Victory Fund Supports Record 17 Candidates

Ranks of Openly Gay/Lesbian Officials Could Swell This Year

Washington, DC — The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, which offers financial and technical assistance to qualified Gay and Lesbian candidates for public office, is recommending a record 17 candidates to its donor network. If most are victorious, the ranks of openly Gay and Lesbian public officials could rise dramatically after this fall's elections.

All 17 candidates have undergone vigorous screening to determine their viability as potential public officials. They will receive campaign contributions from members of the Fund who join for \$100 and promise to donate another \$100 each to two recommended candidates

within a year.

Since its inception in 1991, the Victory Fund has donated more than \$600,000 to qualified Gay and Lesbian candidates. Many of its recommended candidates have won their races. Wisconsin State Rep. Tammy Baldwin credited the Victory Fund with helping to secure her victory for a seat in the State Assembly in 1992.

In late July, Victory Fund Executive Director William Waybourn announced the names of 10 candidates who will be added to the 7 candidates previously awarded Victory Fund backing. The new

candidates include:

woman running in the Democratic primary in September to become New York State Attorney General. Burstein has previously served in the New York State Senate, as Chair of the State Consumer Protection Board, as President of the State Civil Service Commission and as a Family Court Judge in Brooklyn.

when he won a seat on the New York City Council as an openly Gay and HIV-positive candidate, is running for a seat in the US House of Representatives. New York's 8th Congressional District includes the heavily Gay and Lesbian-populated neighborhoods of Chelsea, Greenwich Village and SoHo.

▼ Ken Cheuvront is one of three Democrats competing in a primary for two seats in the Arizona House of Representatives. The district includes central Phoenix. Cheuvront has good name recognition as a longtime community activist and a member of the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Board. In 1990, he won 44% of the vote in a bid for a State Senate seat.

▼ John Hannay, the former Director of Baltimore's Gay and Lesbian Community Center, is running for one of three District 44 seats in the Maryland House of Delegates. Employed by the AIDS Administration of the Maryland Department of Health, Hannay has worked with the Maryland Civil Rights Commission and founded the Free State Justice Campaign, a group lobbying for a

state Gay rights law.

three terms in the Washington State House of Representatives, is running for a seat in the State Senate. The 43rd district includes parts of Seattle. Anderson has strong support from Gays and Lesbians and organized labor and was recently voted the state's third most effective legislator. Anderson has ushered Gay rights bills through the House three times only to see them killed in the Senate.

v Don Moreland, a Seattle businessman, is running for a seat in the Washington House of Representatives. He has been endorsed by Seattle's Mayor and nine city council members, including Sherry Harris, a Lesbian. Moreland served on the Seattle Human Rights Commission and on the Governor's AIDS Task Force. He is a founder of the Privacy Fund, a Gay/Lesbian political action committee.

▼ Tom Ammiano is a special education teacher and comedian who was the first Gay person to be elected to the San Francisco School Board. He has been President of the School Board for several years and is now seeking a seat on the Board of Supervisors. A community activist for many years, Ammiano organized the Gay Teachers Union, served on the Mayor's Advisory Council on Childcare and has been involved in many Democratic Party

The Derek Belt is the unchallenged Democratic nominee for a seat in the Massachusetts House of Representatives, representing his hometown of Attleboro. Belt, a case manager at the AIDS Action Committee of Massachusetts since 1991, is appealing to Gays and Lesbians, women, senior citizens and the Hispanic community. He faces a nominal challenge from a Republican in the November general election but is expected to win.

UW-Milwaukee Offers Gay/Lesbian Studies Courses

Certificate Program
Expected to be Approved
Soon

Milwaukee — Registration for fall
classes at UW-Milwaukee is underway
and among the many offerings are a
number of courses in Gay and Lesbian
Studies. The only glitch is that as of In
Step's presstime, the proposed
certificate program in Gay and Lesbian
Studies had not yet been approved by
administrators.

Students are encouraged to sign up for the courses anyway because they can still earn the credits from the various departments. UW-Milwaukee Associate

Vice Chancellor Paul Haubrich told In Step the program is likely to be approved in August. But even if it takes longer to wend its way through the university's administrative channels, credits for the Gay/Lesbian Studies certificate will be retroactive.

Haubrich said the certificate program still requires approval from UW-Milwaukee Vice Chancellor Kenneth Watters, who must then forward it to Albert Beaver, Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs in the UW-System.

The fall course offerings tentatively approved for credits toward the Gay and Lesbian Studies certificate are listed below. The courses noted with an asterisk are of primary importance to Gay and Lesbian Studies but many of the others are related.

The certificate program requires students to complete 18 credits, including three credits for the Introduction to Gay/Lesbian Studies, nine credits in two of three areas of study (Literary and C u I t u r a I S t u d i e s , History/Sociology/Political Science/Economics/Anthropology, and Psychology/Social Welfare/Health Sciences) and another six credits in tangential areas.

The English Department is offering Introduction to Gay and Lesbian Studies (350-248, Sec. 005)*, The Politics of Representation: The Holocaust and AIDS (350-248, Sec. 008)*, Literature and Media: Stars and American Culture (350-380)*, The Politics of Gender in Media and Performance (350-509)*, and Feminist Literary Theory (350-547).

The History Department is offering

The History Department is offering The Family and Sex Roles in the Past (448-141) and Women in American Society (448-243). Rhetoric in Western Thought (245-435) is available through Mass Communications, while The Economics of Discrimination (296-248) is offered through the Economics Department.

Sociology courses include Sex and Gender (900-250) and Sociology of Deviant Behavior (900-341). Anthropology offers Culture and Personality (156-445). The Department of Africology presents African Religious Thought and Social Organizations (106-311). Theories in the Psychology of Women (820-420) in Psych and The Spectrum of Human Immunodeficiency (397-362)* in the School of Nursing are also available.

Five courses in the field of Social Work are offered: Introduction to Human Services (896-100); Human Behavior and Social Environment (896-350); Social Work and Medical Issues (896-536); Child and Family Services (896-562); and Family Violence (896-591).

Club 3054 Faces Full Common Council Vote August 30

Committee Votes 4-1 For 90 Day Closure

Madison — Madison's Alcohol License Review Commission voted July 27 to accept a stipulation mandating a 90-day closure of Club 3054. The 4-1 decision came in response to allegations of illegal public sexual activity in Wings, the club's basement bar. The stipulation will next go to Madison's Common Council, which will vote August 30 whether to accept or reject the stipulation.

Assistant City Attorney Rick Petri, bar owner Cheri Becker and Becker's attorney, Richard Jacobson, had originally worked out a plan which included a number of conditions, including a 60-day suspension of the Club's liquor license. However, at a July 7 ALRC meeting, Ald. Tim Bruer engineered a resolution to automatically reject any settlement which did not include a 90-day closure.

The lengthening of the suspension was the only change in the stipulation.

LONE ALDERMAN CONDEMNS VOTE

Ald. Dan Waisman was the lone vote against the revised penalty. He did so because he believed that even the original 60-day closure was too harsh a penalty. He called the process by which the ALRC decision was reached a "bad way of doing business." He stated at the meeting his belief that members of the Common Council had struck a deal to close the bar permanently unless a 90day suspension was imposed. He named Ald, Bert Zipperer and Ald, Tim Kehl as two of the dealmakers, saving that they and other Council members "clearly had not read the actual charges [against the bar]. They had only read the newspaper accounts.

Bruer denied that either of the named Council members had spoken with him regarding a deal and denied that any deal had been struck. Neither Zipperer nor Kehl could be reached for comment before In Step's deadline.

After the meeting, Waisman reiterated his belief that there was "a deal done." He noted that there had been 14 police calls from Club 3054 in the last year, and they were all "good calls," i.e. calls the police want to receive. The question of any illegal sexual activity, he said, was a matter for the Public Health Department, which chose to take no action. Bruer has maintained that his only motivation behind engineering a 90-day closure was public health concerns, but recent

actions he has spearheaded to regulate adult businesses in Madison call that assertion into question.

Under Madison ordinance, the recommendation of the ALRC may not be considered until the second regular meeting of the Common Council after the recommendation is made. Petri explained at the meeting that this was so members of the Council would have time to read all of the records pertaining to the recommendation.

Class Detects Discrimination in Tests of Valley Merchants

Oshkosh — Fox Valley merchants are being asked to help rid the business community of bias and discrimination in its dealings with customers. The request comes from a local group in response to a recent experiment done by a University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh sociology class.

Earlier this year, Professor Barbara Peters sent students to 11 Fox Valley stores — including jewelry stores, record stores, shoe stores and sporting goods shops. Some students were African American, while others posed as interracial and Gay and Lesbian couples. White students served as "control groups" and "observers" to determine the level of prejudice by store management and personnel. In all but two retail establishments, the students were discriminated against.

Peters would not name the stores, but said the discrimination included not being offered the same sale price as the "control group," the African American customers being watched closely by store personnel while whites were left alone as sales clerks went to the stockroom for something, and the Gay couples being told they could not look at

Peters says her class's goal in doing this experiment was to give students real-life exposure to some of the day-today biases and prejudices exhibited toward Gays and racial minorities.

STORES TO POST NON-BIAS STICKER

Upon reading about the project's results in the paper and hearing about it on the radio, the multi-racial Toward Community: Unity in Diversity group discussed the findings. They decided they would ask area businesses to sign an agreement and post a sticker, promising not to discriminate. The sticker reads: "The management of this establishment and its employees are committed to providing courteous and non-discriminatory service to all its patrons."

So far the group has only contacted businesses in downtown Appleton, but it plans to extend their reach to cover the Fox River Mall, Northland Mall and Valley Fair Mall. The response from those merchants contacted so far has been positive. When finished in the north Valley, Toward Community may expand their efforts to include businesses in Neenah-Menasha and Oshkosh. As for Peters, she says her class will conduct

the same experiment again this coming school year.

Toward Community: Unity in Diversity was formed last year with the mission of promoting "unity through a sharing of cultural values, an appreciation of the richness of diversity and a commitment to justice through education, advocacy and service."

STATE News Briefs

Pro-Choice Republicans Back Gunderson for US Senate

Madison — Two prominent pro-choice supporters within the Republican Party have thrown their support to Matt Gunderson, the 30-year-old Osseo businessman who wants to unseat US Sen. Herb Kohl (D) in the November election.

Ann Peckham of Madison and George Kaiser of Milwaukee sent a letter to 400 pro-choice Republicans saying, "If the pro-choice forces do not rally around Matt, we will likely never see another high profile Republican choice candidate in Wisconsin...If the electorate rejects Matt, it rejects moderation and embraces moralism."

Gunderson is the younger brother of US Rep. Steve Gunderson and is believed to share his moderate social views on abortion and Gay rights, views that have incensed right wing religious elements within the State GOP.

Gunderson will square off against more conservative, anti-choice Republicans in the September 13 Senatorial primary. His opponents are attorney Thomas Fitzpatrick, State Treasurer Cate Zeuske and State Rep. Robert Welch.

Crypto Report Cites Faulty Equipment, Slow Response

Milwaukee — The July 21 edition of the New England Journal of Medicine contained a report by federal, state and city health officials about the tainted municipal water supply which caused the cryptosporidiosis epidemic in Milwaukee last year. More than 400,000 residents became ill with the parasitic infection and 100 immuno-compromised individuals, many of them with HIV/AIDS, have died of complications from crypto.

The report indicated that while the Howard Avenue Water Treatment Plant was operating within standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency and the State Department of Natural Resources, failures of equipment and

slow response by personnel contributed to the crypto outbreak. "Water quality standards and the testing of patients for cryptosporidium were not adequate to detect this outbreak," the report concluded.

The report said that equipment meant to check the turbidity (cloudiness) of the water on a continuous basis had not been operating for almost a year. Special equipment to monitor whether enough coagulant has been added during the water purification process was also installed improperly, giving Water Works personnel a false sense of security. In addition, because human stool samples are not routinely checked for crypto, health workers were slow to recognize that a water-borne parasitic disease was spreading. None of these factors created the crypto-laden water. They merely disquised it and delayed recognition of it.

The findings of the report are likely to be used by those suing the City of

Milwaukee for negligence.

Gay Republican to Challenge Notestein for State Assembly

Milwaukee — Scott Evertz, a 31-year-old Republican, will be the first openly Gay man to run for a seat in the State Assembly. Evertz filed nomination papers to run against State Rep. Barbara Notestein, a Democrat who has held the 19th District Assembly seat since 1984.

Evertz was born in Washington, DC but came to Milwaukee in 1980 to attend Marquette University where he studied political science and theology. He has been a volunteer for the Milwaukee AIDS Project and is Vice President of the Log Cabin Club of Milwaukee, a group that promotes the Republican Party within the Gay community and promotes Gay rights within the GOP.

Evertz promises to be a strong supporter of Gay rights. He says he prefers legislation to legalize same gender marriage over domestic partnership provisions but would support whichever proposal had the best chance of passage. Crime, welfare reform and property tax relief will be the major issues he will address during the campaign.

Evertz will face Notestein in the September 13 primary. The 19th District, which runs along Milwaukee's east side between St. Francis in the south to UW-Milwaukee in the north, is heavily Democratic. Notestein is currently Assistant Majority Leader in the State Assembly and has strong ties to women's groups, labor, and senior citizens.

Milwaukee — Mayor John Norquist has appointed Bob Moore, President of

Milwaukee GAMMA and coordinator of the Gay Bicycling Network, to the newly created Bicycling Task Force. The purpose of the Task Force is to oversee a bicycling plan for the city that will improve safety and promote bicycling for commuting and recreation while helping Milwaukee meet its clean air goals. Committee Pulls Olympics from Cobb County

Atlanta, GA —On July 29 the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) decided to move the 1996 Olympic Volleyball Games from Cobb County, Georgia.

Last year, the Cobb County Commission passed a resolution condemning the "Gay lifestyle" as incompatible with community standards and has refused to rescind the measure

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MEDICAL COLLEGE OF WISCONSIN despite mounting opposition. Gay and Lesbian residents of Cobb County formed the Olympics Out Of Cobb Coalition with the goal of removing the prestigious Olympic games from the county in light of its anti-Gay stance.

"We commend the Olympic Committee for taking this principled stand and agreeing that Cobb County does not deserve the honor of hosting the Olympic Games," said Peri Jude Radecic, National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Executive Director. "It would have been an international disgrace to host the multicultural Olympics in a county where bigotry and prejudice are proclaimed through anti-Gay resolutions."

"This decision is a victory for Atlanta, ACOG, and all those who believe in human rights and dignity," said Pat Hussain, NGLTF board member and organizer of the Olympics Out of Cobb

Coalition.

Citrus Commission Dumps Rush

Tallahassee, FL — The Florida Citrus Commission has decided not to renew its contract with conservative talk show host Rush Limbaugh who was paid \$1 million for hawking Florida orange juice on his radio and TV shows in the

past six months.

The decision to hire Limbaugh had met with a firestorm of criticism from leaders of the feminist, African American and Gay and Lesbian communities because of Limbaugh's frequent disparagement of those groups. A boycott of Florida orange juice had been picking up steam in recent weeks, but a spokesman for the Citrus Commission denied the boycott was a factor in dumping Limbaugh.

Kim Gandy of the National Organization for Women said the Commission's decision not to renew Limbaugh's contract "sent a message that hate and intolerance will not be tolerated by thinking consumers."

"One hopes that the Florida Citrus Commission has learned a lesson. Bigotry is bad for business," said Mickey Wheatley of Gay and Lesbian Americans which joined in the boycott. "But then you would have thought they would have learned that lesson with Anita Bryant," he added, referring to the singer and orange juice spokeswoman who led battles against Gay rights laws in the 1970's.

Senate Slashes Millions From NEA Budget

Washington, DC — On July 26, the US Senate approved by voice vote a funding bill that will cut the budget of the National Endowment for the Arts by 5%, or a whopping \$8.5 million. The House had previously cut the NEA budget by

2%, so a House/Senate conference committee must work out a compromise.

Democratic Sen. Robert C. Byrd (W-VA), who is chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee, led the attack on the NEA, citing a recent NEA-sponsored performance in Minneapolis in which actor Ron Athey allegedly drew blood from his skull and a fellow actor's body, soaked the blood with paper towels and hung them on a clothesline above the audience. The Walker Arts Center had paid Athey \$125-150 of an NEA grant for his show.

The Senate reductions in NEA funds will reduce three specific programs by up to 40%: visual arts, performing arts and presenting and commissioning. Byrd said these areas "have been at the center of

recent controversies."

The Senate cuts would reduce the NEA budget from its current \$170 million to about \$161.5 million. The current budget is already much lower than in previous years because of earlier cuts brought about by conservative critics like Sen. Jesse Helms. The current budget of the NEA is actually less than what the Pentagon allocates for the armed services' marching bands alone.

FBI Searching for Serial Killer of Gavs

Quantico, VA — The FBI has joined authorities in Virginia, Maryland, Georgia and Florida in the search for a man who is suspected of murdering at least five Gay men along the east and southeast coasts since early this year.

Warrants for first-degree murder have been issued for Gary R. Bowles, 32, in Nassau County, Florida, Savannah, Georgia and Montgomery County, Maryland. The FBI is seeking Bowles for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. Each of his alleged victims are white men who Bowles apparently met in Gay bars. The victims' cars, credit cars and other valuables were also stolen. The victims were alternately beaten, strangled and/or shot to death.

Bowles, a construction worker, was released from a Florida prison last December after serving two years for a robbery and probation violations. Publicity about his alleged murder spree has led authorities in other jurisdictions to re-examine unsolved homicide cases. The FBI is reviewing a series of murders of Gay men in the Washington, DC and Arlington, Virginia area to determine whether Bowles might be implicated. Gay organizations and newspapers are warning Gay men to be careful of who they meet and take home.

Interfaith Alliance to Counter Christian Coalition

Washington, DC — A coalition of Jewish, Catholic and Protestant leaders have formed an Interfaith Alliance to provide a counterweight to the political and social activism of evangelicals and fundamentalist Christians organized as the Christian Coalition.

"Our concern is that the radical right lays claim to the fact that they uniquely speak for people of faith in this country, in essence that 'God is on our side," Joan Brown Campbell of the National Council of Churches told the New York Times. "We feel we must come together as an interfaith group and say to this country there is an alternate religious voice."

"Putting it another way," said Dr. Herbert Valentine of the Baltimore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church (USA), "we're against spiritual

intimidation.'

Among the Board members of the new Interfaith Alliance are Bishop Thomas J. Gumbleton of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit, Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, former President of the American Jewish Congress, and Rev. Leonard Jackson of the First African Methodist Episcopal Church of Los Angeles.

Two Gay/Lesbian Health Foundations Merge

Washington, DC — The National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation and the National Alliance of Lesbian and Gay Health Clinics have merged into a new entity, the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association, to be headquartered in the District of Columbia.

The Lesbian and Gay Health Association plans to provide leadership on policies and funding in the areas of Gay and Lesbian health issues. This goal includes lobbying Congress and federal agencies for monies and programs to benefit Gay and Lesbian health consumers.

The group will continue to assist in the development of Gay and Lesbian health clinics and services nationwide and hopes to publish an annual report on the state of Gay health in America. The Association's first director is attorney Christopher Portelli, who formerly served as general counsel for the National Association of People with AIDS.

Virginia Governor Attacks Gays as "Unnatural"

Richmond, VA — Republican Gov. George Allen, speaking on his monthly radio call-in show, said that Gay relationships are "unnatural" and that it is "not in the best interests of a child" to be raised by same gender parents.

Allen's comments came in response to a question about the custody battle over 3-year-old Tyler Doustou, whose Lesbian mother was ruled an "unfit" parent by a Virginia judge. Sharon Bottoms won her appeal but because the boy's grandmother is appealing that ruling, Bottoms does not yet have custody of Tyler.

"As a matter of government policy, I don't think we should condone that kind of behavior," said Allen about Gay parenting. "Furthermore, it's against the criminal laws in Virginia that homosexual acts are illegal, and I think it should stay illegal."

In a rebuke to Allen's anti-Gay views, the Virginia Housing Development Authority recently dropped the word "family" from its lending regulations, replacing it with the broader term "household." The vote was 6-1, with commissioners saying the change would not just benefit Gay and Lesbian couples but all people who choose to live together or who are forced to live together because of economic necessity.

Stories of Anti-Gay Violence in Workplace Needed

Washington, DC — The Occupational Safety and Health Administration, the arm of the Department of Labor which regulates safety and health threats on the job, is considering including anti-Gay violence (along with violence based on race and gender) in its revised guidelines about the workplace environment.

Joe Dear, Assistant Secretary of OSHA, was recently asked about the inclusion of such a provision. Dear said he would seriously consider it but would like more information, such as evidence that homophobic violence does occur on the job.

Gays and Lesbians are encouraged to write descriptions of incidents of anti-Gay violence they have experienced on the job. Stories should note whether the incident was a physical or verbal assault or threat and whether the perpetrator was an employer, a co-worker or an outsider. The year of the incident is also important information to include.

El Paso, TX - The El Paso Times has joined the growing list of daily newspapers in the country which publish announcements of unions between same sex couples. Publisher Don Flores said: "We strive to be inclusive of people regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, physical disability, age or economic standing."

Boise, ID - Rev. Todd Brown, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Idaho, has issued a statement opposing an anti-Gay initiative which will appear on the ballot in November. However, Brown also said Gays should not be recognized as a "new protected class" and that he opposes the extension of benefits to the domestic partners of same sex couples.

Boston, MA — The administration University Northeastern announced it will recruit openly Gay and Lesbian faculty members by advertising openings through Gay publications and organizations and spreading the news that Northeastern provides benefits to the domestic partners of its faculty members. The outreach to Gays coincides with a broader effort to recruit veterans and disabled people as well.

York, NY Rubenstein, director of the American Civil Liberties Union's Lesbian and Gay Rights Project and AIDS Project for the past four years, has announced his resignation. The projects are staffed by four attorneys, have a budget of more than \$1 million and have been instrumental in cases challenging the

military's ban on Gays, adoption/custody issues discrimination against people with AIDS. The ACLU is seeking a replacement.

New York, NY - The Design Industries Foundation Fighting AIDS, which hoped to raise \$1 million on entertainment events during the Gay Games/Stonewall 25 celebration, lost more than \$60,000 and has had to cut back staff and grants because of the loss. DIFFA dispenses funds to AIDS service groups.


Washington, DC — John James Vasey, a closeted Gay man who lived in a hotel for transients in Portland, Oregon in the years before his death in 1992, bequeathed his Illinois farmland to the Human Rights Campaign Fund. The farm

is worth more than \$400,000.

Survey Reveals Gay Protections at Fortune 500 Companies

One in Four Workers Covered. Policies Triple Since 1990

New York, NY — Census findings released by the Wall Street Project indicate that over 5.7 million - about one in four - employees of Fortune 500 Service and Industrial Corporations are protected by a written sexual orientation

non-discrimination policy.

The national survey found that 134 of the Fortune 500 companies now have written sexual orientation policies triple the number that existed in 1990. Those companies range from General Motors with 750,000 employees to Bay View Capital Corporation, with just 275 employees. Other firms with such policies include Sears Roebuck, Walt Disney and Milwaukee's own Harley Davidson.

Leaders in non-discrimination protections are the fields of Finance, High Tech and Diversified Services, representing 28%, 12% and 12% respectively. Virtually every type of field

is represented, however.

Diane Bratcher, co-chair of the Wall Street Project, commented: "The number companies now offering non-discrimination policies shows that real change has occured in corporate America when it comes to giving Gays and Lesbians real protection from unfair treatment...It is not just large corporations doing so. Smaller firms such

as Trek Bicycle and Johnson & Higgins have also joined the growing trend and adopted policies.'

"It is also interesting to note," said Bratcher, "that in the majority of cases employees asked for the policy and their request was granted. This proves that the time for employees to speak up on this issue has come."

NORTHEAST, WEST LEAD NATION

The census shows a fairly even distribution of the policies across the country, with the notable exception of the South. When divided into regions of the Northeast, West, Midwest and South, sexual orientation companies with policies are distributed 43%, 30%, 22% and 5% respectively. Forty-two percent are based in the states of California and New York alone.

"Change may be coming slower in the South," said Nick Curto, co- chair of the Wall Street Project. "But with Southern companies such as Knight-Ridder, Tandy and Intergraph having policies in place, we feel it won't be long before other companies in the South will grant Gays and Lesbians protection from discrimination.

Of the 134 Fortune 500 companies with non-discrimination guidelines, 72 are in the service sector and 62 are in the industrial sector. The leading service fields with Gay-positive policies are commercial banking, life insurance and other diversified services. The leading fields in the industrial sector include computers and office equipment, pharmaceuticals and scientific and control equipment.

The number of Fortune 500 which conduct sexual companies diversity training for is 84. The number of orientation employees companies with Gay and Lesbian employee groups is 29.

Corporations were also asked about whether they offer any benefits to the domestic partners of employees. Thirty-two companies said they do. Benefits include bereavement leave, family leave, health coverage and use of company facilities. Each of the 32 companies offered at least one of these



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benefits; some offered several. Only Eastman Kodak and Silicon Graphics

offered them all.

At least two corporations based in Wisconsin failed to make the honor roll of progressive policies on Gays. The Wall Street Project report indicates that the A.O. Smith company "refused to answer" the survey and the Fort Howard paper company gave an "unclear response." Land O'Lakes also provided an "unclear response."

Among other corporations which refused to answer were Coca Cola, Monsanto, Quaker Oats and Safeway. McDonald's, Avon, Borden, Helene Curtis, Clark Oil and Texaco said they had no policies on sexual orientation.

(A newly published book called The 100 Best Companies for Gay Men and Lesbians by Ed Mickens includes Harley-Davidson, the YWCA of Greater Milwaukee and CUNA Mutual Insurance Group of Madison.)

PURPOSE OF THE SURVEY

The Wall Street Project is a non-profit program sponsored by the Community Lesbian and Gay Rights Institute. It aims to help educate Americans on the need to provide non-discrimination policies to Gay and Lesbian employees. It seeks to inform corporations of the financial clout and investing power of Gays, Lesbians, their friends and families.

The Wall Street Project also hopes that by publicizing the Fortune 500's personnel policies regarding sexual orientation it may influence investors into making socially responsible decisions

with their money.

Prominent members of the Gay and Lesbian community see the change in corporate employment policies as purely economic.

Michael Goff, editor of Out magazine says: "This census proves that equality for Gays and Lesbians is good for the country and the economy. Unlike government, these Fortune 500 service and industrial companies change policies only for good business reasons. Clearly, they feel that providing these employment protections is good for business."

Diane Bratcher sees many companies, like Levi Strauss and The Gap, as recognizing the buying power of Gays and Lesbians and taking aggressive advertising and marketing positions aimed at these communities.

"We want Americans to take these policies into consideration when purchasing and investing decisions are made," said Bratcher. "We urge consumers and investors alike to contact companies and ask them to adopt non-discrimination policies."

Alan G. Hevesi, New York City's Comptroller, praised the Wall Street Project for identifying Fortune 500 companies that protect the rights of Gays. "All corporations should adopt

similar policies."

"New York City pension funds want the companies in which we invest to choose employees from the widest possible talent pool," said Hevesi. The pension funds have played a leading role in fighting discriminatory employment practices and will continue to do so. The work of the Wall Street Project will make that effort easier."

This type of support for non-bias policies was seen on a large scale recently when the New York City Employees Retirement System (NYCERS), one of the country's most powerful institutional investors, took shareholder action to end anti-Gay discrimination by Cracker Barrel Old Country Stores, Inc., a company which made headlines for firing its Gay and Lesbian workers.

In this case, the NYCERS shareholder resolution was supported by the multi-billion dollar pension funds of the states of California, Minnesota, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, and TIAA-CREF, the largest institutional investor in the US.

"We see more large scale support coming forward on this issue," said Nick Curto. "NYCERS is keenly interested in the results of the Wall Street Project's national census as are several socially responsible investment firms."

"Today I am proud that we can say 25% of Americans in major corporations have been given basic human rights. We will continue to work towards the goal of 100%."

The Wall Street Project intends to conduct its survey of Fortune 500 corporations every year and fully anticipates that the results of each year's census will show greater progress for Gay and Lesbian equality in the workforce.

GLAAD Goes National

New York, NY — The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, which monitors the images of Gays and Lesbians in the media, has formed a strong national group from the merger of its New York City and Los Angeles chapters and is embarking on an aggressive campaign to strengthen smaller chapters throughout the country.

The recent merger and national effort were spurred by "new challenges in the post-Stonewall era," according to a GLAAD release. GLAAD will continue to fight for fair, accurate and inclusive representation of Gay and Lesbian lives in the media and entertainment industries and bestow its annual Media Awards for the best depictions of Gays and Lesbians.

GLAAD will maintain headquarters in both New York and Los Angeles. "A presence is essential in New York, the nation's media capital, and Los Angeles, the entertainment capital," said Ellen

Carton, longtime leader of the New York

In addition to New York and Los Angeles, GLAAD currently has chapters in eight cities: Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Kansas City, Washington, DC, San Diego and San Francisco. Each chapter will get at least one seat on a national governing board of the new group.

"We're meeting and organizing







The Third Ward event is another attempt by BESTD volunteers to reach people at any risk for HIV infection and provide both risk reduction and HIV transmission education in addition to the HIV antibody test. Additional counseling and referral will be done when results are give at times selected by and convenient to each client.

How Things Stand:

The Current Position of Gavs in America

By Richard D. Mohr

This period tumbling between the celebration of Stonewall 25 and the Fall elections is perhaps an apt time for general reflection on the state of Gays in America. What are we doing? What is to become of us? Where are we headed?

I in particular have been prompted to such musing because a number of Gay pundits — people I respect — have found my political writings unwarrantedly gloomy. The pundits are right to point out that some progress, gradual progress, is being made here and there in lots of different, if sometimes small, ways.

But Gays are naive if we adopt the American myth that the future is a single, unbent, unwavering vector of betterment. For we know - should know - from history that Gay life can take hairpin turns for the worse, as occurred during the early 'thirties both under Right Wing populist ascendancy in Germany and under Left Wing populist ascendancy in the U.S. lead by F.D.R. It is ironic which is to say totally predictable - that Gays should have had our worst political year since Stonewall during the very year that another populist Democrat took the White House - this time with massive organized Gay help.

Yet, despite the military disaster and the referendum drives, change is in the America Paradoxically.

experienced some sort of ground shift on Gay issues over the last couple of years. What is it? To sloganize: Gays are winning the cultural wars, even as we are losing the political ones. The good news is that in the long run social practices, political power, and received opinions align themselves with broader cultural forms and values - the general body of ideas by which a civilization defines itself and whose maintenance constitutes a civilization's life.

Take, for example, the changing relation between the Bible and the institution of slavery. When slavery was a defining part of culture, certain passages of the Bible were interpreted as supporting the social practice. Slavery didn't stop because people ceased interpreting the Bible as approving of it; rather when civilization gave up on slavery, people ceased using Bible passages to justify it. The passages letters became cultural dead addressee unknown. The Bible didn't change, the culture did. The bad news is that in general culture is a slowpoke.

Still, the clearest sign that Gavs are winning the cultural wars is the near total collapse in the mainstream of the taboo covering the discussion of Gay issues.

The New York Times now carries more Gay news than does the Advocate. Everybody - except Bill Clinton - is talking about Gay issues. The effect of this structural change in public life cannot be over estimated. Taboos encourage, indeed enforce, the aping of opinions from one person to the next, causing them to circulate independently of both critical assessment and authentic feeling. With the collapse of the taboo, straight people can for the first time really listen to Gay lives, change their views, and in turn express publicly their own real

Also with the taboo's collapse, for the first time there will be a press toward the development of coherent, rational public policy on Gay issues. Public policy, like God, abhors a vacuum. And reason, argument, and justice are all on the side of Gays. In this cultural shift, the role of Gay ideas and of arguments for Gays' justice is not so much to change Average Joe's beliefs but to provide a seed crystal around which a new configuration of cultural forms and values may grow. Then Average Joe will change his mind.

The Right senses and fears the cultural shift underway. Just look where Christian Supremacists and rightists are investing their energies. They are not trying to "punish the sin" by restoring sodomy laws to states without them. Rather they want to get "the sinner" to shut up. They need to reestablish the taboo seeing it as essential to their world. Thus, they focus on representations of Gay life. They target museum exhibitions, television, school curricula, Gay books. and our presence in parades. Their referendum drives too are part of this pattern — attempts to sweep the whole "Gay thing" off the political agenda, out of the arena of public discussion. But, however successful as politics, their strategies necessarily trip themselves as a cultural project. For the more they talk about things Gay, the more the taboo collapses. The more they

debate in public, the more they have to appeal to the tenets of reasoned discourse.

Our own political strategies can be improved, if we understand that political results follow cultural norms. We should view politics not narrowly as a means of garnering votes but broadly as a way of transforming culture. A placard that says "No on 2: Stop Discrimination" does no educating, changes no culture. Placards that say, "I'm Gay" or "My son is Gay" or "Straights for Gay Rights" do both.

In this broad view, much that we

In this broad view, much that we might not at first think of as political actually is so. Urvashi Vaid recently moaned that Gay youth, though leading open lives, are completely apolitical. But these brave youth are key to culture's change on Gay issues. Thanks to them, nearly everyone now knows someone for whom being Gay is an issue. Their measure has made the Gay movement

achieve critical mass.

And some Gay critics rued the fact that virtually all the mainstream media coverage of Stonewall 25 — though extensive — was "soft news": personality profiles and entertainment coverage, nothing political, nothing about Gay rights. But "soft news" changes culture. A newspaper feature in "Lifestyles" about a Lesbian couple who run a real estate business is at least as culturally important as a Gay parade pictured on page one. The parade is the extraordinary; the Lesbians are America's neighbors. To acknowledge their everydayness is to change the everyday.

Will Rogers was probably right when he said "People's minds are changed through observation, not through argument." Certainly arguing Bible passages with Fundamentalists has no point or prospect. But I think Will Rogers was wrong when he also claimed that "We do more talking progress than we do progressing." On Gay issues at least, America is taking the talking cure.

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BestD Answers Health Questions

Fear of Infection From Partners

We recently received a very long and troubling letter from a Gay man in Wisconsin. It is too long to reprint, but the thrust of it is that he had a previous relationship that ended and now has entered into a relationship with a man who is HIV positive. His problems are not unique. The writer of this letter has fears of becoming too emotionally attached to someone who is infected and he also has fears of becoming infected himself.

This letter is troubling to us because there are no cut and dried answers. There is no reference book that says if you take step A and then step B it will happily lead to C. The important thing is to realize that you have something worthwhile in your partner and you have to explore just how important that is to you. The purpose of this column is not to get into couples counseling, nor are we able to do so, but I strongly urge you to find a sympathetic counselor that you can talk with from the standpoint of relationship issues. There are a number of resources listed in the back of this issue that can direct you to someone in your area with whom you can discuss your concerns. Some organizations, like MASN, CPI, ARCW and BESTD, have support groups for partners of Gay HIV positive men. If you can, I would urge you to join one of these groups. In a group you will meet others who share your same concerns and fears and you can discuss ways of resolving and dealing with these issues.

The writer's other concern is one that is important to all of us, and that is how to prevent infection or re-infection with the HIV virus. Every time we have sex, we should assume that our partner is HIV infected. That is the only way to stop the virus from spreading. Far too many people are careless. Among Gay men the virus is known to spread only two ways: blood to blood transmission and semen to blood transmission. To have an enjoyable sex life that is safer you have to put these two transmission factors into a sexual context. Blood to blood transmission is not generally considered a sexual transmission factor among Gay males, but it is. It does present risk to the partner that is penetrating the other. It can also occur by sharing piercing needles or pins, anal toys or whips to name but a few instances. Semen to blood is the highest

risk factor and the greatest cause of infection.

Anal sex is the highest risk factor for the receptive partner. Inevitably when someone is penetrated anally the rectal canal experiences some trauma. These sometimes microscopic breaks in the lining of the rectal wall serve as a doorway for the virus to enter the person's blood stream and cause infection. By all means a latex condom should always be used for anal sex. The insertive partner is at somewhat at lower risk, but if he has any sore or scratch on his penis and it comes in contact with any blood in his partner's anal canal, he has a good chance of becoming infected. These do not have to be large sores or scratches, microscopic breaks in the skin are all that are needed. Use only waterbased, water-soluble lubricants with latex condoms and lube sufficiently to reduce the stress on the condom. It is important that if you and your partner are going to engage in anal sex, that either of you withdraw prior to cumming. This reduces somewhat the risk of anal intercourse.

ORAL SEX

Oral sex is being linked as a significant risk factor in HIV transmission. Many men who claim to have practiced only unprotected oral sex in the last ten years are becoming infected. Again it is the semen that is the infectious agent. (Both cum and pre-cum have been shown to harbor the virus.) We cannot

know the relative health of the inside of our mouth. We may have small sores, scratches or abrasions from sharp food objects or tears from brushing or flossing. These breaks could be the entry way for infection to occur. Unlubricated condoms for oral sex are recommended and again withdrawal prior to orgasm is important because teeth can cause tears in the condom which may leak semen.

So, what is left? Plenty! The men I talk with at the clinic are finding very full and rich sex lives by limiting or eliminating penetration from their sexual activities. There is simply being naked together and holding each other. There is licking, caressing, kissing and hugging. There is mutual masturbation or solo masturbation while your partner watches. And there are fantasies! To utilize fantasies properly requires dialogue between partners. This is very difficult for most of us to do because we were brought up not to talk about sex. But discuss these turn ons with your partner and agree upon what you can both get into. You might need to go out and buy a cop uniform or a wedding gown, but who cares if it enhances your sex life? There are many couples out there that have mixed, sero-status relationships and they are experiencing happy, fulfilled lives



Lesbian Mystery & Gay Music Guide Reviewed

Mucho Mojo by Joe R. Lansdale Mysterious Press, HC \$19.95

The genre of the Lesbian mystery has been a key component in Lesbian Fiction for the past 20 years, producing such bestselling authors as Naiad's Katherine V. Forrest, Sandra Scoppettone from Little, Brown as well as Seal Press's Barbara Wilson and Ellen Hart, just to name a few. Gay men's mysteries have lagged far behind despite such longtime Gay mystery writers, George Baxt and Joseph Hansen whose ground-breaking Dave Brandstetter mystery series featured a non-stereotypical Gay man in the years immediately following Stonewall.

While the protagonist in the typical Lesbian mystery is invariably a strong, self-sufficient, and independent woman possessing many qualities to appeal a Lesbian readership, the protagonists in Gay mysteries aren't always so lucky. Excluding Michael Nava's immensely popular series featuring a very appealing Henry Rios, the typical role for the gay protagonist is virtually sexless, as with Hansen's stiff and neutered Dave Brandstetter, and usually subordinate in nature, often functioning as the straight cop's comic sidekick, as in Stan Cutler's Goodman-Bradley mysteries set in Grant Michael's Hollywood. Kraychik is a hairdress-cum- detective who solves murder mysteries but not before acting as nemesis to the very straight Lieutenant Branco. Redeeming Michael's A Body To Die For and Dead On Your Feet is a marvelous sexual tension created between Kraychik and Branco.

All of this leads us to Lansdale's new mystery, Mucho Mojo. Radiating an intriguing Texas gothic quality, Mucho Mojo features a series of particularly loathsome crimes: the sexual abuse and murder of young, black boys in a rural Texas backwater called LaBorde. Leonard's Uncle Chester has died and left his previously despised Gay nephew Leonard his much dilapidated old house. Enlisting his white trash friend Hap to help with necessary repairs, Leonard is in for quite a surprise when the two turn up the corpse of a young male in a trunk filled with pages from dozens of kiddie porn magazines. Sure that his Uncle Chester could not have been responsible, despite appearances to the contrary, Leonard along with Hap set out to solve this gruesome mystery.

There is much to recommend Mucho Mojo. Lansdale has carefully created a highly charged atmospheric piece set against the hot and dusty Texas summer and has skillfully plotted the puzzle to gradually, almost inperceptively transforming Mucho Mojo into a real nail-biting, page turner. Along the way the reader is introduced to some truly memorable characters including Leonard's lawyer Florida, who briefly has a fling with Hap, the ancient yet saintly McMaw Carter and especially Hap. In Hap, Lansdale has created a truly intriguing, original voice, not educated but filled with humor and a wry, worldly wisdom.

Nevertheless Mucho Mojo is replete with mixed messages, particularly for Gay readers. Despite Leonard's central role in the murder mystery, he is Lansdale's least interesting or developed character, subordinate to Hap is in fact serves as Lansdale's narrator. That Leonard is Gay is established on page 4 yet Lansdale gives Leonard no Gay friends, no previous Gay relationship (as he does with both Hap and Florida) and no Gay prospects for the future. Leonard possesses no Gay identity other than to repeatedly tell people that he is Gay. His Gayness seems to function primarily as a plotting device, serving to counter any potential negative flack for the book's horrendous, Gay-related pedophile Ultimately murders. Mucho singularly lacks any real Gay sensibility. As a sidenote, it also seems curious that in a story filled with black characters that a white man, the book's lone white character, serves as narrator.

Joe Lansdale's **Mucho Mojo** is a superbly crafted and compelling murder mystery, sure to please fans of the genre and still a worthwhile addition to the

category of the Gay mystery, despite drawbacks. Recommended.

Gay Music Guide by Will Grega Pop Front Press, Pb. \$11.95

For those that define the term Gay music as either the hits of the disco divas or recordings by one of the notable Gay choruses, Will Gerega's Gay Music Guide should come as quite a shock. Gay music encompasses the whole spectrum of music, from Country to Punk to Rock to Folk.

In Gay Music Guide, Will Grega has featured over a hundred recordings featuring Gay and Lesbian musicians performing Gay-positive music. Although Grega takes his role as cheerleader for these artists a bit too much to heart (Grega is awfully kind to recordings that are often lacking) this is an indispensable one-of-a-kind guide. Included are profiles of some of the artists, plus information on where to order some of the more obscure CDs and cassettes not even available from sources featuring Gay and Lesbian music.

An added bonus, Grega has compiled a 24-song Gay music sampler and provided a free coupon for this tape at the end of the book. This sampler is a wonderful introduction to Gay music and shouldn't be missed. A must book for anyone with an interest in Gay music.

"Tales of the City" and "Band Played On" Nominated for Emmy Awards

Los Angeles, CA — Two Gay-themed television miniseries, Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City and journalist Randy Shilts's And the Band Played On have been nominated for Emmy Awards. The awards will be

presented in September.

Tales of the City, Armistead Maupin's beloved story about the zany residents of 28 Barbary Lane in San Francisco in the 1970's, was nominated as Best Miniseries. Produced in Britain, but presented on PBS earlier this year, Tales earned the highest ratings of any PBS show in almost five years. PBS has refused to fund its sequel, however.

Among the four other shows competing with Tales as Best Miniseries is Prime Suspect 3, another British-made PBS show. Prime Suspect 3 featured the dogged Detective Chief Inspector Jane Tennison (Helen Mirren) combing London's Gay underground for the killer

of young rent boys.

And the Band Played On, the chronicle of the early years of the AIDS epidemic produced by HBO, won Emmy nominations as Best Dramatic Special and for many of the players in its all-star cast. Matthew Modine was nominated as Best Actor in a Miniseries or Special. Richard Gere, Ian McKellen and Alan Alda were nominated as Best Supporting Actors and Lily Tomlin as Best Supporting Actress.

September "Out" Profiles Surge in Gay/Lesbian TV

Surge in Gay/Lesbian TV
New York, NY — The September issue of Out magazine contains a detailed profile of the many new Gay and Lesbian television shows and videos being produced by Gays and Lesbians for cable and public access TV channels.

The article, "I Want My Gay TV" by Larry Closs, reviews the origins of Gay TV programs and credits the development of cable and public access TV, the greater accessibility of camcorders and increasing sponsorship by individuals and businesses for the proliferation of Gay and Lesbian TV programs in the past few years.

Closs discusses the Gay Cable Network, responsible for eight weekly programs on cable and public access channels, including Men & Films, the hour-long news show Gay USA and the late night talk show Stonewall Place After Dark. He writes about Gay

Entertainment: Television whose programs, like Party Talk, the fashion show Makostyle and Inside/Out, are available in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Miami.

Closs also reviews *Dyke TV*, produced in New York but now available in 15 cities and on satellite; *In the Life*, the monthly newsmagazine seen on 70 PBS stations; *Tricks*, a Gay version of *Studs*, shot in Los Angeles and seen in five cities; *Lavender Lounge*, the San Francisco-based variety show; *One in Ten People*, produced in Fairfax, Virginia and available on 25 stations nationwide; and Network Q, the monthly mail-order video magazine out of Albuquerque.

The Out article covers issues like creative content, financing, distribution, publicity and right wing opposition to Gay and Lesbian shows. It includes commentary by many of the shows' producers, advertisers and viewers. It is the most comprehensive article about Gay and Lesbian TV published so far.

The September issue of Out is currently available on newsstands.

GLAAD Urges Action on Media Issues

Give Networks Your Feedback on Stonewall 25 Coverage

New York, NY — The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation reports that for the most part, the major TV networks offered competent coverage of the Stonewall 25 celebration, but Gay Games IV was virtually ignored, except by some of the print media.

The CBS Evening News featured diverse spokespersons for the queer community, including an African-American Lesbian activist. CBS also pointed out that despite the success of the June events the international struggle for Gay rights is "only in its early

stages."

The NBC Nightly News focused on the increased visibility of Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals at every level of society. NBC also featured an interview with an older drag queen, acknowledging the role the drag and transgender communities played in the Stonewall Rebellion.

ABC World News aired a lengthy piece on the history of Gay and Lesbian activism, though it was not shown in major markets like New York and

Chicago.

Despite the fact that the Gay Games ranked among the largest sporting events of the year, they were given relatively little coverage on network TV,

although the New York Times ran at least eight feature stories that some other newspapers picked up.

And many Gay and Lesbian viewers were disappointed that C-Span, which ran six hours worth of coverage of the rally at the March on Washington last year, telecast none of this year's Stonewall or Gay Games events.


Applaud HBO for Westenhoefer/Smith Comedy Shows

Los Angeles, CA — The FOX network's programming chief, Sandy Grushow, has continued to defend the network's decision to edit a same sex kiss from the May 18 episode of its popular drama Melrose Place.

Compared to the non-stop sexual shenanigans of all of the show's straight characters, Gay Matt Fielding (Doug Savant) has been relegated to virginity by producers afraid of stirring controversy and losing advertising revenue. A kissing scene between Matt and his boyfriend Rob which was written into the script and filmed was cut from the final production that aired.

Grushow was grilled about the unseen kiss by reporters gathered at a recent TV Critics Association meeting. "The bottom line is, we're in a business," Grushow said. "We would have lost up to

\$1 million by airing that kiss," a loss FOX could not absorb.

Watch Out For Those Speed Bumps

As I sort of indicated last time, on life's road one occasionally encounters speed bumps. The purpose of these little intruders is to provide a little dose of reality. My retinitis was my speed bump. After finding the active patch in my good eye and my doing the double dose of foscarnet, which seemed to help ever so slightly, I had to seriously start thinking about treatment alternatives, and there are few of them. Actually at this point there is only one. It's combination therapy: gancyclovir infusion following the foscarnet infusion everyday. As the doctor said, there isn't much information on dosages and long term effects because almost nobody has lived long term. Boy, I really wanted to know that. I told him he better get a paper for presentation out of this.

Well, as of this writing, I've been on combination therapy for two weeks. There's been a small amount of progress with controlling the retinitis and I've also not had any noticeable side effects. This lack of side affects is encouraging even though I'm convinced the human body simply is not designed to ingest the quantity of drugs some of us must do.

Anyway back to CMV Retinitis. I've suffered a slight vision loss in my left

eye, which is where the retinitis began 2 1/2 years ago. It isn't really significant, but combined with the new patch in my right eye, it forced me to seriously consider the possibility of losing my sight. I started looking (bad pun and unintentional) for blind people to talk with about making the adjustment should the loss occur. One theme that I found, and I include myself in this belief, is that we'd croak before we went blind. Now I'm not so sure. As quality and quantity of life improves we need to be more concerned about our vision.

If you start developing problems, contact your local AIDS Service Organization for information on services for the sight impaired. Many state and county agencies exist to provide assistance. Here in Milwaukee there are several groups that provide counseling and classes to make the adjustment; the local vocational technical college also has a course in living without vision. Although my retina doc now feels that vision loss may not be so imminent, the scare made me do some research that is best done while you can see.

PITTSBURGH?

Yes, I really went to Pittsburgh as promised. How did I find Pittsburgh? I went to Lake Erie and turned right. I arrived late on a Friday night and returned Monday morning. The weather was great, 80's and sunny. We drove around to see various neighborhoods, rode a little cable car up a hill that overlooks the point where the Allegheny and Monongahela Rivers come together to form the Ohio River. The view of the new downtown is spectacular and in stark contrast (you remember Stark Contrast, he used to be in vaudeville) to its former self. We looked at photos of the downtown from the 1940's when it was dark at noon because of smoke and coal dust from the steel mills, which are

We went to the new Andy Warhol Museum. If you like Warhol this is a must. They spent \$12 million dollars to renovate an old warehouse, and created an amazing space where you start on the 7th floor and work your way down. All of Warhol's major works are on exhibit.

Sunday we drove an hour to see the house Frank Lloyd Wright designed called Falling Waters. It's situated over a small waterfall on a stream which is still clean, and the surrounding forest is protected land. It was a most spectacular summer home for the Kaufman family who had it built. Their decision to donate it to the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy is a gift to us all. Well, no more trips for a while.

"I don't know how long this break will last, it could be weeks or months, I don't know," she replied when I queried her. Eighteen year old Nick is moving to San Francisco, and his Straight Talk for Gay Youth goes with him. I'm considering several youth writers to take his place, and am open to submissions from other potential youth issues writers.

Cartoonist Tom Rezza and his GaySide are now back on a regular basis, after his Spring sabbatical and getting used to a new job schedule. This issue, I'm glad to introduce you to our new columnist, Kirk Stark, and his new monthly column, Stark Reality. Kirk is in his mid 20's and has experience writing

and editing for several local Universityoriented weeklies. He's carrying a double major in psychology and journalism and I think he'll provide us with some interesting reading.

I've had several questions lately about the change in printing schedules of Wisconsin Light and In Step. As of late June, both papers have been coming out the same week, with a Thursday dateline. In the past, the two papers came out in opposite weeks.

What happened? Last Summer, after the March on Washington, I talked with Light's editor Terry Boughner about how to handle things in '94 for Stonewall 25 and The March on the UN. Terry and I commiserated with one another over the heavy amount of work involved in putting out our '93 MOW issues in a two week time span. I offered the suggestion that both papers, in '94 put out a 3 week issue (instead of a 2 week issue) during the Stonewall celebration time frame, allowing us both to do a more thorough job in a less stressful atmosphere.

Terry said he'd talk it over with his other half, publisher Jerry Johnson. Time drifted into late September, when I start planning In Step's deadline schedule for the coming year. I checked with Terry, and he said they hadn't decided for sure what they were going to do. I then set up In Step's '94 print/deadline schedule with

the three week issue in June. I like to mail these schedules out by early November, so I had the schedule typeset and mailed them out to advertisers and organizations. After they were mailed, I found out Light would continue on a two week production schedule, and not do a three week June '94 Stonewall issue. So, as of June '94 we found ourselves coming out with the same Thursday cover date.

Now, there are some advantages to this current schedule. Because of In Step's longer production period, both publications deadlines used to be the same day. Now, our deadlines are on opposite Wednesdays. In Step has always had a Thursday cover date, but the magazine is out on the streets in Milwaukee late Tuesday evening and most of the rest of our outlets, statewide, have the magazine by our Thursday cover date. Light has a Thursday cover date, too, but their distribution doesn't begin until Thursday afternoon.

In Step is locked into our current schedule through the end of our '94 schedule. Both papers skip an issue in late December/ early January for a holiday break. Hopefully, this scheduling thing can be worked out so, once again, we come out on opposite weeks if that's what the community wants. There's no hard feelings on either side of this... (we get along just fine, thank you!) it was just





If he didn't know where the Lesbians were, how was I going to find them in a city where the cab drivers expect you to give them a map, and addresses are in a language foreign even to the natives.

That night. I did meet an equally bewildered young man from Hong Kong who timidly asked if I was a "IrIrisbian?" in that special Asian middle sound that has no English consonant. Thinking I'd spotted a Mazda Mafia bouncer who could direct to me an ahso deska dyke den, I nodded enthusiastically, only to discover that he, too, was a tourist, hoping to find a club for female Hong Kongenese friends.

Personal Ads

We've all felt it. Summer is here, and we watch couples crawl out of the woodwork like cockroaches — hand in hand, staring at each other like nothing else in the universe exists.

And what a joy it is in this modern society to have so many options to meet that perfect love muffin. There are bars, social groups, and personal ads. Ah yes, personal ads...

The amazing thing about the personals is the scope of how many people you can get to notice you at one time. Why, with one personal ad, you can hit at least ten thousand people.

Questions You Always Wanted To Ask

We receive a lot of questions concerning how to place or answer ads in a publication such as this one.

How do I decide if I want to place an ad?

Writing your own ad can be fun, and it can attract just the type of guy you are looking for. Just decide who and what it is you wish to contact and then set it down on paper. Then when you record your ad it will come off smooth, clear and concise.

How do I place an ad and what should I say?

Keep your ad simple. Be sure to include the area you're from. Then briefly describe yourself, your interests and what you're looking for. You'll get a general idea of how to write your ad from reading other ads. Be sure to list your race and preferences.

How do I answer an ad?

That's easy. Take the ads you really like to a place where you can think quietly, then make notes. You might decide to just write a letter, but you can speed things up, plus give the person a much better impression of you, if they hear your voice. That way, you'll get to the heart of the matter better and often faster.

Make notes about yourself and what you want to say. Remember, you don't want to sound rushed, too casual, indifferent or phony. So, on your message state when you will be home, if you live with someone, who can take messages, and when is the best time for you to receive phone calls.

Describe yourself fully. Everyone is curious and wants to know as much about you as possible. Also, the more you say, the more likely you will get a response. Leave several messages. Leave messages for as many people as you think you want to meet. Not everyone will like you, for whatever reason so, to insure getting some positive results, increase your odds with numbers.

First, be sure the ad is compatible with you. Write down the voice mailbox numbers (5-digit number at the bottom of each ad) of the advertisers you'll be leaving a message for. Press 3 and follow the easy voice instructions. To hear other greetings of thousands of other guys not printed in the paper, press 2. Remember, you can leave private messages for any of these advertisers!

Do people really answer the ads printed?

MANFINDER personal ads receive an average of 5 responses each week. Many advertisers are surprised at just how many responses they do receive.

What about a meeting?

The telephone is a great way to screen who you really want to meet, without being put in an awkward situation. Plan your first meeting in a public place,, maybe a coffee cafe, or a good bookstore. Arrive at the appointed place a little early. You'll learn a lot about the other person's dependability, consistency, trustworthiness.
