FBI Keeping Files on ACT UP. Gay Groups

New York, NY - The Center for Constitutional Rights (CCR), a civil rights watchdog group, has obtained files from the Federal Bureau of Investigation which indicate that the New York office of the FBI has been spying on the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP), Gay Men's Health Crisis and even Senior Action in a Gay Environment, a group of Gay and Lesbian elders.

CCR requested the FBI files through the Freedom of Information Act. The FBI released only 22 pages of its 199 page file on ACT UP, which consisted mostly of newspaper clippings of ACT UP protests. "The serious question is what else is in the documents?" ACT UP member Ann Northrop asked the New York Times. "Is there any attempt to 'destabilize' the group, as they used to

A spokesman for the FBI denied that agents had infiltrated ACT UP, yet cited the protection of "confidential sources" as a reason for withholding most of the file. He also said that ACT UP's militant protests against Presidents Reagan and Bush justified the FBI's interest in their activities. No reason was given for spying on the Gay elders' group SAGE, whose activities are primarily social.

"These are public groups that don't advocate violence or anything of that nature," said Michael Deutsch of CCR. "Some aren't even involved in political protest. One can only speculate on why the FBI is collecting documents on these groups when they say they weren't able to do the same thing for militias and violent right wing groups."

Congressman Apologizes for "Homos" Slur

Washington, DC — Rep. Randy Cunningham (R-CA), who, on the floor of the House of Representatives, equated lawmakers wanting to amend the Clean Water Act to "the same people who would put homos in the military," has apologized for his remarks. Cunningham's mea culpa came when he interrupted a press conference called by the Human Rights Campaign Fund to condemn his anti-Gay slur.

"To me, using that short term was not wrong," Cunningham said, "but if it is offensive, then I apologize, and I will not

use it again."

"His remark was nothing short of bigotry," said HRCF's Elizabeth Birch. "It was beneath the dignity of Congress.

Voters are looking for this Congress to address the business of the nation, not engage in gratuitous Gay bashing." A dozen members of Congress joined Birch

at the press conference.

After Cunningham's use of "homos" the House May 11, he was immediately challenged by Reps. Patricia Schroeder (D-CO) and Bernard Sanders, a Vermont Socialist. Openly Gay Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA), who was not on the floor at the time of the comment, later expressed his "contempt" at such "unwarranted and gratuitous slurs on decent human beings." Earlier this year, Rep. Dick Armey (R-TX) had to apologize after calling Frank "Barney

Sportscaster Lambasted for **Bigoted Comments**

Wilmington, DE — Women golfers and Gay and women's rights advocates joined together in condemning bigoted comments made by CBS golf analyst Ben Wright about women's anatomies and Lesbians in golf. Wright denied the words attributed to him by the Wilmington News Journal during the Ladies Professional Golf Association championship held there in mid-May.

Wright was quoted as saying that "Lesbians in the sport hurt women's golf" by turning off potential corporate sponsors. Lesbianism on the tour, Wright said, is "paraded. There's a defiance in them in the last decade." The increase in power golfers is making women's golf a "butch game" and giving it a "bad image." Wright also said, conversely, that "women are handicapped by having boobs. It's not easy for them to keep their left arm straight."

Feminist attorney Gloria Allred responded that "the only boobs women athletes have problems with are boobs like Mr. Wright who make uninformed, Golfer comments." bigoted Sheehan said: "It makes him look stupid...It's nobody's business what somebody does in their private time."

"This is just one more example of how homophobia in sports hurts all women athletes, whether Lesbian or heterosexual," said filmmaker Dee Mosbacher, who has produced a documentary on homophobia in sports. "Wright's comments clearly identify the connection between homophobia and sexism that women athletes face.

CBS officials met with Wright but them sent him back to the tournament.

D.C. Judge: Lesbian's Lover is "Next of Kin"

Washington, DC - For the first time anywhere in the US in a lawsuit involving a claim of wrongful death, a District of Columbia Superior Court

Judge has ruled that a Lesbian's longterm lover can be considered her "next of

The case involves a wrongful death suit brought against the District by the lover, children and estate of Victoria Lane, who was killed when a tree branch crashed into the windshield of her car in 1993. The right of her children to file suit was established, but an April 26 decision by Judge Frederick Dorsey recognized Laura Solomon's claim as well.

According to the Washington Blade, Solomon and Lane became lovers in 1979 and, in 1991, were the first same-gender couple to win second-parent adoption decrees for each others' children. The couple have two

daughters, Maya and Tessa.

Judge Dorsey ruled: "The relationship between Ms. Solomon and Ms. Lane contained all the attributes of a married couple but for the fact that it is a same sex union that cannot be recognized with a marriage license...This close relationship, coupled with the fact that they were both legally recognized parents of the same two children, leads the court to conclude that Ms. Solomon is the next of kin of Ms. Lane.'

Although the decision is not binding in courts beyond the District's jurisdiction, legal experts say it is significant nonetheless. It adds to a growing list of court rulings recognizing same-gender lovers as family: Minnesota's Supreme Court declared that Karen Thompson constituted Sharon Kowalski's "family of affinity" in a guardianship case in 1992, and a New York court in 1989 recognized a Gay man as "family" when he sued to maintain residence in a rent-controlled apartment leased for years by his lover.

Conference on Aging Opposes Anti-Gay

Washington, DC - In a follow-up to a story in the last issue of In Step about Lesbian rights pioneers Del Martin and Phyllis Lyon attending the White House Conference on Aging, conferees approved a resolution urging opposition to sexual orientation discrimination but rejected a second resolution focused more broadly on civil rights for LesBiGays.

The resolution adopted called on "civic, social, ethnic, cultural and political leaders" to oppose discrimination based on age, race and sexual orientation. Sexual orientation did not appear in the original draft of the resolution but was added during several sessions among delegates.

The second, unsuccessful resolution was drafted by Martin and Lyon, who collected the signatures of delegates to introduce it. It called on the conference to endorse the Employment

Non-Discrimination Act and the inclusion of sexual orientation in the federal Civil Rights and Fair Housing Acts. It also asked that all public documents from the Aging Conference include "Gays and Lesbians" and "domestic partners" among the "Special Populations" of underserved elderly and that federal funds disbursed by the Agency on Aging be distributed proportionately to Gays and Lesbians.

Martin was happy about the victory and philosophical about the defeat of the second resolution. She told the Washington Blade: "It did not pass, but we didn't expect that it would. We wanted it to be in the book so that it would be there for people to see. And that was a coup in itself."

Log Cabin to Christian Coalition: Don't Bash Gays

Washington, DC — When the Christian Coalition unveiled its 10-point social agenda called "Contract with the American Family" on May 17, conspicuously absent from the program was any anti-Gay initiative. This may be due, in part, to lobbying by the Log Cabin Republicans. Gay GOP groups.

"If the Christian Coalition cares about family values," Log Cabin Executive Director Rich Tafel said in advance of the Coalition's announcement, "we urge them to steer clear of anti- Gay rhetoric in their Contract with the American Family because divisive social issues will undermine the Republican majorities in Congress...Anti-Gay legislation will divide the party."

The Christian Coalition's agenda includes proposals to allow prayer in public places, to restrict abortion and pornography, to abolish federal arts programs, to overhaul welfare and to provide a \$500 tax credit for each child. The Coalition's Director, Ralph Reed, took pains to say the agenda was not an ultimatum or threat: "These are the 10 suggestions, not the 10 commandments."

But right wing lawmakers like Rep. Bob Dornan (R-CA) have plans for their own anti-Gay agenda. Dornan, a Presidential candidate, has introduced legislation to prohibit federal employees from forming Gay affinity groups and to require discharges of any soldiers who test positive for HIV.

Oklahoma City, OK — Lesbian Elyse Brumbough, an employee of the Department of Housing and Urban Development who survived the bomb attack in Oklahoma City, told the News-Telegraph: "I thought I was going to die. It was a horrible thing, a crime

against humanity. But it made me think about people. For three days there weren't any divisions here. People were not Gay or Black or Hispanic or poor or rich; they were just people and they all wanted to help. I live knowing that some people are going to hate me just because I am a dyke, and for a few days after the bombing we were all Americans, all people, all victims. We forgot about the politics and our divisions for awhile."

San Francisco, CA — The Sierra Club and the Xerox Corporation have joined the ranks of employers who offer health insurance benefits to the unmarried domestic partners — both Gay and straight — of their workers. "We recognize that families have changed, and our benefits are becoming more flexible as we move toward more choices for all Xerox people, whatever their family circumstances," said a Xerox spokesman.

Lawrence, KS — The City Commission of Lawrence voted 3-2 to add sexual orientation to its municipal human relations ordinance, which outlaws discrimination in housing, jobs and public accommodations. A similar ordinance in Wichita was passed and repealed in the 1970's. The 2 year pro-Gay effort was led by a coalition called Simply Equal, which referred to a character from The Wizard of Oz in its press release declaring victory. The headline read: "Dorothy, You Can Come Home Now!"

Lynchburg, VA — Seeking to shore up his support among Christian conservatives, Republican Presidential candidate Sen. Phil Gramm told an audience at Jerry Falwell's Liberty University in May that America is suffering from a "moral crisis." He pledged to "overturn Bill Clinton's destructive and unworkable policy on Gays in the military."

San Jose, CA — Police are investigating a death threat against Lesbian journalist Deb Price which was left on the answering machine of San Jose's Sisterspirit Bookstore where she is scheduled to make an appearance. The caller said: "I just want to say, if Deb Price appears at your bookstore on June 24th, I'll personally come in and shoot her, I think fags are wrong...I'll shoot her, got that?"

New York, NY — Terrence McNally's new comedy/drama Love! Valor! Compassion! — about eight Gay men gathering at a country house — has been nominated for a Tony Award as Best Play. Joe Mantello has been nominated as Best Director, and three actors, Stephen Bogardus, John Glover and Anthony Heald have been nominated for Tonys in the Featured Actor category. The awards will be presented in a televised ceremony June 4. Meanwhile, Party, a new David Dillon comedy about another group of Gay men, has opened to excellent reviews, with the New York

Times critic calling it "raucously funny."

Seattle, WA — William Lambert, a former executive with Boeing, has left \$450,000 to the Pride Foundation of Seattle in memory of his son, Gray, who died of AIDS in 1991. Believed to be the largest bequest ever to any Gay charity, the money will go toward support of Lambert House, a center for Gay and Lesbian youth named in honor of Gray Lambert.

New York, NY — A former Assistant Stage Director with the Metropolitan Opera has filed suit against the august institution claiming the Met discriminated against her because she is a straight woman. Martha Ellen Brennan, 48, claims her supervisor at the Met showed bias in work assignments and created a hostile workplace for her "because she was over 40 and not homosexual or bisexual and was a woman." Brennan says she was fired after objecting to pictures of naked men displayed in her workplace.

Indianapolis, IN — Gay and civil rights groups are calling for the ouster of Ruth Benavente, chair of Indiana's Civil Rights Commission, after she declared that homosexuals are not entitled to legal protection against discrimination. "I will speak my conscience according to the rightly divined word of God. I would rather be biblically correct than politically correct," said the defiant Benavente, who is refusing to step down.

New York, NY — Richard Morad, 26, has been sentenced to 19 to 38 years in prison for a series of armed robberies of Gay men in New York City. Morad, a bodybuilder who is Gay himself, preyed on Gay men in the East Village, luring them with sex and then robbing them at knife-point. Gay crime-watch groups had circulated fliers calling him "muscular, charming and wanted."

Tampa, FL — The Hillsborough County Commissioners voted 4-3 on May 17 to repeal the sexual orientation clause of the county's human rights ordinance which prohibited discrimination in housing, public accommodations and county contracts. The action was expected after two conservatives were elected to the commission last fall. The vote followed hours of emotional debate at a public hearing attended by more than 200 people.

Long Beach, CA — Dusty Pruitt, one of the highest ranking Army officers to win her initial court battles against the Pentagon for denying her a promotion and giving her an involuntary discharge, has agreed to a settlement with the Justice Department. Pruitt will be allowed to retire at the rank of Major and be entitled to full retirement and medical benefits when she turns 60. "It's a wonderful settlement," said Pruitt, now a minister with the Metropolitan Community Church.

Joint Finance Cte. Restores Funds for ASO's

Madison — In a vote touted as a "huge victory" for AIDS service organizations around the state, the legislature's Joint Finance Committee voted unanimously May 17 to increase the AIDS Life Care Services grant by \$223,000 over the next two years. This constitutes a 7% increase over the current budget and brings the total grant

allocations to \$1,761,000 for each of the next two years.

The Life Care Services grant is a statewide grant that funds the social workers and case managers at all AIDS service organizations in Wisconsin. The Finance Committee's action restored earlier proposed reductions in the grant. Doug Nelson of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin told In Step the increase was necessary to keep up with the expected rise in AIDS cases in the next two years. And he was pleased with the show of bipartisan support.

"In a political climate characterized by the slashing of all sorts of social programs, we were heartened to see such an overwhelming expression of support for providing continued care for people with HIV disease."

In other action, following dramatic lobbying by disabled groups (who ringed the Capitol in their wheel chairs), the Joint Finance Committee restored funding for Supplemental Security Income as well as the Medicaid program which provides for home care attendants. Both of these programs are essential to people with disabilities, including people with HIV/AIDS.

On a more ominous note, the Committee voted to eliminate the mandate that counties provide general relief, including medical assistance, to the indigent. The state instead will provide block grants for the counties to

use as they see fit.

Nelson reports that 25% of the clients at the Milwaukee AIDS Project depend on Milwaukee County's health care plan, which will be dramatically impacted by the legislature's action. The County, which has decided to close Doyne Hospital, the medical facility of last resort for the poor, needs to devise a plan to provide care to indigents and to Nelson, who expects to be involved in consultations.

Dane County Sups. Pocan, McCormick to Attend White House Meeting

Madison — Dane County Supervisors Mark Pocan and Scott McCormick will be among 75 Gay and Lesbian elected leaders to attend a meeting with high level White House officials on June 13. The historic event was coordinated by San Francisco Supervisor Susan Leal and the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, a Washington-based group which gives financial support and technical assistance to openly Gay candidates.

"I'm definitely looking forward to it," Pocan told In Step. "It shows that this administration is taking steps to listen to our community. I'll be interested to see what we put together as an agenda." This will be done at a strategy session the Gay and Lesbian officials will hold before the White House meeting.

McCormick said he too was "very excited at this great opportunity." He plans to take a "crash course" so he knows all the relevant Gay and Lesbian issues "inside out." Both he and Pocan plan to meet with community leaders in Dane County to get input into what are the most critical issues to raise.

Pocan and McCormick also plan to visit Wisconsin Sens. Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold as well as Rep. Scott Klug during a day of Congressional lobbying that will follow the White House meeting.



also serves as Baldwin's aide, will be unable to make the White House meeting because June 13 is likely to be the first day of floor debate in the State Assembly on Gov. Tommy Thompson's proposed budget. Alderwoman Judy Olson is also unable to attend.

Rodney Scheel House Heads for August 1 Opening

Madison — Construction on the Rodney Scheel House for People with AIDS is ahead of schedule, and the Board of Directors of the Scheel House Foundation thinks that residents may be admitted even prior to the official August 1 opening date. Applications will soon be accepted for individuals wanting to live in the 22-unit complex of apartment homes.

"These studio, 1- and 2-bedroom units will provide housing for persons with AIDS and their families," according to David Clarenbach, Acting Director of the Madison AIDS Support Network. "With rents based on a sliding scale, this project will allow many who are disabled with HIV to stay independent."

The Rodney Scheel House is the first AIDS-specific project in south-central Wisconsin funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. In

Scarver Gets 1,000+ Years For Dahmer, Anderson Murders

Portage — On May 15, Christopher Scarver was convicted of two counts of first-degree intentional homicide for the bludgeoning deaths of serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer and wife- killer Jesse Anderson at the Columbia Correctional Institution last November.

Scarver was convicted after changing his plea from guilty by reason of mental defect or disease to no contest. Judge Richard Rehm sentenced Scarver, who had already been serving time for a previous murder in Milwaukee when the Dahmer-Anderson slayings occurred, to two consecutive life sentences plus 30 years.

Scarver, who was given a parole date hundreds of years in the future, is not likely to ever be released. State corrections officials have transferred Scarver to a federal prison in Missouri.

Appeals Court Upholds Cincinnati's Anti-Gay Measure

"Serious Setback for Civil Rights"

Cincinnati, OH — In a decision that surprised and angered advocates of civil rights for Gays and Lesbians, the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled on May 12 that an anti-Gay referendum approved by 62% of Cincinnati voters in 1993 is constitutional.

The court ruled 3-0 against a previous ruling by a federal judge who had found that Cincinnati's Issue 3 violated constitutional guarantees of free speech, due process and equal protection of the laws. Judge Arthur Speigel had said that Issue 3 infringed upon the fundamental rights of Gay people to fully participate in the political process.

Issue 3 repeals the part of Cincinnati's human rights ordinance which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation and forbids the City and any of its agencies or commissions from adopting such laws or establishing "minority or protected status" based on sexual orientation at any time in the future.

(In March, Cincinnati's Common Council voted to delete sexual orientation from the city ordinance. An

MASN Marks 10 Years with Open House, Unity Gathering in June

Madison — The Madison AIDS Support Network is commemorating ten years of AIDS outreach, education and direct services with two events in June, an Open House and a Unity Gathering for MASN clients and the partners, friends and family members of those who have been lost to AIDS.

The Open House will be held on Monday, June 5 from 5:30-7:30pm at MASN's new offices in the Gateway Center at 600 Williamson Street. The Unity Gathering is set for Friday, June 9 from 5:30- 8pm at MASN. The overall theme, according to Acting Executive Director David Clarenbach, is unity.

"As MASN completes its first decade of service, we face the challenge of the AIDS epidemic with renewed vigor, commitment and unity," Clarenbach said. "Just as the epidemic has spread, infecting and affecting new communities, MASN has had to grow in its programming and services to meet the increasing needs."

The MASN was founded in 1985 by community members who realized the urgent need for a local support and resource network for people living with HIV disease. 

Militias & Anti-Gay Rhetoric

The intense media attention focused on the April 19 federal building bombing in Oklahoma City has triggered a public debate on citizen militias and on the consequences of growing Right Wing resentment toward government. In the wake of the tragedy, a terrified public appears to be struggling to understand the threat posed by these militant groups.

However, trying to understand the militias and the danger they pose by studying the bombing and the militias'

self-professed hatred of government is like trying to understand the entire Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and transgender community on the basis of one night at a Gay bar. The citizen militia movement is a complex phenomenon reflective of fast-growing reactionary sentiment with consequences for all of us.

The citizen militia movement is actually one faction within a broader Right Wing backlash against democratic values. The militias are situated to the right of more mainstream rightists such as Pat Buchanan, and are closely tied to white supremacist movements like the Posse Comitatus, the Ku Klux Klan, Christian Patriots, and Christian Identity. When militiamen talk about their "antigovernment" agenda, we should hear — "anti-Gay, anti-Semitic, anti-woman, anti-democratic, and anti-racial justice" agenda.

The militias' proposed alternative to "big bad government" is a return to a society ruled by an unamended Constitution — constructed to protect the rights of white property owners, and intended to exclude women and people of color from participation in the franchise.

Former Center for Democratic Renewal Research Director Leonard Zeskind writes, "It has the smell of yesteryear — states' rights and armed vigilante gangs — but the militias are now the most popular vehicle to the right of Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition. Like the Posse Comitatus 15 years ago, the body work is painted with religion, patriotism, and the US Constitution, but the motor is anti-Semitism and racism, and the drivers are white supremacists." [The Dignity Report, newsletter of the Coalition for Human Dignity.]

The militia movement is powered by a growing fear of white male disprivilege. In an economy in which temporary employment agencies have become our largest private employers, and American workers standard of living has dropped to pre-1953 levels (Jobs with Justice), rightists such as the militiamen are growing increasingly nostalgic for a time when white male entitlements went

largely unchallenged.

In this respect, the militiamen are part of a growing popular phenomena. Perhaps this is the most important aspect of the militia movement that is being overlooked by the media. In spite of the more bizarre aspects of the racial and religious agendas of some of their white supremacist members, militiamen share many things in common with more mainstream elements of the Right Wing.

The militiamen contend that government is failing their members — white men — because of the influence of the civil rights lobby ("racial preferences" and "special rights"), Jews ("international bankers"), feminists ("breakdown of the family and gender roles"), and Gays (you know what they say about us). Some of this language and these ideas are

mirrored in the rhetoric of mainstream Right Wing groups, such as the Christian Coalition, and some of the new Republican members of Congress, like Rep. Helen Chenoweth of Idaho. The militiamen, like mainstream rightists, believe that education is in ruins because of political correctness and secular humanism; they oppose government programs for the poor; denounce LesBiGay people; and often scapegoat minorities as immoral and unproductive. They say we are all destroying God, family and country and use this to justify super authoritarian measures to control or eliminate us.

Samuel Sherwood of the United States Militia Association, based in Blackfoot, Idaho, says of President Bill Clinton, "[he] is determined to seize your guns, steal your food, take your children away. In his term, he will have killed more babies than Hitler, put more homosexuals in government than Sodom and Gomorrah, had the schools teach your children it is right and forced you to

accept it."

In Michigan, the head of the effort to

place an anti-Gay initiative on last year's state ballot used the rhetoric of the militia movement as he advanced the anti-Gay measure. In an interview two years ago with **Metro Times**, a Michigan weekly newspaper, George Matousek described the importance of his anti-Gay initiative in battling the threat of the New World Order.

"Where sodomy is acceptable, the nation declines. Homosexuals are a tool to weaken America. I love this country and I want it to remain strong... The homosexual movement will destroy the military. Soon half of the troops will be gone. They don't want to serve beside queers. And the half that's left will be useless — made up of women and homos, people who can't fight their way out of a paper bag. When this happens, we'll be doomed. We'll be attacked, or called into a war that our military can't handle. Clinton, or whoever's in office, will turn all our troops over to the United Nations. And this country won't exist anymore."

Matousek's plan? "Step one, stop

the homos."

Only the US Constitution and armed citizens will prevent such a takeover, according to Matousek. Which is why he advocates all citizens owning guns.

Matousek expressed frustration at the stagnating economy and how that inspired his actions. "When I grew up... I could get a job with any factory I wanted. I could earn money. Now, with the international bankers in control, there's so much socialist thinking. Work, work — but never really own anything, because of taxes." The solution is "armed revolution... I believe that we're headed for this someday."

This is what the militias are, and what they represent. As we mourn together over the tragedy in Oklahoma City, we must not allow our grief to blind us to the continuing threat of the militias and the Right Wing movement to which

they belong.

We need to get down to business and educate ourselves about the wide array of Right Wing groups that threaten our rights and security, and understand the social and economic factors that lead to their development. We must further understand that our fates as Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and transgender people are inextricably tied to other groups under Right Wing attack. It's time to reach out, broaden our agenda, and increase our capacities for compassion and human connection. We must overcome fear, come out and organize, organize, organize,

A Jew Again

Seventy-two years ago, when I was born to Jewish parents in New York City, I began a religious journey that has not ended to this day. Politics, curiously enough, has been a fuel in this journey, but not the kind of politics that propels the Reverends Jerry Falwell or Pat Robertson.

As an act of faith and evolving spirituality, I joined the Catholic Church more than 15 years ago. In 1990, the growing assault on Gays by religious and secular conservatives prompted me to come out publicly as a Gay man — an act which has brought me immense spiritual healing. As radical right-wing religious groups intensified their attacks on anyone who does not fit their image of a Christian America — including homosexuals and Jews — I took still another step in my journey of self-discovery by reclaiming my birthright as a Jew.

When I was a boy, I went to Hebrew School and celebrated my Bar Mitzvah according to tradition. However, the only connection I had with the religion after that was when I joined with my family in the various Jewish holidays. Although I never practiced formal Judaism, I always glorified in being a Jew, at least a secular Jew, and in the rich heritage of my parents and millennia past.

Yet, on Easter Saturday of 1978, I was baptized in New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral and happily joined the Roman Catholic Church. Always searching for an identity, I believed then I had finally found my spiritual home in Jesus Christ. Although I would always remain a Jew, I could now participate in a religion that seemed to me to be the logical continuation of spiritual Judaism.

However, becoming a practicing Catholic never quite filled the emptiness I felt, the lack of any real cohesion in my life. It soon began to be like the other avenues I had traveled in search of that elusive self-knowledge that might fill the void and bring me lasting contentment. It was only after 77 years of searching that I began to see clearly and count how many roads I had walked, how many masks I had worn, how many roles I had played — all in order to avoid detection as a Gay man. Coming out in defiance of those who might reject me led me to accept the most central core of my being — that I was a homosexual.

Despite the overdue stability it

offered, my very public self-disclosure as a Gay man in the summer of 1990 only started me moving again. I "came out" simultaneously in the conservative National Review and the Gay Advocate. My autobiography, Coming Out Conservative, was published. I became an active participant in the affairs of the Gay community - writing columns and essays publications, joining in Act Up and Queer Nation demonstrations, speaking before whatever group would invite me, working with the Log Cabin organization, trying to serve as a peer model for young Lesbians and Gay men. I wanted to utilize my conservative credentials to the utmost to counter the homophobia that was the latest currency of American right-wingers, for whom homosexuals

I found myself surrounded by young people, would-be children and grandchildren, and became a virtual father-figure in the Gay community. My life seemed to have turned around, enriched and full. I was at peace with myself and with God in all His many manifestations. I no longer felt the urgency to attend the Catholic Church or to formally practice any religion. I was, I believed, finally content and at peace.

had replaced communists as the number

one enemy.

Then, one evening, I saw the film Schindler's List. It jolted me awake. I realized then what was missing — the acceptance of the other half of my equation. I am a Gay man. I am also a Jew. I saw my family, my forbearers, my people, myself, in too many frames of the film, and I finally saw the totality of me

I knew then that I needed to be counted once more, by God and by my community, as a Jew. The film also made me achingly aware once more of the terrible parallels through the centuries of how those eager to prove their might resort to bigotry, fear, and hatred: against Jews, against homosexuals, against any who are different and don't fit in to their vision of paradise on earth.

Because I have always rejected hatred and bigotry, five years ago I came out to fight homophobia. Last year on May 19th, I came out again. This time it was not in any national publications. This time I stood proudly and awestruck before Bet Mishpachah, the Gay and Lesbian synagogue in Washington, DC, to reclaim my birthright and be publicly counted once again as a Jew. My sister and her husband were there, and I wore my father's prayer shawl. I believed the circle had finally been closed.

But not completely. In February of this year, I circulated a column in which I stated that I could no longer call myself a conservative, a Republican, or a Christian because of the homophobia and latent anti-semitism emanating from many who use those labels. I received a letter from Rabbi Bob Saks of Bet

Mishpachah expressing the concern of some members of the congregation by my "Christian" declaration, especially after I had publicly reclaimed my Jewishness before them some eight months before. "It's hard to come out publicly as a Jew, just like it's hard coming out as Gay," wrote the Rabbi. "It's one thing to say 'I'm Jewish' in the synagogue, another to say it in public... your resistance to the label in public upsets people who had hoped you were more 'at home' as a Jew than perhaps you are."

The Rabbi's point was well taken. I realized that coming out must be the self-acceptance and articulation of one's totality. I also now realize that hatred in all its many guises, and those who spread it, are equally my enemy both as a Gay man and as a Jew. Rabbi Saks' gentle chastising had finally helped to complete the circle.

Many years ago, I listened to Eleanor Roosevelt stress the importance of resisting all and any form of hatred, bigotry, and tyranny in equal measures, from wherever it emanates, be it communist, fascist, democrat, republican, conservative, liberal, secular or sectarian. It is in these footsteps that I hope to travel — and in memory of my countless martyred Jewish forbearers.



Washington, DC — The 17th National Lesbian and Gay Health Conference, which includes the 13th annual AIDS/HIV Forum, is scheduled to take place at the Minneapolis Hyatt

Regency Hotel June 17-21.

The conference, sponsored by the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association and the George Washington University Medical Center, draws several thousand scientists, health care professionals and community activists working in various areas of Gay and Lesbian health.

On June 18, Patricia Fleming, National AIDS Policy Coordinator, will deliver the keynote address, "Facing the Challenges" of the AIDS epidemic. Fleming's speech will be followed by an AIDS/HIV Research/Medical Update.

Special symposia will focus on four key topics: "Transgender Health," "Why Do Gay Men Continue to Become Infected with HIV?" "Addiction Issues in the Lesbian and Gay Communities" and "Building a National Lesbian and Gay

Health Agenda.'

Day-long intensives will explore the areas of: Bisexuality, Spirituality, Youth, People of Color, Public Funding, Gay and Lesbian Aging, Violence, Sexual Health of Gay/Bi Men, and the CDC AIDS/HIV Information Network. These are in addition to plenary sessions and dozens of workshops dealing with every conceivable health issue confronted by Gavs and Lesbians.

Milwaukee attorney Steven Brondino will be a presenter at the intensive on Gay and Lesbian Aging, and at least six other Wisconsinites, mostly affiliated with universities, will present research findings or share other relevant

knowledge.

Government Scientists Develop Latex Alternative

Washington, DC - Scientists with the Department of Agriculture have developed a substance that can be used as an alternative to natural rubber latex.

This is good news for the estimated 17 million Americans who are allergic to latex and, as a result, cannot don most condoms, protective medical gloves or other latex products. Allergic reactions in this vulnerable population can range from mild itching to potentially deadly anaphylactic shock.

The new latex-substitute is made from a desert plant called quayule. Guayule provides the elasticity and strength so prized in latex, without causing any allergic reaction in people who are latex-sensitive.

Agriculture Department scientists say they have designed a processing method to draw the rubber particles from guayule to create the latex substitute. But they are seeking entrepreneurs or companies interested in mass-producing the new latex-like compound. It could be several years before it is mass-produced and used to create condoms, gloves and other such items.

New Drug for Breast Cancer Looks Hopeful

Washington, DC — The American Chemical Society reports that progress is being made in the development of a drug like tamoxifen that fights breast cancer. but that has few of tamoxifen's side effects. The worst side effect of tamoxifen is the increased chance of

developing uterine cancer. Dr. Marcus Brewster, with the Pharmos Corporation, reported at the American Chemical Society's conference in April that a water-soluble derivative of tamoxifen, tamoxifen methiodide, was showing good results in tests conducted on mice. Ninety percent of those given the new drug showed a significant reduction in the size of tumors compared to those given tamoxifen or those left untreated. Many more animal tests must be conducted before drug trials on humans can begin.

Lesbians are believed to be more susceptible to breast cancer than heterosexual women because of certain risk factors identified with the disease. Lesbians see doctors and undergo cancer screening tests less often than most straight women. Many either do not give birth at all or delay giving birth. In addition, Lesbians are more likely to be overweight, and to smoke and consume greater amounts of alcohol that straight

"In the Life" Cameras Zoom in on Milwaukee

June Episode to Feature Segment on Brewtown Gays

By Jamakaya Thanks to "remarkable support" from the management and production team at Milwaukee's PBS affiliate, Channel 10, producer John Catania recently flew back to New York with video footage about Gay life in Milwaukee that will be featured in a segment of the June episode of the Gay/Lesbian newsmagazine program In the Life.

The June program will focus on Gays and Lesbians in their communities, especially those communities outside the major cities which dominate the coasts. Coverage of Milwaukee Gays and Lesbians is likely to take up only about a 6 to 7-minute segment of the show, but Catania promises to use additional

footage for stories next fall.

In Milwaukee, during the week of May 15-19, Catania shot footage at Lesbian softball games and interviewed a number of people, including the manager of AfterWords Gay/Lesbian Bookstore, a Lesbian professor at Cardinal Stritch College, students involved in Gay groups at UW-Milwaukee and Carroll College, a leader of the Lesbian Alliance and a Gay couple working with the Skylight Theater who "have found it easier to have a relationship in Milwaukee" than in their previous homes in New York and San Francisco.

Tune in to the finished product on Thursday, June 22 at midnight on Channel 10 in Milwaukee and on Friday, June 30 at 11pm on Wisconsin Public TV (Warner Cable Channel 21 in

Milwaukee).

Catania shot additional segments for the June In the Life in Montana, Connecticut and Missouri. But Milwaukee may have had an advantage over other possible filming sites because Catania is a hometown boy.

HOMETOWN BOY

"I was born in Milwaukee and grew up in New Berlin," the 34- year-old Catania told In Step. "I graduated from Carroll College in 1982 and worked in local theater groups - First Stage and the Skylight. I moved to New York in

Two years ago, Catania began volunteering on In the Life, which was a half-hour program struggling to find a comfortable format. Now, at the end of the show's third season with quarterly one-hour programs in the streamlined newsmagazine format, Catania plays a major production role on In the Life. And he's clearly excited about the growth of the program.

"I hope next year we can expand to five or six episodes," Catania said with enthusiasm, "We're now aired on more than 70 PBS stations across the country - we've been breaking into the South more - and we estimate that we have one to one-and-a-half million viewers for each show. That makes us the largest Gay/Lesbian media entity of any kind in the US, including magazines like Out

and The Advocate."

Fundraising is a constant challenge though. Each episode costs about \$100,000 to produce. PBS gives no funding to the show. It's dependent on a small number of wealthy contributors and a membership network of about 7,000 individuals who donate modest sums. But the show's critical success and growing audience is beginning to attract corporate underwriters.

"We're very grateful for Channel 10's support and technical assistance in the past week," Catania said. "It's done

something no other station has done nationwide by providing support that amounts to substantial in-kind services." WMVS assigned several production staff members to assist Catania and allowed In the Life use of camera equipment and editing facilities.

"Coming Out Under Fire" and "Complaints of a Dutiful Daughter"

The award-winning documentaries Coming Out Under Fire and Complaints of a Dutiful Daughter, along with an episode of In the Life which features a segment on Gay life in Milwaukee, are among a number of Gay Lesbian-related programs to be aired by Wisconsin's public broadcasting stations during June, Gay and Lesbian Pride



Month. Here's a run-down.

Coming Out Under Fire is an hour-long documentary about Gay men and Lesbians who served in the American armed forces during World War II. Based on the book by Alan Berube, the film includes interviews with nine service members who share their experiences of military life 50 years ago. These compelling testimonies are mixed with vintage photos and rare archival footage of medical exams, psychiatric sessions, sex education lectures and "drag" show entertainment for the troops.

In the process, producer/director Arthur Dong uncovers the history of the military's anti-Gay policy that first labeled homosexuals as mentally ill and sought their expulsion as "undesirable." This offers important perspective on the continuing debate about Gays in the

armed forces.

Coming Out Under Fire airs
Wednesday, June 21 at 10pm on
Wisconsin Public Television, which
broadcasts in most areas outside
Milwaukee. Milwaukee's WMVS-TV
Channel 10 will not air Coming Out in
June, but Milwaukeeans with Warner
Cable can catch it on Channel 21 on
June 21 at 10pm.

Another treat for LesBiGay movie buffs is the broadcast of the Oscar-nominated Complaints of a Dutiful Daughter on PBS's P.O.V. series. Complaints will be aired on Wisconsin Public TV (and Milwaukee's cable channel 21) on Tuesday, June 6 at 10pm. It will be repeated at 10pm Monday, June 12. WMVS will run it at 10pm Tuesday, June 13.

Complaints of a Dutiful Daughter by Lesbian filmmaker Deborah Hoffmann traces the advance of Alzheimer's disease in Hoffmann's 78-year-old mother, Doris. Sometimes comical,

sometimes sad and always witty, Hoffmann shows how she grows to understand and adjust to her mother's often strange behavior. The documentary becomes a meditation on the bonds of love and the loss of shared memories.

Mike stands as a remarkable example of an individual having the courage to bring the message of equality.



Ross Walker and Erv Uecker are two very special people. They have been together for over 38 years with much of that time spent volunteering to help others.


Ross and Erv moved to Milwaukee in 1983, in 1985 they got involved with the **Brady Street (BESTD)** clinic. It was love at first sight.

A Perfect Gem of a Book

A Gay Male's Rites of Passage — Not!

Growing Up Gay: From Left Out to Coming Out by Funny Gay Males (Jaffe Cohen, Danny McWilliams, & Bob Smith) Hyperion Pb \$9.95

Growing Up Gay: From Left Out to Coming Out is a perfect little gem of a book, a retelling of the "wonder years" in fabulous and flattering shades of pink and lavender. Jaffe Cohen, Danny McWilliams, and Bob Smith who compose the comedy team of Funny Gay Males, have crafted a unique and long overdue spin with growing up Gay in suburban, middle-America.

Beginning with the "debunking" of several so-called causes of homosexuality and taking us all through the myriad of terrors that high school

often held for us Gay kids, Growing Up Gay is an uncanny portrait of being a stranger in a straight land. Cohen, McWilliams and Smith seem to be seeking to break down the walls of childhood isolation that so many young Gay men experienced by examining and rejoicing in shared experiences. Yet for all of the glibness and a decidedly lighthearted approach, Growing Up Gay possesses a wealth of truth and honesty.

For those thirtysomething Gay men who grew up with Lost in Space, Bewitched and commercials featuring the hunky Mr. Clean, the Jolly Green Giant, and Madge the Manicurist for Palmolive Dishwashing Liquid, Growing Up Gay is a perfect memory book. It is comforting, if not entirely reassuring to find out that there are others out there... somewhere... who also recited Paul Lynde's punchlines from Hollywood Squares out on the playground, developed a crush on the ultra-sensitive John Boy Walton, or quite simply wanted to be "Where the Boys Are."


Along the way, Cohen, McWilliams and Smith managed to enlighten and to entertain, often with a wry eye on popular culture. Nothing is left sacred as these Funny Gay Males turn Brothers Grimm and Mother Goose rhymes Gay or altering a classic Dr. Seuss story from "To Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street" to "Think That I Saw Him on Christopher Street." In "Long Day's Journey Into Silent Night," the authors

have penned a fabulous musical extravaganza as a tribute to the "unique sophistication and savvy of the kiddieshow queen." In a later section, the Funny Gay Males target Ripley's Believe It or Not with a collection so strange, Mr. Ripley is sure to be spinning in his grave.

No, Growing Up Gay is not a serious exploration of the Gay male's rites of passage. Yet lurking closely beneath the humorous surface of Growing Up Gay are some serious messages. As Gay kids, we were different. Okay, other neighborhood kids preferred Tonka Trucks™ while we secretly coveted our sister's EZ Bake Oven™, but there were others, just like us out there. Also, in a more serious vein are the areas of coming out and religion.

Growing Up Gay is perhaps not a great book. The Funny Gay Males are able to offer readers no real answers to the cosmic questions of Gay life. Instead, Cohen, McWilliams and Smith have managed to bring a real sense of humor and perspective to the process of growing up Gay in a straight land. This remains a very difficult process, made a bit easier, with Growing Up Gay. Recommended.

A Look Back

Milwaukee — How did the Milwaukee Classic begin? It started on a cold night in February, 1978. Three guys were having a drink and thinking Spring. What else do you do in Milwaukee on a snowy February evening? Someone suggested, "Why don't we have a softball tournament over the Memorial Day weekend?" The three asked the late Wayne Bernhagen, owner of the Wreck Room, if he would sponsor such an event. Wayne, always ready to promote Milwaukee and the Gay community, said, "Go for it."

Next question: How are we ever going to get anyone to come to Milwaukee in May? After going through Bob Damron's Gay Guide, over 50 invitations were sent out all over the country. The break through came from New York. Richie Diaz said he would have his Eagles team participate. Then came word from Toronto that they would join in. The Classic became international its first year. What a start for the Wreck Room Classic!

The Eagles won the first Wreck Room Classic after a tough struggle with a woman's team from LaCrosse, WI. In 1979, the Gay Softball World Series

came to Milwaukee, so we passed on the Classic that year. In 1980, 11 out-of-town teams joined 8 Milwaukee entries, as M&M of Milwaukee took the crown.

West coast teams from Los Angeles and San Francisco joined in 1981, as the Classic grew to 22 teams. Milwaukee's Wreck Room Chaps defeated Nu-Town Saloon of Los Angeles to take the championship. The Classic again had 22 teams participating in 1982, as the Pendulum Pirates of San Francisco warmed up for their eventual World Series victory to take the Classic.

Series victory to take the Classic.
In 1983, 23 teams participated as the Wreck Room Chaps returned the Cup to Milwaukee in a thrilling 9 inning victory over Sidetracks of Chicago. The final Wreck Room Classic brought 26 teams to Milwaukee in 1984, and Griffs of Los Angeles took the trophy back to the west coast.

MILWAUKEE HAS HOSTED 2 GAY WORLD SERIES

In 1985, Milwaukee Captured the Spirit and hosted another World Series, again putting the Milwaukee Classic on hold that year. For health reasons, Wayne Bernhagen asked the Saturday Softball Beer League (SSBL) to take over the sponsorship of the Classic in 1986. The League accepts and 20 teams participate. That year Cloud 9 Americans of the Twin Cities avenge an earlier loss to Redoubt of Chicago to win the final 2 games, and the Classic. The Americans repeat in 1987, and Club 1270 of Boston became the first Recreational Division champion, when a new division is added.

Chicago and New York come through in 1988 as Sidetracks captured the Competitive and Ty's/Chelsea Transfer took the Recreational. The 10th Annual Classic in 1989 brought 33 teams to Milwaukee, as the womyn join in. Burkhardt's of the 1989 World Series hosted Atlanta to take the Competitive cup. Venture Inn of Philadelphia captured the Recreational. Club 1270 of Boston won the Women's.

In 1990, the Classic was "bad." Blake's Bad Boys of Atlanta won the Recreational; and the M&M Bad Girls of Milwaukee took the Women's Cup. Not So Bad were the Saloon Americans of the Twin Cities, as they captured the Competitive Division. In 1991, the Classic's first no-hitter happened, as Ray led Spike's Black Sox of NY to the Competitive championship. The Brass Rail Bandits of the Twin Cities edged the Wreck Room Spurs of Milwaukee for the Recreational crown.

The largest Milwaukee Classic ever was in 1992 — 46 teams participated. It was also the coldest, as the wind chill temperature dropped into the teens. Because of the record number of teams participating, the tournament was moved to Wick Field. Chicago Sidetracks and Twin Cities Brass Rail Bandits were the

champions.

THE CLASSIC IS ONCE AGAIN, AN ANNUAL TOURNEY

In 1993, the SSBL agreed to alternate the Memorial Day Tournament with the City of Chicago, which is where it was held. That first year (1993), Chicago was inundated with rains the field maintenance was lousy. The Classic was to be alternated back and forth between the two cities on an annual basis.

Twenty-eight teams participated in the 1994 Milwaukee Classic. The

Cincinnati Cats, Chicago's Granville Station and Your Place of Milwaukee were the winners. Chicago held its own Memorial Day Weekend Tournament in 1994, and again there were problems and out-of-towners complained.

In 1995, after consulting with Chicago, the SSBL announced it would once again have an Annual Classic. Chicago decided it had "had enough" and agreed to back out of any Memorial Day Softball tourney. Once again, the Milwaukee Classic is "the" Gay softball tourney in the Midwest.



injunction, pending the court's ruling, had kept it in place until then.)

In a decision one attorney called "stunning in its homophobic rhetoric," the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals rejected the idea that Issue 3 deprives Gays of participation in the political process because, the court noted, Gay people still have the right to vote. The "only effect" of Issue 3 was to "render futile the lobbying of Council for preferentia enactments for homosexuals...because the electorate placed the enactment of such legislation beyond the scope of the

Council's authority."

"The amendment does not impair homosexuals and other interested parties from seeking to repeal the amendment on another day," said the judges. The appeals court also rejected the notion that homosexuals are an "identifiable class" because their "identity is defined by subjective and unapparent characteristics such as innate desires, drives and thoughts...Many homosexuals successfully conceal their orientation...Homosexuals are generally not identifiable 'on sight' unless they elect to be so identifiable by conduct (such as public displays of homosexual affection or self-proclamation

homosexual tendencies)... Those persons who fall within the orbit of legislation concerning sexual orientation are so affected not because of their orientation but rather by their conduct."

"DANGEROUS PRECEDENT"

Suzanne Goldberg of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, co-counsel in the case, commented: "This ruling contains a shocking disregard for basic constitutional guarantees and provides a dangerous precedent for giving legal effect to private prejudice."


"This ruling should give all Americans pause about the security of their civil rights because it permits the government to pick and choose among the citizens who are able to participate fully in the political process. It sets up second-class citizenship for Gay people and leaves all Americans vulnerable to being similarly excluded from the political

process."

All previous rulings regarding anti-Gay initiatives by local, state and federal courts have found the measures to be unconstitutional. The 6th Circuit's decision was especially troubling to supporters of Gay rights, however, because it is now the highest level court to rule on such issues and its decision seems to give such voter initiatives, sponsored by anti-Gay groups, a green light.

Goldberg vowed that "We will demonstrate the ruling's flaws to the US Supreme Court either in the appeal of this case, or in the challenge to the Colorado anti-Gay amendment." She referred to the case of Colorado's Amendment 2, found unconstitutional by the Colorado Supreme Court last year. Proponents appealed to the US Supreme Court, which is likely to hear arguments in the Colorado case this fall and render a final judgment.

For the record, the three appeals court judges ruling in support of the Cincinnati measure were: Cornelia G. Kennedy, a Carter appointee, and Robert B. Krupansky and Alan E. Norris, Reagan appointees.







He asked me to move in. Well, he didn't ask me to just move in, he asked if he could take care of me.


Fiscally. He wanted me to live with him, be his lover, and he wanted to foot all the bills so I could finish college stress-free.
