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

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News Feature In Step Publisher Ron Geiman Sends Greetings & "Thanks" to Community

"I'm Still Alive and Kicking!"

Recently, there's been a lot of speculation about In Step Founder and Publisher Ron Geiman, who wants to assure members of the Gay and Lesbian community: "I'm still alive and kicking!"

Ron retired from his duties as Editor in July, after twelve years of constant deadlines and continual efforts to improve and expand Wisconsin's LesBiGay magazine.

The first issue of In Step appeared on February 9, 1984 and was 48 pages long in a $51/2 \times 8$ inch format. The *Guide* included just a few dozen listings, mostly of Gay bars in Wisconsin and bordering states. The press run was 5,000.

Today, **In Step** runs anywhere from 56-80 pages in the standard 8 1/2 x 11 inch format with more news, features, photos and events than any other queer publication in the state. The *Guide* now includes more than 400 listings of bars, businesses, political organizations, sports teams and religious groups, and the press run is 11,000-12,000.

"Wow, now that I've stepped back and think about how I did all that," Ron sighed, "no wonder I'm pooped."

As many people in the community know, Ron is also HIV-positive, and after many years of good health, the virus began taking its toll this Summer.

"REALLY LUCKY"

"I'm really lucky," says Ron. "I tested positive in 1987. I'm pretty sure I was exposed prior to 1985, so I guess I'm a longterm survivor. I really only developed symptoms in the last year and a half."

"I've been retired since July 7, and I've been in and out of the hospital five times since then with a variety of HIVrelated complications, including kidney problems."

"I want to thank everyone for standing by me during the time I've been sick, and also thank the people who have known when to leave me alone so I could have time to recover."

house and cooking meals. Ron has always loved eating out, so they continue to go to restaurants each week. He is supposed to stick to a certain diet but Ron has sometimes found that hard.

"I fell off the wagon last week because McDonald's had a special on double cheeseburgers," he confesses as he breaks into a hearty laugh.

And he's become something of a "soap queen," spending long afternoons watching the boob tube. He balances the trashy stuff, however, by also challenging his mind with *Jeopardy*.

Ron has only one regret.

"I feel bad for missing so many wonderful [community] events in September and October."

HOLDING COURT

The last big Gay event Ron attended was MAPfest at the Performing Arts Center on August 26. As luck would have it, that was also his 44th birthday. Because he had just been in the hospital, everyone was glad to see him and he was just as thrilled to mingle again with his many queer friends.

With characteristic good humor, Ron greeted his friends with the salutation: "I'm glad you could all come to my party!" At one point, reclining on a lounge and surrounded by well-wishers, someone commented that he looked like a queen holding court. "I am," he laughed.

Upon his retirement, Ron appointed this reporter to be the new Editor and Annabelle Havlicek, a longtime supporter of the LesBiGay community, as Associate Publisher.

"I guess I hired you and Annabelle at just the right time, and I think you're doing an excellent job."

Ron has also overseen the incorporation of **In Step** into Gayman Enterprises. He explained that the name was a play on his own surname and was not meant to exclude Gay women. "I don't want the Lesbians to get pissed off at me," he said in mock terror. (If anything, Ron has worked to make the paper more Lesbian-friendly in the past few years.)

Ron has a message for people who are HIV-positive: "It's real important for people with HIV to stay active. I'm convinced it helped me stay healthy all these years. So don't go curling up and jumping into your grave because you get an HIV-positive test result. Go out and live life to the max!"


Candace Gingrich Gets Warm Welcome in Wisconsin

Madison — Candace Gingrich, the Lesbian sister of Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich, received a warm welcome on her recent visits to Madison and Milwaukee, including a standing ovation on the floor of the State Assembly.

Gingrich was in the Gay Rights State October 3 and 4 as part of a 50-city tour sponsored by the National Coming Out Project, a program of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, in conjunction with National Coming Out Day (October 11) activities.

In Madison, she spoke to several hundred people in the auditorium of the State Historical Society and, as in Milwaukee, was interviewed by the mainstream print and broadcast media.

A high point came when openly Lesbian State Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison) introduced Gingrich on the floor of the State Assembly chamber. (Legislators have the prerogative to introduce "distinguished" visitors.) Everyone present gave her a round of applause and a standing

ovation —Democrats and Republicans alike. A source told **In Step** the Democrats cheered her for being a Democrat and liberal activist while Republicans may have been paying their respects to her GOP brother.

In Milwaukee, she brought laughter to the crowd at Centennial Hall when she said she was glad to finally make it to Milwaukee because "I always wondered what the 'L' on Laverne's sweaters stood for."

In both cities, she urged Gays and Lesbians to come out of the closet and become active in the fight for their civil rights. She also encouraged the families and friends of LesBiGays to stand up for their loved ones' civil rights.

President Mugabe, Who Defamed Gays, in Milw. October 25

Milwaukee — President Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe, who recently stunned the world with viciously anti-Gay remarks, will be at the Ramada Airport Convention Center in Milwaukee October 25 to deliver the keynote speech at the Second International Workshop on Trade and Business Between Africa and the US. His speech is set for 7:30pm.

At presstime, it was unclear whether any local Gay and Lesbian or civil rights groups would mount a demonstration against Mugabe's visit. On the national level, LesBiGay groups as far-flung as New York, Cincinnati and San Francisco said they planned to send representatives to protest Mugabe.

The apparent lack of local reaction may be due to the fact that major groups in Madison and Milwaukee have been preoccupied with National Coming Out Day events. Spokespersons for several groups said they thought the most effective protests could be lodged with state and local officials attending the conference, the idea being that they would convey their disapproval of his anti-Gay remarks to Mugabe himself. Another source told **In Step** he thought it would be inappropriate for the area's "white-dominated" LesBiGay groups to demonstrate against an African leader.

In August, the Zimbabwe government threatened to cut off support for the country's International Book Fair if a Gay group was allowed to participate. At the book fair's opening ceremonies, Mugabe referred to Gays as "sodomists and sexual perverts...who offend both against the law of nature and the moral and religious beliefs espoused by our society."

Mugabe called Gay groups "immoral and repulsive," and later referred to homosexuals as "lower than dogs and

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pigs." In response to a letter from 70 members of the US Congress, Mugabe declared: "Let the Americans keep their sodomy, bestiality, stupid and foolish ways to themselves."

Among the organizations sponsoring the Trade Conference are: the Milwaukee Metropolitan Association of Commerce; the University of Wisconsin; the Marquette University Center for International Studies; Milwaukee County; and the US-African Chamber of Commerce.

NATIONAL News Briefs

\$1.7 Million Awarded in Same Gender Sex Harassment Suit

Miami, FL — A federal judge in Miami has ordered a company to pay \$1.7 million in back pay and lost future earnings to a former female employee who was sexually harassed on the job by her ex-lover, a woman who was also her supervisor.

Marta Blanch and Elba Llampallas lived together in an intimate relationship for ten years. They both worked as managers for Mini-Circuits Labs in Hialeah, though Blanch was a general manager. Shortly after the two women broke up, Llampallas was fired. She filed a civil rights lawsuit, claiming that Blanch had her fired for refusing to continue their sexual relationship.


US District Judge Clyde Atkins agreed with Llampallas' allegations, saying she was clearly subject to unwelcome sexual harassment by Blanch. Atkins also ruled, apparently for the first time by any federal judge, that as a Lesbian, Llampallas was a member of a group protected by the 1964 Civil Rights Act. He ordered the New York-based firm she worked for to pay her the highest amount of damages ever awarded in a same gender sexual harassment case in federal court.

A spokesman for Mini-Circuits Labs said the ruling would be appealed to the US Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta. "We hope to persuade the 11th Circuit that the alleged sex harassment is not actionable under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act."

Leadership Forum Urges Black Gays to Participate in "Million Man March"

Los Angeles, CA — The National Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum has declined to formally endorse the "Million Man March" organized by Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan and scheduled for the nation's capital October 16. But officials of the group are encouraging Black Gays and Lesbians to attend nonetheless. The march is intended as a show of black unity, particularly among black men.

"The Forum did not vote to endorse the march because we do not agree with



its sexist and patriarchal tone and the homophobic comments made by some march organizers," a statement released by the Leadership Forum's Board stated.

But, the Board continued, "Hundreds of Black Gay people participating openly in such an event will send a powerful message, one that will enable many black Gays to abandon their masks of invisibility and assume or maintain their rightful place as citizens, mentors and leaders of their communities."

"We're expecting anti-Gay rhetoric at the march," Board member Dr. Dennis Holmes told the **Washington Blade.** "But that shouldn't stop us. We want to communicate that this is wrong and that we have a role to play in black community affairs."

NGLTF's "Creating Change" Conference in Detroit November 8-12

Washington, DC — The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Policy Institute will present its 8th annual *Creating Change* Conference at the Westin Hotel in the Renaissance Center in Detroit from November 8-12. It is the largest conference in the country that aims to teach political organizing skills to activists in the LesBiGay and Transgender communities.

Major speakers at this year's Creating Change include former NGLTF Director Urvashi Vaid, who has just published an assessment of the Gay and Lesbian movement called Virtual Equality; Wisconsin State Rep. Tammy Baldwin; former San Francisco Supervisor Harry Britt; and Dr. Elias Farajaje-Jones, an African and Native American writer and theologian.

The conference begins on November 8 and 9 with day-long institutes on *People* of Color Organizing and Youth Organizing. The conference will include workshops on fundraising, equal marriage rights, campaign skills, campus and workplace organizing, military policy, etc.

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Washington Blade Crusades for Transgender Victim

Washington, DC — The Washington Blade, the weekly Gay paper serving the nation's capital, has filed a suit in District of Columbia Superior Court charging that the District's Fire Department has violated the Freedom of Information Act. The Department has refused to divulge the names of 16 EMT's who were present when a Transgender victim of a hit-andrun traffic accident was allegedly denied treatment.

Fire Department officials claim that after an internal investigation, they cannot identify which EMTs were at the accident scene August 7 when Tyrone "Tyra" Hunter, 24, was allegedly denied treatment. Witnesses report that one EMT said "This ain't no bitch" and laughed when he realized that Hunter was a man dressed as a woman. They say the EMTs delayed treating Hunter, who died at a hospital several hours later.

At a press conference after the incident, Hunter's mother said: "When someone is injured, you don't stop to check their gender or their sexual preference. You help them because you can help them, because they are human beings hurt —scared and in need...I want there to be a lesson in Ty's death — that everyone should be treated with fairness, dignity and, above all, with respect."

"To spend your last few minutes on earth being mocked for that most hurtful of things, your gender identity, is an absolute disgrace," Transgender Nation activist Jessica Xavier told the Blade. "The DC Fire Department should be ashamed of itself."

Tyrone Hunter, a hairdresser, also performed in drag shows under the name "Tyra." Friends say Hunter was wellliked and fully accepted in his neighborhood as a man who cross-dressed.

Shocking Gray Catalog Firm Files for Bankruptcy

San Antonio, TX — Shocking Gray, the mail-order company that sold clothes, books, jewelry and other items to the Gay and Lesbian community through a glossy catalog, has declared bankruptcy. Numerous vendors and patrons are angry with the company for its allegedly poor business practices and its failure to notify them of its imminent demise.

At least one individual in Wisconsin, veteran Gay activist Scott Gunkel, had filed a complaint with the State Office of Consumer Protection, claiming that Shocking Gray had cashed a check he sent them for merchandise but failed to send him the items.

Bankruptcy documents filed in Texas indicate that Shocking Gray had \$800,000 in debts to vendors plus additional overdue taxes. A year ago, an investment group took over management of the firm

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and expanded by launching a second catalog operation. Critics say the company spread spread itself too thin.

A former employee of Shocking Gray said of the business: "It was a real big mess. We had vendors stop supplying us unless we paid cash. Creditors were hounding us and we just dug a big hole too deep to get out of."

Navratilova to Promote New "Rainbow Card"

New York, NY — The New York Times reports that tennis champ and out Lesbian Martina Navratilova is teaming up with Subaru, the Travelers Bank and Visa USA to promote a new credit card aimed at the Gay & Lesbian community.

Money from use of the "Rainbow Card" will go through a special Rainbow Card Foundation which, in turn, will channel funds to six major LesBiGay and AIDS groups: the AIDS Information Network; the Astrea National Lesbian Action Foundation; the Community Research Initiative on AIDS; the National Breast Cancer Coalition; the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association; and the National Center for Lesbian Rights.

Ads promoting the Rainbow Card and featuring Navratilova's photo and endorsement will appear throughout the Gay and Lesbian press (including **In Step**, beginning in this issue).

Designs Sought for Key West AIDS Memorial

Key West, FL — The Key West AIDS Memorial Planning Committee is seeking designs for an AIDS Memorial to be built in Key West, Florida. They hope to create a worldwide symbol of awareness and provide a place for loved ones to reflect and grieve over those lost to AIDS.

The memorial will be built within a 5,000 square foot area between two beaches and a pier extending out to sea, where it will be viewed by millions of visitors who flock to the tropical island.

The international design competition is open to all who wish to participate. The deadline is November 25, with winners being announced in February next year. The winning designer will receive \$3,000.

Marriage Suit, Relationship Founders in D.C.

Washington, DC — The full District of Columbia Court of Appeals has refused to review a decision of a three-member panel which said denying a marriage license to a same gender couple was legally sound. The couple who initiated the court action in 1990 after they were denied a marriage license are Craig Dean and Patrick Gill. They have decided not to appeal this latest decision to the US Supreme Court because in Dean's words, "We don't think we have a chance in hell there."

At the same time their appeal was rejected, Dean and Craig announced that their relationship ended last year. "We continued the lawsuit," Dean told the **Washington Blade**, "because we believed in what it was all about. The irony is we sued to be together and that act eventually caused the breakup."

Attorneys for Gay rights groups had discouraged Dean and Craig from filing their lawsuit for strategic reasons. Tom Stoddard, former Director of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, told the **Blade:** "They chose the wrong place, the wrong time and the wrong manner to push the issue. Even if they had won their lawsuit, the result would almost certainly have been overturned by Congress."

Also on the Newswire...

New York, NY — The Unabomber, who has sent letter bombs that have killed three people and injured others, has included Gays in his denunciation of "modern leftism." In the lengthy statement he wrote published by the Washington Post and the New York Times, he defined leftists as "mainly socialists, collectivists, 'politically correct types,' feminist, Gay and disability activists, animal rights activists and the like." He denounced as "common catch-phrases of the left" the words "sexism," "racism" and "homophobia."

Washington, DC — A Subcommittee of the House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee has again postponed hearings into allegations of Gay influence and "recruitment" in the schools. The hearings were prompted by leading homophobe Rev. Lou Sheldon of the Traditional Values Coalition. Gay activists see the hearings as an anti-Gay propaganda ploy which could degenerate into a witch hunt, and have lobbied to have them canceled.

Washington, DC — Former Oregon Gov. Barbara Roberts (D), who worked valiantly with Oregon's Gay and Lesbian community to defeat the anti-Gay Measure 9 in 1992, has joined the Board of Directors of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "I am looking forward to participating in the leadership of HRCF," Roberts said. "We must enlist the support of more and more non-Gay citizens to ensure that all Americans without exception may live free from discrimination."

Carrboro, NC — Mike Nelson, the only openly Gay elected official in Jesse Helms' home state of North Carolina, hopes to be the first openly Gay mayor there. Nelson was elected in 1993 as an Alderman in Carrboro, a suburb of Raleigh. Nelson will be facing two challengers in the mayoral election next month.





Independently Speaking -The Great American Smelting Pot

This past August, the authors were the featured guests at a faculty seminar at San Diego City College in California called "Celebration of Voices." The ongoing multicultural seminar assembles speakers from different backgrounds before faculty members to engender a better understanding of diversity and to foster more effective and creative education. We were the gay "Voices," following a Native American poet in July and preceding a Japanese-American WWII internee. The seminar is duplicated, in one way or the other, on hundreds of campuses across the nation, and all with the very best intentions. Our hosts were charming and hospitable. The questions and discussions were intelligent and to the point. The seminar could be considered a great success in furthering the faculty's understanding and toleration of Gay men and Lesbians which they can pass on to their students.

But was it really successful?

The concept of the great American melting pot has sustained American culture for nearly three centuries, and it has shaped and organized our society, our values and perceptions. But the "melting pot" myth is just that. A more apt description would be the "Great American Smelting Pot" where cultural diversity and identity is subsumed and purified into a far-removed Puritanical image of the 17th Century - the consummate white, Anglo-Saxon, Protestant male who, with his dutiful wife, would proliferate and build the perfect nation. To be successful, to be part of the mainstream, American requires its citizens to typify or be as similar to the mold as possible. Our culture, in reality, requires total assimilation rather than an accommodation of the many different values and identities that make up our country.

According to Dr. Gary Weaver, Professor of intercultural communications at the American University in Washington, DC, "We would have to search diligently to find evidence of Chinese, Latin, Middle Eastern, Indian-American, African, or of Eastern or Southern European ethnic patterns of behavior and thought being absorbed into the American culture."

A FAULTY SYSTEM?

While Congressional measures, such as affirmative action and other mandates, have sought to level the playing field through opportunities for minorities over the years, they have been impotent in resolving the real problems of America's

diverse culture of minorities. These measures simply attempt to give a larger share of the culturally imperialistic system, created by the dominant WASP culture, to minorities whose potential success lies only in conformity and in assimilation.

Too many people still believe that government can solve racism, inequity, sexism, homophobia and intolerance. Is it possible that the system by which we live is faulty? Perhaps we should stop crafting policy that still pays homage to the great American melting pot theory and simply accept people who are different, who don't fit into the mold, and don't necessarily want to fit.

Government policies are generally designed to give the people greater access to the "American Dream." But this, in effect, mandates tolerance of specially selected and designated "minorities." Much more than tolerance is required if we are to progress as a nation in the new world society and economy of the 21st century. We must learn, teach, and practice acceptance. But, far too many American's still subscribe to the old thinking that "tolerance" is sufficient. How, then, can we remedy the cultural divide in America without more ill-conceived, albeit well-meaning, government programs?

It won't be easy! The answer lies with the faculty and students of San Diego City College and the millions of other students and faculty members across the nation. Rogers and Hammerstein wrote in one of their timeless lyrics "You have to be taught to hate." By the same token, people can be taught to accept differences. It is not necessary to embrace difference, but it is vital to *accept* it. Seminars and lectures and discussions and classes – beginning early in the education process are what's needed.


ACCEPTANCE

We as a nation must endeavor to teach acceptance of different cultures, lifestyles, religions, and ethnic groups that are part of the rich fabric of American life. Without learning and practicing acceptance, America will be left behind as the new millennium begins. Americans will become the faceless, soulless, and inhuman creatures of the ultimate meltdown: the consummate white Christian male, his comparable mate and children, all rosycheeked and steeped in family values, staring blindly into – nothing.

Teachers, take heed of your overwhelming responsibility to the children, to the young men and women of our country. First, learn to acceptance difference yourselves, and then learn to teach such acceptance to your students. Make no mistake! Such teaching will face strong opposition from those full of hate in our society, from those unable to accept anything but their own mirror image. You must prevail against them for the future of our country. Over the centuries, teachers and students have helped to shape and change the world. This is the time once again.

Dr. Betty Berzon, author of the bestselling **Permanent Partners**, and one of the great Lesbian activists and psychotherapists of our day, writes in her stillto-be published biography:

"We live in a world that rewards sameness because in sameness there is safety. Differentness is feared, and too often punished. We are, therefore, inclined to hide, when we can, the parts of ourselves that others might find displeasing or threatening, the parts we believe will stigmatize us. But hiding parts of ourselves diminishes us. We do not appear as authentic. We are fragmented, weakened, always vulnerable to discovery. Only when we come out of hiding do we gain the strength to challenge others' false superiority over us. Only when we experience ourselves as integrated and unafraid can we become people whose lives are meaningful and potent, people make a difference."

National Academy of Sciences Endorses Needle Exchanges

Washington DC — A National Academy of Sciences (NAS) panel has paved the way for the lifting of a ban on federal funding for needle exchange programs. Exhaustive review of research on such programs indicates that "the onceonly use of sterile needles and syringes remains the safest, most effective approach for limiting HIV transmission" among injection drug users, according to the report issued last month.

Since 1988, Congress has prohibited the use of federal funds to support needle exchange programs. Legislation passed in 1992 called for the NAS study, and indicated that the Surgeon General could reverse the policy if the study found that needle exchange and bleach distributions were effective in reducing the spread of HIV.

Panel chairman Dr. Lincoln E. Moses told the New York Times that while the report indicated that the funding ban should be lifted, it did not call for a national, mandated needle exchange program. "There are communities where there is strong opposition," Dr. Moses said, "and the Federal Government should not force such programs on these communities. We're just asking that existing restraints be removed so people can make their own decisions." He also noted that the need for such programs may vary greatly from community to community.

The report raises hopes that AIDS organizations may finally gain access to federal funding for their needle exchange programs. In addition, the findings may facilitate obtaining state and local funding. Madison City Council member Mike Verveer told *In Step* that he expects the



report will aid in the approval of a \$10,000 allocation in the City Health Department budget to initiate a clean needle exchange program. The Milwaukee AIDS Project has operated its LifePoint needle exchange program for almost two years.

The NAS report also dispels certain myths that have surrounded needle exchange. "There is no credible evidence to date that drug use is increased among participants as a result of programs that provide legal access to sterile equipment," it states. These programs also bring users into more frequent contact with health care services where they have access to safe-sex information and drug rehabilitation programs.

Research also suggests that it is not lack of information about health risks or any kind of "bonding ritual" which leads drug users to share needles. Laws against carrying drug paraphernalia such as syringes create an artificial scarcity on the streets, leading users to share needles out of desperation.

ARCW Releases Updated Statistics on AIDS/HIV

Milwaukee — In conjunction with last month's AIDS Walk Wisconsin, the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, Inc. (ARCW) issued a fact sheet of updated figures on AIDS and HIV disease.

Out of 2,932 cases of AIDS in Wisconsin since 1982, more than 1,700 people, or 58%, have died from AIDS. In 1984, 22 new cases of AIDS were reported in Wisconsin; in 1994, 352 cases were reported, almost one per day. Seventy-two percent of cumulative AIDS deaths reported in Wisconsin occurred between 1992-94.

As of January 1995, 3,101 people in Milwaukee and Dane Counties have been infected with HIV. This is approximately 60% of the state's HIV cases. Other counties with large numbers of people who've been infected with HIV include Brown (141 reported cases), Racine (129), Kenosha (129), Waukesha (99), Rock (99), La Crosse (82), Winnebago (82), Dodge (74) and Eau Claire (51). The balance of those who have been diagnosed with HIV (810) live in other counties of Wisconsin.

As of August 1995, more than 441,500 US residents had been diagnosed with AIDS, of whom 270,870 have died in the last 13 years.

AIDS is the leading cause of death among men aged 25-44 in the United States.

While men represent 86% of AIDS cases reported among adults and adolescents, the proportion of cases among women has increased steadily during the past decade. Females represent 14% of adult and adolescent cases compared to 6% in 1982.

According to the National Underwriter: Life & Health/Financial Service Edition, AIDS may grip 4.4% of the adult US population by the year 2020, and the annual death toll from AIDS could exceed one million people per year, or 25% of all US deaths.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reported that as of late 1994, 18 million adults and 1.5 million children had been infected with HIV. If present trends continue, WHO expects approximately 30 to 40 million people will be infected with HIV by the year 2000.

According to WHO Global Programme on AIDS (GPA) estimates, approximately 2.5 million people worldwide were infected in 1994 with HIV. WHO estimates that more than 4.5 million AIDS cases have occurred worldwide since the beginning of the pandemic.

Free Poster on Vision Disorders & AIDS Available

New York, NY — A colorful new poster and brochure illuminating and describing vision disorders that often accompany the AIDS virus are now available.

The four-color poster, which measures 24 x 36 inches, graphically illustrates the human eye in cross-section. Each of nine potential vision disorders is located with respect to the part of the eye that it affects. The poster warns that up to 80% of persons diagnosed as HIV-positive or who have AIDS will have an ocular problem.

The four-page brochure that accompanies the poster uses the same four-color illustration on its cover. Pages two and three give a brief description of each of the nine vision disorders displayed on the poster: CMV retinitis, ocular hemorrhages, cotton wool spots, Kaposi's sarcoma, keratitis, conjunctivitis, ocular taxoplasmosis, lymphoma, and herpes zoster.

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Legal By Attorney Arlene Zarembka Winning The Elusive Marriage License

What should Gay and Lesbian communities on the mainland do about marriage while the Hawaiian case is pending?

The Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, together with some other national Gay organizations, advocates an "educate, don't instigate" strategy. Under this strategy, Gay and Lesbian couples should neither apply for marriage licenses nor should they file lawsuits challenging denials of licenses. They should wait for a favorable decision in Hawaii, and, in the meantime, educate the public and politicians about the marriage issue to prevent state legislatures from passing anti-Gay marriage laws.

This strategy reflects two concerns if a couple is given a marriage license from a friendly town hall: 1) Another court precedent limiting marriage to opposite-sex couples could get on the books, either because the state will refuse to recognize the license granted by the town and the couple will file suit, or because the state will file suit to overturn the town's decision. 2) State legislatures will respond by explicitly prohibiting marriage licenses from being issued to same-sex couples. In short, the "educate, don't instigate" strategy is based on the fear that granting marriage licenses to Gay couples will precipitate a legal and political backlash across the country.

The problem is: there already is a strong anti-Gay backlash sweeping from coast to coast and to the halls of Congress. While the campaigns for passage of anti-Gay initiatives and laws prohibiting discussion of homosexuality in public schools have been the most virulent parts of this backlash, the marriage rights backlash has already begun. Utah has passed legislation barring recognition of samesex marriages. Other states have considered similar legislation.

REFRESHING LEGAL BREEZE

While it makes sense not to initiate lawsuits in most states, we cannot rule out the possibility that in some states, a legal challenge to the marriage laws may be successful. Before the 1993 Hawaii Supreme Court decision I thought that a legal challenge on the marriage issue was a waste of time. I was wrong. There's been a refreshing breeze clearing the anti-Gay pollution in some judges' minds, not only on marriage, but in issues such as the military ban and second-parent adoptions.

Even in states where courts are likely to be hostile to same-sex marriages, a Page 16 ▼ October 12-27, 1995 ▼ IN STEP

strategy of seeking marriage licenses from friendly city halls should not be ruled out. If Ithaca, New York were to issue a marriage license to Toshav Greene Storrs and Philip Storrs, for example, the media attention surrounding that event would kick off a nationwide debate over Gay marriages. Nationwide TV and newspaper stories, not to mention media interviews of Toshav and Philip or of other couples who wish to marry, would likely ensue. The PR value of having the entire city council and mayor of Ithaca support the right of Gay men and Lesbians to marry cannot be underestimated. In a very brief period, the educational work that everyone supporting marriage rights agrees needs to be done would start happening all over the country.

Agitation and instigation have been part and parcel of all movements for social change, and should be part of this movement as well.

Of course there will be anti-Gay responses. That is an inevitable part of the debate on equal rights for Gay men and Lesbians, whether that debate is about marriage, civil rights protections, sodomy, custody, or adoption. We cannot expect to engage in a process of educating the public as to why same-sex couples ought to have the right to marry without homophobic attacks. Moreover, even if we lose the marriage debate in some states, we are likely, through the process, to gain more public support for less controversial issues - for example, banning employment or housing discrimination, and perhaps even for repealing sodomy laws.

Moreover, there is no assurance that a Hawaiian victory (assuming we are victorious in Hawaii) will, on a concrete level, mean nearly as much for mainland Gay and Lesbian couples as it will for Hawaiian couples. There are three barriers to implementing a Hawaiian victory on the mainland: money, the law, and politics.

CONTINUING BARRIERS

It's not cheap to go to Hawaii. Not all mainland Lesbian and Gay couples wishing to marry in Hawaii would have the financial resources to do so.

Even if a mainland couple were able to marry in Hawaii, this would not mean necessarily that their home state (or the federal government) would grant them all

the same benefits accorded heterosexual married couples. Although, normally, states recognize marriages granted in other states as valid, at least some agencies on the mainland are likely to refuse to give recognition to a Hawaiian marriage certificate held by a same-sex couple. Litigation to require recognition of the Hawaiian marriage may or may not be successful. Judges might conclude that their state's public policy forbids samesex marriage, and therefore, that out-ofstate same-sex marriages should not be recognized. Or, judges might be willing to recognize such marriages only in limited ways, for example for purposes of inheritance, but not for purposes of filing joint tax returns.

For those unable to go to Hawaii to get married, litigation or legislation to be able to marry in their own state still will be necessary. While it certainly will be helpful to have a victory in Hawaii when seeking to achieve equal marriage rights in the other 49 states, the battle for marriage rights will have to be fought in each state. We can start that battle now, or we can wait two years, but a battle it will be nonetheless.

Agitation and instigation have been part and parcel of all movements for social change, and should be part of this movement as well. There is no one "best" strategy to achieving marriage rights for Gay and Lesbian couples. Education, litigation, and agitation all have a role to play.

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
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Books "Entries From a Hot Pink Notebook" Newest Addition to Coming Out Literature

As long as Gay literature continues to be found on bookshelves, the "coming out" novel will continue to be represented.

There seems to be a prerequisite for each newly emerging Gay novelist which makes "rites of passage" fiction mandatory before moving on to other types of fiction. Jeannette Winterson (Oranges Are Not the Only Fruit), Edmund



Many of these "coming Out" novels, certainly those by the above-mentioned authors, are among the most endearing and enduring works of Gay and Lesbian fiction. While Todd D. Brown's debut novel, Entries From a Hot Pink Notebook, may not qualify for inclusion in such a select group, it is a wonderfully engaging read that may well surprise even the most jaded Gay readers.

If the genre of the "coming out" novel has one basic characteristic, it is that the first person narrator invariably comes from a white, middle-class background. Ben Smith, Entries' erstwhile journalist, is no exception. In fact, Ben dwarfs virtually any of his "coming out" counterparts in his absolute ordinariness.

Ben's family is the very image of the failed American dream. Two kids, one car, and, don't forget, a father in the midst of mid-life crisis, seeking but finding no comfort in the arms of another woman (and at the bottom of a bottle of booze). When Ben's dad splits, mom, a career homemaker, finds a McJob at the local McDonalds her only option.

Big brother Jeff might not be too bright, but he plays a mean game of basketball. Only no college scouts ever seem to show up at any of his games to offer him the college scholarship that will be his ticket out of Tranten Township, a little town on the wrong-side-of-the-tracks America. Perhaps a McJob is in his future too. That leaves Ben.

Township is in his future. During the day, he worries that someone might find out about him. Ben is Gay.

Part of fitting in for many Gay teens is going along with "faggot" jokes laughing and not even for a second considering defending the victim of this homophobic abuse. Years later, hindsight may well prove ironic as many others in the crowd will later turn out to be Gay as may some of the worst of the tormentors. But Ben knows that to be labeled a "faggot" in high school is something to be avoided at all possible costs.

The year of Ben's life contained within this hot pink notebook is a marvelous blend of the extraordinary and the day-to-day. With puppy love, family fights, broken hearts, patched-up friendships, a lot of growing up and more than a few surprises, Entries in a Hot Pink Notebook emerges as something more than simply a "coming out" novel. Todd D. Brown has created a dead-on portrait of the supposedly idyllic small-town American life gone awry. At times poignant, at other times painfully funny, and always engagingly written, Entries in a Hot Pink Notebook is a wonderful first novel.





Wanderings

The Writing Life and Other Curious Things

In Step is pleased to initiate this column by Mary Shafer.

Shafer is co-owner and creative director of The Foxfire Group, a creative services ensemble operating out of its Wauwatosa office, and is making her main living as a graphic designer. A longtime contributor to In Step and The Wisconsin Light as both a writer and illustrator, Shafer has turned more and more of her efforts to writing both fiction and nonfiction. Her first book, Wisconsin: The Way We Were, (1993, Heartland Press) is a popular history of the state from its inception through WWII. Her second book, Rural America: A Pictorial Folk Memory, a light historical overview of the country's agrarian roots, was recently published by Willow Creek Press. She is currently editing a book on Wisconsin's all-German Volunteer 26th Infantry Regiment, which fought on the Union side during the Civil War, and working on a proposal for a third book of her own.

You'll be seeing my words in this column once or twice a month from now on, or until In Step decides otherwise. The editor has generously offered me this space to muse on about whatever it is that might be kicking around in my head at any given time; hence, the column's name, Wanderings. Now, you might be thinking, who IS this babe that she thinks we'll even be interested in reading any of her ramblings?! Well, don't be alarmed. Jamakaya wasn't totally off her nut in asking me to write this column; I do actually have some experience at this game, namely being Gay and writing. Which brings me to the subject of this first column: my experiences as a writer who is also a Lesbian.

Not that this is an unheard-of combination. There are lots of Lesbian writers out there. Some of them are heroes of mine. However, there is a difference in being a Lesbian writer and in being a "Lesbian" writer. The former is someone who writes on any number of subjects and is published as an author with little or no reference to her sexual orientation. The latter may write things other than Lesbian oriented material, but is published as an author whose books usually deal either with Lesbian life or are specifically Lesbian lover stories and/or erotica. I think of such people as May Sarton (bless her recently departed soul), Virginia Woolf and Vita Sackville-West as Lesbian-writers. They were Lesbians (or perhaps, in the case of Woolf and West, bisexual) and they wrote, and some of their later material contained Lesbian references, characters and such, but most of that was minor compared to the main body of their work. Then there are women like Rita Mae Brown, Jewelle Gomez, Robbie Sommers and Jane Rule, who are Lesbians and who may write about other subjects, but whose main body of work centers on or around Lesbian characters and situations, and who are mainly noted for this work.

SCHIZOID FEELINGS

I feel that, at this point in my writing career, I fit into the former group. It's not that I don't write about Lesbian life; I do. It's just that my main body of published work, thus far, is not about Lesbians per se. Most of it is historical nonfiction, in which Lesbians certainly played a part, but they are not the focus of this writing. Now, you might ask, where the devil is she going with all this tedious defining? Well, I make the point to introduce my own experience as a Lesbian who is - for the time being, at least known for publishing non-Lesbian-oriented material. I have found that this particular way of making one's writing reputation can lead to some rather interesting, sometimes uncomfortable situations at the least; and at the extreme, could probably cause some rather schizophrenic feelings in both the writer and her readers.

I write popular histories because I love history myself and have a personal investment in trying to engender that same kind of interest in others my own age and younger by making the subject more accessible than I feel it's been in the past. However, because my books are about nostalgic kinds of subjects, I tend to have a lot of readers more in my grandparents' age bracket. I am not at all put off by this reality; in fact, I love it. I love older people, I find them interesting and delightful to talk with, for the most part, and I very much enjoy the interaction with them provided by such events as book signings and presentations. But this situation also has a flip side.

I am very "out" as a Lesbian, and openly acknowledge it both in my personal interactions with people (where appropriate) and in the acknowledgments in the frontispieces of my books. However, for the kind of writing I do, sexual orientation is not an issue. It has never come up at one of my personal appearances insofar as discussions with my readers were concerned. What have arisen, though, are some rather awkward situations where some people who know me as a rather rowdy, out, party-girl Lesbian have encountered me as Mary the Author of History Books.

So, let me set the stage for you here: I am dressed in what is currently known as "office casual" - nice pants, semidress shoes, a crisp blouse and maybe a blazer - with low-key makeup on and my hair done kind of soft. I am speaking with readers in a bookstore who have come to buy my book and have it signed for them. Most of these people are at least fifty, although there are a few younger. Suddenly, out of the corner of my eye, I'll see someone who either heard me discussing my upcoming appearance and decided to show up for it, or who just happened to be there that night. The only problem is, the last time I saw this person and she saw me, we were both in a Gay or Lesbian bar or at a Gay community event. We both probably had had a few, I was telling some lewd joke or making a bodily function reference (it runs in my family), and chances are pretty good that I was wearing full black leather regalia

from head to toe, since that is one of my favorite outfits for going out.

Needless to say, if this person does not know me quite well, this chance meeting at the bookstore comes a something of a shock. Usually what happens, much to my chagrin, is that once she recognizes me in straight-girl drag is that she'll come up and smile really big. And then I know I'm in trouble.


CLOSE ENCOUNTERS

It's not that I'm closeted. I'm about as far out of the closet as a person can get without being RuPaul or Martina in present incarnation. But I do begin to lose the thread of the conversation I'm having with the 73 year-old woman who has been telling me about her childhood on a Kansas farm as I imagine the possibilities of what might emerge from the mouth of my Lesbian friend.

"Wow, Mar! I didn't know you were a writer! How do you manage to write when you've got those handcuffs on?" (Old woman rolls her eyes toward the speaker. I begin to sweat.)

or:

"Shafer! You look kinda different than last time I saw you! What happened to all that leather?" (This is pretty close



to an actual conversation that was mercifully aborted when the speaker realized exactly what was going on.)

or:

"Oooooooh, girlfriend! You're lookin' kinda femme tonight." (Wink, wink. Lesbian friend approaches and gives me an overly friendly and not-verysubtle pat on the butt. Old woman fixes me with a confused stare.)

Well, you get the idea. It's sad but true that many of my history readers would be put off by the fact that I'm Gay, and most of them probably think my acknowledging a woman partner means we're in business together or something. Fortunately, no one has yet made a complete faux pas, as they have all been lucid and conscious enough to grasp the fact that I am promoting historical nonfiction and not Lesbian erotica right now, and have been more than respectful of my need to separate the dichotomies of my life. I greatly appreciate the restraint most of them have shown to me in what can be tremendously uncomfortable situations.

But I must say that I fantasize a great deal about the time that I finally finish those seventeen stories now occupying several megs worth of space on my hard drive and approach Naiad or Firebrand or one of those lovely Lesbian presses with them. Then I hope that those same friends will appreciate that I have also been able to turn my writing skills to the realities, quirks and humor of a life that we all share, and will be able to connect with my writing on that level.

In response to this and all future columns, I both welcome and encourage your feedback. Do you like what I'm writing? (Great.) Hate it? (Even better.) Have I raised some issues with you (best of all) or left something out you feel I should cover? I can't promise I'll respond personally or with a column, but I'll try. And I certainly do want to hear from you. Please send your thoughts to me in care of In Step, and I'll do my best to entertain, enrage, explore and educate. I appreciate the time you spend with my work, and I'll try to show you as much by keeping it at the highest level I can.

Smells Like Team Spirit

Smelled any Gay guys lately? Well, yes, it is a kind of a personal question for a survey, but, hey, we're friends, right? I'm not Connie Chung. You can tell *me*. Just whisper.

You see, I was up early this week, checking the TV to see if it was okay to remove the hurricane shutters yet, or if we still had to duck and cover from the latest Florida adventure in whetherland. Instead of Opal circling wind advisories, I clicked right into the real news of the day on my favorite tabloid TV channel: Gay perfume.

Right. From news of us in men's toilets, we've gone straight – oops sorry – gaily forward, to news of specialty eau de toilette.

It seems that some bright marketer - a straight man, my TV was quick to point out - has figured out what Bill Clinton's kids figured out, politically, a couple of years ago, and Naya and Absolut already knew. We're a bloc. We're Decision Makers. We're Community Influencers. We're a market.

One of our own organizations, Overlooked Opinions, interviewed a bunch of Gay men with hilltop houses and invented the world perception that Gays have more disposable income than your standard demographic family. Gay men, the survey says, often qualify as the most highly desirable of all the psychographs: DINKs. Double Income No Kids. (That's as opposed to Lesbians who often fall into the NITSODKs category: No Income To Speak Of Double Kids.) DINKs are the most desirable target households, it goes without saying, for any manufacturer who wants to add a few kopecks to the purchase price of, oh, say, meat loaf by calling it boef pate. In "normal" circles, these are the (read heterosexual here) couples with the most spendables.

EUREKA!

However, there's a fatal heterosexual logic flaw. In those "normal" couples one of the income contributors is a (gasp!) woman. Therefore, one of those contributors will still make only around 69 cents to every dollar her big, strong, handsome, hetero-hubby hoards. Surely they can do better?!

Surely there are newly discovered Gay couples! Two, two, two male contributors in one household! What a "Eureka!" to every marketeer who can override his revulsion to those silly limp wristers, and find a homo-hotbutton.

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And they have, actually. One that makes perfect scents.

Men's perfumes, oops, colognes (more manly sounding) are formulated to attract women. Duh!

Something to do with squeezing the life out of poor innocent he-whales for the substance they use to attract she-whales, so that they then only attract Greenpeace volunteers. And figuring that anything that would attract something as big as a whale, should be plenty powerful enough to add some pull for as slight and simpleminded a thing as a mere female heterosapien.

If you're a Gay man? What're you supposed to do?

So why not a Gayly guyly kind of aroma that pulls in the right direction?

Enter Q. (What else would they call it, "Butch!"?)

Q will, according to my TV, be sold in, now let me see, how did they phrase it exactly? Oh, yes, "special interest stores for Gay men." So that would be, um, let's see: Nieman Marcus? IKEA? The Gourmet Galleon? Toyota dealerships?

I wonder who they'll choose to be their spokes-Gays besides those Siamese twin poseurs, Jackson-Paris? Too bad that Rock Hudson is gone. He'd have been perfect, and they could have called it ROCK.

A Gay man's perfume. What a smart idea! Though some, like the non-Gay men in the focus test groups who seriously squirmed when asked politely to turn to their left and inhale the aromatic essence of the next guy, may balk at the idea of so specially formulated a sachet, I, personally, sense the sweet smell of success. Interesting that the more we claim to be just like *them*, the more who we really are, and how we should really be treated shows up as truth in advertising.



Inside Out By Yvonne Zipter Everything Old Is New Again

The last couple of years has brought us, along with the usual fare from Hollywood, two new (or re-newed) trends: (1) an unusually high number of films in which Gays and /or Lesbians are featured (Jeffrey, The Incredibly True Adventures of Two Girls in Love, and To Wong Foo are among the most recent examples) and (2) remakes of movie hits from years gone by (the Warren Beatty/Annette Benning remake of An Affair to Remember and Little Women spring to mind and I've heard someone's remaking the Humphrey Bogart/Audrey Hepburn classic Sabrina). So what I'm thinking, of course, is why not combine the two? The classics redone with a Gay male or Lesbian theme.

This would save queers, young and old alike, the trouble of having to translate the hetero movies they love into a same gender configuration. Not that this is especially hard for most of us, having done just that fluidity and effortlessly almost from the start without even realizing half the time we were doing it. Part of it, of course, is just empathizing with the human element in the characters, but what really gives those kisses between Katherine Hepburn and Spencer Tracy or between Bacall and Bogart that emotional punch for many of us was intuiting how it would be for us to kiss someone with that much passion ergo, someone of our own sex. Despite the ease with which we make this translation, it is always nicer more comforting somehow to hear things in one's own "language." So I say, the time is ripe for remakes of classics in which the leading roles are changed to Gays or Lesbians.

Having mentioned Sabrina already, let's start there. How easy it would be to cast Keanu Reeves as the gawky young son of the chauffeur, sent off to cooking school in Paris because he can't get over his crush on the arrogant and philandering Gay son of his father's employer, played by Brad Pitt. Of course, the whole time in Paris, Reeves's character can think of nothing but becoming sophisticated enough to win the heart of Pitt's character, only to discover, upon returning home, that it is truly the straight laced older brother (Dustin Hoffman) who has captured his heart. Of course, the title would have to be changed from Sabrina to, say, Simon. Or, for a bisexual version, how about casting Sandra Bullock as the shy offspring of the chauffeur, head over heals for the employer's dashing son played by Tom Cruise, but realizing in the end, that it is really the Cruise character's more nun-like older sister (Susan Sarandon, dowdied down a little) who has captured her heart. Initially, I was going to suggest Winona Ryder for the Sabrina part in the bisexual version, but even though she only played the daughter of Sarandon's character in Little Women, I couldn't get past the incestuous feel of their pairing in a romantic way. Call me old-fashioned. .

While not exactly a classic yet, I love the movie *Big* and think a shoo-in for a successful remake would be to put Ellen DeGeneres in the Tom Hanks role. Imag-



ine all of her budding baby dyke angst and youthful exuberance winning over Helen Hunt as the corporate dyke with a heart of gold and bothering the heck of the Hunt character's heartless closeted lover/coworker Sigourney Weaver. Wow! Can you imagine the fireworks of that cast together?

And for really inspired casting, how about Whoopi Goldberg in the Jimmy Stewart role and Emma Thompson in the Donna Reed role as the parents of a passel of AI and adopted kids in a Lesbian remake of It's a Wonderful Life? Blockbuster hit for sure. Drew Barrymore as the ditzy socialite in Bringing up Baby and Amanda Donohoe as the absent-minded paleontologist of her dreams? Alec Baldwin and Kevin Kline as the sparring exes of Philadelphia Story with Paul Reiser as the mild man caught in the middle? Or how about a remake of Imitation of Life, in which the daughter of two Lesbian feminists, herself a Lesbian, decides to go through life passing as a heterosexual? Or, in one of my all-time favorites, how about casting Joanne Liebler of "Hometime" fame as the partner of advertising exec. Laurie Metcalf reprising their Lesbian encounter on "Roseanne" as the hapless homeowners of that Cary Grant vehicle of 1948, aptly retitled, for the nineties, Ms. Blandings Builds Her Dream House?

And not since the days of Lewis and Martin, Abbot and Costello, Hope and Crosby, and Laurel and Hardy have there been comedy duos who make slapstick comedy after slapstick comedy and never any pairs of women buddies. So come on! Let's get with the nineties! I think it's high time for *DeGeneres and Cho Meet Frankenstein*, starring Ellen DeGeneres and Margaret Cho, to be followed by *DeGeneres and Cho Meet the Mummy*, *DeGeneres and Cho Meet the Mummy*, *DeGeneres and Cho Meet Dr. Jeckyl and Ms. Hyde*, and *DeGeneres and Cho in Society*.

If anyone out there in tinsel town is listening, this is what we want! If the public is ready for Wesley Snipes and John Leguizamo in dresses, why not in pants, wooing each other as members of rival gangs in a modern-day version of West Side Story? If the public is willing to accept Warren Beatty as a Cary Grant standin, why not Laurie Metcalf. She's much more likable and funny than Beatty it all makes perfect sense to me. And Hollywood? I am available to update any and all of the aforementioned scripts.

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Stark Reality – By Kirk Stark Enough is Enough!

I've heard a certain term for many years. Even before I came out, I saw this term used in a manner to both define and defame the LesBiGay *lifestyle*. Even thinking the word brings bile to the back of my throat.

The first time I heard it was on a *Donahue*'show when I was 13. I was sick, and my only solace was television. Donahue had Gay men on that day — it still being a shocking thing in the pre-Ricki Lake era of talk shows.

The men ranged from drag queens to hot, butch men. Though I didn't understand my own fascination for the topic, my sense of social justice was immediately rankled as a woman from the audience mentioned the "Gay lifestyle" and how filthy she thought it was. Now, as then, I was enraged by this insipid comment.

This is the tack used by people like Jesse Helms and many like him to slander Gay men and Lesbians everywhere. Supposedly, we live a *lifestyle*. If polite, it is referred to as an *alternative lifestyle*, as if no one in their right mind would choose to enjoy such a thing. *Perish the thought*.

So, what is this *lifestyle*? Is it stores that cater to the wants and needs of LesBiGay patrons? A bevy of Gay restaurants, bookstores and clothing stores?

WHAT'S A "LIFESTYLE"?

If that is a lifestyle, then what can be said of ethnic restaurants, African-American stores, and Korean grocery stores? Are these people simply living a *lifestyle*? Do these people deserve to be condescended to, to be told and reminded that in the minds of the mass culture they are an aberration? No, and neither do we.

We don't see the lives of the heterosexual demeaned in such a way, because that's how everyone should *want* to be. If it isn't white, male and heterosexual, it is an oddity which is entertaining if flamboyant and harmless, but is threatening if it is unrepentantly demanding. It is dangerous to want these same rights because if you get them, then *everyone* will want them.

But our *lifestyle* isn't just shops, restaurants and entertainment, though that is what many straight people think. No, we are perverts who are obsessed with and have deviant sex, and 'recruit' their children. We are the killers in mass market movies. We are the seemingly nice man next door who molests children. We are the Dahmeresque people who are necrophilic cannibals. Few other minority groups have had such a graphically negative propaganda campaign set against them. And no other campaign has been so widely supported.

If this virulent concept of a 'Gay lifestyle" wasn't so widely disseminated, there would be a lesser problem within our global Gay community. We would have less people believe they are 'bad' or 'wrong,' we wouldn't have to constantly justify our lives and our love. We would be equal members of this society, for better or worse.

THE POWER STRUCTURE

I know this won't happen though. Minorities in this country are given the run-around. Women, the largest minority in the world (there are actually more of them than there are men) are still lesser partners in society. Even with the great numbers of women that exist, there is a power structure which disempowers them and keeps them from advancing as any homosexual male can.

Women are oppressed. There are stores only for women. Health clubs, magazines and meetings which are for women only. I wonder if men think women live a *lifestyle*?

But you see, the argument is that women, African Americans and anyone else considered to be a minority aren't living a lifestyle, because they didn't choose to be what they are. They did not necessarily want to be what they are. What is missed is that we didn't choose it either.. But just as any other group, we have *pride*.

Some, though unhappy with what they are, have pride because while they have to put up with crap, they know they deserve better. Others know there is nothing wrong with what they are and won't settle for any treatment that tells them there is.

We don't have a *lifestyle*, we have **lives**. We are not aberrations, we are people. We've been stepped on, and continue to be stepped on. But if we have pride, we have it all.


H.I.T. Plans Casino Trip October 21
