UWM Offers More Gay/Lesbian Studies Courses This Fall

GAY STUDIES STONEWALLED?

Though Certificate Program Still Awaits Approval

Milwaukee — With administrative approval of the Gay and Lesbian Studies Certificate Program at UW-Milwaukee expected this summer, English Professor Christopher Lane announced: "We're delighted to be able to cross-list 21 courses in the Certificate Program this Fall semester, with titles as diverse as "Gay and Lesbian Psychology" and "Gay and Lesbian Themes in Latin American Fiction."

"This really is a fine achievement for us," Lane said. "Despite all the negative press the Program received on campus last year from various conservatives, the lesson here is that Gay and Lesbian issues can be taught successfully at UW-M, and that we can hold true to our promise of combining diversity in study with intellectual rigor and excellence."

"Now that more and more faculty are willing to offer courses in this area, we invite the community to join us at UW-M by enrolling in exciting and stimulating classes this Fall."

Course offerings of primary significance to the certificate Program include: "Stand Up Comedy and The Other" (course #350- 509), "Gay and Lesbian Themes in Latin American Fiction" (921- 781), "Women's Affiliations" (900-299), and "Gay and Lesbian Psychology" (820-319).

Other courses of secondary significance include: "The Sexual Politics of Shame" (350-247), "Political Movements and Organizations in the Afro-World" (106-344), "Economics of Discrimination" (296-248), "Sex and Gender" (900-250), "Power, Knowledge, Deviance and Identity" (900-380), "Spectrum of Human Immunodeficiency" (397-362) and "Social Work and Medical Issues" (896-536).

Both Prof. Lane and Prof. Jeffrey Merrick of UW-M's History Department, who helped develop the proposal for the Gay and Lesbian Studies Certificate Program in 1993, expressed confidence that the University's final stamp of approval for the program will come this summer.

Various university committees and faculty bodies approved the certificate program more than a year ago, but when word leaked to the mainstream media that the program might be adopted, right wing opponents, including fundamentalist activists and some state legislators in Madison, issued angry denunciations and threats.

The Gay and Lesbian Studies Certificate Program, which seemed destined for quick approval, was suddenly mired in bureaucratic delay.

Last summer, In Step interviewed six different chancellors, assistant chancellors and/or committee heads both at the Milwaukee campus and at the UW-System in Madison. All repeatedly stated that approval of the program was just weeks away. When that approval did not materialize, each administrator pointed to another university office or official as having responsibility for the final decision.

Last August, UW-M Vice Chancellor Kenneth Watters admitted he was taking time with the proposal. "Given the flap that we had when it was even announced that we might do such a program, we expect a lot of scrutiny and want to make sure we are able to answer whatever questions are asked."

Lane and Merrick report that Watters has since sent the proposal to the UW-System for final approval but that the official OK has been delayed again, this time because of the freeze UW System President Kathryn Lyall has placed on all new programs because of budget constraints.

Although the Gay and Lesbian Studies Certificate Program at UW₇M requires no new outlays of funds or personnel, it has been held hostage by the system-wide freeze, which is expected to be lifted this summer. At that time, Lane and Merrick expect the certificate program to be approved.

Individuals who have taken Gay and Lesbian Studies courses in the past year have already received credits from the departments which offer the courses. Recognition of credits toward the Gay and Lesbian Studies Certificate will be retroactive once the program is approved.

Lane noted that one ambitious student will, by December of this year, have completed the 18 credits necessary to get his Certificate in Gay and Lesbian Studies. A year from now, more students will be completing the course work. If the UW System and UW-M have not approved the program by that time, they are likely to feel even greater pressure from the student body.

Del Martin, Phyllis Lyon Address Older Lesbians

Urge More Visibility, Activism

Milwaukee — "Old Lesbians are probably the most invisible group [of older adults], and it's hard to advocate for the invisible."

Those were the words of pioneer Lesbian activist Del Martin in a keynote speech to The Third Age Conference for Older Lesbians Planning for Their Later Years, held in Milwaukee on April 22. More than 90 older Lesbians from Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, New York and Utah were not invisible as they participated in the day-long conference at Plymouth United Church of Christ.

For more than four decades, Martin, 74, and her partner, Phyllis Lyon, 70, have been outspoken advocates for Lesbian and Gay rights and a variety of other human rights issues. They founded the Daughters of Bilitis, the first Lesbian organization, in 1955. They are the authors of Lesbian/Woman, a classic first published in 1972 and recently republished in an updated edition.

Lyon is retired from her career as a sex educator, and Martin from work with battered women. Martin wrote **Battered**Wives, one of the earliest books on that issue. Both have been active in Democratic party politics for many years.

The Third Age conference in Milwaukee followed the first Lesbian Aging Issues Forum held in 1993 in Madison. Referring to the published report of that conference, Martin regretfully observed the anonymity of its authors.

"This couldn't be happening in Wisconsin," she and Lyon thought, the state of pioneer Gay rights legislation, openly Lesbian Assembly Member Tammy Baldwin and Miriam Ben-Shalom. Martin and Lyon challenged those attending the conference to expand efforts on behalf of Lesbians and Gay men "in the Wisconsin tradition."

Lyon suggested that the "Third Age," the time following the adult years devoted to production and reproduction, should be characterized by "dignity for every person -- regardless of productivity, integration of every older person into society, and recognition of older persons as the moral memory of society."

"THE OLD DYKES HOME"

The Lesbian community, she, pointed out, has developed its own

institutions, culture and spirituality. In an effort "not to turn to the system," some Gay and Lesbian communities have developed their own services for their older members and then "plugged them in" to the system. In San Francisco, where Lyon and Martin live, the Tavern League has underwritten some of the costs of a mental health program for Lesbians and Gay men.

Referring to the "Old Dykes Home," an idea frequently discussed among Lesbians, Lyon suggested that such a facility might result in setting older Lesbians aside, rather than integrating them into the larger Lesbian community. The Old Lesbians Organizing Committee (OLOC), of which Martin and Lyon are members, advocates a multi-cultural, multi-generational housing model.

OLOC members refer to themselves as old Lesbians, not older Lesbians.

"Old is the word we want to reclaim," said Lyon.

"Old is the word we want to reclaim," said Lyon. "Older" is meaningless, since everyone becomes older from the time they are born. We need to deal with the denial [of aging]

and ageism in our own Lesbian community and heterosexism in the larger community."

Noting the importance of developing allies for our causes, she suggested that passage of domestic partner legislation may be more acheivable than samegender marriage at this time.

The California legislature passed domestic partnership legislation on the first try, although Gov. Pete Wilson (R) later vetoed it. Heterosexual senior citizens joined in supporting passage of the bill, recognizing that it offers them an alternative to remarriage, which strips widows of their right to pensions from a previous marriage, even if the remarriage does not last.

ON TO THE WHITE HOUSE!

Shortly after their Milwaukee appearance, Martin and Lyon were in Washington, DC as delegates from California to the White House Conference on Aging. (See related story.) The White House conference is held once each decade to establish policy recommendations on behalf of older Americans.

The couple planned to speak up after finding no mention of "Gay, Lesbian or sexual orientation" in any of the background materials sent out to delegates in advance of the conference. This silencing of Lesbian and Gay concerns occurred despite the fact that specific recommendations had been

Martin & Lyon Storm the Nation's Capital

"We Can't Afford to be Shut Out"

Washington, DC — Ten days after Lesbian activists Del Martin and Phyllis Lyon spoke at the *Third Age* conference for older Lesbians in Milwaukee, they stormed the nation's capital, lobbying for recognition of Gays and Lesbians at the White House Conference on Aging and urging national Gay groups to begin advocating for the concerns of Gay and Lesbian elders.

Faced with what Martin called a "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" attitude about Gays and Lesbians at the White House Conference on Aging, Martin and Lyon attended the meeting intent on raising Gay issues and visibility. They were among more than 2,200 delegates to the conference, held every ten years to adopt guidelines for national policies toward the elderly.

In a telephone interview with In Step from her Washington Hotel on May 4, Martin described the conferees as "very conservative." She attributed this to the fact that delegates were appointed by Governors, Senators and members of Congress, the majority of them Republican and much more conservative after last year's election. Martin and Lyon, lifelong liberals and Democratic Party activists, were appointed by Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) and Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), respectively.

Martin said she was "amazed" at the expressions of hostility against minorities by delegates and charged that the conference organizers intentionally tried to "shut out" Gays and Lesbians. This "silencing" took the form of deleting references to Gays and Lesbians that had appeared in recommendations submitted to conference planners and denying Gays and Lesbians their own caucus room.

Martin and Lyon had asked for a special room where Gay and Lesbian elders could network and plan strategy. They searched in vain for the room, which was not mentioned in conference materials. Ultimately, after getting the "run-around," they learned that the Gay/Lesbian Caucus room they requested was listed as the "San Francisco" caucus room — an apparent stretch homophobic organizers made to avoid using the "G" and "L" words!

"They stopped us from communicating with our community very effectively," Martin said. She and Lyon gradually touched base with just a handful of Gay and Lesbian elders through the painstaking process of searching them out and speaking up at various workshops.

"EDUCATION PROCESS"

Martin and Lyon did succeed in getting sexual orientation added to a resolution that covered all forms of discrimination against old people. They also managed, "despite the hazards," to collect the 220+ signatures needed to introduce a separate resolution that focussed specifically on the needs of Gay and Lesbian elders. These were 2 of 38 resolutions voted on the last day of the conference. Results were still being calculated as In Step went to press.

Martin expressed optimism that the general resolution against discrimination would be passed. She was less sure about the one focusing solely on Gays and Lesbians. She and Lyon knew it might be an uphill battle, but felt it was "necessary to begin the education process" among non-Gay elders.

The energetic and politically committed couple planned to stay in Washington after the Aging Conference to meet with the staffs of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Human Rights Campaign Fund to raise their consciousness about Gay and Lesbian elders and urge them to make senior issues a greater priority. Martin said she was "shocked" that the national Gay lobbying groups had done little in preparation for the White House Conference.

Martin said the lesson she learned from her experience in Washington is one she's talked about many times before: "It's absolutely essential to get our people more involved in traditional politics. We cannot afford to be shut out. We are beginning to elect our own people now, so we don't have to depend on others to represent us. But there's still so many groups and levels of decision-making to which Gays and Lesbians must provide input."

forwarded from the Gay and Lesbian Issues Network of the American Society on Aging, as well as the fact that Lesbian and Gay elders had been, for the first time at any White House Conference on Aging, identified as a "special population" among the older adult population.

"We're facing a 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' policy at the Clinton White House Conference," Martin commented.

Martin urged the Milwaukee audience to "claim full membership" in contd. on page > 6

the larger community and to begin to prepare for the next White House conference, the first of the 21st century, by organizing, forming coalitions, and supporting Lesbian and Gay elders to come out.

In addition to hearing Martin and Lyon, those attending the Third Age conference participated in workshops on legal issues, health care concerns, the process of retiring, making friends and staying connected, travel options and financial planning. A session on the politics of aging was presented by Stephanie Sue Stein, Executive Director of the Milwaukee County Department on Aging.

Conference organizers received financial assistance or in-kind support from the Cream City Foundation and the

Milwaukee County Department on Aging.

STATE News Briefs

MAP Issues Water Alert for Immune-Compromised

Milwaukee - On May 3, the City of Milwaukee found trace amounts of the parasite cryptosporidium in water at the Howard Avenue Treatment Plant. Health Commissioner Paul Nannis, saying the finding did not pose a threat to the public health, said no boil advisory would be issued. But the Milwaukee AIDS Project sent a "Water Alert" notice to all MAP clients, reiterating its longstanding recommendation that individuals with HIV infection or other immune system disorders avoid drinking Milwaukee tap water.

'The Milwaukee AIDS Project continues to advocate a conservative approach to the use of tap water," the Alert said. "The only way to be sure that you do not become infected by cryptosporidium is to continue to drink only boiled water."

Among MAP's recommendations: water should be boiled for at least five minutes; point-of-use filters of sub-micron pore size or smaller seem to filter out crypto from home tap water, but be sure regular maintenance of the filter occurs; if you drink bottled water, make sure the supplier regularly tests its water supply for crypto and other parasites; be aware that tap water is often used to mix sodas, coffees and other drinks at restaurants; do not swim in lakes, rivers or public swimming pools if your T- cells are less than 200.

The cryptosporidium infestation of Milwaukee's municipal water supply in 1993 sickened 400,000 and led to the deaths of more than 100 people. For further information on how

MASN's Teen Squad Wins Golden Rule Award

Madison — On May 2, the HIV Intervention Teen (HIT) Squad of the Madison AIDS Support Network won the Golden Rule Award, sponsored by the J.C. Penney Co. and United Way-Madison. More than 100 groups and individuals were nominated, with three final winners. The HIT Squad won in the Education category. The award includes a \$1,000 prize to MASN.

The HIT Squad is comprised of 22 area high school students. They receive extensive training and then travel to high schools, workshops and other events to present information to their peers on HIV/AIDS. They present factual information on how to protect against HIV infection and engage in role playing

to illustrate ways for young people to make safe choices.

Jamie Clark, a HIT Squad member from Sun Prairie High School, says the program is "a good way to educate teens because they are more apt to listen to other teens than adults." Randi Phelps, a senior at Memorial High School, said of the Golden Rule Award: "It's a big honor to be recognized by the community with this award, and it gives us the initiative to do more. It also makes us realize that what we're doing is appreciated by our community."

Cathreen Godre Elected to Board of the Victory Fund

Madison - Madison attorney and activist Cathreen Godre has been elected to serve on the Board of Directors of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, the national donor network which endorses and finances qualified openly Gay and Lesbian

candidates for public office.

Godre was supported by the Victory Fund in her own campaign for the Dane County Board of Supervisors last year - a bid that was unsuccessful. Prior to entering private practice as a criminal attorney, Godre was an associate attorney with a local law firm. She was chosen by a panel of Dane County judges to participate in the Guardian Ad Litem Project in which she represented children in abuse and neglect cases. Godre previously lived in San Francisco while she attended law school and worked with the Bay Area Lawyers for Individual Freedom.

The Victory Fund works in this way. Individuals join the network by contributing \$100 or more to the Victory Fund while pledging two additional donations of at least \$100 to a Gay or Lesbian candidate of their choice. The Victory Fund screens and endorses candidates, informing members through periodic bulletins. State Rep. Tammy Baldwin credits the Victory Fund with helping her get elected to the State Assembly. AIDS Death Toll in Wisconsin Stands at 1.633

Madison — The AIDS/HIV Program of the Wisconsin Division of Health reports that 127 new cases of HIV infection were reported in the first quarter of 1995. One hundred twelve individuals were diagnosed with AIDS while 83 more people died from AIDS complications, bringing the total of AIDS deaths in Wisconsin to 1,633.

The number of state residents contracting HIV infections since figures were compiled in 1982 now stands at 4,797. Of those cases, 12.8% are among females. The total number of AIDS cases, based on the Center for Disease Control's definition, is 2,800. Of those, 65.2% were exposed through unprotected sex with other men, 12.5% were exposed through injection drug use, 6.1% through heterosexual contact, 5.4% through drug use and unprotected sex between men, with 3.8% hemophilia or blood transfusion-related.

Also Around the State...
Milwaukee — Contrary to a report that appeared in the State Briefs in the last issue of In Step, the City of Milwaukee has not (as we go to press) reached a final settlement with the police fired for dereliction of duty in the Jeffrey Dahmer case. The City Attorney and a Common Council Committee gave preliminary approval for a \$265,000 settlement to cover the cops' legal expenses, but Police Chief Philip Arreola is adamant that the officers themselves get no money. The City did conclude a \$850,000 settlement with the family of Dahmer victim Konerak Sinthasomphone.

Washington, DC - For the first time ever, the White House has scheduled a meeting with Gay and Lesbian elected officials to take place on Tuesday, June 13. Wisconsin's State Rep. Tammy Baldwin and Madison City Council member Judy Olson are among those invited to the historic event. Baldwin is

unlikely to make it because the State Assembly is in floor session that day.

"This much-awaited meeting will give Gay and Lesbian officials the opportunity to provide input to the Administration and to discuss with Administration officials issues of common concern," said Susan Leal, the San Francisco Supervisor who has worked as a liaison between the White House and the Gay/Lesbian elected officials.

"We have spent the last two years laying the groundwork for this unprecedented event," Leal commented, "and now, to paraphrase Harvey Milk, we will give the American people the chance

to judge us by our own leaders and by our own legislators." On the morning before the June 13 meeting, the Gay/Lesbian elected officials will conduct a coordinated series of Congressiona visits to meet with important legislators on key issues affecting the Gay/Lesbian community.

Florida's Ban on Gay Adoptions Remains Intact

Tallahassee, FL — On April 27, the Florida Supreme Court ruled in a 5-2 decision that there was insufficient

evidence to determine whether the state's ban on adoptions by homosexuals violates the equal protection clause of the Florida constitution. It sent the case back to the trial court for further consideration, leaving the prohibition on Gay adoptions intact for the time being.

Florida and New Hampshire are the only two states with statutes that specifically forbid adoptions by Gays or Lesbians. The Florida law was a direct result of Anita Bryant's 1977 anti-Gay campaign to "Save the Children."

The Florida case was brought by James Cox and his partner Rodney Jackman, who, in 1991, were prevented from filing an application for adoption of a child with "special needs" solely because of their homosexuality. Circuit Judge Scott Brownell declared the anti-Gay adoption ban unconstitutional, but the state won on appeal. Cox and Jackman, with the support of the American Civil Liberties Union, appealed to the State Supreme Court.

In its three-page decision, the court's majority rejected the arguments that the ban denies Gay people their due process and privacy rights. But it asked the lower court to more closely examine the issue of whether the ban denies homosexuals equal protection of the laws. In a blistering dissent, Justice Gerald Kogan called the ban blatantly discriminatory, noting that while homosexuals are forbidden from adopting children, no such law bans adoptions by convicted felons or child abusers



Dallas Halts Distribution of Condoms, Bleach Kits

Dallas, TX — Against the advice of health experts and community activists, the Dallas County Commissioners recently voted 4-1 to prohibit the city's Health Department from distributing free condoms and bleach kits. Condoms help to stem the spread of sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS, and bleach kits enable injection drug users to sterilize their needles to prevent HIV infection.

The four votes to end the condom and bleach kit handouts came from four conservative Republicans, who said the Health Department's disease prevention programs should emphasize sexual abstinence and a drug-free life rather than "immoral" conduct. "Sodomy is still against the law in Texas," said Commissioner Jim Jackson. Restrictions were also placed on the language and illustrations in AIDS prevention literature distributed by the city.

Commissioner John Wiley Price, a Democrat who cast the sole dissenting vote, commented: "It's a right wing agenda that's being forced upon the citizens of this county, and that's unfortunate."

Dallas County health workers have been handing out condoms and bleach kits for almost a decade. In that time, Dallas moved from being ranked 9th among American cities with the greatest number of AIDS cases down to 20th. Health experts attribute this reduction to the county's aggressive AIDS prevention efforts and now fear a reversal of the progress they've made.

GOP Senator Helps Lead Effort to Pass ENDA

Washington, DC — Sen. James Jeffords (R-VT) has agreed to serve as the lead Senate sponsor of the Employment Non- Discrimination Act (ENDA), a bill which will outlaw job discrimination based on sexual orientation. He will work for Senate passage of ENDA with Sen. Ted Kennedy (D-MA). The bill, designed to weather conservative opposition, will not apply to religious groups, small businesses or the military.

A bipartisan team in the House of Representatives will also champion ENDA when it is introduced into the 104th Congress this month. House sponsors include openly Gay Reps. Barney Frank and Gerry Studds (D-MA) and Rep. Connie Morella (R-MD).

In the last Congress, ENDA garnered support from 170 sponsors — more than any other legislation aimed at extending civil rights to Lesbians and Gay men. After the 1994 elections, the base of support has remained virtually intact. Lobbyists for the Human Rights Campaign Fund and the many organizations represented in the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights are working hard to enlist more sponsors.

In the Wisconsin delegation, Sens. Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold, both Democrats, have endorsed ENDA as has Rep. Thomas Barrett (D). The state's eight other Congressmen have either refused to support ENDA or failed to state their positions.

DEA Agents Used "Excessive Force" Against Gay Men

New York, NY — A jury in federal court in Manhattan has awarded \$111,000 in damages to two Gay men who charged that agents of the Drug Enforcement Administration launched an unprovoked assault on them in 1988 after the motorcycle of one of the plaintiff's accidentally scratched an unmarked DEA vehicle.

Jeffrey Grubb and Marc Anderson claimed that after Grubb's motorcycle nicked the DEA car, Agent Ross Kindestin emerged and hit and pushed Grubb. When Anderson came to Grubb's aid, another agent allegedly called

Anderson a "faggot" and punched him. Grubb and Anderson were charged with assault, but the charges were soon dropped. The two Gay men, in turn, sued the DEA agents for false arrest and assault.

The jury agreed that the DEA agents unlawfully arrested Grubb and Anderson and used excessive force. They did not agree however that the assault was motivated by anti-Gay hatred.

Gay Journalists: Workplaces Good, Coverage "Fair"

Sebastopol, CA — A recent survey of 179 Gay and Lesbian journalists who work in the electronic media revealed that most believe their work environments are generally Gay-friendly but that media coverage of Gay issues is "fair" to "poor." The poll was conducted by the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association and the Radio and Television News Directors Foundation.

While 67% of those surveyed said



they had heard derogatory remarks about Gays sometime during their employment, almost 75% said that being Gay or Lesbian made no difference in salaries, promotional opportunities or assignments. Two-thirds of the respondents said they were "out" in their newsrooms, a situation that seems to positively impact the attitudes of heterosexual co- workers towards Gays.

But 76% of those surveyed rated media coverage of the Gay community either "fair" or "poor." This is in sharp contrast to a survey of News Directors who gave themselves high ratings for their coverage of Gay issues.

Charlotte, NC - White Rabbit Books and Things, a Charlotte bookstore specializing in Gay literature, was destroyed in April by a fire of suspicious origins. Investigators said that evidence of chemical accelerants around the shop pointed to arson. The store's owner, John Neal, hopes to reopen at a new location this summer.

Haverhill, MA — Transgender activist Leslie Feinberg, author of the Lammy Award-winning Stone Butch Blues, will speak at the commencement ceremonies at Bradford College after all. College President Joseph Short had refused the senior class's request to invite Feinberg but changed his mind following student protests. A student leader said Feinberg was a perfect choice for commencement speaker because her life exemplifies the college's slogan: "Dare to be Different."

Springfield, II - Republican leaders in the Illinois State Senate have once again blocked action on a bill that would outlaw job and housing discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in the Land of Lincoln. GOP Senate President James Philip said the proposal was in need of more "study." and it was shunted off to a subcommittee where it is unlikely to be revived for a floor vote this session.

New York, NY - Pizza Hut, under fire from Gay activists for hiring the homophobic commentator Rush Limbaugh as a pitchman, has fired an employee at one of its Nashville outlets for making a homophobic slur. A Gay patron recently came in to pick up an order and discovered the phrase "What a fairy!" had been printed on his computerized receipt. The Pizza Hut worker was fired.

Minneapolis, MN - A Lesbian couple has filed suit charging that their doctor discriminated against them when she refused to provide them with artificial insemination services. The womens' attorney says the doctor was willing to perform the procedure up until the point she learned they were both Lesbians. The doctor claims she declined only because she is inexperienced with artificial insemination.

Portland, OR - A state appeals court ruled in April that the state legislature had the right to prohibit localities from adopting laws that discriminate against homosexuals. Statewide anti-Gay measures have failed here, but the Oregon Citizens Alliance has succeeded in passing anti-Gay ordinances at the local and county levels. A state statute, passed in 1993, voids such discriminatory laws.

Baltimore, MD - A federal judge in Baltimore has ruled that Lt. (jg) Richard Selland may remain in the military pending the outcome of his lawsuit against the Defense Department for its policy against Gays and Lesbians. Judge Joseph Young granted an injunction

Rev. Mel White Calls for Dialogue

500 Attend Speech at UW-Green Bay

Green Bay — Categorizing the current political debate on Gay civil rights as "shouting at each other across an ever- widening chasm," Gay author, minister and activist Mel White called for serious dialogue between the Religious Right and the Gay community in a speech to 500 people at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay May 4.

In prefatory remarks before his main address, White congratulated the College Republicans at UW-GB for standing up for their beliefs and getting their message out, but cautioned the group that the real work of coming to mutual understanding required "sitting down at the same table to talk things out."

The "get to know us [Gay people]" theme echoed throughout White's 40-minute address, which was filled with humor and a vivid account of his personal spiritual journey and his work as ghostwriter for such Religious Right figures as Pat Robertson and Jerry Falwell.

White also chided the mainstream media for ignoring the growing wave of anti-Gay violence. White contrasted the coverage of the recent shootings of the two abortion clinic doctors with lack of reportage of the hate-motivated murders of 12 Texas Gay men in the last year. "Homophobia is the last socially acceptable prejudice," White said.

White cited economic worries,

White cited economic worries, particularly among white males, as a contributing influence to the growth of intolerance and the "urge to purge."

White also alluded to the growing militia movement, which apparently had ties to the Oklahoma City bombing, as being "as anti-Gay as they are racist and anti-federal government."

At a reception following his talk, White dialogued at length with members of a Green Bay Lutheran evangelical youth group, which held a prayer service outside the student union prior to the event — the only demonstration despite expectations of more widespread protests based on the heightened level of controversy in the weeks preceding the speech.

In introductory remarks, 10% Society President Kurt Anderson referred to the series of flyers circulated both on and off campus during April, condemning White's speech, homosexuality in general and the alleged use of taxpayer's money to fund the event. Some of these flyers were authorized by the junior GOP.

"Several students and student groups have turned what was to be a focus on Gay and Lesbian issues into one of religion and money," Anderson

Responding to critics, Anderson provided a detailed breakdown of funding for White's appearance, which was sponsored by a broad coalition of groups.

US Supreme Court Hears St. Patrick's Parade Case

Ruling on Exclusion of Irish Gays **Expected Soon**

Washington, DC - On April 25, the US Supreme Court heard arguments in the case of John J. Hurley and the South Boston Allied War Veterans Council v. the Irish American Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Group (GLIB) of Boston. The Veterans Council was appealing the rulings of Massachusetts courts which had ordered the group to allow Irish Gays and Lesbians to march in its annual St. Patrick's Day Parade.

The Massachusetts courts had ruled that excluding Irish Gays would be a violation of the Bay State's law forbidding sexual orientation discrimination in public accommodations. The annual St. Patrick's Day Parade was deemed to be a public event, open to all. This charge discrimination was the central argument used by GLIB's attorney, John Ward, before the Supreme Court.

But Chester Darling, the attorney for the Veterans Council, argued that as a private sponsoring organization, the Council has First Amendment rights of free speech to express through its parade "traditional religious and social values" -- First Amendment rights which also protect it from being compelled to support ideas and expression with which it disagrees.

In Wooley v. Maynard (1977), the Supreme Court in fact ruled that the government cannot require an individual or group to accept or convey an idea or message it opposes. The court ruled that the state of New Hampshire could not require residents to use license plates embossed with the state motto "Live Free or Die" if they disagreed with it.

Justice Anthony Kennedy cited the Wooley v. Maynard decision and commented that the St. Patrick's Parade case would be "easier" to rule on.

Other justices also seemed supportive of the Veterans Council's appeal to First Amendment rights. Justice Antonin Scalia noted that the banner with GLIB's name identifying its contingent was inherently a statement of Gay pride, an idea the sponsoring group might find repugnant.

Justice Sandra Day O'Connor asked rhetorically: "How is it that government can compel someone in their private speech to convey the message of someone else? I didn't think that was possible under the First Amendment.'

Ward countered that the Massachusetts courts had ruled that the St. Patrick's Parade was not private; but "an open recreational event." He said members of GLIB had no plans to carry signs asking for the repeal of sodomy laws or challenging traditional values. They merely wanted to carry a banner identifying their group's name, a practice all participating groups engaged in.

"There was not any extrinsic message," said Ward. "Under antidiscrimination laws, one cannot be penalized for merely self- identifying."

"A CONUNDRUM"

Linda Greenhouse, analyzing the case for The New York Times, said that it "poses a conundrum for judges who are both sympathetic to the interests of the Gay marchers and, for First Amendment purposes, committed to maintaining a broad definition of what constitutes 'expression."

"The more that the act of marching under an identifying banner is deemed to be expression, the more weight attaches to the arguments of the parade organizers for excluding unwanted messages."

Some advocates of civil rights for Gays and Lesbians have opposed the legal efforts of Irish Gay groups to be included in St. Patrick's Day Parades in Boston and New York. They fear that an unequivocal ruling in favor of the Irish Gays, which cites discrimination on the part of sponsoring organizations, could mean that organizers of Gay Pride Parades throughout the country will be compelled to allow fundamentalist and other anti-Gay groups to participate in their events.

The Boston and New York cases

In Massachusetts, the courts ruled in favor of including the Irish Gay group in the parade, because of the determination that the parade is a public event and because of the state law prohibiting sexual orientation discrimination. In 1994, the Veterans Council canceled the parade rather than allow the Gays to march. This year, the Council was able to prove the event was designed as a protest of pro-Gay court rulings, so a federal judge allowed the Council to exclude GLIB.

In New York, a federal judge ruled that parades are primarily organized by private interests as protected forms of free speech and that the First Amendment rights of sponsors are paramount and override other considerations. Though New York City does, New York State does not have a law banning sexual orientation discrimination. Since that ruling, for the past three years, members of the Irish Lesbian and Gay Organization have held protests before each St. Pat's Parade, usually resulting in many arrests.

Most court observers agreed that the Supreme Court Justices seemed much more supportive of the Veterans Council's First Amendment arguments in the Boston case. Their decision, which could have broad implications for Gay rights cases around the country, is expected to be issued by the end of the court's session June 30.

The international event, which began in San Francisco in 1983, honors the memory of those who have died of AIDS and demonstrates support for people living with HIV and AIDS. It's the world's largest annual community-based event, with 243 cities in 45 different countries participating last year. Local observances range in character from small gatherings in churches and synagogues to huge marches through city centers.

A special feature of the Milwaukee Memorial will be the sharing of stories by people with AIDS, their family members or friends. Such stories can include fond memories or express frustration, anger or understanding. Individuals are also encouraged to bring photos of their loved ones to the event.

Give us a call Todd, and drop in sometime. There are a bunch of people like you who would love to share their experiences and ideas, and who hope you'll be ready to share yours with them.



A Taboo's End

current American scene certainly provides materials with which a pessimist could paint a gloomy picture of Gay politics: Gay litigative reform lurches two steps forward, two steps back. Unfriendly conservatives have swept both national and state legislatures. The G-word has dropped from Bill Clinton's vocabulary. Talk radio has declared open season on Gays. Our national political groups are weak and stumbling.


Still, I suggest that America is at a crucial turning point on Gay issues and is undergoing an important structural change which bodes well for Gays over the long haul. It is now at least acceptable to inquire about Gay issues in public discussion. The taboo blanketing talk of Lesbian and Gay lives is dissolving.

The clearest indicator of this shift can be found in the mass media. As little as a decade back The New York Times refused to print the word Gay; now it carries more Gay news than The Advocate. Newt Gingrich is talking more about Gay issues than Bill Clinton ever

did, and is constantly keeping Gay issues before the public. Children can now read a nationally syndicated comic strip with a Gay character and even see movie idols of the same sex smoothing on network

The importance of lifting the taboo on Gay speech and Gay issues should not be underestimated. First it will have is having — a significant effect on the public lives of many non-Gay people. Studies have shown that, on Gay issues, people are greatly affected in their opinions by how they think other people will perceive them. Taboos encourage, indeed enforce, the aping of opinions from one person to the next, causing them to circulate independently of both critical assessment and authentic feeling. The result is that many non-Gay people feel socially required to be Gay-fearing or Gay-hating, even when they are not homophobic by personal inclination. As the taboo over talking about Gay men and Lesbians breaks down, so too will the echoes and apings that have maintained so many of the social forces directed against Gays. Non-Gay people will be able to express in public contexts their own real feelings. Barney Frank has perceptively noted that people are now less homophobic than they think they should be. This fortuitous and surprising gap provides great opportunity to those working with Gays' justice for it means that the majority population is now reachable.

Further, with the ending of the taboo, anti-Gay forces can no longer automatically count on visceral responses of revulsion to carry the day for them. This change in turn has several corollary consequences. First, with the collapse of the taboo, it is increasingly difficult for society to maintain the rituals that demonize Gays and Lesbians. Rituals of taboo create an eerie

supernatural realm unspeakably beyond the pale and then populate it with ghouls and monsters. With the taboo's collapse, Gays, in society's eye, are becoming less like monsters and demons and more like hippies and Mormons - or in Newt's favored analogy, like alcoholics. Maybe not something nice, maybe something odd, something one might not chose for oneself, but Gays are no longer something monstrous, repulsive, unthinkably abject. Though not an ideal achievement, this state does mark major

cultural change.

Second, not that it's okay to know and be around alcoholics and Mormons and now even around Gay folk. Without demonization, it is hard, perhaps impossible, to view homosexuality as a vampire-like corruptive contagion, a disease that spreads itself to the pure and innocent by mere proximity. This change of conceptualization will eventually cause to abate the stereotype of the Gay man as child molester and more generally as sex crazed predator. And this change has already markedly lessened - for straight folk - both fear of association and guilt by association. For really the first time it is now possible for Gays to have straight allies, people who cannot instantly and effectively be tarred and dismissed with the slur "queer

Finally, the collapse of the taboo and its visceral effects means that anti-Gay forces now have to argue for and give rational accounts of their position. And the good news here is that the arguments are all on the side of Gays. Moreover, the very ground rules of reasoned discourse - commitments to honesty, consistency, openness, and fair play - make it inherently a force for liberalism.

The Right senses and fears the cultural shift underway. It seems tacitly to recognize that to win the cultural wars it must shore up the deeply fractured taboo. Just look where radicals on the Right are investing their energies. They are not trying to "punish the sin" by restoring sodomy laws to states without them. Rather they want to get "the sinner" to shut up. Thus they chiefly focus on representations of Gay life. They target museum exhibitions, the funding of the arts, school curricula, public television, Gay books, and the

Bearing Witness

It began as an emergency gathering of a few Lesbians and Gay men. It ended up as a unified force that taught a whole community a lasting lesson about courage and hope. They themselves Bearing Witness, a loose coalition of religious leaders and local organizations from the Tidewater area of Virginia. They came together to support Mel White, the Gay minister and activist, who once ghostwrote for such anti-Gay luminaries as Pat Robertson and Jerry Falwell. It was while seeking a meeting with Pat Robertson at his Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN) headquarters on February 15, 1995, that White was arrested for trespassing and

later jailed.
First comprising only a few Lesbians and Gay men, Bearing Witness quickly expanded to include people, from the mainstream of the community, who were similarly concerned about Robertson's sanctimonious extremism and the need to challenge his theology of intolerance. Under the leadership of Alicia Herr, Loen Arlington and Dawn Rankin-Phelps, Bearing Witness grew and attracted attention to White's jailhouse fast

following his arrest.

It is from his offices at CBN that Robertson also directs the Christian Coalition, the million-member, right-wing political group which has been widely credited for electing the conservative Republican members to Among other charges, Congress. Robertson has been accused of promoting anti-Gay discrimination and violence, as well as covert anti-Semitism. In spurning the invitation to meet, Robertson rejected White's offer to "... try to help him understand the terrible consequences of his false and inflammatory rhetoric ... which leads directly to discrimination, suffering, and death." After Mel White refused to leave the CBN compound and was arrested on Robertson's order, he vowed to remain in solitary confinement in the Virginia Beach iail and fast until Pat Robertson agreed to meet with him.

Without the unflagging efforts of Bearing Witness and Mel White's resolve, the public spotlight on Robertson's intolerance might have faded quickly. But, Bearing Witness was determined. Every day, for twenty-three days, a delegation from Bearing Witness

went to the CBN headquarters in a fruitless, but stubborn, attempt to give Pat Robertson a single rose and plead that he meet with the ever-weakening Mel White. Each day, and late into each night, volunteers doggedly worked to publicize Mel White's struggle. Press releases, faxes, telephone calls, culminating on March 5th with an all-

community Truth Vigil in the Unitarian Universalist Church of Norfolk, in which I was proud to participate. Thanks to the heroic efforts of Bearing Witness volunteers, and Mel White's courageous perseverance, the controversy drew national attention. Finally, at 8pm on March 8, 1995, the 23rd day of White's fast, Pat Robertson went to the Virginia Beach jail — "as an act of compassion," he said — to meet with Mel White. Mel White and Bearing Witness won their battle, another small victory for Gay activism.

Mel White's fast provided the catalyst, but local Lesbian and Gay people provided the key ingredients — the skills and volunteers to carry on the


struggle. Bearing Witness is in the great American tradition of citizens organizing and fighting at the local level to achieve such goals as safety and equality that cut to the core of their own lives, yet which resonate far beyond the localities involved. Such local action represents the correct priority for our Gay and Lesbian community.

If this local organizing signifies the great American tradition of community action, Robertson's preaching, pitting neighbor against neighbor, epitomizes its antithesis. Much of the local mainstream support for Bearing Witness came from the recognition that their peaceful Virginia community was not impervious

to the kinds of bigotries they thought

flourished only in foreign places. Our country is the great melting pot, growing ever stronger in the diversity of all of its people. But this vision would be history, they realized, if Pat Robertson continued to gain power and went unchallenged in his quest to re-invent America. Indeed, as a long record of public statements has made clear, Pat Robertson's America has no room for people who do not fit into his vision of a Christian paradise on earth — especially homosexuals.

Pat Robertson lines his pockets by fanning fear and



hatred of Gays, all the while deploying arguments and code words culled from old attacks on Communists and Jews. When the Berlin Wall came down, anticommunism, the cement that held the disparate pieces of the American conservative movement together, had to be replaced by a new enemy. Who? Homosexuals! The same rhetoric used against the Communists to raise money for the ongoing "conservative" machine could be used again, almost word for word, against homosexuals. "They are taking over the media, the schools, the libraries, and are infiltrating every segment of our society, even the churches. They are disease-ridden and unhealthy. They are the children of Satan and must be stopped! They are outside of God's care and mercy. They are the anti-Christ. They must be erased from our midst. In the name of God!"

White and Bearing Witness were correct to call attention to Pat Robertson's anti-Gay extremism and the mortal danger he poses to Lesbian and Gay Americans. While Robertson has been the target of public criticism of late for his occasional brushes with anti-Semitism, his anti-Gay remarks have so far escaped such public denunciations. Gays threaten Robertson's goal of earthly paradise, just as my own Jewish forbearers stood between Hitler and his vision of an Aryan paradise in Europe. They were exterminated. If Pat Robertson prevails, why should it be different here? The United States is not immune. Robertson's attack on Gays should bring down the same public scorn and criticism that confronts his anti-Semitism.

Pat Robertson, and the other preachers of hate, have twisted the words of Jesus Christ to achieve their own ends, including immense personal wealth and political power. American Lesbians and Gay men share with the Jewish community the responsibility and duty to consistently monitor and challenge Robertson's rhetoric of hate, be it overt as it is leveled against Gays and Lesbians, or covert and coded, as it is leveled against Jews.


You never know if they'll arrive in clerical collars or studded ones!" she

Film on Pre-Roe Abortion Underground Screens May 26, 27

Chicago — The world premiere of The Janes: A Women's Underground Abortion Service will take place at the Chicago Filmmakers Kino-Eye Cinema May 26 and 27 at 8pm. The theater is located at 1543 West Division. Admission is \$5

The hour-long documentary features the Chicago-based women's health collective Jane, whose members performed 12,000 safe, illegal abortions between 1969 and 1973, when the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade ruling finally decriminalized abortion.

From the first referrals to the arrests of its key members, Jane's story is told by the women who ran and were served by it. Archival footage, personal documents and in-depth interviews convey the reality of this mobile, illegal clinic which provided over 300 abortions a month to women referred by friends

and members of Chicago's clergy and police force.

The Janes: A Women's Underground Abortion Service was produced and directed by Chicago filmmakers Kate Kirtz and Nell Lundy. It is the first major exploration of the pre-Roe underground abortion network in Chicago, and many of the women in the video have never before spoken publicly about their experiences.

The Friday, May 26 screening will be followed by a panel discussion featuring Kirtz and Lundy, members of Jane, and pro-choice activists. Saturday's screening will be followed by a champagne reception.

Interview

Talking with Scott Heim

In November, 1994, Scott Heim was named by The New York Times Magazine as one of thirty artists under thirty most likely to "change the culture in the next thirty years." The prestigious honor was given him, to a large extent, on the explosive strength of his debut novel, Mysterious Skin.


Vividly set in Kansas, this is the story of the long term effects of molestation on two different boys by their little league coach. Neil recalls the experiences as a model for an idyllic love he can never recapture. He eventually becomes the town hustler and hood before moving to New York City. Brian represses the memory so thoroughly, that when it does emerge, it's interpreted as a clouded dream of alien abduction. The coming together of these two young men and their shared past drives the novel to a satisfying conclusion.

Recently I had the pleasure to talk a little with Scott Heim about the exciting course his life is taking. We discussed the novel, writing, UFOs, music, and Dario Argento, among other things. He was very charming and down-to-earth, and as articulate as his work.

Carl Szatmary does a review that appears in a side bar with this interview.

Owen: A novel is such a huge undertaking, how did it begin?

Scott: Mysterious Skin started out as a story about Brian, then I essentially took the Neil story and sewed them together. Then I realized I had something much bigger than a short story.

Are you challenging the recovery and survivors psychology that surrounds the molestation in the book?

Yes and no. More in the forefront was people's simplification and underestimation of children, that's mostly in the first third. The rest of the book is concerned with memory. The whole aspect of blocked memories is a really exciting topic and also scary. Sometimes it's completely legitimate and sometimes you can have a dream or memory that may or may not be real, you can exaggerate it or make it into something it's not. That's what I tried to do with Brian's story in the book.

Whose story was more difficult for you to write?

Probably Brian's because his story is so internalized. When I was working on the book I was more excited about writing Neil's sections. Whenever I sat down at the computer I would want to write about him. The hardest chapters were those showing Brian coming to terms with his memories. It's funny, but now that I'm touring and doing readings the parts I tend to like to read are the Brian sections.

The UFO theme you include in the book is so thoroughly researched. Is IN STEP ▼ May 11-24,1995 ▼ Page 27

it a personal fascination of yours? Have you ever seen one?

I'm not embarrassed to say the part of the novel where the mother and daughter and son see the UFO is almost exactly how it happened when I was a kid. I remember having really vivid dreams as a child. I can remember one experience with my sister of waking up in the middle of the night feeling something bad had just happened to us. We would have dreams after that with the theme of aliens touching us. My sister also was once driving in the country and saw a UFO and when she arrived where she was going there were two hours missing in her time.

It's something I've always been fascinated by and something I do believe in, but I also am hesitant to talk about it because people are so skeptical. UFOs, Big Foot, Loch Ness Monster, ghosts, ESP, I'm into all that stuff.

Brian and Neil also both come from single mother homes. Is that just a character coincidence?

In a way. It's also just the idea of being a kid from a problem home and an outsider type. It makes them more accessible to the predator in the book.

I'm also curious about your penchant for strange sex scenes like the syrup scene in "Imagining Line" from the "Waves" anthology, or in this novel the cereal molestation or the weird playground exhibitionist seance, or the ballpark stuff. Why do your sex scenes continually have a surreal

Anyone who's read an adult fiction novel has read enough sex scenes to get the same thing over and over. There's only so many terms you can use for penis and vagina. It gets really boring after a while. I like to get into the head of my characters during sex and also insert a setting or emotion or image that isn't usually associated with the average sex scene to make it more powerful, believable, and memorable.

The ultimate compliment is when someone who would normally be repulsed by the situation gets turned on by it. That's my goal when I write a sex scene. To me a vanilla or white bread sex scene is completely boring in real life and ten times more boring in fiction.

It was great to see Dario Argento's "Suspiria," one of my all time favorite movies, captured between the pages of serious fiction.

It's my favorite movie. I love horror

films and I think I've seen just about everything ever put on film or video. Dario Argento is my absolute favorite and I felt somehow I needed to pay him homage, but I wasn't the first. Kathy Acker did it in **My Mother Demonology.** In some ways what I'm trying to do with my fiction is similar to what he does with his films, the juxtaposition of extremes. In his films he does a lot with music and cinematography, surrounding his utmost violence with beauty.

He's such a sensory explosion. Do you want someone to feel the same thing upon closing "Mysterious Skin?"

I want someone to have a really visceral experience. I want someone to feel the way I do when I see a great horror movie, some sort of slap in the face emotion whether it's sadness or shock or horror or disgust — at least I've moved them beyond the usual page turning fluff.

What writer's influenced you?

When I started, Genet and the surrealists. I was also influenced by Dennis Cooper who is my favorite in terms of language and style. Kathy Acker, the poet Anne Sexton. I also love Flannery O'Connor and the southern gothic writers, Cormac McCarthy. I also love Joy Williams.

Do you have any writing idiosyncrasies?

It depends on what you consider an idiosyncrasy. I do my best writing late at night with music blaring. I like to listen to fuzzy druggy fucked-up British guitar band music.

What bands?

My Bloody Valentine, Seefeel, Cocteau Twins... I like things that are very moody and sort of swirls around the room and makes me feel certain ways. With a lot of them you can't understand the lyrics of their songs, so writing for me while listening is like providing words to a soundtrack.

Recently you were named by "The New York Times Magazine" as one of the thirty artists under thirty most likely to change the culture in the next thirty years. What did it feel like to be named to a list like that?

It's very encouraging, but I also feel I have something to live up to now that they've put this title on me. It all happened so fast. It was really fun going to the photo session because I didn't know who else would be involved and there were people I'd seen on MTV and movies or whatever. It was the first time I realized Mysterious Skin was going to be something big in the sense of people across the country will be able to go into a store and buy it. When the magazine came out and there was my picture with these other people, I realized that if I

hadn't been included in this and I were under thirty I'd be very jealous.

Scott, it's when you move in the over thirty crowd that you find the *real* jealousy. Just kidding. Tell me a little something about the novel you're working on now?

I don't have a title. Once again it's set in Kansas and focuses on a trio of outcasts, a teenage boy, a women in her thirties, and a woman in her sixties whose son has just died. They are the pariahs of this town and it's about their desires and how they are sure they will never be fulfilled. Then a sort of dastardly character comes in and tries to fulfill their desires for them. It's also about the past and how the memory of it affects the way we live which I guess is the major theme I'm working on now.

What attracts you to having outcasts as your protagonists?

I think outcasts are almost always more interesting than the most popular people in class. They have stories to tell because they usually have secrets. It's always the more popular or important people that voice their stories. The outcast is usually silent so I like giving a voice to them. A big part of it too, is when I was growing up I was always an outcast in one way or another and people that were my friends were outcasts. I was overweight and my friends and I were the punk rockers in high school. People always looked at us like we were freaks, part of me didn't like that, but most of me did. It's interesting to me that most outcasts are content with being outcasts.

Did you always want to be a writer?

I always wanted to be recognized. The two things I knew I did best were writing and playing drums. I was a drummer in a couple rock bands in college. I was good at it, but there came a time when I realized that to make it in a band was too far fetched, that I should pursue English literature and writing. Eventually, it paid off.

It paid off real big, Scott. Thanks, Thanks, Owen.

A Haunting & Profoundly Moving Work

Mysterious Skin By Scott Heim HarperCollins HC \$20

Few subjects remain as controversial or as ripe for exploitation even in these sexually enlightened times as pedophilia, which makes Mysterious Skin (HarperCollins, HC, \$20) such an unlikely prospect. Yet courageous readers will find Scott Heim's debut novel something of a revelation, a haunting and profoundly moving work that is likely to leave a lasting impression.


Brian Lackey and Neil McCormick were 8-year old Little Leaguers playing on a team called the Panthers during the summer of 1981. Brian was the archetypal nerdy kid, timid and a tad uncoordinated, playing ball that summer, not out of enjoyment, but at his father's demand. Neil, on the other hand, was a gifted, natural athlete, already maturing both physically and emotionally and the team's star player.

In Neil, Coach Heider found a most happy and willing partner. An encounter with Brian left the little boy to awaken in the crawl space beneath his home's porch, still in his Little League uniform and with 5 hours disappeared from his

Mysterious Skin follows Neil and Brian as they grow up, chartering the impact of these encounters. Brian would quit Little League. He would also become a bedwetter and an increasing disappointment to his father. The missing five hours of his life would continue to haunt Brian, later formulating that the secret was due to abduction by a UFO.

Likewise, Neil would drop out of organized baseball, but due to the fact that the town council assigned Coach Heider a much older group of boys the following summer. Lacking the love and guidance, real or imagined from Coach, Neil would become the town outcast at an early age, into drugs and shoplifting. Later and almost effortlessly Neil would drift into prostitution.

Set in the heart of middle America, Mysterious Skin is an exploration of the family, about love and loss, about forgetfulness and rationalization. Finally, Mysterious Skin is about identity, about what we humans do to find our place in the world. The barren Kansas landscape becomes a striking metaphor for not only the emptiness of the American Dream, but also of the human heart and soul.



Gardening in SE WI Can Be A Challenge

So, now that Spring has arrived, are you itching to give your green thumb some exercise? Are seed catalogs, nursery sale flyers, and bulb books stacked up on your coffee table? With Milwaukee's unpredictable Spring weather, you better get going and start planning.

Whether you're starting out with a new home complete with semi-landscaped yard, inherited an older home with existing yard, or only have a balcony or porch to work with, today's hybrid plants, veggies and herbs can grow practically anywhere.

Most gardening experts will tell you that your yard and garden should be a natural extension of your home. Planning on paper is very helpful, plus seek out advice from friends, neighbors, and nursery professionals. With the computer age on us, there are also computer programs to help you design a garden, but gardening is more of an art form than a science, and personal taste is extremely important (something a computer knows nothing about).



The amount of sun, and the length of time it's available for your plants is important. Pick up a book or two (depending on whether you want to do a plant/flower or vegetable/herb garden). Many gardeners suggests planting herbs in with your flowers. Some of them naturally repel insects, and can add height, depth and texture to lower flowering plants.

Containers, fountains, planters, and the like must be chosen carefully, to assist in developing that specific look you're seeking. That cute Guernsey cow planter may be ideal for a flower bed full of petunias, but it will seriously look out of place in a elegant rose garden, or earthy looking rock garden.

But containers can also help you plan out your garden. A distant relative of mine used old shoes from her children, relatives, neighbors and old resale shops to hold various flowering plants. It was quite the spot each summer, but she had to replace the shoes each spring.

Consider Your Lifestyle When Planning

How much time do you want to spend pulling weeds, manicuring and caring for your garden each week? What is the real purpose of your garden? Personal enjoyment, entertaining, competition? Do you own your own home, or are you only renting your property? If you are renting, how long will you stay there, and how much time and money do you want to spend on a garden?

These are all excellent questions to consider when planning your garden. Color, plant trends, amount of sun, available plants, etc. are also things to consider.

Perhaps starting out with small, segmented areas is your answer. Perhaps you just want to brighten an area around your patio. You use it to cook out, to sunbathe, to entertain. Measure out the area, evaluate if for available sun exposure, and then determine what look you want to achieve.

Contain Yourself

Container gardening is perfect for those of us who live in restricted spaces (apartments, condos and small homes with even smaller yards). It's also a perfect way to enjoy plants if you have physical limitations (handicapped, elderly, etc.).

Some basic rules for container gardening include: 1) make sure the last frost has passed before putting anything out. 2) Mix bagged "potting soil" with slightly less than equal parts of perlite and peat moss, and just for good measure, add a heaping handful or two of compost and a small handful of bone meal. 3) Drainage is critical to good container gardening. Make sure every pot has drainage holes. 4) Watch the fertilizer. A heavy hand with the Miracle-Grow can do more harm than good. 5) Water them. The rule of thumb is to push your finger a half inch or so into the soil; if it doesn't feel moist, it's time to water. Use tepid water, plants don't like cold showers. Let your water sit for a day or two before using to permit chlorine to evaporate.



Suggestions on Plant Types

Annuals complete their life cycle in just one season, but do a great job providing instant color and beauty all summer long. Great annuals to plant in Wisconsin include: Begonia, Geraniums, Impatiens, Marigold, Moss Rose, Pansy, Petunia, Salvia, Snapdragon, and Sweet Alyssum.

Some great summer flower and vegetable bulbs include Asparagus.

Begonia, Canna, Calla Lilly, Dahlia, Gladioli, Lily, Onion Sets, Potatoes, Rhubarb.

Some of the top perennial include Astilbe or false spirea, Coreopsis, Bleeding Hearts, Lupines, Day Lilies, Clematis, Yarrow, Lady's Mantle, Columbine, and Hollyhocks.

Some of the most successful vegetables to grow for southeastern Wisconsin weather include Blue Lake and Royal Burgundy Beans; Detroit Dark Red and Big Red Beets; Green Comet and Packman Broccoli; Nantes Carrots; Tasty Green (burp less) and Fanfare

Cukes; Simpson Elite Leaf Lettuce; Bell Boy Peppers; Aristocrat Summer Squash; Bodacious or Kandy Korn Sweet Corn; and Celebrity, Early Girl, or Big Boy Tomatoes.

Herbs add aroma, texture and depth to any garden, flower or veggie. Plus they're relatively easy to grow in containers, too. The top 10 herbs include Chives, Basil, Cilantro, Coriander, Dill, Marjoram, Oregano, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage and Thyme.

Container plants should be purchased based on your available light source. Consider purchasing some of these if you have a Northern exposure: Fuschia, camellia, hosta, various lilies, Easter cactus, philodendrons, prayer plants, sentry and bamboo palms and

caladiums. For eastern or western exposures, look for these: Christmas cactus, impatiens, gardenia, poinsettia, pansies, aspidistra, freesia, iris, Swedish ivy, calla lilly. For southern exposures try statice, dahlia, nasturtium, wallflower, cornflower, aster, gladioli, lavender, heather, roses and herbs.

Trees and Shrubs

To help form the natural setting for your yard, and to establish some permanency of property lines, or give your yard some privacy, use a variety of trees and shrubs.

Trees and shrubbery add a variety of color, texture and shape to your landscaping efforts. Use them wisely to enhance the style of your home.

Trees and shrubs are either coniferous (retain their green foliage year-round), or deciduous (lose their leaves once a year). Think before choosing, and use trees and shrubs to provide shade, and to fill in boring areas of landscape.

Great ornamental trees include "Flame" Amur Maple, "Snowdrift" Flowering Crab, and Apple Serviceberry. Shade trees to consider include Autumn Purple Ash and Greenspire Linden. Suggestions for shrubs include Arrowwood, Rose of Sharon, Grandiflora, Phododendron, and Rose Tree of China.

When planning, consider shape, pruning requirements, maximum growth heights, and individual preference based on your soil, drainage and sunlight conditions.

Selecting and purchasing high quality trees and shrubs can be tricky. Unless you're an extremely experienced gardener, or know someone who is, it's best to consult a qualified landscape planner before deciding on trees and shrubbery.

Become a Seed Tester

The University of Wisconsin-Kenosha Extension Office in Kenosha County has had a homeowners' garden program since 1992. The extension office sends out a choice of seeds to participants each Spring. Gardeners can pick up to four different seeds for a trial. The program yields the gardener a crop of flowers and/or vegetables, and provides data about what grows best in southeastern Wisconsin.

Gardeners must plant the seeds according to directions. They also need to fill out simple performance or evaluation sheets on how the seeds performed. Since 1992, over 300 gardeners have participated.

Dr. Holtgrave contributes specialized expertise to the evaluation of HIV prevention studies and will establish a research program in economic evaluation of HIV prevention and services.




And the knowledge that sex between a man and a woman will generally finish by the man mounting the women is odd to me as well.

Feeling Good

Condoms & Safer

Welcome to Feeling Good, a new. occasional column that focuses on sex, risk reduction, and emotions. Until I trained as a volunteer at the Milwaukee AIDS Project, I considered myself fairly knowledgeable about safer sex. I was wrong. I learned many things about safe sex that I should have known already. When the opportunity arose to do this column and educate others, I grabbed it.

Since condoms are one of the first things that come to mind when talking about safer sex. I felt it would be appropriate to start the discussion with

In technical terms, condoms are thin pieces of latex placed over the penis during sexual acts as a method of birth control and protection against sexually transmitted diseases.

There are three major categories of condoms: natural, novelty, and latex. Natural condoms, such as those made of lamb skin, contain pores and do not protect the user against the spread of

Novelty condoms, like glow in the dark ones, also do not protect against HIV transmission. However they can be interesting if used during foreplay. You could also wear a novelty condom over a

Latex condoms are the most effective in reducing the chances of transmitting HIV when used properly. Most latex condoms are one size fits all but there are condoms available for those with special size needs. They come in a variety of colors from clear to green to black. They come nonlubricated, pre-lubricated, and with a Kiss of Mint (intended for use during oral sex).

Condoms are strong enough to withstand what many people consider the unstoppable force of ejaculation. But they can be damaged if not stored properly. Keep them in a cool, dry place. A dresser drawer works fine, as does a closet (which puts a different twist on "coming out of the closet"). You can carry them for a few hours in a loose pocket, purse or gym bag. Extreme changes in temperature may damage the condoms, so they shouldn't be kept in glove compartments, or anywhere in a car, for long periods of time.

Don't carry them in your wallet or back pocket. The pressure and heat of being bent up and sat on can damage the condom. Room temperature is recommended for the condom to retains

its life span.

EXPIRATION DATES

Have you ever read the condom wrapper? Important information can be found on the package. Many are labeled clearly with expiration dates, while others might contain the date the condom was manufactured (labeled "Date Mfg"), A rule of thumb to follow: if it was made more than two years ago, toss it in the

Removing a condom from its wrapper isn't too difficult. Be careful you don't rip the condom when tearing open the wrapper. In other words, don't tear open the wrapper with your teeth. Inspect the condom before you put it on. Make sure it isn't: ripped or damaged in any way, gummy, brittle, or has any holes. Don't use it if it has already been used; even if it hasn't been ejaculated into. Condoms should never be used more than once.

Yes, there is a right way and a wrong way to put on a condom (see accompanying diagram). Dab some lube into the tip of the condom. Putting lube in the tip makes it easier to put on and can increase sensitivity during sex. Use only a drop. If you use too much, the condom may slip off.

Place the condom on the head of your penis, and pinch the tip to get the air out. Continue holding the tip as you unroll it onto the erect penis. As you unroll it, smooth out any air bubbles, as they can cause the condom to break. Lube the outside of the condom as well as your partner for comfort and to help ensure that the condom does not break during sex.

After ejaculating, hold the base of the condom as you withdraw your penis. After rolling it up and off the penis be careful not to spill any semen. Tie the used condom in a knot and throw it away. It is not recommended throwing it into the toilet, as they can cause plumbing and sewer problems.

USE WATER-BASED LUBES EXCLUSIVELY

Use only water-based lubricants with latex condoms, like K-Y jelly or other lubes (check the label to make sure they are water-based). Lubricants that contain oil, alcohol, or grease can dissolve condoms. These include petroleum jelly. shortening, hand lotion, mineral oil, baby oil, cooking oil, and food products that contain animal fats such as chocolate syrup, whipped cream or coconut oil.

Water-based lubricants containing the spermicide "Nonoxynol-9" are highly recommended. Read the labels to find out which lubricants contain it. Some people may be allergic to Nonoxynol-9. K-Y Jelly does not contain Nonoxynol-9 and is recommended for those who have an allergic reaction. Do not use waterbased lubricants with Nonoxynol-9 during oral sex. It tastes horrible.

Condoms can break during

THE A-B-C's OF PUTTING ON A CONDOM



Gently squeeze the tip of the condom with one hand, making sure there is no air in the tip. (This leaves room for the semen when you ejaculate (cum), and forces out any air bubbles, which are a major reason condoms break.)

While you continue to squeeze the tip of the condom, forcing out any air, begin to unroll the condom down the length of your penis





carefully unrolling it all the way down to the base of your penis to the bair

prolonged or rough intercourse, so have a spare close by and ready to open. Lubricatingperiodicallyduringintercourse helps to prevent the condom from breaking. If you are uncomfortable or unsure of how to use condoms, practice using them during masturbation.

You think you're surprised to find this out. We were astounded. I mean, we've known her for a decade. Who would have though that she'd cancel her subscription to Lesbian Times? Helene?! Imagine.

She and Sharon had been a mainstay of our carefully crafted "family." Oh, sure, we didn't get to see them all that often anymore, since we moved so far away. But they were two of the ones you could count on. They had been

together a dozen years. One breathed in, the other breathed out. They walked in complete lockstep. Before they broke up.

Okay, they hadn't been your garden variety dykes. If they could have brought themselves to say either of the words (They couldn't). "Lesbian" would have been the nomenclature of choice. And it would have been the more accurate of the descriptive choices if you were heavily into stereotypes. They didn't, as far as we knew, own a pair of Birkenstocks between them. A couple of finely tuned Mercedes, yes. But flannel shirts? Not even on their best blustery days. (Do they make flannel shirts in silk?)

They also didn't own a lot of other Lesbian friends. Sure, they had Gay men. Matched sets. Of only the highest quality. As you would find in any careful,

years-long collection.

They didn't go out much. Stayed in their expensive brownstone. Brought people in. Entertained extensively in a closed circle. Had an upstairs gym. And a downstairs office. They thing about them was, even if they weren't out, they

were in it together.

And the thing about their not being out is why we suspect that Helene took her name off the Lesbian list. You see, Sharon was Helene's first. And, lucky for her then, not so lucky now, it took. They were inseparable. For over a decade. Till built-up steam exploded past whatever solder cements the seams of long-term relationships.

And the thing about first Lesbian relationships, it seems to me, is that you don't have to think of them with labels. "Oh, no! We two aren't Lesbians! for heaven's sake. We're just two women



who happened to fall in love with each other." (Which, of course, just happens to be the textbook definition of Lesbian. But, hey, who's quibbling?) First timers almost always spend a percentage of their early energy telling themselves and anyone they trust who'll listen that if it could happen to them, "why, it could happen to anybody!"

The real Lesbian test is the second

relationship.

Because if the first one just happened. Then you have to choose the second. You have to go out of your way to say, "I want to do this again." Which plays hell with denial. You have to mean it and you have to seek it out. You have to deliberately go where there are other women who might voluntarily raise their hands to play Love Connection. You have to find the Lesbians, cover yourself with honey, and throw yourself into their path. On purpose.

Helene doesn't know where the

Lesbians are. And if she did, believing what she believes about them, she probably wouldn't want to go there. She isn't self-loathing. Just, unfortunately, ignorant of the kinds of progress we've made in the last dozen or so years about who we are, and how we define ourselves. About dignity, and pride, and self-esteem being concepts that have moved grandly passed yearning and aspiration for many of us, and into present-time reality. Unhappily, that ignorance is the price of isolation.

So Helene will date men for a while. Some time, if she's lucky, after she's dealt with the dissatisfaction, the longing for something missing and something missed that she refuses to call by its right name, she'll wander into the library, or a neighborhood rainbow bookstore on her own. (You can't just tell someone something like this. They have to get-in for themselves.) She'll find some of the positive new thinking will catch some of

the new attitude. And, with luck, she will, finally, come to terms with herself.

I hope so.

She'll be a lot happier. She can claim that she's not a Lesbian all she wants, she can date all the men in her entire neighborhood, but no matter what, nothing will change who she is. As far as I know, once you've paid your initiation fee to the Lesbian club, it doesn't give refunds.

And the lifetime membership offer never included the words "satisfaction quaranteed."







presence of Gays in parades. But however successful as politics, the Right's strategies necessarily trip over themselves as a cultural project. The more the Right has to talk about things Gay, the more the taboo collapses. Newt's yammering on about Gays, however mindless and wrongheaded, undoes him.

The taboo's collapse suggests that we should be focusing our energies on changing the culture in general — targeting the means by which values are created, transmitted, and nurtured — rather than focusing on politics narrowly construed. And we must not worry too much if we take a few hits on the political front, for we are winning the cultural wars.

Richard D. Mohr's latest book A More Perfect Union: Why Straight America Must Stand Up for Gay Rights, is just out in paperback.
