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Judge Declares Colorado's Amendment 2 Unconstitutional

Gay Activists Heartened, Boycott Ends

Denver, CO — In a decision Gay leaders called "a major victory in the battle to end discrimination," a Denver judge ruled on December 14 that Colorado's anti-Gay Amendment 2 violates the equal protection clause of the U.S. Constitution.

Denver District Court Judge Jeffrey Bayless ruled that the amendment, passed by 53% of Colorado voters in November 1992, violates "the fundamental right of an identifiable group to participate in the political process without being supported by a compelling state interest." Bayless ordered a permanent injunction to prohibit implementation of the measure.

Amendment 2 would have prohibited the state of Colorado and any of its counties and localities from adopting legislation that includes sexual orientation in civil rights protections. It would have voided Gay rights laws already on the books in Denver, Aspen and Boulder. In addition, Amendment 2 has served as a model for other anti-Gay referendum campaigns which could take place in as many as nine states later this year.

"Judge Bayless reaffirmed the American values of fairness and equal protection," said Tim McFeeley of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "The Bayless decision is a major defeat for the wealthy Far Right extremists who have been traveling from state to state fermenting hatred against Lesbian and Gay Americans. This decision says they cannot target one group of Americans and tell them that the Constitution does not apply to them."

"We are going to organize and fight them in the states," said McFeeley of the anti-Gay forces. "This decision gives us added confidence that we will ultimately succeed in our efforts to end discrimination."

"A BIG BOOST FOR US"

Suzanne Goldberg of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund agreed, saying the decision "affirms clearly

that the fundamental rights of Lesbians and Gay men cannot be voted away by the general public."

"It sends a powerful message to the proponents of anti-Gay rights nationwide that they cannot strip away the civil rights of Lesbians and Gay men, and that their efforts offend our nation's constitution," said Goldberg. "With courts in California, Oregon and Colorado declaring anti-Gay initiatives unconstitutional, it's a big boost for us."

During the trial challenging Amendment 2 last October, the state of Colorado was required to prove what "compelling state interest" the measure represented that could override constitutional rights. The state argued that the preservation of "family values" was at stake and that homosexuals comprise a special interst group seeking "special rights."

Bayless rejected these contentions. "If one wished to promote family values," he wrote, "action would be taken that is profamily rather than anti-some other group." He dismissed the allegation that Gays are a special interest group as without "any credible evidence or any cogent argument."

Colorado's Attorney General is appealing Judge Bayless's decision to the State Supreme Court, which most observers, including anti-Gay leaders, expect to support the lower court decision. Whatever the outcome of the appeal, the issue is likely to make its way to the U.S. Supreme Court for a final decision.

BOYCOTT CANCELLED

Meanwhile, Gay activists have called a halt to the boycott of Colorado which was initiated immediately after Amendment 2 was passed. The Denver-based group Boycott Colorado ended the boycott "in the spirit of moving forward from one of the most painful years in Colorado history."

from one of the most painful years in Colorado history."

Boycott spokesman Terry Schleder said the state was expected to lose almost \$120 million from the boycott—
approximately \$102 million from lost convention revenue and \$18 million from businesses that refused to locate in the state.

"Amendment 2 was the most expensive civil rights violation in U.S. history," Schleder told the Washington Blade.

Throughout the boycott, tourism officials downplayed its impact. But after the court ruling and the lifting of the boycott, they admitted substantial losses. The Denver Convention and Visitors Bureau alone reported the loss of convention bookings worth \$38 million. A spokesman admitted the Denver Bureau was "ecstatic" over the judge's ruling and the end of the boycott.

Lawmakers Attack Domestic Partners Proposal

"Abnormal Alliances,"
"Immoral Activity" Feared

Madison — Even before Rep. Tammy Baldwin's bills on domestic partnership and same sex marriage had been introduced, numerous legislators expressed their opposition and outrage.

In a press release sent to media outlets in her district, State Rep. Carol Owens (R-Oshkosh) warned that Baldwin's proposals would contribute to the "increasing decline of traditional families."

"Society has certain rules that we have agreed to live by," said Owens. "Changing the rules to include abnormal

alliances for convenience, financial gain or social privileges granted to traditional families, because a few people choose a different non-traditional lifestyle, can only weaken the traditional family and be a detriment to society."

"I will never support legislation of this type, that seeks to change the structure of the family household that has worked very well for centuries," she declared.

"I support protecting homosexuals from illegal discrimination," said State Rep. Bonnie Ladwig (R-Caledonia), "but I cannot support the legitimization of their lifestyle."

"I don't care what people do in their bedroom, but this goes way beyond the bedroom. Government shouldn't interfere with personal conduct. But we shouldn't officially sanction immoral activity either," Ladwig said..
"If anything is permitted, then

"If anything is permitted, then everything is permitted," she warned. "Society must not be allowed to self-destruct in the name of tolerance."

Assembly Speaker Walter Kunicki (D-Milwaukee) has not stated his opinion of Baldwin's proposals. But Senate Majority Leader Michael Ellis (R-Neenah) has vowed the measures will never get past his chamber.

The strong reaction was not unexpected by Baldwin (D-Madison).

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Pentagon Issues New Guidelines on Gays

Joe Steffan's Case Faces a Big Hurdle

Washington, DC — As 1993 ended and the new year began, the battle over the Pentagon's ban on Gays continued on several different fronts. The Defense Department issued new guidelines on Gays in the military. A recent ruling in favor of former Midshipman Joe Steffan is to be re-considered by the full D.C. Appeals Court, and government attorneys went to court challenging a decision which allowed Petty Officer Keith Meinhold to be reinstated.

THE NEW REGULATIONS

On December 22, Secretary of Defense Les Aspin announced new regulations to govern the treatment of homosexuals in the military. The new guidelines present a complex set of hypothetical situations and recommend under what circumstances commanding officers should or should not investigate a service member suspected of being Gav.

For example, knowledge of a service member's participation in a Gay Pride Parade is not grounds to initiate an investigation. But if that service member were holding the hands of another same sex participant or carrying a sign that indicated he or she was Gay, an investigation could be begun.

Likewise, visiting a Gay bar is not sufficient evidence to open an investigation, but "credible evidence" that a service member had held hands, danced with or kissed a same sex partner in that bar would constitute

grounds to investigate.

Merely stating that one is Gay is not grounds for immediate discharge as it was previously, but is sufficient grounds to open an investigation to determine whether that person has engaged in homosexual conduct. In such a situation, the burden of proof that he or she had not engaged in homosexual conduct would be on the service member. Failure to meet that burden of proof could lead to discharge.

The regulations make no distinction between homosexual conduct on base or off base. Essentially, Gay and Lesbian service members are required to remain totally celibate. The regulations also give a great deal of leeway to commanding officers in deciding whether to launch an investigation, which critics say will lead to inconsistent implementation based on the biased or non-biased attitudes of individual commanders.

"The regulations are simply a re-packaging of the same prejudice and discrimination that existed under the pre-Clinton policy," said Tanya Domi of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, and as such, continue to "institutionalize and accommodate prejudice against Gay people in the military."

"We believe the new law and regulations are unconstitutional because they continue to judge service members according to their sexual orientation and not according to their ability," said William Rubenstein of the American Civil Liberties Union, which vowed to challenge the new policy in court.

Gay Congressman Barney Frank (D-MA) offered the most colorful comments, however. Frank likened the new regulations to "putting a pretty dress

on a pig."

Frank said the only real change in the Clinton policy was that recruits would no longer be asked their sexual orientation. But once in the military, Gays will still be required to hide, fearing disclosure.

The new regulations go into effect February 5.

STEFFAN'S VICTORY IN LIMBO

administration Clinton announced in late December its intention to appeal the recent ruling of a federal appeals panel which ordered that Joe Steffan be reinstated in the Navy. The three judge panel found that Steffan's ouster from the Naval Academy at Annapolis violated the equal protection Constitution. clause of the administration planned to appeal on the narrow grounds that the court had no authority to order that Steffan be commissiobned as an officer, avoiding the broader constituional issues involved.

But on January 7, the full 10-member Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia announced that it would reconsider the entire decision, a move Gay leaders view with grave concern. The panel which supported Steffan consisted of the court's most liberal members, but the full court is comprised of a majority of Reagan-Bush appointees. The very fact that the full court would vote to reconsider indicates many members disagree with their colleagues' earlier decision, which has

now been set aside.

Meanwhile, government attorneys argued before a panel of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals the case of Petty Officer Keith Meinhold, who won a lower court decision to be reinstated. In appealing that decision, the Pentagon was ordered to provide a "rational basis" for its discriminatory policy against Gays and Lesbians. (Meinhold's case, like Steffan's, involves the pre- Clinton policy.)

Meinhold is currently on duty. On

December 16, he re-enlisted for another two year hitch. In a carefully staged media event, Meinhold repeated the oath administered to him by Navy Lieutenant Zoe Dunning, a Lesbian service member also challenging the ban. Immediately after taking the oath, Meinhold rushed to the federal courthouse to hear his attorneys argue on his behalf before the Ninth Circuit Appeals panel. A decision is expected in February.

Finally, in a related story, Les Aspin stepped down as Defense Secretary and was replaced by former Admiral and National Security advisor Bobby Inman. Gay leaders were not sorry to see Aspin go, faulting him for his lack of leadership during the debate on Gays in the military.

Preliminary reports suggest Inman may have pro-Gay leanings. In 1980, as head of the National Security Agency, Inman refused to fire a Gay employee who some suggested might be untrustworthy in a top security position. But what difference Inman can make now that the new policy is being implemented and the courts are fully involved is yet to be seen.

Clinton's Record on AIDS

Washington, DC — On World AIDS Day, the Department of Health and Human Services issued a fact sheet detailing all of the Clinton administration's efforts in the fight against AIDS. Here is a summary:

The National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development, staffed by experts in the key fields of pharmacology, research and treatment, will expedite the search for new therapies against AIDS and HIV. This new task force was announced November 30. See separate story in this

issue for details.

▼ Funding: The Clinton administration has proposed and guided through Congress significant increases in discretionary AIDS spending at all levels: a 21.2% increase in funds to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) for research (total: \$1.3 billion); a 66.5% increase in funds for direct services under the Ryan White Care Act (total: \$579 million); and a 9% increase in funds for preventive education by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (total: \$543 million).

 Disability: The Clinton administration enacted new regulations streamlining and updating the process for

More Federal Workers Get Job Protection

Washington, DC — Just a week after Attorney General Janet Reno issued a directive prohibiting job bias based on sexual orientation throughout the Justice Department, including the F.B.I., Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala did the same for workers in her huge department.

"My personal commitment to diversity and equality is longstanding and non-negotiable," Shalala's order stated. "Simply put, we will countenance no discrimination or harassment of any kind in the HHS workplace. No employee will be denied equal opportunity because of race, color, religion, gender, national origin, age, disability or sexual orientation."

HHS now joins the Departments of Justice, Agriculture, Transportation, Housing and Urban Development and the Executive Office of the President (which oversees White House personnel) in explicitly forbidding bias based on sexual orientation. The Interior Department's new non-discrimination policy omits the term "sexual orientation," but a spokesman said the phrase "any other non-merit factors" would incorporate sexual orientation.

Cross-Dressing Woman and Friends Killed in Nebraska

Falls City, NE — Two young men have been arrested for the murder of a cross-dressing woman, her roommate and a friend at their rented farmhouse outside Humboldt, Nebraska on Christmas Day.

The cross-dressing victim, Teena Brandon, 21, had moved to the rural area from Lincoln last fall. But she called herself Brandon Teena, wore men's clothes and close-cropped hair and, disguised as a man, dated several girls in nearby Falls City. Her true identity was revealed in early December only after she was arrested on a forgery charge.

People in Falls City were reportedly angry at Brandon's deception. Police declined to speculate on the motive of the alleged killers, but townspeople said both John Lotter and Marvin Nissen were enraged when they learned Brandon was a woman. They are charged with numerous offenses, including kidnapping, sexual assault and murder.

The men allegedly came to the isolated farmhouse, held the victims hostage, sexually assaulted Brandon and then shot her along with her roommate Lisa Lambert and a visiting friend, Phillip DeVine. Lambert's infant son was found unharmed.

Mississippi Lesbians Still Under Siege

Ovett, MS — The townspeople of tiny Ovett, Mississippi have formed an Ovett Community Defense Fund in a concerted effort to force a Lesbian couple off their newly purchased land. The town's sheriff helped collect the funds, and Congressman Mike Parker, who represents the area, says he supports efforts to run the women out of town.

Wanda and Brenda Henson purchased 120 acres of land just outside Ovett for use as a feminist education retreat which they call Camp Sister Spirit. Since word leaked out that the women are Lesbians, the Hensons have received threatening phone calls, armed intruders have roamed their property, and a dead dog was draped over their mailbox.

At a community meeting in December, residents poured out their hatred and fears that the Hensons would somehow corrupt the local womenfolk. After another angry meeting January 3, several Gays and Lesbians who had come to support the Hensons were physically ejected from the court house.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has called for intervention from the Justice Department to mediate the dispute. But the Department's Community Relations Service is only authorized to intervene in cases of racial, ethnic or religious bias.

Texas Gays Protest Brutal Murder

Tyler, TX — On January 8, Gays and Lesbians from in and around Tyler, Texas held their first major protest march in response to the brutal murder of a Gay man, 23-year-old Nicholas West.

West was killed on November 30 after being abducted at gunpoint by three men from a popular Gay cruising spot in Tyler's Bergfield Park. West was driven to an isolated rural area where he was robbed, ordered to remove his pants and then shot at least nine times. Three suspects have been charged with kidnapping and murder, and police have not hesitated to call the killing a hate crime.

In conservative East Texas, most Gays and Lesbians are very closeted. But West's murder has brought the area's Gay and Lesbian community together as never before. The march was intended to educate the community by protesting hatred and intolerance and as a means for local Gays to express their frustration and outrage.

Lawsuit Charges Tower Records With Anti-Gay Bias

San Francisco, CA — In a lawsuit filed last week against Tower Records, former security guard Husham Haroun charges that the company advised him that "management intended to terminate or demote Gay store managers because homosexuals do not fit the image of Tower Records." Tower is charged with violating state anti-bias laws.

Haroun says he was forced to quit after he refused an order to bug a Gay manager's office so the company could determine whether the manager was "arranging personal homosexual liaisons" on company time. Haroun, head of security for the Bay area's 11 Tower stores, says he was also ordered to spy on Gay managers outside the workplace.

In a related story, the District Attorney is investigating other charges that a former Tower manager found a wiretap in his office just before being demoted.

A spokeswoman for San Francisco's Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation said: "It is astonishing and infuriating that a company which profits from our dollars and sells the music we create has the audacity to tell Lesbian and Gay people that they don't have a place in their organization."

C-SPAN to Broadcast Parts of Gay Convention

Washington, DC — When the founding convention of the new grass-roots group Gay & Lesbian Americans meets January 15-16 in the nation's capital, C-SPAN will broadcast parts of the convention to a nationwide audience.

The purpose of the new group is to establish a organization of Gays and Lesbians that will have chapters at the state and local levels. This differs from the current structure of groups like the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Human Rights Campaign Fund, which oversee national issues and lobby Congress and the President.

The convention, billed as a "Leadership Summit," will be held at the Georgetown University Law Center. Issues to be discussed include developing a Gay and Lesbian agenda, establishing a workable structure with local chapters, and utilizing computer bulletin boards and phone trees to disseminate information.

Baltimore, MD — With the strong support of Mayor Kurt Schmoke, Baltimore has become the latest city in the nation to extend benefits to the same sex partners of municipal employees. The vote took place in December and the policy will take effect in January, 1995. Meanwhile, as of January 1, New York City's policy extending benefits to the unmarried partners of city workers became operative.

Washington, DC — In December, Susan Hester, President of the Mary-Helen Mautner Project for Lesbians with Cancer, attended a conference of federal health officials charged with developing a national strategy to combat breast cancer. Hester said it was critical that Lesbians have "a voice at the table" and that the government understands that Lesbians are a community at higher risk for breast cancer.

Orlando, FL — Louise Ray, mother of the late Ricky Ray and two other sons infected with HIV, is running for a seat in the Florida legislature. She made her announcement at the Rainbow Democratic Club, a Gay group, and credited the Gay community with coming to her family's assistance when their home in Arcadia was burned by arsonists. Ray will try to unseat a conservative Republican.

Washington, DC — The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force is urging people to write Apple Computer, thanking the company for standing by its domestic partners policy

during the recent controversy in Texas. Because of the policy, Williamson County first voted against allowing the company to open a plant there. The county later reversed itself. Letters can be sent to: Apple Computer, RE: Policies, 20525 Mariani Avenue, Mail Stop 72P, Cupertino, CA 95014.

Atlanta, GA — OutFront, a Gay rights group, has

Atlanta, GA — OutFront, a Gay rights group, has sponsored a huge billboard which greets motorists as they drive into the city of Atlanta. The billboard reads: "Welcome to Atlanta: HATE STOPS HERE. Human Beings. Human Rights." The message was inspired by recent events in nearby Cobb County, where county commissioners passed resolutions condemning homosexuality and limiting funding for the arts.

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determining eligibility for disability and Supplemental Security Income benefits for people with AIDS. The new criteria include symptoms and diagnoses specifically affecting women and children which previously were not considered.


v National AIDS Policy Coordinator: The Clinton Administration created the White House Office of AIDS Policy, headed by Kristine Gebbie, to coordinate the government's overall response to the epidemic.

▼ NIH Office of AIDS Research:
The Clinton administration supported legislation expanding the Office of AIDS Research, which oversees the AIDS research effort at the National Institutes of Health.

v Health Security Act: President Clinton has proposed comprehensive health care reform, including universal coverage. The Clinton plan would outlaw denial of coverage based on pre-existing conditions and guarantee health care coverage, including prescription drug benefits, to all Americans. It would also provide a long-term care benefit to people with disabilities. Some 27% of people with AIDS currently lack health insurance. The Clinton plan, which faces a stiff battle in Congress, would cover them.

▼ AIDS in the Workplace: The Clinton administration introduced a new policy to educate all federal workers on the need to treat co-workers who have HIV and AIDS with dignity and compassion. The Justice Department under Janet Reno is committed to prosecuting cases of AIDS discrimination.

Responding to criticism that federal preventive education efforts have not been explicit enough and have bypassed the communities most at risk, Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders and CDC Director David Satcher have approved new materials targeted to the Gay and minority communities that are much more explicit in their warnings and directions.

Ruling on Property Contract Looks Good for Gays

Madison — In December, the State's 4th District Appeals Court ruled that a legal contract drawn up to share equally the property of an unmarried straight couple who lived together is binding. Attorneys say the ruling has positive

implications for Gay couples as well.

The case involved Patricia Muir and James Stotler, who lived together in Rock County and shared their income and assets since 1977. In 1984, they signed a contract agreeing that if their relationship ended, they would divide their personal property equally and share the proceeds from any sale. When the couple split in 1991, Muir sued Stotler for not living up to the contract. A lower court said the contract was invalid, but the Appeals court overturned that decision.

The ruling could have a significant impact on Gay and Lesbian couples who often live together and share assets and who are increasingly protecting themselves through similar contracts. If the decision is not appealed to the State Supreme Court and is sustained, it is likely to protect the contractual

interests of unmarried same-sex couples as well.

Investigation Continues Into Professor's Murder

Milwaukee — Milwaukee police are continuing to follow leads in the case of Robert Jones, 45, who was found stabbed to death last November 15 in his Juneau Village apartment. Jones had served as Associate Professor in the Department of English and Comparative Literature at

UW-Milwaukee since 1989.

Several sources have informed In Step that Jones was a closeted Gay man, and colleagues at the university said they knew little about his personal life. In the days after his body was discovered, detectives went to local Gay bars to seek any possible information about Jones or his assailant. Because his apartment was not forcibly entered, speculation is rampant that Jones may have been killed by someone he picked up, but that cannot be confirmed.

Milwaukee Police Captain Donald Domagalski told In Step he was hesitant to release too much information for fear of jeopardizing the investigation. But he encouraged anyone with information about the crime to call the Police Department

at (414) 935-7302.

New Alternative Bookstore Opens in La Crosse

La Crosse — Rainbow Revolution, a bookstore that carries Lesbian and Gay literature as well as books about Native Americans and spirituality, opened in downtown La Crosse last fall. It is located at 122 Fifth Avenue South, and the phone number is (608) 796-0383. It is open Monday through

Saturday from 11:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The store is owned by Linda Henkelman and managed on a daily basis by Jeannine Gilles. Gilles told In Step the store carries a selection of Lesbian and Gay fiction and non-fiction, some periodicals and greeting cards, jewelry, buttons, t-shirts and bumper stickers. Lesbian and Gay videos are available for rental, and, as finances permit, the store plans to expand its inventory to carry such things as Women's, New Age and Native American music.

Customers can currently enjoy a cup of tea or coffee as they browse. Henkelman hopes to add a fuller cafe-type setting in the future as well as reading and discussion groups. Two bulletin boards contain posters and announcements of

events happening in the community.

Men Sentenced for Killing Tina Terry, Wounding Doorman

Milwaukee — On January 7, Circuit Court Judge Patricia McMahon sentenced Alonzo Peavy, 20, to life in prison for the first degree intentional homicide of llet "Tina" Terry, who was slain in her North side tavern last July 10. Peavy had also been found guilty of attempted homicide in the shooting of doorman Carlton Jackson. He won't be eligible for parole until the year 2029.

Peavy's accomplice, Jamal Purifoy, 22, who is also his cousin, was sentenced to 45 years in prison on charges of reckless homicide and attempted homicide. Purifoy must serve

at least 11 years before parole eligibility.

The crimes occurred just before closing time at Tina's RTI, a popular meeting spot for African American Gays and Lesbians at 634 W. North Avenue which has since closed. Peavy and Purifoy arrived drunk and armed. When they began to make trouble, Jackson asked them to leave. A struggle ensued in which Jackson was shot four times and Terry was shot point blank in the chest. Jackson is slowly recovering from his wounds.

Cathreen Godre Running for Wagner's Seat

Dane Co. Board

Madison — Out Lesbian Cathreen Godre decided to run for the Dane County Board of Supervisors in the 6th District when Dick Wagner announced his retirement because she knows that there is a critical need to provide a voice for those who rely on Dane County services. She also decided to run because she understands how important it is that Lesbians and Gays are represented at every level of government.

"With Dick Wagner and Tammy Baldwin retiring from the board, we will only have one openly Gay or Lesbian supervisor in Dane County — Mark Pocan," Godre said. "The Gay and Lesbian community is under attack with anti-Gay referenda around the country. We must have equal representation so that it won't happen in Wisconsin."

Cathreen Godre is an attorney, practicing in Dane County for the past five years. The majority of her case load is abused and neglected children, juvenile delinquents, and victims of domestic abuse. She received her Bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and her J.D. from Golden Gate University School of Law in San Francisco. She is currently practicing with Reynolds & Thomas, a small law firm in downtown Madison. Godre has been appointed by Dane County judges to be part of a new county program, The Guardian Ad Litem Project.

Cathreen has been a political activist for 15 years. She 'came out' when she was 20 and described it as a relief. "I never felt like I quite fit in. After

I came out, I found a large community of Lesbians and Gay men. I didn't feel so alone. I remember what it was like to feel isolated and have committed myself to helping to develop a community among Lesbians and Gays."

Her activism has taken many forms: at the University of Michigan, she started a group called the Lesbian Network, whose mission was to provide a meeting place for women and to advocate for the rights of Lesbians on campus. Hate Crimes: Verbal/Physical Harassment Are Illegal, Too

Milwaukee - Did anyone called you 'faggot', 'dyke', 'queer', or some other unfriendly term in '93? If so, it is critical that you report all forms of violence to the S.E. Wisconsin Hate Crimes/ReportingServiceofWisconsin.

Whether you have had someone physically or verbally threaten or hurt you, or someone use the fact that they knew that you were closeted to psychologically intimidate you, these are all forms of Hate Crimes. The Hate Crimes Reporting Service is a project of Gay Information & Services and has been collecting data for the past 5 years.

According to Ralph F. Navarro, the Crimes/Reporting Service coordinator, "In order for us to provide an accurate number of all incidences here in Milwaukee and the state, we need to hear from everyone as soon as possible." Navarro continued: "One of the biggest problems we have is that most people don't report incidents. Either they think that a verbal threat is 'no big thing or they are intimidated because they believe that by reporting any incidente or any type of violence, they will be forced 'out of their closet."

All reports to the Hate/Crimes Reporting Service are protected. No one, other than the coordinator, will know any specifics about the person reporting. Annual reports of numbers, types, dates and locations of all incidences are reported to Police Chiefs, local Fire & Police Commissions and the Hate/Crimes project in New York.

To report any type of hate crime, call (414) 444-7331, 24 hours per day. Any caller leaving her/his name and number will be called back within 24

Wisconsin legislator Tammy Baldwin joined the "Gay rights" feeding frenzy with "They (Gay politicians) are working for the passage of Gay and Lesbian civil rights statutes or local ordinances."

Coverage of the Chicago convention of Gay and Lesbian elected officials says that Human Rights Campaign Fund Executive Director Tim McFeeley said everyone can agree on "the goal of equality for Gays and Lesbians." National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Executive Director Peri Jude Radecic said "You've got to give media people training to get better at passing state and Civil Rights

A story on the HRCF plan of action has Mr. McFeeley talking of "the struggle for Lesbian and Gay equality" which included moving Congress and the President "to pass legislation to secure the safety, health and Civil Rights of Lesbian and Gay Americans." HRCF will form a Federal Advocacy Network "dedicated to ensuring Equal Rights for Lesbians and Gays." HRCF is also going to work to influence public opinion to favor "a federal Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights bill" and work "to secure support for and hold congressional hearings on the heed for a federal Civil Rights bill."

In news briefs, In Step reports on New Zealand's "Human Rights Act of 1993" which adds sexual orientation to existing Civil Rights protections, and on South Africa's new constitution, in which "The protections for sexual orientation are part of broader Civil Rights guarantees for all people."

Of course, like the cat, "Gay Rights" isn't dead yet. A story on the "Creating Change" conference in North Carolina reports that "Conferees watched the anti-Gay video Gay Rights, Special Rights, which is being used to spread fear about the so called "Gay Agenda."

Auld Lang Syne?:

Gay Politics 1993, 1994

Gays did not fare well by democratic processes in 1993, and the prospects for 1994 look at least as bleak. Might we learn something from '93 that will help us

in '94?

In November we saw the first ever piece of Presidentially-signed legislation mendating discrimination against Gay individuals, the Gay military ban, which passed Congress by lopsided votes in both House and Senate. By equally wide margins Gays lost every anti-Gay referendum initiative right across the country from Oregon counties to Cincinnati, Lewiston, and Portsmouth. The last was a particularly gratuitous slam, for the referendum was merely an advisory vote covering governmental, not private sector, employment. Clearly these votes have nothing to do with the specifics of civil rights protections; they are simply thumbs cast up or down on Gay existence. The year saw only two legislative successes. In April, Minnesota passed a state wide Gay rights bill; and Nevada eliminated June. unenforced sodomy law, though at the same stroke it turned its much prosecuted crime of public indecency into a felony offense bearing a six-year sentence - not clearly progress.

The chief site of democratic processes for Gays in 1994 will be referenda, like Colorado's Amendment 2, which bar a state and its divisions from passing Gay civil rights protections. Conservative and religious groups already have in place the machinery to put such initiatives on November ballots in as many as twelve states, including Idaho, Maine, Michigan, Florida, Oregon, Texas, and Missouri,

Washington.

Past record suggests that whatever efforts Gays sink into these initiatives, we will lose the vast majority - possibly all - of them. I suggest that we simply write these efforts off, or at least not treat them as a major focus of Gay political work - for two reasons.

First, work on such initiatives is overly intense and narrow. They generate huge amounts of instant Gay activity and energy, but this bustle and thrill is the political equivalent of a sugar high. The day after the vote, the energy, money, and heady vibes are gone. People are burnt out, frequently devastated, and no lasting institutions have been established, since the focus of the effort was on just one day.

Second, in referendum initiatives our opponents control the agenda. Gays

are from the start always placed on the defensive, haplessly trying to explain why

we aren't the way our opponents paint us as civilization-destroying, childmolestingplague-bearers. Ouropponents have instant access to the culture's repository of anti-Gay stereotypes, and so can code and disperse their emotiontargeted message with telegraphic speed and precision. Direct democracy is sound-bite, platitude, and sentiment, not fact, idea, and argument. Strategically we simply can't compete in these forums.

After a defeat, however crushing, Gay leaders usually have a last hurrah and claim "we 'really' did win, because this was a chance to educate society about Gay people." But if one examines the Gay tactics actually used, it is clear that this is a lie. However large and mass produced, a placard saying only "No on 2: Stand Up Against Discrimination" does no educating about Gay people. Notice that Gayness literally goes unmentioned - just the way our opponents want us.

The other common tactic is to claim, "We are just like you." this claim is rhetorically self-defeating, since it leaves the determination of its truth to those who in fact never have occasion to say they are like us. This recognition is the kernel of truth in Quinton Crisp's witticism that "people who are normal never go around saying they are normal." Yet in consequence of such selfdefeating accommodation, our distinctive values and virtues, with their educative power, never even get represented in the

Gay politicians and thinkers of quick accommodation, writers like Bruce Bawer and Hunter Madsen, fail to remember the classic anti-Gay joke that "a fag is a homosexual gentleman who has just left the room." In the voting booth, the gentleman has left the room and the bigot is left to his own feelings.

Progress will be made only when we change those feelings. And that will occur not by accommodating them, but by changing the culture that bears and nurtures them. Gays now have creative access to the machinery of cultural change - the media, the arts, books, magazines, education, talk shows, movies, lays, private persuasion, op-ed pages, conferences, pop music, computer networks, even religious study groups. Our hope for a better future lies in these vectors of transformation rather than in posterpaint and cardboard.

Like Everybody Else

I don't ever again want to hear that I'm just like everybody else.

That sentiment has been present in the background for years now. I first noticed it in college, when the Gay group I headed would hold "Gay/straight raps." Every time, a number of the Gays would earnestly explain to the straights that the only difference between us and them was what we did in the bedroom. Then when the military issue came to the forefront, we got a parade of past and present Gay and Lesbian military personnel testifying to their normality. In the last few months, especially since the March on Washington in April, we have had person after person tell us, either to our faces or in quotes in the national Gay and Mainstream press, that all of us are just like everybody else.

Excuse me, but we are not just like everyone else. If we are just like everyone else, why is it that most of us knew almost instinctively that our sexuality was something we weren't supposed to talk about? If we are just like everybody else, why have we been fighting for years to secure our most basic freedoms? If we are just like everybody else, why have we expended so much energy trying to build a sense of Gay community?

For all of our protestations that we're just like everybody else, we know, really, that we're not. We know that we are unique in our responses to the things around us, both as individuals and as members of a distinct community. There is a "Gay sensibility," a certain way of viewing the world which is shaped by our common experience of oppression. I like to think of it as an extra set of "cultural filters" through which my life experiences pass to make them uniquely mine. It is senseless to deny their existence.

And what are we doing when we say we're just like everybody else? We're really saying that we're just like straight people. Why would we want to be just like straight people? Straight people are boring and cause problems. Claiming we are just like people straight diminishes importance of the ways in which we are not like them. It erases the pain we feel as we struggle with our sexuality, a pain few if any straights can ever understand. It ignores the joys we feel from simply being safe in the presence of our own. Yes, it is important that straight people know that in some ways we and they are alike. It is equally if not more important


that they be forced to deal with the ways in which we are different. Not to do so is just a different way of perpetuating our invisibility.

In an article in the latest issue of Ten Percent magazine, historical writer Eric Marcus writes, "I have no desire to set myself apart from the mainstream or to carve a new path." Leaving aside for the moment that his excellent book Making History profiles dozens of people who set themselves apart and carved new paths, by making such a statement he fails to understand that every time any of us chooses to challenge the dominant society in which we live, we are setting

ourselves apart from the mainstream. Every time we refuse to conform to the assumption of a heterosexual norm, we carve a new path. Eventually, when enough of us have set ourselves apart, we will discover quite unexpectedly that we are the mainstream. We will have carved so many new paths that the mainstream will have widened to encompass us. That does not mean that we will have become like everybody else lnstead, everybody else will have become a little bit more like us.

We are all of us human, and in that we are just like everybody else.

HIV Therapy Recommendations Issued

NIAID — HIV-infected patients and their physicians must be aware of the benefits, toxicities, limitations and knowledge gaps about antiretroviral drugs when making decisions concerning treatments, according to recommendations published in the Dec. 1 Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) from an independent panel of experts convened by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID).

Such information about the antiretroviral drugs zidovudine (AZT), didanosine (ddl) and zalcitabine (ddC) is reviewed in the panel's recommendations. The panel's recommendations are neither federal nor

NIAID policy.

"Physicians are obliged to educate patients about clinically sound treatment options and their impact on a patient's quality of life," says Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., director of NIAID. "These recommendations reflect our current knowledge of antiretroviral drugs and will guide health care providers and patients in making treatment decisions for early, intermediate and late stages of HIV disease."

The recommendations present 12 clinical scenarios for patients with HIV followed by antiretroviral therapy suggestions and a rationale. The scenarios include HIV-infected patients without symptoms who have not had prior therapy, those with signs and symptoms of HIV-related disease who have not had prior therapy, clinically stable patients who tolerate initial AZT therapy, patients on AZT whose disease has progressed and patients who cannot tolerate therapy.

The panel's recommendations are less prescriptive than those from a previous state-of-the-art conference held in 1990. The 1990 guidelines


recommended that HIV-infected patients whose count of the crucial immune system cell targeted by HIV, CD4+ T cells, had dropped to below 500 should begin taking AZT. A healthy adult has between 800 and 1,200 cells per cubic millimeter of blood. Since that time, other trials in specific situations have shown that ddi alone, ddC alone and ddI or ddC in combination with AZT have value as therapies as well.

The panel's recommendations also emphasize that the primary care provider has a responsibility to assess available support systems, to assure appropriate integration into the health care system and to provide early diagnosis,

immunizations, preventive therapies for opportunistic infections and treatment.

"Treatment of HIV infection and disease requires all the skills of the primary care physician," says Merle A. Sande, M.D., chair of the panel and chief of the medical services at San Francisco General Hospital. "Management of overall health status, counseling to reduce risk behaviors, provision of psychosocial support, assessment of quality-of-life issues and prevention of opportunistic infections all are in the domain of the clinician-patient relationship. The HIV epidemic reminds

practitioners that the finest expression of medicine lies in the optimal blend of science and the art of patient care."

In particular, the panel notes, available antiretroviral nucleoside therapies — drugs like AZT, ddl and ddC - have a role in the treatment of HIV infection, but the benefits unfortunately limited.

"Early intervention for HIV disease does not necessarily imply early drug treatment, and physicians need to integrate up-to-date scientific knowledge with other relevant needs to improve patient care," Dr. Sande and the panel write

During the conference, 14 published research studies were presented to and discussed with the panel by more than 30 investigators and clinicians involved in HIV research worldwide as well as members of the HIV-infected community and the public.

Dr. Kelly's specialty, behavioral medicine, focuses on research that involves the application of psychological principals for illness prevention, psychological treatments for persons who are ill, and the interplay of behavioral and medical factors related to health and illness. With over \$14.6 million in grants from the National institute of Mental Health, Dr. Kelly is one of the nation's leading researchers in AIDS prevention through community-based prevention programs in urban Milwaukee and small cities throughout the country, for at-risk populations, including Gay men, minority women and the chronically mental ill.

In Memoriam

Michael Callen, Diva and AIDS Activist, Dies at 38

Los Angeles, CA — Michael Callen, singer, activist and longtime survivor with AIDS who inspired others to fight the disease, died in Los Angeles December 27. He was 38.

Callen was perhaps best known as a member of the Gay a cappella group The Flirtations, in which he often became the center of attention, camping it up with his incredible falsetto voice. The Los Angeles Times referred to his falsetto as "an upper register that Joan Sutherland would surely envy."

Callen was born in Indiana, raised in Ohio, and graduated from Boston University in 1977, majoring in music. He then headed to New York, where he sang in cabarets and with the New York City Gay Men's Chorus before joining the Flirtations.

Callen's work is available on two albums recorded by the Flirts, The Flirtations and Out on the Road. He also released a solo effort, Purple Heart, in 1988. In the months before his death, he recorded new songs which are

expected to be released posthumously.

Callen learned he had HIV (then called GRID — Gay Related Immune Deficiency) in 1982. The following year, he co-wrote a book called How to Have Sex in an Epidemic, which stressed safer sex practices for Gay men. In 1990, he published Surviving AIDS, which described the strategies employed by 14 long-term survivors of the disease in the hope that their tactics could help others.

Callen was a founder of the People with AIDS Coalition and the Community Research Initiative, a group of PWA's and doctors who conducted their own research and drug trials. They pioneered the use of aerosolized pentamidine to combat pneumocystis carinii pneumonia. Callen was treated with alternative chemotherapy for some of his own symptoms, but never took AZT.

Callen also advocated attitudinal changes to help people with AIDS. He hated the phrases "AIDS victims" and "AIDS patients" and urged the use of descriptions like "people living with AIDS" and "AIDS survivors."

Callen survived with AIDS for so long, some doubted he had the disease. In typical diva fashion, he had this snappy response to a skeptical reporter: "There are easier ways to meet Liz Taylor than by pretending you have the most stigmatized disease of this century."

Callen's last major public performance was at the March on

Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights in April. He looked somewhat frail but delivered a powerful rendition of the AIDS anthem he co-wrote, Love Don't Need a Reason, bringing many listeners to tears. He can be seen along with the Flirts in a brief scene in the movie Philadelphia.

Callen is survived by his lover, Richard Dworkin, his parents, Clifford and Barbara of Hamilton, Ohio, a sister and brother, and millions of grateful music fans and people with HIV/AIDS.

Gene W. Schilling

Gene W. Schilling died at his residence in Milwaukee on Wed. Dec. 29, 1993 surrounded by his caring family and friends after a struggle with AIDS.

Gene was preceded in death by his beloved mother Lucille and a brother Donald both of Green Bay, WI. He was the dear son of Archie Schilling of Green Bay, and brother of Glenn (Gail), Carlton (Sis) and Robert (Joan) Schilling.

Further survived by many nieces, nephews, special friends: Paul Jeffrey, David Torfy, Jack Johnson and Bruce Berg, other relatives and many friends.

Memorial services were held Sat. Jan. 8th at First Unitarian Church of Milwaukee, the Rev. Andrew Kennedy officiating and music by the Cream City Chorus. Further memorial services were held on Jan. 10th at Grace Presbyterian Church in Green Bay. Private interment was at Ft. Howard Cemetery, Green Bay.

Gene was a teacher with the Oak Creek School System for 31 years, retiring in 1993. He was a member for many years of the Cream City Chorus, a founding member of the Brunch Club, a member of the PTA Dinner Club and the Triple L Club. Memorials to the Milwaukee AIDS Project or Caring Bridges appreciated.

Funeral arrangements were handled by the Franzen Jung Kaufmann Weiand Lee & Koeske Associates.

Will Proving That Sexual Orientation Is Immutable Win Equal Rights?

If sexual orientation is immutable, will courts find that laws discriminating against Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals violate the Equal Protection Clause?

The pressure in the legal system to prove that sexual orientation is immutable comes from the Supreme Court's interpretation of the Equal Protection Clause. Generally, the court subjects a law that treats people differently to close scrutiny only when the classification involves a "suspect classification" or infringes on fundamental constitutional rights. Otherwise, the Court presumes that a legislative classification treating groups of people differently is valid. In the 1993 case of FCC v Beach Communications, the Court wrote:

"In areas of social... policy, a statutory classification that neither proceeds along suspect lines nor infringes fundamental constitutional rights must be upheld against equal protection challenge if there is any reasonable conceivable state of facts that could provide a rational basis for the classification. ... Those attacking the rationality of the legislative classification have the burden 'to negative every conceivable basis which might support it,' ... (and) it is entirely irrelevant for constitutional purposes whether the conceived reason for the challenged distinction actually motivated the legislature. (Emphasis added.)

If courts refuse to find that anti-Gay laws create suspect classifications or infringe on fundamental constitutional rights, then they are very likely to uphold anti-Gay laws by deferring to the judgment of legislative bodies (or the electorate, in the case of anti-Gay initiatives).

While the Supreme Court has not been entirely clear as to what must be shown before a classification will be deemed to be suspect, among the standards that the Supreme Court has used to find that a classification is "suspect" are the following: a. that there has been a history of prejudice

against a group; b. that the group has obvious, immutable, or distinguishing characteristics, or is a "discrete and insular minority;" and c. that the group lacks the political power to achieve legislation. To date, the Court has granted heightened scrutiny only to classifications involving race, national origin, alienage, sex, and illegitimacy, and to laws that infringe on fundamental constitutional rights (e.g. the First Amendment). It has refused to grant heightened scrutiny to classifications based on age and on mental retardation, among others.

Most evidence does point to sexual orientation becoming essentially fixed, and virtually immutable, by a certain age (even though researchers do not agree on the causes of sexual orientation). If courts rule that sexual orientation is essentially immutable, the first two toward finding orientation to be a suspect classification will have been achieved (hardly anyone disputes that there has been a history of prejudice against Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals).

Courts also will need, however, to find that Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals are politically powerless to protect their interests. Judges who have held that sexual orientation is not a suspect classification have often argued that the political success of Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals in attracting politicians to support Gay rights "proves" that they are not powerless.

But even if the "political powerlessness" hurdle is overcome. and courts find that classifications based on sexual orientation must be subjected to heightened scrutiny, the Gay and Bisexual communities might not win as much protection as expected from that victory. Winning heightened scrutiny for sexual discrimination by the orientation government would help those who are perceived or assumed by straight people to be Gay, Lesbian, or Bisexual, but not necessarily those who have said or done anything to

Most straight people take a "hear no evil, see no evil, speak no evil" posture to Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals. In an important sense, many straight people, including judges, do not care about sexual orientation per se. What many object to is Gay and Bisexual people breaking the code of silence about their orientation, coming out of the closet, and adopting a Gay or Bisexual identity.

Thus, even were courts to subject sexual orientation classifications to heightened scrutiny, the gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual community might still confront the "don't-ask-don't-tell" mentally illustrated by the infamous

"compromise" on the military ban. Governmental policies that penalize Gay men, Lesbians, or Bisexuals who affirm their orientation or engage in conduct expressive of their orientation still might be reviewed and sustained under the rational basis test, with courts deferring to the judgment of the legislature or voters regarding such laws. To further compound the insult, courts might continue to interpret speech about one's orientation to be conduct, as several courts have done in the past, and thereby claim that no First Amendment infringement has occurred when a person is penalized for being open about his or her orientation.

Accordingly, while proving the immutability of sexual orientation may be one portion of the route to winning equal protection under the law, it is not the end of the road. The real battle is over identity. Immutability is irrelevant to that battle. Indeed, it is the very mutability of one's identity that is part and parcel of the process of coming out, and that is so unsettling to the heterosexual world. Coming out involves changing one's identity, internally and externally, the process often involves a period (sometimes very long) of experimentation with different orientations. Even after coming to terms with their identity. most Gay and Bisexual people present different identities at different times to the outside world, depending ont he perceived safety of the situation.

Thus, the ultimate Equal Protection victory will be getting courts to rule that laws and policies penalizing Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals for expressing their identity violate a fundamental right, namely the First Amendment

Flesh And The Word 2

Flesh And The Word 2: An Anthology of Erotic Writing Edited by John Preston Plume, Pb \$13

Reviewing a work such as Preston's second collection of erotic writing, Flesh And The Word 2 is a surprisingly difficult task. Gone are the



traditional discussion of character development, of theme and symbolism, use of language, and the various other criteria for critiquing literary works. Instead, the reviewer is left with an evaluation of how effective the book is as a work of erotica, or simply, just how stimulating a work of fiction it is.

What makes Flesh And The Word 2 and its bestselling predessor so intriguing is that such anthologies are even published, and then to be published by perhaps the country's largest and most influential publishing house, Penguin USA. Certainly Peston has collected an impressive list of writers, many not normally associated with Gay men's erotica including Anne Rice (writing as A.N. Roquelaurie). Andrew Holleran, Larry Duplechan, Michael Bronski, Steven Saylor (writing as Aaron Travis), Gavin Dillard, and of course, John Preston himself. Yet, when having read the titles of some of the selections, for example The King and the Virgin Boy, Slaveboy Weekend, Baby Love, and Party Meat the question must arise (no pun intended!), isn't this simply a book of "one-handed fiction"?

A curious phenomenon in the Gay publishing world is that there are erotic works (which are usually found in adult bookstores) and there is Gay fiction but rarely is Gay fiction very erotic. Perhaps the reason is that so much Gay literature is published by mainstream publishers who are possibly seeking a wider, mainstream audience. Or, many Gay writers find it difficult to be taken seriously if their work contains too many sex scenes. Even as successful a writer as David Leavitt, a writer whose work is normally free of such primal scenes. now finds himself embroiled in a lawsuit by Stephen Spender because of the so-called "pornographic sex" contained in While England Sleeps. It is perhaps significant that Flesh And The World 2 contains no selections from traditional works of Gay fiction and rather stories were culled from magazines like Honcho, Inches, Advocate Men, and Advocate Freshmen.

Now, having pondered the question of what Flesh And The Word 2 is and what it is not, there remains the question of just how good is the book. With its mix of non-fiction and critical elements mixed in with some wildly raunchy erotica, Flesh And The Word 2 somehow ends up a disappointment. In his compelling titled essay, "Do You Know Who You're Jacking Off To?, Jim Merrett aptly states, "...in porn, nobody gets points for trying. Success in porn is counted in hard-ons and shooting cum..."

While Merrett is actually discussing the curious phenomenon of women penning Gay porn, his point is certainly well taken and can be used as the ultimate criterion for Flesh And The Word 2. Despite some arousing reading, Flesh And The Word 2 is probably going to leave you in the end a bit limp.

The Laughter Of Heroes

The Laughter of Heroes by Jonathan Neale Serpent's Tail, pb \$11.99

Jonathan Neale's The Laughter Of Heroes is the kind of book that is easy to overlook on a bookstore's shelf: an original paperback by an unknown British writer published by an obscure, literary press. To these already unfavorable circumstances, add that the book is a slim volume with a rather innocuous cover, and the book becomes almost invisible. With regard to The Laughter Of Heroes, this is especially unfortunate because Jonathan Neale has written easily one of the most perceptive novels about AIDS in some time.

Set in London, The Laughter Of Heroes tells the story of a young Gay man with AIDS, John, a puppeteer who has just been unceremoniously deported from China and whose sole wish in life is to die alone in Tibet. Surrounding John are Claire, John's supportive sister, and The Firm, a close network of close friends and former lovers. When John takes a turn for the worse, The Firm takes turns caring for John, making him meals, offering companionship, and the like, to help John get through what could be his last months.

When Paul, who still is deeply in love with John, learns of Johns youthful disappointment at not going to Disneyland, he decides to organize The Firm into giving John this dream trip. Only to Andy the Mouse, his star puppet, can John confide his hopes, his fears, and the truth that he no longer dreams of going to Disneyland.

Yet The Laughter Of Heroes is as much about Claire and John's friends as it is about John, and each character must come to terms with their own regrets and disappointments as they strive towards Florida. Claire for years has repressed her own disappointment at not going to Disneyland. Keith is a gradeschool teacher but is a star athlete in his dreams. Especially poignant is Paul's story. Paul has never gotten over

leaving John, leaving him as it turns out when he learned that John had AIDS. Even greater is Paul's guilt over

not having AIDS himself.

Written in a style and with the same caring portrayal of its characters as Armisted Maupin, The Laughter Of Heroes is the kind of book that is read compulsively in a single sitting. When Neale seems to venture too far into pathos and sentimentality, he manages to deftly add just the right touches of farcical humor and moments of harsh truth telling to keep his story sailing on course. After building to a satisfying, comic climax, The Laughter Of Heroes is a wonderful read and is very highly recommended.

Philadelphia: New Life For Pro-Gay Films

It comes as no surprise that the world-wide Gay and Lesbian Community has suffered for a long time from cinematic mis-representations at the hands of mainstream Hollywood: Kiss of the Spider Woman, Cruisin', Partners, Personal Best, or Three of Hearts — well-meant as some of them undoubtedly were — didn't meet the emotional or intellectual needs of the Community. Others, mostly from Europe or from the underpaid independent American and Canadian film-movement — Abused, Another Country, Desert Hearts, or The Lost Language of Cranes have hit home, but to only a fraction of the potential queer audience available.

But now the waters of enlightenment, they are a-risin'. Sony/Tri-Star has plunked \$25 million into a Gay/AIDS film of some consequence: a tight, somber, lovely courtroom AIDS drama from the Academy Award-winning team of Jonathan Demme (director) and Ed Saxon (producer), both responsible for the stunning success of Silence of the Lambs. And by roping in stars of the Stature of Tom Hanks, Denzel Washington, Jason Robards, Mary Stennbergen and Antonio Banderas, they have assured that Ron Nyswaner's intelligent, sensitive and artistic script ended up as a positive view of Gay men in crisis.

Nyswaner, the only Gay man of the creative triumvirate, is in his middle 30's, and has been writing screenplays for the past decade (Mrs. Soffel & co-writer of Gross Anatomy). Saxon, 37, balding and open-faced-friendly, wanted to work with Nyswaner, as did Demme. While Lambs was being edited, Nyswaner brought up the idea of AIDS and discrimination — Gay civil rights. It appealed to the team.

Saxon says, "We didn't want the film to be about just dying of AIDS — we wanted some kind of narrative interest outside of the struggle with the disease. And humor had to be a part of that. We wanted to represent the various attitudes about the disease, but with dignity, and to deal with homophobia, too. Some people have to be enlightened slowly, unfortunately—those very folk who know Gay people, but don't know they know them. Like Denzel's character of Joe Miller." To further that end, they even hired a Gay actor with AIDS, Ron Vawter, to play a non-Gay lawyer in the

What helped most in getting the project off the ground, is the power attached to film-makers who had just won Hollywood's most visible honor, the Academy Award for Best Picture, for Silence of the Lambs. Saxon understates it when he says "Oscar certainly increased our options as film makers."

The role of Andrew Beckett, the Gay lawyer with AIDS, was first offered to Daniel Day-Lewis, who turned it down to do In the Name of the Father.

Hanks was interested, but not in the role of the homophobic lawyer Joe (a character-type Hanks acknowledges he has played often), but rather in the plum and risky role of Beckett. Denzel Washington was a natural for Joe, although the role was written color-blind.

With Banderas, it was even simpler. Demme's wife, Joanne Howard, was best friends with a Gay Spanish visual artist, Juan Suarez Botas, who had developed AIDS during the discussion stages of the film. As Nyswaner had recently also had someone near to him diagnosed with the disease, they decided to honor Botas by using his painting in the film and writing Andrew's lover as Spanish-born.

"It made sense that Miguel was an artist," says Saxon, "and we wanted to cast someone who was a physical presence, and (Banderas) has this phenomenally appealing physical bearing. He's one of the best Hispanic actors around, so coupled with his sex appeal, that's how it came to be."

The rest of the casting fell into place rather rapidly after that. "Jonathan has a way of getting his actors nominated for Oscar's (Anthony Hopkins and Jody Foster both won for Lambs and Mary Steenbergen, Best Supporting Actress for Melvin and Howard)," says Saxon. "It's hard for actors to find good scripts


and it's hard for anybody to get a chance to work on material that's socially relevant, because those movies are rare. That's why we were so lucky to get people like Joanne Woodward to play Tom's mother."

The pivotal moment that charges and drives the movie towards its conclusion is being called The Opera Scene, in which Washington's character, Joe Miller, comes over to Andrew and Miguel's apartment to discuss courtroomstrategy. Instead, Andrew has a brilliant aria of his own, a riff on Maria Callas "Mi Madre Morta" Giordano's Andrea Chenier, where he discusses the passion of opera and how it feeds him. Miller is disturbed by this outburst of what he considers stereotypical "faggot" behavior until he comprehends just how important passion is in people's lives. It is a significant plot and character advancement, clearly one only a Gay writer who's been there could make work

Philadelphia is undoubtedly a major watershed film for the Community: sympathetic and realistic Gays who lead lives of meaning, trapped in a nightmare not of their own making, which leads to greater understanding amid pathos. This is the kind of film Hollywood has been terrified to make: an engrossing weeper about Gavs, which makes you think. The fear comes mostly from the anxiety about backlash from non-Gay Americans. But it's also plain that there are enough Gay and non-prejudiced straight audiences out there who will have a chance to see it, since the power of a rich studio ensures national distribution.

All the elements have come together in the film: a strong script which makes Andrew and Miguel pillars of strength, but also finds subtle shades of gray for

most everyone else, especially Joe, and direction and acting which emphasizes these strengths. Beckett's family is behind him; his lover is a helpmate; the law partners, while guilty undeniably, are not painted as evil Nazi's.

Joe Miller represents the Everyguy who doesn't necessarily hate Gays, but won't go out of his way to get to know them, either. Demme admits that Miller is the closest to him than any of the

characters

"I've always had Gay friends, but like every 'normal' American, I was petrified the first time I found myself in the same space with someone with AIDS. Some people say that it's going a little too far to have Joe go to the doctor for assurance that he can't catch it by shaking hands (with Andrew), but no matter how much you read or hear, when you are touching somebody with AIDS you need assurance, buddy. And you learn that it's OK to touch them, to eat food off their plate, to let them play with your children. All that took me time, and I felt very, very strongly that if we had Joe grow faster than any of the audience might, we'd lose them. If we allowed him to wear a red ribbon at the end, to let us know he was really on the side of PWA's well, the bullshit meter would start going

off big time. But having Joe adjust Andrew's oxygen mask at the end of the movie, small things like that, that's a big move for both Miller and the audience.

Nyswanner wrote Joe as the driving force in the film. And casting Washington was a pivotal decision, as the character is strong, selfish, upset with Gay men with AIDS, and, ultimately, more concerned with the wrong done to Beckett than holding on to his own

"I wrote Joe as someone who makes his life exactly as he wants it to be", says Nyswaner. "In the sense that he's a street-smart, savvy lawyer who wants to make a lot of money."

Some Gay audiences may be disappointed by the lack of overt physical touch by the Gay characters. In comparison with Joe and Lisa Miller, where touch, snuggling, and kissing are a part of their development, Andrew and Miguel do very little of that. The reality of straight distaste influenced the physical choices, but the emotional commitment which Hanks and Banderas give to the relationship is compelling and believable.

The major non-courtroom event is a Halloween party Andrew and Miguel give and to which Joe and Lisa are invited. Lisa (newcomer Lisa Summerour) is the most stabilizing, non-prejudiced voice in the film, and it is through this couple that the mainstream audience will be most able to identify with the film. Gay

audiences will unquestionably see themselves in Andrew and Miguel. At the party the lovers, identically dressed in formal Navy officer whites (sly choice in itself) dance a close dance, looking soulfully into each other's eyes. The kiss which might logically follow is missing for two major reasons: the mainstream American audience wouldn't likely sit through it, and Hanks and Demme had, according to Hanks, "one prolonged discussion about that. Jonathan said 'Why don't we start this off with a great big smooch right on the lips' and I said, yeah, okay, we could do that, but are we doing that to shock the audience in Dubuque Iowa or to placate the audience that's in Greenwich Village?

The only kiss is when Miguel visits Andrew in the hospital when he first arrives. "We danced together as guys who've been lovers for nine years, who make jokes, and who are probably oncea-weekers by now, but we have the companionship and the caring memories so that it became a question as to whether it was right and accurate rather than what can we get away with. Of course, it's probably going to make people in Dubuque go, 'Oh, oh, they're dancing together, oh my God!' and people in Greenwich Village to go 'Ahhhh.' Let me tell you, to be able to get to dance with Antonio - I'm told I am the envy of 95% of the women in the world and 22% of the men. I was getting

slaps on the back from both sides."

Banderas, 33, who debunks the idea of himself as a sex symbol, is growing out of the boyish stage which made his nude presence in Pedro Almodovar's Law of Desire and Tie Me Up, Tie Me Down so memorable. He has a quiet charm as he talks about having to deflect criticism for playing so many Gay roles (he has the upcoming Interview with a Vampire in which his Armand, opposite Tom Cruise's Lestat, is decidedly homoerotic — at least in the novel).

"I'm proud to play a Gay character in this movie. I think Miguel's full of dignity and honesty and it's always beautiful to play a character that way. I truly cannot understand some comments from American moral society. In Desire, I played a Gay killer, nobody complained or asked me, 'Are you concerned playing a killer.' Kids go to the cinema to see them and nobody complains about that, but you play a Gay character, this man kissing another man on the screen, and it's 'Wow, what a polemic! What a controversial stand!"

The mid-sized actor is patient with, but not sympathetic to, questions about Hollywood's possible negative reaction to his playing so many Gay characters. "First of all, I'm very pretty sure about who I am — who is my sexuality. If I were concerned about someone telling me 'I'm not going to call you for the next movie because you played a Gay character,' then I am going to be ashamed, not proud, to be a part of this profession."

Nyswaner's script is complex, and his Gay characters aren't representative of all Gay people, as they cannot ever be. But he has taken one aspect — a Gay man's love of opera — and used it as a symbol of the nature of repressed emotion, freed. Thus, when Joe goes to

Andrew in the Opera Scene, the audience is given a chance to see a pent-up, passing-for-straight, WASP let go. Hanks, who admits to no particular understanding of opera, even mispronouncing, he says, the title of Andrea Chenier at first.

The thing about that scene is that it's not about Andy but about Joe. Subjectively it's a man telling somebody else what he thinks about this beautiful piece of art; letting Joe know how the aria (in which Callas sings about the house in which her mother died during the French Revolution] touches Andrew in a very violent way. That you can listen to [this aria] with no dialogue and it raises the hair on the back of your neck and on your arms is like a performance inside a performance; not unlike being an actor doing one of Shakespeare's great soliloquies - you think it will be difficult when in fact he has strung together these images that are so strong that they just make themselves, and so the scene made itself over and over again. But it's powerful because Joe is witness to it. I think that the audience are witnessing a combination of what I did in it and what Denzel did and what Ron perceived and the way Jonathan shot it and what Chris [Newman] our sound man was able to make - we didn't even loop that scene we just played it loud and live.


There's also a pivotal point in the film where Nyswaner wanted Joe to be on the spot and personally relate his homophobia to the legal strategy of the


lawsuit. The clever scene he wrote has a young, attractive, college athlete (Andre B. Blake) try to pick up Joe in a pharmacy. Joe is outraged that someone might actually think him Gay for representing an out-Gay man, but when he begins to see the connection between the law firm's terror of having a sick Gay man in their midst, he's able to turn it to Andrew's advantage in court.

"For me," says Nyswaner, "the root of AIDS discrimination is the connection between AIDS and homosexuality. And even though we all know now that many people of all kinds have AIDS, it's the merging of two issues which concern people the most; sex and death."

This is the most important Gay-and-AIDS-related film to come out of Hollywood, and Tri-Star is banking on large Gay attendance (not always dependable, unfortunately), as well as non-Gay participation, to make money. They have the product, the heart, and now it's up to us to supply the money.

"advertorial" and is a "thank you" to our advertisers and a way to mention their special events.



Whenever you're ready... I just thought you could use a little "motherly" advice.

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




That's my gram! Always upbeat. Always looking on the bright side of things.



Gay and Lesbian Skiers Expected At Winterfest Tahoe '94

Gay and Lesbian travelers will have a choice this ski season. Rather than attend Gay Ski Week in Aspen, many Gay and Lesbian skiers now plan to participate in Winterfest Tahoe '94, a gala week of skiing, partying, entertainment, gambling and tours to be held at Lake Tahoe, March 13-20.

"We're not trying to compete with Aspen," said Tom Roth of the Marketing Department, co-sponsor of Winterfest. "We're simply offering an alternative that the community can feel good about."

Roth said that many winter sport lovers began looking for new locations when the now overturned Amendment 2 passed in Colorado, which essentially banned any legislation designed to protect the rights of Gays and Lesbians in that state. Ten percent of the profits of Winterfest Tahoe '94 will be donated to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force to help prevent similar measures from passing elsewhere.

Winterfest activities will include downhill and cross-country skiing, snowboarding, back-country skiing, ice skating, sleigh rides, snow sculpture and

snow volleyball.

According to Roth, rooms and suites have been blocked for the festival at the Hyatt Regency, the CalNeva Lodge, the Garni Lodge and the Tahoe Biltmore

In addition to ski events, activities will include tours, dinner shows, mixers, dances, apres-ski parties, barbecues, comedy shows, and a Gay and Lesbian film festival.

Seven-night packages include accommodations; buffet breakfast daily: shuttle bus service; four Winterfest party events, including an Ides of March and St. Patrick's Day parties; taxes; and baggage handling. Rates start at \$395 per person, double.

PRE-WINTERFEST PACKAGE

A pre-Winterfest plan, including a two-night stay in San Francisco, also is

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available for March 11-13. The plan features accommodations at the Ramada San Francisco, breakfast daily, a Winterfest kick-off party and inbound transfers. The rate is \$125 double.


things can warm up a cold winter night like the thought of a hot CHiP.
