



# Milwaukee to Issue Water Alerts for the Immune Compromised

# Report Details Reforms Since Crypto Outbreak

Milwaukee — On May 10, the City of Milwaukee's Health Department and the Milwaukee AIDS Project issued an extraordinary joint statement on the topic of "Cryptosporidium and Immune

Compromised Individuals."

The statement detailed ongoing research into the prevalence of the cryptosporidium parasite in water supplies and the reforms enacted to better detect and eliminate the parasite. Most importantly, it included a commitment by the city to issue an alert when levels of crypto in municipal drinking water may be harmful to people with HIV/AIDS and other immune disorders.

Last spring, an outbreak of cryptosporidiosis from parasites in the city's water supply sickened 400,000 people. Most healthy individuals were able to rid themselves of the infection within ten days or so. But people with HIV/AIDS and other immune disorders were impacted severely. Lacking a strong immune response, many were unable to fight the infection and suffered from constant diarrhea and vomiting. MAP says that 88 of 122 clients who contracted crypto have died. ACT UP says the death toll is over 100.

ACT UP was the most militant voice on this issue, demanding compensation from the city for its negligence and insisting that the city issue special water advisories for immune-compromised individuals. On April 7, ACT UP had conducted a noisy demonstration at City Hall to mark the anniversary of the crypto epidemic, carrying a coffin into Mayor John Norquist's office and presenting city officials once again with

its demands.

At that demonstration, ACT UP says Health Commisioner Paul Nannis dismissed its demands as unreasonable. But Nannis had apparently been meeting all along with representatives of MAP and scientists and health professionals to develop a policy governing the city's response to any potential recurrence of crypto and its effect on the immune-compromised.

In Step interviewed Nannis several times in the past year. He never said special water alerts would not be issued. he just said the timing was not yet right and that more research needed to be

done

The joint statement of the Health Department and MAP covers three main areas of concern which, because of their importance to the Gay and AIDS communities, we are summarizing and excerpting here.

### THE IMMUNE-COMPROMISED

On the question of Should individuals with compromised immune systems boil their drinking water or drink bottled water? the report had this to say. It recognized the "devastating effect" crypto has had on people with HIV/AIDS, causing many deaths. Saying the concerns of immune-compromised individuals are of "paramount importance" to the Health Department, the statement drew the following conclusions.

All cryptosporidium tests on Milwaukee water that are reported to the Health Department are being made available for public review and are being given to the Milwaukee AIDS Project for consideration by the AIDS community.

Water quality monitoring in Milwaukee is ongoing with constant consideration being given to both i m m u n e - h e a l t h y a n d immune-compromised populations.

The Health Department will issue water quality alerts when plant effluent turbidity exceeds 0.5 NTU. [The Environmental Protection Agency reuires state officials to notify it when turbidity levels reach 5.0 NTU, making the city's standard 10 times lower, or more stringent, than the EPA standard.] Alerts may be issued at lower NTU levels if other water quality parameters, such as particle counts, indicate a potential health risk. These water quality alerts are intended to provide individuals, especially those with compromised immune systems, with the best information upon which to make personal decisions on risk reduction.

The Health Department will recommend that the Mayor or the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) issue a boil water advisory when water monitoring indicates a deterioration in water quality that may pose a health risk

for the entire population.

"We believe that the water supply in Milwaukee is safe. For people with weakened immune systems, we believe that the risk of cryptosporidium infection from drinking tap water in a non-outbreak situation is extremely small. This small risk may be reduced even further by boiling water for five minutes and using a water filter.

"It remains an individual's personal decision about the extent to which risk reduction strategies will be used to avoid a food or waterborne disease. We advise that personal risk reduction decisions be made in consultation with a physician and with relevant community-based organizations such as the Milwaukee AIDS Project...

"As data from the water monitoring projects and clinical studies become available, it will be shared promptly with the community so that individuals can make the best decisions concerning

their personal health."

### RESEARCH AND REFORMS

The two other questions addressed in the statement concerned what is being done to better understand the levels and effects of cryptosporidium on humans and what is being done to

prevent future outbreaks.

In a study of the presence of cryptosporidium in 86 surface water treatment plants nationwide, crypto was found in 87% of raw water samples and in 27% of finished water samples, lending credence to the claims of city officials that Milwaukee's is not the only water supply containing crypto. Some studies suggest that 25-35% of the population may have antibodies to crypto.

The EPA is conducting a study to determine the dose or number of crypto organisms that a human would have to ingest to cause illness. These studies, conducted on healthy adults only, will not be completed until the fall of 1995. The results will not provide infectious dose information about immune compromised populations, however.

In December, Children's Hospital began a year long surveillance project in which every stool specimen submitted will be tested for crypto. Seasonal patterns of infection and clinical characteristics of the disease will be

assessed.

Water samples are currently being taken from multiple sites throughout the Milwaukee watershed during different seasons and precipitation periods. A similar study is being conducted statewide by the DNR. Results should help determine whether the presence of crypto in surface water is related to land use, weather conditions, season of year or geographic location.

The city is also working with the University of Wisconsin Institute for Great Lakes Studies to study the water flow dynamics of Milwaukee's outer

harbor. Results may help in decision-making about the possible relocation of intake water cribs for

treatment plants.

Because chlorine is ineffective in eradicating crypto, engineers focused on reforms in the water filtration system in hopes of killing the bug. Both of Milwaukee's treatment plants have installed new monitoring devices on each filter that count the number and size of particles passing through the

filters as well as new equipment that automatically measures water turbidity, or cloudiness. The new equipment gives Water Department staff a continuous stream of data so they can rapidly respond to changing conditions.

Prior to the crypto outbreak, the water used to clean the filters was recycled through the system. Today, that backwash is disposed of rather than

equipment will, by this summer, enable the city to confirm the presence and determine the levels of crypto in the municipal water supply in-house, rather than having to send water samples to outside labs, wasting precious time

As new studies and information about crypto become available, the Health Department and MAP pledge to update their protocols and recommendations to the public.

# Long Distance Marketers Battle For LesBiGay Business Capitalism At Its Finest?

Accusations are flying thick and fast as the dispute gets uglier between two companies vying to be the long distance company to the Gay community. At stake in the war between Overlooked Opinions TransNational Communications (TNC) are the business and the trust of a customer base of about 20,000 people and organizations. A federal court will decide whether those customers belong to Overlooked or to TNC.

When Chicago based Overlooked Opinions launched its long distance provider service, Community Spirit, it contracted with TransNational Communications to provide the phone lines and to bill Community Spirit customers. TNC is a long distance reseller; it purchases long distance access from Sprint and then resells it to other companies. TNC billed customers under a number of names, including MLDA, ZPDI, USBI and US Billing. TNC does not itself own any long distance lines. Overlooked Opinions does not directly purchase or resell long distance from anyone.

According to Jeffrey Vitale, President of Overlooked Opinions, Overlooked notified TNC in November of 1993 that it believed TNC to be in breach of its contract with Overlooked. Overlooked cited poor customer service, non-payment of fees, unreasonable pricing, failure to provide auditing reports, improper bad debt practices, refusal to provide service to Overlooked customers, delays in providing calling cards and unilateral cancellation of

calling cards as its reasons.

According to Michelle Frost, Pride Network Supervisor for TNC, TNC notified Overlooked at the same time that TNC believed Overlooked was in breach of contract. TNC's concerns centered round distribution of donations to the various community groups customers had chosen to receive "[Overlooked] said they would distribute [money] quarterly. TNC sent them [the collected donations] on a quarterly basis. After 15 months, they finally sent out checks.' contd. on page ▶ 6

# Who's Who In The Gay Long Distance Battle

Overlooked Opinions: A marketing and research company, based in Illinois,

which collects data on the Les/Bi/Gay community.

Community Spirit: A project launched by Overlooked Opinions to provide Gay-owned & updated long distance service. Community Spirit pledged to donate 2% of each customer's long distance bill to the Les/Bi/Gay or AIDS organization of his or her choice

TransNational Communications (TNC): A company contracted by Overlooked Opinions to provide long distance access and billing to Community Spirit customers. TNC buys long distance access from Sprint and resells it to other

companies, but does not own any long distance lines itself.

AmeriConnect: A company contracted by Overlooked Opinions after termination of its contract with TNC to provide long distance access and billing to Community Spirit customers. AmeriConnect is also a Sprint service reseller and does not directly own any long distance lines.

The Pride Network: A project launched by TNC on February 25, 1994 to provide long distance service to customers obtained from Community Spirit. The Pride Network has pledged to donate 2% of each customer's long distance bill to the L/G/B

or AIDS organization of his or her choice.

Sprint: A long distance company which sells access to both TransNational Communications and AmeriConnect.

# Chronology of The Long Distance War

January 1, 1993: Overlooked Opinions establishes Community Spirit and contracts with TransNational Communications to provide long distance services and billing.

November 1, 1993: Overlooked Opinions and TNC each allege that the other

is in breach of contract. Negotiations to rectify differences begin.

February 17, 1994: The contract between Overlooked Opinions and TNC is terminated February 25, 1994: TNC establishes The Pride Network and begins to

service Community Spirit customers under that name.

March 8, 1994: TNC drafts a letter to all Community Spirit customers, charging that Community Spirit is not fulfilling their contractual obligations to Community Spirit customers. The letters are not mailed until April 6, allegedly because Overlooked and TNC are "still negotiating in good faith." Enclosed with the letters are a check for \$5, which TNC says is to "thank [customers] for [their] participation."

April 4, 1994: Overlooked Opinions mails a letter to the customers on its database charges of TNC with breach of contract and claiming that fine print on TNC's

check authorizes a "switch" to The Pride Network. Overlooked includes a Letter of Agency for customers to "reaffirm" Community Spirit and AmeriConnect as their long distance carrier. Sprint later finds that Overlooked's LOA is not sufficient to allow it to switch customers back to Community Spirit, and switches customers back to TNC. Overlooked generates proper LOAs and the situation becomes "a marketing battle."

Val Zillig, Overlooked Opinions' National Director for agent Accounts, claims that TNC "misrepresented" Overlooked by saying donations were sent quarterly. Zillig said that donations are sent out on a yearly basis. He noted that checks were sent to at least two Madison area organizations on April 5 of

this year.

Overlooked and TNC were unable to negotiate a contract settlement, and Overlooked announced on February 17 of this year that it was terminating the contract with TNC. At that time, Overlooked contracted with AmeriConnect, another long distance reseller, to provide phone lines and to bill Community Spirit customers. AmeriConnect also buys and resells Sprint long distance.

### **COMPANY MAILINGS COMPLICATE MATTERS**

Further complicating the situation is a series of mailings sent out by both companies. TNC drafted a letter on March 8 to everyone on the Community Spirit database implying that Community Spirit had ceased operations under that name. The letter stated that TNC was "taking over all aspects of the [long distance] program and relaunching it as The Pride Network." The letter also stated that Overlooked Opinions had only been a "marketing agent." While the letter was dated March 8, 1994, TNC did not mail it until April 6. Frost said that this is because TNC was "in good faith negotiating" with Overlooked until that

Enclosed with that letter was a check for \$5, which TNC said was to "thank [Community Spirit customers] for [their] participation." In its mailing to the database, dated April 4, 1994, Overlooked claimed that TNC's \$5 checks were actually "reimbursement checks for switching to Community Spirit." Overlooked further claimed that TNC had improperly included "fine print" on the checks to give themselves "an angle" to claim that any Community Spirit customer who cashed it was selecting TNC as his or her long distance carrier.

With its mailing Overlooked included Letter of Agency. Federal CommunicationsCommissionregulations state that any long distance company must have on file a Letter of Agency, or LOA, before the company may provide that customer with long distance service. According to Frost, when customers chose Community Spirit as their long distance provider, they signed an LOA with TransNational Communications, not with Overlooked Opinions or Community Spirit. This meant, according to Frost, that TNC would remain the long distance carrier for those customers, regardless of the relationship between TNC and

Overlooked. TNC announced on February 25 the formation of The Pride Network to service those customers. Overlooked's disagreement with this interpretation forms the basis of its lawsuit against TNC.

Customers who returned the new LOA to Overlooked were switched by Sprint to Community Spirit's new billing agent, AmeriConnect, According to Frost, Sprint requested a copy of the LOA and determined that "the LOA did not conform to the standards set by Sprint or FCC." A customer service representative for MLDA, one of the names under which TNC bills, said that Sprint's switching of customers was illegal; Frost is unsure if it was illegal, but did say that Sprint determined hat the LOAs "were not regulation. They were not enough for Sprint to switch [customers]."

Frost's version is not quite accurate, according to Sprint media relations person Norman Black. "Sprint's standard [for LOAs] is the FCC's standard," he said. He noted that Sprint did not request a copy of Overlooked's new LOA. Instead, TNC sent copies to Sprint's lawyers, who advised the company that Overlooked's LOAs did not conform to FCC regulations. Customers were "apparently" returned to TNC, he said. Overlooked now says that a newer LOA does meet FCC standards. Black pointed out that Sprint has "not taken on any policing role in this dispute."

> L/G/B COMMUNITY STUCK IN THE MIDDLE

The L/G/B community is caught between these two companies. While Zillig at Overlooked says that "the majority of people... want to keep working with [Community Spirit]," Frost claims an "active customer base" for The Pride Network of approximately 15,000. Both sides acknowledge that some customers are choosing another long distance carrier entirely until the matter is settled, and both agree that a protracted dispute will damage credibility within the L/G/B community.

The trouble has also sparked off a "Who's Gayer than who?" war of words between the companies. In its April 4 letter, Community Spirit called itself "the nation's only Gay and Lesbian owned and operated long distance company" and labelled TNC "a straight company"

out to "line its pockets."

Frost, who is openly Lesbian, responded, "It's true that TNC is not Gay owned and operated, but neither is AmeriConnect," the company assumed TNC's role with Community Spirit. She noted that TNC extends full partnership benefits to its LesBiGay employees except for health insurance, and expects to add that within 30 days.

TNC is based in Massachusetts, which has a law protecting the LesBiGay community from discrimination employment, housing and public accommodations. Illinois, the home state of Overlooked Opinions, does not have an antidiscrimination law, but Chicago, where Overlooked is headquartered,

Overlooked Opinions sought, and was denied, an injunction against TNC to stop it from telemarketing customers from the Overlooked database. Overlooked is seeking another injunction on the grounds of trademark infringement. Both Overlooked and TNC are suing each other in federal court on a number of grounds. Representatives from both sides were unsure as to the exact status of the suits.

YOUR LONG DISTANCE COMPANY

If you were signed up with Community Spirit, you can determine who is currently providing your long distance service, and to which company our money is going, by checking the logo at the top of the long distance page of your phone bill. If it is a Sprint, AT&T or MCI logo, that company is providing your service directly. If the logo says MLDA, ZPDI, USBI or US Billing, then TNC is supplying your service through The Pride Network. Community Spirit is your carrier if you have no long distance page or if the page is topped by an AmeriConnect logo. if you're still confused, contact your local phone company for more information.

# AIDS Memorial at Milwaukee's Miller Pavillion May 22

Part of International Candlelight Memorial and Mobilization

Milwaukee — Milwaukee will join over 240 cities and 45 countries worldwide participating in the 11th International AIDS Candlelight Memorial and Mobilization on Sunday, May 22. The local event, sponsored by the Milwaukee AIDS Project, will begin at 7pm at the O'Donnell Park Miller Pavilion at 910 E. Michigan Avenue.

Representatives from MAP and other agencies will read the names of more than 150 men, women and children who have died within the last year. Candles will be lit in remembrance of them. The St. Elizabeth's Gospel Choir and the Cream City Chorus will perform.

The Candlelight Memorial commemorates those who have died of AIDS, provides support to those who are living with AIDS and aims to strengthen the community's commitment to fighting the disease. It is an opportunity for individuals to learn about AIDS, the services provided by MAP, and how they can get involved.

Throughout the weekend of May 21-22, all masses and prayers at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist at 802 N. Jackson Street will honor those living with HIV/AIDS and those who have died. A special icon, "Mother of God, Light in All Darkness," will be installed in the cathedral that weekend.

This year marks the 11th anniversary of the world's largest annual community-based AIDS event. Memorials will be held in cities in all 50 states and in many countries around the globe.

In addition to the local focus, the event is an opportunity for political and religious leaders to speak out about AIDS. Last year, President Clinton and his wife Hillary participated by placing candles in the windows of the White House, and leaders ranging from Ireland's President, Mary Robinson, to

# Openly Gay Director Rob Epstein Appears In Madison

Madison — Two-time Academy Award winning producer-director Rob Epstein was in Madison on April 28 the show his Oscar winning documentary on the NAMES Project, Common Threads: Stories from the Quilt, and to speak about his work as an openly Gay film maker.

Epstein's first major work was the collaborate effort Word is Out. Six film makers went to different parts of the country and recorded what Epstein called "a picture of what Gay life was, circa 1977." The clips he showed painted a depressing picture, with many of the film's subjects speaking of military witch hunts, involuntary hospitalizations and shock treatments.

Epstein won his first Academy Award in 1984 for The Times of Harvey Milk, chronicling the life and assassination of San Francisco's first openly Gay elected official. His second award came in 1989 for the aforementioned Common Threads. While the audience was moved by the showing. Epstein was challenged for not including any women among the people with AIDs profiled. Epstein responded, somewhat defensively, that all of the names of the people profiled came from the NAMES Project and that "there were statistically fewer women with AIDS at that time." He noted that one of the films narrators was an HIV positive woman.

Epstein's success has led to opportunities in more mainstream arenas. He has done three films for the Playboy Channel (with heterosexual content), and he produced a segment on the Gay movement for ABC's Day One, which aired the day of last year's March on Washington. "Over the last 17 years I've moved farther into the mainstream without changing my point of view as an openly Gay producer," he said.

Epstein is working now to raise funds to produce the movie version of *The Celluloid Closet*, a history of Gays on film based on the book by the late film critic Vito Russo. About half the budget has been raised through start-up money from PBS and a direct mail campaign. "It's been a struggle," he said.

# Busload of Area Students Off To Battle The Right In Missouri

Madison — A busload of Wisconsin students will spend the summer in Missouri, fighting against an anti-Gay initiative on that state's November ballot. Missouri Summer '94 will work with Missouri activist group Show Me Equality doing phone banking, registering voters and talking to community groups.

After a week of training in Minneapolis, students from Wisconsin and Minnesota will depart for Missouri on July 9. They will meet their host families on July 10, when they will receive their assignments in towns across the state.

Missouri Summer '94 is the only known program of its kind taking place this summer. Students in Wisconsin and Minnesota, coming form Midwest states with Gay rights laws that are not facing repeal, are in a unique position to work in a state whose LesBiGay communities are under attack. Two other midwestern states, Michigan and Ohio, are facing similar initiatives, but Missouri's is given the highest chance of passing.

Students participating in Missouri Summer '94 will receive a stipend of \$300 and free room and board for the six-week stay in Missouri. Some professors are also offering course credit. (Spots are still available. Anyone who wants to get involved may contact Missouri Summer '93 coordinator Gary Schiff at (612) 825-7645.)

Chris Morris, co-president of the UW-Madison 10% Society, will be in Missouri for the summer. He will be writing articles on the summer's events which will appear exclusively in In Step.

# Jeff Miller Honored By Nursing Peers

Milwaukee — Jeff Miller, RN, was honored by the Milwaukee District Nurses Association following the 1994 Nurses Lamplight Walk, and celebration on Monday, May 9th at the Italian Community Center.

Attended by more than 500 nurses, Miller was one of three selected by a committee of peers for 'Nurse Of The Year' honors out of over 200 nominations. Accepting his award as a runner-up, Jeff reaffirmed his commitment to service in the community as the thrust of his professional life.

### **AWARDEES**

Special recognition is being given to Dick Wagner, who recently retired from the Dane County Board after more than a decade of distinguished service as an openly Gay supervisor, including several years as board chair. Wagner's many contributions as a community leader, including his ongoing work with the New Harvest Foundation and the Madison AIDS Support Network, have brought him accolades from community leaders of all backgrounds and from all parts of the political spectrum. He has been both a nationally-recognized leader in his support of openly Lesbian and Gay candidates for office and an important spokesperson for the LGB community

On the occasion of the United's award, Madison Mayor Paul Soglin said, "I consider it an honor to (join in) tribute to Dick Wagner. I first met Dick in 1970. Since then, I have treasured his wisdom and counsel. The city and county have benefitted greatly from his intelligence, commitment and passion. His ability to balance community and individual needs in a variety of areas such as historic preservation, land use planning, and tax policy reflects his openness and broad interest in public policy. I can't imagine a finer leader. He is one of the few whose reentry into public office I would welcome."

Two prominent advocates for children and an educational environment

which respects and affirms Lesbian and Gay diversity — Sunshine Jones and Jack Siebert — will be honored as Woman and Man of the year.

Sunshine Jones is a longtime community activist and advocate, and the co-founder of Madison's Lesbian Parents Network. More recently, she has been a leader in GLADE (Gays and Lesbians for Diversity in Education), an organization which advocates for Madison school district policies that address the special issues facing Gay and Lesbian children, families and educational professionals. Her more than twenty-five years of activism have also included leadership as a feminist, environmentalist, family life educator, and spiritual leader.

Jack Siebert is a co-founder of GLEE, an association of G/L/B education professionals that makes a powerful difference both here in Madison and statewide. He is our community's main point person within the Madison school system on these issues. Through his union and community connections, he has worked tirelessly to elect progressive school board members who embrace a multi-cultural, L/G/B affirming curriculum. He is a loving father, an activist, a coalition builder, a policy expert, and a leader in Madison's Gay Father's group.

Longtime women's community leader Sue Goldwomon will receive the

Volunteer Woman of the Year Award. A veteran of the early days of Madison's Lesbian, Gay, and feminist movements, she's been a leader in numerous community organizations including WORT community radio, Community Shares of Wisconsin, and Apple Island Productions. She is in her tenth year as host of WORT's Her Infinite Variety, a weekly show that showcases both old and new music alike, and keeps women in Madison informed about upcoming live performances.

Community Activist Tom Neal's important work often goes unnoticed because it's usually behind the scenes. He currently serves as president of the board of the Gay and Lesbian Resource Center, the agency which is responsible for the state's largest GLB resource library (located at the United and a variety of other support groups and services. "Tom's activism is the hands-on kind," writes one nominator. "Not only does he oversee fundraising and other traditional board president's duties, but he and his partner Pat also build many of the bookshelves for the library."

Like Tom Neal, the people behind Madison's Gay and Lesbian Resource Center (MGLRC) do important work that often goes unrecognized. With this in mind, MGLRC was named Organization





of the Year. Founded in 1974, it is one of the oldest continuing LGB organizations in the state. Its extensive library is housed in the offices of The United, and many people attribute this and other important MGLRC functions to the United - functions which are in fact performed by MGLRC's hard working volunteers.

MGLRC also publishes Madison's Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Resource Directory, which has grown by leaps and bounds in recent years. Hard work has meant numerous new organizational listings and a broad base of advertisers. Numerous community organizations, such as Frontiers, the Blue Bus Clinic, PFlag, and the Gay Fathers group, began under the wing of what is now called MGLRC. The organization's newest project is a GLB resources computer bulletin board service.

The compassion, perseverance, and hard work of two exceptional women is being recognized with two "Ally of the Year" awards. As leaders in the Madison chapter of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFlag), Jane LaFlash and Joann Elder are well known and loved by many in our community, however, too often, their important work has gone unrecognized.

Jane LaFlash is a founder of the local PFlag chapter and her persistence and leadership in the organization's early years were the main reason that the group began to grow and flourish. This year, she organized PFlag's statewide conference. She has served in board and committee positions at The United and MGLRC. As a member of the Wisconsin Council of Churches, she participated in the production of a powerful video on Gays and Lesbians in the church.

Joann Elder, working in partnership with Jane, has been a driving force in the success of PFlag, both locally and statewide. Additionally, she worked long and hard to successfully persuade Madison's Friends Quaker Meeting to permit and affirm same sex unions. Working tirelessly both as an individual and in partnership with her husband Joe, she has been a moving compassionate advocate for the LGB community at he University of Wisconsin, in the greater Madison community, and beyond.

# **STATE News Briefs**

Commission to Appeal Ruling on Dahmer Cops

Milwaukee — After angry protests community organizations, the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission voted May 9 to appeal the recent decision by Reserve Judge Robert Parins which called for reinstatement of two police officers who were fired for dereliction of duty in the Jeffrey Dahmer case. Parins had reversed an earlier decision by the Commission to sustain their terminations.

In the wake of Judge Parins's decision, some politicians urged that the case be closed so the city could "move on." Alderman Thomas Nardelli, who chairs the Common Council's Finance Committee, said no funds should be allocated for the appeal. But seven other council members disagreed, urging the Commission to appeal the decision.

African American and Gay and Lesbian leaders along with members of the families of Dahmer's victims also insisted that the decision be appealed. In a raucous incident May 5, angry protesters disrupted a Commission meeting, demanding the right to be

The meeting had heard. temporarily adjourned.

Commission Chairman M. Nicol Padway said "whatever we do is going to disturb certain sections of the community." But he said the appeal was necessary because without it, a precedent would be set in which the courts could dictate the standards of conduct for police officers.

The fired officers, John Balcerzak and Joseph Gabrish, were found guilty by the Commission of violating seven rules of conduct when they failed to fully investigate the plight of 14- year old Konerak Sinthasomphone who was attempting to flee Dahmer. Sinthasomphone and three other men

Christian Organizations Intensify Political Organizing

Madison — The Christian Coalition held its first organizing meeting in Wisconsin recently, with about 40 participants attending a leadership training session at the Madison Junior

College of Business.

The Director of the Christian Coalition's state chapter, Ginny Marschman, told those attending that it is "God's plan for you to participate in public policy." She said she hopes to see the Christian Coalition organized in every ward in the state.

Sneakers at the conference included Susan Armacost of Wisconsin Right to Life and Scott Walker, a conservative Republican Assemblyman representing Wauwatosa. Also present were the four announced Republican candidates running against Herb Kohl for the US Senate: Assemblyman Robert Welch, State Treasurer Cate Zeuske, attorney Tom Fitzpatrick and businessman Matt Gunderson.

Meanwhile, the US Taxpayers Party, led by conservative ideologue Howard Phillips, is trying to obtain the 10,000 signatures necessary to appear in its own column on election ballots in Wisconsin this November. The Party is supported by Christian conservatives who believe in separating from the GOP. It supports an end to the income tax, the IRS, foreign aid and welfare. It opposes Gay rights, abortion, gun control and racial quotas.

UW-Whitewater LesBiGay Group Wins Grievance

Whitewater — On May 6, the Student Organization Judicial Board at UW-Whitewater ruled in favor of a grievance filed against the school's student government by the Gay/Lesbian/ Bisexual Student Union. GLBSU claimed its rights had been violated when the Student Association denied its request for funding and engaged in anti-Gay rhetoric last November.

The GLBSU had requested a \$900 allocation for the 1994-95 school year and a committee charged with reviewing such requests recommended a \$600 grant. But at a Student Association meeting November 29, debate raged for an hour and a half over the morality of homosexuality and whether any student funds should be given to the group at all. The Student Association agreed only to provide GLBSU \$300 if GLBSU could raise matching funds, a stipulation no other student group was required to meet. After protests and charges of illegal procedures, student senators voted in December to allocate \$600 to the group.

The GLBSU filed a grievance however, and on May 6 the Judicial Board found the Student Association in violation of the UW System's and UW-Whitewater's policies against sexual orientation discrimination. The court ordered the Student Association to hold a one hour session for senators on proper decorum and procedures at meetings, a one hour session on LesBiGay issues, three one hour workshops on cultural diversity, and comprehensive leadership training for

student senators.

# ARCW Lobbies for More Equitable Funds

Milwaukee — Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, recently traveled to Washington with the message that federal AIDS funding must be distributed on an equitable, per capita basis.

Ryan White CARE Act funds are currently distributed through Title I (funding high incidence areas) and Title II (funding all other areas). This dual approach in allocating federal funds, according to Nelson, creates an inequity in funding between states with a high incidence of AIDS cases in metropolitian areas and lower incidence states.

Nelson presented to officials a Proposal for Equity in Per Capita AIDS Funding that calls for reauthorization of the CARE Act to ensure equitable funding. "Currently, Title I areas receive over \$3,700 per case, while Title II areas receive only \$1,163 per case. The \$2,600 per case difference in funding discriminates against people with HIV in Wisconsin and 32 other states," said Nelson.

The ARCW has organized a Campaign for Fairness in Federal AIDS Funding which is supported by a coalition of over 100 AIDS service groups. The Campaign is likely to change the landscape of national AIDS politics which has been dominated by East and West coast activists. "The AIDS epidemic is a national epidemic," Nelson noted, "and AIDS public policy must meet the needs of community-based service providers throughout the entire country."

Williams Gets 20 Years for Gay-Related Slaving

Milwaukee — On May 6, Judge Jeffrey Wagner sentenced Lee M. Williams, 37, to 20 years in prison for the Gay-related slaying of Shorewood resident Harold Miller, 52. Williams was found guilty of first degree reckless homicide in the strangulation murder of Miller in Miller's apartment last November 20.

Williams met Miller at the Shorewood Inn where Williams worked as a cook. After his work shift, Williams had drinks with Miller, who told Williams he was Gay and invited him to his apartment for more drinks. Once at the apartment, Miller allegedly made a sexual advance on Williams. Williams said he first tried to fend it off, but when Miller persisted Williams wrapped an electrical cord around Miller's neck and tightened it until he collapsed. Miller's body was discovered the next day when he failed to report for work.

The jury rejected a charge of first degree intentional homicide but agreed to the lesser charge.

Cammermever's Suit Against Pentagon Gets First Hearing

Seattle, WA - A federal judge heard the first arguments at a pre-trial hearing in the case of Colonel Margarethe Cammermeyer, an Army nurse and decorated veteran who was discharged from the Army in 1992 after admitting she is a Lesbian.

Cammermeyer's attorney argued that the discharge violated Cammermever's constitutional right to equal protection of the laws. She also argued that the Pentagon's ban on Gav and Lesbian service members serves no rational purpose and is akin to the racial segregation in the military that was previously outlawed by the courts.

Opposing counsel argued that Cammermeyer's case should dismissed because of previous rulings supporting the Pentagon ban and the recent Congressional codification of the so-called "Don't ask, don't tell, don't

pursue" policy.

Cammermeyer was a veteran of more than 25 years. She received a Bronze Star in Vietnam and was chief nurse for the Washington National Guard from 1986 to her discharge in 1992. In 1985, she was cited over 34,000 other Army nurses with the Administrator's Award for Excellence in Nursing.

## Austin Voters Repeal Domestic Partners Provision

Austin, TX - Residents of Austin. considered the most liberal municipality in Texas, voted by an overwhelming 62% to 38% to repeal the city's domestic partners provision which extended insurance coverage to the unmarried partners - Gay and straight

- of city workers.

The campaign to repeal the domestic partners measure was spearheaded by Rev. Charles Bullock. president of a group calling itself Concerned Texans, and Christian fundamentalist groups worked hard for the repeal. "The city of Austin has no right to redefine marriage," Bullock declared.

Since the City Council approved insurance coverage for domestic partners last fall, 69 heterosexual partners and 29 Gay or Lesbian partners had signed up for the

coverage.

Meanwhile in Baltimore, that city's Council voted 10-7 against establishing a domestic partners registry. The opposition came, once again, from conservative religious leaders who

feared the measure would sanction unmarried relationships. Baltimore. nevertheless. does extend health benefits to the partners of municipal employees. Critics feared the registry would encourage other employers to adopt similar policies.

Judge Okays School Bans on Military Recruiters

Albany, NY - The New York Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, ruled May 3 that local school boards have the right to prohibit the military from recruiting on school premises as a means of protesting the Pentagon's ban on homosexuals

The 6-1 decision reversed two lower court rulings in favor of the military. The armed services will not be automatically banned from all schools, but local school boards will be free to enact such restrictions. The case involved the decision by the city of Rochester to ban recruiters from its schools. A parent filed the lawsuit challenging the ban on recruiters and

won earlier rulings.

The decision is the second major blow to military recruiters in New York State. Last November, a judge ruled that allowing recruiters on the campuses of the state university system violated an order signed by Gov. Mario Cuomo prohibiting state agencies from discriminating against Gays. University officials declined to appeal the decision. which effectively prohibits military recruiting on almost 30 campuses statewide

## Christian Candidates Lose Big in Evangelist's Hometown

Virginia Beach, VA - Five evangelical Christian candidates supported by fundamentalist preacher Pat Robertson in his hometown of Virginia Beach all lost their bids for school board seats in May 3 elections.

The Christian candidates, running as a bloc called Kids First, lost by margins as narrow as 2% and as wide as 27%. The group pledged to oppose federal interference in local schools and to curb the influence of teachers unions. They also promised "an end to social experiments using your kids as guinea

"The rumor was that we were a right wing takeover," Kids First candidate Edward G. Kreyling Jr. told the New York Times. "Christians are being persecuted. Calling someone a religious person in politics these days is

not a compliment."

While Christian fundamentalist candidates continue to make gains in local elections and statehouses around the country, the defeat of openly Christian candidates in the hometown of the founder of the Christian Coalition

caused Gay and Lesbian leaders a measure of satisfaction. Robertson's frequently anti-Gay talk show, The 700 Club, is broadcast from the studios of the Christian Broadcasting Network in Virginia Beach

### Writer and AIDS Activist John Preston Dies

Portland, ME - John Preston. possibly the most prolific of modern Gay writers who proudly penned cutting-edge pornography and also became an AIDS activist, died of AIDS complications at his Portland home April 28. He was 48.

Preston wrote more than 30 books of both fiction and nonfiction over the past 15 years and was one of the most bestselling of openly Gay writers. Among his books are Franny, the Queen of Provincetown, Personal Dispatches: Writers Confront AIDS. My Life as a Pornographer and Other Indecent Acts and the critically acclaimed anthology Hometowns: Gay Men Write About Where They Belong. Preston wrote for many Gay papers as well as mainstream publications like Harper's and Interview.

Preston was born in Medfield. Massachusetts, graduated from Lake Forest College in Illinois, studied at several seminaries and was certified as a sexual health consultant. He founded Gay Community Services of Minneapolis in 1972 and served as editor of the


Advocate in the 1970's.


# PBS Chief Denies Censorship of "Tales"

New York, NY - Responding to criticism that PBS withdrew funding from the sequel to Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City because of its homosexual content, the new President and CEO of PBS, Ervin S. Duggan, sent a letter to the New York Times defending his decision

In the letter, Duggan reiterated his earlier contention that funding for the sequel was withdrawn for purely monetary reasons. PBS underwrote the first Tales miniseries with just \$150,000 (the bulk of the production was funded by Britain's Channel Four) but was asked to provide \$2 million for the sequel, a sum PBS simply cannot afford, according to Duggan. Such a financial commitment would deplete the budget for an entire season's worth of American Playhouse productions, he said.

Duggan also bristled at media reports casting him as a conservative ideologue. He was indeed appointed by George Bush to the Federal Communications Commission, but as a Democrat, and he previously held different positions in Democratic administrations. Duggan also denied he was a member of any evangelical denomination.



would wager that those members of the community who hold negativity and criticism as their foremost virtues do very little in the area of community service.



# In Search Of A Silver Bullet

Magic Messages And Strong Movements

With only six months until D-Day,
"D" as in possible Discrimination, the
heat is rapidly rising on the anti-Gay
initiatives slated for the November ballot
in at least seven states.

Campaign strategists around the country are frantically searching for an illusive magic bullet that will slay the Far Right dragon threatening to devour our civil rights. They're looking for an effective media and campaign "message" — a silver bullet — that will win votes and defeat initiatives.

But is that the ultimate goal, just to win a campaign battle? What about the overall war? Simply winning a vote returns us to the status quo. We fight with all our strength just to keep what we have, which is insufficient in the first place. Win or lose in November, the current battles and choice of tactics have far reaching significance for our

Arizona, Nevada, Idaho, Michigan, Missouri, Oregon and Washington have official anti-Gay initiatives. More states may follow. The initiatives repeal laws that ban discrimination against Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals, and prohibit passage of such laws in the future. The measures are misleadingly framed as "no special rights" and "no protected minority status"

National and local message polling around these measures reveals fascinating results. First, we face a tough battle in defeating the initiatives. We are confronted with a U.S. public that mainly sees us, and our "lifestyle," as unacceptable and immoral. Our "negatives" range from 50 to 77 percent.

Second, A majority erroneously believe we are already covered against discrimination by the U.S. Constitution, and we do not suffer prejudice. Hence, we seek "special" protections. Opinion is split at best about whether protective legislation is even necessary. Plus, many people polled subscribe to the "don't ask, don't tell" mindset: Gays are okay as long as they don't make it an issue.

Paradoxically, this high level of disapproval is accompanied by an equally strong (75 percent) belief that discrimination against us is wrong. And voters who personally know someone Gay tend to be more supportive.

Messages promoted by our opponents about "special rights", "government forced acceptance of homosexuality", and the lack of "Gay disadvantage" are cited most often by voters who support anti-Gay measures. Our side's messages about job discrimination ring well with voters who oppose the measures.

That's the brew of opinion that campaign strategists must cook into a winning strategy for political campaigns against the initiatives.

Political campaigns, out of necessity, are run by hard working people in war room-like settings. Campaign officials call the shots. The best campaigns find roles for everyone, but often there is minimal decision-making input from the community at large. The goal is short-term victory.

Some campaign battles are fought in states without established Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual organized communities. The campaign, in effect, becomes the "movement," a receptacle for the hopes, dreams, anger and frustration of people struggling for dignity

But after the vote the campaign office closes. Managers move on. Volunteers are let go. Campaigns cannot win ultimately what we want. They cannot contain all that we are. Without a fortified movement in place a tremendous vacuum forms that can cause frustration, division and burnout

MUST ORGANIZE FOR LONG TERM

I say we must strategically organize with long-term progressive social change in mind — with the idea of not only winning elections but also building a stronger movement. A movement that will be around much longer than special rights rhetoric. An anti-racist movement that embraces the struggles for women's equality and social and economic injustice. A movement that stands for freedom and equality. A movement that's part of a broad based, united front capable of vanquishing the Far Right dragon now and in the future.

No matter how effective our messages, how savvy our spin, years of homophobia cannot be unlearned during an eight-month campaign. That requires long-term commitment well beyond

November

We didn't choose these initiatives, the Far Right did. But we can chose to make these attacks opportunities for building a true community-based and empowered movement. Or we can put all our hopes and resources into a silver bullet and hope we don't draw a blank.

# **BestD** Answers **Health Questions**

Sexual Health

I'm confused, I hear a lot of different stories about HIV infection and how safe oral sex is. What should I believe?

This is a question that has troubled health educators and HIV counselors since HIV became known. There are many opinions as to just how safe oral sex is and some of them are just wishful thinking by certain individuals. Whenever you receive another person's blood, semen (cum or pre-cum) or vaginal fluids into your body, you are at some risk. The above body fluids will contain the virus if the other person is infected with HIV.

The HIV virus needs a direct route into an individual's blood stream to infect that person. Some virus' are airborne, HIV is not. When a person performs oral sex on a male, that person should avoid any contact with the male's semen (cum or pre-cum). The best way to do that is have the male wear a latex, unlubricated condom before any sucking begins. Then the male should not ejaculate while still in his partner's mouth. The reason for that is that teeth may cause tiny, microscopic tears in the condom and semen could leak out.

The person doing the sucking is the person that needs to be aware of any breaks in his or her mouth. Even the tiniest sore in a person's mouth could be the entry point for the virus to get into the bloodstream and cause infection. You need to consider such things as: cold sores; fever blisters; gum disease; brushing or flossing just before performing oral sex or recent dental work. Even tiny scratches from sharp food objects or biting our tongue, cheeks or lips could present a door way to the virus. Unfortunately it is unlikely that we can or even could thoroughly examine our mouths before performing oral sex.

As the writer of this question did not identify their gender or sexual orientation we will also cover oral/ vaginal sex. In an infected woman, the virus will also be present in her vaginal fluids. The same precautions should be observed in preventing these fluids from getting into her partner's mouth or lips. This can easily be accomplished by placing either a dental dam or other non-porous barrier over the genital area before performing any oral contact at all. (These other barriers could include: Plastic wraps; condoms cut lengthwise or even latex gloves cut open with the fingers cut off but the thumb left in place for a tongue glove.) The person performing oral sex (the one 'going down' on the other) should also be aware of any breaks in the skin of their face such as: Acne, shaving cuts or facial wounds that could present a doorway to the virus. Unbroken skin presents a barrier to the virus. Broken skin presents risk.

There is much talk about saliva. Saliva does not in itself carry infectious amounts of the HIV virus. Saliva is thought to contain certain factors that will inhibit the virus from infecting us. The problem here is whether or not an individual has enough of this factor to combat the amount of virus that they come in contact with or whether or not the factor even comes in contact with the

virus prior to infection.

Up to this point we have discussed the risk for the person giving oral sex, or the person sucking, licking or eating. What about he person receiving the action? Frequently partners change positions and the partner who was passive earlier has now become the

active partner. As we discussed earlier, saliva does not contain infectious amounts of the HIV virus, in itself, but if there is blood present in significant quantities in a person's mouth the virus would be present in some degree due to the blood. It is not likely that a person with a severe condition that caused blood to be present in his or her mouth would perform oral sex, but with alcohol or other judgment altering drugs present such unlikely actions could occur. The blood from the one person's mouth would have to then get into an open wound on the genital skin on the person receiving oral sex to infect them. This is not too unlikely as teeth have been known to scratch sensitive skin easily.

Consider sexual activity risk like a speedometer. The higher the speed, the higher the risk. Oral sex would pose a risk factor probably around the speed of normal city driving compared to rural freeway speeds. The risk is lower, but no matter how you look at it, there are still risks. This column discussed only risk factors for HIV infection and you should keep in mind that risk factors for other sexually transmitted diseases are different. They are higher.

# BESTD Clinic Says Hundreds Fail to Claim HIV Test Results

# 60 Positive Tests Among the Hundreds Not Picked Up

Milwaukee — Officials at the Brady East STD Clinic, which conducts anonymous HIV testing at its Brady Street location and at outreach sites at Gay bars, are deeply concerned that many people are not picking up their test results. The vast majority of the results are negative, but the clinic currently has 60 tests which have proved positive for antibodies to HIV, indicating that at least 60 individuals may be infected with the AIDS virus.

Some of the almost 800 unclaimed test results date as far back as 1987, but the majority were conducted since the fall of 1991, when Magic Johnson's announcement that he is HIV-positive brought a surge of people to testing sites.

Medical experts say it is essential for people who are HIV- infected to get counseling and treatment as early as possible. It is also important they are aware of their HIV status so they can plan their futures and protect their sexual partners.

People who have been tested but have not sought the results are strongly encouraged to come to the BESTD Clinic on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights between 6pm and 9pm. An appointment is not necessary. Clinic staff are also available to answer your questions or concerns by phone from 10am to 9pm on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, and from 10am to 5pm on Thursdays and Fridays. The number is (414) 272-2144. HIV testing is also conducted the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of the month from 6-9pm during the Alternative Women's Clinic.

### ADVANTAGES OF KNOWING HIV STATUS

There are many advantages to knowing your HIV status. Those who test negative over a period of time are relieved of undue anxiety and can be relatively sure that by using condoms and abstaining from high risk behaviors they can continue to protect themselves and their partners.

Those who test positive for HIV antibodies and who come in to receive their results get immediate support, advice and medical referrals from BESTD Clinic staff. Most of the clinic's HIV counselors have worked with people who have HIV or AIDS for many years. They are knowledgeable about the disease and sensitive to the fears

and questions of people newly diagnosed as HIV- positive.

"While it is true there is no cure for AIDS at this time, there is no question that early medical intervention can prolong life," says Dr. Kelly Balliet, Medical Director of the BESTD Clinic and Director of HIV Services at Sinai-Samaritan. "Early treatment is essential because prophylactic medications can successfully prevent many of the infections associated with AIDS before they have a chance to develop."

Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia, which ravaged many people with AIDS in the 1980's, is, according to Dr. Balliet, almost 99% preventable. Early vaccination against pneumococcal infections and bacterial pneumonias are effective in staving off serious illness. Flu shots are also essential for people with HIV/AIDS, but the key to all these measures, says Balliet, is early intervention.

"Vaccines are most effective if given when the immune system is still healthy. It is much harder to treat people once their immune system is already severely depleted."

Balliet said drug therapies appropriate to each individual are best determined between the patient and doctor and more options exist today than ever before. He cautioned people not to be discouraged by media reports which distorted the results of the recent Concorde study, implying that AZT is ineffective. "Longtime monotherapy [with just AZT] did not increase lifespan, but individuals are now living disease-free for longer periods of time," he said.

### WHAT DO I DO NOW?

People who learn they are HIV-positive are given support through an early intervention program called Positive Approaches to Health, a collaborative effort of the Milwaukee AIDS Project and the STD Specialties Clinic.

Doug Johnson, a Gay man and registered nurse who started the BESTD Clinic's HIV Testing and Counseling service in 1985 and who volunteered there for ten years, said the purpose of the early intervention program is to "calm their fears and ease them into the medical system."

"First, I help them deal with their first knowledge of the infection. It's a crisis situation for most people. Many are in considerable turmoil, even a state of shock. They want to know. What do I do now?"

Ongoing emotional and psychological support can be obtained through case workers and mental health professionals at the Milwaukee AIDS Project and through a variety of support groups for people with HIV/AIDS. Case workers at MAP can also advise clients about family, job and insurance-related issues.

After dealing with the individual's initial shock, informing him or her of the full range of support services, and answering immediate questions, Johnson conducts a medical evaluation. He compiles a medical history and conducts a physical exam and mental health assessment. Some basic lab work which includes blood tests and a chest x-ray will be done.

"Typically, few people are symptomatic when they first learn they are HIV-positive. But the tests allow us to establish a baseline of their current health status and to screen for potential problems."

In assessing each person, Johnson sometimes discovers that he or she may have a problem with drug or alcohol abuse, a problem that must be dealt with along with the HIV infection. So Johnson will try to facilitate their admission to a treatment program.

After an extensive evaluation in which he tries to determine any special problems or needs the person might have, Johnson will refer them to primary care physicians who will take over their care for the long term. Referrals are made only to professionals with a track record of sensitivity to people with HIV/AIDS, to Gays and to people of other minority status.

"The idea is to address the very real fears and anxieties people have and to make them more knowledgeable about their condition and the options they have," says Johnson. Follow-up appointments are made to monitor the individual's progress.

It's important to note that no one is turned away for lack of money or insurance. A Drug Reimbursement Program, Insurance Continuation Program and other forms of assistance and subsidies ensure that people with little or no money will still be cared for through the course of their infection.

"Leaving a person with nowhere to go, no one to talk to, can lead to denial and all kinds of self-destructive behaviors," said Johnson. "Giving them support, correcting their misperceptions, connecting them to good medical care helps them regain some sense of control. It empowers them and gives them some confidence in the future."

If the advantages of early intervention and support are not enough to get people to pick up their test results, Ross Walker, a BESTD Clinic Board member, also appealed to people's sense of pride.


"We're about to enter the season of Gay Pride celebrations," he said. "Knowing your HIV status reflects pride in yourself and respect for the people who love you."



# Counteracting The Radical Right's Campaign of Disinformation

The big lie technique is alive and well. The radical right continues to confuse even those in the Lesbian and Gay community with their campaigns of disinformation about the law and the Supreme Court. Hence, what follows is a legal primer on civil rights laws and civil rights concepts in the employment context.

The radical right refers to civil rights laws as "special" laws that gives "extra" rights to minority groups. They claim to use the "special rights" phrase to distinguish anti-discrimination civil rights protections from First Amendment quarantees. There's no doubt it's a clever phrase. But the analysis it reflects is wrong. Civil rights laws do not give "extra" rights to any group. In fact, civil rights laws protect all people, whether members of a majority or minority group, from discrimination. Whites, Christians, and men all may sue under laws prohibiting discrimination based on race, religion, and sex if they suffer discrimination. Likewise, heterosexuals are protected from discrimination based on sexual orientation where such protections against sexual orientation discrimination are in place.

The right claims that if Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals are protected from discrimination, then employers must give them preference in hiring, and cannot fire incompetent Gay, Lesbian, or Bisexual workers. Once again, false. Anti-discrimination laws leave employers free to refuse to hire and to fire workers (unless, of course, there is a union contract, or other legal restrictions on an employer's right to hire and fire at will). What antiemployees discrimination laws prevent employment decisions based on unlawful discriminatory motives. Civil rights forth the sorts of statutes set discriminatory motives that are unlawful (e.g. race, sex, national origin, etc.).

If an employee claims that she has been discriminated against for an unlawful reason, she has a heavy burden to meet to win her claim. She must, first of all, prove that all the reasons given by the employer for the action taken by the employer were not the true reasons. Second, she must prove that the real reason for the job action was unlawful discrimination. It is so difficult to win civil rights cases that the overwhelming majority of litigators do not even handle

such cases.

With regard to affirmative action, another hot button issue, a court can impose this on an employer only after finding that an employer has intentially engaged in discrimination. In most cases where discrimination has occurred, the court simply awards monetary compensation (and reinstatement if the worker was fired), coupled, at times, with an order that the company cease its discriminatory practices. Much less often is affirmative action ordered as a remedy for proven discrimination. When affirmative action is ordered, it is only a temporary measure.

Affirmative action remedies can be as mild as requiring a company to publicize its commitment to equal employment opportunity or to advertise job openings in minority newspapers. Affirmative action can, but does not always, include active recruitment of minority or women candidates for jobs as they come open, or training programs to improve the job qualifications of women and minorities. These types of affirmative action remedies simply seek to ensure that job opportunities are not limited to those in the "good old boys" network, and that minorities and women are aware of and able to apply for jobs traditionally closed to them.

Only rarely are quotas ordered as part of an affirmative action remedy. They are used in the most extreme cases of discrimination, when strong affirmative action measures are necessary to overcome a history of persistent discrimination. Even when quotas are ordered, they do not impose an absolute bar to the advancement of workers who are not minorities or women.

The radical right also argue that Gay men and Lesbians do not qualify legally for inclusion in civil rights laws, claiming that they do not meet a Supreme Court three-part "minority status" test. Wrong on two counts. First, the "minority status" phrase has no legal meaning, and second, there is no test (3-point or otherwise) for anti-discrimination legislation.

The phrases "minority status" and "protected minority class status" are neither contained in civil rights statutes nor used by judges in court decisions. The radical right has concocted these phrases simply to imply that minorities have some sort of special "status" in the

law, and that people who are not members of groups given "protected minority class status" are not covered by civil rights laws. Unfortunately, some leaders in the Gay and Lesbian community have adopted this bogus terminology, unwittingly undermining their attempts to counteract anti-Gay rhetoric.

With regard to the "three-part test" claim, there simply is no test for passing anti-discrimination legislation. Congress, states, and local municipalities can pass whatever protections from discrimination they deem necessary. The Supreme Court does not strike down laws that prohibit discrimination. Although it has allowed discrimination (e.g. Rostker v Goldberg, the 1981 case that upheld draft registration only for men and not for women), and even slavery (e.g. the Dred Scott decision), the Supreme Court has never required discrimination.

The radical right, of course, uses phrases such as "special rights," "minority status," "quota preferences," and "affirmative action" in its anti-Gay campaigns to mask its true agenda — to make Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals second class citizens and to deprive them of their equal rights under the constitution. If they continue winning at the ballot box on anti-Gay initiatives, all other civil rights protections will be subject to repeal.



# He's John McGivern

Last Thursday, I had an opportunity to meet and have a refreshingly frank conversation with openly gay actor John McGivern. When he came to the door, I thought, "The only similarity on the Midwest Side Story poster posted around town, is John's inviting smile." In person, he's much more handsome (and single), mature looking, and quite tall, actually. Over tea in my apartment, I did notice

one trait that does resemble John McGivern — it's his relaxed and positive attitude towards life.

Carmen: How did Midwest Side Story develop?

John: "My friend and director of seven years from Sheer Madness was instrumental in getting my work down. And I knew this is what I need to do."

Why is it important to tell your story?
"Theatrically, I really accepted this

rheatrically, I really accepted this form of theater; there is no change in the skit, it's John McGivern, honest truths. Personally, it's important for my recovery that I do this. It's almost like a 5th Step (Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.) It's also important for me as a gay man who lives and who has lost an entire community of gay men my age. To rejoice in life right now, and find some hope in what we have been through and where we're going."

Is that what your piece is about (where you're going)?

"That's really what my piece is about: where I've been and that fact that

What is your favorite part in Midwest Side Story?

"The audience. They're with me; I really feel them with me. First, they're checking out my outward appearance. Then they're listening to me, and I'm hoping my voice doesn't bug them. And finally I watch them sit back and settle in."

Tell me about your background in Theater, education, experience...

"I'm a natural comic. I studied acting at the University of South Florida, and I've worked in Atlanta, North Carolina, D.C. The road more traveled as I call it. Chicago is my home for eight years in September; this is where I could go for work."

Who have you discovered, along your road more traveled, are your greatest influences?

In this medium it's Spalding Gray a monologist who wrote Swimming to Cambodia. And as far as acting goes, it's just other actors who maintain this life, who just keep working."

After his run May 11-29 in Milwaukee, he opens in Chicago on June 2 at the Organic Greenhouse Theatre, followed by a run June 20-23 at Joseph Papp's Public Theatre in New York City, and can be seen on HBO's Comedy Central as part of "Out There" through July, 1994!

# Sneak Preview Benefits BESTD Clinic

Sex Is..., a fun, full length documentary film about Gay men's sexuality from the 50's through the 90's. It contains interview segments with a diverse group of men; music and video clips; news clips and some raw sex footage guaranteed to keep your interest piqued. It also explores attitudes of gay men toward sex and sexuality in the age of AIDS & HIV.

Documentary does not equal boring in Sex Is. A preview audience at my house sat through the 80 minute film in rapt attention. Marc Huestis and Lawrence Helman interspersed the "talking heads" with enough graphic images to keep even the most jaded audiences attentive.

One of the most important issues we face today, particularly within the context of HIV, is the expression of physical and emotional intimacy. It is no secret that with the rising conservative climate, there has been a retreat from public depiction's and discussions of Gay sexuality. Sex Is... examines the contradictions and necessity of sexual expression with a vulnerable honesty, maturity and depth.

Winner of the Audience Award for Best Gay Film at the 1993 Berlin International Film Festival, Sex Is... is a penetrating look into the lives of 15 Gay men. The subjects range from a church pastor to porn star in deeply touching interviews and provocative personal stories. Combined with rare archival footage and hot flashes of male erotica, the film provides a wonderful panoramic view of Gay sex through the last 35 years from the repressive 50's to the hedonistic 70's to the cautionary '90's and the age of AIDS.

The film is comprised of fully developed, in-depth interviews with subjects reflecting a broad spectrum of experience within the Gay community: monogamy to casual safe sex, from the overtly intellectual to the intensely physical. Their sexual testimony is very intimate, sometimes emotional, often vulnerable, but always non-judgmental.

Sex Is... is the latest project from

award winning filmmaker Marc Huestis (who also appears in the film) in collaboration with Lawrence Helman. The film has screened at film festivals throughout the world and has met with critical acclaim. It placed amongst the top 5 grossing documentaries of 1993

according to Variety and has broken many house records in the over 40

cities it has screened.

There have been a disparate number of films released in the past few years dealing with the AIDS crisis but none of them have profoundly explored the subject of sexuality in the process of disseminating their information. There have been films about people who are HIV positive, films about the deplorable response of governments to this everincreasing epidemic, films about activism, but to date have not explored Gay sexuality. Sex Is... has the potential to open up sexual closets which are maiming all of us. It is meant to provide a humanistic, intelligent and intimate look at sex and sexuality. It is sex education at its finest - devoid of cliches and stereotypes.

# "Savage Nights" is Exhilarating, Disturbing Fare

# Award-Winning French Movie Tackles One Man's Life with HIV

Savage Nights, a fascinating French film about a charming but egocentric bisexual with HIV, will play for a week at Milwaukee's Oriental Theater beginning May 20. It's a must-see.

The winner of France's Best Film Award last year, Savage Nights comes to American theaters embroiled in controversy. Initially ecstatic reviews have given way to increasing criticism about how the film deals with HIV/AIDS.

Some critics are attacking the film for allegedly romanticizing the irresponsible behavior of its central character, Jean, who knows he is HIV-positive but makes love to his female partner without telling her. They are dismayed that the teenage girl, Laura, transported by her passion for Jean, decides in subsequent lovemaking sessions not to protect herself, spouting the foolish notion that their love will protect them from disease.

These would be valid concerns if Savage Nights were a movie whose purpose was primarily AIDS education, but it is not. And I don't believe the movie depicts Jean and Laura's poor


judgment in a positive light at all. I can't imagine any viewer not recoiling in horror at the sight of Laura taking a condom from Jean and tossing it in an ashtray on the nearby bedstand, literally throwing caution - and possibly her life - into the ash heap.

Savage Nights is one of the only films about HIV, except for perhaps the low budget Living End, which deals in raw and startlingly honest detail about sexuality in the age of AIDS. an ideal world, everyone would practice safer sex and treat their partner or partners with the utmost integrity. In the real world, we all know that is not the case. Sexual relationships can be unpredictable, painful and just plain messy. People hurt each other and do stupid things. All of these elements the pleasures of sexual passion, the pangs of jealousy and deceit and the threat of mortal illness - are on vivid display in Savage Nights.

### IS JEAN A HERO?

Cyril Collard, who wrote the novel on which the film is based and who directed the movie and stars as Jean, had this to say about his purpose: "When you're living out this great passion, you have the impression that nothing can happen to you or to your partner.

"I certainly don't want to justify Jean's attitude: he is committing a grievous error by hiding the truth from Laura. That is the story I am telling: how a character commits a monumental error because of his irresponsibility and lack of regard for others; how, through his love story, his vision of the world and the threat of his illness, he manages to change, and in a certain way, to redeem himself - or to improve himself at any rate '

I think what some people object to in Savage Nights is that this disturbing story is told in such a stylish and invigorating way. It's a really enjoyable film to watch - almost hypnotic. The three lead characters are incredibly attractive (Romane Bohringer plays Laura and Carlos Lopez plays Jean's male lover, Samy), and the movie is fast-paced. with sometimes

effects from hand-held dizzvina cameras The music is hip and complements the story perfectly. It pulses with energy and looks gorgeous.

"I tried to have all the elements of the film converge so as to create the idea of vital energy which dominates everything," said Collard.

"There is no transition whatsoever between lightness, violence and tragedy:

that's life. It was precisely because the character of Jean was HIV-positive that I held to this point of view. I didn't want to make a film about the way death continually gnaws away at life. I am clearly not denying the monstrous character of AIDS but I chose - and it's an artistic choice - to talk about it in terms of life."

Jean's compulsive sexuality, which has him going back and forth between Laura and the hunky but violence-prone Samy and beyond them both to anonymous encounters with men along the banks of the Seine, seems to be a desperate attempt by Jean to hang onto life in the face of illness. But his penchant for driving at breakneck speeds and overlooking the consequences of his behavior suggest a recklessness that may have predated his HIV diagnosis.

> **FLAWS GO UNPUNISHED** Another element that might be

discomfitting to some viewers is that none of the deeply flawed characters is punished for their transgressions. Their behavior is viewed non-judgmentally and they each survive the picture, chastened but intact. The most unbelieveable conclusion involves Laura who, despite numerous unprotected and vigorous couplings with Jean, does not contract HIV. It seems highly unlikely and, since it implies that her love has in fact protected her from HIV, it is the movie's one truly irresponsible message

There's no question that Savage Nights is a very disturbing film, but it is also fascinating and thought-provoking. aggravating one standard that may disappoint Gay viewers though. While we repeatedly see Jean and Laura fully engaged in lovemaking, Jean and Samy, despite the obvious intensity of their feelings, are limited to a few passionate kisses and embraces. Jean's anonymous encounters with men on the embankment are photographed, no doubt accurately, in semi-darkness. But

it's obvious that explicit homosexuality still remains in the shadows, even in this

Collard's story is semi-autobiographical, but unlike the end of his film in which Jean fully embraces life by performing a heroic deed and finally managing to tell Laura that he loves her, Cyril Collard faced a very different fate.

Collard died of AIDS complications just three days before Savage Nights won four Cesar Awards (the French Oscars) in March of 1993. Today, the man who was hailed for his honesty and integrity and his extraordinary filmmaking skills, is being vilified throughout France after a newspaper revealed that a young woman Collard allegedly infected with HIV has also died of AIDS

I think those facts provide a sobering perspective and important counterpoint to the mixed messages in Savage Nights.

# "Salmonberries" Finally Makes it to Movie Theaters

k.d. lang's Film Debut a Mixed Bag

Salmonberries, the 1991 Canadian-German film that features the acting debut of crooner k.d. lang, is finally making it into local theaters. Despite winning recognition as Best Film at the Montreal Film Festival, director Percy Adlon was unable for years to find an American company to distribute his movie in the states.

In a recent interview, Adlon credited


"the Lesbian community" with supporting Salmonberries and giving it a second life. "These women just didn't give up," he told the San Francisco Bay Guardian. "They wanted this picture. They forced us to believe in it again after it was refused."

The difficulty in finding a distributor may have been due to the movie's offbeat subject matter and arthouse pretensions. But homophobia probably had a good deal to do with it too because part of the plot traces the growing attraction lang's character feels for another woman.

Salmonberries tells the story of two very different women who meet in a desolate Alaskan village inside the Arctic Circle. One is Kotzebue (lang), an orphaned Eskimo who works on the Alaskan pipeline. The lonely Kotzebue, whose dress and manner lead everyone to assume she is a man, is eager to learn about her origins and even more desperate for a friend.

Kotzebue is drawn to the village librarian, Roswitha, played by Rosel Roswitha is suspicious

Kotzebue's strange, aggressive bahavior but ends up pouring out her heart to the younger woman, telling her of her hair-raising escape from East Germany under the Berlin Wall and how her husband was killed during the escape. Still haunted by the traumatic memories of 20 years ago and living a self-imposed exile in the frozen north, Roswitha is desperately in need of healing.

Filled with compassion for Roswitha's plight, Kotzebue purchases two round-trip tickets to the newly unified Germany where the two women travel together. In Berlin, Roswitha confronts all the old ghosts, including a brother who betrayed her, and she begins to come to terms with her tragic past. While sharing a hotel room in Berlin, Kotzebue acts on the increasing desire she is feeling for Roswitha, with disappointing results.

Finally, on returning to Alaska, Kotzebue's own identity crisis is relieved when she learns who her father is and the sad circumstances leading to her abandonment as an infant. Kotzebue reacts with understandable hostility toward her father, so there's no simple happily-ever-after ending. And though Roswitha has turned down Kotzebue's advances, one of the last images shows the persistent Eskimo woman knocking on Roswitha's door. (Butches can be persistent!)

### STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES

Salmonberries has all the marks of an alternative, independently-made feature. It unfolds slowly and unpredictably. It's heavily-laden with visual metaphors, like the expanse of ice the two troubled women call home and the jars of salmonberries that line Roswitha's bedroom. Some of the cinematography, particularly images of the women against the frozen horizons, is stunning. Lang's beautiful ballad "Barefoot," heard throughout the film, complements the themes of desire and reconciliation.

Kotzebue's and Roswitha's relationship is convincingly portrayed, but Lesbians are likely to be disappointed by its lack consummation. The sexual tension between the two becomes palpable toward the end of the film, and Lesbian viewers are apt to feel as frustrated as poor Kotzebue when she is rebuffed. Savor the photo that appears with this review. It's about as hot as the action gets! Lang herself has said she wished the relationship had been more fully developed. One brief scene of k.d. in full frontal nudity will dispel any doubts about the androgynous singer's womanly attributes!

Lang's performance is uneven. She's convincing playing the lonely and brooding outsider and her butchiness is endearing. But her line readings, especially later in the movie, are terribly stilted. Rosel Zech as Roswitha, who has several emotionally charged crying scenes, fares better. This may be due to her more flashier role or to the fact that she is a veteran actress.

There are still some very beautiful moments in Salmonberries, many of them in powerful visual images impossible to convey in a review. I also appreciate Percy Adlon's interest in bringing diverse women characters to the screen. Adlon previously directed the quirky movie Bagdad Cafe, about

the relationship between a German woman abandoned by her husband in the desert and the feisty Black proprietor of a roadside cafe who helps her out.

Salmonberries will play at Milwaukee's Oriental Theater May 27 through May 29. Both Salmonberries and Bagdad Cafe are available on video.

Also on the Newswire ...

San Francisco, CA — A California jury has ruled that Delta Airlines violated one of its employees' right to privacy when it included his name on a list of people believed to be infected with HIV. The jury deadlocked on whether Delta intentionally discriminated against Joseph A. Sullivan when it dismissed him, but awarded him \$275,000 for the invasion of privacy.

New York, NY — The American Library Association's Gay and Lesbian Book Awards Committee has named the recipients of 1994's awards for Best Literature and Nonfiction books. Leslie Feinberg's Stone Butch Blues, an exploration of transgendered identity at the time of Stonewall (1969), won the Literature Award. Phyllis Burke's Family Values: Two Moms and Their Son, a chronicle of Lesbian parenthood, won as Best Nonfiction.

Washington, DC — Three people were arrested at the White House May 9 as ACT UP protested, calling on President Clinton to replace Kristine Gebbie as AIDS Policy Coordinator. Claiming that Gebbie has been ineffective, ACT UP urged Clinton to appoint Connecticut Gov. Lowell Weicker in her place.

Minneapolis, MN — Equal Time, the 13-year old award- winning newspaper which served the LesBiGay community of the Twin Cities, ceased publication in late April. Editor Robyn Dochterman cited financial shortfalls for the paper's demise. In the past year, Equal Time had evolved from a bi-weekly to a weekly paper and its circulation had grown to 20,000. Some staff members hope to raise funds to revive the paper.

New York, NY — Mayor Rudolph Giuliani has withdrawn an earlier threat to disband the city's Division of AIDS Services. Giuliani said the move was a necessary means to cutting the city budget but apparently changed his mind after being presented with statistics about the large number of people served by the agency. Giuliani had also been the subject of angry protests by AIDS activists.

#### Rodi's Newest Book

What They Did To Princess Paragon by Robert Rodi Dutton, HC \$19.95

Beginning with his outrageous and controversial debut novel, Fag Hag, the release of a new Robert Rodi novel brings with it certain expectations, the promise of slightly disturbed eccentric characters, outlandish plots, wry, very un-PC commentary, and plenty of black humor. Rodi's second novel, Closet Case now in paperback is certainly no exception. With What They Did To Princess Paragon, Rodi's many fans will not be disappointed.

Exerting an almost superhuman presence over the course of the novel is Princess Paragon, not a flesh and blood character but an aging comic book superhero. Princess Paragon's appearance int he 1940's was startling original, her weapons being truth and reason. Yet the many decades hadn't been particularly kind and her character had been rendered dull and lifeless. In a move designed more to revitalize his career, former hot-shot cartoonist Brian Parrish decides to take over the failing


comic book and decides to turn Princess Paragon, perpetually virginal over the entire span of five decades of guiding the Earth towards freedom and humanity, into a Dyke. With the genius to turn Princess Paragon into the world's first Lesbian superhero, Brian unleashes the force that will radically change not only the direction of Princess Paragon's life, but also his and that of the slightly pathetic obsessive fan of Princess Paragon, Jerome T. Kornacker.

One of the great joys in any Robert Rodi novel is his unconventional approach to his story's protagonist. Rodi delights in the creation of flawed characters. In Brian, Rodi has crafted an unusually human, three-dimensional character: basically likable, definitely condescending, obviously talented, yet clearly lacking any observable warmth or understanding. Brian more than meets his match in Jerome T. Kornacker, a clear loser in anyone's book. Grossly over weight, still living with his shrew of a mother at age 26, Jerome endures his dead end job as night watchman by escaping into the overheated fantasy world of Bang comic superheroes. While the walls of his room are filled with the likenesses of many superheroes, Jerome has a special place in his heart for the chaste Princess Paragon. Never mind Jerome daily attempts at getting through life as anonymously as possible, Jerome will simply not stand by idley while his Princess Paragon is turned into that most perverted of creatures, a dyke. Thrown together a comic book convention, Jerome's encounter with Brian will have hilarious and ultimately lasting impact upon just about everyone ever associated with Princess Paragon.

Relying upon equal measures of outrageous humor, obvious incidents of coincidence, a full roster of kooky characters, and a sharp eye for the satire of anything that has even the suggestion of political correctness, Rodi has created a delightful and engaging comic tour-de-Mercilessly mining force. preposterously humorous elements of the comic book industry and by never refusing to go over the top with any situation that presents itself, What They Did To Princess Paragon will undoubtedly keep even the most cynical thoroughly entertained and constantly turning pages until the novel's final, dramatic conclusion. Highly recommended.

For fans of Armisted Maupin, Steinke's story might initially sound strangely familiar: young, bright, and attractive, Jesse along with the countless others, has left her unfullfilling, oh-so-middle class life in Virginia to come and be different in San Francisco. Yet readers of Darcey Steinke's haunting and evocative Suicide Blonde will be in for quite a shock as any similarity to Maupin's classic Tales Of The City series disappears very quickly.

To begin with, Steinke's San Francisco is not the kooky, fun-loving haven that has drawn and continues to nurture Maupin's characters. Steinke's lost souls never find 28 Barbary Lane. Instead, the San Francisco of Suicide Blonde is filled with seedy Gay bars, world-hardened whores, and aimless

drug addicts.

Then too, Steinke's protagonist Jesse is no Mary Anne Singleton. Jesse finds no warm and loving surrogate family to find support with and has floated from one meaningless job to another. As the novel opens, Jesse, in a desperate attempt to keep her Bisexual boyfriend interested, has been driven to dye her hair blonde. "Taking another sip of bourbon, I put on the plastic gloves and began parting my hair at the roots. As the dye snaked out there was a faint sucking sound, like soil pulling water, and I wondered: if I were brave enough to slit my wrists would I bother to dye my hair?" Furthermore, in San Francisco Jesse finds no escape from the pain of her dysfunctional childhood. In a rare telling moment, her desperately needy mother asks her why she only calls her when she has no time to talk.

Steinke can offer her cast of disenfranchised characters no easy or simple solutions. Instead they continue to live lives filled with pain and emptiness yet refusing to betray even a hint of self pity or the barest cry for sympathy. Bell, Jesse's bisexual boyfriend is an occasionally employed actor and a man torn, unable to shake either his obsession with Kevin, his first and only love or the irrational guilt of killing his father by being homosexual. Driven from Bell. Jesse in turn becomes obsessed with Madison, a whore sans the heart of gold. Jesse's extraordinary journey of self-discovery is peopled with prostitutes, drug addicts, and malevolent dwarfs that more closely resembles a descent into sexual obsession, madness and despair. Clearly Suicide Blonde is not a book for the squeamish.

What makes Steinke's tale so maddingly compelling is her unflinching

honesty coupled with a style of rare eloquence. At once, Steinke combines gritty realism, moments of brutal sex, of naked desire, of fathomless pain with a dreamlike quality that is nothing short of hypnotic. While her characters are neither special nor particularly likable for that matter, they manage to snake their way into the reader's subconscious, exposing in the reader deeply felt insecurities of a dark side that has required years to fully repress. In Jesse, Bell, Pig, and Madison Steinke has crafted recognizable beings unable to fit into mainstream society, too lost to find their "place at the table." In their existence at life's forgotten fringe, they

serve as a warning of lives gone wrong, of childhoods never mended, of lost love never found, of what might have been, or even more frightening, of what yet might

In Suicide Blonde, Darcey Steinke exhibits a truly original voice. Yet as with her characters, Steinke allows her readers no easy solutions, no happy endings. Yet those brave enough to take Jesse's dark odyssey in Suicide Blonde will find ample reward. Suicide Blonde is a dangerous and terrifying rollercoaster of erotic desire and a ride not to be missed. Highly recommended.

## Talking With Author Robert Rodi

Chicago writer Robert Rodi has built a solid career and following over the past two years with two rich, satirical novels Fag Hag, and Closet Case. Fag Hag sparked a controversy. He was called a misogynist, but sales made him a force in Gay fiction. His next book, Closet Case garnered praise and recently gave Rodi his first Lambda Literary Award nomination. It was a popular seller as well.

His recently released third novel, What They Did To Princess Paragon continues his winning streak. This over the top new book centers around the events and hilarious repercussions resulting when a long time comic book heroine, Princess Paragon, is revamped as the most powerful Lesbian super heroine of the galaxies to increase circulation. It's a bold satire on sexual marketing and gleans several other deeper truths from life in a cut-throat

world. And on top of that, it's very very

Recently, Robert Rodi took a break from his job as an advertising copywriter to talk with me about his writing, career, and controversies. He's as funny in person as he is on the page.

Murray, Milwaukee, on Saturday, May 21 from 1-3pm His new book is reviewed in this issues 'Books' Section.) Owen: What They Did To Princess Paragon is an ingenious plot, where did you get the idea?

Robert: Actually I know a lot of people who work in comics and when I first came up with the idea a few years ago they were just starting to incorporate Gay superheros. There are no Lesbian superheros in mainstream comics that I know of?

Until Princess Paragon. Are you a comic book or action hero buff?

I read comics as a kid and all through college, and still do... although most of what I read now is alternative stuff.

What opportunity did you see in the plot of this book? Besides as a venue for humor, what did this premise give you the chance to do?

I wanted to write a satire of the eighties about a hot shot coming in and taking over a corporate property that ethically belongs to someone else. I thought the comics business would be a funny business to do that with. It's like all American business on a smaller scale, only instead of oil wells they're talking about superheros.

The plots of What They Did To Princess Paragon, as well as those of your previous novels Fag Hag and Closet Case, are all extremely plot driven. Do you do an outline and if you do are you meticulous about it?



I work from an outline, but I'm not anal about it. If something suggests itself to me I'll incorporate it... that's what a big part of the creative process is all about.

Did you exercise more caution or restraint with a satire involving Lesbians than you did with one involving Gay men?

I had an inclination to be more cautious but I fought it. There are two wonderful supporting characters in the novel who are Lesbians. They used to be lovers and can't possibly be more different. I think Lesbians will probably be offended by each for different reasons, although I completely adore them. I like to think all my characters are offensive in some way, that was the strange thing about Fag Hag, there were scads and scads of horribly offensive men and one offensive woman, and I was called a misogynist.

Did you anticipate the controversy

surrounding it?

I actually thought there would be more than there was. I was all prepared to be attacked on any number of fronts, but it really didn't happen too severely.

This makes it three novels in three years, is writing starting to eclipse your day job as an advertising copywriter?

It's starting to. I obviously will have to make a decision in the next year or two. I'm starting to talk to people about screenplays. It took me twelve years to sell my first novel and I still can't believe this is happening. It's a new career for me and I don't trust it. I feel very lucky, but I worry it might be a fluke.

Tell me about the film interest.

I've sold Fag Hag to a European production company. They're moving the setting to London. I don't know how they're going to do that, but it's not my problem. They're doing the script now, and then they're going to start casting.

Going back to your fears of flukedom, your publisher seems very high on you. Princess Paragon introduced their book buyer's catalogue. Does the high profile attention ever make you feel pressure as a representative of the community?

It does, and I really don't like it, but I accept it for political reasons. I know that it doesn't matter what I write for the rest of my life, I'm going to be called a Gay author. No one wants to be pigeonholed, there are times it irritates me and in other ways I consider myself very lucky. I think Gay people read in a higher proportion than other demographics.

Characters obsessed is another characteristic of your books. Does that

limitless commitment provide the best avenue for humor?

Those are the types of characters that interest me as a reader, that kind of monomania. It's the basis of great tragedy too. In humor it allows them to be such great protagonists because they sort of lurch into these situations where those of us with a critical distance might look more closely before jumping.

Do you have a way of testing whether or

not something is funny?

I have Jeffrey my partner. He's awfully good at that, but not always willingly. If he laughs when he's reading it I know it's funny. If, on the other hand when he hands it back to me and says something like, "That's really cute," I know it's a failure. He'll never say it's not funny.

Who do you read to make yourself

laugh?

If I have to give one name it's Tom Sharpe, a British novelist. Sharpe takes a situation and pushes it till it's so outrageous that it snaps really. I find him so gut-busting funny.

Fag Hag was your first published novel, but it was your fifth book. In retrospect what was different about the unpublished ones?

Fag Hag was the first time I flirted with the comic muse. It's what I was looking for all along. I was also getting better as a writer.

What are you working on now?

I'm working on another novel in my two word series, Drag Queen which Dutton, my publisher, suggested to me and I was afraid of because a fag hag or a closet case is a character type... a drag queen is a cultural phenomenon. I'm very pro drag so I said yes, I accepted the challenge. Then I came up with a really funny plot and now I'm really enjoying working on it.

Do you have a first memory of wanting to be a writer?

It goes back to learning to write. I think after my first day of class and learning three words I ran home and strung them together.



## Gay Games IV Fulfills a Lifelong Dream

(The second in a series of articles on Wisconsin athletes competing in Gay Games IV in New York City in June).

Madison — For Alix Olson, competing in Gay Games IV is "the culmination of a lifetime of athletic endeavor." Olson, goalie for the Bovine Babes Soccer Team, has been involved in athletics since she was eight. She'd been playing soccer for a couple of years when she first heard about the Babes, who had competed in Gay Games III in Vancouver in 1989. Olson has been with the team since the fall of 1993.

Olson is a twelve-year veteran of the Madison police force. As one of a number of openly Lesbian officers, Olson has been working unofficially as a liaison between the department and the L/G/B communities. She was instrumental in arranging a meeting last year between members of the community and Richard Williams, Madison's new police chief.

Gay Games IV will also be something of a "family affair" for Olson. Her partner is in training to compete in

swimming events.

Olson is optimistic about the Bovine Babes' chances. The Babes, who were undefeated in league play at the time of this interview, "Are a really good team,"

she said. "We have a good offensive threat. I see us going to a medal round."

And ultimately, what are the Gay Games for Olson? "[They're] a chance to express myself as an out Lesbian with others in an openly Gay international setting. What more could you want?"
