



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Gay Games IV and Stonewall 25 Are Here At Last!

Last-Minute Flurry of Organizing for Events in New York

New York, NY — Gay and Lesbian activists and athletes are knocking themselves out with last-minute plans to ensure that Gay Games IV & Cultural Festival and the Stonewall 25 celebration come off smoothly and safely for the one million people expected to descend on New York City June 18-26.

Among those numbers will be the 80 athletes and coaches that comprise Team Wisconsin and the hundreds of others who plan to cheer them on and then attend the massive March on the United Nations scheduled for Sunday,

June 26.

Members of Team Wisconsin gathered for a pre-Games celebration in Madison's Tenny Park June 4 to build team spirit and solidify final plans. Uniforms, warm-ups with the Team Wisconsin logo donated by the Miller Brewing Company, were handed out. They will be worn by athletes and coaches as they march behind Wisconsin's banner at the opening ceremonies at Columbia University's Wien Stadium June 18 and at the closing ceremonies at Yankee Stadium June 25.

At Wisconsin's PrideFest the following weekend, activist Stephanie Hume signed up people to ride on the chartered bus heading from Milwaukee to the Big Apple for Sunday's march on the U.N. Round trip bus fare plus Saturday night hotel accommodations were only \$83. Call (414) 535-9935 to check for

any last- minute vacancies.

The bus to New York will leave from the Milwaukee Enterprise Center, 2821 N. 4th Street, at 4pm Friday, June 25. Anyone who can is invited to drop by to give the road warriors a cheerful send-off.

ON, WISCONSIN!

Gay and Lesbian Badgers will be thrilled to know that they will be the 29th contingent (of 62) in the big march through Manhattan to the Central Park rally. That's much better than in last year's March on Washington, when Wisconsin, the Original Gay Rights State, was relegated to the status of caboose! The Badger contingent had to wait almost six hours to begin marching and arrived at the rally site as the festivities were ending.

Wisconsinites will be marching with Minnesotans this time, which is appropriate, since we're bordering states,

and Minnesota was recently the 8th state to pass a Gay rights law. Badgers are to line up at 11:30am on the morning of Sunday, June 26 at a specific location: Second Avenue between 42nd and 43rd Streets. Wisconsin and Minnesota will be following New York's contingent, expected to be the largest of all:

The morning begins with the unfurling of the mile-long Rainbow Flag from 35th to 48th Streets along First Avenue. The Rainbow Flag project was created by the Stadtlanders Foundation as a means to raise money for AIDS groups. Ten thousand people are needed to raise and carry the enormous flag, which should have a spine-tingling effect on those who witness it in person or through media coverage.

Participants who have paid the \$50 donation to help "Raise the Rainbow" should know that they can request that their donation directly benefit the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. To register as a flag-raiser, call 800-NYC-1994. To designate that your donation go to ARCW, call (414)

273-1991.

The first contingents of the march on the U.N. will be Stonewall veterans followed by international contingents from 64 different nations, all set to move at 11am. The staggered time schedule is meant to help alleviate crowding and long waits. Special contingents like People of Color, Transgender, Military Veterans, Bisexuals, Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, etc. will march in between state groupings.

MARCH ROUTE & RALLY

The march will proceed north on First Avenue, turn west on 57th Street to Sixth Avenue and then move north to Central Park. The rally will be held on the Great Lawn in Central Park from 1-7pm. There will be a wide range of speakers and entertainers from around the world, including many well-known Gay and non-Gay celebrities. Liza Minelli, whose mother, Judy Garland, has been an icon to many Gay men and Lesbians and who died the week of the Stonewall Rebellion in 1969, may be a featured performer.

Marchers are encouraged to bring a hat, sunscreen, good walking shoes, some water and food, and their signs and banners. Police will confiscate any signs mounted on sticks, however. A special resource guide for people with HIV/AIDS will be available, directing them to emergency medical facilities should they need help. Support services for people with disabilities can be obtained in advance by calling (212) 626-6925.

Hundreds of concerts and dances and meetings of every imaginable LesBiGay group are taking place throughout the time of Gay Games and the Stonewall march. Ads and flyers will be blanketing the city promoting them. The June issue of Out and the June 14 issue of the Advocate each have excellent guides to Manhattan and the major events taking place. Every library and bookstore has travel guides to the city.

SECURITY

The New York Times reported recently that New York City police are receiving special training in crowd and riot control — not because of the Gays and Lesbians expected in the city, but because of potential problems caused by rowdies drawn to World Cup Soccer matches which begin at the Meadowlands in New Jersey June 18, the same day Gay Games IV opens.

Lieutenant Thomas Graham of the NYPD said of Gays and Lesbians participating in the Gay Games and Stonewall march: "We're not really concerned with violence at any of their celebrations. They have their own marshals, their own security. We're more concerned with Gays falling victim to crimes, bias-related, or violence — Gay

"It's the World Cup matches that have the potential for most problems more arguments, fist fights," Lt. Graham

told the Times.

Gay Games officials say that security will be provided at all venues where athletic events are scheduled to take place. Organizers of the Stonewall march and rally will also provide private security to augment a thousand or more marshals. The NYPD is also expected to provide plainclothes security details.

If there is any hostility directed toward Gays, it could be goaded on by fundamentalists who have already held noisy protests, targeting the Gay Games as allegedly being a plot to undermine

morality and recruit children.

Republican Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, who has not gotten off to the best start with the city's huge Gay community, nevertheless struck a conciliatory note, calling the Gay Games "positive" for the local economy and the city's diversity. "Maybe they will break down some of the prejudices that remain in the minds, even of decent people," he told critics.

COUCH POTATO ADVISORY

People staying at home during the historic events may be able to catch some of the action on cable channels like C-Span, ESPN and CNN.

Last year, C-Span carried six full hours of the political and entertainment rally at the March on Washington, While

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TV viewers missed out on the immediate excitement of being on the scene, they actually got a clearer, more close-up view of all the speakers and entertainers than anyone at the rally itself.

CNN and ESPN expressed an interest in covering some of the events, but haven't made a commitment. ESPN will prioritize World Soccer matches but could potentially cut away during the gaps between games to pick up some of the action at Gay Games. CNN broadcast extensive coverage of last year's march on Washington, and, in the absence of any other world-shattering event, is likely to cover the Stonewall march and rally

The best advice is to monitor cable channels carefully during Gay Games

and Stonewall 25.

The Gay/Lesbian program In the Life is producing a special hour-long show about Gay Games and Stonewall. It will air on Madison's WHA/Channel 21 on Wednesday, June 29 at 10:30pm. WMVS/Channel 10 in Milwaukee will air it in the wee hours of Friday morning. July 8 at 12:30am (it will be listed as the very last program in Thursday night's schedule).

Brummer Trail Delayed

Lawyer Worried About Anti-Gay Prejudices

Madison - The trial of accused killer Penny Brummer was pushed back to September 19 at the request of her attorney. Jack Priester requested the additional time to prepare her case better, and, he said, because anti-Gay prejudices have been inflamed in the community by media reports of alleged sexual misconduct at Club 3054, a Madison Gay bar.

Brummer is charged with the first degree murder of Sarah Gonstead, the best friend of Brummer's former airlfriend.

Brummer was originally slated to go on trial in July. Priester argued that court proceedings that had been scheduled for late June against Club 3054 owner Cheri Becker would raise the level of anti-Gav sentiment in town enough to endanger Brummer's right to a fair trial. Dane County Court Judge Patrick Fiedler agreed to postpone Brummer's trial.

Priester also sought a reduction in Brummer's bail. She is being held on \$150,000 cash bond. Fiedler denied any bail reduction, citing Brummer's potential risk of flight.

Reports of alleged illegal public sexual activity at Club 3054 were graphically described at a press conference, touching off sensationalistic coverage in the Madison mainstream press.

Media reports have said that in statements to investigators, Brummer had claimed she dropped Gonstead off at Club 3054 the night Gonstead disappeared. At her arraignment, however, no witnesses mentioned Club 3054, and Becker says that the bar was closed the night of Gonstead's disappearance.

Club 3054 Faces July 7 Hearing

Madison — Club 3054 owner Cheri Becker and her attorney, Richard Jacobson, appeared before Madison's Alcohol License Review Commission June 8 to answer to charges of alleged health and public sex violations at the basement bar, Wings. A hearing date of July 7 was set, at which time Becker is expected to agree to a settlement.

"We have an agreement in principle," said Assistant City Attorney Rick Petri. He said his office is redrafting settlement agreement in which Becker's liquor license will be suspended for 60 days. Wings and the basement area would be permanently closed.

Becker said that most of the charges against her were dropped as of June 8. She said she is unsure of which charges are still in place.

Two other conditions may be sticking points to a settlement. Becker stated that Petri is asking for "a formal apology" to him and to the City of Madison. Additionally, she said that "it was rumored to Mr. Petri that I abused alcohol and drugs." Based on that, she says, he is pressing for her to undergo a drug and alcohol assessment. Although she said that she had not yet consulted with her attorney, she thinks such a requirement may violate constitutional rights.


The City Attorney's office could not be contacted for confirmation before In

Step went to press.



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PrideFest '95 Draws Record 15,500 to Milwaukee's Lakefront

Saturday's Cloudbursts Yield to Rainbows, Sunny Sunday

Milwaukee — Wisconsin PrideFest '94 drew a record number of people to Milwaukee's lakefront June 11-12 in a joyous celebration of Gay and Lesbian Pride. Organizers quoted 15,000 people attended the two-day event, highlighted by the largest and longest Pride Parade the Cream City has ever seen.

A series of cloudbursts on Saturday failed to dampen the spirits of those attending PrideFest. Festivalgoers scurried for cover under the tents, rode out the brief but intense rainstorms, and were rewarded by the sight of a spectacular double rainbow that arched across the sky above the deep blue waters of Lake Michigan. "Ooohs" and "aaahs" abounded, and many saw the rainbow as a sign of heavenly approval.

Sunday more than lived up to its name, with the festival grounds sun-drenched from dawn until dusk and temperatures in the 80's. "I had a talk with the Goddess last night," joked PrideFest Vice President Miriam Ben-Shalom, "and she really came

through for us."

PrideFest pulsed to a wide variety of music and dance on two different stages for two full days. Reggae, R&B, folk, pop, rock, rap, blues — yes, and even a few show tunes! — were performed by homegrown Badger talent and entertainers from neighboring states. Dance lovers could watch or take lessons in hip-hop, Latin and country-western styles or boogie to music spun by DJs in the dance tent sponsored by In Step and Club 3054.

The BJ Daniels Revue, featuring

The BJ Daniels Revue, featuring many of the state's best drag artists, packed 'em in Sunday night, bringing PrideFest to a rousing conclusion.

The PrideFest Lite Beer Volleyball Tournament, presented by GAMMA, took place Saturday. Sixteen teams from Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois and Ohio competed in two divisions. Chicago

juxtaposing reports of cruising in Madison's Olin Park with pictures of

Becker and the bar.

Becker reports that as a result of the coverage in the mainstream media, she and her family have been harassed. She says that her son was badly beaten, she has received numerous death threats; her parents' bar has been broken into and two people were shot with paint gun pellets outside the bar.

Assault won first place, Minnesota Ice second in the Championship division. Chicago Team Mary and Tab from St. Paul were first and second in the Social division.

Hundreds of people attended an open-air Interfaith Worship Service Sunday morning, and hundreds of couples took the plunge by exchanging commitment vows at the PrideFest Wedding later that day. The ceremony, begun by Queer Nation five years ago and dismissed by some as silly, has become an increasingly popular tradition.

PrideFest had a number of distinguished visitors.

Dr. Marjorie Hill, health activist and former liaison to the Gay community for New York Mayor David Dinkins, held a workshop on issues of concern to Gays and Lesbians of color. Speaking from the Alyn Hess Outdoor stage Sunday, Dr. Hill extended a personal invitation to everyone to attend the Stonewall 25 March on the United Nations June 26. She vowed it will be the "biggest gathering of Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered people in the history of

humankind."

Arlene Kochman, Executive Director of Senior Action in a Gay Environment, spoke on issues of aging. Kochman has visited Milwaukee several times, offering support to its fledgling chapter of SAGE, which Eldon Murray reports is "growing

strong.

James Kepner of the International Gay and Lesbian Archives brought an exhibit on Gay and Lesbian history. Lines of people waited patiently to view the exhibit, which is an extensive timeline of major characters and events, and lingered over it thoughtfully. "Wow, I didn't know this stuff!" was a frequent response.

State Rep. Tammy Baldwin convened a meeting of Action Wisconsin, led a discussion of the electoral process. spoke at the pre- Parade rally and rode in the Parade. Milwaukee City Council members Marvin Pratt and Faye Anderson Becker and Mayoral liaison Marge Beil put in appearances too.

It wouldn't be PrideFest without awards. This year, longtime Lesbian activists Karen Gotzler and Kitty Barber; and female impersonator BJ Daniels received the prestigious Community Service Award. The Alyn Hess Award, which is given to an activist who is not Gay but a great ally in the Gay community's struggles, went to Milwaukee County Supervisor Dorothy Dean. In addition, ten Stonewall Awards

were presented to activists statewide. (Short biographies of each appeared in the last In Step.)

In this year's Parade honors, LOC/Women of Color, Cream City Chorus and ACT UP/Milwaukee won Marching Unit Trophies. The Lake Michigan Region of the Lambda Car Club (which paraded 33 vintage autos), the Dykemobile, and the Triangle Bar won trophies for Decorated Cars. The 1100 Club, the Sherman Park Rainbow Association and the Walker Point Cafe won in the three float divisions.

Federal Judge Orders Cammermeyer Reinstated

Prejudice Underlying Pentagon Policy "Impermissable"

Seattle, WA — On June 1, Federal Judge Thomas S. Zilly ordered that former Army Nurse Colonel Margarethe Cammermeyer be reinstated to active duty because the Pentagon's ban against homosexuals is based on prejudice and the Army denied Cammermeyer her constitutional right to equal protection of

"I feel a little bit like a general who has won a war," Cammermeyer told the press. "There is exoneration."

But Cammermeyer's victory could be short-lived if the Defense Department chooses to appeal the ruling. President Clinton, despite his original pledge to lift the ban on Gays and Lesbians in the armed services, has ordered government attorneys to appeal previous rulings in favor of Gay service members, notably, Keith Meinhold and Joseph Steffan.

Judge Zilly's ruling on Cammermeyer involved the Pentagon's policy against Gays in the pre-Clinton era. But Defense Department attorneys have rationalized their continued litigation against Gays as a necessity in order to hold off challenges to the new policy, approved by Clinton and passed by

Congress last year.

While the new policy constitutes a change, in that recruits are no longer asked about their sexual orientation, many soldiers and officers alike admit that very little has really changed and that harassment of soldiers perceived to be Gay or Lesbian has actually

"The ruling is an indictment against the government's new policy of 'don't ask, don't tell," said former Army Captain Tanya Domi of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "Because the new policy is identical to the old in that it

serves to accommodate prejudice against Gay people, we believe this ruling is another nail in the coffin of 'don't ask, don't tell."

The reasoning Judge Zilly used to declare the Pentagon's policy unconstitutional mirrored that articulated by several other judges and appeals courts.

Judge Zilly wrote: "The government has discriminated against Colonel Cammermeyer solely on the basis of her status as a homosexual and has failed to demonstrate a rational basis for doing

Zilly said that military officials concede "that their justifications for the policy are based on heterosexual members' fear and dislike of homosexuals." But Zilly declared that "Mere negative attitudes, or fear, are constitutionally impermissable bases for discriminatory governmental policies."

OTHER COURTS AGREE

In a strongly worded statement last year, Federal Judge Terry Hatter Jr. ordered the reinstatement of Petty Officer Keith Meinhold, saying: "The Department of Defense's justifications for banning Gays and Lesbians from military service are based on cultural myths and false stereotypes." Hatter said the courts should "not merely defer to military judgment as the rationale for the policy the court must consider the factual basis underlying the military judgment."

The Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in the case of former Army Captain Dusty Pruitt that the Pentagon had to demonstrate that there is a rational relationship between its policy and a legitimate government interest. The case is back in federal court. And a panel of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia ruled last year that Midshipman Joseph Steffan should be reinstated because the government has no "rational basis" for his exclusion. The full Appeals Court vacated that decision however, and recently reheard the entire case. A decision is expected soon.

While the plight of every Gay person drummed out of the service is compelling, that of Col. Cammermeyer seems especially so.

Cammermeyer joined the Army as a nurse in 1961. She supervised a field hospital in Vietnam where she won a Bronze Star for her service. In 1985, she was chosen from among 34,000 Veterans candidates as the Administration's Nurse of the Year.


Cammermeyer was serving honorably as chief nurse for the Washington State National Guard when in 1989, while being interviewed for a security clearance for another job, she honestly answered that she was a Lesbian. When she was discharged honorably three years later, her commanding officer wept and Gov. Booth Garner appealed to Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney for a special exemption.

Cammermeyer is believed to be the highest ranking officer to be discharged solely on the basis of homosexuality. She is not charged with any misconduct.

Clinton administration The weighing its options carefully. In appealing the ruling in favor Cammermeyer, the Pentagon would be consistent in its determination to challenge alleged violators of both the old and the new policy. But targeting Col. Cammermeyer, of whom even Sen. Sam. Nunn expressed admiration, could be perceived as vindictive and turn into a public relations nightmare for the Clinton administration.

In a sidelight, Barbra Streisand has bought the film rights to Cammermeyer's story, with actress Glenn Close set to play the Colonel in a TV movie to be made next year. Only time will tell whether Cammermeyer's story has a happy ending.

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State Supreme Court: Lesbian Can't Adopt Partner's Child

Appeal to U.S. Supreme Court Likely

Madison — In a defeat for the rights of LesBiGay families across Wisconsin, a sharply divided Supreme Court ruled June 8 that state law does not permit both members of a same-sex couple to adopt a child. The 4-3 decision came in the case of Annette and Georgina Grinkey and their daughter Angel. Judith Sperling Newton, attorney for the Grinkeys, announced her intention to appeal the decision to the United States Supreme Court.

Georgina is Angel's adoptive mother. Annette had petitioned to adopt Angel in February 1992. Although Brown County Circuit Court Judge Richard Dietz agreed that the adoption would be in Angel's best interests, he ruled that under Wisconsin's adoption statues, Annette was not eligible to adopt Angel and that Angel was not eligible to be adopted. The Supreme Court heard the case in March of this year after taking the extraordinary step of appointing a respondent when no state agency

expressed any interest in intervening in the adoption.

Justice Donald Steinmetz, writing for the majority, agreed that the adoption was in Angel's best interests. "However," he wrote, "the fact that an adoption - or any other action affecting a child - is in the child's best interests, by itself, does not authorize a court to grant the adoption." Additionally, the prospective parent and the child must also be eligible under statute to take the action. Annette. the majority ruled, is not qualified to adopt Angel because she is not legally "the husband or wife" of Georgina. Angel is not eligible because only children "whose parental rights have been terminated..." may be adopted. Hence, the court decided, Annette could adopt Angel as "an unmarried adult," but only if Georgina gave up her parental rights to Angel first.

Sperling Newton had argued that Angel was eligible for adoption because her adoptive father had terminated his parental rights. The court in response constructed an elaborate and unlikely scenario of adoption petitions from total strangers to conclude that "[the] legislature could not have intended to declare a minor eligible for adoption under those circumstances," further holding that except in the case of legally recognized stepparents, "a minor is not eligible for adoption unless the rights of both of her parents have been

Sperling Newton had also advanced the argument that with the denial of the adoption, Angel's constitutional rights to equal protection, due process and freedom of association were being violated. The court rejected the constitutional challenge, as well as the assertion by the American Civil Liberties Union that denial of adoption discriminated against Annette on the basis of sexual orientation and/or gender.

Justices Jon Wilcox, Roland Day Janine Geske joined in the majority.

In a strong dissent, Chief Justice Nathan Heffernan noted that the legislature mandates "liberal construction" of the adoption statutes and that "[the] best interests of the child shall always be of paramount consideration" in any interpretation of them. Everyone involved in the case, including Angel's former adoptive father, Angel's social worker, the circuit court judge, the justices in the majority and the court appointed respondent agreed that the adoption would be in Angel's best interests. Therefore, he argued, the statutes should have been interpreted liberally to allow the adoption.

Instead, he wrote, "the majority construes the adoption statutes strictly, the legislatively-mandated cannon of liberal construction and applying canons of its own choosing without providing any reasons for doing so. The majority sets forth hypothetical adoption facts that are not before this



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court and analyzes the statutes in light of those hypotheticals... The majority also ignores the legislature's clear statement that the best interests of the child are paramount. Although strict construction of a statute is often seen as an exercise of judicial restraint, in the present case such construction is precisely the opposite and flouts the legislative will."

Justices William Bablitch and Shirley Abrahamson joined in the dissent.

GESKE WAS SWING VOTE

Justice Geske was widely seen as the swing vote in this case, and she swung with the conservative's writing in a concurring opinion that she believed the majority opinion "correctly analyzes current Wisconsin law." She wrote a separate opinion "to encourage the Wisconsin legislature to revisit [the adoption statutes] in light of all that is occurring with children in our society." She noted how lucky Angel is to live in a loving, supportive home. "Many children are not as fortunate as she," Geske continued, pointing out how many of those unfortunate children "become the angry criminals we see in our felony courts."

While stopping short of asking the legislature directly to legalize same-sex parental adoption, Geske expressed her hope that "our legislatures will continue to advance the interests and protection of our children... Children cannot protect their own interests."

"I am grieved" by the decision, said Sperling Newton. "Not only did the court let Angel down, they let down many many children. The court had a historic opportunity to protect the rights of these children."

Sperling Newton said that while she was deeply disappointed in the decision, it leaves a "slightly open door" for appeal to the United States Supreme Court. The court in a footnote addressed the possibility of viewing Annette's adoption petition as a joint petition by Georgina and Annette. The women did not file a joint adoption petition, so the court did not directly address the issue. They noted, however, that the Massachusetts Supreme Court affirmed a same-sex two parent adoption on that basis.

BALDWIN DISAPPOINTED

State Representative Tammy Baldwin also expressed her disappointment in the ruling. "This decision is a major setback for children and families. The court has failed to protect Angel's best interests. It has denied Angel and other families like hers the legal and economic protections that other children have."

"Someday soon governments across the country will realize this battle will be fought over and over again," said Jack Siebert, a founding member of Gay and Lesbian Educational Employees, a statewide organization that advocates on behalf of the children of LesBiGay

families. Siebert called on the federal government to step in to protect the rights of LesBiGay people and children in Les/Bi/Gay families.

Another case involving Lesbian parents is currently before the court. In that case, a Madison-area woman, Sandy Holtzman, is seeking visitation rights with the child she raised for five years with her former partner. Sperling Newton, who also represents Holtzman, was unsure if this decision would have an impact on that case. She noted that the justices accepted the Holtzman case after they had already decided this case. "I can only hope that the court will look at the [Holtzman] case as it should, in light of the best interests of the child."

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
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Health Care Reform Call-In Day June 28

NGLTF Urges People to Lobby Their Representatives

Washington, DC — The debate over health care reform is expected to intensify this summer, with several proposals working their way through Congressional committees. The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has declared Tuesday, June 28 "Health Care Reform Call-In Day" and is urging Gays and Lesbians to contact their representatives to express their views.

The Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual community needs health care reform for reasons similar to most Americans who find the current system inadequate. But the LesBiGay community faces several special problems under the current health care system: a high rate of uninsured individuals; lack of coverage for our families; and anti-Gay/Lesbian prejudice.

THE NEED FOR REFORM

The Uninsured: Surveys show that at least 17% of Americans under age 65 are completely uninsured. In a recent survey in San Francisco, 36% of Lesbian/Bisexual women said they are uninsured. The AIDS Action Council reports that of people with AIDS, 30% are uninsured, 40% are on Medicaid, and 30% have private insurance. Because many insurance companies refuse coverage for pre-existing conditions, many people with AIDS, cancer and other serious illnesses are "job-locked" for fear of losing coverage.

The health consequences of being uninsured can be devastating. The uninsured are more likely to postpone or go without needed care, and when they finally do seek care, they are likely to be

in worse health.

Lack of Family Coverage: Lesbian and Gay couples, unless employed where domestic partners are extended health coverage, have an added barrier to accessing health care. If one individual is unemployed, self-employed, or employed where health care is not a benefit, he or she is unable to join his or her partners' health plan, unlike heterosexual married couples.

In addition, a national survey of Gay and Lesbian couples showed that at least 21% of Lesbian couples and 9% of Gay male couples have children, which means the inability to obtain health insurance through a partner could also impact on the children in those families. The bottom line is, LesBiGay families are not recognized under most health plans in the current health system.

Anti-Gay/Lesbian Prejudice: Due to the extremely high rate of anti-Gay bias among health providers, Lesbians,

Gay men and Bisexuals are restricted to those providers who are "safe."

A recent study by the American Association of Physicians for Human Rights found that 67% of LesBiGay physicians in the survey reported knowing Gay patients who had received substandard care or been denied care because of their sexual orientation. Meanwhile, 59% reported they themselves suffered discrimination, harassment or ostracism from within the medical profession because of their sexual orientation.

LesBiGay health care consumers and providers clearly need a health system without discriminatory obstacles to receiving adequate care or practicing their profession.

CRITERIA FOR REFORM

At least a half dozen major health care reform proposals are currently under consideration by Congress. The key committees weighing these proposals are: the Senate Finance Committee, chaired by Sen. Patrick Moynihan (D-NY); the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, chaired by Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA); the House Ways and Means Committee, chaired by Rep. Sam Gibbons (D-FL); the House Education and Labor Committee, chaired by Rep. Wendell Ford (D-MI); and the House Energy and Commerce Committee, chaired by Rep. John Dingell (D-MI).

Each day, these bills are changed with amendments and compromises. Because the bills are constantly subject to revision, NGLTF says it is impossible at this point to give definitive support to any one of the current proposals.

However, NGLTF recommends focussing on specific criteria for healh care reform when lobbying members of Congress and assessing the various proposals.

NGLTF encourages activists to use the following five criteria:

 Universal Coverage providing health care to all those residing in the

▼ ComprehensiveBenefits offering a broad package of treatments, including non-Western and alternative therapies.

▼ No Restrictions for Pre-Existing Conditions

 Non-Discrimination Language barring discrimination based on sexual orientation

 Permanence, ensuring that coverage cannot and will not be taken

away.



State GOP Passes Controversial AIDS Resolution

Milwaukee — Over one thousand Republican delegates from GOP units statewide attended the party's annual conference in Milwaukee June 4-5. Gov. Tommy Thompson addressed the conferees and resolutions were passed against abortion, in support of the death penalty, and about AIDS.

The AIDS resolution said that AIDS should "be acknowledged as an

infectious and communicable disease syndrome, subject to public health measures of control as other diseases so classified." Opponents of the resolution expressed concern that the measure had the potential to undermine legal protections of confidentiality extended to people with HIV/AIDS.

State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, a Madison Democrat, said: "The state Republican Party Convention showed that AIDS is two epidemics: the epidemic of the disease and an epidemic of fear of the disease...Unfortunately, the GOP delegates don't realize that no one is

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
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

going to get tested if they think they could lose their job, lose their insurance, be denied medical care or be left alone to die. That is why Wisconsin's legal

protections are important.

In other action, GOP delegates approved a resolution in support of "legal protection for all human beings from conception to natural death." They supported the death penalty, however, for "heinous crimes." Also, four GOP candidates who want to challenge Democratic Sen. Herb Kohl's re-election bid spoke: Cate Zeuske, Bob Welch, Tom Fitzpatrick and Matt Gunderson.

Milwaukee Gets New Lab to Test for Crypto

Milwaukee — The City of Milwaukee has installed new equipment which will allow for quicker readings of tests on water samples to determine if the municipal water supply is tainted by cryptosporidium or other potentially disease-causing parasites or bacteria.

Since more than 400,000 people were sickened by the parasite last year and more than 80 people have died of the infection, the city has worked on various reforms to better detect the presence of cryptosporidium in the water and to more rapidly notify the public in the event of such infestations.

The in-house facilities are expected

to speed the results of tests so that health officials will know within 24-48 hours whether there is any danger to the public. Previously, water samples were sent to the State Laboratory of Hygiene in Madison, and results were not known for a week. The quicker response time could be crucial in minimizing the possibility of any disease spreading among the public.

Also Around the State ...

Milwaukee — Milwaukee will receive a \$320,000 federal grant to use over the next five years for a project offering housing and other services to homeless people with mental or physical disabilities. The targeted groups include people who have HIV/AIDS, people who are mentally ill, and people with chronic alcohol and drug problems.

Nearly 350 Attend Madison Awards Dinner

Madison — A nearly full house turned out to honor some of the best of Madison's LesBiGay community at The United's second annual Awards Dinner. Under the Rainbow drew an audience of nearly 350 people to pay tribute to seven outstanding community member and the

organization of the year.

LesBiGay families and children were major themes of the evening, with half of the award recipients honored for their work around child and family issues. As keynote speaker Sunshine Jones said, "The stories [of L/G/B youth] speak to the challenges we face and the promise we have to offer to the larger community. It's critical that we bring our youth 'under the rainbow." Jones, who was also honored as Woman of the Year for her work with the Lesbian Parents Network. touched on some of the horror stories of anti-Gay harassment of the children of LesBiGay families by their fellow students and Madison teachers and school officials, and lauded the courage of those youths in confronting the homophobia of their peers and authority

Joann Elder and Jane LaFlash were honored as Allies of the Year for

founding and co-facilitating the Madison chapter of Parents, Family and Friends of Lesbian and Gays (P-FLAG). "I've come a long way to this day, when I am being honored by your marvelous community," said Elder. "Joe [her husband] and I were lucky to find each other, we were lucky to have three children... but I'm afraid if we had not had a Gay son, we might never have met and been a part of your wonderful community."

"When my son came out to me 11 years ago," said LaFlash, "I didn't know if it was possible to be Gay and to be happy. Then I started meeting all of you."

"I'm thankful to my son Chad, his partner Dale, all their friends and all of you for allowing me in my small way to be a part of this community, because it has enriched my life," she continued.

Tom Neal and Lana Lawrence accepted the award for Organization of the Year on behalf of the Madison Gay and Lesbian Resource Center. Neal encouraged everyone to "support those who support us," either financially, politically oremotionally. Lawrence talked of the programs that operate under the auspices of the MGLRC, including the resource library and the Directory, a

listing of Madison's L/G/B organizations.

Neal was back at the podium shortly thereafter to accept the award for Volunteer Man of the Year. "I would like to thank those people who were important in setting the foundation of this community before I came here," he said.

He likened the work of the LesBiGay community to a staircase. "Our community is about halfway up that staircase. At the bottom is a place none of wants to go back to. The top is a place that we will call a simple word, equality."

"What I ask each of you tonight is to support your leaders as they climb that staircase, so that when they look back and want to give up, you're there to support them and push them forward."

The Volunteer Woman of the Year award went to Sue Goldwomon for a veritable laundry list of achievements since the early days of Madison's LesBiGay and feminist movements, including a decade as the host of Her Infinite Variety, a weekly women's music show. "I want to thank all of my co-conspirators with whom I've worked in the past and who I work with now," she said. "I wouldn't be here now without all

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"I believe that each of us has a part to play in our struggle against injustice and for equality for everyone, and individuals can make a difference. But it is only when we join together to create a political and social movement that true change can occur. No one can do it alone.

"I really don't consider myself to be such [a superman]," said Man of Year honoree Jack Siebert, in response to a glowing description of his work with Gay and Lesbian Educational Employees and other groups. "I've always said I've done what I can do and I know there are many

others doing what they can do."

Siebert echoed Sunshine Jones in encouraging the community to support LesBiGay youth and the children of LesBiGay families and to demand a safe educational environment for them. "We need to flex our muscles in the educational arena because there are problems we need to be concerned about," including harassment of students and staff and validation of LesBiGay families, he said. He had harsh words for the Madison school district and its reluctance to address LesBiGay issues and concerns and called on the community to educate the educators.

Sunshine Jones reiterated that call when she briefly returned to the stage to accept her Woman of the Year award and thanked everyone who had helped

and supported her through the years. especially her life partner and their

Former Dane County Supervisor Dick Wagner was honored with special recognition for his many years of service as one of the nation's first openly Gay elected officials. "The things that I have been able to do are built on the things that others have done." he said. He guoted Susan B. Anthony and Harvey Milk in imploring every member of the community to come out and be counted as citizens and as persons. "It's 25 years since Stonewall and everything that happened since, it's gonna be 25 great years forward from now, and we're all going to journey that together."

"Gay Day" Draws Thousands to Disney World

Orlando, FL - Thousands of Gays and Lesbians strolled through the streets of the Magic Kingdom June 4 and 5 during the fourth annual "Gay and Lesbian Day" at Walt Disney World. As expected. some Christian fundamentalists protested the event, but the crowds of Gays and Lesbians were able to enjoy the day unmolested by homophobes.

Because of the overwhelming success of previous outings and the publicity they garnered, this year's Gay Day at Disney World was expanded to an entire weekend and drew up to 12,000 people. Officials at Disney World were not happy with the first informal gathering of Gays that took place in 1991, but the growing numbers of Gay visitors and the revenue they bring to Disney World can no longer be ignored. "Disney's been exceptionally helpful this year," a Gay Day organizer told Southern Voice

John Dowless, a spokesman for Florida's Christian Coalition, thundered that "This whole day is focusing on sex, and when you put these elements together, there is the greater possibility of illegal activities on children, or some harassment."

But Richard Sullivan of Tampa, an organizer of the Gay event, told the New York Times such criticisms were ridiculous. "The purpose of the day is for our community to get together and have a good time and show the people attending the park that we're like everybody else."

Dr. Elders in Hot Water Again Over Pro-Lesbian Comments

Washington, DC - Surgeon General Dr. Joycelyn Elders is in hot water again over pro-Lesbian comments

she made recently to USA Weekend magazine. She has previously aroused the wrath of fundamentalists for her pro-birth control, pro-abortion and pro-sex education views and her pro-Gav comments in an interview with the Advocate earlier this year.

"I don't feel that policymakers and decision-makers should worry about anyone's bedroom but their own," the outspoken Elders told USA Weekend. She defended her interview with the Advocate and extended her views against anti-Gay discrimination by the Boy Scouts to the Girl Scouts as well. "None of us is good enough or knows enough to make decisions about other people's sexual preferences."

Predictably, fundamentalist critics again attacked Dr. Elders. But a spokeswoman for the Girl Scouts of America also took exception to Elders' comments, saying, "It's clear she is not up- to-date with the Girl Scout policy." The Girl Scout organization has no official policy about sexual orientation, but "respects the beliefs of each of its members and does not investigate or intrude into personal matters."

Lesbians who are former Girl Scouts or Girl Scout leaders say the Girl Scouts differ considerably from the Boy Scouts' policy of excluding Gays. Most Lesbians say they loved being in the Scouts and that even as Girl Scout leaders they were never targeted or harassed.

Oliver North Wins GOP Senate Nod in Virginia

Richmond, VA - Former National aide and Iran-Security conspirator Oliver North swept to victory at the state Republican convention in Virginia June 4, winning his party's nomination for the US Senate. North is likely to face incumbent Democratic Sen.

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

Charles Robb in the general election this November

North won his party's support with an intense grassroots campaign in which he traveled to GOP meetinmgs and caucuses throughout the state, building support for the past year. He ran on a platform of funding a stronger military and promoting traditional family values. His campaign rhetoric frequently contained anti-Gay slurs, and GOP observers say he hopes, if elected, to take over the mantle of conservatism carried for decades by the aging North Carolina Senator, Jesse Helms.

North's acceptance speech was aggressively defiant and seemed to contain yet another veiled anti-Gay slur. To the blaring music of "Rocky," North bellowed: "Today, we send the Clintons and their cronies a simple but unmistakable message. This is our government, you stole it, and we are going to take it back." He disparaged the White House as teeming with "20-something kids with an earring and an axe to grind."

Meanwhile, Republican Ron Lewis, a minister and owner of a Christian bookstore, won election to Congress from a district in western Kentucky. Lewis stressed "family values" and opposition to Gay rights. He takes over the seat of William Natcher, who recently died. He is the first Republican elected to Congress from his district in 129 years.

Three Gay Californians Win Primary Battles

Los Angeles, CA — Three openly Gay candidates, all recommended by and supported with donations from the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, won their primary bids for state and local office in California June 7.

Tony Miller moved one step closer to becoming the nation's highest ranking openly Gay elected official by winning 38% of the vote to beat two other Democratic candidates in the race for California Secretary of State. Miller faces Republican Bill Jones in the November 8 general election.

Sheila Kuehl won the Democratic primary race for a seat in the California State Assembly and will face the GOP's candidate, Michael Mehan, in the November election. Kuehl, a former actress who played the irrepressible Zelda Gilroy on the old *Dobie Gillis* TV show, is a nationally known civil rights attorney and law professor.

Finally, San Diego Municipal Court candidate Bonnie Doumanis, a former county prosecutor, beat her closest opponent by 20,000 votes. She will run against Anthony Brandenberg November

Supreme Court Nominee Breyer's Record on Gays Unclear

Washington, DC — Gay and Lesbian leaders are taking a wait-and-see attitude toward Judge Stephen Breyer, who President Clinton has nominated to the Supreme Court to replace retiring Justice Harry Blackmun. Breyer has served on the First Circuit Court of Appeals since his appontment by Jimmy Carter in 1980.

Breyer has not issued any decisions in cases which bear directly on Gay rights issues, although he has ruled in several cases in which homosexuality played a peripheral role. In the appeal of one criminal case in which the convicted murderer claimed he killed his victim in a state of "homosexual panic" after the victim allegedly made sexual advances toward him, Breyer voted to sustain the lower court's decision to convict.

Because there is little in his record to give any clear indication of where he might stand on Gay rights, speculation abounds. Breyer is said to be generally pro-business and in support of broad-based religious rights, but he is also considered to be a social liberal. He lives in Cambridge, Massachusetts and rides a bike to work.

The Senate Judiciary Committee will hold hearings this summer on his nomination to the high court. Gay leaders say they are asking liberal allies on the Committee, such as Sens. Edward Kennedy, Howard Metzenbaum, Dianne Feinstein and Carol Moseley-Braun, to probe Breyer about Gay rights issues.

Time Shelves Plans for Glossy Gay Magazine

New York, NY — Time Inc. Ventures, the arm of Time Inc. that develops new magazines, has decided not to move forward with a proposed publication aimed at Gays and Lesbians, according to the New York Times.

The monthly glossy magazine, to be called **Tribe**, had been in the early stages of development over the past year. The success of the **Advocate** and the more recent **Out**, along with

encouragement from Gay journalists, led Time to begin development of its own magazine which it hoped would reach a circulation of 250,000.

Robert Miller, the President of Time Inc. Ventures, said the decision to halt development of **Tribe** was strictly a business decision, not a caving in to fundamentalists or conservative advertisers who may have threatened to pull their ads from other Time publications

"For us to consider any new business proposition, it does have to be of some scale," Miller told the **Times**. "It's difficult to imagine taking on a magazine that would not make several million dollars annually in profits."

Oregon Has More "Out" Officials Than Any State

Portland, OR — Oregon now has five openly LesBiGay state legislators, the largest number in any state, according to a report in Just Out, the state's Gay/Lesbian newspaper.

The three openly Gay legislators who had previously disclosed their sexual orientation were joined by a Lesbian and a Bisexual who "came out" to constituents and the media at a dinner in late April. State Rep. Kate Brown declared she is Bisexual, and State Rep. Hedy Rijken said she is a Lesbian. They join State Reps. Gail Shibley, George Eighmey and Cynthia Wooden as the informal Gay caucus in the state legislature.

All except Rijken are running for re-election and won their Democratic primary races this spring. Four of five other openly Gay candidates won primary races as well. Two of the potential newcomers are Republicans running for the state house. If everyone is successful this fall, Oregon could have six to eight openly Gay/Lesbian legislators in its state house.

Also on the Newswire ...

New York, NY — The 9th annual AIDS Walk in New York City drew more than 30,000 participants on May 22 and raised more than \$5 million for the AIDS service group Gay Men's Health Crisis.



Gov. Mario Cuomo and Mayor Rudolph Giuliani were on hand to greet walkers, and talk show maven Joan Rivers and actress Rosie Perez spoke at the

opening ceremony.

Hattiesburg, MS — A lawsuit filed against Attorney General Janet Reno by fundamentalists, who claimed she acted illegally by sending mediators to investigate the harassment of Lesbians at Camp Sister Spirit, has been dismissed by a federal judge. The suit claimed Reno had no authority to intervene in the local controversy because Justice Department guidelines don't include intervening in disputes based on sexual orientation.

Raleigh, NC — Kenneth French has received four life sentences for a shooting rampage at a restaurant last August that left four patrons dead. As he randomly fired around the restaurant, the former soldier reportedly yelled: "I'll show you Clinton. I'll show you about Gays in

the military."

Los Ángeles, CA — For the first time since hate crimes began being collected in 1980 in Los Angeles, more hate-related incidents against Gay men were reported than those against African Americans. In 1993, there were 211 attacks on Gay men as opposed to 179 recorded against Blacks. The number of Lesbian victims of hate crimes more than doubled from the previous year, from 13 to 30.



This series will offer free HIV and AIDS training, increasing the availability of timely, accurate, livesaving information. The two-hour program starts at 6:30pm at MAP, 315 W. Court St. in downtown Milwaukee

The first session, an Introductory AIDS Education Program, will cover information on HIV disease concepts, virus development, disease progression prevention, current recommendations for treatment, HIV antibody testing, and information about where to get tested and other resources.

The second session on Wednesday. June 29, an Advanced AIDS Education Program, will cover the impact of HIV in greater detail. It will include sensitivity awareness training including gender, sexual-orientation and cultural issues and it will also explore MAP services.

Education is the only means to control the rapidly escalating AIDS epidemic in the Milwaukee Estimates show that as many as 10,000 men, women and children are HIV positive in the county, most of whom are not aware of their HIV infection.



A federal bill to prohibit job discrimination based on sexual orientation will soon be introduced in Congress. National polls tell us that. while most Americans oppose anti-Gay job discrimination, they don't know that it's a serious problem, and they don't know that federal civil rights laws and the laws of 42 states do not protect us. When most Americans hear our personal stories and learn that current laws don't protect us, they support congressional passage of an employment nondiscrimination law.

To educate the public, the Human Rights Campaign Fund's "Documenting Discrimination" Project is seeking personal stories from Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and heterosexual people who have experienced job discrimination based on sexual orientation. These personal accounts will be crucial int he effort to pass this bill and secure equal rights in the workplace for all Americans, regardless of sexual orientation.

We encourage all of you who have ever experienced such job discrimination — or who know someone who has — to tell us their stories. Anyone who wishes to remain anonymous will be able to do so. Dear CCF President & Board of Directors:

Just catching up on reading of local Gay media and learned that you are throwing a party to honor Miller Brewing. First, that is good news. They have become excellent corporate citizens, not just locally, but nationally.

Second, it strikes me odd that in the year of Stonewall 25 that you are so remiss in connecting the pieces together historically regarding Miller Brewing. It was Arthur Lazere, then President of the National Association of Business Councils and myself as Founder and President of Cream City Business Association and the Cream City Foundation who initially met with Miller Brewing to open dialogue on getting them to adopt a corporate wide and published "non-discrimination reg" in their

employee manual. While Arthur and I did the first meeting with their corporate officers, I did the follow up meetings alone.

For your information, no Gay/Lesbian employees would help us since they felt too threatened.

So, I find it a bit ironic that you honor a firm that has become a good corporate citizen with us, but fail to honor the people who helped make it so from our own family. Interesting that the straight wealthy white controlled firm is honored, but the openly Gay Jewish and Hispanic men that did the leg work and nurtured it in the first several years are ignored by you in the year of Stonewall 25!

Sadly, this is but the latest of snubs by CCF of support for those who truly do the work of our community. When I founded CCF I tried to establish a strong truly "grass roots" organization that would primarily support local tiny to moderate efforts to nurture our communities growth, sadly CCF has become elite, snobbish and out of touch. I became so frustrated that after years of trying to help get CCF back to its roots, I have totally removed them from my will, a future loss of \$100,000.

Editor:

As spokesperson for the Human Rights League (HRL), I would like to respond to criticisms raised by Mr. Fons in his (May 5-18, Issue #9) letter to In Step.

HRL has been in existence since May 1993 and was created to advance the political interests of Lesbians, Gay men, and Bisexuals in the metro Milwaukee area by influencing local, state, and national politics, legislation, and public policy. In our first year of existence, much effort has gone into developing ourselves as a 501-C4 membership organization which seeks the active involvement of all who support our mission. Our bylaws reflect this by mandating gender equity and racial diversity as a prerequisite to all Board of Directors and organizational activities. HRL has been publicly active at many community events throughout the year, including PrideFest and MAPFest.

The May 20th planning meeting which Mr. Fons is concerned about was co-sponsored by HRL and involved representatives from a diversity of community groups including Ujiima, CCF, Sherman Park Association, LAMM, MATC, Club Muse, and LOC. The specific purpose of this meeting was to plan and promote the May 26th reception for Marge Beil and Mayor Norquist, a reception which extended an open invitation to our entire community. This planning meeting is just one example of HRL's strong desire to work with other established community groups.

HRL has the right and responsibility to make its membership's opinions and concerns understood to the Mayor's Office. We agree with Mr. Fons that all community members should also contact Marge Beil to express their concerns. Although HRL may choose to adopt a variety of political strategies, we likewise believe that by not also challenging the Mayor, we accomplish little for our community or for ourselves. While Mr.

Fons certainly has a right to express his own disagreement on HRL's strategies, we take issue with his claim that HRL is selling off "our chance at attaining equal rights" so that few of us can feel important. Such claims only serve to further divide us as a community and does little to affect meaningful change as we fight for our equal rights, our human rights.

Gay Life Before Stonewall

EDITOR'S NOTE: Mr. Kepner, founder & curator of Los Angeles' International Gay & Lesbian Archives, brought IGLA's traveling exhibit to PrideFest June 11-12.

Gay life was very different, much more limited, thirty, forty, fifty years ago - though Gay enough for the bold, flamboyant few. We packed many bars in big cities, often without being invited, a few bars or soda fountains in smaller places, and had a Gay old time at house parties, at the opera and ballet, and at rare drag balls, while joking about playing Russian Roulette - "will this be the night the cops bust in and arrest all of us, or the night I pick up 'dirt trade,' and end up in the gutter beaten and robbed - or blackmailed for the rest of my life?" That was a real threat. Discrete Lesbians met friends at softball, tennis or bowling, but never mentioned "the subject". There were a few Gay beaches, often isolated from the general public's view. A few high camp Catholic or Episcopal churches meanwhile became known as "Queen's churches"

It was difficult being Gay then, and few wanted to talk or read about it. You could be arrested for possessing Gay novels (a sorry lot anyhow) or erotic photos (if you could find them). Cops could bust you onthe street for just "looking Gay," and it was illegal to be in a place where perverts, degenerates, bulldaggers and queers hung out. You might get a beating on the way to jail, and a long term. Friends and family would abandon you in horror. Fighting the case was near unthinkable. Unless you found a high-priced lawyer to buy off cops and judge.

The press rarely mentioned us, and then mostly in terms like "Erase the Evil Monster!." Psychoanalysts called us sick. The Churches called us sinners. Judges said "Go directly to jail!" To buy a house together, Gay or Lesbian couples had to pretend to be cousins, or just sharing until one got married. A known or suspected homosexual couldn't become a therapist, teacher, lawyer, or hairdresser — though many closeted ones, from J. Edgar Hoover on down, did, bringing their internalized homophobia to the job.

It wasn't all dreary. A few bold or well-placed souls led very Gay lives, but even they were vulnerable. Cautious ones blamed the "flagrant" swishes and dykes for all the trouble — until they

themselves got caught. Hundreds were arrested every week in the U.S., dozens at a time "run in" in bar raids or park sweeps, or entrapped when a vice cop accused a man of "making a pass." Sometimes, the cops caught a big name: a film star (quickly hushed), the Mayor of Oswego, Senator Walsh of Massachussets, or President Johnson's special assistant. Then the press buzzed briefly about this "sordid social problem."

Most Gays believed we were sick, sinners and worse, so the idea of organizing seemed suicidal. You could get busted for trying, and besides "a bunch of queens could never agree on anything." The few who did hope to organize got jolted when others like them didn't all want the same thing, and couldn't agree on the right way to get it. (Our enormous diversity still gives us that problem, but it also gives us advantages not evident much before 1977.)

In the 1950s we started three small homophile groups, the Mattachine Society, ONE Magazine and the Daughters of Bilitis, to discuss and seek a solution to this "social problem." After the Mattachine turned conservative in 1953, it and the later Daughters advocated a mask of respectability and looked for researchers to discover what made us this way, and maybe do something about it. One more feisty and more co-sexual, advocated building a Gay community, but not until 64 did SIR. a San Francisco organization, start practical work to accomplish that. The old "big three" (combined national membership never reached 2000) had declined. Jointly with East Coast groups that had begun polite protests against exclusion of homosexual from federal jobs, SIR called a North American Conference of Homophile Organizations, meeting in February 1966 in Kansas City, then for ten wonderful August days in San Francisco. The first six days were a high point of social, spiritual and educational events, but four fractuous days of NACHO business sessions brought out "Generals," who had marching orders for the rest of us. Meetings in DC, Chicago. Kansas City again and San Francisco debated whether NACHO should dictate policy for our whole movement, or recognize our movement's pluralism, and trade notes on project, problems and goals. But by the end of sixties, we had 40 or 50 organizations and publications nationwide, apologetic and tame by later standards. But militancy was on the rise. The first Advocate issue headlined the words GAY POWER.

A 1952 to 67 witchhunt in England, and briefer ones in several Americans cities, had begun to change public opinion, and some church and professional bodies recommended law reform — not in terms of Gay rights, but urging decriminalization to thwart

blackmailers. Illinois was the first to change, but Chicago cops remained as oppressive as any.

Bars multiplied, enlarged and diversified in the sixties, drag balls flourished, pool and softball leagues started — but raids continued. A bar could be raided if patrons touched, so the no-touch rock dancing became popular. Cliques of Gay couples who avoided the bar scene became more comfortable with their lives. Until the late sixties, we lacked other explicitly Gay gathering places. There'd been covert homosex in public baths for ages, and some baths became private clubs in hopes of discouraging police invasions.

The country had moved from the McCarthy witchhunts and superconformity of the fifties to the Bisexual randiness of the sixties, with poet Allen Ginsberg the prophet of the overlapping Counter Culture Sexual Revolution Philosophy Playboy Drug Culture Situation Ethics Civil Rights Anti-War Movement Student Revolt. Clothes got more varied, hair longer, we could wear beads and bangles - but most Gays stuck defensively to middle-class styles. hoping that "if we dressed and behaved proper, people would accept us - or at least not notice us."

Two Kennedys and King had been assassinated. Watts and other inner cities had burned in riots. Talk of Revolution was in the air, and while many closeted Gays took leading roles, our movement seemed the last to join the new currents. Our homophile organizations tended to insist on dress codes, shunning Gays who looked like hippies. Most of our leaders looked for Respectability — a very different thing from self-respect.

A few Gay organizations turned radical - Vanguard, a 1966 group of street hustlers who previewed the post-Stonewall Gay Liberation Fronts; the Student Homophile League Columbia University; FREE Minneapolis, the Committee for Homosexual Freedom in San Francisco, which picketed States Steamship Lines and Tower Records for discrimination, and the San Francisco Examiner for slandering Gays. CFHF was organized by fiery Leo Lawrence, an ABC new man and former Californians for Goldwater leader who'd been radicalized by being beaten and gassed by Chicago cops outside 1968's Democratic National Convention.

Gays, taking a lesson from rioting blacks, began responding angrily to some bar raids. At a rally outside a raided L.A. bar, we were ordered not to mention the word homosexual. I told our crowd of 200 that "we won't say who we are tonight, but we promise that after tonight, The Love That Dared Not Speak Its Name will never again be quiet!"

When police raided the Patch II near

Los Angeles, bartender Lee Glaze called out: "They've busted two of our sisters! This is the age of Flower Power; if there's a florist here, I'll buy out the flower shop! We're going to raid the police station!" After a dozen Gays pelted police with flowers, those arrested were released. A Gay legal group, a film and social organization, and Metropolitan Community Church started from this preview of Stonewall.

TV. Time, Look, and Live talked about "the newly militant homosexual," but always gave homophobic shrinks the last word. Underground papers began covering our cause, and ran previously unthinkable Gay classifieds. Gay novels became less apologetic. The religious right had hardly noticed us, though scruffy Jesus Freaks challenged us on the streets. Minority Gays and Lesbians hadn't begun to speak up, mostly wanting to be thought of as "just like everybody else." Many bars excluded them

Lesbians began about 1967 to speak up for women's issues. Many quit the homophile movement to helps tart Women's Liberation, which spurned them awhile. Others who stayed in the homophile groups played the old gender roles — some butches on TV interviews sounded almost like Archie Bunker.

(Editor's Note: In the late 60's Milwaukee, the Gay Liberation Organization was the first, followed by the Gay Liberation Front. Later, GLO became the Gay Peoples Union.)

Thousands of closeted Gays and Lesbians who'd worked for peace, civil rights and other reforms came out after 6/28/69 Stonewall resistance the transformed and invigorated our 19-yearold movement. Wild and funky Gay radicals held center stage politically until Anita Bryant's 1977 homophobic campaign in Dade County propelled Image-conscious middle class Gays back into leadership. Gay life each year became richer, more varied, with thousands of other Gays joining the parade. Until the advent of AIDS, the horizon seemed cloudless.



QUESTION: I plan to buy a larger home. Do you have any advice on the merits of selling versus renting out our present home?

ANSWER: I would strongly consider selling over renting. To keep the house rented, you'll have to pay advertising costs or fees to a broker. Maintenance costs take a bite out of rental income. 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BestD Answers Health Questions

Question: My lover and I have been together for five years. We are not concerned with HIV as long as we are monogamous and have tested negative together many times. I have heard that repeated unprotected anal sex can lead to rectal cancer. It that true?

Besides HIV/AIDS there are other health hazards Gay men who engage in anal intercourse must consider. There are several viruses, and parasites that can be transmitted by unprotected anal sex. Hepatitis B is one example. In the early 1980's there were several outbreaks of Hepatitis B in the Gay communities of the midwest.

"Gay bowel disease" was a common phrase which included several parasites such as Giardia and Entamoeba histolytica which can cause severe diarrhea and abdominal pain. These can be transmitted from person to person through sexual intercourse and also from food handling.

As far as the possibility of rectal cancer, this is a rare but serious complication of untreated Human Papilloma Virus, or HPV (venereal warts).

Warts are a very frequent sexually transmitted disease which are very difficult to treat. Several subtypes of this virus have been lined to cervical cancer in women and less commonly, rectal cancer in Gay men. The likelihood of transformation from an anal wart to rectal cancer increases with time if the wart goes untreated. Persons with HIV seem to be prone to a more rapid transformation. People who are HIV negative are still at risk of malignant (cancerous) transformation.

Unprotected anal intercourse with

someone who has venereal warts can result in infection with HPV, and if undiagnosed and left untreated, rectal cancer is a possibility. Therefore before you engage in unprotected anal intercourse with your partner, I would advise you both see your physician and be evaluated for venereal warts. The exam generally involved a simple visual exam and an Anoscopy. Anoscopy is a procedure where the doctor inserts a small plastic probe about five inches into the rectum and looks at the lining of the rectum for any abnormalities.

I would also strongly encourage you both receive Hepatitis B vaccinations if you have not already. Hepatitis B vaccines are available at BESTD Clinic.

Assuming that all is normal, sexual intercourse can be done as long as you are willing to assume the risks of other possible infections such as Giardia and Entamoeba which are generally treated with antibiotics. Of course if either of you are experiencing any "stomach-flu" symptoms you should refrain from unprotected sex.

It's going to be an embarrassment of riches for Lesbian movie fans in the next month as Forbidden Love: The Unashamed Stories of Lesbian Lives plays a return engagement at Milwaukee's Oriental Theater June 27-30 and the new Lesbian comedy, Go Fish, opens in Milwaukee and Madison in July.

The Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee will hold a special private screening of Go Fish, a benefit for its Education Fund, on Thursday evening, June 30 at 7:30pm at the Oriental. Tickets are \$10 in advance, \$12 at the door. LAMM can be reached at (414) 264-2600.

"FORBIDDEN LOVE"

I first saw the Canadian documentary Forbidden Love at the Great Lakes Gay and Lesbian Film Festival in January. Ever since, I've been telling anyone who will listen that it is simply the best Lesbian movie ever made.

Forbidden Love combines interviews with Lesbians who came of age in the 1940's, 50's and 60's with a mock recreation of the Lesbian pulp novels so popular at that time. The result is a moving document about what life was like in the bad old days of police raids and brutal bashings, leavened by a campy tribute to the books which sensationalized "Love in the Shadows."

Each of the women interviewed in Forbidden Love has something touching and/or profound to say about Lesbian life and love. Their reminiscences are suffused with nostalgia but also with the wisdom that comes with age.

The variety of women is great: old-time butches and femmes, a country dyke, a Black nightclub entertainer, a woman of the Haida Nation torn between cultures, and many others.

Listen to just this one anecdote by Ruth Christine to get a sense of the heartfelt stories in Forbidden Love:

"I was talking to this older woman who had been in the Gay scene for some time, and she could tell I was upset about my marriage breaking up, and she said, 'Well dear heart, if you think it hurts to get your heart broken by a man, wait till you get your heart broken by a woman.'

"I didn't really understand exactly

what she meant. I thought, well, a broken heart's a broken heart. But it was different, and when it happened I realized what she was saying. Because I find being with a woman is a lot more intimate, a lot more shared than with a man. So the pain when you lose that — when you love someone and they don't love you anymore — the pain is harder. You're losing a part of you.

"I never felt when I broke up with my husband I was losing a part of me. I thought I was losing him and my family and my surroundings. I never really felt I was losing part of me. But when I had my first heartbreak with a woman, I felt I was losing a part of myself. Kinda sad, huh?"

Interspersed throughout these compelling testimonies is a dramatic recreation of a Lesbian pulp novel in which the experienced and butchy Mitch (Lynne Adams) gradually seduces the sweet and naive Laura (Stephanie Morgenstern). These corny episodes culminate in one of the nicest Lesbian sex scenes ever filmed.

Forbidden Love is much more than the traditional "talking heads" type of documentary. The wit and wisdom of the real- life Lesbians interviewed is inspiring, and the campy melodrama of Mitch and Laura is highly entertaining. This movie is both funny and intelligent and says more about Lesbians than any other movie yet made. Forbidden Love is simply the best Lesbian movie ever made. Go see it!

"GO FISH"

When I spoke recently with Rose Troche, the director of the new Lesbian movie Go Fish, I gushed that I thought it was the best Lesbian comedy ever made.

Troche burst into laughter and said "How am I supposed to take that? It's the only Lesbian comedy ever made!"

"That's true," said I undaunted, "so it's the first and the best Lesbian comedy ever made!"

Go Fish is a lighthearted romantic comedy about a group of Lesbian friends in Chicago. To me, they are the most realistic, down-to-earth Lesbians I've ever seen depicted on film. Each of the main characters — Max, Ely, Kia, Evy and Daria — will immediately remind you of your own Lesbian friends: funny, quirky, angst-ridden over girlfriends, and over-concerned with or contemptuous of political correctness.

The film is basically about Lesbian friendships and dating rituals and is

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infused with great humor throughout. It focuses on the gradual coming together of the punky, lovelorn Max (Guinevere Turner), who laments that she hasn't slept with a woman in almost a year, and the ugly duckling Ely (V.S. Brodie), who transformed into a mighty. self-possessed butch after having her hair completely shorn.

Max and Ely's friends use all sorts of tricks to get them together, and after their first date and their first night together, they talk and talk and talk

about them. Sound familiar?

Every few minutes the camera breaks away from the story to a close-up of all the women, heads huddled



together, commenting like a Greek chorus on the funny goings-on. In a running joke, the sexually omnivorous Daria comes to these gatherings with a new woman each time. Along the way, the banter includes the outing of famous celebrities (Whitney Houston, Morgan Fairchild) and a discussion of what to call female genitalia (honey pot, love mound,

I wish I could share some of the jokes with you, but at the advance screening I attended I was honestly laughing so hard that I couldn't take notes! The humor comes thick and fast and, unlike some recent Lesbian-themed flops, builds to a very satisfying conclusion. Don't be put off by recent Lesbian films that have been disappointing. This is the one we've been waiting for - it's a delight!

One of the film's strengths is the diversity of its characters. Kia and Evy. who are new lovers, are Black and Latina, respectively. They and their friends have different backgrounds and body types and attitudes. But they're all obviously and happily dykes, played by non-professional actresses, all Lesbians

from Chicago

"We cast women who looked different enough but still looked as though they would actually hang out together and could mean something to each other," said Troche. "In casting V.S. Brodie and Guinevere Turner, the goal was to make a couple that didn't look 100% likely.

"Everyone seemed to have a sense that this project was in some way important. I believe this happened because the cast and crew were predominantly Lesbian, and we knew we wanted to get more images about ourselves. There simply are not enough Lesbian films being made. If there were, there would be no such thing as a 'Lesbian film.' It would simply be a film."

One thing viewers should know before they see Go Fish is that it was shot on a shoestring budget in black and white. While some of its production values are not up to the standards we expect from multi-million dollar Hollywood productions, its overall Lesbian content, its sweetness and wit outweigh any

quibbles about its modest packaging.

Go Fish was voted an "Audience Favorite" at Robert Redford's Sundance Film Festival earlier this year apparently even straight audiences are digging it - and the Samuel Goldwyn Company is promoting and distributing it a first for any Lesbian film. It will play in Milwaukee at least two, possibly three, weeks beginning July 1 and opens at Madison's Majestic Theater July 22.

I plan to attend the benefit screening June 30 sponsored by the Lesbian Alliance, and I hope you readers out there will too. This rollicking comedy will be a blast to see with a mostly Lesbian and Gay (guys should come

too!) audience.

"For A Lost Solider" Tells of a Boy's First Love

Coming-of-Age Tale Set in WW II

For a Lost Soldier, the sensitive story of a boy's relationship with a soldier who helps liberate a Dutch village at the end of World War II, will play a limited engagement at Milwaukee's Oriental Theatre June 24-26.

Anyone who missed it when it was screened at the Great Lakes Gay and Lesbian Film Festival earlier this year is encouraged to attend. The beautifully written and photographed movie was directed by Roeland Kerbosch. It is in both English and Dutch with some subtitles, but don't let that keep you

The story is told in flashback as Jeroen, a 40-something choreographer, is rehearsing a dance called "Liberation." Jeroen looks back on his childhood when Allied forces liberated the Netherlands and he experienced his sexual awakening with a handsome young Canadian soldier.

The movie effectively conveys the



loneliness of 12-year-old Jeroen (Maarten Smit), whose mother sends him away from Amsterdam to stay with a family in the country during the "Hunger Winter" of 1944-45. Young Jeroen struggles to adjust to country life and his new foster family, while also dealing with his budding sexuality, which is awakened during banter about sex and horseplay with his foster brother and a friend.

The Allied liberation of the little village is carried out peacefully by less than a dozen soldiers, one of whom, Walt (Andrew Kelley), takes a liking to Jeroen. They soon become inseparable. Walt teaches Jeroen to drive his jeep and helps him investigate a downed airplane. They go for long walks. Their

mutual affection evolves into intimacy in several subtle but undeniably erotic scenes.

The climax comes when Walt is ordered to move on and Jeroen is devastated by his abrupt departure. Jeroen doesn't even get the chance to say goodby, and all he has are a pair of Walt's sunglasses to remember him by.

For a Lost Soldier packs an emotional wallop, primarily because of the great performance by Maarten Smit as Jeroen. His youth and vulnerability and the anguish he feels over the loss of Walt can't help but pull the heartstrings.

But it doesn't leave you bummed out. It's so lushly filmed and dreamily romantic that everyone viewing it is likely to be drawn back into nostalgic memories of their own first loves. And even though the older Jeroen pines over Walt, it's clear that his wartime idyll constituted his own personal liberation and that he has moved on from there.

For a Lost Soldier may be the most beautiful coming-of-age and coming out story ever filmed. It's only playing three days, so don't miss it!



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

Stonewall Rebellion.

The Stonewall edition of In the Life will be broadcast just days after the event on Madison's WHA/Channel 21 Wednesday, June 29 at 10:30pm. Milwaukee's WMVS/Channel 10 will run the Stonewall special at 12:30am July 8 (note that this is the last program on its Thursday night, July 7, schedule).

Fifty-three panels from around the country and overseas were brought to


New York by the Names Project specifically for the ABC taping.

Lammy Awards Bestowed on Best Gay/Lesbian Books

6th Annual Lambda Literary Awards

Los Angeles, CA — The 6th annual Lambda Literary Awards were presented at a special gala held in conjunction with the American Booksellers Association conference in Los Angeles in late May. The "Lammys" honor the best in Gay and Lesbian literature for the preceding year.

The noteworthy trend this year is that more awards were given for books published by mainstream, establishment companies than ever before. In the first years of the Lammys, most of the books honored were published by small Gay and Lesbian-owned presses, like Alyson and Firebrand. The changing trend is another indication that Gay and Lesbian-themed works are increasingly published by large companies, like Dutton, St. Martin's and Knopf.

The recipients of Lammys for Best Gay and Best Lesbian Fiction were Living Upstairs by Joseph Hansen and Written on the Body by Jeanette Winterson. Lammys for Best Gay and Best Lesbian Mystery went to Steven Saylor for Catilina's Riddle and Mary Wings for Divine Victim.

Lammys for Best Gay Men's and Best Lesbian Studies books went to Randy Shilts for Conduct Unbecoming: Gays and Lesbians in the US Military and to Elizabeth Kennedy and Madeline Davis for Boots of Leather, Slippers of Gold, a study of working class Lesbians in Buffalo, New York.

To no one's surprise, Tony Kushner's Angels in America won the Lammy for Best Lesbian or Gay Drama. Kushner's play previously won the Pulitzer Prize and a Tony Award as Best Broadway play.

Another highly honored book, Edmund White's Genet, a mammoth study of French writer Jean Genet, won the Lammy for Gay Men's Biography. Genet recently won the National Book Critics Circle Award as Best Biography. Lammy winner for Best Lesbian Biography was Josyanne Savigneau for Marguerite Yourcenar, a Lesbian writer who was the first woman ever named to the prestigious French Academy.


Cartoonist Alison Bechdel won her third Lammy, this time for her cartoon collection Spawn of Dykes to Watch Out For in the Best Lesbian and Gay Humor category. The Lammy for Children's/Young Adult Literature went to Hillary Mullins for The Cat Came Back.

Collected Poems by James Schuyler and 1990 by Michael Klein tied for Best Gay Men's Poetry. The late Audre Lorde won the women's Lammy for her collection, The Marvelous Arithmetic of Distance.

The Lammy for Best Lesbian and Gay Science Fiction/Fantasy went to Starhawk for her book The 5th Sacred Thing. The Lesbian and Gay Small Press Book Award was a tie between Leslie Feinberg's Stone Butch Blues and B. Michael Hunter's Sojourner.

The Lammy for Best Lesbian or Gay Anthology went to the editors of The Lesbian and Gay Studies Reader, and the Editor's Choice award went to Coleman Dowell for A Star Bright Lie.

The Lambda Literary awards are sponsored by the Lambda Book Report, a bi-monthly Gay/Lesbian literary journal. Names of nominees are submitted by readers, and a panel of writers, publishers and booksellers make the final choices of who wins the Lammys.





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Advocate's History of the Gay and Lesbian Movement

Long Road To Freedom ed. by Mark Thompson St. Martin's Press \$40.00 HC

Back in June of 1969 the Advocate was less than two years old, twelve pages long and little more than newsletter, looking far more like a mimeo throwaway than the four-color glossy publication that we find at the newsstands today. Yet there is probably no publication that effectives mirrors the twenty-five years since the Stonewall Riots. In Long Road To Freedom: The Advocate History of the Gay and Lesbian Movement, Mark Thompson has culled a fascinating collection of essays, quotes and photographs from the Advocate's archives to chronicle the often turbulent history of the Gay rights movement

With an introduction from Randy Shilts, Long Road To Freedom offers a unique window on Gay history. The book is divided by year and within each year. Thompson includes a brief overview of the year, a sampling of representative Advocate covers, a month by month timeline, some key essays interviews, occasional quizzes, cartoons, letters to the editor and lots of photographs. What emerges is an amazing portrait of the countless individuals, many now long forgotten who were among the first activist. James Balwin, Rita Mae Brown, Andrew Holleran, Jesse Jackson, and Susie Bright are just a few of those profiled or interviewed. The development of Gay culture is highlighted by essays on monumental books and films, beginning with Donn Teal's The Gay Militants in 1971 to Paul Monette's award winning Becoming A Man in 1992.

What elevates Long Road To Freedom beyond the status of simply another coffee table book is the amazing merging of the intensely personal with grand sweeping portraits of AIDS in the 80's and the rabidly homophobic "Kill a Queer for christ" campaign of the late 70's with Anita Bryant as spokesperson. Despite all of the gains made since Stonewall, what is surprisingly evident from Long Road To Freedom, is how much has stayed the same, including the myriad of problems within our own queer community. Del Martin's bitter and angry farewell to the Gay rights movement (Good-bye, My Alienated Brothers 1970) remains as powerful an indictment of the white male predominance in the movement today as it did back in 1970. Randy Shilt's piece, Castro Street: Mecca or Ghetto? from 1977 brings to mind Bruce Bawer's questions of

ghettoization within the Gay community in A Place At The Table. Even Armisted Maupin's oft-quoted Design for Living is as perceptive and as apt today as in

Many people complain about the Advocate's conservative slant positions on various issues but this should not act as any deterrent from picking up Long Road To Freedom. In a year when all queers will be in New York, be it in person or in spirit, it is important to occasionally look back at Gay liberation's roots. We may have come along way in 25 years but certainly not as far as we might have and just maybe, not quite as far as we think. Highly recommended

The Weekend

The Weekend by Peter Cameron FSG. HC \$17

Time and time again we hear such statements as "life is too short..." and "time heals all wounds" and "home is where the heart is". Cliches? Certainly. Nonsense? Perhaps. Yet, for all of their blatant banality, sometimes such platitudes have an unnerving ring on truth. Relationships can and usually are messy. Life is often surprisingly awkward. Even the most caring people can appear to be quite mean when in pain. Often the best advice is that which isn't given or if given, not taken. And finally, neither life nor love have any easy solutions for those in despair. The very familiarity of such messages is in fact the very quality that makes them so comforting. Certainly this is the case in the hands of a writer like Peter Cameron in his touching and poignant new novel, The Weekend

Cameron's plot for The Weekend is deceptively simple. Gay art critic Lyle is bringing Robert, a new boyfriend on a visit of his oldest and dearest friends. Marian and John for the weekend. They swim and have dinner. Robert and Lyle fight. Robert leaves. Marian feels responsible. If this sounds a bit dull, and it must, it is because Cameron isn't so much concerned with what happens as to what is happening internally within

each of the characters.

With great warmth and tremendous tenderness, Cameron reveals how unfailingly human are all of his characters as they seek love and validation in their relationships, both in friendships and, of course, in love affairs. What becomes immediately apparent is just how emotional, complicated, and unpredictable we humans can be. Marian has learned to escape reality by romanticizing the most ordinary of objects. John loves his wife and tries to be supportive yet spends increasing

amounts of time out in the garden building, yes, a wall. Lyle offers the room of his recently deceased lover Tony to Robert, a much younger art student to whom he is attracted, as a studio in

which to paint.

The character of Tony is The Weekend's greatest enigma precisely because in death, as in life, he has proven to be such an enigma to all those around him. Tony and John, his halfbrother always believed each other to be opposites but as they matured, increasingly and much to the surprise of both, learned the ways in which they were similar. For Lyle, Tony was the love of his life yet their relationship was never easy, owing to Tony's frequent sexual liaison's with strangers. Even the mourning process is messy and unexpected, not A gradual lessening of pain and grief, "For Tony and Lyle had not always loved one another very well, and this fact made Lyle's mourning all the more complicated. His sadness at losing Tony was ornamented with guilt."
Peter Cameron's The Weekend is

an engaging and wonderful red, filled with many quiet moments of joy and loss, of misguided and misunderstood kindness and finally of disillusionment and regret. With its subject love in its many and varied forms, The Weekend is certainly not covering unfamiliar territory. What elevates The Weekend is its rare mix of lyricism and honesty; Cameron neither looks for nor conveys any simple answers in his elegant prose. If some of the book's constructs and coincidences seem a bit too contrived. The Weekend more than manages to offer enough insights, comforts and surprises to compensate. Highly recommended.

A Bold New Photographic Look at Lesbians and Gays in America

Harper San Francisco is celebrating the 25th Anniversary of Stonewall and National Lesbian and Gay Book Month with the publication of Family: A Portrait of Gay and Lesbian America by Nancy Andrews. This is a landmark book that will dramatically alter the perception of Gay men and Lesbians in the United States.

Family contains seventy stunning black and white portraits accompanying personal stories that capture the common and uncommon moments in the lives of Gays and Lesbians - particularly in corners of the country that are not typically covered by either the mainstream or the Gay media.

Included are portraits of Phyllis Hunt and Terrie Harner, two Christian Lesbians who, "next to Jesus," love each other the best; Ruth Ellis, an 85 year old

Lesbian who lives alone in a senior citizens complex in Detroit; Jim Dean, an investor who has compiled a portfolio of Gay friendly companies called Dean's List; and many others.


