.

Clinton Appoints Kristine Gebbie AIDS Czar

AIDS Groups Cautiously **Optimistic**

Washington, DC - Saving that it is time to seek "unprecedented remedies to unprecedented problems," President Clinton on June 25 appointed former Washington State Commissioner of Health Kristine Gebbie to be the nation's AIDS "czar." Gebbie's official title will be AIDS policy coordinator and she will operate directly from the White House.

Gebbie's job will be to bring some cohesion the many strands of AIDS policy, research and treatment programs at federal, state and local levels. Her difficult task will require coordinating the efforts of such huge government bureacracies as the Department of Health and Human Services. the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Accepting the appointment at a Rose Garden press conference. Gebbe said: "People have had to put out far too much energy in every community, putting programs together and policies together that could be pulled together on a single nationwide basis, leaving folks free at the local level to really respond to individuals in the way they need to respond, and to apply what we've learned in every community in this land."

Gebbie, 49, is a registered nurse who has been a professor of nursing and public health. She was the top public health official in Oregon in the 1980s and Health Commissioner in Washington from 1990 to 1992. In 1987, she was appointed to the President's Commission on AIDS despite her strong criticisms of Ronald Reagan's handling of the epidemic.

She is not as widely known among AIDS service organizations as other people who were rumored to be considered for the position, but representatives of AIDS groups responded to Gebbie's appointment with cautious optimism.

A spokeswoman for the AIDS Action Council described Gebbie as "a strong communicator who clearly understands the demands of the AIDS

epidemic." Elizabeth Glaser of the Pediatric AIDS Foundation cited Gebbie's extensive experience with AIDS issues and said she would be "a real voice of reason."

KRAMER CALLS APPOINTMENT A "JOKE"

The only immediate criticism came from writer and AIDS activist Larry Kramer, who called Gebbie's appointment a "disaster" and a "joke." Kramer had actively lobbied for the appointment of Connecticut Gov. Lowell Weicker as AIDS czar. Kramer felt strongly that someone of national stature needed to be appointed so they would have the power required to make real changes.

Weicker, along with New York City Health Commissioner Margaret Hamburg and Rep. Jim McDermott (D-WA) were all considered for the position, but each withdrew their names. Clinton said he was impressed with Gebbie's years in public health and her experience in dealing with AIDS issues.

The appointment process was slowed a great deal by the reluctance of many potential candidates to commit to taking on the high profile job. Given reports at the recent International Conference on AIDS in Berlin that a vaccine may be decades away, Gebbie is sure to have a difficult and thankless job. If little progress is made in the next few years in the areas of research and treatment, she is likely to become the target of renewed criticism against the government's AIDS policies.

President Clinton Signs Landmark Legislation

Strengthens AIDS Efforts

Washington, DC (HRCF) -President Clinton invited representatives of health care, women's and Lesbian and Gay organizations to the White House on June 10th to witness his signing of the National Institutes of Health Revitalization Act, landmark AIDS legislation which will strengthen the Office of AIDS Research at

The AIDS provisions included in the law emerged from a reform originally proposed by the Treatment Activist Group (TAG) and was hailed by AIDS activists as a major step to improve coordination and management of research programs throughout the twenty one institutes that comprise the NIH.

President Clinton stressed the importance of the legislation in battling AIDS and women's health concerns, noting in particular his support "for the inclusion of women and minorities in research activities. It's important that we ensure that resources are devoted to increasing our knowledge about conditions which uniquely affect these populations."

The President called the battle against AIDS "an immense undertaking" and noted that "nearly 300 of our fellow citizens" become infected with HIV each

Diversity Training of Milwaukee Cops Abruptly Halted

Gay Leaders Express Disgust with Process

Milwaukee - On June 17, the long-awaited diversity training for the Milwaukee Police Department was brought to an abrupt halt just days after it began, and Gay activists who have worked to improve community relations with the police are disgusted with the entire process:

Stephanie Hume of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMM), who has served as liaison to the Milwaukee

Police Department (MPD) since 1991 when the Jeffrey Dahmer case reinforced the need for better police-community relations. is not necessarily angry that the training has been postponed. Her criticism is aimed at the training model itself and the process by which the training was developed.

"It is not at all what the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Commission asked for, not at all what the Gav and Lesbian community asked for or what the African American and Asian communitites and neighborhood groups asked for," said Hume.

Despite strenuous efforts by Gay groups to submit their own proposals for training, to confer with police officials and In Step ▼ July 1-14 1993 ▼ Page 91



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

Community Health Behavior Program Medical College of Wisconsin to communicate with the Washington, DC-based Police Foundation which was ultimately contracted to write the training model, Hume said: "We weren't taken seriously as part of the process. Our ideas weren't incorporated into the training model. So the end product does not represent our interests."

EXCLUDED FROM THE PROCESS?

"Homophobia is not even mentioned in the outline for diversity training," according to Hume. "From our first contact with the Police Foundation, it was very clear they did not believe the Gay and Lesbian community had the knowledge to advise them about police training."

"We really bought into this hook, line and sinker with the hopes of really changing the system," said Hume, "but we've been blown out of the water. It [the training model] does not meet any of our

community's needs."

"The program is very generic, with a huge slant toward managing diversity at the higher echelons of police ranks rather than teaching acceptance of and respect for diverse communities throughout the department — and there's a big difference," Hume commented. "They've created a model for administrative training rather than focusing on community relations out in the streets."

"The training is being done by outsiders not from Milwaukee through a program not geared toward Milwaukee's

history or needs."

Hume also noted that Gay and Lesbian activists felt overlooked in the process of developing the training. Many aspects of LAMM's initial police proposal (born under the tutelage of the Milwaukee Lavender Network) were incorporated into the Blue Ribbon Commission report in late 1991. But LAMM and other local groups were bypassed in favor of the Police Foundation when it came time to fund the development of a training proposal.

The Police Foundation hired a consultant from UW-Green Bay to compile a list of resources serving Milwaukee's Gay, Black, Latino and Asian communities. The consultant called LAMM and other Gay groups to obtain a resource list, causing great resentment among activists who felt an outsider was being paid to do the job they were most qualified to fill.

Representatives of the Gay and

Lesbian community met Police Foundation officials in November to express their concerns about the MPD and ideas for change. Despite promises by the Police Foundation to maintain open communication, Hume and other Gay leaders report that repeated calls to the Foundation and to the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission were never returned. (Numerous calls by In Step to the Police Foundation were also never returned.)

"We moved from a point where we were supposed to be involved in the process of developing the training to being presented with the final product," said Hume. She and other community leaders were given only two days notice about a final meeting to be held about the training

in May.

At that meeting, Hume was asked to participate in one aspect of the training as it had been designed, but she declined. She cited concerns with the "wrong" focus of the training and admitted to In Step: "I think we need to distance ourselves as far as possible from the whole model."

"MORE FRUSTRATED THAN EVER"

Ralph Navarro of Milwaukee's Gay Information Service, who conducted a 50-minute sensitivity session on Gay issues for Police Academy cadets for seven years prior to the new reform effort, is equally disgusted with what he called the "magical, mystical process" of reforming police training.

"Despite my experience, they [the Police Foundation] never, never made any attempt to contact me until that last meeting in May, when I got just one day's notice to attend. It's been the most frustrating experience I've had in a long

time," said Navarro.

"Nobody seemed to be in charge. Nobody would answer anything. People at the Fire and Police Commission here took the position that they had nothing to say, nothing to do. They would refer me to the Police Foundation, which never returned my calls."

Navarro contends that in the months just before the Dahmer case broke, "We were making real progress toward a better program, with good, frank discussions in which community people met face to face with police officials. Now despite all these big efforts at improving police-community relations, the community



problem."

OTHER OPPOSITION

Police Chief Philip Arreola's abrupt postponement of the diversity training may stem from criticisms quite apart from those of the Gay and Lesbian community. Police union officials condemned part of the training which stresses a "customer- based" approach to policing. The most controversial aspect calls for those who utilize police services, including alleged criminals, to be surveyed about the treatment they receive.

"Normally, only criminal defense lawyers refer to suspects as customers," the head of the Police Supervisors Organization told the Milwaukee Journal. "Supervisors already review arrests and determine if anyone has received improper

treatment and handling."

Former Deputy Police Inspector Van Vergetis was contemptuous of the entire process, saying that tougher law enforcement, not cultural diversity, is what the city really needs. Older police veterans, especially the command staff which were the first (and last) to receive the new training, are believed to hold similar views.

Meanwhile Chief Arreola, who initially endorsed the customer- based approach, has backed off and said the training may resume in the fall but only after higher ranking officers have a chance

to critique and revise it.

Insiders on the Fire and Police Commission, on the Common Council and even in the Mayor's Office are said to oppose the new training program, but their reasons for opposing it are unclear. Do they share the concerns of Stephanie Hume and community- based groups which feel the training does not sufficiently address police-community relations? Or do they oppose it from a more conservative perspective that scoffs at the very idea of cultural diversity?

STRONG COUNTERPOINT NEEDED

"It's definitely a mess," said Hume, "but we're not going to stop pressing for real change within the MPD."

Navarro agreed. "Some of us need to get together and push the issue to make sure our concerns are heard. If there's not a strong counterpoint soon,

they'll water it [the training proposal] down further so it's virtually irrelevant."

What has Hume learned from

these years of lobbying?

"I guess I was really naive. I've learned a lot about reality - that Mayor Norquist's reality, that Chief Arreola's reality, that the Gay community's reality is not the same. We may talk the same talk but the way we follow through is very different."

There is one thing that Hume feels very sure of however.

"If we succeed in reforming the Police Department and making our neighborhoods safer, it won't be because of the Chief or Mayor Norquist or the Blue Ribbon Commission, it will be because of the trust and respect and relationships that have developed between community groups. That has been the biggest improvement in the whole city since the Dahmer case."

Shooting Death at Bar Not Gay-Related

Woman Was Innocent Victim

Milwaukee - Twenty-eight year old Marlene Krieser died from a gun shot wound to the chest early the morning of Tuesday, June 15 at Vuk's Place tavern. Krieser happened to be in the line of fire when a passer-by fired several shots at the bar from across the street. One bullet travelled through the open tavern door and struck Krieser as she was drinking and talking with friends.

Krieser worked at Trinity Memorial Hospital, and stopped at the quiet, friendly South Side neighborhood Gay bar after her shift, with a fellow coworker. Twelve to fifteen people were on the premises when the incident occurred at

approximately 1am.

Owner Tom Vuk was playing pool with a young Hispanic male, who said his name was "Oscar". It was Oscar's first time in the bar and Vuk said Oscar was friendly and talkative during the time he was there. As they finished the game, Oscar was saying goodbye, and Vuk said "One of our customers jokingly said, "See ya later Taco Breath" and Oscar made some verbal comments back to the customer saying something like, "Don't fuck with me - I just

came in here to have a couple of drinks and a good time and I did. I like this bar and don't have a problem with it so why do you have to fuck with me while I'm walking out the door? It ain't shit for me to come back here and get your ass!"

Vuk told In Step at that point, he stepped in and said "Hey Oscar, it's no big deal, he wasn't talking to you... let it rest." Vuk said Oscar replied, "OK, see ya later,

have a good night."

Five to seven minutes after Oscar left, someone unseen "fired shots into the bar from somewhere across the street. Bullets came through the wall and one hit a ceiling fan, another hit the smoke eater and another came straight through the door, past the other customers, and right into Marlene's chest," according to Vuk.

"No one was really sure right away what was happening. The bullet striking the fan sounded like glass shattering, and once we realized that bullets were flying, everyone hit the floor. Afterwards, I went to help Marlene get up. and when I turned her over there was no blood, just a gurgling sound. But then it (the blood) started to trickle. She died in my arms minutes later - she just closed her eyes and let go. The paramedics or

police, I don't remember who was there first, were too late to try and resuscitate her. I'll never forget the experience."

Police do not know for certain that the man who was taunted earlier (Oscar) was the same person who fired the shots into the tavern, but they are seeking him for questioning. They are looking for an Hispanic male, about twenty-one years old, with tattoos of crowns and pitchforks on both fore arms. A similar design is used by the Latin Kings, a Latino gang. As of In Step deadline, the police had yet to find the suspect.

Krieser was the adopted daughter of Sharon Dixon, owner of Fannie's, a popular Milwaukee Lesbian/Gav bar. Dixon adopted Krieser at the age of fifteen after her mother, a close friend of

Dixon's, died.

Vuk said since the incident he's had to answer lots of questions from customers and others who wanted to know if it was a Hate Crime but Vuk said he was sure the shooting was "not aimed at us because we're a Gay bar." Vuk said the police questioned all the neighbors within a two block radius and no one had anything bad to say about the tavern, much less about it being Gav.



Gay Leaders Analyze Judge Ginsburg's Record

Supreme Court Nominee's View on Privacy Explored

Washington, DC — Lesbian and Gay activists are studying the record of US Supreme Court nominee Ruth Bader Ginsburg to determine if she will be counted as a supporter of equal rights for Lesbian and Gay Americans.

If confirmed by the Senate, Ginsburg would take the seat of Justice Byron White, the conservative jurist who wrote the high court's 1986 Hardwick decision upholding the constitutionality of state sodomy laws.

Ginsburg has a reputation as a centrist, although her record prior to her appointment to the Appeals Court for the District of Columbia was as an attorney who successfully argued several landmark women's rights cases before the Supreme Court. While her record in support of women's rights is well known and admired, her stand on Lesbian and Gay issues is less clear.

"We are concerned about Judge Ginsburg's positions on issues of importance to our community," said Tim McFeeley, Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "During the next several weeks we will be conducting a serious study of Judge Ginsburg's record, speaking with those who know her and working with our allies in the Senate to clarify her views."

Ginsburg's views will be examined in public hearings before the Judiciary Committee, which will vote whether or not to recommend her to the full Senate. Senators will also quiz her in off-the-record meetings in the next few weeks.

"We hope that the Senate will explore Judge Ginsburg's views on the constitutionality of privacy when she appears before them for confirmation," McFeeley said.

A particular case that came before the Appeals court in 1984 has raised concern among Gay activists. In Dronenburg v. Zech, Ginsburg voted with the majority on a three judge panel that refused to grant a rehearing to a sailor

discharged for homosexual conduct.

Dronenburg had argued that his discharge violated his right to privacy and his right to equal protection of the laws. But the court ruled the state had a legitimate interest in discharging service members found quilty of sodomy.

The ruling read, in part: "The effects of homosexual conduct within a naval or military unit are almost certain to be harmful to morale and discipline. The Navy is not required to produce social science data or the results of controlled experiments to prove what common sense and common experience demonstrate."

Although the wording of the decision seems quite clear, McFeeley commented: "There is some debate as to why Judge Ginsburg voted against a rehearing. We want to get as clear an understanding as possible of her views on the issues."

Supporters of Judge Ginsburg in the Gay and Lesbian community are coming forward to provide background information to allay concerns.

Barbara Flagg, a law professor at Washington University in St. Louis, worked as a clerk for Judge Ginsburg in the 1980s. "Judge Ginsburg," she said, "is generally moderate, but her commitment to equality is not."

Flagg, who is a Lesbian, said of Ginsburg: "If she is confirmed, our rights will be more secure than they are today."

NATIONAL NEWS BRIEFS

California Court Voids Local Rights Laws

Sacramento, CA — The Supreme Court of California has upheld a lower court decision which voids all local Gay rights laws by declaring that the state's Fair Employment and Housing Act supersedes all local anti-discrimination ordinances.

But the Fair Employment and Housing Act does not include the category "sexual orientation," leaving a huge loophole for those who find themselves victims of such discrimination. In the case at hand, the Supreme Court rejected the appeal of a bisexual man, Jim Delaney, who filed a discrimination complaint under the City of Los Angeles ordinance.



Gov. Wilson signed a bill last year allowing anti-Gay employment discrimination complaints to be filed under the state labor code, but the provision does not allow for attorneys fees or punitive damages and has a much shorter statute of limitations than many municipal laws. In 1991, Wilson vetoed a measure that would have added "sexual orientation" into the FEHA.

"The Delaney case does essentially what the right wing has been trying to do through referenda," Amelia Craig of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund told the Washington Blade. She referred to ongoing campaigns by right wing groups to void or prohibit local laws protecting Gay rights through statewide action.

Stonewall Pioneer Craig Rodwell Dies at 52

New York, NY — Craig Rodwell, a Gay rights pioneer who played a major role in the 1969 Stonewall Rebellion, died of stomach cancer on June 18. He was 52.

Rodwell was a Chicago native who came to New York in the late 1950s and made Greenwich Village his home. He stirred up controversy in the local Mattachine Society by encouraging more-visible protests to fight for Gay rights. In 1967, he founded one of the nation's first and most successful Gay bookstores, the Oscar Wilde Memorial Bookshop, of which he remained proprietor until this year.

Rodwell played a leading role in rallying opposition to the police raid on the Stonewall Inn in 1969, rallying the crowd with shouts of "Gay Power!" He helped organize the Christopher Street Liberation Day March, the precursor of New York City's annual Gay Pride Parades, and advised many other Gays and Lesbians about opening bookstores around the country. In recent years, he became increasingly involved in issues facing Gay and Lesbian youth.

Rodwell's influence on the Gay rights movement of the 1960s and '70s is detailed in Martin Duberman's new book, Stonewall. (Reviewed in "Books" this issue of In Step.)

AMA Adopts Gay Rights Protection

Chicago — After four years of acrimonious debate, the American Medical Association adopted on June 15 a revision to its bylaws which clearly states that membership in the AMA and its state affiliates cannot be "denied or abridged" on account of sexual orientation.

The approval came on a voice vote of the AMA's 435-member governing body, the House of Delegates, meeting in its annual convention. The proposal had been rejected each year since 1989 when it was first introduced. "we are not condoning any lifestyle," AMA President Dr. John L. Clowe told critics of the measure. ""All we want is too put this to rest."

During debate, Dr. Scott McCallister of Chicago declared: "I am a physician, and I'm proud of that. I am Gay, and I'm proud of that. Please allow me to be proud of being a Gay physician."

Students "Climb for the Cure" on Mt. McKinley

New York, NY — In mid-June, a nine-member team of Princeton University students launched a month-long expedition to the top of Alaska's Mount McKinley in an effort to raise money and greater awareness about AIDS, especially among young people.

"Mt. McKinley is the tallest peak in North America, and climbing it symbolizes the challenge of conquering AIDS," said Alexander S. Friedman, a Princeton senior who organized the expedition. Friedman, along with eight other Princeton students, four men and four women, expect to scale the peak about mid-July in an expedition dubbed "Climb for the Cure."

The goal of "Climb for the Cure" is twofold: to raise \$250,000 for AIDS research and education and to call attention to the fact that HIV/AIDS has increased by 62% in the past two years among 13 to 24 year-olds in the US. The money will go to the American Foundation for AIDS Research.

AIDS Report Blunt, But Miss America Censored

Washington, DC — The new report on AIDS by Surgeon General Antonia Novello contains much more explicit information and language than the report issued seven years ago by C. Everett Koop. But Miss America Leanza Cornett reports continual battles with censorship as she tries to raise awareness throughout the country.

The new Surgeon General's report is much more explicit than the Reagan era report, using blunt language to describe how HIV is transmitted and giving detailed instructions (along with illustrations) on how to put on and remove a condom properly. It also offers tips to drug users on how to clean and disinfect needles.

"There will be some who accuse us of being too explicit," said Dr. Novello. "Sex and drugs are facts of life. We have to deal with the world we live in now rather than the world we wish."

Meanwhile, Miss America Leanza Cornett again expressed frustration at being prohibited from discussing AIDS or using the word "condom" on recent visits to schools in Florida. At one school she told students to make sure they protected themselves with a "latex glove." "I hope you understand what I said," she added with a wink.

Cornett has become increasingly politicized as she faces constant hurdles to AIDS education. "They don't want to hear Miss America use the words 'sex' or 'AIDS'," she said in a recent interview.

Lesbian Health Survey Seeks Participants

Los Angeles, CA — In what is expected to be the largest and most comprehensive survey ever of Lesbian health care issues in the US, the Lesbian Health Project is urging Lesbians to obtain and complete the questionnaire.

More than 15,000 surveys were distributed during the recent March on Washington, and organizers report that more than 2,000 have already been returned. The only previous study on Lesbian health care, conducted in the mid-1980s, included the responses of just under 2,000 women.

Kameny, a founder of Washington's Mattachine Society and the NGLTF, will review the history of the modern Gay and Lesbian movement. Dr. Hill, who served as Director of the Mayor's Office for the Gay and Lesbian community in New York City, will address the closing session on homophobia and overcoming the barriers to Gay and Lesbian rights.

Dozens of workshops will focus on diversity training, domestic partnerships and family issues, international Gay issues, fighting right wing campaigns, and more.

Atlanta, GA — The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported last month that AIDS has become the leading cause of death among men ages 25-44 in 64 American cities, surpassing heart disease, cancer, suicide and homicide. Among women of the same age, AIDS was the leading cause of death in 9 cities, all on the east coast.

San Francisco, CA — This fall, San Francisco State will become the first 4-year university in the country to offer a minor in Gay Studies. Students can earn the interdisciplinary minor by taking eight of 22 courses offered in such subjects as "Homosexuality on Film," "Lesbian Literature," and "Research on Sexual Identity."

Washington, DC — In the recent survey of sexual harassment in the nation's schools conducted by the American Association of University women, almost one quarter of boys and one fifth of girls said they had been called Gay or Lesbian by their peers. Among boys, 85% said they would be "very upset" by being called Gay. They said they were more upset by Gay taunts than other forms of harassment, like someone stripping their clothes off or forcing them to perform a sexual act.

San Francisco, CA — Mayor Frank Jordan pleased two important constituencies in June when he appointed Susan Leal, a Latina Lesbian, to fill the seat vacated by former Supervisor Roberta Achtenberg. "I'm going to first of all answer to all the people of San Francisco," said Leal. "But I will have a particular sensitivity to the Latino community and to the Gay and Lesbian community." She faces an election in 1996.

Washington, DC — Maj. Gen. Harold Campbell, who called President Clinton a "Gay loving," "pot smoking," "womanizing" and "draft dodging" commander-in-chief at a public event in Europe this spring, has been fined \$7,000, given a letter of reprimand and has retired as of this month. Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Merrill McPeak said Campbell's comments were "wrong and cannot be tolerated."



Transportation, Agriculture, HUD All Forbid Job Bias

Washington, DC — In a continuing string of victories for Gay and Lesbian federal workers, the Transportation and Agriculture Departments have become the latest federal agencies to prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation.

In April, Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy issued new guidelines calling for aggressive enforcement of existing anti-discrimination policies within the huge department, added sexual orientation to the categories of protected groups, and called for a "work environment free of discrimination and harassment based on gender or sexual orientation."

In May, Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena, a former mayor of Denver, went even further. Pena issued a statement on equal opportunity within his department, ordering that "no one be denied opportunities because of his or her race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, disability or sexual orientation."

But Pena also voiced his intention of actively fostering diversity within the Department of Transportation (DOT).

"My commitment extends far beyond simply reducing or preventing discrimination. We have an obligation to do more," Pena said. "I will aggressively promote equal employment opportunity for all persons in our workplace, to fully include minorities, women, individuals of different sexual orientations, the disabled, and older Americans at all levels of the organization and to remove any real or artificial barriers that may limit opportunities."

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PENA SPEAKS AT PRIDE EVENT

Pena also took the extraordinary step of appearing at a Gay Pride forum June 15 sponsored by the Department of Transportation's Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual Employees (GLOBE) group. The forum took place at DOT's headquarters and was publicized in the agency's official newsletter. Pena is believed to be the first Cabinet Secretary to address a Gay Pride event.

DOT also sponsored a display about Gay and Lesbian history in the lobby of the Federal Aviation Administration during June.

The Transportation and Agriculture Departments now join the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in protecting Gay workers. Earlier this year, it was revealed that HUD management had signed a contract with its union employees which prohibited bias based on sexual orientation.

In addition, the HUD contract allows employees to utilize annual leave time to care for incapacitated family members. "Family member" is defined broadly as "any individual related by blood or affinity whose close association with the employee is the equivalent of a family relationship."

The three federal departments join the General Services Administration and five of the National Park Service's regional offices in prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation.

The victories are attributed to the activism of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual government workers organized into chapters of GLOBE throughout the federal bureaucracy. Activists also credit the Clinton administration and its cabinet appointees who are much more sensitive to Gay and Lesbian issues than their Republican predecessors.



discrimination policies, however. Veteran Gay activist Frank Kameny told the Washington Blade the new policies offer

Gay workers "only half a loaf."

Kameny said the individual statements offer only symbolic protection from job bias because formal discrimination complaints must be filed with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, which does not recognize sexual orientation as a protected class. Sexual orientation can only be added to the EEOC's guidelines through a Presidential executive order or an act of Congress.

Members of GLOBE recognize this deficiency in the new policies, but say they are working to strengthen internal mechanisms and conflict resolution procedures in each department to offer

some form of redress to victims of discrimination. They hope to add teeth to the anti-bias policies, and say the statements are a real measure of progress considering that sexual orientation has never been addressed by the departments

Leaders of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Human Rights Campaign Fund are urging President Clinton to sign an executive order protecting all federal workers from anti-Gay bias. They also reiterated their commitment to building Congressional support for a federal Gay and Lesbian civil rights bill that will cover all employment and housing discrimination.

UW System's LesBiGay Community Forms Network

Madison's Jan Sheppard Convenes Historic Meeting

Madison - On May 25, the University of Wisconsin-Madison played host to the first ever networking meeting of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual faculty and staff members from UW campuses and centers throughout the state.

The meeting was called by Janice Sheppard, Assistant to the Dean of Students at UW-Madison, "to establish a system wide network of individuals working on L/B/G issues." Sheppard, whose job it is to work on discrimination and diversity issues, is the official university liaison to the Gay and Lesbian campus community.

"It seemed like the logical thing to do," said Sheppard, about calling for the meeting. "It was clear on our campus that we didn't know how other campuses were proceeding on any number of Gay and Lesbian issues. This is an issue that's ready to take off. There's a need to coordinate and compare information between people who are linked through UW policies."

Sheppard said Wisconsin campuses should be particularly hospitable to Gay and Lesbian issues given the "firm foundation" of both state laws and university regulations which prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation. About 60 people attended the networking meeting, some from as far away as River Falls and Superior. Many expressed delight at meeting so many other openly Gay and Lesbian colleagues in the university system as well as straight allies in the UW administration.

Jeffrey Merrick, a History Professor at UW-Milwaukee who is a member of the school's Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Caucus, called the Madison meeting "immensely successful."

He noted that each campus seems to be at different stages in the development of Gay Studies courses and personnel policies regarding Gay employees. "The exchange of information was very valuable," he said.

Merrick envisions the group "forming a statewide network comparable to the Women's Studies network, a permanent body to promote communication and collaboration between campuses."

In the curriculum area, Merrick would like to see the development of certificate programs in Gay and Lesbian Studies. He'd also like the group to become a strong advocate around broader issues, to support the work done so far by Gay student organizations, which don't have nearly the clout of faculty and staff members.

The May meeting began with representatives of each of the UW campuses and centers summarizing the current status of LesBiGay issues and programs on their campus. Participants

Members of the Academic Staff Compensation Committee and the Teaching Assistants Association at Madison discussed current efforts to obtain benefits for the domestic partners of university employees. Mike VerVeer, an aide to State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, talked about legislative plans to define domestic partners on a statewide basis.

Plans were made to hold another statewide meeting of this new faculty and

staff network in the fall.

"The level of enthusiasm was very high," said Sheppard. "Everyone wants to meet again, and we'd love to double the attendance and set a real agenda for coordinated action."

Number Of Openly Gay Officials Rises To 120

Total Doubles Since Last Year

Washington, DC - The number of openly Gay and Lesbian elected and appointed officials has nearly doubled in the past six months, according to William Waybourn, Executive Director of the Gay

and Lesbian Victory Fund.

Prior to last November's elections, the Victory Fund tallied 64 openly Gay and Lesbian officials throughout the US. The increase to the current count of 120 is attributable to many factors, including more Gay and Lesbian candidates winning elections and appointments, and more public officials "coming out" as openly

"The November, 1992 election was a very profitable one for the Gay and Lesbian community," Waybourn noted. "Besides receiving widespread recognition

as a major force in presidential politics, Gay and Lesbian voters made great strides in electing their own to office."

All 16 of the officials who were up for re-election last fall were voted back into office. In addition, 11 new candidates were elected for the first time, bringing the number of openly Gay elected officials to

In the past six months, there have been even more victories at the polls, including newly elected New York City School Board members Jill Harris, John Nalley and Angela Rovira, Dallas City Councilman Craig McDaniel and Madison Municipal Court Judge Shelley Gaylord.

The roster of openly Gay and Lesbian appointed officials grew with the recent addition of Clinton appointees Roberta Achtenberg to the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Romulo Diaz, Jr. to the Energy Dept., Victor Zonona to the Dept. of Health and Human Services and Bob Hattoy, Keith Boykin and R. Paul Richards to the White House staff.

In Oregon, George Eighmey and David Gernant were appointed to vacancies in the state legislature and the judiciary,

respectively.

Among the officials who publicly acknowledged their sexual orientation in recent months were Rhode Island State Sen. Will Fitzpatrick, and the Mayor of Melbourne, Iowa, Bill Crews.

Another factor contributing to the increase was the low rate of attrition in the ranks of openly Gay and Lesbian officials. Notable losses were the deaths of Vermont State Rep. Ronald Squires and New York State Supreme Court Justice Richard C. Failla. Both died of complications of AIDS.

Two Gay and Lesbian seats on the San Francisco Board of Supervisors were relinquished when Harry Britt, Harvey Milk's successor, chose not to run for re-election, and Roberta Achtenberg resigned to become Assistant Secretary for Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity at HUD.

The rapid increase in the number of Gay and Lesbian officials augers well for the political future of the Gay and Lesbian community, according to Waybourn.

Being represented by our own is the highest form of political empowerment," he said. "Every time an openly Gay or Lesbian candidate crosses a political threshold, the door is opened for others to follow."

GOP Platform Opposes Abortion, Gays In Military

La Crosse — Despite appeals by Republican leaders like Gov. Tommy Thompson to adopt a "big tent" philosophy regarding social issues, the state GOP, meeting in its annual convention June 11-13, adopted a strong anti-abortion plank, and another statement favoring the ban on Gays in the military.

The anti-Gay resolution was passed by an overwhelming voice vote, while the abortion plank garnered more debate among delegates. Some argued that the national Republican Party's opposition to abortion had cost George Bush crucial support from women voters in the 1992 election.

But the platform adopted says that abortion "violates the first and most basic of human rights" and calls on legislators to enact laws to "protect all human beings from conception to natural death."

Meanwhile, the state Democratic Party, meeting that same weekend in Green Bay, approved a pro-choice resolution. Although a specific proposal on Gays in the military was not adopted, an official of the state party told in Step the party supported the position put forward by President Clinton that the ban should be lifted.

Life Sentence Given in Beating Death

Milwaukee — Craig B. Mitchell, who was found guilty of first degree intentional homicide in the beating death of a homeless man in Milwaukee in October, 1991, has been sentenced to life in prison with no possibility of parole for at least 57 years. Mitchell is 20 years old.

Mitchell killed 65-year-old Arthur Haymond behind a furniture store in downtown Milwaukee after Haymond allegedly called him a "faggot." Mitchell beat Haymond with a stick and a rock and then set fire to the victim's face and groin area.

Haymond was widely known among street people in Milwaukee, several

of whom confirmed that he sometimes used anti-Gay slurs. Mitchell was known to frequent Milwaukee's Gay bar scene.

MAP Planning Needle Exchange Program

Milwaukee — After months of private meetings and consultations with public health officials and community leaders, and after months of trying to keep its plans secret for fear of negative reaction, the Milwaukee AIDS Project acknowledged June 10 that it is planning to launch a needle exchange program to help curb the spread of HIV among drug users.

Milwaukee Health Commissioner Paul Nannis said the city was neither supporting nor opposing the needle exchange plan. He said the city's prime concern was the proper disposal of used needles. An estimated 4,400 people in Milwaukee are believed to regularly inject themselves with drugs. Thirty-three other cities in the US have some kind of needle exchange program.

ACT UP/Milwaukee, which has been monitoring the development of the program, wrote in its June newsletter that officials at MAP said the program could start as early as September 1. But MAP spokesman Tim Kennedy denied that any timeline or target date existed.

Members of ACT UP contend that MAP has been particularly careful about the release of information about the proposed program, fearing a possible backlash could sabotage its implementation.

Homicide Charge Against PWA Stands

Beloit — A court commissioner in Beloit has denied a defense motion to dismiss a charge of attempted homicide against a man with AIDS who allegedly bit a police officer during a struggle earlier this year. Prosecutors argued that the bite was a 'deliberate attempt to spread HIV

Charles A. Rucker will be tried on charges of battery, bail jumping, battery to a peace officer and attempted first degree homicide of a police officer.

The attempted murder charge is one of nearly a dozen such charges against people with HIV/AIDS around the country.

Milwaukee Libraries Publish Gay/Lesbian Booklist

Milwaukee — For the first time ever, the Milwaukee County Federated Library System has published a list of recommended book titles about Gay and Lesbian subjects or written by Gay or Lesbian authors. The list, printed on heavy duty card stock, is available to the public at each of the county's branch libraries.

The booklist, which was

published to coincide with Gay and Lesbian Pride Month in June, contains 35 different titles under the categories of History, Fiction and Literature, Biography, Social Sciences and Popular Culture. Edmund White, Adrienne Rich, Armistead Maupin, Rita Mae Brown, Martin Duberman, Audre Lorde and James Baldwin are among the authors included.

The booklist follows close on the heels of a Cream City Foundation grant to the library system for the purchase of Gay and Lesbian books and periodicals.

Russia Repeals Stalin-Era Sodomy Statute

Gay Leaders Rejoice; Discos Open

Moscow, Russia — For decades under the communist regime, Gays in Russia led hidden and repressed lives, subjected to five years in a labor camp if their homosexuality became known.

But the legal repression of Russian Gays ended April 29 when President Boris Yeltsin signed a decree repealing most of Article 121, the law which made sex between consenting adult men illegal. Yeltsin retained part of the law which makes homosexual rape and sex between male minors illegal.

Lesbians were never officially included in the government proscription against homosexuality, apparently because the men drafting the law did not see Lesbians as a threat or take them seriously. But open Lesbians were often persecuted nonetheless, often being forcibly incarcerated in mental hospitals.

Article 121 dated back to 1936, when Joseph Stalin was dictator. Communist officials at the time viewed homosexuality as "bourgeois perversion," an evil that capitalist society was spreading to Russia.

The law was frequently used against people who challenged the communist system. No proof beyond another person's testimony was required for conviction, which made the provision a useful tool for the dictatorship. In 1974, for instance, Sergei Paradzhanov, a prominent film director, was sentenced to five years in a labor camp. Many believe he was

punished more for his controversial films than for his homosexuality.

As late as 1989, before the revolution that brought democratization to Russia, 500 men were sentenced to prison for homosexuality. In the first half of 1992, just ten men were imprisoned. Today, the law is no longer being enforced.

"A WONDERFUL EVENT"

Within weeks of the repeal, prisoners were being released, Gay groups were becoming more vocal, and Gay discos were opening in Moscow and St. Petersburg.

"This is a wonderful event. We've waited a long time for them to change the law," the editor of the Gay magazine Risk told Associated Press. "It allows people not to be scared to go to the doctor and to openly form Gay relationships."

Gay leaders think one of the most positive results of the repeal is that Gay men will feel more confident seeing doctors and asking for HIV tests. Previously, doctors would sometimes turn their Gay patients over to the authorities. The repressive atmosphere prevented Gay men from forming stable relationships and led many to seek anonymous sex with strangers. Gay leaders hope the repeal and greater AIDS education will minimize such risky behaviors.

"There is still a lot of homophobia in Russian society," Kevin Gardner, director of an AIDS service group in Moscow told AP. "But I think the repeal will help reduce the fear level of Gay men, which could translate into making it easier for them to get information and treatment."

Official statistics indicate that Russia has 700 cases of full blown AIDS, but activists say the number is probably ten times that and the number of people with HIV much greater still. HIV in Russia has been spread primarily through dirty needles and unprotected sex. Until recently, Russian hospitals, because of shortages, reused needles, inadvertently spreading HIV to patients. Condoms are still not widely available, but western entrepreneurs are moving to fill that void.

Gay groups and newspapers throughout Russia are rejoicing in the news of the repeal, hoping it will enable them to operate more openly without fear of retribution. Moscow has six different Gay publications of varying quality which until recently have been distributed in secretive underground fashion. Krylia (Wings) and the Tchaikovsky Foundation in St. Petersburg have become officially registered groups and plan to organize more visible public activities.

GAY NIGHTLIFE IN MOSCOW

Within weeks of the repeal, at least three new Gay bars opened in Moscow, according to Joe Seifert, a Milwaukee businessman who spent the last few months in the Russian capital. "A year ago, I wouldn't have believed it, the changes are so vast," he told In Step.

"You see a lot of open homosexuality now that you didn't see before. The police aren't so much of a problem anymore. They're much too busy

with other things."

"Before the law changed," said Seifert, "the only outlet for homosexuals was the park in front of the Bolshoi Theatre. They'd socialize at the Bolshoi Park and the park near the Kremlin. Chances are 9 out of 10 you'd run into Gays there. I'd met people in the park, we'd go for coffee, and they told me about the bars opening up."

Seifert said that after the last film had shown on Friday and Saturday nights, the lobbies of movie theatres were quickly converted to bars and dance floors, creating makeshift discos. The most impressive night spot he attended was the Cinema Mir (Peace) where 300-400 crowded in to dance and view a drag show. "They had some pretty good talent. I was really impressed," he said. He called Cinema Mir the "La Cage of Moscow."

comparing it to Milwaukee's dance club.

Seifert said that American music was very popular and the current smash as of May, 1993 seemed to be Gloria Gaynor's "I Will Survive," an oldies disco tune that has special meaning for Russia's long oppressed Gay community. He said that ABBA songs were also popular.

Seifert said the cover charge was equivalent to about \$3 in US currency, pretty expensive for Russians, but that soda and beer were just 15 and 30 cents each. He said Lesbians also came to the bars, making up about 25 to 30% of the

partiers.

Many Russian Gays and Lesbians emulate western fashions. Most wear jeans. The boldest Gay men wear earrings, and pink triangles and other buttons are often in evidence.

"PEOPLE ARE STILL AFRAID"

But Moscow is unlikely to see anything like the huge March on Washington in the United States.

"Most people are still afraid. Because it's been illegal for so many years, they're very, very apprehensive. I'd say 95% are still very closeted. They've got a 'sit back and wait and see' attitude. It's too new yet, the freedom is too new. It'll take years just like it did here," said Seifert. "It's almost like what we went through in the 1970s—that revolution. That's happening here now."

Seifert will be back in Moscow from July through September opening a production facility for his cosmetics firm. He promised to keep In Step apprised of new developments there.

Giving To New Harvest Foundation Is Up

Madison - Contributions to The New Harvest Foundation really turned upward in 1992, asserts the Foundation's veteran fundraiser, Don Lamb. An affable, sharply attired executive, Lamb has been involved with New Harvest since its founding in 1984.

"In those days," he recalls, "we used to meet one-on-one at lunch with our prospective donors. Today, we hold entertaining social hours in someone's stylish home, with soft music and tasty snacks and drinks." He alludes to a recent such event held in the historic lakeside home of Dick Wagner, long-time Madison political activist. "We raised \$10,000 in pledges there from about 15 men and women present. It shows that our community still cares about Gay and Lesbian issues," he smiles.

In 1991, there was concern that was no longer the case. Total donations to New Harvest that year dropped below total grants by nearly \$4,000 - \$22,000 in grants to only \$18,000 in contributions. "We were really worried, and started cutting back on our financial aid to worthy causes."

Lamb observed.

But in 1992, things started turning around. "Perhaps it was the focus on Gay and Lesbian issues during the U.S. Presidential campaign," he suggests. "But whatever, our people ended the year on an upbeat note for us - by reaching deep in their pockets and checkbooks and sending us over \$24,000 to support the causes New Harvest gives money to."

Will the trend continue? Don Lamb does not know. But he expects the current focus on Gay and Lesbian activism - the March on Washington, lifting the ban on Gays in the military — will strengthen the resurgent support for volunteer organizations like New Harvest.

"After all, we channel all of our resources to groups and programs that are totally committed to making life better and more secure for our people. That's a formula that can't fail," he predicts.

"Stonewall"

What Really Happened 24 Years Ago

Stonewall by Martin Duberman Dutton, Hardcover, \$23

On the last Sunday in June hundreds of thousands of Lesbians and Gay men will have hit the streets in virtually every large urban area in the United States (unless you are in Milwaukee when it happened two weeks earlier) and even across the world to commemorate the Stonewall Riots of 1969. Not so much an angry march as a joyous romp, today's Gay Pride Marches are a time when pro-Gay buttons and outrageously indiscreet t-shirts are worn, for many the only time such items will be worn during the year. In front of even more thousands of onlookers. although rarely by representatives of the straight media, for one day out of the year Lesbians and Gay men become the majority. Such normally taboo activities as exhibitions of same-sex affection, hand holding for example, suddenly yet briefly become acceptable.

But what of the actual Stonewall Riots? Despite their comparatively recent (by historical standards) occurrence, there has been virtually no recorded account of this rebellion. Yet the Stonewall Riots have nevertheless acquired an almost mythical significance, for many becoming synonymous with the start of the modern Gay Rights movement. Martin Duberman, one of the foremost writers and scholars of Gay and Lesbian history has sought to look beyond this mythology surrounding the Stonewall Riots in order to bring to light what really happened during those hot June nights 24 years ago.

In Stonewall Duberman focuses on six Gay and Lesbian individuals whose lives intersected during the riots: Yvonne, the black Lesbian daughter of a politically minded, outspoken mother; Ray, a young Hispanic transvestite whose street name is

Sylvia; Craig, teenage radical of the Mattachine Society who opened the country's first Gay bookstore; Jim, actor and former Yippie leader; Karla, the increasingly militant Lesbian feminist; and Foster, older and a veteran of the earlier "homophile movement." In tracing the lives of these six early activists, Duberman is able to take us through the many stages of the Gay movement.

Right from the start, Duberman debunks the myth that the modern Gay movement began with the Stonewall Riots. In his profiles of the six individuals. Duberman is able to illustrate both the repression that led to this revolution in Gay culture and the divisions based on race and gender that would emerge within the Gay & Lesbian Rights movement and within the community as well. The climax for Stonewall is appropriately enough the Riots themselves. Yet even Duberman's attempt to chronicle the events of June 28. 1969 are frustratingly sketchy, with many details in dispute. Also lacking are any photographic records of these monumental riots, despite Duberman's account of at least two individuals taking photos during the first night's rioting.

In all, Stonewall manages to accomplish the impossible, personalizing history. Not only are readers given what is by far the most comprehensive and accurate account of the Stonewall Riots, but has it placed in an entirely human perspective. These early leaders do not take heroic proportions but prove to suffer the same foibles to which we all are subject. That Stonewall reads more like a fiction, with all the qualities of plain good old-fashioned story-telling, than of an academic test proves that history can be not only exciting but also a damn good read!

Medical College Launches "Men At Work"

Seeks HIV/AIDS Prevention Study Volunteers

Milwaukee - The Community Health Behavior Program of the Medical College of Wisconsin has launched "Men at Work," a new HIV prevention program for Gay and Bisexual men in southeastern Wisconsin. The program will provide men with the most up-to-date strategies on ways to avoid contracting HIV infection, with a strong emphasis on ways to consistently maintain risk reduction behavior changes and to maintain safety in relationships. All men participating are expected to personally benefit from Men at Work by learning better ways to consistently stay safe, and will also contribute to research leading to improved methods of AIDS prevention and thereby be able to help others.

"More than any other segment of the American population, Gay men have changed behavior to reduce their risk for contracting HIV infection and have taken the lead in community efforts to prevent AIDS" said Jeffrey A. Kelly, Ph.D., MCW Professor of Psychiatry & Mental Health Sciences and director of the Community Health Behavior Program. "However, consistently maintaining change is difficult for many Gay men, and the risk for contracting HIV is high for persons who have any lapses to unsafe sex. For that reason, even men who are already knowledgeable about AIDS often want support to boost their efforts to remain

Men at Work focuses its attention on ways to avoid risk at all times and under all circumstances, is intended to support men's efforts to develop relationships that remain safe, and help people handle situations that could trigger risk. "Our objective," says Dr. Kelly," is to support Gay men in their efforts to have safe relationships not just for a week or a month, but for years to come."

All participants in Men at Work

will be invited to attend a day-long Saturday program, held by MCW personnel at a convenient eastside location. Because Men at Work is a study evaluating the best approaches for long-term HIV prevention, all men contributing to this AIDS prevention research will receive \$40 for attending the session and for completing detailed but confidential questionnaires on the day of the program.

In addition, participants will be asked to complete followup questionnaires, and some will be invited to attend later short followup sessions. Additional payments of \$20 for completing followup questionnaires and \$15 for followup sessions will be given to men willing to assist in the followup evaluation of the program. A total of 600 men from southeastern Wisconsin are sought to participate in Men at Work.

"We are pleased because Men at Work is not only a study intended to identify the best approaches for HIV prevention that will help in AIDS prevention everywhere, but is also a program that will offer the best available HIV prevention approaches to hundreds of Gay men of all ages in the Milwaukee area," said Dr. Kelly. The program is open to Gay or Bisexual men over age 18, and all sessions are led by MCW professional staff who adhere to the highest standards of confidentiality protection.

people are familiar with K-Y, or its generic equivalent, but there are others like Sex Grease, Wet, and Comfort which are available at the condom store and local adult bookstores.

Several of the new lubricants contain the spermicide Nonoxynol-9. This will kill the HIV virus on contact, but do not interpret that to mean you can use the spermicide without a condom. You should also be aware that for some people Nonoxynol-9 is an irritant, which means that blood vessels will move closer to the surface, possibly creating additional risk. If you find that Nonoxynol-9 is an irritant for you, you might want to use a water soluble lubricant that doesn't contain that spermicide.

Remember the choice is still LIVE SAFE OR DIE!

On a somewhat related subject, there seems to be a need for HIV+ people and those with AIDS to get together in a social setting. I am exploring the possibility of starting a social group to meet regularly, say on Fridays from 5pm until 7pm. This would be open only to those who are HIV+ or who have AIDS. It would NOT be a support group. Please write and tell me what you think of the idea and include suggestions for locations, days and times.

Condom Using Hints Positively

· Put on the condom before you enter vour partner.

· Make sure there is no air in the condom, including the tip.

· Use plenty of water based lubricant. (For example K-Y jelly, For-Play, PrePair and Probe.) Never use saliva!

· Hold onto the base of the condom when you're pulling out after intercourse to prevent the condom from coming off inside your partner.

· Use a fresh condom every time you have sex.

(See the diagram near this article showing the proper way to put on a condom.)

THE A-B-C-'s OF PUTTING ON A CONDOM



Gently squeeze the tip of the condom with one hand, making sure there is no air in the tip. (This leaves room for the semen when you ejaculate (cum), and forces out any air bubbles, which are a major reason condoms break.)

While you continue to squeeze the tip of the condom, forcing out any air, begin to unroll the condom down the length of your penis . . .





... carefully unrolling it all the way down to the base of your penis to the hair.

Condoms, Condoms Everywhere — So Use Them

One of the things I neglected in my article on safer sex was a detailed look at condoms (the "C" word) and lubricants. Of course had I included this information, my article would have been too long and no one would have read it.

Recently I paid a visit to the Mister Hard Head Boutique, Milwaukee's only condom store, It's at 420 E. Wells. between This Is It and the DeLind Gallery. This place eliminates all reasons for not using condoms. The selection is really worth seeing and sampling, from the very popular Glow in the Dark to the Lolly Pops (colored condoms on a stick) to the Camouflage Condom (ready for jungle warfare) to the Stealth Condom (you don't see it coming) to the Generic Condoms for cheap fuckers.

Choose your favorite flavored condom for oral sex. They carry the standard Kiss of Mint, but also have flavors like orange, banana and the very popular strawberry. Colored condoms abound, with

red being the most popular.

There are packages that look like large rolls of Lifesavers, but contain assorted color condoms. Condoms also come packaged as sandwich cookies, fortune cookies and nuts. One of the more interesting condoms is the Petermeter. This is perfect for all of you obsessed with size. It has ruler markings right on the condom. No more estimating size or enhancing reality. I also like the Masturbation Kit. which contains a condom, a latex glove and a Wet Nap. They also carry several water soluble lubricants and body rubs.

And speaking of lubricants, the wrong one will render a condom ineffective. That means not using anything with a petroleum base; no Vaseline, no hand lotion, no baby oil. You must use a water soluble lubricant. Besides protecting the condom, they actually wash away. Most

Berlin June 7. The new association was organized by Dr. Glick and Dr. Stephen N. Abel, Director of Dentistry, Spellman Center for HIV Related Disease, St. Clare's Hospital, New York, to provide improved oral healthcare to persons with HIV disease.

According to Dr. Glick, "DAAC has attracted many of the leading world specialists in the oral management of HIV disease. This extraordinary enthusiasm for DAAC's mission by leaders in the field of oral healthcare demonstrates the challenge presented to the global community by HIV disease."

The new association will provide a wide range of educational resources to its members. Among these will be a quarterly peer-reviewed publication, "DAACForum," an 800 number to answer questions presented by dental care professionals, and a series of local community meetings for both patients and care providers. Plans are also under way to form a network of oral healthcare professionals and other concerned professionals to conduct clinical trials. Additionally, in conjunction with the University of the Pacific School of Dentistry, San Francisco, California, DAAC will be sponsoring a national/international symposium on Clinical Management of Oral HIV Disease in 1994.

PAAC Targets Pain Management Education

Critical to AIDS Care

At a press conference at the IX International Conference on AIDS in Berlin on June 9, Mathew Lefkowitz, M.D., assistant professor anesthesiology, State University of New York, and chair of the pain management committee of the Physicians Association for AIDS Care (PAAC) called for a commitment by physicians to prescribe adequate dosages of narcotics to keep the public comfortable when severe pain is a complication of AIDS or other life-threatening disease.

According to Dr. Lefkowitz, "We can no longer, as professionals, accept our failure to keep our patients with severe or moderate pain comfortable." Dr. Lefkowitz cited statistics that indicate the 70 to 90 percent of cancer patients suffer moderate to severe pain and that 50 percent of physicians fail to prescribe adequate dosages of narcotics. Dr. Lefkowitz stated

that "these are unacceptable statistics for a profession whose oath is to do no harm. Allowing unnecessary pain may be the greatest harm that we can inflict on our patients."

Dr. Lefkowitz also cited anecdotal reports of increased suicide in AIDS patients, "not because they fear dying, but because they fear pain." According to Dr. Lefkowitz, "We spend more time debating the morality of physician-assisted suicide than we do addressing the pain management needs of our patients. It is possible that if we met our obligation to keep our patients comfortable, physician-assisted suicide would be a non-issue."

In an effort to educate physicians, other caregivers and patients on pain management issues, Dr. Lefkowitz announced the formation of PAAC's pain management committee and the committee's mission. Central to the mission is the establishment of a patient's moral and legal right to be kept comfortable when pain is a complication of AIDS-associated illness or other life-threatening disease. The committee will also launch a major educational effort to teach physicians, other caregivers, and patients about effective pain management and reduce concerns about respiratory and other possible complications of narcotics and what Dr. Lefkowitz cited as "unfounded concerns about patient's potential addiction to narcotics."

Other goals of the committee are to develop algorithms for effective control of pain in the immune-compromised patient not caused by a HIV associated disease; change providers attitudes on their reluctance to prescribe adequate pain control medication based on fear on addiction and/or respiratory or other complication of narcotics; develop provider guidelines for sharing decisions on pain control with patients; study differences on pain control priorities among diverse ethnic groups; study how religious beliefs may foster a reluctance to request pain relief; define the difference between pain and suffering; and establish guidelines to relieve suffering through supportive comfort care. The group also wants to provide patient education on their rights to appropriate pain control and how to exercise these rights.

State of Maryland, its impact is likely to be felt across the country. Hospitals eager to avoid any risk of lawsuits by patients who become hysterical when they learn that they were treated by an HIV infected person may consider transferring any surgeons and any other HIV infected health care workers who perform any invasive procedures out of patient care.

Some hospitals might go a step further, and require periodic HIV testing of all surgeons and health care workers who engage in invasive procedures. While employers cannot require testing before a job offer is made, once an offer is made, then the employers can make the job offer contingent on the results of a medical examination, including a HIV test. Such medical examinations are permissible only if an employer tests all employees within a job category.

Yet if a hospital instituted a system of testing all health care workers who theoretically could transmit HIV to patients, and then transferring all HIV infected health care workers out of patient care, it might run afoul of federal laws that protect the disabled. In 1992, the Civil Rights Reviewing Authority of the U.S.

Department of Health and human Services found that Westchester County Medical Center in New York had violated the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (which prohibits handicap discrimination), because it denied employment to an HIV infected pharmacist. The Medical Center had argued that there was a risk of transmission of HIV to patients because pharmacists use needles and syringes to transfer substances from one container to another. The panel found no direct threat to the health or safety of others, and ordered federal funds to the Medical Center cut off until the Center reversed its policy of discriminating against HIV infected employees.

Unfortunately, the Westchester decision was not a court decision, and may carry less weight than three court decisions that have upheld discrimination against a HIV infected nurse, dental student, and surgeon, on the grounds that these health care workers posed a significant risk of harm to patients. Moreover, the pharmacist was not involved in direct patient care.

HIV-Infected Health Care Workers At Risk From Court Decision

A unanimous decision by a Maryland court in March has thrown open a Pandora's box for both HIV infected health care workers and hospitals. It may well precipitate efforts by hospitals across the country to restrict the duties of HIV positive surgeons, and possibly some other HIV infected health care workers as well. Hospitals will be walking a tightrope, seeking to avoid the threat of lawsuits by patients upset that they were treated by an HIV infected health care worker, while simultaneously seeking to comply with federal laws that prohibit discrimination against the disabled.

The Maryland decision arose out of case involving two former breast cancer patients, who filed suit against the estate of a Maryland surgeon who died of AIDS and against Johns Hopkins Hospital, where their breast cancer surgery occurred. The women claimed that the surgeon was negligent in not disclosing his HIV positive status to them before operating, and that Johns Hopkins was negligent in allowing him to operate. (There was no indication that Johns Hopkins even knew the HIV status of Dr. Almaraz.) There was no claim by the plaintiffs that the surgeon (Dr. Almaraz) had failed to use proper barrier precautions, or that any incident had occurred during surgery that could have caused Dr. Almaraz' blood to enter the

women's bodies. Moreover, over a year after their surgeries, both women tested HIV negative.

The trial court had dismissed the plaintiffs' lawsuit, holding that the plaintiffs had not suffered any damages. The trial judge did not address the issue of whether or not Dr. Almaraz had any duty to disclose his HIV status to his patients.

The Maryland Court of Appeals (the highest court in Maryland) reversed the trial judge, and sent the case back to the trial court for further proceedings. The Appeals Court acknowledged that there are no known cases of transmission of the HIV virus from surgeons to patients. Nevertheless, the Court indicated that HIV infected surgeons might have a duty to warn patients of their HIV status before operating, stating:

We are unable to say, as a matter of law, that Dr. Almaraz owed no duty to the plaintiffs, either to refrain from performing the surgery or to warn them of his condition. ... While it may be unlikely that an infected doctor will almost surely die if the virus is transmitted.

It ruled that the plaintiffs' fear of acquiring AIDS, during the period of time between when they learned that Dr. Almaraz had died of AIDS (which they learned from the newspaper) and when they tested negative for HIV, was not necessarily unreasonable, and that they could recover damages for this period of time if the trial court concluded that Dr. Almaraz was negligent. The Appeals Court also said Johns Hopkins could be held liable, on the theory that a hospital is liable for the acts of its agents.

Although the decision is not a final ruling on the case (the case was sent back to the trial court for further proceedings) and although the decision technically applies only to lawsuits in the

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

Lesbian Music Trailblazer

Alix Dobkin has been singing the glory of women-loving-women and using the word "Lesbian" in her music since 1973. She blazed a trail for many women, some of whom are now making it big-time as "out" Lesbian singers (the k.d.s, Tracys and Melissas.)

A folk-singer from childhood, Alix had become good enough in 1971 to be wooed by two major recording companies. But then that Feminist "thang" hit her. She insisted on total control over every aspect of the record, including marketing. She voiced doubts about making music for men. "I had no idea I was falling in love with women. I just knew I'd had it with men." Needles to say, her chances to work for a major label evaporated.

But she persevered and as she gradually came to realize that she was a Lesbian and what that meant, she also formed her own record label, co-producing with Kay Gardiner the famous "Lavender Jane Loves Women." Life was never the same for Lesbians or women's music after that. Her history of recording continued with "Living With Lesbians" (1976); "XXALIX" (1980); "These Women Never Been Better"(1986); "Yahoo Australia" (1990); and "Love and Politics" (1992).

Alix Dobkin's music still relates a joy of discovery. Lesbian love, Lesbian sex and Lesbian community are celebrated in her continuous battle against patriarchy and all the "isms" that separate us. What is her message to the current generation of women? "Be your own agent. Reach deep inside and tell the truth. Let all the secrets out, no matter how horrid. Have fun and be free."

Organizers estimated approximately 1,000 shared at least part of the concert experience, and it was deemed a "big success" by celebration organizers.

It was the first time a second day was added to the Celebration, and organizers are already talking about extending the festival to two full days and evenings in '94 (instead of a full day and the previous evening's concert).

Sunday was the big day, starting off with a well attended interdenominational worship service and wrapping up with the BJ Daniels shortened revue (they ran out of time). In between, there was the Parade; entertainment scheduled to satisfy all musical tastes; the Queer Nation Wedding with dozens of participants; lots of great food, beer, and soda; Pride merchandise; informational booths; how-to demonstrations; shopping; and educational opportunities.

Approximately 2,000 marched in the parade, with many others watching it along the new route. A total of 11,000 were estimated to have attended the day-long event.

Only one arrest was made, contrary to some of you doom-sayers who "heard" that Harley-riding gangs would "tear the place up and bash some heads." No problems from that at all, just some demented anti-Gay skinhead with an "X" tattoed on his forehead who took a swing at some festivalgoers. Festival security and the Milwaukee Police Department were quick to react.

It really was an excellent, well organized event. (It must have been... even Lawrencia (Bambi) Bembenek was seen perusing the grounds with her lawyer boyfriend!)

Besides the potential extension of the festival to two full days, I've also heard rumblings of moving it from Juneau Park to

a new, larger location.

Another possible wrench in plans for '94 is that Chicago had to move their Pride Parade to the same weekend we had ours this year. Why? All the major cities that usually hold their Pride Parades on the 4th Sunday of June agreed last year to move their parades back a week so as not to conflict with New York's plans for the Gay Games & Cultural Festival, and the 25th anniversary of Stonewall festivities culminating with the big March on the UN on the 4th Sunday.

The first weekend looks like the logical left-over weekend. Let the Pride Committee know

what you think.

Now that we've talked about Pride, let me step back a few days to catch up with what went on between my last deadline (June 10) and deadline for this issue (June 24)...

Nitengale's reversed gears June
11 and became BoysTown, aimed at
