290 Members of 104th Congress Affirm Non-Bias in Hiring

7 of 11 in Wisconsin's **Delegation Sign** Pledge

Washington, DC - Almost three hundred of the 535 members of the GOP-controlled 104th Congress have established non-discrimination policies in their own offices providing equal protection to Gay and Lesbian employees and job applicants. Among them are seven of Wisconsin's eleven elected representatives in Washington.

Badger State reps guaranteeing non-bias based on sexual orientation include both Democratic US Senators, Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold. House members include Scott Klug (R), Steve Gunderson (R), Gerald Kleczka (D), Tom Barrett (D), and David Obey (D). Only Republicans Mark Neumann, Thomas Toby Roth and Sensenbrenner have no such policy.

The survey of Congress, conducted by the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), revealed that 290 members of Congress - 64 Senators and 226 House members - confirmed in writing that the sexual orientation of an individual is not a consideration in the hiring, promoting or terminating of an employee in their

Congressional offices.

In the House, 64 Republicans are among the 226 members making the non-bias pledge, up from 58 in the 103rd Congress. In the Senate, 24 Republicans are among the 64 members who have such policies. House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Majority Leader Dick Armey are two prominent GOP leaders who have not promised non-discrimination, but Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, the front-running Republican Presidential candidate, has.

"The fair-minded employers in Congress range from conservative Republicans to liberal Democrats," said HRCF's Daniel Zingale. "Those who would single out Gay people for discrimination are clearly out of step with the majority of the Congress and the American people. Those who support the fundamental values of fairness and equality are right in line with the country's most successful businesses and the voting public."

"The members of Congress who voluntarily established nondiscrimination policies are following the lead of the country's most successful businesses," said HRCF's Elizabeth Birch, who is herself a former executive with Apple Computers. "More than half of the Fortune 1000 companies provide basic protection for their Lesbian and Gay employees. Equal treatment in the workplace is critical to employee morale and productivity.

A post-election poll of people who voted last November 8 found that 70% supported equal rights in the workplace for Gays and Lesbians. That majority included 64% of Republicans, 77% of Democrats and 71% of Independents.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund encourages supporters of civil rights for Gays and Lesbians to thank those Senators and House members who have adopted non-discrimination policies and to urge those representatives who have

not to do so.

HRCF's survey of the 104th Congress comes shortly before federal legislation called the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) will be ENDA will prohibit reintroduced. employers from discriminating in hiring, promotion and firing practices on the basis of sexual orientation.

Last year, in the 103rd Congress, ENDA garnered 32 sponsors in the Senate and 135 in the House, Among the sponsors were Wisconsin Senators Kohl and Feingold and Rep. Tom Barrett. With the growing number of both Republican and Democratic representatives who are pledging non-bias in their own offices, Gay and Lesbian lobbyists hope to enlist the support of even more sponsors in this Congress.

STATE News Briefs

Milwaukee Settles With Cops, Sinthasomphones

Milwaukee ->In April, the City of Milwaukee finally to settlements with the family of Konerak Sinthasomphone, one of Jeffrey Dahmer's murder victims, and the two police officers who were fired for mishandling the Sinthasomphone case. On May 21, 1991, Officers Joseph Gabrish and John Balcerzak left the 14- year-old Konerak with Dahmer, who claimed Konerak was his adult, intoxicated lover. Dahmer killed the boy after the cops left.

The City agreed to pay \$265,000 to the attorneys for the two officers for the legal fees involved in their appeals of their firings. Some of the money may go directly to Gabrish and Balcerzak. The City also agreed to pay \$850,000 to the surviving family members of Konerak in order to avoid a federal trial in which the Sinthasomphones accused the City and Police Department of institutionalized racism and homophobia

The Common Council approved the Sinthasomphone

settlement, but not before Aldermen Tom Nardelli and Daniel Schramm made comments attacking Konerak's so-called "lifestyle" and saying the boy's mother and father were "terrible parents." There is no evidence that Konerak was Gay or that hus parents were anything but responsible and deeply concerned about his disappearance. Nardelli later apologized.

Grinkeys Devise New Strategy to Adopt Angel

Green Bay — Annette and Georgina Grinkey have another date in Brown County Court May 22 as they pursue a new legal strategy for Annette to adopt Georgina's 9-year-old daughter, Angel. Both women, a Lesbian couple, want to be recognized as Angel's legal parents, but a State Supreme Court decision last June denied their appeal.

The state court's ruling hinged on the belief that, because the two weren't legally married and because Angel already has one legal parent, Annette couldn't adopt Angel without Georgina first terminating her parental rights. Georgina has now filed a new petition, asking the court to terminate her parental rights on the condition that both women will then be

allowed to adopt Angel concurrently.

The couple vow to continue to seek legal recognition as a two-parent family so that Angel may enjoy the benefits that would accrue, such as being included on Annette's insurance plan and knowing that if something should happen to either Annette or Georgina, the other would be able to maintain

Gay Youth Group Pressures MPS for Action

Milwaukee - More than three years after the School Board of Milwaukee passed a resolution recommending that in-service training on Gay and Lesbian issues be conducted among teachers, staff and administrators and that the school system identify support services for Gay and Lesbian teens, the Milwaukee Public Schools have taken no action to implement

these recommendations

That was, in part, the impetus for Michael Lisowski, Director of Gay Youth Milwaukee, to send a display advertisement listing resources for Gay and Lesbian youth to 27 area high schools. Of those, only Shorewood High School has agreed to publish the ad in its student newspaper. But the media attention to Lisowski's efforts has resulted in numerous calls to the Gay Youth group asking for further information.

Lisowski is part of an MPS work study group charged with devising plans to provide more support to Gay teens. He told In Step he hopes this results in more action being taken.

Also Around the State ...

Green Bay — Officials with Region III of Action Wisconsin report that members of the College Republicans at circulated fliers recently Bay "disinformation" about the May 4 appearance there by Rev. Mel White. The GOP group falsely alleged that White's honorarium, made of taxpayer money, had been granted to the school's 10% Society to allow White to "vilify Christianity." In fact, no tax dollars are involved, White's lecture is being sponsored by a variety of university offices and student groups, and White himself is a devout Christian.

Madison — State Rep. Tammy Baldwin was expected to be hospitalized in late April for an appendectomy. Last September, Baldwin suffered a ruptured appendix. At the time, doctors removed an abcess and treated the infection, advising Baldwin to return for a follow-up appendectomy as soon as her schedule allowed. Milwaukee — The 9th annual "Make a Promise" dinner, show and silent auction at the Pfister Hotel raised \$113,000 for AIDS care, prevention and research, according to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. Nearly 900 people attended the event.

Virginia Supreme Court Says Lesbian Mom is "Unfit"

Richmond, VA - In a decision that has infuriated supporters of Gays and Lesbians nationwide, the Virginia Supreme Court on April 21 stripped Sharon Bottoms of custody of her 3- year-old son Tyler, agreeing with a lower court that her Lesbianism makes her an "unfit mother." The court ruled in favor of the boy's grandmother, who was given custody of the

The Virginia court stated that because Bottoms engaged in oral sex with her female lover, April Wade, she was violating the state's sodomy law and, as such, was an unfit mother. It also said that giving custody of Tyler to his grandmother was preferable because the child was likely to suffer from societal prejudice because of his mother's sexual

Suzanne Goldberg of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund called the ruling against Sharon Bottoms "cruel." She said it was a dramatic example of how sodomy laws are used to oppress Gay and Lesbian people. Goldberg called for greater efforts to repeal such laws and for more

education about Gay and Lesbian parenting and families.
Goldberg continued, "The ruling is both tragic and offensive in its disregard for Tyler's best interests, and in its willingness to give legal effect to private prejudice against Lesbians and Gay men. Today's decision ignores the reality that tens of thousands of children are growing up happy and well- adjusted in Lesbian and Gay households.

Roberta Achtenberg to Run for San Francisco Mayor

Washington, DC - Roberta Achtenberg, the highest ranking openly Lesbian appointee in Bill Clinton's administration, is resigning her post as Assistant Secretary of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity in the Department of Housing and Urban Development to run for Mayor of San Francisco.

Achtenberg was a longtime Lesbian organizer in San Francisco who served on the Board of Supervisors. She also previously made one unsuccessful run for the California State Assembly. When her nomination as Assistant Secretary for HUD came before the Senate, Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) referred to Achtenberg as a "damn Lesbian."

Achtenberg has formed an exploratory committee to seek the funding and support necessary for the mayoral race, set for this fall. She has long criticized the "mediocre" tenure of incumbent Mayor Frank Jordan who, she says, "lacks vision, leadership and the management skills" required to run the city.

UPI Ordered to Clear Lesbian Reporter's Record

Washington, DC — A federal judge has ruled that United Press International illegally fired its former Supreme Court reporter, Julie Brienza, for being a Lesbian, and ordered the news organization to clear her personnel records of any

wrongdoing.

Judge Joyce Hens Green ruled that UPI had unlawfully terminated Brienza on the basis of her sexual orientation and for freelancing for a Gay publication, in violation of the District of Columbia's Human Rights Act. The ruling followed by only a week a settlement with Milwaukee's Rev. Vic Eliason, who paid Brienza \$255,000 in damages for leading a campaign to have her fired. Brienza filed the suit against UPI and Eliason after being fired in April, 1990.

"I couldn't be happier," said Brienza, who had worked at UPI for four-and-a-half years before her termination and wno since has been working as an editor at a legal publication. "After all these years, to finally hear a judge rule that UPI had fired me illegally is beyond words. This is a terrific decision that will allow me to continue with my first love: reporting."

5,000 Texans Gather to Protest **Hate Crimes**

Austin, TX - In the wake of the hate-motivated killings of eight Gay men in Texas last year, more than 5,000 demonstrators marched on the Capitol in Austin in early April calling for a revision of the state's hate crimes law to include

the category sexual orientation. Conservative legislators, many of them Republicans, oppose such a change.

The demonstration was organized by the Lesbian and Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. Protesters were addressed by activists, politicians and family members of the murdered Gay men

"I would like this bill to pass because I do not want anyone else to go through what me and my family are going through," said Daniel Saldana, whose son, Ernest, was kicked and beaten to death by Gay bashers last November.

"We are here because we are angry, we are sad, we are hurt that some of our fellow Texans - and a growing number of them — are choosing to act on their hatred and fear of us," said Letitia Gomez of the National Latino Lesbian and Gay Organization.

Openly Gay State Rep. Glen Maxey called on his fellow legislators to adopt the revision, but comments made by State Sen. John Leedon illustrated the hurdles in the way of passage. To a delegation of Log Cabin Republicans who came to seek his support, Leedon repeatedly referred to Gays as "queers" and said that "queers" were to blame for their own victimization as well as AIDS.

Combined Budgets of Top Gay Groups: \$17.3 Million
Washington, DC — An analysis conducted by the

Washington Blade reveals that the combined annual budgets of the six largest national Gay/Lesbian organizations has reached \$17.3 million, an increase of 38% since the last survey in 1993. The total still dwarfs the budgets of the top anti-Gay groups. Focus on the Family alone, for instance, has an annual budget of \$88 million.

The top six Gay organizations and their projected budgets for this year are: the Human Rights Campaign Fund, \$7.97 million; the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, \$3.1 million; the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, \$2.28 million; the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, \$1.9 million; Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, \$1.2 million; and the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, \$921,247.

The analysis indicates that less than 2% of Gays and Lesbians nationwide contribute to their national groups, with the average donation per individual \$86 per year. Gay and Lesbian leaders have often said that if every Gay or Lesbian person donated just \$10 or \$20 to a Gay group annually the budgets of Gay groups would be much larger. Greater funds could contribute to more effective organizing and lobbying efforts.

Newt's Sister Candace Joins HRCF Staff

Washington, DC - Candace Gingrich, sister of Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich, has joined the staff of the Human Rights Campaign Fund as a spokeswoman for HRCF's

National Coming Out Project.

Over the next six months, Gingrich is expected to visit 35 cities, including Milwaukee and Madison, to promote the values of honesty and openness about being Lesbian or Gay, and to urge people to get involved in educating Congress and the American public about the discrimination LesBiGays face. The tour culminates with the annual observance of National Coming Out Day on October 11. In June, Gingrich will be a Grand Marshal in San Francisco's Gay and Lesbian Freedom Day Parade.

"When my brother became Speaker of the House, I recognized that I had an opportunity and obligation to get involved in the movement for Gay and Lesbian equality in a

meaningful way," Gingrich said.
"Working with the HRCF, I will be asking more and more people to join this effort and help meet the challenges presented by a more conservative political landscape. When people realize that they have Gay friends, families and co-workers, they are more likely to understand the problem of discrimination and support equal rights."

Perry Watkins, Victor Against Pentagon, Fighting AIDS

Fighting AIDS
Seattle, WA — Perry Watkins, the only Gay servicemember to have won his case against the Pentagon for refusing to re-enlist him, is suffering from serious effects of AIDS, according to friends. Watkins was diagnosed as HIV-positive in 1990.

Watkins, who has spent the last few years touring the country talking about his experience of discrimination — as a Gay man in the military, as a black man in the Gay community — recently had his right leg amputated above the knee due to cancer and infections. "You hold up as long as you can," he told the Associated Press.

Watkins was drafted in 1968. He served in Vietnam, won excellent performance ratings and, despite being open about his homosexuality, was allowed to re-enlist in 1971, 1974 and 1979. In 1982, he filed a lawsuit to challenge the revocation of his security clearance and to prevent his imminent discharge, both based on his sexual orientation.

The legal wrangling ended in 1990 when the US Supreme Court denied the Army's petition to review an Appeals Court decision which ordered Watkins' reinstatement. The court had reasoned that since the Army re-enlisted the openly Gay Watkins on three occasions, it must do so again. Watkins was promoted to the rank of Sergeant First Class and voluntarily retired with substantial back pay.

Chastity Bono Comes Out in "The Advocate"

Los Angeles, CA — Ending years of tabloid speculation, Chastity Bono, the daughter of the former singing duo. Sonny and Cher, has acknowledged her Lesbianism in the pages of the Advocate.

The April 18 Advocate includes a lengthy interview with the 26-year-old Bono, who says that both her parents have been very supportive. Cher's initial concern about Chastity's career and the harassment of tabloids eventually gave way: "She told me: 'You're a writer. How can you write real feelings and live the way you want to if you hide who you really are?"

Sonny Bono, now a Congressman from California, said of the tabloid outing of his daughter: "It was painful for me to see her having to deal with this, to live in fear of being discovered, feeling that it would do such personal harm to her. But I knew the minute she crossed the threshhold on it, she'd be OK...[B]ecause if you go through your life hiding, it's a constant nightmare."

In the interview, Bono says her

reluctance to come out earlier was due to fears about its impact on her budding music career and reluctance to out her older female lover, Joan, whom Bono nursed until Joan's death from cancer in 1994.



San Francisco, CA - Within hours of disk jockey Tom Kahm of KSFO, San Francisco's new "all conservative" talk radio, attacking the Lesbian Avengers. vowing to "Put you off the map," the Lesbian activist group received hate calls and death threats. Kahm called on his "fellow posse members" to rid the city of the Lesbian group

Denver, CO — The Personnel Board of the City of Denver has agreed to extend 10 days annual paid sick leave to unmarried municipal employees so that they may spend time with their ailing domestic partners. It applies to both straight and Gay unmarried workers. The measure was bitterly opposed by Colorado for Family Values, the same group that sponsored Amendment 2, now under review by the US Supreme Court.

Washington, DC - Rep. William Goodling (R-GA), chair of the House Educational Opportunities Committee, has said he does not plan to hold any hearings on alleged Gay propaganda in federally funded public school programs. Such hearings were promoted by Rev. Lou Sheldon, head of the anti-Gay Traditional Values Coalition, and supported by Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich.

Oxford, OH - More than 100 members or supporters of the Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Alliance of Miami University confronted a meeting of the College Republicans, charging them with encouraging hatred for posting fliers during LesBiGay Awareness Week which said: "H82BGAY." A spokeswoman for the College Republicans said: "They are flaunting their sexual preference around campus and we felt we had the right to flaunt ours."

New York, NY - Kevin Ammons, an aspiring musician who was the boyfriend of Whitney Houston's hairdresser, has filed a lawsuit claiming that Houston's father offered him \$6,000 to break the arms and legs of Houston's longtime friend, Robyn Crawford. Ammons says John Houston despises Crawford for being a Lesbian and ruining Whitney's marriage to Bobby Brown. Houston has repeatedly denied rumors about herself and Crawford. In the suit. Ammons says he was fired when he refused to attack Crawford.

Washington, DC - Kerry Lobel, former organizer of the Women's Project in Little Rock and editor of an anthology about Lesbian battering, has been named Deputy Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. Lobel will oversee day-to-day management of NGLTF's program, administration, finance and development areas, giving Executive Director Melinda Paras the ability to travel more on organizing and fundraising trips. NGLTF currently has 25

staff members and a budget of \$3.1

New York, NY - For the first time ever, the giant corporations Proctor & Gamble and General Motors have taken out advertising in the Gay press. Beneficiary of the big advertising bucks from P&G's Giorgio Beverly Hills and GM's Saturn unit is the national Gay monthly, Out.

Boris Yeltsin Signs HIV Testing Law

Moscow - President Boris Yeltsin has signed a law which requires all foreign visitors to Russia who plan to stay three or more months to present documentation proving they have tested negative for HIV, the virus that causes

The law, passed overwhelmingly by the Russian legislature earlier this year. also calls for mandatory testing of certain groups of people in Russia. But the law is vague on exactly who those groups are. Gay activists fear the law will be used to require testing of all homosexuals. Others suspect the law will be applied to Russia's growing population of injection drug users.

Yeltsin had previously vetoed a bill which would have required mandatory testing of all visitors to Russia. The Russian tourist industry had warned it would drastically reduce revenues from tourism, and others warned that the notoriously shoddy, often unsanitary conditions in Russian medical facilities would cause people to refuse to be tested. The bill Yeltsin signed was a modification of that first proposal.

AIDS experts say the new law is unlikely to stem the spread of AIDS in Russia, in part, because Russians traveling abroad can contract AIDS and bring it home. In addition, the wider availablity of good condoms and more preventive education are seen as essential to halt the spread of the disease.

Outing Campaign Snares More British Clerics

London - The ongoing campaign by Britain's Gay group OutRage to embarrass or intimidate clerics and politicians into admitting their homosexuality continues to yield mixed results. Earlier this year, Peter Tatchell, OutRage's leading exponent of outing, sent 20 letters to British clerics and politicians urging them to come out voluntarily or be forcibly exposed.

Michael Brown, an openly Gay Conservative Member of Parliament, has condemned the tactic, saving any MP's who receive a letter from Tatchell should "throw it in the bin with the rest of the rubbish they receive." Some believe that the heart attack which resulted in the death of MP Sir James Kilfedder may have been caused by a threatening letter from OutRage

One retired Scottish Episcopal Bishop, Rev. Derek Rawcliffe, has acknowledged his homosexuality. David Hope, the Bishop of London, conceded that, while celibate, his sexuality is "ambiguous." The Bishop of Durham, Michael Turnbull, denied that he is Gay, saving that a 1968 conviction for "gross indecency" with a Yorkshire farmer was

A recent conclave of Anglican bishops in London responded to the outing campaign with this statement: "We are conscious that, within the church itself, there are those whose pattern of sexual expression is at variance with received Christian moral tradition, but whose lives in other respects demonstrate the marks of genuine Christian character."

U.N. Approves Lesbian Groups for

Beijing Confab New York, NY — At least two Lesbian organizations which were initially denied credentials to attend the 4th World Conference on Women in Beijing. China this summer have now been informed that their applications to attend have been approved. But many other Lesbian groups, along with women's groups from Tibet and Taiwan, have been barred from the world summit.

The conference, which convenes August 30-September 15, will draw representatives from all member states of the United Nations to discuss the problems facing women worldwide and draw up a plan of action for seeking reforms. A simultaneous conference of non- governmental organizations (NGOs), which a number of Lesbian groups hoped to attend, will also discuss such issues.

The Mautner Project for Lesbians with Cancer, a D.C.-based health advocacy group, and the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission, based in San Francisco, will be allowed to participate in the NGO conference.

The United Nations is under increasing criticism for allowing China to host the event. China has attempted to exclude groups whose politics or nationalist aspirations it opposes, such as the women of Tibet.

Gay Games V Opens Office in Amsterdam

Amsterdam — Officials of Gay Games V, slated to take place in summer of 1998 in The Netherlands, have opened an office in Amsterdam. This follows the bestowal of a \$500,000 grant on Gay Games V by the City of Amsterdam. The Dutch government has pledged to donate up to \$5 million to sponsor the international sporting event.

Marc Janssens of the Gay Games V Organizing Committee says that, so far, 17 types of sports have been certified for the Games, with the possibility of up to 13 others. Up to 12,000 athletes are expected to participate in the two week event, with at least one hundred thousand spectators in attendance. The Netherlands is known for its relaxed atmosphere and acceptance of Gays and Lesbians.

Also Around the World...

Rome — Italian doctors attending a national medical association meeting recently passed a resolution banning the use of alternative inseminiation techniques for single women, heterosexual or Lesbian. They also rejected the use of frozen sperm from deceased donors to create pregnancies. The medical association has been under pressure from the Vatican which opposes any type of artificial insemination.

Toronto — A Canadian federal court recently ruled that the country's sodomy statute is unconstitutional because it discriminates against Gay men. The government unsuccessfully argued that the law, which allows younger ages of consent for oral and vaginal sex than for anal sex, was necessary to prevent the spread of HIV.

Vancouver — Little Sisters Lesbian bookstore has received death threats by letter and phone in recent months. Religious fanatics are suspects in the intimidation because one hand-written letter promised "a day of reckoning" and included quotes about Sodom and Gomorrah.

Milan — The Purple Planet, an Italian Lesbian newspaper, reports that a women's soccer team which ranked third in its league was disbanded because of Lesbian relationships among the players. The team's manager said he couldn't tolerate "various mental and personal ambiguities of too many girls."





More on Marriage

Editor:

In "Viewpoints," p. 16, Vol. 12, Issue 6 of In Step, Richard D. Hicks states that "[m]ost of those legislatively-conferred benefits [of marriage] (except for tax exemptions and dependency status) can be obtained by private contract between the parties." This is used to imply that "Gay marriage" isn't needed. While I certainly support each

person's right to individual opinions and decisions regarding how their relationships are or are not legally recognized, I think the omission of some rather important "benefits" has been glossed over. Tax exemptions and dependent status are probably two of the most used benefits of legal marriages.

Shelter and medical care are some of the largest necessary items on which income is spent. Private contracts only affect those who have signed: they can influence external parties which control the availability and taxation of those

I see no way in which a private contract can force a medical insurance


plan to cover a same-sex spousal equivalent under current law; this limits the ability of unmarried spouses to change jobs or not work (for example, due to disability or illness, or to raise children), as well as increases the portion of household income budgeted for insurance premiums.

A private contract cannot force an employer to grant sick leave or bereavement leave, but many employers do provide such leave for attending to the needs of an ill (or deceased) spouse. Can you imagine handing an interviewer a contract, instead of the other way around?

Finally, it is my understanding (perhaps incorrect - and I would like to know the truth), if a couple purchases a dwelling together, when one individual dies, the other cannot completely own the property without paying inheritance taxes on the late individual's portion. For a retired person on a fixed (and perhaps now reduced) income, this could mean losing one's home.

I, in no way, question our right to be diverse individuals, and I recognize that legal same-sex marriage is not everyone's personal goal. If Hicks is willing to carefully complete every piece of paperwork, spend attorney's fees on verifying their correctness, worry at night whether every insurance plan has its respective beneficiary designation form completed properly, and still not be secure in his home or with his medical insurance, that is his right. But those of us who want the option of having such security shouldn't be led to believe that "most" commonly-used benefits are readily available through a private contract.

AIDS Briefs

Marinol Effective for AIDS-Related Weight Loss

Tulsa, OK — A study of 139 patients at 18 AIDS treatment centers across the US concludes that dronabinol, more commonly known as Marinol, is a safe and effective treatment for AIDSinduced anorexia associated with weight loss. Weight loss of more than 10% of body weight is the index diagnosis for almost one- fifth of AIDS cases. Patients in the study treated with Marinol experienced a statistically significant increase in appetite.

Results of the double-blind, placebo-controlled study, reported in the Journal of Pain and Symptom Management, also confirm that Marinol, a medicinal form of delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol, the chemical in marijuana, tends to reduce nausea and

improve mood.

"This study is important because it demonstrates that the anorexia of AIDS can be controlled with Marinol," said Dr. Jeffrey Beal of St. John Medical Center in Tulsa. Beal was the principal

investigator in the study.

"Though Marinol may take up to two to four weeks for appetite improvement, at the end of the six week study there was already a small weight gain reported in the patients treated with Marinol. Meanwhile, placebo patients continued to lose weight."

CDC Launches New AIDS Treatment Information Service

Washington, DC - The National AIDS Clearinghouse of the Centers for Disease Control has initiated a new HIV/AIDS Treatment Information Service for people with HIV/AIDS, their families,

friends or health providers.

The free service, which is staffed by speaking English and Spanishspecialists, utilizes the National Library of Medicine's database on AIDS/HIV treatment as a reference guide.

HIV May Have Originated in Humans, Not Monkeys


Ann Arbor, MI - Outbreak, the movie about a monkey infecting Californians with a newly-evolved lethal virus, has many similarities to the way most scientists believe HIV originated in primates and spread to humans. But new evidence suggests that human beings are just as likely to have infected the monkey, according to evolutionary biologist David Mindell of the University of Michigan.

"The conventional wisdom is that is a new virus transmitted to humans from African monkeys, chimps or other primates within the last 50 years," Mindell commented. "However, a careful analysis of the evolutionary relationships among HIV-related viruses does not support this popular view."

"Based on the current evidence," said Dr. Mindell, "it's equally possible that HIV is a very old virus, which may have co-existed with people in isolated parts of Africa or elsewhere for hundreds

or thousands of years."

Mindell emphasized that he is not claiming humans are the ancestral host species for HIV. Rather, his point is that there is not enough evidence to resolve the issue either way.



In Memoriam

Becky Furmann

Little Girl with Crypto Loved Her Two Male Parents

Milwaukee — Becky Furmann, who attracted national attention, and was a victim of Milwaukee's 1993 Cryptosporidium epidemic; died April 19 at her Bay View home of complications of AIDS. She was 4.

Rebecca Ann Katherine Elizabeth Furmann was the last Milwaukee child still alive who was known to be chronically infected with the waterborne parasite.

Becky was born to a drug-addicted mother who had HIV. Becky became infected even as she grew in her mother's womb. Two men — Larry and Ric Furmann — became her foster parents when she was 10-months old.

One of the two men legally adopted her — they never disclosed which one.

But to Becky they were both her parents
— one she called Papa and the other
Dad. Her biological mother is dead, and
the status of her father has been
unknown for years, Larry Furmann said.

"She was a gift to me and (Ric) and she was a gift to everyone who knew her," he said. "She was a vibrant and headstrong young lady who commanded respect and got it.

"She was a child of promise," he

said.


Despite having HIV, Becky led a fairly normal life for her first 2 years and had a good number of T-cells key components of the immune system that gets depleted by HIV. That changed dramatically after she got cryptosporidiosis.

The two years since the epidemic saw many ups and downs for her parents and Becky. She was hospitalized numerous times, sometimes for complications of the cryptosporidiosis, including bile duct blockages and pancreatitis.

She spent the last year of her life mostly at home, with nursing assistance, and on morphine. She was hooked to an intravenous feeding and medication system at least 12 hours a day.







"Bar Girls" is a Witty, Sparkling Lesbian Comedy

Spoofs the Ups and Downs of Dating, Relationships

I'm thrilled to report that the new Lesbian movie Bar Girls is a lot of fun! It's a delightfully daffy look at the relationships among a group of women who hang out at a place called the Girl Bar in Los Angeles. I attended a critics' screening with two Lezzie friends and we giggled ourselves silly!

Bar Girls is being promoted with the tantalizing tag line, "Finally, a romantic comedy without men!" and it lives up to that subversive billing. But see it soon! It will only be playing a week (maybe two) at Milwaukee's Oriental Theater beginning April 28 and then at Madison's

Majestic. Don't miss it!

The good news about Bar Girls is that even though it's another relatively low-budget Lesbian movie, its production values, especially the sound and photography, are pretty good. Also, in subject matter, it moves beyond the coming out themes that have dominated most Lesbian flicks of the 1980's and '90's. No agonizing here. These Bar Girls are out Lesbians and feeling just fine about it, thank you very much!

The main character is the fast-talking, wise-cracking Loretta (Nancy Allison Wolfe) who makes a play for Rachel (Liza D'Agostino), a beautiful woman who wanders into the Girl Bar one night. Loretta succeeds in luring Rachel home and into her bedroom only to admit, at the crucial moment, that she can't have sex with anyone she's not in love with. Instead of having sex, Loretta and Rachel sit up and swap comical stories about past lovers, communication that draws them closer together.

Eventually, in a tender scene, Loretta and Rachel confess their love for each other and make love. Very shortly thereafter, in a scenario most Lesbians will immediately recognize, Rachel moves in with Loretta. But not too long after that, the relationship is challenged by Loretta's jealousy of another woman, a soon-to-be L.A. cop named J.R. (Camila Griggs) who makes a blatant play for Rachel.

A LOONEY LESBIAN SOAP

If it sounds like the type of Lesbian soap opera many of us dykes have been through, it is. But it's done with such sharp humor and insight! Loretta and Rachel's discussions of monogamy/fidelity are as funny as they are poignant, and when J.R. (an obvious reference to the villain in Dallas) first strides into the Girl Bar, her clothes, her stance, her attitude signal "Here comes trouble!"

I haven't yet mentioned the bevy of supporting characters intertwined in the main storyline. Bar Girls knowingly portrays the incestuous-like relationships that often develop among Lesbian friends. There's Loretta's ex-lover Annie, "a psycho athlete from Bakersfield," who pairs off for awhile with J.R. as well as with Sandy, who, if memory serves me right, is Rachel's ex. One of the funniest scenes has Loretta and Rachel finally sparking romantically over Sandy's head, which is lying unconscious on a table in the bar.

Meanwhile, Loretta's best friend Veronica is a lifelong het who, after experiencing the flirtatious charms of a waitress, demands of Loretta: "Find me a Lesbian!" Cruising the Girl Bar in search of a femme ("I want a femme!"), flaky Veronica instead falls for the very butch Tracy.

There's also a loony subplot in which Loretta, writer for a cartoon show called "Heavy Myrtle," blackmails an airheaded producer into including a Lesbian plotline in the show. It's an inside joke about the fickleness of Hollywood producers and the recent cache of "Lesbian chic."

The most outstanding elements of Bar Girls are its brisk pace and its witty, often punny and Lesbian-smart writing. Loretta's sardonic putdown of J.R., that "She's probably been through more women than a speculum," is just one of dozens of zingers that will keep Lesbian and Gay audiences in stitches.

For the record, Bar Girls is based on the play by Lauran Hoffman. The movie is directed by Marita Giovanni. Don't miss Bar Girls. It's witty and wise and a very welcome addition to the growing body of Lesbian-positive movies.

"Priest", "Strawberry & Chocolate" Urge Compassion

Religious and Political Intolerence Exposed

It's almost an embarrassment of riches lately for queer movie buffs. In addition to the Gay-themed The Sum of Us and the Lesbian romantic comedy Bar Girls, Priest and Strawberry and Chocolate are now being shown at select theaters throughout the country.

theaters throughout the country.

Both Priest and Strawberry and Chocolate contain pleas for tolerance and compassion, the former through an expose of the hypocrisy of the Catholic Church and one priest's struggle with his own sexuality, the latter through an expose of the ideological and sexual oppression of Cuba's communist government.

Priest is the more controversial of the two films. It has been attacked by church leaders for its depiction of homosexuality and its attack on Catholic ideology, primarily celibacy. Some Catholic groups have called for a boycott of Disney, the parent company of Miramax, which is distributing Priest. The ruckus is only drawing more people to the film.

While *Priest* is unabashedly liberal in its outlook and skewers the church hierarchy, it isn't really anti-Catholic. It's a very humanistic portrait of the real lives and struggles of two priests, one of whom is deeply devoted to his parishioners, the other of whom, through his own crisis of faith, becomes much

more empathetic to the problems of others.

The story revolves around young Father Greg Pilkington (Linus Roache) who is newly assigned to a poor parish in Liverpool. Father Greg is a recently ordained and rigid Catholic ideologue with little tolerance for any ideas or practices that stray outside of church dogma. He immediately comes into conflict with Father Matthew (Tom Wilkinson), an easygoing fellow who disparages church formalities, mixes with his flock at the local pub, and carries on a relationship with Maria, his housekeeper.

CRISIS OF FAITH

Just when Father Greg's sanctimony is becoming really annoying, there is a crack in his rectitude. We see him take off his priestly collar, bike incognito to a Gay pub, pick up a guy and, in a pretty hot, well-shot scene, have passionate sex with him. It seems there's a big gulf between Father Greg's pious declarations and his personal desires.

Father Greg continues to seek out Graham (Robert Carlyle) when the pressures of his priestly duties are too much. But in one of the movie's most dramatic scenes, Father Greg refuses to acknowledge Graham when he comes into his church. This conflict dovetails with another crisis of conscience over a young girl who has told Father Greg in the confessional that she is being sexually abused by her father. How can he help her without violating the seal of the confessional?

The resolution of these problems leads to an emotional conclusion in which the values of forgiveness and redemption — two pillars of Christianity

- are celebrated.

The performances by Roache as the handsome but tortured Father Greg and Wilkinson as the earthy and compassionate Father Matthew are outstanding. Carlyle as Graham and Cathy Tyson as Maria lend solid support.

Although Priest deals with profound issues of theology and sexuality, it also has surprising moments of humor. And though it's weighted heavily against the

Catholic hierarchy — uniformly depicted as narrow-minded and cruel — the overall themes of compassion and forgiveness make it a thoughtful and welcome contribution.

STRAWBERRY & CHOCOLATE

Strawberry and Chocolate is similar in theme to Priest but concerns the relationship between a flamboyant Gay intellectual in modern day Havana and the young ideologically rigid member of the Communist Youth League he befriends.

In an early scene, the stereotypically queer Diego (Jorge Perugorria) cruises and then tries to pick up young David (Vladimir Cruz) at an outside cafe. The men's differences are humorously symbolized by Diego's choice of strawberry rather than chocolate ice cream. The suspicious David returns to Diego's apartment where he angrily brushes off Diego's come-on, but in the process becomes intrigued by Diego's open contempt for communist orthodoxy and his collection of politically proscribed music, art and books.

A fellow communist urges David to return to Diego's place to spy and collect information on the flamboyant rebel, but David instead gradually develops a deep respect for his new friend. Though frustrated himself because he still longs for David, Diego becomes a matchmaker, getting David together with his neighbor, Nancy.



Meanwhile, an art exhibit Diego and a friend are trying to mount is prohibited by the government, and the suppression Diego feels as an artist, an intellectual and a Gay man comes to a dramatic climax. Ultimately, the movie is a plea for freedom and tolerance and shows the toll taken by such suppression of individual talents and desires.

Strawberry and Chocolate won an Oscar nomination as Best Foreign film and is somewhat revolutionary, being the first film with a Gay theme to be supported by the notoriously homophobic Castro regime. Director Tomas Gutierrez Alea was given free rein to shoot the movie at locations around Hayana Like

"The Sum of Us" Has Something for All of Us

There is something definitely special about seeing a Gay movie where the entire audience understands the unique vernacular of Gay-speak.

This is not to say that The Sum of Us is made just for the Gay audience; there are plenty of parents out there who would benefit from seeing the movie, if anything, to learn how to have a loving relationship with their Gay or Lesbian child, for the movie revolves around a not-so-typical relationship between a father and his Gay son.

Harry Mitchell (played by Jack Thompson) is your average, working-class kind of guy who doesn't mind a quick stop at the tavern after a day of work. A widower, Harry does his best to provide a stable home environment for his son Jeff (played by Russell Crowe). Not only does Harry cook meals and launder clothes for his son, he also provides his son with a library of reading material, namely Gay skin magazines, an attempt on Harry's part to make sure his son plays safe.

Harry also takes great interest in Jeff's new friend, Greg (Jack Polson), hoping that Jeff will find true love. In fact, the whole theme of the movie is based on five different loving relationships, and this is captured in the line, "... the greatest explorers of all ... are explorers

of the human heart."

We see glimpses of Jeff's love for his grandmother (Mitch Mathews) and her female lover of 40 years, Mary (Julie Herbert). It is reaffirming to see images of elderly Lesbians together, assuring us that love does not pass with the years. However, there is a heart-breaking scene that does bring tears to the eyes and makes me wonder if such an occurrence can happen in this day-and-age (I won't give it away by telling you what happens).





B&B's and Resorts In All Areas of Wisconsin

Bed and Breakfast Inns (B&B's) were first introduced to the United States in the late 1970s. Today, there are approximately 15,000 B&B's scattered through all 50 states, located in cities, small towns, charming, quiet villages, and expansive rural areas. Most rely on the natural beauty of their area, the charm and friendliness of the locale, and the ability of their visitors to explore and appreciate the surroundings.

Because customers are treated more like house guests, you'll get a sense of "visiting" rather than "staying." Friendly Innkeeper(s) are out to provide guests comfort and a relaxing get-away. The key to being happy at a B&B is to approach them with a sense of adventure. Yet you should have no trouble being entertained while staying at a B&B if you enjoy nature, local history, antiques, hiking, biking, fall colors, relaxing by a fireplace with a good book, a companion or both, just "getting away from it all," or being pampered in style and comfort.

Policies vary from place to place, but almost all

Policies vary from place to place, but almost all B&B's require at least a 50% deposit within 3-7 days of making your reservation. Unlike hotels, whose standard is "cancel within 24-hours before arrival and you'll receive a full refund," most B&B's require at least a weeks notice to cancel to receive a full refund.

The size of B&B's may vary from 1 to 20+ guest rooms. In some of the smaller establishments (1-10 rooms), rooms are unique from each other in features and amenities. Private baths may be limited to specific rooms. Some bathrooms may only have a shower, or a tub, or a sunken Jacuzzi for two.

Most B&B's have more than one level of accommodation and rate, and rates can vary from season-to-season. A B&B's brochure should provide a good description of each room, in-room amenities, and common area features.

Televisions, telephones, and air conditioners are not always found in each room. But that's what "getting away from it all" means, doesn't it? B&B's featured here seem to be well equipped with amenities, some including VCRs, refrigerators, CD/cassette players, in addition to televisions.

The size of your room may sometimes be a surprise. Some are huge, nearly studio size. But many B&B's are in restored homes and mansions, where many rooms tend to be smaller. Common areas like living rooms, parlors, and libraries are the places to read, relax, perhaps watch TV, and engage in interesting conversation with the other guests. A B&B is not always the place for you if you want to remain anonymous or be alone from check-in to check-out.

Breakfast is also the place for getting to know the other visitors. It's actually part of the B&B experience, which is a good reason to patronize a Gay owned/operated/ friendly establishment. It will no doubt enrich your stay and allow you to feel comfortable with the other quests, and help you to make friends easier.

Breakfast is usually the pride of B&B's. There's usually no choice of entree, which is tricky if you're vegetarian, don't eat dairy products, or have other dietary restrictions. There will most likely be a specific time (or times) when breakfast will be served. There's not a short order cook on staff, nor will your breakfast normally be cooked to order.


It might be served buffet style, family style, or sit-down with wait staff. Some B&B's change their menu seasonally, use a bakery in town for fresh baked goods,







Stark Reality By Kirk Stark

Dangerous Liasons

So, it's Spring. The trees are coming back to life, grass is growing, birds are back, and people are falling in love.

I've seen the soft-focus, slow motion, romance flowing about me like an unstoppable river of schmaltz. What have I to say about it?

Broadcasting System and the Corporation For Public Broadcasting have yet to back the show. Consequently, In the Life must contact each public television station around the nation and convince them to air the series." Catania said program directors realize the subject matter is controversial, "but because they really like the show and think its important, they're willing to air it."

In the Life is a non-profit organization and is solely supported by more than ten thousand members and a few major contributors. Catania said it costs between \$50,000 to \$100,000 to produce an hour show, and each show reaches approximately one million viewers. Catania said he is dedicated to building on the success of the show and increasing the number of show from four a year to a monthly series.

"The success of *In the Life* over the past three years proves that we're not only existing but growing, and growing rapidly. This is the first year *In the Life* will be aired in the South enabling Lesbians and Gay men living in Atlanta, New Orleans and Dallas to enjoy the program right along with their Wisconsin sisters and brothers," said Catania.

"We (Lesbians and Gay men) belong on TV. It's a very powerful

medium. We shouldn't be limited to one kiss on Roseanne."

The program ran last week on Milwaukee's Channels 10 & 36. The rest of the PBS stations in the state were to air it at 11pm, April 28.
