FILING DEADLINE FOR CRYPTO DAMAGE FORMS

The February-April, 1993 release of the parasite Cryptosporidium (Crypto) into the water supply prompted the City of Milwaukee and other affected cities to issue boil orders. Despite this, many persons suffered diarrhea, vomiting and dehydration. Others were hospitalized, and over 100 persons died as a result of the contamination. Some businesses closed down temporarily. Others were forced to purchase bottled water to supply to customers.

A class action lawsuit against the City of Milwaukee, affected municipalities and others on behalf of all injured persons and businesses began shortly after the outbreak, and is still under-

HOW TO FILE THE NOTICE OF **CLAIMFORM**

You should file claims on behalf of yourself, your business, your children or other people legally under your care, or on behalf of a deceased relative. Use one form for each person or business claiming damages (you may photocopy the blank form at the right).

Send the form to the Clerk of the City of Milwaukee. Also, send a copy to the clerk of the city in which you lived or worked at the time, if it is listed at the bottom right. You may want to send this via registered or certified mail, or deliver it directly to the clerk and get a stamped copy. Keep a copy for your records, along with any doctor or hospital bills. receipts for medication, and any other documents which might help to prove your claim. It is not necessary to have medical bills or time lost from work to file a claim. Persons who suffered vomiting, dehydration or diarrhea can file

The amount of your claim should include pain and suffering (number of days sick x \$300.00 is one way to compute this; there is no one formula). any medical bills, loss of income, cost of replacement water supply and any other costs you incurred as a result of the contamination.

The class attorneys will not represent persons who file this form except through the class action. You may also contact your personal attorney about this matter.

The City of Milwaukee and the affected suburbs maintain that a Notice of Claim must be filed. Due to time limitations, it is necessary to file claim forms before December 6, 1995.

MAP Promises Action on Concerns Raised in Community Forums

Dialogue Needed on Additional "Unspoken" Issues

Milwaukee — Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the Milwaukee AIDS Project, has promised "full accountability" to the Gay and Lesbian community about concerns raised at several recent public forums about MAP's services.

The forums, held November 1 at the M&M Club and November 2 at MAP's offices, were attended by about 45 and 40 people, respectively, with about half those in attendance employees of MAP itself. The events were organized to seek input and suggestions from the Gay and Lesbian community. In Step attended the Wednesday night forum at M&M.

The agenda called for managers in each MAP department to speak briefly on its current status and future goals. The areas addressed included: direct services to clients with HIV/AIDS; prevention services; volunteer opportunities; and clinical trials and advocacy. The floor was then open for comments, criticisms and suggestions.

CASE WORKERS "OVERLOADED"

A MAP client who resides at one of MAP's housing facilities, Wisconsin House, complained that he has had "more case workers than I can count." He said, "There's too many people for these case managers to deal with. They're just way overloaded."

That point was tacitly acknowledged by MAP officials who indicated that the ratio of case workers to clients is approximately 1 to 80.

Another concern of the resident of Wisconsin House was that he and fellow housemates did not have direct access to mental health and other services there but had to travel to MAP's headquarters in downtown Milwaukee or to County Hospital. He also questioned why the cost for staying at Wisconsin House is 56% of the client's income (this includes room and board).

MAP officials responded that they are pursuing the goal of establishing inhouse counseling at Wisconsin House. They explained the rent scale was designed prior to the opening of the House, and though commensurate with other such residential facilities, would be put "on the agenda" for reconsideration. "The

intent of the Wisconsin House is not to drain the finances of the people residing there," said Neil Albrecht, Deputy Director of MAP.

Another person spoke of a lack of follow-up by MAP staff, who he said were immediately responsive when his lover was first diagnosed as HIV-positive but then never again contacted him. Instead, he said, they were mailed pledge and donation cards. Another individual said that he has not been re-evaluated since his initial intake eight years ago.

Doug Nelson said: "It is standard operating procedure for case managers to be in monthly communication with all their clients." Initial emphasis is placed on urging new clients to enter MAP's Early Intervention Program through which they can access a variety of services.

BUREAUCRACY ALLEGED

Another complaint had to do with MAP's voice mail system: "I can't remember the last time I have actually, physically spoken to anyone at MAP." Nelson apologized but said it was "a necessary evil in terms of efficiency of service." The possiblity of a separate client line is being pursued.

Another more general charge was that case workers are sometimes hard to get hold of and don't always understand "what the funding is for the programs." One man expressed frustration at the seeming bureaucracy at MAP: "Your case worker can't make an appointment — you have to go through the program manager."

Concern was also raised about the need for more assistance to clients in the areas of financial management and benefits. MAP will soon be adding a Benefits Specialist to its staff. In addition, all case managers will be surveyed and trained to be able to provide some of that assistance to clients.

Another person suggested there should be more flexibility in the training of volunteers. He claimed he was prevented from providing some simple support services until he went through the whole training, much of which he had undergone elsewhere. (MAP offers an initial 2-hour orientation session, followed by day-long (7 hour) training.) MAP's

Albrecht acknowledged that the volunteer training is a "very structured program," and with the numbers of people involved there "is not enough time to do individual assessment."

After almost two hours of information and lively discussion, the evening ended with Doug Nelson joking that he needed to have "the last word." He promised to follow-up on all the issues raised and, in January, issue a report about the changes being instituted to address those concerns.

MORE DIALOGUE NEEDED

A number of people present expressed satisfaction at being able to bluntly address some of the alleged deficiencies of MAP's services. Several others said they were disappointed that more critics of MAP, who are vocal "behind MAP's back" as it were, did not show up to "speak their onions." One longtime Gay activist said that some community members and Gay-owned businesses are so "disgruntled" with MAP, they are not interested in trying to reform it.

Indeed, a number of issues that have been repeatedly brought to In Step's attention over the years by reputable sources were not mentioned at either forum. These include: severe disaffection with the agency's management among former and current MAP personnel; questions about the ratio of funds allocated to administrative as opposed to client services; allegations of nepotism, racism and Lesbophobia; the perception among smaller community groups that MAP has an unfair monopoly on state and federal AIDS dollars, etc.

Because these persistent allegations have never been explored and discussed openly in the Gay and Lesbian community, In Step invites readers to "speak their onions" in upcoming issues and will provide MAP, which has pledged to "continue the dialogue begun at the forums," with the opportunity to respond.

Another Gay Badger, former State Rep. David Clarenbach, will also attend the conference. Clarenbach is now Director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, a Washington-based group which endorses and channels funds to openly gay candidates. It's in that capacity that he will address the conferees about the 1996 US Election.

INGLO meets each November, giving openly Gay politicians and officials an opportunity to network with colleagues from home and abroad and discuss shared concerns. The communication provides a useful springboard for ideas on political and social issues.

This year's INGLO conference is the first to take place outside the US. Other speakers at the conference include Svend Robinson, a member of Canada's Parliament, who will talk about fighting the Right Wing, and New York City Council

member Tom Duane, an HIV-positive man who will discuss HIV/AIDS and health care.

Also Around the State...

Madison — Just days after becoming one of the first religious student groups on campus to be allocated student activities money from the UW-Madison student government (\$75), Christians in Action had its registration as a student group revoked. The UW Student Organization Office found the Christian group did not meet eligibility standards. But the investigation was begun after the Ten Percent Society, the UW's LesBiGay student group, filed numerous discrimination complaints against the group.

"Save Our Space" to Counter Homophobic Reaction to Public Sex Controversy

Madison – Recent weeks have seen a flurry of reports in the mainstream media about male-to-male sex in Madison's Olin Turville Park following complaints by neighborhood residents. On Thursday, October 26, about two dozen people came to the first meeting of Save Our Space (SOS), a new group formed to launch a coordinated response to what members characterized as an often homophobic overreaction to the situation from city government, the police department, and the media.

SOS members' most immediate concern was a proposed city ordinance that would give the police the power to ban a person from all city parks for up to six months for a violation of the city's ordinances. The offenses cited in the ordinance range from public exposure to the use of "profane" language, and "boisterous behavior." The ordinance was initiated by police Captain Ellen Schwartz, the department's spokesperson on the public sex issue, and was unanimously approved by the city's Parks Commission.

Civil libertarians, including Dianne Greenley, president of the Wisconsin American Civil Liberties Union, expressed concerns about the sweeping and largely undefined nature of the powers being assigned to the police under the ordinance. The ordinance's vagueness raised questions about due process and unwarranted restriction of citizens' rights to freedom of assembly, she said.

Citing similar concerns, Mayor Paul Soglin withdrew his support for the measure. At press time, the ordinance was scheduled for a vote at the November 7 Common Council meeting, but as support for the measure weakened, it seemed likely that the measure would be defeated or referred back to committee, according to openly Gay Ald. Mike Verveer.

While a wide range of opinions about the specific issue of public sex was expressed at the Oct. 26 SOS meeting, there was agreement that the way this issue has played out has resulted in official overreaction, and resulting mistrust between members of the Gay community and the police. However, several people observed that a recent meeting with Capt. Schwartz of the police had been productive, and they were encouraged to continue that dialogue.

There was also concern about the sometimes inflammatory nature of the press coverage. Another group was assigned to monitor and work with the media around the issue. The next SOS meeting will be at the UW Memorial Union, at 7:00 pm on Thursday, November 16.

Two Gay Congressmen, Gunderson and Studds, Won't Run Again

Washington, DC - Two of The US's three openly Gay members of Congress, Reps. Steve Gunderson of Wisconsin and Gerry Studds of Massachusetts, have announced that they will not seek re-election in 1996. Gunderson is a Republican, Studds a Democrat.

Gunderson said he plans to honor a pledge made to constituents in his western Wisconsin district to retire from Congress after completing his eighth term in the House of Representatives. He hopes to continue to be active in important national issues in some other capacity than politician.

Gunderson was reluctant for years to come out of the closet. When he did so it was only after being confronted by Queer Nation activists with his alleged hypocrisy of being a closeted Gay man and a key player in GOP politics on Capitol Hill.


Gunderson disparaged the tactics of Gay militants and has remained loyal to the Republican Party, while also trying to reform its more reactionary positions from within. To protest the anti-Gay rhetoric displayed at the GOP's 1992 convention, Gunderson resigned a coveted post as chief deputy whip to then-Minority leader Newt Gingrich. He has urged the GOP to move away from the right and more toward the center.

His Democratic colleague Studds said of Gunderson in a recent interview

in the Advocate: "People like Steve may be the only hope for the Republican Party to really flourish on a national basis."

Meanwhile, Studds will be retiring after his 12th term in the House. After surviving a sex scandal in 1983 in which he admitted having had sex with a 17-year-old years before, Studds admitted he was Gay and became a champion of Gay causes in Congress, including the fight against the Pentagon and security clearance bans on homosexuals. He worked for increased AIDS funding, passage of the Hate Crimes Statistics Act and was a sponsor of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

"As is clear from his record," said a spokeswoman at the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, "Gerry Studds' leadership will be missed. While there remain a number of other allies for our communities, with Barney Frank heading that list, losing Gerry Studds' voice and leadership in the battles ahead will have a major impact on our community."

New York to Allow Gay Couples to Adopt

New York, NY — New York State's highest Court, the Court of Appeals, voted by a 4-3 margin November 2 to allow unmarried couples — both Gay and straight — to adopt children. New York now joins Vermont and Massachusetts as the only states in the union to allow unmarried couples to adopt. Lower courts in 11 states have made similar rulings.

The majority decision, written by Chief Judge Judith S. Kaye, acknowledged the "fundamental changes" that have occurred in American family structures, including the fact that there has been a sixfold increase in the number of children born to unmarried couples.

Judge Kaye reasoned that the fundamental purpose of the state adoption law is to protect the best interests of the children and that expanding the number of qualified individuals who can adopt would ensure that more children secure "the best possible home." Unmarried applicants for adoption would still have to meet already established standards.

Judge Kaye specifically addressed the significance of allowing homosexuals to adopt, noting that because same gender couples cannot marry, their children are deprived of many of the rights, protections and entitlements accorded to heterosexual married couples. The decision, therefore, is definitely in the "best interests" of the children of Gays and Lesbians.

Meanwhile, in New Jersey, an appeals court has granted a Lesbian the right to adopt her female partners' 3-year-old twins. The adoption was deemed in the "best interests" of the children there too. The vote was 2-1.

Congress Vetoes DC's Domestic Partners Benefits

Washington, DC — By a 249 to 172 vote, the US House of Representatives repealed a local District of Columbia law which would have provided limited benefits to domęstic partners. House debate clearly revealed that anti-Gay bias motivated the veto.

The District law allowed any two citizens who lived together for more than six months to register as domestic partners. It also extended health benefits and hospital visitation rights to the domestic partners of city employees.

Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton of the District of Columbia, a longtime civil rights leader, was furious at the Congressional action: "What we saw on the House floor yesterday was a primitive exercise in naked bigotry. It's time to call a spade a spade. Homophobia is too polite a word for prejudice that is functionally the same as blacks have faced in this country since its founding. Gay men and Lesbians have faced the same prejudice throughout eternity."

Norton has called on the City Council to fight back by re-enacting the law: "Home rule and DC's prerogatives must not be trampled on — least of all by intolerant members of Congress."

"For a House that talks about family values," Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign, "this was an incredibly anti-family vote. Denying hospital visitation rights to two people who live together and care for each other is about as mean-spirited as you can get."

NGLTF Hails Support From Congressional Black Caucus

Washington, DC — Over 250 national and community leaders packed the Washington, DC Hyatt Regency October 24 as the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) paid tribute to the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC). The gala affair, which featured a stunning performance by Sweet Honey in the Rock, honored the CBC for its unfailing support of LesBiGay issues in Congress.

Keith Boykin, Director of the National Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum, outlined the CBC's exemplary pro-Gay voting record, including support of domestic partnership registration in

Washington, DC, Gays in the military and the hate Crimes Statistics Act.

Presenting the award, Melinda Paras, NGLTF Executive Director, called on the LesBiGay community to "wake up" and recognize true friends. "We make a mistake," said Paras, "when we focus on our enemies and forget to honor our friends."

CBC Chairman Rep. Donald Payne (D-NJ), said the CBC would support what was right regardless of the politics of the day: "We will continue to be the conscience of Congress. We all must join hands and battle oppression wherever it rears its ugly head across America." State Department Orders Embassies to Report on Anti-Gay Bias

Washington, DC — The Washington Blade reports that the US State Department, in a cable transmitted to US embassies and consular offices around the world, has asked officials to report on whether Gays and Lesbians are subjected to persecution in those countries based on their sexual orientation.

The idea for the cable was initiated by the Justice Department, which hopes to obtain information on anti-Gay bias to help it adjudicate the increasing requests for asylum from gays and lesbians overseas. In 1994, Attorney General Janet Reno ruled that anti-Gay persecution was a legitimate basis on which to apply for US asylum. "The Department seeks an update on the character and scope of persecution, if it exists, against homosexual citizens in your host country," the cable reads. "There are increasingly frequent assertions by asylum applicants that their sexual orientation would subject them to persecution in their home country should they be forced to return there." The cable went on to say the Immigration and Naturalization Service "would profit from additional information to assess the credibility of these assertions."

Three years ago, the State Department agreed to a request by Gay activists to include information about anti-Gay bias in foreign lands in its annual human rights report.

New York City Votes to Restrict Sex Shops

New York, NY — The New York City Council recently voted to pass tough new zoning restrictions to stop the proliferation of sex-related shops and businesses in Manhattan. The measure could significantly impact many businesses that are geared to gay customers.

The new zoning restrictions prohibit any sex-related establishments from doing business within 500 feet of a residential area, church, day care center or school. (Art galleries and legitimate theaters are exempted.) This will relegate most such businesses to some manufacturing and commercial areas. Many businesses currently in operation will have to relocate. Business owners are filing suit to challenge the constitutionality of the law.

One openly Gay City Council member, Antonio Pagan, backed the measure, but Gay Councilman Tom Duane decried

it as "pure censorship."

Gay activist Bill Dobbs told the Washington Blade: "If you clamp down on the expression of sexuality and access to erotica, it's a roundabout way to outlaw Gay and Lesbian culture, because our culture is defined by sexuality."

But other Gay and Lesbian activists said the idea that pornography venues are synonymous with Gay culture is ridiculous.

Washington, DC — In October, the administrative board of President Clinton's church, Foundry United Methodist Church, voted to become a "welcoming congregation," agreeing to include all people in their congregation, regardless of sexual orientation.

New York, NY — Wisconsin born and bred John Catania, who is now a staff producer for the PBS Gay and Lesbian newsmagazine series In the Life, was recently honored by the National lesbian and gay Journalists Association for "outstanding commitment to the fair and accurate coverage of Gay & Lesbian issues."

Washington, DC — Spokespersons for national gay groups reacted with disgust at the news that Rev. Lou Sheldon, a right wing religious fanatic who has built his career by attacking Gays, was allowed to deliver the invocation on the floor of the House of Representatives November 2. "After all he has done to divide the country with fear and discrimination, Americans of all faiths and political stripes should be outraged that an extremist like Lou Sheldon was invited to give the House prayer," the Human Right's Campaign's Elizabeth Birch said.

Long Beach, CA — On October 27, a candlelight vigil was held to remember the late Allen Schindler, a sailor who was the victim of a vicious attack by homophobic Navy colleagues in 1992. Schindler was beaten to death just outside a US naval base in Japan and became a symbol of Gay oppression.

Amnesty Seeks Support for "Breaking the Silence" Campaign

New York, NY — Amnesty International, the worldwide group of activists who advocate for individuals and groups oppressed by their governments, is seeking support for its "Breaking the Silence" campaign, which seeks to work on behalf of Gays and Lesbians who are mistreated.

Plenty of evidence exists of that mistreatment. Amnesty's annual human rights report for 1994 documented incidents such as paramilitary death squads in Colombia murdering Gays and Transvestites as part of so-called "social cleansing," arrests and beatings of gay activists in Albania and Romania and the execution of Gays in Iran merely because of their sexual orientation.



Several years ago, Amnesty International voted to include individuals oppressed because of their sexual orientation as "prisoners of conscience," in need of support and liberation. The "prisoners of conscience" status applies to anyone who is imprisoned solely because of his or her homosexuality —including the practice of sexual acts in private between consenting same-gender adults — and to any person who is detained for peacefully advocating for the rights of homosexuals.

The "Breaking the Silence" campaign works in this way: When homosexual prisoners of conscience are identified, groups of Amnesty activists worldwide are immediately assigned the task of writing thousands of letters of protest to the government and political leaders of the nation where the person is imprisoned. Activists also hold public demonstrations, campaign in the media to alert

the press, and put pressure on offending governments on behalf of the Gay and Lesbian prisoners.

Censorship Backfires - Poles Flock to See "Priest"

Warsaw — An attempt to ban screenings of the film *Priest* in Poland has backfired against Catholic critics. As many censors in the past have found, threatening to ban books and films only gives them much more publicity.

Reuters reports that more than 75,000 Poles flocked to theaters to see *Priest* during the first week of its release there. This was despite — or perhaps because of — threats of censorship by Catholic groups and church leaders who decried the movie as "immoral" and "perverse."

Priest is a British-made film about a young Gay priest who struggles with his

sexuality and his faith. Several scenes in the film show Father Greg (Linus Roache) meeting another man for clandestine sex in the evenings after his parish duties are finished. A fellow priest in the poor Liverpool neighborhood they both serve, Father Matthew, is having a relationship with his female housekeeper.

Despite this, *Priest* is not a sensational film. Its director, Antonia Bird, wanted to ask some serious questions about the roles and personal struggles of priests in modern urban society.

One Polish bishop compared the movie to the Communist authorities' oppression of the church in the 1950's, while one Catholic group which unsuccessfully petitioned the Prosecutor General to ban the film, warned it would "destroy the fruits of educational work by Polish families and the Church." Russia Denies Registration to LesBiGay Group

Moscow — The International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission reports that the Ministry of Justice of the Russian Federation has denied official registration to the Triangle Center, a LesBiGay center in Moscow which focuses on uniting Gays, Lesbians and Bi-

sexuals, defending their rights and fighting against discrimination in Russian society.

In a letter to the Center, the Deputy Chief of the Ministry of Justice, K. Visknevski, stated that recognizing the Center would "contradict public standards of morality and does not correspond to requirements of Article 23 of the Federal law on Non-Governmental Organizations."

Article 23 specifically states that registration of an organization will be denied if its name insults the moral, national or religious senses of citizens.

Homosexuality was decriminalized in the Russian Federation on April 29, 1993. However, harassment of and discrimination against Gay and Lesbian Russians by state and extra-official actors continue to be a serious problem. Organizations like the Triangle Center are essential watchdogs in a country where the LesBiGay population has been repressed for so long.

Turkish Government Again Bans Gay Festival

Istanbul — For the second time in as many years, an official in the ostensibly secular Turkish government has issued an edict banning a Gay festival from taking place.

Saying "it did not respect the morals of [Turkish] society," the Istanbul Governor's Office refused permission for the Gay/Lesbian Cultural Festival to occur. The Festival, organized by Turkey's Lambda Association, was meant to "present the Gay culture" to the Muslimdominant society in which the topic of homosexuality is rarely discussed. The Festival would have included Gaythemed films and discussion groups.

Although Turkey is a secular republic, the rising tide of Islamic fundamentalism in the Middle East and Asia is begin to make inroads. While current government leaders like to compare Turkey to democratic western nations, the political culture in Turkey is becoming ever more conservative.

Majority of Irish Gays Have Felt Bias

Dublin — The Gay Community News, a Gay newspaper in Dublin, reports that preliminary results of a study show that two-thirds of Irish Gays have either experienced isolation or discrimination because of their sexual orientation.

The relatively small survey of 159 men and women was conducted by the Combat Poverty Agency and the Gay group GLEN. Most of those respondents were not out to their families. Forty percent said they had been harassed at work, and almost a quarter said they had avoided jobs they were qualified for because of fears of co-workers' reactions to their homosexuality.

Eleven percent of those surveyed had experienced more than one incident of physical violence because of their sexual identity, and 60% said they had actually considered emigrating to another country to avoid the anti-Gay oppression they felt by their families and colleagues in Ireland.

Also Around the World...

Copenhagen — Eigil Axgil, a pioneering Gay activist in Denmark who was the first homosexual to legally marry his male partner, Axel, in 1989, has died at age 71. In 1948, the Eigils founded the National Homosexual Association, one of the oldest Gay groups in Europe.

London — A survey of 200 multi-national companies by Mobil Europe has found that many companies are increasingly tolerant of office romances, and 25% of those surveyed indicate they "are now prepared to recognize same-sex partners" when recruiting for jobs in Europe.

Ottawa — Canada's oldest Gay organization, the Association of Lesbians, Gays and Bisexuals of Ottawa, which was founded in 1971, recently closed because of low membership and financial shortfalls.

Tel Aviv — An Israeli judge has denied the request for benefits by a Gay man whose recently deceased lover had been an Army Colonel. Adir Steiner argued that since he and his partner had an openly recognized relationship, he should be entitled to the benefits routinely accorded to surviving spouses. Israel's Supreme Court had previously ruled that El Al Airlines had to give such benefits to the Gay spouse of an employee, but the judge in Steiner's case said that what applied in the business world did not necessarily apply to the Israeli Defense Forces.



Bob Dole's Waffling Over Gay Money Exposes GOP's Ambivalence Toward Gays

For weeks now, the media has been filled with stories about Sen. Robert Dole's campaign for President and its relationship to Log Cabin Republicans, the Gay Republican group.

Dole returned Log Cabin's \$1,000 campaign contribution, claiming he could not accept money from a group so at odds

with his political philosophy.

Log Cabin successfully countered with facts and documents demonstrating that the Dole campaign actively solicited its help and its money, with full knowledge of Log Cabin's stand on such issues as Gays in the military and Gay marriage. Dole has now changed his story again, blaming his staff for poor judgment in returning the contribution.

The whole controversy has been a publicity bonanza for Gay Republicans and a public relations disaster for the Dole campaign. It also highlights the intense battle being waged for control of the Republican Party as right wing religious radicals capture control of the party machinery in more and more states, and moderate Republicans with political ambitions scramble to win extremist support.

It raises questions as well about where the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender communities should be putting our political energy, especially as we approach a Presidential election year.

The Log Cabin Republicans articulately advance the position that, except for the extremist rhetoric of the radical right, the Republican Party could be a welcoming home for Gay and Lesbian Americans. In this view, the fierce anti-Gay rhetoric of the Republicans' 1992 Houston convention was the aberration, whereas the Contract with America, silent on such "divi-

sive" issues as abortion and Gay rights, offers a sound basis for national policy.

UNCONVINCING

The argument doesn't persuade me. First of all, Houston was about more than the hate-filled rhetoric of Pat Buchanan. The Republican convention as a whole ratified a platform for the party, and it was fiercely anti-Gay.

and it was fiercely anti-Gay.

"We believe," it said, "in traditional family values and in the Judeo-Christian heritage that informs our culture."

The platform opposed efforts to include "sexual preference" in federal, state and local civil rights statutes, and it came down against the legalization of same gender marriage and against laws to permit Gay men and Lesbians to adopt children or provide foster care.

In the area of AIDS prevention, the platform called for education that stressed abstinence and marital fidelity, and rejected condom distribution as a prevention measure. Taken together, these planks are pretty comprehensive in their homophobia.

Then there's the Republican agenda in Congress, expressed through the Contract with America. True, it doesn't pander to anti-Gay extremists, but it is still hurtful to the Gay community.

The Republican version of budgetbalancing, for instance, is a disaster. Budgets can be balanced in all sorts of ways. In the Eisenhower era of the 1950's, the budget was balanced, but largely through a progressive tax structure with levies of up to 90% on the income of the very rich.

In this post-Cold War era, Gingrich's Congress proposes large military budgets, low taxes, and steep cuts in spending related to human and community needs. This kind of budget-balancing will adversely affect services to LesBiGay and Transgender youth, substance abuse programs offered by Gay community centers, and federal grants to pay artists and scholars.

Even when this Republican Congress seems to be with us, as in support for re-authorization of the Ryan White CARE Act, it takes away with the other hand what it gives with one. Efforts to gut Medicaid will be a disaster for our community, since Medicaid provides four times as much money to care for people with AIDS as does Ryan White.

And what about the Republican role in the scuttling of health care reform last year?

MIXED SIGNALS

The public statements of today's most visible Republican standard bearer, Newt Gingrich, have been loving towards his own family and hostile towards the rest of ours.

While acknowledging his love for his openly Lesbian half-sister, Gingrich has simultaneously said: "It's madness to pretend that families are anything other than

heterosexual couples."

Gingrich has opposed laws banning discrimination against Gay people, and has advanced right wing misinformation about alleged "recruitment" of gay youth, saying: "I think, frankly, you have had clearly what is in effect recruitment in so-called counseling programs. So I'm very cautious about the idea that you want to have active homosexuals in junior high school and high school explaining that they have all of these various, wonderful options."

Finally, what the arguments of Gay Republicans miss is that their party is becoming the majority party precisely because of the extremism of the radical right.

Groups like the Christian Coalition are providing the dollars, the recruits and the passion that have made Republicans competitive in state after state. Without them, moderates might run the Republican party, but Republicans would remain the minority that they were for the last half century. And, as the extremists become better and better organized, moderates like Dole engage in the necessary contortions to appear acceptable to this dynamic extremist wing.

I am very glad that Republicans who are Gay are at long last coming out of the closet. I am glad that they are doing battle inside one of the largest anti-Gay institutions in the US, since homophobia should

never go unchallenged.

Where I part company with Gay GOPers is over the claim that more of us should become Republican. That isn't good either for the Gay and Lesbian community, or for the country.

Planned Parenthood Puts Out the Welcome Mat for Lesbians

Milwaukee — Every woman needs an annual breast exam, Pap smear and pelvic exam. The need for birth control tends to lure heterosexual women into gynecologists' offices on a fairly regular basis, but every existing study on the topic shows that Lesbians get gynecologic health care less often than they should.

Lesbians need to know that Planned

Parenthood of Wisconsin offers routine gynecologic exams, along with pre-conception counseling, mid-life services and other care for all women regardless of sexual orientation or income.

'It's a safe environment. It's a welcoming environment," said Betty Lowenstein, RN, who works at Planned Parenthood's Milwaukee office at 302 N.

Jackson Street.

Lowenstein and Gail Baier, a Nurse Practitioner, started a Lesbian specialty service at a clinic formerly open at 2nd and Wells Streets earlier this year, but that effort ended when Planned Parenthood suffered funding cutbacks.

But Planned Parenthood still has clinics at locations around Milwaukee County, in Waukesha, Dane County and the rest of Wisconsin - all of which can be found in local telephone directories. All women needing any sort of reproductive health care or routine exams can call for appointments.

Although prices and payment policies vary slightly from clinic to clinic, services are never refused if a woman says she can't pay," Lowenstein told In Step. "We just expect them to do the best they can." Planned Parenthood does not scrutinize a woman's finances to determine if she is low income, she said.

Clinic workers are all female, except for a doctor who performs abortions and one of the cancer examination specialists. Clinics already see a few Lesbian patients, Lowenstein said, especially one clinic located near a large women's college.

"We want to be here for everybody, and we're happy to take care of anybody," she said. If more Lesbians choose to come, "we'd sure be happy to see them."

The Fight Against Amendment 2 Is Not Over

Now that all the briefs are in and the oral arguments have been made in *Romer v Evans*, there is a second court that will consider Colorado's Amendment 2. The Supreme Court may pay as much attention to the conclusions of this second court as it does to the legal briefs. What happens in this second court over the next three to six months may be as crucial to victory in the case as the October 10 oral arguments before the Supreme Court.

This second court - the court of public opinion - is the court to which the Supreme Court listens in controversial cases. Neither brilliant briefs nor appeals to basic human rights stopped the Supreme Court from upholding slavery in 1857 (Dred Scott), nor from sustaining "separate-but-equal" Jim Crow laws in 1896 (Plessy v Ferguson), nor from justifying concentration camps for American citizens of Japanese descent in 1944 (Korematsu), nor from upholding the right of states to criminalize private consensual sexual behavior between samesex couples in 1986 (Hardwick). Public support for equality and fundamental justice is as important as lawyers' briefs.

Granted, the plaintiffs won the sound-bite war in the October 10 oral arguments and in the media coverage of the arguments. Most of the justices and media seemed to "get it" — that Amendment 2 is about legalizing discrimination against Gay Men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals, about fencing the lavender community out of the political process.

The prognosis? Cautiously hopeful.

JUDGING THE JUDGES

Based on their comments and questions at the oral argument, as well as their judicial record, Justices Ginsburg, Souter, Stevens, and Breyer all seem to be solid votes against Amendment 2. Justice Ginsburg said at the oral argument that there had never been two sets of rules for participation in the political process. Although her historical analysis is certainly inaccurate (the "Founding Fathers" established a country based on a complete lack of access to power by slaves and women), this comment illustrated how shocking she found the Amendment. Justice Souter indicated he could see no justification, no rational basis, for Amendment 2, an opinion shared by Justice Stevens (who dissented in the Hardwick case). Justice Breyer expressed concerned about the breadth of the amendment.

Justices Scalia, Rehnquist, and Thomas, on the other hand, are virtually certain to vote in favor of Amendment 2. Scalia peppered Jean Dubofsky, who rep-

resented the gay plaintiffs in Romer, with hostile questions. Justice Rehnquist not only seemed supportive of Amendment 2 at the oral arguments, but has been consistently hostile to civil rights and to the lavender community in his career on the Court. Although Justice Thomas asked

no questions, he has yet to demonstrate any support for social justice or civil rights.

That leaves Justices Kennedy and O'Connor as the determining votes. Jus-

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

tice Kennedy, like Justice Ginsburg, said he had never seen a case like this, and, like Justices Souter and Stevens, questioned if there was any rational basis for the law. Justice O'Connor seemed concerned about the broad scope of the amendment.

While a 6-3 decision striking down Amendment 2 now appears a distinct possibility, the case is not over until the Court renders its decision. The worst mistake that those who care about civil rights could make is to sit back and wait, thinking the case has been won. In 1986, for example, Gay and Lesbian attorneys who attended the oral arguments in Hardwick were convinced, based on the Justices' reactions at the arguments, that the Supreme Court would strike down Georgia's sodomy law; predictions as to the margin of victory ranged from 5-4 to 7-2. Justice Powell, initially a vote against Georgia's law, switched his vote to support the law

his vote to support the law.

Although Justices Kennedy and O'Connor seem to be leaning against Amendment 2, their vote is not assured. On most civil rights cases, they have sided with the conservative wing of the court. Moreover, Justice O'Connor generally views voterapproved referenda as something that should be upheld by the courts as the purest form of democracy. There is every possibility that Justices Kennedy's and O'Connor's initial doubts about Amendment 2 will fade, as anti-Gay forces rev up the media war with arguments designed to appeal to their conservative instincts.

COURT OF PUBLIC OPINION

With supporters of Amendment 2 already arguing their side in the court of public opinion, members of the lavender community — nonlawyers and lawyers alike — should do no less. It is crucial that the country at large understands the devastating

impact that a vote to uphold Amendment 2 would have on the Gay men, Lesbians, and Bisexuals, and indeed, on the principle of equal rights in a democratic society. Public opinion will filter up to the Supreme Court, through newspapers, magazines, and television.

To participate in this court of public opinion is as simple as writing a letter to the editor, whether to your local newspaper or a national newspaper or magazine. For those willing to do so, participation in discussions in the media are crucial. This can mean calling in to radio talk shows, meeting with newspaper or TV editors and columnists to educate them about Amendment 2 and about the Gay and Lesbian community, or even appearing on a local show to debate the issue.


Vigils and demonstrations against Amendment 2; with media work to ensure coverage, also can help get the message out.

Refusing to participate in the debate because, as I've heard some people say, "our human rights shouldn't be subject to debate," will mean that only the voices of our opponents will be heard. If our foes have no opposition, then they can, with impunity, distort the truth about Amendment 2 and lie about who Lesbian and Gay people are.

Supporters of basic justice have taken an early lead in the Romer vs Evans race. But it's too soon to call the victor.

Meredith Monk in Residence at UW-Madison November 9-15

Internationally Acclaimed Dancer/Singer/Composer to Teach and Perform

Madison — Wisconsin will be graced by the presence of Meredith Monk, the internationally acclaimed performance artist, during a weeklong residence at the University of Wisconsin-Madison November 9-15.

Monk's activities will include workshops on voice, sound and movement, a lecture on composition, a seminar on *The Collaborative Art*, a master class in cello, and a performance of her work *Facing North*, with colleague Robert Een. Most of these events are open to the university community and the public.

The entire week of Monk's visit, which has caused major anticipation and excitement among performing artists of all varieties, is being sponsored by the UW-Madison Arts Consortium.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

"When the time comes, perhaps a hundred years from now, to tally up achievements in the performing arts during the last third of the present century, one name that seems to loom large is that of Meredith Monk," critic Alan M. Kriegsman has asserted. "In originality, in scope, in depth, there are few to rival her."

Monk is an innovative and prolific artist who composes music (songs and whole operas), sings in a three octave range, writes plays, directs documentary films and choreographs dances. She has won voluminous awards for excellence in all these areas and is most honored as a pioneer in "extended vocal technique" and "interdisciplinary performance" — flawlessly combining various art forms into a cohesive whole.

In 1968, Monk founded The House, a company dedicated to an interdisciplinary approach to performance, and in 1978, she formed Meredith Monk and Vocal Ensemble to perform her unique vocal compositions.

Monk has written dozens of songs and several operas (ATLAS, Song of the Lark), for which she has won 16 ASCAP awards for musical composition. She has made ten recordings, two of which — Dolmen Music and Our Lady of Late: The Vanguard Tapes — have won international honors.

She has made several documentary films — Book of Days and Ellis Island — which have also received awards. Monk has created dozens of dance works, which often incorporate music and theater. She won the 1986 National Music Theater Award and the 1992 Dance Magazine Award.

This year, Monk won a prestigious "Genius" grant from the MacArthur Foundation. It's a one-time grant of about \$300,000 for her to use as she pleases in

pursuing her artistic endeavors.

Monk told Out magazine last year that she resists categorizing her sexuality: "But I can tell you that I've been with men in my life and I've been with women in my life. And right now, I've lived with one woman for a really long time."

Though Monk has never explored issues of Gay and Lesbian sexuality very deeply in her work, her overall creative genius has made many LesBiGays proud to claim her as our own.

The Making Of A Gay And Lesbian Almanac

Talking with "Out in All Directions" Editor Lynn Witt

Warner Books has just released Out in All Directions: The Almanac of Gay and Lesbian America, one of the most eagerly awaited titles of the season. At 635 pages, this expansive compilation of essays, quotes and facts is less a reference book than a solid testament to our progression as a community and as a people.

Combining the talents of over 200 writers, artists and photographers, editors Lynn Witt, Sherry Thomas and Eric Marcus have created a rich and varied cultural tapestry. The ten chapters cover a myriad of subjects like history, entertainment, politics, family, business, etc. Out in All Directions is fun as well, with plentiful trivia, "Did You Know?" sidebars, photos, illustrations, interviews and more. It's the sort of book that's tough to put down.

Recently, I had the chance to chat with editor Lynn Witt about this most ambitious undertaking.

Owen: How did Out in All Directions come about?


Lynn Witt: Back in the seventies, Sherry Thomas published The People's Almanac and co-authored a book called Country Women. Her editor at the time was a woman named Loretta Barrett, who had a woman named Maureen Egan working for her. Fast forward 25 years. Loretta is now an agent and Maureen is head of the trade book division at Warner's. They were having dinner together one night and came up with the idea of a Gay and Lesbian almanac as something they would like to see. Loretta said, "I know just the person, I'll get Sherry Thomas." Sherry had just started her job at the library foundation and told Loretta she was sorry but she couldn't do it. Loretta told her to go home and think it over, so Sherry came home and said: "You'll be so proud of me, I finally said 'no' to something." When she told me the story, I said, "I'll do it." So then we put together a 30 page proposal with sample pages, because we wanted to design the book as well.

What was the first step of beginning a project of such vast dimensions?

The very first thing I did was go to the library and look at almanacs. What kind of almanacs are out there? What kind of information do they have? How are they organized? I purposely didn't look at The Alyson Almanac, which I personally enjoy and think is fun. I knew it was out there and that we weren't doing the same thing, but I didn't want to look at it and be subconsciously influenced. Looking at every other kind of almanac imaginable, I took notes on notecards about possible topics and arranged them on the floor in categories. Next, I came up with a chapter outline which, though some contents and specifics changed, the framework held up through the whole thing.

Was there an initial objective or statement of intent?

It was more open-ended. We kept saying, "Who's our audience?" and kept trying to remember it wasn't just for us but for non-Gay people as well. We also talked about how to do both men and women in one book.



You seem very conscious in representing a large part of the country as well.

We decided we didn't want to be just a New York and San Francisco book, so I spent four weeks going around to about ten different cities with literally the table of contents. I went to various community leaders and showed them the categories and asked: "Who knows about these topics?"

What sources were the greatest help in your research?

I used the Internet a lot. I used the Gay Librarians Network. They were very helpful. If you wanted a fact or [citation] or to know information on X, Y or Z—they were there. The other thing it was really good for was dialogue and getting

the experience of different people. When I said I needed experiences of people who had been to the music festivals, I got responses. Some of the other Gay bulletin boards were helpful as well. Every day I got on for about an hour and read the news and got a lot of tidbits and facts that way. It was also a great way of communicating with a lot of people from the Midwest and the South. We also read the Gay press. I had volunteers who did nothing but clip Gay news items.

You did a great job with the design. It's so readable, with the "Did You Know?" and "Can You Believe It?" items in the margins, the mini-essays and photos. Whenever I open to a page, something catches my eye.

That's the effect we wanted to achieve. Actually, we paid a designer here in San Francisco to do it, but we wanted every page to have something interesting on it. From the start, part of what was going to sell this book was the visual. We knew that if we could control what the page looked like it could make a huge difference in how it sold.

Any plans for periodic updates?

Our fantasy is to do an international edition. It's a very US-centered book, and I suspect that's something we'll get criticism on, but it's intentionally US-centered. I have files of international data, and I'd love to do one. In terms of Warner's commitment, the agreement is that I get to update the paperback edition next year.

What sort of statement do you think a book like this makes?

We all felt it was really time for a book like this, that was both inside and outside the culture. It's not meant to educate as much as to say, "Wow, we're really here in a big way. We've done a lot; look at who we are. We're not one community, we're dozens of communities. Be proud of who we are." Actually, I think the title says it best.

Do you have a favorite tidbit of information in Out in All Directions?

Yes. My favorite bit is that the song I Left My Heart in San Francisco was written by a Gay man, Douglas Cross, for his lover, George Corey, after they visited the city in 1954.

That's a pretty incredible bit of trivia. Congratulations on the book, Lynn, and to your fellow editors.

Did You Know . . .?

...the oldest continuous Gay bar in the US is the Double Header in Seattle, founded in 1934 and still run by the same (straight) family.

...the queerest cast on TV was that of Bewitched, which starred such Gay actors as Dick Sargent (Darrin), Diane Murphy (Tabitha), Paul Lynde (Uncle Arthur) and, of course, Agnes Moorhead (Samantha's mother).

...current anti-cross-dressing laws in New York State originated in an attempt by the early state legislature to prevent militant farmers from committing acts of civil disobedience while dressed as Native Americans.

...the first recorded evidence of homosexuality is found in Mesopotamia circa 3000 B.C., where artifacts depict men having sex with other men.

...Amanda Bearse, star of the FOX TV show Married...With Children, was the first prime time series regular ever to come out.


...in 1991, Essence magazine received the most letters in its 24-year history in response to an article by senior editor Linda Villarosa and her mother on Linda's coming out. The letters, which were overwhelmingly positive, prompted a follow-up article.

...in 1993, Mattel came out with Earring magic Ken, a Ken doll sporting an earring, a large ring on a necklace, and a mesh lavender shirt with matching purple vest — Mattel denied any intention to create a Gay Ken.

Producers of Milwaukee Gay Cable Programs Win Philo Awards

Milwaukee — When the 10th annual Philo T. Farnsworth Awards were handed out at an awards ceremony October 27, Gay producers and programs walked away with four of the coveted honors. The awards are bestowed for excellence in local TV programming by the Milwaukee Access Telecommunications Authority (MATA).

BESTD Clinic Live!, the weekly health education and discussion program sponsored by the Brady East STD Clinic, garnered two Philos, one for Best Single Informational Program and one for Best Informational Series. BESTD Clinic Live! is produced by Jeff Buckles.

Another Philo Award went to longtime community activist and videographer Mark Behar for his hourlong special, Gay Pride, Gay Future: Let It Shine. The program featured video footage of the 1994 PrideFest celebration on Milwaukee's lakefront and included short interview clips with about 40 of the diverse people in attendance.

Gay Pride, Gay Future was honored as Best Advanced Informational Program. It was also a finalist in the National Hometown Awards, one of the largest video competitions in the nation.

In addition, Tim Marshall was given a Philo Award for Best Documentary of an Event or Person for his production Danc'n for AIDS, about the annual fundraising dance.

Danc'n for AIDS was shown on the first night of what has come to be known at GAYBC in Milwaukee — the all-queer line-up of shows on Warner Cable MATA Channel 47 on Tuesday evenings.

GAYBC begins at 6:30pm with BESTD Clinic Live! (this is a rebroadcast of the live show Thursday nights at 7pm), followed by the always outrageous Queer Program at 7pm, then Gay By God's Will, sponsored by the Metropolitan Community Church at 8pm, and either the hometown produced soap True to Desire (three Tuesdays) or Pride Around the Year (1 Tuesday).

In further good news, a source with the Brandon Marsh Entertainment Group, which produces *True to Desire*, says recent contract negotiations have resulted in keeping the GAYBC line-up intact on Channel 47 through 1996.

Openly Gay Actor Plays Gay Character on "Guiding Light"

New York, NY — The long-running CBS daytime drama *The Guiding Light* has introduced an openly Gay and HIV-positive character, "Wyatt."


Singer/actor Keith Christopher has been cast in the role of Wyatt. Christopher took his place in TV history last June by being the first Gay and HIV-positive actor hired to play an openly Gay character with HIV (on NBC's Another World). The actor's appearance on that show centered around National AIDS Compassion Day.

The character of Wyatt on The Guiding Light is an HIV counselor who supports a series regular through her testing and diagnosis.

Christopher is a recent Billboard Certificate of Achievement Award Winner for his song, "Smiling in the Dark." His 1994 self-titled debut album received critical acclaim and radio airplay. His new


Meanwhile, ABC's All My Children has also created a continuing Gay character, "Michael Delaney," played by straight actor Chris Bruno. But Bruno's

I didn't want to carry this torch." Bruno further fretted that many in the TV audience "don't separate the actor from the character."



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"Postcards," "Go Fish," Now Out on Video

Los Angeles, CA — Postcards From America, a Gay-themed film based on the writings of artist David Wojnarowicz, and Go Fish, a sprightly romantic comedy about Lesbian friends and dating rituals, are now both available on video.

In Postcard From America, director Steve McLean weaves a fictional narrative of Wojnarowicz's life, focussing on three distinct passages: his abused childhood, his early coming-out years as a New York hustler, and his adult life on the road. The movie is filled with painful

as well as transcendent memories and images. The cinematography by Ellen Kuras (Swoon) is outstanding.

Go Fish is much lighter fare and a must-see for all Lesbians and their friends. It follows the misadventures of the brash Max (Guinevere Turner) and her gradual courting and sparking with the shy and gawky Ely (V.S. Brodie). Made on a low budget by a bunch of working class dykes in Chicago, Go Fish was a breakthrough film that went on to earn \$1.5 million at the box office.

"Give Us a Break, Geraldo!"

San Francisco, CA — The San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) reports that the theme for Geraldo Rivera's talk show on October 18 was "Gay Today, Straight Tomorrow," and that the usually aggressive Rivera did little to question the anti-Gay biases of his guests.

Although one Gay and one Lesbian couple were on the panel and spoke eloquently for acceptance, the bulk of the show was taken up by Charles Socarides, the author of A Freedom Too Far, who has made a career out of spreading homophobic misinformation. Joining Socarides were several self-loathing Gays and Lesbians who talked about what a "perverse" lifestyle they had allegedly left behind.

Socarides cited the long discredited notions that men become Gay because of a lack of masculine influence in their childhood, while women become Lesbians because of bad relationships with their fathers. He also made a really low play by addressing any young Gay people who might be watching, urging them to be healthy and *choose* heterosexuality.

Throughout this charade, GLAAD reports, Rivera "remained conspicuously neutral throughout the show...Rivera's deference to homophobia is a classic media bias" that requires a response.

GLAAD urges Gays and their allies to write to Geraldo Rivera at The Geraldo



"The Doom Generation" - A High Energy Rollercoaster Ride

New Flick by Queer Director Gregg Araki

I can't actually remember breathing during Gregg Araki's new film, *The Doom Generation*. But I do remember finally relaxing once the final credits rolled. Was it because the film was that interesting, that engrossing, that upsetting, that erotic? It must have been, because I haven't stopped talking about it since.

The premise of *Doom Generation* is fairly simple: two young lovers, both 18 or so, meet up with a tall, dark stranger who's older — at least 21. The three seem to be plagued by misfortune, misunderstandings and just plain misery while on the run from a series of violent mishaps. However, they also get involved in an erotic, sexually charged threesome of sorts that makes each one keep coming back for more in this dark comedy.

Araki has assembled three relative unknowns for the principle players. James Duval plays Jordan, a guy with a *Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure* mentality. His girlfriend, Amy (Rose McGowan), is harsh and ballsy. Johnathan Schaech is the tall, dark stranger Xavier. You may have seen him as the hunky heart-throb in *How to Make an American Quilt*.

Araki also utilizes a quirky cast in cameos, like Hollywood madam Heidi Fleiss, comedian Margaret Cho, Married...With Children's resident Lesbian Amanda Bearse, Chistopher Knight (alias "Peter Brady"), Lauren Tewes from The Love Boat and Perry Farrell of the rock group Porno for Pyros.

STYLE PARAMOUNT

One important note: Doom Generation is an arty rather than a mainstream film. The dialogue, plot and characters are secondary. The style, symbolism and message of this picture take center stage. That probably sounds pretentious, but it's accurate. Araki's editing, cinematography and music deliver a rollercoaster ride of a film — it's visually dazzling as it pounds away at you. I went in expecting a "normal" movie and was disappointed until I realized I enjoyed Doom Generation because it's so different.

Araki weaves a devilish theme throughout the entire movie, the most obvious being the use of the devil's numeric namesake — 666. It seems that almost every address, convenience store tab

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
total or serial number is demonic. That's just one way Araki keeps the dark comedy working in *Doom*.

Doom's soundtrack also warrants attention. If you like alternative or techno music, you won't want to miss this disc. Music by Love and Rockets, the Cockteau Twins, Curve, Lush, MC 900 Ft. Jesus and Meat Beat Manifesto give a sultry, slamming flavor to Doom.

Araki served as writer, producer, director and editor of *Doom Generation* — his first big budget film. He first gained notoriety as one of the pioneers of "New Queer Cinema" with such pictures as *The Living End* and *Totally F***ed Up.* But one thing you can't miss in the opening credits of *Doom* is the line: "A Heterosexual Movie by Gregg Araki." True, the film is mainly hetero, but incredibly Gay-friendly.

If you're looking for something different from a cinematic experience, check out *The Doom Generation*. The high energy, high sexuality in this film is sure to intrigue and overwhelm while giving you something to talk about.

The Doom Generation is playing a short run at Milwaukee's Oriental Theatre.

Happy faces (costume contest winners) at Fannies.

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





Men would claim they were versatile and when it came down to it their legs would fly in the air so fast my bedroom would shake from the force of the sonic boom. Either that, or you would get close to their butt, and they would clench tighter than a Republican's hand on Medi-

Versatility is much like Bisexuality: you may appreciate both, but there is one that is more preferable. It is like saying you like Antonio Banderas and Joe Pesci, but we know who will be the boink of choice. Some truths can be held to be selfevident.

So why let concern about what others think get in the way of what you like. If we all chose to do that, we'd never have sex for fear of what the homophobes think

So come with me, my brothers and sisters, and let us scream to the skies, I'm a (insert preference here) and I'm proud of it! Of course, I will be leading this declaration, so give me a few minutes. I have to limber up my ankles.

I would venture a guess that this is the only town in the country where the living quarters upstairs from the firehouse has country linen eyelet curtains in the windows, or where the smalltown Gay newspaper is thicker than the straight one. Where the entire town puts on an event called Women's Week - the reason I'm here - and they don't mean women like Nancy Reagan or Barbara Bush. Hillary, maybe.

It was a great feeling to sit drinking a cold soda and watching a group of girls in 50's male drag (complete with facial hair) cavort on the outdoor patio of Bubala's, a local eatery. The most fun was watching the minority straight couples, who obviously were unaware of the nature of this particular resort town, gawking or awkwardly avoiding contact on the narrow sidewalks with hand-holding Gay and Lesbian couples who either totally ignored them or kind of smiled in a way that said, "So . . . how's it feel to be outnumbered?"

RAINBOWS EVERYWHERE

Aside from the quaint New England beauty of the town itself, the myriad little shops (with lots of LesBiGay merchandise), the warm, almost "college" feel of the place, there are other really enjoyable aspects to P-Town.
