HUD Secretary Cisneros Meets with MASN

AIDS Housing Issues Discussed

Madison — Mary Alice Mowry, Executive Director of the Madison AIDS Support Network (MASN), met October 1 with Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Henry Cisneros to discuss the problems of community based housing for people with HIV disease. Mowry and 11 other advocates for AIDS housing from around the country met with Cisneros and 22 members of his staff. The meeting was the second in a series of community meetings Cisneros will have with housing advocates.

"It went very well," said Mowry. "It was the first time in a long time I walked out of a meeting stunned in a positive

way."

The meeting focused on the many complex technical issues surrounding securing Section 8 rental assistance certificates for people with HIV/ AIDS. Mowry said that 5,000 Section 8

certificates have been reserved for PWAs/ HIV, and that distribution of those certificates should begin by the end of the year. Advocates and the Secretary also spoke about his plans to create an Office of AIDS/ HIV Housing within HUD.

Mowry said that Cisneros is committed to getting input from smaller communities with lower incidence of HIV/ AIDS in the implementation of distribution plans for those certificates and future housing assistance. "States and cities with low impact will be at the planning table," she said, "so even if Madison is not eligible for this round of grants, we will be there to insure the program will work for us in the future."

GROUNDBREAKING SOON FOR SCHEEL HOUSE

MASN has been working for the last three years to construct the Rodney Scheel House, a 22-unit apartment complex for PWAs/ HIV. Work on the project has been hampered by the concerns of area residents, both about AIDS/ HIV and preserving greenspace in the neighborhood. Mowry said that while

this meeting with the Secretary did not focus specifically on the social issues involved in AIDS housing, other meetings with HUD personnel have, and Cisneros has a good understanding of the social issues involved. Groundbreaking on the Rodney Scheel house is tentatively scheduled for later this month.

"Right now, of equal concern and trouble is living through the morass of HUD regulations," Mowry said. She noted that MASN has been getting funding both from HUD and the city of Madison HOME project, and that the regulations of the two programs are often directly contradictory. She said that Cisneros has committed himself to resolve "in a broad- based way" the conflicts between federal and local regulations, in a way he hopes will become a model for other federal Departments.

"Secretary Cisneros has made a commitment to and understands the need for safe, affordable and self-determined housing for people with AIDS and HIV across the country," Mowry

concluded

Madison Lesbian Found Guilty of Homicide

Lesbian Love Triangle Ends in Death

Madison — Penny Brummer was found guilty October 1 of first degree intentional homicide in the slaying of Sarah Gonstead. Brummer had been accused of killing Gonstead in March of this year for allegedly interfering in Brummer's relationship with Glenda Johnson, Brummer's former girlfriend who was also a childhood friend of Gonstead's. Brummer faces a maximum sentence of life imprisonment, with an additional mandatory five year sentence for using a "dangerous weapon."

The prosecution built its case largely on circumstantial evidence, since they had neither a confession from Brummer nor the .22 caliber gun used in the slaying. Dane County Prosecutors Ann Sayles and Judy Schwamle highlighted inconsistencies between Brummer's account of the night Johnson disappeared and the testimony of other witnesses. Brummer had claimed that she and Gonstead had parted on Madison's east side the night Gonstead vanished. However, several witnesses placed her and Gonstead at Jake's Bar & Grill, two miles from where Gonstead's body was found. Brummer initially denied to police that she and Gonstead had been at Jake's, but said during trial that

they may have been there, claiming to have suffered an alcoholic blackout in the course of the evening.

Also damaging to Brummer's case was testimony from James Foseid, who stated that Brummer had told him in February or March that she was going to "waste" a "fat ugly bitch" who was interfering in her relationship with Johnson, Defense attorney Jack Priester argued that Foseid's testimony should be excluded. Priester claimed it was prejudicial and overly vague, since Foseid could not name the woman Brummer had allegedly threatened, and that Foseid had come forward at the "11th hour" and Priester had no time to check out his background. Judge Patrick Fiedler ruled that the testimony was admissible. Brummer later denied ever being in the bar where this conversation allegedly took place.

The prosecution also linked Brummer to a .22 caliber pistol which had been owned by her late father. The .22 was the only one of several firearms missing from Brummer's mother's home.

In her defense, Brummer refuted almost all of the circumstantial evidence against her. The defense also offered their own suspect, Brett Turner. Turner is Johnson's former boyfriend. Priester suggested that Turner might have been angry at Gonstead for preventing him from spending more time with Johnson.

Priester used the testimony of David

Zoromski, who testified that he saw a red vehicle similar to a Ford Ranger or Bronco parked near where Gonstead's body was found ten days after she disappeared. He testified that he saw a purple and pink object the size of a duffle bag on the ground at the driver's feet. When shown a picture of Gonstead in the bright pink jacket she was wearing when she vanished, Zoromski said the colors "rang a bell" with him. Zoromski stated that "the build and size" of the driver were similar to Turner's, as were the "facial structure and hairline." Zoromski rated Turner's orange Jeep a seven on a scale of one to ten in terms of similarity to the vehicle he saw, and rated Turner's father's red Bronco an eight or nine.

Prosecutors refuted Zoromski's testimony by producing time card records showing that Turner was at work at the time Zoromski said he saw the vehicle. Sayles took Priester to task during her closing arguments for "point(ing) fingers at phantoms" in accusing Turner and later Johnson of possibly playing a role in

Gonstead's death.

A sentencing date has not yet been set. There must be a pre-sentencing investigation first, which takes from 45-60 days.

Survey of UWM Students Finds 11% Are LesBiGay

UW System LesBiGay Issues Network Releases Report

Milwaukee — About two dozen faculty and students showed up for the fifth meeting of the UW System LesBiGay Issues Network on Friday, September 30 at UW Milwaukee. The Network, a group of UW faculty and students advocating on LesBiGay issues throughout the University of Wisconsin System, met for five hours to discuss topics such as campus climate and Gay and Lesbian Studies curriculum.

The Final report of the Gay and Lesbian Issues Task Force at UWM was presented. The heart of the Task Force's work came from researchers in the sociology department, who conducted a survey of students to measure campus climate on LesBiGay issues at UWM.

STUDENT SURVEY REPORT

The researchers found 11% of responding students were LesBiGay, a number close to the often quoted figure of 10% for the general population. Fiftynine percent of those LesBiGay students said they had experienced violence or

threats of physical violence at UWM for being LesBiGay. Fifty-six percent said they had faced LesBiGay slurs or jokes on campus

The survey also found that women were far more liberal than men in their attitudes on LesBiGay issues. Overall, as the interaction with LesBiGay people became more personal, bigotry rose. Researchers say this seems to show that many students have an intellectual acceptance of the civil rights of LesBiGays, but few of them are open on more personal issues, like having a LesBiGay person as a roommate.

Non-white students were more liberal than whites about more personal interaction with LesBiGays. However, non-whites were more conservative, which researchers say may reflect a fear amongst minority students of becoming a minority group twice by being publicly connected to LesBiGays.

The researchers warned that the survey's response rate was low, less than 30%, and that as a result the findings actually paint a brighter picture of campus climate than reality.

IMPROVING CAMPUS CLIMATE

The Task Force's suggestions for improving campus climate included creating more permanent positions in the administration to monitor students' experiences. Task Force members also suggested targeting straight men, the most bigoted group in the survey, for classes like those approved by the Certificate Program in Gay and Lesbian Studies at UWM. They suggested changing teaching methods and curriculum to attract more straight male students and educate them on LesBiGay issues.

Members of the Issues Network also addressed the direction they feel the Network should be taking in advocating for changes system-wide. Prof. Christopher Lane, coordinator of the Certificate Program in G/L Studies at UWM, and others, emphasized the importance of visibility of LesBiGay faculty and students. A student leader from Lawrence University and others agreed that the climate and level of support for LesBiGay issues varies widely from campus to campus.

Members of the Network also agreed that an official sign of approval for their efforts from the administration would help. The Certificate Program in G/L Studies at UWM has yet to receive its final approval from UW administrators although classes in the Program unofficially began this fall.

STATE News Briefs

Herb Kohl Signs On As Co-Sponsor of ENDA

Washington, DC — Wisconsin's Democratic Senator Herb Kohl has announced that he has signed on as a co-sponsor of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act, nicknamed ENDA. ENDA is a federal bill that will prohibit discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation.

Sen. Kohl's office did not send out an announcement about his sponsorship of ENDA. In Step learned of his endorsement through other political sources. When asked for a statement, Kohl's press secretary Brad Fitch supplied In Step with this two sentence comment from the Senator: "This legislation brings federal law in step with Wisconsin statutes already providing this type of protection. I have a similar policy in my office hiring to prevent discrimination in the workplace."

When Fitch was asked why it took so long for Kohl to endorse the measure, he said it had "only been introduced a few months ago." When In Step noted that Sen. Russ Feingold had been an original sponsor of the bill and that even

Sen. Kohl's Republican opponent, Bob Welch, had endorsed ENDA (with modifications), Fitch replied, "Well, now Sen. Kohl has."

Kohl joins Feingold and Rep. Tom Barrett as the only members of the state's Congressional delegation to support ENDA.

Tammy Baldwin Slated for Follow-Up Surgery

Madison — State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, the first openly Lesbian member of the Wisconsin legislature, was released from the UW Hospital September 30 and is recovering from a ruptured appendix. She is expected to undergo follow-up surgery in the next month.

Baldwin became ill with abdominal pain in mid-September, but doctors at reportedly her HMO ruled Baldwin appendicitis as a cause. resumed her normal busy schedule until her partner rushed her to the hospital Saturday evening, September 25, when she was suffering severe abdominal pain and a high fever. Doctors removed an abscess and treated the infection. She will have to return to the hospital sometime in the next month for an appendectomy.

Baldwin's Legislative Aide, Mike

Verveer, told In Step that during the period of misdiagnosed illness, Baldwin continued her usual frenetic schedule, working in the office every day, completing the 10k Wisconsin AIDS Walk in Milwaukee, playing volleyball with her team and introducing Rep. Barney Frank at a fundraiser for 2nd District Congressional candidate Tom Hecht.

Baldwin's illness is not expected to harm her re-election campaign. Her Republican opponent recently dropped out of the race, so she is a shoe-in for a second term. Get well cards can be sent to Baldwin in care of the Wisconsin State Assembly, P.O. Box 8952, Madison, WI 53708.

PrideFest Moves to Summerfest Grounds

Milwaukee — As In Step prepared to go to press Monday, October 10, word was received that the PrideFest committee, sponsors of the annual Wisconsin PrideFest, were preparing to sign a contract on Wednesday, October 12 to move the 1995 celebration to the Henry H. Maier (Summerfest) grounds.

PrideFest Co-Chair Bill Meunier

PrideFest Co-Chair Bill Meunier called our offices on October 10, to invite us to witness the October 12 signing of the agreement between PrideFest and Summerfest. "It will actually cost us less that the lakefront art center site we used in '94, and it will announce to the

community that 'we have arrived'."

PrideFest moved to the Art Center site in '94 after outgrowing its former Juneau Park location. The Summerfest site will eliminate the need to rent tents, food preparation facilities and porta potties. More details in our next issue.

Rath and Hurdman Deaths May Be Murder-Suicide

Janesville — Police officials in Janesville believe that the deaths of prominent businessman Virgil Duane Rath and his longtime companion, Frederick D. Hurdman, may be the result

of a murder-suicide.

The men's bodies were discovered on the morning of October 6 in the mansion they shared overlooking the Rock River just south of Janesville. The body of Rath, 53, who had apparently been stabbed to death, was found in a bedroom. The body of Hurdman, 48, was found in the garage with a car motor running.

Rath was for many years chairman of Rath Manufacturing Co., a successful business that produces steel tubing products. At age 33, Rath had been named Wisconsin's Small Businessman of the Year, and in 1990, Forbes magazine called Rath Manufacturing "one of the country's best small

businesses."

Also Around the State...

Milwaukee — The 1st District Court of Appeals has upheld a lower court decision ordering the reinstatement of officers John Balcerzak and Joseph Gabrish. The officers had been fired by Police Chief Phillip Arreola in 1991 for dereliction of duty in the Jeffrey Dahmer case and their firing had been supported by the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission. Gabrish has since found a job with the Grafton police. Balcerzak is back on duty, working in the Communications Operation Division of the Milwaukee Police Department.

NATIONAL News Briefs

Education Bill Passes Without Anti-Gay Provisions

Washington, DC — The U.S. Senate gave final approval to the \$12.7 billion Elementary and Secondary Education Act October 5 without the anti-Gay provisions which Sen. Jesse

Helms (R-NC) had earlier attached to the measure. The anti-Gay language was deleted by a House-Senate conference committee and the bill, with the support of Wisconsin's Democratic Sens. Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold, passed 77-20.

Helms's provision would have given the federal government control over curriculum, teaching materials and counseling in local schools. It interfered in classroom teaching, barring even neutral references to homosexuality, and targeted Gay youth for discrimination. Federal funds could have been denied to any school sponsoring programs or support services for Gay teens.

"The nation's schools have been spared an unprecedented intrusion by the federal government," said David Zingale of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "The Congress has reaffirmed local control over education and rebuffed Helms's discriminatory and intrusive language."

Important allies in the fight to have the anti-Gay language removed were Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA) and Rep.

Jolene Unsoeld (D-WA).

AIDS Funding Slightly Increased in 1995 Budget

Washington, DC — AIDS activists had hoped for an increase of more than \$800 million in federal funds for AIDS research, prevention and care services, but the final appropriations bill that reached President Clinton's desk contained only a modest increase of \$142 million above last year's total. Total AIDS spending for fiscal year 1994 was \$2.419 billion. For 1995, it will be \$2.561 billion.

The final figures were arrived at by a House-Senate conference committee just days before Congress adjourned for its fall recess. President Clinton is expected to approve the funds, which are part of the Department of Health and Human Services 1995 appropriations bill.

The \$142 million represents a 5.9% increase over AIDS funding in the 1994 budget. The Ryan White CARE Act will be raised by \$53 million to \$633 million in fiscal year 1995. Research monies will be increased by \$41 million to \$1.338 billion, and funds for preventive education will go up \$47.2 million to a total of \$590.2 million.

Ohio Lesbians Victims of Brutal Hate Crime

Canton, OH — The Gay People's Chronicle reports that two Lesbians were raped in their home in late August by an attacker who repeatedly made anti-Lesbian remarks during the assault, including the comment that "I'm tired of all the Lesbians moving into the southwest end of Canton."

The assailant either stalked the

women or identified them as Lesbians because of a rainbow windsock hanging on the front porch

and a flag with a triangle flying in back. He entered the home at 2am, threatened them with a knife, blindfolded them and tied their hands behind their backs.

In an ordeal that lasted four hours, the assailant raped each woman in separate rooms and then physically beat them, warning them not to call police and threatening to kill the 8-year old daughter of one of the women who was sleeping in another room.

"It was terrifying," said one of the victims, Sally Wamsley, who also characterized the police department's response as "indifferent and hostile." When the police arrived, she told the Chronicle, "We got the impression that they did not really believe us."

Bork, Meese Join Anti-Gay Effort in Cincinnati

Cincinnati, OH — Robert Bork, the right wing ideologue who failed to gain approval as a Reagan nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court, has become legal counsel to the group seeking to preserve Cincinnati's anti-Gay ordinance, Issue 3. Reagan era Attorney General Edwin Meese has agreed to raise funds for the effort.

Issue 3 repealed a city ordinance extending non-discrimination protections based on sexual orientation and would have prohibited Cincinnati lawmakers from adopting any similar protections in the future.

On August 9, Federal Judge Arthur Speigel, ruled that Issue 3 was unconstitutionally vague and that it denied homosexuals the right to full participation in the political process. The group which sponsored the measure is appealing Judge Speigel's decision. The involvement of Bork and Meese is seen as an attempt to solidify conservative support. One Cincinnati newspaper referred to it as a rolling out of the "big guns."

Bork was the author of a 1984 federal appeals court decision which stated that there is "no constitutional right to engage in homosexual conduct." Meese raised hackles in the Justice Department by asking prospective prosecutors if they were homosexual. More recently, he has appeared at Christian Right conferences and in an anti-Gay video saying that Gays and Lesbians should not be included in civil rights protections.

Some State Workers Get Partners Benefits in New York

Albany, NY — Several unions representing public sector employees in New York State have successfully

negotiated the inclusion of benefits for unmarried domestic partners into their

contract language.

United University Professions, which represents professors in the state's public universities, and Council 82 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which represents guards in the state prison system, successfully negotiated with the state for the inclusion of health insurance benefits for the unmarried domestic partners of union members. Gov. Mario Cuomo (D) supported the benefits, which will become available to qualified workers next year.

"It's part of the movement to equalize the way we cover the people who are left out of the system," Joseph Bress of the Office of Employee Relations told the Associated Press. "We do not feel one set of employees should be deprived of benefits others are

entitled to."

The Public Employees Federation, New York's second largest state workers' union, is also expected to gain partners' benefits for its members. That means that more than 100,000 state workers in New York are eligible for such insurance benefits.

Vermont is the only state in the union so far which provides domestic partners' benefits to all its state workers. That provision was also arrived at through collective bargaining.

Camp Sister Spirit Bolstered by Big Donation

Ovett, MS — Security at Camp Sister Spirit, the feminist education retreat that has been harassed and vandalized by local residents outraged at the presence of Lesbians, will be much improved after organizers received a donation of more than \$10,000 from women attending the West Coast Women's Music and Comedy Festival in September. The money is helping to pay for the installation of over a mile of fencing around the property and a security gate.

Camp caretakers and volunteers are working hard to prepare the camp for winter so everyone will have warm and secure living quarters. The women's bunkhouse is almost finished and a men's sheltered camping area is taking shape. Plans have also begun for the 7th annual Gulf Coast Womyn's Festival, set for April 14-17, 1995 at Camp Sister

Spirit.

A nuisance suit filed against the Camp by local residents is in the deposition stage. A hearing may be held in November or December. Expenses are likely to exceed \$9,500. Camp Sister Spirit would greatly appreciate any donations of money or goods. As a 501(c)3 organization, donations are tax-deductible.

US Grants Asylum to Gav Pakistani

New York, NY — Immigration Judge Gabriel Vidella has granted political asylum to a Pakistani man who was a professional cricket player until he was kicked off his team for being Gay. The 27-year-old testified that "I would be a dead man" if deported back to Pakistan.

The Pakistani, who asked to remain anonymous to protect his identity and that of his family back home, was the first individual to be granted politicial asylum since Attorney General Janet Reno announced this summer that Gays and Lesbians could be eligible for asylum as members of a "particular social group" that might be persecuted in their homelands.

The man's attorney cited as evidence of persecution Pakistan's laws against sodomy which can bring life imprisonment and even death by stoning. She told of a beating he received at the hands of police and the anti-Gay slurs and threats he suffered after word got around that he was Gay. She also cited his stable and gainful employment in the U.S.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service has said it will not appeal Judge Vidella's decision. The Pakistani will be able to apply for permannet residence in one year and for American citizenship four years after that.

Washington, DC — People for the American Way, in its recent report Attacks on the Freedom to Learn, reports that Annie on My Mind, a novel about a teenage girl's crush on another girl, was one of the Ten Most Frequently Challenged Books during the 1993-94 school year. The sensitive and widely acclaimed book was written by Nancy Garden.

Washington, DC — An estimated 38,000 walkers, including Tipper Gore and several members of Congress, took part in the annual AIDS Walk in Washington DC, raising \$1.6 million for AIDS education and services in the nation's capital. The District of Columbia has been hit hard by the epidemic. A total of 6,500 residents have full-blown AIDS.

York, PA — The Rev. Gordon Ross, pastor of St. Matthew's Church, has canceled a Christmas concert by the Harrisburg Men's Chorus after learning that chorus members are Gay. "We're not trying to be tough on homosexuals or Lesbians," Rev. Ross told the AP. "That's not our purpose. But what they want is contrary to the teachings of our church. We don't want to support their political agenda."

Minneapolis, MN — More than 300 journalists from throughout the nation gathered September 22-25 for the third annual conference of the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association. Among the guest speakers were Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders and Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA). Jesse Green won a \$1,000 award for his feature article What the Navy Taught Allen Schindler's Mother, which appeared in the New York Times Magazine last year.

Santa Fe, NM — The Great Southwest Council of the Boy Scouts of America is likely to lose out on an annual stipend of about \$12,000 from the United Way of Santa Fe County after United Way adopted a policy which forbids funding to agencies which discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation.

Washington, DC — In September, members of the District of Columbia Lesbian and Bisexual Women Against Racism Everywhere (DCLARE) performed an exorcism outside the Washington Hilton where 3,000 people were gathered for the annual conference of the Christian Coalition. The exorcism, which outraged some conventioneers, was meant as a "symbolic gesture" to purge the racist and anti-Gay bigotry unleashed by the Christian group.

Los Angeles, CA — Officers Lance LaPay and Natasha Benavides have filed a multi-million dollar suit against the Los Angeles Police Department for its alleged failure to follow through on a court agreement to open up the department to Gays and Lesbians. The suit charges that anti-Gay harassment and violence against openly Gay officers continues and that several Gay and Lesbian cops have been forced to quit or to take sick leave because of the pressure.

Houston, TX — After complaints from conservatives, the University of Texas has withdrawn student funding from a series of workshops aimed at individuals exploring their sexual orientation. The UT student health center originally sponsored the workshops at a cost of \$882, but the workshops will now be underwritten by private funds.

Camp Lejeune, NC — Lt. Gen. Robert Johnston has refused to recommend for discharge a Marine corporal who admitted in a private counseling session that he is questioning his sexuality. The Navy psychologist to whom Cpl. Kevin Blessing admitted his doubts, testified against him at the

hearing.

Washington, DC — If you'd like to call your Senator or member of Congress and speak in support of civil rights for Gays, there's a way to do so while charging the call to the Christian Right. A coalition of Christian groups has started a tollfree hotline — (800) 768-2221 — that anyone can use. Just call the number and ask the operator to connect you to your representative. The Christian groups will foot the bill!

UW-Madison Hosts Homecoming Lecture on Homophobia

Madison - The University of Wisconsin-Madison is proud to sponsor a lecture by author and historian John D'Emilio on Homophobia and Postwar America on Friday, October 21, at 4pm in the auditorium of the State Historical Society, 816 State Street in Madison.

The talk will draw on his research for a biography of Bayard Rustin and will Illuminate the mingled strains of conservatism, racism, and homophobia that prevailed during the post-World War II decades in the United States.

An African-American Bayard Rustin introduced Gandhian nonviolence to the struggle for racial justice and mentored Martin Luther King. He organized the 1963 March on Washington and was a key advocate of an interracial alliance of civil rights forced and American labor in the interest of remaking American capitalism.

Rustin was also a Gay man. Homophobia and Gay oppression shaped both his career and his strategic thinking about social and political change in addition to shaping the response of others to his ideas and his leadership.

John D'Emilio, professor of history at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, has gained national recognition as the author of the awardwinning Sexual Politics, Sexual Communities: The Making of a Homosexual Minority in the United States, 1940-1970 (1983) and Making Trouble: Essays on Gay History, Politics, and Culture (1992). With Estelle Freedman, he co-authored Intimate Matters: A History of Sexuality in America (1988), which received a front-page review in the New York Times book review. A preeminent scholar in his field, D'Emilio also enjoys an outstanding reputation as a public

Dear Editor:

The history of civil rights in this country has been one of incremental progress rather than sweeping reform. Women and African- Americans first worked to end slavery, then to win voting rights, then protection from discrimination in employment and public accommodations, and later in housing. Arlene Zarembka's criticism of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), "Legal" column (In Step, Vol. 11, Issue 19, Sept. 29- Oct. 11), overlooks this history and ignores the realities of creating change in the American political system.

The bill fills a major gap in the law by prohibiting discrimination in employment based on sexual orientation. It will protect untold millions of Americans from being refused work, fired, or otherwise discriminated against in hiring, firing, compensation and other employment practices. ENDA represents an important step forward toward full equality for Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual people — but it's not the end of the road.

ENDA is an important milestone for our community. For the first time, the U.S. Senate has held hearings on legislation to extend equal rights protection on the basis of sexual orientation. The bill has already provided an opportunity for our community to educate national lawmakers about the impact of discrimination in an area where all Americans share common ground — the workplace. This educational process will pave the way toward greater understanding of the Gay and Lesbian experience and create the climate for change.

As the history of the civil rights movement demonstrates, progress requires a lot of hard work and a measure of compromise. The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, which is championing ENDA is Congress, has been the driving force behind every major civil rights bill passed in this half-century — and has not lost a battle yet. The Gay and Lesbian community should learn from the experience of our civil rights allies and follow their example in the pursuit of our rights. We are in good company.

On Sunday, September 18, the inmates and staff at the Racine Correctional Institution in Sturtevant held an AIDS walk. The walk was the 2nd annual walk and was held in conjunction with the 5th Annual Wisconsin AIDS Walk in Milwaukee.

This year we were very fortunate in fact that we had more walkers/runners than the previous year, 27 in '93 to over 30 participants this year. We were also successful in raising over \$100 more than last year. While most of you out there in society may think that is not a big deal, think about this. The average inmate receives a mere \$33 a month. One inmate alone donated \$30 and another inmate \$26, with yet another \$15. One very important point that I would like to pass on to you is that the inmates here at the prison donated more than \$800 of the over \$1,400 collected.

This is the second year that I have been here at RCI and again helped organize both walks. I wish to publicly thank both the administration and the staff here at the prison. If they did not fully support the efforts of putting the Walk together, then it would not have happened.

Along with having the AIDS walk, the prison has worked out an agreement with the SE Wisconsin AIDS Project (SEWAP) to have a case manager come in monthly for counseling services. Also the prison has finally, after two years of persistence by me, began a support group for people with HIV/AIDS.

It is often said that you can't fight city hall, or you can't beat the system. Well neither one of those is the case here, nor was that my intention. If it weren't for the compassion and understanding of certain staff members here, NONE of these things would have occurred.

My hope for the future is that other prisons in the state and in the country join us in our fight against AIDS and Ignorance. World AIDS Day is December 1st.

State Medical Schools to Launch Women's Health Study

Women Needed to Volunteer as Subjects

Madison — The University of Wisconsin Medical School and the Medical College of Wisconsin have each received \$8 million grants from the

federal government to conduct research into women's health issues.

The huge grants are part of the \$628 million Women's Health Initiative which was approved by Congress as a means to compensate for decades of federal health research that systematically excluded women. It is being administered by the National Institutes of Health.

The massive research project, which will closely monitor the health of 163,000 post-menopausal women over a 10-11 year period, is expected to produce important findings about heart disease, osteoporosis, breast cancer and other women's health concerns.

"This is the most comprehensive and extensive effort our country has ever undertaken to study women's health issues, and I am proud that Wisconsin's two medical schools have been selected to participate in this important national project," said Gov. Tommy Thompson.

The UW-Medical School and the Medical College will each study 3,600 women over the next decade. Fourteen hundred women at each school will participate in the clinical aspects of the study, while 2,200 women at each school will serve as an observational group whose normal lifestyles will be monitored.

The clinical studies will try to determine whether low-fat diets help to prevent heart disease and breast and colon cancers. They will examine the impact of hormone replacement therapy on the heart and bones and whether calcium and vitamin D can prevent osteoporosis.

Medical College epidemiologist Jane Kotchen explained that after menopause, "women begin to experience excess disability and death due to heart disease, breast and bowel cancer and bone loss, all of which appear to have common causative factors."

Tracing the health histories of women in the clinical group, who will be asked to modify certain behaviors, and those in the observational group, who will be allowed to function as usual, is expected to produce valuable information about preventive health care for women which will hopefully reduce the incidence of such disabling illnesses in the future.

Lesbian health advocates lobbied hard to make sure the study includes questions about participants' sexual orientation and are encouraging Lesbians to volunteer. The findings may someday reveal the extent of and any unique manifestations of disease among Lesbians

Women aged 50-79 are currently being sought for the study, which is expected to begin in February. All participants will be provided with free screening tests and regular medical check- ups during the course of the study. Women participating in the hormone replacement tests will be provided with free estrogen.

New Developments in the War Against Breast Cancer

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a time in which health professionals try to emphasize education and preventive measures against breast cancer, which claims the lives of almost 46,000 American women each year.

Lesbians especially need to raise their awareness because certain factors put us at greater risk of contracting the disease. A study by Suzanne Haynes of the National Cancer Institute found that while women as a whole have a 1 in 8 chance of developing breast cancer by age 85, Lesbians have a 1 in 3 chance.

Haynes identified several risk factors for Lesbians. In one study, 70% of Lesbians over age 50 had not borne children, a startling statistic because childbirth is linked to lower risks of breast cancer. Up to 40% of Lesbians do not seek regular gynecologic or obstetric care, so cancers are often found at later stages and are harder to treat. Lesbians over 50 have also been found to consume more alcohol than their straight sisters, adding another risk factor.

The good news is that about 80% of the women who are diagnosed with breast cancer at an early stage of the disease can be treated effectively and go on to live long and productive lives. Among breast cancer survivors are such high profile women as First Ladies Betty Ford and Nancy Reagan, actresses Kate Jackson and Ann Jillian, and TV reporters Betty Rollin and Linda Ellerbee.

In the past year, there have been a number of new developments in the war against breast cancer. Here is a summary of the most recent findings.

MUTANT GENE FOUND


A team of scientists based at the University of Utah Medical Center recently discovered the mutated gene that may be responsible for cases of hereditary breast cancer. An estimated 10% of all breast cancer cases are linked to family histories of the disease.

In findings published in the journal Science October 7, the researchers, led by Dr. Mark Skolnick, found that a large gene connected to the bottom half of chromosome 17 is responsible for breast cancer. It has been labeled BRCA1. Women who carry the mutant gene have an 86% chance of developing breast

cancer during their lifetimes. Women without the mutated gene have a 10% chance of getting breast cancer by age 80

Scientists still do not understand exactly how or why the gene mutates, so much more research needs to be done to understand its workings. It may be many years before any kind of gene therapy is developed to alter or repair the gene to prevent cancer.

The discovery of BRCA1 was hailed as a necessary first step to developing a diagnostic test. But once that test is developed, possibly in the next year or two and before the advent of effective gene therapy, doctors and patients will be faced with the additional challenge of deciding what prophylactic measures to employ to stave off cancer. Women with the mutated gene might opt for preventive mastectomies. Research into



the cancer- fighting properties of the drug tamoxifen are likely to be expanded.

TAMOXIFEN

Several studies indicate the drug tamoxifen reduces the chances of a recurrence of cancer in those already treated for breast cancer. Women prescribed tamoxifen after breast cancer surgery have a 38% better chance of living disease-free for the next five years than cancer patients who do not take the drug.

drug.

The government is currently conducting a study to determine if tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer altogether (its first development, not just its recurrence). About 11,000 women at high risk for breast cancer are participating in a long-term drug trial. The results could provide hope to those identified as carriers of the BRCA1 gene.

But the Food and Drug

But the Food and Drug Administration has issued a warning that tamoxifen may increase the possibility of contracting uterine cancer. A study by the National Cancer Institute found that women taking tamoxifen are two to three times more likely to get uterine cancer than women in the general population.

Uterine cancer is fairly rare, with about 30,000 cases diagnosed each year in the U.S. Endometrial cancer, the most common form of uterine cancer, is easily treatable in its early stages and has a

survival rate of 83%.

FDA officials and cancer experts say the benefits from tamoxifen in preventing recurrences of breast cancer far outweigh its possible side effects, however. Individuals taking tamoxifen should be closely monitored for any side effects, including the potential for uterine cancer.

LUMPECTOMIES

A study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association last April showed that women with breast cancers who underwent lumpectomies followed by radiation treatment were as likely to survive the next five years as women with cancer who had a mastectomy, in which their entire breast was removed.

The study, conducted by researchers at the University of California-Irvine, involved 5,892 women in Orange County who were diagnosed with cancer from 1984 to 1990.

The results reinforced earlier findings of a federal study that lumpectomies — removing just the malignant lump — followed by radiation treatment could be just as effective and life-saving as the more extreme, disfiguring procedure of removing the whole breast. The findings are likely to further discredit the use of mastectomies except for severe, advanced stages of cancer. Mastectomies were once the standard treatment for all breast cancers.

The California findings were rushed

to publication after federal officials admitted that some data in the earlier study had been falsified. Some women who had undergone lumpectomies were frightened and confused by the government's gaffe but were reassured by the independent study.

Feminist activist and breast cancer survivor Gloria Steinem, who underwent a lumpectomy in 1986, felt vindicated by the results of the studies. She commented: "We were crusading against radical mastectomies in our first issues at Ms. We knew than that there were 400% more mastectomies being done in the U.S. than in England and the survival rate was the same."

BLACK WOMEN

A new study, published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, reinforces earlier findings that African American women are more than twice as likely as white women to die of breast cancer.

The study traced the disease progression in more than 1,100 black and white women diagnosed with breast cancer in 1985-86. Documenting the number of deaths among the breast cancer patients through 1990, researchers found that black women were 2.2 times more likely to die than white women.

The higher death rate was attributed in large part to the more advanced nature of the cancer at the time it was

detected in the black women as opposed to when it was detected in the white women. This may be caused by lack of finances and access to health care. About 15% of the difference was linked to cancerous tumors being more aggressive in black women. The reasons for the more aggressive cancer in black women, whether genetic, environmental or otherwise are yet to be determined and will be the focus of future studies.

The findings point to the necessity for greater preventive education and screening aimed at African American women. Survival rates among women of all ages and races improve dramatically when cancer is detected early.

EXERCISE

A new study published in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute says that regular, moderate exercise can reduce a woman's risk of developing pre-menopausal breast cancer by up to 60%.

The study, conducted by Dr. Leslie Bernstein at the University of Southern California, involved more than 1,000 California women under age 40. About half were newly diagnosed with breast cancer, the other half were cancer-free. All were asked about their lifetime exercise habits and other risk factors.

The findings revealed that the benefits of exercise were greatest in women who had been physically active in their teens and early 20's and who had

STREET SAFETY TIPS

No crime victim is to blame for the crime committed against them. Even though you can't be sure you won't become a victim of crime, these prevention tips may be helpful:

- Identify local "Danger Zones" in areas you frequent. Avoid them if alone, and stay aware of your surroundings;
- Plot out "safe" routes from the bus stop or parking lot to your home or other places you frequent.
 Use well lit streets, and be aware of late night stores where you could run for safety;
- If you feel unsafe, trust your instincts, and remove yourself from the area. Make noise, blow a whistle, scream "FIRE!" Call 911 for police assistance;
- If you go home with strangers, make sure you introduce that person to a friend or bartender. Make people aware you are leaving together, so if a problem arises later, they can help identify the perpetrator;

- Lesbians should be cautious of men they meet in Lesbian bars who claim to be Gay and invite women to their homes to party;
- Leave bars with a group of people you know. Assailants often lurk outside Gay identified establishments waiting for their next victim:
- Always carry a whistle, consider taking a self defense class. (Self Awareness is often more important than Self Defense), or, carry Pepper Spray (legal in Wisconsin as of October 1, 1994).
- Be alert and aware of your surroundings. Don't take short cuts through unlit areas;
- Get license plate numbers of cars with suspicious occupants, or whose occupants shout out anti-Gay slurs . . . then report it to police.

borne one or more children. Women who exercised at least four hours a week, jogging, swimming or playing tennis, reduced their risk of contracting breast

cancer substantially.

Bernstein launched her research after learning of an earlier study which found that Radcliffe alumnae who were college athletes were much less likely to develop breast cancer than non- athletic classmates. While it has long been known that intense exercise can alter or even stop a woman's menstrual cycle, little has been done to chart the long-term effects of moderate exercise on women's hormones.

Many questions remain to be answered about the precise way exercise impacts women's risk level for breast cancer, but the most profound result of Bernstein's finding is that exercise is a factor, unlike family history, that women

can control.

Just for the record, regular exercise has also been shown to reduce the chances of contracting heart disease, osteoporosis, diabetes and hypertension.

RISK FACTORS

The New York Times recently published a chart of risk factors for breast cancer. While many of the specific physical mechanisms involved in causing or preventing breast cancer are not fully understood, here are the widely accepted generalizations about what we know or

suspect at this point: Identified Risk Factors

▼ Family History: Risk is lower among those with no history of the disease among close relatives.

• Age at Onset of Menstruation:

Risk is lowest among those who start

menstruating late.

▼ Age at First Pregnancy. Risk is lowest among those who have had a first child by age 20 and among those who have a greater number of pregnancies.

▼ Socioeconomic Status: Higher status is associated with higher risk.

Possible Risk Factors

▼ Breastfeeding: There may be some protective effect for those who breastfeed.

Dietary Factors: Like high-fat diets, high alcohol intake, or a need for certain vitamins or fiber.

▼ Environmental Factors: Like electro-magnetic fields and cancer causing chemicals.

 Hormones: From birth control pills or as replacement therapy.

Probable Risk Factor Modifier:

▼ Moderate Exercise: Even four hours a week is associated with a significantly lower breast cancer risk.

MAMMOGRAPHY

When and how often to take mammograms — breast x-rays — is a topic of continuing debate among medical professionals. mammography continues to be one of the most important screening methods for detecting breast cancer, studies have come to conflicting conclusions as to how

effective they are. Virtually all studies have shown the beneficial effects of annual or biennial mammograms in detecting cancers in women over 50 years old. Their risk of dying from breast cancer is reduced by a third. But data compiled from several studies and presented at a symposium of the National Cancer Institute last year indicated that women in their 40's who had regular mammograms had the same death rate of women who had not undergone mammogram screening.

The data was extremely disturbing to women's health advocates who have

touted mammograms as the best way of detecting cancer and saving lives. "This is really bad news for women," said Cindy Pearson of the National Women's Health Network. "This, the best detection test, doesn't work so well."

Currently, the American Cancer Society continues to recommend a baseline mammogram by age 40, mammograms every one or two years until age 50, and annual tests after that. The National Cancer Institute says that unless there is a family history of cancer, regular mammograms should not be taken until age 50.

Women should consult with their physicians about the need

BREAST SELF-EXAM

Breast Self-Examination (BSE) is an easy procedure for detecting any changes in women's breasts and in possibly detecting early signs of breast cancer. It does not require a physician, it's free of charge, and most women find it self-empowering. The basic steps are listed below. You can do it on your own, but if you have questions, any nurse or doctor can run through it with you.

By examining your breasts carefully at the same time each month, you'll be able to notice any unusual change, thickening or lump. Pre-menopausal women should examine their breasts one week after menstruation stops. Post-menopausal women should do so the first day of every month. See BSE chart.

Only 27% of American women currently perform regular self-exams. Women can be our own best physicians and reduce the chances of developing advanced cancers by taking the time to monitor the textures of our breasts each month.

For further information, talk to your physician or consult these books: The New Our Bodies, Ourselves by the Boston Women's Health Book Collective and Dr. Susan Love's Breast Book by Susan Love, a Lesbian physician and nationally recognized expert on breast cancer.






At the Mirror: Sit or stand in front of your mirror. First, look at your breasts with your arms relaxed at your sides, then raised over your head. Notice any changes in breast size or shape. Look for any lump, dimpling, rash or puckering of the skin or nipple. Repeat with hands on hips, pressing down firmly to flex chest muscles.







Lying Down: To examine your left breast, put a pillow under your left shoulder to flatten the breast evenly over your chest. With your left arm above your head, use your right hand to systematically examine your left breast.



Place the pillow under your right shoulder, raise your right arm, and examine the other breast with your left hand. Finally, squeeze the nipple of each breast gently between thumb and index finger. Any discharge should be reported to your doctor immediately.







In the Shower: Wet, soapy skin makes this step easier. First, mentally divide your breasts into sections. Whether you imagine quadrants, circles or strips, it's important that you do a complete, systematic examination of each breast. Raise left arm over your head and using your fingers held flat (not fingertips), feel the left breast with your right hand. Press gently but firmly over each section. Reverse this procedure to examine your right breast.


Lesbian Couples Calendar

evening-length, multi-media work involving music, movement and video all built around the theme of living with life-threatening illness.

Still/Here had its premiere performance in Lyons, France in September and will tour Wisconsin this month before its much anticipated opening at the Brooklyn Academy of Music in November. It's not often that we in the Badger State get to participate in the birth of such a significant artistic event.

Bill T. Jones, the Artistic Director of the Jones/Zane Dance Company, began his dance training at the State University of New York at Binghamton, where he studied classical ballet and modern dance. But his artistic juices were really fueled by the African dance classes he took there and his meeting with Arnie Zane, the man who became his lover and principle dance partner for 17 years.


In 1973, the two men founded the American Dance Asylum and, in 1982, the Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Dance Company. Since that time, the 11-member company has become one of the most dynamic and critically acclaimed dance companies in the world, creating many new dances and touring throughout Europe, Asia and the Middle Fast

The Jones/Zane Dance Company's repertoire is recognized for its mercurial energy, its innovative use of partnering, unexpected body juxtapositions and technical virtuosity. The dancers' multicultural backgrounds are the group's trademark and reflect their eclectic training: athletics, acting, and classical, modern and folk dance.

STILL/HERE

Jones is himself HIV-positive, and in 1988 he suffered the loss of his companion and dance partner, Arnie Zane, to AIDS. Still/Here is Jones's attempt to transform the life and death issues he has dealt with, and continues to deal with, into an artistic vision. Like all his work, it is suffused with moral and political implications.

Jones got the idea for Still/Here after a conversation with a friend who had just had a double mastectomy. The two of them engaged in a deep conversation about the process of accepting illness and the potential for imminent death. Though entirely different in lifestyle, gender, race, age, education and sexual orientation, Jones and his friend discovered they were alike in very profound ways, especially in their determination to live.

Jones decided to consult with others who face serious illnesses and to incorporate their voices and experiences into an epic dance. In the last two years he held "Survival Workshops" called Talking and Moving About Life and Death with people who are living with serious and/or terminal illnesses. He held two such workshops in Madison and Milwaukee earlier this year. The testimonies of participants were videotaped, and Jones has incorporated many of their thoughts and expressions and movements into Still/Here.

The work is divided into two sections. The first, Still, is a meditative dance set to an original composition — a song cycle based on dialogue from the survival workshops — by classical composer Kenneth Frazelle and sung by legendary folksinger Odetta.

The second part, Here, is a dance set to a composition inlaid with dialogue from the workshops by rock composer/performer Vernon Reid of Living Colour.

The set design, by media artist Gretchen Bender, which consists of television monitors mounted on carts and projection screens, plays media images collected from the Jones/Zane Dance Company's outreach in various communities around the world.

In creating Still Here, Jones wanted to bring the voices of an often silent community into the work. He has done this by recording and utilizing the ideas expressed by people in the survival

workshops.

He also wanted to ensure that the life and death issues expressed in Still/Here would resonate beyond the stage once the performances are completed. He is accomplishing this by sponsoring Managing Mortality symposia in local communities at the time of the performances to encourage further discussion.

A documentary film and book tracing the development of the Still/Here dance project will also carry the discussion forward and reach those unable to see the live performance.

Bill Moyers of PBS was in Milwaukee last February to film parts of the survival workshop Jones held there. The segment is expected to appear on a PBS special called "Healing and the Arts" sometime this winter.

Interviewed recently for an article in Poz, Jones was asked how he copes with his own HIV-positive status. He

replied:

"I spend a lot of time preparing for the shock of something to happen, and I use the terminology of the black church to describe it. Getting ready, it's called....What they mean of course is that on that fateful day when you got to lay down all of your worries and concerns and let go of everybody, are you going to be ready to make the journey to wherever you have to make it to?"

"I promise myself now that I will be ready," said Jones, "and that's what my work is about, holding my head up, loving the man I love, facing the things that scare me, acknowledging my fears of being unappreciated or penniless and not being crippled by them, operating as a 42-year-old creative person at the peak of my powers absolutely unsure if tomorrow I'll still be able to do it."

Even so, Jones told the New York Times: "My job is to be resilient. That's why I call life a dance. I understand it as

dance."

HOUSE VALUE VS. LOT VALUE

QUESTION: What is the proper relationship between the cost of a lot and the value of the house on it?

ANSWER: Old rule of thumb have lost much of their meaning. It used to be that land represented about one-sixth of the home's purchase price. Then it moved up to one-fourth. And it will change again as the cost of land continues to rise or fall.

Nevertheless, the land value versus house value ratio cannot be totally dismissed because it does, to some extend, affect the resale value of the property. It may not make much difference if you put an inexpensive house on an expensive lot, but, it could be a mistake to have too much house for the land.

Lesbian Subtext Fuels "I, The Worst of All"

Movie at UWM Theatre October 21, 22

Milwaukee — Sister Juana Ines de la Cruz who lived in "New Spain" in the 1600's is today recognized as one of Mexico's greatest poets. A movie about her short but defiant life suggests that her most passionate poetry was inspired by

another woman, Maria Luisa, wife of the Spanish vicercy.

I, The Worst of All, a historical epic about Sister
Juana's life and her persecution during the Inquisition, is directed by Argentinian feminist filmmaker Maria Luisa Bemberg. It will be shown Friday and Saturday nights, October 21 and 22 at the UWM Union Theatre as part of its New Feminist Features series.

The movie was not available for preview, but all the advance publicity and previous works by director Bemberg suggest that it's a must-see for feminists and Lesbian film buffs. Lesbian movie critic B. Ruby Rich has said of Bemberg: "All her films treat the subject of women who defy prohibitions, go up against institutional powers and pay the price for their bravery.

Bemberg's 1984 film, Camila, the true story of a 19th century woman who fell in love with a priest and was executed,

was nominated for a Best Foreign Film Oscar.

I, The Worst of All is based on a story, "The Traps of Faith," by Nobel laureate Octavio Paz. It tackles the big issues of repression vs. freedom, orthodoxy vs. independent thinking, church vs. state, men vs. women - all against the backdrop of

Spain's 17th century colonization of the "New World."

In the film, the intelligent and idealistic young Juana enters the convent, which was the only viable option for women of her class who did not want to marry. Eventually, through the patronage of the liberal viceroy and his admiring wife, she gains special privileges like her own large room filled with books and scientific instruments and the leisure time to explore her independent thoughts and to write her plays and passionate

While there is no overt display of sexual activity between Sister Juana and Maria Luisa, the chemistry between the women (played by Assumpta Serta and Dominique Sanda, two of Europe's most beautiful and accomplished actresses) is palpable. The Chicago Tribune called I, The Worst of All "an offbeat romance of startling austerity and intensity." The Boston Globe noted the "Lesbian passion seething behind convent walls" and called the film "engrossing, enriching and

The arrival of a new archbishop, charged with enforcing orthodoxy and punishing suspected heretics, brings to an abrupt and tragic end Sister Juana's growing influence. Her ideas are deemed radical, her writings inappropriate for a nun, and she becomes one of thousands of victims of the

Catholic Church's Inquisition.



Bed and Breakfast inns (B&B's) were first introduced to the United States in the late 1970s. Today, there are approximately 15,000 B&B's scattered through all 50 states, located in large cities, small towns, charming, quiet villages, and expansive rural areas. Most rely on the natural beauty of their area, the charm and friendliness of the locale, and the ability of their visitors to explore and appreciate the surroundings.

Because customers are treated more like house guests, you'll get a sense of "visiting" rather than "staying." The key to being happy at a B&B is to approach them with a sense of adventure. Yet you should have no trouble being entertained while staying at a B&B if you enjoy nature, local history, antiques, hiking, biking, fall colors, relaxing by a fireplace with a good book, a companion or both, just "getting away from it all." or being pampered in style and comfort.

Policies vary from place to place, but almost all B&B's require at least a 50% deposit within 3-7 days of making your reservation. Unlike hotels, whose standard is "cancel within 24-hours before arrival and you'll receive a full refund," most B&B's require at least a weeks notice to cancel to receive a full

The size of B&B's may vary from 2 to 20+ rooms. In some of the smaller establishments (2-10 rooms), rooms are unique from each other in features and amenities. Private baths may be limited to specific rooms. Bathrooms may be shared with another room. Some bathrooms may only have a shower, or a tub, or a sunken Jacuzzi for two.

The B&B's we surveyed for this feature all have private baths, and some feature whirlpools as well.

We offer pleasant and inexpensive lodging which is responsive to the needs of our visitors: dormitory sleeping rooms, shared kitchens, dining rooms and baths. Clean, safe accommodations, at a good value. \$12+ tax/night; \$9+ tax, AYH Members.

Hike It! Bike It! Raft It! in Forest County! Most B&B's have more than one level of accommodation and rate, and rates can vary from season-to-season. In Step's survey of B&B's show rates vary from \$47 to \$165 per night, including breakfast. These rates may apply to a certain level of accommodation, or to a specific room. A B&B's brochure should provide a good description of each room or level, in-room amenities, and common area features.

Televisions, telephones and air conditioners are not always to be found in each room. But that's what "getting away from it all" means, doesn't it? B&B's featured here seem to be well equipped with amenities, some including VCR's, refrigerators, CD/cassette players, in addition to televisions.

The size of your room may sometimes be a surprise. Since many B&B's are restored homes and mansions, rooms tend to be smaller. Common areas like living rooms, parlors, and libraries are the places to read, relax, perhaps watch TV, and engage in interesting conversation with the other guests. A B&B is not the place for you if you want to remain anonymous or be alone from check-in to check-out.

Breakfast is also the place for getting to know the other visitors. It's actually part of the B&B experience, which is a good reason to patronize a Gay owned/ operated/ friendly establishment. It will no doubt enrich your stay and allow you to feel comfortable with the other guests, and help you to make friends easier.

Breakfast is usually the pride of B&B's. There's usually no choice of entree, which is tricky if you're vegetarian, don't eat dairy, or have other dietary restrictions. There will most likely be a specific time (or times) when breakfast will be served. There's not a short order cook on staff, nor will your breakfast be cooked to order.


It might be served buffet style, family style, or sit-down with wait staff. Some B&B's change their menu seasonally, use a bakery in town for fresh baked goods, or make everything themselves from scratch. Surveyed B&B's went into some detail on what's served at their establishments (see below).





Sisters Are Doing For Themselves

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Women have traditionally been "good girls" — asking politely, not demanding, seldom complaining about their lot in life, and just generally not making waves. But then, during the women's movement of the 1970s, Lesbian and non-Lesbian feminists began shaking things up: more women began speaking out about physical and sexual abuse and refusing to be victims of a patriarchal system that discriminated against them or sometimes, worse yet, ignored them and their needs completely. At last, women were fighting for their rights — except, for the most part, in the arena of health care, where "female problems" continued to be secrets shamefully held be women and left in the hands of the male-dominated medical professions.

Breast cancer in particular was greeted by women with a sense of shame, and they were encouraged in this by support organizations and the medical establishment, which prodded them to do everything they could to hide the fact that this terrible thing had transpired, including buying breast prostheses and, later, having breast implants. Granted, for some women, the appearance of normality was an important part of their psychological recuperation. organizations like Reach to Recovery. which sent volunteers to visit women like my mother who had just had mastectomies, never presented women with any other options.

However, as the incidence of breast cancer in women increased at an alarming rate, and as it became evident that progress in breast cancer prevention and treatment was slow, not because research was turning up nothing, but because male researchers and male-headed funding agencies didn't care enough about the problem to truly pursue - women gradually became more radicalized in this arena as well. Among the first to stop waiting and start acting were Lesbian feminist cancer support organizations like the Community Cancer Project in Chicago. As recently as two years ago, only five or six such organizations existed; now there are 15 or 16 of them, all members of the National Coalition of Feminist and Cancer Projects. Cancer projects like these were a revolution in

support organizations, taking a proactive stance toward disease rather than that of a victim, the position most often taken by earlier groups with names like Y-Me. The earlier organizations performed a critical support function when not much was available to women with cancer, but the newer brand of organizations provided a haven for women who wanted support not only in merely copying and helping their husbands cope but also in aggressively demanding changes for themselves in insurance, research, and medical care and in exploring alternative

It is not surprising to me that Lesbians should be at the forefront of this proactive movement: historically, they've often been there, from the social reform movement at the turn of the century to the second wave women's movement. What is surprising is how many people you wouldn't expect to be fighting for change are out there now making their voices heard - like the women on Long Island, some of them grandmothers, who are taking their cue from proactive groups like ACT UP and are surveying the area, making a map of the abnormal incidence of cancer there, and demanding environmental clean-up.

Even more surprising is that a wide array of people are starting to recognize that Lesbians have special health care needs and concerns. It's hard to say exactly what those concerns are, given that nearly no research has been done specifically on Lesbians to date. However, extrapolating from the data currently available, researchers suspect that Lesbians are at an 80% higher risk of getting breast cancer than the general population of women and that Lesbians have an 80% higher mortality rate. The reasons for this, they suspect, have to do with everything from the fact that Lesbians are less likely to have had fullterm pregnancies and a history of lactation (factors that reduce cancer risk) to the fact that Lesbians don't have adequate access to health care. The latter is not just a matter of financial factors but is also a result of, not uncommonly, the insensitivity of the medical profession toward Lesbians, which manifests itself in the heterosexist slant of questions asked by gynecologists to more overt forms of callous treatment.

It is such situations and statistics that people are starting to notice. In spite of the fact that national cogender Gay and Lesbian organizations still won't commit seriously to advocating women's health concerns (both NGLTF and HRCF had Lesbian health advocates but dropped the positions after about a year), word is getting out. In the last year alone, the Lesbian Community Cancer Project has been contacted by the Centers for Disease Control, the AMA, Senator Ted Kennedy, the Illinois Department of Health, and Y-Me for information about Lesbian health issues. And with the Women's Health Survey that LCCP has just conducted and is currently processing, there will soon be more data to share - especially since the survey will now also be done in Minneapolis and New York, providing important comparative data.

However, for getting people to take notice of the breast cancer epidemic in this country and for demonstrating that women are indeed fighting back, the most elaborate plan has to be Expedition Inspiration. Sponsored by the Breast Cancer Fund in San Francisco and several corporations, the Expedition team led by 4-year bone marrow transplant survivor Laura Evans, hopes to raise \$2.3 million when they climb Mount Aconcagua in Argentina this January.

When asked why the team of breast cancer survivors and others would want to climb a mountain to raise money, executive director Andrea Martin of the Fund has said, "There's something heroic about meeting the challenge of a mountain, and every woman, no matter how she fights the disease, is a hero."

Yes, sisters are doing it for themselves. And it's starting to pay off. And yet... Sometimes I think there is still some hurt, a little anger, over the fact that so few Gay men have rallied to this cause the way Lesbians have been on the front lines as AIDS activists. I still have arguments with Gay men about whether breast cancer is a "Lesbian issue," about whether there is a particular kind of cancer that affects Lesbians more than others. These concerns about quantification and verification have yet to be answered no one has cared enough until lately to actually find out. But all that should matter really is that, clearly, this issue is of vital concern to Lesbians. If we are in fact, a Bisexual, Gay, and Lesbian community, what affects parts of us in a devastating way should be of concern to the rest. During October, Breast Cancer Awareness Month, I hope every member of this diverse community will donate some time or money to the cause of saving women's lives.

"You know, sometimes there's no one else left to be a supportive buddy, your friend or family but your dog or your cat. When it gets difficult, what do you do?" 
