

Openly Gay Legislators Toasted in Milwaukee

They've Progressed From Pariahs to Players

When Glen Maxey, the first openly Gay member of the Texas House of Representatives, took his seat on the House floor in 1991, several colleagues moved their seats to get away from him.

their seats to get away from him.

Today, through hard work and coalition-building, Maxey has won the respect of most of his fellow House members and has been honored as Texas Legislator of the Year by groups like the Gray Panthers, the Sierra Club, Public Citizen and the Coalition of Texans with Disabilities.

For Ken Cheuvront, elected to the Arizona House of Representatives last year: "Being an openly Gay elected official in a conservative state like Arizona, about 60% of my colleagues said I am the first openly Gay person they've ever met. I knew when I walked in on the first day they were expecting pumps... I think they were quite disappointed."

And Tim Van Zandt, the first openly
Gay person elected to the Missouri House
of Representatives last November, sees
progress in the fact that he did not face
the ostracism Glen Maxey initially did,
and even succeeded in passing three
pieces of legislation in his first year in of-

These three openly Gay officials — all Democrats — were among the thousands of politicians in Milwaukee in mid-July for the National Conference of State Legislators. Wisconsin's own Lesbian State Representative Tammy Baldwin, with the assistance of the Cream City Foundation, Landmark Enterprises and Miller Brewing, hosted a reception for the trio at the Fox Point home of Ross Draegert and Robert Starshak July 19.

Ed. Note: There are at least 15 openly Gay or Lesbian state legislators in the US, three openly Gay members of Congress, and dozens of Gay and Lesbian officials serving on school boards and in local and county government.

Cheuvront told those in attendance that he was very "apprehensive" on first meeting his fellow House members, 20% of whom are Mormon. "The Mormon Church has never really embraced us as a community," he noted with wry understatement.

"What I realized was that once I got over the fear and I became comfortable with myself, my colleagues became comfortable with me," said Cheuvront. "And by the end, some of the most conservative members — members of veterans groups and Mormons — we went out drinking together!" "I think I'll realize when I'm really accepted is when they start paying for me," Cheuvront joked.

Tim Van Zandt said the significance of his election as an openly Gay man was impressed on him by a colleague, a 77-year-old grandmother who had been the first woman elected to the Missouri House many years ago. She told him: "Just by your being here, by your sitting here, you've already accomplished a whole range of things...Just by being a player and sitting at the table with the rest of us."

GLEN MAXEY'S SAGA

Glen Maxey spoke to In Step about his journey from pariah to player in the Texas House. His experience may serve as a model for other Gay officials hoping to become effective lawmakers.

"I started out in 1991 in a very hostile environment. The legislature was not very happy to see a Gay person arrive at their doorstep. In fact, the day I arrived, there were members who moved their seats so they wouldn't have to sit near me.

"But in my third term, a short five years later, I'm very proud to say that in this past legislative session I was successful in passing more legislation than any other member of the Texas House. For those of us who are openly Gay and Lesbian elected officials, the battle of getting there is the first step," said Maxey. "But once we get there it's important for us to be leaders of our community not just on Gay and Lesbian issues but leaders on the myriad of issues that affect constituencies -at-large."

"This last session I was in the leadership of combatting the conservative swing on issues such as welfare reform that impact a much larger population than just Gay and Lesbian people. As a Gay person, being able to take leadership positions on issues like that becomes real important because it creates the kind of coalitions that come back and help us.

"As the leader on welfare reform, it put me in a great place, when our legislature voted on a hate crimes bill, of bringing all the progressive constituencies together — the minority caucuses, the women's caucus...

"I am seen in the Texas legislature as the leader on ethics, which is a very interesting place for a Gay person to be," Maxey said. "I pushed that issue when I was elected. We had a very corrupt legislative process and legislature, and I picked ethics as my issue because I knew that it polled at an 80% positive rating with every constituency group. Even the Christian Coalition is very strong on ethics reform and lobbying control.

BRIDGING THE GAPS

"Taking ethics as my issue helped me bridge those gaps so that even people who are political enemies would have to agree with me on some issues. It was important to pick as many issues on which I could have common ground with the people I knew I might be fighting on other issues, so that you're not put in the position of always being on opposite poles. This is very important, especially in a legislature as in Texas, which is extremely conservative and very homophobic."

But Maxey has seen great progress.

"The legislature has improved tremendously over the past five years, and I'm proud to say that a lot of it is not so much on issues I took leadership roles on...Anyone here tonight — Ken from Arizona, Tim from Missouri — would say that those of us who are serving in very conservative legislatures, just the fact that we are there and we are out has tremendously changed the perceptions of Gays and Gay and Lesbian issues among the members.

"I was the lobbyist for the Gay and Lesbian community when I ran for office, so I was well known as a Gay activist. I guess my greatest success is being able to look back on that knowing I am now judged as a legislator first and a Gay person second, not as I was when I first came: as a single issue, single agenda candidate."

A colleague recently congratulated Maxey, saying: "You had a really successful session for the Gay and Lesbian community."

"I turned to him and said: `But I didn't pass anything that affects the Gay and Lesbian community, per se.'"

"No," the colleague replied, "but every time you pass another piece of legislation that helps senior citizens or the environment, the women's community or people with disabilities, it's a victory for Gay people."

Gay people."
"I think," Maxey concluded, "that's a very great perspective on what all of us are doing as out Gay and Lesbian officials

across the country."

A Conversation with NGLTF's Karen Bullock-Jordan

Milwaukee - On Thursday, July 20, Milwaukee's LesBiGay organizations hosted a dinner and talk back with Karen Bullock-Jordan, a representative of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) at the M&M Club. Bullock-Jordan's visit was designed to create dialogue and encourage attendance from individuals and organizations of Milwaukee, for the 8th Annual Creating Change Conference.

For the first time since 1990, Creating Change, the National Conference for the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Movement, will be held in a Midwestern city. Detroit, Michigan is the site for the November 8-12, 1995 Creating Change Conference. In a conversation with Bullock-Jordan, she stated, "I hope this is the start of creating relationships in the Midwest. It gives us an opportunity to get a lay of the land and the people, and we're letting them know NGLTF is here to strengthen relationships."

"The biggest gathering of its kind in the country, Creating Change has been the incubator of our movement," Bullock-Jordan proudly continued. Her visit to Milwaukee was one of many cities under her "field" of contacts that also includes Indiana, Ohio, Illihois, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Arkansas and Michigan. Getting in touch with local organizers and answering any questions people

might have about attending *Creating Change* was the focus of her visit to Milwaukee.

Creating Change, which began in 1988 and is held each year on Veterans weekend, offers a weekend of political and cultural refreshment, skills-building, networking and most importantly, is the national activist/organizer school for all who seek social justice. In addition, there are five Pre-Conference Institutes to strengthen the LesBiGay movement: the People of Color Organizing Institute, Youth Organizing Institute, and Finding Common Ground: Allies Across Race, Class & Gender, to name just a few.

When asked, "What is the biggest challenge this year?" Bullock-Jordan said without hesitation, "Our biggest challenge is preparing local activists to take on the Right. We have a shared vision of what we want this country to look like. Now more than ever, we have to figure out how to talk to the middle core of people that have not been reached by the Right, and we must build real coalitions."

If you're wondering what kind of people attend the conference, just ask someone who has volunteered in the past. Creating Change pulls people from all spectrums of the community. From people who are first coming out to those working for social change, the conference brings together so many segments of the movement to learn how to strategize, plan tactics, and get the skills needed to succeed.

This year's special guests include Wisconsin's Representative Tammy Baldwin and a Gay/Lesbian, feminist community organizer and former NGLTF Executive Director, Urvashi Vaid. Other highlights include a Community Dance, Exhibitors, Hot Talks, Roundtables and Skill Building-Intensives.

To assist with costs, Creating Change 1995 again offers scholarships to support attendance by activists and organizers who otherwise would be unable to come to the conference. Senate Approves Ryan White CARE Act Re-Authorization

Wisconsin Reduces Care, Increases Prevention Funds

Washington, DC — Despite strenuous efforts by Sen. Jesse Helms to hobble the measure, the Ryan White CARE Act Re-Authorization bill — which will provide life-sustaining medical and support services to people with HIV/AIDS for the next five years — was passed by the US Senate July 27 by an overwhelmingly bipartisan vote of 97-3.

When the Ryan White CARE Act is approved in the House of Representatives — it will be debated and voted on in September — the legislation will go before a House-Senate conference committee, which will reconcile the two versions. The conference committee will be in a strong position to deliver a bill solidly focused on providing treatment to men, women and children living with HIV/

"The Senate's Ryan White bill establishes for the first time in the history of the Ryan White CARE Act the principle that there is a national epidemic and that resources must be distributed equitably throughout the country," Doug Nelson of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin told In Step.

"Not only are we thrilled that re-authorization has passed, but we're especially glad the principle of equity has been firmly established," Nelson said. "ARCW fought hard for the equity formulas. The CARE Act's passage together with the news that it is likely to be flat-funded means that Wisconsin could potentially see about a 60% increase in Ryan White funds."

Although the exact appropriations still need to be ironed out, Nelson said that Wisconsin, over the next five years, could receive an increase of almost \$3.5 million in Ryan White funds.

The Ryan White CARE (Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency) Act is the federal government's leading program for providing care and treatment for more than 350,000 people living with HIV/AIDS. AIDS has become the leading cause of death among all Americans aged 25 to 44. A bipartisan poll of American voters commissioned by the Human Rights Campaign Fund found that 78% of voters support maintaining or increasing federal funding for the care of people with HIV/AIDS.

DEFEAT FOR HELMS

During debate on the CARE Act's re-authorization, Sen. Helms (R-NC) offered several amendments designed to gut the bill and keep Gay people from receiving medical care. Helms' anti-Gay attack (he accused Gay men with AIDS of "incredibly offensive and revolting conduct") was reversed by an amendment offered by Sens. Nancy Kassebaum (R-KS) and Edward Kennedy (D-MA).

Helms introduced an amendment which prevented funds from being used for programs that directly or indirectly "promote homosexuality," effectively denying funds to AIDS providers who extend care to Gay people. It passed by a 54-45 vote.

But Kassebaum and Kennedy put forth an amendment which essentially canceled the effect of Helms's measure. It prohibited federal funds from going to any programs that promote sexual activity or intravenous drug use, yet guaranteed the delivery of essential medical and support services to all people with HIV/AIDS. It passed by a 76-23 vote.

"The vote on Sen. Kassebaum's amendment was a victory over Jesse Helms' efforts to gut the Ryan White Act," Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign Fund commented. "Helms was stopped in his tracks. The Senate made a clear choice by adopting language that does not single out anybody for discrimination or exclude Gay Americans from much-needed medical care."

Helms was also rebuffed in his efforts to place a funding cap on Ryan White funds, freezing spending at 1995 levels for the next five years. AIDS activists saw this freeze as potentially disastrous given rapidly growing AIDS case loads around the country. The Senate agreed, defeating the measure, 67-32. (Helms did succeed in passing one amendment which allows federal workers to opt out of AIDS awareness classes sponsored by the government.)

David Zingale of the Human Rights Campaign Fund was encouraged by the final 97-3 Senate vote: "The bipartisan outcome of today's vote creates momentum for its final passage in the House." Concerned citizens are urged to contact their members of Congress during the August recess when many return to their home states.

IN WISCONSIN...

In a follow-up to a story in the last issue of In Step, Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson gave final approval to the state budget, which includes a 3-4% decrease in funds initially allocated by the legislature's Joint Finance Committee for the AIDS Life Care Services Grant. The Life Care Services Grant funds the social workers and case managers at AIDS service groups throughout the state.

According to Doug Nelson of ARCW, the \$75,000 decrease over the next two years will adversely affect AIDS service groups, which are struggling to keep up with caseloads growing by 20% each year.

"It's outrageous," Nelson said. "It's a bad hit on the Life Care Grant at a time when the numbers are going up drastically." He expressed dismay at a "shifting" of funds "without consultation with the AIDS community."

The \$75,000, along with another \$75,000 drawn from a federal grant for community aides for Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse services, was transferred, at the initiation of Assembly Majority Leader Scott Jensen (R), into a state AIDS prevention initiative. AIDS service organizations and community groups around the state will be able to apply for these funds for specific programs.

Nelson expressed frustration with this shifting of funds and contended that a new prevention grant of \$700,000 from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention made the state initiative unnecessary.

Nevertheless, Nelson said: "I appreciate the good intention of Rep. Jensen to invest in the fight against AIDS, and I look on it as an opportunity for us to work together for meaningful AIDS policy in the future."

NATIONAL News Briefs

May Sarton, Prolific Lesbian Writer, Dies at 83

York, ME — May Sarton, a Lesbian writer who authored dozens of books of poetry, fiction and memoirs in her 65 year career, died at York Hospital in her hometown of York, Maine on July 16 of breast cancer. She was 83 years old.

Sarton was a strong individualist who craved alone time to do her writing. She lived for almost 30 years in a secluded clapboard house on the coast of Maine with only her dogs and cats. But she also told a reporter that when it came to inspiration, "Women have been my Muse."

Sarton wrote 20 novels, the most well-known being Mrs. Stevens Hears the Mermaids Singing and The Education of Harriet Hatfield. She came out as a Lesbian in 1965 with the publication of Mrs. Stevens, whose Lesbian protagonist was modeled on her own life. Harriet Hatfield was also vaguely autobiographical, in that the heroine was a 60-year-old woman who acknowledges her Lesbianism.

Sarton wrote 15 books of poetry, among them The Land of Silence, A Private Mythology and Collected Poems, 1930-1973. She also published many journals and memoirs, notably Journal of a Solitude, Recovering: A Journal and After the Stroke.

Because her writing was so personal, Sarton was often overlooked by critics. But she became a heroine to feminists in

the 1960's and developed a huge cult following. She eventually earned 18 honorary degrees from universities.

Sarton said of her writing: "On the surface, my work has not looked radical, but perhaps it will be seen eventually that in a nice, quiet, noisy way, I have been trying to say radical things so that they may penetrate without shock."

Of her unconventional life, Sarton wrote: "We have to be ourselves, however frightening that may be."

Hawaii Marriage Trial Postponed Until 1996

Honolulu, HI — In a scheduling change that permits the Gay and Lesbian community more time to educate the public on the freedom to marry, Judge Kevin Chang set a new trial date for the landmark Hawaii case brought by three samegender couples who are seeking marriage licenses.

Judge Chang postponed the trial to give state lawmakers one more chance to review recommendations from a commission assigned to study the issue. The trial, originally scheduled for this September, has been moved to July of next year.

The case, Baehr v. Lewin, stems from a lawsuit filed in 1991 by three same-gender couples — two Lesbian and one Gay — whose marriage applications were denied. In 1993, the Hawaiian Supreme Court ruled that the state's refusal to grant the marriage licenses appears to violate the Constitution's equal protection clause. Sending the case back to the lower court, the justices ruled that unless the state can demonstrate a "compelling state interest" for refusing the licenses, it must stop discriminating against same-gender couples who want to marry.

"The case is fully on track," said Evan Wolfson of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, a co-counsel in the case. "This move will give the Gay community and its allies more time to organize state by state, and engage the American public on the vital civil rights issues at stake. We intend to use this time wisely and make sure that political organizing and public education accompany the legal work as it continues to move forward."

Illinois Court Allows Joint Adoption by Lesbians

Chicago, IL—On July 18, an Illinois appéllate court allowed two Lesbian couples to adopt their children jointly, the first such ruling ever in Illinois. In each case, the couple petitioned for recognition of the children's relationship with both parents in what is commonly called a "second parent adoption." The partner in one couple sought to adopt a child born to her lover through alternative insemination. In the other case, the partner wanted to adopt her lover's two children, one conceived through alternative insemination, the other previously adopted.

Overturning a lower court decision last year, the three-judge panel ruled in the two separate cases that Illinois adoption law allows Lesbian and Gay couples to adopt together: "Nothing in the [Illinois Adoption] Act suggests that sexual orientation is a relevant consideration...

Sexual orientation is simply not an issue in these cases.

The decision is the fourth by an appellate court in the country to grant second parent adoptions to Lesbian and Gay couples. In June, an appellate court in Washington, DC allowed two Gay men to adopt their 4-year-old daughter to-

Of the three State Supreme Courts which have ruled on the issue, Vermont and Massachusetts permitted the adoptions, while Wisconsin did not. New York's highest court is currently considering the issue. In at least 14 other states, trial courts have granted second parent adoptions, recognizing that they are in the child's best interest.

Gays Arrested for Dancing Together Win Settlement

Chicago, IL - Four Gay men who were harassed and wrongfully arrested for dancing together in a suburban Chicago sports bar have reached a favorable settlement after winning a sexual orientation discrimination suit at the trial level

Under the agreement, the bar must pay the men an undisclosed sum for damages and attorneys' fees, pay a \$2,000 fine to the county, and post a notice pledging compliance with the Cook County Human Rights Ordinance. The law prohibits discrimination in public accommodations, employment, housing, credit and education on several grounds, including sexual orientation.

The incident occurred in March, 1994 when the four men went to the Sidelines sports bar in Harwood Heights after a dinner and movie. They were dancing in couples when an employee approached and told them they had to "find partners" or stop dancing. When the men explained that they had partners, the bar owner called police, who arrested all four men.

The men were acquitted of all charges stemming from the arrest but brought a discrimination suit before the Cook County Commission on Human Rights. A Commission officer ruled that Sidelines had indeed engaged in discrimination by ordering the arrests of the men and recommended that the bar pay the maximum fine, including damages and attorneys' fees.

This settlement sends a loud message that there is a high price to pay for discriminating against Lesbians and Gay men in Cook County," said Patricia Logue of the Lambda Legal Defense and Educa-

ACT UP Storms GOP Office in San Francisco

San Francisco, CA - Fifteen members of ACT UP/San Francisco invaded the offices of the local Republican Party in mid-July, hanging effigies of GOP leaders and splattering red painted hand prints around the walls to "symbolize the blood on Republican hands" for opposing increases in AIDS funding

A spokesman for ACT UP said the action was meant to put Republican leaders on notice that the party's "homophobic and AIDS-phobic agenda" would not be tolerated. ACT UP specifically cited attempts by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) to destroy the Ryan White CARE Act. (The bill was passed by the Senate July 27 - see related story.) They also targeted California Gov. Pete Wilson and Attorney General Dan Lungren.

For twenty minutes, ACT UP commandeered the office, using telephones and fax machines to send out their message, before police arrived and arrested four of the occupiers. Damage to the office was estimated at \$4,000.

Arthur Bruzzone, Chairman of the San Francisco GOP, showed reporters the damage and commented: "We think that these kinds of acts are extremely unproductive, as unproductive as the remarks of Jesse Helms. This is not the way to solve these problems.

Meanwhile, five members of ACT UP/New York were arrested July 10 in Bethesda, Maryland when they tried to enter a private meeting of an AIDS panel of the National Institutes of Health at the Hyatt Regency.

Judge Denies Attempt to Close Camp Sister Spirit

Ovett, MS - A Mississippi judge has ruled that the Lesbian-owned feminist retreat called Camp Sister Spirit does not constitute a nuisance to its neighbors, but he warned the camp's owners that "activities in the future are subject to scru-

tiny by the courts.

Brenda and Wanda Henson, a Lesbian couple, bought the 120-acre former pig farm in rural Mississippi in 1993, planning to develop it into a women's retreat. When word spread around the small town of the women's orientation and their intentions, the Hensons were subject to numerous threats and harassment. National Gay groups asked the federal government to intervene, but a Justice Department mediator said his hands were tied because there are no federal statutes giving the department jurisdiction over disputes based on sexual orientation.

A group of 11 neighbors filed suit against the Hensons last year, hoping to force them off the property by having it declared a nuisance. They claimed the camp was bringing too many outsiders into the area increasing traffic flow and noise, that some local girls were afraid of the Lesbians there, that their own property values would decrease and that the media attention was too intense and un-

Although Judge MacKenzie found some of the plaintiffs "fears and concerns...genuine," he said the Hensons had so far not broken any laws and that

the Camp could stay open. The Hensons were grateful for the judge's ruling but expressed frustration that the justice system has not fully investigated their claims of harassment.

Also on the Newswire...

Fort Leavenworth, KS — On July 11, a Navy Board again denied clemency to Terry Helvey, the seaman convicted of brutally beating to death fellow sailor Allen Schindler, a Gay man, in 1992. Gay veterans and Schindler's mother, Dorothy Hadjys, were outraged that the Navy sent a tardy notice to Hadjys, informing her of the hearing at the last minute. They are also angry because it was the second clemency hearing for Helvey in less than two years.

New York, NY — Olympic diving champ and occasional actor Greg Louganis will be stepping into the lead role of Dan Butler's play The Only Thing Worse You Could Have Told Me August 8 Off-Broadway at the Actor's Playhouse. The play is a one-man comedy / drama about growing up and coming out as a Gay man. Louganis previously played a role in the theatrical version of Jeffrey, but about his new role he admitted to the New York Times: "I'm terrified."

Jackson, MS — Jon Hinson, a former Republican Congressman from Mississippi who acknowledged his homosexuality after facing sodomy charges, died of AIDS complications July 21. He was 53. Hinson, a conservative, was elected to Congress in 1978 but resigned early in his second term after being arrested on sodomy charges for an incident in a restroom on Capitol Hill. After his resignation, he became active and spoke out on Gay issues.

Los Angeles, CA — Federal Judge Terry Hatter Jr. has ordered the Navy to pay \$440,000 in court costs incurred by openly Gay Petty Officer Keith Meinhold in Meinhold's successful attempt to stay in the service. Last August, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ordered the Navy to reinstate Meinhold despite his homosexuality.

San Francisco, CA — The California State Bar has reached agreement with Blue Cross of California to provide benefits to the domestic partners of members of the State Bar. There are about 146,000 attorneys in the California Bar. The partners plan is believed to be the first offered by any state bar association.

Minneapolis, MN — The National Education Association, the nation's largest organization of teachers with almost 2.2 million members, has passed a resolution officially recognizing October as National Gay and Lesbian History Month. The group committed itself to the inclusion of fair portrayals of Gays and Lesbians in school curricula, sensitivity training for teachers, and the elimination of harassment against Gay and Lesbian students.

Washington, DC — During a meeting with officials of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, Rep. Bill Paxton (R-NY) revealed that the National Republican Congressional Committee, which played a key role in securing a GOP majority in the House last year, has forbidden sexual orientation discrimination against its employees since 1991.

Reno, NE — The School Board in Washoe County, Nevada has voted not to allow people with AIDS to come into sixth grade classes to try to educate children about the disease. The board also denied a request to include the number of a Gay Youth support group in a brochure given to middle and high school students.

Fr. Jason Samuel Acquitted of Sex Assault Charges Integrity/Milwaukee Asks for Community Support

New Berlin — On July 14, a jury acquitted Father Jason Samuel — an openly Gay Episcopal priest and the chaplain of Integrity / Milwaukee — of sexually assaulting a teenage boy.



Samuel was one of 5 men charged in 1994 with abusing the same 14year-old boy on different occasions at the Nashotah House Seminary. Only Samuel has been acquitted thus far, while three other men have been convicted. The accuser, now 21 and living in Texas, brought the case against the 5 men

7 years after the events allegedly took place.

Samuel maintained that the boy, confused by other abuse he had experienced, made advances toward him that he rejected. Samuel told therapists and friends about his rejection of the boy years before being charged, evidence the jury apparently used to acquit Samuel.

Samuel told the press: "This has been the most terrifying experience of my life. I have lived with this for a year and a half, been portrayed as a monster, as a person who would molest children. All I've ever tried to do is serve the church."

Integrity/Milwaukee, a group for Gay and Lesbian Episcopalians, is asking the LesBiGay community to help Samuel with moral and financial support.

"Jason Samuel is one of the most honest and sincere priests of our church and has never hidden his sexuality," said Royce Darby of Integrity. "His future is in the hands of those of us who can help him financially and emotionally to recover from this terrible attack on his character and honor."





King Productions Died With Its Founder But the Pageantry Lives On

Milwaukee – On Saturday, August 18 and Sunday, August 19, Appleton, will be the host for the 7th Annual Miss WI-USA Pageant. It will be TAG Team Productions' first State pageant, but Todd, Ann and Greg (which comprise TAG Team) are continuing a tradition, which could have very well died with its founder – Jimmy King.

WISCONSIN'S PIONEER

There are people in Milwaukee who will tell you that Jimmy King was the pioneer of drag in SE Wisconsin. Before the first Miss SE Wisconsin Pageant was held on M&M's patio, with Miss BJ Daniels capturing the crown in 1983, Jimmy King was putting on the

\$1.98 Drag Show. This parody on a pageant had a strong comedy element to it. It was fun, entertaining, and it featured

"drag queens."

Over the next 5 years, King began creating a series of preliminary pageants, culminating with the Miss SE Wisconsin Pageant. Even before he was involved in a national system, King had formulated his own unique preliminary system.

his own unique preliminary system.
In 1988, as a guest of USA Pageantry,
Inc., King found the way to showcase
Wisconsin's talent and give his winners
the opportunity to go further than just a
local pageant system. In 1989 he brought
the first nationally franchised female impersonator pageant to Wisconsin.

King held his first Miss Gay WI-USA Pageant with 15 contestants. The competition was done in one night, at the Pivot Club in Appleton. Over the next year he held 12 preliminary pageants, which are still intact today. He added and deleted preliminaries over the next several years, with the goal of showcasing the abundance of talent from across the state.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN, AGAIN

Greg, a former Mr. Gay Wisconsin and Mr. Gay Wisconsin-USA, had been working with King in the pageant circuit for more than 5 years. Todd, his partner (in more ways than one), is also a former Mr. Gay Wisconsin-USA.

While King was still alive, Greg and Todd acquired the Great Lakes System from King Productions. King, of course, had made the bridges for them with Jerry Bird (the owner of USA Pageantry, Inc.).

Late last year, King announced to the community that he was forming a committee to run and manage King Productions. Greg, Todd, myself, and several others were part of the Committee. Its purpose was to continue the award-winning King Productions in its founder's place.

In fall of 1994, Jerry Bird had several discussions with Greg and Todd regarding King's declining health. King had informed several of us that he was making arrangements with Bird for King Productions to continue in the future, managed by the Committee.

It wasn't until after King's death that Greg and Todd discovered that arrange-

ments had never been made. As a matter of fact, according to Bird, plans had never even been discussed. It was obvious then that King had only thought about the future of King Productions, but not seriously enough to discuss them with Bird.

But a very accurate source and historian of King Productions told me that Jerry Bird was not ignorant about King's wishes for King Productions to continue, managed by a committee. "I had several discussions with Jerry Bird on this subject. He was well aware of Jimmy's wishes," my source said.

- TAG TEAM IS BORN

When King died around the first of this year, it was Bird's decision to disband the Committee (for personal and professional reasons). He told Greg and Todd that if they weren't interested in the Wisconsin System, he would sell it to someone from the Chicago area. As Greg told me, "Jerry sort of talked us into it."

As new pageant system owners, TAG Team made very few changes their first year. They eliminated some preliminaries that were not profitable. They also sold some preliminaries off as franchises. TAG Team helps their franchise owners set up the preliminary, securing judges and doing basic promotion. In turn, the franchise owners pay a franchise fee, but decision making, prize structuring and management is done by the franchisee.

But commitments King had put in place before his death had to be kept. King had already agreed to hold the 1995 WI-USA Pageant at the Paper Valley Hotel in Appleton on August 19, 1995. The date and place for Mr. Gay Wisconsin and Ms. Gay Wisconsin had also been scheduled. Greg said, "This year's pageant will hopefully be as good as last year's."

IS IT ALL WORTH IT?

As a pageant owner myself, I know the heartaches and headaches, first hand. To the audience and the contestants, a pageant is glamour, glitz, competition and celebration. But to the owners, it's costly, expensive and not cheap. It's extremely difficult to get the event to pay for itself, much less make a profit. And even when your event is over, you still need to dish out money to send your winner to the nationals. Top HAT Productions only has one winner to bank roll at the Finals. TAG Team has five (yes, I said 5!).

But TAG Team was pleased with their contestants at the various Finals this year. Miss Wausau, Josie Lynn, finished 28th out of 77 contestants. Kylie West, Miss Great Lakes, placed 33rd. "Josie's talent is always flawless," said Greg. "And Kylie is experienced, which can get you far in the Finals." He admitted that he believes everyone learned a lot, and the learning experience is worth its weight in gold.

WHAT'S AHEAD?

Todd, 27, a former Mr. Gay Wisconsin USA, has been involved in the pageant circuit for approximately three years. After his reign was over, he continued to help run and manage pageants for King Productions. Todd works for IDS Financial Services in Green Bay.

Ann, in her mid-20's, is a Claims Adjuster for AMS Medical. She's been great friends with Greg and Todd for several years. Ann is straight, but has a genuine love and fascination for the art of female impersonation. As she and I both know, the only way for a straight woman to be involved in Gay pageants is through ownership or management. She was happy to throw her hat in the ring and become a part of TAG Team Productions.

Greg, 32, has been involved in the pageant circuit as a titleholder or in administration for over five years. When TAG Team Productions isn't occupying his every waking moment, he manages Za's in Green Bay.

Jimmy King used his pageants to showcase the finest female impersonators in the state. He did that for five or more years and he was a dedicated, hard working, at times catty, but always straightforward pageant system owner. Several of his state titleholders have gone on to compete and win other pageants, in other systems. All of them speak lovingly of him, and miss his enthusiasm and dedication.

7th Annual Lambda Literary Awards Bestowed

Surprise Winners and No-Shows at Gala

Chicago — The Lambda Literary Awards, now in their seventh year, celebrate the very best in Gay and Lesbian literature. These most prestigious honors are announced at a truly lavish dinner attended by the brightest Gay and Lesbian writers, publishers and media personalities.

This year, the Lammy Awards gala took place at the Palmer House in Chicago, during the annual American Booksellers Association convention. The irreverent Kate Clinton was again at the helm as MC, where her usual mix of wit and zany antics made enjoyable a night otherwise more notable for the several surprise (and absent) winners that left most attendees baffled.

It was certainly a surprise that John Berendt's New York Times non-fiction best-seller Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil was nominated in the Best Gay Mystery category, but winning over Caleb Carr's superb The Alienist was an even bigger surprise. More baffling was the heterosexual Dr. Abraham Verghese's win of Gay Men's Biography/Autobiography Lammy for My Own Country, a memoir about working with AIDS patients

Some other winners that caused a bit of a stir included: Renate Stendhal's Gertrude Stein in Words and Pictures over the much higher profile Serving in Silence by Margarethe Cammermeyer as Best Lesbian Biography/Autobiography; and Kiss & Tell's Her Tongue on My Theory over Dorothy Allison's Skin as Best Lesbian and Gay Small Press Book. Skin won however, not unexpectedly, as Best Lesbian Studies.

In a few categories, the winners seemed like foregone conclusions. Allan Hollinghurst's The Folding Star, Tony Kushner's Angels in America, Part 2: Perestroika, and Melissa Scott's Trouble and Her Friends were certainly no sur-prise winners as Best Gay Fiction, Best Lesbian and Gay Drama, and Best Gay and Lesbian Science Fiction/Fantasy, respectively. High profile, mainstream press offerings Chloe Plus Olivia, edited by Lillian Faderman and Joan Nestle, and John Preston's Sister & Brother were sure winners in the fiction and non-fiction Lesbian and Gay Anthology categories.

The lack of winners in attendance was perhaps the most notable fact of the awards ceremony. Among the few present were Ellen Hart, whose Small Sacrifice won as Best Lesbian Mystery, and Rebecca Brown, who accepted her Best Lesbian Fiction Lammy for Gifts of the Body, about the experiences of an AIDS careworker. Someone accepted the award

for Her Tongue on My Theory but no one was quite sure whether it was Kiss or it was Tell. Barbara Smith, winner of the Publishers Service Award, was unable to attend, but Mab Segrest's moving acceptance speech as recipient of the Editor's Choice Award for her devastating Memoir of a Race Traitor was by far the evening's highlight.

If there was one category where all of the nominees should equally have shared a Lammy, it was Gay Men's Stud-







A Lesbian cooks. A dyke defrosts. A dyke makes dinner. A Lesbian makes reservations.


A Lesbian entertains at home. A dyke has a regular stool.
