

Thousands Expected for Wisconsin AIDS Walk Sept. 17

Al and Tipper Gore Likely to Lead Walk

Milwaukee — As In Step went to press, a record-breaking 9,000 people had already signed up to participate in the 6th annual AIDS Walk Wisconsin on Sunday, September 17 along Milwaukee's lakefront.

Organizers at the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) promise constant entertainment and plentiful food along the 10 kilometer (6.2 mile) fundraising walk, which supports vital AIDS care, prevention and research programs in Wisconsin. Organizers also hope the sunny skies and warm weather which graced last year's Walk make a return appearance, ensuring that everyone has a great time.

Pre-registration is required, and can be done by calling 1-800-348-WALK.

Vice President Al Gore and his wife Tipper are Honorary Co-Chairs of this year's Walk. Mrs. Gore, who has joined in other AIDS fundraisers around the country, is committed to attending the event. The Vice President's schedule had not been confirmed as of In Step's deadline, but organizers are hopeful he will be on hand.

In accepting ARCW's invitation, the Gores said: "We are personally dedicated to doing all that we can to support the excellent work of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin in delivering AIDS prevention, support and research services. It is with great enthusiasm, therefore, that we accept your invitation to serve as Honorary Co-Chairs of AIDS Walk Wisconsin."

AIDS WALK BREAKFAST

Opening the big day will be the AIDS Walk Wisconsin Breakfast, from 9 to 11:30am at the Italian Community Center, 631 E. Chicago Street. Carol Meekins of Today's TMJ4 will be Master of Ceremonies. Doug Nelson of ARCW and Lon Sprecher of Wisconsin Physicians Service Insurance Corporation will speak, with a keynote address on "AIDS in America — Embracing the Challenge."

Tickets for the Breakfast are \$50 per person, and RSVP is requested by September 11. Casual attire is fine.

THE WALK

Meanwhile, registration for the AIDS Walk opens on the Summerfest grounds at 10:30am to the melodic sounds of the popular band, Love Monkeys. Participants are urged to bring their pledge money and sponsor forms to the sign-in area. Opening ceremonies begin at Noon, with the Walk stepping off at 12:30pm. It's estimated that most people will take about three hours to complete the Walk.

Walkers will also be greeted by clowns, jugglers, a mime artist and the "Funny Little People" from Chicago. Massage therapists from the American Massage Therapy Association will provide massages, and aerobics instructors from the Sports Medicine Institute will lead the crowd in pre-walk aerobics.

"We strongly encourage people to come early and have fun," says Robert Florek ("BIM" of BIM Productions), Entertainment Committee Chair of the Walk. "Take advantage of our massage therapists, help make quilt squares, do some aerobics or have your face painted while you listen to the music. The AIDS Walk Wisconsin is truly an 'entertainment walk."

Other entertainers along the 6.2 mile route include the bands Casper, Hat Trick, Loons and In Black 'n White, singer Maria Montenegro, dancers from Dancecircus, Danceworks, Ferrago and the Cream City Cloggers. Food and water will be available at six rest stops along the route, as well as at the staging area.

At approximately 3:45pm, a Grand Finale Celebration will take place at the Miller Stage on the Summerfest grounds. More entertainment will be provided, and the results of the Walk will be announced.

ARCW hopes to shatter all records in terms of participation and funds raised at this year's Walk. Last year, the Walk drew more than 8,500 participants and raised \$570,135. Since the first Walk in 1990, the event has raised more than \$2 million and increased community awareness about HIV/AIDS.

FRIENDLY COMPETITION

Prizes will be awarded to those individual participants and teams who collect the most money by September 17.

The top three pledge-getters in the entire Walk will receive: Grand Prize — 2 round-trip United Airlines tickets to London, with 5 nights' accommodation; First Prize — lodging and two round-trip tickets to Las Vegas; Second Prize — 2 round-trip tickets on United Airlines to any destination in the contiguous 48 states.

Another friendly competition between Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian bars will reveal which bar is able to field the largest team for the Walk and raise the most funds. As of August 23, Mama Roux was out ahead with 60 team members, with the M&M Club and This Is It close behind at 44 and 39 participants, respectively.

Other bars participating are: Just Us, Kathy's Nut Hut, The Triangle, 3B's, Fannies, the Wreck Room, La Cage, the 1100 Club, Cafe Melange, and Crossroads / Friends in Fort Atkinson. Please stop in at your favorite establishment and sign up for its AIDS Walk team.

Everyone who participates and raises at least \$100 will get an AIDS Walk Wisconsin t-shirt. Those bringing in \$250 will get an AIDS Walk sweatshirt; \$500 reaps a Ricoh Super 35mm camera. Anyone raising \$1,000 will get a Sony AM/FM Cassette Boombox; \$2,000 will net the walker an AIWA CD Walkman.

WHO BENEFITS?

The groups benefitting from this year's AIDS Walk are many and varied. They include: the Milwaukee AIDS Project, the Madison AIDS Support Network, the Center Project Inc. in Green Bay, the Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project in Kenosha, the Northwest Wisconsin AIDS Project in Eau Claire and the Wisconsin Community-Based Research Consortium.

The AIDS Walk also benefits: the East Central Wellness Project in Winnebago, Camp Heartland, the Midwest Hispanic AIDS Coalition, the Central Wisconsin AIDS Network in Wausau, Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin, the Milwaukee Indian Health Board, the Northern AIDS Network in Rhinelander/Superior, the AIDS/HIV Ministry Task Force of the Wisconsin Conference of Churches, ACT UP/Milwaukee and the Great Lakes Hemophilia Foundation.

"Long Road to Freedom" History Display Opens at Milwaukee's City Hall September 5

Madison, Chicago Will Also Host Exhibit



Milwaukee — Anticipation is building for the September 5 reception at Milwaukee's City Hall which will mark the opening of the Long Road to Freedom Gay and Lesbian history exhibit sponsored by The Advocate and the Seagram Company. The exhibit will then have a ten-day run at Milwaukee's Central Library.

The opening event, a benefit for PrideFest '96, is being touted by organizers as a chance to "Make history while viewing history." It is the first openly LesBiGay event to be held at City Hall.

PrideFest Co-Chair Bill Meunier was enthusiastic about the significance of the event's location. He told In Step: "Last spring, we placed rainbow flags along the downtown streets to remind people that they're our streets too. This incredible event will remind people that it's our City Hall too!"

Marge Beil, an aide to Mayor John Norquist, had this to say about the significance of the display: "The Long Road to Freedom recognizes the dedication, struggles and contributions of Gays and Lesbians in America. Gays and Lesbians in Milwaukee and elsewhere are valued members of our communities. Their history, challenges and successes deserve our attention."

THE EXHIBIT

The exhibit, which chronicles 27 years of the Gay and Lesbian movement through photos, cartoons, articles and ads that have appeared in The Advocate, debuted at the Stonewall 25 celebration in New York City last summer and has been touring the country since then.

The display is comprised of 30 panels, each 4' by 7'. Twenty-seven panels correspond to each of the years since the founding of The Advocate in 1967. They document police repression against Gays in the form of beatings and bar raids, early Gay Liberation protests, the various factions of the movement (drag, leather, Lesbian separatist, etc.), the cultural component of the Gay awakening (entertainers, writers, etc.) and much more. Three additional panels chart the evolution of marketing toward the Gay and Lesbian community by advertisers.

Stephanie Blackwood of The Advocate told In Step The Advocate's development and expansion over the years has mirrored that of the Gay and Lesbian movement.

"When you consider where the community and the movement were in '67 — hidden, not visible. The Advocate was just an 8-page newsletter. Today, it's like the movement: colorful, brash, very out, very political."

Indeed, the first copy of **The Advocate** was mimeographed clandestinely in the basement of an ABC television office in Los Angeles in September, 1967. Today, it is a full color glossy newsmagazine, sold on newsstands throughout the nation and the world.

The exhibit is based on a compilation of The Advocate's history, which was gathered into the mammoth book Long Road to Freedom: The Advocate History of the Gay and Lesbian Movement, edited by Mark Thompson and available in bookstores.

The first decade **The Advocate** was published, it focused almost exclusively on Gay men. Blackwood acknowledged that fact and said an effort was made to make the book and exhibit somewhat more representative of women and people of color as well. In the last decade, **The Advocate** has become much more balanced, with readership among women in particular increasing exponentially.

Blackwood said it is especially satisfying to see interest in local Gay and Lesbian history mushroom as Long Road to Freedom is shown in cities around the country.

"As this show finds its home in each community, local people are becoming involved in their own projects, interviewing Gay elders and documenting their own histories."

Milwaukee has been part of that national trend. This past summer, PrideFest hosted the first display of *Living the Dream*, a large exhibit focusing on Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian history since Stonewall. The project was coordinated and sponsored by Attorney Steve Brondino and, like *Long Road to Freedom*, is expected to be shown at Milwaukee's Central Library.

WHERE TO SEE IT

After the gala reception at Milwaukee's City Hall on September 5, which costs \$25, The Long Road to Freedom will be set up in the Humanities section on the second floor of Milwaukee's Central Library where it can be viewed by everyone for free through September 14.

From October 6 through November 5, Long Road to Freedom will be displayed at the Chicago Historical Society. Those dates roughly coincide with Gay and Les-bian History Month in October, a tradition many Chicago activists have worked hard to establish.

Mayor Richard M. Daley will appear at a benefit for the Gerber/Hart Gay and Lesbian Library and Archives at the Historical Society on LaSalle and North Avenues October 20. In addition, Gerber/ Hart, at 3352 N. Paulina, will display Keepin' On: Images of African American Les-bians from October 6-31. It was created by the Lesbian Herstory Archives in New York.

Candace Gingrich to Visit for Coming Out Day Events

Milwaukee — Candace Gingrich, the Lesbian half-sister of Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich, will visit Wisconsin in October to participate in activities around the annual celebration of National Coming Out Day.

Gingrich has become a spokesperson for the National Coming Out Day Project, which is sponsored by the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) in Washington. She has been touring the nation, lecturing on the importance of Gay and Lesbian visibility and urging Gays and Lesbians and their supporters to become more politically involved.

'When my brother became Speaker of the House, I recognized that I had an opportunity and an obligation to get involved in the movement for Gay and Lesbian equality in a meaningful way," the 28-year-old Gingrich has said.

"Working with HRCF, I will be asking more and more people to join this effort and help meet the challenges presented by a more conservative political landscape. When people realize that they have Gay friends, families and coworkers, they are more likely to understand the problem of discrimination

and support equal rights."

Gingrich recently signed a contract with Scribners to write a book called Family Matters, about her life and her relationship with her brother. She told the press the book will trace "Newt's path from an eccentric libertarian up-front about his own foibles, to an archconservative closely aligned with hardright, anti-Gay crusaders like Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson.'

Gingrich will hold Town Meetings in Madison and Milwaukee on October 3 and 4. The time and location of her Madison appearance had not been confirmed by In Step's deadline. She will appear on Wednesday, October 4 at Centennial Hall of Milwaukee's Central Library from 6:30 to 8:30pm. The Milwaukee event is being sponsored by the Human Rights League. It is one of a series of events planned around National Coming Out Day, which is October 11. Watch for more information in the next issues of In Step.

Pro-Lesbian Family Rights **Ruling Stands**

Madison — A federal district court judge has refused to overturn a landmark Wisconsin Supreme Court decision issued in June that affirmed for the first time the importance of the bonds formed by

Lesbian and Gay parents with their nonbiological or non-adoptive children.

In an August 23 preliminary decision that US District Court Judge Malcolm Shabaz said he is likely to make final, Judge Shabaz ruled that he could not overturn the state's highest court's decision, and that the proper route of appeal would be to the US Supreme Court.

In June, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled that Sandra Holtzman of Madison had legal standing to seek visitation rights with the six-year-old son she helped raise with her former partner, Elsbeth Knott, also of Madison. Knott is the child's biological mother, but the boy has told the court that he considers both

women to be his parents.

In a long and complicated legal battle that began with the dissolution of the couple's decade-long relationship in 1993, Knott had sought to deny Holtzman the right to spend time with the boy. Knott's attorney, Charles Schutze, declined to say whether he will now appeal the case to the US Supreme Court. If the case is not appealed, the case will be returned to Dane County Circuit Court Judge George Northrup, who will define the terms of Holtzman's rights to visitation with the boy.


Eau Claire — Chad Johnson, 19, has been sentenced to one and a half years in prison and must pay \$1,790 in restitution after pleading guilty to aggravated felony battery for a Gay bashing incident in Eau Claire earlier this year. He received an enhanced penalty under Wisconsin's hate crimes law, which provides for stiffer sentences if the crime was motivated by

Janesville - Mercy Hospital is suing a nurse formerly employed there as well as the nurse placing service that recommended her in an attempt to recoup damages awarded to a patient who said the nurse had lured her into a Lesbian relationship. In March, a jury ordered the hospital to pay the alleged victim \$460,000. The nurse was also ordered to

pay damages of \$250,000.

NATIONAL News Briefs

Lesbian Couples Win Joint Adoptions in Illinois

Chicago, IL — Following a year-long legal battle that resulted in a precedent-setting ruling, two Lesbian couples seeking to adopt their children were granted their petitions by a Cook County

judge on August 24.

In one of the cases, Judge Marjan Staniec ruled that "[I]t is fit and proper for the best interest of the minor sought to be adopted that...the Petition for the Adoption be granted. It is therefore ordered that from this date, [the child] shall be to all legal intent and purposes the child of the petitioners, the same as if she had been born to the petitioners in lawful wedlock."

The order follows an Illinois Appellate Court ruling in July which held — for the first time — that unmarried couples, including Gays and Lesbians, have the same adoption rights as married and single parents under Illinois law. The appellate court, which covers trial courts throughout the state, sent the case back to Cook County court to determine if the adoption was in the best interests of the children, a paramount concern in all adoption proceedings. The lower court found that it was.

The Lesbian couple in one of the cases, Kay and Deb, sought to jointly adopt their three-year-old daughter, Olivia, whom Kay conceived through alternative insemination, without disturbing Kay's parental rights. In the other case, Kathy and Mary sought the joint adoption of Kathy's two children—one adopted, one conceived through insemination.

Rob Eichberg, Coming Out Day Founder, Dies at 50

Tesuque, NM — Dr. Robert Eichberg, a psychologist and co-founder of National Coming Out Day, died of AIDS complications August 11. He was 50.

In 1988, Eichberg, together with Lesbian activist Jean O'Leary, initiated National Coming Out Day as a means to encourage homosexuals to come out of the closet and become more visible and active. Each year since, National Coming Out Day has become a bigger celebration, with celebrities (actors Dick Sargent and Amanda Bearse) coming out of the closet and events in major cities across the country.

Eichberg was born in Brooklyn, but spent most of his life in Los Angeles and Santa Fe. In 1978, he established The Experience, an intensive workshop in which participants were given support to learn to accept and then reveal their sexual orientation to loved ones. In 1990, Eichberg published Coming Out: An Act of Love, the book which has become the central guide for many people struggling with the issue.

In Coming Out, Eichberg wrote: "I am asking that you disclose your homosexuality and realize that by hiding your sexual orientation you have contributed to the prevailing stereotypes of what it is to be Gay and can make a major contribution in changing those stereotypes."

"If you are a heterosexual and know and love someone who is Gay, I am asking that you come out as well. You too have supported oppression by not stating that you have a son, daughter, mother, father, cousin, friend, or acquaintance who you care about and who is Gay."

Gay Army Officer Assumes Reserve Command

El Monte, CA — In a formal ceremony before 150 soldiers of the 155th Corps Support Battalion (CSB), Captain Ken L. Osborn, an openly Gay soldier from Placentia, California, assumed command of the Headquarters Detachment. Osborn is a 13-year veteran of the Army Reserve and has served with the 155th CSB in El Monte for the past six years.

Osborn is still serving in the Army Reserve even though he is openly Gay due to an injunction issued by Federal. Judge Eugene Nickerson. Osborn is one of five litigants in *Able v. US*, the class action suit challenging President Clinton's revised ban on Gays in the military. The case is pending.

The offer of a command position came as a surprise to Osborn who said: "Since the Army knows that I am Gay and involved in litigation, I never expected to be offered a command position. This is one of the proudest moments of my life. Ever since I was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant, I have looked forward to command time."

"This is a great day for the Gay Veterans," said Osborn, who serves on the board of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Veterans of America. "As far as I know, I am the first publicly Gay officer in the service to be given a command position after his orientation was known. This action by the Army Reserve only reaffirms the fact that a soldier is a soldier, no matter the orientation."

Postal Service, Veterans Affairs Ban Anti-Gay Bias

Washington, DC — The US Postal Service and the cabinet-level Department of Veterans Affairs have each adopted policy statements which forbid discrimination based on sexual orientation in personnel matters.

In July, Postmaster General Marvin Runyon issued a new policy which says: "Harassment or disparate treatment based on actual or perceived sexual orientation or identity will not be permitted or condoned in the Postal Service."

Then in August, Veterans Affairs Secretary Jesse Brown declared that his department "does not condone nor tolerate discrimination based on race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability or sexual orientation in any of its personnel policies, practices and operations."

"It is essential that we recognize that diversity of culture and life styles exists among employees, as it does in our veteran population," said Brown.

The Department of Veterans Affairs is now the 14th of 15 cabinet-level department which have forbidden sexual orientation bias. While some sectors within the Department of Defense prohibit such discrimination, it is the only department which refuses to issue a department-wide anti-bias policy.

Man Wins Damages for Same Gender Harassment

Montgomery, AL — A male employee of an insurance company who claimed that his boss sexually harassed him on the job has won a federal lawsuit against his employer.

A jury in Montgomery agreed that Ford W. Prescott, who was employed for

13 years by Independent Life and Accident Insurance, was the victim of sexual harassment by his boss, Tommy Lee Meeks, who reportedly grabbed Prescott's crotch and kissed him on the neck. Meeks had eventually fired Prescott, claiming Prescott was spreading the rumor that he, Meeks, was Gay.

Before the jury could decide on damages for Prescott, he agreed to a settlement for an undisclosed amount of money from his former employer.

The ruling in Alabama follows one last May in Tennessee, in which a federal jury awarded \$1.6 million to a male employee of a Waldenbooks store who

was sexually harassed by a male supervisor.

But the overall treatment of samegender sexual harassment by the courts is mixed. Attorney Chai Feldblum told the Washington Blade in May: "If the harassment is based on sexual advances made by a Gay supervisor, which the Waldenbook case is, the courts have been deciding in favor of its victims.

"But where the harassment is sexual orientation-type harassment, in other words, based on an employer harassing a [same gender] employee because of sexual orientation, the courts seem to be ruling that Title VII [of the Civil Rights Act] does not cover such harassment."

Geffen and Taylor Foundations Donate Millions to AIDS Groups

New York, NY - Foundations run by entertainment mogul David Geffen and actress Elizabeth Taylor have donated more than \$7 million to AIDS charities.

On August 9, Geffen, an openly Gay man, announced that his foundation would donate a total of \$4 million to the Gay Men's Health Crisis and God's Love We Deliver, two New York-based AIDS service and advocacy groups. It is believed to be the largest single donation in the history of the AIDS epidemic.

Gay Men's Health Crisis will get \$2.5 million to open a center which will provide HIV testing, counseling and preventive education. It will be called the David Geffen Center for HIV Prevention and Health Education. God's Love We Deliver, which provides 1,600 hot meals a day for people with HIV/AIDS, will receive \$1.5 million.

Meanwhile, the Elizabeth Taylor AIDS Foundation has announced that since its inception in 1991, it has given grants totalling more than \$3.1 million to 100 AIDS service groups around the world. The groups range from the Pediatric AIDS Foundation to Gay and Lesbian Adolescent Services to the

Minority AIDS Project.

"I am extremely proud to have been able to help so many worthy organizations in their efforts to help people with HIV/AIDS and prevent the transmission of the HIV virus," Taylor said. "I am also very proud of the fact that my foundation has no expenses. I personally underwrite all expenses so that every penny that comes into the Elizabeth Taylor AIDS Foundation can go out to deserving AIDS organizations throughout the world."

Achtenberg Gathers Nat'l Support for Mayoral Bid

San Francisco, CA — Gay and Lesbian leaders across the country are rallying to support the historic effort of Roberta Achtenberg to become Mayor of San Francisco. Achtenberg was formerly a member of the city's Board of Supervisors and was the highest ranking Lesbian official in the Clinton administration, serving as an Assistant Secretary in the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Among those who have signed on to Achtenberg's Campaign Committee are entertainers Harvey Fierstein and Kate Clinton, singer Janis Ian, writers Tony Kushner and Larry Kramer, and fellow politicians Barney Frank and Sherry

Harris.

Achtenberg has two primary opponents in the election to be held November 7: incumbent Mayor Frank Jordan and former California Assembly Speaker Willie Brown. Current polls show Jordan with 30%, Brown with 27% and Achtenberg at 20%, but rising. All are Democrats. They face only token Republican opposition because the city has long been a Democratic stronghold. One of the candidates must garner at least 50% of the vote, or a run-off will be held in December.

Lesbian and Democratic Party activist Hillary Rosen says: "Our community has a fantastic opportunity to elect a reformer like Roberta Achtenberg as Mayor of San Francisco. We must seize this opportunity."

Montpelier, VT — Vermont's State Auditor, 44-year-old Ed Flanagan, revealed in an interview with the Associated Press in August that he is a Gay man. He is now the highest ranking elected state official to be openly Gay or Lesbian. "The whole Gay rights initiative is about us being judged as individuals," Flanagan told the Washington Blade. "I hope to do my part by speaking out as one individual."

Washington, DC — Officials at the District of Columbia's Fire Department are under attack after an emergency medical technician made jokes and delayed assistance to the Transgender victim of a car accident. Witnesses say the EMT said, "This ain't no bitch!" and delayed treatment of Tyrone "Tyra" Hunter when he realized Hunter was a man dressed as a woman. Hunter died an hour later in the hospital.

Washington, DC — William Waybourn, the former Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, has become the new Director of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD). "GLAAD has built an impressive grass-roots framework to educate the public about the important roles Gays and Lesbians play in our society," Waybourn said. "I look forward to expanding that network and bridging new alliances in the crucial next phase of GLAAD's development."

Washington, DC — The Human Rights Campaign Fund has attacked GOP Presidential candidate Sen. Phil Gramm for "pandering to extremists" by supporting the Christian Coalition's effort to oust Jonathan Wilson, a Gay member of the Des Moines School Board. Gramm called a pro-Gay curriculum proposal "an attack on our children" by the "radical

homosexual community."

St. Louis, MO — Dr. Robert Goss, the author of Jesus ACTED UP, has announced his intention to transfer his clergy credentials from the Roman Catholic Church to the Metropolitan Community Church, which has a special ministry to Gays and Lesbians. "I have found a home in a non-sexist and non-homophobic church, ending my exile as a Catholic priest," Goss said.

Dallas, TX — Norma McCorvey, the "Jane Roe" of the Supreme Court case that legalized abortion who recently disavowed her position and was baptized by an Operation Rescue minister, has said that she will not leave her female lover of more than 25 years. McCorvey said she'd leave the anti-abortion side before she'd ever leave her lifetime partner, Connie

Gonzalez.

New York, NY — Terrence McNally's Love! Valour! Compassion!, the Gay-themed play which was the first play ever to sweep the five top New York theater awards in one season, will close on September 17 after 249 performances. The play won a Tony Award as Best Play, an Outer Critics' Circle Award for Outstanding Broadway Play, the New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best American Play, the Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Play, and the OBIE Award.

San Francisco, CA — Mayor Frank Jordan, in a tight race for re-election, has asked the city's Parks Department to consider naming an athletic field in the heavily Gay Castro District after Ricki Streicher, the late owner of the legendary Lesbian bar, Maud's.



Sharon Dixon, owner of Fannies, recalled Dorn as "a great guy. With Jim, his word or his handshake was as good as

gold."

Chuck Balistreri, the manager of Club 219 who was a longtime friend of Dorn, said: "I consider Jimmy to be one of the leaders of the community at that time [the 1960's and `70's]. He was a leader in our business association and attended Gay People's Union meetings."

Jim Dorn was the son of the late John and Lorraine Dorn. He is survived by his sister Shirley and many relatives and friends. Services were held August 21 at the Schaff Funeral Home, with a private interment at Highland Memorial Park.



Janet Mueller, Deb Procknow Wed

Milwaukee — On Saturday, August 5, Janet Mueller and Deb Procknow were married at the Quaker Meeting House in Milwaukee. The Quakers have a long tradition of non-state sanctioned marriage, and the Milwaukee Friends Meeting has approved of same-gender marriage since October of 1987.

"It's great to know that there are religious groups that have evolved to the point that they are not just tolerant, but accepting and truly integrating of Gay and Lesbian couples and families,"

Procknow told In Step.

The ceremony began with Meeting members and friends and family of Mueller and Procknow gathering in silence, after which a longtime member of the Meeting explained the Quaker marriage process and the history of samegender marriage. Mueller and Procknow then exchanged promises (in Quaker tradition, they are not called "vows"), including this one:

"In the gathered presence before our friends, family and spiritual community, I promise to be your faithful and loving partner, friend and spiritual companion for as long as we both shall live."

In another Quaker tradition, after the couple exchanged promises, individuals had the chance to speak and share their thoughts, tributes and best wishes for the newly wed couple. The ceremony ended with Cris Williamson's popular composition, Song of the Soul.

One hundred thirty-one people placed their signatures on the Marriage Certificate, indicating the Meeting's approval of the marriage. Procknow explained that having their marriage taken "under the care of the Meeting" means that all Meeting members have a stake in the new relationship and family that Mueller and Procknow have formalized.

Mueller and Procknow met in 1986 and became lovers a year later. Mueller is an attorney with the Legal Aid Society and a co-owner of Just Us at 807 S. 5th Street. Procknow manages the bar. 
Jamakaya to Receive Award

Legal

A Call for Community Ethics in Court

Litigants have the "right" to make any argument they wish that they think will win their cases. But litigants, and their lawyers, can choose to exercise ethical judgment when deciding what arguments to make. The Lesbian and Gay community should demand no less when disputes erupt between members of the community.

The need for ethical principles is most apparent in child custody disputes between two Lesbians (or Gay men) who formerly reared one or more children together. In a number of cases, the biological parent has asserted her "right" to exclusive custody of the child, denying the child the right to an on-going relationship with the other (nonbiological) parent.

The issue arises because most Lesbian co-parents are not recognized legally as parents. Only recently have some courts begun to allow Lesbian co-parent adoption, by which both parents become recognized legally as parents. Despite the recent tremendous victories in the D.C. and Illinois Appeals Courts, and the 1993 victories in the Massachusetts and Vermont Supreme Courts on this issue, however, such second-parent adoptions are not allowed in all states.

Thus, in a large number of Lesbian families, although Lesbian partners are rearing children together, only one parent, namely the biological one, is legally recognized as the parent on the children's birth certificates. This works fine, so long as both parents are alive and getting along fine. But problems can develop when the biological mother dies or the couple breaks up. In the latter case, unless courts recognize the nonbiological mother as a parent, the biological mother can cut off all relationship between the children and the other mother.

THE WISCONSIN CASE

The Wisconsin Supreme Court's June decision affirming the right of children to a continuing relationship with the nonbiological parent in this type of situation, the first decision of its kind, is a marvelous breakthrough. Adding to the sweetness of the victory is the fact that it is the Wisconsin Supreme Court that last year ruled against Lesbian co-parent adoptions. Wisconsin had hardly seemed like the court that would render a positive decision on this issue.

The Wisconsin court ruled that visitation rights may be granted to a partner when she "has a parent-like relationship with the child," the biological parent has interfered with the parent-like relationship between the child and the nonbiological partner, and the partner

seeks court-ordered visitation within a reasonable time period after the interference. The court said a "parent-like relationship" exists: 1) if the partner had lived with the child and had taken on significant responsibility for the child's development and had contributed to the child's support; 2) if the biological parent consented to and fostered the relationship with the child; and 3) if the relationship between the person and the children had existed long enough to create a parental bond.

Sadly, it was not some heterosexual guardian appointed for the child who argued in the Wisconsin case that the child had no legally-enforceable rights to visitation with the nonbiological parent. That would have been upsetting, but par for the course when litigating Lesbian and Gay civil rights cases in an overwhelmingly heterosexual legal system. But it is positively galling to realize that it was the Lesbian biological mother, and her presumably pro-Gay attorney (he has represented many other Gay clients), who vigorously opposed visitation by the nonbiological parent.

IS BIOLOGY DESTINY?

Their argument? That the biological parent had a constitutional right to decide who would visit the couple's child, and that this superseded any rights of the child or the partner. In essence, she and her attorney were arguing that biology is destiny when determining who is a parent.

Mind you, this was a case where the couple had decided jointly to raise a child together, had decided to have one of the women inseminated by an anonymous donor, had reared the child for over four years together; where the nonbiological parent had shared child-care responsibilities; and where the nonbiological parent had provided the primary support for the family.

As reported in the July 7 Washington Blade, the attorney for the Lesbian biological mother claimed that he and his client felt "torn" in this situation, but that their arguments were "the only way to prevent visitation." Making legal arguments undermining the validity of Lesbian and Gay families is simply not the "only way" to win the case. If the nonbiological mother is as terrible for the child as the biological mother apparently believes, then the biological mother can present evidence at trial to convince the judge that this is so. She shouldn't be trying to establish a legal principle — applicable to all cases — that a child has no rights to a continuing relationship with a nonbiological mother.

But she and her attorney seem determined to do just that.

They are not willing to accept the Wisconsin Supreme Court's decision, and return to the trial court to slug it out over the facts. Instead, they plan to make a federal case of it, filing suit either in Federal district court, or else appealing to the United States Supreme Court.

(Editor's Note: A federal judge on August 23 refused to overturn the June decision. See "State Briefs" for details.)

If they are successful in their quest to give a biological mother in a Lesbian family absolute power over the children's relationships with their other (albeit nonbiological) mother, it will be a terrible set-back for judicial recognition of Lesbian and Gay families. If the biological mother and her attorney want to stop feeling "torn" about what they are doing, there is an easy remedy — stop their appeals.







Saturday and Sunday August 19-20 was the 7th annual Miss Gay WI-USA Pageant in Appleton. Check out Belle Pepper's







No Middle Ground

"Well," Kathleen responded, "I'm definitely in the middle. Yep. Middle. Oh, well, I do have a couple of butch tendencies. You know, little ones. I once had to pull the engine on my 4x4, and I do enjoy weights. Um, a couple of my girlfriends, well, you know, were kind of into makeup. But, no, on a one to ten scale, I would say that I belong in the middle. I bake."

The question was: Are you butch, femme, or in the middle?

It was a simple question, and I had been asking nearly any Lesbian who would stand still, the same thing, (and you know how hard it is to get a Lesbian to stand still for anything!) In order to get some idea of our ideas of what the butch/femme thing means these days.

Now, I admit that most of the Lesbians I hang out with can tell you where they were when Kennedy was shot, even if it was "in daycare." So that would mean that they had some association with the National Organization for (Not Lesbian) Women, which, at that time, was afraid that its butch contingent would screw things up (a technical term). And mandated flannel shirts, chinos and Birkenstocks for everyone, so nobody could tell the Lesbians from the Lesbians. (Who was kidding whom in those days?)

Butch/femme was declared an "anathema to progressive behavior, and a mock reflection of the male/female paradigm" (translation: Us imitating them. Again.) And was deemed UNAC-CEPTABLE!!!!! (Emphasis theirs.) Thereby disallowing even the merest possibility that butch/femme might have

something that was uniquely Lesbian in search of a real definition, and not one that had to have a big, strong male in any part of the comparison.

That it might be butch/femme, and not homme (man)/femme, for a reason.

As a result, we have an entire generation, and a bi-i-i-i-g generation it is, which has knee jerked the concept of butch/femme off the playing field. For itself and generations to come. For example, on the other hand, Dianne: "Uhhuh, me? Middle. No question. Definitely. In The Middle!" Her voice has a lilting giggle to it. She has been spotted on occasion in heels and nail polish. She isn't afraid to ask for help changing a tire, then fully direct the process. And she claims the middle. "Well, okay, I probably do have a tiny touch of femme. Nothing contagious, you understand. But I do like the feel of silk against my skin. And I like skirts. IS THAT A CRIME? But I can stop the toilet from running. So I would say ... put me in the middle. Definitely."

The thing is, if you lined up nearly all of the Lesbians I'd ever met, possibly with the exception of Leslie Feinberg and Joann Loulan (No, they are not a couple. Now don't start that!) against the wall, they would each claim to be a five. Ask nearly any other Lesbian to assign a 1-10 number to each member in the entire array, and not one would have the slightest difficulty figuring out who is a 4 butch and who is a 3 femme. We know it. Instinctively. About other people. (And darn few would end up with a 5.5 which is the real middle on a one-to-ten scale)

So what is it about denial that we find so attractive? What keeps us from looking our selves squarely in the mirror. (Give or take a hot fudge sundae or two) and recognizing that there is a yin-yang of human behavior that we all qualify for?

Admit it, you do know a butch/
femme couple. Okay, that's a good start.
Now in this couple, one seems more . . .
what? In charge? That would be the
femme, right? Wrong? How can you tell?
The one with the long hair could also be
the one with the 800 math scores. I met
her in Chicago. Her frilly-souled partner
masquerades as a sports jock type. Seems
we've struggled with the definition forever. And butch femme has nothing to do
with what we wear. A femme in a tuxedo

in a tuxedo may look that way till her butch-in-a-tuxedo partner comes along, then you really know which is which.

Now look at all the couples you know. (This is a game. There will be prizes and a bonus round at the end.) Which one is butch? Which femme? What about butch-to-butch couples? Does one femme (can femme be a verb?) by default? And femme 2 femme (besides being the Lesbian Village People)? Who fixes the ceiling fan? And how long have they been together, not counting tomorrow?

Of course it's confusing. The minute we stopped borrowing our definitions from other people, we discovered we have none of our own. So, obviously we need to reevaluate the entire premise, starting with you.

Wanna know where you stand on the 1 to 10 butch/femme scale? Easy. Go find an honest Lesbian you aren't married to. And then ask her. Chances are, without even knowing you, she'll accurately have your number. And it will be any number but five.



If Madonna's Truth or Dare left you wanting more out of a "pop" documentary, then the "Truth and Flare" of fashion's Unzipped will be a welcome surprise. Pretentious, playful and poignant — Unzipped is a candid, hip, compelling look at an American original — fashion "wonder boy" Isaac Mizrahi.

Although centered around Mizrahi and his fashion empire, this film is not a one-man show. The cast is filled with familiar faces you love and others you end up loving. Mizrahi's studio and runway includes fashion's staples: Naomi Campbell, Linda Evangelista, Cindy Crawford and many others. Fawning fashionites such as Eartha Kitt, Liza Minelli and Sandra Bernhard give Unzipped added zip. Cameos by the fashion editors of Elle, Vogue and Allure give this flick an absolutely fabulous air. If you went to Ready to Wear ready for a big dose of fashion and were disappointed - you won't be disappointed by Unzipped.

The film holds one scene stealer — Mizrahi's mother. A charming Jewish, New Yorker mom, I wanted her for my own. She's like "buttah." With pride, Mother Mizrahi adds a splash of color to the screen as she extols amazing anecdotes about her son — the little designer.

Douglas Keeve, Mizrahi's ex-lover and *Unzipped*'s director, not only makes this film a dazzling portrait of a high profile designer, he is also able to make Mizrahi comfortable enough to share his personal, intimate side with the camera. From conception to completion of a new collection and all it entails, the audience is witness to Mizrahi's struggles and insecurities as he fights to live up to his name.

Fun with fabrics, friends and faux fur makes *Unzipped* extremely watchable; plus, the "real-life" story is fulfilling. Despite some serious subjects, *Unzipped* never loses what makes it a good film: the playfulness of fashion.

If you can't hop a jet to New York and buy an original, full-length bright orange faux fur by Mizrahi to wear while strutting around "The Village," then run to see Unzipped — it's the next best thing.
