United Nations Suspends ILGA's Membership

Link to Pedophile Groups Cited

New York, NY — Despite the severance of its ties to pedophile groups this summer, the International Lesbian and Gay Association has had its consultative status within the United

Nations suspended.

The action came September 16 when the U.N.'s Economic and Social Council voted unanimously to suspend ILGA's membership. The recommendation came from the United States, which argued that pedophilia violated the rights of children as guaranteed in the U.N.'s Declaration of Human Rights and that ILGA could not be sure whether some of its member groups supported pedophilia.

The issue was raised earlier this year in the US Senate, where anti-Gay crusader Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) introduced an amendment to withdraw \$118 million in US funding from the world body if it continued to support groups that harbored pedophiles or promoted pedophilia. Gay and Lesbian activists decried Helms's measure as a thinly veiled attack on ILGA, using the emotional issue of pedophilia to discredit

The International Lesbian and Gay Association is a coalition of dozens of Gay and Lesbian groups worldwide. It encourages networking between Gays and Lesbians across national borders and documents anti-Gay policies and human rights violations by governments

and groups internationally.

ILGA had lobbied for recognition from the U.N. for almost a decade, finally achieving consultative status as a non-governmental organization in 1993. ILGA was not a full member group of the U.N., but its consultative status enabled it to submit reports on Gay and Lesbian issues and human rights abuses to U.N. committees.

After the Senate passed the Helms amemndment by an overwhelming vote, ILGA, fearful of losing its hard-won status at the U.N., moved to revoke the membership of several member organizations whose primary purpose is promoting pedophilia. At its annual meeting in June, ILGA members voted 214-30 to expel the North American Man/Boy Love Association, Project Inform/Free Will and the Dutch group Vereneging Martijn. ILGA also formally disavowed pedophilia as inconsistent with its aims.

Lisa Powers, a former co-chair of ILGA, said at the time that it was more important to maintain ILGA's U.N. status than to cater to the desires of one fringe group. "This is a decision of whether we go back into the ghetto or stay in the real world."

But NAMBLA spokesman Bill Andriette countered: "The expulsions compromise ILGA's autonomy and long-standing commitment to diversity and toleration. The panic around the issues of childhood and adolescent sexuality has so demonized the issue that a fair airing of our place within this organization has become impossible."

Citing other ILGA member groups which contain subgroups in support of pedophilia, Andriette called ILGA's purge inconsistent and warned that "ILGA's capitulation to US pressure does not change the fact that its U.N. status is in

jeopardy."

Indeed, information about the affiliation of pedophile groups with ILGA was first publicized by anti-Gay crusaders in the right wing newsletter Lambda Report. If the attack on pedophilia had not succeeded in discrediting ILGA, Lambda Report was preparing to expose ILGA's connections with a group of S/M activists in New

York

Hans Hgerpekjon, Secretary General of ILGA, said of the U.N. suspension: "The US government has repeatedly told us they are the defender of Gay and Lesbian causes and we have the feeling if this is how our friends behave, then certainly we feel very lost in the world with all the number of enemies we have to cope with."

"ILGA's valuable function as a consultant to the U.N. was to promote basic human rights and understanding for the international Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual community," said Peri Jude Radecic of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "I am disappointed to see the U. N. fall into old stereotypes and misinformation perpetrated by Sen. Helms and other homophobes."

ILGA's governing body will be holding emergency consultations to determine how to respond to its

suspension from the U.N.

Milwaukee Cops Mum on Attacks in Walker's Point

Gay Leaders Urge Caution

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee Police Department has refused repeated requests by In Step for any information regarding a series of vicious attacks on people in the Walker's Point area of the near south side during the month of September. The area is home to many of the city's Gay bars, although they exist alongside many straight bars as well.

In Step has received anecdotal reports about attacks against people leaving bars at night or while driving through the area. Alleged attacks have occurred in the area bordered on the north by I-794, on the south by Maple, and east of 6th Street. Many reports say that 2 or 3 assailants, described as young Hispanic men, have approached the victims, beat them around the face and head with bricks or tire irons, and robbed them.

Several reports cited the use of anti-Gay slurs like "faggot" by the attackers, but it is not clear whether the attacks are bias-related because people leaving straight establishments like Steny's have reportedly been victimized as well.

On September 2, three men who had just left a Gay bar were traveling west on Maple Street when they were allegedly forced off the road by another

car. The men in that car identified themselves as police officers but proceeded to beat and rob the three men. The supposed officers were not wearing uniforms and did not display badges. The next night, a lone man leaving the 3 B's bar was reportedly attacked, beaten and robbed near the viaduct on S. KK.

Around midnight, September 14-15, two Gay men were attacked near 3rd and Walker. Both received concussions and required stitches for gashes caused by having bricks smashed into their faces and heads by two assailants. A motorist was able to report the license number of the assailants' car to police, but police have declined to confirm whether arrests have been made.

NO HELP FROM MPD

The In Step office has received many other anecdotal reports, sometimes from anonymous sources, which cannot be confirmed. In the absence of any advisory from police in the Second District, Gay community leaders are urging people who walk and drive through the Walker's Point area to be extremely cautious. All incidents should be reported to the police and to the Gay Bash Hotline: (414) 444-7331.

In Step spoke to several police officers, including a beat cop and the crime prevention officer in the Second District. They refused to give out any information about the series of attacks and referred In Step to the Police Department's Public Information Office. A Sergeant Lucas at the Public Information Office said he could not release any information and referred us back to the Second District or to the Open Records Division.

When this reporter indicated our deadline prevented us from spending hours sifting through police records to confirm the assaults and that we were merely seeking advice from the MPD at to whether our readers and community should be on guard, Sgt. Lucas accused In Step of "pushing a special interest."

In Step called Stephanie Hume, who has been the Gay and Lesbian community's liaison to the Milwaukee Police Department. She expressed her own frustrations in communicating with the police. Hume said she and several other Gay and Lesbian leaders are meeting with police officials in October to discuss the ongoing problems and would convey In Step's complaint to Assistant Chief James Koleas and other high level officials.

In Step will continue to seek information from the Police Department and the District Attorney's Office and do our best to report any other similar incidents.

Editor's Note: If you were a victim of a similar incident, In Step would appreciate first person accounts of the assault. We've only had second and third person accounts and would prefer hearing about the incidents directly. Also, as of October 1, pepper spray, a non-lethal defensive weapon, is legal in the state of Wisconsin.

STREET SAFETY TIPS

No crime victim is to blame for the crime committed against them. Even though you can't be sure you won't become a victim of crime, these prevention tips may be helpful:

 Identify local "Danger Zones" in areas you frequent. Avoid them if alone, and stay aware of your surroundings;

 Plot out "safe" routes from the bus stop or parking lot to your home or other places you frequent. Use well lit streets, and be aware of late night stores where you could run for safety;

 If you feel unsafe, trust your instincts, and remove yourself from the area. Make noise, blow a whistle, scream "FIRE!" Call 911 for police assistance;

 If you go home with strangers, make sure you introduce that person to a friend or bartender. Make people aware you are leaving together, so if a problem arises later, they can help identify the perpetrator; Lesbians should be cautious of men they meet in Lesbian bars who claim to be Gay and invite women to their homes to party;

 Leave bars with a group of people you know. Assailants often lurk outside Gay identified establishments waiting for their next victim;

 Always carry a whistle, consider taking a self defense class. (Self Awareness is often more important than Self Defense), or, carry Pepper Spray (legal in Wisconsin as of October 1, 1994).

 Be alert and aware of your surroundings. Don't take short cuts through unlit areas;

 Get license plate numbers of cars with suspicious occupants, or whose occupants shout out anti-Gay slurs . . . then report it to police.

Brummer Trial Opens in Madison

Jury Questioned on Anti-Lesbian Bias

Madison — As In Step's deadline
approached, Penny Brummer's trial in
Dane County Circuit Court on a charge
of first degree intentional homicide was
underway. Brummer is accused of
murdering Sarah Gonstead, the best
friend of Brummer's former girlfriend,
earlier this year. The trial started
Monday, September 19 with jury
selection. A jury was impaneled late
Monday night and ordered sequestered
by Judge Patrick Fiedler, who is hearing
the case. The trial is expected to last 10
days, and In Step will have complete
coverage in the next issue.

HOMOSEXUALITY A MAJOR ISSUE

From the questionnaire given to prospective jurors and pre-trial motions by the prosecution, it is clear that Brummer's Lesbianism will be a major factor in the case. Prospective jurors were given a 77-item questionnaire; 10 of the questions were designed to gauge respondents' attitudes towards Lesbians. They were asked to report their attitudes

toward Lesbians on a scale from "acceptance" to "disgust," whether they had any Lesbian acquaintances or coworkers and whether Lesbians should be certified to teach school. Those who expressed disgust or moral objection to homosexuality were excused.

Prosecutors Ann Sayles and Judy Schwaemle also plan to introduce evidence of Brummer's Lesbianism to establish motive, but were blocked by Fiedler from introducing any evidence relating to Brummer's 1991 marriage to a man while she was in the US Air Force. Prosecutors had argued that the marriage was an attempt to deceive military officials and to obtain benefits for which single people are not eligible. "We're not talking a straight/Gay issue; we're talking about deception," said Schwaemle.

Defense attorney Mark Borns argued that Brummer's being forced to conceal her homosexuality, as countless numbers of other Gays in the military were forced to do under the military's former anti-Gay policy was not an indicator of her credibility. "Every Gay who served in the military should not be deemed unworthy of belief," he said. (Brummer served while the military had a blanket discharge policy for all Gay service members; that policy has been

replaced by the current "don't ask, don't tell" law.) Fiedler ruled that any evidence relating to Brummer's marriage would be impermissibly prejudicial.

DEFENSE POINTS TO NEW SUSPECT

Brummer's defense team has filed papers with the court stating that they have a witness who saw a man unload what appeared to be a bright pink package from a truck less than 100 feet from where Gonstead's body was found.

According to defense attorney Jack Priester, the witness, David Zoromski, saw a red vehicle resembling a Ford Ranger or Bronco parked on Mineral Point Road at about 7pm on March 16. Zoromski said the passenger door was open, and that as he drove past, he saw something large and pink at the driver's feet. When shown a picture of Gonstead in the bright pink jacket she was wearing when she disappeared, Zoromski said the colors "rang a bell" with him. Gonstead's body was found a short distance from where Zoromski said he saw the truck parked.

Zoromski was interviewed by investigators two days before Brummer was arrested. Dane County Sheriff Rick Raemisch told the press that he was not familiar with Zoromski's statement, but said, "Obviously, it would have been followed up on." Other personnel from the Sheriff's office declined to comment.

STATE News Briefs

AIDS Walk Nets \$587,000 for Care and Education

Milwaukee — The 5th annual AIDS Walk Wisconsin held on September 18 raised \$587,915 for AIDS care, education and research programs. The funds will be disbursed to 20 AIDS service or activist organizations throughout the state.

More than 8,500 people participated in the Walk. Both the number of people and the amount of funds raised is a record, exceeding the totals in previous years. Among the walkers along Milwaukee's lakefront were Congressman Tom Barrett, Mayor John Norquist, State Attorney General Jim Doyle

and Milwaukee Brewer slugger Darryl Hamilton.

Among the funds raised this year were \$1300-1400 by inmates and staff at the Racine Correctional Institution in Sturtevant. About 30 inmates and 4 staff members walked or ran around the track on the prison's recreation field. Deputy Warden Dan Buchler told In Step: "It's important to raise money, but it's also important to raise education and awareness. It may help the people here understand that AIDS is a growing concern and end the 'It can't happen to me' syndrome."

Gunderson Finally Comes Out in The Advocate

La Crosse — Steve Gunderson, the US Representative for the 3rd Congressional District in western Wisconsin, seems to have finally, officially come out of the closet. The seven term Republican legislator is the subject of an interview feature in the October 4 issue of the Advocate in a story titled: "Outward Bound: Wisconsin Congressman Steve Gunderson Talks About His Private Life — At Last."

Gunderson, 43, reveals less about his private life than does his partner, Rob Morris, 34, who jokes in the interview about being a "political wife" to Gunderson. Gunderson says he thinks people are obsessed with sex and that he believes the goal of equality in America is to make factors like an individual's

religion or sexual orientation "irrelevant."

Gunderson is facing Democratic State Rep. Harvey Stower in the November election. He said of the election: "Let's be honest. I'm not running for re-election to advance the Gay cause. The reasons I'm running are the issues that happen to be very important to my district — the farm bill, passing and implementing a health care bill, and supporting vocational education."

Gunderson was first forcibly outed in 1991 by Queer Nation activist Michael Petrelis, who threw a drink in his face at a suburban Washington, DC Gay bar. Last year, he spoke out eloquently on the floor of Congress against the ban on Gays in the military, and this spring his speech at a fundraising dinner for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, a Gay lobbying group, generated further publicity and speculation about his sexual orientation.

Log Cabin Says Welch Supports a Modified ENDA

Milwaukee — The Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin, a group of Gay Republicans, reports in its September 18 newsletter that State Rep. Bob Welch has endorsed the federal Employment Non- Discrimination Act, or ENDA, as long as it contains a broader religious exemption. Welch is challenging incumbent US Sen. Herb Kohl in the November election. Kohl has not taken a position on ENDA.

ENDA will ban discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment. Welch, a conservative Republican, reportedly told members of the Log Cabin Club he would sponsor ENDA "with a minor modification expanding the religious exemption so that it does not cover only organizations

affiliated with a particular denomination but also includes organizations whose members have a common creed (e.g. a fundamentalist viewpoint) and which are designed to advance that creed."

ENDA already includes exemptions for businesses with less than 25 employees, for the military services and for religious organizations. It forbids preferential treatment or quotas and does not require employers to provide benefits to domestic partners of unmarried employees.

As of late September, US Senator Russ Feingold and Rep. Tom Barrett are the only members of the Wisconsin

delegation to endorse ENDA.

Norquist Seeks \$89 Million for Water Improvements

Milwaukee — Mayor John Norquist, famed for his budget- cutting ways, surprised many by including an \$89 million allocation for improvements in the city's water system in the proposed 1995 budget he presented to the Milwaukee

Common Council September 23.

The proposal was seen as an acknowledgement by the mayor of the changes and new technologies that are necessary in Milwaukee's water treatment plants to avert a catastrophe like the cryptosporidiosis epidemic that felled hundreds of thousands of people in the spring of 1993. About 100 people, many of them with AIDS, were killed by the parasitic infection. The city continues to deny liability for the disaster and is defending itself against numerous lawsuits.

The \$89 million would be spent on these improvements: to install ozone disinfection systems at both the Linnwood and Howard Avenue Treatment plants; to replace much of the water filtration systems at both plants; and to relocate the intake pipe in Lake Michigan that serves the Howard Avenue plant about a mile northeast from its current

If the Council approves the appropriation, Milwaukee residents will pay an additional \$16.80 annually on their water

bills for a period of 20 years.

Also Around the State...

Kenosha — The Gay and Lesbian Organization at UW-Parkside recently purchased racks on which copies of the state's two LesBiGay publications, In Step and Wisconsin Light, are displayed in the halls. This visibility has caused some complaints, including one letter to the Ranger News, the school paper, in which the writer declared: "Homosexuals are abnormal...GET HELP!!!" GLO Coordinator John Powilaites responded with his own letter, saying: "Just when everybody was beginning to think that bigotry and intolerance had ceased to exist here at Parkside, you have proven otherwise by writing your humorously ignorant letter against us..."

NATIONAL News Briefs

Wilson Vetoes California Partners Law

Sacramento, CA — Republican Gov. Pete Wilson, who four years ago vetoed a Gay rights bill, once again infuriated California's Gay and Lesbian community by vetoing a statewide domestic partners law that would have been the first of its kind in the nation. Gay and Lesbian leaders vowed to work for Wilson's defeat in the November election. Wilson is facing a stiff challenge from Kathleen Brown.

In vetoing the bill, Wilson said that government had the responsibility to enact policies "that encourage and reward

marriage and the formation of strong families."

Wilson declared: "Government policy ought not to discount marriage by offering a substitute relationship that

demands much less and provides much less than is needed by the children of such relationships and, ultimately, much less

than is needed by society."

The 1990 census indicated that a half million households in California consist of unmarried couples. The bill would have allowed both Gay and straight unmarried couples to register. It would have ensured that such registered couples had hospital visitation rights, could act on behalf of each other in the event of illness and could bequeath property to each other.

Courts Deal Setback, Victories to Lesbian Moms

Richmond, VA — The Virginia Supreme Court has dealt a blow to a Lesbian mother who is seeking to regain custody of her child, while courts in Alabama, Nebraska and

Utah have issued rulings in favor of Lesbian moms.

In Virginia, the State Supreme Court rejected a request by Sharon Bottoms that it expedite an appeal filed by the child's grandmother who lost custody to Bottoms in a lower court decision. Even though Bottoms won, the grandmother can retain custody of 3- year old Tyler until her appeal is decided, which could take more than a year. The court refused to transfer custody to Bottoms during the course of the litigation.

In Alabama, a Birmingham family court judge awarded custody of three children to their Lesbian mother, Sandra Ross, instead of their father. The judge said the children, ages 9, 12 and 14, would be better off in the stable home of their mother who lives with her Lesbian partner than in the home of their

father, who abused and neglected them in the past.
In Nebraska, a judge gave custody of a 6-year-old boy to his mother, Brenda Manning. Despite being a Lesbian, the judge ruled, Manning had been the child's primary caregiver

throughout his life and was better able to provide a stable, loving home than the boy's father.

Finally, in Utah, an appeals court rejected a lower court's decision that a woman's Lesbianism automatically made her an "unfit" parent. The appeals court did not grant custody to Lynne Tucker but ordered the lower court to reconsider its decision.

Gay Candidates Advance to General Election

Washington, DC — Fifteen openly Gay and Lesbian candidates who have received backing from the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund have survived primary battles and are

advancing to the general election on November 8.

Among the candidates are two who, if victorious, will be the highest level state officials elected as open Gays and Lesbians. Tony Miller is favored to become California's Secretary of State and Karen Burstein is leading in the race for Attorney General in New York state. Both are Democrats.

Among the other candidates endorsed by the Victory Fund are: Tom Ammiano and Susan Leal for the San Francisco Board of Supervisors; Cal Anderson for Washington State Senate; Derek Belt for Massachusetts House of Representatives; Chuck Carpenter, Cynthia Wooten and George Eighmey for the Oregon House; and Ken Cheuvront for the Arizona House.

Other Gay and Lesbian candidates are: Bonnie Doumanis for San Diego Municipal Court; Will Fitzpatrick for the Rhode Island State Senate; Sheila Kuehl for California State Assembly; Teri Schwartz for Los Angeles Superior Court; and Tim Van Zandt for the Missouri House of Representatives.

Federated Realty Group, Inc. decline of the "traditional" nuclear family and are likely to add greater fuel to the debate about "family values" and the rights of alternative families.

The statistics indicate that nearly half of all American children - 32.3 million - live in situations that vary from the traditional nuclear family. The traditional nuclear family is defined as a married heterosexual couple living in the same household with their own biological children, with no other adults or children present. A full 30% of America's 96 million households are those in which people either live alone or with people they are not legally related to.

Robin Kane of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force told the Washington Blade: "This reflects what the Gay and Lesbian community has been saying loudly for several years. The family has been going through dramatic changes, and to make public policy decisions based on a model that exists less and less frequently is just irrational, in addition to

homophobic."

City Liable for Seizure of Gay Paper

San Francisco, CA - A federal jury has awarded more than \$35,000 in damages to the Gay/Lesbian newspaper Bay Times after finding that former Police Chief Richard Hongisto violated the constitutional rights of the paper's editors and readers when officers seized 2,000 copies of the paper from newspaper racks in 1992.

Three police officers served suspensions without pay after it was determined they had illegally confiscated the Gay papers under Hongisto's orders. Hongisto denied he issued

such orders but was fired by the Police Commission.

Hongisto was apparently furious about a doctored photo of himself on the front page of the Bay Times in which he was wielding a huge night stick as if it were his penis. The picture was an editorial comment about the Police Department's strong-arm tactics in the arrests of 2,000 people following the first Rodney King verdict.

"We're supposed to have a free press," Bay Times editor Kim Corsaro said after the jury's verdict. "Police can't go rounding up papers that aren't complimentary of them.

The City of San Francisco must pay all legal costs and

punitive damages as well.

Bashing Charges Against Prosecutor Dismissed

Boca Raton, FL - Assault charges against a Broward County prosecutor who was accused of yelling anti-Gay slurs and vandalizing a Gay bar with members of his

rugby team have been dismissed.

Mark McHugh, 32, who supervises the felony crime unit in Fort Lauderdale as a state attorney, was arrested along with three teammates after they reportedly entered the Paradise Club in drag, shouted about "homos, faggots and dykes," demanded beer and proceeded to tear down pictures and rip up potted plants. Police charged them with disorderly conduct and public intoxication.

While one man will be charged with dosorderly conduct and another with resisting arrest, Palm Beach Assistant State Attorney Moira Lasch ruled there was insufficient evidence to prosecute McHugh. Lasch further ruled that despite numerous witness reports of anti-Gay slurs, no evidence

existed to prosecute the four men for hate crimes.

When asked whether the decision not to pursue charges could be perceived as prosecutors protecting their own, McHugh's lawyer agreed it was "a spin that could conceivably be put on this." Meanwhile, Paradise bar owner Kenneth Rohlman said: "They did it, and they got away with it."

Mississippi School Bans "Falsettoland"

Jackson, MS - Administrators at Hattiesburg High School have given in to some parents' complaints and banned a student production of the musical Falsettoland because the

play has homosexual characters and themes.

The play, by William Finn, focuses on a Jewish family thrown into crisis when the father realizes that he is Gay. There is much family turmoil and the couple is divorced. But in the end, there is some reconciliation when the father's lover is diagnosed with AIDS and family members lend their support.

"We believe that it is inappropriate for students to play the parts of homosexual characters in a public forum," read one complaint. "We believe, and public reviews of the play confirm, that this is a Gay-agenda production rather than an AIDS

awareness production."

Drama advisor Michael Marks criticized the banning of Falsettoland as a form of censorship that "discourages academic growth." Seventeen-year-old student Joey Hood told the AP: "This play portrays aspects of life that are real and are not going to go away."

Palo Alto, CA - Stanford University has agreed to be the repository for most of poet Allen Ginsberg's personal papers and effects. The school reportedly paid \$1 million for a collection that includes original drafts of his poems, letters to colleagues like Jack Kerouac and William Burroughs and other personal documents. Ginsberg, 68, expressed amusement that Stanford, a conservative institution that never invited him to read from his works, will house his archives.

Dallas, TX — Mica England, who sued the Dallas

Police Department for refusing to hire her after they learned she is Lesbian, has settled her case for \$73,000. "It's been a long battle, but I accomplished what I wanted to. I changed the state law and the police hiring policy." A state court ruled police could not ask job applicants about their sexual orientation or use the sodomy statutes to exclude homosexuals. England has

since decided to become a chef.

West Palm Beach, FL — City commissioners in West Palm Beach passed an ordinance prohibiting housing and job discrimination based on sexual orientation. They created a panel to hear complaints and violators can be fined \$500. The vote was 4-1. Mayor Nancy Graham stood strong against

fundamentalist opposition. Seattle, WA - About 90 couples, most of them Gay and Lesbian, signed up as domestic partners on the first day that Seattle's new domestic partners registry went into effect. The \$25 certificate confers no benefits but many couples were happy nonetheless. "Now it's official, we are a family," said Carolyn Sue, 57, of her relationship with her partner, Linda Gonzalez, 46.

Washington, DC - A reception was held September 13 honoring singer and AIDS activist Patti LaBelle, who has agreed to be Chairperson of the National Minority AIDS Council. The diva has long been a friend to the Gay community and has performed at numerous benefits for AIDS care and research

Los Angeles, CA - In an interview with Vanity Fair, actor Tom Cruise has denied the persistent rumors that he is Gay. "First of all, I don't think it's an indictment," said Cruise. "It's not true, but people are going to say what they want to say. I don't care. I don't care if people are Martians. Straight.

Gay. Bisexuals. Catholic, Jewish. Or Scientologist."

Chicago, IL — The Chicago Commission on Human Rights has ruled that a discrimination suit filed against the Chicago Area Boy Scouts Council by a former Eagle Scout who is Gay and who was denied a position as volunteer leader can proceed. "Substantial evidence" of illegal discrimination exists in the complaint filed by G. Keith Richardson, the Commission Key West, FL — Richard A. Heyman, one of the first openly Gay elected officials in the United States, died of AIDS complications September 16. He was 59. Heyman was elected to the Key West City Commission in 1978 and was elected Mayor in 1983. He served two consecutive terms, took a break and then ran and became mayor again in 1987.

Letters

To the Community:

October 11th is National Coming
Out Day across this great land, and I
was compelled to write my first letter to
In Step. I do this from the perspective of
someone who has recently come out.

I relate my history as a standard of sorts to give you perspective from where I come. I was raised in "redneck Jefferson County." The only way to survive was to talk a straight walk, and talk a straight talk. I knew at the age of twelve that I was Gay (or, at that time, queer). Every day of my life was a living hell of dishonesty, and self dilution. I went into the service, got married, had two beautiful children, and was miserable every step of the way. I had no one that I could consider a friend, because nobody knew who I really was. I felt close to no one, least of all my own family.

After twenty years of marriage, I told my family the truth. Not only because I could no longer stand living a lie every moment of the day, but because my wife deserved to be loved in a way that I was

incapable of.

Another reason to "come out" at this particular time, was the fact that the Gay community, in the past few years, had campaigned so earnestly and convincingly. Now I come to the crux of this letter. Since I have been out, I've been welcomed in no one's community, I have been embraced by no one, and have found it hard to even get to know anyone who might introduce me to a social base of Gay friends. Something is seriously wrong.

After having been told "come on in, the water is fine," I find myself alone in the undertow. I know there are organizations, self help groups, and a slew of hot lines and BBS's, but I'm not looking for psychiatric help, specialty groups, or counselors. I'm looking for friends. Someone to watch a football game with, hang with, and laugh with. I'm looking for that ordinary Joe blow off the street to kick back and have some

grins with.

Maybe I've been looking for friends in all the wrong places. The bar scene is cliquey and if you talk to someone they react as though they've just been violated (perhaps Dahmer syndrome). NCOD was founded in 1988 to commemorate the 1987 March on Washington for Gay and Lesbian Rights and as a positive and proactive statement of pride on the part of Gays and Lesbians nationwide. This year's theme is *Being Out in the Workplace*, and events throughout the country aim to increase Gay and Lesbian visibility at both the national and local levels.

Born Queer Amanda Bearse

Amanda Bearse is probably not the only Gay actor in prime time television. But she is the only openly Gay actor. While the notion of coming out has dozens of other performers paralyzed with fear, Bearse had always planned on it. This year she is the national spokesperson for National Coming Out Day.

"I think I was born queer," says Bearse. "I've always been in Gay relationships. I did date men, but being in a Gay relationship was more of who I was. I've always been out in a way. I don't wear a badge, I don't wear a sign, but as people get to know me in different situations, they get to know this about me."

Hiding her sexuality was never an option for the actor, now starting her ninth season as Marcy Rhodes D'Arcy on Fox's Married With Children. Bearse says she has always been open with her co-workers, and has never received any flak for being a Lesbian.

"I wasn't living secretly, and I didn't use pretense, beards, dates," she says. "I'd either go to events alone or bring my companion at the time. This was no secret to the people that I work with."

Still, Bearse avoided making public pronouncements until she felt she must. Two years ago, tabloids picked up the story that Bearse was planning to adopt a child. Articles about her personal life sprung up in the tabloids, and Bearse had to respond.

"When they invaded my life they way they do, I had the impulse to answer back, but I was very careful how I did that because I did not want to exploit my family any further than they already had," she says. "When the Advocate came along and approached me about doing the interview, I jumped at the opportunity because that was my community, and I could say to my community — and anyone else who decided to read it — that this is my community and this is who I am, and I have no shame about it."

COMING OUT

As a recognizable actor on a popular series, Bearse stood to lose a great deal by coming out. On the other hand, she also had a greater effect because of her position.

"I did have security. I wasn't a starving actor, and that's a reality because when you're raising a family, you need to ensure that security for your family," she says. "The other side of it is that it wasn't going to have an impact unless I had a certain amount of visibility and exposure. I'm in millions of people's homes daily because of the syndication of Married With Children, so people who don't know they knew what a Lesbian looks like now know that they know what a Lesbian looks like."

Viewers must be confused, however, to find the only openly Gay actor in prime time playing the man-hungry neighbor to television's most dysfunctional nuclear family. Is there any chance that the writers will clear up matters with a Lesbian storyline, pairing off Bearse with the show's hair-hopping housewife Katey Sagal, or the teenage blonde bimbette Christina Applegate?

"I wish!" says Bearse with a laugh. "I think we'd have to bring in another character. I loved Bewitched when Samantha would play the cousin and they'd do that split screen thing. I'd love to do that with Marcy.

"People ask me if maybe Marcy could turn Gay. But

that's not really fair to Gay people. You don't just turn Gay, and that character has been very entrenched in her own heterosexuality for eight years, and it's just not a flip of the coin thing. But to be able to play the character, Marcy's dyke cousin, would be a hoot. I don't write the show, I don't produce it, and I wouldn't hold my breath that it's going to happen. I'll wait until my next series."

UPCOMING PROJECTS

Bearse does hope that her next series will include a Gay character. While she is not sure if her own network is ready for such a leap — despite some progress with *Melrose Place* — she does think that the networks in general are improving their coverage of Gay issues.

"Little by little, we just keep moving forward, and when my job ends on Married With Children, I'd love to play a Gay character, to have that be the central focus of another sitcom, and I hope I'm up for the role," she says. "If I have the opportunity to develop such a show, I'll shop it around. I'm not going to give up easily."

"OUT THERE II"

In the meantime, Bearse will come out on television as the host of Comedy Central's second annual Out There Gay comedy special, set to air October 11 — National Coming Out Day. A far cry from the bathroom humor of Married With Children, Out There II focuses exclusively on Gay stand-up comedy, but Bearse seems as comfortable on the special as she does in her series.

"I happen to think that homosexuals are very funny," says Bearse. "When you grow up in an oppressive situation, one of the best ways to survive is to laugh."

Taped over Stonewall weekend at Caroline's Comedy Club in New York City, Out There II will place Bearse in an explicitly Gay context for the first time in her television career. But while the program showcases Gay comics, it also tries to appeal to straight audiences — and

that is where Bearse's recognition among non-Gay audiences is essential.

"When they first asked me to host the show, I was flattered," she says. "I was aware of the first one and the success it had for the Gay community and the straight audience that found its way to the show, and I understand that's what my presence lends to this event, gathering as many people to see this lineup of Gay talent. And the more people we can get to be aware of who we are and how we do our jobs, the better.

While she is enthusiastic about the special, Bearse still prefers her quiet home life to her work. For now, Bearse has her hands full with her 16 month old daughter, Zoe, whom she adopted at birth. "She is the most incredible person I know, the greatest thing that ever happened to me," says Bearse. Although Bearse, 35, has no immediate plans to adopt more children, she already has a full house with her lover

Amy, three dogs, and four cats. Fulltime actor and part-time activist, Bearse places her role as self-proclaimed 'homebody" above everything else.

"I have a very full and rich life. I have a family, I have a job, and being homosexual is not an issue," she says. "It's a part of who I am, but it's not all of who I am.

ENDA: A Problematic Bill

ENDA (the Employment Non-Discrimination Act) recently introduced into Congress, places those supporting Gay and Lesbian civil rights in a difficult position. On the one hand, it seems disloyal to criticize a federal civil rights bill that would provide significant protection from employment discrimination based on sexual orientation, that is supported by much of the national Gay and Lesbian civil rights leadership, and that has 30 sponsors in the Senate and over 120 in the House. On the other hand, ENDA contains serious limitations, which, if the bill passes, will haunt sexual minority communities for a long time.

What is particularly frustrating about ENDA is that it violates a cardinal rule of negotiations: it leaves its proponents no bargaining room. The bill was so stripped down before it was filed that there is virtually nothing left to compromise. Moreover, it will be almost impossible to improve the bill — any Congressperson proposing to strengthen the bill will face the argument that the civil rights leadership is perfectly happy with the bill

as it is.

What are the major problems with ENDA? One, a broad religious exemption. Two, the absolute prohibition on preferential treatment. Three, the failure to include transgendered people. Fourth, the failure to include public accommodations.

RELIGIOUS EXEMPTION

ENDA has a far broader exemption for religious institutions than other federal civil rights bills governing employment. Title VII (the federal law prohibiting employment discrimination based on race, sex, color, national origin, and religion) gives religious institutions the right to use religious preference in hiring, but does not exempt them from the race, color, sex, and national origin provisions. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) allows a similar religious preference in hiring by religious institutions. ENDA, on the other hand, exempts all religious institutions completely (except for their for-profit activities).

It also exempts any educational institution that is substantially "supported" by a religious association. What constitutes substantial support is not defined. Will sizeable financial contributions from a religious group to an educational institution be enough to exempt the school from coverage? If so,

conservative schools may solicit donations from religious groups to become exempt from ENDA.

PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT

ENDA flatly prohibits an employer covered by the law from giving preferential treatment to an individual and from using quotas based on sexual prientation. No other federal civil rights law absolutely prohibits preferential treatment and quotas. Preferential treatment and employment goals are among the remedies courts have ordered under Title VII in cases involving a history of intentional discrimination against a class of people. It is not clear whether the prohibition on "preferential treatment" in ENDA will mean that affirmative action programs designed to recruit Gay men and Lesbians will be prohibited.

Professor Arthur Leonard argues, for example, that ENDA would outlaw Northeastern University's affirmative action policy, which, in order to provide role models and mentors for Gay students, seeks to hire more openly Lesbian and Gay male faculty.

A number of national civil rights leaders maintain that the prohibition on quotas and preferential treatment neutralizes rightwing claims that ENDA would grant Gay men and Lesbians "special rights." By drafting ENDA to prohibit quotas and preferential treatment in order to prove that this is not a "special rights" bill, the drafters subtly undermine important remedies that courts have used to eliminate patterns of race and sex discrimination. That is, the rationale for prohibiting preferential treatment and quotas buys into the rightwing claim that preferential treatment and quotas are "special rights."

TRANSGENDERED PERSONS

ENDA prohibits discrimination that is based on "Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, or heterosexual orientation, real or perceived, as manifested by identity, acts, statements, or associations." Transsexuals and transvestites are not protected from discrimination. The 1993 Minnesota civil rights law, by contrast, covers transgendered people, also including in its definition of sexual orientation those who have a "self-image or identity not traditionally associated with one's biological maleness or femaleness."

A Minnesota- type of law would protect not only transsexuals and transvestites, but also those gender-bending Gay men and Lesbians who face discrimination not because of their sexual orientation per se, but because they are too femme or too butch.

PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS

Contrary to most civil rights laws, which cover public accommodations as well as employment, this civil rights bill does not prohibit discrimination in public

accommodations. As a result, Cracker Barrel employees would be protected from sexual orientation discrimination, while their patrons would not. Rep. Barney Frank, one of the two prime sponsors in the House, was quoted in the Washington Blade as saying that supporters of civil rights for Gay men and Lesbians have "taken the bigots at their word. We have produced a bill that says one thing and one thing only."

Yet chief Senate sponsor Edward Kennedy himself wrote that the "radical right will leave no stone unturned to block the enactment" of this bill. So nothing appears to have been gained in catering to the rightwing by omitting public accommodations from a major civil

rights bill

ENDA was drafted to appease rightwing forces that do not support any civil rights legislation, let alone protection for sexual orientation. The radical right already has won an important part of the battle over civil rights for sexual minorities by limiting the terms of the debate before ENDA was even filed.

Whether or not it passes Congress, ENDA, with its drawbacks, likely will serve as a model for state legislatures considering civil rights protection for sexual minorities in their states. ENDA not only is a problematic civil rights bill for sexual minorities, but it subtly undermines existing civil rights remedies as well

What Price Vanity

If you wonder why I constantly harp about quality of life issues, it's because I'm in no hurry to depart. After all, the longer I live, the more people and businesses I can annoy. Since not enough of you annoy AIDS Service Organizations, health care providers, and others who think that we are dependent on them, I feel I should make up for your inaction. So let's have a big Amen for toll free 800 numbers because they allow you to annoy people all over the USA. On the flip side let's have a big raspberry for automated answering systems. Although, when I encounter an automated system, I cope with it by either pretending I have a dial phone and wait for a live person, or take a chance and hit "O" in hopes of getting an operator. These systems are getting harder to fool, but it's important that we

On another matter, drug companies often have good information to disseminate on a variety of topics relating to HIV/AIDS. However, they're usually only distributed through physician's offices. The problem here is that docs often don't let us patients know

that they have this stuff.

I want to mention two items that your doc should have or can get for you. The first is a brochure from Pharmacia called Understanding MAC Infection, which tells you what you should know about MAC. I think this is important because as I mentioned last time, MAC can be a killer. The other piece of literature is from Ross Labs, the people who make Ensure and Advera nutritional supplements. They have an occasional newsletter called In Focus: News and Views for People Living with HIV. It has lots of good nutrition information. Both of these items are distributed directly to physicians, so you have to ask your doc or his/her nurse for them. Also, there is a new Ensure called Ensure High Protein. It comes in wild berry flavor and is possibly the best tasting supplement I've found. Most docs who treat HIV/AIDS should have samples, so once again, ask for it. Remember, if we don't try stuff and give our comments, companies won't know what we think. That's why I brought up the value of using those 800 toll free numbers

One of the things that AIDS has done is to increase business for dermatologists. I'm not raising this issue in a negative way, but as a fact. We seem to have initiated an entirely new

set of skin conditions to deal with — some we just have to live with and others can be helped. One of many things I've had to deal with lately are sudden itches on various places on my face, something not uncommon among people with AIDS. The itches do no harm, but they're as annoying to me as I am to many companies and agencies.

Earlier in the summer, I developed a pattern of brown spots on my face. They were in areas that the sun reached directly, and since I wear sunglasses, I have a reverse raccoon look. One of my docs said it looked like the mask of pregnancy that some women get. Boy, I was thrilled to hear that — and by the way, I am not pregnant. The dermatologist said it's probably photosensitivity related to one of my drugs, but we don't know which one. So I'm using a bleach cream to bleach out the brown spots. The stuff smells awful. What price vanity.

Further, I have a foot fungus that requires the application of a cream twice a day. I don't know how long this procedure will take, but it did come with two refills; not very encouraging. Finally, (at least I hope it's the last of the skin problems) is red bumps / welts all over my body. Those arise (awful pun) in the morning before I've even taken any of my drugs, appearing after I've been up for a while, and then they just go away. My only complaint is that when I'm at the gym, they sure don't make me look healthy. So, remember, if your body is surprising you with whatever, you're not





Congratulations to Sasha, and all the other finalists!



The big crowd got a triple treat: The bar forgot to cancel their regular Wednesday evening performance by Body Sweat, so they performed from 10pm to midnight. In between the male groups, a female audience member was convinced to dance on stage in an "Equal Time" for women slot. Most everyone enjoyed her, especially her group of Lesbian co-

workers.

Then Mount-N-Men took to the stage. This New York duo, who are also lovers, performed a unique set. Not typical pretty boy dancers, the one was in his later 40s and solid muscle, they made a few mouths drop open. Their gymnastics with a heavy dose of S&M influence, made the crowd sweat!




Rock Climbing Clinic for Women



we refuse to give that up.


