Showdown Time for Pentagon Ban and Colorado Amendment

Courts to Decide Fates of Major Gay Rights Issues

As In Step went to press, the fates of two major Gay rights issues, the Pentagon's ban on Gay and Lesbian service members and Colorado's anti-Gay Amendment 2, were being debated and decided by the judiciary

In Washington, the Clinton administration announced its intention of asking the Supreme Court for an emergency stay of an injunction ordered by Federal Judge Terry Hatter which prohibits the Pentagon from initiating or following through on any discharge procedures against soldiers because of their sexual orientation.

Judge Hatter had declared the Pentagon ban on Gays unconstitutional in January when he ordered Petty Officer Keith Meinhold reinstated to the Navy. He reiterated and strengthened his order on September 30, saying Clinton's new policy is just as unconstitutional as the previous restrictions, and threatened to charge the government \$10,000 per day if it does not comply with his order.

Hatter's order prohibits the military from "taking any actions whatsoever against Gay or Lesbian service members, or prospective service members, that in any way affects, impedes, interferes with or influences their military status, advancement, evaluation, duty assignment, duty location, promotion, enlistment or re-enlistment based upon their sexual orientation."

Hatter declared: "Sexual status alone is not sufficient to establish sexual conduct."

Gay rights advocates rejoiced at Hatter's order but were then angered by Clinton's decision to appeal to the Supreme Court.

In Step went to press before the

Supreme Court heard the appeal so, as of this writing, the Pentagon cannot implement its ban against Gays. However, Gay rights attorneys urged caution.

Attorney Michelle Benecke told the New York Times: "I want to caution against euphoria that the issue has been taken care of, because it has not. It will take time to go to the Supreme Court and even if the formal ban ends tomorrow. Gay service members are likely to continue to face tenacious harassment and discrimination."

AMENDMENT 2 IN COLORADO

Also as In Step went to press, lawyers argued before a Colorado district court for and against the constitutionality of Amendment 2, passed by 53% of Colorado voters last November. The amendment prohibits the state or localities from adopting laws which bar discrimination based on sexual orientation. It voids existing laws in the cities of Denver, Boulder and Aspen.

The decision on Amendment 2, which is likely to be appealed to the Colorado and U.S. Supreme Courts, is crucial because it will affect the outcome of similar right wing referendum campaigns in cities and states around the country.

An injunction is currently in effect blocking implementation of Amendment 2 until the courts decide on its constitutionality. A judge found "probable cause" that the measure infringes on the constitutional right of citizens to equal protection of the laws.

When Colorado for Family Values sought to lift the injunction earlier this year, the state Supreme Court rejected the request by a 5-1 vote, saying: "One's right to life, liberty and property. . . and other fundamental rights may not be submitted to a vote." The court ruled that only proof of a "compelling state interest" could override basic constitutional guarantees.

In the showdown which began on October 12. Colorado's Attorney General, charged with defending the Amendment, argued the "compelling state interest" at stake was the preservation of "family values," and that homosexuals do not constitute a legitimate minority in need of legal protections.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs (including Colorado resident Martina Navratilova) argued, as before, that Amendment 2 infringes on the rights to due process and equal protection of the laws enshrined in both the U.S. and Colorado constitutions.



Madison - As the Wisconsin Community Fund begins its twelfth year of bestowing grants on progressive groups throughout the state, at the helm of the organization are two veteran Gay activists who believe passionately in the fund's mission.

Ralph Navarro, a former President of Milwaukee's Cream City Business Association and the Lambda Rights Network, says he's found a "home" at the Wisconsin Community Fund. He is President of the Fund's Board of Directors.

"I got tired of working on single issues, tired of being separated and divided in my activism," Navarro told In Step. "The Wisconsin Community Fund provides a wholistic approach to all of my concerns and therefore I can focus my energy and do

Attorney's office that no illegal conduct had " occurred, officers again stopped a similar distribution at Hamilton High School.

The ACLU of Wisconsin believes that the police are violating the First Amendment rights of ACT UP members. In an October 15 letter to Chief Arreola, ACLU volunteer attorney Waring R. Fincke, called upon the MPD to stop interfering with protected First Amendment activities by ACT UP in the future. Fincke wrote that "My clients ... expect that your officers will not prevent them from exercising their civil rights, including preventing students from receiving the literature... Any violations of my client's rights will result in legal action for injunctive relief and damages."

ACLU of Wisconsin Executive Director Christopher Ahmuty said October 15, "The MPD must have better things to do than censoring a message which may just prevent one of our students from exposure to AIDS, ACT UPs message may make some officers uncomfortable, but that's no excuse to violate the First Amendment."

things here that have broad application to every issue that I'm concerned about."

The Fund provides grants averaging \$2,000 - \$3,000 to non- profit, grass roots groups "striving for democracy, diversity, justice, a sustainable environment, and social and economic equality." The primary beneficiaries have been women's groups, environmental projects, Native American, Latino and African American groups, peace and labor activists and Gay and Lesbian organizations.

Steve Starkey, recently appointed Executive Director of the Fund, also appreciates its broad progressive agenda.

"There's a real connection between the struggle of Native Americans, people working for environmental protection, and people working for Gay and Lesbian rights," he told in Step.

"All of the things we do are related to. each other. Some of the groups may seem different but our work all relates to the same thing, which is the empowerment of people who are disenfranchised in some way, whether by racism, sexism or homophobia."

Starkey, who was the production manager of the Gay newspaper Out in the 1980's, said: "It's important for the Gay and Lesbian community to support other progressive causes, and it's important for

the Gay and Lesbian community to realize that there's a lot of support for us from left groups — there's a mutual interest there. United we stand, divided we fall."

COUNTERING THE RIGHT WING

Indeed, another compelling issue motivating the leadership of the Fund is the knowledge that right wing groups are mounting aggressive campaigns and amassing huge treasuries.

"Wisconsin is taking a hard right turn," says Navarro. "I'm very concerned that there's nothing to even begin to counter the power of the growing right wing conservative movement in the state."

"We're a pip-squeak next to that big money," Navarro said of the Fund. "But because we're a statewide organization, because we're connected to many different places, we must nurture that and capitalize on it."

Future plans call for a survey to identify the many progressive groups in the state, to identify common attitudes and goals and to stimulate greater discussion and networking.

In the meantime, Wisconsin Community Fund (WCF) continues to give grants to community-based groups. Among this year's recipients are: the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee for its work on the Police Relations Task Force; Ujima, an African-American Gay and Lesbian group, for start-up and development; the Bad River Chippewa Tribe, to prevent construction of a waste incinerator on the reservation's border; Men Stopping Rape in Madison for preventive education against sexual assault; and 9 to 5 in Racine/Kenosha, for outreach and support to working women.

Since its founding in 1982, the Fund has disbursed almost a half million dollars to community groups working for justice or social change.

Staff members also conduct workshops for non-profit groups on fundraising and grant-writing. They sponsor sensitivity seminars on racism, sexism and homophobia. They provide training on Lotus software and, in partnership with the Lotus Philanthropy Foundation, WCF has awarded over \$150,000 worth of software to dozens of community groups.

NEW GRANT CYCLE BEGINS At the end of this year, WCF will send

out a request for proposals to the 1,200 community groups currently on its mailing list. After careful review and evaluation by its Grant Allocations Committee, which is made up of a diverse group of community activists including women, Gays and people of color, the Fund expects to give out more than \$100.000 in grants next spring.

The Fund is currently gearing up for its fall/winter fund drive with the goal of raising \$250,000. Starkey noted that donations from a small number of well-off individuals comprise the lion's share of the total received. But staff and Board members want to vastly increase the number of donors who give lesser sums to widen the group's base of support. Donations of any size are welcome, and all are tax-deductible.

Plans also call for the establishment of an endowment fund, which will ensure WCF's stability for the long term.




LAMM & Ujima Get Grants From Fund

LesBiGay Groups Hold Forum on Racism

Lively Debate Occurs, But Few Solutions Outlined

Milwaukee - About 40 people attended an open forum on "The State of Racism in the Milwaukee Gay Community" October 10 at the First Unitarian Church. The forum was sponsored by Men of All Colors Together and the Open Door Committee of the First Unitarian Society.

Patrick Bellegard-Smith of the Department of African American Studies at UW-Milwaukee began with an historical overview of how the ideology of racism developed alongside the expansion of slavery in the western world. He stressed that economic oppression was and is "an essential factor in racism."

Professor Bellegard-Smith presented several working definitions of racism, with the key point being that it is not just a matter of individual expressions of bigotry but a power structure institutionalized through all levels of society that oppresses people of color.

Brenda Coley, a longtime community activist known for her anti- racism work. facilitated the following discussion. She reinforced Prof. Bellegard-Smith's point by asking: "What are you willing to do to challenge the institution? Until we crack the institution, we can talk about loving each other all day long."

Representatives of local Gay and Lesbian groups then made individual statements. A Board member of the Lesbian Alliance said she felt it is largely the responsibility of white people to fight racism because whites have created and unfairly benefitted from it. Other speakers talked of the need for working together to solve the problem.

SEPARATISM OR COALITION?

The most powerful speech was delivered by Meloney Nelson of Black Lesbians United Emergence. Using the metaphor of a pie, she seemed to argue for Black separatism, saying the taste of "integration pie" had become "bittersweet."

and that "we have the ingredients for a sweeter, richer pie in our own kitchen."

Others expressed the belief that only by working in coalition could the LesBiGay community resolve issues of racism and sexism.

Rodney Johnson of Ujima noted that groups dominated by whites control 95% of the financial resources of the Gay community. He called for a "re-distribution" of resources in the LesBiGay community "so that everyone has a voice."

Most in attendance agreed that the forum was an important means of beginning dialogue on racism in the LesBiGay community. But many expressed frustration with the absence of specific suggestions for problem-solving.

For instance, in her speech, Nelson cited as examples of her disillusionment the lack of representation of people of color in leadership positions at the annual PrideFest celebration as well as discriminatory treatment by Gay bar owners. Community groups have the power to put pressure on these institutions to change their ways. Discrimination is against the law, and bar owners should be made accountable. Unfortunately, none of these suggestions for pro-active response were discussed.

A spokesman for Men of All Colors Together promised to host more such forums in the future. Perhaps those can move beyond identifying the issue of racism to focus on specific methods of problem solving.

LesBiGay concerns at UW-M.

Open hearings are scheduled for Tuesday, November 9 from 6-7 p.m. in the Union Fireside Lounge, and Wednesday, November 10 from 12:30-1:30 p.m. in the Union's Wisconsin Room Lounge. All hearing sites are located in the Student Union at 2200 E. Kenwood Boulevard.

Closed hearings (closed to the press to ensure the anonymity of those who wish to testify) will take place Tuesday, November 16 from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. in Union E309, and on Wednesday, November 17, from 6-7 p.m. in Union E250.

The Task Force on Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Issues, made up of students, staff and faculty, was appointed by Chancellor John Schroeder to investigate issues of concern to the school's LesBiGay community and to recommend any needed reforms to the administration by the end of the 1993-94 academic year.

The Task Force will assess the campus climate for LesBiGay people, study the coverage of LesBiGay subjects in the curriculum, and examine the university's policies regarding employee benefits, among other matters.

The Task Force is also likely to suggest some permanent mechanism for representing the needs of the LesBiGay community through university governance. Its overall mission is bolstered by a "vision" statement formulated by UW-M last year which reads, in part: "The campus will be esteemed as a community that values mutual respect and dignity among individuals with diverse backgrounds and divergent ideas."

LESBIGAY LIAISON APPOINTED

In what many LesBiGay activists see as a sign of progress at UW-Milwaukee, the Office of the Dean of Students has assigned one of its staff members, Thomas Dake, as an official part-time liaison to their community.

Dake told In Step he was "very happy" to be appointed liaison. He sees his job as "bringing student concerns into administrative channels and helping to interpret Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual issues to the administration."

Washington, D.C. — The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, which puts the power of its national donor network behind the campaigns of qualified Gay and Lesbian candidates, has endorsed and funded a record number of candidates this year.

Among the success stories have been Wisconsin's own Tammy Baldwin, elected to the State Assembly last November, and Shelley Gaylord, elected to Madison's Municipal Court earlier this year. Another Lesbian candidate, Jackie Goldberg, was elected to the Los Angeles City Council, and a Gay man, Craig McDaniel, was elected to serve on the Dallas City Council.

having official liaisons to their schools' LesBiGay communities. UW-M's Task Force on Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Issues joins similar task forces in operation at UW campuses in Madison, La Crosse, River Falls and Whitewater.

Dake's appointment and the announcement of the November hearings at UW-M roughly coincided with the second meeting of LesBiGay faculty and staff members from throughout the UW System at UW- Oshkosh on October 8. The first such networking meeting, organized by Jan Shepard, LesBiGay liaison on the Madison campus, took place last May.

Discussion at the daylong meeting in Oshkosh focussed on three primary areas: campus climate, curriculum and university policies. Much networking took place among the approximately 40 people in attendance. Individuals from campuses with progressive attitudes and policies toward LesBiGay students and staff offered some advice and support to those from more conservative campuses.

The group agreed to meet again, probably in February.

For further information on the hearings scheduled at UW-M in November, call Thomas Dake at (414) 229-5780. On Tuesday, November 2, six candidates recommended by the Victory Fund will be on ballots across the country. Marilyn Shafer is seeking to become a Civil Court Judge in Manhattan and Wallace Swan is running for the Minneapolis Board of Estimate and Taxation.

Derek Belt is campaigning for a seat on the Attleboro, Massachusetts City Council Christine Kehoe is running for the San Diego City Council. Michael Nelson hopes to become a member of the Carrboro, North Carolina City Council as does Tom Roberts in his hometown of Santa Barbara.

The Victory Fund has endorsed three other candidates (so far) whose elections are scheduled for 1994. Larry Bagneris is vying for a seat on the New Orleans City Council. Ken Wolf is seeking to become City Commissioner of Fort Lauderdale, and Victoria Sigler is running for Dade County Court Judge in Florida.

The steady increase in endorsements is proof that the Victory Fund is succeeding in its primary goals: maximizing the number of openly Lesbian and Gay officials who hold elective office, and maximizing the number who seek it.

"We can't accomplish the first goal without accomplishing the second," said William Waybourn, Victory Fund Executive Director. "The commitment of our members to Gay and Lesbian empowerment is helping to encourage more and more in our community to consider running."

Members of the Victory Fund pay \$100 or more to join the network, then agree to support at least two recommended candidates over the next 12 months with direct contributions of \$100 or more.

"The impact of Victory Fund combined contributions can really make a difference in a race," said Waybourn. Indeed, Tammy Baldwin has credited the \$11,000 she received from the Victory Fund with helping put her over the top in her successful bid for the Assembly last fall.

On November 21, the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund will hold a special event at the Skylight Opera Theatre in Milwaukee. Special guests will include Clinton-Gore campaign advisor David Mixner, bodybuilders Bob and Rod Jackson-Paris, Rep. Baldwin, and

This past year, Nelson, the only member of the Committee's Board of Directors from the Midwest, served as Co-Chair of the Committee with the Executive Chair of the Gay Men's Health Crisis in New York City.

The Washington D.C. based AIDS Action Council is the nation's most powerful AIDS lobby dedicated to influencing federal AIDS policy. The public Policy Committee formulates the policy initiatives and prioritizes the policies that the AIDS Action Council implements.

"Because national health care reform will be a primary issue in the country over the next year, ARCW's powerful involvement at the national level is coming at the best possible time and will have a major impact on national issues that affect men, women and children with HIV," said Nelson.

ARCW, a non-profit social service agency, operates the Milwaukee AIDS Project, Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project-Kenosha, Northwest Wisconsin AIDS Project- Eau Claire and the Wisconsin Community-based Research Consortium. These agencies provide compassionate care for more than 900 people living with AIDS and HIV disease, innovative and aggressive HIV prevention programming, issue-related advocacy and HIV clinical research.

One Guilty, Another On Trial in Murder of Tina Terry

Milwaukee — A jury has found one of two defendants in guilty on all three counts in the murder of llet (Tina) Terry. A second trial began October 18 for the second man charged in the case. The two men have been accused in the August murder of Ms. Terry, proprietor of Tina's RTI, a popular bar frequented by members of Milwaukee's African American Gay and Lesbian community.

Terry was shot to death while coming to the assistance of her doorman, Carlton Jackson, who was shot by intruders in the early morning hours of July 10 at the north side bar. Jackson has made a slow recovery from serious wounds.

Alonzo Peavy, 19, who was found guilty of first degree intentional homicide, attempted first degree intentional homicide and being party to a crime. The second defendant, Jamal Purifoy, 22, was on trial as In Step went to press. Both men plead not guilty, and were tried separately. Prosecuting District Attorney Carol Kraft is conducting the cases before Circuit Court Judge Patricia McMahon.

Manitowoc Woman to Stand Trial for Murder

Manitowoc — Theresa Radl, 24, is scheduled to go on trial January 10 for the first degree intentional homicide of John Hauke, 48, last August. She is also charged with burglary, armed burglary and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. Radl allegedly shot Hauke to death. She has pleaded not gulity.

Radi's case got much media attention at the time of her arraignment, when a Sheriff's Department detective testified that Radi called police and confessed to the crime. Associated Press reported that Det. Larry Conrad said Radi told him she was frustrated with her life after the failure of a business and a Lesbian relationship, and that she killed Hauke so she could go to prison where she could be among other women.

In Step spoke with Erik Loy, the Public Defender assigned to Radl's case. Loy said the issue of Radl's Lesbianism "was



sensationalized and blown out of proportion." He described her as "generally stressed out and down on life." Loy declined to discuss any more details, citing the pending trial, but admitted it would be "a challenging case."

Madison Police Chief Meets with Community

Madison — Madison's newly appointed Police Chief, Richard Williams, is scheduled to meet with representatives of the Gay and Lesbian community at the City/County Building on Wednesday, October 27 at 10 a.m.

The meeting with Chief Williams was facilitated by Detective Alix Olson, a Lesbian officer. When the city was conducting its search for a new chief earlier this year, Olson and other Gay and Lesbian officers on the Madison Police force had asked that consideration be given to a candidate who understood the diverse population the department serves, including a large LesBiGay community.

Chief Williams is an African American formerly with the Montgomery County, Maryland Sheriff's Department. A 26-year police veteran, Williams worked his way up from street cop to chief.

MASN Gets \$5,000 Grant from Milwaukee Foundation

Madison — The Madison AIDS Support Network has received a \$5,000 grant from the Wisconsin AIDS Fund of the Milwaukee Foundation. The grant will help in the development of the Rodney Scheel House, a 23-unit, independent living facility for people with AIDS and HIV infection and their families.

The Wisconsin AIDS Fund, established by the Milwaukee Foundation in 1988, has distributed more than \$300,000 in grants. Its purpose is to reduce the impact of HIV/AIDS in Wisconsin by supporting prevention, care and treatment programs.

MASN leads south central Wisconsin in the delivery of those services to people with HIV/AIDS. MASN can be contacted at (608) 238-6276.

Prison Inmates and Staff Raise Money for AIDS Care

Sturtevant — While 8,000 people walked along Milwaukee's lakefront September 26 in the 4th annual AIDS Walk, inmates and prison staff at the Racine Correctional Institution in Sturtevant also participated in the event, albeit in the confines of the prison yard, raising \$1,300 for the fight against AIDS.

The goal of raising at least \$1 per person was achieved. This may seem a tiny amount to some, but quite a bit to inmates who earn just a few pennies a day for their work behind bars.

Inmate Joe Woller, a Gay man who is HIV-positive, wrote to In Step to report on the successful event which he says raised awareness within the institution about AIDS. (See "Letters" section.)


Woller, who is a volunteer for the Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project, said he walked on behalf of friends who have died from the disease: "No one ever deserves to die of this disease no matter who they are or how they got it. . How awesome it would be if all of you in society would give a dollar to fight AIDS and show compassion and care."

Milwaukee Still Has No Policy to Control Crypto

Milwaukee — Despite dozens of deaths and hundreds of thousands of people falling ill from Milwaukee's tainted water earlier this year and despite feverish consultations between government officials and scientists about preventing such disasters in the future, the City of Milwaukee has still not adopted any policy for preventing or controlling the presence of cryptosporidium in its water supply.

Seven months after the parasitic epidemic ravaged the city, the only decision made by a special advisory committee is that if chemists at the Water Department detect levels of crypto again, they should send a fax alerting the City Engineer, the Health Department and the Public Works Commissioner. Other than that, there are no guidelines on whether more tests should be conducted, whether the water plants should be shut down, or whether or when the Mayor's Office or the public should be notified.

A staff member at the Milwaukee AIDS Project said MAP was continuing to advise clients to drink bottled or boiled water and was busy supplying much of the water to them. More than 40 clients of MAP have died from complications brought on by the cryptosporium parasite, which their weakened immune systems could not fight.

New Hope Congregation

Closes in Milwaukee

Milwaukee — The New Hope United Church of Christ, a congregation attended by Gays and Lesbians on Milwaukee's south side, has closed its doors because of diminishing membership and financial shortfalls.

The church gained wide publicity in 1990 when an avowed Lesbian, Rev. Margarita Suarez, was appointed its minister. But she surprised many of her congregants a year or two later when she married a man. While In Step is aware of several church members who became disaffected because of this, both Suarez and spokesmen for the United Church of Christ denied this was the reason the church closed down.

Plymouth Church at 2717 E. Hampshire is another United Church of Christ congregation that accepts Gays and Lesbians, and the Brown Deer United Church of Christ at 6380 W. Dean Road has a longtime Lesbian minister, Rev. Jan Doleschal.

Massive Rainbow Flag to Grace Stonewall 25

Pittsburgh, PA — "Raise the Rainbow" is a project to create the world's largest rainbow flag, one mile long by 30 feet wide, to be unfurled during next June's celebration of Stonewall 25 in New York City. The project is being underwritten by the Stadtlanders Foundation and tax-deductible contributions, with proceeds of up to a half million dollars earmarked for AIDS service groups across the country.

The massive rainbow flag will be unfurled on June 26, 1994 during the Stonewall 25 International March on the United Nations to Affirm the Human Rights of Gay and Lesbian People. More than 10,000 individuals are needed to help carry the colorful banner, made with 17,000 square yards of material, up Fifth Avenue.

Those who want to help carry the flag are asked to register with a tax-deductible contribution of \$50 or more to the Stadtlanders Foundation, which is the charitable arm of the pharmaceutical firm. They will also receive as a souvenir a small strip of the historic banner after its appearance.

U.S.: Clean Needles Do Reduce Spread of HIV

Washington, D.C. — After a lengthy and comprehensive study of programs throughout the country, the U.S. government has concluded that needle exchange programs do indeed slow the spread of HIV and that the government ought to end barriers to such programs and finance their expansion.

The investigative panel found little evidence that needle exchange programs promote the use of illegal drugs. Instead, people utilizing such programs are exposed to education and medical attention they might not otherwise get. They learn of the dangers of dirty needles, learn how to use bleach to clean needles when necessary and even curtail their drug usage somewhat.



At least 37 needle exchange programs exist nationwide. Many are run illegally because of federal, state and local laws which prohibit them. The government's interest lies in the fact that of the more than 300,000 Americans with AIDS, a third of them were infected through tainted needles or through unprotected sex with a partner who injects drugs.

Newly appointed Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders, who has vowed to mount an aggressive war against AIDS, has the responsibility to recommend lifting current federal restrictions and to call for government financing of such programs.

Father in Custody Battle Criticizes Decision

Richmond, VA — The biological father of a 2-year-old boy who was taken from his Lesbian mother after a judge ruled she was "unfit" because of her sexual orientation has condemned the decision, saying it is "totally wrong."

The case drew national attention in September when Judge Buford Parsons stripped custody of little Tyler from his mother, Sharon Bottoms, and granted it to the boy's grandmother. Parsons declared Bottoms an unfit parent because of her "illegal and immoral" conduct. Bottoms lives with her Lesbian partner.

Dennis Doustou relinquished legal rights to Tyler when he and Bottoms divorced. "I was young, I was stupid. I figured that Tyler was better off without me," he told Associated Press.

But Doustou defended his ex-wife and insisted she should have been granted custody because Tyler "means the world to her." About her Lesbianism, he said: "If that's what makes her happy, I don't have anything against it. There's nothing that says Lesbians and Gays cannot raise kids. It's no reason to take a child from his mother. That's totally wrong."

P-FLAG Adds "Families" to Its Name

Washington, D.C. — At its annual convention in September, the international federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (P-FLAG) voted to revise its name by adding the word "Families." P-FLAG's acronym will remain the same, but now it stands for Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. George Neighbors Jr., a P-FLAG


spokesman, explained: "We felt it was important that we try to include as many people as we can. The whole idea of family values has been perverted and twisted by the right wing, and it's time that people realize that real family values are about unconditional love and support of your family members.

In a recent survey conducted by the Washington Blade, P-FLAG was found to be the fourth largest group in the nation working for Gay and Lesbian rights (after the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Lambda Legal Defense Fund). It has an annual budget of nearly \$1 million.

Journalists Rate Newsrooms for Gay Sensitivity

Miami, FL — TV and radio newsrooms may be generally good environments for Lesbians and Gay men to work in, but there's a wide gap in the way newsroom managers and Gay journalists view

coverage of Gay issues, according to a study by the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association and the Radio and TV News Directors Association.

While both Gay journalists and news directors said they occasionally heard anti-Gay slurs in their newsrooms, a majority of both groups agreed that newsrooms are, overall, comfortable places for Gays and Lesbians.

However, while 72% of news managers gave high marks to media coverage of homophobic violence, the debate over the Pentagon ban and other Gay issues, only 35% of Gay and Lesbian journalists believed the coverage is good. In addition, many Gay journalists who are "out" to their colleagues say they are rarely consulted about coverage of Gay issues.

Billy Graham Apologizes for Slur Against PWAs

Cleveland, OH — Evangelist Billy Graham has apologized for a comment he made during his recent crusade in Ohio, suggesting that AIDS is "a judgment of God."

"Is AIDS a judgment of God?" Graham asked rhetorically during a sermon. "I could not say for sure, but I think so. The Lord is not going to let any nation or any person get away with living in adultery or fornication, for these are grievous sins. The Bible says we are going to pay for our sins. The Lord may already have your casket in town."

After a firestorm of criticism, Graham told the Cleveland Plain Dealer: "I do believe that God stands in judgment of all sins. AIDS is a disease that affects people and is not part of that judgment. To say God has judged people with AIDS would be very wrong and very cruel. I would like to say that I am very sorry for what I said."

Also on the Newswire ...

Washington, D.C. — In mid-October, Congress approved a massive increase in funding for AIDS research and care, boosting spending for the epidemic by almost 30% to \$2.5 billion, surpassing government expenditures for cancer or any other major diseases. As In Step went to press, President Clinton was expected to sign the bill.



Dear Editor:

On September 26, 1993 Magic Johnson and Mike Dunleavy, the coach of the Milwaukee Bucks, co-chaired the 4th annual Wisconsin AIDS Walk. The AIDS Walk drew over 8,000 walkers and raised over \$500,000.

On that same day, inmates and staff members at Racine Correctional Institution in Sturtevant also held an AIDS Walk. With 27 walkers and runners taking part, over \$1,300 was raised for the AIDS Walk. With an inmate population of about 900 and a staff of over 100, the awareness of education, research and AIDS care was raised. People of every ethnic background and lifestyle, including the warden, staff and inmates, all actively participated. Indeed, a very diverse population at the prison actively put forth a very successful effort in the ongoing fight against a horrific disease that touches us all.

The society at large has attached the stigma that all inmates in prison are cruel, awful, selfish and horrible people. That is not now nor has it ever been the case. Yes, people in prison have broken the law but that does not mean that they are "bad" people. Every person in prison is loved by someone out there in society, perhaps you.

I believe that the judges, district attorneys and law enforcement officials have contributed very little if anything to the fight against AIDS. Inmates with very little money gave a portion of their pay with one inmate giving \$10 and another donating \$15, so that the goal of \$1 per person was achieved and exceeded. Over 75% of the staff donated to this worthwhile battle

against AIDS and ignorance. How awesome it would be if all of you in society would give a dollar to fight AIDS and show compassion and care.

I am an inmate here at the institution and also a volunteer for the Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project. I walked in the Walk for Sherry, Danny, Jack, Roberta, Ricky and other friends of ours who were not able to walk this year because this disease took their lives. I love and miss them all and keep them and their families in my prayers. No one ever deserves to die of this disease no matter who they are or how they got it. Certainly no one went out looking to get infected.

In closing, I would like to leave you with these parting thoughts. In December, on World AIDS Day, stop and say a prayer and remember Ryan White, Arthur Ashe and Magic Johnson and all the others still living with HIV and AIDS. Do not be afraid of an infected person but rather be accepting and compassionate. I truly hope that none of you will have to go through facing the loss of a loved one to this disease. Keep hoping and praying, and LET US ALL BE HERE FOR THE CURE. Take care.

Thanks for your wonderful coverage and great photos of the Wisconsin AIDS Walk in the recent edition of In Step. I want to clarify a couple of issues that were raised about the Walk in your "Steppin' Out" column.

We were pleased that Magic Johnson drew 8,000 walkers, almost twice as many as last year. Although it would have been wonderful to have also doubled the dollars raised, the experience of AIDS Walks around the country that have grown even larger than ours is that the increase in attendance is always greater than the increase in funds raised. The Walk is intended to increase AIDS awareness as well as raise much needed funds. Our hope is that the greater awareness that has been generated from Magic Johnson's visit will result in a greater commitment and more funds raised in the years to come.

We are thrilled that the Walk exceeded its goal again this year by raising \$550,581. This amount is entirely generated from the Walk itself. The \$100,000 donation from the Magic Johnson Foundation was a separate contribution that had been received earlier to support the programs of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. Magic Johnson's time in Milwaukee was limited on the day of the Walk. He addressed the Walk Breakfast, the opening ceremonies of the Walk, and walked a small portion of the Walk before he was obligated to participate in a press conference and than attend an important meeting with members of the Black Health Coalition.

The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin is deeply grateful to the 8,000 walkers and 430 volunteers — all of whom made the Walk a much bigger success this year. Twenty AIDS service agencies throughout Wisconsin will benefit from this success.

Next year the Walk will need to be even more successful as these agencies struggle to deliver services that keep pace with the worsening HIV epidemic. The Walk has become an annual statewide rallying event in the fight against AIDS and is truly a lifeline for Wisconsin's AIDS service agencies and the thousands of people with HIV disease whom they serve.

AIDS Vaccines Contracts Pave Way for Large National and International Studies

With the awarding of two five-year contracts, the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) continues to lay the groundwork for large, multisite trials to examine the effectiveness of promising vaccine candidates that might prevent AIDS in high-risk populations in the United States and abroad.

Abt Associates, Inc. of Cambridge, Mass., will oversee the domestic master contract to conduct feasibility studies and manage multisite HIV vaccine trials in the United States. Family Health International (FHI) of Research Triangle Park, N.C., will administer the international master contract for similar services outside of the United States. Estimated first year costs for the contracts are \$4.3 million for Abt and \$2.2 million for FHI.

"NIAID is committed to providing direction and funding to begin Phase III vaccine efficacy trials as soon as promising candidates are available," says Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., director or NIAID. "While we as yet cannot fully foresee the timing, number, design and magnitude of clinical trials that may be required for testing these candidates, NIAID anticipates that several domestic and international multicenter Phase III efficacy trials could begin between 1994 and 1998.

"Behavior changes have reduced the transmission of HIV, but such modifications alone have not stopped HIV from spreading," says Dr. Fauci. "Having a safe, effective vaccine could make a significant impact towards successful, global control of this pandemic."

Already in the United States, NIAID has completed 3 trials and is conducting 12 trials of several HIV vaccine candidates at the institute's AIDS Vaccine Evaluation Units (AVEUs). Specifically, investigators of these phase I and II studies are evaluating the vaccines' safety and ability to stimulate the immune system in more than 1,250 men and

women uninfected with HIV. The five AVEUs are at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md., St. Louis University, Mo., University of Rochester, N.Y., University of Washington in Seattle and Vanderbult University in Nashville, Tenn.

In late 1992, NIAID launched the first Phase II trial of a preventive HIV vaccine in the AVEUs. Unlike the earlier trials, some participants in this study have a history of behavior that puts them at high risk for HIV infection-injection drug use, multiple sex partners or a sexually transmitted disease. As part of the trial, they receive repeated counseling to avoid such high-risk behavior. In addition to providing safety and immunogenicity data, the trial will help determine if such individuals, representative of people likely to enroll in large-scale trials, respond differently to vaccines.

Geared Towards Hispanic/Latino Community

Milwaukee - The Milwaukee AIDS Project will conduct two AIDS Awareness Workshops, scheduled for Wednesday, October 27, and Wednesday, November 17. Each session will begin at 7:30pm at the Social Development Commission Southside Neighborhood Center, 913 W. Madison St., Milwaukee.

The programs, designed to meet the needs of Milwaukee's Hispanic and Latino communities, are being presented by the Milwaukee AIDS Project, and sponsored by United Migrant Opportunities Services, SER Jobs for Progress, the Sixteenth Street Community Health Center, and La Causa Day Care Center.

Representatives from the Milwaukee AIDS Project will give a basic overview of AIDS and HIV disease, including how the virus is transmitted, HIV antibody testing procedures and the effects of HIV on the body. Participants' questions will be addressed, as well as methods to prevent HIV from spreading.

thing was the effect that it had on me.

Having watched, received and performed piercings, I was strangely stunned by what I saw. The procedure itself didn't bother me; the appropriate precautions were taken. I guess I just never expected to see a high-school aged teen receive a piercing that I consider to be an "adult thing."

We are again faced with a recurring theme. A segment of the population creates or adapts something as a symbol. It can be anything from an article of clothing to a complex code of behavior, what matters is that the thing has meaning to those who share it. This "thing" is then adopted by others outside the original group, not because of what it symbolizes, but because it appears attractive to them.

So what was once a symbol of commitment to some is now little more than a fashion touch.

I will still keep my nipple ring, and plan on having more piercings and tattoos done in the future. I just hope I can do it without becoming fashionable.

conference in Madison. It was gratifying to see such a high level of interest in the subject of HIV/AIDS, not only care and treatment issues, but education as well. The meetings were attended by more than 600 people from all over Wisconsin. I strongly believe that more doctors and minority people should attend these meetings, but as usual most of those in attendance were white female nurses. I also would like to see a few more people with AIDS in attendance at meetings like this.

The meeting was opened by Gov. Tommy Thompson, who over the years has surprised many by being very supportive of AIDS issues. He introduced Mary Fisher who then gave the keynote address. Mary Fisher is the HIV+ woman who addressed the Republican National Convention last year. She is a strong compassionate voice in the fight against AIDS. Just in case you thought I was going to give you a blow by blow synopsis of the meeting, not to worry, it will only be highlights.

A lot of time at the conference was devoted to working with teenagers to prevent the spread of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases. This is a really important topic, because if we cannot influence the behavior of people just becoming sexually active, we will never put an end to this plague. Most appropriately the emphasis was on teaching kids self esteem and the importance of making decisions based on thought rather than visual advertising images.

There were many interesting sessions on a variety of other topics as well, including TB, community behavior programs and for me personally an excellent presentation on nutrition. The nutrition session was presented by Cade Fields Newman who has worked extensively with AIDS patients at San Francisco General Hospital. She spent a lot of time on nutritional evaluation and the importance of diet and the body's ability to absorb nutrients. This is the kind of

information that needs to be more readily available and particularly should be required for physicians. The conference had a lot of good materials available, and while they're all from drug companies or pharmacies, they contain useful information on nutrition, including recipes for keeping one's weight up. Check with your doctor or local AIDS Service Organization for additional information.

I could hardly report on the State Conference without talking about the session on AIDS/HIV: Wounding and Healing the Spirit. Of course the fact that I was on this panel has nothing to do with my wanting to talk about it. (Just a joke!) As I mentioned in my previous article I really enjoy having the opportunity to speak before an audience and particularly to answer their questions. And when I have the opportunity to talk both seriously and irreverently it's even more rewarding. Unlike several other panel members, God is not my spiritual center, I am my own spiritual center. My belief in myself and my sense of humor are what keep me going. This is in no way meant to disparage anyone else's point of view. A belief in something can be a strong motivating force in keeping up your mental and physical health.

Finally, one of the great rewards of writing this column, other than the opportunity to say whatever I want to say, is to find out that people really read what I write. While most of my friends and acquaintances read my column (they better), it's knowing that it's read around the state that counts. I had the pleasure of having a case manager from Green Bay tell me he reads these columns and copies them for clients. Thanks!

Piercing

I remember when I got my "erotic piercing." I had been waiting for several months to have my left nipple pierced, and in many ways, this marked a turning point in my life.

I had several reasons for having the piercing done, but the primary one was commitment. For me, the piercing symbolized my decision to pursue the life that I had chosen for myself. It meant that I would be marked forever as a LeatherMan.

There was no peer pressure involved in my decision to have the piercing done; I didn't do it because I thought it would look cool, nor was it done as an act of rebellion.

Many people have the same reasons for getting their piercings, or tattoos, or even cuttings (incisions used to create patterns of scar tissue). All of these procedures were historically used as "coming of age" rituals by tribal cultures, and in many ways their use in the Leather Community has been similarly inspired.

Now, however, these same procedures have achieved a new following; they have crossed over into pop culture. They have become Trendy With The Teenagers!

I suppose it was destined to happen eventually. Adolescents have been searching out new and exciting ways to shock and dismay their parents (and other . members of the "older" generation) since time began. I'd be willing to bet that when our earliest ancestors started cooking meat over this new thing they called fire, it was nothing more than a cleverly devised way to get their parents to scrunch up their faces with obvious distaste and exclaim, "I don't know why you always have to be trying every new fad that comes along! What will the neighbors think? I just hope you have the good sense not to do that sort of thing when your Grandmother comes to visit!"

In the Sixties, shocking and dismaying one's parents was much easier. For men, having your ear pierced and growing your hair long was more than satisfactory. For women, openly disagreeing with their father's political beliefs was sufficient. For the truly daring, burning a bra or a draft card was enough to send shock-waves through an entire extended family.

Lately, surprising one's parents is more challenging than anybody of my generation ever imagined. For instance, how can you shock your father by growing your hair and getting your ear pierced if your father's hair grows halfway down his back and he wears larger earrings than your mother? Obviously, something more dramatic is called for.

But what could fill the bill?

A few months ago, I saw a promo spot on MTV where — through a series of video flashes — a mild-mannered, button-down sort of guy was transformed into a leather wearing wild-man, complete with harness and arm bands, sporting rings from his nasal septum and both nipples. I viewed it as a caricature, something designed to be amusing. It didn't offend me, but it did disturb me on some level.

Then a few days ago I saw an episode of Oprah. Now please understand that I don't make it a habit of watching every talk show that comes down the line (besides my roommate won't let me watch too many of them, I get too worked-up and eventually start yelling at the guests and audience members when they say stupid, narrow minded, prejudicial things, but that's another story) but I happened to catch this show about parents who hated the way their teenagers dressed and wanted to give them makeovers.

In addition to showing the obligatory before and after shots of the teens, there was also video footage of one young woman in what appeared to be a doctor's office having her naval pierced. I guess this was done to show why the mother so disliked her daughter's wardrobe and personal style, and it definitely elicited a steady stream of moans, groans and nauseated looks from audience members (even Oprah herself looked pretty shaken-up). Cutting The Heart Out Of Civil Rights Legislation

Wisconsin's Supreme Court Decision Undermines Historic Gay Rights Bill

A 1993 decision by the Wisconsin Supreme Court concerning a civil rights ordinance prohibiting marital status discrimination undermined the historic achievement of Wisconsin's Gay and Lesbian community in obtaining passage of the first state civil rights protections for sexual orientation. Moreover, if the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision is followed by other states and municipalities that have civil rights laws prohibiting marital status or sexual orientation discrimination, the decision will have disastrous effects on Gay men and Lesbians who live far outside Wisconsin's borders.

The case of County of Dane v Norman involved claims of discrimination against one landlord filed by two groups of prospective renters. One group consisted of three single women who wished to rent a 3bedroom duplex; the other group consisted of a woman who wished to rent an apartment for her two children and her female roommate. In both cases, the landlord refused to rent to them, stating that he refused to rent to unrelated individuals who planned to live together. Dane County filed suit against the landlord, alleging that he violated Dane County's fair housing ordinance by discriminating on the basis of marital status.

In ruling in favor of the landlord, the Wisconsin Supreme Court cut the heart out of the protections against marital status discrimination. It ruled 4-3 that it is not a violation of Dane County's ordinance prohibiting marital status discrimination for a landlord to refuse to rent to unrelated persons. Why? Because, the court concluded, living together is conduct, not status. The court ruled that the ordinance prohibits discrimination only against the status of being single or married. Since the

landlord refused to rent to the women because of their intent to engage in the conduct of living together, the landlord did not violate the Dane County ordinance. If that were the end of the decision, it would be disturbing enough. But the court went further. The Dane County ordinance defines "marital status" to mean "being married, divorced, widowed, separated, single or a cohabitant." The court struck down that part of the ordinance that defines marital status to include being a cohabitant. After noting that municipalities cannot pass ordinances infringing on the "spirit" of a state law or general policy, the court wrote:

"[The ordinance's] requirement that landlords make available their rental units to 'cohabitants' is inconsistent with the public policy of this state which seeks to promote the stability of marriage and family. As a result, it is outside the enabling authority of [state law], and invalid."

It then quoted the preamble to Wisconsin's marriage statute to support its conclusion that protecting cohabitants from housing discrimination is invalid. The preamble reads, in part:

"It is the intent of [the Family Code] to promote the stability and best interests of marriage and the family. ...Marriage is the institution that is the foundation of the family and of society. Its stability is basic to morality and civilization, and of vital interest to society and state."

The Wisconsin Supreme Court not only interpreted Wisconsin's marriage law to mean that marriage is the only acceptable relationship between people and that there is a public policy against cohabitation, but conveniently ignored two Wisconsin laws designed to guarantee equal access to housing to all persons and to prevent discrimination in housing. The first of these laws is the state fair housing legislation, which prohibits discrimination in housing based on marital status and sexual orientation, among other categories. The second is another law that states that the right of all persons to have equal opportunities for housing is a matter of local, as well as statewide interest, and, accordingly authorizes and encourages local authorities to pass ordinances providing for equal opportunity in housing.

hope of privacy and dignity all ye who enter here." But I suppose that would cut down on the visitor population some. The first of the indignities I had to suffer was being catheterized, with my little bag of pee hanging right out there for everyone to see. It's a disconcerting experience, to say the least, to have your friends know you are! least, to have your for the know you are! It did bring us closer together, though.

Next came an alarming procession of doctors, most of whom I remember rather indistinctly, being in a morphine-induced haze. One guy, who reminded me of Colonel Klink with his bald head and German accent (Do you think I watch too much TV?), seemed pretty hot on doing another surgery on me, so I kind of remember him. I also remember some doctor saying that she needed to do an on-the-spot rectal exam. "You're kidding," I said. She wasn't. I have a sideways kind of recollection of her as well.

Then there were the nightly visits from nurse C., whom I affectionately came to call "Nurse Ratchet" - although not to her face. I guess maybe we just got off to a bad start. At midnight the first night, she came into my room to rearrange my bed table (tidiness knows no time, I guess) and to tell me I must sit up and cough up my "sputum." I replied indignantly that I didn't have any sputum. "You may think you don't, but you do," she retorted rather testily, then slammed a few more things around and left the room. I listened for a key in the door lock, but I guess she figured that if I didn't have the oomph to sit up and take care of my sputum I wasn't in any danger of running away or starting a mutiny.

As it turned out, Nurse Ratchet was in the minority. Most of my nurses were quite wonderful. I think they kind of liked me. I didn't cuss them out the way my crabby roommate and others did and I made them laugh. Like the time two of them entered the room wearing rubber gloves. "Oh-oh," I said. "Two people wearing rubber gloves: this can't be a good sign." I also exchanged pleasantries with them as I did laps of the ward, my hand encircling my I.V. pole like the hand of a secret friend.

Probably the worst indignity of all, though, was having to suffer through 6 count 'em: 6 — enemas before going for a colonoscopy. Fortunately for all concerned,

at least I didn't have a roommate at that point in time. I said to a friend of mine later. "I can't believe some people actually do enemas for pleasure." "Yeah, and pay for them," she commented. Then, after a pause, she added, "Oh. I guess you'll be paying for it too ... " After the whole enema thing, the colonoscopy was almost anticlimatic, except that it is a little weird to be laying there with a group of people gathered around your bare butt watching the inside of your colon on a TV screen as though it were an especially riveting episode of "Upstairs, Downstairs." "What a way to make a living," I commented to the technician after the show was over. She laughed and said, "Yep, that's all we do here - butts and guts."

As it turned out, based on the second opinion we asked for, we decided I didn't need to undergo the second surgery. Or at least not right away. But given that the surgeon who proffered the second opinion was this way cool dyke doctor, my girlfriend decided on the spot that if I ever did need a second surgery, we would assemble an all-Lesbian surgical team, and didn't figure we'd have much trouble doing it. "Now all we need is a Lesbian anesthesiologist," my girlfriend commented. To which a friend of ours replied, "Or, maybe by the time you're ready for the other surgery, one of the male anesthesiologists will have undergone a sex change operation and become a Lesbian. Then you'll have to decide if you want a woman-born woman only team."

Actually, at this time, although my belly looks a little like either a football or a trussed turkey (we can't decide which), I'm recovering quite nicely and, having left the hospital, have reclaimed most of my dignity.

What we did get — myself in particular — is a whole lot of support from my friends and family all across the country, who called and sent cards, and plants, and love. I'm not saying I would go through the whole thing just to get that giant booster shot of love. And I'm not suggesting you should either. But with all the unpleasant surprises a hospital visit can bring, it sure is nice to have at least one pleasant surprise — as if having that hospital gown flap open in the back as you walk down the hall weren't excitement enough!



The court's reasoning in striking down the protections for cohabitants is likely to be used by opponents of Gays and Lesbians throughout the country to eviscerate Gay and Lesbian civil rights protections. Should courts in other states follow the lead of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, and find their marriage laws to be antithetical to nonmarried relationships, laws prohibiting discrimination based on marital status or sexual orientation, especially housing discrimination laws, could be rendered virtually unenforceable. This especially would be the case if courts find that anything other than simply "being" unmarried, or Gay or Lesbian amounts to conduct.

To reverse the Wisconsin Supreme Court's decision will require amending state law to make it clear that discrimination against unmarried cohabitants is unlawful. Gay men and Lesbians do have powerful allies on this issue, both in Wisconsin and in other states. Laws and practices preventing non-married persons from living together are common in many parts of the country. Lowincome housing activists have long been concerned about the severe shortage of affordable housing throughout the country, and are natural allies. Shared housing is

high on the agenda of groups such as the Older Women's League, since elderly people often wish to have others live with them, for emotional, physical, or financial support. Disabled persons often need to reside with companions who can provide assistance. Immigrants often come from countries where extended families and shared quarters are the norm, not the exception. College towns tend to attract large numbers of single persons for whom shared housing is the only way to obtain affordable housing. The Lesbian and Gay communities should join forces with these allies, in Wisconsin and in other states, to ensure the right of individuals to share housing. These efforts not only will help achieve the goal of shared housing rights, but will help to build lasting ties between the Gay and Lesbian communities and other communities.

Janis lan was on Howard Stern's show recently promoting her new album, Breaking Silence. In the first five seconds, he tossed his auburn curls like some latter day Loretta Young entering his hair through a doorway, and asked how old she was when she first acted on her Lesbianism.

What? Janis? One of us? Oh, Gaydat, where were you when I really needed you?

"Fifteen and a half." she replied in the kind of months-on-end accounting ascribed to the impatiently young learning to tally their lifetime.

"Oooonh." I thought I inwardly groaned. Only, Judi, lying beside me in our Sunday nightlet's-watch-a-little-TV-before-we-haveto-sleep-ourselves-into-a-new-week bed, asked, "What's wrong?"

"Oh, nothing. I used to know her." And drifted into a twenty year old Chicago reverie. Way back to when I still wanted to throw up at the Lesbian scenes in paperback books. I had been married to Whatsisname for about as long as we were going to last, and had taken up a friendship with a woman at work who fulfilled all the blond, blue-eyed Cinderella fantasies I was never going to be. As friends, you understand. Best friends. The kind who invent traumas weekly for excuses to hug. The kind who later would bring suicidal realizations, none of which would ever get acted on. And only very later understood.

I was still working my way through my frustrated twenty-something housewife phase when Priscilla said, "You have to hear this music" and played Janis lan's interracial insight, "Society's Child." It had turned lan from schoolyard outcast into famous folksinger at fourteen. She, who got to hang with Hendrix, was an icon I had missed, and I was taken. With the voice, with the lyricism of the writing, with the sentiment and sensitivity and the concern about the boundary-crossing of the song.

It was significant months later, with Whatsisname packed and gone, Priscilla offering scant relief, and a company which said, "Vacation: Use it or lose it." The kind of chill December ultimatum that caught me short on cash and travel inspiration. I'd paid for the divorce, was still paying for childcare, and couldn't cover costs beyond the wilds of Gary, Indiana, and inconceivable opportunity for midwest adventure travel. So I did what any poor Chicago soul in my circumstances would o... I looked in the Sunday Sun-Times for amusements, and planned to stay home.

And Io. And behold. A grownup Janis

Ian was at a local club for the week. For a few bucks to cover the babysitter, and the price of an elevated train to, and an indulgent taxi from, I could have my own Janis Ian festival.

She was splendid. I was entranced. For four nights I showed up and sipped scotch which hadn't yet been designated environmentally unsound, and drank the music and the lovely lady in.

On the fifth night, the record company advance man acknowledged my existence with free albums and free drinks. Nothing lascivious, I was vaguely disappointed to discover (what did I know then?) just good business for an obvious fan, I still have the album, a little cat scratched along the upper edge, but with the magic marker inscription still intact. To me. From Her.

On the fifth night we talked a little. Between sets. The sort of star to fan nonconversation that makes your adams apple sit doubled inside your throat. But, I must have said something, because the sixth night, the last night, she said. "So, uh, you wanna come with us 'n' get something to eat? Help us pack?"

"Did I? Of course! It was way into the little hand numbers by the end of the last set. We rode up the Northside, Janis, me, the three in the band, in a Sherman tank Checker Cab that defines the streets of Chicago. I sat backward on the fold-down, while they talked of the next gig. And I tried to figure out what I was doing there, or was supposed to do. Help her pack, I guessed. Going home with a guy from a club, I'd have known. But this? It was very undefined.

We headed to the hotel, where I handed her clothes from a drawer or a pile on the floor, and listened to memorable oneway conversation I can't reconstruct. Just the float-through image of being there, innocently, strangely, strongly drawn in a magnetism that had no vocabulary then, in



13th Chicago Lesbian And Gay International Film Festival

November 5-14

Chicago Filmmakers proudly announces the 13th Chicago Lesbian and Gay International Film Festival, opening Friday, November 5th, for ten days of the best Lesbian and Gay films and videos from around the world. Screenings will take place at the Music Box Theatre, 3733 N. Southport, and at Chicago Filmmakers' new Wicker Park location, 1543 W. Division. The Festival recorded information number is (312) 384-1406; the public may also call (312) 384-5533 for additional information.

Now marking its 13th anniversary, the Festival is the second oldest Gay film festival in the U.S. and has become established as one of the most significant festivals of its kind in the world. Based on the success of past festivals, we expect an audience of over 10,000 this year.

The Festival was founded to showcase and celebrate the work of Lesbian and Gay directors and to focus attention on films which provide an alternative to the Gay stereotyping prevalent in Hollywood movies. The Chicago Lesbian and Gay International Film Festival is part of a growing network of Gay film festivals developing throughout the country which are collectively creating greater visibility for Gay and Lesbian films and videos. This year nearly 250 entries were received.

The Festival opens with Forbidden Love by Canadian documentary filmmakers Aerlyn Weissman and Lynne Fernie. "Campy, popular Lesbian pulp novels from the 1950's and 60's inspired the steamy love story that frames this vanguard of the 'sexy documentary.'" Tabloid headlines, interviews, and narrative and archival footage make up this engaging and rebellious look at the lives of Lesbians.

Also screening in this year's Festival are Belle, director Irma Achten's stunningly beautiful debut feature which has been called "a feminist cross between Citizen Kane and Wings of Desire; For a Lost Soldier, a lush, moody and romantic story set against the Allies' liberation of Holland during WWII in which a man recalls his adolescence and first erotic relationships; Smoke, a deeply moving and personal film by School of the Art Institute of Chicago alumnus Mark D'Auria, capturing three days in the life of Michael, and alienated young loner with a penchant for older men; Tectonic Plates, as surreal and stylish as Orlando, offering musings on art, music, the relationship of Fredric Chopin and George Sand, psychotherapy and mythology; Enchanted, a compelling oral history about Gay and Lesbian heroism and endurance during the Nazi-era and post-war years in Hamburg, Germany; Hong Kong's The East is Red, a gender-bending Swordsman sequel packed with energetic, fun and dizzying choreography; Prince in Hell, the escapades of three young queer drop-outs through the vanishing elements of Berlin's counterculture: Derek Jarman's Wittgenstein, a flamboyant interpretation of the life and works of Ludwig Wittgenstein, one of the century's most influential philosophers; Amazing Grace, Israeli Director Amos Gutman's ground-breaking film exploring the complex relationships developed between parents, children, friends and lovers in the midst of AIDS; Split -William to Chrysis: Portrait of a Drag Queen, a witty and tender portrait of International Chrysis, the legendary New York drag queen and former companion to Salvador Dali; A Touch of Fever, a strong representation of the exciting new Gay cinema that has recently emerged from Japan; and Zero Patience, by John Grevson, a zany Brechtian-inspired postmodern musical that weaves a tall tale of love and loss, sex and science, history and hysteria in the age of AIDS.

Also highlighting the Festival will be A Queer Feeling When I Look at You: Hollywood Stars and Lesbian Spectatorship in the 1930's, a presentation by Emmy award-winning filmmaker Andrea Weiss, including film clips from Morocco, Queen Christina, Sylvia Scarlett and Blonde Venus, among others.

Steppin' Out

You may have seen the "teaser" ads scattered throughout the October 7th issue and are probably wandering what they are about... "Changes...", "BIG Changes Coming to In Step", "Big Changes Coming to In Step's Dec. 16th Holiday Issue", and Watch for our Big Change to Kick Off 1994, our 10th Anniversary Year".

February 1994 marks our 10th anniversary issue, our 11th year publishing!

In Step has grown, in those 10 years, from 32 page issues to the current 96 pages. We went from a press run of 5,000 copies and just last issue climbed to 10,500. One year ago we printed 9,000, so we've added 1,500 copies in the last year alone. I project we'll hit 11,000 by the Christmas issue.

96 pages is the most our printer's bindery can handle. We can't add any more pages and that's why we have to occasionally "pull" columns, maps, news, and other sections to accommodate increased ad space sales. It doesn't make economic sense to turn down paid ads because of lack of space, so we have to "pull" what may be your favorite columns or sections on a sporadic basis.

As publisher/editor, I finally had to accept the fact that In Step had come to a cross roads. Either we stay the same size and stagnate, or we change the format. Option one is to stay with the same 5 1/2" x 8" format and eventually become a "shopper" — a magazine with mostly ads, and little editorial and column space. However, I don't want In Step to be called a "bar rag" ever again. I've spent 10 years making In Step a well-rounded, thoughtful publication for Wisconsin's Gay and Lesbian community and I don't want to continue to publish it if it is nothing but ads, a calendar and a guide.

A second option would be to go to a weekly publication schedule instead of a biweekly schedule, and stay in the same 5 1/2 x 8" format. However, If I go that route, I would have to hire permanent full time staff to handle the increased workload. If I have to hire staff, advertising rates would have to increase approximately 40%, an increase I don't want to make, and I'm sure advertisers wouldn't want to pay. The third option, and the one I've chosen to go with, is to change the format of In Step to a regular magazine size (8 x 10 1/2"). Gay Chicago made this same decision several years ago, and it turned out to be a boon for them. They've grown by leaps and bounds since they made "the change."

The larger size will give us more space on the pages to be creative with, and it will circumvent having to drop columns because of lack of space. Some of the other pluses include going to a larger point size for the type (currently body copy is set in 8 point type, we'll be going to 10 point) which will make reading in Step a little easier to read for those of us getting up there in years; we'll be able to add more new columns and features we've had to reject in the past because of lack of space; and we'll be able to assure our current columns run on a regular basis.

The larger size will also add to In Step's "legitimacy" and "professional look", an objective I think meshes very well with our move into our 10th anniversary year!

I'd appreciate any comments you might have about this "Big Change" that will usher in a new era here at In Step.

It's been relatively quiet around the state when it comes to the nightlife scene, but you can tell the Mr. and Miss Gay Wisconsin Pageant is right around the corner with all the benefit and other shows... Tabitha Stevens is gearing up a run for the crown with a show October 3 at Your Place, and Sasha Mitchell's (Miss YP) show at the YP on October 10. Shannon Dupree, Miss Gay WI-USA At-Large, in preparation for her shot at the national At-Large title held a benefit show at BoysTown October 7. Sasha and her femme fatales also helped Carrie, owner of BoysTown celebrate her birthday with a show on October 10.

Meanwhile, the Pivot hosted the first of an all new season of King Productions with a Miss Gay Appleton preliminary on October 10. All the girls are reminded they must win or take first runner up at one of these preliminaries to be eligible to enter the Miss Gay Wisconsin-USA finals next summer. On the 8th, the Pivot hosted Milwaukee's hometown comedian Tony Domenico in his first Appleton appearance.
