

U.S. Supreme Court to Rule on Colorado's Amendment 2

Constitutionality of Anti-Gay Initiatives to be Resolved

Washington, DC — The United States Supreme Court has agreed to consider the appeal of the State of Colorado in defense of Amendment 2, the controversial anti-Gay measure passed by 53% of the state's electorate in 1992. The outcome of the case, Romer v. Evans, is likely decide the fate of anti-Gay referendum campaigns throughout the country.

Amendment 2 would void Gay rights ordinances already on the books in Denver, Aspen and Boulder and prohibit any government entities in the state, including cities, counties, school boards and the state legislature, from adopting civil rights laws banning discrimination

based on sexual orientation.

Amendment 2 has never been implemented because opponents won an injunction prohibiting its enactment until court challenges to its constitutionality are fully resolved. The US Supreme Court, which will hear oral arguments in the case this fall and render a decision next year, is expected to do just that.

The first challenge to Amendment 2 came in Denver District Court where, in December 1993, Judge Jeffrey Bayless found the measure in violation of the Constitution's right to equal protection of the laws. Supporters of the measure then appealed to the Colorado Supreme

Court.

Last October 11, which was National Coming Out Day, the state's high court sustained Judge Bayless's decision by a vote of 6-1. "The right to participate equally in the political process is clearly affected by Amendment 2," the court ruling declared. "States have no compelling interest in amending their constitutions in ways that violate fundamental federal rights."

Amendment 2, Colorado Chief Justice Luis Rovira wrote, "singles out one form of discrimination and removes its redress from consideration by the

normal political process."

Colorado's appeal to the US Supreme Court describes Amendment 2, on the other hand, as an attempt to restrict "special rights" for a group identified only by its sexuality. It calls the state court's ruling "unwarranted interference in the political process" which "strikes at the heart of voter

sovereignty and federalism itself."

IMPACT OF RULING

Kevin Cathcart of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, which is co-counsel in the *Romer v. Evans* case, welcomes the review by the nation's high court.

"The rights of any minority should not be swept away by popular vote," he contends. "The Court recognized the serious implications that anti-Gay initiatives have on the democratic process. We now look forward to a ruling to end this national assault on Gay and

Lesbian civil rights."

Cathcart referred to the anti-Gay referendum campaigns which have spread across the US in the past few years. Right wing organizations and Christian fundamentalist groups have often spearheaded voter initiatives which aim to write Gay men and Lesbians out of state constitutions and local civil rights laws.

In 1994, over ten states faced anti-Gay initiatives, but pre- election challenges and inadequate signatures on petitions prevented many from taking place. The two statewide measures submitted to voters in November were defeated in Oregon and Idaho, although a similar referendum in Alachua County

in Florida was approved. It is currently

under legal challenge.

This year, anti-Gay initiatives are expected to be held in the states of Maine and Washington and also in Tampa, Florida. Because the high court is not expected to rule on the Colorado case until next year, the results of these votes will not be affected immediately, though Gay rights advocates and the American Civil Liberties Union will no doubt submit separate legal challenges if they are passed.

On March 7, the US Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit will hear arguments in the appeal of a lower court decision striking down an anti-Gay measure passed by Cincinnati voters. The judge in that case had also ruled the anti-Gay initiative unconstitutional.

Suzanne Goldberg, staff attorney with Lambda Legal Defense who is working on both the Colorado and Cincinnati cases, commented: "Anti-Gay initiatives call into question the very heart of our democracy. If courts permit these measures to take effect, it would fundamentally change the relationship between the rights of minority groups and the power the majority has to infringe upon those rights."

"This case," she said of the Amendment 2 appeal to the Supreme Court, "will affect the future of all civil

rights in America."

House, Senate Committees Take Divergent Action on AIDS Funds

House Members Slash Funds; Senators Support CARE Act

Washington, DC — In a mind-boggling outbreak of Congressional schizophrenia, committees of the House and Senate in late February adopted wildly divergent positions on funding for AIDS.

The Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources heard extensive testimony from people with HIV/AIDS, Clinton administration officials and AIDS service providers about the necessity for re-authorizing and increasing allocations for the Ryan White CARE Act. Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, was among those who testified.

To the relief of AIDS advocates, the committee's powerful chair, Sen. Nancy Landon Kassebaum (R-KS) expressed

her strong support for re-authorization and her opposition to a plan to turn the CARE Act into a block grant program. The committee's second-in- command, Edward Kennedy (D-MA) is a solid supporter of the CARE Act and increased funding

But just as these positive signals came from the Senate, preliminary votes by two subcommittees of the House approved the slashing of AIDS funding already allocated for the current fiscal year. These are funds already in the pipeline which AIDS groups had

anticipated receiving.

The House appropriations subcommittee on Labor/Health and Human Services/Education voted to cut \$13 million from Ryan White CARE Act programs. The same committee slashed \$23 million from prevention programs at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, even though the programs are effectively stemming the spread of AIDS.

Meanwhile, the House appropriations subcommittee on Veterans Affairs/Housing and Urban Development voted to eliminate the \$186 million Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) program, which provides housing assistance to people with AIDS who would otherwise remain

"This is awful," Doug Nelson told In Step about the subcommittees' action. "I'm afraid it's a signal of what is yet to come in the 1996 budget battles and indicates how difficult this new era will be."

"This is a very dangerous time for social programs and economic justice issues," Nelson commented. "Everything is on the cutting block. Cutting the WIC program Inutrition for Women, Infants and Children], the school lunch program - it's such heartless slashing."

Nelson said the House subcommittees' action cutting AIDS funds is far from the last word. The cuts would have to be ratified by the regular committees, then the whole House, then the Senate. If the budget-cutting is approved, Wisconsin would not be immediately affected because Title II funds have not (yet) been targeted. But Title I funds to cities with high incidences of AIDS and money for pediatric AIDS and prevention programs would be sorely missed

Nelson found some cause for hope in the commitments made by Senators Kassebaum and Kennedy and in the favorable reception accorded to the idea that the formulas of the Ryan White CARE Act be revised to ensure more equitable distribution of funds. This is a goal long lobbied for by Nelson and AIDS service providers in smaller states and communities. Their efforts reinforced by a Government Accounting Office report that confirmed the money is inequitably distributed, causing great disparities from city to city, state to state.

The three proposed changes to the CARE Act funding formulas include: counting cases based on the number of people actually living with AIDS rather than using a cumulative count from the beginning of the epidemic (60% of those individuals are dead); stop the "double-counting" of AIDS cases in places that get both Title I and II funds; and factor in a formula that takes into account the different capacities of each community to provide services instance, Los Angeles is more likely than Detroit to have more local funds for AIDS services because of its bigger and wealthier tax base.

Citizen support is desperately needed in the battle to re- authorize the Ryan White CARE Act, to maintain current funding and to increase next year's AIDS budget. Nelson urges In Step readers to call their Senators and members of Congress.

NATIONAL News Briefs

Gav Olympian Greg Louganis Reveals He Has

New York, NY - Olympic diving champion Greg Louganis, who declared his homosexuality last year during opening ceremonies at Gay Games IV in New York, has now revealed that he has AIDS

In an emotional interview with Barbara Walters on ABC's 20/20, Louganis revealed that he received his HIV diagnosis several months before competing in the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea. He feared the discovery of his condition but was advised by his doctor and coach not to reveal it. He went on to win gold medals in springboard and platform diving (just as he had in 1984). Today, he said, according to

the Centers for Disease Control's definition, "I have AIDS versus HIV."

Louganis told Walters of his traumatic childhood. As a Gay boy, a dyslexic and the child of a Samoan father, he was taunted as a "sissy, nigger, retard." He made several attempts to take his life, all of which failed. He admitted that channeling all his energies into diving was a way to escape the harassment and his own self-doubts by

immersing himself in his sport.

The media made much of the fact that Louganis hit his head on the springboard and bled a tiny bit into the pool at the Seoul Olympics. The doctor treating the cut did not wear protective gloves. The doctor has tested HIV-negative and experts say there was virtually no danger of anyone contracting HIV from the pool's water. Meanwhile, spokesmen for the Olympics have said they have no intention of testing athletes for HIV.

Log Cabin Leaders Defend Controversial Words, Deeds

Washington, DC - Leaders of the Log Cabin Federation, a coalition of clubs for Gay Republicans, are on the defensive for their decision to hold their annual convention in Cincinnati, a city which passed and anti-Gay referendum, and for comments that seemed to imply they did not fully support the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), a bill in Congress that will outlaw job bias based on

In 1993, Cincinnati voters approved a measure forbidding the city to adopt civil rights protections for Gays. Local Gays called for a boycott, which the Greater Cincinnati Convention and Visitors Bureau concedes has cost the city \$19 million in lost revenue from canceled conventions. While the initiative is being challenged in

court, local activists say the boycott is still on.

"Some people may ask why the Federation would come to a place that supports discrimination against Gays and Lesbians," Log Cabin President Abner Mason said. "We are excited to engage in a dialogue with the people of Cincinnati. We believe that the majority of Cincinnatians are good people who do not believe that anyone should lose their jobs or be denied a home or service because they are Gay or

Meanwhile the Federation's Executive Director, Rich Tafel, told the Washington Blade that he was misquoted in press reports as saying that he thought passage of ENDA should be delayed. He had said last November after the GOP victory: "Many Americans find expansive civil rights legislation as one of the most visible types of government intrusion."

Tafel clarified his position by saying that since ENDA is unlikely to be passed by Congress this year, the Gay community's top priority should be re-authorization of

the Ryan White CARE Act.

Award-Winning Author Paul Monette Dies at 49

West Hollywood, CA - Paul Monette, whose critically acclaimed novels. memoirs, poems and essays chronicled the struggles of Gay men accepting their sexuality and living and dying in the time of AIDS, died of AIDS complications at his

West Hollywood home on February 10. He was 49 years old.

Monette won the National Book Award in 1992 for his memoir **Becoming a** Man: Half a Life Story. The book traced his youthful upbringing, his suppression of his homosexuality and his gradual acceptance and celebration of it. In it, he wrote: "I can't conceive the hidden life anymore, don't think of it as life. When you finally come out, there's a pain that stops, and you know it will never hurt like that again, no matter how much you lose or how bad you die."

Monette also wrote Borrowed Time: An AIDS Memoir, about Roger Horowitz's death from AIDS. The New York Times said of the book: "Monette has etched a magnificent monument to his lover's bravery, their commitment to each other and the plague of hatred and ignorance they had to endure."

Monette's book of poetry, Love Alone: 18 Elegies for Rog, was a tribute to Horowitz. His novel Afterlife was about three Gay men who meet in a hospital as their

Monette was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts and educated at Yale, He taught college English for many years. He is survived by his lover, Winston Wilde, his father and a brother

Rev. Mel White Fasts in Prison Protest

Virginia Beach, VA - As In Step went to press. Rev. Mel White of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches was completing the second week of a fast to protest his arrest outside the headquarters of the Christian

Broadcasting Network on February 15

Rev. White, a Gay man who is a former ghostwriter for Pat Robertson, the owner of CBN and producer of the 700 Club, had gone to the CBN offices to see his former boss. White hoped to discuss Robertson's extensive use of anti-Gav rhetoric on the 700 Club and in Christian Coalition policy statements and fundraising appeals.

White and a coalition of other members of the clergy went to CBN on Valentine's Day but were turned away. When they returned the next day, they were met by CBN security guards. His delegation left, but White was arrested for trespassing at an institution of higher learning. He is currently in the Virginia Beach jail under \$2,500 bond, which he has refused to pay. He has vowed to fast until

Robertson meets with him

White wants to make two requests of Robertson: that Robertson acknowledge the growing number of hate crimes against Gay and Lesbian people. and that he condemn those hate crimes and the people who incite or commit them.

Lesbian Avengers Spread Terror with "Plague of Locusts"

San Rafael, CA - The Lesbian Avengers have struck again! This time they unleashed a "Plague of Locusts" on the headquarters of Exodus International, the organization which oversees 75 ministries that claim to cure Gays of their homosexuality through redemption in Jesus Christ.

Five Avengers stormed Exodus's office February 8 chanting and carrying signs saying "Queer Love is Not a Disease!" Once inside, the women climbed on a desk, shouted "We don't need to be cured!" and released 1,000 "locusts" (crickets) in

an attempt to shut the operation down.

The Exodus staff watched dumbfounded as the swarming pile of crickets spread across the office floor. One worker picked up the phone and dialed 911, shaking as she reported, "There are Lesbians here with bugs!" By the time she was able to convince the police that it was not a prank call, the Avengers were on their way back to San Francisco.

Through their action, the Lesbian Avengers wanted to expose the fact that Exodus and the "ex-Gay" ministry movement are an insidious part of Christian Right

organizing that have profoundly devastating effects on Gays and Lesbians.

Thousands of troubled people are referred to these "conversion" programs every year. And "ex-Gays" are used as "trophies of the far Right," noted Avenger Katie "They're used in right wing propaganda to prove that homosexuality is a chosen perversion. And that we therefore don't deserve basic civil rights."

"If anyone deserves a plague of Biblical proportions right now," Avenger Liz

Harris declared, "it's the Radical Right."

Attorneys: Homosexuality Shouldn't Limit Child Custody

Chicago, IL — The American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers, comprised of the nation's top 1,500 divorce and matrimonial law attorneys, has declared that homosexuality in and of itself should not be a bar to the custody of children. The policy statement was included in an amicus brief filed in the Sharon Bottoms custody case, soon to be heard by the Virginia Supreme Court.

Any presumption that a homosexual parent is 'unfit' for custody simply by virtue of his or her homosexuality is a doctrine based upon prejudice and stereotypes which deprives a parent of fundamental rights and privileges guaranteed under the Constitution, while simultaneously ignoring the best interests of the child," the brief

"The fact is," Attorney Cynthia L. Greene, primary drafter of the Academy's statement, said, "that as to actual child-rearing skills and the ability to provide an appropriate home environment, be it from a material, moral or spiritual viewpoint, recent research shows there is no difference between heterosexual and homosexual parents."

In the case at hand, Sharon Bottoms, a Lesbian mother, was denied custody of her son by a trial court in 1993 based solely on her homosexuality. Custody was granted to the boy's grandmother. An appeals court reversed that judgment, but the grandmother appealed that decision to the state's high court.

Also on the Newswire...

Washington, DC - Homophobic Congressman Bob Dornan (R-CA) may be planning a new anti-Gay campaign. Dornan recently requested that the Department of Health and Human Services provide him with detailed information on any and every HHS program that involves Gay or AIDS-related grants or projects. Activists are bracing for Dornan's expected onslaught.

Los Angeles, CA - Hundreds of African American Gays and Lesbians met in Los Angeles the weekend of February 18-19 for the annual conference of the Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum. Discussion focussed around building the group into a national organization which could give support to fledgling organizing efforts by black Gays Lesbians in their localities. Participants also discussed desperate need for better AIDS prevention efforts among young Gay and Bisexual men of color.

New York, NY — Terrence McNally's critically acclaimed comedy/drama Love! Valour! Compassion! has moved from the Manhattan Theater Club to Broadway's Walter Kerr Theater. The popular play about eight Gay men interacting on successive weekends at a farmhouse retreat, needed a larger theater to accommodate the crowds and is likely to be nominated for a Tony Award. Another Gay-themed play, Cheryl West's Holiday Heart, about a girl who finds family with a boisterous drag queen, opened off-Broadway to mixed reviews.

Toledo, OH - A new group called the Toledo Gay and Lesbian Coalition planned to hold its first demonstration March 1 to protest disciplinary action taken against a high school student for wearing a "Boycott Homophobia" t-shirt. Activists planned to distribute information on Gays, Lesbians and AIDS as well as condoms in their protest at Central Catholic High School

Honolulu, HI - A court has granted the state of Hawaii an extra period of five months to prepare for the trial which is expected to decide the legality of same-gender marriage in the islands. Opening arguments were originally scheduled for April, but the trial will now

be delayed until September.

Chicago, IL - The American Civil Liberties Union has reached a settlement in its challenge to the Chicago Police Department's HIV testing policy. The City has agreed it will no longer test police recruits for HIV, nor will it require them to disclose their HIV status. The ACLU's lawsuit had prompted Mayor Richard Daley to issue an executive order prohibiting all city agencies from testing prospective employees for the virus.

San Francisco, CA — After strenuous protests by Gay and Lesbian activists, KSFO fired its conservative talk show host J. Paul Emerson. Emerson had called for the imprisonment of people with AIDS, labeled Gay men "sick butt humpers," and described Japanese Americans as "rotten and filthy." He repeatedly stated that all listeners who did not agree with his views should be shot.

New Milford, CT — Bob Randall, who wrote the Broadway play 6 Rms Riv Vu and was head writer and producer of the Kate and Allie TV show, died of AIDS complications at his Connecticut home February 13. He was 57. Randall also wrote the suspense novels The Fan, The Next, and The Calling. He's survived by his partner, Gary Pratt, and a son and daughter.

Washington, DC — The Freer Gallery of Art, affiliated with the Smithsonian, canceled the showing of a Gay film in February citing its "explicit sexual scenes" which would be "exceedingly problematical" for gallery-goers. The film was Okoge, a Japanese movie about a woman who befriends a Gay male couple.

Two Madison Area Men Charged in Gay Bashing

Attack Labeled Hate Crimes

Madison — Two Dane County men are free on \$1,000 signature bonds in the beating and robbery of a 33 year old Gay Madison man, who wishes to remain anonymous.

Authorities charged both Ryan D. Meiller, 18, of Madison and Erik Jacobson, 20, of Waunakee with robbery and substantial battery on February 23. The two were arrested the morning of February 22. The assault is being classified as a hate crimes, which extends the maximum prison sentence they face from 10 years to 15 years on each count.

When arrested, Meiller allegedly told officers: "All right, I did it. We beat the shit out of that faggot." According to police he also said "I don't like homosexuals and anything like it."

According to the filed complaint, the two met the anonymous victim near the Red Letter News, and adult bookstore on East Washington Street in Madison and agreed to follow him to Demetral Park. There, the two allegedly kicked the victim repeatedly in the ribs and head.

The alleged assailants then took the

man's automated teller card, and while Jacobson held the man in the park, Meiller tried to use the card. When it didn't work, Meiller returned to the park and the two allegedly beat the victim even more.

As the pair departed, the victim wrote down their license plate number and then called police. The criminal complaint alleges that the two initially intended only to beat the man "because he was homosexual" but later decided to rob him as well. The robbery yielded about \$7.


Wisconsin's Hate Crimes Enhancement Penalty provides for an increase in sentence for bias against people in a number of categories, including sexual orientation. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled unanimously that such statutes are constitutional.

STATE News Briefs

Federal Suit Against Milwaukee Police Starts March 21

Milwaukee — Attorneys for the family of Konerak Sinthasomphone, a 14-year-old victim of serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer, go to federal court March 21 to argue that institutionalized racism and homophobia in the Milwaukee Police Department contributed to the death of the boy.

The civil rights lawsuit will be argued before Judge Terrence Evans and a jury which, if it decides in the Sinthasomphone family's favor, will determine what compensation is in order. The defendants in the suit are the City of Milwaukee and Officers Joseph Gabrish and John Balcerzak who, on the night of May 27, 1991 returned the fleeing Konerak back into Dahmer's custody where he was killed. The ABC and DEF Insurance companies are also defendants.

The plaintiffs charge that the Milwaukee Police Department "tolerated and acquiesced in a custom, practice and policy of discrimination on the basis of race, sex and sexual orientation," that "a clear and unequivocal statement of anti-discriminatory policy" was never adopted, that "measures to eliminate discrimination in recruitment and selection were not implemented" until after Konerak lost his life, and that the conduct of officers Gabrish and Balcerzak on the evening in question included "racism, sexism and homophobia."

One affidavit in support of the Sinthasomphone case is by Ralph Navarro of the Gay Information Service, who relates his own impressions of discrimination and its toleration by police brass while he tried to run sensitivity seminars on Gays and Lesbians at the Police Academy.

Former Student Sues School for Allowing Harassment

Madison — A lawsuit filed in federal court charges that 19-year-old Jamie Stuart Nabozny was beaten and harassed by fellow classmates throughout his high school years and that although Ashland school officials were informed of the problem they did nothing to stop it.

The suit states that classmates became aware of Nabozny's sexual orientation after he was sexually assaulted in 1987. After name- calling escalated into physical harassment, Nabozny and his parents reported the behavior to the school's principal who allegedly responded that "boys will be

boys." The principal also suggested Nabozny might be provoking other students by acting "openly Gay."

students by acting "openly Gay."

"Regardless if Jamie flaunted his sexuality or not," his attorney, Rae Randolph, told the Associated Press, "you can't put the onus back on the child. That's not an appropriate response by school officials when a physical assault complaint is brought."

Nabozny twice attempted suicide and dropped out of school as a junior in December of 1992. He seeks \$350,000 from the Ashland school district and an order allowing him to attend graduation ceremonies and get his diploma.

MASN Moves to New Location; Mowry Resigns

Madison — On February 24, the Madison AIDS Support Network moved from crowded quarters on Lathrop Street into spacious new offices in the Gateway Center at 600 Williamson Street. The new location has the added advantage of being completely wheelchair accessible. There are some parking spots reserved for MASN in front of the Center, and handicapped spaces are clearly marked as well.

In other MASN news, Director Mary Alice Mowry tendered her resignation to the Board of Directors. Mowry cited health reasons and left at the end of February

The Board issued this statement about Mowry's work: "With great regret, the Board accepts Mary Alice's resignation. Her three- year tenure at MASN was an important and challenging time. MASN is a much stronger and more vibrant service organization because of her efforts."

Also Around the State...

Kenosha — Citizens here are lobbying local TV station WHKE-TV, Channel 55, to take the *Bob Enyart Live!* show off the air because of the host's inflammatory anti-Gay, sexist and racist rhetoric. Enyart has served time for disruptions outside abortion clinics and was convicted of child abuse last month for beating his own stepchild with a belt. Complaints can be lodged with WHKE General Manager John Miller at (414) 657-9453.

Milwaukee — Over 500 people attended the annual Danc'n for AIDS fundraiser at the MECCA Convention Center February 11 raising \$45,000, exceeding the event's goal by \$10,000. The dance, sponsored by the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, featured live music by the local band Rhinocerotic and dance mucic by V100 and Muzic in

Motion. Funds will support AIDS care, education and research through several state AIDS service groups.

Puerto Rican Police Harass Gay Cops

San Juan — Members of the Gay Officers League, in Puerto Rico in mid-February for their annual convention, were harassed by Puerto Rican police as they partied in a Gay bar after their meeting.

Leaders of the Gay Officers Group, with chapters in 14 American cities, say they believe the harassment was retaliation for their public statements against institutionalized anti-Gay discrimination in the San Juan Police Department.

The incident occurred just before closing time at a bar called The Cups and just hours after some of the Gay officers present had appeared on a local news show discussing Gays in law enforcement. Fifteen San Juan cops toting automatic weapons entered the bar, demanding to see its liquor license and other permits. Fearful that anything might provoke the police into violence, the bar patrons, mostly police officers themselves, stood still and did not

In Puerto Rico, cops who associate with "homosexuals, prostitutes or persons of ill repute" are subject to dismissal. Police Superintendent Pedro Toledo denied any wrongdoing in the bar raid and reiterated his department's belief that homosexuals are not cut out for the rigors of police work.

Canadian Parliament Harbors 3 Jesse Helms Clones

Ottawa — The Washington Blade reports that three members of the Canadian Parliament have emerged as vocal leaders of Canada's tiny but growing anti-Gay movement. One is a member of a right wing party, but two are members of Prime Minister Jean Chretien's Liberal Party which is committed to adding sexual orientation to the country's Human Rights Act.

Roseanne Skoke, 40, a Liberal MP from Nova Scotia, has made the most blatant Gay-bashing remarks. Skoke has called homosexuality "unnatural, immoral" and "an inhuman act" that "defiles humanity, destroys family and is annihilating mankind." When Skoke was confronted with her own family's moral lapses in the form of evidence that her daughter had given birth out of wedlock,

she replied: "At least she is not a Lesbian." Skoke belongs to the Bayside Movement, a group which believes the Virgin Mary has appeared in Bayside, New York.

Skoke is joined in her anti-Gay fervor by fellow Liberal Tom Wappel of Toronto and Myron Thompson from Alberta. Thompson is a member of the Reform Party, which is actually the most conservative group in Parliament. This trio, which claims support from at least a dozen other MP's, intends to block revision of the Human Rights Act and another bill mandating stiffer penalties for hate crimes based on sexual orientation.

Some activists and politicians dismiss Skoke and her cronies as far right extremeists with no credibility. But John Fisher of Equality for Gays and Lesbians Everywhere in Ottawa blames the Prime Minister and the ruling party. "There is a lack of leadership on the part of the government," he told the Blade. "There needs to be a firm hand in dealing with such feelings of hatred."

Latvian Lutheran Church Excommunicates Gavs

Riga — The International Lesbian and Gay Association reports that the Latvian Evangelical Lutheran Church, the largest denomination in this country of 3 million people, recently took action to excommunicate all sexually active homosexuals.

The church's governing body issued a statement declaring that "Persons who deliberately practice homosexuality and have chosen it as their way of life shall not be allowed to fulfill any responsibilities during parish services or within the church hierarchy. They shall also be separated from the Eucharistic community while the evangelical principle, 'Repent your sins and bring forth the fruits of your repentance' remains unfulfilled."

Latvian Gays and Lesbians, organized as the Latvian Association for Sexual Equality, held a demonstration outside church headquarters protesting the church's action. Since Latvia declared its independence from the former Soviet Union, small numbers of Gays and Lesbians have begun meeting and organizing. Progress for them is likely to be very slow because of the deeply conservative nature of their homeland.

Protests Squeezing Benetton Retailers in Germany

Kassel — The New York Times reports that increasing protests against Benetton's controversial advertising campaigns are cutting the company's

Benetton, an Italian-owned clothing manufacturer, has been subject to increasing public protests and boycotts for ads featuring vivid images of misery: a dying AIDS patient, a war cemetery, an oil-soaked sea bird, child labor, and the bloody uniform of a Croation soldier. While anger has been expressed worldwide, Germans, with a special sensitivity to the horrors of war and the Holocaust, have reacted most aggressively. A survey found that 84% of Germans feel Benetton's ads are in poor taste.

German retailers who are Benetton licensees say their business has dropped nearly 30% since the public outcry began. They have appealed to Benetton to change its ad campaign. Several retailers who have tried to sever their relations with Benetton, or refused to pay the company to cover their own losses, are being sued by Benetton.

"It is using human tragedy and suffering to sell clothes," attorney Ulfert Engels said of Benetton's ads. "I think that's totally cynical and without feeling. If you are against child labor, poverty, war, fine, take out all the ads you want. But don't put your company logo on it."

In a related story, a French court recently ordered Benetton to pay \$32,000 in damages to several French people infected with HIV who were distraught by the company's depiction of people with HIV/AIDS. The company will be fined \$9,000 for each offending poster that is not taken down.

Vengeance-Seeking Serial Killer Dies of AIDS

London — The Reuters News Service reports that Michael Lupo, convicted of killing four Gay men in 1986 after he learned he had contracted HIV, has died of AIDS complications in prison in northern England.

Lupo, an Italian-born fashion designer, was Gay himself. Furious that he had been infected with HIV, he went on an eight-week killing rampage before being arrested. He strangled his five victims after having sex with them and mutilated their bodies. He also confessed to two other attempted murders.

"Lupo had been ill for a long time," said a prison official, "and we had all been expecting him to die."

Also Around the World...

Canberra — The Australian Industrial Relations Commission has decided that Gay and Lesbian federal workers may have access to sick leave to care for loved ones. The Commission revised the language of the policy from

allowing sick leave to care for "immediate family members" to allowing sick leave to care for the more broadly defined

category "household."

Medellin — A new study reveals that homosexuals are among the many victims of roving drug gangs and death squads that mete out frontier "justice" in the cocaine capital of Medellin, Colombia. About 1,500 people are killed each year in a vicious form of "social cleansing." The main targets are suspected criminals, prostitutes, Gays and others perceived as "undesirables." The death squads are often made up of former and current police officers.

Manchester — A British newspaper reports that a woman broke into the Styal women's prison in Cheshire last month so she could spend an evening with her incarcerated female lover. When guards

found a hole in the fence, they conducted a security search suspecting that an inmate had escaped. But all the prisoners were accounted for. The intrepid Lesbian had apparently hidden under her lover's bed and left the next morning, undetected.

Ottawa — During a committee hearing on health expenditures last month, openly Gay Canadian member of Parliament Real Menard told fellow MP's that his lover has HIV. His revelation came during a grilling of the Health Minister who has withheld funds from AIDS projects in Quebec. Menard declared: "I live with someone who is infected. When the minister tells us she's not obliged to spend all the money, it's criminal. There's no other word, it's criminal."

Family, Community Bid Farewell to Christopher Fons

Respects Paid to "The Conscience of the AIDS Community

Milwaukee — Hundreds of family members, friends and fellow community activists paid their respects to Christopher Fons, the man known as "The Conscience of the AIDS Community," at a memorial service at the Pabst Theater Sunday evening, February 26

Fons passed away the morning of February 21 at the home he shared with his lover, Yuri Keegstra, in Bay View. Keegstra was present, along with Fons's longtime friend from high school days, Eric Burna.

Fons died from AIDS complications at age 27. He had received the diagnosis of his HIV-positive status in 1987 and, since then, had been a tireless advocate for AIDS education and funding. Fons was a founder of the Milwaukee chapter of the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP) in 1989 and led many campaigns and demonstrations to get institutions like the school system, the medical societies, the prisons and city government to better respond to the epidemic.

By all accounts, Fons provided much of ACT UP's leadership and inspired others to become activists. Fellow members of ACT UP say the best memorial to Fons's life and work is for others to come forward to continue the fight.

"Moral Compass"

Chris Fons was "the moral compass of the group" said his brother Dan, also involved in ACT UP. "He was an activist to the core, putting himself on the line all the time. What amazes me most is how he opened up his very personal disease process to the public, trying to educate and sensitize people."

"Whenever I was with him, I felt stronger in my beliefs, my determination to confront the ignorance out there," Dan told In Step. "I will continue to feel him looking over my shoulder, guiding me for the rest of my life. I was closer to him

than anyone in my family, and I'm going

to miss him very much.

"Chris created and defined AIDS activism in Milwaukee and made it work." said Doug Nelson of the Milwaukee AIDS Project. "He inspired hundreds of people to join the ranks of AIDS activism and his leadership made a real difference '

"He led the fight in Milwaukee against AIDS discrimination. He constantly challenged public officials and private leaders and institutions - even the Milwaukee AIDS Project - to respond more aggressively to AIDS. Nobody could ever ignore Chris and he, on the bottom line issues, was always right. I think Chris was the conscience of the AIDS community.

Fons's death was "devastating" both personally and politically to Keegstra, his lover and partner in activism, who said: "I

feel like half of me is gone.

Keegstra moved to Milwaukee from Chicago to be with Fons. They were together two and a half years. Keegstra nursed Fons through his final illnesses, exacerbated by his contraction of cryptosporidiosis from Milwaukee's Milwaukee's tainted water two years ago.

"It was an incredible relationship," said Keegstra. "We loved each other and we worked together well politically. We

were a really great team."

Outreach to Youth

Michael Lisowski, Director of Gay Youth Milwaukee, who first met Fons when he came to Gay Youth meetings as a teen, said Fons's most important legacy was his commitment to educate young people about HIV/AIDS.

'Chris always said, 'I didn't have the information to protect myself, and we shouldn't let that happen to any other

The first of Fons's numerous arrests occurred in October, 1990 when ACT UP distributed AIDS information condoms outside Marquette University High School, his alma mater. charges were dropped, but ACT UP has continually been harassed by police, school officials and some parents for their ongoing outreach to teens.

"They were actually shielding the kids from us," Fons once observed. "They don't want us to hand their kids condoms, but how would they like it if someone handed them the AIDS virus?"

At the memorial service, Kari DeFonzo, a friend and fellow AIDS educator at MAP, noted that Fons was speaking to student groups up to a month before his death, sharing what it was like to live with AIDS.

These kids, who probably gave their teachers an incredible amount of hell during the day, listened to Christopher with bated breath." DeFonzo recalled. "What blew me away is not what he said or how much he was willing

to share - which was alot - but he spoke to them with such respect. He never made any of them feel their questions were stupid, and that's why he reached people "

ACTing UP

Fons initiated and/or participated in most of the major public awareness and civil rights campaigns around AIDS in

southeastern Wisconsin.

In 1990, ACT UP surveyed about 200 dentists in Milwaukee and found that nearly one third either refused to treat people with HIV/AIDS or were ignorant of how to use universal precautions. A picket line and subsequent meetings with Wisconsin Dental Association resulted in the WDA providing its members with HIV/AIDS information and reminding them of the illegality of turning away people with HIV/AIDS.

In 1991, Fons was arrested after trying to present Gov. Tommy Thompson with a peanut butter and jelly sandwich, protesting the state's refusal to give dietary supplements to prison inmates with HIV/AIDS. He protested the failure of the State Department of Corrections to implement reforms in the prisons as well as the deaths of Donald Woods and Dennis Hill, men with AIDS who were allegedly mistreated by prison guards -Woods at Waupun, Hill at the Racine County Jail.



and more funding for an AIDS cure, Fons was arrested with 36 other AIDS activists who disrupted the US Senate and occupied the Capitol's rotunda in October, 1991. The charges were later dismissed.

During a local visit by President Bush's Secretary of Health and Human Services, Fons and his brother Dan were detained and thrown into a paddy wagon by Milwaukee police, one of whom made

Arnold (Arnie) M. Malmon

Milwaukee — AIDS activist and community volunteer Arnie Malmon died of complications from AIDS February 27 at Sinai Samaritan Medical Center. Malmon, 51, was a strong vocal client advocate at the Milwaukee AIDS Project where he served on the subcommittee on the board of directors, the consumer advisory panel and the internal review board for clinical trials. He also served on the internal review board of the Wisconsin Community-Based Research Consortium, and several committees of the HIV Program at Sinai Samaritan.

An accomplished public speaker, Malmon became a community educator by traveling the state speaking to students, educators and health care professionals about living with AIDS. He drew his audiences in with humor and his personal approach. He also influenced drug manufacturers and health care providers to make their products more patient friendly and through this he became a consultant to Caremark. His bi-weekly column, Positively HIV, which appeared in In Step Magazine was collected into a booklet that was widely distributed at health conferences throughout the state and in other parts of the country.

Malmon's experience in the health care field began when he directed the Milwaukee Blood Pressure Program where he turned a fledgling community health program into an international model. At the invitation of the German government he took a six month leave of absence to set up a similar program in Munich, Germany. He also worked as fund development coordinator for the Alzheimer's Association of SE Wisconsin, and was a visiting scholar at the UWM Center for Architecture and Urban Planning. He was a director and founder of the Cream City Foundation and a member of GAMMA

Most recently Malmon took part in a survivor's workshop used for the creation of internationally acclaimed choreographer Bill T. Jones' dance production Still Here. Malmon wrote about this experience for the Milwaukee Journal.

Malmon, a graduate of UWM, is survived by his parents, Lee and Morrie Malmon of Ormond Beach, Florida; his brother and sister-in-law, Sheldon and Ruth Malmon of Fox Point; two nieces, Elizabeth Malmon of Fox Point and Ellen Malmon of Chicago; and a sister, Sunsh Stein of New York City.

A celebration of Arnie's life will be scheduled in about a month, watch In Step for details.

Ron Geiman, publisher of In Step commented: "Arnie always said he'd write his *Positively HIV* column as long as he could. He'd say, 'It's not over till

the fat lady sings' so I hope she performed his favorite aria."

His sister, while browsing through Arnie's computer found that Arnie had started to write his final column. Reprinted below is what he had completed, headlined **Dead End...**

"If you're reading this column you can safely assume my demise. So this is the final column. I started writing this in January of 1994. I figured that it couldn't hurt to be prepared. Anyway, I wanted to title this article Positively Dead. But everyone I showed it to was appalled. Anyway, you might want to watch In Step for information on my celebration of life."





Milwaukee - Many of us in the Gay community and those of us who are associated in one way or another with the Milwaukee AIDS Project were very familiar with Lavender Hill. (Lavender Hill was a MAP fund-raiser and party that was very popular in Milwaukee for many years.) It was started by Steve Steinhauer and held in his back yard on Booth Street for many years. In fact, it was held for 11 successive years before it was forced to bow out and in a sense

The last Lavender Hill event was held on Saturday, August 6, 1994 at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee campus. The committee who worked so hard to plan this event, hoped for a very successful evening and lots of good

people there to support it.

MANAGEMENT.

The large ballroom that evening was beautifully decorated and the food was plentiful and delicious. Costumes were stunning. However, success was not to be... the evening wore on and less than 175 guests were present and 25% of those were admitted free. We had hoped for at least 500 to be present to make it a huge success. Large attendance that evening was so important to the survival of Lavender Hill.

Those members who gathered there next day to take down the decorations were visibly broken hearted.

They knew they had not brought in the crowd needed to survive and their hard work had been in vain. They saw the "handwriting on the wall."

A meeting was held in November tinged with sadness and regret and the vote that day was in favor of disbanding Lavender Hill after 11 wonderful, heartwarming years. There was not a dry eye that day... a sad meeting and remorse over the demise of a wonderful and heartfelt fund raising event.

Sometime this summer, a very intimate Lavender Hill party, committee members and their quests. will be held. Monies collected will be donated to MAP, or to some group associated with helping HIV victims.


Because the event had outgrown Steve's yard, the committee decided to





night when the temperature dipped below zero and the wind chill tore at your face, a small group of friends in Sheboygan set out on the most adventurous project they'd ever attempted; a silent auction which was the culmination of a benefit they had begun on January 1st to Give Your Heart to a Friend in Sheboygan County who are struggling in a battle with HIV/AIDS.

New Years Day began at the Blue Lite Bar in Sheboygan with the first of at least five hundred red and white hearts being applied to the walls etched with the names of friends who had lost the battle over the past years, Valentine wishes from patron-to-patron as well as slams meant in nothing more than good humor. The profitable end of the hearts is that while it only costs a dollar to put a heart up; they charge three dollars to take one down. Then, toward afternoon, steaming crockpots of chili began arriving from many donors for the First Annual Chili Cook-Off. Bar owners Dean Dayton and his mother Vera, generously had provided space, tables, silverware, condiments, and slabs of hot garlic bread to help the event. Two dollars per person was the charge and prizes were awarded for the top three chilies. T-shirts and sweatshirts, silkscreened with the word HOPE; a large red ribbon replacing the O, also went on sale that day and would continue through Valentine's Day

The tempo continued to build until Superbowl Sunday when the committee launched the Connie Casserole Cook-Off. Once again, generous volunteers paraded into the Blue Lite laden with a plethora of delicious concoctions, each one vying for the coveted title. There was a charge of two dollars per person and the outcome was more than anyone expected. By this time they had far exceeded the amount raised the year before on the sale of hearts alone and

there was more to come.

By February 11th, spirits at the Blue Lite were much higher than the temperature outside as the committee organized dozens of antiques, gift items, art works, and gift certificates they had coerced, begged, and panhandled from friends and merchants something they had never before tried to accomplish. The back room of the bar had been converted to a gallery of treasures, all for sale to the highest bidder. There were donated snacks there for the hungry and a delicious champagne punch to help loosen tight wallets. At midnight, Dean announced the bids were about to be picked up and what had been a mild melee an hour earlier suddenly resembled a feeding frenzy among the tables of merchandise. When it was done, over \$2,000 had come in from the auction alone; the highest bid appearing on a photograph which was donated by In Step photographer, Jamie Taylor.

This small group of people had truly given their hearts, time, labor and

money, even down to a "swear jar" used by the in-house dart league to raise \$85. Here, in a relatively homophobic blue collar community, nestled on the shores of Lake Michigan, a brave group of adventurers had raised just over \$5,000 which they will pass on to Synergy, a blanket HIV/AIDS organization which serves the Sheboygan County area.

We can never thank these 15 organizers enough for what they have done for all of us. And, they are not done. Fund raisers will continue over the summer and no one knows what Give Your Heart to a Friend will produce for the next chilly February in Sheboygan.

Rejecting Former Labels

About fourteen months ago, I began writing a monthly column for Gay publications around the country. I called the column Conservatively Speaking. Why this title? I believed that my major credential in the Gay community was my autobiography Coming Out Conservative, and the fact that I was a mover and shaker in the American anticommunist/ conservative community for many years before I came out at the age of 67. There were many Gay men who could write a column, but there were not many Gay conservative men around, over 70, who wanted to share their thoughts in the Gay press. I certainly had that spot covered — with no competition.

Most of the publications printed my columns either regularly or sporadically. However, most of the publications never used Conservatively Speaking as the column header, but simply published what I had to say under my own name. I realized that the word "conservative" repels most Lesbian and Gay men, as do such words as "Christian" and "Republican." Rightly or wrongly, these terms had become code words symbolizing bigotry, fear and loathing of Gay men and Lesbians.

But, I am conservative, Republican and Christian. God knows, I'm Gay, too. Isn't it possible to be all four, or have I become a living oxymoron? The answer eluded me for some time, but is now obvious: No, it is not possible, at least for

me, not in today's world.

In my coming out letter to my friend, William F. Buckley, Jr., which was published in his National Review in July 1990, I aired a premonition that had been haunting me for a long time: "I feel that our cause might sink back into the ooze in which so much of it rested in pre-National Review days," I wrote to Buckley. "In that dark age, the American Right was heavily, perhaps dominantly, made up of bigots, anti-Semites, anti-Catholics, the KKK, red-necks, Know Nothings, a sorry lot of public hucksters and religious medicine me. Now, times are changing. There is no longer the anticommunist cement to hold the edifice together. The great enterprise... is in danger of sinking back into an aggregate of bigotries."

HOLD THE FORT AGAINST THE BARBARIANS

Alas, my prediction has zed. The words "Conservative," my prediction has been "Christian," and "Republican," are being held hostage by the same forces that controlled the American Right before Buckley and his band of true believers (of which I was proud to be part) made American conservatism more mainstream and respectable. Of course, even now, there are still those among the Republican ranks, like Senator Arlen Specter, who attempt to hold the fort against the barbarians. But, they are vastly outnumbered by the descendants of those from a half-century ago who would drag the country back into the swamps of intolerance and division. Can the valiant defenders prevail? I don't believe they can, not in the foreseeable

Where does this leave me?

I cannot associate myself with Rush Limbaugh and other new "Conservative" leaders, nor with Pat Robertson and his "Christian" brigades, nor with Jesse Helms and his new "Republican" majority. The only identity of which I am absolutely certain is that I am a homosexual in a country which has little patience with us Gay folk.

Millions of Americans Gay men and Lesbians — perhaps a great majority of our would-be community — are in the closet, terrified of coming out and standing openly with their sisters and brothers against the forces that would see us obliterated. Make no mistake: The ultimate goal of our enemy is to make us disappear, either back to a closet that will make today's seem wide open by comparison — or dead. Hysterical? I don't think so...

Where does that leave me? Us? I can no longer accept such labels as conservative, Christian, or Republican, which draw much of their coherence from hostility towards people like me. No Gay or Lesbian American should any longer accept any of these labels, which have become mere code-words for attacks on our collective dignity. We can accept no labels any longer. We must give our allegiance and support only to those individuals and groups who publicly stand with us against bigotry and fear of Gay Americans.

Forget the hand-wringing over Congress and the federal government.

We must focus on our own neighborhoods, our cities, and our states. This is where we will find allies, men and women who have seen our faces, who know who we are. Here we develop the coalitions and power bases who make elected officials — local, state, and national — sit up and take notice. Here, too, we must find and nurture new Gay leaders to replace the figureheads of our national Gay groups who have accomplished little and at great cost.

No longer can we give our votes, our contributions, and our efforts for the pursuit of vague promises. We mustn't sell the soul of our community for "tolerance." Although we desperately need allies from America's mainstream, we must be satisfied with only their full and open support for our cause against our enemies. Indeed, as we have done so often in the past, we will give them our unbridled aid for their steadfast

support.

In the past — and sometimes to the consternation of my African-American friends - I have compared the Gay rights movement to the Black civil rights movement of the sixties. I still believe that they are comparable, and we have much to learn from the history of this great quest, both from its setbacks and its victories. Now, however, I believe it even more urgent to draw a comparison between our community and the Jews and homosexuals of Europe in the 30's and 40's. Then, as now, the majority cried out that those who predicted death and misery were crazy, that such things as mass extermination could not happen, that hysteria was dangerous. Until the very last, until they choked on the lethal gas in the extermination "showers," they did not accept the fact that the Nazi state despised them to the point of eradicating them from the face of the Earth.

The Jews and homosexuals of Europe were victims. We are not. We must never be grateful for mere crumbs off the table at which we have no place. Neither must we let ourselves be shamed from claiming our identity as Gays, content instead to seek shelter under tents whose stakes are planted in the backs of our brothers and sisters.

I can no longer call myself a "conservative," nor a "Christian" nor "Republican." I am a Gay American, and I will retain my independence from any other label. You may, from time-to-time, still come upon my thoughts in the Gay press. Henceforth, however, my column will be called Independently Speaking.

AIDS Briefs

Protein in Saliva May Help Block HIV

Washington, DC — Scientists from the National Institute of Dental Research have discovered a protein in human saliva which seems to play a key role in preventing HIV from infecting blood cells. The finding vindicates the long-held belief that saliva rarely if ever transmits HIV, and it could lead to new routes for preventing or treating HIV infection.

For several years scientists have tested saliva to understand why it apparently contains properties hostile to HIV. But the finding by the Dental Association team has pinpointed the exact element in saliva that inhibits the virus. It is called SLPI (pronounced slippy), for secretory leukocyte protease inhibitor.

SLPI does not directly attack HIV, but works indirectly, sticking to the surface of white blood cells, called monocytes, and preventing HIV from adhering to that same surface and invading the cell. When scientists added purified SLPI to test tubes containing HIV and monocytes, the virus was unable to take hold or to replicate. They need to understand precisely how and why SLPI has this effect in order to use that knowledge in the development of preventive medications or treatments for HIV.

In addition to saliva, SLPI is found in the body's mucous membranes. It is believed to provide protection against the body's own protein-destroying enzymes. Researchers plan to measure the amounts of SLPI found in the rectal and genital and urinary tracts of humans to see if low levels of SLPI in those areas aid in the transmission of HIV.

Overview of Gene Therapy for HIV Published

Washington, DC — The February 18 issue of the medical journal Lancet includes a state-of-the-science review of gene therapy for HIV disease and discusses other innovative approaches to restore the immune systems of HIV-infected individuals. It is written by researchers from the Division of AIDS in the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID).

HIV gene therapy involves injecting into human cells a gene that confers resistance to HIV infection and then infusing these altered cells into a person with HIV. Such therapy may help limit HIV replication within the body and delay

the progression of HIV disease.

The article discusses the future use of harmless viruses or non- viral agents in tiny spheres called liposomes or gold particles to deliver protective genes to a patient's cells. Other technologies described are infusions of certain cells, grown to large quantities in labs, to help restore immune function, and the use of "naked DNA" vaccines to enhance an HIV-infected person's immune response to the virus.

Five NIAID-supported gene therapy trials for HIV disease are awaiting approval by the Food and Drug Administration. One approach involves splicing a gene for molecules called ribozymes into CD4+ T-cells. Another study will try to determine whether a modified form of an HIV protein called Rev, produced by a gene inserted into immune cells, can prevent the killing and depletion of the cells by competing with normal HIV Rev.

Majority of AIDS Cases Outside Largest Cities

Milwaukee — A scientific article published by a team from the Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) at the Medical College of Wisconsin reports findings of the largest study ever conducted establishing HIV/AIDS risk among Gay and Bisexual men in middle-sized American cities and identifying factors that contribute to risk.

Although AIDS is often thought to be primarily a "big city" problem, over 57% of AIDS cases diagnosed in the US have occurred outside the nation's ten largest cities. The CAIR study's findings show that a new front line in HIV prevention

efforts is the nation's small and moderate-sized cities.

The study, directed by Professor Jeffrey A. Kelly, anonymously surveyed 6,000 Gay men in 16 US cities, all with populations of less than 250,000. Excluding from the survey those men in exclusive relationships, 27% of the men reported that they had engaged in

unprotected anal intercourse in the past two months.

"This is of great concern," said Dr. Kelly, "because unprotected anal intercourse is the sexual practice which confers the greatest risk for HIV infection among Gay men, and many men having high risk sex were doing so outside of exclusive relationships. Efforts to reach these men with effective HIV prevention programs are urgently needed if we are to avert a growing HIV/AIDS epidemic in our country's smaller cities."

The survey also questioned men about factors that contributed to their risk or to their successful avoidance of risk. Gay men who were older, had more education, had fewer sexual partners overall, had a strong commitment to safer sex, and who believed that safer

sex was an expected standard of behavior among their own friends were the group most likely to avoid risky sex.

"By contrast," Dr. Kelly noted, "those men who were most likely to continue having unsafe sex were younger, had less education, had larger numbers of sexual partners, and believed that safer sex was not an accepted norm within their circle of friends."

The article, published in the February 1995 issue of the Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology, calls for an increase in HIV/AIDS prevention efforts in middle-size

American cities, particularly directed toward younger and less educated men sexually active with multiple partners.

"Our findings show that effective HIV prevention programs are those which extend beyond simply providing basic factual information about AIDS," said Dr. Kelly, "and instead change social norms within the Gay community to foster safer sex and to strengthen people's intentions to avoid risk."

The War on Unmarried Mothers

Bashing women on welfare has become the latest political sport. President Clinton did it to help his election chances in 1992. The Republicans have picked up where Clinton left off.

"Welfare reform" has become a phrase for re-asserting patriarchal control of women. Women who are unmarried for whatever reason — because they are divorced, deserted, Lesbians or heterosexual women who simply choose not to marry — are suspect members of society whose independence must be arrested. As Newt Gingrich proclaimed in his April interview with Chandler Burr, "... [I]f you look at the pathologies and weaknesses of America today, reestablishing the centrality of marriage and of the role of a male and female in that relationship is a very central issue of the next 20 years."

In background to the welfare reform proposals contained in the Contract with

America, the Republicans claim that the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program, when it was first established in 1935, was created to help widows with children, but that it "now serves divorced, deserted and nevermarried individuals and their children."

Two points must be made. First, the AFDC program was never limited to widows with children (although it is true that most female-headed households during the Great Depression resulted from the death of the father). Second, the Republican subtext is clear — AFDC has been perverted from its original "noble" purpose of helping deserving poor widows (whose single status is not anyone's "fault") to one of helping undeserving families headed by women who are divorced, were never married, or have been deserted by the father.

The Contract proposes to forbid completely AFDC and housing benefits to families headed by unmarried mothers under 18 years of age (with states having the option to extend this prohibition to age 21). Families headed by women who give birth when they are 18 also could not receive AFDC unless the mother lives at home with her parents, marries the father, or another man who adopts the child.

What if the father refuses to marry the mother? What if the father is violent and the mother does not want to marry him? What if the mother's parents are abusive and the mother and the child should not stay in their home? What if the mother's parents won't let them stay? What if the mother marries another man, but he cannot adopt the child because the father still has parental rights? The Contract fail to deal with these real life situations.

The Contract would require states to set up work programs for AFDC recipients. While the programs are billed in the Contract as "work training and education programs," there would be no requirement that states provide recipients with any sort of training or education. Instead, states simply would have to ensure that a certain number of their AFDC recipients are working outside the home 35 hours a week (or working 30 hours plus searching for a job 5 hours). A mother taking care of her own children at home is not considered working, while a mother paid to care for another family's children is counted as working.

States would have the option of ending AFDC payments to any recipient, including older mothers, after two years, if the recipient has been in a work program for at least one year. States would be required to terminate AFDC payments after 5 years. No exceptions, even if there is no paid work available for the mother, or even if employment that is available fails to raise the family out of

poverty.

Full-time year-round minimum wage employment provides a gross income of \$8,840, which is less than a poverty level income for a mother and her child. The Republicans oppose increasing the \$4.25 per hour minimum wage. The Contract says not a word about providing health insurance, which is rarely provided by minimum wage employers. Nor is support for day care expenses for young children a feature of the Contract. (Presumably, friends and relatives are expected to provide free day care.)

The Republican "solution" for families where women are unable to earn sufficient money to support their children when they are denied or forced off AFDC are adoption, group homes for unwed mothers, and orphanages. Item #4 in the Contract, the "Family Reinforcement Act of 1995," would give a \$5,000 tax credit

to families adopting children. So much for reinforcing poor families.

Playing on common stereotypes of large families growing fat on AFDC, the Contract would allow states to reduce AFDC benefits if a recipient had another child. Never mind that the average size of families on AFDC is less than three, that birth rates of AFDC mothers are lower than birth rates for the general population, and that the birth rate among AFDC recipients in states paying low AFDC benefits is actually higher than in states paying high benefits. Never mind that combined AFDC and food stamp benefits are less than the poverty line in virtually all states. Never mind the additional AFDC benefits for an additional child is far less than the cost of raising the child, so that mothers do not increase their living standard by

having more children.

At the same time that the Republicans would penalize a woman for bearing an additional child, they would ensure that a woman, once pregnant, carries her baby to term: the Contract would forbid states from using federal funds for abortion services or counseling.

The welfare proposals are designed to force women into marriage, and where women refuse or are unable to marry, to destroy their families. Just as Lesbians and Gay men are deemed by many judges to be unfit to raise children, so too are poor unmarried women deemed unfit to raise their children.


In the past there were three types of vacations for LesBiGay travelers: exclusively Gay or Lesbian group trips such as a cruise or a visit to an all-inclusive resort; a trip tied to a specific LesBiGay event like the annual Mardi Gras in Sydney, Australia, the carnival in Rio, etc.; or, travel to a Gay-friendly town like Provincetown, Key West or Palm Springs.

Today however, Gay- and Lesbian-friendly tour operators are realizing that the most important thing about LesBiGay travelers is that operators can't characterize it in term of individual travelers; it covers the full range of travel experiences.

WOMEN TRAVEL DIFFERENTLY

Gay men and Lesbians don't travel the same way. Most Lesbians are interested in the identity aspect of a trip, like going on a woman-only cruise. The quality of accommodations is also more important to women.

Plus, like other working women, Lesbians tend to make less money than Gay men. Several Gay-friendly travel agencies set up special payment plans to give Lesbian clients



greater flexibility in paying for their trip.

Lesbians also seem to like their itineraries to emphasize cultural activities, more sightseeing and (like all

women) time to shop.

Women-only white-water rafting trips in California, Oregon, Arizona and Utah are very popular. Lesbians are also traveling more frequently to Costa Rica and other ecotourism destinations around the world. Adventure travel tours popular with Lesbians include destinations like Peru, Honduras and Australia for kayaking, diving, snorkeling and rafting.

Accounting for 10-15% of the \$3.5 trillion spent worldwide on travel, adventure travel is the fastest growing

RSVP Travel Productions offers all-men and all-women cruises from St. Martin and calls at Anguilla, St. Barthelemy, St. Kitts and Nevis. Fares start around \$995 in double occupancy. Next season they

won't have many same-sex cruises, many will be more mixed.

Olivia Cruises and Resorts out of Oakland, CA caters to Lesbians and offers a seven night Alaska cruise. Fares start around \$1595 in double occupancy.

Other charter cruise companies have trips on the French and Italian Rivieras, Costa Rica, the Caribbean and the Mediterranean starting around \$1295. Pied Piper Travel in New York sells blocks of cabins on cruises to Gay clients. SO... GET PACKING

Pack light. The general rule is don't pack anything you'll end up having to carry everywhere you go. Plan on taking washable, wearable, packable clothes that coordinate well. Cotton knits and cotton-poly fabric blends travel well. Pack for the climate you'll be visiting. lunches were some days on one of the on-slope restaurants and other days down in the villages. California's Russian River Area Bounces Back From Flooding

Guerneville, CA — The flooding is long gone and clean-up along the Gay favorite Russian River is proceeding faster than expected. The river crested January 9 in Guerneville, CA at just under 48 feet, a foot lower than the flood of 1986.

Dozens of inns, bed and breakfast, cabins, restaurants and other businesses in the area have reopened. Many seized the opportunity to make capital improvements to land and buildings while repairing damage caused by the flood.

Although the excessive rainfall led to flooding that attracted national media attention, most areas of west Sonoma County were unaffected. The Sonoma Coast and famous Armstrong Redwoods State Reserve were virtually undamaged by the heavy rains, and wine grape growers report the dormant vineyards "slept through" the substantial rainfall and emerged unscathed.

The Russian River Region is a visitor information center established in 1953. It includes the Russian River from Cloverdale to the Pacific Ocean, the Sonoma County coastline, and the largest wine growing region in Northern

California.

SPRING AROUND THE CORNER

Of the businesses not yet reopened, most say they will be ready for visitors this spring. The wet winter is expected to produce one of the most spectacular springs ever in the area, with huge seas of yellow mustard, budding vineyards and thousands of plants and trees in bloom. Along the ocean, the usual endless array of wildflowers will be even more dramatic this year,

All special events are expected to take place on schedule, including April's Apple Blossom Festival in Sebastopol and Fisherman's Festival at Bodega Bay. 



Spirit of Oscar Wilde Triumphs in "Man of No Importance"

Albert Finney Shines as Late-Blooming Gay Irishman

The new movie A Man of No Importance is a pleasant surprise. It's a heartfeltslice-of-life comedy/drama about a middle-aged Irish bus conductor coming to terms with his sexual identity back in 1960. And although not exactly a featured player, Oscar Wilde makes his presence felt strongly throughout the film.

Albert Finney is Alfie Byrne, the affable bus conductor who is so smitten with Wilde's writing that he reads passages to his bus passengers and organizes them into an amateur theatrical troupe to perform Wilde's plays

Alfie is also smitten with the handsome young bus driver he is teamed with, calling him "Bosie," the endearment Wilde bestowed on his lover, Lord Alfred Douglas. But Alfie's desire for his Bosie is kept in check for he is convinced that Bosie, played by the gorgeous Rufus Sewell, will be "repulsed" by his feelings.

While bringing together his amateur thespians to rehearse Wilde's risque Salome, Alfie also becomes obsessed with a pretty young woman just new to Dublin, Adele (Tara Fitzgerald). Charmed by her sweetness and grace, Alfie dubs her his "Princess." Alfie's clueless sister makes a comical attempt to matchmaker the two

But Adele has her own secret. She breaks down during one rehearsal unable to utter the playwright's words about her character being a virgin. (Hey, this is 1960 in very Catholic Dublin!) In a dramatic sequence, Alfie learns the truth about his idealized "Princess." That revelation and the realization that his love for Bosie will forever be unrequited finally lead Alfie to publicly assert his sexuality.

HELP FROM OSCAR

Alfie dons the cape, fedora, walking stick and lapel flower favored by his beloved Oscar Wilde, sashays into a Gay bar and picks up a young man. The result is momentarily disastrous but ultimately liberating. Everyone now

knows about Alfie. A few narrow-minded characters, like a butcher who has tried to censor Salome, respond with predictable taunts. But Alfie's many friends, who know him as a decent man, and his pious sister, who is distressed but compassionate, open their hearts to him. Even Bosie comes around, and the last lighthearted scene has Alfie coaching him in a reading of Wilde's Ballad of Reading Gaol!

A Man of No Importance is a very slow-paced film, and American moviegoers have to contend with some heavy Irish brogues that may obscure some of the dialogue. But patient viewers and those prepared to see a sensitive movie about a very special character will be rewarded for their attention.

Albert Finney is simply splendid as the repressed, but irrepressible Alfie, who loves life and art with a passion yet is anguished by his own virginity. Finney conveys Alfie's sly humor and abundant wit and is most compelling in a wrenching scene when he bares his soul to his disapproving sister who doesn't want him to touch her anymore. "My hands are innocent of affection!" he cries.

Lest you think this is another lugubrious Hollywood tale of a tortured homosexual, rest assured it is not. There is a great deal of humor and insight sprinkled throughout and, praise the Lord, the queer doesn't die in the end! There's actually a very funny scene where Alfie, in despair, tries to kill himself. He jumps off a bridge, lands in water only knee-high and has a good laugh at himself. For those of us familiar with the long history of queer movie characters who commit suicide, it's a lark!

For any cynics out there who may be chortling at the idea of a middle-aged Gay virgin — get a life! I have no doubt there are men and women, hetero- or homosexual, who experience their sexual awakening late in life. I think A Man of No Importance treats its protagonist with intelligence and wit and dignity. It's a portrait of one man's struggle that adds to the growing diversity of movie images about Gay and Lesbian lives.

nominated for her directorial debut, Complaints of a Dutiful Daughter. Dutiful Daughter is a profile of a Lesbian dealing with her Alzheimers- stricken mother. It is nominated as Best Documentary Feature.

Openly Gay singer/songwriter Elton John is expected to be on hand Oscar night and will most likely perform at least one of the three songs he penned for Disney's *The Lion King* which have been nominated as Best original Song: "Can You Feel the Love Tonight?" "Hakuna

Matata," and "Circle of Life."

Strawberry and Chocolate, a new Cuban film, is nominated as Best Foreign Film. It's about a straight member of the Communist Youth League, David, who develops a friendship with Diego, a cultured and witty Gay man with little patience for political correctness. The film is a plea for respect for diversity and is somewhat revolutionary, being the first movie with a positive view of homosexuality produced in Cuba, whose government and mainstream culture is notoriously homophobic.

The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert, about a transsexual and two drag queens camping their way across the vast Australian outback to a nightclub gig, won a nomination for Best Costume Design. Anyone who has seen the movie will know exactly why.

Nestle had also refused to sponsor last year's episode of Northern Exposure, in which the town's Gay couple were wed.

Uniting Gay & Lesbian Fiction

A Talk with Nisa Donnelly

By Owen Keehnen

In 1990, Lesbian writer Nisa Donnelly burst upon the scene with her sensational debut novel The Bar Stories, winner of the Lambda Literary Award that year. Four years later, St. Martin's Press released her second novel, The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay, and it was well worth the wait.

This deeply moving and rewarding novel centers around the chaotic life of Phoenix Bay, a thirtysomething Lesbian who, her life in shambles, moves in with her friend Rennie Johnson, a Gay writer with AIDS. Also included in this household is Rennie's sister Cecelie, an archaeologist who has fled from a war in Peru and lost her daughter to illness. Soon Cecelie and Phoenix become lovers, and along with Rennie, they create a true home. Through trauma, fear, and hardship, the three not only endure, but grow.

The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay is a simultaneously heartbreaking and heartwarming tale, perceptive, honest, and inspirational. There is an enormous amount of wisdom within these pages. It is a celebration of friendship and family amongst a group of wonderfully drawn Lesbian and Gay characters. This novel has bridged the gap between Gay and Lesbian literature expertly, smoothly, and naturally. Ms. Donnelly has created a genuinely powerful work, one of the most beautiful novels to come out in some time.

Recently, I had the opportunity to congratulate Nisa on her success and we talked a bit about the book and her writing.

Owen: In my opinion, "The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay" is one of the best Lesbian and best Gay novels of the year. Was your intention partially to erode those barriers?

* * *

Nisa: Oh absolutely. In 1989 I worked on the first OutWrite conference and I'll admit that before that I thought Gay literature was pretty much confined to pornography and trash. But I found a lot of really terrific writers working on the conference and they thought Lesbian literature was for the most part, reduced to political diatribe. We got to knowing each other and reading each other's literature and found out we were dealing with the same kinds of issues. When I started looking at Gay men's literature, I

was amazed that no one had talked about the relationships between Lesbians and Gay men, yet I've known from the get-go this was tremendously important and I wanted to make a fictionalized statement of that.

Rennie's illness is so fully explored, what was your method of research? Was it reading, interviews, personal experience?

All of the above. In the acknowledgements I list some of the men who helped me. They were all extremely helpful when I'd ask tough questions about what it's like to be a writer with AIDS.

Your characters are really exquisite. You take the reader deep inside their Photo by Phyllis Christopher

psyches. What's your secret?

I was a newspaper journalist for a long time and that teaches us how to look at people differently. I was a feature writer. You learn to look at people in a new way and hear how they talk. Other than that I let the characters pretty much lead me and develop their own way.

Are you certain of your instincts in situations like that?

I wish I were. My editor wanted the novel trimmed which I did, but we trotted off on a three week dead end in the process. When I got to the dead end I knew I was misguided, but all along the pat I thought, "Boy are we moving!"

The power of created families dominates both your novels. What

does its power represent?

In America, most of us grow up in these really screwy dysfunctional families. As adults we have the option of creating families that are good to us, help us, and do all the things families are supposed to do. I don't have any siblings but when I was in college I found a surrogate sibling. Over the years I've added others to this family circle. What we're doing is saying this screwed up way of the nuclear family that Americans

love so much does work for us—especially for many Gays and Lesbians who are turned out by their biological families or are grossly misunderstood by them.

Another common theme in both "The Bar Stories" and "The Love Sons of Phoenix Bay" is home. How do you define that?

A safe place where you don't have to be constantly on your guard against saying or doing the wrong thing. It's a place you can surround yourself with the things and people you love. It's a place where you can reaffirm who you are and grow with the things around you. I like to keep a lots of plants around me, and I like to live with friends. I'm not really great at lover relationships. I tend to be a much better date than I am a marriage partner.

There's much to be said for that.

It's true. Yo babe, we'll go out but don't go bringing the moving van. This is where I live and where you don't. I've worked really hard to make a place where it's peaceful and safe and we don't have to worry. We don't live with bars on the windows and I won't live with emotional bars either. I lived like that for too many years.

The new book is so emotionally frank. Was there one part that was more difficult for you to write than the others?

The part where Phoenix goes home for her mother's funeral was probably the most personally difficult. I know so many people who live in that southern Illinois

world, farther south than Kentucky. I have the feeling I escaped, yet I know a whole bunch of people who didn't. Writing brought a lot of that back into focus.

What do you see as your greatest writing strength?


The realistic characters. It's what I've always worked the hardest for. I have to be honest to them. That's what I want and what I believe. I don't want to write about all the ugly things. I figure we can get enough of that by going outside every day.

Both your novels also contain fairly graphic sex scenes. Is the representation of Lesbian sex a political or an artistic decision for you?

Both. I got really tired of Lesbians turning their sex lives into a genre called erotica. I didn't see anybody else doing



that. John Updike puts sex scenes in his novels and no one thinks anything about it. Gay men certainly do it, yet Lesbians want it cordoned off in a special little section of a certain shelf called Lesbian erotica, like cookbooks or something. I would like to see more Lesbians work sex into their novels, however they choose to do it. If they choose not to, that's certainly their business, but I'm afraid many have chosen not to do it over the years because it was considered politically incorrect.

What are you working on now? Jersey. It's a novel and the name of an apartment building and it's about the lives of five or six characters that live there

Do you have a career theme? Lesbian triumphs over adversity.

One of your characters comments that "Loving what I do has been my beacon." Is writing your first love?

Absolutely. My first sentence according to my mother was "I sit and write." Mother loves to tell people that. It's the only thing I ever wanted to do.

"Love Songs of Phoenix Bay"

Donnelly's Novel Reaches Out to Both Sexes

Reviewed by Carl M. Szatmary It is difficult to imagine Lesbian literature and Gay literature anymore separate and distinct, with little crossover appeal over the past few decades. Gay writers have often included substantial heterosexual women characters but only rarely did their novels include Lesbians. Gay male characters likewise only rarely turned up in Lesbian novels. Sarah Schulman, David Leavitt, Jane Rule and Armistead Maupin in his Tales of the City books are among the handful of exceptions. This list can now include Nisa Donnelly with her remarkable new novel, The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay.

Nisa Donnelly's debut novel, Bar Stories: A Novel After All has been one of the best-selling Lesbian novels over the past decade with its wise and poignant portrayal of the Lesbian nation in the microcosm of Babe's Bar on a nondescript street in San Francisco. Now after a five year wait, Donnelly returns

with a warm and insightful novel of love and loss set against the background of a San Francisco reeling from the AIDS epidemic.

At the center of The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay is Phoenix Bay, a Lesbian whose lover of several years, Jinx, has abruptly left her. Phoenix is left emotionally adrift until her old friend, Rennie Johnson, asks her to move in with him. Rennie too is struggling, fighting his own private war, a war against AIDS and one in which he has already lost his lover, Carson. When Rennie's sister, Cecile, also comes home after many years in Peru, she too is suffering from the loss of her adopted daughter, Mala. This unlikely trio, each so desperately needing to find a sense of belonging, gradually are able to find the strength to become a family.

Any brief scenario of Donnelly's plot of The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay cannot adequately communicate the richness of her characterizations, the complexity of the novel's relationships, or Donnelly's wry observations on Gay male/ Lesbian bonding in the 90's. Nevertheless Donnelly has created a novel filled with immediately recognizable people with stories that are all too

Throughout The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay, Donnelly has focused her storytelling on the weaving together of small, simple moments - some filled with joy, other bittersweet - but all set against the tapestry of the characters' personal histories.

During one evening as Phoenix and Cecile are falling in love, Phoenix losses herself while counting stars, "Back home on summer nights... she would fall asleep trying to count the stars. Every night she had to start over, it never occurred to her that the task itself was impossible. Instead she felt like a failure, night after night, falling asleep before she was done

When Phoenix returns home following the death of her mother, she is surprised when faced with an encounter with her childhood confidente, David. Years before Phoenix had lost touch with David, and wrongly assumed that he too was a victim of the AIDS plague. But their reunion is, at best tinged with sadness. Unlike Phoenix, David has returned home, now running appliance store that had been his father's blaming his own cowardice

The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay is truly a meditation on human love, both the burning and passionate kind that lovers share as well as the deep and resonant kind of love that old friends can develop. Nisa Donnelly has found a voice that is not only powerful and distinct but which speaks to both Gay men and Lesbians. This is a book that I would highly recommend to everyone, not only to Lesbian readers but also Gay men. The Love Songs of Phoenix Bay was certainly one of the finest Lesbian or Gay themed novels of 1994!

Chris was "The" Milwaukee AIDS activist, and a founder of ACT UP Milwaukee. Arnie has written his column, Positively HIV, for In Step for the last few years, chronicling his battle with AIDS with humor and words. Both are written up more extensively elsewhere, this issue.

No lectures this issue. I guess I stirred things up a bit with my lead off in my last column... then again, if I got people talking about it, that's the purpose of advocacy journalism.

Dancin' for AIDS benefit for ARCW raised more money than they had predicted. They had hoped to raise \$35,000, and ended up with \$45,000! Lots of events were centered around Valentine's Day weekend. Because VD occurred on a Tuesday, many places decided to celebrate it on the previous weekend, instead. 

Where the Hell Are All the Gay People?

"I've just moved here," she said.
"So I asked my friend, 'Where the hell
are all the Gay people?' And this is
where she sent me."

I was speaking to a small group of Gay men and Lesbians who were struggling to maintain a storefront gathering place/ information center/ social opportunity group in a town that could be anywhere in the US or Canada. I'd asked everyone to introduce her/ himself and share how they had found out about the place, as a nice ice-breaking pull-down of some of the barriers between those sitting in the chairs, and me, standing in front. Some people talked about giving back, and becoming volunteers. Some said they'd

found out about a specific program that took place within the confines of this umbrella organization's walls, and it didn't take Einstinean relativity to make the connection. And some explained that their group which had been borrowing living rooms had transferred their sites here because they didn't have to sit in each other's laps unless they wanted to.

Hardly unexpected answers. But this one woman's response caught me up short with its clarity even beyond its intention.

Where the hell are all the Gay people?

Now, I live in a part of the country where, if the 10% Kinsey statistic holds water, there are nearly half a million homodirectionals within an area code or two. Yet when it comes time for a fundraiser/ demonstration/ meeting/ lecture/ concert/ performance/ cruise/ dance/ election/ bazaar/ tag sale/ community cookie bake, we're lucky to turn out enough takers to cover the cost of buying the paper tablecloths.

I'm not so naive as to expect that it is any different for heterorientationals. They have different interests from each other, come from different walks of life, different economic levels, different religious outlooks, different values, ideals and shoe sizes. Kind of just like all of us. But there is something they don't have that we do: the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States of America actively campaigning for their

demise.

So our not showing up for each other is one of those I-don't-get-it things.

It seems to me that if the Martians invaded, we all, regardless of our preferred brand of cola, would check to see if Orson Wells' ghost was playing games again. If not, a common enemy

would unite us under whichever leader recognized a power vacuum when he met one


On our front, the theory is that the more of us who come out, the safer it will be for all of us to come out. And eventually everyone will be so safe that Newsweek won't even bother taking polls any more. Cool theory.

However, and here's where my thinking kicks in: we who have ventured through the visibility veil to the other side, and lived to tell about it, did so at some peril at first, but really, more and more, in a relatively safe environment. Now, if we're looking for safety in numbers, we're dependent on people who couldn't come out when it was relatively safe. And it would seem, it is more decidedly unsafe. So they are a whole lot more likely to stay buried, sucking air through a straw, just when we need them the most.

That's where you, and groups like the one I just visited come in.

(You know how I hate to shake my finger under your nose and tell you what to do, but sometimes a woman's gotta





say what a woman's gotta say. So please just consider this a gracious invitation.)

Go get someone still hiding behind the hangers, and drag 'em to one of the events planned in those little storefronts, or someone's living room. Take 'em to yet another concert/ fishbake/ 10k waddle/ pancake breakfast filled with dozens of shameless homosexuals. And don't let 'em get away with the old, "I'll come out. Really. When I can." stuff. We need 'em. Now.

Show 'em what a shameless homosexual looks like by being one. We're beginning to win our elections. By exactly the percentage that the New York Times says approves of our lifestyle: 52%. Winning is good. But it's not by accident. What's the difference from all our years of losing? A million people on a mall? Maybe. More likely 14 openly Gay people in an office. 6 of us out in a family of 50. 2 of us out to our grandchildren. (Teachers, you're excused. For the moment.)

Out, loud and proud. I know you've heard this. I know I have my mommy voice on. But I'm really not talking to you, I'm talking to the people hiding behind you who can't be found or involved or pulled to the table except by the ones who already know who they are. This is the time we need them the most

This is a time when we are going to have to rely on our must reluctant. It's a

time for the last lurkers to join the parade. Then maybe the storefront centers could pay their rent. And our obstinately clueless enemies could buy a

We scrambled to keep up with the numbers being called while we nervously replaced the chips we'd been using with blobs of color. When did bingo becomes so complicated? Then, after a game in which chips had been used, a terrific clacking noise rose up in the room: all of the regulars were sweeping magnetic devices that looked like bristleless hair brushes over their metalrimmed chips, which, once collected, were safely deposited in their Imperial Margarine containers or Tupperware for safekeeping until the next markerless game

We three swinging gals were breathless and sweating in the unventilated room, trying to maintain a couple of cards each at a time. How were our fellow bingo players managing to keep a half dozen or more cards going all at once, we wondered? And how much must they spend each night, at \$1 per card? Aside from the fact that we hadn't won once in the hour or two we were there, Kathy and I were tuckering out, our eyes burning from the cigarette smoke. And though I think gramma would have stayed to the bitter end, we left then, poorer in cash but wiser in the ways of bingo. This year, I'm bringing my cardboard cut-out of Mo from Dykes to Watch Out For and writing away to the company in Canada who makes the bingo markers. And I'm definitely saving my appetite for some of those Lions Club sloppy joes and hot dogs and a can of Sprite. I hope gramma's ready when we

March is the month that marks the official start of Spring. In March, those of us in the worst of the winter hat-hair zone can just begin to start hoping that summer will one day come again. And with only that small amount of encouragement, I, for one, find myself reminiscing about summers past mostly, I think, to take my mind off the fact that I am getting chilblains while I watch TV in my living room on account of the fact that the windows in our old house are mostly "for show" and I never got around this year to putting that plastic stuff over them.

Be that as it may, I was thinking about an excursion that my gal Kathy and I took last summer. Just like the Monks, those Gay road-faring magazinewriting wags, we hit the road. Although, to be honest, there are a few differences between the Monk boys and us. Like for one, our vehicle of choice isn't a lumbering mobile home. And, two, for us a road trip is not a way of life but simply a break from otherwise regular jobs. Also, I suspect that the Monks, if they stop at major outlet malls at all, don't approach them with nearly the manic glee that we do when we hit the Lighthouse Place mall in Michigan City, Indiana, every year on our way to Kathy's family's summer cottage in Michigan. Furthermore, we, unlike they, are women. Other than that, we're just like the Monks.

Actually, what put me in mind of the Monks was the excursion that we took from our outpost at the cottage - which is just across the road from her grandparents' place and next door to a cousin's. You've heard of the Kennedy compound? Well the "Kirby compound" is the working-class version: no elaborate security system, no curious onlookers, no Kirby-wannabes hanging around, and no excessive amounts of money cluttering things up. Anyway, it's not easy finding a hot night out on the town is Sister Lakes, Michigan — we haven't, for instance, found a Lesbian bar or women-only coffeehouse there yet - and so one has to be a bit creative. Beside the bingo sheets, each had an assortment of colored tubes neatly standing at the - tools of the trade, we later discovered: special bingo markers used for certain bingo games instead of chips. 

Gay Tennis Circuit Releases 1995 Schedule

One of the fastest growing sports in the Gay and Lesbian community in the last 10 years has been tennis. In the 1982 Gay Games in San Francisco, about 90 players entered the sport of tennis in one of the first "national" Gay tournaments of its kind.

In the 1994 Gay Games, tennis was the first sport to fill up — with over 700

entrants, and there were potentially hundreds more who missed the deadline. In the early 90's, the popularity of the sport inspired some of the many local Gay tennis organizations around the country to form an umbrella association over Gay tennis, to improve communication and manage the expansion of the Gay tennis circuit. Tennis year, the Gay & Lesbian Tennis Alliance (GLTA) will sanction 22 international tournaments around the US, Canada and Australia.

The events include divisions for all abilities, from beginner to experienced open tournament player for both men and women. A computer ranking system similar to the professional circuit is maintained that accumulates points for player results from each of the GLTA events.


Milwaukee Gay BBS Reachs 100,000 Callers



the mistake of commenting: 'If you live this Gay lifestyle, what do you expect? Of course, you're going to get AIDS."

Dan drew laughs from the crowd at the Pabst Theater as he finished the story: "Well, my reaction was, the theater's over, we've been arrested, let's just sit here, do our time and get out. Not Christopher. He spent two hours lecturing those officers — in a very friendly manner — and by the end of the two hours they were best friends. Later, they asked about him whenever I saw them."

After being stricken with crypto, and despite suffering severe diarrhea and further AIDS complications, Fons worked to make the city of Milwaukee accountable for the many deaths. During a protest at City Hall, he said: "I blame the City of Milwaukee. I can't imagine a more callous, small-minded combination of people and actions. It is time for the city to admit there are problems, create a better warning system, and allow us to vent our frustrations. It's also time for reparations."

Fons then led ACT UP in a "Target City Hall" campaign, demanding that the city include funds for AIDS service groups in the budget and develop a strategic plan for dealing with AIDS in

the Milwaukee area. Largely due to ACT UP's pressure the funds were granted, and strategic planning is now underway.

"I know the kind of energy it takes to be an organizer, to put yourself on the line," Kitty Barber of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee commented. "I know the toll it takes when you're healthy. I can't imagine what it must have been like for Chris having AIDS, yet accomplishing all he did. I admire him alot. This community was really lucky to have him."

Other Interests

When not "Acting up," Chris Fons loved reading. He worked at Schwartz Bookstore for many years, a perfect job given what family members called his "insatiable appetite for knowledge." He loved biking, especially around Milwaukee's bike trails, and owned three bikes, including a tandem, which his partner Yuri could never quite master.

Fons had worked as a page in the State Senate, an experience that nurtured his interest in politics. He loved the theater, and ushered for several years at the Pabst, which donated the space for his memorial service. He last attended the Pabst in October, when choreographer Bill T. Jones presented his new work Still/Here, about people living with serious illness. Fons had worked with Jones, who incorporated

some of his ideas and movements into

Fons also liked computers and music — from classical to folk, pop and the blues. Three of his favorite songs, carefully chosen and each deeply political, were played at his service. One was a powerful spiritual by the African American a cappella group Sweet Honey in the Rock. Another was the jaunty rock tune Zero Patience from the movie about people with AIDS.

The third song was Holly Near's It Could Have Been Me, a tribute to activists killed in the line of duty which urges survivors to take up the fight. Special lyrics were written for Fons and sung by his sister Mary and the trio MOOK. As the audience sang the chorus, there was hardly a dry eye left in the theater.

Fons is survived by his mother Pat, who encouraged him early on to work for social justice issues, three sisters, four brothers, many nieces and nephews, and his partner, Yuri Keegstra.
