Gov. Thompson Urged to Veto Cuts in AIDS Life Care Grant US Senate Sets Floor Action on Ryan White Bill

Madison - AIDS activists and service groups throughout Wisconsin are urging Gov. Tommy Thompson to veto a budget provision which will reduce the state's Life Care Services grant. Instead of a 7% increase over funding in the last biennial, the grant will only increase by 3-4%.

The Life Care Services grant (a total of about \$1.7 million in each of the next two years) funds the social workers and case managers at all AIDS service groups in Wisconsin. The reduction in funds for these critical services comes at a time when the caseload of people with HIV/ AIDS is expected to increase by 20% in the next few years.

Initial action by the legislature's Joint Finance Committee in May had increased the grant by 7%. But in the final budget bill, the Life Care Services grant was reduced by \$37,500 in each of the next two fiscal years. In addition, the legislature has cut the same amount of money each year from a federal grant intended for AIDS prevention services. Doug Nelson of the AIDS Resource Center of Milwaukee is confident that these monies from a federal block grant cannot be used for other purposes and will eventually be restored.

Although both Nelson and State Rep. Tammy Baldwin urged concerned people to contact the governor's office, they had positive words for the bipartisan support AIDS issues have generally received in the Wisconsin state legislature.

Unlike fierce battles in other states and in the US Congress, "We are fortunate that, thus far, in Wisconsin, AIDS funding has not vet become a highly bipartisanized issue," Baldwin told In Step.

Of the initial decision by the legislature's Joint Finance Committee to increase the Life Care Services grant by 7%, Nelson said: "In a political climate characterized by the slashing of all sorts of of social programs, we were heartened to see such an overwhelming expression of support for providing continued care for people with HIV disease."

AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL

Meanwhile in Washington, Senate majority Leader Bob Dole announced that he would bring the Ryan White CARE (Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency) Act Re-Authorization bill to the floor for consideration July 24.

Sen. Jesse Helms has threatened a filibuster of the bill, but there are now 64 co-sponsors of the bill in the Senate, enough to head-off any parliamentary maneuvers by the notoriously anti-Gay North Carolina Republican, CARE Act supporters now include even conservatives like Strom Thurmond (R-SC).

Helms recently ignited a firestorm of criticism when he said that federal funding for AIDS should be reduced because people with AIDS contract the disease through "deliberate, disgusting, revolting conduct."

"We've got to have some common sense about a disease transmitted by people deliberately engaging in unnatural acts," Helms told the press. Helms also claimed that more money went to AIDS research and treatment than any other disease - which is false. The Public Health Service reports that total annual federal outlays for heart disease stand at \$36.3 billion. For cancer, it's \$16.9 billion, while current AIDS spending stands at \$6 bil-


"Helms' comments are symbolic of complete ignorance, and are enormously destructive of public policy," Doug Nelson told In Step: "Fortunately, his voice is in the minority in Congress."

While Nelson is confident that the Ryan White CARE Act is now "filibusterproof," he said the battle will be to prevent any negative amendments from being attached to the bill.

AIDS activists will also be busy doing damage control in the House of Representatives where a House Appropriations Subcommittee voted to eliminate the federal government's budget for AIDS research.

The Subcommittee voted along party lines (8 Republicans to 5 Democrats) to gut the Office of AIDS Research at the National Institutes of Health and cut \$1.4 billion targeted for AIDS research in fiscal year 1996. The proposal must still go through the full Appropriations Committee and then be agreed to by the Senate.

A spokeswoman for the Human Rights Campaign Fund said that with AIDS now the leading killer of all Americans between 25 and 44, "This is not the time to retreat on AIDS."



NGLTF Report Tracks Pro- and Anti-Gay Efforts in State Legislatures

Progress Achieved Despite Growing Attacks

Washington, DC – A new report issued by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) reveals that anti-Gay attacks through state legislation were pervasive during 1995 legislative sessions and are on the increase. But LesBiGay organizers are adapting to the changing political climate and defeated many anti-Gay measures, while pursuing limited advances toward non-discrimination.

Beyond the Beltway: State of the States, 1995 is NGLTF's first annual state-by-state survey of Gay-related legislation that moved forward during the past year's sessions. As such, it offers a picture of where LesBiGay political organizing stands at this particular time in history and reveals where the challenges lay for the near future.

Beyond the Beltway reports that 30 states were the sites of anti-Gay measures, while 18 states advanced non-discrimination measures that include sexual orientation in some way.

Many of the anti-Gay measures advanced this year focussed on the areas of family and education – curtailing rights to adoption and foster care and mandating only negative references to Gay-related issues and individuals through the educational system.

"The Radical Right is successfully exploiting emotional flashpoints around children in the context of family and education," Robert Bray of NGLTF commented. "These are areas where myths and misinformation about child abuse, parenting abilities and the existence of diverse family structures ignite fears and inspire extremist legislation."

This past year also saw a number of measures advanced to permit statewide ballot referenda in those states which do not currently have a mechanism for voter initiatives. These measures are frequently supported by anti-Gay Radical Right activists, who have begun a national campaign of both state and local anti-Gay ballot measures.

ON THE PLUS SIDE...

Most of the non-discrimination measures that moved forward included sexual orientation in a broader list of other characteristics. Many of these clauses were included in hate crimes and health and insurance-related legislation.

"Years and years of organizing and education on the issues of AIDS and anti-Gay violence has clearly paid off," Bray said.

One state, Rhode Island, became the ninth in the union to adopt a law prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing, credit and public accommodations.

"Rhode Island served as an inspiration to the rest of the country, where activists were frequently under assault by the Radical Right," Bray said. "It was encouraging to see a state take an important step toward valuing all citizens equally, even in the face of vicious anti-Gay maneuvers to kill the bill."

Of a total of 97 Gay-related (pro- and anti-) measures introduced across the US, 15 had been signed by governors as of mid-July. Of those, 6 were anti-Gay (although Montana's was stripped of anti-Gay language prior to passage); 1 was a non-discrimination measure specifically mentioning sexual orientation (the Rhode Island law); and 8 were non-discrimination measures that included sexual orientation in a broad list of categories (mainly related to hate crimes and health care).

"This survey documents what activists have been telling us all year – tha national climate of divisiveness and intolerance is playing itself out at the state and local level," Bray said. "Thankfully, Gay activists have risen to the occasion, frequently responding successfully to increased attacks even in states that have a limited history of Gay political organizing."

NATIONAL News Briefs

Rhode Island, Louisiana **Uphold Sodomy Laws**

Providence, RI - In May and June, the State Supreme Courts in Rhode Island and Louisiana upheld sodomy statutes, rejecting lower court rulings which called the laws unconstitutional invasions of privacy.

In Rhode Island, the state's high court ruled on the complicated case of a man, Jorge Lopes, who was initially exonerated of sexual assault charges but then prosecuted for sodomy. The lower court ruled in favor of Lopes, saving the state's statute against "abominable and detestable acts against nature," with jail terms of up to 20 years, was an invasion of privacy. Rhode Island remains the only New England state which outlaws sodomy (both heterosexual and homosexual).

In Louisiana, the case involved a man named Johnny Baxley, who was arrested for solicitaion to commit sodomy when he inadvertently propositioned and undercover officer. A lower court there found the law invaded Baxley's privacy and that it "discriminates against Gay men and Lesbians."

But in its May 22 decision, the Louisiana Supreme Court ruled that the law was "neutral" toward Gays and non-Gays, punishing both equally, and, quoting the 1986 Bowers v. Hardwick US Supreme Court ruling, said that a right to privacy regarding sodomy does not ex-

Since 1986, five state sodomy laws have been reversed. Today, 16 states have sodomy statutes that cover both homosexuals and heterosexuals, 6 states have homosexual sodomy laws only, and 28 states, including Wisconsin, are "free" states, without legal restrictions on sod-

Court OK's Adoption by Gay Couples in D.C.

Washington, DC - The Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia has ruled that the District's adoption law allows for the adoption of children by unmarried couples, both straight and Gay.

The 2-1 decision found that the District's law "expressly authorizes adoptions by any person without limitation" as long as that adoption is clearly in the best interests of the child. Judge John Ferren said that "Nothing in the legislative history can be said to exclude adoptions by unmarried couples."

The decision reversed a lower court ruling which found that although the Gay male couple was eminently qualified to adopt the 2-year-old girl in question, District law disallowed unmarried couples from adopting. But Judge Ferren wrote that the provisions of the statute "neither assuredly authorize adoptions by unmarried couples nor conclusively preclude them...We are satisfied that the paramount statutory purpose - the "best interests" of the adoptee - will be best served, and that no other affected interests protected by the statute will be ill served, by a liberal, inclusive interpretation of the [DC law]."

"Accordingly," Ferren concluded, "adoption petitions by unmarried couples shall be granted or rejected on a case-bycase basis in the best interests of the prospective adoptee."

Award-Winning Gay **Activist Shot in Detroit**

Detroit, MI - A veteran Gay activist who was presented with a lifetime achievement award at a Gay and Lesbian Pride event in Detroit June 15 was shot in the offices of the Triangle Foundation two weeks later.

Dr. Henry D. Messer, 67, is recovering fom a bullet wound to the abdomen. The assailants first entered the Triangle Foundation's office, inquiring about the group. They later returned and, in an apparent robbery attempt, scuffled with Messer. Dr. Messer managed to brush the gun away, avoiding a bullet to the head.

Jeffrey Montgomery, President of the Foundation, said of Dr. Messer: "He remained conscious during the whole thing. And he gave directions to the EMS crew."

Dr. Messer, a retired neurosurgeon, is a pioneering Gay activist who was forced to resign his commission as an Air Force captain in 1953 because of his homosexuality. He was involved early on in New York's Mattachine Society and helped organize the first efforts to pass a civil rights law protecting Gays in New York City 25 years ago. Since his move to Michigan with his partner of 43 years, Dr. Messer has worked for Gay rights groups

When he accepted his "lifetime achievement" award, Dr. Messer told the crowd: "Wait a minute - my lifetime ain't over yet." He was right.

"Dildos for Sale, Not Dildos in Jail!"

Atlanta, GA - Southern Voice reports that in June, Atlanta police descended on six stores, two of them frequented by Gays and Lesbians, and confiscated dildos and arrested store employees. It is a crime in Georgia to sell items whose major purpose is to stimulate the genital area.

On the day that the 15 people arrested were arraigned in court, members of the activist groups Lesbian Avengers and Queer Planet held a raucous protest in front of police headquarters, chanting: "Dildos for sale, not dildos in jail!" and "Don't waste time, sex is not a crime!" The Avengers were joined by their new "Ladies Auxiliary" - men in drag.

In court, charges against store employees were dropped. But three store owners entered guilty pleas and were fined \$500 for running a "disorderly house." One store owner decided to fight the charge, while charges against two others were dropped.

The recent dildo raids are apparently part of a wider crackdown on alleged "vice" activities by Atlanta police, who have also stepped up undercover patrols of Gay cruising areas. Joe DeRose of Queer Planet told Southern Voice: "To prioritize [dildo sales] in the same week that Atlanta was named the third most dangerous city in America is absurd, and it is unacceptable."

Coors Extends Benefits to **Gay Partners**

Golden, CO - Coors, the brewing company which has alienated many Gays for its Foundation's support of anti-Gay causes, recently announced that it is extending full benefits to the domestic partners of all unmarried employees - including Gays and Lesbians.

In a letter to In Step, Earl Nissen, a Coors Community Relations Specialist, declared that the recent policy change puts Coors among the top 20 most progressive companies in the country in the area of Gay and Lesbian employee benefits. Coors now has: a written non-discrimination policy; benefits for domestic partners, diversity training; an organized and recognized Gay and Lesbian employee group; and support for employees with HIV/AIDS.

NATIONAL News Briefs

The proposal to extend partner benefits came from the Gay/Lesbian employee group called LAGER – Lesbian and Gay Resource Group. The Board of Coors approved the change in May and announced it to employees in June. The benefits package includes health and life insurance policies, pensions and other benefits.

"We applaud the victory LAGER has won, and think it is a great step forward for Coors Brewery employees," Kerry Lobel of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force told the New York Times. "However, we are still concerned aout the relationship between the Coors Brewing Company, the Coors Family Foundation and members of the Coors family who fund social policies that are not in the interests of Gays and Lesbians in this country."

San Francisco School Board Retains JROTC

San Francisco, CA – After hours of public testimony and heated debate, the San Francisco Board of Education voted to continue supporting the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) programs that operate in the city's high schools. By a 4-3 vote, Board members defeated a resolution that would have phased out the military programs and replaced them with non-violent and non-homophobic alternatives.

Specifically, the failed resolution would have created a task force "to develop alternative, creative, career-driven programs which provide students with a greater sense of purpose and respect for self and humankind." The existing JROTC programs have been repeatedly faulted for promoting homophobia, racism and physical violence."

Several pro-JROTC Board members attempted to argue that the program does not, in fact, discriminate.

"That is utter nonsense," Laurie Falik of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation declared. "The history of JROTC s a clear history of homophobic indoctrination. The JROTC programs are an agency of the Department of Defense and are bound by the DOD's discriminatory policies."

Survey Reveals One Third of Americans Support Same Gender Marriage

New York, NY – In a telephone survey of 1,000 voters nationwide, 33% of respondents agreed with the statement: "If two people love each other, they should be able to get married even if they are of the same sex." Sixty-three percent disagreed. The margin of error is 3 percentage points.

Young voters, those with higher incomes, and those with more education were more likely to be in favor of equal marriage rights, according to the June survey conducted by EPIC-MRA Mitchell Research, a polling firm in Michigan.

"This survey offers an encouraging snapshot of the country's support for our freedom to marry," said Evan Wolfson of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund. "Despite a lack of visibility of Gay and Lesbian relationships, and of the ways that Gay people are denied myriad protections and benefits as a result of being unable to marry, a large percentage of voters understand that marriage ought to be available to same-gender couples. The poll results tell us that Lesbians and Gay men can win the right to marry if everyone does their part in educating the public."

Also on the Newswire...

New York – On June 22, Gay activists attending a dinner sponsored by the HUman Rights campaign Fund near Lincoln Center were met by Transgender protesters. Members of Transsexual Menace object to the exclusion of transgender people in the Employment Non-Discrimination Act before Congress. HRCF is working for its passage.

Richmond, VA – The Supreme Court of Virginia has rejected a request to rehear the case of Sharon Bottoms, who had her son, Tyler, taken from her because she is a Lesbian. The child is likely to remain permanently in the custody of his grandmother, who had sued for custody, claiming her daughter was unfit. The US Supreme Court is unlikely to take the case, as it generally defers to state courts on issues of family law.

Morgantown, WV – West Virginia University's extending limited benefits to the same-gender partners of students and employees. The benefits will include use of university recreational and library facilities, campus day care and scholarships for partners' children.

Los Angeles, CA – Tennis champ Martina Navratilova recently told TV Guide that her Lesbianism has definitely reduced her ability to get advertising and promotional contracts. "I was marketable to the corporate world in every way but one. And although I don't regret being Gay, I regret that you have to hide in the closet to sell yourself to Madison Avenue." But with print ads for a computer company and being hired by HBO as commentator at this year's Wimbledon matches, "maybe I finally sort of won people over," she said.

New York, NY – Hill & Knowlton, one of most successful public relations and ad agencies in the world, has formed a unit to do direct marketing to the Gay and Lesbian community. Fourteen employees at the firm's seven offices worldwide will dedicate their talents to capturing the Gay and Lesbian markets for clients.

Washington, DC - The Navy has decided to allow openly Lesbian Reserve Lieutenant Zoe Dunning to remain in the service. Navy Secretary John Dalton upheld the decision of a board of inquiry, which agreed with Dunning that acknowledging her sexuality did not violate the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy.

Omaha, NE – Phil Owen, a campus minister who has been openly Gay since 1980, has been ordained as a United Church of Christ pastor. "He will make a very good pastor," Rev. Lee Miiligan, a church official told the Associated Press. "I am proud to have him as a colleague."

New Orleans, LA – Ronald Graves has been sentenced to life in prison for the Gay-bashing murder of Joseph Balog. Balog was stabbed in the back six times during the murderous encounter in the French Quarter in 1993. At the sentencing, the victim's father, William, argued against the death penalty: "There's been enough killing here."

Washington, DC – The Christian Coalition has refused a request for dialogue with the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the nation's largest Gay and Lesbian rights group. "I'm disappointed that the Christian Coalition seems to be more interested in dividing the nation than in building bridges," said HRCF's Elizabeth Birch.



Comic Not Funny

Ms. Bo Black, Mr. Bob Babisch:

I attended Gilbert Gottfried's 8:45p.m. performance at the Comedy Stage [July 9] and was disappointed to hear him use a number of homophobic jokes regarding Gays in the military. The jokes went something like this:

"I think there should be homosexuals in the military. It would make the enemy run faster. I know I'd run faster. Any guy would. The enemy can stand having grenades thrown at him, but flowers?"

I'm not a big fan of political correctness, and I don't believe anyone is above being a target of legitimate satire, but that's not what his material sounded like to me. It sounded just like simple pandering to hurtful stereotypes. He probably thought it was an easy way to get some cheap laughs – which some in the audience provided him. I find it really reprehensible for a performer to profit from promoting and reinforcing stereotypes which he probably knows are untrue.

It's disheartening to hear a nationally known performer of some stature use material like that. It hurts even more to hear it at an event in which we Milwaukeeans take a great deal of pride and look upon as a positive reflection of our community. I don't really believe that Summerfest supports the use of this type of material by your performers. I know there's no way you can prevent stuff like this from being performed. However, I would really like to hear your reaction to this and learn how you might let Mr. Gottfried and other performers know that this is not acceptable material for Summerfest...I'm sure that others in the Gay and Lesbian community as well as the general community at large will be interested in your answer as well.

Milwaukee's lakefront festivals and the downtown flags promoting them are making a great statement for celebrating diversity, and I think we can take a lot of pride in them. I hope Summerfest's reaction to Gilbert Gottfried's performance will be one that the city will be proud of as well



St. Pat's Parade Ruling No Defeat for LesBiGays

Possible Advantages in Decision

The US Supreme Court recently decided that Irish veterans in Boston may keep a LesBiGay group out of the veterans annual St. Patrick's Day Parade. Understandably, many Lesbians and Gay men assumed the decision was a defeat. However, a close look shows that far from a defeat the case may prove to be a significant help in our fight for equality.

There are four positive things in the decision. First, the court said that generally speaking, laws prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation are constitutional. Since this really was not an issue in the case, the court had to go well out of its way to say that. This part of the decision will greatly assist us in defending discrimi-nation laws which protect us against attacks from the radi-

cal right

Much more subtle but also helpful is the respectful treatment which the court gave the LesBiGay Irish group, typically referring to its members as "Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual individuals." The de-meaning language of previous decisions involving Lesbians and Gay men, which helped set a tone of hostility toward us in federal courts generally, is completely absent. This may help us to begin setting a new tone.

Third, the court said that by marching behind a banner identifying themselves as Lesbian or Gay, the Irish group was making a statement that there are Lesbians, Gay men and Bisexuals among the Irish, and that we "...have as much claim to unqualified social acceptance as heterosexuals..." This is quite close to what the Gay rights movement itself has been saying for years. Coming out of the closet is a political act, which makes the statement that we are everywhere and that we are entitled to equal treatment.

This decision lays the foundation for a freedom of speech defense for anyone who suffers at the hands of the government for coming out or for being openly Gay. That it is important for every Lesbian or Gay man to come out is our movement's first great truism. We keep hearing it because, relatively speaking, so few of us have been able to come out. The parade decision may make it easier by giving some legal protection to those who do.

THE BASIC PRINCIPLE

Finally, the basic principle of the decision will help Lesbians and Gay men. By the time the Boston parade case got to the Supreme Court, both the veterans and the Irish Lesbian/Gay group agreed that

the parade was not sponsored by the city. That was critically important. As the American Civil Liberties Union told the court in a "friend of the court" brief, if the parade were sponsored by the city, the first amendment would require that it accept all messages and allow the Gay

group to march.

But a private parade stands (or strides) on a different footing. Here, the question was whether the government could close the streets to a parade unless its sponsors agreed to accept a message they did not agree with. If the Supreme Court had decided that government could, this new power would have been used against us far more quickly and forcefully than it would have been used against our opponents. Indeed, in San Diego, a group identifying itself as "Normal People" has already sued for a place in that city's pride parade, claiming it is being excluded because of sexual orientation.

Some say that the San Diego Pride Parade is different, because there the two messages are inconsistent with the theme of a parade or demonstration. According to the court, the First Amendment says that decision belongs to the speaker, not to the government. Our own history with government power and its abuse should lead us to cheer that conclusion.

(Ed. Note: Attorneys for the "Normal People" group, bowing to the Supreme Court's decision and conceding the suit was without

merit, withdrew it in mid-July.)

The decision of the Boston veterans was stupid and cruel, stupid because it defies reality to pretend that there aren't Irish Lesbians, Gay men and Bisexuals, and cruel to maintain the pretence in the face of real humans who want to join the celebration. We should try to convince them to change that decision.

But if anyone should understand that it is a bad idea to use the coercive power of government to shape what a person wants to say, it is our community. The success our movement has depends on persuasion. We need the unfettered right to speak and shape our messages.

MASN Sponsors Skills Building Workshops in August

Madison – The Madison AIDS Support Network (MASN) and the AIDS Support Network (ASN) are sponsoring two one day skills building workshops on HIV/AIDS for service providers: August 24 in the Janesville/Beloit area and August 25 in Madison.

Workshop topics include: AIDS Basics, an AIDS Update, Medical Care, Legal Issues Concerning HIV/AIDS Confidentiality, Testing and Right to Know, Outreach to Injection Drug Users, Peer Intervention with Teens, Support and Case Management, and more. Experts in medicine, research, law and the social services will lead the workshops.

AIDS Drug Panel Issues Recommendations

Washington, DC – The National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development has called on the federal government to provide tax credits to drug companies to accelerate the development of new HIV/AIDS medications.

With the exception of protease inhibitors (drugs which have shown some promise in blocking the enzyme that causes HIV replication), very little new research is being conducted into anti HIV/AIDS drugs. Pharmaceutical firms claim they are stymied with the high costs of drug development and the low return on their investment.

A researcher from Cell Genesys Inc. told the Task Force: "The investment atmosphere is chilly to hostile with respect to investing in AIDS drugs."

The Task Force recommended that companies be given a 50% tax credit for clinical research into new HIV/AIDS medications and a 50% tax credit for studying the additional uses of already approved HIV/AIDS drugs.

In addition, the Task Force urged that companies engaging in HIV/AIDS research be given seven years of market exclusivity over any drug they develop that is approved, enabling them to recoup their investment.

HIV Infection in Men of Color Skyrockets

Atlanta, GA – New data released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention confirm long held predictions that the rates of HIV infection among African American and Latino Gay men are increasing dramatically.

The statistics trace the rates of HIV infection among various groups between 1989 and 1994, when the last complete figures are available. While the rate for white Gay men increased 14% (from 10.7 cases per 100,000 in 1989 to 12.2 cases per 100,000 in 1994), the rate for black Gay men jumped by 79% (from 20.8 cases per 100,000 in 1989 to 37.3 cases in '94). The rate for Latino Gay men increased 61% (from 14.0 per 100,000 to 22.6).

Patrick Sullivan, the CDC epidemiologist who conducted the study, told the Washington Blade: "The numbers represent black and Hispanic men who were infected in the '80's but for a myriad of reasons, not the least of which was a lack of focused intervention, are just now showing up in emergency rooms around the country only now with diagnoses of full blown AIDS."

Cornelius Baker of the National Association of People with AIDS, who is African American and HIV positive, cited three primary reasons for the alarming statistics: "Disparate ways of handling or mishandling the epidemic, homophobia within communities of color, and a lack of appropriate levels of funding. When combined, these three factors result in the not so surprising revelation that black and Latino men are the hardest hit by AIDS."

Milder HIV May Hold Clues to AIDS Vaccine


Washington, DC – A study of prostitutes in West Africa indicates that those infected with HIV 2, a milder form of HIV 1, are 70% less likely to acquire HIV 1, according to an article in the journal Science. If scientists can determine what components of HIV 2 inhibit HIV 1 infection, they may be able to use that information to help devise a vaccine against HIV 1.

HIV 1 is the virulent strain responsible for the worldwide AIDS epidemic. HIV 2, found primarily in Africa, can take up to 25 years to develop into AIDS while HIV 1 can become lethal in half that time. HIV 2 is also less infectious, which is why it has not spread as aggressively as HIV 1.

The study, conducted by researchers with the Harvard School of Public Health and a university in Dakar, traced the health histories of 756 prostitutes in Senegal from 1985 to 1994. At the outset, 138 women had HIV 2, while 618 had no HIV infection. Nine years later, women with HIV 2 were 70% less likely to have acquired HIV 1 compared to the women who were initially uninfected with either strain. (The persistence of gonorrhea infections among many of the women studied indicated that few of them had changed their behaviors, so the finding cannot be attributed to safer sex practices.)

The development of the smallpox vaccine around 1800 provides a hopeful model for a vaccine against AIDS. At that time in Britain, Dr. Edward Jenner noticed that people infected with a mild disease related to smallpox, cowpox, were less liable to contract the deadly smallpox. That knowledge led to an effective vaccination against smallpox.

Dr. Anthony Fauci of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases said the findings from Senegal offer "circumstantial but not definitive proof that HIV 2 might protect against HIV 1 and thus add a little data that helps buoy an old thesis. It is interesting, but there are a lot of 'ifs' involved."

Director Maria Maggenti Talks About "The Incredibly True Adventure of Two Girls in Love"

It's midafternoon, but in the bar of the Phoenix Park, where director Maria Maggenti and the two stars of her new feature film have camped out for a series of interviews, it looks - and sounds - a lot like the scene of a slumber party. A '90s slumber party gone

"It's just perverted!" howls Maggenti from the bench on the far side of the table, past the scattered iced coffee glasses and the bloody Mary empties. There's genuine glee in her voice. Tucked into the corner banquette with her, Laurel Holloman and Nicole

Parker giggle outrageously.

There's a kind of punchiness in the air; Maggenti is a hyper-animated woman with a wavy blonde mane and an endearing little gold nose ring and a way sometimes of ending sentences with a rising inflection so they sound like questions even when they're not? She's describing a scene at the end of The Incredibly True Adventure of Two Girls in Love, a throwaway bit in which a blowsy suburban

siren puts the moves on a trio of high school in-crowd girls.

Maggie Moore's "tacky-ass, heart-of-gold, total movie-convention character," Wendy, is something of a constant in Two Girls, even if she's not a main player. She first appears in the opening scene, locking lips with blue-collar baby dyke Randy Dean (Holloman) in a service station rest-room. By the film's conclusion, Randy and society girl Evie Roy (Parker) have fallen in love, smoked pot, trashed the house, gotten caught in bed together, and fled their families to hole up in a seedy motel. Wendy brings cash to help with their escape, but as she's leaving, all the relatives arrive. Amid the chaos, Wendy turns to three of Evie's cliquish friends who've come to watch the showdown. "So," she vamps, her voice dripping suggestiveness. "Do you girls all go to Wallace High School?"

Wendy's scenes, Maggenti says, with more than a hint of satisfaction, are in part why Two Girls "is not a John Hughes film with

Lesbians in it." More laughter all around. "These are all very adult, subversive, perverse things that I put in for myself."

FIRST LOVE

Originally, Maggenti set out to make a film that was, if anything, more adult than the one she wound up with. Two Girls is about awkward silences and giddy outbursts, friends who don't get it and authority figures who can't be trusted - all the ordinary, earthshaking drama of teen courtship and first love. Skyville, Maggenti's first Randy-and-Evie script, opened with the two young women already involved and followed them through hell and back to the end of their relationship.

"In the original film," Maggenti says, "they wind up having gone through the worst things any teen could go through, from sex for money to forced abortion. Everything - it was really intense and over the top? Their letters posted in the hallways..." The closing page of the Skyville screenplay left Randy and Evie alone on the high school football field at dusk, clutching each other, as the camera pulled away

in a crane shot.

All that changed last year, after a group of independent producers who'd read the script came back to Maggenti with a question: How did these two become a couple? "And I pitched them this idea on the spot about how the two of them got together," Maggenti explains, "and they said, 'We love that idea. We love that script. That's the script we'd like to read.' And of course I hadn't written it yet, but I thought they were going to give me money, so I said I had?"

Outside the producers' New York office, Maggenti turned to a colleague who'd gone to the pitch meeting with her. "'What the fuck am I going to do? I haven't written that script!' And she said, 'We're gonna go to your apartment, I'm gonna lock you in, and you're gonna

write it.' And that's exactly what happened."

In eight days, no less. When the Two Girls screenplay was done, Maggenti got on the phone to a fellow ("a straight man, an older gentleman") who'd seen one of her short films and been impressed.

"He said if you ever need anything, give me a call. So I called, and I said, 'Guess what. I need something.'" The businessman, who

Maggenti says prefers to remain anonymous, lent her \$35,000 – an "insane" budget figure Maggenti plucked out of thin air – to make *Two Girls*. The script kept changing, up until the first day of shooting and even beyond. Take Evie's swank wheels, for instance – a Range Rover she says her father gave her out of guilt for having divorced her mother.

ABOUT THAT RANGE ROVER . . .

"In the script it was a Saab," says Maggenti, rolling her eyes for emphasis. "And that Range Rover, actually, it's like 15 years old. It looks beautiful, but let me tell you, it's not.

"We were sitting around in a production meeting about a week before we were gonna shoot, and I said, 'So, how's the Saab? Do we have the car? And there was this dead silence. And everyone looked at Dolly (Hall, the *Two Girls* producer). She's the only one in our group who has a car, and she has this ancient Range Rover. And Dolly looked at me and said, 'Well, I guess she's gonna drive a Range Rover.'

"So that's how we got that Range Rover. It's so over the top for this girl to have a Range Rover. She explains, like, 'My Dad's overcompensating,' and you're thinking, 'Whoa? Overcompensating?'"

"I don't drive, by the way." That's Nicole "Nick" Parker, piping up from her side of the bench. She's sporting a short greenish-blue do, though she wore braids in the film.

But Evie drives the Range Rover all over the place in the film, doesn't she? Maggenti just laughs some more, drumming her palms on the table.

"Every time she's pulling out? Half the time there's 10 of us pushing the car, O.K., and at the other end of the screen – "

"There's somebody with sandbags and a flag, going, 'Stop!"
Parker finishes, waving her arms.

In the one scene where the Range Rover actually gets driven, Maggenti points out, it's Randy at the wheel. "I added that whole thing about, 'I can't believe I'm driving your car.' Because I had to. Totally."

TWISTED SUBTEXT

Most scenes in *Two Girls*, of course, played out as written. And in most, Maggenti says, there's a twisted subtext that only she and a few other people will ever understand. In one wryly funny moment, for example, Evie tells her three girlfriends that she's got, um, a new girlfriend. They don't react well.

"The funny thing is that like Evie, I was part of that group," says Maggenti, who spent much of her youth in Washington, DC (her mother was attached to the World Bank). "We were the popular smart girls, and we knew it. "I can tell you, however, that situation never happened to me when I was in high school, and it didn't happen to me when I came out. It happened later in life, when after having only been with women I fell in love with a man. And then all my Gay friends turned against me. So that scene is doubly hilarious for me, because so much of it was based on that moment – my Lesbian friends sitting across from me in this tribunal thing, like, 'You're going to have to turn in your dyke card!' I get a lot of pleasure out of that scene, I gotta say."

"And the other thing is that I had so many dykes working on this project, and we all knew all these in-jokes; I have dykes playing straight characters and straight people playing dykes, and that makes things very funny actually, because there's this constant subversion of what we think we know about what's happening in the movie..."

So now that she's mentioned it, who's straight and who's Gay here? Laurel? Nick?

Crashing halt. Bad question. Too concrete, sets up too much of a dichotomy. Nobody seems to want to be either/or.

Nick: "If you look at the facts, it's like, had a boyfriend, had a girlfriend, had a boyfriend, had a boyfriend. That's the reality, and – does that make me bi?"

Laurel: "Yeah, I don't know how to label it. I mean, I went into this movie in a relationship with a man. Started to fall apart while I was making this movie, because I was never available. And then I sort of came out of this movie, and I was just like – I think it was because the women around me were so courageous about who they were – it gave me the courage that, wow, if I get in another relationship and it's with a woman, I want to be just as courageous as those girls."

Nick: "I think it would disappoint a lot of people. Because the reality is that our sexual history is like, is fluid. We're still growing, still figuring everything out. People want us to either be straight or Gay."

Mark this down for the record: Essentially, two young, aspiring actresses have just apologized, with the tape recorder running, for not being Lesbian enough.

US AND THEM

Two Girls plays with notions of race and class, too, but in a downright understated way. So it's not all that surprising that the African American Evie and her mother, Evelyn, are based on Maggenti and her mother.

"It wasn't hard to do, quite frankly. That came very naturally," the director says. And Randy's extended family – her Lesbian aunt, the aunt's lover, and the aunt's ex-lover, who looks a lot like the current lover – that was "a composite portrait of a lot of the dykes I've known over the years, and a lot of the young

Gay people I have met who've been kicked out by their own families and lived with Gay or Lesbian relatives. Had a girlfriend, my ex, who had an aunt named Rebecca who was very instrumental in her life, as an older Lesbian... So I pulled those stories together; she would tell me what it was like to be a young dyke and go to visit her aunt and meet women and try and figure out who she was.

"Again, I was really interested in class: What are the differences in (Randy and Evie's) class backgrounds and how do I portray that? There's a lot of activity always at Randy's house – that sense of fluid hippie chaos which I was very interested in. And Evie's house, that's my pseudo-Ozu shot, where they're sitting there eating sushi on the floor in a two-shot, to show the formality of their environment..."

But why the suburbs? Why not a hip, downtown love story set in, say, Chelsea?

"I didn't want people to be able to say, Yeah, well, in the city girls fall in love, but not in my town they don't . . . So I wanted to make it kind of an everytown? I also wanted it to be really lush and green, because I needed that heat, that kind of libidinal teenage thing happening in the environment."

Besides, Maggenti says, these things are happening everywhere, not just in Manhattan and L.A. "And I really wanted to play with that. Similarly, there are upper middle-class black families all across this country. Films somehow never manage to show them except as uppermiddle-class black families – you know, like that's the statement. All this is very matter-of-fact for me, and I wanted it to be very matter-of-fact, so that we can really concentrate on the characters. And I hope that comes across."

"It seems so light on the surface, this film. But there's a lot of subtext throughout that's not light at all. About my feelings about first love, about what happens after first love. That ambiguous dolly shot at the end – all that stuff. Throughout, I'm trying to plant that it is not what we think it is. They think it is gonna last forever. 'We're gonna be together in 30 years.' That's what you think with that first love," Holloman says.

"Because you have to believe that," Maggenti insists. "You say it, but that's the last time you'll ever say it. And that's what I was trying to explore in the film."

"True Adventure of Two Girls" Conveys Bliss of First Love

Newest Lesbian Romantic Comedy "Endearing"

There's something uniquely tender and endearing about first love, and the magic of that youthful phenomenon is captured by firsttime feature filmmaker Maria Maggenti in The Incredibly True Adventure of Two Girls in Love.

The latest in a string (three now?) of hip romantic comedies by young Lesbian directors, True Adventure explores the innocent openness to sensation that the trendy Bar Girls babes and even the 20something Go Fishers have already left in their amorous wakes

The two girls of the title are 17yearold high school seniors Randy Dean (Laurel Holloman), a scruffy white working class tomboy dyke, and Evie Roy (Nicole Parker), who is beautiful, black, brainy, very welltodo and apparently heterosexual. Clearly, a perfect match.

Randy is a rebellious out-of-the-closet outcast who wears ACT UP tshirts and whose only friend is a sympathetic Gay male classmate. She lives with her Lesbian aunt, along with her aunt's lover and an exlover who is training to be a boxer. Just a "regular Lesbo household," as Randy puts it. To her more conventional schoolmates, she is thought of as "like a total pothead, number one, and a total diesel dyke, number two."

But she's a real cutie by Lesbian standards, and Holloman projects a sweet shyness and vulnerability through that baby butch exterior. Even Randy's preEvie affair with a married woman, which consists of hungry kissing trysts in the restroom of the shabby gas station where Randy works after school, doesn't detract from her essential innocence.

When Evie pulls into the gas station in her pricey Range Rover, anxious about imaginary car problems, Randy is immediately smitten, and does her butch best to make appropriate "repairs." Evie's interest in Randy is more subtly expressed, but it's clear that she's intrigued.

They soon meet again in the school restroom when Randy walks in on the tearful Evie, now distressed over problems with her boyfriend. Randy consoles her in her awkward but touchingly minimalist fashion, after which they get nabbed by school authorities for sharing an illicit cigarette.

SYMPTOMS OF YOUNG LOVE

While they serve detention together, their giggly exchanges and nervous flirtatiousness reveal their budding delight in each other. This is followed by other symptoms of young love: searching glances in school hallways, sharing of favorite books and music, and notes slipped expectantly through locker door vents.

The most affecting moments are played with humor and poignancy by Holloman and Parker. This includes the first time they hesitantly hold hands (in a public diner,

under the eye of the waitress), and the occasion of their first kiss, rendered just slightly goofy by the fact that they are both chewing gum.

As the attraction intensifies, issues of race, class and sexuality are adressed although, since this is essentially a comedy, not with heavyhandedness (or much depth for that matter). But it is interesting to see the race and class role reversals at work, and Maggenti's presentation of the girls' wildly different living environments is funny and striking. When Evie is invited to Randy's "Lesbo household" for supper, boisterousness and pasta

reign. In contrast, Evie's culinary home life consists of her fussing over the preparation of a gourmet meal while her doting mother (who is an agricultural economist with the World Bank) coaches her, and classical music permeates the background.

COMPLICATIONS ARISE

Various troubles (i.e. "adventures") begin to complicate the girls' lives the disapproval of adults, the rejection of Evie by her snooty het friends ("Couldn't you at least have chosen someone pretty?"), Randy's imminent failure to graduate, and a jealous rage by the husband of Randy's married "ex."


Things reach critical mass when Randy and Evie are caught in bed together by Evie's completely unsuspecting and outraged mother. They manage to escape to a tacky motel room, where everyone converges on them in a farcical climax that may appear to end too abruptly, but also serves to freeze a moment when youthful love transcends the pressures of the world around it.

True Adventure strains credibility here and there to maintain its plotline, and is not without some flaws in characterization, but its delight flows from the freshness and charm of its two leads and their ability to convey the awkward tenderness and bliss of first love, and of Lesbian first love in particular.

Produced on one of those nobudget budgets young Lesbians have to work with (are we surprised?), and filmed in only 21 days, Maggenti's feature debut was a hit at the Sundance Film Festival, and its comingofage theme is universal enough to hold crossover appeal.

The Incredibly True Adventure of Two Girls in Love, with certain appeal to Lesbians, young and old alike, opens at Milwaukee's Downer Theater July 21.



Held each year on the forests and meadows of Walhalla, Michigan, tens of thousands of mothers and daughters, lovers and friends travel to the city of womyn that rises in August in a place known simply as "The Land."

Michigan is a vision of more than the grand music festival that it is. It is a space on this mother earth that is honored with the presence and the energy of womyn from many countries and cultures who come together out of our love for the music, dance and theater of womyn. Here are excerpts from the Michigan Fest's brochure:

WHAT IS MICHIGAN?

"The Land" comes to life beginning in July by hundreds of womyn who build stages, raise tents, lay water and electric lines and prepare menus for thousands in the fields of Northwestern Michigan.

This year, the week of August 7-14, womyn will gather to create their own world - a place where womyn can bring their principles and values, thoughts and voices - unlike anywhere on this planet. Everyone stays on site, camping in tents or RV's.


Chicago Women's Film & Video Fest








Above: Blue Lite 3rd Anniversary. Staff, from I to r, Vera, David & Dean. Photo by Jamie.





No Nunsense

Gayrobics

Summer is definitely here. So it's time we party animals shed our outer coats to reveal our beautiful bare bodies beneath.

We don't want to miss out on summer cruises (and I DON'T mean on ships) because of a few pounds and inches (no, not THOSE inches...) we need to shed first

From Billy Holliday's Library:

Well kids, summer is sweatily upon us – I know the allusion is all screwed up, but so am I. It's time to review that reading list. Mine is always behind the time, but that's because I'm reading all those interesting letters from you. (That's right, I don't share the interesting ones; I call them personally.) So my books aren't current, but my wiring is. Here's a couple to add to the list.

Young Men & Fire, by Norman Maclean

Honey, this is a good book. You will just fall in love with these boys who die much too young. Doesn't it sound familiar? Thirteen boys who played with fire, or maybe the fire played with them and left them dead on a cruel hillside in Montana in 1949.
