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Milwaukee Common Council Rejects Partners Benefits Proposal

Milwaukee — The proposal to provide partners benefits for City of Milwaukee employees was killed in committee only to be resurrected and defeated again at a meeting of all 17 aldermen on October 14. The final vote was 14 to 3. Voting for the measure were Paul Henningson, Mike D'Amato and George Butler.

The full Common Council vote came after a committee of aldermen voted on October 8, to place on file the proposal to extend health and funeral leave benefits to unmarried partners of city employees. A move which effectively killed the measure. The Common Council's Finance and Personnel Committee voted 4-0 to place on file the proposal presented by Alderman Paul Henningson.

Henningson told In Step, "I was disappointed, I thought several members who would have voted for it, didn't. I think most of them chickened to the religious

The only two members of the committee who would comment, Michael Murphy and Marvin Pratt, said their concerns were financial. Both Alderman James Witkowiak and Suzanne Brier had no comment about the measure.

The city's budget office estimated it would cost \$600,000 a year to pay for the additional benefits. The committee voted after two hours of debate over everything from money to morality. A handful of protesters gathered outside City Hall before the meeting started with signs decrying "gay sex" and alluding to "sodomites and fornicators." Others made their way inside wearing small placards reading, "No taxation for perversion."

"Financially, this is a drop in the bucket," stated Henningson. "The city pays \$500,000 a year for health benefits for employees. It was projected by our fiscal experts this might have increased the budget by about \$300,000 to \$900,000 a year.

Mark Street of the Domestic Partnership Task Force stated, "I think the financial aspect plays a major role in it. Our city has the good fortune of being very well financially managed. It has led to a culture of conservative budgeting. However, there are other issues behind the scenes."

On October 9, at the Human Rights League Public Officials Reception Mayor John Norquist urged a crowd of over 100 persons "not be upset or discouraged" by the failure of the benefits proposal.

Street agreed with Norquist stating, "Change takes a long time. This issue was not even on the people's radar screens before this, and it is moving forward."

it another way ... through the labor contracts," stated Henningson.

Street told In Step that another push for a partners benefits package is likely to begin again next year, "We will look at strategizing a legislative effort in 1998. In addition, we are going to take a much closer look the angle of using the union bargaining to bring this about through contract negotiation."

Henningson believes it will take at least a year for same-sex partners benefits to become part of the Milwaukee's benefits package. He also believes in the union bargaining route, "If the unions made it part of the negotiating demands ... the Mayor probably would not object to it.'

Typically, Milwaukee will probably be one of the last big cities to do this. It is inevitable as just a normal part of the benefits that municipal employees receive, it is an issue of equal benefits for equal work," according to Henningson.

Researchers Report Mixed Results for New Protease Inhibitors

Toronto - Two separate research studies reported at the four-day Interscience Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy carried both good news and bad news about new treatments to battle AIDS, underscoring how much advancement has been made in fighting off the disease in the past few years while at the same time showing how agonizingly elusive a cure remains.

One study suggests that therapeutic cocktails of three drugs - AZT, 3TC, and one of the new protease inhibitors - continue to fight off HIV in many patients for up to two years, twice as long as previously reported. The report also indicated that many patients' immune systems continued to grow stronger over time, according to lead researcher Roy Gulick of New York University.

Gulick's study found that 22 of 28 patients — or 79 percent - still had no detectable HIV in the blood systems after taking the three-drug combination under rigorously controlled clinical conditions. "This shows that you really can control HIV infection in a lot of patients for as long as two years," Gulick told the Toronto conference. But, Gulick cautioned, "The million-dollar question is: How long will this last?"

Just as encouraging, Gulick said, is evidence that the

three-drug cocktail helped patients actually rebuild their immune systems, helping them ward off opportunistic diseases. Patients taking the drug cocktail experienced a rapid rise in CD4 immune cells over the first six months, then a slower but continued rise in cells during the one-and-a-half years that followed.

The bad news, however, was reported by Dr. Steven Deeks who said a year-long study of the three-drug cocktail treatment appears to be ineffective or failing in about half those taking the combinations.

"The epidemic will likely split in two, and for half the people, we will need new therapeutic options," Deeks said in reporting his findings which were based on a study of 136 HIV-infected patients being treated at an AIDS clinic at the University of California in San

The study found that 53 percent of the patients showed a return to detectable levels of HIV, even though most of them had earlier experience a dramatic drop in viral levels to an undetectable point after starting the treatment.

The reason for the reported difference in the percentages of those being helped by the three-drug cocktail treatment — a large difference of 23 percentage points -may also prove to be an important, indirect piece in the AIDS treatment puzzle.


The Gulick study, which found more than threequarters of patients being dramatically helped by the trio of drugs, was smaller and was conducted under strict clinical conditions to assure the patients all took the medications regularly and as scheduled.

The Deeks study, which found only about half the patients being so dramatically helped by the three-drug combination, was based on a much larger group of patients - more than six times as many as in the Gulick

Perhaps equally important, the Deeks study focused on what the researchers themselves called "real-world patients in real-world circumstances." The 136 AIDS patients Deeks studied were going to a public health clinic for treatment and their medication schedules were no more rigorously monitored than most patients.

The differences in the findings of the two reports suggest AIDS in this country may be turning into a bipolar epidemic and that while many patients taking the three-drug combination treatment have excellent prospects for a healthy future, nearly as many other patients are in desperate need of newer and better med-

"The public has gotten the feeling that the epidemic is over, that these drugs are having this tremendous effect, with people who were on their death bed doing great," said Deeks. "But there's a whole group of patients - up to half - now showing evidence of drug failure. Those people in all likelihood are not going to respond very well to other protease inhibitors, and we have to develop other options for those people."



New Gay Newspaper Draws Fire

New York, NY (AP) — When the Washington Blade announced plans to launch a gay newspaper in New York, it sounded like welcome news for the nation's largest gay community. But some New Yorkers have greeted the venture with a Bronx cheer. There is grumbling that the Blade is teaming up with News Communications, a Manhattan-based firm whose chief executive, Wilbur Ross, oversees the Hill, the Capitol Hill paper, and nearly two dozen weeklies in the New York area.

In other words, can straight corporate owners do justice to gay journalism?

"I'm concerned the *Blade* is in bed, so to speak, with someone whose work is really questionable," said Larry Kramer, the playwright and gay activist. "I don't understand what the *Blade* is doing. They want a timid piece of toilet paper that people can wrap their old fish in. I don't think the gay community will have an interest in it at all."

Said Troy Masters, publisher of LGNY, a gay biweekly in New York: "There is a concern any time a corporation comes in with big money and says it's going to set the terms of debate in a community. This is about selling ads [and] corporatizing gay culture."

Pretty rough stuff for a newspaper that won't even print its debut issue until later this month. But Don Michaels, publisher of both the Washington Blade and the New York Blade News, dismissed the carping as insignificant.

"The gay community has moved beyond the point of disdaining alliances with the mainstream community," he said from Manhattan.

Michaels said the New York paper, like its Beltway counterpart, would not be an advocacy publication. "We follow the objective journalist style of reporting," he said. "There's a lot of news to cover [in New York] that isn't being covered."

The 45,000-circulation Washington Blade is an employee-owned paper, with Michaels the majority stockholder. The New York version will be owned 50-50 by Blade people, who will have editorial control, and News Communications, which will focus on production and distribution. The Blade News plans a circulation of 50,000.

As for those who insist such ventures should be owned exclusively by gays, Michaels said: "So what? A paper like this has been needed in New York for a long time."

DeGeneres Accuses ABC of Censorship

New York, NY — (AP) — Ellen DeGeneres reported for work last week on the set of her ABC comedy despite a public threat to quit over battles with the network over scripts and an "adult content" warning label being placed on her show.

"She's not happy," said her spokeswoman, Pat Kingsley. "I think it's an exaggeration to say she's leaving the show or threatening to leave the show. I think she would like to continue to keep doing the show."

In an interview published in the New York Times, DeGeneres said she and her executive producer, Tim Doyle, "are ready to walk off the show" because of fights with the network.

The actress said the only reason the episode is getting a warning label is "because I'm gay."

ABC advised parental discretion "due to adult content" prior to last Wednesday's "Ellen" episode, in which the star engaged in a joking — but lengthy — kiss with actress Joely Fisher, who plays Ellen Morgan's heterosexual best friend.

DeGeneres called it "blatant discrimination" because she and her character are gay, and said no other ABC show would carry such a warning for a similar scene. "I never wanted to be an activist, but now they're turning me into one," DeGeneres told *TV Guide*.


The disgruntled actress also said that ABC Entertainment President Jamie Tarses had nixed a scene in a future episode in which Morgan and a woman walk toward a bedroom, presumably to have sex.

Tarses and other ABC executives weren't talking, but ABC spokesman Kevin Brockman said DeGeneres hadn't made any threats to quit to them.

DeGeneres hasn't been happy with ABC for a while, reportedly because she didn't want to continue her sitcom this year but the network wouldn't release her from her contract. She complained last month when top executives didn't call to congratulate her about winning an Emmy Award.

Losing "Ellen," for all its headaches lately, would be a blow to ABC. Ranked 30th in the Nielsen Media Research ratings so far this season, it's one of the struggling network's few successes.

ABC, owned by the Walt Disney Co., has also been under attack from religious groups over Ellen's comingout episode and the new series "Nothing Sacred," about a priest ambivalent on such church doctrines as abortion and celibacy.



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Gay and Lesbian Domestic Violence Widespread

San Francisco, CA — A stereotype-shattering report just released by the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs and based on data from 12 participating agencies around the country suggests that domestic abuse in gay and lesbian relationships is just as widespread as it is in heterosexual relationships.

The report estimates that one or the other member in one-quarter to one-third of all gay and lesbian relationships experience verbal, physical or domestic violence."

Of the 12 cities reporting incidents in this study, San Francisco recorded the largest number with 533 incidents - nearly a quarter of all the domestic abuse reported. Ironically, anti-violence activists say, the disproportionate number may be because San Francisco is perhaps in the vanguard in addressing gay and lesbian domestic violence in this country.

CÚAV has been recording reports of same-sex domestic violence longer than any of the other agencies participating in the study; there are 11 established anti-abuse agencies in San Francisco, and several of them have increased their services for same-sex couples in the past few years because of increasing awareness of the problem; within the past year, two new agencies have been formed in the city - Queers United to Eliminate Abusive Relationships and Rape, and Women's Alliance to End Same-Sex Domestic Violence Inc. - specifically to address domestic violence in gay and lesbian relationships; and late last year the city's district attor-

sexual abuse by their partner.

Anti-violence workers collected information from agencies in Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Columbus, Ohio, Denver, Little Rock, Ark., Los Angeles, Minneapolis, New York, St. Louis, San Diego and San Francisco between 1986 and 1996 in what is the most extensive study of gay and lesbian domestic violence to date. And last year the agencies recorded 2,352 incidents of domestic violence in same-sex relationships — about equally divided among male relationships and female relationships — from agencies in those cities, a figure that anti-violence activists say is "just the tip of the iceberg."

What the 12-city coalition also reported that may be as unnerving as the high level of gay and lesbian domestic violence itself is that none of the 50 states legally recognize domestic violence in same-sex relationships, and that seven states specifically exclude such partner attacks from being classified as

domestic violence.

One of the side-effects of this official denial of same-sex domestic violence, advocates say, is that many gays and lesbians themselves also find it difficult or impossible to see themselves as victims in an abusive relationship because there's simply no recognition — legally or in the gay community — of such abuse.

Greg Merrill, one of the co-authors of the report and the director of client services at San Francisco's Community United Against Violence (CUAV), said, "We don't think about domestic violence in homosexual terms. People in our community feel immune. So when someone pushes us down a flight of stairs, we know it's wrong, but we don't call it ney hired a full-time staffer to handle same-sex domestic violence cases — the only post of its kind in the country.

All this, advocates say, may simply mean that domestic violence in taken more seriously in San Francisco, so the likelihood of it being reported may just be greater.

"Locally, we are probably way ahead of any other city in developing services," CUAV's Merrill said. "We've seen in San Francisco an unprecedented growth in the number and quality of services available to this community over the last several years."

Woman Rabbi at Gay-Lesbian Congregation

Chicago, IL — Congregation Or Chadash, which is largely gay and lesbian, kicked off its new year last week by installing Suzanne Griffel as its first rabbi.

"As we enter the new year, we enter a new stage by hiring a rabbi," said Jonathan Edelman, co-president.

The congregation began in 1975 as a gathering of gay Jewish men. The group met regularly but began to lose members until it adopted religious services in 1976 and took the name Or Chadash. For 20 years, Or Chadash had met at the Second Unitarian Church, 656 W. Barry in Chicago.

Most Americans Infected with HIV Believed Already Tested

Toronto — The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported at the Interscience Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy that the majority of people in the United States who are HIV-positive have been tested for the virus.

CDC researchers reported their studies indicate that of the estimated 650,000 to 900,000 Americans infected with HIV, between 509,000 and 545,000 already have been tested and know about their infection.

While CDC officials said the news was good, it also indicated that tens of thousand of American -between 105,000 to as many as 391,000 people-may be infected in the U.S. without ever having been tested for the virus.

Chicago, L.A. Hold AIDS Walks

Chicago, IL — An estimated 65,000 people showed up in the Windy City for Chicago's eighth annual AIDS Walk in an effort to raise about \$2 million for local AIDS organizations.

African-Americans and other minority groups have criticized what they consider unfair distribution of funds raised by the AIDS Walk, charging that too little of the money ever reaches agencies serving minority communities in Chicago.

One member of the People of Color Coalition said, "AIDS Walk won't be a true success unless it serves all of Chicago."

Meanwhile, In Hollywood, more than 25,000 people turned out to participate in AIDS Walk-Los Angeles 1997. Money raised in the 10K walkathon will go to the AIDS Project-Los Angeles.

Last year the Los Angeles event raised a record \$3.4 million.

British Lesbians Win Benefits Ruling

Luxembourg — The European Court of Justice has accepted that a British employer breached EU law by denying equal rights to lesbian employees. If a full session of the European Court ratifies the decision, Britain would be compelled to implement dramatic changes to its employment, pension and social security laws.

Lisa Grant brought the case against South West Trains when her partner, Jill Percey, was denied travel concessions available to other workers' husbands, wives or "common law opposite-sex" spouses.

Speaking after the decision Percey said: "We are ecstatic. It has been a long 2 1/2 years fighting for equality and we are just over the moon to think we have achieved what we set out to do 2 1/2 years ago."

Representing Grant was Cherie Booth, the wife of British Prime Minister Tony Blair. Booth told the European Court of Justice in July that South West Trains had adopted a policy of sexual stereotyping. South West Trains believed "that a man lives with a female partner, and a woman with a male partner, and not with partners of the same sex."

Study: School Condom Programs Don't Increase Teen Sex

New York, NY — A study published in the American Journal of Public Health reports that an analysis of school districts in New York City and Chicago suggests that AIDS education programs that include easy access for students to condoms do not increase rates of sexual activity, but do increase the use of condoms.

The study, conducted by researchers from New York University as part of a three-year evaluation of New York's AIDS Education program, compared rates of condom use and sexual activity among teenagers attending New York City public schools - where condoms are available - to those of students in Chicago school districts, where condoms are not a part of AIDS education programs.

According to researchers, providing condoms in schools is "a low-cost, harm-less addition" to HIV prevention efforts.

Apuzzo Named to Post as Clinton White House Assistant

Washington, D.C. — Virginia "Ginny" Apuzzo, one-time head of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, has been appointed to a post as Assistant to the President for Management and Administration in the Clinton administration.

The pest will put Apuzzo in charge of the management of White House and Executive Office administration area such as the travel office, the internship program, the complex telephone system and the White House photography office.

The position does not require Senate confirmation.

Apuzzo has had a long history in public service posts, from serving as a commissioner with New York state's civil service department to deputy director of New York's consumer protection board.

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"Forming LGBT Communities at Work" Topic of HRL Forum

Milwaukee — Mark Street of the Human Rights League introduced Monica Bryand as the Keynote Speaker of "Forming LGBT Communities at Work." This eight person panel of speakers was held in the M&M Club banquet room on Wednesday, October 8 at 5:30 p.m. The event was part of the Human Rights League's ongoing National Coming Out Day Celebration.

As a co-chair of Workplace Alliance, a Twin Cities organization that encourages and advocates companies and employees to form LGBT employee groups, Bryand was able to give examples of the obstacles in forming a group, the necessity of making and leveraging straight allies and overcoming the reluctance of people to join a LGBT group. She said that Workplace Alliance has provided education to over 700 executives, managers, and supervisors.

Bryand is a 15-year employee of St. Paul Companies, which has a thriving LGBT employee group and is ranked among the top ten LGBT-friendly companies nation-wide. in 1992, Bryand decided to go to the Human Resources Department and said, "Here I am. What are you going to do about your LGBT employees?" She said she was very lucky in that she spoke to a Human Resources person who got what she was talking about very quickly. There was also a Human Resources VP who was very homophobic, but who changed and is now very supportive of the group.

The LGBT group started with 14 people and currently numbers about 250 members. There is a very active network and an in-house speakers bureau that incorporates their "friends" (Bisexuals, Transgendered and Straight people) into the speaking engagements, which usually include a gay man a lesbian and a "friend." There is a "Safe Zone" sticker which has been distributed throughout the company that allows people to identify friends who place the stickers on their cubicles.

Through this group they have been able to stop the hate articles and discrimination the right-wing groups have tried to post within the company. They worked with management, with the result that now that kind of conduct is not tolerated. They are against oppression in any form and are working to include racial and disability groups. The terms Bisexual and Transgender will be incorporated into all their communications on their e-mail system.

Bryand was joined by a panel of representatives from GLEAM (Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Employees of Ameritech), GLADE (Gay and Lesbian Alliance of Deluxe Employees, and Pack 69 of the Firstar Corporation. Each group of representatives discussed the formation of their groups and later participated in a question and answer session with the audience.

Chuck Carlson, the president of the GLEAM/ Milwaukee, spoke about the formation of the original Ameritech group in Chicago. GLEAM is allied with minority groups, supports AIDS Walks in the five-state area Ameritech serves, and includes high-level management as members. They are currently lobbying for domestic partnership benefits.

Linda Bradshaw, of GLADE/Milwaukee said that all of her dealings with Human Resources and the Deluxe company have been very positive. She said, "It was worth the fear," in relation to coming forward to form the group, which now consists of 25 members in an informal supportive network.

Pack 69, a fledgling group from Firstar Milwaukee, is at present a social group that exists through e-mail. Nathan Walker, a black ex-marine said that he expects the group to formalize soon. The newest member of the Pack, Ben (a female to male transgendered person), was introduced and said that since he started three months ago, his experiences with Firstar and their Human Resources Department has been nothing but positive.

To quote from the HRL pamphlet that was handed out, "Today's companies are realizing that embracing LGBT employees is good for the company and good for business. ... Forming a group of LGBT employees at work is a path to full inclusion, which leads to success for both employees and employers."

Gay Hispanics Meet in Puerto Rico

San Juan, Puerto Rico (AP) — Gay Hispanics held their first international congress in Puerto Rico, where legislators want to ban same-sex marriages and police are in court for attacking homosexuals.

Last week, anti-abortion and religious groups gathered outside the Capitol tosupport the bill against homosexual matrimony — two days before the five-daycongress starts.

The conference drew about 1,000 delegates from all over the Americas, but mostly from the United States. Manuel Ornelas Quintero, director of the Latino-LatinaLesbian and Gay Organization, said they chose the U.S. Caribbean commonwealth because it is "the door to the Americas."

"Violence against gays and lesbians is not unique to Puerto Rico," Ornelas said from the group's Washington headquarters.

But local homosexuals argue that the island's religious bent and Latin tradition of gender roles make for a more hostile atmosphere. There is a police regulation against employing homosexuals and homosexual sex is a felony, punishable by 10 years in jail.

Police responded with undisguised hostility to the last gay convention in Puerto Rico, two years ago.

When the Gay Officers Action League, a homosexual police group, arrived for their 1995 congress, police prevented them from holding a peaceful march.

That provoked protests and a television talk show where Puerto Rican officers scoffed at the idea of homosexual law enforcers. Police Commissioner Pedro Toledo said you couldn't have "limp-wristed men" enforcing the law.

A few hours later, officers in riot gear armed with automatic weapons raided a lesbian bar hosting a reception for the conferees. Police said they were checking for a liquor license.

A keynote speaker at this week's convention is Mexican legislator Patria Jimenez, believed to be the first openly gay person elected in Latin America.

PrideFest Wraps Up '97 Festival; Begins Preparation for 1998

Milwaukee — This year's PrideFest set an all-time high attendance mark of 12,278, a 28-percent increase from the previous year. PrideFest was one of the three festivals that recorded an increase in attendance, and the other two (Asian Moon and Mexican Fiesta) both had fund-raising walks that ended on their festival grounds.

Volunteers Backbone of Festival

The volunteer support that made the festival happen numbered 1,014 strong, another record. Over 49,000 volunteer hours were logged during the two-and-a-half

days, roughly two years worth of 40-hour work weeks.

For the organizations who recruited volunteers and staffed specific work areas, there cam added benefits. These organizations earned a percentage of sales with PrideFest paying out \$5225.13 in 1997 alone. The organizations that provided assistance included Washington Heights Rainbow Association; Sherman Park Rainbow Association; Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee; P-FLAG/Milwaukee; AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin; Castaways MC; UWM Gay/Les/Bi Community; Marquette Gay and Lesbian Student Group; and GALANO Club. The total contribution PrideFest has made to volunteering organizations over the past three years no totals \$15,222.60.

August Dates in '98

Perhaps the most significant change for PrideFest '98 will be the dates. To accommodate the 95th anniversary celebration of Harley-Davidson, PrideFest has been

moved from its traditional June Celebration to August 28, 29 and 30.

Members from the community have shared their desires for a Sheepshead tournament; gospel music; bingo tent; 50's rock 'n roll bands; and an open dance tent on Friday night. Others would like to see Family Day activities expanded; a coat/package check-in service; and plays or skits. Plans are being made to shift stages and activity areas to reduce the amount of noise interference and possibly make room for new venues. Organizers will begin to work with these ideas and try to make some of those wishes come true.

Entries for the 1998 slogan will be accepted until November 15 and the PrideFest Council will vote on the entries soon after. The person who suggests the winning slogan will be a parade Marshall in the '98 Pride Parade. 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



AIDSLine Expands to Include Teen Focus

Milwaukee — The Wisconsin AIDSline, a statewide service of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), has expanded its service by including specific hours for teens to call and talk to teens regarding HIV and AIDS information.

he U.S. Supreme Court did it again... It won't ask about "Don't Ask, Don't Tell". This is the third time the head judicial honchos refused to debate the Pentagon policy that obviously isn't working. It looks like it is going to have to be dealt with through legislation and I don't see Congressional Pentagon loyalists allowing the issue to come up. I predict the President won't touch this political hot potato because he got so badly burned the first time around. It doesn't look good for those gays and lesbians still in the service who aren't telling, but are still being booted out with increasing regularity.

Statistics have proven what I've been saying for the past year... nearly 50% of People with HIV/AIDS are failing on the famous "Drug Cocktail" combo of two anti-retrovirals and one

protease inhibitor. A hefty percentage of that 50% fail because they don't strictly adhere to the tough administration regimen, i.e. take "drug vacations" or miss doses; but many of us just don't have positive results with the "miracle" protease inhibitors.

As I told you last time, I started my fourth protease inhibitor, Nelfinavir (Viracept), in the middle of September. The previous

three just didn't work for one reason or another.

This week, I am switching my anti-retrovirals (RT Inhibitors or RTI's/nuceloside analogues). I've been on 3tC (Lamivudine) and d4T (Stavudine) for well over two years, through all the time I've been on the various protease inhibitors. I've already experienced all the other RTI's (AZT, ddC, ddI) so now it's time to try something new. I'm sticking with 3tC, and adding Nevirapine (Viramune) a Non Nucleoside Reverse Transcriptase Inhibitor (NNRTI) an even different kind of drug.

NNRTI's (another one is Delavirdine) were originally studied in combination with two RTI's, then protease inhibitors came along, and the NNRTI studies were de-emphasized. There are now some trials studying a triple combination of an NNRTI'Anti-retroviral/protease inhibitor but I couldn't find any trial studying the specific three I'll be taking (3tC, Nelfinavir, Nevirapine). Should be interesting.

Have you read about the squabble between Elton John and the Rolling Stones Keith Richards? Seems that Richards slammed Elton's re-release of "Candle in the Wind" in memory of Princess Diana by saying his talent is "writing songs for dead blondes". Elton came back by calling Richards "a monkey with arthritis". Yeah, and he doesn't have any veins left either so he wouldn't be good as a test animal.

Milwaukee's proposed Domestic Partnership legislation was shot down in committee on October 8th, when the Common Council's Finance and Personnel Committee voted 4-0 to place the issue "on file."

Budget estimates of the cost of the legislation were viewed by many supporters as being vastly overblown, yet aldermen kept yelling "fiscal impact" when in reality it was fueled by homophobia.

Homophobia was in blatant evidence at the October 8th hearing, with reactionaries gathered outside and inside City Hall calling us "Sodmites and Fornicators" and demanding "No taxation for perversion" and "Henningsen Supports Perversion". Alderman Paul Henningsen sponsored the ordinance saying "It is simply the right thing to do".

Meanwhile, one of the four aldermen on the finance committee, James Witkowiak, who has the vast majority of gay bars in his 2nd district, voted, without comment, to place the issue on file. Remember that the next time he comes looking for cam-

paign donations from our community.

President Clinton has nominated openly Gay James Hormel, a well known wealthy democratic donor from San Francisco, to be Ambassador to Luxembourg. If approved by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee he would become the first out gay ambassador.

Arch-Conservative homophobe Sen. Jesse Helms is chair of the Foreign Relations Committee, but he had previously recommended confirmation of Hormel as an alternate delegate to the UN.


Helm's previous confirmation is one point in favor of Hormel, and another is Hormel hasn't publicly commented on the issue of legalized marijuana (which got Weld sidetracked from his Mexican ambassadorship).

As an aside, if Hormel is approved quickly, perhaps he can help negotiate the purchase of Luxembourg steel for Milwaukee's Miller Park. I recently read that steel in the length needed for the movable roof structure is no longer made anywhere in the Americas and that Mitsubishi, who is in charge of the roof, is looking at purchasing it from Luxembourg. Maybe Hormel can finagle us a deal on the price, and make it convenient to ship it here via the Atlantic and through Milwaukee's

port which will make the union happy.

Clinton also has named openly lesbian Virginia Apuzzo as Assistant to the President for Management and Administration. This move doesn't require anyone's approval, and makes Apuzzo the highest ranking out appointed government official, ever. National GLBT groups were unanimous in their accolades.

Went to see "Angels in America" part one "Millennium Approaches" at the Milwaukee Rep's Powerhouse Theatre. The



three and a half hour play breezed by in the comfortable theatre, and it was a striking emotional piece. People I know who have seen it in NYC and Chicago commented that the nudity was cut (lots of pajama wearing) and the one "sex scene" was sanitized in the Milwaukee version, but then this IS Milwaukee. It was bad enough that just the fucking cursing by the Roy Cohn character was enough to chase out the four elderly women seated behind us during the first act.

The Angel crashing through the ceiling at the end of the play was a bit disappointing in its execution, and her dress reminded me of "Joseph's" Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat; but I still can't wait to see part two, "Perestroika", performed by the Milwaukee Chamber Theatre at the Broadway Theatre Center.

That's about it for this issue. Halloween comes up at the end of the month, and then in early November it's the Pageant, and Light's 10th Anniversary Gala, and then Thanksgiving later in the month. It would be nice if El Niño would keep us above normal temps, but I would like to see some snow for Christmas!

Partners Angst

To The Editor-

So cost has derailed the Domestic Parners proposal. Cost certainly has a nasty way of disruption things. I seem to recall that a few decades ago, cost kept Milwaukee's public schools racially segregated. People in outlying areas of the city wouldn't really have minded African-American children coming to vacant classrooms in their neighborhoods, if only it wouldn't cost the taxpayers money — at least that's what the school board and politicians were claiming.

Well, I guess cost is something we have to live with. We've seen what a struggle there was to integrate our school system, and all because of cost. Perhaps the people who want Domestic Partner benefits will figure out some legal theory to get their case into the courts, where school integration was finally settled. Since we have laws against discrimination based on maritial status, perhaps they'll figure out some way to make a court case based on that.

While I have no personal interest in the Domestic Partner matter, I've been sensitive to the way society discriminates against single people in favor of married people in handing out benefits and tax breaks. I do the same work as the guy next to me, but his paycheck is bigger than mine, simply because of family welfare disguised as "tax deductions."

I haven't seen the current legal opinion claiming Wisconsin's anti-discrimination law requires extending Domestic Partners benefits to people who can legally marry, rather than just those who can't (which is what has driven the estimate cost up so sharply). The Illinois law didn't stop Chicago's action, and some private companies extend Domestic Partner benefits only to employees who can't legally marry. The legal opinion would suggest that, to the extent those companies operate in Wisconsin, they're in violation of state law.

The Common Council or sponsore person should ask the Attorney General Doyle to review a Domestic Partners proposal that is limited to people who cannot legally marry. An opinion from the Attorney General, and perhaps even an undertaking not to prosecute, could allay fears of the city Attorney. There's plenty of precedent for it — the needle exchange program comes to mind,

which, though illegal, has assurance that there will not be any prosecution.

Seeking an opinion or undertaking not to prosecute from the Attorney General would also allay the suspicion some have that a great sign of relief was hear on Wells Street when the opinion and resultant increase in cost provided a way out of a sticky situation.



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State Courts Chart New Gender, Orientation Bias Turf

ivil rights laws don't always work out quite the way people expect, and a series of court cases this year has underscored the sometimes peculiar twists anti-discrimination legislation can take and the unexpected uses such laws can have. Heterosexuals — and especially straight men — are increasingly finding they can use sexual harassment laws intended to protect women from their own offensive, intimidating and strong-arm workplace antics to their own purposes as more and more heterosexual men find these same sexually laden "pranks" by supervisors and bosses obnoxious when they're the target of them.

While federal courts around the country have fairly consistently ruled that the 1964 Civil Rights Act prohibits opposite-gender sexual harassment, but that it doesn't apply to same-gender sexual harassment — a legal viewpoint that even if technically correct unnerves many. The Justice Department has now urged the U.S. Supreme Court to hear one such same-gender sexual harassment case and insists that the Civil Rights Act does indeed bar sexual harassment regardless of who's involved in such

incidents.

In the case being considered for review by the Supreme Court, Joseph Oncale was hired by Sundowner Offshore Services Inc. as a worker on one of its Gulf of Mexico oil rigs. Oncale charges that he was physically and verbally harassed and threatened with rape by two of his supervisors and a co-worker — all males.

A federal court ruled Oncale's charges weren't covered under the federal statute and a federal appeals court agreed.

The Supreme Court has so far refused to review any of the other same-gender harassment cases, but the brief filed by the Justice Department in Oncale's case argues that the Civil Rights Act "protects all employees from sex discrimination, without regard to the gender of the harasser or the victim" and may convince the justices to review the case.

In state courts, where federal anti-bias laws aren't considered in such legal actions, straight men have fared far better.

In late August, the Minnesota Supreme Court agreed with a state appeals court by a 6-to-1 majority ruling that same-gender sexual harassment is banned under state law—even if that law isn't explicit on the point and even if the lawmakers who enacted Minnesota's human rights laws never even contemplated such sexual harassment when the debated the workplace protections.


The Minnesota high court ruled that a complaint by Richard Cummings, a seasonal truck driver working for S & K Trucking and Landscaping, falls under the state's anti-harassment provisions even if the incidents the complaint is based on all involved males who are all heterosexual. The court rejected the defense of Charles Koehnen, the firm's co-owner, who insisted that the physical grabbing and simulated sex incidents that he admits he did were just "horsing around" and "guys just having fun" without any actual sexual intention.

In its majority decision, the court ruled that it's immaterial what the gender or orientation of the individuals involved may be — and that even if the intent isn't actually sexual "sexual harassment can include any verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature that has the effect of substantially interfering with the plaintiff's employment."

Earlier this year, a California Superior Court also ruled that a same-gender sexual harassment suit by two workers at the Big Four Rents in Rohnert Park, Calif., charging their male supervisor sexually harassed them for nearly two years could proceed.

Attorneys for the rental company had argued that there was no legal basis for the suit because the male supervisor allegedly involved in the incidents is heterosexual and that he had no sexual intentions toward either men. The state court ruled that it didn't matter and ordered the case to proceed.

Then in February of this year, the Massachusetts Supreme Court ruled that sexual harassment is prohibited under state law, regardless of the gender of the individuals involved and irrespective of their sexual orientations. In that case, three men sued the 84 Lumber Company charged their supervisor with sexual harassment — including grabbing at their genitals, fondling them, and asking for sexual favors — although all the men and the supervisor insist they are heterosexual.



But certainly the most expensive if not the most precedent-setting case so far came in April when a Los Angeles jury has awarded more than \$5 million to Frank Christian, a 32-year-old heterosexual mechanic, who sued his former employer J & J Snack Foods charging that his male supervisor during the two years he worked at the firm sexually harassed him.

Christian's lawsuit charged that Pedro Gutierrez, his supervisor at the company and also heterosexual, made lewd sexual remarks to him, grabbed his crotch and buttocks on several occasions, and at one point walked up to Christian as he was working on the ground and put his crotch in Christian's face.

During the trial, Gutierrez said he and Christian were friends and engaged in "horseplay," but that he never grabbed the man and that there was never any sexual intention in any of the incidents.

In these various state cases, the courts have based their extension of anti-harassment protections that nowhere explicitly cover same-gender sexual harassment on state anti-bias laws as much as employment protections barring workplace sexual harassment.

It is, in the language of the law, an "unanticipated shadow of protection" in one area that grows out of a not directly related law or precedent in another area. Perhaps the most familiar example of such unexpected "legal shadows" arose as a result of Hawaii's state constitution completely removing any gender references in an effort to create a legal framework that isn't biased against women. In expunging gender references, however, Hawaii also unexpectedly set the stage for the current legal case by gay and lesbian couples to be granted marriage licenses.

But expanding anti-bias laws can also have another

In March, the San Francisco human rights commission officially reprimanded a popular gay bar in the city's predominately gay Castro district for kicking out a heterosexual couple because they were passionately kissing in the club.

The couple filed a complaint with the city agency after the owner of the bar was quoted in a local paper as saying that the bar had a "no straight make-out" policy and that he wouldn't back away from it. The commission agreed that any such policy was contrary to the city's anti-discrimination laws prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation.

In June, Peg Daluge has filed a complaint with the Minnesota human rights department charging that her employer, HealthSystem Minnesota, discriminated against her because she is heterosexual when it refused to add her longtime companion, Dean McCurdy, to the firm's domestic partner health benefits program.

HealthSystem's domestic partner benefits package is restricted by the firm's policy to the same-sex partners of its workers, and specifically excludes opposite-sex couples from the benefits program. A spokesperson for HealthSystem Minnesota said that the company decided to limit the benefit package to same-sex partners because heterosexual couples can legally marry, making them eligible for an equivalent spousal benefits package.

And earlier in September, two men in Minneapolis filed a lawsuit against one of the city's most popular gay bars — the Gay Nineties — charging that a doorman at the club had refused to let them into the bar because they are heterosexuals.

The bar's manager says the men weren't refused admission because they're straight, but because one of the two men became nervous and hostile about entering the club and the doormen are told not to let such people in because they can cause trouble once they're actually inside.

But the attorney representing the two men in their lawsuit says the refusal to let the men into the gay bar amounts to discrimination because of their sexual orientation, which is illegal under a state law that was adopted to protect gays and lesbians from discrimination.

And while that lawsuit was being filed in Minneapolis, the city attorney's office in Milwaukee was also issuing a legal opinion that the domestic partner measure proposed by Alderman Paul Henningsen that would extend benefits to the same-sex partners of city workers would probably violate state anti-bias laws based on sexual orientation because the proposed measure would not offer such benefits to unmarried heterosexual partners of city employees.


Because domestic partner measures are usually controversial in themselves, it is likely that the city attorney's opinion could easily have the effect of stopping the proposal dead in its tracks before it could even get to a committee hearing — at least for the time being and in its present form.


Through all these legal cases this year, an underlying thread and an important political lesson seems to be that our courts — at least at the state level — are insisting that anti-bias and anti-harassment laws apply across the board regardless of gender or sexual orientation.

And while that may in the short term have unwanted results for a gay bar in San Francisco or for a proposed partners measure in Milwaukee, in the long run the thrust of these rulings is toward a more integrated and orientation-blind legal system.

Reading In Circles

Since October is Gay and Lesbian History Month, I thought it might be interesting to take a look at some of the books and authors that are available at the public library and mention a few of my favorites along the way. It has become clear to me that I have been reading in a loop—unconsciously finding and reading books that all the previous authors have read. It's a nice treat to recognize a name and say to myself, "Oh yes! I remember that one."

The Milwaukee Public Library has lots of books listed under *Homosexuality* in their card catalogs. (I have just been reminded by a friend that all books listed under that subject were formerly cross-referenced with criminal acts. That's a scary thought!) There are biographies, autobiographies, and LGBT studies; there are also novels about gays and lesbians—by gay and lesbian authors. This is the place to find the books that you never got around to buying—or reading.

When I first became aware of my sexuality in the late 40s, I went to the public library to seek validation. I found it in the books I read about people who I thought were like me. As I went through the identification cards, no one could tell what I was looking for until I nervously went to the check-out desk with my selections. Now, I'm not afraid anymore and they have computers to make the task easier.

My first books were *Death in Venice* and *The Magic Mountain* by Thomas Mann; a daunting read for a young lad. I read all the books I could find by Ronald Firbanks, an English author of the early 1900s. His novels opened up a world of fantasy and wonder for me. *Valmouth* and *Vainglory* stand out in my memory. There is a paragraph-long chapter about a lesbian seduction in a rowboat that consists of nothing but the repetition of a single name. This author left *everything* to your imagination, and I was slowly developing a good one.

Carl Van Vechten was another writer I loved to read. Among his books I particularly liked *The Tattooed Countess*. His name keeps popping up again and again as I read more books about, and by, gay and lesbian authors of that time. He seems to have know everybody on both sides of the Atlantic.

Nancy Mitford, an author who is not gay but certainly included gay characters in her witty novels, was a brilliant writer of biographies. Her life history of Frederick the Great (that fruit kuchen from Prussia), was astonishing. Freddie is said to have bedded not a few of his officers.

Many years ago I discovered the short stories of Saki (H.H. Munro). He was a favorite of Noel Coward and Mitford. I have a volume of his work that includes all the stories, two novels and three plays; I have read it to bits and loan it out with caution as this one is out of print.

Edward F. Benson's collected *Lucia Stories* are another great treasure. Lucia and Miss Mapp would surely put any two manipulating queens to shame. Wait 'till you get a load of Georgie Pilson and "quaint" Irene, the local artist; there are certainly same-sex partners in their backgrounds. I recommend Mr. Benson's cast of outrageous characters highly.

I grew to love southern writers like Tennessee Williams, Carson McCullers, and Truman Capote. I read *Giovanni's Room* by James Baldwin. I tried to read *The Well of Loneliness* by Radclyffe Hall, but I just didn't get it. Now I review lesbian writing. That's opened up a whole new area for me.

Gore Vidal's *The City and The Pillar* and *Myra Breckenridge* were eye-openers. His historical novels are a wonder. There is always a gay man in the background — somewhere. Vidal never pulls any punches about sex or sexuality in any of his works.

His recent biography *Palimpsest* is in paperback and, as only Gore Vidal can, he lets the dish fly about everyone. It's like being at a cocktail party with Vidal as the host. This is an excellent book by one of our best living gay writers.

Speaking of biographies, Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas come to mind. I was recently loaned three books that were written by Samuel M. Steward. The first was a memoir called *Dear Sammy: Letters From Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas*. Another was a fictional mystery called *The Caravaggio Shawl*, in which Gertrude and Alice are billed as two of the most unlikely detectives since Miss Marple.

Stein's books were hard to read, but who didn't read Alice's Cookbook? The Hashish Fudge recipe was worth it all—a friend sent her the recipe; she unknowingly included it, and it caused a scandal. All the hippies loved it. What a hoot!

The last Steward book, *The Boys in Blue*, was written under the pseudonym "Phil Andros" and is a fine piece of porn. Steward wrote seven or eight of these novels in the 60s and 70s. He has been called the best gay erotic writer to come out of that era. Incidentally, he also helped to research *The Kinsey Report* in the 50s — physically!

Lately, another name has come to my attention. James Purdy is a 73-year old novelist who was treasured by fans like Tennessee Williams, Langston Hughes, Carl Van Vechten, Dame Edith Sittwell and Alice B. Toklas. He is a favorite of Fran Lebowitz, Gore Vidal and John Waters. His 26th novel was just published in England he and is working on another. I can't wait to get to know his work.

So you see how the circle goes; one book leads to another. I read about someone or a friend recommends an author, and now I have a new passion. The nicest thing is that all this stuff is available at your public library. Go and check something out.



DANCE BEAT

t seemed only fitting that my first review be of AQUA (aka THE dance band of the moment). The song Barbie Girl has literally taken the world by storm. I don't need to tell you how well this band is doing now, but to give you an idea ... in their native country of Denmark, their #1 album is Quintuple Platinum. So who is AQUA and are they really all that?? I did a little research (and learned a little Danish) to bring you up to scoop.

Aqua is made up of an ex game-show hostess, an award winning break-dancer who used to work on a cruise ship, an ex gas-station attendant and a seamster (I do

not make this stuff up).

Lene Grawford Nystrom and Rene Dif perform lead vocals (Lene is "Barbie" and Rene is "Ken"). Soren Rasted and Claus Noreen play the instruments. The group collaborated on writing almost all of the music and lyrics on the album.

Aqua comes from a long line of "male rap/female vocal" dance groups, a sound that is almost entirely European. One of the first was Culture Beat (remember Mr. Vain). Then came Real McCoy, La Bouche, and Le Click. Aqua rises above their predecessors not only because they write their own material and are truly a band, but because their vocal abilities are superior as well. Aqua also realizes that dance music is for bouncing in your car or grooving at the club. They don_t take it or themselves too seriously.

The first track on the album Happy Boys and Girls is an ode to themselves and the legions of smiling faces on dance-floors everywhere. The lyrics are about as deep as the title. . . . "Be happy/Come on let's go get it on," but Aqua is about unadulterated fun; not about changing the world.

The second track My Oh My is like a techno fairy tale about a princess and her Robin Hood. Songs like this one and the middle-eastern flavored dance track Roses are Red are what give Aqua that edge over the

competition-originality.

Another thing I like about Aqua is Lene's voice. On Barbie Girl she gives a voice to the doll that is believable and downright catchy. On other tracks like the smooth Turn Back Time she sounds almost like Madonna.

Overall, for those of you looking for a great new dance album, or just something hip to add to your collection, then Agaumarine is the perfect choice. And I know we haven't heard the last of Aqua. Their follow-up to Barbie Girl is being eagerly anticipated. Many Aqua fans hope it will be the eurodance track Dr. Jones, a worthy follow-up.

It also seems that the little comp[any that makes the doll, Mattell, is not very happy. They've gone so far as to ask for the removal of the songfrom record shelves and radio stations. So grab up your collector's item! Barbie Girl will definitely go down in my book as one of the best dance tracks of

So there it is, you have just been caught up. Until next issue, thanks again for the words of encouragement and as always, slower traffic keep right.



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
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
