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



### Thousands Enjoy Madison Pride Weekend

Madison — Good weather helped draw thousands of people to the State's capital for the 24th annual MAGIC Picnic and GALVAnize March on July 19 and 20.

An estimated 1,300 persons attended the MAGIC Picnic in Brittingham Park on Saturday which was down slightly from last year's total. A two-hour rain failed to damped the spirits of picnic goers.

"It was a good turn-out despite the rain," commented Greg Scheel, organizer of the MAGIC picnic. "The car bash and dunk tank were very fun."

On Friday, July 18, the United, Madison's LGBT Community Center, held its 5th Annual Community Awards Dinner at Madison's Sheraton Hotel. Awards for community activism and service were given to four individuals with Frontiers receiving a special organization award.

Martha Popp was the recipient of the Woman of the Year Award. Popp, a teacher at Middleton High School has been active in creating a safe environment for gay, lesbian and transgendered youth.

Man of the Year honors went to Paul Hughet a longtime Madison activist and businessman.

Ten-year old Sol Kelly-Jones was named as Ally of the Year. Her emotional testimony during the AB 104 hearings in Wausau won her wide-spread attention in the media.



Kelly-Jones spoke briefly before a loud, appreciative audience, and was greeted with shouts of "Run, Sol Run," a variation on the now familiar mantra of supporters of State Representative Tammy Baldwin's Congressional bid.

Baldwin addressed the crowd as well, receiving the most sustained applause of the day. She spoke of the importance of continuing the fight for human rights and gay rights into the months and year ahead.

#### Second Gay Man Presses Hate Crime Charges in Green Bay

Green Bay — A second hate crime charge has been filed against a Green Bay man who allegedly pepper sprayed a gay couple early Monday morning on July 14. Dan McDonough of Green Bay came forward to press charges last week after seeing reports of a first attack allegedly made by a Green Bay man. Mark Anderson, aged 17 is charged with the crimes, and has been held over in adult court. According to police records, Anderson has an extensive criminal record and has previously been charged with other previous crimes as an adult.

The second incident occurred in mid-June at approximately 8 p.m. at the intersection of Main and Randolph Streets. According to McDonough, two men — one of whom was Anderson — began calling him "faggot" and other derogatory terms while he was delivering promotional items for AIDS Walk Wisconsin to businesses in the area. He was then struck to the ground with a plastic pipe and "roughed up." His attacker then stole the promotional materials and threw them in the East River.

McDonough reported the incident to Green Bay police at about 9 p.m. that evening but chose at the time not to press charges. After seeing televised news reports of the earlier incident, McDonough spoke with Action Wisconsin representatives and decided to press formal charges. Charges were then recorded by Officer Koch of the Green Bay Police Department.


According to Mike Fitzpatrick of Action Wisconsin, the group has been made aware of additional recent assaults to both individuals and property and encourages all members of the gay community who have been injured to contact the police and report their incidents, whether they choose to press charges or not.

In the first attack, Anderson and an 18 year old man maced an Appleton man and another Green Bay man apparently "to teach you faggots a lesson." The incident occurred early Monday, July 14, according to one of the victims, David Washack.

The attackers reportedly saw the couple holding each other in a parking lot some distance from Za's, a popular Green Bay gay night club. The incident occurred shortly after closing time in the lot, which is sometimes used by Za's patrons.

Anderson allegedly scouted the area, and then returned to home, obtained pepper spray and returned to attack the gay couple. The behavior of the assailants was observed by the Appleton man's brother, Jerry Washack who is also gay and who was sitting in his car waiting to drive his brother back to Appleton.

This attack comes just weeks after a gay Marinette man was found murdered in a Green Bay motel. Green Bay police have announced no new leads in that case. Fiztpatrick told *In Step* that since the arrests he is unaware of further attacks against gay people in the area.



### Cunanan Update: Nationwide Manhunt Following Versace Murder

Miami Beach, FL — Andrew Cunanan, already a most-wanted fugitive by the FBI now being sought in Gianni Versace's killing, used his real name and willingly left a thumbprint at a pawnshop eight days before the designer was gunned down.

The clerk at the pawnshop, Vivian Olivia, said she followed Florida law requiring her to mail a receipt to Miami Beach Police for the gold coin Cunanan pawned. The coin is believed to be stolen from one of Cunanan's prior victims.

It's not clear whether police received that receipt or what they did with it.

"There are four copies of (the sales receipt)," Olivia told The Associated Press. "One I give to the customer, one I put in with the coin, and the one with the fingerprint I give to police."

Cunanan also left a record of the name of the hotel where he was staying and a room number where he continued to live until the day before the killing.

Olivia said records show the transaction took place at 4:42 the afternoon of July 7. She told the Sun-Sentinel of Fort Lauderdale that she mailed the receipt to police the

She didn't talk to police until the day after Versace's killing, when she called to tell them about the receipt she still had. They came and confiscated the fingerprint card and the coin, which investigators said was stolen from Lee Miglin, a Chicago developer Cunanan is charged with

—Lee Miglin Recent reports speculate that Cunanan may now be masquerading as a woman, authorities say. The announcement comes after investigators searched the hotel where he was believed to have stayed last week. They found hair cutting equipment and hair dye, hotel staff say.

The FBI has made a list of wealthy, gay men it believes are "potential targets" and warned them to take precautions, the New York Daily News reports. The agency has also contacted gay groups in Boston, Atlanta and New York, fearing he may go there next, the newspaper says.

sive international fraternity of upper-class gay men called Gamma Mu fearing that the club may have given Cunanan access to hundreds of names and addresses gay men scattered throughout the country. Cunanan may have belonged to the organization, and it is common for names and addresses of group members to be exchanged at group social functions.

Initially Gammu Mu officials denied any association with Cunanan except to say he visited a 1995 event in Seattle with Norman Blachford, a member and wealthy former companion of Cunanan's living in La Jolla, Calif. But a May newsletter stat-

In what reads like a warning to the membership, a section of the newsletter calls Cunanan "a former member ... who lived in San Diego and was a roommate to several influential members in that area."


The Ft. Lauderdale-based organization has denied that any of the victims belonged to Gamma Mu. The group, with members worldwide, including Chicago, first formed 30 years ago with a gathering of 17 gay men for a festival in Washington, D.C. Since then, the membership has grown to nearly 600 menfrom lawyers and doctors to top TV producers and politicians.

The search continues in South Florida. In Miami Beach, police chief Richard Baretto says a number of Cunanan sightings have been reported, but he adds the suspected serial killer could be "anywhere." He says the latest reported sighting was Saturday night at the Airport Hilton hotel in Miami, but nothing turned up.

A coalition of anti-violence groups in 15 U.S. cities that normally work on gay-

bashing attacks against homosexuals announced an intense effort to alert gays of the danger Cunanan may be. The group also announced a \$10,000 reward for inforleading mation Cunanan's arrest.

In Milwaukee, FBI Dick special agent Essleston told In Step there is no reason to believe that Cunanan is in Wisconsin, however he cautioned that no one knows exactly where he is, and that he could be anywhere. Essleston indicated the local FBI office had made contact with the Human Rights League (HRL) in mid-May in an

effort to spread the word about Cunanan in Milwaukee's gay community and fliers warning of Cunanan have been distributed around the city.

#### The Search for a Motive Leads to Speculation

Police said they had not been able to find any evidence so far that Cunanan and Versace had ever known each other despite news reports the two men had met in San Francisco, possibly in 1990 when Versace designed some costumes for a San Francisco Opera. Both Time and Newsweek magazines are quoting FBI officials as saying that Cunanan may have slain Gianni Versace out of jealousy because he had a crush on the fashion designer's boyfriend.

FBI sources also say it's likely Cunanan and Versace first crossed paths in San Francisco in 1990, when several witnesses say Cunanan began bragging he knew Versace. They quickly add, however, Cunanan could have been lying, and the exact nature of the relationship remains a rumor.

In California, The San Diego Times reported that two months before his alleged killing spree began, Cunanan feared he might be infected with the AIDS virus and vowed revenge on whoever may have given it to him. According to the report, Cunanan sought out a counselor at Davids' Place, a nonprofit agency in Hillcrest for people with AIDS and HIV. Mike Dudley said Cunanan approached him in February at the group's Fifth Avenue coffee house.

Dudley told the Times, "He was mentioning some of the things he had done sexually. I explained the things were sort of in the gray area and he should take greater precautions... He became agitated, and he got up and kicked the wall and said, 'If I find out who did this to me, I'm gonna get them."

Widespread rumors persist that Cunanan was allegedly motivated by his grief over learning he is HIV-positive, however during their brief conversation in the privacy of the patio at David's Place coffee house, Cunanan never confided to Dudley that he had tested positive for HIV. Dudley kept quiet for months, but then told police of his meeting with Cunanan after deciding his obligation to protect society was more important than Cunanan's confidentiality.

Cunanan's former roommate disputed the Cunanan was HIV positive indicating to America's Most Wanted that he would have known if Cunanan was HIV positive.

#### FBI Didn't Warn Florida Gay Press

The Miami Herald reported that FBI agents went to the Gay and Lesbian Community Center in Fort Lauderdale about a month ago to spread the word on suspected serial killer Andrew Cunanan. A spokesman for the center says she gave the agents a list of publications that serve gay readers and locations of bars and other



places where affluent gay men might be found, since that seemed to be Cunanan's victim profile.

But when Versace was gunned down in front of his Ocean Drive mansion, many gay men in South Florida had no clue that Cunanan might be in the area. They didn't know because the FBI never followed up, say

The FBI did leave a single flier at Twist, a popular gay club on in Miami Beach, and asked management and staff to keep an eye out for Cunanan. The flier was posted in a rear office. But many other popular gay clubs in the area said they were never visited by the FBI

or notified to keep an eye out for Cunanan.

Immediately after the Versace murder, the FBI and other law enforcement agencies flooded South Florida, especially the gay community, with those fliers. The community center in Fort Lauderdale received a batch of 15,000. Fliers featuring four faces of Andrew Philip Cunanan hang above the stalls and urinals at Twist now.

FBI spokeswoman Anne Figueiras said she didn't know why fliers had not been delivered to the community center earlier. She says the FBI has traveled from West Palm Beach to Key West in recent months, visiting gay bars, restaurants and "anyone that may lead us to Mr. Cunanan."

The FBI is urging anyone with information about Cunanan to contact a special toll-free hotline set up to deal with the call, 1-888-324-9800.

"We were never contacted by the FBI," Bill Watson, publisher of TWN, a weekly newspaper that serves the South Florida gay community told The Herald. "We were told by people at the Gay and Lesbian Center to expect a call, but it never came."

Publishers at the other major gay publications, Scoop and HotSpots of Fort Lauderdale, and also Wire of Miami Beach, which has many gay readers, said they also were never alerted by the FBI to Cunanan's possible

#### Non-Gay Media Feeds Off Hunt for Cunanan

For nearly a week, the brutal murder of fashion designer Gianni Versace and the hunt for prime suspect Andrew Cunanan was the lead story of the nation's media. The intensity of the coverage has brought both the best and worst out of the media.

While many outlets have explored the impact that these events have had on a frightened and angered lesbian and gay community, some reports have served to fuel the fear and ignorance of the general public towards lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgender people.

#### Blaming the Victim

According to the Gay & Alliance Against Lesbian Defamation (GLAAD), less than 48 hours after the death of Versace, both Cindy Adams and syndicated tabloid television program, "Hard Copy" set their sites on "demonizing the victim," a highly respected and regarded man.

In the July 16 New York Post, gossip guru Cindy Adams told readers that "come nightfall, the workaholic (Versace) played... Often in what the uptight might term dens of iniquity. Props in those places included leather harnesses and young studs. Joints where 'a second date' was only a phrase not a reality.

That day the tabloid television show Hard Copy showed topless men dancing together at Miami events, and promised to explore "more about Versace's private playland... a world some say may have led to his untimely death."

According to Hard Copy, Versace threw parties that "included scantily clad men as servants... the kinds of parties that Cunanan reportedly trolled for fresh victims."

#### Sensationalized **News Coverage**

GLAAD labeled The New York Post's coverage of Versace's murder and the hunt for Cunanan was typical of the "new peaks of sensational sleaze" in the non-gay

GLAAD sited the frequent and continued use of the phrases "gay killer," "gay serial killer" and "bloodthirsty gay serial killer," among other variations, to link Cunanan's sexual orientation to his suspected murders. According to GLAAD this serves to place "guilt by association" on the lesbian and gay community.

Locally, WTMJ Channel 4, WITI Channel 6 and WISN Channel 12 and numerous local radio news broadcasts all used variations of "gay killer" in association with news reports of the Versace

However GLAAD praised the coverage by Cynthia McFadden on ABC's PrimeTime Live, which discussed Cunanan's sexual orientation only when it was relevant, resulting in a balanced story that took the high road in discussing Cunanan's alleged activities.

NBC was not as balanced according to GLAAD. In its extensive coverage the day of the murder, Tom Brokaw opened its story describing Andrew Cunanan as a "homicidal homosexual."

Edna Buchanan, a respected crime reporter and novelist had an interchange with Matt Lauer, host of The Today Show:

Matt Lauer: "The Mayor and police down there said yesterday that this could have happened anywhere. That Miami is a safe place. How do you feel about that?'

Edna Buchanan: "...I think the Mayor and the Commission some years ago decided to appeal to the gay element - the gay community, with the tourism advertising. They [the governmental leaders] thought they [gay tourists] have more disposable income, they're well-behaved, and would make wonderful tourists. They deliberately sought out that market, and South Beach did in fact become a gay mecca. Now they're complaining that this happened here.

Well, where else? Obviously he [Cunanan] was drawn here, that's his M.O. Obviously Mr. Versace's here. Now, they're unhappy about the whole thing. But they're the ones that sort of put this in motion."

#### Rumor Control

GLAAD also cites as homophobic the linking of Cunanan's supposed HIV status and the murders - the New York Post headline on July 17 read "AIDS Fuels His Frenzy." Inside, a story based on pure speculation conjectured that Cunanan may have killed because he "fear[ed] he had AIDS" and that he was targeting people he thinks may have infected him.

A GLAAD statement points out that people find out that they are HIV-positive every day-and they don't turn into "spree killers," and that kind of sensational and speculative media coverage unfairly connects HIV with murderous intent, feeding into the old stereotype of gay people as both "sick" and "mentally unstable."

#### Some Good Coverage

While reporting on a story that has impacted the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community so deeply, a number of media outlets have explored that impact in significant ways.

The Washington Post's "Long Skeptical of Law Enforcement Efforts, Activists Now Are Working in Partnership," explored the growing number and role of gay and lesbian anti-violence groups across the nation and the violence against the community that has spearheaded that growth.

On Thursday, July 17, USA Today included the story entitled "Gay Groups Worry About a Backlash," and in the New York Times appeared a lengthy story on the gay community in South Beach, Miami entitled "Loss and Concern in the Gay District."

#### **WHO Releases 1996 AIDS** Figures - 18% Increase

Geneva — In its annual report on the number of AIDS cases globally, the World Health Organization says the number of cases rose 18 percent last year to nearly 1.65 million people diagnosed with the disease. WHO says the number of diagnosed cases reflects only about 20 percent of the actual number and estimated that since the beginning of the AIDS epidemic to the end of 1996, about 8.1 million people have contracted the disease around the world. The United States reported the largest number of cases, with a total of 581,429; Brazil was next with 103,262 cases, followed by Tanzania with 82,174 reported cases.

#### STD-HIV Link Reported

London — According to a report in the British medical journal, The Lancet, researchers with the University of North Carolina's school of medicine in Chapel Hill have found that HIVpositive men who have also contracted other sexually transmitted diseases have as much as eight times as much HIV in their semen as do men without two infections. The researchers studied 135 men in Malawi who had been infected with HIV and found that after two weeks of treatment, the level of HIV in the men with other STDs was similar to the levels seen in men who did not have other STDs, the report also says.

The findings are significant because they suggest that the treatment and detection of other sexually transmitted diseases could help prevent new HIV infections, AIDS researchers said.

"The study has important economic and public health implications," said Dr. Anthony S. Fauci of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, "because if you can treat a sexually transmitted disease with a few doses of relatively inexpensive antibiotics, you may prevent a number of HIV infections that would cost a lot more to treat.

#### Florida Commissioners Won't Reconsider Rights Measure

Miami, FL - After listening to gay rights activists for 10 minutes, the Dade County commission refused to reconsider its rejection of a measure adding sexual orientation to county antibias protections.

In mid-June the commissioners rejected the proposed ordinance on a 7-5 vote at its first reading — an unusual step for such a significant proposal. At the time, Miami-area activists hadn't bothered to show up at the commission meeting since no one expected the commissioners to do anything about the ordinance except refer it to committee for hearings. Instead, under intense pressure from anti-gay religious groups, the commission simply rejected the bill.

At the second reading, hundreds of gay rights supporters showed up, but were given only 10 minutes to address the commission about the anti-bias measure. The commission, however, rejected a motion to reconsider its original vote on the measure.

Commissioner Bruce Kaplan, author of the measure, said he would reintroduce the ordinance after a mandatory six-month waiting period to bring back failed measures elapses.

#### **MCC** Welcomes Presbyterians **Protesting Church Anti-Gay Policies**

West Hollywood, CA — Presbyterians protesting their church's policies against gays and lesbians holding church offices are being invited to receive Holy Communion at the some 300 congregations of the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC), a predominantly gay and lesbian Christian church.

After the Presbyterian Church (USA) adopted bylaws that effectively exclude gays and lesbians from serving as ministers, deacons or other church officials, many Presbyterians launched a national call for a "Eucharistic fast" in protest, refusing to receive the sacrament in their churches until the denomination accepts homosexuals fully in the church. In response, the MCC has issued an invitation to all Presbyterians who are participating in the "Eucharistic fast" to "partake of the sacrament of Holy Communion at any [MCC] congregation with the full knowledge that our community of faith unreservedly affirms and celebrates their spirituality, conscience and God-given sexuality," according to the Rev. Elder Nancy Wilson, vice-moderator of UFMCC.

#### Congressman Barney Frank Criticizes Starr Over Interview with **Gay Official**


Washington, DC (AP) - An aide to Whitewater independent counsel Kenneth Starr denies a charge by a leading congressional spokesman for homosexual rights that "implicit bigotry" was behind investigators' questioning of a gay White House official.

In a letter to Starr, Rep. Barney Frank complained about an April interview with Bob Hattoy, a former White House liaison for the Interior Department and a gay activist. Frank, who is gay, said that during the questioning, Hattoy reportedly was asked if he had been successful in helping homosexuals get high-ranking jobs in the administration.

'Were these investigators so laggard in their understanding of American politics that they thought that demonstrating - or perhaps threatening to demonstrate — that the president had hired openly gay and lesbian employees would somehow give you leverage over him?" he asked Starr in the letter.

"This is one more outrageous example of Kenneth Starr's insensitivity and incompetence," Frank, D-Mass., said in a statement.

Starr's office said Frank was informed via return letter that the interview with Hattoy was a "routine and extremely cordial interview" in which Hattoy was asked to "generally describe his job duties. He was not asked specifically if his job involved recruiting or placing openly gay people. In answer to general questions he volunteered this information."

#### **IRS Reverses Homophobic Stance** in Gay Youth Case

Washington, DC (AP) - The Internal Revenue Service has admitted it was wrong to demand that a support group for young gays show it discouraged "homosexual attitudes and propensities," a gay youth group said last week.

The Gay and Lesbian Adolescent Support System

(GLASS), of Greensboro, N.C., had received the demand in a letter from the IRS after the group applied for tax-exempt status as an educational and social wel-

But the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund in New York stepped in and wrote the IRS, with Lambda lawyer David Buckel saying the IRS had no business inquiring about "homosexual attitudes" any more than it had business asking about "heterosexual attitudes."

The IRS said he was right.

"We agree with Mr. Buckel that the methodology used to communicate a viewpoint or position to others should be the focus rather than the viewpoint itself," the IRS said in a July 9 letter.

The IRS promised to take "a fresh look" at the application for tax exempt status and said the case would be "quickly resolved."

The founder and president of GLASS, Gary Palmer, said he was gratified by the news.





Last autumn, the Washington IRS wrote GLASS a five-page letter asking the group to "detail the procedures and safeguards in place to assure that counselors and participants do not encourage or facilitate homosexual practices or encourage the development of homosexual attitudes and propensities by minor individuals attending your program."

Lambda, which provides civil rights representation for gay and lesbian causes, said in its letter that GLASS was "a well-run, grassroots support group that helps young people besieged by anti-gay bigotry."

Buckel said the IRS decision was in line with the views of President Clinton, who has asked America's communities to counter anti-gay hate crimes and turn out as volunteers to help others.





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#### **Challenges Remain Despite New AIDS Treatments**

Washington, D.C. — The death rate for persons with AIDS living in the US continues to fall but daunting challenges remain to control the deadly epidemic, a leading group of AIDS experts said Monday July 14 at the "State of AIDS Forum."

The overall slowing of the epidemic and the impact of effective new drug treatments has led to the lower death rates, but women and minorities are failing to benefit the same way men and whites are, experts said during the annual State of AIDS Forum.

In the first nine months of last year, 30,700 people in the United States died

from AIDS, down 19 percent from the 37,900 who died in the first nine months of 1995, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

That continued a trend started in the first six months of 1996, when 13 percent fewer people with AIDS died than in the first six months of 1995, the first time a signficant drop was recorded. Experts believe the number of people contracting acquired immune deficiency syndrome — currently about 40,000 Americans per year — is declining.

"All of this is extremely good news," Helene Gayle, director of the CDC's national center that deals with AIDS, told a news conference. "We really are entering a new era."

Gayle and other experts raised grave concerns because women and minorities were not benefiting from new treatments that are extending the lives of AIDS sufferers.

The death rate for men fell 22 percent in the first nine months of 1996 versus the same time period in 1995. By comparison, the death rate for women fell only seven percent.

The death rate for whites fell 28 percent compared to only 10 percent for African Americans and 16 percent for Hispanics, the CDC said.

"AIDS is not over," Daniel Zingale, executive director of AIDS action, an acclaimed AIDS advocacy organization, told reporters. "If we treat it like it is over, it never will be."

Specialists at the forum said the epidemic is slowing as high-risk groups like homosexual men and intravenous drug users are engaging in safer practices.

More important has been the wider use of so-called protease inhibitors, a drug treatment that, combined with previous treatments such as the well-known AZT, has dramatically increased the condition for people with AIDS and HIV, the virus that leads to the fatal disease.

However, the drug treatment alone can cost up to \$15,000 a year for one patient, putting a squeeze on limited government funding to support AIDS-related health care.

Doug Nelson, Executive Director of the AIDS Resource of Wisconsin (ARCW) who was a featured presenter at the forum stated, "Our most difficult challenge today and in the years ahead will be to assure access to health care as HIV treatment costs go up and the safety net comes down."

"Compounding these problems is the growing misconception that with improved HIV treatments, AIDS is less urgent, the crisis is over, and that public and private resources can be invested elsewhere," Nelson continued.

AIDS Action said \$168 million a year more was needed in federal AIDS-treatment funding, which would nearly double the current levels. And with more people surviving longer periods, more treatment was needed, adding more strain to the system.

## Gay Republican Convention In D.C.

Washington, D.C. — The nation's largest gay and lesbian Republican organization will hold a national convention in Washington, D.C., featuring a range of Republican Members of Congress, top political commentators and prominent gay writers at its events.

Log Cabin Republicans will host a series of national meetings from July 23 through 27, culminating in the 1997 LCR National Convention, with hundreds of state and local LCR activists gathering in the nation's capital for political seminars, panel discussions, lobbying on Capitol Hill and major political speeches by authors, activists and Members of Congress. Under the theme of "Building the Big Tent", it will be the largest gathering of gay and lesbian Republican activists ever held.

Highlights of the conference include appearances by Rep. Jim Kolbe (R-AZ), Michaelangelo Signorile, Senator Alfonse D'Amato (R-NY) Rep. Sherwood Boehlert (R-NY), Rep. Christopher Shays (R-CT), Rep, Brian Bilbray (R-CA), Rep. Sonny Bono (R-CA), Rep. Connie Morella (R-MD), Rep. Rick Lazio (R-NY), Rep. Tom Campbell (R-CA), Rep. Sue Kelly (R-NY), Rep. Jim Greenwood (R-PA), and Rep. Jon Fox (R-PA).

Log Cabin Republicans is the nation's largest gay and lesbian Republican organization, with 50+ chapters nationwide and over 11,000 members.

#### 'Closed' Court for Zimbabwe Ex-President Banana

Harare, Zimbabwe — Canaan Banana, the ex-president of Zimbabwe, finally had his day in court to face charges of sodomy and indecent sexual assault charges against several men. Unfortunately, government officials went to extraordinary lengths to keep anyone from finding out what happened.

Government prosecutors first switched the location of the preliminary hearing to a different courtroom. And when reporters finally tracked down the right location, Judge Jaqueline Pratt ordered everyone except court officials, prosecutors, Banana and his attorney out, claiming it was a "curtailed preliminary hearing" which she could preside over in closed session. But court records show that there was actually nothing "preliminary" about the hearing, and Banana was charged with 11 counts, including sodomy and sexual assault of former military aides, his cook, his gardener and his bodyguard.

He was ordered to hand over his passport, making it impossible for him to leave the country. He was released only after posting a \$2,250 bond. The case has been slated for trial before Zimbabwe's High Court on August 4.

#### Yale Nixes Gay Studies Professorship Offer by Larry Kramer

New Haven, CT — Yale University has refused an offer of several million dollars to fund a tenured professorship in gay and lesbian studies from one of its best-known gay alumni, authoractivist Larry Kramer.

Allison Richard, Yale's provost, said in a letter to Kramer that the school had frozen its hiring and that endowing a new professorship in gay and lesbian studies would therefore force the university to fire some other professor. Yale officials also insisted that the subject area was "too narrow" for a permanent professorship.

But the 62-year-old Kramer, author of "Faggots" and "The Normal Heart" and one of the founders of ACT UP, said his alma mater is taking a stand against its own gay and lesbian students.

"I think we have enough evidence to call Yale a very discriminatory and homophobic institution," Kramer said. "I would expect this kind of treatment from Oral Roberts University, but not from Yale."

Kramer has now withdrawn his offer, which would have lead to an endowment of about \$4 million.

#### Tiny Country Repeals Anti-Gay Laws

San Marino — The tiny postage-stamp-sized country of San Marino, about midway between Venice and Rome near the Adriatic Sea, has voted to dump it's laws against homosexuality. The country's parliament voted 28-21 to repeal the laws against same-sex sexuality that carried penalties of up to a year in jail. The law hadn't been enforced for years, and the parliament decided there was no reason to have the legislation on the books any longer.

#### **HIV Crew Yacht Finishes Race**

Ojai, CA — The crew of Survivor, the racing yacht with the names of people who have died of AIDS on its hull, finished 19th in the 2,200 mile Transpacific Yacht Race. The 10-member crew consisted entirely of HIV-positive yachtsmen, some of whom have full-blown AIDS.

Co-captain Robert Hudson said, "If we can sail across the Pacific, we can go back to work in libraries, we can be fighter pilots, we can do anything we want. But we need to start leading the way for people to say 'you know what? I can start living with this illness, I can survive.'"

#### Needle Swap Programs Help Reduce HIV Infections

London — According to a report in the medical journal The Lancet, researchers in Australia used an ecological study design to examine changes over time in HIV seroprevalence among intravenous drug users throughout the world in cities with and without needle-exchange programs.

Of the 52 cities without such programs, seroprevalence rose by about 5.9 percent per year, the researchers reported. But the 29 cities that did have needle exchanges saw an approximate 5.8 annual decrease in seropositivity. The results, the researchers concluded, indicate that needle-exchange programs are very effective in reducing HIV incidence among drug addicts.

## LGBT Community Center Focuses on Membership Drive

Milwaukee — More than one hundred volunteers have been working over the past sixteen months to give the Milwaukee LGBT community a home of its own. The Center is maturing quickly, and the realization of this dream is fast approaching. A location has been chosen for the center, organizations are committed to leasing space in the center, and the membership campaign is more than halfway to its goal of raising \$26,000.

The site, located at 1801 N. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive, previously the Sander's Bowl Building and earlier, the Dreamland Center, will be the home for the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center. Extensive interior and exterior building restoration will begin this fall. The restoration, managed and funded by the Dreamland Group by the building's owner and developer, will be complete by the time the Center opens in early 1998.

As of July 15, American Express Financial Advisors, BESTD Clinic, the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee, and the Milwaukee AIDS Project have committed to leasing space in the Center. The proposed floor plan will accommodate up to ten organizational offices and retail spaces, as well as a cafe, large meeting room, central reception area, kitchen, library and small meeting room.

Finally, the Center's fundraising and financial teams have announced that during June, more than \$18,000 in memberships and lead gifts were pledged to the "Home of Our Own" campaign. This money, donated by Center volunteers and the community at large, will support LGBT services and programs, lease building space and assist organizations as they move into the Center.

The Center's Steering Committee volunteers kicked off the "Home of Our Own" membership drive by pledging an astounding \$10,000 in lead gifts. Following that incredible vote of confidence, LGBT community members gave an additional \$7,000 in membership support during PrideFest. These donations represent over half of the \$26,000 goal needed to open the center.

A community-wide appeal is now underway to continue the "Home of Our Own" campaign. Membership brochures will be mailed to community members in July. 



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

#### "Bobby Positive" Freed from HIV/AIDS on July 4.

Chicago died from complications of AIDS on July 4th. A celebration of his life was held in Chicago on July 6th with burial on July 8th in Venice, Florida. He was known as "Bobby Positive," the pen name he used for a number of booklets he wrote in the last two years of his life.

The most popular booklet was, "AIDS 201: survival tips for symptomatic PWAs," 51 pages of tips, advice, suggestions and practical wisdom gleamed from living with HIV and

AIDS for many years.

In partnership with BESTD Clinic of Milwaukee, Lutz had the booklet published and 30,000 copies have been distributed to individuals and agencies around the world. Excerpts have been published in Positively Aware and POZ, both nationally distributed magazines for the HIV community. Newsletters from Maine to California and Guam to Kamloops, British Colombia have also either highlighted or serialized his work.

Roxanne Laboratories has not only been distributing "AIDS 201" at their regional seminars across the nation, but have taken on the task of translating the booklet into Spanish and bearing the cost of printing it. Word has it that there is currently a concentrated distribution in Thailand among the at risk community.

Other booklets authored by "Bobby Positive" were "Side effects? Just say


Chicago - Robert E. Lutz of no!," "ER 201: Emergency room survival tips," and "CMV 201: Tips on going blind gracefully." While each booklet is focused, factual and direct, Bobby also wrote with a certain earthy humor and was able to celebrate his life and laugh at his disease.

The partnership with BESTD Clinic began with the friendship that Ross Walker and Erv Uecker have had since 1982 with Bob and his deceased life partner, artist Jon Reich. Jon died from complications of AIDS in September, 1992. Preparing for an exhibit of Jon's work at BESTD Clinic early in 1996, Ross and Erv encouraged Bob in his writing and worked with him in polishing up "AIDS 201" by making suggestions, editing and proofreading. Bob then asked if BESTD Clinic would take on the publishing and distribution of the book, which its Board willingly did because of the potential positive impact it could have. Having already distributed and shipped almost 30,000 copies of AIDS 201, a third printing of 15,000 copies is in the works through a Chicago printer. BESTD will carry on "Bobby Positive's" work and continue to make all of his booklets available for as long as they are useful.

Bob Lutz is survived by his current "second love" and life partner, since 1994, Rich Cristobal, his father Eugene, sister Marigene and brothers Jim, Chuck and Tom and of course countless admirers around the world.

#### **Anatomy of A Smear Campaign**

Right-wing Republican political campaigns are famous for smear tactics, and we saw them utilized skillfully by both of Ronald Reagan's presidential campaigns: Democrats of all stripes were tarred with the term 'tax and spend liberal' until the word 'liberal' eventually turned into a dirty word.

Some Republicans have even used these tactics against each other: Patrick Buchanan, invoking antigay rhetoric, smeared George Bush during the 1991 Republican primary race for his minimal support of the National Endowment for the Arts, injecting hate into the election campaign and polarizing discussion.

It's hard to believe that esteemed gay scholars, among others, would engage in this kind of a campaign. Yet those in the newly-formed New York group helped orchestrate a campaign of name-calling meant to discredit queer activists (including myself) and damage their reputations — decidedly not the way that academics usually engage in debate and discussion.

The first phase of the smear campaign began in June when the group wrote and distributed a flier that claimed that I 'blame' gay men for 'spreading' AIDS, and that I don't 'trust' gay men. It then attempted to blur the distinctions between me and other gay writers the group is targeting, and to portray us all as 'neo-conservatives,' much in the way the right-wing attempts to blur the distinctions between everyone in the Democratic Party so as to portray them all as far-left ideologues.

The fliers were distributed all over New York City, placed in coffee shops, slapped on telephone poles, distributed house-to-house on Fire Island, and even placed inside all copies of my new book at one prominent gay bookstore. They were reprinted in full page ads in gay publications, and an electronic version was posted on the Internet and sent around the world. In perhaps the group's least creative moment, the fliers proclaimed me and other writers, "TURDZ!"

Why would esteemed scholars and others do this? It appears the reason is simply because I—who am very much on the gay left and probably agree with them on most things—seem to disagree with them on one particular issue: How to navigate sex in the middle of the AIDS epidemic.

And they seem to believe that one's positions on this issue is a litmus test for being properly queer. It seems that they do not like the critique I have put forth in my new book, Life Outside. For that reason, these scholars and activists would rather engage in a smear campaign than talk to me about the actual ideas I lay out in my book. The goal of any smear campaign is to induce fear in people by making baseless charges.

(This group has gone so far as to suggest that my book has inspired government repression).

A couple of weeks after the fliers were distributed, the campaign went into its second phase. One gay academic for whom I've always had a lot of respect, was quoted in the group's widely-distributed press release claiming that I 'don't believe in safer sex.' He did not

present any examples from my work to back up these assertions. Anyone who has read my work—particularly my columns in *Out* on unsafe sex—knows this is patently false.

The third phase of this smear campaign came days later when another academic, also a member of the group, published a piece in *The Nation* in which he incredulously lumped together gay writers who run the gamut of the gay political spectrum and dubbed us all 'neo-conservatives.'

He claimed that I like to think of myself as being 'in the mainstream of the gay movement' but that I am really a 'neocon,' even if 'unconsciously.' What examples from my work did he use to back up this truly bizarre charge? None. All he offered was his observation that, among other things, I 'repudiate' the gay movement's 'goal of political mobilization.'

Really? Through my work in ACT UP, Queer Nation, OutWeek magazine, The Advocate, and Out, and through my books and articles, I have certainly done my share of political mobilizing. For the record: I chaired ACT UP's media committee through its most successful years, co-founded Queer Nation, and greatly contributed to the firestorm over loutingî when I began reporting as a journalist on often hypocritical closeted gay public figures—a position I still support and about which I continue to come under attack from gay conservatives and many others.

I am opposed to the death penalty and to dismantling welfare. I believe we must fervently protect affir-

mative action and a woman's right to choose an abortion. I believe we must continue to demand a federal needle exchange program to prevent the spread of HIV among IV drug users.

In recent columns in Out I have championed the transgendered movement, and have been highly critical of what I see as the Human Rights Campaign's pandering to the Clinton administration.

Some might think it ridiculous for me to have to state my positions on issues, and to summarize my history in order to disprove the charge that I am a incocon.î But when it comes to smear campaigns one must challenge the perpetrators ad nauseum. For this is how smear campaigns work: The perpetrators put a label on you, an ugly and potentially damaging charge that has no basis in fact, which they repeat over and over again, hoping that it will stick.

But while smear campaigns are often successful, at other times they don't stick simply because people wise up and become tired of the attacks. That is what happened during Bob Dole's run against President Clinton. And it will happen in the midst of this particular smear campaign too, simply because most gay people are too smart for such tactics, and will not stand for them.

But the question remains, Why are these people doing this? To answer that we need only to look at why right-wing Republicans do it: To divert attention from the real, important issues at hand. My book raises a lot of questions about where gay men as a community are going as the AIDS epidemic continues its assault, how some aspects of our sexual culture often impact our emotional and physical well-being, and how we need to be more self-aware and self-critical at this point in time. It looks at a particularly influential segment of gay sexual culture that demands conformity and creates anxiety for a lot of men. And while the book does not advocate any one way for gay men to lead their lives, it displays the problems some gay men are facing and looks to other men for possible solutions. Life

Outside is about creating more options for gay men, not limiting them.

What we need right now is a national, open discussion about sex and our sexual culture—not ugly smear tactics, fear-mongering, and name-calling that polarize debate and shut down discussion. These tactics carve out a black and white scenario that oversimplifies our lives.

In spite of what has transpired, I would welcome working with these individuals in the ongoing fight against homophobia. I welcome listening to their ideas about how to deal with the problems many gay men face, and I welcome hearing their ideas for new HIV prevention strategies. I'm encouraged already by what appears to be a change in their tone. But if the name-calling and labeling continues, I will continue to expose it as the smear campaign that it is.

#### HRL Use of Membership Lists Questioned

#### To the Editor:

I would like to relay to your readers a concern I have regarding the Human Rights Campaign's (HRC) use of it member's personal information.

My name and personal information were placed on the "membership" list after I promised a contribution to HRC at Milwaukee's 1995 Gay Pride Festival. Since this time several problems have surfaced:

1) The solicitor who took my membership information advised me that I would not receive phone calls from HRC. This was not true (see point 2).

2) The person that called to remind me of my contribution left a message for me with my roommate. The message stated he was calling regarding the "contribution I promised at Pridefest." Had my roommate not known I am gay, this could have created some obvious problems. In addition, it was inappropriate to be discussing my financial matters with a third party.

3) I requested on four occasions over the last two years that all mailings to my address be stopped. Not only did I receive letters and phone calls from the Member Services Coordinator advising me that correspondence would stop, I also received a copy of the computer screen "proving" that I would no longer receive mail. As of approximately 7/10/97, I am still receiving junk mail.

The purpose of this letter is not to discourage donations to HRC. I strongly believe we must have organizations, such as HRC, to look out for our community's best interest. Unfortunately, I can not say that HRC has looked out for my personal best interests. I merely want to advise those who can not afford the above mentioned "errors" to think twice prior to giving out "membership" information. If you do choose to donate to HRC a donation, it

may be in your best interest to do so anonymously. I wish I had.

Founded in 1972, New American Theatre is the only year-round nonprofit professional Equity Theatre in Illinois outside of Chicago. #### Madison Rep Sets Sail For A Musical Summer With "Dames At Sea"

Madison — The New York Times called "Dames At Sea," a real winner, a little gem of a musical." Reminiscent of the 1930s musical extravaganzas, this musical comedy with its delightful melodies, toe tapping rhythms, and a story of love and Broadway dreams, takes us back to a time when song-and-dance people gave it their all, talent was discovered overnight, stage vampires twisted men around their fingers and endings were always happy.

"Dames At Sea," a hit of the 1968 off-Broadway season, pays a special tribute to the 1930s musical films of famed director/choreographer Busby Berkeley. Berkeley's films were born out of American's need to be distracted form the realities of the depression. In his movies, loners always found each other, all problems could be solved with enthusiasm and cleverness, and a spunky person could always rise and succeed. Mostly, they were stories of hope.

Berkeley's movies were noted for large casts of beautiful chorus girls, leading characters dripping with charm and personality, and extravagant dance numbers. The creators of "Dames At Sea" decided to recreate a 1930s film experience "on a postage stamp" using only six actors (our production has seven). "Dames at Sea" specifically spoofs "42nd Street" with its lead characters having the same names as the stars of the film-RUBY Keeler and DICK Powell.

In "Dames At Sea," we are introduced to Ruby, just off the bus with only a suit-case and dreams of stardom. She meets Joan, the wise-cracking showgirl with a heart as big as the Bronx who convinces the dubious manager/producer Hennesey to give Ruby a chance in his upcoming show. Soon, Ruby finds herself sharing the stage with the temperamental Broadway star, Mona Kent. While they rehearse the play, Mona makes her move on Ruby's true love, Dick, the good looking, song-writing sailor. When Hennesey loses the theater right before opening night, it's Dick's heroic idea that saves the show. The cast is complete as Dick's sailor sidekick Lucky enters the scene, along with Ginger, the gum-smacking showgirl.

Pam Kriger returns to the Madison Rep as director and choreographer. Her delightful 1995 production of "Forever Plaid" was a hit with Madison audiences. Kriger's directing credits included the off-Broadway production of "Zombies from the Beyond," "Cabaret" for the Milwaukee Jewish Community Theater and "Little Shop of Horrors" at Cardinal Stritch College. Milwaukee-based Richard Carsey will serve as musical director. Carsey is artistic director of Skylight Opera Theatre. He has conducted hundreds of performances ranging from the "Marriage of Figaro" to "Sweeney Todd." He is also the founder of the Skylight Music Series and co-author of "Broadway Cabaret."

Determined, wide-eyed Ruby is played by twenty-year-old Tonya Kay. She has recently been seen in Theatre at the Center's "Finian's Rainbow" and as Patsy in "Crazy for You" with the Peninsula Players. Other credits include "The Elephant Man" and the first national tour of "The Tap Dance Kid." Tony Clements plays Ruby's romantic interest, Dick. Clements, returns to Madison Rep after his performance in "Forever Plaid." He recently starred in "Falsettos" at the Skylight Theatre in Milwaukee. Other performances at the Skylight include the role of Anthony Hope in "Sweeney Todd" and Billy in "Wings." The dramatic role of Broadway diva Mona is played by Carolynne Warren. Warren has been touring her one-woman musical revue, "The Carolin' Carolynne Show" for the past three years. Warren is also the recipient of Chicago's After Dark Award for Outstanding Cabaret Artist of the Year.

Making her Madison debut, Becky Spice plays the role of the wise-cracking showgirl Joan. Spice has performed primarily with the Skylight Opera Theatre in their productions of "West Side Story," "Falsettos," and most recently as Eliza Doolittle in "My Fair Lady." Other credits include Bonnie in "Anything Goes" with Music Under the Stars and Guenevere in "Camelot" with The Milwaukee Players. Joan's talented sailor beau, Lucky, is played by John Staniunas. Staniunas returns to the Rep where he has been seen in "Forever Plaid" and "Goodnight Desdemona." His credits include teaching at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and acting and directing at regional theaters across the country.

## Editorial Cartoons By Ross Lewis and William Gropper at Milwaukee Art Museum

Milwaukee — Poverty and racism. Unemployment and government relief (welfare). Labor unrest and government corruption. Threats of war and evil international demagogues. Today's headlines? Yes, but they're also the themes of political and editorial cartoons produced between 1925 and 1970 by giants of the genre, New Yorker William Gropper and Ross A. Lewis, *The Milwaukee Journal*'s editorial cartoonist for more than thirty-five years.

Personality opposites, Gropper and Lewis had vastly different family backgrounds, educational opportunities, personal lifestyles, political interests and even drawing styles. But their art, made about the same time, reflected many of the same topics which irritated, inflamed, frightened and amused the entire country. The sixty or more works in the exhibition speak about a deeply troubled United Statesone picture at a time.

Gropper was born in 1897 on New York's Lower East Side, to a large, poor Jewish family. As a child, he worked in a garment district sweatshop as did his mother and numerous siblings, an environment that influenced his lifelong empathy with workers, his support of labor unions and his distrust of big business. He attended art classes part time, first at the Ferrer School where he met and learned from many prominent artists, and then at the New School of Fine and Applied Art. His first work as a political cartoonist was at the New York Tribune, a conservative, anti-communist newspaper that fired him two years later when his left-leaning politics, and cartoons made anonymously for the Rebel Worker, became known publicly.

The Gropper style developed during subsequent years as he contributed work to socialist publications including *The New Masses*, the *Daily Worker*, and the Yiddish paper *Morgan Freiheit*. However, his work was also seen in other publications such as *Vanity Fair, New York American, New Republic, The Nation* and the *New York Tribune*. His prints and paintings were featured at one-man shows throughout the world. The Metropolitan Museum of Art purchased two of his paintings and he received awards for his work from numerous sources. He was commissioned to paint murals for the Interior Building in Washington, D.C., the State of Pennsylvania and a post office in Detroit.

Ross A. Lewis was born and raised in Metamora, Michigan moving to Milwaukee in 1920 to attend Milwaukee State Normal School, now the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. He joined *The Journal* as a staff artist in 1925, and was assigned to advertising layouts and illustrations. In 1928 he went to New York where he studied with the Art Students' League, the only time his path might have crossed Gropper's-although there is no evidence they ever met.

Lewis was a Pulitzer Prize winner and the editorial cartoonist for *The Milwaukee Journal* for thirty-five years-from 1932 until his retirement in 1967. He established a reputation as a skilled artist and a close observer of the social and political scene

with the ability to sum up complex situations in a simple sketch.

Lewis's Pulitzer Prize was awarded in 1935 for a cartoon called "Violence," printed the previous year during a period of severe labor unrest, which depicted a hired thug holding bombs in one hand and bricks in the other, with one foot next to a factory, the other next to a picket line. The caption read "Sure, I'll work for both sides." He won many other awards and honors, including a 1959 Public Service Award from the National Safety Council and the 1965 Richard S. Davis award from his Journal colleagues.

Ross Lewis and William Gropper's selected examples of their work is currently on exhibit at the Milwaukee Art Museum's Teweles Gallery through September 28.

### A Visual Presentation of America by Author Mark Warhus

Shorewood — Forget everything that you have ever learned about reading maps. Mark Warhus, a curator at the Milwaukee Art Museum, will engulf your senses, and change the way you perceive both Native American culture and maps in his new book, "Another American: Native American Maps and the History of Our Land." Native American maps are pictures of experience. More directly than words they picture one's place in the world and the people and things that give it meaning. As such maps move beyond descriptions of geography, even beyond their importance as historical documents, they are windows on the lives of people who have gone before us, a means to share in their existence. "This is the first major treatment of indigenous Native American maps. It is an exciting topic whose time has come. 

#### The Rise and Fall of Gay Culture

his author, who uses lots of thousand dollar words and really-reallyreally long sentences, has explored the phenomena of the rise and fall of gay culture. I would suggest that you have a dictionary at your side and good memory

Harris says his book

"investigates various aspects of the gay experience as they have evolved over time." He investigates the subtle shifts, from one generation to the next in the meaning of rituals like drag, obsessions like divas, methods of communications like personal ads, commodities like pornography, ... and styles of adornment like tattoos and body piercing."

As for assimilation into the mainstream public (which he talks about a lot) he says, "Only when we have achieved a considerable degree of acceptance and social mobility as open homosexuals does our former ostracism begin to exert a certain fascination for many of us. Nostalgia is the final death knell of the subculture, a sure sign that it has entered its final stages of decay."

"Homosexuals are being accepted so quickly by the general public that two of the most valuable features of our culture, our involvement with the arts and

camp, our highly mannered style of humor, are disappearing."

The author says that "gay culture ultimately arose in response to the physical and psychic injuries of homophobia." Gay men evolved their exquisite sense of irony and camp as an inner code to help other gay men identify each other. When one hears a voice in a crowded room say, "Toto, I don't think we're in Kansas anymore," one knows there is a another gay person out there.

Here are just a few comments showing that gay culture is not what it used to be. You will have to read the book to find out what he is comparing all this to -

and that's much more interesting.

Diva Worship: "While gay culture is still obsessed with celebrities . . . young gay men no longer have the same involvement with popular culture that they had when the movies served almost as a social intermediary . . . a badge to identify oneself to other members of the clan, other "Friends of Dorothy" [a reference to Judy Garland in "The Wizard of Oz"].

Personal ads and Magazines: "If the change from "special friend" to "husband" encapsulates [anything about] the story of our assimilation into mainstream society, a comparison of gay glossy magazines from the 1970s and 1990s reveals that the discrepancies between gay and straight society have become so minimal that ... the two dissimilar constituencies are now distressingly alike."

Foreskins and Piercing: "In the heated debates that gay men wage over the foreskin [ natural as opposed to circumcision] ... they are willing to undergo the most unnatural cosmetic techniques ... by skewering their nipples, navels, penises and testicles with piercings as invasive as any botched circumcision."

Bears: "Although bears profess to venerate the paternal authority of older men, it is difficult to imagine a more infantile preoccupation. The movement is tainted by the kitsch of "The Care Bears," as can be seen in the personal ads of Bear Magazine. If you skin the bear, you find not a toothless old hillbilly . . . but a typical age-obsessed queen with a subscription to House Beautiful.

Leather and S&M: "In seeking the legitimization of kink[y] [sex] in the eyes of mainstream society, leathermen are committing a very slow act of suicide, a process of self-eradication in which sadists the world over are engaging in the deadliest form of S&M possible, a snuff scene—their own."

As you can readily see this goes on and on and on (and I can't). We get


comments and facts about Porn in Films and Literature, Underwear, Drag, AIDS and "Glad to be Gay" propaganda. In case I missed anything there is a huge Index for you to look up your favorite topics.

What I found to be most disconcerting was the fact that he could have said what he was saying in half the space. He has terminal run-on of the mouth . . .

Blah, blah, blah! Yatta, yatta, yatta!

One starts to read something and thinks, "Oh my, this is interesting," and between the footnotes and the repetition you very quickly get bored and skip to the next chapter in hopes of some good dish. I don't smoke, I don't do drugs, and if I say I have a beer a month, that might be an exaggeration. It's not any kind of Puritanist streak that keeps me from these things (although I may, in fact, have such a streak); I just don't enjoy them anymore. What I will admit to are an obsession for fried foods—which, for the sake of my arteries and clothing budget, I try to stay away from—and a love of television.

I spent years downplaying this love because of the apparent stigma attached to being a devotee of the small screen. But now that Rosie O'Donnell has been so open about her devotion to that medium, I feel that the time has come for me to say it loud, say it proud: I love TV. And now that Ellen-the-character has come out, I am especially eager for the new season to start. Only a few more weeks to wait.

No doubt I am setting myself up for a fall, but I figure now that the closet door is open, who knows who or what else will come tumbling out when the season premiers hit the air waves. I'm sure the writers of all the other shows have been hard at work trying to come up with Ellen-rific story lines, but I have a few ideas of my own, natch.

3rd Rock from the Sun. They touched on the gay theme a couple of times, evanescently, once with guest star Phil Hartman thinking Harry was gay. Harry mentions Dick to Hartman, a cosmetics salesman in the episode. "Who's Dick?" Hartman asks. "My High Commander," Harry answers with a whine. "Oh. I had one of those," Hartman responds knowingly. Another time, Sally was mistaken for a transgendered person by a gay man. But I think they've missed a whole untouched avenue on that show: have Sally, that marvelous amazon of a woman, explore newly discovered feelings for women. Maybe the WNBA could recruit Sally and she could be stricken with desire for one of those amazons. I suspect, though, that the WNBA, with all of their emphasis on Lisa Leslie-the-runway-model—as if that were her full given name and as if no runway models are lesbians-might not go for that story line. So how about hooking her up with Nina, the wisecracking secretary? That would break new ground all over the place: an interracial liaison between two women, one of whom is bisexual-Sally still being smitten with Officer Don, you see. This plot makes perfect sense in terms of the premise of the show: the aliens want to experience everything earth has to offer, and bisexuality is definitely one of

those things.

Frasier. With the capable Joe Keenan—author of a couple of delightfully campy gay novels—in place as executive producer and sometime writer of this show, there shouldn't be any trouble with the story line I have in mind: the Crane boys, those effete, often nearly effeminate snobs, must repeatedly declare their heterosexuality. Frasier had to do this once, when the new station manager assumes he's gay like himself, and interested, but frankly I don't see why this doesn't come up much more often with these two fussy, opera-loving, gourmet, interior-decorating fellows. Daphne could explain that she never took any interest in Niles because she thought he was gay; Roz could try to fix Frasier up with one of the men she'd been after but who turned out to be queer; a gay contractor, doing work for Frasier, could make disparaging remarks about how men like Frasier, with all their stereotypically pansy-like pursuits, give gay men a bad name; even Frasier and Niles could question their own sexuality after weighing all the evidence, including their failed marriages.

Many more scenarios from a multitude of other shows have occurred to me: Bobby on King of the Hill could exasperate his father Hank by insisting he's gay, for example, or Mulder could pursue an X-File in which he suspects that the aliens turned Scully into a lesbian (which, I'm pretty sure, is in line with how Jesse Helms and his ilk figure we all got this way). However, I thought it might be good to simply start with a clean slate—that is, a brand new show. In the show I'm envisioning—a sitcom called Skirting the Issue—the main character would be a femme who must come out over and over again, often to the same people, because no one can quite believe she is actually gay. Or what about a revival of that old show Queen for a Day? In this nineties version, though, men of all persuasions would dress up like women and strut their stuff for prizes. Apparently, if we can tell anything from, for instance, movies like Tootsie, Mrs. Doubtfire, and To Wong Foo and skits of all kinds on television, this is an ardent fantasy of men everywhere.

Believe me, I've got dozens more ideas for how to queerify TV! And this isn't the first time I've put into print my own queer spin on prime time, either. But when I first did this, nearly 11 years ago, it seemed like only so much silliness. Now, however, it's entirely possible that *Skirting the Issue* or something similar actually could turn up on the fall lineup. The Southern Baptists might not be ready for us, but television clearly is.
