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

Baldwin Responds Deftly to Homophobe's Invitation to Debate

The following letters were exchanged between Ralph Ovadal, an anti-Gay crusader, and State Rep. Tammy Baldwin, an "out" Lesbian legislator.

Ovadal included a copy of his letter to Baldwin in a fundraising appeal addressed to "Dear Christian." In it, he wrote: "The homosexual movement truly has initiated a quiet, deadly war on America and everything this nation once stood for. They are confident they have now gained the upper hand and have only to mop up the little resistance which remains to their perverse agenda...The eventual goal of WCU [Wisconsin Christians United] is to get legislation introduced to repeal the gains which the homosexuals have made in the last decade and to eventually recriminalize homosexuality...Please get involved in this battle in some way. Why would you not? Why would any of us want to be remembered as the generation who surrendered our beloved America to Queer Nation? Please do something, anything to turn back the "gay" tide about to wash over our land. It is my prayer that you will join with me to ensure that 1996 will be the year the homosexual movement in Wisconsin was forced to abandon their dreams of conquest..."

NOVEMBER 27 OVADAL TO BALDWIN

Dear Rep. Baldwin,

As you are well aware, my organization, Wisconsin Christians United, has been intensifying our efforts against the agenda of the homosexual movement, an agenda which you spearhead. You are the outspoken leader of the "gay" movement in Wisconsin, and I am perhaps the most active opponent of that movement. It strikes me that it could be a most beneficial and interesting thing for us to engage in a series of public debates around the state, debates pertaining to the subject of homosexuality.

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind you that the cause you champion and the lifestyle you flaunt both violate the very precepts this nation was founded upon and meant to be forever governed by, the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God. These are the laws the Constitution was written to carry into practicable application for the governance of our nation. Since your actions and lifestyle place you in violation of the oath you took to uphold and support the US Constitution as well as the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, I would suggest you consider stepping down from the office you now hold.

In closing, Rep. Baldwin, let me say this: I know it is fashionable for you and your peers to claim that individuals like myself "hate" homosexuals. This is nothing short of a lie. What we hate is the lifestyle you promote, a lifestyle which brings nothing but harm to our nation and stirs the wrath of the God we are under. As for you and others like you, it is my hope and prayer that you will consider the warning and the promise given to homosexuals in I Corinthians 6:9-11 and that you will be "washed...sanctified...and justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ."

I will be waiting to hear if you are willing to defend your position on homosexuality in a public debate.



DECEMBER 5 BALDWIN TO OVADAL

Dear Mr. Ovadal:

I am in receipt of your letter dated November 27, 1995. In that letter you ask me to consider participating in a series of debates with you, around the state, on the issue of homosexuality. You present that challenge, in part, because you perceive me to be "the outspoken leader of the 'gay' movement in Wisconsin."

While I would certainly be proud to have earned the title you bestow upon me, the truth is that I am not the leader of the "gay" movement in Wisconsin. To claim such a title would not do justice to the many courageous men and women who have devoted their time and energy to the efforts to end violence against Gays State Rep. Tammy Baldwin



and Lesbians; to secure equal treatment under the law regardless of sexual orientation; and to achieve legal protection for their loved ones. Rather, I am a public official who has decided to be truthful about my sexual orientation. In light of that rather simple fact, I am frequently called upon by the media to state my opinion on issues concerning Gays and Lesbians.

You speak, in your letter, of the "lifestyle" I flaunt. Let me tell you a little about that "lifestyle" which you claim violates the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God. I work typically six or seven days per week, usually well in excess of eight hours per day. As you know, I represent approximately 50,000 constituents in the State Assembly. I try, as best I can, to respond to their inquiries, concerns and requests for assistance from state government. I serve on five Assembly Committees. The public policy issues that I prioritize include the following: public safety (criminal justice), fair taxation, access to health care, prevention of poverty, services to persons with disabilities, education, and protection of civil rights. When I'm not working, I have recently been tending to the health care needs of my 89-year-old grandmother. That, Mr. Ovadal, is my "lifestyle." I suspect that it is more similar than it is dissimilar to yours.

STATE Briefs Friends Establish Fund for Recuperating Kitty Barber

Milwaukee — Friends of Lesbian activist Kitty Barber, who is at Madison's University Hospital recovering from multiple gunshot wounds, have begun a fund in her behalf. Checks can be made out to The Kitty Barber Fund and sent to PO Box 617, Milwaukee, WI 53201. Barber's condition has been upgraded to "fair" and she is no longer in the Intensive Care Unit.

Barber was shot December 1 by law enforcement officials in Dane County after she reportedly led them on a high speed chase from E. Washington Avenue in Madison about 16 miles north to the junction of Highways 19 and CV. There, at a Super America station, Barber reportedly emerged from her minivan, put a gun to her head and then aimed it at police and sheriff's deputies, who opened fire. Authorities have ruled the shooting "justifiable."

Barber, a longtime activist in Milwaukee's Lesbian community, had reportedly been despondent over recent relationship break-ups. Fellow law students at the University of Wisconsin said Barber had expressed frustration with law school and may have fallen behind in her studies.

Repeated calls to Barber's closest friends, including her former partner Karen Gotzler who is apparently acting as her Power of Health or Attorney, were not returned to **In Step**, so further clarification or details were difficult to come by.



As of **In Step's** deadline, the District Attorney had not formally charged Barber with any crimes, but sources have told **In Step** that criminal charges against Barber are inevitable.

The Milwaukee women who have established the fund for Barber were not yet sure how the money would be used, whether for medical or legal expenses, but expressed the view that it was an appropriate way to show Barber that her many friends would not abandon her.

"Countering the Right Wing" Conference Set for February 10

Madison — The Wisconsin Community Fund and the Institute for Wisconsin's Future are sponsoring a daylong conference on February 10 called *Sex*, *Lies, Stereotypes and Profit: Countering the Right Wing in Wisconsin.* Because Gays and Lesbians are one of the primary targets of right wing groups, the conference is expected to be beneficial for Gay and Lesbian activists.

The conference is designed to bring together policy makers, grassroots activists, union members and academics to examine the growing power of conservatism in Wisconsin and to develop strategies that can effectively confront and defeat right wing campaigns at the state and local level.

Topics to be discussed include: sexuality and gender issues; public assistance; crime; race; the environment; workplace issues; and education reform.

David Newby, President of the Wisconsin State AFL-CIO, will present an overview of right wing policy initiatives; State Rep. Rebecca Young will talk about the current legislative landscape; Joanne Ricca will talk about right wing think tanks; Dennis Dresang of the University of Wisconsin will speak on the ambivalent political culture of Wisconsin, represented by John Birch and Bob LaFollette.

The keynote address will be delivered by Loretta J. Ross, National Program Research Director for the Center for Democratic Renewal. Ross directs projects addressing human rights education and Klan and neo-Nazi activities.

The Countering the Right Wing conference will run from 8:30am to 5pm on Saturday, February 10. It will be held at the Concourse Hotel, 1 West Dayton Street in Madison. Perhaps by your reference to "lifestyle" you mean only to focus on the fact that I have been **honest** with the public about my sexual orientation. Would you think it more honorable for me to lie and deceive the public?

In your letter you asked me to resign from office. May I remind you, that the voters of my district (the vast majority of whom are heterosexual) elected me. They elected me with strong majorities in both 1992 and 1994, with full knowledge of my sexual orientation.

Concurrent to mailing your letter to me, you mailed a fundraising letter to your Wisconsin Christians United mailing list. In that fundraising letter you state: "...the least we do when we aggressively confront this issue is to cause the homosexualists to divert resources from offensive action into defensive action' (emphasis original). Your fundraising letter reveals the true reason you have asked for a series of debates. Mr. Ovadal, I have no interest in assisting you making a name for yourself, in raising funds for your organization, or in diverting the energy of Gay men, Lesbians and our allies away from the effort to secure equal treatment under the law and end the violence directed toward us.

You may wish to contact Action Wisconsin: A Congress for Human Rights or PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) in order to secure a debate partner. I am too busy representing my constituents in the State Legislature to debate you at this time.

NATIONAL News Briefs Murder Of Lesbian Activists Seen as "Wake-Up Call"

Washington, DC — Calling the murder of two Lesbian activists a "wake-up call" to the nation about anti-Gay and Lesbian violence, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) has called on Attorney General Janet Reno to monitor the investigation and offer federal protection to Gay activists in states which are facing anti-Gay initiatives.

In Medford, Oregon, Roxanne Ellis, 54, and Michelle Abdill, 42, were reported missing December 4. Four days later, the bodies of Ellis and Abdill were found in the back of their pick-up truck. They had been bound, gagged and shot in the head.

On December 13, tipped off by the suspect's mother, police in Stockton, California apprehended 27-year-old Robert James Acremant and charged him with the murders. Acquaintances of Acremant said they believed the crime was a botched robbery attempt, but friends of the victims said the possibility that the killings were motivated by hatred against Gays and Lesbians had to be fully investigated.

"Clearly, in Oregon and elsewhere, where anti-Gay initiatives happen, so does violence and discrimination," Scot Nakagawa, field organizer with NGLTF commented. "We urge law enforcement to investigate to the fullest extent any possible bias aspects related to this incident. We may not know all the details of this case right now, but one thing we do know is that in communities that battle anti-Gay initiatives, violence against Lesbians and Gays increases."

In 1992 and 1994, the Oregon Citizens Alliance (OCA) mounted unsuccessful statewide anti-Gay initiative campaigns to roll back civil rights for LesBiGay people. During that time, OCA efforts resulted in 27 new city or county-wide anti-Gay laws, including in Medford, the site of the murders, as well as Jackson County. Local organizations reported a dramatic increase in anti-Gay violence, including the fire-bombing of the home of Hattie Mae Cohen, a Lesbian, which resulted in her death as well as the death of Brian Mock, a Gay man.

The NGLTF letter to Reno recounted this and other hate crime incidents and said: "We strongly urge you to consider the possibility of having local FBI or other federal offices in states with anti-Gay and Lesbian initiatives or legislation be on alert for increased violence and civil rights violations against our communities."

Hawaiian Panel Recommends Same-Gender Marriage

Honolulu, HI — In an historic first, a Hawaii state government-appointed commission, specifically charged with studying the freedom to marry that is denied to same-gender couples, forwarded a report to the state legislature recommending that Hawaii's marriage laws be amended to "allow two people regardless of their gender to marry."

The report was issued by the Hawaii Commission on Sexual Orientation and the Law, whose members were appointed by the governor. The commission was created by the legislature in June, 1994 to determine how best to address the ways in which same-gender couples are affected by not being able to marry.

"After months of intense research and witness testimony, a government body has finally concluded that there is no legitimate reason for the state to continue refusing civil marriage licenses to same-gender couples who want to make the commitment of marriage," said Rich Tafel of the Log Cabin Republicans, one of broad range of groups organized together as the National Freedom to Marry Coalition.

The commission was created in reaction to a landmark lawsuit challenging the denial of civil marriage licenses to samegender couples. In May, 1993, the Hawaii Supreme Court ruled that the "same-gender restriction" on marriage appears to violate the state constitution, specifically, the section that forbids gender-based bias. The court held that unless the state can identify a "compelling" justification for discriminating, it must stop.

The case, Baehr v. Lewin, is now before the lower court, where the couples are represented by attorneys with the Hawaii Equal Rights Marriage Project and the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund. If a decision favorable to the plaintiffs is delivered and sustained on appeal, Hawaii could become the first state in the union to legalize civil marriage between samegender couples.

Anti-Gay Extremists Exploit Congressional Hearings

Washington, DC — The long-awaited hearings on the alleged influence of Gays in America's public schools took place December 5 and 6. To disguise the homophobic nature of the investigation, which had been orchestrated by the Rev. Lou Sheldon of the Traditional Values Coalition, the hearings were titled "Parents, Schools and Values."

Many of the speakers did, in fact, express dire warnings about the lack of values and the supposed homosexual infiltration of schools. They testified against sex education and AIDS prevention programs, suggesting that these programs encouraged young people to act out sexually. They decried diversity programs as smokescreens for allowing homosexuals to be allowed in to "recruit" children.

"While they certainly might have been worse had there not been a public outcry, these hearings nonetheless provided a taxpayer-funded platform for religious political extremists seeking to impose their divisive agenda on everyone," said David Zingale of the Human Rights Campaign.

But the House Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House Economic and Educational Opportunities Committee also heard compelling testimony in support of Gay and Lesbian students. Mary Griffith told the heart-wrenching story of the suicide of her son Bobby, who was Gay. Ann Simon, a high school teacher from Massachusetts, spoke of the harassment she has witnessed against Gay students.

In written testimony, a Wisconsinite named Jamie Nabozny spoke of enduring four years of constant harassment by schoolmates in his Ashland school while school officials did nothing. Nabozny, who had to move to Minneapolis to complete his education, is suing the Ashland school district. (See the text of Nabozny's testimony in this News section.)

The subcommittee took no action on the testimony delivered, and a number of committee members expressed skepticism about the federal government interfering in any way with diversity and sex and AIDS education programs developed by local school districts.

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AIDS Activists: More Leadership Needed From Clinton

Washington, DC - About 200 people, including AIDS advocates, health workers, researchers and people with AIDS, attended the first-ever White House Conference on AIDS December 6. President Clinton spoke out against homophobia and vowed not to destroy the federal safety net, including Medicaid. on which people with AIDS rely.

Doug Nelson of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin attended the White House Conference and gave In Step his assessment.

"It was highly successful, a historic step forward with regard to AIDS public policy. It was the first White House conference ever, with 200 front-line activists talking to President Clinton for several hours. Everyone there hoped for a stiffening of Clinton's resolve to protect the safety net, primarily Medicaid."

"One of the messages that we sent," said Nelson, "is that we simply cannot afford any further retrenchment on health care issues. The whole AIDS health care service system is collapsing. We're seeing that in Milwaukee with the closing of Doyne Hospital and the cut-off of General Assistance funds. The infrastructure is beginning to collapse. The last thing we need is for the President to negotiate away essential health supports at the federal level."

"The other message we sent was 'Thank you, President Clinton. We recognize you've done more on AIDS than any of your predecessors, but we still need much more leadership from you on AIDS issues. We need leadership to lift the federal ban on needle exchanges. We need leadership to lift the stigma on AIDS in general, and we need more funds for AIDS research."

Clinton acknowledged that the massive cuts in the Medicaid budget proposed by the GOP majorities in Congress would



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drive "a stake in the heart of our effort to guarantee dignity to the people with AIDS in this country." He said: "I do not want to wait until every single family has somebody die before we have a good policy."

Responding to a participant's reference to AIDS-related discrimination, the President said: "We can't let our bigotry - or, to use his word - we can't let our homophobia blind us to our obligation."

CDC AIDS Prevention Ads (Finally) Target Gav Men

Atlanta, GA - Amid troubling new evidence of the toll AIDS continues to take on America's young adults, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have released a new series of public service announcements aimed at young people, especially people of color, urging them to take responsibility in protecting themselves from HIV infection. Among the ads is the first ever to target Gay men.


"This new campaign is welcome and long overdue," said a spokesman for the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD). "For too long, government and health establishments have refused to use television to speak directly and affirmatively to Gays, even while HIV has ravaged Gay teenagers."

In one 30-second spot called Men - Talk About It, a young couple exchange such banter as: "We have to talk about sex." "There's no reason to be scared" and "If you don't practice safe sex, and I do, then we're not made for each other, honey."

In announcing the new campaign, Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala said: "While our AIDS prevention efforts have succeeded in stabilizing or even reducing the rate of infection among older Americans, they are not having the same kind of effect among young adults."

Shalala cited a new study by the National Institutes of Health showing that AIDS cases have increased much more rapidly among younger individuals, born in 1960 or later, than among older Americans.

"What we have is a generation in jeopardy," said Shalala. "And it is up to us to take action now to reverse these troubling trends before we wipe out a new generation of leadership for this country."

Producers Protest NC-17 Rating for Lesbian Film

Los Angeles, CA — October Films, producers and distributors of the new movie When Night is Falling, a Lesbian love story, have rejected the NC-17 rating stamped on their film by the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) and are marketing it to theaters unrated.

The NC-17 rating restricts viewership to adults over 17, limiting the film's distribution and prospects for financial success. The new rating also carries a popular stigma (from an affiliation with soft-core pornography) that is likely to keep people away.

When Night is Falling focuses on a theology professor, whose chance meeting with a circus performer leads to romance. The film includes two love-making scenes that are no more graphic than similar heterosexual scenes routinely included in "R" and even "PG-13" rated movies.

"It is our strong belief that if these two scenes had involved heterosexual love-making, we would have received the less restrictive R rating," said Amir Malin of October Films. "It is very unfortunate and quite ominous that the MPAA has opted to take this course with its rating decision."

When Night is Falling has opened around the country in major markets to generally good reviews. It is directed by Patricia Rozema, whose previous film work includes the quirky *I've Heard the Mermaids Singing*.

Philadelphia, PA — The Philadelphia Gay News reports that the Pennsylvania Insurance Department has approved requests by Independence Blue Cross and Pennsylvania Blue Shield to provide domestic partners coverage. Domestic partnership benefits will soon be available to about one million of the insurance companies' subscribers, enrolled in 8,000 employer groups nationwide.

Washington, DC — Rep. Rodney Frelinghuysen (R-NJ) has become the latest sponsor of the federal Employment Non-Discrimination Act, making him the 160th legislator to sign on in support of the bill. ENDA, as it is called, will outlaw employment discrimination based on sexual orientation throughout the country.

New York, NY — Lesbian writer Marilyn Hacker has been named the winner of the 1995 Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize, a prestigious award that carries with it a grant of \$10,000. She won for her collection Winter Numbers, which was judged to be "most outstanding."

Alexandria, VA — The National Federation of Republican Women has issued repeated apologies after receiving complaints about a vendor at its recent national convention. The vendor sold bumper stickers that said: "The miracle of AIDS turned fruits into vegetables" and "Roosevelt — a chicken in every pot/ Clinton — a fag in every foxhole." Another sticker said: "Work — the white thing to do."

Washington, DC — Rep. Patricia Schroeder (D-CO), a longtime ally of the Gay and Lesbian community, has announced that she will retire after this, her twelfth term in office. During her tenure, she voted against involvement in the Vietnam War, supported a range of civil rights legislation, and was a champion of women's rights and Gay and Lesbian rights, earning consistent grades of 100% for her voting record on Gay and AIDSrelated issues.

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Wisconsin Youth Tells Congress of Anti-Gay Abuse in His High School

Parents Say: "No Family Should Go Through This...'

At the recent hearings investigating the alleged influence of homosexuals in America's public schools, the House Economic and Employment Subcommittee on Oversight and investigations received testimony from a Wisconsinite, Jamie Nabozny, who endured four years of anti-Gay taunting and violence in his school in Ashland. Nabozny, with the help of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, is suing the Ashland School District for failing to protect him and denying him his right to an education.

Following is the text of the testimony submitted by Nabozny and his parents to the House Subcommittee on December 5.

JAMIE NABOZNY

My name is Jamie Nabozny, and I thank you for this opportunity to address this committee. As a high school student in Wisconsin, I suffered over four years of anti-Gay violence from some of my classmates. The school officials took no actions, sending the message to the other students that beating me up was okay. I hope this hearing will send a different message across America, so fewer kids are getting hurt out there. If the hearing truly addresses teaching values, then there should be a focus on the most important value: respect for others.

I went through over four years of daily verbal and physical abuse, including having pencils thrown at me, books knocked out of my hands, my chair being pulled out from under me, and being spit on. Often the physical abuse got really bad. In seventh grade, after a teacher left the classroom, two boys wrestled me to the floor and acted out a rape on me, while the rest of the class watched and laughed. In ninth grade, two boys knocked me to the floor and urinated on me. In tenth grade, about ten boys trapped me in a hallway and one kicked me in the stomach so bad that I had to go into the hospital later.

My parents kept calling and meeting with the school officials but the response was that if I was Gay that I should expect this kind of treatment. The school took no meaningful actions against the boys who were harassing me, which sent the message that it was okay to keep harassing me. The school was teaching the values that disrespect for others is okay, and that violence is okay.

Instead of disciplining the kids beating me up, the school started to treat me like I was the problem. They moved me into separate classes, even though I wasn't the problem. Eventually, they separated me even more and moved me into a special education class, even though I wasn't the problem. When kids on the bus wouldn't stop throwing things at me and spitting on me, the school changed my assigned seat to the front of the bus where I had to sit with the elementary school children, even though I was 16 years old and even though I wasn't the problem.

When I could no longer use the student bathrooms because I would always get beaten up in there, I was forced to use a separate bathroom in the home economics classroom, even though I wasn't the problem. Instead of teaching the value of respect for others, the school taught that if you are different you are the problem, and you are the one that has to be separated out and hide.

Well, the values of disrespect and violence got through to the other students, and they got through to me. I attempted suicide three times when I was a teenager, and I was hospitalized each time. I couldn't take it any longer by the eleventh grade, so I dropped out of school at age 16, and I moved to Minneapolis to escape. I had to give up my wonderful family, I had to give up my high school education to get a GED, and I had to give up my teenage years.

What happened to me is now a legal case being appealed by Lambda Legal Defense. One of the things I sued for is the right to get my diploma and to go to the graduation ceremony that I was never able to attend. Can you imagine having to sue a school just for the right to attend your high school graduation?

I hope that these hearings on schools and values will focus on teaching respect for others, so that other young people are not forced to leave their families and homes, lose their educations, and lose their childhoods. I hope that these hearings will send the message that it is not okay to ruin people's lives simply because they are Gay.

CAROL & ROBERT NABOZNY

Thank you for this opportunity to address this committee.

We are the parents of Jamie Nabozny, who suffered over four years of harassment and physical assaults at his public school in our town in Wisconsin. Jamie suffered this abuse simply because he is Gay. We hope that this hearing, called "Parents, Schools and Values," will address the kinds of violence our son suffered and that children across this country suffer in public schools. Our fear is that some of the hearing testimony will actually contribute to the very atmosphere that promoted the abuse our son suffered and that allowed the abuse to go unaddressed for over four years.

This Committee needs to understand what our son went through. For four-anda-half years our son was repeatedly beaten up, kicked and pushed around, spat and urinated on, and one day his classmates wrestled him to the floor and acted out a rape on him, in front of the rest of the class.

All these things happened even though we kept calling the school and having meetings with school officials. Do parents have to go to school with their children eight hours a day just to make sure they are safe? Our son has had to sue and then appeal through Lambda Legal Defense simply to show that school officials should have responded to our complaints. By failing to do so, the school sent the message that it was acceptable to beat our son up because he is Gay.

Based on all he went through, Jamie was forced to drop out of school. As his parents, it was the hardest thing we ever had to do when we let him leave home at age 16 to go to a big city where he could finish his education. He has made us very proud, but no son or daughter, no family in this country should go through something like this as a result of our schools' sending the message that being gay is bad.

Unfortunately, the violence won't stop until we change the message to the students in our schools. We fear that these hearings will send the same message that the school sent to the students who beat up our son. If you allow that message into our schools, more children will suffer this way and lose what should be the happiest times of their lives. More families will have to break up as children cannot survive living in their hometowns.





WISCONSIN COMMUNITY-BASED Research consortium (WCRC)

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
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"Thank You" to MAP

To the Editor:

I am writing in regards to the previous articles expressing dissatisfaction with Milwaukee AIDS Project services. I regret being unable to attend the forums and was disturbed by Mr. [Richard] Miller's recent letter [In Step, December 7-20, 1995]. Losing a loved one to AIDS is traumatic enough without having his anguish compounded by his experience with MAP. My heart goes out to this man for his loss. MAP, as with any organization, could stand room for improvement and they have made it clear they intend to do so.


I became a client of MAP in March of this year after being rushed to the hospital with what we thought was exhaustion and pneumonia. Over the next few days, I learned I had pneumocyctis carini pneumonia, Kaposi's Sarcoma and a Tcell count of 22 — full-blown AIDS. I was put in contact with MAP by a friend and my first contact was with Kaye Tucker, Intake Specialist. She was kind and understanding and had me assigned to a case manager within a week. On two separate occasions, she spent more than an hour counseling me, as I was near hysteria at first.

My case manager, Mike Stenz, has been a life-saver and a god-send. I can't thank him enough for all he's done. After my discussions with Kave, he put me in touch with a psychotherapist for regular counseling. He informed me of many services and information I would need in the future. When the time came to stop working, he coached me in filling out forms for SSI and SSDI and told me what to expect. He's visited me in the hospital on his own time and is always "there to talk" if I need it. Any message I've left has been returned within 24 hours. He may not have the answers to every question I pose, but he does his best to put me in touch with people who do. His level of service amazes me considering his total case load.

Phil Rosenkranz in the legal department has also been very helpful with information and assistance concerning wrapping up my business affairs and necessary legal documents. His knowledge has saved me money and unnecessary trips to other sources.

I would like to say a public "Thank You" to these people and hope that they are models for MAP personnel in the future.

Profiles Will Fellows to Publish Book on "Gay Farm Boys" *"Farm Boys" Slide Show in Milwaukee January 8*

Milwaukee — A Wisconsin farm boy himself, Will Fellows is going to have his book, Farm Boys: Lives of Gay Men From the Rural Midwest, published by the University of Wisconsin Press in 1996.

In creating this collection of life stories, Fellows interviewed more than 70 men throughout the Midwest, many of whom also contributed photographs. Using a generous selection of these images, Fellows has produced a slide-illustrated talk that presents an engaging overview of the Midwestern "Gay farm boy" experience during this century.

For those who'd like a first sneak peak at the contents of Farm Boys, Fellows will present his slideshow/talk at Milwaukee's First Unitarian Society, 1342 N. Astor Street, on Monday, January 8 at 7:15pm. It's free and open to the public.

Fellows, 38, was born and raised on a dairy farm in south-central Wisconsin in Rock County, near Evansville. He attended the University of Wisconsin and UW-Platteville and ultimately obtained a Masters degree in Nutrition from Cornell University.

In the mid-1980's he came back to Wisconsin, first to Madison, and then in 1993 to Milwaukee where he works as a

nutritionist for the Wisconsin Early Childhood Association.


"I found my work agreeable enough," Fellows told **In Step** of his job as a nutritionist, "but not as creatively satisfying as I'd like."

"PERSONAL RESONANCE"

While still in Madison, Fellows became determined to work on a project involving Gay and Lesbian history in some way. Citing its "personal appeal and resonance," he eventually decided to explore the lives of Gay men, who, like himself, were raised on farms in the Midwest.

"I thought, not only would it be interesting to look at the life experiences especially the growing-up experiences of Gay men raised on farms, but how they feel as Gay men today and how their rural roots have influenced their lives."

With the assistance of grants from the New Harvest, Cream City and other foundations, Fellows began his project in the spring of 1992. First, he took out ads in Midwestern Gay papers (including **In Step**) seeking individuals to interview. He then conducted 75 interviews with Gay farm boys who shared their life stories. The oldest was born in 1909, the youngest, in the 1960's.





Of those 75 interviews, 50 were completely transcribed and, of those 50, Fellows chose 25 he felt to be "most substantive and representative" of the Gay Midwestern farm boy experience. He discarded the question/answer format and broke down the interviews so they will appear as first person narratives in the book — one chapter for each farm boy.

Fellows began sending his manuscript to publishers in late 1994, and the University of Wisconsin Press agreed to publish it in 1996. They were no doubt attracted by the thoroughness of Fellows' work along with the contribution **Farm Boys** makes to multiple areas of academic and popular interest: to regional/local history; to the field of oral history (first person accounts); and to the growing field of Gay and Lesbian history.

"I hope it contributes in that way," Fellows commented modestly. "I also hope Gay men raised on farms will see their lives reflected in the stories. I hope they find it as gratifying as I have felt working on it."

By Marvin Liebman In the Name of God The Danger of Far Right Religious Preachings

The world was shocked by the assassination of Israel's Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin by an ultra-religious rightwing Jew. He murdered "in the name of God" and under the preachings of fundamentalist rabbis whose interpretation of God's word gave him the license to kill.

I was neither shocked nor surprised. There has always existed in Israel - as it exists in Iran, in Bosnia, in Ireland, in the United States and throughout the world - extreme religious fundamentalism that calls for death for the unbelievers who stray from their view of God's teaching. In 1947, I worked with the Irgun, the armed underground of the right-wing Zionist Revisionists, whose basic philosophy rested on the certainty that God had decreed that a Jewish nation should exist on both sides of the Jordan River. Anyone who gives away even a handful of Israeli soil, for whatever reason, does so at his peril. The Revisionists have become the extreme right of the Likud Party in Israel. Their inflammatory rhetoric led to the assassination of Rabin and will result in more killings "in the name of God."

Extremist clergymen and politics. Sound familiar?

The United States is certainly not immune from violence based on the rhetoric of religious leaders. While hate-based violence against Lesbians and Gays is a decades-old epidemic, it may at last prove capable of provoking an overdue nationwide debate — both moral and political. As in Israel today, the scrutiny of rightwing religious groups' role in fanning such violence is a good place for that debate to start.

P-FLAG'S CAMPAIGN

The linkage between anti-Gay religious rhetoric and acts of violence is complex, and begs exploration. Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (P-FLAG) is a national organization that wants to expose the connection between hate rhetoric and anti-Gay violence. Recently, P-FLAG produced two 30-second public service TV spots which take aim at just this combination. Further justification of its focus comes from a recent **Newsweek** magazine poll showing that 21% of all Americans, and 43% of evangelical Christians, believe that the Gay rights movement is "an incarnation of Satan." Taking this belief to its logical conclusion, Lesbians and Gays become Satan's agents on earth and must be eradicated "in the name of God."

One of P-FLAG's TV advertisements portrays a teenage girl contemplating suicide with a handgun; the other, a young man being beaten to death by a gang of thugs shouting anti-Gay slurs. The victim's mother, Nancy Rodriguez, appears at the end of the TV spot saying that the FBI had declared that the murder of her 27-year-old son was a hate crime, "a Gay bashing." In a final blow, Mrs. Rodriguez was fired from her job when her involvement in the P-FLAG campaign became public.

In the ads, the voices of the Rev. Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson are heard over the film's soundtrack. Robertson is heard saying: "Homosexuality is an abomination...many of those people involved with Adolf Hitler were Satanists; many of them were homosexuals. The two things seem to go together." Falwell simply says: "God hates homosexuality."

Syndicated bigots like Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson, whose Christian Coalition has become the major power-broker in the Republican Party, liberally intersperse their sermons with inflammatory anti-Gay tirades. Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN) has threatened to take legal action against any station running the P-FLAG ads, effectively keeping them off the air.

RHETORIC SPURS VIOLENCE

While criticism of Falwell, Robertson and their politically religious clones exists, they largely escape scrutiny for their role in inspiring hate crimes "in the name of God." Rev. Mel White was on the right track with his jailhouse hunger strike this spring when he was arrested trying to prevail on Robertson at his CBN headquarters in Virginia. But that protest went largely ignored in the national media as well as in much of the Gay press itself.

"Christian" and "family values" hucksters constantly bemoan the influence of TV and Hollywood portrayals of violence. Let the anti-Gay religious leaders listen to their own inflammatory rhetoric. Let them understand the violence that can stem from their sanctimonious sermons on Satan and homosexuality. If their followers could muster just a fraction of their outrage at Hollywood in opposition to anti-Gay violence, the epidemic of hate violence might gain much of the attention it deserves.

With the proper resources, attaching a stigma to incendiary religious rhetoric becomes quick work. Falwell and Robertson implicate themselves. P-FLAG's ads showing some of their rhetoric deftly make the case that their own words provide the climate in which such acts of violence might proliferate and gain religious sanction.

The case against anti-Gay violence can take many tacks. Yet, for too long, the sheer abundance of other pressing issues on the desks of Gay political leaders has allowed attention to the issue to lapse. With its far-reaching ravages, hate violence against Gays cannot continue to slip from the spotlight. The murder of Rabin in Israel has once again awakened people of conscience around the world to the fact that far-right religious preachings eventually can lead to bloodshed. Perhaps Gays in America can awaken our fellow citizens to a similar and equally simple conclusion.

In this month of Christian celebration, we call on Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell and all the other professional "Christians" — in the name of their professed Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ — to preach love, not hate; peace, not violence; and, above all, the Golden Rule.





Health "HIV/AIDS & the Spiritual Life" Set for Dec. 29-31

Milwaukee — Embracing the Mystery: HIV/AIDS & the Spiritual Life, sponsored by the St. Camillus AIDS Ministry, is designed to help participants re-frame their often negative experiences of living with HIV disease.

The retreat, scheduled for December 29-31, is open to anyone living with HIV/ AIDS without regard to race, gender, religion, sexual orientation or age. There is no fee required for participation, but enrollment is limited, so reservations are requested.

At the retreat, guided meditation, reframing of emotional resistance, group sharing, trance journeying, bodywork, music and ritual are woven into an holistic exploration of tools for healing which participants can integrate into their daily lives.

Participants will explore their feelings about HIV in their lives and what HIV means to them. Sharing in a ritual of grieving and a journey of healing, it is hoped participants will find a renewed strength and commitment to live fully now and experience healing from within.

Also on the AIDS Front...

Washington, DC — A study published in the Journal of Urology reports that in an analysis of more than 100 semen samples taken from 16 HIV-infected men over a two-year period, live and infectious virus was detected 22% of the time. The findings, by Dr. Ann Collier of the University of Washington in Seattle, dramatize the high risk of unprotected sex with someone who is HIV-positive.

"People who are sexually active should be aware that HIV could be in the semen at any time, and that means people should be cautious all the time," Collier told the New York Times.

Washington, DC - A study conducted by the National Cancer Institute reveals that one in every 92 American men between the ages of 27 and 39 are HIV-infected. The statistics for African American men in that age group are even more grim: one in 33 has HIV. Since identifying the disease in 1981, more than a half million Americans have contracted HIV and more than 311,000 have died of AIDS complications.

Atlanta, GA — Dr. Helene Gayle, a scientist who has studied the impact of AIDS on women and children, has been appointed to replace Dr. James Curran as chief of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's AIDS division. The Division of HIV / AIDS was recently reorganized to incorporate other sexually transmitted diseases as well as TB.

Dr. Curran was one of the first scientists to investigate AIDS when reports of the disease began to surface in 1981. He specialized in the area ever since. Curran left the CDC to take a position at Emory University.






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Memoriams Michael James Hinderer August 19, 1968 - December 10, 1995

Michael James Hinderer, a pioneer in AIDS prevention education in Wisconsin's Deaf community, passed away from AIDS-related complications at his south side Milwaukee home Sunday, December 10. He was 27. With him were his partner of five years, Bob Plahmer, and their dog, PJ.

Michael was born and grew up in Chicago. He attended the Illinois School for the Deaf and then Gallaudet University in Washington, DC. He moved to Milwaukee in the summer of 1990.

Michael learned he was HIV-positive at age 17 during his first semester at Gallaudet.

In recent years, he worked with the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) and other groups, organizing AIDS prevention outreach to the Deaf community. He was featured in an ad for the BESTD Clinic, encouraging deaf people to get tested for HIV.

"If there was a group that wanted to hear about AIDS and they had hearingimpaired people, Michael was there," MAP Prevention Educator Laura Lutz recalled.


"Michael was driven," his case manager at MAP, Sarah Berg, commented. "He dedicated years to making sure the Deaf community knew what was going on with HIV/AIDS."

"He was also enormously supportive of people in the Deaf community who were HIV-positive, teaching them to question doctors and caregivers, urging them to stand up for what they needed."

"With Michael's death, there is a huge void," said Berg. "We really need someone to carry on, someone who has sign language ability and his knowledge of the Deaf community and HIV/AIDS."

Michael is survived by his partner, Bob, PJ, his sisters Theresa and Nicole, his brother Daniel and his mother Nancy. He is further survived by many friends in the Deaf community and the Gay and Lesbian community.

A memorial service was held December 14 in the Prasser-Kleczka Bay View Chapel on S. Howell Avenue. It was presided over by Rev. Lew Broyles of the

Metropolitan Community Church. The service ended with the playing of Barbra Streisand's version of "Over the Rainbow."

Ancient, pre-Christian holiday festivals used greenery, lights and flame to symbolize life and warmth in the midst of the cold and dark of winter. Of course, most people will agree that the most splendid symbol of a modern Christmas


is the evergreen tree, brilliantly decorated with strings of multicolored lights.

The Egyptians, Chinese and Hebrews, among other peoples, also used evergreens and wreaths as symbols of life. Tuetonic and Scandinavian people of northern Europe decorated houses and

barns with evergreens at the new year to scare away demons.

The modern Christmas tree seems to have originated in Germany during the Middle Ages. In the same room as the tree, Germans kept a Christmas pyramid made

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of wood, with shelves to hold figurines. The pyramid was also decorated with evergreens, candles and a star. By the 16th century, the pyramid and the tree had merged, becoming the Christmas tree so popular today.

The Christmas tree was introduced in England early in the 19th century. The trees were decorated with candles, candies, paper chains, and fancy cakes that were hung from the branches with ribbons.

German settlers brought the Christmas tree custom to the American colonies in the 17th century. By the 19th century its use was quite widespread. Trees also became popular in Austria, Switzerland, Poland and Holland. In China and Japan, Christmas trees were first introduced by Christian missionaries in the 19th and 20th centuries. There they were decorated with intricate paper designs.

Bavaria is credited with inventing and producing the first blown glass Christmas tree ornament in the 1700's.






"Aimee, Lord, Aimee" at Waterloo's Mode Theatre



Books The Best Gay & Lesbian Fiction of 1995

As has been the case throughout the '90's, this past year has seen yet another bumper crop of impressive Gay and Lesbian titles ranging from wonderfully eccentric and extraordinary anthologies, distinctive and compelling works of fiction, and an increasingly diverse range of nonfiction titles.

Gay readers saw the triumphant, virtual "epic" return of two of the most popular Gay novelists of the 1980's: Ethan Mordden and Felice Picano. Mordden's trilogy of deftly comic novels, Buddies, **I've A Feeling We're Not In Kansas Anymore** and **Everybody Loves You**, chronicling Gay life in the city, have never lost their popularity. In **How Long Has This Been Going On?** (Villard, \$25.00), Mordden traces the birth of the Gay movement across the panoramic American landscape through the eyes and the lives of a rich and diverse group of characters.

As a founding member of the legendary Violet Quill Club and also as author of a stunningly disparate body of work, from the best-selling thriller The **Lure** to **The New Joy Of Gay Sex**, Felice Picano has remained a major, if occasionally controversial figure in Gay literature. In his self-described "Gay American epic" **Like People In History**, (Viking, \$23.95), Picano traces the lives and loves of two men, their lives intertwined, over four decades.

Some of the most fresh and innovative work of Gay fiction came from a host of new and upcoming Gay writers of fiction. The most stunning debut novel of 1995, or in recent memory for that matter was Scott Heim's spare, haunting **Mysterious Skin** (HarperCollins, \$20.00). In this harrowing account of the extraordinary ways that people choose to interpret memory, two boys must face the incidents

of childhood sexual abuse at the hands of their little league coach.

Equally stunning was Jim Grimsley's extraordinarily eloquent, astonishingly lyrical **Dream Boy** (Algonquin, \$18.95). Another novel from the not so nurturing heartland, **Dream Boy** chronicles the joys and pains of teenage sexuality and love. Surely this is a novel not to be missed.

Ever popular comic writer Robert Rodi returned in '95 with his fourth hilarious farce, **Drag Queen** (Dutton, \$21.95). Replete with improbable characters and even less likely situations, **Drag Queen** is a laugh-out-loud, roller-coaster of a romp.

Matthew Rettenmund's delicious, provocatively covered **Boy Culture** (St. Martin's Press, \$19.95) is a sexy and surprisingly romantic Gay love triangle. Perhaps a bit old-fashioned at heart, **Boy Culture** is a marvelously touching portrait of Gay love and lust in the '90s.

Perhaps the most innovative works of fiction are Peter Cashorali's Fairy Tales (HarperCollins, \$18.00) and Howard Cruse's graphic novel, Stuck Rubber Baby (Paradox Fiction, \$24.95).

With Hans Christian Andersen and the Brothers Grimm, among many others as inspiration, Cashorali has with grace and wit, quite artfully contemporized classic folk and fairy tales to provide Gay men with stories that touch their lives. Ranging from an especially poignant Ugly Duckling, a movie-mad Hansel, and a Rumpelstiltskin with a riddle about HIV, Fairy Tales is the perfect bed-time read.

Best known for his popular Wendel comic strip, Cruse in **Stuck Rubber Baby** explores the coming out and coming of age of a young Gay man in the South during the Civil Rights movement of the 1960's. Engaging and lucid, Cruse effectively utilizes both words and pictures to capture the confusion, anger and growth of his protagonist.

Also deserving of special mention are Todd D. Brown's delightful comingof-age novel, Entries From A Hot Pink Notebook (Washington Square Press, \$10.00), Christopher Bram's wry, melodramatic Father Of Frankenstein (Dutton, \$19.95) and Lars Eighner's sexy thriller Pawn To Queen Four (St. Martin's Press, \$21.95).

Still the question remains: When is Armistead Maupin going to publish another novel – inquiring minds want to know!

LESBIAN FICTION TITLES

1995 will be remembered as the year that Lesbian writers finally found a real niche in the world of mainstream publishing, with an unprecedented roster of novels by some of the biggest names in Lesbian fiction writing for such leading mainstream publishers as Bantam, Random House and Simon & Schuster.

The year began with the eagerly awaited and much debated novel from Jeanette Winterson, **Art And Lies** (Knopf, \$22.00). The always interesting, invariably controversial Winterson here brought together three apparently disparate figures on a high-speed train hurtling throughout centuries. Passionate, beguilingly symbolic and maddeningly confusing, **Art And Lies** is a dazzling work of fiction.

Equally controversial is **Claire Of The Moon's** Nicole Conn. In **Passion's Shadow** (Simon & Schuster, \$22.00), Conn focuses on the volatile relationships of a mother and daughter, both heterosexual, and the strong and strong-willed Lesbian who loves them both.

Rita Mae Brown is perhaps the most widely known, most versatile, and most beloved of all Lesbian writers. Rita and the ever incorrigible Sneaky Pie Brown

have released their latest Mrs. Murphy mystery, Pay Dirt (Bantam, \$21.95) just in time for the holidays!

The ever-popular Sarah Schulman, perhaps the most original of any Lesbian writer today, returns this fall with the quirky, touching Rat Bohemia (Dutton \$19.95). At turns funny and deeply moving, Rat Bohemia is a novel of contemporary Gay New York. At its center is a most unlikely, yet utterly likable protagonist, Rita Mae Weems, a rat killer and gosh-darnit, proud of it. With friends Killer, a career plant-waterer, and David, an HIV-positive writer, Rita explores the ways Gay men and Lesbians form their own, often alternative families.

Lisa Alther is the best-selling author of such popular mainstream titles as Kinflicks, Original Sin and Bedrock. In Five Minutes In Heaven (Dutton, \$22.95), Alther has written a powerful Lesbian love story, a story that challenges notions of love, sex and the meaning of life.

From Naiad comes Paxton Court (\$21.95), the third novel from Diane Salvatore, the popular author of Love, Zena Beth and Benediction. Paxton Court is a picturesque cul-de-sac in Lakeside Leisure, a sleepy retirement community in Florida. Or rather sleepy only until residents find out that their newest neighbors are Gay and Lesbian couples. Insightful, erotic and wickedly funny.

Just as wickedly funny is the third entry in Mabel Maney's delightful Nancy Clue mystery series: A Ghost In The Closet (Cleis Press, \$10.95). Here teamed up with the ever-so Gay Hardly Boys, Frank and Joe, Nancy helps solve the case of the missing Hardly parents. Romance, thrills, excitement and Red Herrings abound in this delightfully Gay satire of favorite girlhood and boyhood reading.

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



David, offended by Diego's come-on and shocked by his vocal disparagement of Communism, eventually becomes a friend, learning valuable lessons from the Gay rebel.

Strawberry and Chocolate was nominated for an Oscar as Best Foreign Film. It was directed by Tomas Gutierrez Alea and was

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a breakthrough film, being the first Gay-oriented film ever to receive support from the notoriously homophobic Cuban government. Ask for it at your local video store.

New York, NY — The December episode of the Gay/Lesbian newsmagazine show *In the Life* was delayed for broadcast and will be seen on Wisconsin Public TV stations Tuesday, January 2 at 11pm.

The show features several interesting segments, one an interview with President Clinton's advisor George Stephanoupoulos on Gay and Lesbian issues. Another focuses on how Gays and Lesbians celebrate the holidays, both with their biological and their chosen families.

An extended segment focuses on Gays and Lesbians within Catholic institutions. Host Katherine Linton interviews Gay students at Notre Dame University where they have engaged in a



struggle with the administration over official recognition of their group. Also interviewed is Professor Linda Plagman, a Lesbian who teaches at Cardinal Stritch College.

A segment on Gay cartooning features Jennifer Camper and Howard Cruse, and In the Life visits the Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington to explore the Gay aspects of Nazi persecution.

Feature Gay Travel Magazines Approach Gay Travel Differently Peruse "Out & About," "Our World" and "The Guide"

The Gay travel industry is taking off like a Concorde. Guesthouses, beaches and even cruise ships now cater to Gay and Lesbian travelers. As the number of destinations and vacationers increases, publications spring up to cover the burgeoning Gay travel market. But what makes Gay travel distinctive?

"Sometimes being Gay is very important to the decisions we make about travel, and sometimes it's entirely irrelevant," says Billy Kolber, Editor of the Gay travel newsletter **Out & About**.

While places like San Francisco, Key West and Provincetown have long been known as Gay destinations, Gay travelers are increasingly opting for less Gayspecific vacation spots, he says.

"We see virtually the entire world as potential destinations for Gay travelers," says Kolber. "There are very few places that Gay people don't travel to either for business or pleasure. We see covering that world as our mission."

Out & About publishes its 16-page, two-color newsletter ten times a year, out of New York. In addition to feature stories about travel spots, the magazine rates guesthouses and restaurants around the Russia and Eastern Europe have become popular destinations for the Gay and Lesbian community. Photo: Our World



world. And not all of those venues are Gay.

"The majority of hotels that we write about are not exclusively gay places, but

places where a Gay couple or single person could feel comfortable not having to hide their sexual orientation," says Kolber, noting that **Out & About** isn't a Gay travel magazine per se. "We really think of ourselves as a mainstream travel publication with a Gay perspective."

But perhaps **Out & About** is closer to a Gay travel version of **Consumer Reports**. Launched in 1992, **Out & About** accepts no advertising, and is entirely supported by its 8,000 subscribers.

"We felt that the Gay travel information that was available to women and men traveling prior to our inception was very much advertiser-driven — not only advertiser-biased, but it also tended to cover destinations that had Gay travel advertisers as a way to lure those travel advertisers," says Kolber. "We felt that the only way to cover Gay travel objectively was to start a publication that didn't accept advertisers."

"OUR WORLD"

Wayne Whiston, Editor of **Our** World, has heard this complaint for years, but he still doesn't buy it. His publication is advertiser-supported, and he doesn't think this compromises the magazine's integrity. "I think it's a red herring," says Whiston, noting that he has covered venues that have never advertised, and vice versa. "People say since you have advertisers, you can't be objective, but I think that's nonsense."

Whiston, like Kolbert, includes non-Gay establishments in his magazine. With a circulation of 28,000, Florida-based **Our World** is now one of the largest — and toniest —Gay travel publications on the market.

"We sort of wanted to be like Conde Nast," says Whiston, who has tried to redefine Gay travel in a more classy and less sexual way in the eight years he has edited **Our World**. "We didn't want to geared toward sex trips where everybody travels just to meet somebody. Gay travel has changed so much, and the bulk of Gay travelers are couples. A lot of people who travel now are not going for Gay bars."

But clearly, a large number of travelers are still looking for Gay bars and taking "sex trips." For those readers, Bostonbased **The Guide** stands out as the least mainstream of the travel publications.



"For travel information, we try to cover the explicitly Gay angle of cities, and it's surprising to me that sometimes so-called Gay travel information spends a lot of time covering information you could get from the Michelin Guide or Fodor's," says Guide Editor French Wall. "We don't do that. We want you to know where the sauna is in town and where the cruisy area would be and where the guesthouses are that are specifically geared toward Gay travelers. All that other information is available elsewhere."

"THE GUIDE"

Sex is central to **The Guide** and its travel information. In fact, as Wall describes, **The Guide** isn't just a travel magazine, as its non-travel articles and columns make evident.

"It's a Gay and sexual liberation publication, and we use travel to increase our distribution and revenue to support the editorial message," says Wall. With a circulation of 31,000, this tactic seems to be working.

Each monthly issue of **The Guide** includes news on entertainment, politics and sex in addition to a handful of travel features, and nearly two dozen maps of gay venues in cities around the world. While it lacks the comprehensive rigor of a **Spartacus** guide and the journalistic objectivity of its competitors, **The Guide** is upfront with its biases and blunt with its travel advice, and its listings are extensive enough at least to get travelers started in a new city.

If Kolber and Whiston disagree about the impact of advertising on credible reporting, Wall actively embraces the advertiser bias in bias in **The Guide**.

"We're overtly trying to promote advertisers," Wall says. "When we do travel articles and features, we try to make sure the information is all accurate and useful to readers and in no way misleading, but our goal if we do feature a city is to promote it as well as the people advertising."

The Guide not only accepts ads from guesthouses and bars, but also from bathhouses and phone sex lines —which Our World explicitly refuses to do. The Guide, which began in 1980 as a men's bar rag, doesn't court a large Lesbian audience; the other magazines, however, aim to serve both Gay men and Lesbians. While even a few years ago this would have meant covering two distinct sets of travel itineraries, today the Gay and Lesbian travel markets overlap as much as they diverge, notes Whiston. Key West and Provincetown have long been known as

Gay male resorts, for example, but increasingly, they are becoming popular Lesbian destinations as well.

GAY TRAVEL TRENDS

Out & About also covers Lesbian spots, including women-only venues and mixed venues where Lesbians are welcome. "Because so much of what we write about is places where Gay people can feel comfortable, there is a large overlap between men and women," says Kolber, adding that his subscriber base is 20% women.

Whether the trends in Gay travel really are toward Gay couples instead of singles, mixed venues instead of exclusive ones, and museums instead of saunas, one trend is evident just from looking at the magazines' featured trips: the Azores, Quebec, Sydney. Gay travel is getting expensive, no longer limited to run-down cabins by the dunes in Provincetown. Gay travel now runs to five-star hotels in chic locales.

"Things have certainly gotten more upscale, there's no doubt about it," says Whiston, who has seen significant changes since his magazine's inception. Not only are the trips more luxurious, he says, but more people are looking for "exotic adventure holidays" in places like Nepal, which were a rarity ten years ago.

Just in the last decade, Gay travel has grown from a limited endeavor into a major international industry. As Whiston concludes: "It's a whole new ball of wax, really."
