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
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Clinton's AIDS Day Address Revealed Character, Commitment

Unusually Personal Speech Won Over This Skeptic

On World AIDS Day December 1. President Bill Clinton orchestrated an impressive series of media events to show his administration's concern about the AIDS epidemic

At the Justice Department, Attorney General Janet Reno promised aggressive prosecution of cases involving AIDS discrimination. Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary and Commerce Secretary Ron Brown announced -programs of AIDS education for their departments' employees.

Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala joined Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders serving food to people with AIDS at a Washington shelter. The previous day, Shalala had announced the formation of a new working group, the Task Force on AIDS Drug Development, "to refocus and re-energize our best minds for a concerted attack on this killer." (See related story.)

The media gave major coverage to Clinton's own World AIDS Day speech. but mostly to the angry interruption by activist Luke Sissyfag, who screamed at the President: "Talk is cheap and we need action! You are doing nothing! Look at your record, Bill! One year, no results! The Manhattan Project on AIDS that you promised during the campaign where is it? Thirty recommendations of George Bush's Commission on AIDS - where are they? One year! Slick Willy! The Republicans were right! We should have never trusted you!"

I was excited and glad to see Clinton called on the carpet. I am always proud to see an individual take the risk of speaking out in that way. But the media's focus on the heckler detracted attention from the body of Clinton's speech which, in my opinion, was one of the most eloquent, emotional and educational statements about AIDS any elected leader has ever delivered.

Of course, words are no substitute for action. And I firmly believe that we must all keep the pressure on the people and institutions and bureaucracies that have so far dragged their feet and/or profiteered from the epidemic.

AIDS AND THE HOLOCAUST

But I also don't believe a man's (or woman's) words mean nothing. Clinton's speech was extremely thoughtful and impassioned and revealed a depth of



understanding and concern about AIDS that cannot be dismissed. His response to the heckler was most revealing.

Clinton listened to Sissyfag without interrupting or yelling back. Then, when audience members at the Georgetown Medical Center auditorium began shouting Sissyfag down, Clinton calmed them, saying "It's okay. It's alright." (Can you imagine Bush or Reagan reacting this way? Neither of them ever even gave a speech devoted solely to AIDS, and each of them treated hecklers with contempt.) Sissyfag was escorted out, but he was not arrested.

Clinton then responded to the heckler by making a profound analogy between the despair and rage felt by people with AIDS and the despair and rage experienced by people during the Holocaust. His comments were Holocaust. His comments were extemporaneous and his voice was brimming with emotion.

"Look, last night, last night I went to see Schindler's List," said the President. "We had a special showing of it for the Holocaust Museum. It's not going to be a highly advertised movie and it's coming out around Christmas time, and it will be tough for people to see it then. I implore every one of you to go see it. It is an astonishing thing - Schindler's List. It's about a non-Jew who, as a member of the



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Nazi Party, saved over one thousand Jews by his personal efforts in World War Il from the Holocaust. . .

"The reason I ask you to go see the movie is you will see portrait after portrait after portrait after portrait of the painful difference between people who have no hope and no rage left and people who still have hope and still have rage. I'd rather that man be in here screaming at me than having given up altogether, much rather.

A LIGHTNING ROD

"The reason I say that is this. Part of my job is to be a lightning rod. Part of my job is to lift the hopes and aspirations of the American people, knowing that as long as you're trying to lift hopes and lift aspirations you can never fully close the gap between what you're reaching for and what you're actually doing, and knowing for sure that there's no way I can keep everybody alive who already has AIDS."

That last line was delivered with a real sense of frustration and regret. The fact that Clinton had the sensitivity to make the connection between AIDS and the Holocaust I think says volumes about his intellect and his heart. While that alone will hardly speed a cure for the virus, it propels us leagues ahead of the Reagan-Bush era. I'm convinced Clinton understands both the horror of the epidemic and the urgency of finding a cure.

Elsewhere in the speech, Clinton spoke of the friends he himself has lost to AIDS, including Dan Bradley, whose memory was emblazoned on a panel of the AIDS Quilt hanging directly behind the President. He talked about how the epidemic was bringing out the best and the worst in America, "exposing some of our prejudice in ways that is self-defeating" and "showing us the courage and the incredible capacity of the American people to give and to love."

"WHY DOESN'T SOMEONE HELP?"

Clinton also spoke about Jeffrey Schmaltz, a New York Times writer who recently died of AIDS. Schmaltz's last article, entitled Whatever Happened to AIDS? was a stinging rebuke of Clinton, of the press, of the scientific community and the Gay community for losing interest in the epidemic. "I am dying," Schmaltz wrote, "Why doesn't someone help us?"

Clinton said it was the responsibility of everybody to fight on for those who no longer can, and that the purpose of World AIDS Day was to "remind us that our attitudes, behavior and passion should be revved up in the other 364 days of the year."

"This is an issue," said Clinton, "if you just look at the sheer numbers, if you look at what is happening in some African countries. ... if you never had a heartbeat of compassion, you would have to be nearly obsessed with this problem."

Clinton outlined the steps his administration has taken against AIDS in the past year: the funding increases,

the extension of disability benefits, the AIDS czar, the new drug task force and his proposal for universal health care.

We ail feel these efforts are inadequate because they don't seem to be leading to any progress against the disease. Even scientists are despondent over their inability to make any substantial breakthroughs.

"A VICIOUS ADVERSARY"

Donna Shalala probably said it best when she referred to HIV as a "vicious and cunning adversary." Her words reminded me that HIV, more than Clinton

or the NIH or the drug companies, is the real enemy — an evil, relentless, God-awful virus the likes of which the world has never seen. We must make our leaders and institutions more responsive and accountable. But we must never forget what the real enemy is and we mustn't let our hatred for this disease consume ourselves or each other.

Some readers may accuse me of being an apologist for Clinton. But the compassion and deep insight he displayed in his speech on World AIDS Day made me proud that he is our President. Clinton is not the enemy. He is clearly in as much pain as we all are.



The Gay community has taken a leading role in AIDS prevention efforts. Yet, even men who know a lot about AIDS often need support to keep up their change efforts, and want to learn even better ways to stay safe and help others stay healthy. That's why the Community Health Behavior Program of the Medical College of Wisconsin created Men at Work.

New Task Force Formed to Speed AIDS Drugs

Shalala Promises Better Coordination and Action

Washington, DC — On the eve of World AIDS Day, Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala announced the formation of a National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development to expedite the search for new therapies against AIDS and the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV).

"The task force has a clear and critical mission," Shalala said, "to identify and remove any barriers and obstacles to developing effective treatments."

The 15-member panel of experts will be drawn from government, the pharmaceutical industry, academia, medicine and AIDS-affected communities. "This represents an unprecedented high level collaboration among leaders in the field," according to Shalala

"The Food and Drug Administration has made great strides in streamlining the approval process for drugs to treat life- threatening conditions, and the National Institutes of Health has contributed mightily to our understanding

of AIDS and HIV," said Shalala.

She pointed out that the Clinton administration had raised the federal AIDS research budget to \$1.3 billion. "But the sad fact remains that not a single new drug application for an antiretroviral drug is currently before the FDA. No matter how much we shorten the pipeline, we cannot achieve our goal unless we start filling that pipeline with

promising compounds."

Dr. David A. Kessler, the
Commissioner of Food and Drugs, said of the new task force: "We have never done anything like this before. We will have the government and industry and the AIDS community all sitting down together to develop strategy on AIDS drug development, collaboratively for the first time. We will discuss what drugs to look for, how to find them, what are the best leads now, and are we pushing them as best we can.'

Dr. Phillip Lee, Assistant Secretary for Health who will chair the new task force, said: "The group will be constantly evaluating the process — identifying obstacles, charting strategy, and asking: What are our options? Is anything falling through the cracks? Are we doing everything we possibly can?"

SPEEDING THE PROCESS

"Too often in the past, the needed links have been missing or relationships have been adversarial, resulting in unnecessary duplication of efforts or potential drugs not being developed and

evaluated as rapidly as they might."
"We're not just talking about anti-virals," Dr. Lee added. "We need an across-the-board strategy to develop drugs to treat all aspects of HIV disease. We need immune modulators, anti-cancer compounds, and agents to treat and prevent opportunistic infections."

Shalala called HIV "a vicious and

cunning adversary.


"The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention inform me that AIDS and HIV. on average, kill 92 people in this country every day. With so many people being held hostage by this virus, we must explore all possible options."

"This is not just another government panel appointed to study an issue and write a report that gathers dust," Shalala promised. "I expect the task force to report to me personally, rapidly and regularly, and I pledge to work with all its members to eliminate any obstacles to finding effective treatments."

A spokesman for the AIDS Action Council, a national lobbying group, responded to the formation of the new panel by saying: "We will hold this task force accountable for what it does and

does not do."

Writer and AIDS activist Larry Kramer told USA Today: "I don't consider the formation of another panel as anything



more than window dressing, but I'm hopeful because there are good people involved."

Clinton advisor Bob Hattoy, a Gay man with AIDS, who has been disappointed with the administration's slow response to the epidemic, said: "What we need is a war on AIDS, and this will be hopefully an attempt to get the best minds together to conduct that war."

Baldwin Announces Plan For Partner Legislation


Second Bill Would Expand Marriage Definition

Madison — Spurred on in part by the troubles with the TAA contract, State Representative Tammy Baldwin announced plans in a press conference arlier this month to introduce two bills in the upcoming legislative session to achieve legal recognition for same-sex couples. One bill would establish domestic partnership. The second bill

would expand the legal definition of marriage in Wisconsin to include samesex couples.

Baldwin noted the importance of establishing marriage rights and domestic partnerships as a whole, rather than pursuing health care or other singular aspects. In drafting of the bills, Baldwin ran a computer search for references to "marriage," "husband," "wife" or "spouse" in state statutes. "We



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Homophobia Kills Domestic Partnership Effort

UW Madison Teaching Assistants Bargaining Note Removed From Contract

By John Cain Madison - The actions of "influential Republicans" in the Wisconsin State Senate led to the removal from a contract language that supported health care benefits for unmarried domestic partners of UW-Madison teaching assistants. That was the charge leveled by Representative Tammy Baldwin, Teaching Assistants Association CoPresident Hillary Callahan and Wisconsin AFL-CIO Secretary-Treasurer David Newby at a December 1 conference.

Teaching Assistants' The Association (TAA), a labor union representing 2,400 UW-Madison employees, negotiated the contract in October in the hopes of having it scheduled for action in the Legislature later the same month. The contract included a bargaining note stating that, if, during the course of the TAA contract, state government employees were extended partnership health benefits, the

TAA would receive the same benefit without requiring a renegotiation of the TAA contract. The contract was approved almost unanimously by the TAA and was unanimously ratified by the Department of Employment Relations

During hearings before the Joint Committee on Employment Relations (JOCER) later that month, Kris Paap, chief negotiator for the TAA, mentioned the note, along with several points the TAA had won, as a part of her testimony. Other than "a few eyebrows went up, there were no (negative)

were amazed to find over 3,000 references," she said. "There are all sort of rights and privileges, responsibilities, that go along with marriage in this state." Same-sex marriage would confer all of these rights and responsibilities at once and preclude having to secure each one through

separate legislation.

State Republicans are vowing opposition. Although he was not interviewed for this article, Senate Majority Leader Michael Ellis (R-Neenah) was quoted in the Wisconsin State Journal as saying he "would not support a man and a woman living together having health insurance like a husband and wife would have insurance. I will work as vigorously against (Baldwin's) idea as she will work for it." It is unclear whether Ellis would oppose same-sex marriage, but it seems likely.

A Hawaii court is currently considering the legality of that state's refusal to recognize same-sex marriage. Plaintiffs there are claiming such refusal as gender discrimination under the Equal Rights Amendment of Hawaii's state

constitution.

If Wisconsin or any other state legalizes same-sex marriage, such marriages may become legal throughout the nation because of the "full faith and credit" clause of the U.S. Constitution. Under that clause, each state agrees to recognize the laws of every other state.

However, Baldwin believes it is more likely that couples will have to serve as test cases, marrying in a state that recognizes the union and suing their

home states for recognition.

Baldwin has no illusions that passage of these bills will be an easy process. "At this point I'm being a political pragmatist. We will have to have a dialogue for quite some time before we can realistically look at passage of this legislation. But I'm in this for the long haul."



reactions" from the Committee, said Callahan. The contract passed JOCER unanimously.


Following the hearings, Paap was called to the DER office and told that the partnership language had to be exchanged for a side letter saying that if any changes were made in health care, the contract could be renegotiated. Paap agreed, on the condition that the words "domestic partnership" appeared in the letter. An hour later, a high-ranking DER official called Paap to say that such language was unacceptable. "It became very clear that (the contract) was being held up on the words 'domestic partnership' and nothing else," said

Papp. "They made it very clear that we were facing the loss of our contract."

Losing the contract would have meant losing the negotiated wage increases it contained. "There were pretty clear threats to parts of our contract," Paap said. "(The DER) said that if we had to go back and bargain again, they wouldn't take it lightly." The TAA held a series of emergency meetings and agreed to the removal of the note from the contract, but only in exchange for the right to file grievances on harassment issues.

"We were still pretty angry, but we were pleased to be able to get at least this crumb," said Callahan. The revised contract went back before JOCER on the last day of the October floor period and passed the Senate. The contract went into effect November 16.

In addition to raising questions about anti-Gay bias, the action against the contract has ramifications for organized labor. "To my memory, there has not been a situation (before this) where the state has ratified a contract through DER and asked the union to approve the contract, and then taken a step back and said 'no, we have got to change that contract,' "said Newby. "That is a very disturbing development for the relationship between the state and all of its unions, and has grave consequences for the collective



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Whitewater Gays Harassed by Student Senate

The Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Student Union at UW-Whitewaterwent before the Whitewater Student Association (WSA) on November 29 in hopes of receiving funding for next year's activities. What it got instead was an hour and a half of illegal abuse at the hands of student senators.

GLBSU requested \$900 for next year's budget. The Segregated University Fee Allocation Committee (SUFAC), the body responsible for recommending budget allotments for student organizations to WSA, originally

bargaining process in Wisconsin."

No one was willing to name names at the conference, because there is no hard evidence linking a specific person to the killing of the language. Currently, DER Secretary Jon Litscher is taking responsibility for the decision. "Quite frankly I'm suspicious of that," said Baldwin. She believes it is more likely that Senate Republicans blocked the scheduling of the bill until the language was removed. Republicans currently hold a one-vote majority in the Senate and thus control scheduling of Senate activities.

Litscher has stated that assertions of homophobia are "ridiculous. The issue of homophobia has nothing to do with it," he said. "It's a health insurance issue that expands coverage." However, the note in and of itself would not have expanded coverage. However, the note in and of itself would not have expanded coverage. TAA domestic partners would have gained coverage only if other state government employees later received it in their contract. Also, the TAA had already agreed to removal of the note and only wanted to ensure the inclusion of the words "domestic partnership" in the new side letter.

The TAA is now pursuing a threefront initiative on partnership issues. It is filing a grievance on behalf of several employees whose partners are ineligible for benefits, charging discrimination based on marital status and sexual orientation. It will be submitting domestic partnership proposals for 1995-97 contract negotiations, which will make partnership benefits a mandatory bargaining point. The TAA will also hold a series of educational forums on campus around Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual and partnership issues.

recommended that GLBSU receive \$600, which GLBSU found an acceptable figure. WSA disposed of the budget requests for all student groups, except the GLBSU and the Black Student Union (BSU), in less than an hour


"THEY TOTALLY SLAMMED US"

WSA then spent an hour and a half addressing GLBSU's budget request, littering the discussion with anti-Gay remarks. Senator's comments ranged from "Homosexuality is wrong" to "I don't like Gay people. I am not a homophobe. I'm not afraid of them. I just don't like them."

"(Senators) were giving their moral

positions," said SUFAC chairperson Jamie Brown. GLBSU members saw it a little differently. "They bashed us for an hour and 35 minutes," said GLBSU President Kim Simes. "In that time, they asked two, maybe three questions that related to our budget."

WSA finally voted against any direct funding of GLBSU, but did agree to match any funds GLBSU raised, up to a maximum of \$300. This allocation in itself was not illegal or in violation of UW-W policy, but is highly unusual. "We're the only organization on campus required to match funds," said Simes. The actions of senators which led to the decision were illegal, according to

Brown. "You can't use your moral opinions in setting a budget," he said. Three members of the UW-W administration were present at the meeting. None of them intervened as senators violated WSA and UW-W policy and state law.

According to one source, WSA had planned to rectify their actions at a December 6 meeting, but another controversy erupted, this one involving student elections. The GLBSU budget was instead scheduled to be addressed at a special session on December 13 (After In Step's deadline).

Brown believes WSA will approve SUFAC's original \$600 recommendation at that meeting. Simes, however, noted that "several senators said they would not back down, even if we took them to

court."

It is important to note that the questions relating to BSU's budget were because of procedural points and were apparently not racially motivated.

AN ANNUAL PROBLEM

GLBSU has similar problems every year during its budget request process. Still, Brown sees the issue as one of economics, not prejudice. "A lot of other groups got money cut, too," he said. "Things have been fixed. It's a dead issue."

"That's bullshit," said GLBSU
Secretary Eileen Krysiak. "Everybody from
GLBSU (at the meeting) feels it was

prejudice. Economics had nothing to do with it "

"It is far from a dead issue," she continued. "(WSA has) not approached us to say 'we were wrong.' Their behavior was intolerable."

Simes agrees. "You can't fix the discrimination and the lack of education just by giving us money."

OVER 100 DEMONSTRATE SUPPORT

On December 9, over 100 people turned out for a rally and march in support of GLBSU, entitled "A Simple Matter of Justice." Close to 20 speakers appeared at the rally, representing a broad coalition of UW-W students, faculty and staff and members of the Whitewater community. Following the march, GLBSU board

Crypto Death Toll Rises; Water Works Criticized

Milwaukee — A spokesman for the Milwaukee AIDS Project says that at least 62 of the agency's clients have died as a result of the cryptosporidium parasite which tainted Milwaukee's municipal water supply last spring. Five other crypto-related deaths bring the total to at least 67.

The intestinal parasite causes uncontrollable diarrhea and, in some cases, vomiting. People with healthy immune systems can fight off the illness within a week or so. People with weakened immune systems, like those with HIV and AIDS, have a much more difficult time. MAP Director Doug Nelson

members presented a formal grievance to UW-W Assistant Chancellor for Student Affairs Roger Ludeman. Ludeman, who submitted a statement in support of GLBSU to be read at the really, was quoted as saying he "would get right on it"

At press time, no disciplinary action has been taken against the senators involved. It seems unlikely that any action will be taken against them. WSA is a student organization, and under UW-W procedure, disciplinary action against student organization is handled through the Student Organization Judiciary Board, which is an arm of WSA.

The WSA action is the latest in a string of anti-Gay events at UW schools in recent weeks. A UW-Milwaukee newspaper recently libeled the Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Community (GLBC) at that campus. Republican state senators allegedly blocked inclusion of domestic partnership language in a contract for the state's Teaching Assistants. And at UW-Stout, a Lesbian was the target of a severe hate-motivated beating.

Meanwhile, the City of Milwaukee's Deputy Health Commissioner, Thomas Schlenker, who is leaving for a job elsewhere, took some parting shots at the Milwaukee Water Works, which he said "danced around" requests for information when the crypto crisis first broke.

Pressured by high level politicos, Schlenker later apologized for his remarks, saying he did not mean to imply any "misrepresentation" on the part of Water Works personnel.


Man Charged in Possible Gay Related Murder

Milwaukee — Lee M. Williams, 37, has been charged with first degree intentional homicide in the November 21 strangling of Shorewood resident Harold Miller, 52. Williams pleaded not guilty and claims his actions were in self-defense

The criminal complaint states that Williams met Miller at the Shorewood Inn, where Williams works as a cook. When Williams' work shift ended, he met Miller in the restaurant and the men drank together for some time. During their conversation, Williams says Miller told him he (Miller) was Gav.

Williams says he accepted an invitation from Miller to share a few more beers in Miller's apartment nearby. There, Miller allegedly made sexual advances toward Williams which Williams tried to ward off. When Miller persisted, Williams says, he took an electrical cord and held it around Miller's neck until he collapsed.

At press time, Williams was being held at the County Jail.

Jefferson — Harold C. Maass, 78, was found guilty of second degree intentional homicide for the October, 1992 shooting death of businessman Robert Woelfel, 48. Woelfel was killed at Maass's rural Ixonia property while wearing a dress, nylons and high heels. Maass shot him once in the back and then in the head. He could be sentenced up to 25 years.

Maass's attorney claimed the shooting was self-defense because the old man had allegedly been previously attacked in his home by a cross dresser. But Maass told police he killed the victim and should get a medal for it. "If more of these sons of bitches would get it, we wouldn't have these problems we have today," he said. Neighbors testified Maass was a violent man.

The victim's wife said she knew of Woelfel's cross-dressing, but that he was a "wonderful man" nonetheless.

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Feds Asked to Investigate Harassment of Mississippi Lesbians

Lesbian Couple Threatened by Small Town Residents

Ovett, MS — An arm of the U.S. Justice Department may take steps to intervene in a potentially violent situation in tiny Ovett, Mississippi, where two Lesbians have been threatened by town residents.

Upon the urging of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), officials of the Justice Department's Community Relations Service called the local sheriff and FBI office in Mississippi to express their concerns and let them know a federal agency was monitoring events.

For the past two months, Wanda and Brenda Henson, a Lesbian couple who bought 120 acres of land near Ovett for use as a women's retreat called Camp Sister Spirit, have been subjected to increasing harassment by area residents. They have received threatening phone calls, armed intruders have roamed their property, a dead dog was hung on their mailbox, and the mailbox has been shot at.

Brenda Henson told NGLTF: "Even local government officials are involved in the attempt to force us from this land. I view this as an open conspiracy to deny

us our civil rights."

The Hensons contacted NGLTF after a December 6 town meeting in which both residents and public officials denounced the two women and vowed to find a way to force them off their land. Officials plan to research state and local laws and hope that Mississippi's anti-sodomy statute will provide them with some pretext to banish the women.

At the meeting, one resident said of the Hensons: "These people can pick up our little girls and take them to this place and do whatever they want to." A pastor warned: "[They] will intervene with women and girls in this community when they're vulnerable and in need of help. I believe we're dealing with something that

is against nature."

While an official of the Community Relations Service (CRS) has contacted authorities in the area, the federal agency is limited in its powers because it is mandated to mediate disputes related only to race, religion and ethnicity—not sexual orientation. The Service cannot intervene in the dispute further without direct orders from Attorney General Janet Reno.

"The situation warrants immediate attention — the women's lives are in danger," said NGLTF Director Peri Jude Radecic. "We must convince Janet Reno

that the Community Relations Service needs to mediate the dispute and alleviate the potential for harm to the Hensons. CRS must change its mandate."

Accordingly, NGLTF sent a letter to Reno outlining its concerns and asking for immediate action from the Justice Department, including CRS mediation, FBI oversight and an investigation by the Civil Rights Division to determine whether the Hensons' rights have been violated. Copies of the letter have also been sent to the heads of Congressional committees which oversee the Department of Justice and to Rep. Mike Parker (D), who



Gay FBI Agent Wins: Bureau Will No Longer Discriminate

Washington D.C. — Frank Buttino, a highly honored 20-year veteran of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who was fired in 1990 when his superiors learned he was Gay, has won an out-of-court settlement with the Bureau. Buttino won pension rights and compensation for legal fees.

The settlement was reached December 10 just as Buttino's case was about to be heard in federal court. The previous week, Attorney General Janet Reno had issued a directive barring discrimination throughout the Justice Department. For the very first time, the list of protected categories included sexual orientation. The FBI was covered by Reno's order, and the Bureau promised, in its settlement with Buttino, to no longer discriminate against agents who are Gay or Lesbian.

"This is the beginning of a new day!" said a jubilant Buttino about the settlement and policy change. The FBI had excluded homosexuals entirely before 1979. Since then, the Bureau continued to restrict suspected Gays from security clearances and, as in Buttino's case, fired those open about their orientation.

Massachusetts Protects LesBiGay Students

Boston, MA — On December 10, Republican Gov. William Weld signed a bill which prohibits discrimination against students based on their sexual orientation. Massachusetts, which was the second state to pass a general bill against anti-Gay job and housing bias (after Wisconsin), now becomes the first state to specifically safeguard LesBiGay youth in the schools.

Impetus for the bill grew after the state Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth identified higher drop-out rates and suicide attempts among Gay youth. Gay students also testified to enduring harassment from fellow students and even teachers because of their sexual orientation.

The law prohibits any forms of discrimination against Les BiGay students and requires schools to provide security and equal opportunity to them, including in extracurricular activities. Schools must allow students to form Gay clubs and allow them full access to school facilities.

Texas County Reverses Itself, Welcomes Apple

Georgetown, Tx — The Williamson County Board of Commissioners, bowing to communioty pressure, negative publicity and protests by business leaders and Gay groups, reversed an earlier vote and decided to allow the Apple Computer Corporation to build a new multi-million dollar facility in its county.

The Board first voted 3-2 against helping Apple with tax abatements because the company offers benefits to the domestic partners of its Gay and Lesbian employees. Commissioners cited fears of a homosexual influx into their community and the need to preserve "family values."

But after a firestorm of criticism, after Apple received hundreds of offers from other cities, and after becoming a national laughingstock for turning down thousands of good-paying jobs, the county reversed its vote, welcoming Apple.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force hailed the second vote as a "victory of jobs over prejudice." A Lesbian activist in the Lone Star State said: "If a conservative state like Texas can change, anybody can change."

D.C. Appeals Court Hears Gay Marriage Case

Washington, DC —A panel of the District of Columbia Court of Appeals recently heard arguments in the case of a Gay couple who were denied a marriage license by the city.

Craig Dean and Patrick Gill filed suit against the city in November, 1990. A Superior Court judge ruled that the city was justified in denying the license based on centuries of Judeo- Christian tradition

and said the denial was not a violation of the men's equal protection rights.

In their appeal, Craig and Dean argued that since the District bans discrimination based on gender and sexual orientation and because D.C.'s marriage code is gender neutral (refering only to "parties" and "applicants" rather than sexes), denial of the license was illegal.

D.C. Corporation Counsel James McKay countered that nothing in the District's Human Rights Act specifically supported same sex marriage, and that a 1977 proposal to incorporate Gay marriage into a revision of the laws was defeated.

A decision is expected next year.

Rumor That Bert & Ernie Are Gay Creates Uproar

Tupelo, MS —Officials at the Tupelo Coliseum report that for weeks before a November performance by the touring company of Sesame Street Live, they were bombarded with phone calls by irate citizens demanding to know whether the popular Muppet characters Bert and Ernie are Gay lovers.

Some of the callers were concerned that Bert and Ernie would actually participate in a wedding ceremony during the show. And the Associated Press reports at least one caller said he didn't want to come to the show if the rumors were not true.

Coliseum management appealed to Jim Henson Productions, the company which creates and markets the Muppets, to clarify Bert and Ernie's relationship. The company issued a statement saying, "There is no truth whatsoever to the rumors that Bert and Ernie are married."

San Francisco, CA — More than 2,000 people marched in a solemn candlelight procession from Castro Street to City Hall November 27 to mark the 15th anniversary of the assassination of Supervisor Harvey Milk, a pioneer of the Gay rights movement. Milk and Mayor George Moscone were killed by a homophobic ex-cop, Dan White, who later took his own life.

Washington, DC - Gay activist and Clinton campaign advisor David Mixner has reached a rapprochment with his friend in the White House after denouncing the President earlier this year for his failure to lift the Pentagon ban. Mixner met with Clinton in the Oval Office for 90 minutes on December 3 and the two friends settled their differences.

New Orleans, LA - Mayor Sidney Barthelemy has vetoed a domestic partners ordinance which would have provided health coverage to the partners of Gay and Lesbian city employees. Berthelemy said the provision would cost too much money at a time when municipal revenues are down.

Washington, DC - A new national grassroots organization called Gay and Lesbian Americans will hold its first major meeting and strategy session in the nation's capital January 15- 17. To register, write to: Gay and Lesbian Americans, P.O. Box 77533, Washington, DC 20013-7533. The fee is \$35, but no one will be turned away.

Health Reform and AIDS

By Donna E. Shalala

In 1987, John McGann lost his health insurance. Not because he didn't pay his premium. Not because he lost his job - and not because his employer dropped health coverage from its benefit package. McGann lost his insurance because he had AIDS

McGann died in 1991 without ever regaining his insurance. But his fight, taken eventually to the Supreme Court, taught us that we need to reform our health care system so that people with life-threatening diseases such as AIDS don't face this greatest of personal crises without the protection of health insurance.

Since the epidemic began 13 years ago, thousands of people with AIDS and other life-threatening or chronic diseases have systematically been excluded from the private insurance market. In particular, women and children and minority group members are constantly confronted by obstacles to insurance

Profit-conscious insurance companies have used both crude and sophisticated methods to keep those people from getting coverage. For example, many insurers require individuals and employees of small companies to submit to HIV antibody screening tests. Others refuse to sell insurance to entire communities where AIDS is prevalent. Some invoke preexisting medical condition clauses to refuse coverage. And a growing number of insurers impose unrealistic lifetime limits on insurance coverage or specifically limit reimbursement for AIDSrelated services.

Employers, worried about the cost of their insurance policies and the risk of losing coverage for all their workers, have gone along with these limits. Some. like McGann's employer, the H & H Music Co., have even chosen to selfinsure in order to gain an exemption from state insurance rules.

As a result, today an estimated 27% of people living with AIDS are uninsured nearly double the national average. Another 45% rely on Medicaid for their coverage, and 4% get coverage through Medicare. The remaining 24% live in daily fear that their often limited private insurance coverage will either disappear or be priced beyond their reach.

This spotty coverage can lead to reduced life expectancy for those with AIDS who are uninsured and who cannot avail themselves of medical and preventive treatments. Similarly, among

those who are HIV infected, a lack of insurance can lead to a more rapid acceleration to full-blown AIDS and an inability to take advantage of the research and treatment advances we have achieved

For a desperately ill person without insurance, the news of a new drug approval or research breakthrough may not be a cause for celebration, but merely a cruel hoax.

The cost of treating such patients does not go away. Rather it is shifted unevenly to other parts of societies. including inner-city hospitals that are left with the burden of uncompensated care.

This has got to stop. And when Congress enacts President Clinton's Health Security Act. it will stop.

The Health Security Act provides all Americans with coverage that is affordable, portable, and permanent. For people with AIDS, those who are HIV infected, and those with other lifethreatening or chronic diseases, these benefits are of tremendous value.

First, insurance reforms will prohibit exclusion on the basis of a pre-existing condition; bar the use of lifetime or disease-specific coverage limitations; and return to the use of old-fashioned community rating, which spreads the cost of care for the chronically ill among the members of large communities rather than exacting that cost from those who are least able to afford it.

Second, the acute care segment of our Medicaid population will be folded into regional health alliances and be given a Health Security card and a comprehensive package of benefits equal to that of all other Americans.

Third, all insurance plans will provide extensive coverage of the costs of outpatient prescription drugs, which often amount to thousands of dollars a year for a person with a life-threatening disease

And, finally, out-of-pocket medical costs will be limited to no more than \$1,500 for an individual and \$3,000 for a

As a nation, we must remain committed to ending the scrouge of AIDS. At the same time, we have to improve our commitment to those who are living with AIDS and other chronic and lifethreatening diseases.

The President's Health Security Act is a major step in that direction and one that we can all agree must be taken.



Books

1993 Books In Review

1993 was a wondrous year for Gay and Lesbian publishing and the reward is an unprecedent number of exceptional books, both fiction and non-fiction aimed at the Gay and Lesbian reader. Such well-known authors as David Leavitt, Anne Rice, Randy Shilts, Jeanette Winterson, Joseph Hansen, and Rita Mae Brown each published new works receiving national acclaim and exposure. Increasingly, mainstream publishing houses are recognizing talented queer writers and that there is a substantial market for books by these authors. At the same time, smaller Gay and Lesbian presses, such as Naiad, Alyson, Cleis and Rising Tide continue to thrive.

Three books in particular have forced both Gay and straight America to re-examine their notions of queer issues. Since Clinton's election, the issue of Gays in the military has taken on national importance. Much of straight America seems to be obsessing on just what would happen if there was a Gav man or a Lesbian in an army barracks. For an informational, balanced report, there's Randy Shilt's Conduct Unbecoming (St. Martin's, \$27.95). This definitive investigation on national bestseller lists, revealed for the first time that some of America's most celebrated soldiers were homosexual. In Michaelangelo Sigrolile's explosive and controversial Queer In America (Random House, \$23) the issues are outing and how forces in America's three main influence and power centers: New York, Washington D.C. and Hollywood effectively perpetuate the conspiracy of the closet. In particular Signorile focuses on how oppressed, closeted Gays in power allow this homophobia to continue. Currently Bruce Bawer's A Place At The Table (Poseidon Press, \$21) has touched a nerve in both Gav and mainstream America. Both openly Gay and conservative. Bawer attacks not only the homophobia practiced by the fundamentalist right but also questions Gay and Lesbian activists and what he calls "the extremist Gay subculture."

It just wouldn't seem like Christmas without a new crop of expensive, lavish new coffee table books to tempt Gay and Lesbian readers, and 1993 was has been no exception. The stunning photography of Tom Bianchi is familiar to many from his first book, Out Of The Studio and also in postcards and greeting cards. In Extraordinary Friends (St. Martin's, \$50), Bianchi

again has filled a book with extraordinary black and white photographs of men and women, many friends of the photographer. Acclaimed fashion photographer from the 1930's and 1940's, George Platt Lynes was truly a photographer ahead of his time as will be evident from a stunning collection of male nudes in George Platt Lynes (Bulfinch, \$60).

There are several new books this year that have equal appeal to both Gay men and Lesbians. Certainly a highlight of 1993 was the March on Washington. Whether or not you were one of the million strong in Washington D.C. this past April, One Million Strong (Alyson, \$17.95) is a wonderful record of that monumentous occasion. Also from Alyson is Michael Willhoite's delightful book of caricatures of Gay men and Lesbians Members Of The Tribe (\$24.95), Several books focusing on Gay and Lesbian films were published in 1993 including Gay Hollywood Film & Video Guide (Companion Publications, \$15.95) by Steven Stewart, Vampires And Violets: Lesbians In Film (Penguin, \$15.99) by Andrea Weiss, and High Camp: A Guide to Camp and Cult Film Vol.1 (Leyland Pub., \$15.95) by Paul Roen. The Lavender Screen (Citadel, \$17.95) by Boze Hadleigh however really stood out. Hadleigh's book is both lavishly illustrated while focusing on both Gay and Lesbian Hollywood films.

Some of the biggest names in Gay and Lesbian fiction produced new titles in 1993. Rita Mae Brown published her first Lesbian themed book in nearly a decade with Venus Envy (Bantam, \$21.95). Brown's protagonist is Mary Frazier Armstrong, a woman believing to be dving, decides to write her closet friends and family to tell them what she really thinks of them and that she is Gay. Then suddenly she finds out she really isn't dying. Oops. In a delightful send up of the classic teenaged heroine, Nancy Drew, comes Mabel Maney's The Case Of the Not-So-Nice Nurse (Cleis, \$9.95). Also in 1993 came new titles from Mary Wings. Divine Victim (Dutton, \$20), and Jeanette Winterson, Written On The Body (Knopf.


Charles Busch is known for several outrageous theatrical revues, including "Vampire Lesbians of Sodom." In the delightful Whores Of Lost Atlantis (Hyperion, \$21.95) Busch tells how sweet and innocent performance artist Julian Young becomes a celebrated drag diva. Equally farcical is Chicago writer Robert Rodi's Closet Case (Dutton, \$21) which tells the cautionary tale of Lionel Frank, a closeted Gay man who will go to ever increasing and outrageous extremes to remain so. Also of note is David Leavitt's sexy and controversial While England Sleeps (Viking, \$22) and Fenton Johnson's poignant Scissors, Paper, Rock (Pocket, \$20).

In the genre of biography, Gay and Lesbian readers found several

entertaining and intriguing true life stories in 1993. Singer k.d. lang has garnered national attention with her announcement of her sexual preference. Her story can be read in William Robertson's Carrying The Torch (ECW Press, \$9.95). Equally as notable as an open Lesbian is tennis star Marina Navratilova. In Love Match (Birch Lane, \$19.95) Sandra Faulkner writes of Navratilova's explosive relationship with Judy Nelson. In A Special Agent (Morrow, \$23), Frank Buttino reveals the intriguing story of being both Gay and a FBI agent. The multitudes of fans of the drawings of Tom of Finland will find the Tom's true life story in the profusely illustrated Tom Of Finland: His Life And Times (St. Martin's, \$24,95), Other biographies of note include Genet (Knopf. \$35) by Edmund White, Mary Renault (Harcourt, Brace, \$24.95) by David Sweetman, and The Erotic Life Of Anais Nin (Little, Brown, \$24.95).

If the holidays prove to hectic, keep in mind a couple of books on the lighter side. Lesbians can turn to the first collection of cartoons from the outrageous Hothead Paisan, titled simply Hothead Lesbian Terrorist (Cleis, Paisan: \$12.95). Both Gay men and Lesbian are sure to enjoy the latest Stonewall Riots Collection from Andrea Natalie, Rubyfruit Mountain (Cleis, \$9.95). And finally, for the child of any age or sexual preference comes Uncle What-Is-It Is Coming To Visit (\$12.95), the latest delightful offering from Alyson Wonderland by Michael Willoite

Regardless of your reading tastes and preferences, a Happy Holidays to one and all.

Miller will also work with distributors in select markets to assist in fundraising events for local teams. "With our distributors, we'll raise additional funds to help defray some of the expenses for these teams," said Plowe.

Other companies sponsoring the Gay Games IV so far include Out Magazine, Naya Beverages, and a pharmaceutical firm, American Prefered Plan. Organizers are actively soliciting corporate sponsorship to help cover part of the estimated \$5.5 million budget necessary to produce the Games. Registration fees and tickets to attend events will also help defray expenses.

AMSTERDAM IN '98

Meanwhile, at its annual meeting in Washington, DC recently, the Federation of Gay Games chose Amsterdam in the Netherlands as the site of Gay Games V, tentatively scheduled for August 1-8, 1998. Amsterdam will be the first non-North American site for the Games. In 1982 and 1986, they were held in San Francisco. In 1990, they were held in Vancouver, British Columbia.

"Amsterdam is a very open society with a strong history of tolerance and acceptance, so it's only fitting that Amsterdam's theme for Gay Games V is 'Friendship,'" said the co-Presidents of the Federation of Gay Games.

Have you opened your Gay & Lesbian holiday mail yet?

Oh, I hope so. There's a raft of it. This year it's possible to deck your halls in rainbow colors, trim the tree with triangles, and send friends and family season's greetings in true reflection of the holiday spirits (which ever ones you choose to invoke), and of the actual kinds of family we really have. All courtesy of the virtual Gay & Lesbian mall in the mail.

I've just come to back to South Florida from business in Boston, that grim, gray, brown-brick of a city, where holidays do look and smell like Christmas cards say they're supposed

Take Thanksgiving, which I had no choice but to do there, business sometimes demanding more of me than I can force through a fax machine. The NorthEast fed me full of steamy breath and crunchy grass, and blowing on your hands inside the car till the engine warmed the windows enough to see through the intersections. Thanksgiving morning sent perfect flurries, just enough to catch on your tongue, and not enough to stick on the ground and send your Toyota careening into moving objects. At outside temperatures I usually see only on the setting inside my Amana.

Back home again, (where winter chill means you wear a sweater with your shorts.) I found the season working hard at itself, as it has to every year when you live in a semi-tropical climate. When you're plucking citrus off back yard trees in December, and snow persons aren't an option, you really do have to rev up for Christmas, pump the air conditioning up to Permafrost to justify flambe-ing the Yule log, and delude yourself into believing that barbecued Christmas Turkey would have been a holiday tradition if Bethlehem had either turkeys or Weber kettles. 
