
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
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

















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David Clarenbach Chosen to Lead the Victory Fund

Veteran Legislator Says: "I am a Gay Man"

Washington, DC — The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, which trains and finances openly Gay candidates running for public office, has chosen Wisconsin's David Clarenbach to replace outgoing Executive Director William Waybourn.

Clarenbach served as a Dane County Supervisor and Madison City Council member before being elected to the State Assembly, where he served nine terms from 1975 to 1993. During that time, he played a key role in the passage of Wisconsin's Gay rights law, its consenting adults law, its hate crimes enhancement act and its bill of rights for people with HIV/AIDS.

Clarenbach has also served as a mentor to Gay and Lesbian candidates and elected officials, including State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, who won his long-held 78th District Assembly seat in 1992. That year, Clarenbach made an unsuccessful bid for the US Congress.

Clarenbach told In Step he was "delighted and challenged" to be chosen as Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund. His job will be to "expand the list of successful candidates that win elections and represent our community in every nook and cranny of this country."

"Gay and Lesbian civil rights has established a place of legitimacy in the national debate," according to Clarenbach. "But we need to be more of an influence on the political process — we need to be part of the political process. We cannot expect anyone to assure our equal rights. We have to do it ourselves."

"Every person who believes in the Gay and Lesbian civil rights movement has an obligation to support qualified Gay and Lesbian candidates. It's not just an act of charity," Clarenbach said. "It's an investment in our future."

"The proof is in the results. Four years ago, when the Victory Fund began, there were just a handful of Gay and Lesbian elected officials across the country. Today, there are 11 openly Lesbian elected officials in California alone. In Oregon, 5 state legislators are Gay or Lesbian..."

The recent victory of a statewide Gay rights bill in Rhode Island is credited, in large part, to the inside lobbying of colleagues by openly Gay State Sen. Will Fitzpatrick. Clarenbach agreed, saying: "I don't think that it can be done unless there are insiders making change happen."

CLARENBACH COMES OUT

A press release issued by the Victory Fund touched on one problematic aspect of Clarenbach's relationship with the Gay and Lesbian community, especially in his home state. In it, Clarenbach was quoted as saying that Gays and Lesbians have often been "invisible" in politics.

"One of the biggest regrets of my life," Clarenbach said, "is that I didn't run for Congress as an openly Gay candidate. As Executive Director of the Victory Fund, I will do everything in my power to keep other qualified candidates from making the same mistake."

In 1992, Clarenbach lost the Democratic primary for In Step ▼ June 22-July 5, 1995 ▼ Page 4

the Second Congressional District seat to Ada Deer. Despite years of support for Gay issues, some Gays and Lesbians abandoned Clarenbach because of his marriage to a female partner shortly before the election. His wife was featured in campaign ads. Some said they felt betrayed because they had been led to believe for years that Clarenbach was a Gay man. They said his marriage raised "questions of trust."

"I am a Gay Man. I am comfortable with that fact."

In our telephone interview with Clarenbach June 14, In Step asked about his current marital status and gave him the opportunity to explain his seemingly contradictory behavior.

opportunity to explain his seemingly contradictory behavior.
"Every person follows a different path in their personal development, their sexual development and their level of comfort in disclosing or sharing those intimate aspects of their lives," he said.

"I was elected to my first political office in 1972. I was 18 years old, and there were no openly Gay elected officials anywhere in the country at that time."

"I've had a loving and caring relationship with a woman. I have had a committed and caring relationship with a man who has since died of AIDS. I am Gay. I am comfortable with that fact. I have always believed that one's sexual orientation is an irrelevant criteria for any job. That's the whole point of our movement — that individuals in a free society should be allowed to live and love whomever and in whatever way they choose."

Clarenbach said he is legally separated from his wife, 'Heidi. "We remain good friends, and she is very happy for me and supportive of the work I will be doing with the Victory Fund."

"I know I was not the favorite candidate, by any means, when I went to Washington to interview for this job. But I received a unanimous vote from the Board of Directors. They were confident I was the best qualified to lead the Victory Fund to its next level. And that's exactly how anyone should be treated — without respect to who they love or how they love."

treated — without respect to who they love or how they love."

"So I don't think the path I've taken to get to who I am today will interfere in the slightest. If anything, it will help. Having served in local and state government for over 20 years and having personally run for Congress, I can relate to the candidates. I can relate to the campaign. I know what it means to raise money. I know what it means to be under pressure. I'm ready to assist others in their successful campaigns."

WHITE HOUSE VISIT

Clarenbach, who has been Acting Executive Director of the Madison AIDS Support Network and who runs his own consulting business, said he had "lots of loose ends to tie up" in Wisconsin but will be taking over at the Victory Fund and moving to Washington "as soon as possible."

"Individuals in a free society should be allowed to live and love whomever and in whatever way they choose."

He got a taste of his new position when he visited the White House June 12 with William Waybourn and Melinda Paras and Elizabeth Birch, the Executive Directors of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Human Rights Campaign Fund, respectively. The four leaders spoke with Clinton aide George Stephanopoulous about the meeting with Gay and Lesbian officials set for the following day. (See related story.)

Clarenbach said the "wide-ranging discussion"

included talk about re-authorization of the Ryan White CARE Act, the Justice Department's refusal to file a brief against Colorado's Amendment 2 (see related story), and the "Don't

Ask, Don't Tell" Pentagon policy.
"We tried to paint the picture for the administration that this is a very active and sophisticated community — in fact, it's more than one community, it's many communities that have a common interest - and the respect that should be accorded to the Gay and Lesbian community needs to go beyond mere tokenism. While a meeting in the White House with openly Gay and Lesbian elected officials is an important step in communication, it does not constitute an end in itself."

On a personal note, Clarenbach was also happy to be reunited with NGLTF's Melinda Paras, with whom he attended grade school and Madison West High School.

"You know, when we were kids," he said of Paras, "we played tackle football together, and once I broke her finger. When we met again at the White House after all these years, it was the first thing she spoke to me about," he said, chuckling.

Clarenbach anticipates a good working relationship with both Paras and Birch, who lead the two other major national Gay and Lesbian organizations.

Children the Winners in **Landmark Visitation** Case

Wisconsin Supreme Court Ruling Sets Precedent

Madison - In a precedent-setting case with national implications, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled on June 13 that adults in non-traditional families may seek visitation rights with the children of those families when the family unit dissolves.

The ruling came in the case of Holtzman v. Knott, in which Sandra Holtzman sought custody and visitation of the child they raised together during their 10-year relationship. This decision is the first time a state supreme court has protected the rights of children in non-traditional families to maintain parental relationships if those family units break up. The Court remanded the issue of visitation back to the trial court.

Attorney Judith Sperling Newton, who argued Holtzman's case before the court, noted that Wisconsin is now "the first state to protect the constitutional rights of a child to maintain parental relationships in their lives." She pointed out that the ruling is not limited to Lesbian and Gay parents, but applies in any case where a child has formed a parent-like

relationship with an adult.

Holtzman sued her former partner, Elsbeth Knott, in 1993 for custody and visitation rights under a state law allowing people who had "maintained a parent-like relationship with the child" to seek visitation. She charged Knott was an unfit parent because of mental instability, citing evidence of self-mutilation and the fact that Knott had been under a suicide watch in Dane County in 1992-93.

Knott argued that Holtzman had no right to a hearing on visitation, because such a hearing would interfere with Knott's constitutional right to decide with whom the child should associate. Additionally, Knott charged that Holtzman was emotionally abusive of her and that Holtzman didn't really care about the boy. Holtzman, she charged, was using the case to establish herself as a child advocacy lawyer.

Dane County Circuit Judge George Northrup summarily ruled against Holtzman, finding that although visitation with Holtzman was clearly in the child's best interest, he was unable to grant it because of a 1991 Wisconsin Supreme Court ruling in another case involving Lesbians and visitation rights. In that case, known as ZJH, the Court ruled that the visitation law applied only when there was a legal action already affecting the family before the court, such as a divorce or custody petition. In Wisconsin, as in the rest of the nation, same-sex marriages are not legally recognized. Holtzman appealed, and the Supreme Court took the unusual step of accepting the case directly from the trial court, bypassing the appellate court.

A 4-3 DECISION

In a 4-3 decision, the Court ruled that Holtzman did not "present a triable issue regarding Knott's fitness or ability to parent her child and has not shown compelling circumstances requiring a change of custody." Thus, the Court dismissed that portion of Holtzman's suit. Regarding visitation, the Court reversed the dismissal by the lower court and adopted a fourpronged test to determine whether a party was a "parent-like relationship" with a child. The Court ruled that petitioners must demonstrate that:

The petitioner and the child lived together in the same household.

The petitioner assumed obligations of parenthood by taking significant responsibility for the child's care, education and development, including contributing towards the child's support, without expectation of financial compensation.

Openly Lesbian State Representative Tammy Baldwin praised the decision. Before the ruling, she said, "there were two classes of children; those whose best interests would be considered and those whose best interests would not be. A child cares not about legal gymnastics... a child cares only that he or she has lost someone known to them as 'Mom' or 'Dad."

Newton concurred. "It is critically important that children be raised in loving, caring families and that those relationships not be severed for no good reason."

Baldwin, who is preparing legislation to legalize samesex marriage and domestic partnership, cited the importance of "having a dialogue on what constitutes a family." The decision indicated that "there is already a dialogue among the justices as to what makes a family. That dialogue has to take place not only in the chambers of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, but in every corner of the state."

FORMER COUPLE EXCHANGED VOWS

Holtzman and Knott had been in a relationship since 1983. They exchanged vows in a commitment ceremony in 1984 and the couple decided to have a child together. Knott conceived a son, referred to in court records as H.S., through artificial insemination in Boston by an unknown doctor; the child was born in 1988. Knott and Holtzman are both named on H.S.'s birth certificate. The couple held a church ceremony naming them both as H.S.'s parents. H.S. has a hyphenated last name, Holtzman-Knott.

The couple moved to Madison in June 1992 so Holtzman could attend the University of Wisconsin- Madison Law School. Knott is a graduate student at UW in child and family studies, currently on medical leave. When the couple broke up in August of that year, Knott refused to allow

Holtzman to see the child, now nearly six years old.

The ruling is not binding outside of Wisconsin, but as courts around the country grapple with custody and visitation issues involving children from Gay and Lesbian partnerships, they could look to Wisconsin for guidance. Knott could appeal the ruling to the US Supreme Court. Neither Newton nor Baldwin was aware of any plans by Knott to file such an appeal.

Inere have already been some rumblings from conservative members of the Legislature that the decision undermines "traditional family values." Newton said in reply that "traditional families should be elated by this ruling." She noted that the ruling gave children no new rights. It merely equalized the rights of children raised in traditional and non-traditional families. Any attempt to reserve the ruling, she said, would "undo a great service to children."

The National Center for Lesbian Rights, which filed an amicus brief on behalf of Holtzman, estimates that at least 10,000 children have been conceived by Lesbians through artificial insemination, and as many as 10 million children are being raised in Gay and Lesbian households in the US.

Justice Shirley Abrahamson wrote the majority opinion, with Chief Justice Nathan Heffernan and Justices William Bablitch and Janine Geske concurring. Justices Day, Steinmetz and Wilcox all concurred with the majority on the custody issue, but dissented regarding the visitation issue.

More than 12,000 LesBiGay and Transgendered people and their friends strolled, sashayed and cruised the festival grounds in Veterans Park along Milwaukee's lakefront

on Saturday and Sunday, June 10 and 11.

"We believe the count was up about 20% from last year when we just made a rough estimate," said PrideFest Co-Chair Bill Meunier. (Last year's estimate was high at 15,500.) "This year we made a more reliable count through tickets and clickers.

The weather cooperated beautifully. Both days dawned gloomy, but became sunny and warm by the

afternoons. There are several theories about this.

One Lesbian said it confirmed the old slogan that Mother Nature is indeed a Lesbian. But Bill Meunier noted the sun came out just as Rev. Vic Eliason, one of Milwaukee's leading homophobes, left his surveillance perch on the bridge overlooking the PrideFest grounds. Thanks for leaving, Vic!

Meunier declared PrideFest '95 to be "an artistic, a social and a financial success - the biggest and best festival

"The entertainment was great, the variety of activities made everyone happy, and the crowd was orderly. This year's PrideFest showed off everything about our community that is creative and positive."

Meunier extended this message to all who attended: "On behalf of all the organizers and sponsors of PrideFest '95, we want to thank everyone who came for allowing us to live our dream, and we hope we helped you to live yours."

It is impossible to review all of PrideFest's entertainers

and events, but here is a recap of some highlights.

PRIDEFEST HIGHLIGHTS

US Sen. Russ Feingold stopped by Saturday morning and spoke to the 40 people gathered for the annual

meeting of Action Wisconsin. Feingold reiterated his longstanding support of civil rights for Gays and Lesbians, including his sponsorship of the federal Employment Non-Discrimination ACT (ENDA). Action Wisconsin elected new Board members and approved a budget.

The Saturday Evening Gayla drew almost a thousand people to the Alyn Hess Main Stage area where they were treated to a variety of quality performances by vocalists like Lojo Russo and Jill Clarke, dancers like Spanky and Foreplay and the Iberian Dancers and female impersonations

by the outrageous Gloria.

The Lazer Force Laser Show and Miller's Lite Up the Sky with Pride Fireworks after the Gayla lasted a full half-hour, eliciting "oooohs" and "aaaahs" and "wows!" from throughout the awed crowd. The general response was, "Wow! We had no idea it would be this intense!" Miller was reportedly thrilled with the crowd's response, so another fireworks display

is likely next year.

The PrideFest '95 Parade wound through the streets of East Town with several new contingents and colorful cars. Awards for best floats went to Walker's Point Cafe, Loose Ends and Just Us, in that order. Awards for decorated cars went to the Stonewall Truck (the huge, rainbow-colored semi), the Latino/a Organization and the Sherman Park Rainbow Association. Awards for marching units went to the ROTC Chicago precision drill team, the Shoreline Dancers, and the Lesbian Alliance and ACT UP (in a tie).

The parade judges were three of Milwaukee's most Gay-supportive politicians, County Supervisors Elizabeth Coggs-Jones and Sheila Aldrich and Alderman Paul Henningsen. Coggs-Jones read a supportive statement signed

by County Board members at the Main Stage.

The PrideFest Wedding, presided over by Revs. Lew Broyles, Jan Doleschal and Bishop Roy Barnsback, united about 100 couples as "lovers and lifemates." Scripture readings included those about Ruth and Naomi and David and Jonathan as well as the "Love is patient, love is kind..." section from Corinthians. Most of the couples took their vows very seriously, some even shedding tears of joy. They then got to have a piece of the massive three- tiered wedding cake provided by the Metropolitan Community Church and PrideFest. Mmm-mmmmm.

The Miller Lite PrideFest Volleyball Tournament, organized by GAMMA, featured eight teams. Winning the Gold Medal in the Competitive Division was Chicago's Assault, led by Joe Sanchez. The Silver Medal went to Madison's Fun Attack. The Gold Medal in the Social Division went to Madison's Geraldine's. Next year, GAMMA hopes to expand the tournament to 16 men's and 4 women's teams. Open net play on Sunday was enjoyed by many.

DRAG, HEALTH, HISTORY

The annual BJ Daniels Drag Revue packed 'em in Sunday night. BJ outdid herself this year, coordinating a gaudy, often naughty, but thoroughly entertaining show. Lost in the delirious drag mayhem was the first-ever PrideFest Boat Parade, a modest effort in which five lighted boats cruised serenely by the Lake Michigan shoreline. PrideFest hopes for more entries next year.

The BESTD Clinic was on hand, with personnel conducting health education and HIV screening. Several thousand people walked through the History Tent, this year featuring a display on recent Gay and Lesbian history in Milwaukee along with the national exhibit on loan from the

International Gay and Lesbian Archives.

PrideFest's Community Service Award went to Ross Walker and Erv Uecker for their many years of service and financial support to the BESTD Clinic. A Lifetime Achievement

Award went to Ron Geiman, the publisher of this magazine, who told the crowd: "Thank you for allowing me to live my dream." Stonewall Award winners were: Milwaukeeans Gary Wells, Jan Doleschal and Terry Boughner, editor of Wisconsin

Light; Mike Fitzpatrick of Green Bay; and John Quinlan or Madison.

Dale Gutzman produced a diversity of classy fare for the Fine Arts Tent, ranging from Baroque music to choral concerts to African story-telling and music to a Gay Broadway revue. The Alyn Hess, CCF Main Stage rocked, rolled, reggaed and reveled to the sounds of the Sweet Cheeks Motown Revue, Dave Robinson and Road Damage, Blarney Castle, the John Schneider Orchestra, the Purple Creek Cloggers and many more.

More entertainers performed in the Harvey Milk Tent, while meetings, workshops and tapings of Queer TV took place

in the Stonewall and Activity tents.

Given the large, boisterous crowds and all the activities, there were very few security problems. Security chief Miriam Ben-Shalom said only two men, apparently intoxicated street people, were arrested after verbally and physically harassing several women. In one other incident, a member of Exodus International, the so- called "ex-Gay ministry," was escorted off the grounds for handing out his group's literature and hassling people. Several heated exchanges between ex-lovers who unexpectedly crossed paths were quickly defused by security people.

Solicited by Sky Plus Travel?

Milwaukee — PrideFest has received many complaints from people who have received aggressive telephone solicitations from Sky Plus Travel, which had a booth at the festival. Operators tell people they have won a vacation to Florida or the Bahamas if they merely fork over several hundred dollars and their credit card numbers.

PrideFest attorney Steve Brondino and Co-Chair Bill Meunier apologize to everyone who has been disturbed or confused by these calls. PrideFest is filing a complaint with the State Attorney General's Office about Sky Travel and will work to ensure that all groups and businesses taking part in

PrideFest next year are more carefully screened.

Sky Plus Travel (based in Blue Springs, MO) obtained people's names and phone numbers at its PrideFest booth by asking them to fill out small yellow cards. They hired a local agent, Dion Berlewitz, who was reportedly paid 50 cents for each card he could get people to sign. Dozens of individuals have told PrideFest officials and In Step that Berlewitz told them the cards would be used in a raffle for a free Florida/Bahamas trip. But subsequent calls from Sky Travel have consistently included hard-sell tactics and requests for money up-front.

First of all, remember to never give your credit card numbers out over the phone. Second, you should never have to pay money up-front for a supposedly "free" vacation. Third, when making travel plans, stick to reputable, locally-owned travel agencies that have a good track record<>. Several such excellent businesses advertise

in In Step.

ENDA Re-Introduced in Congress With 148 Co-Sponsors

Kohl, Feingold, Barrett and Gunderson on Board

Washington, DC — Rep. Steve Gunderson joined Rep. Tom Barrett and Sens. Herb Kohl and Russ Feingold to co-sponsor the Employment Non-Discrimination Act, which was introduced into the 104th Congress on June 15. ENDA, as it is called, would prohibit discrimination based on sexual

orientation in the workplace.

Of the four members of Wisconsin's Congressional delegation supporting the legislation, Sen. Feingold was an original sponsor when it was introduced last summer. Herb Kohl and Tom Barrett declared their support last fall, and Steve Gunderson, a newly out Gay man serving his last term in the House, lent his support in the new GOP-controlled Congress.

Gay and Lesbian relatives of members of Congress joined victims of anti-Gay job discrimination and Congressional sponsors of ENDA at a large news conference announcing the

bill's re-introduction.

gathered were Among those Chastity Bono, daughter of Rep. Sonny Bono (R-CA); Candace Gingrich, sister of Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich (R-GA); Julie Pell, daughter of Sen. Claiborne Pell (D-RI); and Sandy DeWine, cousin of Sen. Michael DeWine (R-OH).

"Anti-Gay discrimination can touch any family in America," said Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "As Gay and Lesbian people come out in their own way and educate their families, friends and co-workers, our movement for equality makes enormous

strides forward.

Several people who have been either fired, demoted, or harassed in the workplace spoke up about their experiences. They included Ernest Dillon, a postal worker from Detroit; Michael Engler, a stock broker from Baltimore; and Jesse Shaw, a former social worker from Jackson, Mississippi.

"Hard-working people across this nation are fired, refused work and treated unfairly simply because they are Gay and have no federal law to turn to for justice," Birch noted. "ENDA would simply ensure that no one loses their job for a reason wholly unrelated to their skills or job performance."

"When Americans understand that the discrimination Gay people face is

both widespread and legal, they support the fundamental values embodied in ENDA." A post-election poll of voters last November found that more than 70% favor equal rights in the workplace for Gays and Lesbians. That number included 64% of Republicans, 71% of Independents, and 77% of Democrats.

Congressional support for ENDA is bipartisan, with Sens. Edward Kennedy (D-MA) and James Jeffords (R-VT) leading sponsors in the Senate, and Reps. Connie Morella (R-MD), Peter Torkildsen (R-MA) and Gerry Studds and Barney Frank (D-MA) leading the effort in

Among the record 148 co-sponsors

are 30 members of the Senate and 118 members of the House.

Gay lobbyists in Washington believe that Wisconsin Reps. Scott Klug (R) and David Obey (D) are most likely to support ENDA but can use some encouragement from constituents. Contact Rep. White House Officials Meet With LesBiGay Leaders

Rubber Gloves Incident Spoils Event

At a historic June 13 meeting between White House officials and 45 openly Lesbian and Gay elected officials from across the country, Wisconsin was well represented. Three out of its seven openly gay officials were in attendance: State Representative Tammy Baldwin; Dane County Supervisor Mark Pocan; and Dane County Supervisor Scott McCormick.

The Gay politicians met with a number of high level Administration officials, including Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala; Housing and Urban Development Secretary Henry Cisneros; AIDS "czar" Patricia Fleming; and, White House counsel Abner Mikva. White House staffer Marsha Scott was named Liaison to the LesBiGay Community, and the Administration also used the occasion of the meeting to announce a new 30-member panel to advise Fleming on AIDS issues.

Topics discussed included the Clinton Administration's stands on Gays in the military, and the recent decision by the Justice Department not to file an amicus brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in the anti-Gay Amendment 2 case. "There were lively exchanges," said Baldwin. "We heard the administration's rationale and offered opposing viewpoints."

According to Baldwin, the Administration believed in regard to the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy that it was caught in a "classic political dilemma: pragmatism versus principle." White House officials felt that had they continued to push for a complete lifting of the ban, the LesBiGay communities would have lost bigger than they did with the compromise.

Similarly, while Attorney General Janet Reno had previously said that the Administration would not file a brief in the Amendment 2 case because there was no federal statute involved, officials at the meeting again cited fears of a "significant backlash" to the L/G/B communities had a brief been filed.

Baldwin said that the general feeling among the Gay officials present was "Don't 'protect' us like that. Get our input." She encouraged the Administration to take a stand on principles and reminded officials that the LesBiGay communities supported Clinton in the 1992 election, and now look to him for leadership on Gay civil rights issues. She also expressed hope that, with the

appointment of Scott as the community liaison, there would be more of a consultative process involved in the decision making.

The meetings also touched on funding for AIDS programs such as the Ryan White CARE Act and the Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS (HOPWA) program.

WHITE HOUSE SECURITY WORE RUBBER GLOVES

The meeting was marred by a particularly ugly incident in which the Lesbian and Gay officials were met by White House security guards wearing rubber gloves, apparently out of fear of catching HIV, the virus believed to cause AIDS. When queried about the gloves, the guards said only that they were for "protection." Many of the Lesbian and Gay officials were incensed at this treatment. Councilman Thomas Duane of Manhattan was quoted in the New York Times as saying, "I can assure you that I did not catch HIV through my hands. I'm sorry they still don't know that in Washington."

Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin, who oversees the Secret Service, has ordered a probe of the glove incident. White House spokesperson Mike McCurry said during a June 14 briefing that "it's safe to say that [White House] chief of staff [Leon Panetta] or others were distressed by that and it seems to have an error in judgment." McCurry also stated that the Administration was unaware that guards had chosen to wear the rubber gloves until the Gay officials brought it up at the meeting, but that the incident did not affect the tone of the meeting, which he said was "very good and established a basis for further discussions." Baldwin said at a June 15 press conference that the guards involved in the incident were apparently "rent-a-cops" who were hired after numerous recent White House security breaches to operate such equipment as metal detectors.

WISCONSIN POLITICIANS LOBBY CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION

While in Washington, the Wisconsin group also took time to lobby members of Wisconsin's Congressional delegation. Baldwin, Pocan and McCormick met with Senators Russ Feingold and Herb Kohl and Representative Scott Klug (whose

Congressional district includes Dane County) and openly Gay Wisconsin Congressman Steve Gunderson. They discussed issues including the Ryan White CARE Act and the soon-to-bereintroduced Employment Non-discrimination Act (ENDA). Kohl and Feingold are among ENDA's 30 Senate co-sponsors. Gunderson is among ENDA's 118 co-sponsors in the House, as is 5th District Rep. Thomas Barrett.

Wisconsin has a total of seven openly Lesbian or Gay elected officials at every level of government. In addition to Baldwin, Pocan, McCormick and Gunderson, the list also includes Madison Alderpersons Mike Verveer and Judy Olson and Madison Municipal Court Judge Shelly Gaylord.

Immune-Compromised Should Not Use USA's Tap Water


Washington, DC — Bowing to recent studies which found contaminated water supplies thoughout the country, officials with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Environmental Protection Agency have finally issued a statement suggesting that people with AIDS or other immune-compromising disorders should avoid tap water and consume only boiled, filtered or bottled water.

The EPA sent out a contradictory message, however, in a statement that also said: "Current risk data are not adequate to support a recommendation that severely immuno-compromised persons in all US cities boil or avoid drinking tap water." By issuing a "suggestion" rather than a "recommendation," the federal government avoids the embarrassing situation of having to admit that America's drinking water is unsafe.

The American Water Works Association has issued a much bolder guideline, saying pointblank that immuno-compromised people should never drink unboiled or unfiltered tap water anywhere in the US. AIDS service groups, including the Milwaukee AIDS Project, which lost almost 100 clients after they became infected with cryptosporidium from the municipal water supply two years ago, have consistently advised their clients to avoid tap water in favor of boiled, filtered or filtered bottled water.

The government's action follows the publication of a study conducted by the Natural Resources Defense Council, which found that 45 million Americans regularly drink water supplied by 100 systems in which the crypto parasite has been detected.

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Janet Reno Refuses to File Brief Against Amendment 2

Activists Decry Another "Betrayal" by Clinton

Washington, DC — Attorney General Janet Reno announced on June 8 that the Clinton administration will not file a friend-of- the-court brief against Colorado's anti-Gay Amendment 2, a decision some Gay activists are calling yet another "betrayal" by President Clinton.

The US Supreme Court will hear arguments about the constitutionality of Amendment 2 in October. Its decision is likely to have far-reaching consequences on anti-Gay initiative campaigns and on all aspects of civil rights for Gays and Lesbians. Many legal experts call the case, Romer v. Evans, the most important Gay rights case ever to reach the high court.

Amendment 2, passed by Colorado voters in 1992, would repeal Gay rights laws already adopted in Denver, Boulder and Aspen and prohibit the state, its counties and localities from ever including sexual orientation as a protected class in civil rights laws. It was struck down as unconstitutional by the Colorado Supreme Court last year.

By all accounts, the decision about whether to file an amicus brief in the Supreme Court appeal caused great debate within the White House and the Department of Justice. Gay rights lobbyists and supportive officials within the Clinton administration say the final decision was largely based on several political considerations:

President Clinton, after his Gays in the military fiasco, felt he could not take another stand in favor of Gays with his re-election bid just around the corner.

Attorney General Reno was concerned that the administration's opposition to Amendment 2 could undermine its legal arguments in the pending court case over Gays in the military.

Reno denied that political considerations were a factor: "We considered many issues, constitutional issues, and tried to figure out what would be the best role for the federal government and determined not to participate... This is a matter in which we [the federal government] were not a party. We were not asked by the court to

participate. There was no federal program or federal statute involved."

But legal experts and Gay activists rebutted Reno's contentions.

"JUST PLAIN WRONG"

Matt Coles, head of the Lesbian and Gay Rights Project of the American Civil Liberties Union, which is a co-counsel in the case, told the **Washington Blade**: "The Department of Justice has a long history of filing briefs in Supreme Court cases, even those where the United States is not a party and there is not a federal program or law involved. So that implication is just plain wrong."

Indeed, during the Reagan and Bush administrations, the Justice Department frequently filed briefs in support of positions that helped to advance their conservative views. These were cases in which a federal interest or program was not always evident.

Coles also said that an administration's formal support for (or opposition to) an issue had "enormous" influence on Supreme Court decisions.

"The issue before the court is one of fundamental fairness," said Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, "and whether any group of Americans should be denied access to the democratic process. The federal government has a clear interest in standing up for these fundamental principles."

Beatrice Dohrn of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, another co-counsel in the case, said of Reno's decision: "It sends the wrong message to Americans that the Justice Department will not vigorously protect the basic civil liberties of all its citizens."

"Fundamentally, this case is about whether everyone participates in political life under one set of rules, or whether Gay men and Lesbians are second class citizens, forced to adhere to rules written just for them," according to Nan Hunter, a Lesbian attorney with the Department of Health and Human Services.

Hunter told the **Blade**: "It saddens me enormously that the United States is not going to present an argument to the Supreme Court on a question of this magnitude. To me, that decision demonstrates a failure of will and insight."

Reno's decision came just days before a much-anticipated meeting between openly Gay elected officials and White House staffers. "One of the reasons we were having this meeting is to see how we can work together," San Francisco Supervisor Susan Leal told **USA Today**. "This is not the best way to start the dialogue."

See related story about the meeting between Gay and White House officials. On the "up" side, the American Bar

Association, the Leadership Council on Civil Rights, the American Psychological Association, the American Federation of Teachers, legal scholars from the Harvard and Stanford Law Schools, Christian and Jewish groups and more than a dozen states and cities have filed amicus briefs challenging the constitutionality of Amendment 2.

"This powerhouse coalition of organizations and community leaders highlights the important constitutional and democratic issues at stake in this case," said Suzanne Goldberg of Lambda Legal Defense. "While Amendment 2 fences out Lesbian and Gay citizens from participating fully in our democracy, it also threatens to undermine the foundation upon which the rights of every citizen is built."

Clinton Appoints Another AIDS Panel

Washington, DC — In the same week that Gay officials meeting at the White House were greeted by Secret Service police wearing rubber gloves, President Clinton appointed yet another AIDS panel, this one to advise the government on improving AIDS prevention, treatment and research.

Named to the panel were individuals whom AIDS Policy Coordinator Patricia Fleming said had "real world experience" dealing with the disease, including several people with AIDS: Bob Hattoy, White House liaison to the Interior Department, and Steve Lew of the Gay Asian Pacific Alliance HIV Project.

Other appointees include: Dr. Benjamin Schatz, Director of the Gay and Lesbian Medical Association; Debra Fraser-Howse of the Black Leadership Commission on AIDS; and Dr. R. Scott Hitt, who runs one of the largest private practices dealing with AIDS.

Some Gay and AIDS activists welcomed the advisory panel, but ACT UP/Washington had a withering response: "Coming nearly three years into Clinton's Presidency and two years after the National Commission on AIDS expired, it proves that he has no commitment to ending the AIDS crisis."

"The glove incident only heightens long-simmering resentment," said ACT UP's Wayne Turner. "We have no real AIDS Czar, no Manhattan-style project,

not one of the recommendations of the last Presidential Commission on AIDS implemented. Clinton promised to make AIDS a top priority, yet all he's done in three years is appoint another AIDS panel."

Meanwhile, a parliamentary maneuver by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) has stymied the Ryan White CARE Act re-authorization bill in the Senate. The CARE Act has 58 co-sponsors, but 60 votes will be required to end a planned filibuster by Helms.

Men Convicted in Brandon Teena Multiple Murder

Falls City, NE — The second man charged with killing transsexual Brandon Teena and her two friends on New Year's Eve, 1993 has been convicted of multiple charges of murder and faces either life in prison or the electric chair.

"I do want him to die," Teena's mother said of 23-year-old John Lotter. "He took the lives of three innocent, loving people."

Lotter and his accomplice, Marvin Thomas Nissen, 22, went to a farmhouse rented by Lisa Lambert, 24, in search of Brandon Teena. The men shot to death Lambert, Teena, and another of Teena's friends, Phillip DeVine, 22. Teena was stabbed and killed with an execution-style shot at close range to the back of the head. Lambert's infant was found, unharmed.

Lotter and Nissen had allegedly become infuriated after learning that Teena, 21, was a biological woman who cross-dressed and lived as a man. Teena was reportedly raped by the men on Christmas Day, charges local police did not aggressively pursue, and Lotter and Nissen decided to silence Teena permanently.

Nissen, who admitted to stabbing Teena, testified against his crony, assuring Lotter's conviction, in exchange for a waiver of the death penalty for his own crimes. He was convicted in March and will be sentenced along with Lotter in July.

Teena's mother said her daughter's life had been threatened and that she had been raped, and charged local police with negligence for failing to intervene to prevent the murders.

Sen. Simpson, Gov. Weld Address Gay Republicans

Washington, DC — The Washington Blade reports that Sen. Alan Simpson (R-WY) and Gov. William Weld (R-MA) expressed support for the role the Log Cabin Republicans play in the political process and specifically within the GOP at a series of events sponsored by the Gay Republican group

in early June.

On June 8, Sen. Simpson told members of the group gathered for a luncheon at the Hyatt Regency on Capitol Hill: "I want to thank you for what you do for the Republican Party." Simpson said he doubted there would be the kind of anti-Gay rhetoric at the next GOP convention as there was at 1992's: "There are too many Bob Doles and too many William Welds and too many Lamar Alexanders who are not into that kind of bashing. Those people aren't going to let that happen."

Gov. Weld, a supporter of civil rights for Gays, thanked the group for supporting his gubernatorial bids in 1990 and '94. He urged Log Cabin members to find "common ground" with members of Congress who might not be totally supportive of the Gay political agenda.

Weld was part of a reception with other GOP House members, including Wisconsin's Steve Gunderson and Reps. Rick Lazio (R- NY), Jim Kolbe (R-AZ), Steve Horne (R-CA), George Neathercutt (R- WA) and Sue Kelly (R-NY). All the

events were held in conjunction with Log Cabin's annual Board of Directors meeting. Log Cabin members also lobbied members of Congress in favor of the Ryan White CARE Act and the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

"Love! Valour!" and Cherry Jones Win Tony Awards New York, NY—As happens every

New York, NY — As happens every year in June, Gays and Lesbians paraded across the stage of a Broadway theater to accept Antoinette Perry "Tony" Awards for excellence in the past Broadway theater season.

At the awards ceremony June 4, Gay playwright Terrence McNally won the Tony for Best Play for his critically acclaimed comedy Love! Valour! Compassion! It focuses on the interactions of eight Gay men at an isolated farmhouse in upstate New York, exposing their fears, their foibles and their uniquely queer perspective.

New York Times critic Vincent Canby wrote this "proudly Gay play...is written, directed and acted with such theatrical skill and emotional range that it's as broadly entertaining as it is moving."

The Tony for Leading Actress in a Play went to Lesbian Cherry Jones, who won critical raves for her performance as the repressed Catherine Sloper in the revival of *The Heiress*. Mainstream media referred to Jones as a "newcomer," but she is, in fact, a veteran trouper well known and highly regarded among theater folk.

Jones, 38, is a native of Tennessee. She attended the Tony Awards with her lifetime companion, Mary O'Connor. She is apparently the first openly Lesbian woman to win a Leading Actress Tony.

In other awards, Glenn Close cemented her claim to Diva-dom, winning a Tony for her over-the-top portrayal of the loony Norma Desmond in Sunset Boulevard, and Gay icon Carol Channing, soon to revive Hello Dolly! on Broadway, won a Lifetime Achievement Tony.

Major Leaguer Glenn Burke Dies from AIDS

Oakland, CA — Glenn Burke, the former Major League outfielder who was the first (and still only) baseball player to come out as a Gay man, died of AIDS complications May 30. He was 42.

Burke played for the Los Angeles
Dodgers and the Oakland A's between
1976 and 1980. He participated in the
1977 World Series, in which he is
credited with delivering the very first
"high five." Burke had a career batting
average of .237, with 35 stolen bases.

Burke left baseball in 1980 after A's

manager Billy Martin refused to renew his contract. Burke says Martin told the entire clubhouse, "I don't want no faggot on my team." After that, Burke said he was "blackballed" throughout the league: "A Gay man in baseball? Uh-uh. No way...Prejudice drove me out of baseball sooner than I should have."

"I think he gave it up because he wanted to be happy, and he knew he couldn't be happy inside of baseball," A's teammate Mitchell Page told the **New York Times**. "But then he found he couldn't really be happy outside of

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baseball either. Baseball meant everything to him. To decide he had to give it up because he was Gay, that must have eaten him up, day after day, a little bit at a time."

Burke fell on hard times after leaving baseball, serving prison time for theft and drug possession and battling

Los Angeles, CA - Dan Butler. who plays the macho "Bulldog Briscoe" on the NBC sitcom Frasier and who is currently performing his one-man show The Only Thing Worse You Could Have Told Me... in New York, will join Candace Gingrich as spokesperson for the Human Rights Campaign Fund's 1995 National Coming Out Day (NCOD) Project.

Butler takes over from last year's celebrity spokesperson, Married...With Children's Amanda Bearse, and is expected to provide encouragement to other Gays and Lesbians to embark on the journey of coming out. He will appear in print and broadcast public service ads during September and October stating. "I'm not a straight man, but I play one on television." October 11 is National Coming Out Day.

"I want to show people that from my experience, coming out was much easier

than I thought," said Butler. "To me, being openly Gay is the natural thing to do because it is part of who I am.'

The Coming Out Project also unveiled new radio public service ads featuring Lesbian rock star Melissa Etheridge, who declares: "Labels belong on records, not on people." Over 100 radio stations in the top 25 media markets will air the PSA's.

Also on the Newswire...

Washington, DC - A federal court has upheld President Clinton's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy, refusing to stop the Navy from discharging Lieutenant Paul Thomasson. The court said Thomasson violated the policy last year when he sent a letter to four admirals declaring that he was a homosexual. The letter, a board of inquiry found, proved that Thomasson "had a propensity to engage in homosexual acts."

Cincinnati, OH - Cincinnati, which passed an anti-Gay referendum that has been upheld by an appeals court, will have a good deal less convention business this year. The American Statistical Association, the Psychological Association and the Music Teachers National Association have recently canceled conferences. Cincinnati officials concede the anti-Gay law has so far cost them \$20.5 million in lost revenue.

Washington, DC - In late May, 450 people attended the third annual conference of the Latino/a Lesbian and Gay Organization. Workshops focused on sexuality, AIDS, family issues, immigration and civil rights. Michael Marinez of San Antonio said: "We walk away from this conference and back to our communities able to say, 'I'm Latino and I'm queer and I'm not going away.'

Austin, TX — The Texas House of Representatives has defeated a hate crimes bill that included steeper penalties for crimes motivated by anti-Gay bias. The vote was 70-68. At least 12 Gay men were murdered in Texas last year, the victims of homophobic attackers. Observers said the inclusion of sexual orientation in the bill, along with race and religion, was what turned many against it.

Houston, TX - A jury has awarded the family of a Gay man murdered in 1991 \$10.5 million in damages from one of the convicted killers. Paul Broussard was beaten and stabbed to death by 10 youths. The family is unlikely ever to collect the money. "It's not really about the money," said their attorney, "it is the message. This community is not going to condone this type of vicious hate crime. Those who commit them will be pursued in both criminal and civil courts.

Lesbians Encouraged to Have Regular Pap Tests

Washington, DC — Disturbed by a recent study that ties lack of Pap tests to advanced cases of cervical cancer and by misinformation conveyed by some health providers to Lesbian patients, women's health advocates are encouraging Lesbians to obtain regular Pap tests, sometimes called Pap smears.

In a Pap test, which is painless and takes only seconds, a health practitioner scrapes, with a swab-like instrument, cells from the surface of the cervix and places the sample on a slide. Lab technicians then analyze the slide and can detect any abnormalities that might indicate a malignancy or pre-cancerous condition. Detected early, laser surgery and other techniques are effective in treating such abnormalities. Detected late, women may find themselves with invasive cervical cancer, which is much more complicated to treat and sometimes fatal.

According to the American Cancer Society, this year in the US, 65,000 women will be diagnosed with pre-cancerous cervical lesions and almost 16,000 will be diagnosed with invasive cervical cancer.

There has been a long-standing misconception among many Lesbians and among some health care providers that if Lesbians engage in sexual relations only with other women they are unlikely to develop cervical cancer. Not so. Among the risk factors for cervical cancer are smoking, being the daughter of a mother who took the drug DES, and the presence of the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV), a sexually transmitted disease commonly called genital warts.

Health providers sometimes contribute to Lesbians' confusion about Pap tests. Most major medical societies issue guidelines which suggest that all "sexually active" women have routine Pap tests. But "sexually active" is invariably defined as sexual relations with men, leading some to believe Lesbians are exempt.

A study of 481 Connecticut women who were diagnosed with invasive cervical cancer between 1985 and 1990 found that 29% had never had a Pap smear. Almost 33% had not had a Pap test in the previous five years, and 15% had not returned for follow-up care after receiving an abnormal or inconclusive result. The study did not indicate how many of the women were heterosexual or Lesbian, but the implications for all women are clear.

"Every case of invasive cervical In Step v June 22-July 5, 1995 v Page 20 cancer is preventable," according to Dr. Dwight Janerich, who conducted the Connecticut study. The Pap test, a simple, painless screening method, can detect and prevent cervical cancer. The test is relatively inexpensive and is often available free to low-income women through community clinics and local health departments.

Says one Lesbian health worker: "Pap tests save women's lives — Lesbians' lives."

CDC Officials Meet with Lesbians on HIV/AIDS

Atlanta, GA — A contingent of 18 Lesbians, some of them health care providers and activists and others Lesbians with HIV/AIDS, met with officials of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently to discuss their concerns about the lack of information being compiled about Lesbians and HIV/AIDS.

The CDC convened the two-day meeting and, as a measure of its commitment, even paid the travel expenses of the women who attended. The women, in cooperation with CDC officials, drew up a list of recommendations for the agency to implement regarding the documentation ofpossible female-to-female transmission of HIV, the treatment of Lesbians with HIV/AIDS and preventive education.

Among the recommendations were that the CDC develop a definition of Lesbians within the context of HIV/AIDS, that it begin investigating the possibility of female-to-female transmission, that it begin documenting such cases and that it develop a preventive education campaign geared toward the Lesbian community.

Present during the weekend meeting was James Curran, the Associate Director for the CDC's HIV/AIDS Division. At least one participant, Marj Plumb, health consultant to the National Center for Lesbian Rights, expressed cautious optimism about the meeting. Plumb told the Washington Blade that Curran's "willingness to roll up his shirt sleeves and take a stab at the recommendations and really have an honest dialogue was very promising." She hopes to see changes and a proactive strategy from the CDC within the next year.

In addition to Plumb and several Lesbians with AIDS, other participants included: Amber Hollibaugh of the Lesbian AIDS Project at Gay Men's Health Crisis in New York; Jean Chin from Lyon-Martin Women's Health Services in San Francisco: and Beverly

Biddle who oversees Lesbian services at the Whitman-Walker Clinic in D.C.

a surviving partner of a Lesbian with

Mary-Helen Mautner Project for Lesbians

"After my partner died from cancer, I knew if there was one cause I would be able to help with, this was it," said Bono, the daughter of singer Cher and Rep. Sonny Bono (R-CA). "When I received the invitation from the Mautner Project, it gave me the perfect opportunity to work on two issues I care the most about --working for understanding of Lesbians and working on cancer."

The Mautner Project provides direct services to Lesbians with cancer, their partners and caregivers in the Washington, DC area, and offers education and information to Lesbians about cancer. It also advocates on cancer and other Lesbian health issues on the national level.

"Wigstock" is Anything But a Drag!

Latest Drag Film Opening Locally

The market for films about men-whodress-as-women is still of strong interest to the film-going public. And the latest to hit town is a goofy, wonderfully silly, documentary about the annual Happenin' in Manhattan, Wigstock.

Directed by neophyte Barry Shils, a 40-year-old Gay Jewish man from Philadelphia, it does no diving to any intellectual depths, but does explore a side of contemporary Gay life which is only now finding a mainstream voice. Shils has, in his past, produced the feature film, Vampire's Kiss, which starred Nicholas Cage and Jennifer Beals, which was written by Joseph Minion (After Hours).

He's not a drag person himself ("I don't do drag — my last time was as a Weird Sister in a college production of MacBeth), but he does share a fascination with millions of others with the mystique of gender-bending: "I'm more of an admirer of drag. My take on (the documentary) Paris Is Burning paved the way for this film. That film took the stance that drag is despair, but I disagree with that.

stance that drag is despair, but I disagree with that.

A couple of years ago Alexis Arquette (the Gay actor brother to Rosanna and Patricia) came to town to see me. I was intrigued by his naive, excited view of the drag scene here and his reaction to the Wigstock Festival. It was he who got me to thinking about a documentary giving a non-New York audience a chance to see it the way he did. I know John Epperson (who does drag as Lypsynka), and between he and Alexis (whose drag name is Eva Destruction), I got to the Lady Bunny, who was one of the founders of Wigstock."

Enter now The Lady Bunny, a chubby, cheerful fellow somewhere in his mid-to-late 30's, from Wilmington, North Carolina, who declines to give her real name (or age). S/he tells how Wigstock came to be: "I am a drag artiste. I love it. I think we're just following in the footsteps of The Founding Fathers of the USA — they wore wigs, and I wanted to carry on a rich tradition. Just kidding! Nah, we wanted to showcase the drag acts who were popular at the Pyramid Club (then a world-famous Manhattan drag/rock spot).

In 1984, what happened was, we were drinking one night at Pyr. When it closed at 4am, a group of us weren't ready to stop drinking, so we grabbed a few six-packs and ran across the street to Thompkins Square Park (in the East Village) and starting clowning around on the bandstand, and we thought, 'Hey! What if we got all of us together and did this as a major party'? It might have faded with the next day's hangover, but it didn't, and we went out and obtained the permits from city, held several benefits to pay for the sound system, and booked the entertainment."

Wigstock was an instant success, bringing in as many as 30,000 spectators who watch the event for free. "There's such a wide variety of acts at Wigstock, that even if you hate someone, they'll be replaced within five minutes by someone else different. There are drags who impersonate

existing stars, those who lip-sync, and bonafide recording acts like Deborah Harry, Crystal Waters, RuPaul, and Cindy Wilson of B-52s. We try to make it a party atmosphere: light,

non-political, fun.

So what's the incredible energy behind this drag phenomenon? The Lady Bunny has been doing drag since before she came New York in 1984. "Drag has come in and out of popularity over the years, and the current revival migh be the sinking in of the sexual revolution of the '60s and '70s We're still examining alternative sexual roles, like 'house-husband', and as we become more sexually liberated Drag is one of the last taboos, one of the last stigmas to be lifted.

As entertainment, drag is a real theatrical device, larger than life, often comic. It's been around since theater began: Kabuki, Ancient Greece, Shakespearean England, Weimar Republic. It's entertaining." As for the Lady herself, "just like wearing women's clothiers; there's something in me which needs to express itself in women's clothes. Thank Got I found an audience for it!"

There has been a phenomenal growth in the Festival's ten years of life, and Bunny couldn't be happier with the fact of the documentary. "There's no doubt that the film will help attendance. It's going to screen at both Sundance and at the Berlin Film Festival. It's gonna be Outta Control! We'll need a jumbotron video-screen so everyone can see." This fall, the Festival will be back at the Westside/Christopher Street Pier.

One of the ways they've encouraged audiences is to invite them to arrive in full drag-costume or wearing a wig. That plus the fact that it takes place on Labor day weekend, which "gives everyone an excuse to have an end-of-summer blowout, before we go back to school, or before we bring in

the crops," saith the Lady B.

Director Shils was able to get hold of some early video-footage of the Festival from the estate of the late Tom Rubintz, a video artist who died from AIDS four years ago. "Tom was a talented artist who had made a 20-minute video of the early years of Wigstock (1985-86) which was quite a bit more than a home video. I incorporated some of his imagery in the first few minutes for a historical distance (the black & white material at the start of the film.)

He'd worked with Bunny, trying to mount a drag show on (America) cable TV. But they're all so conservative

here, even the Gay people who produce for cable. Still, the independent distributors have become aware of the diverse audience available, so I got a private investor two years ago, a straight married couple I've known for years who knew my work as a film maker."

There is a wide variety of acts, under the producership of Scott Lifshutz and Lady Bunny: "the Diva and the Painter," as director Shils describes them. "There are so many: Wendy Wild, who does her act with an IV bottle as she's suffering from cancer, was also one of the originators, along with John Sex, now dead, who did a New Wave Elvis-type act. But most were Gay drag queens.

Bunny is a hair-brained honey, with the perseverance and vision to make it happen every year. I love Wigstock because it's a festive, celebratory event. In fact, it's incredibly cross- cultural: grandparents, children, families as well as we Gays. We get Blacks and Latinos, and never have any troubles from the audiences. It's like they're on Xtasy—not that they're ALL on it, although we do see a fair amount of intoxicants from the crowd. Priscilla, Queen of the Desert used the slogan: 'Drag is the Drug,' and it's true."

While there are some straights involved in Wigstock, the event certainly springs from the Gay community. Some of the participants in the film, which was shot during the 1993 and 1994 celebrations, include Lady Kier from a rock band, DEEE-LITE, which, according to Shil, were Inspired by drag queens. Jackie Beat and Alexis Arquette, from Los Angeles, are profiled in the docu in an amusing manner. "I don't think you'll see another movie with a cast of thousands, most of them drag-queens. I wanted to make a film which was a spectacle of drag. It's about talented, funny, performers, who can sing and dance. These gals are leaders in the Gay community


Like Mistress Formika, or the Lady Bunny, who is very much not an in-your-face political act. She loves raunchy jokes, especially scatological humor. I filmed 40 hours of material because I wanted to make a movie which could bring things to you which you might not see in person. It's a celebration of life and of freedom of expression. I love that you can put on a wig and heels — anything which will make you have a good time. I love the glamour, humor and

the gender-bending. It's the kind of all-around film, that when we showed to a preppy audience in Georgetown, during the Washington, D.C. Film Festival, they were 80% straight, and they loved the film!"



The Milwaukee segment includes interviews with two couples, Ray Jivoff and Michael Wright who work in the theater, and Jessica and Christie Banike-Palm. In the Life cameras went out to Wick Field for the Lesbian Alliance's softball game, and a spirited group of Milwaukee dykes even sing the Laverne and Shirley theme song.

Also in the June episode is an interview with Patrick Stewart, Captain Picard of Star Trek: The Next Generation, who will be starring as a Gay interior decorator in the upcoming movie comedy Jeffrey, and Dan Butler, who plays "Bulldog Briscoe" on TV's Frasier. Butler has just been named the new spokesman for National Coming Out Day and is currently starring in his one-man show, The Only Thing Worse You Could Have Told Me....

In the Life profiles openly Gay/Lesbian politicians in San Francisco, including Roberta Achterberg who is running for mayor. A preview of this summer and fall's Gay movies, including The Incredibly True Adventures of Two Girls in Love and Love and Human Remains, is also featured.

Two Videos on Gays and Religion Available

Warwick, NY — Two new videos which deal with Gays, spirituality and homophobia — Eve's Daughters and Maybe We're Talking About a Different God — are now available for purchase.

Eve's Daughters is a half-hour documentary about five women who are attempting to heal the separation between sexuality and spirituality in a religious tradition which views being

female and homosexual as a "moral evil."

The women discuss their paths to freedom after fusing their bodies and souls.

"This stunning film about five powerfully loving, creative Lesbian women should make every Gay or Lesbian Christian proud and most denominational leaders bow their heads in shame," says Carter Heyward. "It's a beautifully made video that manages to portray the movement of the spirit transforming the Church."

Maybe We're Talking About a Different God tells the compelling story of the Rev. Jane Adams Spahr, a Lesbian minister called to lead a large church in Rochester, NY. Her appointment was vehemently protested by other churches in the area and Rev. Spahr was put on trial. The half-hour video shows the struggle of ordinary people coming to terms with their homophobia. A discussion guide is included.

Gay Film Projects Awarded Big Grants

St. Paul, MN — Two projects dealing with Gay/Lesbian issues are among the 12 film productions to receive grants from the Independent Television Service (ITVS), which helps underwrite independent productions for public television. Among previous grantees was the award-winning Coming Out Under Fire about Gay service members in World War II.

Su Friedrich, an independent Lesbian filmmaker in New York, won a grant for her project Bedtime Stories, which combines interviews, school hygiene films and pop TV scenes in a coming- of-age/coming out story. Friedrich has previously made First Comes Love, Rules of the Road and Lesbian Avengers Eat Fire, Too.

Paris Poirier, who created the documentary Last Call at Maud's about the legendary San Francisco Lesbian bar, won a grant for a project called Pride Divide. It will explore the historically separated spheres between the Gay and Lesbian communities and how, from the 1940's to the present, the gap between Gay men and Lesbians has affected their common struggle for equality in society at large.

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Language Lover

Talking with Author Leslea Newman

Versatile Lesbian author Leslea Newman has an astounding 27 books under contract at age 39. She has written novels, short story collections, poetry books, essays, children's books and even a young adult novel all with great skill. The reviews of this multiple Lambda Literary Award nominee have been consistently good and offers keep coming. Some of the most popular titles by this dynamic woman include A Letter to Harvey Milk, In Every Laugh a Tear, Good Enough to Eat, Secrets, Sweet Dark Places, and Gloria Goes to Gay Pride. Alyson's publication of Heather Has Two Mommies, which she jokingly refers to as her "problem child," catapulted Leslea into a maelstrom of controversy which she has weathered quite nicely. She is busier and more determined than ever and active in just as many areas. Recently we had a chance to talk. What struck me most was her incredible level of energy and enthusiasm.

Owen: You have such varied writing experiences, novels, short stories, poetry, children's, young adults, were you ever tempted to do a stage adaptation yourself?

Leslea: I've written a one act-play that was produced. It was very exciting. As a writer I'm usually just sitting in a room by myself. There was a cast party and all these great things. I love the theater, but I don't know it as well as need to be a playwright.

A "Letter to Harvey Milk" was also made into a Canadian film?

It's interesting to see the different directions it has gone. It was a film Yariv Kohn did for his BFA, his thesis. It's been shown in Gay and Lesbian film festivals and Jewish film festivals.

The plot concerns the friendship that develops between a young Lesbian teacher and an elderly gentleman student after he writes a letter to Harvey Milk as his class assignment. If you were given the same assignment, what dead person would you write and what would your letter say?

I would definitely write to my grandmother who I write to or about all the time.

A sort of trans-generational understanding is also a recurring theme of yours. Is that the root of it?

Definitely. Actually, the character of Harry Weinberg is very loosely based on my grandmother. I wanted to transgender him into a woman, but it just didn't happen. He was clearly a man as soon as I started writing his diaries. I wrote that story because my grandmother wouldn't tell me her stories because they were too painful. I felt I had to write them down anyway as best I could. At 99, in the last year of her life, she did tell me her stories. It became the backbone of my novel in In Every Laugh A Tear.

Other generations also motivate you. Give me your take on the "Heather Has Two Mommies" story.

I wrote the book in 1988 because I was walking down the street and a woman I knew stopped me and said, "My lover and I just started a family and we have no books to read our daughter. We need someone to write one." It made me think about growing up as a Jewish child and having no books about being Jewish. Even though I was in a Jewish neighborhood, I would always read about Santa Claus and the Easter Bunny and all of that. All I knew at the time was that I didn't see myself being reflected anywhere. So the request of this woman really resonated with me. I wrote the book and couldn't find a publisher, so I published it along with a friend wanting only to get back the money I put into the project. Six months later Sasha Alyson of Alyson Publications bought the book out from us. Then things really started going haywire with the Rainbow Curriculum in New York City and anti-Gay movements in Colorado and Oregon, where the book was used to depict the degeneration of society. It was good for book sales, but hard for me emotionally. I had never really experienced homophobia directed right at me like that. Had I known better I wouldn't have gone on talk shows or been on panels where the sponsors felt they had to be "fair" and give air time to bigots.

With "Heather," do you think most of the controversy arose from the Lesbianism that's from Alyson. I also have two books I've edited coming out, one is called The Femme Mystique and it's about femmes. The other is called Bearing the Unbearable, and it's about losing loved ones to AIDS. In 1996 I have two books lined up from In Step ▼ June 22-July 5, 1995 ▼ Page 32



or from the inclusion of artificial insemination in the text?

I've thought about this a lot. If someone had said "the book is fine, it's just that one page," I'd happily have gone to the publisher and see if we couldn't do another Heather without the artificial insemination. That didn't happen, the artificial insemination was not the problem, it was the icing on the cake, the cake was the problem. Most people who had a hard time with the book never read it.

Yeah, I read some of those clippings and it's obvious they have no idea what they're talking about. Some of your forthcoming books are children's titles from Clarion, a branch of large publishing house Houghton Mifflin. Are they open to the inclusion of Gay children's titles?

The first of my children's books that they took, Too Far Away to Touch, is about a little girl whose favorite uncle is a man with AIDS. It's a picture book for children 4-8. My editor fell in love with the story and didn't back down on anything, even the inclusion of the man's lover. I was more nervous than the publishers. They had never heard of Heather Has Two Mommies, and it got to the point where I was almost talking them out of it saying, "I'm a really controversial writer, you may be firebombed, are you sure you want me?" The other two Clarion books aren't Gay, they're Jewish picture books. One is called Remember This and it is about a little girl and her Bubbe. The other is Matzo Ball Moon and it's a Passover story.

You also have a young adult novel coming out called "Fat Chance." Is that a difficult age group to write for?

It was actually the easiest book I've ever written which was a little frightening

because it's told in diary form. I became a 13-year old keeping a diary. It came so naturally to me that I began to wonder about my own emotional state.

Besides all of this, you also conduct writing workshops and have written the nonfiction book, "Writing From the Heart," as well. What's the most essential thing to remember when sitting down to write?

Believe in yourself. Take yourself seriously. Make a commitment to yourself, write everyday. And don't expect anything from anyone.

Do you have a strong sense of operating within a Gay and Lesbian literary community? Absolutely.

Given your many titles, is there a message that transcends all of it, the sort of essence of your work?

There are definitely themes I write about a lot, sexuality, Jewish identity, I think mostly I write about self-identity. Because the message in my books is pretty much what I said to you, "Believe in yourself, your voice has power."

Going back to your mention of Jewish identity, what do you see as common in the Jewish Lesbian experience?

Well, in my own upbringing my grandmothers were the backbone of my family. It was very clear that the matriarchal lineage is important. There were strong women everywhere. My mother and my aunts, biological and chosen, had the most intense relationships. It was clearly the most important thing to them. I was raised to question things, to educate myself, and to go for what I wanted. So I did that, but not in the way my parents expected me to, so at some point it wasn't a good thing anymore.

You've also written extensively on women's body perception, namely with your book "SomeBody to Love." Why is dieting the most difficult thing you've ever given up?

When I talk about identity, my first, aside from being female, was of being fat. It's something I had as a defining fact of existence. When I pictured myself as a little girl I had no idea what I looked like, but I do know it was the image I carried with me. It defined everything I did, not only what I ate, but who I hung out with, what I wore, what activities I participate in, everything came from that one fact. I developed an eating disorder which I had for 15 years and haven't had now for 12 years. Our culture just infuses girls from pretty much day one with you have to be thin. No matter what else you do in life you must be thin. When I stopped dieting I said, "I refuse to accept this message." It was a rebellion on many levels for me. I would still say it's definitely the hardest thing I've ever done.

Tell me about the projects you have

forthcoming.

This fall I have Fat Chance, my young adult novel, coming out from Putnam. I have a book of short stories called Every Woman's Dreams from New Victoria. I have two children's books, Too Far Away Too Touch, from Clarion, and Felicia's Favorite Story, which is about an interracial Lesbian couple who adopt a little girl, and that's from Alyson. I also have two books I've edited coming out, one is called The Femme Mystique and it's about femmes. The other is called Bearing the




Unbearable, and it's about losing loved ones to AIDS. In 1996 I have two books lined up from Clarion, Remember That and Matzo Ball Moon.

Newman's Newest

Too Far Away To Touch

Too Far Away To Touch by Leslea Newman with Illustrations by Catherine Stock Clarion Books HC \$14.95

Leslea Newman is a very talented and prolific author of more than 15 books for adults, and also for children. Perhaps her most famous work is the classic, Heather Has Two Mommies. In her latest title for children, Too Far Away To Touch, Newman tackles the very difficult subject of children facing the death of a close relative due to AIDS.

This deceptively simple and moving story focuses on the relationship of a little girl named Zoe and her Uncle Leonard. Uncle Leonard is Zoe's special, favorite relative, who takes her to all kinds of interesting and exciting places. But Uncle Leonard is sick.

Still, Uncle Leonard takes Zoe to the Planetarium and then surprises her by pasting glow-in-the dark stars on her bedroom ceiling. The stars are meant to represent to Zoe that no matter what happens to Uncle Leonard, he will always be a part of her life. While the stars may be too far to touch, they will always be close enough to see.

Newman's eloquent story is a moving portrayal of a young child facing the probable loss of a one to a serious, fatal disease — AIDS. Although AIDS is specifically mentioned within the content of the story, Newman's text makes Too Far Away To Touch most effective reading for any child with a friend or family member suffering from any lifethreatening illness.

Too Far Away is very refreshing in its honesty and integrity. At no point does Newman offer false hope or easy solutions. Very bluntly Zoe asks Uncle Leonard if he is going to die. He responds, "Everyone has to die sometime, Zoe. There is no cure for AIDS yet, so I may die soon. But I hope not."

Leslea Newman also simply and subtly includes the suggestion that Uncle Leonard is Gay. While patiently waiting for her Uncle Leonard's visit, Newman clearly expresses Zoe's expectation that Nathan would be coming along on their adventure. Later, while at the beach, Nathan is shown caring for Leonard in the fashion of a partner.

Never preachy or didactic, Too Far Away is Leslea Newman's storytelling at its best. Accompanied by Catherine Stock's luminous and evocative watercolors, it is an absolutely marvelous book. Highly Recommended.

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



I've forgiven TJ for being heterosexual. And she's absolved me of any responsibility to her around my particular life choices. Which is good, because we're really close friends.

We once were also business partners at a time when the financial ground under New England feet was crumbling. There wasn'tenough business to keep us in business. But, despite our differences, there was enough friendship to last.

She, her husband, and her two teenage-boy children left the state we were in and headed into Oregon. I headed to warm South Florida fortunes.

Now TJ visits us once a spring to get a tan. And to get her yearly fill of female. When you're surrounded by that much testosterone for fifty weeks, you're due a little estrogen relief. So TJ spends her days beaching, her evenings cooking us gourmet meals, none of which call for hot dogs or peanut butter as a key ingredient, and her nights talking women-stuff.

One outdoor afternoon on Ocean Avenue, feasting on Miami Beach warmth, the tourist array, and the hideously guilt-inducing satisfaction of News Cafe burgers and fries, I decided to talk Oregon. (Florida was facing a self-righteous religious fanatic attack and it's always helpful to get perspective from a winning arena.)

"So, what was the Oregon fight like from a straight person's perspective." I queried, mental note-pad poised for helpful hints on our local struggle. I didn't get any. Instead, I got umbrage.

"You can't do that to me!"

"Do what?"

"Ask me a question like that. It presumes that we're different. It separates us."

Phew! Hard to disagree on that. Haven't I spent hours of ink telling the "Thems" that we were just like them and they shouldn't treat us any differently?

But I realized then conversation that we are different. Not so much in sexual practice, as in survival practice. We, in circling our wagons, have crafted ourselves a culture. A Culture of Struggle. One that gives us common ground even in our fractioned diversity, a common perspective from which to voice our shared experiences, hopes and fear. When anyone asks what a Gay North

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Carolina Pig Farmer, and a New York City drag queen have in common, meaning "nothing," I say: "Lots!"

The differences aren't so much

genetic as societal.

I asked TJ if she knew who Kate Clinton was. Did she like to listen to Romanovsky & Phillips? Did June mean anything more to her than National Watermelon month? Had she heard of Stonewall? Read anything by Michelangelo Signorelli? Or Jewelle Gomez? Where had she put herself on the Kinsey scale? Had she considered weighing herself on such a scale? Could she recite the dialog from the movie, Lianna, by heart? Or seen Desert Hearts? If I referred to "the Cammemeyer kiss" would she know what I was talking about? Sure, she knew about Harvey Milk, but did the name David Kopay ring a bell? Did her magazine rack hold 10 Percent? Or Out? Or Lambda Book Report? Did San Francisco hold a special place in her heart for anything beyond dungeness crab and cable cars? Had she studied Loulan?

I didn't mean to exclude her, but as we talked, it became clear that there were differences in our lifestyles.

While we were swabbing our fries, we came to an understanding. It wasn't necessary for us to be exactly the same in order for us to share love, and honor. Our human qualities, the ones that were the same, like laughing and crying, and loving and dying, and most of the one-to-one emotional interactions in between, were enough to forge strong links. And that there was still sufficient space to allow for our diversity. That it was okay for us to be not- exactly-carbon-copies, because out of that difference could come respect.

I guess I hadn't thought of us like

that before. Not until TJ demanded that I not make myself different from her, did I began to examine the reality of our differences. The richness and value of a culture that I hope we're not willing to sacrifice in the name of assimilation. Someone asked Frank Browning if he thought that our culture could survive the success we seek. He said he didn't know, but that since he thought it would "take a couple of hundred years for us to achieve that success, what difference did it make? We'd all be gone by then."

If he'd have asked me, or TJ, after our afternoon on South Beach, I think we would have disagreed. We'd have said that it will be the combination of the richness of our cultural differences and similarities that will create the

acceptance we're after.

I can't wait till TJ's next visit. I know we're going to continue this conversation. And by then, I should have worked through enough cholesterol angst to order another burger. Her, too. It's something we have in common.



Shop or They'll Drop

It's not unusual for books and bookstores to be on my mind. I have been a bookaholic since an early age. As a toddler, when I disappeared from my mother's sight in a grocery store, I'm told she always knew where to find me: at the Little Golden Books display; I had my first library card at age 4, for which purpose I had expressly tormented my mother to teach me to write my name — a requirement for getting a card; and my grade-school summers were filled with trips to the library, in which I would check out as many books as the library allowed, read them, and return for more.

As soon as I entered adulthood, buying my own books became one of my greatest pleasures — so great, in fact, that it was a factor in creating my lentil-and-potatoes based diet: I would rather have a new book than a good meal and spent hours in my campus bookstore looking for just the right one. I could go on and on with this catalog of how much I love books and bookstores, but by now

you've surely gotten the drift.

So as I say, books and bookstores are often on my mind. But lately, the subject of bookstores has loomed particularly large: the bookstores that I love in a most personal way — the women's bookstore and the Gay & Lesbian bookstore — are endangered species: stores like Barnes & Noble, Borders, and Crown are squeezing the little independents out, with their huge advertising budgets, their ability (because of the volume of books they buy) to undercut independent bookseller prices, and their numerous, and therefore convenient locations.

It used to be that Gay-and-Lesbian type bookstores were more safe from this than were other small stores because the chains didn't carry queer books, and so Gay and Lesbian booksellers had their own little niche carved out. But ever since people have discovered that Gays and Lesbians have money to spend, myriad folks among them have gotten over their distaste for us enough to try to sell us their wares. So publishing houses and book chains are all of a sudden dealing heavily in Gay and Lesbian literature.

Never mind the fact that, if it ever becomes unprofitable, the big name folks will drop us like empty candy wrappers without so much as a thought; there are some very important things you just can't find at these chains, even now. First and foremost, as my girlfriend put it, I want to In Step * June 22-July 5, 1995 * Page 44

go to a bookstore where everyone knows my name. While we seldom eat pretzels there and while bar stools are not in abundance, it is very *Cheers*-like, with the same cast of regular characters always working and shopping there, and all of us there for the great company and to nurture our addiction to the written word. Yvonne! they yell when I come into the store, and I know I am among friends.

But tell me this: when you're shopping at those big name bookstores, do they ever do any of these things for you: 1) tell you when a new book has come in by your favorite author? 2) Inquire after your girlfriend's health? 3) Let you shop with your girlfriend's credit card, and laugh at you when you offer to show them a note from her, giving permission? 4) Spend long spans of time with you, helping you find books that they think you'll enjoy? 5) Offer to get a book signed for you by that visiting author so you don't have to stand in line for an hour? 6) Take your check without requesting enough ID to get you a security clearance at the Pentagon? 7) Chat with you about their lovers and children, your job, your cat, your garden — in other words, interact with you in a personal and caring way?

The independent booksellers I frequent have done all of these things and more. For instance, I don't care how many times I've browsed at the Crown Bookstore down the street — they never once offered to lend me money in my poorer days. My friends at the women's bookstore did that for me. Never once have they called out my name when I entered the store, and never once did they give my girlfriend a promotional t-shirt for one of her favorite authors because it was her birthday. Our friends

at the Gay and Lesbian bookstore have

Of course the "services" I just mentioned are not regular features of the independent bookstore's business practice. I'm just saying that the folks in these stores have the potential to be much more than nameless, ever-changing clerks. To their loyal and/or frequent customers, they can become friends, happy to see you, even if you're not buying a book each and every time you enter their store. At Barnes and Nobel, not only do they not know me, but I never recognize any of them as having been there from one visit to the next. Don't get me wrong: the staff at the chains are often helpful enough - as helpful as they can be, at any rate, when they don't know you or your taste in literature at all - but it's all just so impersonal.

Just in case my agenda isn't clear by now, let me close with this word from our sponsors, your local Gay-and-Lesbian-friendly bookstore. Sure it's tempting to save a buck or more on every book you buy. But ask yourself this: When the chains lose interest in us. will your little independent bookstore still be there to offer you books that speak to your life? Contemplating this question again in a more profound fashion than I ever have in the past, what with the current megastore climate sweeping the country and threatening small businesses of all kinds (witness, e.g., the Walmart phenomenon), I have personally pretty much forsworn the chain bookstores for good now. Oh sure, I'll drink the coffee at Barnes & Noble and I'll visit the new Borders bookstore downtown, just to glory in being in the presence of that many tomes. But I won't buy their books. Nobody there even knows my name.

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





column. But if enough of my friends write in, I'll give some pointers on sens-you-el-ee-tay.



In May, 1995, the fledgling company

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

The No Regrets safer sex pouch contains two lubricated latex condoms; one nonlubricated condom specifically designed for oral sex); one latex glove; two finger cots; one No Regrets Partner (a step-in latex shield for oral sex only); one dental dam; and two lubricating jelly packets. Each pouch also contains directions for the use of all enclosures and a reorder

Taylor is deeply committed to educating young people and at-risk populations on the prevention of STDs. She has volunteered at the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) for years and in 1994 was honored with a special award for her exceptional service.

In addition to heading Lil/Gra, Taylor worked at the Milwaukee County Jail as a staff nurse treating inmates with a variety of physical problems. The jail has a higher percentage of inmates with HIV and AIDS than most hospitals, generally because of unsafe behaviors — injecting drug users, sex industry workers, promiscuity, homelessness and the like. Taylor has taught classes with the staff of MAP to the Deputy Sheriffs at the Jail.

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

San Francisco, CA — The American Library Association's Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Book Awards Committee has chosen the winners of this year's Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Book Awards. The winners are Dorothy Allison's Skin: Talking About Sex, Class & Literature and Phillip Sherman's and Samuel Bernstein's Uncommon Heroes: A Celebration of Heroes and Role Models for Gay and Lesbian Americans.

New York, NY — Meredith Monk, the Lesbian composer, choreographer, theatrical director and filmmaker, has been awarded a prestigious "Genius" grant from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. Monk received a \$315,000 no- strings-attached grant.

Washington, DC — Arthur Kropp, the President of People for the American Way, a 300,000-member civil liberties group that has championed civil rights for Gays and Lesbians, died of AIDS complications June 12. He was 37. Kropp led the liberal group in the fight against Robert Bork's nomination to the US Supreme Court and in support of the Civil Rights Act of 1991. People for the American Way monitors the Christian Right closely and publishes detailed reports about its activities.

San Antonio, TX — Dennis Rodman of the San Antonio Spurs, who dates Madonna, told Sports Illustrated recently: "I visualize being with another man. Everybody visualizes being Gay. They think, 'Should I do it or not?' The reason they can't is because they think it's unethical. They think it's a sin... You're not bad if you're Gay, and it doesn't make you less of a person."

Hobson, AL — On May 15, a fire gutted the building which housed rural Alabama's only AIDS clinic. The five-year-old AIDS Services Center near Anniston, which served 200 people in surrounding counties, was completely destroyed. Police have confirmed that the fire was intentionally lit, but that haven't arrested anyone yet for arson.
