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

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Medical College Named One of Four National AIDS Research Centers

\$4 Million Grant Will Expand Staff & Studies

Milwaukee — The Medical College of Wisconsin has been awarded \$4 million by the National Institute of Mental Health to establish a new Center for AIDS Intervention Research. The award, announced by Wisconsin Senators Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold and Congressman Tom Barrett, will create an AIDS Research Center focussed on the development of improved HIV prevention, mental health and health behavior interventions.

The Medical College is one of just four institutions nationwide to receive the special grant. It will be the only AIDS Research Center of its kind in the Midwest, and will establish Milwaukee and the Medical College of Wisconsin as one of the country's leaders in research on AIDS prevention. The Center will coordinate AIDS prevention and mental health research efforts and attract leading AIDS researchers to Milwaukee.

According to Dr. Harry Prosen, chairman of the College's Department of Psychiatry and Mental Health Sciences: "It will support the rapid development of innovative new research programs in such areas as HIV prevention for disenfranchised communities, evaluation of mental health services for those

affected by HIV, and behavioral medicine interventions intended to improve the health of persons with HIV disease."

The Center will work to more quickly develop improved HIV/AIDS prevention programs and to accelerate research on ways to meet the mental health needs of patients.

Jeffrey A. Kelly, a Psychologist and the Center's Director, has received nearly \$18 million in grant support since 1990 to conduct prevention and mental health research on AIDS.

"We are very excited because the Center offers us a means to coordinate the efforts of HIV researchers with the efforts of community and public health

agencies," said Dr. Kelly.

"It is important that key HIV research results quickly be communicated to community-based and health organizations so they can use research findings, and also that community input can help define questions that HIV researchers should investigate," said Kelly. "The Center will now have the resources to facilitate this communication."

Most importantly, scientists from a range of disciplines, including psychologists and psychiatrists, medical specialists in infectious diseases and internal medicine, social scientists, experts in HIV epidemiology and research personnel familiar with the needs of communities affected by HIV/AIDS will be brought together as a single team.

Because it will be the only Center of its kind between New York and California, we anticipate it will become the focal point for HIV behavioral research in the entire region," said Dr. Kelly.

The other three centers are Columbia University Health Sciences Center in New York, the University of California-San Francisco, and the University of California-San Diego School of Medicine.

The Center for AIDS Intervention Research will replace the former Community Health Behavior Program. In addition to Dr. Kelly, the Center will be comprised of eight Medical College faculty members who will devote their full efforts to HIV research, ten faculty members who will devote partial effort to the new Center, and about 25 other community research personnel who conduct AIDS prevention and mental health projects.

The present focus of the Center's research includes HIV prevention efforts focused on Gay men, inner city women, the chronic mentally ill and the homeless, as well as research to improve mental health services for persons with HIV disease and their loved ones.

The new funding will allow for expansion of all these areas as well as new clinical research studies on behavioral treatments for nutritional disorders, pain and other health disorders of persons with HIV disease.

Shalala Announces Big Boost in Ryan White AIDS Funds

Wisconsin to Get More than \$1 Million

Washington DC — On March 24, Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala announced the award of an additional \$322.6 million in grants to cities and states under the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act. Wisconsin will get just over \$1 million. Ryan White is the teenaged AIDS activist who became a spokesman for the cause and who died in 1990.

"Total Ryan White funding for 1994, including the grants announced today, will be \$579.4 million, up 66% from last year," said Shalala, "and President Clinton's budget calls for another 16%

increase in 1995."

"These funds will be used to provide health services for people who desperately need them — people with AIDS who have nowhere else to turn. Ryan White funds will also provide relief to hard- pressed city and state governments across the country."

The total includes \$160 million in supplemental grants to hard- hit cities, up 76% from last year, and \$162.7 million in Title II formula grants, up 60%.

Title I supplemental grants were awarded to the 34 US cities with the highest reported cases of AIDS. No Wisconsin city qualified for these funds. The largest Title I grants went to New York City, \$54.2 million, San Francisco, \$20.1 million, and Los Angeles, \$12.8 million.

Title II formula grants were awarded to all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and US Territories. These grants were awarded based on the number of AIDS cases reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for the 2-year period October 1, 1991 to September 30, 1993. The state of Wisconsin, which recorded 924 cases during that time, is slated to receive \$1,069,752.

California, with the largest number of reported cases, got the largest Title II grant of \$28 million, followed by New York, with \$26 million. Six states that reported the fewest AIDS cases received the minimum grant of \$100,000 each

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Steve Gunderson Gay-Baited on House Floor

Gunderson, Barney Frank Shine During Debate on Education Bill

Washington, DC — During Congressional debate on a major education appropriations bill March 24, Rep. Bob Dornan (R-CA) taunted Wisconsin Rep. Steve Gunderson about whether or not he is a Gay man.

Gunderson had spoken against the wording of an amendment sponsored by Rep. Mel Hancock (R-MO) that would have prohibited federal funds from being used in any education program "that has either the purpose or effect of encouraging or supporting homosexuality as a positive lifestyle alternative."

During his speech, Hancock held up as examples brochures on AIDS prevention produced by New York City's Gay Men's Health Crisis, which he claimed had been distributed at high schools. He said taxpayers were tired of "their hard-earned money being used to bombard their children" with allegedly pro-Gay propaganda.

Gunderson expressed concern the Hancock amendment would have "the effect of prohibiting school counseling and guidance. It has the effect of prohibiting AIDS education."

Dornan rose to condemn children's books that include Gay parents and any discussion of Gay issues in the schools. He then lashed out at Gunderson whom, he said, has "a revolving door on his closet...He's in, he's out, he's in, he's out, he's in, le's out, he's in. I guess you're out because you went up and spoke to a huge homosexual dinner, Mr. Gunderson."

Dornan was referring to a speech Gunderson delivered March 12 to a fundraising dinner for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, a national Gay rights group. (In Step carried extensive excerpts of Gunderson's HRCF speech

in the last issue.)

As Dornan finished his comments, bedlam broke out on the floor of the House of Representatives, with some members yelling at Dornan to sit down and shut up. When several Congressmen threatened to censure Dornan, which means he would be prohibited from speaking for the rest of the day, Dornan agreed to withdraw his remarks so they would not be included in the Congressional Record. But he did not apologize.

Dornan later told reporters: "We have a rep on our side who is a homo who goes in and out of the closet. I have just had it with him saying he takes second place to no one in this House...[in] upholding Christian

principles.

increase in funds: "The Clinton Presidency immediately made a big difference in the federal government's financial commitment on AIDS, and the Ryan White CARE Act is symbolic of that."

Nelson said 1994 grants represent a 100% increase over funds offered during the final year of the Bush administration. Milwaukee's share of Ryan White funding alone doubled from about \$250,000 to \$500,000.

But Nelson said the proposed increase of just 16% for 1995 was problematic: "Unfortunately, we won't do nearly as well next year with just a 16% increase in Ryan White funds, and the fact that the proposed budget for the CDC's AIDS prevention program does not increase at all is very troubling. The country needs a much more aggressive

AIDS prevention effort."

Nelson encouraged people to contact Wisconsin Sens. Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold to urge them to support greater funding. Congressman David Obey, who was just named to head the House Appropriations Committee, will have a powerful influence on the shaping of next year's budget and should also be lobbied.

APPLAUSE FOR BARNEY FRANK

Gunderson did not respond directly to Dornan's outburst. He also declined to talk to the press about the incident. But openly Gay Congressman Barney Frank (D-MA) elicited applause for comments he made in response to Dornan and the potential impact of the Hancock amendment.

Responding to another member of Congress who said that public school counselors had no business talking to students about their sexual orientation, Frank bellowed "How dare you not support that kid! How dare you tell her she's worthless!"

To the charge that homosexuals were attempting to use the schools to "promote" their "lifestyle," Frank argued passionately: "If you paid me to promote homosexuality, I don't know what I'd do!"

Frank said the idea that anyone can "promote" homosexuality is ridiculous. "What do you think it is, a taste for food?" he asked rhetorically.

The Hancock Amendment, which was heavily promoted by the Rev. Lou Sheldon's Traditional Values Coalition, passed on a 301-120 vote.

However, immediately afterward, a

secondary amendment introduced by Rep. Jolene Unsoeld (D-WA) was passed, 224-194. Unsoeld's measure undercut the Hancock Amendment by stating clearly that the federal government could not intervene in local school district's decisions about their curricula. Local control has always been the hallmark of American education. Gay leaders observed that a reiteration of that policy could have the effect of ensuring protection for programs like the Harvey Milk High School for Gays and Lesbians in New York City.

The \$12.7 billion education bill now moves to the Senate where more controversy is likely. Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) recently engaged in a filibuster to require voluntary prayer in the public schools. Outmaneuvered by colleagues, his campaign failed. But amendments regarding school-based health clinics and licensure for home schooling have also raised conservatives' ire.

This appropriations bill is different from the Goals 2000 education reform bill just signed by President Clinton.

LOG CABIN CLUB PROTESTS

Meanwhile, the head of the National Log Cabin Republican Clubs has called on Republican Party chairman Haley Barbour to "take a stand against the spirit and tenor of Congressman Dornan's statements" against Rep. Gunderson, "and to do so publicly so that there will be no doubt about where the Republican Party stands on this matter."

"I think you would agree that the term 'homo' is a slur," Log Cabin Director Rich Tafel wrote Barbour, "and that it is not fit for decent discourse."

Tafel called on Barbour to express his support for Gunderson: "We must hear from within the GOP. Congressman Gunderson deserves at least that level of commitment from his own party which he has served so well."

"The Republican Party is trying to move away from an image that tolerates slurs and bigotry," Tafel wrote. "We cannot hope for this to happen without making clear that Bob Dornan has crossed the line."



Statewide Network Meets, moves Forward

Adopts Interim Name & Operating Principles

Madison — About 40 people gathered in Madison on march 19 for the latest meeting of Wisconsin's new statewide Gay organization. The group adopted a temporary name and adopted in principle a temporary "governance document." The organization will be known as the Statewide Advocacy Network (SWAN) during its "interim" period, which is expected to last six

The interim governance document was created and presented to the Network by members of the Structure committee. The document contains the basic operating principles for the organization and detailed the privileges and responsibilities associated with membership.

The Network will use modified consensus as its decision-making process. An effort will be made to reach complete agreement on all courses of action the organization takes. If this is not possible after reasonable discussion, the Honorary Chair or the meeting facilitator may call for a vote. This method was chosen to maximize the voice given to each member's point of view and to reduce hierarchy.

The governance document established a Steering Committee and several standing committees. The standing committees are: Communications/ Public Relations; Resource Assessment; Structure/ Bylaws; Conference/ Education; and Fundraising. Also established was an ad hoc "Issues Monitor Group." responsibilities of each committee were also outlined.

SOME CONTROVERSY

Two points of the document generated some controversy. The first was the issue of dues. It was agreed to establish dues as a means of fundraising, and to tie voting privileges to dues paying. Disagreement surfaced when it was proposed that the Network create a "family" or "partnership" dues rate. Those in favor of the idea cited the importance of recognizing same-sex relationships. Those opposed claimed that such a rate would discriminate in the way that marriage discriminate. It was decided that during the interim phase, a flat \$10 per person dues structure would be adopted. The issue will be revisited at future meetings, as will the possibility of offering other classes of membership, such as "organizational" or "sponsoring."

Another minor point arose at the idea of State Representative Tammy

Baldwin's serving as Honorary Chair during the interim period. One member "played devil's advocate" and suggested that Baldwin's participation in such a visible leadership position could lead to the wrong perception among Network opponents or the public that the Network was a Baldwin political organization.
Baldwin responded, "The creation of

a statewide network has been a longterm dream of mine. I am honored to fill a role in its early stages until the creation of a permanent governing structure.

These issues have wide and dramatic impact and can not be characterized as a personal agenda, she continued.

The Network will also examine the idea of having one co-chair of each gender in response to concerns about polarization along gender lines.

After the governance document was approved in principle, the meeting broke meetings of the standing committees. Nine members present volunteered to serve on the Steering Committee

PARTICIPANTS FROM ACROSS THE STATE

The Network continues to attract participants from a wider and wider

swath of Wisconsin's landscape. In addition to the standard Madison-Milwaukee axis, representatives attended the latest meeting from Whitewater, Menominee, Evansville and Rockford, Illinois. The March meeting also saw its first attendant from Superior in the person of David St. John, a police officer who serves as the Superior Police Department's Liaison officer to that region's Lesbian/ Gay/ Bisexual communities.

St. John spoke near the top of the meeting about his activities as liaison which include conducting officer, trainings for his department and other agencies, such as the National Park Service. His presence challenged many of the stereotypes the L/G/B communities have of the police.

The L/G/B communities' political landscape was also widely represented. Those in attendance ranged from radical queer activists to a member of Wisconsin's Log Cabin Club, an organization for Gay Republicans.

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Philadelphia Settles Important AIDS Discrimination Case

Other Cities and Emergency Workers Will Feel Impact

Philadelphia, PA — The City of Philadelphia has reached an out-of-court settlement with the Justice Department in the first- ever AIDS discrimination case filed under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Although the monetary compensation to the victim is relatively small, the case is expected to have a major impact on how cities, other institutions and all health workers treat people with HIV/AIDS.

The case arose out of an incident in January, 1993 when an emergency medical technician refused to help a man suffering from chest pains after the man indicated he was taking AZT for his HIV infection. The helpless man, lying on the ground in pain, was told to get on the stretcher himself. He was only conveyed to the hospital after a passer-by helped him into the ambulance.

When the city failed to atone for its mistreatment of the victim, the AIDS Law Project of Philadelphia filed a complaint on his behalf with the Justice Department last October. In no time at all, city officials began responding to Justice Department lawyers, seeking a settlement.

The 28-year old man, who used the pseudonym John Smith in the lawsuit, was awarded \$10,000 and a written

apology from the city.
What is most remarkable about the settlement, however, is the swiftness with which the Clinton Justice Department pursued the case and the requirements for major reforms in Philadelphia's Fire and Police Department procedures, including the re-training of all emergency personnel.

re-training of all emergency personnel. In what is likely to become a model for other cities nationwide, Philadelphia agreed to develop, in cooperation with AIDS service groups, a model AIDS awareness training program to teach its 1,400 firefighters and 900 emergency medical technicians how to prevent transmission of HIV, how to respect the patient's privacy and to respond to the special needs of people with HIV/AIDS.

"It's clear that in 1994 if you are a fireman or policeman or a paramedic, and you choose not to deal with those who have AIDS, then you have to find a new line of work," Bruce Flannery of Philadelphia Action AIDS told the press.

And just so the point was not missed on a national scale, National AIDS Policy Coordinator Kristine Gebbie issued the following statement:

"This settlement addresses the fact that HIV cannot be transmitted through casual contact. For those individuals working in a medical environment, where risk to exposure of HIV may be greater, the use of universal precautions greatly lessens the risk of becoming infected with the virus. By following these precautions, health care providers can protect themselves and other patients.

"There are still many people in America that are ignorant to the needs of people living with AIDS, and many local governments in the US that have not educated their employees and people about the issues of HIV transmission and sensitivities.

"This action by the Justice Department sends a very clear message to the nation that discrimination by anyone to a person living with HIV or AIDS will not be tolerated. There is no reason that a person should be denied services because of their HIV status. This message is a consistent one throughout the entire administration."

Rodney Johnson to Head MAP's Outreach to Gay Community

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee AIDS
Project has hired longtime activist
Rodney Johnson to coordinate AIDS
prevention programming in the Gay and
Lesbian community. He started the job
in March.

Initially, Johnson plans to create an advisory committee of community leaders, groups and volunteers to help in assessing community needs and designing appropriate prevention

strategies.

"Among the areas that we will be dealing with will be prevention education directed at Gay youth, women, people of color, and the Gay bars," said Johnson. "Our new focus will include issues such as grieving, HIV-negative support, relationships, sexuality, self-esteem and other emotional factors that contribute to a person's disregard for their own health, safety and well-being."

Johnson should get a good reception in the Gay community, where he has been active for many years. He has helped develop programs for the Gay and Lesbian Cable Network, lectured on diversity issues, and co-founded UJIMA, Inc., a non-profit group that is developing the city's first HIV prevention project for African American Gays and Lesbians.

LAMM's Kitty Barber Addresses Tolerance Rally

Event in Synagogue Held to Counter Nation of Islam Speaker

Milwaukee — Kitty Barber of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee spoke at a "Rally for Tolerance and Understanding" held at Congregation Emanu-El B'Ne Jeshurun on March 23. The event was organized by a coalition of Jewish, African American and other community groups as an alternative to a speech given by Khallid Abdul Muhammad at the UW-Milwaukee Student Union that night.

Muhammad's appearance garnered massive publicity because of a speech he delivered last year at Kean College in New Jersey in which he called for the murder of Jews, Catholics, "faggots" and the disabled, among others. He called the Pope a "no-good cracker" and accused Jewish leaders of a conspiracy against the African American

community.

As it turned out, in his speech at UW-M, Muhammad steered clear of the harsh rhetoric which led Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan to demote him.

"I didn't come here to teach you to hate white people. I didn't come here to teach you to hate white Jews," said Muhammad. "I came here to teach you

to love your black selves.'

Muhammad received a tumultuous welcome from an audience of 1,500, who cheered his message of self-empowerment. Muhammad urged his listeners, mostly African American and primarily students, to work hard in

the most challenging areas of study like Mathematics, Chemistry and Engineering. He also attacked the City of Milwaukee for its racist practices: its high black unemployment rate, its deteriorating inner city and its segregated housing.

Mordecai Lee of the Milwaukee Jewish Council helped organize the Tolerance rally and invited Kitty Barber to speak. Other speakers included Brother Booker Ashe of the House of Peace, Robert Ashmore of the Arab Americans of Wisconsin, Elnar Tangen of the Wisconsin Association for Asian Americans and Paul Jordan of the Milwaukee Minority Chamber of Commerce. Barber was the only one to speak primarily about Gays and Lesbians.

Barber said, in part: "While we must be aware of history, and know the truth about the crimes committed against Africans and African Americans, against Jews, against other people of color, and against Lesbians and Gay men, we must not allow ourselves to be caught up in a game of 'my oppression is greater than yours."" For while we are busy playing it, the KKK and the skinheads and the neo-Nazis are laughing, happy that we are preoccupied, happy to see us divided.

"But we cannot be divided.

"For among us and standing with us here tonight are Gay and Lesbian African Americans, Jews of all races, all orientations, white people who fight racism, Christians who really do love their neighbors.

"And we are, all of us, more than

Appeals Court Says Boy Scouts Can Exclude Gays

Los Angeles, CA — In a 2-1 decision in late March, a California Appeals Court ruled that the Boy Scouts of America has the right to prohibit Gay men from becoming Scout leaders. The ruling came in the case of Timothy Curran, a former Eagle Scout who was denied a job as assistant Scoutmaster after the Boy Scouts learned of his homosexuality.

The court ruled that forcing the Boy Scouts to accept Gays would violate the group's First Amendment rights to free speech and association. "Unless speech and association. scouting can determine its own standards of morality, it will be disabled as a teacher of moral views on any

subject," the court said.

Contradicting another recent court decision, the Appeals Court said that as a non-profit charitable organization, the Boy Scouts did not fall under the requirements of a state law forbidding employment discrimination. Just last month, a lower court in Orange County had ruled that the Boy Scouts were a business and, as such, were indeed governed by the state's nondiscrimination law.

"Many charitable organizations direct their services to a distinct religious, cultural, gender, ethnic or age group in a way that would be unacceptable in a business, but is neither offensive nor improper in the

just our sexual orientation, more than our religions, more than the color of our skin. We are indivisible not only because we choose to stand together but because we are, in many ways, the same people. We can't be put into small, neat packages, ready for disposal. Although some people want to make us small, we are here tonight because we are big - too big to be silent, too big to be ignored.

"And so tonight, we stand together for a small thing: tolerance. I do not ask that you love me, and you do not ask me to love you. But I hope we can see tolerance only as a beginning, for we must also come to respect and value one another if we are to build a peaceful

world.

"For now, let us tolerate each other as we must if we are ever to learn to hear one another, to believe one another, if we are ever to learn to trust one another. This is our only hope we must believe in and respect the humanity of each one of us. Let us begin tonight."

Reno Waives HIV Rule for Visitors to Gay Games
Washington, DC — On March 22,

Attorney General Janet Reno issued an order placing a 10-day waiver on regulations which restrict people with HIV/AIDS from coming into America. The waiver had been sought by organizers of Gay Games IV & Cultural Festival, who expect many foreign participants at the event which runs from June 18-25.

Reno signed the order after consultations with officials at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Department of Health and Human Services who assured her that visitors with HIV or AIDS pose no imminent health risk to those they come in contact with.

The Justice Department has previously issued similar waivers, usually for foreigners who come to America to attend health conferences on HIV/AIDS. Organizers of Gay Games are pleased with the decision because it will alleviate any possible conflicts in dealing with customs and other officials

at ports of entry.

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Gay Mexican Granted Asylum in US

San Francisco, CA — In a historic decision, the Immigration and Naturalization Service on March 24 granted asylum in the US to a Mexican man who claimed he was the victim of harassment and violence because he is Gay. Authorities said it was the first time the INS ever granted asylum based on a person's claim of persecution because of sexual orientation.

The man, using the pseudonym Jose Garcia, said: "As a Gay man in Mexico, life was made intolerable for me." He said he had often been arrested merely for walking in certain neighborhoods or for visiting Gay clubs. Once while in police custody, Garcia said he was raped by an officer.

The INS was presented with evidence gathered by the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission which documented the murders of at least 25 Gay men and transvestites in the southern Mexican state of Chiapas. The INS approved Garcia's application for asylum because he had established, according to the INS's guidelines, "a well-founded fear of persecution" based on his membership in a particular "social group," in this case, homosexuals.

Last summer, an immigration judge granted asylum to Marcelo Tenorio, a Brazilian who said he faced persecution in his homeland because he is Gay. The INS is appealing that decision because Tenorio lived and worked illegally in the US for several years. Garcia, on the other hand, applied for asylum as soon as he arrived.

Clinton Defends Old Pentagon Policy

Washington, DC - In a move that has Gay rights supporters furious, Clinton administration lawyers went to court March 30 to defend the Pentagon's former policy on Gays in the military in order to prevent former Midshipman Joe Steffan from gaining reinstatement.

Last year, a three judge panel of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia ruled that Steffan's ouster from the Naval Academy at Annapolis violated the equal protection clause of the Constitution and ordered his reinstatement. The Clinton administration decided to appeal, but days later, the full 10- member Court of Appeals decided to reconsider the decision. This is problematic for Steffan because the full court is much more conservative than the panel which ruled

Administration lawyers argued before the full court "the rationality" of the old policy. Its brief stated: "[T]he military's conclusion that the policy prevents homosexual acts that would interfere with the military mission provides a rational basis for the policy."

Buttino Accepts Settlement: FBI Pledges Non-Discrimination

San Francisco, CA - Frank Buttino, a 20-year veteran of the FBI who was fired when the Bureau learned he is Gay, has reached a settlement with the Bureau which has promised not to discriminate any more on the basis of sexual orientation.

The settlement was overseen by a federal judge who had begun hearing the case in December. But at that time, Attorney General Janet Reno announced a policy of non-discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation for all offices and agencies connected to the Justice Department. FBI Director Louis Freeh sent the new policy to all FBI field offices in March. It forbids discrimination based on "homosexual conduct among consenting adults in private."

The Bureau will pay Buttino \$100,000 and an additional \$53,000 for his legal fees. Buttino will also be eligible for a monthly pension of \$1,746 when he turns 62 in 2007. Buttino, who has written a book about his expulsion from the FBI, agreed not to seek

reinstatement.

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"Christian" Group Attacks PBS for Gay Programming

Tupelo, MS — A March mailing to as many as one million Americans by Donald Wildmon, President of the American Family Association, attacks the Public Broadcasting Service, claiming: "Your Tax Dollars Used to Air Pornographic, Profane, Homosexual TV Series."

The series in question is Armistead Maupin's Gay-positive Tales of the City, a 3-part miniseries about life in San Francisco in the 1970's aired by PBS in January. Attacking it as "filth" and "pro-homosexual propaganda," Wildmon is coordinating a massive protest campaign to urge Congress to completely de-fund PBS.

Along with Tales of the City, Wildmon cites the Gay/Lesbian variety show In the Life, and the recent dramatizations of Portrait of a Marriage and David Leavitt's The Lost Language of Cranes, about a father and son coming to terms with their homosexuality, as examples of the "Homosexual Pride Taxpayer-Funded"

TV Network."

The mailing contains the outrageous distortion that in 1992, Congress gave PBS \$250 million "to air these pro-homosexual programs." Only a miniscule amount of that entire budget went to any Gay-related programming. PBS supporters are urged to call the network expressing support — 800-356-2626, and to call elected officials to counter the AFA's influence.

Thousands of Lesbians Gather at "The Dinah"

Rancho Mirage, CA — Thousands of Lesbians descended on this Southern California resort March 23-27 to participate in an annual rite of spring — the Dinah Shore Ladies Professional Golf Association Tournament, or in Lesbian-speak: The Dinah.

Billed by some promoters as "the largest annual Lesbian gathering west of the Mississippi," the tournament draws thousands of women, less for the sporting event than for the many parties, dances and all-women events that are the hallmark of the week. This year, participants mourned the loss of entertainer Dinah Shore, who passed away just one month before the big

event.

That didn't stop the wild partying however. Dyke comics Lea DeLaria, Marga Gomez and Marilyn Pittman put in appearances as the "Queens of Comedy." There was a night of Female Wrestling featuring Kona the Barbarian, a "Love Hangover" Party hosted by Chastity Bono and a "Lesbo Expo and Pool Party."


For the record, Donna Andrews sank a 6-foot birdie putt on the final hole to win her first major tournament, finishing with a 70, 12 under par.

Washington, DC — James Billington, chief librarian at the Library of Congress, has issued a statement protecting Gay and Lesbian workers. "Although sexual orientation is not a protected category under federal law, it is library policy that all staff members have the right to be treated impartially and fairly in matters affecting their employment... I expect every manager to ensure that personnel decisions are made on the basis of job- related criteria, and those alone."

San Francisco, CA — More than 100 people representing Gay and Lesbian Asian and Pacific Islander groups marched for the first time in San Francisco's annual Chinese New Year Parade on February 26. Unlike the controversies in New York and Boston over the St. Patrick's Day Parades, the organizers of the Chinese Parade welcomed the participation of Gays and Lesbians.

Washington, DC — Lesbian chanteuse Suede recently underwent surgery for the removal of a large ovarian cyst. The cyst was benign and she is expected to fully recover.

Community Health Behavior Program Medical College of Wisconsin

Albany, NY — New York's Democratic-led State Assembly has once again passed a bill prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing and public accommodations. But the bill faces an uphill battle in the Republican-controlled Senate where, last year, GOP leaders refused to release it out of committee for a floor vote. Assemblywoman Deborah Glick, the bill's chief sponsor, has vowed to continue introducing and lobbying for the bill until it's passed.

St. Paul, MN — The Minnesota Court of Appeals has ruled that Gay men or Lesbians who are forced to quit their jobs because of homophobic behavior are entitled to apply for unemployment benefits. The court likened harassment based on sexual orientation to that based on gender and said that if a work environment became so oppressive it forced workers to quit, those employees are eligible for benefits.

Somerset, KY — Rep. Harold Rogers (R-KY) has refused to apologize for a homophobic joke he made at a Republican Party fundraiser. Rogers said that President Clinton was being named "Gardener of the Year" by Better Homes and Gardens "because he got the Bushes out of the White House, Flowers in the bedroom and pansies in the Marines."

Los Angeles, CA — Dack Rambo, the actor who starred as Jack Ewing on Dallas and in the soaps, including Another World until 1991, died at his California ranch March 21. He was 53. Rambo had revealed his bisexuality and HIV-positive status several years ago. The cause of death could not be confirmed however.

New York, NY — Harry Kondoleon, a playwright and novelist whose last book, Diary of a Lost Boy, traces a man's decline from AIDS, succumbed to the disease on March 16. He was 39. Among his plays are The Fairy Garden, Zero Positive, Love Diatribe and The Houseguest. Kondoleon won the 1983 Obie (Off Broadway) Award as most promising playwright, and won another Obie last year for The Houseguest.



Minneapolis, MN — Rabbi Gregory Kanter of Temple Israel, who came out as a Gay man to the Temple's Board of Trustees in a letter, has been met with a "strong statement of support," according to Equal Time. Three years ago, another rabbi at the same temple, Stephen Pinsky, resigned after admitting to an extramarital Gay affair.

Officer Shot While Helping Victim in Walker's Point

Cops Seek Tips From Gay Community

Milwaukee — As In Step went to press, Milwaukee police were looking for two assailants who allegedly robbed and assaulted someone in Walker's Point and then shot an off-duty cop who came to the victim's aid. After the assailants fled and the officer went to a nearby call box to summon help, the victim, possibly a transvestite, also fled the scene.

The assault took place just before midnight on March 31 in the lot of the abandoned gas station at S. 1st and Walker, close to a number of Milwaukee's Gay bars. The police officer who was shot is recovering from a graze wound to the face. Detectives have discovered the Oldsmobile Cutlass the suspects drove and are trying to locate the victim to gain more information about the assault and the suspects. The victim, believed to be 5'7" to 5'9", of slim build and from late 20's to early 30's, dropped a wig at the scene of the crime. Police described the victim as having thinning hair and a pony tail, and possibly of Hispanic origin.

Detective Leroy Shaw came upon the assault at about 11:45pm as he was driving to work in his own van. He stopped and ordered the assailants to lie on the ground. One complied, the other came at Shaw, swung at him, then shot him in the face. Shaw returned fire and took cover in his van as the suspects fled, with the gun still blazing. Shaw asked the victim to wait while he drove to a 5th and National police call box to call for help. When squad cars arrived, the victim was gone.

Within minutes, Milwaukee police cordoned off a sizable area. Teams of cops visited all of the bars — Gay and straight — to search for the suspects or clues. Police also made additional visits to Gay bars throughout the weekend. Most bar owners and bartenders told In Step the police behaved professionally. Politicians Who Opposed Gay Studies and PrideFest Citation

In updates to two stories reported in the last issue of In Step, we publish here the names of those State legislators who signed a letter urging the President of the UW Board of Regents to block the proposed Gay Studies program at UW-Milwaukee and the names of those members of the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors who voted against a resolution recognizing PrideFest '94, the Gay and Lesbian Pride Festival scheduled for June 11-12.

The letter to Regents' President George Steil stated that the Gay Studies program was "not a wise use of taxpayer dollars" and that issues "affecting a small group of people who choose an alternative lifestyle" shouldn't constitute an academic program. Steil replied that since no new expenditures or personnel were needed for the program, the Board of Regents had no right to intervene. The final decision rests with UW-Milwaukee Chancellor John Schroeder.

Circulating the anti-Gay Studies letter among fellow legislators were Reps. Bonnie Ladwig (R-Racine), Steven Nass (R-Whitewater) and John Dobyns (R-Fond du Lac). The letter was signed by State Senators: Gary Drzewiecki (R-Pulaski), Alan Lassee (R-De Pere), Dave Zien (R-Eau Claire), Tim Weeden (R-Beloit) and Margaret

Farrow (R-Elm Grove).



I live on the edge of Walker's Point, two blocks away from National Avenue, two blocks away from Milwaukee Technical High School where drive-by shootings occurred not long ago. The ultra-trendy Rudy's restaurant is one block away. Timer's, Steny's, Louis' and La Cage are three blocks away. Aside from the bar noise, the neighborhood is very quiet.

It is Sunday night around midnight. The streets are deserted. I walk down an alley half a block from my home. I am upset at someone who I've been seeing for five years but possibly not much longer. I have tears in my eyes, so I walk down the alley, rather than create a spectacle of myself on the sidewalk.

Have I committed a crime yet?
Then explain to me why suddenly a
police van pulls up behind me, and out
steps a stupid looking little man with a a
gun and his apprentice, who proceed to

ask me a million questions: "Where have you been?" "What are you doing in this alleyway?" "Don't you know it's not safe here?"

I fight back a few tears and resist the urge to slap the idiot and respond "Don't you have any real crooks that you can catch? This is my neighborhood. I know where it is safe and not safe. And furthermore, it's none of your business which of Milwaukee's bars I spent my night in."

It is all I can do to stand there and listen to his little P.R. speech that he should have been addressing to a group of grade school children. Two more cop cars enter the alley. My "friend" the officer is running my I.D. card through the computer which in itself took twenty minutes. I still have no explanation as to why I am being detained. He doesn't seem to understand my anger — my bad attitude. I tell him that I have had nothing but bad experiences with the Milw. Police Dept. He says he's sorry to hear that. I'm thinking of all the times I was stopped or the crime of walking past a Gay bar after

midnight, and the times my friends were beat to the pavement by homophobes on 2nd and National, and all the times I've had bottles thrown at me, been followed by drunken men intent on proving to me what real men they were, and all those times I had to defend myself against the ignorance and cruelty that are encouraged in a so-called city like this.

The little man with the gun finally tells me I can go. As I walk away one of the other officers says "Have a nice night, girl." I know that I am pushing my luck to even respond, but I back up and walk up to the window and say with as much contempt as I can manage, "Girl?" Maybe some of these friendly guardians of society should go back to school and learn to tell the difference between a girl and a boy.

I want this type of harassment to stop. I want our tax money spent wisely and our police patrolling areas that are proven dangerous. And I think someone owes me an apology.

Price Controls = Death

The Clinton Health Care Plan And AIDS Research

Statement by Richard Tafel (Mr. Tafel is the National Director of Log Cabin Republicans.)

In the debate over whether there truly is a health care "crisis" in this country, there is one certain element of crisis in evidence. Over one million Americans are in desperate need of new treatments and a foreseeable cure for AIDS, and President Clinton's health care plan offers price controls on breakthrough drugs as an alleviation of their suffering.

Rather than embrace this proposal, the Gay and Lesbian community, AIDS activists, and all Americans who are deeply concerned about he AIDS epidemic should carefully consider how it would seriously damage the likely source for an early AIDS vaccine or cure — the U.S. biotechnology industry. A thoughtful analysis of the facts reveals a disaster in

Biotech is a venture capital industry, totally reliant on risk capital and, therefore, the most eager to take on the kind of high-risk drug development research which pharmaceutical companies and publicly-funded government agencies shy away from. The increasing demand for new AIDS and cancer treatments, coupled with a

free market for drug investment, were the forces that created biotech. Over time, the industry has grown into a major source of innovative research in treatment development for the desperately ill.

Price controls will significantly alter that environment, and ultimately cripple AIDS drug innovation in the United States. Since the U.S. is the home of nearly every independent biotech company in the world, the ripple effect could doom millions of AIDS sufferers around the globe.

Simply proposing price controls at the beginning of the debate spurred a foreshadowing of the deepening crisis ahead. Due to a series of White House leaks a year ago that a breakthrough drug price review board was being considered for the Clinton plan, biotech stocks plummeted by 40% between January and March of 1993 without subsequent recover, and all of its available capital nearly dried up overnight. As a result, initial public offerings in 1993 dropped from \$175 million in January to zero in February, making them impossible to sell, the curtain is lowering on many future projects due to a lack of faith in the flow

of funds. If this trend continues, biotech may crumble as an industry regardless of what the final reform plan looks like.

The complicated nature of market forces are not easy to grasp in a political context. President and Mrs. Clinton's drug company-bashing has further clouded the issue. People with AIDS have reasonable fears of diminished access to treatments, and we all share their fears. But by discouraging the incentive to develop new treatments and reduce prices through competition, those fears will be horribly realized. New drugs

will not appear, monopolies will be prolonged, and the quality of treatments will flatten out.

The whole idea of price controls over breakthrough drugs is antithetical to common sense. In this society, when a killer is loose among us we put a high price on his head, putting maximum pressure on people to come forward quickly with information that will lead to his arrest. There is no greater killer loose in America than AIDS. Biotech offers the greatest bounty we can hope for.

Had price controls been in effect during the 1980's, the first AIDS treatment (AZT) would have taken longer to become available if there been any interest to invest in it at all. Even if AZT had arrived under a price control regime. there certainly would never have been a ddl or ddC, and the only source of capital available for a vaccine or cure would have been in the hands of politicians. The 1993 Berlin conference on AIDS gave poor marks to the available treatments for AIDS and was gloomy on the prospects of successful new treatments in the short term. Introduce price controls now and you can kiss an AIDS cure goodbye.

But the impact on venture capital isn't all that is wrong with the price control mechanism in the Clinton plan. If passed, the plan will establish an advisory council of 13 appointees who will advise the Secretary of Health and Human Services on the "reasonableness" of the prices of all "breakthrough drugs" submitted for FDA approval, such as new treatments for AIDS. It will have no established criteria for these judgments, and could arguably make decisions based on political choices, rather than scientific or economic data. A politicized panel could choose not to prioritize

breakthrough drugs that will benefit politically unpopular groups — like the Gay and Lesbian community.

Furthermore, the price review board would mandate that the prices it sets be the established price for drugs financed through Medicare, and the drug companies will be required to pay the difference between the retail and wholesale prices (or 17% of the retail, whichever is higher) back to the government for each pill sold. Otherwise, the drugs will be excluded from Medicare by order of the Secretary of HHS and blacklisted by the government. As much as 40% of all AIDS patients currently depend on Medicare.

Simply put, the price review board will add on bureaucratic layers, increase the cost of drug development, and stonewall the availability of some drugs in favor of others based on squabbles over pricing or politics. This adds up to continued suffering and death for the most desperate of all terminally ill

people.

Past examples of free market victories in the fight against deadly illnesses should inform our decisions on price controls. Int he 1980's, when the government and other drug companies saw too high a risk in funding research on Gaucher's disease — an inherited

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
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disorder within a small population which causes fatal bone and organ deterioration over an agonizing period — a biotech company called Genzyme developed Ceredese, the first Gaucher's treatment. Not only did their high-risk research bring relief to desperate patients, it also created a market for other companies to aggressively compete in. There could be four or five new drugs on the market, each more innovative than the other, within the next four years.

While many other Gay and AIDS advocacy organizations have put a premium on total support for the Clinton plan, there has been no discussion on the importance of the relationship

between biotech's survival and finding a cure as quickly as possible. We must be unafraid to challenge President Clinton, particularly since he and Mrs. Clinton have invited debate. We must exert our full pressure to oppose price controls. The loss of biotech and the decline of competition in drug development could indefinitely postpone what we need most — a cure.

Will Gay and Lesbian Organizers Be Sued Under RICO?

Could organizers of boycotts against states or cities that pass anti-Gay initiatives be sued under RICO? No. Could those who "sip-in" at Cracker Barrel Restaurants? Unlikely. What if members of ACT-UP sat in at a drug company to force it to give away AIDS medications to indigents? Depends. These are the conclusions to be drawn from NOW v Scheidler, The Supreme Court's most recent expansion of RICO.

The RICO (Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations) law was passed in 1970 as part of the Organized Crime Control Act. It prohibits anyone associated with an "enterprise" that engages in or affects interstate commerce from conducting enterprise in a pattern of racketeering activity. That means that anyone who carries out an enterprise's affairs by committing at least two of the felonies listed in the RICO statute is a racketeer. Only certain felonies, however, make a person a racketeer. These include actual or threatened murder, kidnapping. robbery, arson, extortion, dealing in obscene matter, bribery, gambling, and dealing in narcotics, as well as violations of various other criminal laws pertaining to financial and credit accounts, fraud, pension funds, obstruction of justice, and certain interstate theft.

RICO whose allows those businesses or property has been damaged by racketeering to sue the racketeers. If a business wins a RICO lawsuit, it gets a judgment for treble damages, costs, and attorney's fees. (In most non-RICO civil lawsuits, a business cannot recover treble damages or attorney's fees.) The court also can order the racketeering defendants to divest themselves of any interest in the enterprise and prohibit them from engaging in the same type of activity in It also can order the the future. enterprise to dissolve or reorganize Thus, businesses injured by racketeering activity can take matters into their own hands, without depending on prosecutors to file criminal charges (which may not always happen in politically charged conflicts such as abortion), and can file civil suits against racketeers. A business can use the treble damages and attorney's fees provisions of RICO to wipe out their opponents financially.

By ruling in NOW's favor, the Supreme Court made the RICO statute a heavy club that can be wielded by businesses against political protestors. Before the NOW v Scheidler decision, it was not clear if RICO applied to enterprises that did not have an economic profit-making motive. The Supreme Court ruled unanimously that the term "enterprise" was not limited to profit-making organizations, but included social or political "enterprises." RICO can now be used by some businesses that are harmed by political protestors.

Organizers of boycotts designed to change anti-Gay laws are, however, safe from a RICO suit, even though such boycotts may cause millions of dollars of business loss.

Other nonviolent direct actions intended to change anti-Gay laws probably also are safe from a RICO suit. This is both because RICO requires certain serious criminal activity that harms businesses or property to occur before there is any liability, and because there are First Amendment protections for nonviolent actions that are designed to change government policies. The Supreme Court held in a 1982 non-RICO decision (NAACP v Claiborne) that those engaging in nonviolent business boycotts that are aimed at changing government policy are protected by the First Amendment from suit by merchants injured by boycotts. (Merchants can, however, sue those who cause losses by violent activity.)

Those who "sip-in" at Cracker Barrel likewise are safe from a RICO suit, even though the Cracker Barrel protestors are not targeting government policy but instead the policy of a private corporation, so long as none of the crimes listed in the RICO statute are committed. Thus, even those "sipper-inners" convicted of trespass could not be sued under RICO since trespass is not a racketeering activity under RICO.

Nonviolent ACT-UP sit-ins at a drug company demanding that it give away AIDS medications to indigent PWAs also should not trigger RICO liability. If, however, ACT-UP demonstrators used or threatened force, violence, or fear to extort the company to give away its property (i.e. the drugs), they would be risking a RICO suit alleging that they were engaging in extortion. Whether demonstrators used or threatened "fear" would be in the eyes of the beholder—homophobia or AIDS-phobia could very well bias the court's decision as to whether demonstrators used or threatened "fear."

While RICO suits against political protestors will be hard to win, there is a risk that protestors' fear of a possible successful RICO suit and the ensuing treble damages and attorney's fees will have a "chilling effect" on nonviolent protest activities. Even an unsuccessful RICO lawsuit can end up costing political organizers tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars in costs and attorney's fees. While a court might order

a losing plaintiff to pay the defendants for their attorney's fees in defending against the RICO suit, courts generally do not order losing plaintiffs to pay defendants their attorney's fees unless they find the suit to be "frivolous." Moreover, even those defendants who win RICO suits might be found liable on other types of claims, depending on what their political actions were.

Thus, while it certainly is nice to see those people who have been terrorizing abortion providers being defendants in a suit that could wipe them out financially, has the NOW decision made the RICO statute too powerful a weapon against legitimate protest?

Heather Bishop's Performance Warm and Welcoming

Reviewed by Muriel Hogan - As Milwaukee Kenwood Methodist Church filled up with (mostly) women, everybody squirmed pleasantly

in their seats, waiting for Heather Bishop as though she was their favorite aunt. Bishop's skills aren't just musical: she has an uncanny gift for making an audience feel welcomed and embraced.

Bishop, a singer/songwriter from Manitoba, has toured North America for more than 20 years, and has been out as a Lesbian from the beginning. Bishop's well loved on the women's music scene, but she's also won hearts at folk festivals, with symphony orchestras, and at the community centers in tiny Canadian outposts.

From the first song onward, you could tell that you were in professional hands. Bishop's poise and presence fill the room. Her guitar playing is a pleasure, too, amplified acoustic with a few understated pedal effects.

But you hardly notice the guitar once you hear her powerful voice. She's an accomplished singer who'll apparently try anything, and she serves an extravagant feast of different styles: folk, blues, pop, and rock. Each is a knockout performance!

Let Them Talk is her version of a slow dance from the Fifties. Did Little Willie John really write a song about Lesbians? Probably not, but Bishop's delivery can convince you that it's just possible.

Sleekly mysterious in a minor key, The Queen of the Night is her wellcrafted song about the cat whom nobody has ever seen. What a pleasure to hear a serious writer of pop!

Bishop complimented Wisconsin songwriters Peter and Lou Barryman. singing their existential waltz: "Pretty soon it could all end with a boom/ Why am I painting the living room?

Classic rockabilly provides the form for Bishop's song about winter driving: "You gotta pull it up/ Back it up/ Pull it up/ Back it up/ You gotta rock that sucker if you wanna get home tonight!"

Right up to date. Bishop has written the Co-Dependent Love Song, a title provided Kate Clinton. "If only I could read your mind/ I'd know how I feel," goes the plaintive C&W tune. She asks. "If you leave me, darlin'/ Can't I come

And she had the crowd roaring with her account of Anne Murray meeting kd lang at the Canadian Country Music Awards. Bishop claims to be a big Anne Murray fan, but asks, "Who dresses her?" Criticizing Murray's spike heels, she said, "Only fags know how to wear those things, and they Practice!"

Delightfully, Bishop lacks some marks of the professional touring musician; the dull eyes and boredom that come from burnout on the road.

In her Milwaukee performance, Bishop spent not one single minute on automatic pilot. She was better than "fresh." This woman was alive!



Milwaukee Lesbians Participate In Hawaiian Wedding

On February 20th on the north coast of Oahu, the sun was pouring onto the mountains, the air was fresh with warm ocean breeze, and the women wore brightly colored cloth. Earlier that morning there had been a rainbow over the clear blue water as the women floated. It was our marrying day.

The campground with its cabins and courtyard and beachfront had been transformed into a home for two hundred Lesbians attending the first Hawaiian Women's Music Festival. On Sunday morning, the last day of the Festival, fifty of those stood to witness six Lesbian couples marry. Although Hawaiian legislation had not progressed to the point where we could apply for state marriage licenses, Ena Crilly, Universal Life Church minister and Hawaiian resident, performed a moving ceremony uniting each of the couples.

Ena's introductory words described marriage as a "lifelong consecration to the ideal of loving kindness, backed with the will to make it last," and as "the construction of the love and trust between two human beings into a single

growing energy of spiritual life." She told us that there is no earthly happiness that exceeds it. Pat and I, as the first couple to be joined, then stepped forward.

Pat thanked the witnesses and asked them to create a vibration for us while we performed our vows, a hum or anything else they wanted to do to bless us. I invoked the ancestors, guardians,

guides, angels, and power animals. I invoked all the women who may have wanted to marry but never had this opportunity and told them we would enact it for them. I thanked Pele, Goddess of Hawaii's volcanoes, for the fire of Love.

The Politics Behind The Hawaiian Wedding

This was the first in what will, no doubt, become a bridal wave of Gay marriages in the Islands. We ourselves will return to renew our vows as soon as favorable legislation

affords us legal sanction.

On May 5, 1993, the Hawaiian Supreme Court ruled that barring same-sex marriages was a form of gender discrimination in violation of the state's constitution. Its decision stipulated that the state must find "compelling state interests" to ban marriages between people of the same gender, sending the case back to a trial court. Many legal scholars on both sides of the issue agree that the condition of compelling state interests does not exist in Hawaii — there are, for example, no sodomy statutes on the books. The next court date is set for April 1995. Once a decision is reached, the state cannot appeal its case before the U.S. Supreme Court because in Hawaii, the state supreme court has the ultimate jurisdiction.

Meanwhile, the Hawaiian State House of Representatives recently passed a bill to ban such marriages on the grounds of the state's interest in procreation. However, since Hawaiian laws do not specify that marriage is for the sake of procreation, the State Senate wisely tabled it indefinitely.

Now the Hawaiian Senate is considering a bill to limit marriage to male-female couples, while allowing any resident couple to form a legal "domestic partnership." A domestic partnership bill would not use the word marriage and would be recognized only in Hawaii. The question is whether such a sidestep would satisfy the Supreme Court. The Senate author believes passage of a domestic partnership law would make the case before the Supreme Court moot. Some supporters of same-sex marriage have said that a "separate but equal"

domestic partnership arrangement would be no more acceptable than "separate but equal" public schools were to African Americans in the South.

The other possible derailment of the Supreme Court's intent would require a constitutional amendment, enacted either through a constitutional convention, or by a two-thirds vote of the legislature with ratification by popular vote, both highly unlikely.

Whatever happens, it will probably happen in Hawaii first. As Out Magazine recently reported: Hawaii has played a pivotal role in progressive national American politics over the past 25 years. Hawaii was the first state to legalize abortion, in 1970. It was the first to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment, in 1972; and the fifth to offer employment protection for Lesbians and Gay men, in 1991. In Hawaii, it is the homophobes who are in the closet. And Hawaii has been a model for universal health care, which is by law provided by all employers. It is a state with a strong Democratic Party; a state with virtually no Republican Party, let alone a religious Right; a state with a rapidly growing sovereignty movement rebelling against the U.S. Government. Perhaps most significantly Hawaii has no majority, just a dozen or so minorities — whites included.

While this explains why and how it may happen, many of us have a question that is more fundamental: Do we want to work for an institution that has been used to limit women the way marriage has? A very practical part of the answer is that many of us, including my partner and me, desperately need the option of family health insurance coverage. (We have been struck by the irony that while a person does not have the legal right to marry a person of the same sex, she does have the right to change her sex.) My partner's answer is that she does not wish her happiness to be tolerated — she asks loud and clear that it be celebrated, in the sanctioned social ritual afforded other human beings for the joining. In order to transform the notion of marriage and family entirely, we require the freedom to choose it.

Do you take this woman to be your loving wedded spouse to love and to cherish, to continually bestow upon her your heart's deepest devotion?

I do.

Repeat after me: You are consecrated to me now from this day forward, to love and to cherish, to have and to hold, for richer or poorer, for better for worse, in sickness and in health, in sadness and in joy, to share together as long as we both shall live.

May these rings be blessed as a symbol of affection and unity. These two lives are now joined in one unbroken circle. Wherever they go, may they always return to one another in their togetherness. May these two find in each other the love for which all people yearn. May they grow in understanding, and in compassion. May the homes which they establish together be such a place of sanctuary that many will find there a friend. May these tokens symbolize the touch of the spirit of Love in their hearts.

Inasmuch as these two have consented together in marriage before this company and have pledged their faith and declared their unity, and are now joined in mutual esteem and devotion, I now pronounce them Lifelong Intimate Witness. Aloha.


Ena then led us all in a processional to the oceanside singing a chant to Yemaya. The five other couples were joined there on the beach, and each chose what they wanted to be called as a couple. We named ourselves variously as sacred companion, partner, wedded love of my life, playmate/ lover/ friend,

married Lesbian, united in life together, lifelong intimate witness, and loving wedded spouse. At the close of the joining, Ena encouraged us to perform the Hawaiian Noserub Tradition of marriage while she read from Gibran:

"True love gives nothing but itself and takes nothing but itself. Love does not possess, nor would it be possessed. For love is sufficient unto love. Love has no other desire than to fulfill itself. To awake at dawn with a winged heart, and give thanks for another day of loving, to rest at noon and meditate love's ecstasy, to return home at eventide, and then to sleep with a prayer for the Beloved in

your heart and a song of praise upon your lips. Go now to your dwelling place to enter into your days of togetherness. And may your days be good and long upon the earth." Blessed Be. Aho.

After kisses and hugs all around and lots of general raucous Lesbian hoopla, couples drifted along the edge of the beautiful clear blue water and spontaneously sang together Yogananda's song: "Listen listen listen to my heart's song/ I will never forget you I will never forsake you..." Before long all the brightly colored garments were left on the beach and the ocean opened its arms to us on the day of our marrying.

Melissa Etheridge

"Yes I Am" Tour Lands in Milwaukee April 24

She's a rocker with grace and a woman filled with passion. She has shared the stage with Sting and k.d., and has been compared to rock legends Janis Joplin and Bruce Springsteen. Yet, on disc she is incomparable, and according to the critics reviews of her electrifying concerts, she can certainly hold her own. She is 32-year-old singer-songwriter Melissa Etheridge.

On April 24, Etheridge will be performing at the Eagle's Club in Milwaukee. For those of you unfortunate LesBiGay's, myselfincluded, who grew up without experiencing Etheridge's music and energy, all I can say is: I'm glad she came out when she

Melissa Etheridge was born in Leavenworth, Kansas, and received her first guitar at the age of eight. Etheridge's father introduced her to the songs of Simon and Garfunkel and Neil Diamond, while her older sister got her hooked on hard rock. By the time she was ten, Etheridge began writing music, and her first tune was entitled. Don't Let It Fly Away (It's Love). From the very beginning, performing was in Etheridge's blood; and as a teenager, she began playing in bars and clubs. At 18, she left behind the bars and clubs of Leavenworth for the coffeehouses in Boston, while she studied guitar at the Berklee College of Music.

In 1982, Etheridge moved to L.A. and found herself playing in bars and clubs once again, only this time, it was her brand of heartland rock being played in women's bars. For the next six years, her crowd was the lesbian community she played for at the bars, and at the women's music festivals in Northern California and in the South. Etheridge did a whole tour on her own where she just played women's bars all the way across America, before she was signed "on the spot" in a Long Beach bar by Island Records' founder Chris

Blackwell.

Since then, her career has grown steadily upward beginning with her 1988 self-titled debut, Melissa Etheridge. Brave and Crazy followed in 1989, and in 1993, the single, Ain't It Heavy, from her 1992 disc, Never Enough, earned her a Grammy for Best Female Rock

Performance.

Etheridge's personal life has been on an upward spiral as well. Soon after her first album hit, she met Julie Cypher, her partner of five years. Julie, who is a feature film director, was a production assistant on Etheridge's first video shoot, and Etheridge is writing two songs for Cypher's feature film debut, Teresa's Tattoo.

Etheridge, who has always been out to friends, family, and business colleagues, came out in a highly public way at the Triangle Inaugural Ball in Washington last December. She also performed at the March on Washington for Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Rights, and was recently named a Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) award winner as Outstanding Recording Artist.

Yes I Am, her fourth gold album, is her frank answer now to questions about her sexuality. Yet Etheridge insists that "she has no plans to change her style of songwriting and performing. It is important to her to have her music "as accessible and reachable for all

types of sexuality." CONSTANT READER BOOKSHOP, LTD.

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Personally, growing up with the sounds of tex-mex, salsa, and disco did not leave much room for rock or women's music. So, it wasn't until now that I'd even heard of Etheridge (Well, slap my wrist!). I recently had a chance to listen to her latest release, Yes I Am, and I must say she has captivated me the way she has so many of her hard core Lesbian fans: with a voice as deep as the heartland she comes from, and lyrics as emotional as the love she writes of

Hey Mom, Guess What! is a wonderful primer for anyone experiencing the anxiety of coming out to one's parents as well as a delightful read for both Lesbians and Gay men seeking to reflect on their own experiences. Highly recommended.

The many fans of Eric Orner's first collection of cartoons, The Mostly Unfabulous Social Life of Ethan Green are in for a treat with his second book, The Seven Deadly Sins of Love. To those uninitiated with Orner's unique, quirky perspective on Gay life, his wonderfully eccentric cast of characters include the socially-challenged Ethan Green, his cynical cat Lucy, drag divas, the Hat Sisters and many others. Bypassing the larger panorama of Gay life, Orner focuses in on the routine occurrences of daily life with hilarious results.

Occasionally a topical issue will catch Orner's attention, including a particularly memorable Milwaukee episode, when the Hat Sisters, suitably dressed in Germanic garb seek to persuade Milwaukee's mayor from canceling the Gay Pride Parade. Yet undoubtedly, the highlights of this

collection are Orner's Seven Deadly Sins of Love, Love's seemingly inevitable pitfalls that are obvious as they would appear to be unavoidable. Delightful and wonderfully positive, The Seven Deadly Sins of Love... are not to be missed.

Of tremendous interest, equally to Lesbians and Gay men are the cartoons of Andrea Natalie. The latest volume of her Stonewall Riots Collection, Rubyfruit Mountain again contains Natalie's unique, sweetly cynical portrayal of Lesbian and Gay experience in the 1990's. The range of Natalie's subjects is truly remarkable ranging from Sesame Street's Bert & Ernie, Jesse Helms, and Divine to an absolutely hysterical panel featuring "Dykes So Politically Correct They Can't Move." Always cleverly drawn, Natalie's cartoons invariably feature not only a sharp eye but also an irresistible urge to deflate the pompous and the pretentious in both Gay and straight life.


King's 1994-95 Miss Gav Wisconsin-USA finals have been scheduled for September 10-11 in

They had placed their bet in cash, got a great price, locked up tight whenever they left the room. And waited for recovery.

Finally, recently, their friends had stopped scoffing. The bars came down. Fresh stucco in key lime colors won out over dinge. And the city moved to enhance the seaside walkway by widening the beach park across their

street, protecting their property value, and their view, from marauding high-

I only mention it at all to give you an idea of the kind of savvy company we are in here. It was true of the whole room. Most were part-timers, dividing their years into South Florida winters, and Long Island summers, shifting Gay bases before the weather ever caught up to them.





The chief sponsor of the resolution was Supervisor Elizabeth Coggs-Jones. She was joined in supporting the measure by Sheila Aldrich, Anthony



Registration for Gay Games Extended to April 18

New York, NY — The organizers of Gay Games IV & Cultural Festival have announced that the deadline for athlete registration has been extended to April 18 in sports with available spaces remaining. The \$50 late registration fee has been waived as well.

Gay Games IV & Cultural Festival, to be held June 18-25 in and around New York City is expected to draw more athletes than participated in the 1992 Summer Olympics. Gay Games IV competition will be held in 31 individual sports from aerobics, badminton and basketball to bowling, cycling, golf, ice hockey and judo to martial arts, powerlifting, soccer and squash, to table tennis, track and field, triathlon, water polo and wrestling.

Due to an overwhelming response in registration, several sports have already reached or approached capacity. Tennis, which is being contested at the United States Tennis Association's National Tennis Center in Flushing Meadows, site of the US Open, was the first sport to hit capacity, with over 600 registrants. Swimming, volleyball, squash, martial arts and badminton are close to maximum participation numbers, but are still accepting athletes.

As of March 17, 8,500 participants had signed up for athletic events. Registrations have come in from over 31 countries, including the Czech Republic, Ghana, Malaysia and Peru. Attorney General Janet Reno has signed a special waiver order allowing Gay Games participants outside the US who may have HIV or AIDS to visit the US for a ten day period. There should be no problems getting through at the borders.

"Our registration numbers have been fantastic so far," said Roz Quarto, Director of Operations for Gay Games IV. "But with the extension of the deadline and the removal of the late fee we're making our event accessible to many more athletes."
