

STATE News Briefs

Sen. Kohl Responds to Votes on Helms Amendments

Washington, DC — Wisconsin's US Sen. Herb Kohl (D) has finally responded to an inquiry by In Step publisher Ron Geiman about his votes in favor of anti-Gay amendments to a federal education bill sponsored by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC). The votes took place in August, and Kohl's alliance with Helms infuriated many Gays and Lesbians.

"My vote in support of Sen. Helms' amendment reflected my concern that schools have overstepped the bounds of safe sex education and tolerance building and have, in some cases, promoted sexual experimentation." Kohl wrote.

"...In the name of tolerance, some schools have distributed literature, such as The Playbook for Kids About Sex, which has very little to do about tolerance and instead actually encourages kids to explore their sexuality. On an issue this sensitive, I believe that we must protect parents' rights to pass their values on to their children without being contradicted in public schools.

"I do not believe that Sen. Helms' amendment impedes sex education or tolerance building, but rather sends a message to schools that they should not be encouraging sexual activity of any kind. It disturbs me that materials which were too explicit to show on the floor of the Senate could be considered necessary instruments for teaching young people to accept diversity.

"In addition, I would like to allay some fears about possible consequences of the amendment. Senators Helms and Smith [R-NH] specifically addressed charges that the language would have a chilling effect on efforts of school counselors to help students who are depressed or suicidal because they think they may be homosexual.

"They reiterated that the amendment does not prohibit counselors from doing anything which is helpful to a student as long as they do not promote homosexuality or refer the student to an organization whose purpose is homosexual advocacy. The amendment does not forbid counselors from referring a troubled student who needs professional help to a psychiatrist, therapist or neutral support group."

Milwaukee Police are Recruiting New Officers

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission is currently accepting applications for the position of police officer for those who meet the minimum qualifications. Applicants must be at least 21 years old and citizens of the US. They must have completed high school or a high school equivalency program and must have a valid drivers license. Applicants must participate in a written test (passing grade: 70), a physical agility test, and an oral interview.

Recruits undergo a paid 21-week police training course after which they are available for all essential police duties. Officers work a 40-hour work week, get two weeks of paid vacation

after one year of service, three weeks after eight years, and four weeks after fifteen years. First year pay is \$26,955, second year pay is \$29,640, third year is \$33,115, and on up. Medical, dental, life insurance and pension plans are included in employment.

Applicants should apply in person at the Commission office, 749 W. State Street, Room 706, between 8:30am and 6pm November 14-23. Applicants can also come in Thursday evening, Nov. 17 until 8pm and Saturday, Nov. 19 from 9am to Noon.

Also Around the State...

Janesville — A freedom of information request filed to obtain police files on the October 6 murder-suicide of businessman V. Duane Rath and his companion, Frederick D. Hurdman, discovered what many have speculated all along: that Hurdman apparently killed Rath because Rath had begun a relationship with another man and was trying to call it quits with Hurdman. Rath was a wealthy businessman who gave generously to AIDS charities and Gay rights causes.

Eau Claire — Three men face a court hearing November 14 on charges of battery and disorderly conduct with a hate crime penalty enhancer for verbally and physically assaulting two men leaving the bar Scruples on September 12. Steven W. Endle, 42, Rocky P. Morzenti, 37, and Thomas M. Alley, 41, allegedly used anti-Gay slurs as they attacked the victims. If convicted, they could receive up to three years in prison and stiff fines.

NEA Cuts Indirect Grants to Individual Artists

Washington, DC — The National Endowment for the Arts, victimized for years by right-wing political attacks and Congressional budget cuts, has abruptly ended a program that allowed non-profit arts groups to disburse \$1.3 million in federal grants to individual artists.

The NEA contends the move was made for purely budgetary reasons, but local arts groups suspect it is meant to prevent them from giving small grants to emerging artists whom NEA critics have judged to be too controversial. The administrative change will require all individual artists to apply directly to the NEA rather than through a sponsoring agency, and will give the NEA greater oversight on how the funds are disbursed.

When confronted with complaints that the NEA was caving in to conservatives, NEA Chair Jane Alexander issued this terse statement: "We trust that these decisions, while difficult and necessary, will allow the Arts Endowment to work more effectively and efficiently, while continuing to serve the evolving programming needs of the arts community."

Congress cut NEA's budget last year by 2.5% to \$170.3 million. This year, it was cut back to \$167.4 million. This is less money than the Pentagon spends annually on military bands alone.

Socrates, Sappho Top List of "Gay 100"

New York, NY — The Greek philosopher Socrates and the poet Sappho of Lesbos have been named the most influential Gay and Lesbian of all time in a new book called The Gay 100, compiled by scholar Paul Russell and published by Citadel Press.

The book is a follow-up to previous works like The 100: A Ranking of the Most Influential Persons in History and The Black 100: A Ranking of the Most Influential African Americans.

Russell, a professor at Vassar College, told the Washington Blade: "In some ways ranking the top 100 is a gimmick. It's a marketing technique, because everybody's gonna have their own opinions about what you're doing." He decided to take on the task, however, when he thought of the book's educational value.

Russell's top 10 are: Socrates, Sappho, Oscar Wilde, Magnus Hirschfeld, the Patrons of Stonewall, Walt Whitman, Gertrude Stein, Karl Heinrich Ulrichs, Edward Carpenter and J.A. Symonds. Hirschfeld and Ulrichs were German pioneers of Gay rights, all the others, except the Stonewall Inn patrons, are influential writers and thinkers.

Other rankings are: Mattachine Society and Radical Faeries founder Harry Hay, 22; Poet Adrienne Rich, 47; playwright Larry Kramer, 48; Martina Navratilova, 76; singer Holly Near, 88; and writer Edmund White, 92.

Another new book, Hollywood Lesbians, by

entertainment writer Boze Hadleigh, outs actresses Barbara Stanwyck, Agnes Moorehead, Tallulah Bankhead, Judith Anderson, Sandy Dennis, Capucine, Marjorie Main ("Ma Kettle") and Nancy Kulp (Jane Hathaway of The Beverly Hillbillies)

Gay Support May Have Foiled Federal Appointment

Washington, DC - Former Police Chief Tom Potter of Portland, Oregon, whose Lesbian daughter is a cop and who has been supportive of Gay rights, withdrew his name from consideration for a federal appointment as head of President Clinton's Community-Oriented Policing Service after a Justice Department official suggested his support of Gays could undermine Potter's credibility with law enforcement groups.

Potter says he reluctantly backed out after Associate Attorney General John Schmidt suggested that Potter's pro-Gay positions could be problematic. "I agreed it was a potential problem," Potter told the New York Times, "but I told him I had dealt with the problem before and it had made me stronger, and that I had ended up with more support from the community than

before."

But the Justice Department countered that Potter himself raised the question of his own credibility and voluntarily withdrew his name from consideration before officials even discussed the matter. They also cited Attorney General Janet Reno's policy of non-discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment matters throughout the Justice Department.

Gay Turk Given Asylum in U.S.
Washington, DC — Twenty-two-year-old Serkan Altan of Turkey has been granted political asylum in the United States because of persecution he is likely to face in his homeland due to his sexual orientation. Altan is Gay.

Altan is the second Gay person to be granted asylum since Attorney General Janet Reno announced earlier this year that Gays and Lesbians could meet asylum eligibility as members of "a particular social group" subject to persecution.

The letter from the Immigration and Naturalization Service to Altan read: "It has been determined you have established a well-founded fear of persecution were you to return to Turkey."

Altan's application to the INS cited years of

harassment and violence leveled against him in Turkey. He was threatened and beaten by fellow students and raped twice, once by police officers, another time by a gang of youths who shouted anti-Gay epithets. The constant harassment led Altan

to attempt suicide.

Altan lives in Virginia now, where he plans to resume his schooling. He hopes to apply for permanent residence in one year and American citizenship four years after that.

Gay Plays Brighten New York Theater Season

New York, NY - Two new plays by Gay writers have opened in New York theaters to rave reviews from the critics, Terrence McNally's Love! Valour! Compassion! and

Charles Busch's You Should Be So Lucky.

McNally, who won plaudits for his previous play, Lips Together, Teeth Apart, has written a similar ensemble piece, this time featuring eight Gay male characters vacationing at a remote farmhouse in upstate New York. Love! Valour! Compassion! explores their lives and interactions.

New York Times critic David Richards called the play a "high point" of the young theater season, a mixture of "abundant humor" and "terrible sadness... Love! Valour! Compassion! celebrates our strengths, forgives us our weaknesses and, with a glance at the vast, starry heavens, admits that life has always been out of our hands anyway.

The Times's Ben Brantley called You Should Be So Lucky an "utterly winning new comedy" that is a "spiritual cousin to the Cinderella theme movies of the 1930's and

40's...an outlandish, corny and magical tale of transformation." It was written by and features drag artist Charles Busch as a shy Gay man whose gesture of kindness to an elderly man leads to fame and fortune. The headline of the Times review teased, "Charles Busch Takes a Role With Trousers."

Scientists View Male Octopuses Engaged in Sex

Deep in the Pacific Ocean - Nature reports that scientists aboard the submarine Alvin, deep within the Pacific ocean about 1,000 miles due west of Guatemala, recently witnessed sexual activity between a small and a much larger octopus. The oceanographers videotaped the sexual encounter, which lasted 16 minutes.

Researchers have noted same-gender sexual behavior between many birds, mammals, amphibians, reptiles and insects before, but this report seems to be the first documentation of same-gender attraction among the many-

tentacled octopus species.

The sexual organ of an octopus is like a tentacle, which can be inserted into the mantle cavity, the main opening in the bodies of both male and female octopuses. In this incident, the tiny octopus, which measured just 15 inches in length, breathed "vigorously" and inserted its organ into the mantle cavity of a much larger but passive male octopus.

Scientists speculated on reasons for the same-gender tryst. They say female octopuses bear eggs only once so they are very selective about their mates. Because the ocean is so vast, octopuses may not encounter each other very often. The little octopus could have been "less cautious about checking out other mates," according to one scientist.

None of the scientists suggested a more obvious conclusion: the roll in the sea may have been caused by love

at first sight.

Writer David B. Feinberg Succumbs to AIDS

New York, NY - David B. Feinberg, an . award-winning writer and AIDS activist, succumbed to AIDS complications on November 2. He died in his Manhattan home

at age 37

Feinberg won a Lambda Literary Award in 1990 for his first novel, Eighty-Sixed, an unsentimental look at Gay male life before and after the AIDS epidemic began. Spontaneous Combustion, published two years later, is a collection of interrelated stories featuring the character of B.J. Rosenthal, who was introduced in the earlier novel. "I'm sorry I contracted the deadly HIV virus," B.J. tells his mother, "and I promise I won't do it again."

Feinberg became active with ACT UP and was arrested during that group's infamous disruption of St. Patrick's Cathedral in 1989. More recently, he became disenchanted with conflicts in the group. Viking has just published Feinberg's latest book, Queer and Loathing: Rants and Raves of a

Raging AIDS Clone.

INTERNATIONAL News Briefs

French Leaders Indicted in Blood Scandal

- Three former top officials of the Socialist government of Francois Mitterand will stand trial on charges they allowed thousands of people to become infected with HIV through their failure to see that blood products were screened as soon as an HIV antibody test became available.
Former Prime Minister Laurent Fabius, former Social

Affairs Minister Georgina Dufoix and former Health Minister Edmond Herve will all be tried for their failure to implement blood screening procedures in 1985. Documents published in Liberation indicate that even though an American test was available with which to test blood for HIV antibodies, the government ministers delayed, hoping instead to use a French diagnostic test that was still in development.

During the period of government inaction, at least 1,200 hemophiliacs became infected with HIV through tainted transfusions. Four hundred of those people have died of AIDS complications.

Last year, the director of France's national blood bank was sentenced to four years in prison for his negligence in the case, and the head of the blood transfusion research bureau, who also knew of the potentially infected blood supplies but did nothing to correct them, was sentenced to two years. Hemophiliacs and others who contracted HIV through transfusions had clamored for officials higher up the chain of responsibility to be made accountable.

Fabius, Herve and Dufoix all allegedly attended meetings at which the HIV-tainted blood supply was discussed and refused to protect the public against it until a French antibody test could be

Albanian Gays Allegedly Tortured by Police

Tirana — The International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission reports that members of Albania's only Gay organization, Shoqato Gay Albania, were "severely beaten by the police" on October 14.

Three members of the group were arrested in Tirana, Albania's capital, and accused of belonging to an "illegal" group. Sex between men is illegal in Albania. Police reportedly beat the men for several hours, demanding to know the names of other members and the group's president. One man suffered a broken leg.

"This level of official persecution of Gay people resembles Nazi tactics in the 1930's," said Jorge Cortinas of the Human Rights Commission. "Defenders of liberty and human rights around the world need to denounce such state-directed persecution in clear and unequivocal terms."

China to Begin AIDS Education Effort

Beijing — The Communist government of China, bowing to the reality that AIDS is not just a product of the decadent west and that HIV is beginning to spread among the mainland's more than 1 billion inhabitants, is launching an unprecedented preventive education

campaign to combat the spread of the

The State Council took action after learning that the number of people in China testing positive for HIV rose to 1,435 this summer. The actual figure is probably eight to ten times greater than the official figure. While small in comparison to totals in African and western nations, if the trend continues, China could have as many as 250,000 AIDS cases by the year 2,000.

Representatives of the European Community are helping China's Public Health Ministry to devise effective education methods and sharing research and treatment information. The campaign will employ television, newspapers and the schools to spread the preventive message.

Human Rights Commission Won't Replace ILGA at U.N.

San Francisco — Julie Dorf, a spokeswoman for the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission which monitors human rights abuses against Gays and Lesbians worldwide, has denied reports that the Commission will try to replace the International Lesbian and Gay Association (ILGA) as a consultative member of the United Nations' Economic and Social Council.

Such speculation arose after the Council suspended ILGA's membership because it could not guarantee that none of its member groups advocated pedophilia. The ouster was initially orchestrated by right wing Christian groups in the US, suspicious of ILGA's growing influence in the world body.

ILGA had fought for many years to gain consultative status on the Economic and Social Council, and its suspension has been a tremendous blow to the credibility of the international movement for Gay and Lesbian civil rights. The Human Rights Commission is actually an arm of ILGA and Dorf said it did not have the time or the resources to apply for U.N. status.

Also Around the World...

London — On November 2, the occasion of his 90th birthday, Gay actor Sir John Gielgud received the honor of having the Globe Theatre in London's West End named after him. Gielgud began his theatrical career in about 1920 and has received nearly every acting award the English-speaking world offers. Gielgud no longer performs on stage, but will soon appear in the TV sequel to Gone With the Wind. He lives with his longtime companion at their rural England estate.

Johannesburg — Thousands of Gays and Lesbians marched October 1 in South Africa's national Gay Pride Parade. Marchers celebrated the country's newborn multiracial democracy and a section of the interim constitution that guarantees equal civil rights to all people regardless of sexual orientation. Activists are working to see that the "Gay rights" provision is included in the final constitution.

Berlin — A Gay man and a Lesbian were elected to the German Bundestag (the lower house of Parliament) in October, becoming the first openly Gay people to serve in the legislature. Christina Schenk is a veteran feminist activist and member of the Party of Democratic Socialism. Volker Beck is a member of the Green Party, whose central tenets are peace and environmentalism.

Paris — Dozens of AIDS activists have been conducting sit- ins in the lobbies of the most exclusive hotels in Paris to protest the government's neglect of housing for homeless people with AIDS. ACT UP vows to continue the noisy sit-ins until Mayor Jacques Chirac makes housing provisions for poor people with HIV/AIDS.

Montreal— A Gay organization in Quebec has returned to the provincial government a check for \$2,000 which was intended to fight anti-Gay violence. The group had requested \$180,000. "This \$2,000 sum is insulting...to each of the 17 Gay men murdered in the province in the last three years," Gay activist Roger LeClerc told the Montreal Gazette.

Buenos Aires — Gay activists in Argentina held a press conference in October to denounce continuing police harassment of Gays and transvestites. Police are said to respond violently to reports of individuals cross-dressing or same-gender couples dancing at nightclubs. The press conference was held the day after a man was allegedly beaten by police because he has AIDS.






Conservatively Speaking


Denial=Death

Commentary by Marvin Liebman

As of January, 1994, sixty-three thousand young American men, between the ages of 20 and 29, had AIDS. The overwhelming majority of them were infected when they were teen-agers. These authoritative statistics come from the Federal Government's Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

What will be the figures for the balance of 1994? 100,000? 150,000? Whatever the statistics report, they will show that we are losing yet another generation to the disease. This time it





will not be silence and ignorance that will equal death. It will be because of our denial and our refusal to deal with the plague that is killing our youth.

After living in the midst of the AIDS epidemic for 14 years, a generation of Gay men have become inured to the everyday ambushes of fear. revelation of illness, and the specter and reality of death. For the first ten years of the epidemic, when the slogan "silence equals death" held sway, I was sadly silent. I was in the closet, and I reacted like most other Americans. AIDS was a disease that infected "them." One took a rather cursory interest, felt sporadically sorry for "them," even grieved when a friend died of the disease, but then "hebrought-it-on-himself-didn't-he?" | even thought it was a unique idea when my friend, Bill Buckley, suggested that Gay HIV-positive men be tattooed on their buttocks as a warning to their sexual partners. I was alternately amused or appalled by the actions of Larry Kramer and ACT-UP. It was all rather distant, even tedious. It had nothing to do with

And then, in the summer of 1990, just days before my 67th birthday, I came out publicly. In a blazing revelation, I understood it was not "them." It was "us." It was me. From that point on, I devoted myself to our community in every way I could think of, desperate to make up for the wasted, the silent years. And I knew that outsiders could never really understand this terrible plague that had wreaked havoc on our community and had killed off too many of our best. Only we, Gay men, could take full measure of our loss and assume the responsibility for our future. Certainly, we have compassionate allies in our Lesbian sisters and men and women representing all facets of America's mainstream. But, in the end, it is we who will die and it is we who must take action. Silent for so many years. I know that I now have the duty to speak out as a Gay man deeply concerned over the future and the fate of all of us.

We are, in a way, like the citizens of Sarajevo, living in a city long besieged, and the constant bombardment begins to seem less terrifying over time. We become able to accommodate the ritual of thunderous assault, the nagging certainty of loss, and continue on, somewhat nostalgic, but resigned. Precariously alive, we are impeccably trained in self-defense with the condom as our major shield. The siege has become particularly commonplace for young Gay men, maturing in the crucible of AIDS, highly schooled in safer sex survival tactics. Yet, too many, while well-versed in AIDS prevention, carry on with sex and pleasure in an almost fatalistic frenzy, convinced alternately of immortality or an inevitable date with HIV.

Decline in Cases is Fragile

Another onslaught, another new and still more horrifying round of casualties. is now taking shape. A study recently completed by Columbia University which tracked Gay men, unsafe sex, and incidence of AIDS indicates that the overall pattern of decline in incidence is so fragile that adding scarcely one more new and unsafe partner per Gay man per year would begin to increase the total number of cases after years of decline. The conclusions from the study are chilling. "Young men are the future of this epidemic," says Dr. Martina Morris, coauthor of the study. First hand reports from San Francisco, New York, Dallas, and Los Angeles, show that young Gay men are adopting or simply falling back upon sexual behaviors which dramatically increase the risk of contracting HIV, most notably anal intercourse without a condom. The Whitman-Walker Clinic reports that the rate of adolescent infection in Washington, DC is doubling every 14 months.

Why? There are many theories discussed at inconclusive meetings of physicians, social workers, psychologists, and AIDS bureaucrats in this country and throughout the world. Not one of them has come up with an answer to the self-destruction of Gay men who bring death to each other. It is deeply depressing to note that the present trend in unsafe sexual activity by younger men persists and grows. I must unhappily repeat former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop's recent somber remarks on AIDS





at Ohio Wesleyan University on September 7th of this year: "There never will be a cure, and the likelihood of a vaccine is dim. We Americans do a better job of preventive maintenance on our cars than we do on ourselves."

"It is deeply depressing to note that the present trend in unsafe sexual activity by younger men persists and grows."

I thus rage against the possibility that this dread plague will not only outlast me, but also the generation of Gay men fifty years my junior. This horror can no longer be blamed on Ronald Reagan or the Christian Right or the Republicans or an uncaring government or on silence alone. We have heard the basics over and over for more than a decade — getting tested, knowing our HIV status, communicating that knowledge honestly before sex, and maintaining absolute use of condoms during intercourse.

My good friend, Greg Scott, a veteran activist who lives with AIDS, espouses a more personal, direct and radical approach: "Only those of us who are HIV-positive can actually prevent its spread. To stop HIV transmission, those of us who are already infected must stop having sex of any kind with

those who may still be negative.

Whatever the methods, the blame will be **ours** if the AIDS holocaust is to continue to decimate our community. We hold the future in our hands. Our struggle for civil rights, our marches and demonstrations, our national and local organizations, all of it is useless if we continue to deny what we know. Acceptance and personal commitment to each other equals life. **Denial equals death.**

Test to Measure HIV in Blood Looks Promising

But HIV Damage to Nervous System Increasing

Washington, DC — A new federal study indicates that despite the use of anti-HIV medications, nervous system disorders in people with HIV are actually increasing in incidence. But scientists also report progress in the development of a test which measures the exact amount of HIV in a person's bloodstream, a test that will help doctors decide the types of therapy that may be most effective at any given time.

Viral Burden Test

Researchers report that a sensitive, rapid test may soon be used to monitor the amount of HIV in a patient's bloodstream, a procedure that will help doctors decide when to give anti-HIV therapy and better gauge its

effectiveness

The test, called the branched DNA assay for HIV-1 infection, may help investigators determine more quickly if experimental HIV therapies are effective. Currently, clinical trials can take years as scientists often rely on the development of AIDS-related infections or even death to judge new treatments.

The report on the new test appears in the November issue of the Journal of Infectious Diseases. It's the first paper to discuss the use of the assay to measure changes in the amount of HIV in a person's blood — his or her viral burden — in response to anti-viral drugs or immune-boosting therapy at any given time.

Many physicians believe monitoring a patient's HIV viral burden is important because of the apparent correlation between viral burden and the severity of disease: sicker patients generally have more virus than those with less advanced disease, and research suggests that reducing viral burden with anti-retroviral drugs delays the progression of HIV disease.

"The ability to measure levels of HIV in the blood is critical because changes in the amount of circulating virus may predict a patient's clinical course," according to Dr. H. Clifford Lane of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID). "The branched DNA assay is a sensitive, reproducible and rapid method for

evaluating HIV viral burden at all stages of infection."

The assay, developed by the Chiron Corporation, is currently available only for research use. It offers advantages over other measures of viral burden. For instance, blood culturing is laborintensive, and results can vary from lab to lab. The p24 antigen assay, a measure of HIV-produced proteins, may not accurately gauge the amount of viable HIV in a person's blood.

The branched DNA assay, on the other hand, is relatively simple to perform and yields reproducible results. It measures the amount of RNA, the genetic material of HIV, in virus particles

in a patient's blood.

"By measuring changes in virus levels, it may prove possible to plan effective, individualized treatment strategies for patients, and to rapidly determine the minimal effective doses of new drugs," said Dr. Lane.

"With virologic measurements such as the branched DNA assay, clinicians may be able to distinguish between patients likely to remain stable and thus not in need of immediate therapy, and patients whose increasing viral loads suggest that therapy is indicated."

"For patients already on therapy, the branched DNA assay reveals changes in virus levels in response to therapeutic intervention," said Dr. Lane. "An increase in viral load might show that the therapy is losing effectiveness, and that a switch to another therapy is indicated."

But Dr. Lane cautioned that "Additional work is needed to validate these ideas before such approaches can become part of routine clinical practice."

Nerve Damage


In other news, a study sponsored by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases has found that despite the widespread use of anti-retroviral drugs, HIV-related damage to the nervous system is increasing among AIDS patients.

The findings stem from an analysis of seven years of data on 2,641 HIV-infected men enrolled in NIAID's Multicenter AIDS Cohort Study and are published in the October issue of the

journal Neurology

The study indicates that rates of five HIV-related neurologic conditions increased among the men from 1985 to 1992. Those conditions are: toxoplasmosis, a parasitic infection affecting the brain; cryptococcal meningitis, a fungal infection; lymphoma of the brain, a cancer; multifocal leukoencephalopathy, a viral infection; and neuropathy, nerve degeneration that weakens a person's limbs.

Dementia, the progressive deterioration of thinking, behavior and motor skills that afflicts some AIDS patients, did not increase in frequency. But dementia and neuropathy were found to occur three times more often than the



other conditions in the men studied.

conditions Of the neurologic monitored between 1988-92, the greatest annual rate of increase - 50% occurred for neuropathy, with 138 of the

men developing the disorder.

AIDS dementia rarely developed before other AIDS-defining illnesses and occurred with an initial AIDS diagnosis in 3% of the men. The men had a 7% annual rate of developing dementia during the two years after an AIDS diagnosis, totaling 151 cases between 1988-92

In observing the increases of the four other conditions, scientists found the fastest rise in incidence, 47% per year, forlymphoma. Leukoencephalopathy had the second highest rate increase at 24%

The increase in incidence rates of central nervous system opportunistic infections among the men may stem from their use of anti-retroviral therapy, which allows them to survive longer with more severely suppressed immune systems and lengthens the vulnerable period for brain infection," according to Helena Bacellar, senior analyst at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health.

More awareness, better diagnostic capabilities and improved follow-up by health care professionals may have contributed to the observed increases in

the illnesses as well.

Most neurologic diseases noted in the study occurred among men with 100 or fewer CD4+ cells (T-helper cells) per cubic milimeter of blood. T-cells are the crucial immune cells targeted by HIV. However, neuropathy sometimes occurred at T-cell counts above 500 or was induced by the anti-retroviral therapy itself. This new data, along with other neurologic studies, suggests that despite therapy, HIV indirectly damages central nervous system parts.

studies reported Earlier neurologic conditions related to HIV affect 40 to 60% of AIDS patients, but autopsy examinations found brain

changes in as many as 90%.

The neurologic illnesses associated with AIDS are important, not just because of their frequency, but because they complicate caring for AIDS patients, add to the severity of advanced HIV infection, and shorten the survival time after the onset of AIDS," Dr. Justin C. McArthur commented.

The results of this study emphasize despite the effectiveness of pre-AIDS prophylactic medications to temporarily prevent certain HIV-related opportunistic infections of the central nervous system, new and better drugs and therapeutic strategies directed specifically at HIV must be developed."

On one brighter note, drug therapy appeared to help prevent toxoplasmosis and cryptococcal meningitis. From 1991-92, men with 200 or fewer CD4+ cells who took antimicrobials were 2.6 times less likely to develop

Women's Health Briefs

Saturated Fat Linked to Ovarian Cancer

Washington, DC - The results of the first large scale study of how diet may impact ovarian cancer has revealed that eating ten grams of saturated fat a day may raise a woman's risk of ovarian cancer by 20%.

But the study, published in The Journal of the National Cancer Institute, also found that eating just two small servings of vegetables a day could offset the risk of ovarian cancer posed by the high intake of saturated fat.

Ovarian cancer strikes 20,000 American women each year. Up to 12,500 women die from the disease, largely because it is hard to detect in its early stages and difficult to treat when found in its advanced form.

The study, conducted at the University of Toronto, compared the eating habits of 450 women who had recently been diagnosed with ovarian cancer to the eating habits of 540 healthy women of similar demographic groupings. For every 10 grams of animal fat a woman ate each day, her risk of ovarian cancer increased 20%. Women who lowered their saturated fat intake by 10 grams per day reduced by 20% their chance of developing ovarian cancer.

There's more and more evidence that grandmother was right," Dr. Michael Thun of the American Cancer Society told the New York Times. "Eating a diet high in fresh fruits and vegetables and low in fat is a good thing for a variety of illnesses, and now it may be beneficial for ovarian cancer too."

Survey Finds All STDs Transmissible Between Women

West Hollywood, CA - A survey of over 6,000 women conducted by the Wholistic Health for Women Clinic has found that all sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) can be passed between women. The survey is the first longitudinal survey of Lesbians' and Bisexual women's health, and is the largest of its kind ever undertaken.

Small but significant numbers of women reported contracting gonorrhea, chlamydia, syphilis, herpes, human papilloma virus (genital warts), hepatitis, chronic fatigue syndrome and HIV infection from female sexual partners.

"Transmission of STDs between women is certainly not as common as among heterosexuals, but it does happen

and it needs to be take seriously," said Suzanne Gage, the Clinic's Director and a nurse practitioner.

"The implication of these findings is compelling," Gage said. "It validates our nearly ten years of clinical experience in serving and treating Lesbians, as well as over twenty years of my own personal clinic practice in providing health care for Lesbians."

Yearly gynecological exams and screening for STDs among women who have multiple sex partners whose sexual histories they may be unfamiliar with is clearly advisable.

CDC to Open Office of Women's Health

Atlanta, GA - The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention plans to establish a new division called the Office of Women's Health to coordinate all CDC programs that relate to women's health issues.

In announcing the new division. CDC Director Dr. David Satcher said that "The office will ensure that women's health receives the kind of attention and expertise that's needed."

The CDC's decision to open a women's office is part of an overall government effort to respond to criticism by women's health advocates who have complained bitterly that federal health and drug research programs have routinely excluded women.

A change has occurred in the last few years, with Congress approving a record \$620 million for a mammoth survey, the Women's Health Initiative, whose purpose is to identify problem areas in women's health and to monitor the effectiveness of current treatments. Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala has made women's health concerns a priority, and the increased number of women in Congress along with the more aggressive stance of women's health advocates, is finally bringing more attention to women's health concerns.

Three key areas the new CDC Office is expected to focus on are: the promotion of early screening and testing for breast and cervical cancers; the prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases; and stepped-up research into female- controlled

contraception.

Protesters Demand Gender Parity in Drug Trials

Washington, DC — The National ACT UP Women's Network held a raucous protest outside the Food and Drug Administration recently accusing the FDA of excluding women from potentially life-saving experimental drug treatments and demanding gender parity in all future clinical research and drug

Up to 300 protesters attended the noisy rally, with some of them holding up effigies of FDA Commissioner David Kessler and another figure labeled

"White Male Scientists."

Dawn Averitt-Doherty of the AIDS Survival Project reported that only 9.7% of the subjects in the AIDS Clinical Trial Group are women. But the protest was not specifically about exclusion from AIDS drug trials, according to Averitt-Doherty, "but rather the whole history of the FDA and women's access to trials."

"The FDA has never mandated women's involvement in clinical trials. It's time for the FDA to design regulations that absolutely include women in clinical trials and mandate that the pharmaceutical industry do

women-specific studies."

The women activists also demanded that the FDA require labels on vaginal anti-fungal creams to include the message that persistent vaginal yeast infections may be a sign of HIV infection. They said an 800 number that women could call for testing and counseling should also be included.

Can Estrogen Make You Smarter?

Washington, DC — Results of a study of estrogen conducted at the State University of New York at Buffalo suggests that the female hormone may not only protect older women from brittle bones and heart disease, it may make their minds sharper.

Dr. Uriel Halbreich tested 36 postmenopausal women before and after they began estrogen replacement therapy. He measured them for such things as reflexes, memory, hand-eye coordination and the ability to learn new information. He found that after estrogen

therapy began there was a small but statistically significant increase in the mental acuity of the subjects.


Although a larger study is required to support the findings, Dr. Halbreich said: "We showed that estrogen replacement therapy is not only good for osteoporosis and cardio-vascular disease prevention, but also it can improve cognitive function."

I'm a procrastinator by habit, which is probably not a good idea when you're terminally ill. However, I've finally gotten around to the additional information on testosterone and other steroids as I promised several articles ago. Besides the information on testosterone, there currently is a clinical trial on an oral steroid. I'll try and keep you posted on this steroid.

Like many therapies today, the use of steroids, particularly testosterone, has its good points and bad points. In surveying the literature, I have found some consistent patterns from various physicians who are using steroids on their AIDS patients suffering from wasting syndrome. In a breaking news story, a paper was presented at the *Third Annual Symposium on Nutrition and HIV/AIDS*, October 14th in Philadelphia. A two year study on HIV/AIDS patients suffering from the wasting syndrome showed remarkable improvement with daily injections of human growth hormone. Although not available generally at this

Challenging Anti-Cohabitation Laws

Housing discrimination against Gay men and Lesbians is often thought of as overt refusal to rent or sell to someone based on their sexual orientation. A more subtle, yet probably more pervasive, form of discrimination are zoning and occupancy laws restricting the number of unrelated persons who can live together. Because Gay people cannot legally marry, such laws often exclude Gay couples and Gay families from single-family areas.

Legal challenges to these anticohabitation laws have, for the most part, been blocked by a 1974 Supreme Court precedent, Village of Belle Terre v Boraas. In that case, the Court upheld the constitutionality of an anticohabitation law that allowed no more than two unrelated persons to live together in a district zoned for single families. The Court ruled that such zoning laws are rationally related to legitimate municipal interests in controlling population density, traffic, and in providing quiet, open spaces for families.

Amendments to the federal Fair Housing Act in 1988, however, provide a means to challenge anti-cohabitation laws legally. These amendments prohibit housing discrimination based on disability, and require municipalities to make reasonable accommodations in their policies when necessary to afford disabled persons equal opportunity to housing. Some litigants have successfully used these amendments to overcome municipal protestations that group homes cannot be placed in areas zoned for single-family residency because the residents of the group homes are not related to each other. Litigants have argued that refusal to change singlefamily zoning laws to accommodate group homes for the disabled amounts to discrimination against the disabled.

At first blush, whether or not group homes for the disabled must be permitted in areas zoned for single-family

residences does not seem to have any relevance to housing rights for Gay men and Lesbians, except for those disabled with AIDS. Yet as communities learn that single-family neighborhoods do not fall apart when group homes move in, it will become easier for them to accept other households of nonrelated people.

But victory for group homes for the disabled is not assured. The 1988 amendments exempt from the Fair Housing Act municipal ordinances that place reasonable restrictions on the maximum to interpret this exemption. At least one appellate court has ruled that this justifies the exclusion of group homes from single-family districts, while other courts have ruled that anticohabitation laws are not exempt from the 1988 amendments.

The 11th Circuit Court of Appeals, for example, concluded in 1992 (Elliot v City of Athens) that the "maximum number" exemption justified the exclusion of a group home for twelve men who were recovering alcoholics from a single family district. In that case, Athens, Georgia prohibited more than four unrelated persons from living together in a single-family residence, yet placed no limits on the number of related persons who could live together in one residence. The 11th Circuit interpreted the "maximum number" exemption to mean that municipal ordinances limiting the maximum number of unrelated people who can live together is beyond the

reach of the Fair Housing Act amendments.

District Courts in both Virginia and Missouri have refused to follow the 11th Circuit decision. They have interpreted the "maximum number" exemption in the 1988 amendments to mean that while a municipality can place restrictions on the total number of people in a residence, the municipality cannot distinguish between related and unrelated people. They point out that the Congressional history of the 1988 amendments makes it clear that maximum number of restrictions are permitted only if they apply to all occupants. Accordingly, they concluded that municipal have ordinances limiting the maximum number of unrelated people who can live together, but not limiting the maximum number of related people in the same way, are not exempt from the Fair Housing Action amendments.

A 1994 decision by U.S. District Court Judge Catherine Perry in Oxford House-C v City of St. Louis provides a detailed legal analysis of the irrationality of anti-cohabitation laws and exclusion of group homes. The case involved two group homes for recovering and sober alcoholics and addicts, located in large residences in single-family zoning districts. One home had 10 men living in a 5-bedroom house, the other had 12 men living in a 6-bedroom house.

Judge Perry pointed out that under St. Louis' anti-cohabitation law, a related

family of "six or sixteen or twenty-six individuals" could occupy a dwelling, while the city limited the number of unrelated persons who could live together. Her opinion also addressed the misconceptions about group homes that abound, writing, "[A]II scientific studies involving group homes of nine or more demonstrate that such congregate living arrangements have no discernible effect on property values, safety, crime rates, or any other measurable value." Judge Perry also rejected as discriminatory the city's argument that the group homes should have to apply for a variance from the zoning code. She pointed out that the public hearing required before a variance can be granted serves only to stigmatize the persons living in the group home; after all, others do not have to go through a public hearing before moving into a neighborhood.

To the extent that the disabled are successful in wining the right to live in single-family districts, it will be easier to establish group homes for people with AIDS in such districts. In addition, as people living in single-family districts learn to live with group homes, it will become easier, on a political if not a legal level, for Gay men and Lesbians to challenge their exclusion from such






The Journey of Milwaukee's Jewish Immigrants Opens Stiemke Theater Season



"Sex, Drugs, Democracy" Looks at Freedom in Holland

How Did the Dutch Become So Tolerant?

Sex, Drugs and Democracy is a feature-length documentary about freedom in The Netherlands. It explores the tolerance of a country with legalized prostitution, the open sale of marijuana (and the use of harder drugs), government guarantees of housing and jobs for all, a multiracial population and total equality for women as well as Gays and Lesbians.

The 87-minute documentary moves fast. It includes dozens of brief interviews with everyone from prostitutes to police chiefs, feminists to hash dealers, boxers, Buddhists, judges and priests. Everyone sings the praises of their tolerant

homeland.

"Holland is one of the countries where homosexuality is most free," declares a spokesman for Amnesty International, the human rights group based in Amsterdam.

"The right to use drugs is an individual right. It has to do with your body and no government should interfere," says the head of the country's Institute of Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

"Holland is the country with the lowest imprisonment rate in the Western world. It's easy to see that it's so low because we make less sentences, and the idea behind it is that you tolerate more variations in behavior," says a

judge.

An economist: "There is a general welfare program for every member of the Dutch community. They get high quality and relatively cheap universal health care insurance. And the education system is completely free."

A lawyer: "It's very free here. You can say and write and do anything you

want."

Ah, to be Dutch! Ah, to be free! The interviews are accompanied by film footage, much of it focusing on Holland's thriving sex industry and drug trade. While time is taken to explain the positive aspects of both (sex workers are not tied to pimps and their health is monitored; hemp is an ecologically sound alternative to wood and petroleum products and smoking it is a legitimate way to explore one's mind, etc.), much of the footage, especially about the sex industry, seemed gratuitous and lurid to me. A short section on state-sponsored methadone treatment and syringe give-a-ways merely hinted at the more serious drug problems that exist beyond the ubiquitous "coffeehouses" that sell

small bags of weed.

I went to see the film because the promotional material touted its discussion of Gay and Lesbian freedom, but very little is said about us. And maybe I'm being too moralistic, but to briefly mention equal rights for homosexuals while showing pathetic looking drag queens and audience members yanking on a naked dancer's dick is not my idea of serious filmmaking. Mentioning civil rights for Gays and racial minorities in the overall context of images of sex and drugs does little to enhance anyone's understanding of the issues involved.

I saw Sex, Drugs and Democracy at a critics' screening. When the relentless (and grainy) images of sex and drugs finally ended, I said to my colleagues, blurry-eyed: "Gee, freedom sure can be exhausting." Doug Armstrong of the Milwaukee Journal quipped: "I could use a little repression about now."

The one redeeming value for me, which unfortunately was not explored to any depth, was the question of why the Dutch have developed such a tolerant society. The lengthy struggle of the Protestant Dutch against Catholic Spain in the 1600's, the tradition of democratic socialism from the 19th century and the legacy of Nazi occupation and the Holocaust are mentioned fleetingly.

I would have liked a lot more thoughtful background and a lot less sensational imagery. The director, Jonathan Blank, a History major from Columbia University, could have done a much better job.

showing of the movie.

The film itself traces Ginsberg's life from his youthful development and first published works, through his struggle to accept his homosexuality, to his current status as a Grand Old Man of Letters. (Ginsberg is 68.) It details his battles with censors and his friendships with other influential "Beats" like Jack Kerouac, William Burroughs and Lawrence Ferlinghetti.

Many of Ginsberg's colleagues and fellow activists like Burroughs, Timothy Leary, Joan Baez, Ken Kesey, Amiri Baraka and Norman Mailer offer their memories and candid opinions of Ginsberg and his writing. The interviews are mixed with film footage of the earth-shaking events that shaped the Beat Generation, including the anti-war

protests of the 1960's.

The movie also contains first-hand accounts by Ginsberg and passages in which Ginsberg reads from his own work, like Howl and Kaddish. The Life and Times of Allen Ginsberg is a thoughtful and entertaining chronicle of Ginsberg's life and work as well as of the wider artistic community and social movements in which he operated.

Feature Film "Stonewall" Begins Production

New York, NY - Stonewall, a 90-minute feature film about the 1969 Gay rebellion, is currently being filmed in locations around New York City. The project is being funded by the BBC and is directed by Nigel Finch, who previously directed David Leavitt's Lost Language of Cranes. It is being produced by Christine Vachon, who has produced successful Gay/Lesbian films like Go

Fish, Poison and Swoon.

Stonewall relates the stories of a half dozen Gay men who lived in New York at the time of the Stonewall Rebellion. Loosely based on the historical book Stonewall, by Martin Duberman, the film recounts the police harassment, Mafia control, and general oppression faced by Gays and Lesbians

just before Stonewall, and how a handful of drag queens defied the authorities and launched the militant phase of the Gay rights movement.

"This is a feel-good movie with a very powerful message, and the potential to educate millions of people - Gay and straight - about the circumstances that led up to the Stonewall riot," says producer Vachon.

Stonewall is budgeted at \$2 million. It will be broadcast on the BBC and will have a theatrical release in the US and elsewhere possibly as soon as next year. The biggest challenge for the filmmakers has been recreating the entire Sheridan Square area of Greenwich Village as it appeared in the 1960's.

"In the Life" Returns to TV

Milwaukee — In the Life, the groundbreaking TV program about Gays and Lesbians, is back, but in a new form. In The Life ran for two years on Public Television as a half hour show airing eight times a season. This year, the innovative program will be an hour long

and air quarterly.

Series producer Chuck Ignacio and producer John Catania say the change in format was due to the favorable reaction to the *In The Life* special on Stonewall 25. According to Catania, station managers preferred the longer version because it was easier to schedule an hour program than a half hour show. A second reason was money. It's cheaper to make four, one hour programs than it is to make eight, half hour programs. *In The Life* does not get any funding from PBS or the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. Most of the money for the show is raised on a unique membership base made up of viewers.

Milwaukee Premiere

Ignacio and Catania were in Milwaukee at a hastily organized premiere screening of the first hour long In The Life program. Held at the Milwaukee Enterprise Center, the event was sponsored by the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee and GLBC at UWM. An audience of about 20 were urged by Catania to call or write the Milwaukee PBS station (WMVS/WMTV) to show support for In The Life and request a better time slow for the show.

The Fall '94 premiere episode of In The Life highlighted National Coming Out Day with an interview with Amanda Bearse. Two employees from AT&T and HBO describe being out in the workplace. Then the In The Life camera went to A Different Light Bookstore where Minnie Bruce Pratt, Sarah Schulman, and Norman Wong talk about their lives as Gay and Lesbian authors. If that wasn't enough, the camera also went to the Manhattan Theatre Club where playwright Terrence McNally was interviewed. McNally's play Love! Valor! Compassion! features eight Gay characters. Scenes from the play drew quite a few laughs from the audience.

The most interesting segment of the program was on the "two-spirit people," Native American Gays and Lesbians. They told of the rich heritage "two-spirit people" had in Indian culture and how that was changed over time by the white culture. Included in the segment was a

music video called Follow Your Heart's Desire, by Ulali. After the screening, several members of the audience asked if the music was available on compact disc. Catania said he didn't know, but they received the video from the American Indian Community House in New York.

Finally, In The Life interspersed excerpts from a new video, Straight from the Heart, a documentary produced by Dee Mosbacher and Francis Reid. The video profiles parents who have come to understand their Gay and Lesbian children. One segment featured a copy who talked about his daughter, also a cop. A particularly moving segment featured a Christian family who began to question their church's stand on homosexuality.

In The Life airs on Channel 10 (WMVS) on November 17 at 12 midnight.







Openly Gay Country Singer Jeff Miller

A Country Boy Can Survive

For a young country singer, the road to the big time involves two angst-ridden rites of passage: giving up one's day job, and making the big move to Nashville. Having made the first leap four and a half years ago, open Gay country singer, Jeff Miller, recently observed the second anniversary of his move from Southern

California to Nashville.

"Making the adjustment from San Diego to Nashville was initially quite a culture shock," says Miller, "but after two years I find I'm actually starting to like it here and from a business standpoint it was definitely the most intelligent decision I could've made at this stage of my career. As an artist, you grow up real fast here or this town will eat you alive. You go from being a big fish in your home market to just another one of the thousands of dreamers that arrive in Nashville each month hoping to get noticed. Five years on the road had seasoned me enough to know that they wouldn't be waiting for me at the bus station."

People are taking notice of the lanky singer/ songwriter, and West Allis native, who for years has been a major presence on the Gay country music scene. He was recently profiled in the July segment of Network Q, the national Gay video news-magazine. Mainstream America got to meet him in a recent feature on minorities in country music which ran in Gannett newspapers nationwide, including the Tennessean in Nashville.

"I expected some major flack from the Gannett article since it pretty much outed me to the industry here in Nashville but so far it hasn't proved a problem. I was pleasantly surprised that the most significant aftermath of the article turned out to be the constant ribbing by my Gay friends here over Gannett christening me a 'hunky country singer."

His growing recognition has not been without its tribulations and heartaches. "The biggest shock for me was how tough things could get so quickly," explains Miller. "You can't make any money singing in Nashville since there are so many people here willing to give their talents away just to try and get noticed. At a few really hot clubs here, performers actually pay the club to play. This can come as quite a shock to someone used to making a living from

their music. It was obvious that there was no money to be made in Nashville and that I'd have to depend upon my road show for survival and to finance my

recording project."

In the early months of 1994, things finally began to come together for Miller. He took a job stocking shelves all night at a grocery store and spent his days booking and rehearsing his show and perfecting his songwriting for his upcoming debut album. "I worked real hard on the show and developing my own vocal style. After years of singing covers I wasn't sure that I even had one," he laughs. "But now it's paid off and people that haven't seen the show in a while often come up to me afterwards and tell me how blown away they are by how I've matured as an artist. That feels good, real good."

Miller is determined and focused on his career. "I've talked to a lot of artists that have made it here in Nashville and the common thread between all of them is that they never gave up. They'll all admit that talent is just a small part of what it takes to make it here. It's more important to want it so bad that you don't give up during those hard times."

Miller's striking emerald green eyes take on a pensive quality as he leans back on his porch swing, "I'd like to think that the worst is behind me now, but I'm not giving up. If I've learned one thing since I embarked on this journey it's that tough times don't last... but tough people do"

Miller Set to Appear at Club 219

Milwaukee — Openly Gay Country Western Nashville recording artist Jeff Miller makes his Milwaukee debut at Club 219 on Thursday, November 17 for two shows: 10 and 11:30pm. The Thursday night show kicks off an every other Thursday country night at Club 219 hosted by the Shoreline Dancers who will present a country dance show and line dance lessons those evenings. Miller has appeared in Appleton, Madison, and Janesville over the years, but finally comes "home" to Milwaukee. (He's a West Allis native!)

"This is a real departure for 219," said manager Chuck Cicirello. "We've always been a dance bar, but never offered country music until now." To help kick off the twice monthly country dance, "we thought we'd bring in Jeff Miller to start things off right." If the evening builds enough interest, it may become a weekly instead of bi-weekly feature.

The Shoreline dancers will be able to use the stage so the audience can more easily see the demonstrations of line dance technique, and the special dance floor lighting can be utilized to set the mood.

Rude Girls & Outrageous Women By Jennifer Camper Laugh Lines Press pb. \$8.95

A World Without Homosexuals By Jason Ross Road Kill Press Pb \$10

Adding to the ever growing collection of Gay and Lesbian comic books are new entries by Jennifer Camper with Rude Girls and Dangerous Women and A World Without Homosexuals by Jason Ross. Similarly blessed with uniquely queer outlooks on life, deliberately un-politically correct stances on "the issues" and with decidedly irreverent styles, both Ross and Camper eagerly, if not downright gleefully, take no prisoners in their cartoon satires.

Regular readers of In Step over the years are certain to be familiar with Jennifer Camper's collection of Big Mean Sweaty Dykes Just Looking for Trouble. Those unaquainted should not be intimated by Camper's cartoon women gracing the book cover and delve right in... and be prepared to be surprised. By combining truly inspired drawing, some real political savvy and the occasional "out-on-a-limb" viewpoint, Rude Girls and Dangerous Women will make you laugh, shout with anger and tug at your heart, sometimes all in the same cartoon.

Not surprisingly, heterosexual men figure to be high on the list of Camper's favorite targets. In If Men Got Pregnant, Camper has a few fresh twists on this age-old feminist scenario. Less subtle but no less humorous is Het Boys Say Damedest Things (and not surprisingly, the most sexist things). Yet for all easy humor, Camper finds and satirizes with such obvious targets, she will turn around and on the very next page come up with a cartoon like a rather bitter interpretation of Traditional Family Values or the thought-provoking Guilty or Innocent. All told, Camper is a refreshing cartoonist, daring and sexy, pointed and compassionate and definitely queer. Rude Girls and Dangerous Women immediately puts Jennifer Camper into a select group of Gay and Lesbian cartoonists with the likes of Andrea Natalie, Howard Cruise and Alison Bechdel. A must read.

Enjoyable, if not nearly as inspired, is A World Without Homosexuals, Jason Ross's campy satire of a world where homosexuality was outlawed, contributions by Lesbians and Gays eradicated and homosexuals became extinct. With a drawing style that perhaps only Matt Goering (and Jason's Mom) could love, A World Without Homosexuals often falls victim to stereotypical portrayals of Gay men and Lesbians that are quite simplistic and rather cliched. Certainly we expect that a world without Gay men will be a black & white world lacking designers and playwrights. Yet occasionally, Ross scratches beneath the surface, cleverly finding the humor in such outrageous depictions as, for example, a hilarious group of "Homo-less Poodles" (who will "fetch 4 food") or the one straight Chippendale dancer. Although the humor in many of the cartoons falls a bit flat,

there is enough potential in A World


