#### **Helms Introduces Legislation Targeting Gay Workers**

#### Gingrich Says **Employers** Should Be Allowed to Discriminate

Washington, DC - In the first volley of anti-Gay prejudice to spew forth from the Republican controlled 104th Congress, Sen. Jesse Helms (D-NC) has introduced two bills which promote discrimination against federal workers who are Gay or Lesbian while new House Majority Leader Newt Gingrich has declared that employers should be allowed to discriminate against Gays.

"This is the first indication that Jesse Helms intends to use his newly acquired power in Congress to pursue his anti-Gay obsession, a clear breach of the Republican promise to address issues that are important to Americans," said Elizabeth Birch, the new Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "Voters who changed the face of Congress have overwhelmingly rejected discriminatory measures of the ilk that Helms is proposing."

One Helms bill, S.23, will give to government employees who voice prejudice against Gay and Lesbian co-workers a special exemption from workplace anti-discrimination policies.

Another bill, S.25, targets Gay and Lesbian employees for discrimination by denying their employee organizations the same rights to free association and free speech guaranteed to other employee affinity groups such as those set up by African- American, Hispanic or female workers.

There are currently 22 affinity groups for Gay and Lesbian federal workers in various government agencies and departments. The Commerce, Interior, Education, Energy, Treasury and Health and Human Services Departments as well as the Environmental Protection Agency, the Library of Congress and other agencies have chapters of GLOBE, which stands for Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual Employees.

Following a growing trend in the private sector, at least 17 major federal agencies have included Gays and Lesbians along with other workers in non-discrimination policies. Helms's proposals will put a huge loophole in those protections and place limits on the activities of Gay/Lesbian affinity groups,

prohibiting them from advocating on their own behalf.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund believes that Helms's proposals will "promote hate speech and discrimination against federal workers."

The powerful new House Majority Leader, Newt Gingrich (R-GA), has not yet endorsed Helms's proposals, but statements he made in an interview with journalist Robert Novak on < >> Meet the Press<> in December do not auger well for Gay rights in this Congress.

In that interview, Gingrich said, "I think that your private sexual behavior should be private, period. I'm against any law which gives you legal status based on your sexual behavior.'

"So you think then that a businessman should have the right not to hire a Gay person?" Novak asked

"Absolutely. Absolutely," Gingrich

#### ENDA is Needed

The HRCF's Birch, who was formerly an executive with the Apple Corporation, cited the private sector in her appeal for justice: "The federal government has only recently been catching up to corporate America, where half of the Fortune 1000 companies have non-discrimination policies protecting their Gay and Lesbian employees."

"A growing number of successful corporations also have Gay employee groups and diversity training," Birch continued. "If successful companies like Apple and Xerox provide equal protection their employees, the federal government would do well to follow their example.

HRCF polled members of Congress last year regarding their own employment practices, and found broad bipartisan support for the principle that Gay and Lesbian people should not be singled out for discrimination in the workplace. Eighty-two Republicans and 231 Democrats - including majorities of both parties in the Senate - confirmed that they do not themselves discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation.

In addition, a poll of voters after last November's election revealed that majorities of Republicans (64%), Democrats (77%) and Independents (71%) agree that Gays and Lesbians should not be subject to unfair job bias.

Still, no overall federal law protects people from being fired or otherwise discriminated against in the workplace on the basis of sexual orientation.

This injustice was brought to light on January 12 when an appeals court in Pennsylvania upheld a jury's decision that no law prohibited Demuth

Management Consultants from firing Daniel Miller after company owners learned Miller was Gay. As an added insult, Miller was ordered to reimburse the company \$110,000 for forming his own management firm after his termination in violation of a clause in his contract with his former employer.

A bill in Congress could outlaw this kind of blatant job bias. The Employment Non-Discrimination Act, or ENDA, introduced in the Senate last year by Ted Kennedy (D-MA) and in the House by openly Gay members Barney Frank and Gerry Studds (both D-MA), would outlaw job-related sexual orientation discrimination nationwide.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund has activated its 5,000 member Advocacy Network to flood the Capitol with calls and letters opposing the Helms proposals and encouraging support for ENDA instead. Gays and Lesbians and their supporters are encouraged to contact their representatives in opposition to S.23 and S.25 and in support of ENDA, which is number S.2238 in the Senate, HR.4636 in the

#### Joe Steffan Decides Not to Appeal Military Case

#### Suit Against New Policy Expected to be I andmark

Washington DC - Joseph Steffan, who suffered a major blow last November when an appeals court rejected his suit challenging his 1987 dismissal by the Navy, has abandoned his quest for a further appeal. Instead, Gay rights attorneys are focusing on a class action suit in New York which challenges the new Clinton- era restrictions on homosexuals in the military, a suit whose final outcome is likely to be definitive.

Steffan's decision to halt further court action was a difficult but pragmatic one. He had said all along he would fight to the finish and felt confident the Supreme Court would ultimately rule in his favor, reinstating him as a

commissioned officer.

But in the past year, the legal fight over the Pentagon's ban on Gays has shifted away from the old restrictions to the newly revised "Don't ask, don't tell" policy endorsed by President Clinton and

ratified by Congress in 1993.

The Clinton administration signalled its indifference to defending the old policy when it decided not to pursue an appeal in Keith Meinhold's case. Last year, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled the old anti-Gay unconstitutional and ordered Meinhold's reinstatement. A federal court also ordered that Colonel Margarethe Cammermeyer, who was ousted under the old rules, be reinstated. Both Meinhold and Cammermeyer are currently on active duty.

Government attorneys and, now, civil rights advocates have clearly decided to give priority to the major case challenging the new policy, a class action suit called Able v. USA.

#### Able v. USA

Able v. USA was filed last March in federal court in Brooklyn on behalf of six service members, ranging from a lieutenant colonel to a petty officer. All of the plaintiffs wish to continue to serve their country, without fear of investigation or discharge based on their sexual orientation.

The suit challenges the 1993 federal law and Defense Department "Don't ask, don't tell" guidelines. The plaintiffs are represented by attorneys from the American Civil Liberties Union and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education

In briefs filed with the court, the ACLU and Lambda claim that the statute and regulations create a system under which all Gay and Lesbian service members are not judged on their fitness or ability to serve, but instead are subject discharge or denied entrance altogether because of the perceived prejudices of others.

They argue that the restrictions violate the Constitution's equal protection clause because they punish Gay and Lesbian service members for engaging in speech or behavior that is otherwise completely permissible for heterosexual service members. This distinction serves no legitimate and rational government or military interest, the plaintiffs claim, but is based solely on the presumed prejudices of straight service members and civilians.

The papers further argue that the statute and regulations "burden, chill and circumscribe" all public and private speech that would tend to identify service members as Gay men or Lesbians in violation of the First Amendment and deny Gay and Lesbian service members their rights to freedom of expression and

association.

Shortly after the suit was filed, Judge Eugene Nickerson issued a preliminary injunction preventing the government from initiating any discharge proceedings against the plaintiffs until a full hearing of their case is completed. On January 3, a federal appeals panel extended that injunction for another three months during which time the court has been ordered to schedule a hearing in the case.

ACLU and Lambda attorneys are happy with that decision because it means the case will be heard soon. But they are also anxious because they now have limited time in which to hone their arguments and prepare for the historic

In its briefs, the government seemed to rely on the argument that since allegations of homosexuality are subject to a "rebuttable presumption" by the person under investigation the regulations do not violate free speech and equal protection guarantees.

An attorney for Lambda challenged that contention, noting that because the law extends the "rebuttable presumption" only to Gavs and not to heterosexuals who might be suspected of engaging in sodomy, it is still inherently

discriminatory.

Government attorneys are also likely to cite their oft-repeated rationale for the Pentagon's special policy on Gays: that it is necessary to maintain the good order and morale of the military. Many judges have deferred to the military's judgment in that regard in the past, and the Pentagon's fears are now embedded. thanks to Bill Clinton, in federal law.

In Step will report on the progress of Able v. USA when it is argued in court in the next few months.

#### STATE News Briefs

#### Tammy Baldwin Invited to Meeting at White House

Madison - State Rep. Tammy Baldwin has been invited to attend a meeting with White House officials on February 24 as part of a delegation of the country's openly Gay and Lesbian

elected officials.

Baldwin received the invite from San Francisco Supervisor Susan Leal who had been appointed by President Clinton to arrange a White House meeting with Gay and Lesbian officials. The officials hope they will meet directly with the President, but have planned a series of meetings with other administration officials and Congressional leaders as

Leal's letter proposed meetings with Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala to focus on Lesbian health issues and re-authorization of the Ryan White CARE Act, with Attorney General Janet Reno to discuss federal enforcement of hate crimes laws, with AIDS czar Patricia Fleming to confer about AIDS issues. and

Congressional leaders to lobby for the **Employment Non-Discrimination Act and** other legislation.

The Gay and Lesbian elected leaders plan to meet February 23 to set their agenda for meeting with White House officials and to lobby members of Congress. They are inviting openly Gay Congressmen Barney Frank, Gerry Studds and Wisconsin's own Steve Gunderson to the meeting to advise

If all goes according to plan, "Tammy will definitely go to the White House on the 24th," said her aide, Mike Verveer. "And depending on the [state] legislative schedule, she hopes to be there on the 23rd as well."

#### PrideFest '95 Set for June 10-11 in Veterans Park

Milwaukee - Wisconsin PrideFest '95 is scheduled for the weekend of June 10-11 at Veterans Park on the shore of Lake Michigan. PrideFest will unfold at the same site as last year, just north of

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the War Memorial Art Museum.

PrideFest officials had approached World Festivals Inc. to negotiate use of Henry Maier Festival Park, site of Summerfest and Milwaukee's other famous ethnic festivals. But Summerfest staff are planning to upgrade the park's grounds, and Board members said they would need the weekend of June 10-11 to finish improvements before the start of Summerfest.

A Task Force of the Summerfest Board offered to allow PrideFest to share the grounds with the Miller Ride for the Arts on June 3- 4, but for a variety of logistical reasons PrideFest declined. An option to hold PrideFest on the Summerfest grounds in August or September was also declined.

PrideFest co-chair Bill Meunier was philosophical about the outcome: "We already have a wonderful site that we know works well for us. The Summerfest grounds would offer many advantages. We remain committed to moving the festival there...We will have to wait until

1996."

#### Businessman Sues Company Over Sexual Harassment

Ashland — The Wisconsin State Journal reports that a businessman has filed a federal lawsuit against the C.G. Bretting Manufacturing Co. for allegedly failing to take action to protect him from sexual harassment by a male customer.

Paul Wenner, who was the manager of electrical engineering at the Ashland company, says in the suit that his employer not only failed to protect him from the harassment but fired him eight days after he complained about it. The suit also alleges that C.G. Bretting refused to comply with a clause in Wenner's contract promising to purchase his home in the event his job was discontinued.

Wenner worked at C.G. Bretting since November, 1992 and had earned several performance bonuses for his exceptional work there. He is seeking compensation for lost wages, legal fees and pain and suffering. He also seeks additional punitive damages from the company and a public notice that it has violated the Civil Rights Acts of 1964 and 1991.

Numerous suits have been filed nationwide charging same-gender sexual harassment on the job. They have met with mixed results (see National News Briefs). Wenner's case is somewhat different because most cases involve harassment by a boss or co-worker, not a customer or client. New legal ground could be broken over the liability of

business owners in that regard.

Wenner is married with two children. Since his termination, he has moved to Slinger. He currently works at Banner Welding Systems in Germantown.

#### Verveer to Run Unopposed for Madison Council Seat

Madison — Mike Verveer, Legislative Aide to State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, will be the sole name on the ballot April 4 when 4th District residents choose their new alderman. The filing deadline for candidates was January 3, and Verveer was the only individual to submit nomination papers.

Verveer told In Step: "Unless there is a massive write-in campaign, it looks like I will be succeeding Ricardo Gonzalez as 4th District alderman. I'm especially glad we'll be keeping the seat

lavender."

The aldermanic position is only part-time, so Verveer expects to remain on Baldwin's staff as well. Because his election chances look solid, Verveer is using the time between now and his swearing-in on April 18 to familiarize himself with City Council procedures and to more closely examine pressing municipal issues.

#### Rick Beaudoin, Noted Therapist Dies of Heart Attack

Milwaukee — Richard Beaudoin, who was Clinical Coordinator of Gay and Lesbian Mental Health Services at Sinai Samaritan Medical Center in Milwaukee, passed away January 6 after suffering a heart attack. Beaudoin was 38.

Professional colleagues, clients and friends gathered for a memorial service at St. Paul's Episcopal Church January 11. Beaudoin had been an active member of the church, serving on the committee that chose its first woman

Beaudoin was recalled as a bridge-builder and advocate for Gays and Lesbians. His colleague Gary Hollander told the Milwaukee Journal: "At a large medical center, it might be easy to assume that Gay, Lesbian and HIV issues would have a broad acceptance. The truth is they only get a broad acceptance if the ambassadors who are doing that work are both strong advocates and patient people. Rick was both of those."

Beaudoin was working toward a doctorate in Psychology at UW-Milwaukee and specialized in developing support systems for Gay and Lesbian

youth.

Milwaukee — The Washington-based AIDS Action Council, the nation's most powerful AIDS lobby, has chosen Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, to once again chair its Public Policy Committee. Nelson was also reelected to a two year term on the group's

Board of Directors.

Nelson will lead the Public Policy Committee during a time of political change in Washington. "We have an enormous challenge to advance an AIDS agenda that meets the needs of a worsening national AIDS epidemic yet is acceptable to a far more conservative Congress," Nelson commented.

He said the priority for the national AIDS agenda in 1995 is the re-authorization of the Ryan White CARE Act and AIDS housing programs, advocating for a greater commitment by the Centers for Disease Control to empower local communities to conduct effective HIV prevention programs, and working to increase Congressional appropriations for AIDS prevention, care and research generally.

"I am honored that my colleagues in the national AIDS community have again asked me to lead this important AIDS Policy Committee," said Nelson. "We will need to organize and mobilize and advocate like we have never done

before."

#### Milwaukee Police Commission Holds Meeting Jan. 31

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission is hosting an open meeting to obtain public comment on its controversial Citizen Complaint Process which is currently being reviewed and revised.

#### NATIONAL News Briefs

West Palm Beach Voters Retain Gay Rights Law

West Palm Beach, FL — On January 10, voters in West Palm Beach, Florida rejected an attempt by right wing forces to turn back Gay rights. Residents voted by a 5 % to 44% margin to retain the sexual orientation clause in their city's human rights ordinance. The law forbids discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations.

The repeal effort was led by members of the Christian Coalition and the American Family Association. Its spokesperson was Sarah Brack Nuckles, a member of the City Commission, who seemed stunned by the loss. She denied the issue was discrimination and asked, "Why are we passing laws that promote and validate a lifestyle that causes untold deaths and costs?"

A coalition of groups calling itself Citizens for Fairness organized successfully against the repeal effort. "This is a victory for the fundamental value that all people should be able to live their lives free of discrimination," said spokesman Richard Giorgio.

Giorgio said the vote "takes the wind from the sails of the radical right political groups trying to spread their divisive agenda throughout Florida and across the country. They wanted a wave to sweep through Florida, but it stopped in West Palm Beach."

Supreme Court to Rule on St. Pat's Controversy

Washington, DC — The US Supreme Court has agreed to hear an

appeal brought by organizers of Boston's St. Patrick's Day Parade who want to exclude a LesBiGay Irish group from participating in the annual event. The arguments are scheduled for April, so the court's intervention will not affect this year's celebration.

Last year, the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court ruled in favor of the Irish-American Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Group. It said the organization had the legal right to participate because of the state's public accommodations law, which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation.


Furious with the court's decision, the South Boston Allied War Veterans

Council cancelled the parade last year rather than allow the Gay group to march. It then filed an appeal with the US Supreme Court.

The Veteran's Council argues that as sponsor of a privately- funded religious event, it has the First Amendment right not to be associated with individuals whose philosophy is "unwanted and antithetical" to its own purposes. The State court rejected that contention, labeling the St. Pat's Parade "an open, recreational event" without a particular message.

A similar controversy has raged in New York City for years. But there, a federal court ruled that the St. Pat's

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Parade had been organized for decades by "Roman Catholic men of Irish descent" with a specific religious Ancient Order purpose. The Hibernians was allowed to exclude the Irish Gays, who have held protest marches each year since then. (New York State also lacks a Gay rights law.)

This year, anti-Gay Archbishop John Cardinal O'Connor will be Grand Marshal of the Big Apple's parade, so protests are likely to be quite lively. Of his role, O'Connor deadpanned: "There will be some, I'm sure, who will not be pleased."

Diplomatic Post Denied to Gay Man Washington, DC - D

Debate continues to swirl over exactly whose prejudice caused the Clinton administration to renege on its plan to name James C. Hormel, a longtime Democratic activist and an openly Gay man, ambassador to Fiji.

Sources close to the White House told the Washington Blade that Clinton was planning for some time to name Hormel to the post in Fiji. But Clinton advisers got worried after Republican gains in the November elections, fearing a protracted confirmation battle over the Gay nominee in the Senate.

At about the same time, Clinton advisers learned that Fiji has strict laws against homosexuality. Offenders can be imprisoned for up to 14 years. The administration apparently decided that naming Hormel to the Fiji post might be perceived as less than diplomatic.

While Gay leaders Clinton's decision to nix the appointment, Hormel exhibited his diplomatic flair. He told the New York Times: "There have been at least two dozen significant appointments. That's two dozen more than any administration up to now. Someone like me could not even have been considered for a position in the State Department before this administration.

#### Federal Workers May Be Granted Partners' Leave

Washington, DC Washington Blade reports that a new rule issued by the US Office of Personnel Management gives the green light to Gay and Lesbian federal workers to use sick leave to attend to the medical needs of domestic partners.

The rule was published in the December 2 Federal Register. Though it does not specifically use the term "domestic partner," experts say its broadened definition of "family" includes the unmarried partners of both Gay and straight government employees.

The rule defines family to include spouses, parents, children, brothers and sisters and their spouses, and "any IN STEP ▼ Jan.19-Feb.1,1995 ▼ Page 8

individual related by blood or affinity whose close association with the employee is the equivalent of a family

relationship."

The Office of Personnel Management indicated it expanded the definition of family to match the new definition incorporated into a law approved by Congress last year. District of Columbia Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton, a longtime liberal and former chair of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, responsible for having the new language put into the bill.

She said at the time: "This is the first time I'm aware that the domestic partners of federal employees will be officially recognized by a federal statute. For that reason, this new law is a small but revolutionary step that I hope and believe will be replicated in more and more laws in the future."

Low Arrest Rate for Those Who Kill Gays

New York, NY - A survey by anti-violence groups nationwide has revealed that at least 151 bias-related homicides of Gay men and Lesbians occurred in 29 states during 1992 and 1993. The findings indicated that the murders were often gratuitously violent and that the percentage of crimes solved is lower than for other murders.

While % of all homicides in 1993 were cleared through arrests of alleged perpetrators, arrests were made in only 51% of the cases evaluated in the two-year study of Gay-related murders.

Another alarming element was the excessive amount of violence used in the murders of Gays. Sixty percent of the 151 victims were subjects of "overkill," defined as four or more gunshot or stab wounds, the repeated use of blunt objects or the use of more than one murder weapon. Many criminologists agree that hate crimes are characterized by extreme brutality.

We have to ask the local police and the FBI to take this much more seriously than they have been taking it," Rep.

Jerrold Nadler (D-NY) commented.

But New York Assemblywoman Deborah Glick said the violence did not occur in a vacuum. "We've seen a rise in the hostile rhetoric that justifies - to the ignorant, uneducated or fearful reason why it's okay to physically assault Lesbians and Gay men."

Judge Says Same-Gender Harassment Not Illegal

Baltimore, MD - In a decision that dramatizes how vulnerable to, discrimination Gays and Lesbians are in the workforce, a federal judge ruled in late December that no federal statute prohibits same-gender sexual

harassment on the job.

In so ruling, Judge Alexander Harvey II dismissed a suit filed by David Hopkins, a former employee of Baltimore Gas and Electric, who said a male supervisor had repeatedly approached him with sexually suggestive comments and unwelcome physical advances. While such behavior was undoubtedly unpleasant, said the judge, Hopkins had no grounds for suing because no federal law prohibits such harassment.

Lee Hoshall, an attorney with the Maryland Human Relations Commission, expressed shock at the ruling and vowed: "This agency will continue to investigate and prosecute cases of same-sex harassment as long as it is harassment based on a person's sex, whether it is a male harassing a female or a male harassing a male.'

Award-Winning Historian John **Boswell Dies** 

New Haven, CT - John Boswell, whose books and lectures raised the consciousness of fellow scholars and the public alike about the history of homosexuality, succumbed to AIDS complications on December 24. He was 47 years old.

Boswell's 1980 book Christianity, Social Tolerance and Homosexuality won the American Book Award for History. It is esteemed as a revolutionary book because it investigated, in greater depth than ever before, homosexuality as it was perceived and as it actually existed in the Middle Ages. The book's rigorous scholarship gave credibility to the newly emerging field of Gay and Lesbian studies.

Just last year, Boswell published Same-Sex Unions in Premodern Europe. He contended that a close study of old manuscripts reveals that the church by the 12th century actually endorsed ceremonies consecrating same-sex unions.

Boswell was born in Boston, obtained his doctorate from Harvard and began teaching at Yale in 1975. He helped organize Yale's Gay and Lesbian Studies Center and became chairman of the History Department in 1990. Boswell spoke 17 languages and, in addition to his constant research, was an extremely popular teacher.

"I regard him as one of the major innovative figures in Gay and Lesbian scholarship," said Gay historian Martin Duberman. "John was very brave and pioneering. And very brilliant."

#### Also on the Newswire...

Seattle, WA — After years of litigation, a Gay couple has finally been allowed to adopt a special needs child they had initially brought into their home for foster care. When the birth mother learned the child was placed with Gays, she sued to regain the parental rights she had earlier abandoned, but the state Supreme Court refused to hear her appeal. "I'm living here forever," four-year-old Gailen said of his new parents, Ross and Luis Lopton.

Pierre, SD — The South Dakota Supreme Court has ruled that a divorced woman who lives with her Lesbian lover can retain custody of her two children despite her ex-husband's objections. The court cited the children's stated preference to live with their mother and noted that there was no evidence of harmful effects from her care.

San Francisco, CA — The San Francisco Board of Supervisors unanimously passed an ordinance banning discrimination against transvestites, transsexuals and cross-dressers. It adds "gender identity" to the classifications of people protected from discrimination in housing, jobs and

public accommodations.

Washington, DC — Colorado Attorney General Gale Norton filed an appeal with the US Supreme Court in December, asking the high court to reverse the Colorado Supreme Court's decision declaring that state's anti-Gay Amendment 2 unconstitutional. Gay advocates are confident the high court will sustain the ruling, dealing a mortal blow to other anti-Gay referendums.

Laurel, MS — The trial of Marvin McClendon for the murders of two Gay men in rural Mississippi is scheduled to begin January 30. Judge Billy Landrum decided to reserve judgment on whether the results of post-mortem HIV tests on the victims will be allowed as evidence. The defense apparently wants to rationalize the killings as self-defense.

Washington, DC — The National Law Journal has named openly Gay Commerce Department official Bruce Lehman Lawyer of the Year. Lehman, who was born and raised in Wisconsin, is Commissioner of US Patents and has won praise for his knowledge and expertise in intellectual property rights and patent law.

New York, NY — The Joyce Mertz-Gilmore Foundation has given a \$300,000 grant to the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, which will use the money to support its transition from a loose network of chapters into a strong national group. The Mertz-Gilmore Foundation gave other Gay groups, a total of \$1.3 million last year.

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#### INTERNATIONAL News Briefs

#### Same-Gender Marriages Now Legal in Sweden

Stockholm — As of January 1, Sweden became the third nation in the world to legally recognize same-gender marriages. Denmark was the first to adopt Gay marriage in 1989, and Norway followed just last year. Almost 3,000 Danish Gay and Lesbian couples have wed.

The first couple to tie the knot in a civil ceremony in Sweden were Hans Jonsson, 42, and his partner Sven Olav Jansson, 58. Within days, another dozen Gay and Lesbian couples were married. Stockholm Gays and Lesbians held a rally to celebrate on January 5.

The Swedish Parliament approved same-gender marriages last June by a vote of 171-141 with 5 abstentions. The law gives Gay and Lesbian couples all the rights of marriage except for the right to a church wedding, the ability to adopt children and access to artificial insemination.

When the Gay marriage law was passed, Swedish Prime Minister Carl Bildt said: "We accept homosexual love as equivalent to heterosexual. Love is an important force to personal as well as social development and should therefore not be denied."

Israeli Court Recognizes Gay Couples

Tel Aviv — The Israeli Supreme Court ruled late last year that El Al, the Israeli national airline, must provide free tickets to the partner of a Gay flight attendant just as it does to the spouses of its married employees. The high court's recognition of Gay couples may have wider application in other areas in which Gays face discrimination.

The case had been in arbitration and litigation for five years. Jonathan

Danilovich sued El Al after the airline refused to grant his partner a free ticket. The case finally reached the Supreme Court when El Al appealed a regional labor court's decision in favor of Danilovich

Supreme Court Justice Aharon Barak based the ruling on an amendment to Israel's Basic Law for Equal Rights in the Workplace which prohibits sexual orientation bias. He wrote: "The purpose of this benefit [the free ticket] is not the strengthening of the legal institution of marriage, and its denial [to Danilovich] is clear and blunt discrimination, and a violation of the principle of equality."

Amit Kama, a spokesman for Israel's Gay rights group, Society for the Protection of Personal Rights, told UPI: "On the national level, Israeli society took a huge step forward in regards to its treatment of minorities...On the homosexual level, it is very important that we are treated equally, and that the utmost institution in our country acknowledges our full rights for equality."

Australia Adopts Sexual Privacy Bill

Canberra — In December, the Australian Senate ratified an earlier decision by the House of Representatives and voted in support of a sexual privacy bill which covers the entire nation. The law was sought by Gay and Lesbian activists hoping to override the punitive sodomy law still enforced in the Australian state of Tasmania.

The Tasmanian legislature had refused to revise or repeal its sodomy statute, which mandated prison sentences for those found guilty of homosexual acts. A committee of the United Nations had ruled that Tasmania's sodomy law violated human rights.

The Tasmanian Gay and Lesbian Rights Group hailed passage of the new law guaranteeing privacy in sexual matters. It was approved the day before International Human Rights Day, which commemorates the adoption of the U.N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1950.

A spokesman for the Gay group told the Associated Press: "We are rightly proud that we have brought this issue to the attention of the country, instigated federal intervention to correct an obvious human rights abuse, and created the conditions for coalition support for our rights."

While the new federal law nullifies enforcement of Tasmania's sodomy law, it remains on the books. Activists are committed to fully excising the language of the law from the statute books.

#### Asian Gays Hold Historic Meeting in India

Bombay — The first-ever conference on Gay rights in South Asia was held at an undisclosed location near Bombay December 27- 31, drawing about 70 people from India, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Pakistan and Nepal. Organizers were forced to keep the conference private because of threats of violence from Hindu fundamentalists who believe homosexuality is immoral.

The conference decided one priority is to attempt to overturn India's punitive sodomy law. The law provides for up to ten years in prison for those found guilty of "carnal intercourse against the order of nature." Gays in India's prisons are frequently required to perform hard labor and are subjected to other abuses.

"We are not asking for legalizing homosexuality yet," Ashok Row Kawi told the Associated Press. "But it should not remain a criminal offense."

India's Parliament is dominated by conservatives, so the chances for sodomy law repeal are slim. The Gay activists are aware they must move forward with caution. They also called upon scholars and historians to research Gay and Lesbian literature and subcultures in India's past. Such education is needed, said Kawi, to "tell students that homosexuality existed in ancient India."

Kawi estimates there may be as many as 50 million Gays in India. But, bowing to religious and cultural traditions, many of them live closeted lives and marry opposite-gender partners.



#### **VALENTINE'S DAY MESSAGES**

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#### Aussie State Forbids Insemination for Lesbians

Darwin — The legislature of Australia's Northern Territory has passed a law restricting Lesbians and other unmarried women from access to state-sponsored artificial insemination and in-vitro fertilization (IVF) programs.

The restriction was suggested by the Territory's Health Minister after publicity surfaced about an unmarried heterosexual woman who had availed herself of the government-funded medical service. The initial rationale for restricting access was to curb state expenses for artificial fertilization procedures, but Attorney General Fred Finch revealed a moral purpose at the time the law was passed.

Finch said: "The community, like the Territory government, believes that the best possible relationship for a child to be born into is a stable, loving relationship between a man and a woman. We do not believe IVF services should be generally available to single women or Lesbian couples."

# Also Around the World...

Ottawa — Thirty-two-year old Real Menard, who represents a district in Montreal, Quebec, has become the second member of the 295-seat Canadian Parliament to declare that he is Gay. He joins Svend Robinson who is a representative from British Columbia. Menard came out last fall after another member of Parliament made a homophobic speech attacking Gays.

Oslo — Not to be outdone by the Canadians, a second member of the Norwegian Parliament has come out as a Gay man. But Anders Hornslien apparently came out reluctantly after activists threatened to "out" him in the Gay newspaper Blikk. Hornslien now joins his openly Gay colleague John-Arne Balto in the Norwegian Parliament, called the Stortinget.

Geneva — The World Health Organization reported on January 3 that the official number of AIDS cases worldwide has exceeded one million, although it is believed that due to under-reporting and misdiagnoses the real number may be more than 4 million. More than 70% of the AIDS cases are in Africa, 18% in North and South America, and the rest in Europe, Asia and the Pacific.

London — Late last year, the militant Gay group OutRage released 55 helium-filled condoms during Sunday Mass at a London cathedral to protest the Vatican's opposition to condoms and AIDS education. The activists chanted "Condoms stop AIDS, condoms save lives" while parishioners watched in amazement as the condoms floated

upward and became lodged in the central dome of Westminster Cathedral.

Shanghai — The Shanghai Evening News recently reported that one young woman died and another was seriously injured after they attempted double suicide by injecting themselves with a household cleaner. The women had been lovers for years, but one of them was considering bowing to convention by marrying a man. They decided on suicide instead.



#### **Gay Generations**

Census folk tally a generation as 25 years. But in the Gay World — even before the temporal compressions worked by AIDS — a generation logs about every seven years, sometimes quicker. This feature of Gay time was driven home to me anew by John Boswell's obituary in Christmas Sunday's New York Times. I rubbed my eyes: he was only three years older than me. Though in both person and photo he always appeared an agelessly angelic youth, his career had been so accomplished and he had done so much personally for me, so much (how to say) paternally for me, that it was hard to imagine that but three New Year's separated our births.

Boswell's 1980 book Christianity, Social Tolerance and Homosexuality dashed the taboo covering Gay subjects in academe. It cleared the space in which Gay studies began to grow exponentially and initiated Gay-affirming discourses in the wider public sphere. Especially since it now appears that Gay progress for a long time will have to take the form of cultural rather than political change, the value of Boswell's

work for Gavs is inestimable.

Published just five months before his death, Boswell's final book, Same Sex Union in Pre-Modern Europe, is a history and prizing of Gay marriage. It's main cultural import and challenge is for Gays - and others - to take Gay relationships more seriously. It invites us to view Gayness not as something that, like eye-color or an earring, one might have in splendid isolation, but as something, like loving and caring, which is a relational property, a connection between persons, a human bonding, one in need of tendance and social concern. Think about it.

For me, Boswell performed that thankless ivory-tower chore whose real-world counterpart is helping friends move. He wrote letters of recommendation — ones that got me years off to write Gays/ Justice (1988) and Gay Ideas (1992) and one that got

me promoted to full professor. I think about these good deeds often.

But Boswell was no saint. He could be quite the grouch and his obit gave cause for moral puzzlement. Boswell's writings possessed the real-world virtues of candor, boldness, and courage that are usually the first things to go in an institution as bureaucratic as the academy. So I was surprised to see that, apparently as his behest, his obit did not take advantage of the Times policy of listing intimate life partners among survivors and named his only as "a friend" rather than "long-time companion," the Times' concession to the emerging institutionalization of Gay marriage.

Further, for years Boswell had told people, including me, that his long illness: was "just" Lyme's Disease, not AIDS, and so I was morally deflated to read that the cause of death indeed was AIDS. Perhaps these events have innocent explanations. but a fair cultural read of them suggests that in our actual lived experience (whatever our ideals may be), we Gay folk, even at our best, have made little moral progress

beyond Rock Hudson and Liberace.

It is, of course, unreasonable to expect heroism in every dimension of a person's life. We should be glad that it occurs at all. And Boswell's heroism is already

having real-world effects on new Gay generations.

Christmas Eve, the day of Boswell's death, the post brought me a card of greetings from a Gay graduate student with whom I'd been corresponding a bit, but about whose personal circumstances I knew nothing. The photo- card's classic format of family snapshot plus Xmas message is the sort of thing that has made Olin Mills the Campbell's Soup of the photo industry. Well, the student and his lover had just adopted an infant. And there they all are, without the slightest hint of irony or camp, posed against a brick wall with a piece of couch art at head level; the dads, in matching renting tuxedos, beam with pride as they jointly hold up baby Joshua swaddled only in a diaper. The photograph is at once a rune and an icon of Gay family, an imploding yet radiant fusion of American Gothic and Gay Bethlehem. Admittedly at first the photo struck me as a little bit silly, even as it was a great deal wonderful - silly because my feelings weren't instantly up there where my mind tells me my pride is.

As I sorted out my feelings, I was taken back half a dozen years to remember another Gay Family event, the one and only Gay wedding I've attended. I didn't bother to take a present, not because I was a skinflint, but because — shamefully — I clearly wasn't taking Gay relationships seriously enough, even though by that time I'd already

been in one for a decade.

We have learned much from Boswell's writings, but I suspect we - and our future generations too - still have much more to learn.

Basic public health concerns, such as water quality standards, are too often non-existent or inadequate.

Still, here in Wisconsin, in part because of the strong and unified voice of people concerned with HIV and AIDS issues, government agencies and policy makers are starting to respond to the needs of the AIDS community. ARCW applauds the City of Milwaukee's water quality improvement package and AIDS

funding: the state of Wisconsin's funding of an early intervention program for people with AIDS: and the federal government's increasing commitment to people outside of the country's largest urban areas

With your help, government can and will do even more.

ARCW is organizing its public policy advocacy volunteers, and I invite you to volunteer now as an AIDS public policy advocate. Work with us to help shape public policy on AIDS. Together we can have a major impact on basic governmental policies on HIV and AIDS to better meet the needs of those we care about so deeply.

# You Want Me To Do What?

At this point, a Happy New Year is called for, since if you're reading this you've survived another year, as have I. For this, congratulations are in order. As many of us continue to defy the odds, one can't help thinking about all of this. Managing this disease is as much or more our own responsibility as that of our physician. Now that I look back over these last almost four years, I can see some distinctive shifts in my health based on my changing attitudes.

In the beginning I didn't have a handle on AIDS or its consequences. As a result I went through a period of almost two years of being scared and feeling bad, during which I had a second bout of PCP and then CMV retinitis. After I really came to terms with everything and decided to take control of the disease and my life, things improved greatly. In that time, I have not been hospitalized again. For better or worse (I haven't decided yet) I found out that I'm one of the longest surviving patients in southeastern Wisconsin using foscarnet. This after 2-1/2 years of use.

On another short note here, I have decided to name my permanent IV site. Because of my location, here in Milwaukee, I decided to name it after a sign on the freeway. So let me wish a Happy Third Birthday to the "Port of Milwaukee." There's probably an inside joke here but I haven't thought of it.

A character created by the late science fiction author, Robert Heinlein, once said, "everybody lies about sex." Over the years, I've found this to be quite true. I've also found that people lie about arrival and departure times and when you'll really see the doctor. This all has no bearing on anything, it is simply an observation.

Recently, I was selected by my doctor to do a 24-hour urine collection. If you should be offered this opportunity and not be in a hospital, you might want to seriously consider declining such an honor. Here following is the story of the 24-hour urine collection. I needed the 24hour urine collection to check on my creatine. My serum creatine has been at the upper reaches (2.8) of safely using foscarnet. Not to jump the gun, but my urine creatine measure was much better than the estimates had been. Anyway, I agreed to do the urine collection not realizing that a 24-hour collection means just that. All of your urine for, in my case, 10am Wednesday to 10am Thursday. So the lab brought me two urine bottles. Then they told me it had to be kept in the refrigerator. "Excuse me, but I don't have room in my refrigerator for urine."
Well, the lab brought out an ice chest for me to store it in. Since my infusion drugs necessitate me getting up to urinate every 1-2 hours all night, you can see how much fun it was.

I'm a little ahead of myself again (but that's easy to do because I move slower now than I used to), because the lab also said not to urinate directly into the container because it contained a preservative that might irritate the skin (it didn't). Like in the middle of the night I'm going to be transferring urine from one container to another. The last bad part of the experience was the fact I had two meetings, back-to-back that Wednesday

evening. So I took one of those frozen chemical blocks, put it in a shopping bag with the urine bottle. I arrived at our local AIDS Project office toting my bag, and walked around saying, "urine anyone?" It was good I took it, because I had to use it twice.

The last time I had a 24-hour urine collection was several years ago, in the hospital. The nice thing about the hospital (if there is a nice thing) is that all you have to do is urinate into a container with a large opening and press the call button.

I already told the nurse that, "I'll get you for that." So, before you agree to any procedure to do at home, get ALL of

the details in advance.

Herpes-Type Virus May Cause Kaposi's Sarcoma

New York, NY — Scientists at Columbia University have reported strong evidence that a newly detected virus, similar to the herpes virus, may cause Kaposi's Sarcoma (KS), a rare cancer that afflicts many Gay men with AIDS. Their research was published in the December 15 issue of Science.

Drs. Yuan Chang and Patrick S. Moore found that virtually all the KS lesions from people with AIDS they analyzed contained a DNA sequence similar to the family of herpes viruses. "For a long time," said Dr. Moore, "we've suspected that KS might be caused by an infectious agent. [This is] the very first clear evidence that strongly implicates a specific type of virus in the development of KS."

The findings are only preliminary. The analysis of tissue samples must be repeated and the findings replicated by independent sources. The scientists themselves noted that they have not yet isolated the virus and mapped its structure. It is possible also that the virus is actually produced after the

development of KS.

But if the viral discovery is confirmed, researchers can proceed to develop more effective treatments for KS. They may also better understand how a once benign cancer that affected a small number of older men (most of Mediterranean heritage) has become such a virulent, malignant killer affecting Gay men much more than any other group of people with AIDS.

KS is 20,000 times more common in people with AIDS than those free of HIV infection. Among those with AIDS, Gay and bisexual men are 20 times more likely to develop KS than hemophiliacs with AIDS. Women with AIDS are more likely to get KS if they contracted AIDS from sex with bisexual men than from an intravenous drug user.

#### HIV Most Contagious in First Months of Infection

**Detroit, MI** — Researchers at the University of Michigan have determined that HIV may be 100 to 1,000 times more contagious during the first two months of infection in a person's body than it is as time goes by and antibodies form.

The study, a mathematical analysis of data drawn from more than 8,000 cases of HIV-infected Gay men, indicates that HIV works much like the viruses which cause influenza or chicken pox: they are most infectious just before antibodies to

the virus begin to proliferate.

Because HIV tests can only detect the presence of the virus after antibodies have formed, this finding contains a clear warning for those who may engage in unprotected sex. Individuals with recent negative HIV test results may unknowingly harbor the virus and engage in unsafe sex during HIV's most infectious period.

"The danger is that a person who tests negative and is very active sexually may be more dangerous than someone who has tested positive," said University of Michigan researcher

Carl S. Simon.

The study found that the chances of infecting a partner through unprotected sex within the first two months of infection may be as high as 3 in 10. The study is published in the November issue of the Journal of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

Trials of Growth Hormone for Wasting Syndrome Begin

Washington, DC — The Food and Drug Administration has given approval to Serono Laboratories to begin clinical trials of Serostim, a recombinant human growth hormone, for the treatment of wasting syndrome in people with AIDS

AIDS-related wasting syndrome (catabolism) is a profound weight loss of greater than 10% of usual body weight in an HIV-infected person. It is one of the indicators of progression from HIV infection to AIDS. AIDS-related wasting syndrome is one of the major causes of death in people with AIDS.

Randomized, placebo-controlled limited trials of Serostim on 178 patients in 12 sites nationwide revealed a average weight gain of 3.6 pounds per patient, while muscle weight increased 6.6 pounds indicating the subjects were gaining lean tissue rather than fat. The success of these preliminary findings issued last fall hastened the FDA's approval of wider clinical trials of Serostim.

"We are sincerely heartened that the FDA has granted [clinical trials] for Serostim," said Dr. Hisham Samra of Serono Labs. "There are currently no treatments available to increase lean body mass in people with AIDS-wasting, and we believe the FDA has made a compassionate decision that will help people with wasting syndrome...The HIV community's support and counsel has helped us immeasurably and will play an essential role in the continued success of our programs."

Serono Labs has set up a toll-free number for doctors and patients with HIV/AIDS. The Serostim Information Line is (800) 714-2437 and is staffed from 8am to 4pm CST.

FDA Approves Oral Test for HIV

Washington, DC — In December the Food and Drug Administration gave approval to a new HIV test which uses oral saliva specimens to determine the presence of antibodies to HIV.

OraSure, the name of the oral specimen collection device developed by Epitope, Inc. of Beaverton, Oregon, is expected to increase the number of people willing to be tested for HIV because it does not involve the needle stick required with HIV blood tests.

OraSure consists of an absorbent pad mounted on a lollipop-like stick. The pad, treated with a salt solution to enhance antibody collection, is placed between the lower cheek and gum for two minutes. The oral specimen is then placed in a sealed vial with a preservative and sent to a laboratory for analysis. The lab conveys the result to the attending physician who informs the patient. Confirmation of a positive test result will be done through Western blot testing of the patient's blood sample. Clinical trials are currently underway for a confirmatory test using saliva specimens.

"OraSure has a number of advantages," said Adolf Ferro, President of Epitope. "It is a non-invasive form of testing. There is no danger of a needle-stick accident. It is relatively simple to obtain a specimen. The services of a trained phlebotomist are not required. As a result, we believe OraSure

will be less costly to use."

# Popular Wisdom Confirmed: Women With HIV Die Faster

Washington, DC — A study monitoring more than 4,000 men and women with HIV has revealed what many AIDS workers have long observed: that women die much faster than men with HIV. But the reasons for this difference in mortality are still unclear.

The study tracked 768 women and 3,779 men with HIV over a 15 month period and found that the women were 33% more likely to die than men who were comparably ill at the time the study began. In women twice as often as men, death was the first sign that HIV was progressing. Men were much more likely to show early signs of HIV infection, like fungal infections and pneumonia.

The causes of such survival rate disparities between men and women infected with HIV are still unclear. Researchers theorize that in some cases women may wait longer to seek treatment, or that health workers treat women differently, perhaps discounting or misdiagnosing early symptoms of HIV infection. High rates of domestic violence

among HIV-infected women may also play a role in reducing their survival time.

More research needs to be conducted on women and HIV because women and children comprise the fastest-rising group of people now contracting AIDS. Ten years ago, women made up only 3% of AIDS cases. Today they constitute 15% of all new cases. AIDS is the leading cause of death for women aged 25-44 in New York City, and AIDS is the fifth-ranked killer of women aged 25-44 nationwide.



# Spinning the 1994 Elections

Several Gay male commentators have taken pains to proclaim that the November elections really weren't so bad

for Gay men and Lesbians.

Tim McFeeley was guoted in the Nov. 11 Washington Blade and Dec. 8 In Step as saying that now that Republicans are in control of Congress, they will be inclined to curtail anti-Gay legislation "to prove that Republicans have something positive to do other than taking potshots at Gay kids." Hastings Wyman, Jr., in his November 18 commentary stated that, "... [Gliven the Idaho and Oregon results, the new Republican establishment isn't likely to push any anti-Gay measures," and in a December 2 commentary, touted Newt Gingrich's April statement in favor of "tolerance" for Gays as a positive sign. Chicago writer Paul Varnell wrote in his election commentary in the St. Louis News-Telegraph that the replacement of Democratic congressional leaders "by Republicans, especially in the south represents little loss for Gavs." Richard Mohr wrote in his election commentary in the Nov. 24 In Step "... Lesbians and Gays need not worry too much that we are losing the political wars, for we continue to win the cultural ones.

Their arguments are: 1) the Oregon and Idaho anti-Gay initiatives were defeated; 2) all 13 Senators who cosponsored ENDA and were up for reelection won, 110 of 120 co-sponsors of ENDA in the House were re-elected, and 11 newcomers have pledged to cosponsor ENDA; 3) a record 39 openly Gay candidates were elected to public office; and 4) the GOP "Contract with America" makes no mention of Gays.

All true. Yet these facts are only a

very small part of the picture.

and Idaho initiatives were more overtly anti-Gay in their language than was Colorado's Amendment 2. Yet only 51% voted "no" on Oregon's Measure 13 this November, down from a 56% "no" vote in 1992, probably because Measure 13 was less virulently anti-Gay than had been 1992's Measure 9. In Idaho, the margin of victory was fewer than 3,000 votes. It is questionable whether either state would have defeated the initiatives if they had been merely a Colorado-style "no civil rights" initiative.

In Alachua County, Florida, voters not only repealed a local ordinance prohibiting sexual orientation discrimination (by a 57% majority) but adopted an ordinance prohibiting any future inclusion of sexual orientation in civil rights ordinances (by a 59% majority). Moreover, according to Nadine Smith, executive director of the Human Rights Task Force of Florida, the attorney defending the validity of the "no civil rights" ordinance in court is attacking all civil rights laws, including the landmark 1964 Civil Rights Act.

2) Support for ENDA. The fact that numbers of Senators Representatives co-sponsoring ENDA held steady is a major achievement. But translating that fact into victory for ENDA seems unlikely. Newt Gingrich has a 0% voting record from the HRCF (and a 100% rating from the Christian Coalition). and since the November elections has stated that employers should be allowed discriminate based on sexual orientation, Nancy Kassebaum, slated to chair the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee which has jurisdiction over not only ENDA but also AIDS legislation, has only a 20% HRCF rating. Richard Tafel, executive director Cabin Log Republicans. recommends that ENDA be pulled from Congress, and that the Gay and Lesbian civil rights movement proceed state by state and company by company to achieve nondiscrimination protections. His argument, quoted in the Dec. 2 Blade, is that, "Many Americans find expansive civil rights legislation as one of the most visible and offensive types of government intrusion." With friends like Tafel parroting the Republican laissez faire capitalist line, we might as well kiss ENDA (and any other federal civil rights legislation) good-bye.

3) Openly Gay elected officials. While the increase in the number of openly Gay elected officials is a matter worth celebrating, increased visibility alone is a slim defense for the attacks of the radical right. There was a large and visible Gay and Lesbian community in Germany in 1933, but that certainly did not stop the Nazi takeover, nor save Gay men (and every other group despised by the Nazis) from the concentration camps.

4) The Contract with America. The Contract states what House Republicans plan to accomplish in the first 100 days of the new Congress. As Rep. Gunderson (R) himself admitted in an interview with the Blade, "After the first 100 days, there's no question that they intend to have a second agenda," and

that social issues, including Gays, are likely to be part of the second agenda.


But even the first Contract includes thinly-disguised attacks on Gays. Item #4 of the 10-point Contract is the "Family Reinforcement Act." The Act speaks of "strengthening rights of parents in their children's education," among other things. Does anyone want to guess the Republicans' view on diversity curricula or teaching about homosexuality in the schools, particularly if a parent objects?

In the April 1 interview with Chandler Burr, where he professed "tolerance" for Gay men and Lesbians,

Gingrich himself proclaimed that it is "madness to pretend that families are anything couples," other than heterosexual "re-establishing that centrality of marriage and of the role of a male and female in that relationship is a very central issue of the next 20 years." and that it is "fundamentally and profoundly wrong" to "educate kindergartners in understanding Gay couples." According to the Seattle Gay News, Gingrich promised Lou Sheldon that he would hold hearings on the "homosexual agenda as it is relevant to the public schools."

It will not be easy to figure out the best strategies to take in the new climate. But we should at least stop kidding ourselves about the threats we

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

# Gay/Lesbian Film Fest at UW Milwaukee Will Chase Away the Winter Blues

# Wide Variety of Films January 26-February 2

Milwaukee — The 4th annual Gay and Lesbian Film Festival at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee begins a weeklong run January 26 just in time to help us all shake the mid-winter blues. A wide variety of films will screen at the UW-M Union Theatre in a festival sponsored by Great Lakes Film and Video and funded by the Cream City

Foundation.

The festival includes four major feature films playing for the first time in Milwaukee: Greg Araki's Totally F\*\*\*ed Up, about the trials and tribulations of a group of Gay and Lesbian teens (see related story); Richard Glatzer's Grief, about the inter-relationships between Gays and straights who produce a campy TV show; Steve McLean's Postcards From America, based on the writings of artist David Wojnarowicz; and Fresh Kill, Shu Lea Cheang's loopy "eco-cybernoia" fable.

The festival also features documentaries on Boy George, Sandra Bernhard and queer sex workers, films that explore Gay and Lesbian families, homophobia in gangsta rap, breast cancer among Lesbians, as well as shorts on dating, sex, relationships, racism, AIDS, transgenderism and more.

Lest all of that sound too heavy, be assured that there is a great deal of humor mixed in with the pathos. Of the films and videos I was able to preview, the evening of Lesbian shorts looks to be especially hilarious. The Gay short Love Machine had this hard-core dyke laughing herself silly. And the pairing of the Boy George film Boy Next Door with Dream Girls, about an all-women cross-dressing theater troupe in Japan, is guaranteed to entertain and fascinate both Gay men and Lesbians.

Responding to criticisms made in past years that the films were too strictly divided into separate men's and women's programs, Matt Frost, organizer of this year's fest, has scheduled several double bills of Gay and Lesbian films that share similar themes. The hope is that Gay men and Lesbians will view these films together, interact more and perhaps learn more about each others'

experiences.

Outstanding double bills that will appeal to both men and women include the aforementioned Boy Next Door and

Dream Girls on January 27; Cancer in Two Voices and Fast Trip, Long Drop, which deal with life-threatening crises, on January 29; Rocking the Cradle and Florence and Robin, about Gay and Lesbian families, on January 31; and Darker Shade of Black, Long Time Comin' and Greetings From Africa, which center on issues of race and Gays and Lesbians of color, also on January 31.

9pm: Totally F\*\*\*ed Up: Greg Araki zeroes in on the hopes and anxieties of six Gay and Lesbian teens. An excellent cast of young actors creates compelling characters each facing a choice or crisis, but the film is often marred by heavy-handedness in its writing and execution. The alienation of Andy (played by River Phoenix look-alike James Duval) loses its poignancy after we're barraged with none-too- subtle conceits like close-ups of his t-shirt declaring, "I blame society." Two Lesbian characters are peripheral. I'd still recommend it. There are moments of teen angst and revelation most queers will strongly identify with. (See related story for more in depth analysis.)

Friday, January 27

7pm: Boy Next Door is the saga of George O'Dowd's rise and fall and rise

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as pop star Boy George. It's paired with Dream Girls, a fascinating look at the Takaruzuka Theater School in Japan where girls don drag to play all the roles. The schoolmasters are conservative men whose goals are to instill discipline and endurance so the girls become better wives, while crowds of adoring female fans have a completely different agenda. swooning over the handsome drag kings!

9pm: Confessions of a Pretty Lady is a moderately entertaining documentary about singer/comic/actress Sandra Bernhard. Bernhard is much more popular among Gay men than Lesbians. many of whom are apt to spew when they hear the editor of the Advocate call her a Lesbian role model for the 90's or hear two drag queens tout her as a progressive leader of the Gay movement for posing in Playboy. Ratifying this mindless diva-devotion is the inane Camille Paglia. Pul-leese!

Saturday, January 28
7pm: Fresh Kill is nearly impossible to describe. It has a wonderfully rich and bizarre multi-cultural cast set against the backdrop of decaying garbage and radioactive fish lips in New York City. The central characters are a Lesbian couple with a little girl who gets mysteriously kidnapped. That's about it for plot. Along the way, there are wry takeoffs on public access TV, cyberpunks. corporate paternalism,

recycling. Indian mysticism, yuppie businessmen, canned cat food and the apocalypse. Fresh Kill's pace is as frenetic as the Big Apple itself and its jumble of ideas and images is as infuriating as it is stimulating.

9pm: Remembrance of Things Fast by John Maybury promises to investigate


the "seedier rest stops along the information super-highway" populated by "menacing dominatrices transgeneder aristocrats." It stars queer Brit favorites Tilda Swinton and Rupert Everett. It's paired with the hilarious Gay short The Love Machine, about a series of hapless Gay naifs smitten and then abandoned by the Gay swinger of the title. Designed, costumed and shot in a sort of '60's retro style, The Love Machine is an instant camp classic.

Sunday, January 29
7pm: A program called "Love and

Survival" features Cancer in Two Voices about a Lesbian couple's struggle with one partner's breast cancer, and Fast Trip, Long Drop, a self-portrait and analysis by HIV-positive videographer Greg Bordowitz.

9pm: Grief finally comes to the big screen in Milwaukee just as it's about to hit the video shelves. But don't be a couch potato! This comedy-drama will be great to see with a large and responsive queer audience. Grief is about the inter-relationships of a group of TV writers producing the side-splittingly tacky daytime drama "Love Judge." Mark (played by Craig Chester of Swoon) is grieving for his partner lost to AIDS but is attracted to bisexual co- worker Bill (Alexis Arquette) who, in turn, is sleeping with colleague Jeremy (Carleton Wilborn). Further complications ensue when their boss, the wicked-tongued Jo (played by dragster Jackie Beat) announces she's quitting, causing all the principles to jockey for her position. Despite its downbeat title, Grief is funny, sweet, thoughtful and wonderfully irreverent.

Tuesday, January 31
7pm: A program on Gay and Lesbian families features Kirk Marcolina's Rocking the Cradle, in which the experiences of three queer families are intercut with the filmmaker's conversation with his own mother, who expresses her fears about Gay parenting. One highlight has two Gay men, shopping for baby furniture, engaging in debate with other customers. Nick Finnis's Florence and Robin is also on the bill. It's about a Lesbian couple's quest to have a child through artificial insemination.

9pm: This program focuses on racism, homophobia and Gays and Lesbians of color. It features the new film by Looking for Langston director Isaac Julien, called A Darker Shade of Black, which explores homophobia in dancehall, reggae and gansta rap music. Among the chief offenders interviewed are Shabba Ranks and Buju Banton. Darker Shade is paired with Long Time Comin', a portrait of African-Canadian singer Faith Nolans and her best friend, artist Grace Channer, both out Lesbians and political activists. Nolans' beautiful blues numbers complement Channer's paintings and multi- media creations beautifully. Also scheduled: Greetings From Africa.

Wednesday, February 1
7pm: Straight for the Money:

Interviews with Queer Sex Workers is a documentary about eight Lesbian and Bisexual women who willingly play "straight" by working for their livings as strippers and lap-dancers. provocative film is paired somewhat improbably with Berenice Abbott: A View From the 20th Century. It's about award-winning Lesbian photographer Berenice Abbott whose work spanned the decades from the 1920's to the 1980's and whose friends included such queer luminaries as Andre Gide, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Janet Flanner and

Djuna Barnes. The 92-year-old Abbott was interviewed extensively just before her death a few years ago.

9pm: This diverse series of Gay shorts includes moments of sublime filmmaking and trash. Most notable is the slickly produced half hour film Death in Venice, loosely based on the Thomas Mann novel but set in Venice Beach. It's about a sexually repressed professor (an "expert" in romantic love!) who goes on vacation to ease workrelated stress, only to become aroused his sister-in-law's gorgeous 17-year-old Gay son. Needless to say, he, the boy and the unsuspecting mother are thrown into crisis. Also scheduled: A Friend of Dorothy, about a shy college student named Winston and his humorous attempts to desperate. connect with another man; Some of These Days, a mini-soap opera about tangled relationships among friends; also Virus, Dottie Gets Spanked and Shit Fit, which is (unfortunately) self-explanatory.

Thursday, February 2
7pm:Chicago-basedfilmmakerJulie

Zando will be on hand to answer questions about her film Uh! Oh!, which purports to be a re-reading of the S&M porn classic The Story of O. I'm not sure that using an all-woman cast in any way "subverts the original text" or gives us any new take on "the relationship between power and sex." My objection is not to the S&M content but to its tedious presentation. Then again, maybe that's the point. Perhaps Zando can answer such questions but, frankly, no one could pay me to sit through this awful movie again. Maybe I'm wrong. See it for yourself and make up your own mind. But don't say I didn't warn you.

9pm: Postcards From America is a feature length adaptation of the writings of frequently censored artist David Wojnarowicz, who succumbed to AIDS several years back. Postcards is a powerful but unrelentingly bleak tone poem about his abusive upbringing, his years as a young hustler and his dangerous quest for anonymous sex with very rough trade. I kept waiting desperately for any sense of redemptive value or transcendence in his life - for instance, did he find any fulfillment through his art? — but it never surfaces. One redeeming feature of Postcards however is its stunning cinematography. It was photographed by Ellen Kuras who also shot the mesmerizing Swoon. Otherwise, it is much too long and extremely depressing.

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# Film Maker Gregg Araki's Newest Release To Screen at Film Festival

Gregg Araki isn't the easiest guy in the world to get along with; just ask the producers and distributors of his films. (And the critics he's annoyed with abusive phone calls.) But he's a talented live wire, this 33-year-old Japanese-American resident of Los

Angeles, California.

Araki burst onto the international filmic scene two years ago when his fabulously successful *The Living End* earned a million U.S. bucks in world-wide distribution. He was criticized at the time by film critics for a weak and meandering script, an old and continuing problem for him, but was justly lauded for his energetic and wrathful direction.

Now he has a fourth film in distribution, the eighty-five- minuteslong, troubled Gay teen flick, Totally F\*\*ed Up (the asterisks are part of the title, since humanity clearly cannot accept the word "Fucked" spelled out for all to see).

A maze of personal contradictions.

Araki, originally from Santa Barbara (a historic, pretty, "white" town 100 miles north of Los Angeles) has earned his reputation as an artist—albeit a temperamental one—from his four low-budget (nothing over \$40,000), Gay-themed features. He describes his style as "guerilla film-making", which essentially means shooting on the quick, without permission, anywhere and whenever you want to. It's a style fraught with artistic and moral peril, of course, and the end result often has the quality of your great-aunt Matilda's blessed home videos, but because they're about depressed Gay and Lesbian youth and

it's often riveting viewing.

His first two films, unlike the latter duo, were in black and white, long and reasonably tedious. Three Bewildered People in the Night (1987) and The Long Weekend (O'Dispair) (1989) were seen

their equally frustrated straight friends,

only in film festivals, usually at the tail-end when folks were tired, so not too much attention was paid (although he did win some minor awards for both) until The Living End came out, which brought media attention, and did guerilla-business throughout the world. And that is bound to keep you going if you're a struggling and angry film-maker.

His Best Yet

His latest, Totally F\*\*\*ed Up, is the strongest of the bunch, continuing his love-affair with the style of the aging French New Wave film-maker, Jean-Luc Goddard: an open-structured, plot-free, gaze into the lives of queer teens struggling with their emergent identities in an indifferent Los Angeles.

As Araki writes, "the narrative (what there is of it) follows the interconnected experiences of six racially-diverse young



queer friends: aspiring film-maker Steven (Gilbert Luna), his loyal artist boyfriend, Deric (Lance May), terminally bummed Andy (James Duvall), skater-dude Tommy (Roko Belic) and trendy dykes Michele (Susan Behsid) and Patricia (Jenee Gill). As Steven and Deric's relationship comes undone and Andy falls in love with a sexy, edgy stranger named Ian (Alan Boyce), life becomes more and more complicated for the adolescent sextet." In a nutshell, that's what we see up there on the screen. The film is dimly lit, grainy, hard to understand sometimes, with actors who are both theatrically trained and otherwise, but is undeniably electric and

In all his films, Araki has cast the best non-union actors he could, allowing an essential element of honesty to his work. However, with a potentially crucial component, which of the actors are actually Gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, or straight, is not addressed directly by him in interviews (rather sensible, actually) since careers are still side-tracked in Hollywood by the perception of homosexuality; concerning the current film, he merely alludes to one of his leads being homosexual, leaving it up to the viewer "to guess which one". The actors are all so totally committed to the work, however, that you would guess all were. And unless he's lying to protect them, perhaps we can hope homophobia is dying out amongst actors, if not among casting directors and studio heads, especially those who are Gay themselves.

"A Curious Prudery"

There's another more puzzling aspect to his work, however. Considering how "revolutionary" he's trying to be in his work, there's a curious prudery in his refusal to explore filmic nudity. As mainstream Hollywood warms up to it (as Europeans did long ago), male nudity has begun to catch up with female pulchritude, especially homosexual-themed films, but Araki refuses to use it. As he said to me two years ago, and this presumably hasn't altered, "I've never meant [it] to be mportant to my films... frankly, when sex s in the air, I'm much more interested in what's going on in the two men's heads han their dicks... besides, the films aren't about sex, but love. They're not neant for a porn-age audience.

Araki is sexy in a grungy way, cute, on the shortish side, with straight black hair, cut conventionally short. He carries with him a palpable anger at the world, based on who-knows-what, that has begun to cause him some potentially serious trouble as he continues to work. One producer, who demanded anonymity, was furious after an attack by the flash-point director, insisting to me he'd never work with the strident man again, although he ended up working with him anyway. Araki's been known to

have his assistant call up recalcitrant critics and lambast them for their critical opinion of him At the end of F\*\*\*ed, a card gives a special thanks to several dozen names, followed by "a big fucking no thanks to you all know who you are." While grammatically inaccurate, it makes his point that he seemingly doesn't care who he alienates, a somewhat refreshing attitude in artistic circles, unless you happen to be a part of the group he's attacking.

Whatever that anger, fury, indignation, or resentment is about, it probably isn't yet being addressed in his private life-he's single, and regularly turns down requests for interviews with journalists. Araki holds a BA degree from the University of California, Santa Barbara and a MFA in Film Production from the prestigious University of Southern California. He's currently working on his fifth, sixth, and seventh scripts: The Secret Movie, what he calls a teenage Last Tango in Paris road epic; Nowhere, "a radical antithesis to [the excessively yuppie television show] Beverly Hills 90210 - more nihilistic L.A. youths on the rampage; and The Separation of the Earth From Its Axis, about a Gay kid who falls in love with a single father. He continues to have Gay on the brain, fortunately, as there's still a dearth of quality films about young Gay people, and Totally F\*\*\*ed Up will do good business among film-literate folk of whatever sexual or political persuasion. He explained the genesis of F\*\*\*ed recently: "Like all my movies, it [came] from a number of inspirations. One of the initial sparks was [an] article about the disproportionate percentage of Gay teen suicides which begins the film. Another was a small news-item about a troubled Gay boy who killed himself by drinking Drano [a lye product] and drowning in his family's swimming pool. And I felt a need to respond to the unrelenting barrage of institutionalized homophobia-from the media, from ignorant politicians, from rabid cultural 'watchdogs' .... [My film] is a kind of twisted cross between avant-garde experimental cinema and a queer John Hughes flick."

Generational Insight


In F\*\*\*ed, Araki is trying to let us in on a generation who should be finding plenty of role-models, and upbeat lives to lead, but who aren't. Especially in urban areas such as Los Angeles or New York, American Gay teens are given a wider

range of opportunities to live open lives than ever before. Except for the specter of AIDS, to be Gay has never been easier or more accepted. But Araki's kids are unhappy, drugged, angst-ridden. They spend their time with each other, helping out as family as best they can, either in school or in work, but for Andy, nothing can go right. And they feel completely cut-off from their older homosexual role-models, who might act as important guides to the future. As one of the characters in the film says: "Everything that homos are supposed to like—disco music, drag shows, Joan Crawford—I hate!" But critics are noticing him: Janet Maslin in the New York Times recently raved, "[He] brings an intelligence to bear disaffected characters, so that his work plays vigorously as part movie, part manifesto." It's what makes his work here so energetic, plus the fact that his weakness in script-writing is less obvious as the story is told more with visuals than with dialogue.

William Morrow Publishing/NY is coming out with a bound version of his screenplays, The Living End and Totally F\*\*\*ed Up this year, which should help propel the stubborn and talented filmmaker onto a higher echelon. Whether or not he learns to play the "Hollywood game" in order to advance his career, or continues on his own highly idiosyncratic way, is very much open to discussion, speculation, and continued observation. It's probable he doesn't know himself. But you can be sure he will be controversial and scrappy. In fact, you

can bet on it.

NBC to Air Uncensored Cammermeyer Saga February 6

Los Angeles, CA — Ignoring protests by the conservative Family Defense Fund, NBC plans to air in its entirety on February 6 the two hour TV drama Serving in Silence: The Margarethe Cammermeyer Story, starring Glenn Close. It was produced by Barbra Streisand.

Right wing groups expressed opposition to broadcasting the docudrama about the highly decorated Army nurse who was kicked out of the military for being a Lesbian. They specifically objected to a scene in which Close, playing Colonel Cammermeyer, kisses her lover Diane, played by Judy Davis.

But NBC is refusing to cave in to the pressure. A network spokeswoman said that Serving in Silence is "an insightful and moving portrayal of one woman's struggle to save her career and hold her family together. NBC will air the film as delivered."

Streisand and Cammermeyer are hosting a gala premiere of the TV movie in Hollywood on January 23 with proceeds going to the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation. Close, currently performing on Broadway in the musical Sunset Boulevard recently held a private showing of the film for fellow cast members.

About her smooch with Davis, Close told **Out** magazine: "We were a little nervous, but each time we did it, we got less self- conscious...During that scene with Judy, I had a revelation of what it's like to be Gay. I thought, 'It's kind of nice to kiss a woman."

Edwards said the song, You'd Be Surprised, will "either be reworked so that it reflects the sensibilities of the movie, or it will not be in the show." Complaints from actors who had to sing the song during auditions motivated Edwards' decision to make a change.

The 1982 movie musical Victor, Victoria was well received by the Gay and Lesbian community for its positive, Gay-friendly message. But the song written for the stage version by lyricist Leslie Bricusse contained lines like: "If you knew who's a tough, but who's a real powder puff, you'd stand with your back

to the wall," and "Til the laws are revised...convictsare compromised...Boy Scouts and choirboys terrorized."

# The Good, The Ugly, The Badly Written...

'94 in Review

With so many and varied titles out in 1994, the days when you could actually buy and read any and every Gay or Lesbian themed book are for all practical purposes, gone forever. Not that I'm complaining. The avid Gay and Lesbian reader now faces an embarrassment of riches. One might truly say: "So many books, so little time," or even that "the Love that dare not speak its name," really won't shut up, at least not in print.

Yes, it's that time of year when critics make their Best of... lists and occasionally even their choices for Worst of... A few of the exceptional titles of 1994 include The Weekend by Peter Cameron, Violet Quill Reader edited by David Bergman, Kate Bornstein's Gender Outlaw, Margarethe Cammermeyer's Serving in Silence, and American Studies by Mark Merlis. My vote for most over-hyped, pretentiously over-written book goes to Alan Hollinghurst's Folding Star.

By far the most promising trend this past year has been the marked increase in titles geared toward Gay and Lesbian teens. 1994's biggest disappointment is how far Lesbian fiction still lags behind Gay fiction, despite some truly original works like House Rules by Heather Lewis and The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay by Lisa Donnelly.

From the dozens and dozens of Gay and Lesbian titles published in 1994, a few deserve to be singled out for special mention:

The "Much Ado About Nothing" Award: Rod & Bob, by Tom Bianchi, St. Martin's Press \$60. Why? For sixty bucks, you didn't get to see anything!

The "Rush Limbaugh Homophobia" Award:

Informed Answers to Gay Rights Questions by Roger Magnuson. Multnomah Book. This quote from the introduction says it all: "The political proposals advanced by an increasingly aggressive group of homosexual activists, who demand full social acceptance of sexual deviance, will continue to drastically alter the fabric of American culture, if left unchecked. Critical public policy issues can only be properly addressed and challenged by educated, informed people. This innocent looking book is very scary, indeed!

The "Maybe Book Burning Isn't So Bad After All" Award:

The "You Mean They Did That Sort of

Thing Back Then?" Award:

The Alienist by Caleb Carr,
Random House, \$22. This superbly written detective novel explores a series of killing of youthful male prostitutes in New York City in the late 1800's. Yes, they had places like that sort of thing even back then.

The "Family Values for the Rest of Us" Award:

Reinventing the Family by Laura Benkov, Crown \$22. Ever increasing numbers of Gay and Lesbian couples are choosing to become parents. In Reinventing the Family, Laura Benkov chronicles the joys as well as the struggles faced by those unconventional family units.

The "Look Who's Teaching Your Children" Award:

One Teacher in 10 edited by Kevin Jennings, Alyson \$9.95. Young people today are often being taught by teachers that are out and proud. Kevin Jennings has collected a wonderful selection of personal narratives of some "everyday heroes."

The "Do Not Go Gently into That Good Night" Award:

Last Watch of the Night by Paul Monette Harcourt, Brace, \$21,95, Paul Monette remains a very angry man, not mellowed by age or by AIDS as is eloquently proven in his concluding volume to his autobiographical trilogy.

The "Keeping It In the Family" Award: Doing It For Daddy, edited by Pat Califia, Alyson, \$9.95. 

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

For now, never mind the fact that we have been put in the position of trying to downplay our love for one another, of having to all but deny the fact that our sexuality doesn't fit into the narrow mold of 1 "innie" + 1 "outie" = normal sex (to borrow Roseanne's terms). No, as usual I am going to go off on a completely different topic, namely, Just what is it that this extrasexuality is composed of?

Generally, of course, when we say same-sex relationships are not just about sex, we are thinking of things like, we got to work every day, we visit the dentist, we watch TV hoping for signs of Lesbian life, and we make important financial decisions, like Breyers? I don't happen to actually know any of these women personally, but I'm sure they exist.

I am, however, acquainted with Lesbians who demonstrate, for example, an ardent attachment to the one-woman empire that is Martha Stewart. The truth is, I live with just such a Lesbian. Given Kathy's passion for all-things- Martha-Stewart, it is hard for me to imagine anyone who doesn't know who the impishly capable Stewart is. Kathy, it seems, has discovered her homemaker within. While this means Martha Stewart has become a regular presence in our lives haunting the TV screen and our video tapes, cluttering our magazine rack, bloating our recipe files - it also means that I stand to profit from all of Kath's thusly acquired knowledge, getting to eat Martha's scrumptious menu items and reaping the benefits of her vegetable gardening tips.

So okay, Kath's inner child has recently made known her longing for a Suzy Homemaker doll. That still doesn't explain, Why Martha Stewart? Aside from the fact that Martha is "really something, with that tool belt on" (according to Kathy), she's also quite charming — funny and totally at ease in front of the camera. 



But you could see in his husband's eyes a glimmer of light that showed they had that discussion once upon a time.





# "Queer Duck"


# An Introduction to In Step's Newest Multi-Panel Cartoon

Gay, short, furry, cuddly, whiskered, quiet, discreet, reserve, level-headed, temperate, sensitive, empathetic, politically conscientious, naive, altruistic, do-gooder, on a never ending quest to find "Mr. Right." These are the words that best describe Gooch, the feline sidekick in my cartoon creation Queer Duck.



Gay, short, fat, loud, obnoxious, boisterous, bawdy, flamboyant, impulsive, indulgent, chain-smoking, hard-drinking, thrill-seeking, insensitive, conceited, politically unconscious, jaded, self-serving, ne'er-do-well, on a never ending quest to find "Mr. Right Away." These are the words that best describe Quentin Duck, the star of the strip.



In conceiving a plan for a cartoon that would appeal to the most people, I thought it important to center the strip around two characters with completely different personalities. In this way I could better illustrate the vast variety of Gay

experiences and perspectives. It's hard to imagine two so diametrically opposed characters being good friends. But they do share a common bond. They are both outsiders.

Outsiders

Quentin and Gooch represent the 90% of "the 10%." Gays and Lesbians who feel estranged from the world at large due to their orientation, and yet don't feel fully a part of the Gay subculture either. I call it "being on the outside of the outside looking in." Not especially young, not especially pretty, not especially fashionable. Ordinary.

Being "on the outside of the outside looking in" gives you a unique perspective. And as a cartoonist, Queer Duck gives me the creative outlet to share this perspective with others.

Gay people are the most diverse group of people you could possibly meet. In my cartoon I try to bring out the humor that lies in those commonalties and differences.

To my frustration, in a bi-weekly magazine I only have 25 opportunities each year to exhibit my best work and make people laugh. Therefore it is very important to me that each episode be hilarious and be one that all Gay people can strongly identify with. I want people to chuckle and say "that is so true," or "that's what happened to me."

In my strip I try to touch upon all aspects of Gay life. Queer Duck is about finding laughter in the Gay experience, even when laughter is hard to find. It's about homophobia, internalized homophobia, making friends, Gay-dar, cruising, dating, relationships, sex, AIDS, pop-culture, television, music, film, celebrations, fashion, and more.

But I've already said too much. I have a personal philosophy that a work of art should be able to stand on its own, independent of the artist, without lengthy explanation or critique. Art should have a life of its own, as should this cartoon. So on this very special occasion, being the debut of Queer Duck, I would just like to wish Quentin and Gooch a long and prosperous life. Good luck guys! And thank you Ron Geiman, Editor, for giving Queer Duck a home.

# The Original Disco Diva

# Donna Summer — Still Mired in Controversy?

By Wayne Hoffman It seems like every few years, Summer makes another "comeback." This winter, after a five year hiatus from the pop charts, Summer has returned yet again, teaming up with mega-producers Robert Clivilles and David Cole of C&C Music Factory on her newest single, Melody of Love. Already topping the dance charts. Melody of Love will anchor a new album due out this summer. In the meantime, the single is featured alongside Summer's greatest hits on the singer's latest anthology, Endless Summer (Mercury). The new track, the new compilation, and her traditional (read Religious) Christmas album (Christmas Spirit), recorded with

the Nashville Symphony Orchestra (also on Mercury), may well place Donna Summer back on the pop charts, but she is reluctant to see it as a dramatic resurrection.

"I try not to view it as a comeback. I didn't go anywhere," she says. True enough, Summer has never gone even three years between albums. During times when success eluded her in the US, she kept selling records in Europe. And just because she lost her heavy rotation on pop radio does not mean she disappeared; she was winning Grammys for inspirational music years after disco was "dead." "You're not always where the public is at the moment you do something," she admits. "Sometimes they get it, and sometimes they don't, and you can't take it personal."

Melody of Love combines C&C's quintessentially 1990's light house sound with Summer's trademark 1970's formula: a slow orchestral intro exploding into a string-laden dance anthem. Endless Summer balances the new dance single with a new ballad, Anyway At All, produced by Michael Omartian, who provided Summer with She Works Hard for the Money, a decade ago. If neither song is as revolutionary today as her breakthrough Love to Love You Baby was in 1975, both demonstrate still-impressive energy, Summer's emotion and range.

Even if the Boston native has not visibly aged even a day since her career

began 20 years ago, Summer — who turned 46 in December — has matured artistically. She has tried her hand at gospel, rock, country, and showtunes, garnering grudging respect from critics who were all too happy to bury disco. And her current image as a devoted Christian and mother is miles away from her 1970's Bad Girls persona. Still, Summer knows that no matter what she sings and how she acts, people will peg her as a disco diva. Her name still evokes memories of Thank God It's Friday, a cake someone left out in the rain, and nightclubs filled with sweaty men singing "toot toot, yeah, beep beep."

"It's kind of to the point where it's a spoof to me, it's kind of like a cartoon," says Summer of her association with disco. "I don't want it to limit me in what I can do. I did this, I did that, I did it well,

now let's move on."

But moving on has proved difficult for Summer, as another part of her past still haunts her as well. In 1983, the Village Voice reported that the bornagain Summer made anti-Gay remarks and referred to AIDS as the well-deserved result of the sin of homosexuality; "I have seen the evils of homosexuality; AIDS is the result of your sins." Summer's popularity within the loyal Gay community plummeted as the rumors spread, and without this core of support her career plunged

simultaneously. She is still fighting to win back her Gay support.

"I don't actually remember everything that happened," she starts, tired of defending herself, yet eager to clear her record. "I think that because of bad publicity in the past of Christians who go on and judge everybody, just the word Christian sends some people into a tailspin. I don't think it was even what I said or didn't say or supposedly said. I think some people felt threatened by the fact that they thought, 'OK, does this mean she's going to be this way?' and making these judgments on what they presumed me to become or be like, and all these rumors began to fly."

"It's a shame, that's just now who I am," she says. "I'm not a judgmental person."

Summer insists that despite her high profile, she had no way to refute the allegations at the time; her belated response in the Advocate some six years later was hardly timely enough to halt the loss of her longtime listeners.

"When words are put in your mouth in the press and you have no recourse to defend yourself and it just spreads like wildfire, you sit there and go, 'Oh my gosh, I could never put this to sleep!' How could I ever?" she asks. "If I gave you my blood, draw blood to prove I'm telling the truth, it would never be enough. The bottom line is either you're going to believe me when I tell you the first time or the second time or the fiftieth time or you're going to say 'She's lying "

time, or you're going to say 'She's lying."

While she cannot recall exactly what she did say that set off such a string of misunderstandings, she is certain she would never have made such a remark about AIDS, especially when she has lost so many friends to the disease herself. At the same time, she says she has grown because of the incident, from seeing the effect her actions could have on other people. But no matter what her words were at the time, she says, the time has come to move on.


"I have a lot of Gay following, and still do, and I love them as much as they love me," she says. "It's not a one-sided thing. I don't know how you can remove your history. They're a part of my history, the whole way my career started. But at some point, I'm at a loss for words. What am I supposed to do?

"It's ten years ago," says Summer, with the last word on her alleged remarks. "If I'd have gone to jail for it the year it happened, I'd be out of jail by now."

In some ways, Summer has essentially been in solitary confinement, scorned by her US audience and unable to sell records. But she stresses, in

typically upbeat fashion, that even the tough years have helped her in the end.

"Sometimes I think that the misunderstandings and the failures have ultimately caused me more inner success. I know that sounds bizarre," she admits, "but in learning to grow with the public, I feel personally that I have far more understanding now than I would have or could have had, had some of these things not happened. It's OK to make mistakes, it's just not OK not to learn from them."



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
