

Feature Interview A Talk with National Coming Out Spokeswoman Candace Gingrich Newt's Lesbian Sister to Visit Madison and Milwaukee

Candace Gingrich, the Lesbian half-sister of the Republican Speaker of the House of Representatives, is touring the country on behalf of the National Coming Out Project. She'll hold Town Meetings in Madison and Milwaukee on October 3 and 4, respectively. The Madison event will take place Tuesday evening at 7pm in the Auditorium of the State Historical Society. The Milwaukee event will be held at 6:30pm in Centennial Hall at the Central Public Library.

As the Lesbian sister of the notoriously conservative Newt Gingrich, Candace has garnered much publicity this year. She talked with In Step Editor Jamakaya about her brother, her new role as a Lesbian activist and why it's important to come out.

Candace, how has your life changed since coming out so publicly and becoming a personality in your own right?

There's some pretty obvious things. I no longer work 60-70 hours a week in offices and at UPS. I get to work 60 and 70 hours all over the country. I don't get to play rugby as much anymore. But actually, it's all been wonderful, so any changes that have happened have happened for the better.

Have you ever felt that you've been used by gay leaders?

I've gone in pretty clear-eyed and ready-to-go. I completely welcomed the opportunity to do what I'm doing and have not had to be talked into anything. I couldn't be happier to be doing this. I've made the decisions all on my own so, no, I don't feel that way at all.

You've been traveling around the country quite a bit.

Yeah, by the time I get to Milwaukee and Madison, they'll be the 44th and 45th cities since April.

What do these "Town Meetings" consist of?

Well, it's part of the Coming Out Project, so first I talk a little bit about my own coming out stories and how I got to be involved and what kinds of things other people can do to help for equality for Gays and Lesbians. Of course, coming out being the best thing they can do...Then a Human Rights Campaign Fund staff person will talk a little bit about what's happening federally: what kind of

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legislation are we up against, what kind of things people can do on a national level. And then we have Questions & Answers, and that's usually pretty fun because people can ask whatever they want to. It's a good way to find out what people in the country are really concerned about.

Are the audiences mostly Gay and Lesbian, or are they mixed?

It's usually mixed. At the majority of stops, maybe 60-70% are Gay and Lesbian supporters, but they may not necessarily be involved.

Are you getting any really interesting or challenging questions?

Well, people are really concerned about the stuff going on nationally, because in some communities they just don't get information from the federal level. So people will be curious about how the Colorado case is going [the constitutionality of the anti-Gay Amendment 2 will be argued in the US Supreme Court October 10], where legislation is at - like the Employment Non-Discrimination Act. They know we introduced it a while back but they want to know its status right now. People want to know what we need to be doing to combat the anti-Gay bills and amendments [Rep. Bob] Dornan and [Senator Jesse] Helms usually introduce.. For the most part, they really want to know what they can do.

And you're helping with that process. I think so.

And it sounds like you're enjoying it quite a bit.

Yeah, a lot.


Have you received any negative feedback at all?

Not much, just from a few people who, I guess, criticize me for what they see as capitalizing on somebody else's achievements. I had a letter very early on from someone who said that "nobody gives a rat's ass what you're doing you're no better than Roger Clinton!" [laughs]

This interview will appear in *In Step*'s National Coming Out Day issue, so I want to ask you about your own coming out. I understand your mother found out about you after finding a Gay newspaper in your room. How did you feel after your mother and sisters found out about you?

I was happy. I hadn't really thought about how I was going to approach them, per se. Would I talk to them? Would I just let them discover it? And then it just kind of happened. My mom found the newsletter and brought it to me and it was like, "Oh well, I guess I'll tell them now."

How old were you?

Twenty-one. I'm 29 now. It kind of made me realize there are a lot of people who just don't understand Gays and Lesbians, because when I first talked to my Mom she had what I consider to be very common misconceptions about Gay people. She wanted to know what had happened to me to make me become a Lesbian, and she wanted to know where she and my Dad had gone wrong in raising me - those kinds of things. I just assured her that this was who I was: I was healthy, I was happy, I was comfortable with it. There is nothing you can do to change it, so just be happy for me. I let her fill-in the rest of the family, but from that point on, within that setting, I always felt perfectly comfortable ...

Your sisters were OK with it too?

Yeah. One is 16 years older, the other 18 years older. Newt is 25 years older.

So you're the baby -

[in a mock tone] The baby, the postscript, the mistake, the afterthought, the change-of-life baby — you know.

Yeah, I know. I'm the youngest, so I get that too. So it changed your life in a positive way?

I thought it was positive. It was very nice not to have to hide it. They knew, so it wasn't like I had to dance around any subjects or make up excuses for why I wasn't dating. They knew.

Why should other Gays and Lesbians come out?

There are a bunch of reasons, ranging from the personal to the public. One is just the empowerment that you get. You can finally say to yourself: *I am important*, *Who I am is important. And yes, I care about the people around me, but it's time for me to take care of myself.* I think for people who are not out, for people who cannot come out, it's kind of like an enslavement. You basically make a decision to hide a very important part of your life from people around you, whether it's people you love or people you just know. It's a fulfilling and empowering thing for a person to be able to be honest about themselves..

Jumping from the personal to the public level, most people who know someone Gay or Lesbian do understand the discrimination we face, and they are more supportive of what we're trying to do to end that discrimination. So not only do you empower yourself but you gain allies in the fight towards our equal rights. It's harder to discriminate against someone when you know them. When it's Sue that I work with or Bob next door, it puts a face on it. By coming out you actually help educate people.

"Your Brother Doesn't Have to Be Speaker for You to Make a Difference in America."

You've said you are as liberal as your brother is conservative. I'm wondering where you picked up your liberal views along the way.

That's a good question. How do people pick up values — so to speak anyhow? I did grow up in the 1970's and 80's and was strongly influenced by the activism of the 60's. Most of my family grew up in the 50's, so there was a really different feel in the country then. I guess I also realized at a really early age that as far as picking liberal, conservative, Democrat or Republican — that as a woman, I saw much more acceptance and concern about women's issues in the Democratic Party, in the values the Democratic Party espoused.

So you'd define yourself as a feminist?

Yeah. I knew I was a feminist long before I knew I was a Lesbian.

So, is your brother returning your calls yet?

I haven't been calling him recently [laughs].

You met him on Capitol Hill last Spring with all the cameras rolling. Since then, it's been quiet?

Yeah, but that's not unusual. It's not like we talked all the time anyhow. Partly because of our age difference and the fact that he lived in Georgia [Candace, her mother, Newt's stepfather and her sisters settled in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania while Newt stayed in Georgia for college and to begin his family 30 years ago], we only - Candace Gingrich, National Coming Out Project Spokesperson

saw each other a few times a year anyway.

Has there been any friction in your family because of the role you've taken on, with the Coming Out Day Project?

If there has been, they haven't let on. My sisters and my Mom and Dad are always curious about where I've been, who I've gotten to meet, what kind of stuff is going on, so they're not going to take sides. They understand what I'm doing and why I'm doing it, and they also understand that my brother has a job to do in whatever capacity he feels he needs to do it, so it hasn't been a dividing line.

How did you feel about the way he handled that media event with you on Capitol Hill?

That day on his balcony, I think he said some wonderful things. He basically said Gays and Lesbians are part of the American family. This reporter said to him: "Your position has been for a return to family values. How can you justify having a sister who is a Lesbian?" [laughs] Newt said: "Well, we're an American family with all the complexity of an American family." So Newt - the Speaker of the Republican-controlled House - essentially said that Gays and Lesbians are part of the American family, which is what we've been trying to remind people all along. That was great, and I felt pretty good after that. The problem is, the next morning at his press conference, he was back to the same old, you know -'we recruit, we don't need federal protection in the workplace - he just completely reversed any of the beauty of what he had said the day before.

I had the impression —

— someone gave him a few phone calls. Yeah, that's the impression I got too. Particularly because the words he was using were almost completely echoing the things we've heard from the Radical Right.

Any hopes of influencing your brother or perhaps balancing some of his views?

I guess the only thing I can really hope for is to provide the truth when it comes to Gay and Lesbian issues in opposition to the myths that he generates. I haven't influenced him yet. I don't see that as changing. Hopefully, people will also hear what I'm saying and they can be the judge.

Would you consider testifying at Congressional hearings like the kind that are planned on the supposed Gay influence in the schools?

I've offered. Those have been postponed until October. I don't know how they're going to decide who will testify and who won't. But I've certainly volunteered. I volunteered a long way back when Newt first proposed those hearings.

Is that particular issue — Gay youth and education —close to your heart?

It definitely is. That's one of the places where we have the highest stereotypical, mythical mountain to climb because the Radical Right uses that as kindling to get people fired up when the basis for their argument is completely misguided. They don't want us to be talking about these things in schools because we're supposedly promoting homosexuality. [emphatically] Well, it's an Orientation. You have it, you're born with it, it develops. You can't suggest it to someone! You can't make someone Gay or Lesbian - ugh! It's infuriating! We know that Gay and Lesbian youth are three and four times more likely than non-Gay youth to commit suicide...If you can't even talk about it as a problem, then those kids experiencing that oppression when they're in school are ignored and abandoned and made to feel less than what they are. It seems so clear to me. But it's so frustrating. [Homophobes] find all sorts of ways to warp it and to twist the issues to their own views.

What about the future?

I'm going to continue to work for the Human Rights Campaign Fund. I'm an intern in the Political Department here, so hopefully, I'll be able to continue my work. I really enjoy doing this, and I'm pretty confident it's making a difference. As long as I'm sure about that, I'll continue doing it.

I'm glad you found a way to use your Sociology degree.

Well, yeah [laughing]. I wasn't sure I'd be able to.

There's a quote of yours that appeared earlier this year in the Washington Blade that I just love. You said: "Now that I look back, I kind of feel like I've been a bad Gay person."

I hope I'm redeeming myself. I did kind of feel that way. Not that one can ever make up for not doing something but after spending seven or eight years as an apathetic, complacent person, I'm doing whatever I can do to rectify that. Hopefully, along the way, helping other people to realize they shouldn't wait for something to happen before they get involved. You know, I've met so many people who didn't get involved until they lost a loved one to AIDS, or until they were beaten up leaving their bar, or until they lost their job. There was something that finally pushed them to get involved. Although I know that's kind of the case with me, I hope that other people realize that we can't all wait for something to happen. We need to make it happen, now.



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Tips for Coming Out and Taking Your Next Steps

- Wear an openly Gay symbol or button for an entire week.
- Fly a Rainbow Flag outside your home on Coming Out Day October 11 and on Gay and Lesbian Pride Day in June.
- Call a radio talk show and introduce a Gay or Lesbian topic.
- Read a Gay newspaper openly on a bus or in a restaurant.
- Write out a check to a LesBiGay organization to support its work.
- Invite your Gay and straight friends to the same party.
- Confront your co-workers about a bigoted joke or comment.
- Put your lover's photo on your desk at work.
- Call "him" a "him" and "her" a "her" when talking about your love life.
- Hold hands with your partner publicly.
- Have both of your names put on your magazine subscriptions.
- Open a joint bank account with your partner.
- Be openly affectionate with your lover upon arrival or departure at an air, bus or train terminal.
- Go to your local jeweler with your lover to shop for matching rings.
- Invite your LesBiGay family to traditional family or religious functions.
- Take your lover home for the holidays this year.
- Come out to your family parents, brothers and sisters.
- Come out to your landlord, neighbors and co-workers.
- Write a letter to your Senator or member of Congress in support of Lesbian and Gay rights.
- Help organize a march or discussion group on LesBiGay rights.

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COME OUT! - To National Coming Out Events In Wisconsin NCOD to Be Celebrated Across the Nation

The 8th annual observance of National Coming Out Day (NCOD) will be celebrated with public forums, concerts, dances, art exhibits, religious ceremonies, lectures and rallies all around the US, and especially here in Wisconsin, the Original Gay Rights State.

On NCOD, October 11, Candace Gingrich, the Lesbian sister of House Speaker Newt Gingrich, will address a rally on the steps of the US Capitol in Washington.

In Los Angeles, actor Dan Butler of NBC's Frasier, who along with Gingrich is a spokesperson for NCOD, will speak at the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center.

Denver will see a week of Gay-related activities, New York City's Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center will hold dozens of celebratory events, and the Texas State Fair will experience its first Gay Day.

For the third year, Comedy Central will run an hourlong comedy special featuring Gay and Lesbian comics. This year's show, Out There in Hollywood, will be hosted by Scott Thompson of Kids in the Hall.

Next to the traditional Gay and Lesbian Pride parades and festivals in June, National Coming Out Day is rapidly becoming the new Queer Holiday. Some communities have so many events related to NCOD, it may need to be renamed National Coming Out Week or Month.

NCOD was initiated in 1988 by veteran Lesbian activist Jean O'Leary and Gay psychologist Rob Eichberg. (Eichberg later wrote the classic guide to coming out, Coming Out: An Act of Love. He passed away this summer of AIDS complications.)

Called to mark the anniversary of the 1987 March on Washington for Gay, Lesbian and Bi Rights as well as the first showing of the NAMES Project AIDS Quilt in the nation's capital, NCOD was aimed at encouraging people to come out of the closet and become more involved in the fight for Gay and Lesbian civil rights

Wisconsin, with its proud record of being the first state in the union to adopt a Gay rights law, has been in the forefront of NCOD activities, and this year is no different. A list of the many activities follows

AIDS Walk Wisconsin Raises a Record \$783,748

Milwaukee — September 17th's AIDS Walk Wisconsin along Milwaukee's lakefront raised more money than any other AIDS fundraising event ever held in Wisconsin. A record-breaking crowd of 10,028, enjoying the brisk early Fall weather, raised \$783,748 to fund AIDS care, prevention, research and advocacy throughout the state.

"The turn-out at this event shows that in times of crisis, people in Wisconsin come together to help each other," said Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. "It is truly heartwarming to see the outpouring of support. We could not provide high quality services to people with AIDS without the dollars people bring in on Walk day."

Tipper Gore, wife of Vice President Al Gore, attended. She spoke at the pre-Walk Breakfast and at the Opening Ceremonies on the Summerfest grounds, where she was greeted enthusiastically by the crowd.

Mrs. Gore said: "When you see all the people involved in AIDS Walk Wisconsin, you've got to have hope. Whether you're living with HIV or you have AIDS, or you know someone or you're their partner or a member of their family, you have to feel a sense of hope and solidarity with the rest of this great community here."

According to Diane Dalton and Cliff Heise, co-chairs of the Walk Steering Committee, the event was nearly flawless: "The weather cooperated, the route was in great shape, the entertainment along the walk was excellent. We just couldn't have had a better day."

Meanwhile, Landmark Enterprises has announced an awards party for participants in Foots*teps to the Future*, the friendly competition among area bars to raise the most money in AIDS Walk pledges.

The party will be held Sunday, October 1 from 3-6pm at the Comedy Cafe, 618 E. Brady Street. At the party, a Grand Prize will be awarded to the individual who raised the most pledge money. Clarenbach, Gay/Lesbian Politicians Honored at Madison Event

Madison — Former State Rep. David Clarenbach stopped off in his old hometown of Madison September 21 to attend a fundraising reception for the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund. The event at the

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Olbrich Botanical Gardens drew most of Wisconsin and Dane County's many openly Gay and Lesbian officials.

In attendance were State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, Dane County Supervisors Mark Pocan and Scott McCormick, City Council members Judy Olson and Mike Verveer, Municipal Judge Shelley Gaylord, former Chairman of the Dane County Board Dick Wagner, and former City Council member Ricardo Gonzalez.

The reception was the first stop on a 16-city national junket for Clarenbach, who this Summer was named Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.

Clarenbach cleared up ongoing confusion about his own sexual orientation this Summer when he told In **Step:** "I am a Gay man." During his 20 years as a state legislator, Clarenbach authored Wisconsin's landmark Gay and Lesbian civil rights law, sexual privacy legislation and a bill of rights for people with HIV/ AIDS.

The Victory Fund, based in Washington, DC, endorses and funnels money to qualified Gay and Lesbian candidates for public office. Clarenbach's tour is intended to raise awareness of, and financial support for, the Victory Fund.

Madison Attorney Cathreen Godre, a Board member of the Victory Fund, reports that while four years ago, there were few openly Gay or Lesbian elected officials, today there are more than 150 nationwide. The Victory Fund has given more than \$1 million to such candidates, and 65% of those endorsed by the Victory Fund have won their races.

Wisconsinites Can Apply for Slots at Democratic Convention

Washington, DC — The Democratic National Committee has approved a delegate selection plan for Wisconsin, clearing the way for Wisconsin voters to apply for slots to attend the Party's national convention in 1996.

Convention delegates vote on the Party's nominees for President and Vice President. They also participate in caucuses that address specific issues, such as HIV/AIDS and Gay and Lesbian equal rights concerns. The Democratic Convention will be held next year in Chicago. "Gay and Lesbian voters from Wisconsin have the opportunity to make their voices heard on the national level," said Kevin Layton of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "Delegates have a hand in choosing the Party's nominee and shaping the way the Party handles our issues. We can have a tremendous impact by coming out for equal rights and getting involved."

General Assistance Cut-Off in Milwaukee Will Harm People With HIV/AIDS

Milwaukee — The decision by the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisor to end General Assistance payments to the indigent on September 30 is expected to severely impact many people with HIV/AIDS in the metropolitan area.

Cheryl Vaughn, Director of Social Services at the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP), told In Step that 25-30% of MAP's approximately 1,000 clients depend on their monthly General Assistance checks. Some of them need the money (\$200) to carry them through while they await a decision on their application for disability insurance from Social Security. Others require the money because they are homeless and unemployed.

Vaughn painted a stark picture of the future of the poor in Milwaukee: "With General Assistance ending and with Doyne Hospital closing, indigent people, including those with HIV/AIDS, will see critical supports pulled out from under them."

"There will be an increase in homelessness and the need for more shelters and soup kitchens. We're likely to see more people wandering the streets. In families under increased economic pressure, there is likely to be more violence and abuse," said Vaughn.

"The medical and social services communities are trying desperately to identify more services and sources of revenue to help. Personnel in MAP's Public Policy Department are working with medical professionals and politicians to devise alternative sources of support for indigent people with HIV/AIDS." Vaughn believes MAP will have to provide clients with more rent assistance and general financial assistance. And MAP's food pantry will be used more than ever. "I find it shocking that there have

been no contingency plans to take care of these most needy people. We can all un-

derstand the need for government belttightening, but to just abruptly stop payments like this is not a humane response."

County Supervisor Dorothy Dean has been the most outspoken and bitter critic of the General Assistance cut-off. She recently issued a series of "tips" for poor people who will have their money cut off.

Among Dean's tips: begin collecting cardboard for your new home; scout restaurants with the best leftovers in the garbage; "Form a sports team and threaten to leave the state," and "Pretend you are dead. The County pays \$1,000 for burial of paupers."



Also Around the State ...

Madison — In his proposed budget for the 1996 fiscal year, Madison Mayor Paul Soglin has included a \$10,000 allocation within the City Health Department budget to initiate a clean needle exchange program to reduce the spread of HIV/ AIDS.

Although several conservative City Council members have voiced opposition to such a program, Council member Mike Verveer expects the allocation to be approved, especially in light of a National Academy of Sciences study praising the effectiveness of such programs.

Ryan White Act Clears the House on Voice Vote

Washington, DC — On September 18, the Ryan White CARE (Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency) Act cleared a critical hurdle in its long journey through Congress when the House of Representatives approved the bill on a voice vote. It was passed by the Senate in July on a 97-3 vote.

Health advocates had worked to avoid a repeat of the mid-summer attack on the bill by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC), who offered amendments on the Senate floor designed to gut funding for the program in general and, specifically, to deny life-sustaining medical care to Gays with HIV/AIDS.

A lobbying strategy targeted at moderate Republicans and key Democrats successfully prevented anti-Gay zealots from attacking the bill with hostile amendments in the House. Among the bipartisan group of lawmakers who cooperated to advance the legislation were Reps. Michael Bilirakis (R-FL), Tom Bliley (R-VA), Steve Gunderson (R-WI), Gerry Studds D-MA) and Henry Waxman (D-CA).

"The way has been cleared for the renewal of the government's leading program for the care of people with AIDS," said Winnie Stachelberg, Health Policy Advocate for the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "After months of tough negotiations and a lot of hard work by people on and off Capitol Hill, it looks like people with AIDS can continue to count on help from Ryan White."

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US Supreme Court to Hear Colorado Case October 10

Washington, DC — On October 10, as Gays and Lesbians across the nation prepare to celebrate National Coming Out Day, the US Supreme Court will hear oral arguments to determine whether Colorado's anti-Gay Amendment 2 is or is not constitutional.

The Amendment, passed by Colorado voters in 1992, would prohibit state and local lawmakers from adopting any measure protecting the civil rights of Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals. It would also repeal existing Gay rights laws in Denver, Boulder and Aspen.

The Colorado Supreme Court struck down Amendment 2 as a violation of the equal protection clause of the US Constitution. "The right to participate in the political process is clearly affected," wrote Justice Luis Rovira. The Amendment "singles out one form of discrimination and removes its redress from consideration by the political process."

Proponents of Amendment 2 appealed the Colorado court's decision to the Supreme Court. The resulting case, *Romer v. Evans*, is considered by legal experts to be the most significant case to deal with civil rights for Gays and Lesbians since the *Bowers v. Hardwick* case in 1986, when the high court upheld Georgia's sodomy law.

Even more may be at stake with Romer v. Evans because numerous anti-Gay initiatives are brewing in states throughout the country. The Supreme Court's decision in the Colorado case could halt them in their tracks or give anti-Gay groups the green light to continue their campaigns.

"We intend to set the record straight on Amendment 2," said Suzanne Goldberg of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, a co-counsel in the case. "Although the radical Right and their public relations firms have tried to disguise the true nature of anti-Gay ballot measures, we will show how these measures are discriminatory, undemocratic and unconstitutional."

Maine Mobilizes Against Anti-Gay Measure

Augusta, ME — Independent Governor Angus King has joined a coalition of Maine community organizations, businesses and officeholders to campaign against the first anti-Gay initiative to appear on a statewide ballot east of the Rocky Mountains. The coalition, Maine Won't Discriminate, is working to defeat Question One on the November 7 ballot.

"Question One is an extreme and flawed measure, written by outsiders, that will embroil Maine in a costly legal disaster," according to Pat Peard of Maine Won't Discriminate. "Question One targets the Gay and Lesbian people in our community, but it will invite interference in all of our lives and cost maine taxpayers millions of dollars."

Question One was written by Bruce Fein, a right wing lawyer from Virginia who has worked with Radical Right groups to push similar measures in other states. It would prohibit "sexual orientation" from being included in any future civil rights laws. The Maine Bar Association opposes it, and the Maine State Superior Court has condemned it as "misleading."

Congress to Hold Hearing on Alleged Gay Influence in the Schools


Washington, DC — A Congressional panel has set October 13 as the tentative date for a hearing sought by anti-Gay crusader Rev. Lou Sheldon to investigate alleged "homosexual influence" in the country's elementary and secondary schools.

In an August fundraising appeal for his Traditional Values Coalition, Sheldon boasted of his role in staging the hearing and promised to use the taxpayer funded forum to attack local school efforts to prevent anti-Gay violence, suicide and AIDS. Sheldon has built his career out of scapegoating Gays and Lesbians.

Some communities have adopted modest efforts to address the epidemic of hate violence and discrimination aimed at young Gays and Lesbians within the schools. It is these programs which stand accused of "promoting" homosexuality. Gay and Lesbian leaders are urging

Gay and Lesbian leaders are urging people to call and write to Rep. Peter Hoekstra (R-MI), Chairman of the Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee, to cancel the proposed hearings. Hoekstra's office number at the Capitol is (202) 225-4401.

Gay lobbyists suspect that the hearings, timed to coincide roughly with National Coming Out Day events across the country, will be used as a forum to attack the alleged "Gay agenda," and spread more myths and fear about Gay people.

Gay School Board Member Defeated in Des Moines


Des Moines, IA — On September 12, Jonathan Wilson was defeated in his bid for re-election to the Des Moines School Board. Wilson, who is openly Gay, became the target of a massive right wing campaign to unseat him after he revealed his homosexuality during a heated battle over a school board policy about the teaching of diversity.

The election results were dramatic. The top two vote-getters were candidates endorsed by the Christian Coalition and supported by Bill Horn. Horn, formerly of southern California and producer of the anti-Gay propaganda video *The Gay Agenda*, moved to Iowa to work as a Radical Right operative. He led the anti-Wilson forces in a campaign that alleged Wilson was trying to foist his homosexuality upon students.


"The dramatic victory of the Radical Right in Iowa must serve as a wakeup call to all Americans of conscience who support an education system free of intolerance and bigotry," said Robert Bray, Field Organizer for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "It is another scary reminder of the power of the Radical Right to marshal its electoral forces to defeat diversity and quality education systems free of prejudice."

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


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

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Gay/Lesbian Leaders Talk Civil Rights With Janet Reno

Washington, DC — On September 13, representatives of national Gay and Lesbian advocacy groups met with Attorney General Janet Reno and other Justice Department officials to talk over Gay-related civil rights issues.

The groups, including the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the Human Rights Campaign Fund, Lambda Legal Defense and Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, sought the meeting with Reno after the Justice Department refused to file an amicus brief in the upcoming Supreme Court case involving Colorado's Amendment 2.

"We wanted to express our disappointment with the Department's decision in the Colorado case," said NGLTF's Helen Gonzalez, "and explore opportunities for the Justice department to weigh in on future civil rights issues related to Gay citizens."

Discussion focused on hate crimes, anti-Gay ballot measures and pending and potential legislative attacks on Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual people.

"The Attorney General seemed genuinely moved when we discussed the issue of hate crimes, and interested in using her office as a bully pulpit in condemning hate violence."

"As we enter the Presidential primary season, we can expect that anti-Gay rhetoric and legislative attacks will only get worse before they get better," NGLTF's Melinda Paras commented. "We need allies who support justice and fairness to be vigilant in defending basic civil rights principles. The Justice Department should be one of those allies."

Elizabeth Dole Accused of Squelching AIDS Information

Washington, DC — The New York Times reports that some officials with the Red Cross have accused the group's President, Elizabeth Dole, of toning down the character of Red Cross publications on AIDS for political reasons.

Dole's husband, Bob Dole, is a Republican candidate for President who recently has been taking increasingly conservative stands to bolster his support with the party's right wing.

The Chairman of the Red Cross, Norman Augustine, denied that Mrs. Dole's directives were motivated by politics.

"[I]n this particular case, Mrs. Dole has some strongly held personal views," Augustine said. "There were concerns raised that the material is highly explicit in terms of sexual matters, including illustrations. But it didn't have anything to do with politics, but what's best for the Red Cross."

Red Cross chapters across the country have been without an array of prevention materials about HIV/AIDS since the national office has delayed their distribution because of revisions.

The **Times** reported that internal Red Cross documents expressed concern with some explicit language in the fliers and videos, wanted more emphasis placed on personal responsibility in preventing AIDS and asked that a drawing of a penis be redrawn "in a more clinical fashion."

Shana Ross, HIV/AIDS Coordinator for the Houston Red Cross called the delays and excuses "unconscionable."

Chicago Rights Commission Rules Against Boy Scouts

Chicago, IL — On September 19, a hearing officer for the City of Chicago Commission on Human Relations issued a preliminary decision that the policy of the Chicago Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America prohibiting the employment of homosexuals in professional scouting positions violates the City's Human Rights Ordinance.

Hearing officer Jeffrey L. Taren rejected the Boy Scouts' claim to be a religious organization exempt from coverage of the ordinance. Taren also stated that the Boy Scouts' First Amendment right to expressive association had not been violated because opposition to homosexuality is not an expressive goal of the Chicago Area Council.

Taren recommended that the Commission issue an injunction barring the Boy Scouts from considering the sexual orientation of applicants for employment, and from publishing on its applications or literature distributed in Chicago, any employment criteria which indicate a preference or limitation on the basis of sexual orientation.

"Hopefully, this ruling will send a strong message to employers, especially in Chicago, that they cannot discriminate against people because of their sexual orientation," said Harvey Grossman, Legal Director of the American Civil Liberties Union.


Tyler, TX — The second man convicted in the Gay bashing murder of Nicholas West in 1993 has been sentenced to death. Henry Earl Dunn Jr. and Donald Aldrich face the electric chair for killing West, whom they abducted, took to a remote area, ridiculed and shot nine times. One more suspect is yet to be tried.

Virginia Beach, Va — Virginia Beach has quietly amended its equal opportunity policies to prohibit job discrimination based on sexual orientation. The change was only made public months after it had occurred. But at least one local fundamentalist pastor is vowing to gather enough signatures to force the City Council to reverse the action.

Washington, DC — A \$20,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts is helping to bring the entire NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt back to the nation's capital in October, 1996. The display is expected to be 23 times larger than the first showing of the Quilt in 1987. Almost 45,000 panels dedicated to loved ones lost to AIDS will stretch from the Capitol to the Washington Monument.

Marietta, GA — Two years after Cobb County passed an anti-Gay resolution, a poll indicates that the majority of county residents think the resolution was wrong, that it's had a negative impact and that it should be rescinded. The resolution condemned the "Gay lifestyle."



Viewpoint Coming Out — Its Day and Nature

A Gay friend new to town needs to buy a washing machine. "I want a really basic model," he tells the salesman, who in response asks if he's married. He hums and says no. The salesman continues "well, when you do get married, you'll want a de licate cycle for her dainties." Later, my friend guiltilyadmits, "I should have just come out to him. I was caught off guard."

It's Fall again. The first day of school. Two minutes into class. After drawing attention to the syllabus listings of my office information, I do a mental push-up and proceed: "I've also given you my home telephone number; there's an answering machine and my lover is willing to take messages, though please don't try his patience with complicated ones." The sentence floats out over the room: some students get it, some don't, some, still sleepy-eyed, aren't even listening. But word gets around. Word is out. I've just come out to fifty strangers.

October 11th marks the eighth annual celebration of National Coming Out Day. What is it that we celebrate? What makes coming out something worthy of celebration? Why for so many Gay people is coming out the central event of their lives? The answers are courage, freedom, and dignity.

Now, many Gay theorists - most ly trendy academics - claimthat the very idea of coming out is a bugaboo. They hold that there is no lurking inner Gay essence that somehow is first discovered by the Gay person within him or herself and then made manifest to others through an act - "coming out" - whereby that which before was concealed is now revealed. They claim rather that society induces or constructs the person as Gay and so also always knows that the person is Gay even though both society and the person pretend that this fact is not known. On this account, homosexuality is an open secret, a secret that is always giving itself away

CLAIMING ONE'S SEXUALITY

But the issues of whether one's sexuality initially is an open or a complete secret and whether its causes are society, genes, or something else are largely irrelevant to understanding

the coming out processes. Coming out is primarily a moral rather than a cognitive act. It is not a matter of *knowledge* but of *acknowledgment*. In coming out, one acknowledges one's sexuality to oneself and presents it to others in such a way thateven if they know of it already, they can no longer act as though they don't.

Coming out is the claiming of one's sexuality as one's own (wherever it came

from) and raising it as an issue for others where relevant. As the Lesbian theorist Joyce Trebilcot has put it, coming out is primarily a matter of taking responsibility for sexuality: "Coming out is not merely a matter of reinterpreting one's past; it involves taking responsibility for being a Lesbian both in the past and in the future." Coming out is socially important because it dashes the shame generated by the open secret, the dirty little secret that runs: "we know that you know that we know, but we won't mention it because your sexual bearings - you - are as embarrassing to acknowledge as excrement." Coming out says no to the humiliating rituals of "don't ask, don't tell." Coming out is a refusal to go along with society's presumption that for all public purposes being a person means being heterosexual.

But because this presumption is so central to society's understanding of itself, coming out will not be socially viewed as merely an irritation, like hooliganism. It will be viewed, like civil disobedience, as an act of treason – a challenging of the very ground rules by which society, largely through unacknowledged habit, constitutes itself. And so coming out is a major act of moral courage. Indeed as modern culture becomes ever more bureaucratic, mechanistic, and socialistic, the coming out process affords one of the few remaining opportunities to manifest courage.

But what's in it for the individual? Many Gay activists hold that the point of coming out is that it makes you feel good and gives you power. The truth, though, is one which Gays' parents in particular don't want to hear: coming out is not chiefly a means to happiness and power; indeed it typically requires putting these values at risk. Coming out cedes away privilege and its powers. It increases one's exposure to discrimination. It gives one a heightened awareness of the ways in which society despises Gays. These changes are not near occasions of happiness.

A SENSE OF SELF

But no one who goes through the coming out experience ever willingly goes back into the closet. For people get something else, something more important, out of the experience. They get a sense of self, a sense that, for better or worse, their life is their own, that it has a ground. This is something quite different from acquiring materials and benefits or enj oying, say, sex or a tune. Coming out is an ultimate adventure, for it constitutes the surfacing of the individual as capable of guiding her life by her own lights. To be so positioned is to be a person, to live in freedom, to have dignity. In their willingness to sacrifice their own happiness, privileges, and benefits, Gays and Lesbians through coming out reconsecrate personhood, freedom, and individual dignity as the highest human values.

We are right then to celebrate coming out and to give it its special day. Coming out is the heart of Gay pride. What is worthy of celebration is not the simple and perhaps given fact of being Gay, but our doing something about it for the good. That we mark coming out, like a birthday, with one special day, though, should not mislead us into thinking that coming out is an event, like being born, which is singular, unique, and done once and for all. At least until the emergence of the messianic era, everyday living itself will occasion the need for coming out on a rolling basis. The paradigm case of coming out is not that of telling Mom and Dad, but of telling sleepy students and clerks at Sears.


"Roominations" Performance Art at Walker's Point Center

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Books Zipter's "Ransacking the Closet" Offers Humor & Insight About Lesbian Life

Yvonne Zipter's humorous essays on contemporary Lesbian life have been entertaining readers for years, including in Wisconsin where her column, *Inside Out*, appears monthly in **In Step.** With **Ran**-

sacking the Closet, Zipter has culled some of her best previously published work and mixed in some fresh material to present the wide and incredibly diverse Lesbian culture.

A native Milwaukeean now living

in Chicago, Zipter has a keen and observant eye plus wry wit. She emerges from the pages of her **Closet** as a kind of EveryLesbian. Definitely a child of the "Wonder Years," Zipter possesses downto-earth perspective on the many mysteries of Lesbian life.

Zipter knows that nothing identifies any group like a simple but catchy label, and therefore opens **Ransacking the Closet** with a discussion of the proper term to effectively describe a collection of Lesbians. Although a "deluge of dykes" has been experienced by many at any of the seemingly endless Melissa concerts over the past eighteen months, Zipter finds poetry in "a burst of Lesbians." She writes: "Nothing makes my heart soar like a burst of Lesbians."

Incorporating her own personal "life-as-a-Lesbian" experiences, Zipter tackles the mysteries of modern life. From an exploration of the attire of the chic dyke to a "How Much of a Jock Are You?" quiz, Zipter attempts to identify today's Lesbian. The foibles of dyke dating (particularly her own) is covered in "Dates, Nuts and Serial TV" and "Here at the Grand Coulee Dental Dam." These help answer the perennial question: Just what do Lesbians do in bed? Besides sex, there is apparently much laughter.

Much like **Growing Up Gay** by Three Funny Gay Males, Zipter is a true child of '60's TV and believes she is not alone in this phenomenon. For example, she notes that far more Lesbians would probably be able to sing along to the theme song from *Gilligan's Island* or *The* Flintstones than "any song you could name by women's music stars such as Cris Williamson or Holly Near."

After exploring the curious appeal of the popular soap All My Children, Zipter

then goes on to ponder, in a deliciously bitchy fashion, that Lesbian icon of the 1970's: the character Buddy from Family. Noting that tabloids had once reported that actress Kristy McNichol reputedly barked like a dog

during sex, Zipter bashfully admits to contemplating doing her biography: Bark Like a Dog: The Kristy McNichol Story. Zipter wraps up her essay, "What the Nielsons Don't Know (And We'd Rather Not Admit)," with her refreshing version of an issue of TV Guide in a Lesbian-centered world.

Whether it is softball or dating (which Zipter suggests are often one in the same), dealing with old lovers or new girlfriends, experiencing Lesbian motherhood or therapy, Zipter maintains a positive, though irreverent, view of life. Those looking for a scholarly examination of the Lesbian mystique should look elsewhere. Zipter writes purely from the world she knows well and obviously loves dearly — that of herself and her friends.

Aided by a keen sense of observation, Zipter manages to find some — often hilarious — universal truths. If anyone ever thinks about putting together a Lesbian time capsule for the 1990's, **Ransacking the Closet** definitely deserves to be included. Recommended.

Zipter's other books are Diamonds Are a Dyke's Best Friend: Reflections, Reminiscences and Reports From the Field on the National Lesbian Pastime and The Patience of Metal, a poetry collection.







No Nunsense By Sister Dana Van Iquity National Coming Out Day: Now Come Out, Dammit!

Finally, October is upon us! The marvelous month when we get to revel in our Gay/Lesbian/Bi/Trans double-barreled holiday!

As any queer-in-a-costume knows, this is our annual national religious festival - Halloween (or Hallow Queen, as we Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence affectionately call it); that once-a-year event permitting even the butchest of boys to don a dress and the femmiest of Lesbians to sport a motorcycle jacket, and allowing every other oddity to occur!

But it is also National Coming Out Day (NCOD), October 11, when zillions of Gaymericans will participate in NCOD's eighth anniversary. Celebrating the historic March on Washington and the inaugural visit of the NAMES Project Quilt to Capitol Hill on October 11, 1987, it is a time, in the words of NCOD spokespersons, of "taking your next step out of the closet" in a spirit of national Gay Pride.

Last year's NCOD spokesperson, Amanda Bearse (Marcy Darcy of Married ... With Children fame), is an openly Lesbian mother who boldly said: "I'm not a straight person but I play one on TV. Acting belongs on television, not in real life. That's why I stopped acting and came out. It feels great to be open and honest." Which is a cue to all us queers and queersin-training.

NCOD promises endorsements from celebrities from the religious, business

and political arenas across the nation. But what we really need is for every closeted celeb and politico to come roaring out of their closets at once. Queer Power!

A CASE IN POINT

Because it is just that creepy closet behavior that keeps us from our civil rights. For instance, the 1986 Bowers v. Hardwick Supreme Court case, where the Georgia sodomy law was upheld, happened because Justice Lewis Powell had voted at one time towards striking the law but later changed his mind and allegedly said that he had never known a Gay person in his life. Ironically, his own law clerk was Gay but not out.

(Come to think of it, have you ever noticed that judges, in their tasteful basic black robes are just one strand of pearls short of being flawless, cocktail-party drag queens?)

Nevertheless, if only that queer clerk had had an open and frank dialogue with the judge, perhaps we wouldn't have those stupid sodomy laws in America today. So, another way of commemorating NCOD is to celebrate sodomy with another practicing queer -practice makes perfect! - emphasizing the all-important second word in National Coming Out Day.

NCOD Project Director Wes Combs said: "By coming out in the workplace, Gays and Lesbians can have the important dialogue with others that can start turning ignorance into acceptance."

Did the Log Cabin Republicans flunk Politics 101?


