Judge To Decide Soon on Colorado Amendment

Eight Day Trial Aired Both Sides of Gay Rights Debate

Denver, CO — After an eight day trial that included more than 35 hours of testimony by 27 witnesses, Denver District Court Judge Jeffrey Bayless is expected to rule soon on the constitutionality of Colorado's anti-Gay initiative, Amendment

Colorado residents approved Amendment 2 last November by a margin of 53% to 47%. It prohibits the state of Colorado and any of its counties or localities from adopting legislation that includes sexual orientation in civil rights protections. It voids Gay rights laws already on the books in Aspen, Boulder and Denver.

Immediately after the vote, opponents won an injunction to prohibit the implementation of Amendment 2 until the courts can rule on its constitutionality. The U.S. Supreme Court recently refused to lift that injunction. A lawsuit challenging Amendment 2 was filed, and the case was heard before Judge Bayless in Denver District Court October 12-22.

Both sides of the increasingly contentious debate over Gay rights aired their arguments, knowing full well that the Colorado ruling will affect similar anti-Gay initiatives in the works in as many as nine other states. Whatever decision is rendered will be appealed to Colorado's Supreme Court and then to the U.S. Supreme Court, so a final decision may take another year or more.

In issuing the injunction earlier this year, Judge Bayless found sufficient evidence to suggest that Amendment 2 could cause "irreparable harm" to

homosexual residents of Colorado. He said there was a "reasonable possibility" that the measure would be found in violation of the equal protection clauses of the Colorado and U.S. Constitutions. The State of Colorado was ordered to prove what "compelling state interest" Amendment 2 represented that could override constitutional rights.

THE COURTROOM DRAMA

Much of the courtroom debate centered on whether Gay people constitute a legitimate minority group that needs government protection from discrimination. Expert witnesses called by both sides discussed the history of discrimination in America, the different forms it takes and the differences between race discrimination and that based on sexual orientation.

The state, charged with defending Amendment 2, presented witnesses who said that discrimination against racial minorities and Gays was completely different, and that adding sexual orientation to civil rights laws would "dilute" their effectiveness.

Professor Joseph Broadus of George Mason University School of Law noted that sexual orientation was not included in the protected categories covered by the 1964 Civil Rights Act because unlike race, religion, national origin and sex, sexual orientation had no previous "constitutional reference."

Broadus said the failure of federal Gay rights legislation since its introduction in 1974 proves that "Congress has never found persuasive" the idea that sexual orientation is "worthy" of protection.

Another state witness, Ignacio Rodriguez, a former member of Colorado's Human Rights Commission, testified that sexual orientation was not a distinguishable class "worthy" of protection. "My class is easily distinguishable," he said, and has suffered overt discrimination. He cited signs proclaiming "No dogs or Mexicans" allowed.

Rodriguez said adding sexual orientation to the list of protected classes "would be a drastic departure that would weaken and dilute those civil rights protections won by minorities, women and the disabled over the years."

DO GAYS SUFFER BIAS?

In cross-examining a witness for the plaintiffs, an attorney for the state grilled a civil rights leader, Joe Hicks, about forms of

bias.

Do Gays suffer from lack of access to education?

"I wouldn't say that," Hicks replied.

Do they face the same economic oprression that Blacks do?

"Some do, some don't," said Hicks. Have Gays ever been denied the right to vote?

"Not to my knowledge," said Hicks.

Hicks is an official of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and is an expert on the Civil Rights Act. He scored some of his own points against the defense. He said that while Gays had never been denied the right to vote, many had been denied housing and jobs and were subject to verbal and physical harassment.

Hicks disagreed with defense witnesses, saying: "I believe any people discriminated against can and should be allowed protection. That doesn't diminish the rights of those already recognized."

Hicks also articulated a major contention of the plaintiffs about Amendment 2: "It allows people to put human rights to a popular vote, and that's a very bad precedent. If we had put them to a vote in the 1950's and '60's, Black people would have lost."

Another witness testified that, of course, bias against Blacks and Gays did not always take the same forms. But the "common element" in discrimination against any group — women, Blacks or Gays — is the "irrationality of the prejudice."

Burke Marshall, a Justice Department official in the Johnson administration who presided over civil rights enforcement, testified by tape that sexual orientation was not included in the 1964 Civil Rights Act because Gay people were closeted at that time, "so the problem was not apparent." Marshall noted that federal anti-bias laws have been amended to include new groups like the disabled once different forms of discrimination have been recognized.

OTHER TESTIMONY

The state called to the stand two leaders of Colorado for Family Values, the group that sponsored the anti-Gay initiative. Both Will Perkins and Tony Marco testified that they were not motivated by any personal prejudice against homosexuals. They said they just wanted to counter, in Marco's words, "statewide aggression by the militant Gay movement."

Another state witness. Robert Knight of

the conservative Family Research Council, spoke about the alleged political power of the Gay community. But Knight seemed to undermine his own testimony at one point. In citing figures that indicated national Gay groups have combined annual budgets of over \$12 million, he inadvertently said the same study showed that right wing religious groups have combined budgets of more than 10 times that.

The plaintiffs presented evidence indicating that claims made by Colorado for Family Values during the election campaign that Gays were more likely to be child molesters are patently untrue. Expert scientific witnesses also testified that more and more research indicates that homosexuality in an innate, perhaps genetically determined and therefore immutable characteristic. This testimony contradicted defense claims that homosexuals can disavow their sexual orientation.

In closing arguments, Colorado's Solicitor General Tim Tymkovich argued that Gays and Lesbians were not seeking equal rights but "special" rights for a lifestyle which the majority of Coloradoans disapprove. The "compelling state interest" served by Amendment 2 is "preventing a special interest from getting special rights.

. Colorado voters have made a choice

which we must respect."
Former Colorado Supreme Court

Justice Jean Dubofsky, arguing against Amendment 2, challenged Judge Bayless to substitute the words African American for homosexual in the wording of the Amendment. "There wouldn't be any question, then, that Amendment 2 is unconstitutional. Substituting those words makes it clear that this is discrimination."

"The very fact that we are here with this Amendment," said Dubofsky, "highlights the vulnerability of Gays and Lesbians as a class."

Judge Bayless's decision could come as early as late November but is likely to be handed down in December.

Senate Passes Hate Crimes Sentencing Legislation

Russ Feingold and Jesse Helms Among the Few Opponents

Washington, D.C. — On November 5, he U.S. Senate voted by an overwhelming margin in support of the Hate Crimes Sentencing Enhancement Act, legislation modeled on the Wisconsin statutes. The vote was 95-4. Among the tiny minority voting against the measure was Wisconsin's iberal Democratic Sen. Russ Feingold and the infamous homophobe Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC).

Feingold has long supported virtually every item on the Gay rights and women's rights agendas. But he has consistently opposed hate crimes legislation. Even as a State Senator, Feingold voted against Wisconsin's hates crimes penalty

enhancement bill.

Like his former colleague, State Sen. Lynn Adelman, who unsuccessfully argued against the state law in the Supreme Court earlier this year, Feingold is concerned that such legislation may infringe on constitutional guarantees of free speech and free thought.

After his "nay" vote in the Senate, putting him in the unlikely company of Jesse Helms, Feingold told the press: "I despise hate activity and I have tremendous disdain for discrimination, as everybody knows. But I don't think that using the criminal law to make distinctions between people's beliefs is a good use of the criminal law."

Helms said on the floor of the Senate that he was worried the law might infringe on constitutional rights. But most observers saw through his hypocrisy. It was Helms who, the the last two years, led opposition to such a bill, killing it with the threat of a filibuster. His primary and vocal objection has always been to the inclusion of "sexual orientation" among the categories targeted by hatemongers.

WHAT THE LAW DOES

The Hate Crimes Sentencing Enhancement Act mandates additional penalties for those found guilty of a federal crime against persons or property when that crime is found to be motivated by hatred based on race, color, religion, national origin, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation or disability. Sentencing guidelines would be revised to increase prison sentences for hate crimes by about one third over the current standards.

The legislation was approved in the House of Representatives by an overwhelming voice vote September 21. It was then introduced in the Senate by Sens. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA), Ben Nighthorse Campbell (D-CO), Carol Moseley Braun (D-IL) and Barbara Boxer (D-CA), all freshmen Senators, and veteran Hawaiian

Democrat Daniel Inouye.

For a bill which had been ignored and defeated in recent sessions, the Senate vote was an overwhelming and somewhat surprising victory. Proponents credited its success to the new crop of senators — four female, one African American, one Native American — and the new consciousness about minority rights they have brought to the Capitol.

The June decision of the Supreme Court which sustained Wisconsin's hate crimes statute also alleviated some senators' concerns about constitutional

issues

In the high court's unanimous decision in June, Chief Justice Rehnquist rejected First Amendment concerns, saying that conduct, not thought or speech, was being punished. He noted that judges have always had wide discretion in weighing various factors, especially motivation, in determining criminal penalties.

Rehnquist also agreed with the state of Wisconsin which argued that hate crimes are "thought to inflict greater individual and societal harm" because they can "provoke retaliatory crimes, inflict distinct emotional harm on their victims, and incite community unrest."

ONE MORE HURDLE

The Hate Crimes Sentencing Act must overcome one more hurdle before it goes to President Clinton's desk for a signature. The act is an amendment to the omnibus crime bill Congress has been debating for



Gay Rights Measures Rejected in Three Cities

But More Openly Gay Candidates Elected to Office

The results of the November 2 elections were a mixed bag for supporters of Gay rights. The defeat of Gay rights measures in three cities left Gay leaders deeply concerned about the many statewide anti-Gay initiatives that will be voted on next year. But, at the same time, more openly Gay and Lesbian candidates won elective office in their localities.

LOCAL RIGHTS LAWS DEFEATED

Voters in Cincinnati, Ohio, Lewiston, Maine and Portsmouth, New Hampshire rejected Gay rights measures by wide

Cincinnati residents voted by a 62% to 38% margin to repeal an ordinance which expanded the city's human rights act to prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation. The city is now prohibited from enacting any legislation that would give Gays, Lesbians or Bisexuals "minority or protected status, quota preference or any other preferential treatment."

Local Gay activists say that the group sponsoring the initiative outspent Gay proponents by at least 5 to 1. Some of the largest donations toward the anti-Gay effort came from Colorado for Family Values, the group that was successful in passing a statewide anti-Gay measure there last year.

the last few months. As In Step went to press, continuing controversy over the bill's gun control provisions could threaten the whole package.

But proponents in both the House and Senate say that support for the measure is so widespread that it is sure to pass in this session either as an amendment or as an independent bill.

implementation of the Colorado measure until the courts decide on its constitutionality. See related story in this issue.

The anti-Gay group in Cincinnati called itself "Equal Rights, Not Special Rights." As in other anti-Gay campaigns, they were apparently successful in getting the public to believe that anti- discrimination protection covering sexual orientation amounts to "special rights" for Gays and Lesbians.

The pro-Gay forces formed coalitions called Equality Cincinnati and Stonewall Cincinnati to counter the right wing. Support came from such diverse groups as labor unions, the League of Women Voters and the Catholic Archdiocese. The "Fight the Right" project of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force as well as the Human Rights Campaign Fund sent organizers to help.

Gay activists plan to file a lawsuit against the referendum. Some are also calling for a boycott of Cincinnati. The American Library Association and the United Church of Christ have indicated they will cancel plans to hold conventions there. But some Gay activists doubt whether boycotts are a realistic strategy considering the growing number of states and localities passing such anti-Gay laws.

On the same day, voters in Lewiston, Maine voted 8,788 to 4,138 to repeal a city ordinance passed earlier this year which prohibited discrimination based on sexual orientation in the areas of housing, jobs, public accommodations and credit.


Local Gay and Lesbian activists say the forces for repeal sponsored TV ads and distributed pamphlets that distorted the so-called Gay rights "agenda" and preyed on people's worst fears of things like Gay schoolteachers and child molestation.

Meanwhile, In Portsmouth, New Hampshire, in a non-binding ballot question, voters were asked whether the city should enact a law extending civil rights protections covering sexual orientation. Voters rejected the idea 2.814 to 1.934.

"The initiatives show that we've got a lot of work to do," said Gregory King of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "It's clear our message is not moving the public."

Because as many as nine states could offer anti-Gay referenda on next November's ballots, Gay leaders are hoping more than ever that the courts will find the Colorado

New York City Extends Health Care Benefits to Partners

New York, NY — In a move that was seen by many as an election eve ploy to solidify his support among LesBiGay voters, Mayor David Dinkins announced October 30 that the city would extend full health benefits to the domestic partners of municipal employees. "I believe that if we are really for family values," said Dinkins, "we must value all families."

Dinkins went on to lose the election to Republican Rudolph Giuliani on November 2, but Gay New Yorkers were nevertheless grateful for what amounts to a parting gesture by the most Gay- supportive mayor

the Big Apple has ever had.

In January, Dinkins announced the establishment of a domestic partners registry for both Gay and unmarried straight couples. The executive order by the mayor entitled all registered couples to visitation rights to their partners in city hospitals and jails. It also allowed them to qualify for city housing and to inherit rental leases if one partner died. But it fell short of providing full health benefits.

New York is the most populous city in the U.S., among more than 25 others, which offer some form of domestic partner

recognition.

"Hostile Climate" Reports on Anti-Gay Efforts Nationwide

Washington, D.C. — The day after Gay rights measures were rejected in three cities November 2, People for the American Way, a liberal think tank, released a 60 page report called Hostile Climate: A State by State Report on Anti-Gay Activity.

Hostile Climate is a comprehensive summary of the many fronts on which right wing groups are working to roll back the modest gains of the Gay rights movement. The report notes that while two states voted on anti-Gay ballot initiatives in 1992, nine states face similar measures next year. They are Arizona, California, Florida, Idaho, Maine, Michigan, Missouri, Oregon and Washington.

The report details anti-Gay legislative efforts in more than half of the nation's state houses. It charts the infiltration of anti-Gay

religious candidates onto school boards and local councils. It describes increasing censorship campaigns around the country and exposes the concerted efforts of right wing leaders to continually defame Gays and Lesbians as a group.

AFL-CIO Agrees To Help Fight Against Anti-Gay Initiatives

San Francisco, CA — Delegates attending the annual convention of the AFL-CIO in October unanimously passed a resolution condemning the recent anti-Gay referendums in Colorado and Oregon and pledging the support of the country's largest labor group against future anti-Gay campaigns.

The resolution says the national AFL-CIO commits itself to "an active role opposing measures which reduce the rights of people based on their sexual orientation." The resolution also condemns "violence motivated by bigotry, prejudice and hate." The AFL-CIO, which represents 15 million American workers, adopted a policy opposing workplace discrimination based on sexual orientation in 1983.


Howard Wallace, a Gay labor activist who is part of the Lesbian/Gay Labor Alliance, an affinity group for Gay union members, introduced the resolution at the October convention. He told In Step: "The resolution gives us a lever. We can now go to any AFL-CIO-affiliated labor body in the country and seek assistance against these anti-Gay campaigns."

the gathering, saying: "I strongly believe that every individual in our nation has a valuable contribution to make to America. Judge Dismisses Case Brought By Georgia Lesbian

Atlanta, GA — In October, a federal judge dismissed a suit against Georgia Attorney General Michael Bowers by a Lesblan who claimed Bowers discriminated against her.

In the suit, attorney Robin Shahar claimed that despite her excellent record as a summer intern and despite a promise by Bowers to hire her as a permanent staff member, Bowers refused to hire her after he learned she planned to participate in a wedding ceremony with her female companion. In his defense, Bowers argued that same sex unions were not recognized in Georgia and that the state forbids sodomy.

Federal Judge Richard C. Freeman agreed with Bowers that the "suspected sexual conduct of [justice] department attorneys" could interfere with the "efficient delivery" of the attorney general's law enforcement responsibilities. But while dismissing Shahar's case, the judge also declared that Shahar's relationship with her lover is a "constitutionally protected intimate association" under the free association clause of the First Amendment — the first time a federal judge has made such a statement.

Shahar has appealed the decision. Bowers successfully argued in favor of Georgia's sodomy law in the landmark Supreme case of 1986.

NGLTF Conducts Survey of Fortune 1000 Companies

Washington, D.C. — Only 10% of the nation's top 1000 businesses surveyed by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force's Policy Institute completed the questionaires, leading the NGLTF to conclude that "American companies have a long way to go in ensuring that Gay and Lesbian employees are treated equally in the workplace."

"The results of this survey are in effect a corporate report card and while there are a few companies with high marks, the majority of the Fortune 1000 are flunking," said NGLTF Board Co- Chair Chris Collins. "Much of the real progress. . has been pioneered by firms that are not part of the Fortune 1000. It has been the little Davids rather than the Goliaths of corporate America that have led the way."

Roughly three-fourths of the respondents have non-discrimination policies including sexual orientation. Over half of the companies include issues relating to sexual orientation in their diversity training. Over 70% provide some form of support for employees with HIV/AIDS. Five companies offer domestic partner benefits for the same sex partners of their employees.

NGLTF notes that the small number of companies which responded to the survey could be expected to have more Gay-sensitive policies than the companies that did not respond. NGLTF will conduct the survey annually to monitor progress in workplace policies. It will also exert pressure on unresponsive companies to participate in the future.

Minneapolis, MN — The University of Minnesota has adopted a policy extending benefits to the domestic partners of employees. The policy includes sick and bereavement leave, housing benefits, resident tuition, childcare services, retirement benefits and reimbursement for partners' health insurance. The Minneapolis School Board has also agreed to provide benefits to the registered domestic partners of all school employees, from teachers to cafeteria workers.

Fort Collins, CO — The College Republicans at Colorado State University are selling t-shirts with slogans like "Homosexuality is an abomination, and kind

of gross too" and "In the beginning... God created Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve." A spokesman for the young Republicans dismissed criticism: "All of these things are meant to be humorous."

New York, NY — On November 3, comedian Joan Rivers hosted an all-star cast in an entertainment benefit for the Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center. Comics Kate Clinton and Karen Williams, the Five Lesbian Brothers and the Hot Lavender Swing Band were among the acts performing at the Palace Theatre.

Washington, D.C.—Frank M. Lemay, a State Department economist who warned in the 1980's that Saddam Hussein of Iraq was diverting American development money for arms purchases, died of AIDS complications October 28. He was 36. Lemay, a Gay man, came to prominence during the Persian Gulf War when it was learned he had been warning about the dictator for several years.

Pittsburgh, PA — The Roman Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh has instituted a counseling program for Gays and Lesbians that is based on the Alcoholics Anonymous model. The program, called "Courage," urges Gays to ask God's help in suppressing their sexual desires.

World AIDS Day Events in Wisconsin

December 1st Observance Called "Time To Act"

The 6th annual observance of World AIDS Day December 1 is meant to call attention to the growing pandemic and to get people involved in the fight against AIDS.

The World Health Organization, which sponsors the annual event, has selected the theme "Time to Act!" for this year's observance. WHO reports that as of mid-year, at least 2.5 million people worldwide have AIDS, while up to 13 million others are infected with HIV.

In the United States, the U.S. Postal Service will unveil its specially designed red ribbon AIDS awareness stamp on December 1. Art galleries and museums throughout the country will close some exhibits or shroud artworks from view to dramatize the loss to the art world of those who have died from AIDS complications. This symbolic act, tied to World AIDS Day, has come to be known as a "Day Without Art."

Chapters of the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power, ACT UP, are planning to hold protests, while AIDS service organizations are sponsoring prayer vigils and educational events.

Throughout Wisconsin, a variety of events will be held on and around December 1. The most comprehensive set of events, AIDS Awareness Week, 1993 will take place in Madison, But special observances will also take place in Green Bay, Eau Claire, Racine-Kenosha and Milwaukee. Here is a summary of World AIDS Day events statewide.



Milwaukee Common Council Increases AIDS Funding

Milwaukee — In a surprise move, Milwaukee's Common Council approved on November 11 a \$190,000 increase in the city budget to fight AIDS. The vote on AIDS funding in the proposed 1994 budget was 9-7. Mayor John Norquist still has the ability to veto the budget.

Responding to growing pressure from AIDS service groups, community organizations and Milwaukee ACT UP, Norquist proposed only a \$50,000 increase in the Health Department's budget for next year. Health Commissioner Paul Nannis

The June 26, 1994 March on the United Nationals to Affirm the Human Rights of Lesbian and Gay People will wrap up a month of activities in New York commemorating the 25th anniversary of the "birth of the modern Gay Rights Movement". Immediately following the U.N. March, a huge rally will be held in Central Park with top line entertainment and an International cadre of speakers. The fourth Gay Games will be held in New York in June (18-25). The Gay Games are an international athletic and cultural festival modeled after The Olympics.

would have been responsible for allocating those funds to particular areas of need, like AIDS prevention.

But a coalition of groups, including the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP), Planned Parenthood, STD Specialties Clinic, the Milwaukee Indian Health Board, United Migrant Opportunity Services and the Institute for Child and Family Development, lobbied Common Council members to support the larger allocation.

If the Council's vote stands, each group will receive part of the \$190,000 grant through individual contracts with the city. Previously, only MAP received city money — a \$69,200 grant each year since 1986. Despite the growing number of city residents infected with HIV, the city had not increased the funding until now.

who initially responded to the victim after the attack immediately turned the matter over to campus police. The victim is a sophomore at UW- Stout. Sources have also told In Step they don't believe campus police have conducted a thorough investigation and may have been insensitive to the victim, questioning her at the hospital and then dropping the injured woman off outside her dormitory in the middle of the night. The woman sustained a dislocated shoulder, a concussion, a fractured jaw and multiple bruises.

In subsequent discussions with concerned students, campus security director Dennis Shaw reportedly said he could not tell whether the criminal assault was a hate crime. He said only the district attorney could make that determination.


Meanwhile, on November 1, one hundred people attended a public forum about violence on campus. The bashing incident and hostility against racial minorities on campus was discussed. Then, on November 11, Gay and Lesbian students from the school's Ten Percent Society joined with more than 100 others in a March for Diversity around campus.

Debate Rages at Public Hearing About Gay Newspaper

Hales Corners — One hundred people showed up November 10 at a public hearing called to hear testimony about whether the biweekly Gay newspaper Wisconsin Light should be banned from the display racks of the Hales Corners Public Library. The controversy began when one person complained that the paper's allegedly pornographic ads made it inappropriate for viewing by children.

Eleven of the 13 people who testified spoke in favor of censoring the paper. Many of them cited religious objections or the need to "protect" children from homosexuality. "The Light is not pleasing to God," said Robert Braun of the Christian Civil Liberties Union, who picketed in front of the library before the hearing. Rev. Warren Matson called the newspaper Satanic. "There is no light in that paper, there's darkness," he said.

But Beverly Schwaller asked: "What is the next thing that is going to be banned from our library? The library is for everybody. Not just for religious conservatives." And Village Attorney Jesse

Wesolowski reported that the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office said the newspaper does not violate obscenity laws. Removing the paper could subject the village to a lawsuit.

The Library Board will make its final

decision in December.

School Board Votes to Censor ACT UP Literature

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee School Board has approved a resolution calling for school administrators to work with the city and state to devise legislation that will give them greater authority to restrict the kinds of safe sex literature Milwaukee ACT UP has been distributing outside high school dances.

The resolution was introduced by Board member Christine Sinicki, who argued that the schools already provide AIDS education and that some parents were offended by the graphic nature of ACT

UP's pamphlets.

The controversy broke when members of ACT UP gave away safe sex literature outside homecoming dances in October. They also leaflet students during prom season in the spring. When Milwaukee police harassed and detained several ACT UP members, the American Civil Liberties Union defended the group's First Amendment rights and demanded the Police Department stop its harassment.

In response to the School Board's action, ACT UP issued its own formal resolution indicting the school system for inadequate AIDS education and violations of constitutional rights. ACT UP vowed to continue distributing AIDS information until "thorough information and condoms are made available to all students."

Lesbian's Bid for Custody, Visitation Dismissed

Madison — Dane County Circuit Court Judge George Northrup has dismissed a lawsuit brought by a Lesbian seeking custody and visitation rights to a child conceived by her former female partner through artificial insemination.

Sandra Holtzman had sought custody and visitation rights to the 5-year old boy born to Elsbeth Knott. The two women separated earlier this year, and Knott prevented Holtzman from seeing the boy.

In dismissing the case, Judge Northrup said that state appellate courts had consistently denied recognition to individuals who may have been primary caregivers but who have no biological or adoptive tie to the child. He said it was an issue of increasing concern on which the legislature must provide guidelines.

Judge Northrup asked both women to work out some sort of accommodation. "If there is going to be any true resolution in the best interest of the child, it is frankly one that will be reached outside the courtroom."

The State Supreme Court will soon hear the case of a Green Bay woman who is seeking to adopt the child of her Lesbian partner. A lower court denied her request for what amounts to a same sex joint adoption.

LesBiGay Group Condemns Defamatory Article

Milwaukee — The Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Community at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee is taking action on several fronts to protest the publication of homophobic article in the UWM Times, which contains inaccurate information and defames the Gay group.

The article, headlined "UWM Students Financing Illegal Organization" with the subheading "The law must be enforced or abolished, no ifs, ands, or butts," appeared in the November 8 edition of the Times.

The article mistakenly quotes a section of the Wisconsin statutes regarding prostitution, claiming it outlaws sodomy, and says that since "members of the GLBC are freely admitting that they have and/or do commit these acts. . all of those members should be arrested for those crimes." In fact, Wisconsin's sodomy law was repealed 14 years ago.

The GLB Community is consulting an attorney for possible legal action against the newspaper. Members are also contacting the paper's advertisers to alert them to the inaccurate and inflammatory nature of its editorial content.





Group Notes

Eleven Groups Receive \$10,000 in Fall Grants

New Harvest's 16th Round of Giving To Gay and Lesbian Causes

Madison — New Harvest Foundation awarded nearly \$10,000 in new grants to eleven organizations and programs to aid and advance the Gay and Lesbian community. In its sixteenth round of giving since 1985, the Foundation selected a wide array of causes for its financial backing. These included varied support groups for teenagers, elderly men and women, and abused Lesbians. The Foundation also contributed to two women's centers, the 1994 Gay Games and the United's phone counseling service.

This cycle of awards, for the second half of 1993, brings the total gifts of New Harvest in its 8 year history to \$140,000. In June, the Foundation received requests for over \$28,000 in new funding, but was only able to provide one-third of that amount, \$9,762. Earlier grants made in the first six months of the year came to \$8,830.

Here are the programs and services earmarked for funding this fall.

Teens Like Us — \$1,000 to a support group sponsored jointly by Briarpatch and PICADA for high school-age Gays, Lesbians and Bisexual teens needing to explore issues and information related to their sexual orientation.

African-American Sexuality — \$875 to the Beloit Inner City Council to launch a support group for Gay and Bisexual black men focusing on coming out, discrimination, and family issues.

Plays for Living — \$1,000 to Family Service of Madison to develop a new script in its play repertoire dealing with AIDS awareness and aimed primarily at teenagers.

Book on Once-Marrieds — \$767 to writer Sarah Newport to transcribe taped interviews for a book dealing with the personal experiences of formerly married Lesbians.



Issues Of Concern To Gay And Lesbian Elders

A retired friend of mine recently paraphrased the familiar expression, "Nobody loves you when you're old and gray," changing the word gray to Gay! In some cases I am inclined to agree with his opinion because I know some older Gays and Lesbians for whom the "golden" years have proved to be somewhat "leaden."

Statistical interpolation indicates that there are over four million Gay men and Lesbians over the age of 60 in the U.S. today. That number will be rising as the general population ages. Too many of these people are not visible, preferring to live in isolation than suffer the rebuff of both the heterosexual and the homosexual communities.

The heterosexual community seems to be more broadminded today than in the past and is overcoming slowly its prejudices against those with affectional preferences for their own sex. However, many older homosexuals, remembering the years of

harassment and prejudice, simply do not trust the heterosexual agencies for senior citizens. "I went to a straight senior citizens function recently," said another of my older friends, "and all they talked about was their grandchildren and I literally had to fight off the widows looking for a new husband." He went on to say that he felt that he didn't dare tell them that he is Gay for fear that they would shun him completely.

His experiences in the Gay community had not been much better. He told me of trying to start a friendly conversation with a younger man sitting next to him in a Gay bar, only to be curtly told, "Let me alone, you dirty old man. I don't want to talk to you." I was pleased, somehow, with his reply: "What makes you think that I could possibly be interested in your body? With that attitude of yours you probably won't live long enough to reach my age and if you do, you will be one sorry, lonely old man."

The Gay community has come a long way in overcoming its own prejudices with many Gay groups now insisting on gender and racial parity in leadership positions, but ageism is still a lingering problem in the heavily youth oriented society.

"One definition of a community is that it cares for its more vulnerable members."



says Arlene Kochman, executive director of New York's SAGE (Senior Action in a Gay Environment). She also points out that a Gay family should not only have Gay brothers and sisters, but older Gay members as well, since younger people can frequently benefit from the experience and advice of their elders.

An older Lesbian whom I met at a SAGE function in New York confided in me that before coming to SAGE she had been at a loss as to how to meet other older Lesbians since she is frail and afraid to go out alone at night and she does not much care for the bar scene. She had fought her feelings for other women until, at last, she came out in middle-age, so she didn't have a lot of Lesbian friends. She told me that she had found that her situation was not that unusual, saying, "there are a lot of lonely older Lesbians out there!"

Is it obvious, then, that the Gay community needs to have social functions designed for older Gay people, even if they provide nothing more than an opportunity for an intergenerational mingling in a safe place. Isolation and loneliness need not dominate the lives of older Gay people. A friendly atmosphere where older Gays can meet and reminisce about their past lives with people who share their feelings can go along way toward lifting isolation and sometimes even severe depression.

In addition to the concerns of being an older Gay person in a sometimes hostile society, Gay and Lesbian seniors share the common concerns of all elderly people. They worry about health care and insurance, transportation, affordable housing, retirement income, and bereavement on the loss of a life partner in the same way as their heterosexual counterparts. State and local agencies for the elderly, however, almost never have an outreach to the Gay community, rarely realizing that older Gays and Lesbians have special problems that need to be addressed in every one of these areas of concern. Gerontologists and social workers are just beginning to admit the need for such outreach. Older Gay people sometimes need special counseling as they deal with the problems of ageing. For example, it is believed that Gay people are more prone to have alcohol problems than heterosexuals, since much of their socializing has traditionally revolved around the Gay bars.

family members to take care of them when they become ill or homebound. Unless they enjoy a certain popularity and have a circle of Gay friends (Gay family), they sometimes suffer their illness alone, with no one to help them with shopping and household chores, no one to help them keep medical appointments and pick up prescriptions. They frequently have no more than a television set to help them pass the lonely homebound hours. Just a friendly visit from another person can make a real difference in recovery from illness.

Even where groups for seniors have formed, it has been found that setting up services for the homebound requires professional leadership; social workers who can evaluate the needs of the client and train the volunteers who will be the "friendly visitors." Professional social workers can also help older Gays plug into the services available in the larger community. After all, older Gays have paid their taxes during their working years and are entitled to the same services that are provided by governmental agencies to heterosexual seniors. Since older Gays frequently avoid heterosexually oriented senior citizens groups, they often do not know how to get the various services that are available.

The illness and bereavement over the death of a long term lover is the same for a Gay person as it is for a marital partner, but since the Gay relationship is not recognized by society, special problems need to be dealt with. For example, many hospitals still allow only blood relatives to visit those who are seriously ill, barring Gay partners from visitation. Company health insurance policies rarely include "significant others" in their benefits. Social Security benefits do not continue for a Gay lover upon the death of his or her Gay "spouse" of the same sex. Even wills have been known to be challenged successfully by blood relatives when assets or money was left to a surviving Gay partner. Special legal advice is necessary to provide iron clad documents and/or strategies to protect a survivor from a sometimes hostile and greedy family. The bereavement process itself may require special counseling, since older Gays are reluctant to make new friends and engage in new activities, having relied to such an extent on their deceased partners for solace and comfort in a hostile world.

Special groups are beginning to form in various cities across the country with a special mission and outreach to senior Gays and Lesbians, but so far they number less than a dozen and most are strictly social in nature, not having yet established professional services for the elderly who are not mobile. Most of these groups are trying to follow in the footsteps of SAGE, the oldest, largest and most well organized senior group in the country. SAGE is fifteen years old, has over 7,000 members, and a paid professional staff of ten people.

A new group is forming in Milwaukee, with its initial meeting to be held on Thursday, December 2, at 7pm, in the upstairs banquet room at M&M Club, 124 N. Water Street. A report on the recent SAGE conference will be given, followed by a viewing of SAGES' short film titled A Family Portrait, before the organizational process begins. Everyone interested in this project is invited to attend, regardless of age or sexual persuasion. Optimistically, a new group should be off and running in a short order!





become all too predictable. I respect their work very much but can't resist suggesting a parody. How about *The Remains of the* Room at Howards End?

THE PIANO

No one is likely to accuse writer-director Jane Campion of being predictable. The only thing her three major features, Sweetie, An Angel at My Table and, now, The Piano, have in common is Campion's choice of strange and compelling stories and her unique visual interpretations of them.

The Piano shared the Grand Prize at the Cannes Film Festival earlier this year with China's Farewell My Concubine (a film with a strong Gay subtext which will open in December). The Piano deserved the honor. It is a poetic and absolutely breathtaking masterpiece.

The Piano is like nothing I have ever seen before in my life. I know that's an awful cliche, but it's never been more apt. I can say a little about the story and performances, but this is a movie that has to be seen to be believed, folks. The visual and aural atmosphere of this movie takes you to places you have never been before.

The place is the raw, rainy and muddy New Zealand bush back in the 1800's. The movie begins when a boat, surviving a violent sea crossing, drops a Scottish mail order bride, Ada (Holly Hunter), her 9-year-old daughter Flora (Anna Paquin) and their belongings on a New Zealand beach. Little Flora promptly pukes in the sand while Ada opens a huge crate and begins playing a piano rhapsodically.

Ada, for reasons that remain amusingly unclear, is mute. She communicates with her daughter through sign language but expresses herself most fully through her piano playing. It's a rather bad omen then when husband-to-be Stewart (Sam Neill) decides the piano is too heavy to be carried through the difficult terrain and must be abandoned on the beach.

A rough hewn neighbor of Stewart's, George Baines (Harvey Keitel) agrees to purchase the piano in exchange for some land. He then asks Ada, who is going out of her mind without her music, to give him lessons. But it turns out he doesn't want lessons, he wants to "do things" while she plays. She can earn her piano back if she

complies with his wishes. Ada reluctantly agrees.

The "lessons," which begin as a perverse little game, gradually build in intensity until both Baines and Ada are swept up in the emotional vortex. The eroticism of these scenes is heightened by the passionate piano playing. In each "lesson" together, the two bare not only more and more of their physical selves but their souls as well. Baines eventually calls a halt to it, but Ada can't let him go.

I realize this sounds like the scenario for a bad porno flick. The Piano is anything but that. The love scenes between Ada and Baines are highly charged but non-exploitive. Their's is a profound story about isolation, communication, intimacy, passion — music. Their brief idyll is shattered when Stewart is alerted to what's happening. As one might expect, there is a violent climax, but a peaceful and satisfactory resolution. Through it all, the native Maori people observe the Anglos' angst with a combination of bemusement and contempt.

Every performance in *The Piano* is outstanding. Holly Hunter, who plays the piano herself throughout the film, is amazing. Her performance is one of great depth and intensity that surpasses anything she has done in her more superficial American films. Keitel puts in another brave and daring performance. Hunter and Keitel are clearly actors with unlimited potential.

The haunting visuals in this film really leave one gasping. The damp, eerie, underwater look of the all-enveloping bushland makes you feel you are truly in a world apart. Other images linger: the piano, crated and alone on the vast expanse of beach; Ada, her dress billowing, as she sinks in the mud after being attacked by Stewart; Ada's hands moving along the keys as Baines caresses her arms, her neck; Ada's and Baines's naked bodies writhing and rocking together.

Oooh, damn! The Piano is a feast for the senses! Don't miss it.

All hail, Jane Campion! — a wonderful young director from down under whose intelligence and vision are likely to bring us many more such fascinating movies.

The Piano opens at Milwaukee's Oriental Theatre November 19 where Remains of the Day is already playing. Consult local listings for theaters in your area.

"Remains of the Day" and "The Piano" Among Best Films of 1993

Classy, Art House Movies Will Delight Film Buffs

Rarely does one get to see two truly great movies within the space of a week. I had that privilege recently after attending critics' screenings of James Ivory's The Remains of the Day and Jane Campion's The Piano.

REMAINS OF THE DAY

The Remains of the Day reunites the creative team that triumphed in last year's art house favorite, Howards End. Directed by James Ivory, produced by his longtime partner Ismail Merchant, and scripted by award-winning screenwriter Ruth Prawer Jhabvala, the film stars recent Oscar winners Anthony Hopkins and Emma Thompson.

Like many of the Merchant-Ivory team's films (Room With a View, Maurice, Howard's End), Remains of the Day is a slow- moving but elegant narrative which explores repressed emotions and sexuality in the larger context of Britain's rigid class system.

Remains is primarily the story of Stevens (Hopkins), head butler at the huge country estate of the wealthy Lord Darlington (James Fox). The story is told in flashback as Stevens looks back on his years of service to Lord Darlington just before the outbreak of World War II. At that time, Lord Darlington, blind to the evil intents of the Germans, hosted secret diplomatic meetings with the naive intent of appeasing the Nazis. Christopher Reeve appears in a supporting role as an American Congressman who warns Darlington against trusting the Germans.

Stevens presides over the large staff of footmen, parlormaids, cooks and scullery workers who must move like clockwork to make the lavish dinners and accommodations for the diplomats run

smoothly. His singleminded dedication to his job renders Stevens blind to the pro-Nazi leanings of his master and, worse, closes his heart to the needs of his dying father and to the housekeeper (Thompson) who loves him.

Hopkins is great as the efficient, perfectionist Stevens who sacrifices his personal feelings to the ideal of unquestioning service to his master. Thompson is compelling as the pleasant and sprightly Miss Kenton, who finds herself attracted to Stevens but sadly unable to break through his thick layer of reserve.

Remains of the Day is really the tragedy of Stevens, who only realizes, much too late, the error of his ways. He not only loses the love of Miss Kenton, who could have warmed and brightened his life, but he eventually, out of shame, denies his ties to Lord Darlington, who becomes widely viewed as a traitor.

Stevens and Darlington, despite their class differences, have the same sort of tragic flaw: blindly going about what they see as their "duty" without seriously questioning the implications of their actions. For the high-minded but foolish Lord Darlington, "Peace in Our Time" is to be achieved at any price. For Stevens, obedience to his employer is the highest standard. It is not his place to question his master or be concerned with world events. Even when he is treated contemptuously by some of Darlington's upper class cronies, Stevens politely defers to their authority.

I've revealed much of the plot, but fans of James Ivory films know the greatest satisfaction is to be found in the details, especially the visuals. Remains is, as usual, beautifully photographed with set decoration that is both extravagant (upstairs) and humble (downstairs). The deceptively simple story unfolds slowly, revealing layers of meaning and subtleties of character which are rendered expertly by the whole cast.

My only reservations about this classy film are that 1) like most Merchant-Ivory productions, it's about 15-20 minutes too long, and 2) with yet another movie about repressed emotions and class distinctions, Merchant-Ivory movies are slowly becoming self-parodies. There is some wit in Remains, but overall, the seriousness, the subtleties, the understatement, the repressions and the reverential tones which characterize Merchant-Ivory films have
