

Madison Lesbian Charged in Murder of Her Lover's Best Friend

Jealousy Possible Motive

Madison — The Dane County Sheriff's Department has arrested on first degree intentional homicide charges, a woman authorities say killed her lover's best friend out of jealousy. Dane County Sheriff Rick Raemisch announced the arrest of Penny Brummer April 13.

Brummer pleaded not guilty at her April 15 arraignment. Court Commissioner David A. Flesch ordered cash bond in the amount of \$175,000 and restricted Brummer from contact with any witnesses in the case. Brummer also can not carry a firearm, or travel outside of Dane and Sauk Counties. A preliminary hearing has

been scheduled for April 21 before Judge Patrick Fiedler in Branch 8.

The victim, Sarah Gonstead, disappeared on March 14. On April 10, her body was discovered in a wooded area near Cross Plains. She was killed by a single gunshot wound to the back of the head. Authorities did not know if she was killed at the site, or if her body was dumped there after her death.

According to Sheriff Raemisch, Brummer was jealous of a romantic or sexual relationship she suspected between Gonstead and Glenda Johnson, who had been Brummer's lover for the last seven months. Although Johnson and Gonstead had known each other since second grade, a spokesperson for the Sheriff's office said that there was no indication that they were romantically involved.

Previous police reports had stated that Gonstead and Brummer had been

out barhopping the night of Gonstead's disappearance, to celebrate Gonstead's 21st birthday. In the course of investigating the disappearance, Brummer told police that she had dropped Gonstead off at a Taco Bell parking lot on Madison's east side so Gonstead could walk to Johnson's house. This story led to fears of a killer stalking the east side neighborhood.

Brummer, 24, is described as living part of the time in Spring Green and part time in Madison. She grew up in Spring Green, a town of about 1,000 people, just west of Madison. She was a star of her high school softball team and graduated in 1987. She is an honorably discharged Air Force veteran who married a man while in the service. They are now separated and he lives in California.

UW-Stout Student Recants Claims of Lesbian-Bashings

Campus Community and 10% Society "Stunned" and "Angry"

Menomonie — Amber Withrow, the 19-year old student at UW- Stout who claimed she was the victim of homophobic attackers last October and again in February, has signed a statement retracting all of her previous reports to police authorities.

The UW-Stout campus community, especially members of the 10% Society, the school's LesBiGay group, are "stunned" and "angry" with the turn of events. Both students and administrators had come to Withrow's defense, a reward fund had been established to find the perpetrators, round table discussions were held to discourage intolerance and a March for Diversity was held last November.

"A lot of people feel really hurt and really angry and feel like they've been taken for a ride."

"A lot of people on this campus and in this town went out on a limb for her, giving her support," 10% Society member Susie Rodger said of Withrow. "A lot of people feel really hurt and really angry and feel like they've been taken for a ride."

"We were frankly shocked because we believed her all along," Dennis Shaw, chief of campus Security told the Eau Claire Leader-Telegram.

Withrow herself had spoken out in several classes and campus forums about the alleged incidents. Only a week before her recantation, she had attended a conference of university student governments in Chicago where she talked about the attacks against her.

On March 31, Withrow signed a statement formally retracting reports she had previously made to the Menomonie Police Department, Security and Police Operations at UW-Stout and the school's Affirmative Action Office about the alleged attacks.

Withrow had claimed she was attacked by as many as four people last October 19 as she walked to her car in a parking lot on campus. She said at the time the assailants had shouted anti-Gay slurs as they beat her. She claimed to have sustained a concussion, a fractured cheek and a dislocated shoulder in the attack.

Then, on February 3, Withrow reported that she was attacked while in her dorm room at Tustison Hall. She said the male assailant punched her several times and made reference to the earlier attack. She provided police with a description of the suspect which was

converted into a sketch that was widely distributed.

INCONSISTENCIES EMERGE

Campus police, who by all accounts had aggressively followed all potential leads in the assaults, grew suspicious of inconsistencies in Withrow's stories in March. When they checked the hospital report from Withrow's visit after the October attack, it made no reference to the serious injuries she claimed to have sustained, just bruises and minor abrasions. They also discovered that at the time of the alleged incident in February, Withrow was not in her dorm room but was seen elsewhere in a cafeteria on campus.

Confronted with these inconsistencies, Withrow agreed to sign the statement disavowing her earlier reports. She has not offered any explanation for the deception and has refused to talk to the media. In her retraction, Withrow agreed to desist from discussing any of the alleged incidents any further. (Since the October incident, In Step has repeatedly phoned Withrow, but she has failed to return calls.)

In exchange for the retraction, UW-Stout Security and the Dunn County District Attorney agreed not to press criminal charges against Withrow for the false reports. An obstruction of justice conviction could have cost Withrow a \$10,000 fine and up to nine months in prison.

Withrow agreed to leave the

UW-Stout campus immediately, although she will be allowed to finish her courses for this semester from off-campus. She is expected to inform UW-Stout Security if she visits the campus because there continue to be concerns about her safety, especially in light of the anger many people feel toward her now. Withrow was also encouraged to seek counseling.

UW-Stout Chancellor Charles Sorenson seemed to breathe a sign of relief. He told the Leader-Telegram: "I'm very pleased we could free the name of the university. I felt we'd taken a real black eye with this thing. We're not interested in retribution. We're interested in setting the record straight and helping her get on with her life."

The university also released a statement that said: "As a result of these allegations, numerous events and much discussion have centered on the need to support cultural diversity and to decry intolerance. The university will continue to speak out on this issue and to recognize that while the alleged incidents did not occur, there is still much to be done to promote tolerance in an increasingly diverse society."

10% SOCIETY MOVES ON

The Ten Percent Society, which had supported Withrow through her alleged victimization, issued this statement: "Amber is our sister and, in as much as she was part of the 10% Society as well as a student at Stout, we hope that whatever personal turmoil or problems that caused her to do these things can be resolved."

"This news, although a surprise and certainly not the kind of resolution to this situation which we had anticipated, it is simply not going to derail our efforts. At the beginning of this semester we resolved not to focus exclusively on violence. This group is moving forward with an agenda of important initiatives."

The 10% Society will participate in a March for Human Rights on campus April 27 and will be involved in the Diversity Festival set for April 29-30. Members continue to meet with administrators to discuss ways of improving the campus climate for Gays and Lesbians. The 10% Society also serves as a resource and support group for Gays and Lesbians on campus and holds regular meetings.

Despite the frustration and disappointment with Withrow's turnaround, Susie Rodger told In Step: "A lot of good things have come out of it. We have a closer relationship with campus police and administrators. We've connected with Tammy Baldwin's statewide network [the Statewide Advocacy Network], with the UW campus network and the Gay newspapers."

Conservatives Gain In Dane County Elections

Out Gay Representation on Board Drops

Madison — The conservative side gained and openly Gay representation dropped sharply after the April 5 elections for the Dane County Board. Conservatives won 22 of 39 seats, increasing their majority by one. At the same time, the retirement of two openly Gay Supervisors and the election loss of one openly Lesbian candidate caused the number of openly Gay supervisors to fall from three to one.

Mark Pocan handily won his race in District 4 by a more than two- to- one margin over his opponent, Daniel Jason Stevens. Pocan was the only openly Gay incumbent standing for re-election.

Openly Lesbian attorney Cathreen Godre lost in her bid for the District 6 seat of retiring Board Chairman Richard Wagner, who is also openly Gay, by a 400 vote gap. Godre's campaign was dogged in its closing weeks by controversy over rumors that she was employing a paid staff person. Godre was endorsed by the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, a national group that raises money for openly Lesbian and Gay candidates, and rumors also arose regarding the amount of money the Victory Fund was funneling to Godre's campaign. Overall, Godre raised over \$10,000 from various sources.

Many of the Board races focused on such issues as land use, greenspace and fiscal policy. With the exception of the Victory Fund rumors, sexual orientation as an issue was largely absent from the various campaigns. While Dane County already has laws protecting the civil rights of LesBiGay residents, the conservative makeup of the board would probably make it difficult to pass new initiatives dealing with domestic partnership or AIDS issues.

At the Dane County Board meeting following the election, Board members

praised retiring Chairman Wagner. Among those paying tribute was State Representative Tammy Baldwin, who retired from the Board to devote her full attention to her state position. Baldwin spoke of the example Wagner set as an openly Gay politician for her. "When I was first coming out, I thought I would have to choose between living openly as a Lesbian and pursuing a political career," she said. Wagner, she added, demonstrated that the two are not mutually exclusive.

Statewide Network Holds 'General Congress' April 23

Madison — The Statewide Advocacy Network which has been meeting for the last few months to forge a strong network of Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals in Wisconsin, will hold its next meeting, a General Congress, on Saturday, April 23 at 2pm in the North Hearing Room of the State Capitol.

The Network plans to create a visible and effective voice for the state's LesBiGay community to support pro-Gay legislation and to guard against right wing attacks on Gay rights. State Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison), Wisconsin's first openly Lesbian elected official, chairs the group.

On the agenda for the 23rd is the choice of a permanent name for the network and a decision on the priorities of the group in its early stages. Committees will report on their progress in such areas as fundraising, education and outreach, resource assessment and

communications. What response the network might make to the anti-Gay ballot initiatives currently threatening other states and the imminent decision regarding Gay marriage in Hawaii will also be discussed.

Past meetings have drawn Gays and Lesbians from Superior, River Falls, Menomonie, Whitewater, Racine, Stevens Point, Fond du Lac, La Crosse, Janesville and Wausau, as well as from Madison and Milwaukee. Each meeting has been an important networking experience for participants.

Surgeon General Under Attack for Pro- Gay Views

Catholic Cardinal Opposes Elders; Gays Show Support

Washington, DC — Cardinal James Hickey of the Washington, DC Catholic Archdiocese has called on President Clinton to "disavow" the "harmful and offensive remarks" recently made by Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders in an interview with the Gay/Lesbian magazine The Advocate.

President Clinton had no immediate response to Hickey's request. But about 20 members of ACT UP/Washington, DC protested against Hickey outside the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on Easter Sunday. They did not interrupt the church service but were jostled themselves by several anti- Gay protesters. ACT UP members carried signs saying "Jesus taught love, not hate," while opponents held signs saying "Turn straight, turn right" and "Long Live the Pope."

In the Advocate interview, Dr. Elders expressed support for Gay and Lesbian relationships and said that Gays ought to be able to adopt and to care for their own children. She criticized the Boy Scouts' ban on Gays and said the government should do a better job of targeting AIDS prevention information to young Gay men and in preventing Gay and Lesbian teen suicide. Elders also berated conservatives for wanting "to keep all sexuality in the closet."

"Fear of sexuality" is what motivates anti-Gay attitudes, Elders told the Advocate. "We have to be more open about sex and we need to speak out to tell people that sex is good, sex is wonderful. It's a normal part and healthy part of our being, whether it is homosexual or heterosexual.

"There are certain times and places where sex is inappropriate," said Elders, "but just because it is inappropriate at certain times does not mean that it's bad. I think the religious right at times thinks that the only reason for sex is procreation. Well, I feel that God meant sex for more than procreation. Sex is about pleasure as well as responsibility."

Elders said that Americans must "learn that Gay people are not just out there wanting to have sex with anybody who walks down the street and that Gay people have real loving, lasting relationships and families."

GAY ADOPTIONS OKAY

"I feel that good parents are good parents — regardless of their sexual orientation," said the Surgeon General. "It's clear that the sexual orientation of parents has nothing to do with the sexual orientation or outlook of their children.

"Many children in this society are

born unwanted, and I feel that if Gay or Lesbian couples feel that they want children enough to adopt, well, then they are probably just as capable of being good parents as heterosexual parents who choose to adopt. Gays and Lesbians are not going to choose to adopt or have their own children unless they really want children. They are making a conscious choice. We have too many parents who did not choose, nor did they want, to be parents."

Cardinal Hickey seemed particularly incensed by Dr. Elders' liberal views of alternative families. He attacked her support of adoption by "so-called

homosexual couples."

His letter to Clinton said: "The comments of Surgeon General Elders are destructive of a true understanding of family life. It is one thing to defend the human rights of homosexual men and women; it is quite another to encourage, as she does, a lifestyle which puts so-called homosexual unions on a par with marriage and family and condones homosexual behavior among young people."

That last comment apparently referred to Elders' advocacy of providing safe sex information to Gay youth.

Steve Michael of ACT UP/DC said: "The results of the Cardinal's ignorant and intolerant remarks will be wasted human lives, especially among young people who need information and support, not condemnation. We also see the Cardinal's involvement in these issues as a violation of the church's tax-exempt status, under which religions are not to lobby the government in matters of politics and legislation."

"We praise Dr. Elders' efforts and invite the President to support her statements and actions. ACT UP is also dismayed at the efforts of Democratic National Committee Chairman David Wilhelm to distance the party from Dr. Elders' statements. Dr. Elders is rare among Clinton appointees as someone willing to speak the truth."

DIGNITY LENDS SUPPORT

Support for Dr. Elders also came from the capital's chapter of Dignity, a group of Gay and Lesbian Roman Catholics. Dignity sent a letter to President Clinton signed by 170 members. It said, in part:

"Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders has been an outspoken advocate in the fight against AIDS and homophobia in this country, and Dignity/Washington would like to express to you our support

and thanks to her.

"As you know, the federal government has refused for many years to support frank and informative advertising campaigns mentioning condoms as a method of preventing the spread of HIV. Thanks in part to Dr.

Elders, steps have been taken to reverse this deadly policy.

"Some have criticized Dr. Elders for supporting adoption by Gay and Lesbian people. As a community with a number of Gay parents, including adoptive parents, we truly know that it is love that defines a family. We urge you to maintain your support for Dr. Joycelyn Elders."

In the Advocate interview, Dr. Elders was candid about her own ignorance about Gays and Lesbians: "I don't know enough about Gay and Lesbian issues. I'm trying to get educated as fast as I can."

She expressed concern about the high rate of Gay and Lesbian teen suicide, saying: "[W]hen we are talking about young people taking their own lives, that's the worst health threat we can possibly face...[W]e should make educators and counselors aware of the issue and make sure they know how to respond to the situation when it arises.


"I certainly see addressing Gay and Lesbian youth suicide as part of my mission. My job as Surgeon General is to talk about all the health issues that have an impact on Americans."

In a meeting with Lesbian health activists in January, Dr. Elders said she would encourage the Department of Health and Human Services to fund informational brochures about Lesbian health issues to educate and sensitize health care providers.

Elders concluded her interview with the Advocate by musing philosophically: "If you are truly right within your heart and within Christianity, you know in advance that you do not know enough about other people's lives to judge them... You have to wonder how much love that people who hate Gay people have in their hearts."

Dr. Elders was interviewed in the March 22, 1994 Advocate.

INTERNATIONAL News Briefs

Germany Repeals Paragraph 175, Infamous Sodomy Statute

Bonn — In March, Germany's Parliament, the Bundestag, repealed Paragraph 175, the infamous sodomy statute which played an important role in inspiring the world's very first Gay rights movement back in the 1800's. Paragraph 175 was also used by the Nazis to send tens of thousands of homosexuals to concentration camps.

The law was first adopted in 1871 during the period of the Second Reich under Kaiser Wilhelm. It prohibited sexual acts between men and mandated prison sentences of up to five years for those convicted. In 1897, a small group of German Gays and their progressive allies formed the Scientific Humanitarian Committee to research the causes of homosexuality and to lobby against the law. The Committee launched the first-ever petition campaign for Gay rights at the turn of the century.


When Hitler came to power, Paragraph 175 was expanded to include any same sex physical contact (kisses, hugs) and even sexual fantasies. Individuals could be convicted merely on the testimony of another person. The Nazis lengthened the prison sentence and used the law as a pretext to destroy the thriving Gay community which had emerged in Germany in the 1920's and

Tens of thousands of Gays were sent to concentration camps and, when the Allies liberated the camps in 1944-45, prisoners with the distinctive pink triangles were forced back behind the barbed wire to finish their remaining sentences. Homosexual prisoners were also denied any reparations from the post-war German government. No other group victimized by the Nazis was treated with such contempt.

Paragraph 175 was reformed in 1973 to apply only to adult men who had sex with boys under the age of 18. Repeal of Paragraph 175 has been the central demand of the modern Gay rights movement in Germany. With German unification in 1990, the governments of the West and East agreed to do away with the law within three years. On March 10, the Bundestag finally repealed 175 by a large majority. Legislators also reformed another statute, making the age of consent for sex consistent for men and women of all sexual orientations. The new age of consent for everyone in

Germany is now 16.



Arson at Gay Theater in London Kills 9

London — London police have arrested 34-year-old David Lauwers for an arson attack against a Gay adult movie theater February 26 which claimed the lives of nine theater patrons and injured another 20. Lauwers has been charged with nine counts of murder and two counts of attempted murder.

Lauwers gave himself up to police several days after the fire, which destroyed the Dream City theater. Lauwers allegedly poured gasoline into the building's letter box and then struck a match to ignite it. The resulting column of fire raged up a stairway into the theater inside. The only emergency exit was blocked, leading to the high death toll. Seven victims died from smoke inhalation, one from severe burns and one from jumping out of a window.

Police have not disclosed Lauwers' motivation.

Sydney's Gay Mardi Gras Biggest Event Ever Down Under

Sydney — The 17th annual Gay Mardi Gras Parade in Sydney March 3 drew more than a half million spectators, the largest gathering for any event in Australian history. The monthlong series of events which culminated in the colorful parade pumped more than \$28 million into the city's economy.

The colorful and sometimes raucous parade was led by a huge contingent of Dykes on Bikes followed by Spokes, a group of Gay men in G-strings riding on bicycles festooned with large pink balloons. Drag queens, leathermen and other elaborately costumed participants rode, pranced or walked alongside more than 100 different floats.

Ninety members of Australia's Parliament issued a statement condemning the parade, saying it was a bad influence on children, and Rev. Fred Nile, an anti-Gay crusader, held a small rally nearby to counter the parade. But Prime Minister Paul Keating and opposition party chief John Leader sent their greetings and support to parade organizers.

Also Around the World ...

Bogota — In March, the high court of Colombia ordered the country's military and police forces to end their bans on Gays and Lesbians, making Colombia the first country in South America to allow homosexuals to openly serve. Gay activists in Bogota were said to be astonished by the decision because hatred of Gays in Colombia is widespread, and paramilitary units have been accused of executing Gays.

Tokyo — On March 30, the District Court in Tokyo ruled that the city's Board of Education had discriminated against a Gay organization when it refused to allow members of the group, called Occur, to stay overnight at a city-run youth hostel. The Board argued that the group members might engage in sex at the hostel, but the court ruled the Gay youths' rights to free assembly and equal protection had been violated. The group won several thousand dollars in damages. Japanese Gays praised the ruling as an encouraging victory in a country that remains very homophobic.

Rome — The League for Sexual Rights, a Gay rights group in Italy, has filed a lawsuit charging Pope John Paul with defamation for calling homosexuality "deviant behavior" and saying that Gay and Lesbian unions are "a serious threat to the future of the family." The suit is unlikely to proceed because the Vatican is an independent fiefdom and the Pope has immunity from any of Italy's civil laws.

Ottawa — A Human Rights Commission has criticized the government of former Prime Minister Brian Mulroney for failing to protect the rights of women, Gays and Lesbians, native people and the disabled. The Liberal Party of current Prime Minister Jean Chretien is pledged to amend Canada's Human Rights Act to protect Gay rights, but Party leaders fear the votes do not yet exist for passage.

Wellington — The

Wellington—The government-funded Tourism Board of New Zealand has embarked on an advertising campaign encouraging Gays and Lesbians to visit the island nation. Data showing that Gay people have higher than average incomes and enjoy traveling spurred the campaign, which is meeting with some opposition from politicians. The first ads will be targeted to Gays and Lesbians in Australia.

Tokyo — A Japanese court has sentenced 19-year old Christopher Glidden, a US Marine, to 5 to 10 years in prison for the reckless homicide of Seiyo Yokota. Glidden struck Yokota with a concrete block after Yokota allegedly made a sexual pass at him. Glidden confessed to the crime, said he was drunk at the time, and claimed a rape he experienced at age 15 caused him to lash out at Yokota

Federal Court Bars Discharge of Service Members

New York, NY — In a ruling that Gay rights advocates found encouraging, a federal judge on April 4 approved a preliminary injunction preventing the Defense Department from discharging six openly Gay and Lesbian members of the military. The six active duty members had filed suit in March, challenging the constitutionality of the new "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" regulations of Congress and the Pentagon.

The new rules say that any service member who even speaks of their homosexuality is subject to discharge, and just days after filing suit, several of the plaintiffs were informed that discharge procedures were being initiated against them. Attorneys for the American Civil Liberties Union and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund immediately applied for the injunction to secure the plaintiffs retention in the armed services until all issues can be fully heard in court.

In granting the injunction, Judge Eugene Nickerson cast doubt on the Defense Department's policy. He said: "There is a serious question as to whether a regulation goes beyond what is reasonably necessary to protect any possible Government interest when it inhibits six service members from

continuing to speak in court to make a constitutional challenge."

The plaintiffs will argue that the Pentagon policy denies them their rights to free speech and association and the equal protection of the laws.

Debate Over Bathhouses Re-Ignites in San Francisco

San Francisco, CA — The announcement by two businessmen in March that they plan to open a new Gay bathhouse in San Francisco has re-ignited controversy about the role the establishments play in the spread of HIV. Rick Stokes and David Clayton, who own the Steamworks Bathhouse in Berkeley, have chosen a three story building on Turk Street for their new business.

But Mayor Frank Jordan immediately attacked the plan. "I will strongly oppose the opening of a bathhouse. After all, we have an AIDS epidemic," he said. While Jordan himself does not have authority to stop it, city agencies are already giving the businessmen a hard time in terms of obtaining necessary zoning changes and remodeling and business permits. In 1985, with the AIDS epidemic

In 1985, with the AIDS epidemic spiraling out of control, the city managed to obtain a temporary injunction closing the bathhouses. That legal authority was based on a complex mix of health, zoning and building code regulations.

Sentiment is still split within the Gay community, with some wanting the bathhouses to reopen and others

wanting them to remain closed. Numerous sex clubs are currently open in the city, but they differ from bathhouses in that sex is conducted in open, public areas where it can be more closely supervised. The new bathhouse would have private rooms in which sexual behavior is harder to monitor.

Dozens Arrested Protesting AIDS Cuts in New York

New York, NY — More than two dozen AIDS activists were arrested and carried away on stretchers after they attempted to block a corridor just outside Mayor Rudolph Giuliani's office in City Hall on April 12. The activists were protesting a proposal to drastically reduce the city's Division of AIDS Services.

Mayor Giuliani is under pressure to cut the city budget. But AIDS activists were incensed at the proposal to cut money from or eliminate altogether the Division of AIDS Services. The Division, whose current budget is \$22 million, helps people with HIV/AIDS connect to city services. The number of people served by the Division is now 16,000, but that number is expected to rise to 30,000 by 1997. Protesters argue the cuts would be illogical and inhumane.

The protesters grew more angry and entered City Hall after security guards refused to allow them to use the steps of City Hall for a press conference, a courtesy that has always been extended to protest groups in the past. Among those joining the protest were actresses Susan Sarandon and Rosie Perez.

Justice Blackmun Praised as Champion of Privacy

Washington, DC — When Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackmun announced his impending retirement April 6, Gay rights leaders praised his commitment to the right to privacy and his ringing dissent in the court's infamous sodomy ruling of 1986.

"Justice Blackmun's eloquence in the defense of the right to privacy extended beyond his landmark opinion in Roe v. Wade [the decisioon that legalized abortion] to his forceful dissent in Bowers v. Hardwick, in which the Supreme Court denied that a fundamental right to consensual sexual intimacy between two adults of the same sex exists," said Peri Jude Radecic of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

In his dissenting opinion in Bowers v. Hardwick, Blackmun wrote: "This case is about 'the most comprehensive of rights and the right most valued by civilized man,' namely, 'the right to be let

alone."

"Depriving individuals of the right to decide for themselves how to conduct their intimate relationships poses a far greater threat to the values most deeply rooted in our nation's history than tolerance of nonconformity could ever do. Because the Court today betrays those values, I dissent."

Radecic said: "It is important that President Clinton appoint a consensus-builder who is also able to carry on Justice Blackmun's legacy of defending the right to privacy."

Filmmaker Marlon Riggs Succumbs to AIDS

Oakland, CA — Award-winning filmmaker Marlon Riggs, an African American Gay man whose films explored racism and homophobia, died from AIDS complications on April 5. His mother, Jean, and his lover, Jack Vincent, were at his side when he died. He was 37 years old.

Riggs won acclaim for his experimental film Tongues Untied, which explored the struggles of African American Gay men through poetry and erotic, sometimes startling images. Shown on PBS in 1991, the film became a target of right wing groups attacking PBS for its allegedly immoral programming and the National Endowment for the Arts for funding the documentary.

Riggs wrote and directed the Emmy Award-winning Ethnic Notions, which traced racial stereotypes through centuries of popular culture. He won the prestigious Peabody Award for his documentary Color Adjustment, which examined racist images and stereotypes in the television industry from the 1940's through today. Other films included the shorts Anthem and Affirmations, and Non, Je Ne Regrette Rien (No Regrets), about Black men who are HIV-positive.

Riggs was born in Texas, graduated from Harvard in 1978, and got his masters degree from the University of California-Berkeley's Graduate School of Journalism. In addition to his film work, Riggs had recently earned tenure at UC-Berkeley as a Professor of Broadcast Journalism.

Coors Blasted for Deception Regarding Zima, Gay Rights

Washington, DC — Gay rights leaders are warning the public not to be fooled by a new public relations campaign of the Coors Brewing Company, which claims the brewery has progressive policies and attitudes about Gay rights. Coors has gone on the offensive since activists exposed the fact that the popular new malt beverage Zima, which is labeled as a product of the Zima Beverage Co. of Memphis, is

actually made by Coors.

A statement from Coors claims that it champions diversity, protects its workers from bias based on sexual orientation and has donated \$345,000 to Gay groups since 1988.

But David Smith of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force challenged those claims. "Make no mistake," he said, "Members of the Coors family contribute millions of dollars and political direction to far right wing organizations that form the foundation of the current wave of political Gay bashing sweeping the nation."

"The Coors press release failed to mention the anti-union, anti-Gay, anti-civil rights agenda of the Coors family that profits from each sale of a Coors product," said Smith. "In effect, a percentage of every dollar spent on a Coors product goes directly to radical organizations that are attacking this country's Gay population."

Coors products to avoid are Zima, Coors Beer, Killian's Red, and non-alcoholic Coors Cutter.

Ikea Toasted & Roasted for Gay-Positive Ads

New York, NY — All Madison Avenue is abuzz over reaction to a new TV advertisement by the furniture retailer Ikea which features a Gay male couple who, while shopping, talk about how their purchase of a dining room table will symbolize their longterm commitment.

The ad has so far run in only limited east coast markets, but Ikea has had a flood of responses — from Gays and Lesbians who love it and feel the openly Gay characters are long overdue, and from conservatives who think the ad endorses immorality.

Ellen Carton of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation said the ads were important for "humanizing" Gays and "showing an aspect of Gay life that people never see: our daily lives." But a spokesman at the right wing Family Research Council told the AP: "Openly promoting homosexuality will upset America's mainstream and cost the company business."

The ad has already succeeded on one important level: it has drawn enormous public attention to Ikea. PBS Withdraws Support for "Tales" Sequel

San Francisco, CA — The San Francisco Chronicle reports that the Public Broadcasting Service has decided to withdraw funding from a

planned sequel to its production of Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City.

When the Gay-positive Tales miniseries ran in January, it received the highest viewership of any PBS drama in the past decade and was generally praised by critics. But PBS has been under attack by conservative religious groups lately, and executives, although they deny it, may have felt pressured not to fund a sequel. Most recently, Donald Wildmon of the American Family Association sent out a mailing to more than a million households attacking Tales as an allegedly "pornographic, profane" show.

"For them to deny that they're running scared at this point is preposterous," said Maupin of PBS

executives.

Tales of the City was funded and produced in large part by Britain's Channel Four, which remains committed to finding other financial backing to produce the sequel.

Concord, NH — The New Hampshire House of Representatives has voted 226-131 to adopt a bill prohibiting job and housing bias based on sexual orientation. Gay activists believe it has a good chance of passing in the State Senate, but Republican Gov. Steve Merrill, who says the bill is unnecessary, has promised to veto it. A similar bill is awaiting action by the State Senate in New York.

Athens, GA — Silverlake Life, a searing documentary about a Gay couple coping with the ravages of AIDS which aired on PBS last year, has won a prestigious Peabody Award. Mark Massi died during the course of the film and his partner, Tom Joslin, died shortly thereafter, leaving their friend Peter Friedman to complete the editing process. Peabodys are bestowed for excellence in radio and television.

New York, NY — Gay playwright Edward Albee was awarded the 1994 Pulitzer Prize for Drama for his play Three Tall Women. It is Albee's third Pulitzer. He won for A Delicate Balance in 1967 and Seascape in 1975. Ironically, Albee was passed over for his most famous and enduring play, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?

Austin, TX — Residents of Austin will go to the polls May 7 to vote on whether to retain or repeal that city's domestic partnership law. A group called Concerned Texans, whose slogan is "Enough is enough!" obtained the 20,000 signatures necessary to put the

issue on the ballot.

Louisville, KY — John Paul
Poynter, 18, was arrested March 24
after wearing a dress, pantyhose and a
wig to Louisville's Central High School.

Poynter, who is Gay, said: "I wore the

dress because I wanted to be myself."
School officials suspended him and, when he showed up on the premises again, had police arrest him for trespassing. Poynter refused a prosecutor's offer to drop the charges in exchange for community service.

Washington, DC — All 16 of the non-supervisory employees at the Human Rights Campaign Fund have voted unanimously for representation by the Service Employees International Union. HRCF management did not oppose the organizing drive and, in fact, praised unions as staunch allies in the fight for Gay and Lesbian rights. This contrasts to a bitter conflict in New York, where management at Gay Men's Health Crisis allegedly tried to stifle union organizing.

Salem, OR — Democratic Governor Barbara Roberts, who has been a strong supporter of her state's Gay community, will not seek another term this year. Roberts cited her husband's recent death and other family responsibilities. An unabashed liberal, Roberts consistently spoke out against the Oregon Citizens Alliance, which has organized anti-Gay initiatives in the state and signed a bill which voids all local anti-Gay measures.

College Park, MD — Vicki Yost, a former member of the University of Maryland's field hockey team, has sued the coach and assistant athletic director for \$1.5 million, claiming they used

derogatory slurs against her and forced her to keep her Lesbianism secret. Yost said she filed suit so that in the future younger women would "be free to develop sexually and emotionally."

Berkeley, CA — Jeffrey Leiter, a Gay man, has become the Mayor of Berkeley after the former Mayor, Loni Hancock, accepted a position with the Clinton administration. The San Francisco Sentinel reports that Berkeley is now the fourth city in California to have an openly Gay mayor.

Denver, CO — In March, members of the Denver Police Department visited the city's Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Service Center to actively seek new recruits from Denver's LesBiGay community. Confronted with criticism from conservatives, the DPD explained that 100 community groups were being approached. Half of the current force is eligible to retire in five years, so the Department wants a large pool of available recruits.

ACT UP Marks Crypto Anniversary with Protest

Milwaukee — ACT UP/Milwaukee staged a lively protest at City Hall April 7 to mark the first anniversary of the deadly cryptosporidiosis outbreak, which has contributed to the deaths of 104 immuno-compromised people so far.

The cryptosporidium parasite infested Milwaukee's water supply last spring, causing severe diarrhea in almost 400,000 residents. People with HIV/AIDS and other weakened immune systems have been unable to recover from the infection. The city has installed new equipment to detect the parasite, but traces continue to be found, and the Health Department has refused to issue a boil advisory for people with immune deficiencies.

ACT UP protested the city's inaction, chanting "Stop lying, people are dying," and delivered a coffin to the office of Mayor John Norquist. ACT UP is demanding that the City acknowledge its negligence in failing to warn residents about the tainted water and provide restitution to the victims of crypto. They also want the Health Department to issue a water boil advisory for people with weakened immune systems.

GOP Deeply Divided in Gunderson's District

Eau Claire — Internal squabbles, caused in part by US Rep. Steve Gunderson's increasingly vocal support for Gay rights, are dividing members of the Republican Party in Gunderson's home base, the 3rd Congressional District in western Wisconsin.

The Milwaukee Journal reports that recent party meetings have turned into ideological battles between moderate to liberal Republicans, who support Gunderson, and GOP members who lean toward Christian fundamentalism and the right wing. Conservative activists have been gaining key positions in the party and mainstream Republicans are increasingly alarmed by their boldness.

The rift could impact negatively on Gunderson, a seven term incumbent, who may be challenged by another GOP candidate in the primary later this year. Gunderson has said he will retire from national politics after serving one final term. In an unprecedented snub, Winnie Close, chairwoman of the Eau Claire County GOP, said she was disappointed that Gunderson was running again, and unsigned flyers have been circulated attacking his positions on Gay rights and abortion.

Winnie Close told Craig Gilbert of the Journal: "What is wrong with the Religious Right taking over? At least they

Religious Right taking over? At least they have good morals."

Geske Wins Full Term on State's High Court

Madison — Justice Janine Geske garnered more than 77% on April 5 to win a full 10-year term on the Wisconsin Supreme Court. She defeated William Pangman, a Libertarian, who had credibility problems due to his imprisonment for failing to pay child support to his ex-wife.

Justice Geske, a longtime Circuit Court Judge in Milwaukee, was appointed by Gov. Tommy Thompson last year to finish the term of the retiring Justice Louis Ceci. She will now join six other justices and may provide the crucial swing vote on a court which is often split right down the middle. Justices Shirley Abrahamson, William Bablitch and, to a lesser extent, Nathan Heffernan are fairly liberal, while Justices Roland Day, Donald Steinmetz and Jon Wilcox are conservatives.

Geske won the endorsement of diverse organizations, including police associations, unions and senior citizen and women's groups. But no one is quite sure where she stands ideologically. She styles herself as a moderate and vows to render her decisions based on the facts in each case. Gay and Lesbian activists are especially anxious to see how she will rule in the appeal of a Lesbian from Green Bay who wants to adopt her partner's child. That decision is expected by June.

New "Christian" Group Threatens Gay Gains in State

Monroe — Wisconsin Christians United, a new fundamentalist political group, has launched a project to monitor and target pro-Gay initiatives in the state.

The group is led by Ralph Ovadal of Monroe. As a recent guest on Rev. Vic Eliason's Christian radio program Crosstalk, which is broadcast nationally, Ovadal announced the beginning of an anti-Gay campaign called "Resist and Restore." The project aims to expose the so-called "homosexual agenda" through a video and an ongoing newspaper and to introduce legislation that will strike all references to sexual orientation from the Wisconsin statutes.

Ovadal stated repeatedly that he opposed certain civil rights for Gays and Lesbians because of their "sinful" and "immoral" lifestyle. He erroneously cited the Declaration of Independence as denying rights to homosexuals.

Professor Lectures on The Right's Tactics

Madison — Gays and Lesbians fall victim to "the discourse of equivalents" in the debate over Gay civil rights protection, according to a law professor speaking on the subject.

Jane Schacter, a law professor at the University of Wisconsin- Madison, delivered her April 14 lecture as part of a series on Lesbian/Gay/Bi research being conducted at UW. The series was sponsored by the University's Liaison Office to the L/G/B Community.

The "discourse of equivalents," according to Schacter, is a new strategy emerging from the Religious Right in its campaigns to roll back and prohibit Gay rights legislation on the state and local levels. The strategy targets groups which are currently extended civil rights protection and relies on demonstrating to them that L/G/B people are sufficiently like" them. She cited as an example the revised wording of the initiative proposed by the Oregon Citizens Alliance. Measure 9, which was defeated in 1992, would have required that the state teach that homosexuality is "unnatural, abnormal and perverse." The new wording states that sexual orientation "does not equate legally or socially" to other protected classes of people.

Schacter said that the discourse of equivalents incorporates two contradictory new forms of discussion. The first is to deny that anti-Gay discrimination exists. Gay rights opponents foster a stereotype of Gay people as better educated and more affluent than the norm, and as seeking "special rights" to obtain an "extra edge" over everyone else. The second is to admit that L/G/B people are discriminated against, but that they deserve it because of their "chosen behavior." Sodomy laws are often cited in these instances.

"This whole depiction [of L/G/B people] is based on a crude, leveling caricature" that denies the diversity of experience of people within the wider L/G/B communities, she said. "It reduces the essence of discrimination to a one-dimensional experience" which holds up discrimination against one group, usually African-Americans, as a "normative baseline."

Schacter also spoke to the concept of "special rights." Special rights as a symbol "collects and communicates a set of ideas that are hostile to civil rights" for Gays and others, she said. She noted survey results that indicate a majority of heterosexuals support the idea of equal job rights, but say in the same survey that they oppose expanding existing civil rights laws.

Peshtigo/Menominee Whitewater Rafting Trip Planned for May

Milwaukee - Ten years ago a group of Milwaukee Gay men regularly scheduled two days of whitewater rafting on Wisconsin's wild Peshtigo and mighty Menominee Rivers. Whitewater (in Wisconsin, not Arkansas!) is a hot topic with outdoor sports. Through the efforts of Milwaukee GAMMA and Madison Frontiers, a trip on Memorial Day weekend will be held on these two great rivers in the Crivitz, Wisconsin area.

This trip, open to all Gays and Lesbians in Wisconsin, will begin with a 1pm meeting on Saturday, May 28th in Athelstane, Wisconsin at Kosir's Rapid Rafting Company. After the trip, the group will camp overnight at Kosir's and have a roaring campfire. On Sunday morning, we leave the campsite at 8am and begin our journey that will take us down Menominee's legendary Piers Gorge in twelve-person rafts. We will return to Milwaukee on Sunday evening.

The per-person cost for the Peshtigo is \$16; camping is \$4; and the Menominee trip is \$28. In addition, the participant needs to provide transportation, tent and camping facilities, food and beverages. GAMMA will coordinate car pooling. Various components of the package are available. 

BestD Answers Health Questions

By Bob Ambelang & Dr. Kelly Balliet

You have started off this column with a couple of really great questions. Both of these questions have multifaceted answers so we'll start right away!

Why Is Fisting Unsafe?

This question concerns Gay men and Lesbians, Bisexuals and heterosexuals. There are degrees of finger and hand insertion into a partner's anus or vagina. The risks are pretty much the same in all cases. First, there must be an understanding of which body fluids can transmit the HIV virus. Blood, semen and vaginal secretions are the infectious agents for HIV transmission. If hand or finger insertion were the only activities there would be low risk. The risk becomes greater if there is other activity such as intercourse.

If there is only "fisting" involved what we have to consider is transmission of the virus via the "blood to blood" method. This is where infected blood gains entry into another person's bloodstream to infect them. The risks here are that the person being

The chances are very strong that this is going to occur to some degree despite the partner's experience in this activity. When there are ruptures or tears, these breaks in the delicate lining of the anal canal or vaginal canal are open doorways for the virus to invade the bloodstream of the receptive partner. Fingernails are especially dangerous and easily tear or scratch these delicate tissues even if trimmed.

Where does the virus come from? It could come from any wounds, breaks or sores on the hand or fingers of the person doing the penetrating. Hang nails & paper cuts are examples of potential risk factors. If the person "fisting" has these wounds and they begin to bleed during the action, blood that carries the virus could potentially enter the partner's blood stream and cause infection. Conversely, blood from ruptures or tears in the anus or vagina could enter the wounds on the hand or finger and infect that person. There do not have to be significant amounts of blood present for risk. The blood may not even be obvious to the naked eye, but nonetheless microscopic traces of blood may be present

Latex gloves or finger cots present the best protection for this activity and depending upon the degree of penetration should be used in an

appropriate length.

The greatest risk to "fisting" is that intercourse follows. If the person fisted is going to have his or her partner perform intercourse either with penis or "toys" a condom should positively be used in the first instance or the toys must be perfectly clean and should not have been used by others. The HIV virus depends upon direct transmission into a person's

bloodstream to enable infection. Because of the intensity of penetration in fisting a direct route is almost always present and extreme care should be taken whenever this activity is engaged in.

If Left Untreated, Can Other Sexually Transmitted Diseases Become AIDS?

Simply put, no. Other sexually transmitted diseases will not develop into HIV infection and ultimately AIDS. But, other STDs can put you more at risk for HIV infection. Both diseases are transmitted primarily the same way, through sexual activity. If, for example, a man develops a sore on his penis from syphilis and has unprotected sex with an HIV infected partner, that sore is an open door for the virus to get into his body to infect him. The same is true for women or for men who are anally receptive.

Untreated STD's are extremely dangerous from the standpoint that many complications will occur in the future. Neurological damage may infertility, deformity, severe, painful infections, and death are only a few of the results from going untreated. modern science has Fortunately developed cures and therapies for STDs. Treatment is as close as your primary care provider or specialty clinics such as BESTD or STD Specialties in Milwaukee or Blue Bus in Madison which serve the Les/Bi/Gay/Trans communities.

Lesbians Win Inclusion in Massive Women's Health Survey

Aggressive Lobbying Campaign Pays Off

Washington, DC - Intensive lobbying by Lesbian health advocates paid off when it was announced in March that the federal government's massive women's health survey will include questions which ask about participants' sexual orientation.

The Women's Health Initiative, a \$625 million project being administered by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), will investigate the health histories and problems of more than 160,000 post-menopausal women over

a 14 year period. The Women's Health Initiative is the largest project on women's health ever to be undertaken by the US government and was approved by Congress last year, at least in part, to make up for the lack of research on women's health by the government in the past. Female Senators and members of Congress along with women's health advocates worked hard to obtain funding for the study.

Findings of the study, which may not become available for ten years, are expected to tell physicians alot about the causes and prevention of heart disease, osteoporosis, and breast and reproductive tract cancers in women.

The health concerns of Lesbians, such as breast cancer, have been ignored for too long," noted Paula Ettelbrick of the National Center for Lesbian Rights. "This victory proves that when we organize we can impact on national policy and demnad that our tax dollars be used to address our health needs as women and as Lesbians."

When the project was first announced last year, its director, Dr. William Harlan, said he did not see the need to include a question about participants' sexual orientation. He said this despite the fact that questions about race, ethnicity, economic status, education level and many other aspects of the respondents' social backgrounds were considered crucial to the survey. Harlan said he also did not anticipate doing any special outreach to see that Lesbians were included in the study.

Harlan's comments raised concern among Lesbian health activists, who felt excluding questions about sexuality would prevent them from drawing any conclusions about the special ways

certain health problems impact Lesbians. They feared it would be a lost opportunity to learn more about Lesbian health and so, began a strong lobbying

Susan Hester of the Mary-Helen Mautner Project for Lesbians with Cancer in Washington, DC organized a letter writing campaign. Representatives of the National Center for Lesbian Rights and other groups met with federal health officials including Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala. Dr. Kate O'Hanlon, President of the American Association of Physicians for Human Rights, testified before scientific committees of the NIH urging inclusion of the question about sexual orientation.

THE CRITICAL QUESTION

The NIH released the final version of the health survey last month, and Lesbian activists were thrilled to see the inclusion of two questions about sexual orientation

The questions do not ask directly whether women are homosexual, heterosexual or bisexual. Instead the first question is phrased: "Regardless of whether you are currently sexually active, which response best describes who you have had sex with over your adult lifetime?"

To answer the question, participants can mark "Have never had sex," "Sex with men," "Sex with women," "Sex with both men or women," or "Prefer not to answer."

A second question asks the same question, but about sex after age 45. Lesbian health workers praised this distinction, noting that sexual behavior sometimes changes over time and that some women don't come out as Lesbians until middle age.

These seemingly simple questions, which it took months of lobbying to have included, may result in a treasure trove of information about Lesbian health in years to come. Statisticians will be able to cull and compare data and hopefully arrive at some conclusions about Lesbian health care and prevention and treatment of diseases.

Previous surveys have been conducted on Lesbian health, notably a survey of 1,925 Lesbians by the National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation in the mid-1980's and a more recent survey of Bisexual and Lesbian women by the Lesbian Health Project of Los Angeles. But because of its massive scope, the Women's Health Initiative is expected to produce more comprehensive results.

AIDS Briefs

Medical College Finds HHV-6 May Be Co-Factor in AIDS

Milwaukee - Medical College of Wisconsin researchers have found an important link between human herpes virus 6 (HHV-6) and AIDS. Their findings were recently reported in the British medical journal Lancet.

Medical College researchers Professor Donald R. Carrigan and Konstance Kehl Knox evaluated the rate of HHV-6 infection in nine patients who died of AIDS and found HHV-6 infected cells in every tissue from every patient.

The majority of the HHV-6 infected cells in all the tissues were T-lymphocytes (the disease fighting T "helper" cells), and the degree of HHV-6 infection correlated with the number of lymphocytes in the tissue. The T-cells are the same cells targeted by HIV, the AIDS virus, and whose depletion causes

The researchers also found that the HHV-6 infection rate was more than twice that of cytomegalovirus, a virus relative of HHV- 6, that was previously considered the most frequent opportunistic virus in AIDS patients. Leading AIDS researcher

Robert C. Gallo, who conducted a study first isolating HHV-6 from HIV patient samples, said that his research together with the Medical College findings pointed to a catalytic role for HHV-6 in the progression of HIV infection."

More research is required, however, to answer two vital questions about HHV-6: Is the widespread reactivation of HHV-6 another phenomenon of underlying immunodeficiency and HHV-6 simply another opportunistic agent enabled to thrive in patients with AIDS? Or, once activated during AIDS, does HHV-6 have a detrimental effect on the immune system to speed disease progression?

It is important to note that up to 90% of all people are infected with HHV-6 but it is generally latent and harmless. The HHV-6 identified in these studies were actively replicating and destroying tissue.

Herpes Simplex May Increase Chance of HIV Transmission

London - Another recent article in the medical journal Lancet reported that infection with the herpes simplex virus may increase the chances of HIV

transmission during oral sex.

Researchers say that HIV may spread more easily during oral sex if the receptive partner has oral herpes cold sores, caused by the herpes simplex virus, or HSV-1. Studies on AIDS patients who have herpes simplex sores indicated that HIV particles are able to enter skin cells already infected with HSV-1 and multiply into large numbers within these skin cells.

The scientists concluded by noting the importance of incorporating anti-herpes medications into the overall treatment regimens of people with AIDS.

Optimism Over Merck's Protease Inhibitor Fades

Trenton, NJ — After initial signs of success, researchers at Merck Laboratories have reported disappointing results in human tests of a new drug designed to inhibit the enzyme protease, which the HIV virus uses to replicate.

Individuals who took the protease inhibitor, called L-735,524, initially showed marked improvement: decreased levels of HIV in their blood and improved appetites and weight gain. However, within six months the virus rebounded to its previous elevated levels. Scientists surmise that the HIV virus quickly adapted and became resistent to the drug.

Dr. Anthony Fauci of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases told Associated Press: "I think rather than throw our hands in the air we should try to figure out how we can best use these drugs to their maximum

even though they are not in and of themselves going to end replication of HIV."

Merck plans to experiment with different doses of the drug as well as using its protease inhibitor in combination with other already approved AIDS drugs. Hoffman-La Roche and several other drug companies are working on other protease inhibitors. The La Roche study of 1,200 individuals is giving some the protease inhibitor, some the already-approved ddC, and some a combination of both.

AZT Reduces HIV Transmission to Fetuses

Washington, DC — Scientists are elated with the findings of a federal study in which HIV-infected women who took AZT during their pregnancies substantially reduced the chances that their children would be born with HIV.

In a control group of HIV-infected women who took placebos, 25.5% gave birth to children who tested HIV-positive. Previous surveys have indicated maternal to fetal HIV transmission runs at about 25%. But the pregnant women who took AZT throughout their pregnancies and whose children were given the drug for 18 months after their births showed only an 8% transmission rate.

"It's the first indication that mother-to-child transmission of HIV can be at least decreased, if not prevented," said Dr. Harold Jaffe of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Jaffe said the results would provide greater impetus for identifying pregnant women who are HIV-positive and encouraging AZT treatment. The CDC believes that at least 7,000 women of child-bearing

age in the US are HIV-positive.

The results were a bit of good news about AZT which recent studies have suggested is effective for only a limited period of time. The limited period of pregnancy in this case may somehow allow AZT to work most beneficially.

CDC: AIDS Continues to Slow Among Gay Men

Atlanta, GA — The latest figures released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention show that for the first time in the 14 years of the AIDS epidemic Gay and Bisexual men now make up less that half of all new AIDS cases.

Statistics for 1993 revealed 48,266 new cases of AIDS diagnosed among Gay and Bisexual men, or just 46.6% of the total of all new cases. A year ago, the percentage of new cases among Gay and Bisexual men was 52.7%. In 1985, it was 66.5%.

The lower percentage on the national scene reinforced the latest statistics out of San Francisco's Department of Public Health, which reported that while 3,326 new cases of AIDS were recorded in the city in the peak year of 1992, the number fell to 1,507 in 1993.

The bad news is that AIDS continues its rapid increase among injection drug users and heterosexuals, especially women. Heterosexual transmission, only 1.9% of all cases in 1985, now constitutes more than 9% of cases. Transmission through contaminated needles is up to 27%. Latinos and African and Native Americans continue to be disproportionately affected by the epidemic.

Court Upholds DEA Ban on Marijuana

Washington, DC — Advocates of the medicinal use of marijuana were dealt a major blow in February when a federal appeals court upheld the Bush administration's ban on doctors' prescribing marijuana to seriously ill patients. Proponents of marijuana use say it eases the severe nausea which afflicts people undergoing radiation and chemotherapy and people with HIV/AIDS and restores their appetites.

The Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia rejected arguments in support of marijuana, saying that "marijuana's medicinal value has never been proven in sound scientific studies." The justices dismissed evidence of marijuana's beneficial effects as "anecdotal."

Beginning in 1976, some individuals were able to apply to the Food and Drug Administration for special permission to use marijuana. But that practice ended in 1992 when the Drug Enforcement



Administration ordered the FDA to stop considering individual appeals. Marijuana proponents then took their case to the courts where their appeals

have been rejected.

An interesting sidelight to the recent ruling is that one of the judges opposing medicinal marijuana was Douglas Ginsburg. Ginsburg withdrew himself from consideration for a seat on the US Supreme Court during the Reagan administration after he admitted that he had smoked marijuana as a young man.

Prevention Programs for Men of Color Underfunded

Atlanta, GA — A yearlong study by the US Conference of Mayors and the CDC found that while 20% of all AIDS cases in the US are among Gay and Bisexual men who are Black, Latino, Native or Asian American, populations are targeted by only 1-13% of AIDS prevention funding. (The percentage varies according to locality.)

"For far too long Gay men of color have been rendered invisible in this epidemic," Mario Solis-Marich of the Latino Gay group LLEGO told the Associated Press. "This country cannot stop HIV transmission and cannot indicate that it's even serious about doing so until it spends the adequate dollars in Gay and Bisexual minority

communities. The study faulted a lack of prevention materials aimed at non-English-speaking Gay and Bisexual men, underfunded prevention programs aimed to Gays in general and white dominance of AIDS service organizations, making men of color feel excluded. AIDS activists plan to use the study's findings to lobby for more funds to be targeted to Gay and Bisexual men of color.

HRCF Criticized for Cutting AIDS Staff Position

Washington, DC — AIDS activist Luke Sissyfag has attacked the Human Rights Campaign Fund, one of the country's largest Gay lobbying groups, for cutting its only full-time AIDS staff position.

Sissyfag accused HRCF of being "asleep at the wheel" when it comes to the AIDS crisis. With a budget in the millions and 40 full-time staff members, Sissyfag said the decision to end the AIDS position as of June 1 is "incompetent, bordering on criminal."

As a part of its reorganization, HRCF plans to hire a Health Care Policy Director and an Assistant to the Director to oversee all Gay and Lesbian-related health issues. But a former staff member of HRCF who worked on health care told the Washington Blade: "I doubt very seriously if one individual will be able to meet all the issues of health care reform, as well as AIDS.

Sissyfag is urging people to call HRCF to express concern with the staffing change. HRCF is at (202) 628-4160.

Guide for HIV-Infected Health Workers Available

San Francisco, CA — The American Association of Physicians for Human Rights has published the first legal guide for health workers who are infected with HIV. The Gay and Lesbian physicians group produced the guide with help from the National Lawyers Guild AIDS Network.

The Legal Rights and Obligations of HIV-Infected Health Care Workers is a 47-page guide which discusses employment discrimination, insurance coverage, informed consent laws and privacy/confidentiality issues.

Local Gay Rights Pioneer Dies At 53

Louis W. Stimac

Milwaukee - On April 8, 1994, Louis W. Stimac died after a seven year battle with throat cancer. He was 53 years old.

Louis was a true pioneer of Gay rights in Wisconsin during the 1970's and early 1980's. While he spent his first 8 years after high school in the St. Francis Seminary, he left the seminary to pursue a Gay life and soon after was drawn to the Gay rights movement. Perhaps his greatest contribution to our community was the incorporation of the first Gay group in Milwaukee, the Gay People's Union (GPU) in 1971. He wrote the group's Articles of Incorporation, which forced the state to legally recognize the group, and was one of the four individuals who signed the required documents at a time when being publicly known as a Gay man usually meant losing your job and being arrested and beaten by the police.

During his 10 years with GPU, Louis lectured extensively across the state at schools and churches, using his vast religious and behavioral knowledge to refute the misconceptions of audiences. He was responsible for starting numerous support groups, the first Gay hotline in Milwaukee and the first Gay Alcoholics Anonymous meetings. Louis was one of two openly Gay speakers at the first Gay Symposium on Sexuality and spoke twice a week on the city's first radio program for Gays. He was particularly proud of his work in educating ministers and priests with funding from the Priest

After leaving GPU, Louis continued to foster positive alternatives for Gays, but in a smaller more personal way. He allowed his home to become a safe haven for Gays who faced abusive families or who were simply needing a place to feel comfortable with who they were. Louis loved to regularly cook for people, and every year, he prepared and hosted a Christmas feast for friends and those who were not welcome at their own homes. During these years, Louis acted as a mentor to a number of up and coming activists who learned the importance of research, inclusiveness and visibility in activism, and who carry on his legacy today.

During the past ten years, one of Louis' greatest joys was his well-known video tape collection. At the time of his death, he had over 6,500 titles catalogued and available in his home.





The first time I saw Jamie Anderson in concert she was the opening act for Kate Clinton. Within a few moments of taking the stage Jamie had me laughing so hard my face hurt. And, impossible as it may sound, Jamie made Kate seem downright boring.

Now Jamie's best and funniest songs are available on compact disk. Bad Hair Day contains some of the songs performed on Jamie's earlier albums. Wedding Song is about attending the straight wedding of an exlover. Jamie wryly observes, "Pardon me for being flip, but it's only right 'cause Lesbian couples don't get the official green light."

One of my favorite Jamie Anderson songs is also here. I'm Sorry, a twist on the typical response Gays and Lesbians face when coming out of the closet. "I'm sorry that you're straight/ it can't be your fault./ Have you tried counseling or talking to god?/ There's lots that you can do./ There's help for people like you./ You could change if you wanted to."

Bad Hair Day contains a few new songs as well. Two have become my instant favorites. Love Song, a cliche-filled ode to the urge to merge, uses lyric and melodies from some of the '70's sappiest tunes. It's a hoot. On the Nashville-styled Wynona Why Not Jamie sings, "You wear black leather and you ride a Harley bike./ If I didn't know better, I'd say you were a dyke."



"Four Weddings" is a Witty, Madcap Romantic Comedy

But What About Those Gay Characters?

Despite its hopelessly heterosexual title, Mike Newell's Four Weddings and a Funeral, with its witty dialogue and Gay characters, should captivate LesBiGay viewers. I say "should" because this madcap romantic comedy is also a bit problematic.

It has a lot of things going for it, not the least of which is our charming cover boy, actor Hugh Grant. Grant is leading man Charles, a fellow who attends all his friend's weddings but can't seem to make a commitment himself. Grant is being touted by many critics as the next Cary Grant and it's easy to see why. His handsome features and easygoing style make him a wonderful romantic lead. More about him later.

The plot of Four Weddings and a Funeral is simple. It's encapsulated right in the title. We watch Charles and a wide assortment of his daffy and heartwarming friends as they attend a series of social gatherings over several years' time. In the process, they exchange delightfully witty banter about the nature of commitment and become entwined in each others' quests for love.

The screenplay by Richard Curtis is

bristling with sophisticated dialogue. It moves at a furious pace, so the laughs keep coming almost nonstop. Some of the humor is also very broad, even a little lowbrow, with a touch of slapstick a la Monty Python.

The humor is leavened, however, by moments of deep pathos in which characters pine over lost love or otherwise bare their souls. Who out there will remain unmoved by Matthew's (John Hannah) reading of a beautiful love poem by W.H. Auden at his lover's funeral? Or by the long-suffering Fiona's (Kristin Scott Thomas) confession of unrequited love for Charles?

The movie is an ensemble piece, and the bevy of talented British actors is another plus. While Grant is the centerpiece, the combined energies of the company are its real strength. Thomas is great as the alternately aloof and vulnerable Fiona, James Fleet is perfect as her bumbling but decent brother Tom, Simon Callow goes over the top as the outrageously flamboyant (re: queer) Gareth, and David Bower is compelling as Charles' deaf brother David who, it turns out, has perceptions the others lack. And check out Anna Chancellor as the hapless Henrietta. Is she a ringer for Ava Garner or what?

The one problematic character is Charles' love interest, Carrie, played by America's Andie MacDowell. Some critics have attacked her performance, but I think it's a terribly under-written role that's at fault. She's a lovely and competent actress but isn't given much to work with here. We're given no idea of Carrie's background, personality or the motives for her behavior so at best she comes off as a willful tease, at worst, as a whore. What does Charles see in this woman that makes him finally forsake bachelorhood? Even their love scenes together are perfunctory and utterly

without passion.

To make my next point, I have to reveal a major plot twist. You might want to see the movie first before reading on.

THE QUEER ANGLE

The other difficulty I had with Four Weddings was its depiction of the Gay couple, Matthew and Gareth. Their relationship is seamlessly wound into the overall story and no big deal is made of their homosexuality, which at first I thought was admirable. It's fun to see more Gay characters popping up in movies. But the more I thought about it, the more it bugged me.

Matthew and Gareth's relationship is so low key, it's virtually invisible until the second half of the film. Queers are more likely to pick up on it, although Callow's presence seems a dead give-away. Callow, whose face, if not his name, will be immediately familiar to film buffs, is himself a Gay man and plays Gareth with such broad flamboyance only an idiot

could miss the signals.

In the flim's production notes, Callow is quoted as saying: "It's unusual to see a Gay couple portrayed in a very normal fashion. I took great pleasure in playing a Gay character who is involved in an intense and personal relationship with another chap but whose relationship is never mentioned as such... That's quite a radical breakthrough in writing in my opinion and a major reason for taking the

Hmmm, I wonder. Gareth is obviously, stereotypically queer but his relationship with Matthew is not made clear at all until Gareth dies. At that point, Charles and friends wax nostalgic about how Gareth and Matthew were the "perfect match" and joke about how, among their crowd of bachelors, Gareth and Matthew had actually been an old married couple all along.

Why is it that queers aren't appreciated until they're dead? Why is it they only achieve nobilty through suffering and death? This is an old, old pattern in the movies and one I hope will soon be broken. While offering a seemingly fresh, nonjudgmental portrait of a Gay couple, Four Weddings also

gives us the same old shaft.

Yet, there is still much to enjoy in Four Weddings. The humor and quick wit is delightful and the performances are all top notch. It's the kind of smart, breezy romantic comedy that Hollywood seems unable to produce.

And then there's always the sweet, semi-hunky Hugh Grant, whose charm and intelligence make even this Lesbian



swoon. Grant is not Gay - sorry guys! - but played a Gay character who bows to convention in the Merchant-Ivory movie Maurice, based on E.M. Forster's novel. He also played the fragile genius Frederic Chopin opposite Judy Davis as the butch George Sand in what I think is the best romantic comedy of the last decade, Impromptu. Both films are available on video and are highly recommended.

Grant can also be seen in three current releases. In Sirens, he plays an uptight preacher, soon undone after confronting his sexuality. He has a supporting role as an anti-Nazi journalist

in Merchant-Ivory's Remains of the Day, and is also featured in Roman Polanski's thriller, Bitter Moon. Watch this guy, he's gonna be a star.

"Threesome": Advances in Gay Film-Ville?

A Chat With Out-Gay Director Andrew Fleming

Let's make a movie. We'll keep it light, cast it sexy, make it steamy and people it with some college-age students: a Gay man, a straight man, and a straight woman. We'll put them all together in bed, with dollops of male and female nudity, rate it 'R', stand back, and watch who comes to see it. Goodness, what will Hollywood come up with next?

Andrew Fleming has done that in an amusing, semi-autobiographical tale of college days, shot at UCLA, wherein a "confused" young Gay man (from whose perspective the voice-over narration tells the tale), a Gay friendly guy, and a naive romantic woman learn to be friends, take that relationship and extend it to include sex, after which they are forced to grow up.

The second feature film of 31 yearold, Los Angeles born, out Gay director Fleming (Bad Dreams, a horror film, produced by Gale Anne Hurd, presaged it), "It was my first big break out of school. I'd been making my own films in high school and college, as I wanted to be it all - a writer, an artist, an actor and making a film lets you put all these crafts to use; everything you have. It's incredibly absorbing - you can't think of anything else when you're doing it, and then it's so much fun to sit back and watch what you did up there on the screen." Especially since the best thing in his film is that they didn't end up marginalizing the Gay character.

Fleming, articulate and genial, proved enough of his worth on Bad Dreams to get independent financiers to back his personal story of telling a positive Gay tale without using discredited stereotypical visions of Gay people: "I was interested in writing about that period when you're away from home for the first time and learning about who you are, and I thought it would be nice to have a film where the lead is no Mr. Victim or Ms. Swish or Mr. Psychopathic. The story's not centered on how other people reacted against his sexuality; it's about how he felt about himself and his confusion at that time. Normally, people

don't see that process of growth — after all, it's a life-long procedure of trial and error. Those back and forth questions of 'Ohmigod, am I Gay? I can't be, I'll try not to be;' Then you realize how stuck you are with it. Eddy [the Gay central character played by Josh Charles] knows he's Gay, but he's having trouble facing it — dealing with the ramifications of it."

It's unusual enough for Hollywood to support positive Gay features: read Vito Russo's still relevant history homosexuality in the films (The Celluloid Closet/Harpers/ 1981 & 1987) or Boze Hadleigh's fine book on the same subject (The Lavender Screen/Citidel/ 1993) to see how it used to be, and to a certain extent still is. But as Fleming found out, "While we don't have a lot of Gay themed films, it's not like people are avoiding the subject. Studio execs greenlight films they think will sell. I didn't have any political agenda in making this movie about these [three] people. It wasn't my intention to further any kind of Gay agenda at all; I'm not interested in polemics - Gay or otherwise. I think, if anything, I wanted to present a normal Gay character who folk could identify with - non-Gays included. There's nothing particularly new in this film for the Gay audience, but the reaction from the non-Gay community at large tells me it's new for them. There've been a lot of films marketed for Gay audiences which are much bolder or ballsier, but this one is more accessible to straights.

Fleming spent a year sending out his script and meeting with a lot of

people and, finally, getting it cast. As is normal in Hollywood, he ended up with three non-Gay actors in the leads: Lara Flynn Boyle, Stephen Baldwin, and Charles, with out Gay Alexis Arquette and Martha Gehman in silly and funny support roles. "In terms of my casting, I was looking for an important quality the sexuality had to be right and I needed three people with the proper chemistry. To be perfectly honest, I didn't know who was Gay or straight when they auditioned; we looked at all kinds of actors, including ones of color as well. As to whether or not Gay would have meant getting the job, well, it wasn't a consideration, although I can see how Gay actors might be frightened of taking an A Gay role - the town's still hard on out-Gay actors. But only actors: there's no problem for non-actor Gays getting work because there's simply not that much hiding anymore for them.

What was a big surprise for Fleming was in how quickly and easily Threesome sold to a major studio. It was produced for just over \$2 million, and Tri-Star bought as a negative pickup (where the studio plunks down money for a total buyout, and then they take care of the marketing). That trafficking has been very clever, towards Gays of all ages, and non-Gays from the college-age crowd. At a recent rock radio- listeners screening, the group of grunge- clad non-Gays reacted positively to the sexual images and burst into applause at the end of the film. The 93 minute movie, which is not without its problems, got laughs and knowing hoots all the way through. Tri-Star has what looks to be a moderate hit on its hands here.

Certainly, its director agrees. "I don't think people are really that conservative on the subject anymore. One of the redeeming things is that all the situations

are presented in a humorous light and play well with audiences. I knew that if I presented it as melodrama or got preachy [on the subject of Gay-tolerance], the film goers won't be interested. I knew it needed to be commercial. Besides, I was just trying to make a little movie to amuse myself; I never imagined that it would go big time with a major studio." In a show of confidence, Tri-Star has given it a wide release to over a thousand theaters all around North America.

"I think the real barrier to cross is just how incumbent it is now to have Gay writers and directors make good Gay movies.

"I've also been impressed with the positive feedback from the community; somehow I thought there'd be more flack. But my movie's honest and they feel that. There're two Gay male characters in the film [Charles, with a crush on Baldwin, and Arquette with a crush on Charles]. I've heard some complaining about the lack of a kiss between Charles and Baldwin, but the straight Guy just wouldn't have kissed the Gay one, at least before the threesome. But nobody, including the producers tried to de-homofy the story." It may well be that the old barriers of sex or love between men have begun to crumble, but now the question remains, is there a large enough audience interested in coming to see films with Gay subject matter? "Will they go to films about cancer? Or Somalia? I think the real barrier to cross is just how incumbent it is now to have Gay writers and directors make good Gay movies. Stop treating the subject as 'an issue of the week' - that's all been covered. Nowadays, I get a lot of Gay scripts hell, a lot of scripts, period - and most everything I'm sent is dreck."

Alexis Arquette, plays a character who is a "potential love interest for Josh" and, along with the looney and loopy Gehman, are "gossiping kids who always are looking into the dorm room of 3C, reporting to each other on the threesome within. I'm used as a pawn to draw Josh's sexuality out. I don't think the film's going to open too many doors for Gays, but Andy's young and energetic and Gay. And while it doesn't delve deeply into the issue of being young and Gay, and all the pain that goes with it, it is entertaining, and you get to see Stephen Baldwin's butt, which doesn't hurt any."

And what is in the future for the talented Fleming? "Well, of course, I'd like to have the clout to go from projects which range from small to bigger to smaller as wanted because I want to make films on a wide range of subjects,

not just Gay themes. Look, with Threesome, it's ultimately not about homosexual-angst or even group sex, but about three people and what they have in a relationship as friends. Yeah, that's really what it's about."



There she sat coiled in an edge chair two rows from the back. Mark David Chapman in dyke's clothing.

Waiting to strike.

It was a festive night for the rest of us. A Chris Williamson/Tret Fure concert twelve years in the remake. A full dozen years since the top of the line had come to the bottom of the East Coast. And we were revved for the experience. Psyched and sold out

Women and a few men gathered outside the Ft. Lauderdale UU church two hours early. Even thought the soldout status meant that everyone already had a ticket, the stadium seating meant that front row center was up for first-

come, first-served grabs.

Security was tight. No badge, no early entry. Order of the day was stand and sweat. It was afternoon in the South Florida eighty degree sun. Sümmer would be air impossible to breathe if this day was our indication. Still, many managed to make it more an interaction than a trial

It wasn't anybody's fault this was Holy week at Alamo rental cars. It couldn't be helped that our artists were made to stand in a line of their own at the car counter raising holy hell with our schedule. This was Chris Williamson, the songstress of early Lesbian evolution, and she would be worth the wait.

Then everyone steamed and eddied inside. Stadium seated. Air-conditioned. Breath- held for a first chord promising energy and unity and full blown Lesbian

nostalgia

Sure, Chris and Tret would play their new ones. Everyone expected it. In fact, Chris announced it at the beginning, right after she embarrassed the kids with the Kodaks into putting them away.
"Make no mistake." She seemed to be "These are my newest gifts to you. These are who I have been lately. These are who Tret and I have recently become, and here are a few thoughts and possibilities we are anticipating for the future.'

And near to the back she sat. Still. Hinkley in hiding. Tucking her rattle closely, tightly, silently, keeping her coiling to herself.

We heard about the adventures in Russia where Tret and Chris were cheered for their bravery. "Bravery?" they asked? "Da." Replied the Russians. "To be two women who have traveled without men. Da." Da. What other kind of thinking would you expect from a country which equated the word for 'yes' with the universal baby sound for father?

"Da." Tret said. And "Ha!" we responded, chortling our sharing of the secret

"We had them singing Song Of The Soul in a Russian tavern. They know a drinking song when they hear one!" Chris reported, swinging her imaginary stein in a chanty rhythm to which we all silently supplied the words. "... why don't you sing this song? ...why don't you..." In the trailing silence, you could hear the hearts collectively sighing for the want of the rest of the song's singing. But no one said a word, leery of Chris' legendary disposition, an artist who offers her gift in the wrapping of her own choosing. Three hundred and thirty eight of us welcomed the new gifts. Such lyricism. Such new depth. So many roads traveled since the beginning. Twenty years we have all been changer. Fourteen years Tret had been transformed from raw rock and roller to musical partner. Together they were changers, changed. And we were thrilled to be witness. For nearly two hours

Only one of us was instead impatient

"For the last song..." Chris hesitated for effect. And the crowd hoped hard for something at last familiar to tie present time to a past with a Chris Williamson background sound track.

And she struck!

"Sing the old ones! Not all of this trash." She spewed, Nasty! Demanding. Loud. No gentle, tolerable request. bought a ticket. I paid the price. I stood in the sun. I own you. Give me what I order," she seemed to scream in venomous accusation and requirement. Outrageous and out of place. It was the groups' collective hope grown cancerous. To disrupt, Affront,

Breaths were held. How would Chris. deal with this damaged moment. Leave the stage? Forever? Would South Florida have to wait for a very cold day till she ever came back? Would Chris think that the viper was us? Would she hold it against us? Would the serpent never shut up? She went poisonously on till the producer approached and required

We were all very proud of Chris Williamson that night, aware of her

reputation earned for intolerance with the lesser folk. Earned at a cost of keeping to herself the pieces demanded by ravenous fanatics. Chris stayed. And stood her ground and processed us all through the worst of it. Explaining love. and gifts, and seventeen albums since Waterfall. Then she sang it anyway. As she had been about to, before she was so rudely interrupted. And we sang too. Some small satisfaction hovering above the lingering disquiet.

Later, privately, after three hundred thirty eight women had apologized for the one. Chris said, "There's almost always one. The beast. When you look down into their soul, what you see is ugly need. And there's no quieting them." "Did you ever try?" I queried. "Yes. But to no good. The need is too big. They can never be satisfied. And I am not a

iukebox."

So the Song Of The Soul that Chris Williamson sings now is with Tret Fure. And the sound is more fully textured than when it began. And if she asks me to keep my memories in a drawer, is that so much to ask? After all, they are my memories, and my drawer. And she has new memories to offer.

If you're reading this Chris, thanks for the memories, and I accept the new gifts. And in the aftermath, I can only hope that you will not judge the most of us for the least of us. That, once again, all of us are not going to have to be represented by the one of us who was the worst of us. I hope you will come back to sing your songs for us again.

And we can sing for a long, long time. ©1994. Shelly Roberts.

Not that there won't always be little pockets of homophobia - look at how much racism continues to run rampant all these years after the Civil Rights Movement - but what, exactly, will become of us when we are equals under the law and when, if our families freak out upon our coming out, they will be the weirdos, not us? If we don't have marches on Washington to organize and attend, if Queer Nation and ACT UP become obsolete, if we no longer need to protest and rally on a regular basis, what will we do with ourselves? We will be a people with time on our hands! Whole segments of the pocket calendar industry may be thrown out of work...

And that's not the half of it. For instance, what fun will it be coming out when no one is shocked by it anymore? We'll have to find something else to do to

"Why, yes, what used to hold this community together was our sexual orientation and our ostracism because of it. But now, really, our main tie is that we all do hang gliding during tornado warnings."

Then too, wasn't sex just a teenyweeny bit more dazzling when we knew that the bulk of our neighbors would think what we were doing was perverted and sick? As for support groups, sure they'll go on for awhile - all those radical fairies and dykes trying to cope with the loss of a sense of purpose but eventually, even those folks will have adjust to the new wave of respectability, and support groups will be artifacts of the past.

That's why it does this old heart

good to see the controversy swirling around the infamous kiss scene on Roseanne: those terrifying days of a lackluster homosexual existence are still far off in the future. Talk about much ado about nothing, though. You'd think that the script had called for Roseanne to have nude sex with donkeys, what with all the ruckus in the media and talk of the show not airing. In fact, as it turned out, America as a whole was apparently not all that shocked by what they saw after all. At least, once the episode had aired, nary a peep was heard about it again.

B.E.T. because they can find or create more productive programming. Videos are alright for a while. But not all day, and not if they are sending out the wrong message of the Black woman. And those re-runs of What's Happening and Sanford and Son have got to go!

So where did we go wrong? How did we get to this point? Can we turn it around? How?

I see our young men out in the streets talking about women like they're animals. And I see young girls smiling at degrading comments these boy's because they haven't learned that they deserve to be respected. A lot of them retaliate by being loud and obscene with the boys. It makes me want to cry. I don't want to fear my Black brothers because I'm a Black woman and a Lesbian. I want to understand my brothers and hope that they understand me. I want us to speak to each other without tearing one another down. I want us to be unified, strong, proud, spiritual, Black.

We need to stop letting other cultures tell us how to raise our children. Our ancestors were raising little African children long before they were put on the boat. And they did a fine job, I'm sure. No other race of people could ever tell me how to raise my little Black child. Black parents must teach and demand that our children know their history and their culture first. It's OK to learn about others, but know yourself first. Let's turn

things around. We can make it better. We have to.

When I'm out and I encounter a group of tough-looking young boys or girls, I make eye contact with every one of them. I look into their eyes and behind all of that tough exterior is a child that just wants to be understood. A lost child that needs to be listened to, not just heard. When they look into my eyes, I want them to see a woman that wants to listen and understand. A woman that truly wants to help. And most of the time, just taking a few minutes to talk to them in a positive and constructive manner means so much. I can see that in their eyes, too.

When I pass a sister or brother walking down the street, I smile and speak. You see, we used to do that

anyway.

There's so much to be done. So we better get started because time is running out. Wake up everybody!



Straight Talk for Gay Youth

Today we face hardships as teens dealing with problems in school and at home. But most teens have friends who can support and stand by them when they are needed. But with Gay teens what do you do? How is a Gay teen supposed to tell a good friend that they are Gay? The focus of this issue's article is going to be how Gay teens tell their best friends that they are Gay. This is probably a huge question that many Gay teens ask.

What do I say? I am afraid of what they may say? Are they not going to like me anymore? Are they going to tell others? Will they laugh at me? Will we ever be normal friends? It is hard enough just being a teenager in today's society but to be Gay and have to deal with the thought of telling others puts a big pressure on Gay teens as well. The following is how one individual handled the situation and the advice that the person would give others.

I have only a few months of school left, but I am preparing for the last laugh. I do remember very well what I had to go through to tell my friends that I was Gay. Some of the things that I will remember is wondering if the person I'm telling will like me after they know about me? Will they tell others? Are they going to tell me things that I just don't want to hear?

Most of the time it went so well that we became closer friends, but in other instances it didn't happen that way. I feel that telling others has helped me grow because it forced me to deal with my problems and therefore benefitted me. Some advice about how to prepare to tell others about you being Gay are:

Are you sure about your sexual orientation? Do not raise the issue unless you are able to respond with confidence to the big question "Are you sure?" Confusion on your part will increase your friends confusion and decrease their confidence in your judgment.

Are you comfortable with your Gay sexuality? If you are dealing with guilt and periods of depression, it would be a good idea to wait.

Do you have support? In the event your friend's reaction devastates you, there should be someone or a group that you can confidently turn to for emotional support and strength. An example is Gay Youth Milwaukee, or Picada/ Briarpatch in Madison.

Are you knowledgeable about homosexuality? Your friend may respond based on negative incorrect

information.


What's the emotional climate that you are experiencing with them? Choose a time when they are not dealing with such matters as school pressures or work or home troubles.

Can you be patient? They may need time to deal with it, which may take some length of time perhaps.

What's your motive for coming out? Hopefully its because you care for the person to let them know about such an important part of your life.

Do you have available resources? Homosexuality is something people know little or nothing about. Have available information for them to read if they would like.

These are some very good guidelines to go by and should help make the situation less stressful. Next issue's column will feature activities and organizations for Gay teens to participate in. Team Wisconsin Preparing

Nearly 70 Wisconsin Athletes to Participate in Gay Games

Madison - With just over two months to go until Gay Games IV in New York City, the co-coordinators of Team Wisconsin are working hard to insure a strong Wisconsin presence. Estimates for overall attendance at the Games range from 9,000 to 15,000, which would make it one of the largest athletic events ever. Wisconsin will be represented by close to 70 athletes competing in 16 different

Co-coordinator and women's volleyball player Chris Boyd is a veteran of Gay Games III in Vancouver. "There were 22 athletes from Wisconsin. No one knew each other. Everyone was wearing different uniforms." For Gay Games IV Boyd has joined with co-coordinator Stacy Seibert to promote the Games and generate support for the team. The two wrote grants and solicited sponsorships. To date, they have secured sizable grants from the Cream City Foundation in Milwaukee and Madison's New Harvest Foundation. In a major coup, the pair got the Miller Brewing Company to agree to outfit all of Team Wisconsin

in matching warmup outfits.

The late Dr. Thomas Waddell, founder of the Games, wanted to "provide an arena for all athletes of all skill levels to compete," said Boyd. She and Seibert agree on the role the Games play. "It's important to pull the community together and celebrate Gay Pride," said Seibert, adding that the Games are a great opportunity "to be visible in a very positive way.


Boyd concurs. "The opening and closing ceremonies really set the stage" for the event, she said. With so many athletes competing from around the world, the Games offer a "different perspective on Gay and Lesbian culture, she added.

The Games also serve as a way for athletes to meet others in their sports. Seibert noted that a men's tennis player from Wisconsin discovered a national Gay men's tennis players association through his involvement with the Games. Since then, he's helped organize the Metro Milwaukee Tennis Club. In addition to athletics, there will be a strong presence int he arts at the Games. And of course, the Games coincide this year the massive Stonewall celebration.

Team Wisconsin has planned a Pre-Games celebration at Madison's Tenney Park for Saturday, June 4 starting at 4pm. Miller Brewing Company will be donating the beer for the party, and the event will also include food, a DJ, activities and speakers.
