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
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

Lobbying Efforts Force Senate Hearing on Wisconsin Anti-Gay Marriage Bill

Madison — A bill that would ban gay marriages in the State of Wisconsin has been scheduled for a public hearing on March 18th before the Senate Judicary Committee with a chance the full Senate could vote on the bill by the end of the Legislative session this spring.

The bill, AB104, introduced by Rep. Lorraine Serrati (R-Spread Eagle) passed the Wisconsin State Assembly on May 13, 1997 by a vote of 78 to 20.

"The Legislature will once again be spending taxpayers dollars during these last few 'crunch' days of the session on unnecessary legislation which bans something that does not exist," points out Walt Jackson, President of Action Wisconsin, a LGBT civil rights organization. ships and create an unsafe living environment for lesbians and gays," adds Jackson.

In addition to AB104, the committee will hear testimony on other controversial bills, including a proposed ban on partialbirth abortions.

"It remains unclear which bills may advance through the Senate. But, people concerned about AB104 must definitely remain vigilant," State Representative Tammy Baldwin told *In Step*.

"My guess is that the bill that up for hearing this week, were all scheduled because of the pressure placed on the Senate for action, as well as the fact that we are nearing the end of the 1997-98 legislative session," added Baldwin.

In recent weeks, Wisconsin Christians United, a religious right-wing group in support of the bill mounted an intense lobbying effort to bring AB104 to a vote.

The fate of AB104 may ride on a special election, to be held on April 7, to fill the Senate seat vacated by State Sen. Lynn Adelmann. The election will decide which party controls the Senate, and thus the future of the bill.

According to sources, it is expected that if the Republicans secure the seat [and a majority in the Senate] that they would call for a three week special session at which AB104, and other bills could be voted on.«

Action Wisconsin is encouraging concerned persons to focus their written remarks, phone calls or email to committe members asking them not to report out the bill for a vote in the Senate.

Methodist Church Jury Delares Pastor Not Guilty

Kearney, NE — An ecclesiastical jury of the United Methodist Church has concluded that the Rev. Jimmy Creech did in fact conduct a same-sex union ceremony but failed — by a single vote — to agree that conducting the rite for gay and lesbian couples was a violation of church law. The jury of ministers voted 11-2 that Creech had in fact conducted a homosexual union ceremony and then voted 8-5 that he had not violated church law in doing so. Nine votes would have been needed for the jury to find him guilty on the charge.

Nebraska Methodist Bishop Joel Martinez, who earlier this year suspended Creech for conducting a union for two women and referred the matter to a church trial, said after the 13-member court decision, "The church has spoken. We trust and honor the process."

Bishop Martinez ordered Creech reinstated as the senior pastor at the First United Methodist Church of Omaha, the church's flagship church in that city. "Rev. Creech is an elder in good standing with the United Methodist Church," the bishop said, "His appointment is to First United Methodist Church in Omaha. His suspension is lifted."

In a statement following the trial, the jurors — all of whom were Methodist ministers like Creech himself — said in a statement that they "agonized" over their verdict. "We gathered in prayer, in silence, and in respectful dialogue," the statement said. "Our vote reflects the difficulty the General Conference has experienced with this issue."

The 53-year-old Creech himself told reporters later he was surprised by the decision. "Frankly, I wasn't prepared for the verdict to be innocent," he said. "I'm in shock, and I'm very pleased."

Creech himself said later that he would continue to perform same-sex unions if asked to by gays and lesbians wanting to formalize their relationships with the blessings of the church.

Supreme Court Rules Federal Law Covers Same-Sex Job Harassment

Washington, D.C. — The U.S. Supreme Court has unanimously ruled that the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits sexual harassment at the workplace, even when the individuals involved are of the same gender.

The ruling came in a closely watched case initiated by Joseph Oncale, a Louisiana man who charged in a lawsuit that he was sexually harassed and menaced by a male supervisor and two other male co-workers during his employment on an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico. Attorneys for Sundowner Offshore Services, operators of the oil rig and Oncale's employer at the time, argued that the behavior was just male "locker-room horseplay" and that the Civil Rights Act of 1964 didn't cover such behavior involving members of the same sex. establish a legal case the harassment or discrimination has to be shown to be clearly based on gender, "not merely tinged with offensive sexual connotations."

Justice Scalia wrote that the 1964 act "does not reach genuine but innocuous differences in the ways men and women routinely interact with members of the same sex and of the opposite sex. The prohibition of harassment on the basis of sex ... forbids only behavior be taken into consideration.

"A professional football player's working environment is not severely or pervasively abusive, for example, if the coach smacks him on the buttocks as he heads onto the field — even if the same behavior would reasonably be experienced as abusive by the coach's secretary [male or female] back at the office."

In the past few years, several state and federal courts have reached widely differing conclusions about samegender workplace harassment. Some state courts have recognized their state laws as prohibiting on-the-job same-sex harassment, while federal courts have reached differing conclusions.

In his original lawsuit, Oncale claimed that during his four months working as an oil rig laborer in 1991, he was sexually assaulted, battered, touched and threatened with rape by his immediate supervisor, John Lyons, and another supervisor, Danny Pippen. A co-

A federal appeals court in New Orleans had dismissed Oncale's lawsuit, saying that the 1964 act prohibited sexual harassment on the job only when it involved members of the opposite sex, not members of the same sex.

But the Supreme Court justices agreed in its fairly short seven-page ruling that the act also applies in cases where the harasser and victim are the same gender. The ruling reinstate's Oncale's suit and orders a rehearing of the case.

In writing the court's opinion, however, Justice Antonin Scalia said that the federal sexual harassment restrictions should be applied only if the conduct that's alleged is serious enough to cause an abusive or hostile environment in the workplace. The ruling says that to "This lays down a standard for every employer so that he or she understands that sexual harassment of any kind cannot be tolerated in the workplace and will not be tolerated by a court."

so objectively offensive as to alter the conditions of the victim's employment."

The opinion addressed the objections raised by Sundowner Offshore Services, saying the 1964 act "does not prohibit all verbal or physical harassment in the workplace; it is directly only at discrimination because of sex. We have always regarded that requirement as crucial, and as sufficient to ensure that courts and juries do not mistake ordinary socializing in the workplace — such as male-on-male horseplay or intersexual flirtation — for discriminatory conditions ofemployment."

Among other things, Justice Scalia said the "context" of such charges of same-gender harassment should workers, Brandon Johnson, was charged in the suit with helping in one of the alleged incidents.

Oncale says in the suit that he reported the charges to the oil rig's site manager twice, but nothing was done to stop the alleged abuses. Finally, Oncale says, he quit because of concerns he would in fact be raped by the men.

The Supreme Court ruling carefully avoids any reference to sexual orientation, but gay rights advocates nevertheless hailed the decision.

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Quick Changes in Boy Scouts

Trenton, NJ - Just being gay isn't sufficient reason for the Boy Scouts of America to exclude homosexuals from the youth organization and is a violation of state anti-bias laws, a three-judge panel of the Appellate Division of the New Jersey Superior Court ruled in overturning a lower court decision.

The appeals court ruling comes amid reports that the national Scouting organization has already changed its policies against gays in one smaller program the youth group runs around the country.

The New Jersey court said in its ruling that the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) and its affiliated local councils are "places of accommodation" that "emphasize open membership" which makes them subject to the state's anti-bias laws that in 1992 were broadened to bar discrimination based on sexual orientation.

The court ruled that the Scouts are similar to other groups, such as Little League baseball or student dining clubs at Princeton University, that must adhere to state anti-discrimination laws even if they are "private associations."

The appeals court decision, the first of its kind in the U.S., overturns a lower court ruling that sided with the Boy Scouts in a lawsuit filed by James Dale, who was expelled as an assistant scoutmaster by the organization in 1990 after it learned he was an officer in the Rutgers University Lesbian/Gay Alliance.

The court decision comes on the heels of reports that the national Boy Scout leadership has in fact already changed its the policies of a division of its Explorer scouting programs so they will actually be open to gays, girls and

those who don't believe in god. The Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel reported that the BSA's national executive board in February made the changes in the "Venturing division" of Explorer Scout units. The newspaper reported that Gregg Shields of the national group had confirmed the executive board had eliminated the requirement that boys in the Venturing division of the Explorer Scouts would not require a pledge of religious belief in god and would have no restrictions against gays or girls.

The Venturing program is aimed mainly at urban youth between the ages of 14 to 20 years and focuses mainly on career choices instead of traditional camping and outdoor activities most people associate with scouting.

Federal courts have consistently ruled in favor of the Boy Scouts' right to exclude atheists and agnostics who refuse to pledge their belief in god and its right to exclude girls.

State courts around the country have handed down mixed rulings, and the California state supreme court is currently reviewing conflicting lower state court rulings on the Scouts' policies regarding gays, girls and the non-religious.

But in February, Chicago authorities officially severed city sponsorship of Scouting programs in that city until the organization drops its ban against gays and stops requiring a religious oath. San Francisco made a similar move a few years ago and dropped its support for the youth groups in the city because of the Scouts' anti-gay restrictions.

The shift, however, raises legal questions for others about whether the organization has effectively created a kind of 'separate but equal" policy within the Boy Scouts - and whether the non-discrimination policies will in fact be applied or instead will be only a "paper policy." Defense Fund, however, said he considers the change in policy "a partial victory" in the sense that it at least offers "a way that people who want to participate in scouting can.'

In a larger sense, Davidson speculated that the Boy Scouts are "recognizing that discrimination is legally problematic for them and is creating a public relations and community problem" that they are trying to find a way out of. "They can't run a discriminatory program and at the same time have it supported by arms of government, like the police and fire departments," he said."

Mounting Woes May Mean the End for 'Ellen'


Los Angeles — "Ellen" is coming under attack again — just as ABC pre-pares to decide the fate of the controversial show. In a major blow to the alreadystruggling series, ABC affiliate WSYX in Columbus, Ohio, is considering a plan



to yank "Ellen" from its lineup - and replace the lesbian-themed comedy with syndicated repeats of "Seinfeld.

Indeed, DeGeneres is already planning for the end of her show, Sources say "Ellen's" writers and producers have written a one-hour, star-studded series finale which would be broadcast in May.

Researchers: Physiological Differences Between Lesbians and Non-Gay Women

Austin, TX — Researchers at the University of Texas at Austin report in the journal, *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*, what they say is the first evidence of a physiological basis for differences in sexual orientation between non-gay women and lesbians.

According to the scientists, lesbians hear very soft noises different from non-gay women. It is already known that women in general hear such noises different from men, but the Texas researchers say their study shows that lesbians also hear such sounds, on average, differently from non-gay women.

Ed Pasanen of the experimental psychology department at the University of Texas, who cowrote the research report, said the study will have to be replicated by other scientists, but that he is convinced their findings will be confirmed.

The idea for the study arose from earlier research which noted that there were differences in the inner ear structures of women who had twin brothers and women who did not.

Among other things, the inner ear produces minute echoes in response to weak clicking sounds — a fact that doctors have used for some time to diagnose possible hearing difficulties in babies. But in females, these imperceptible echoes are generally slightly louder than in males for reasons scientists don't yet understand.

Prof. Dennis McFadden, an experimental psychologist at the University of Texas who headed the study, used this difference in weak echoes to mea-

sure the tiny clicking echoes in 237 male and female students and volunteers.

Prof. McFadden and his associates found that overall, the echoes measured among the 61 lesbian and bisexual women were noticeably weaker than those of the 57 heterosexual women in the study. The imperceptible sounds of both the lesbians and straight women were, however, still stronger than the 119 men involved in the study, and the researchers said they found no measurable differences between lesbians and bisexual women, not between gay and straight men.

Prof. McFadden said, "The interpretation is



that the auditory system has been masculinized along with whatever brain sites are controlling sexual preference."

The researchers suggested that low levels of male hormones circulating in all the bodies of all pregnant women might be "masculinizing" unborn girls in their mothers' wombs, possibly affecting their anatomy.

Other studies have indicated genetic differences and distinctions in parts of the brain between gay and straight males, but similar physiological research into differences between lesbians and heterosexual women has not been done until this study, the scientists say.

'Seinfeld' Menu Seems Tasteless

Los Angeles — You might want to think twice before ordering at the "Seinfeld" diner. It appears it may have tasteless fare.

The menu board at Monk's, the make-believe hangout for Jerry and the gang, tends toward unappetizing and even profane items in a photograph printed in the April issue of *Swing* magazine.

Besides a grilled burger "on Lice," the menu includes a "Double Chili Butt Burger" and "2 Large Fresh Homos." It's enough to drive a hungry customer into the arms of the Soup Nazi.

The picture was shot on the "Seinfeld" set in early December as part of a profile of producers Jeff Schaffer and Alec Berg, *Swing* spokeswoman Tory Johnson said.

It was unclear if the menu board, tucked into a corner of the set, has ever made it into an episode of the show with off-color listings intact. According to *Swing's* photo caption, Schaffer and Berg devised the menu.

A call for comment from the pair and from series producer Castle Rock Entertainment was not immediately returned Tuesday. NBC declined comment. Whether intended as an in-house gag or not, the display's reference to homosexuals tasted sour to some.

"It sounds fairly anti-gay to me and certainly not in keeping with the show's progressive outlook on life," said David Smith, spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign, the nation's largest gay and lesbian political organization.

"At the same time, in the context of that entire menu, it sounds ridiculously juvenile," he said.

"Seinfeld," the No. 1 comedy on television, is wrapping up its nine- season run this May.

"I doubt very seriously there will be protests outside of the 'Seinfeld' set for anti-gay bias," Smith said. "However, it's clearly offensive and juvenile and should be taken down."

Aussie Golfer Says Half LPGA Are Lesbians

SYDNEY — Australian golfer Nicole Lowien says in an opinion piece in the magazine "Golf Australian" that half of the plays in the Ladies Professional Golf Association are lesbians.

"I've got no problem with what I said, none at all," Lowien said later. "I think it needed to be said. I just wanted to give the players' point of view. I don't regret writing it at all."

Lowien described herself as "fully heterosexual" but said, "I think the more open you can be on the subject the better."

Gay Legislator Wants to Repeal Missouri Anti-Sex Law

JEFFERSON, M0 — Acknowledging that its a futile effort, Missouri state Rep. Tim Van Zandt (D-Kansas City), the state's first openly gay lawmaker, has nevertheless introduced a measure that would make homosexual sex legal in private in the state.

Missouri, along with Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Maryland, is one of the states with laws prohibiting same-sex sodomy, and Van Zandt says that outlawing gay sex is simply wrong and discriminatory.

Van Zandt admitted, however, that the chances of the legislature repealing the state's anti-gay-sex law is negligible but said that the issue needed to be debated to illustrate "government being in places it shouldn't be."

Glaxo-Wellcome to Cut AZT Prices in Developing Countries

WASHINGTON, D.C. — British drug manufacturer Glaxo-Wellcome says it will cut the price of the AIDS drug AZT for pregnant women in poor countries in a move it says should help minimize the spread of HIV from mothers to their newborn infants.

Researchers say giving AZT to pregnant women infected with HIV can sharply reduce the risk the infection will be passed on to their babies. But the drug is often not affordable in many developing countries, which account from some 90 percent of the world's AIDS cases.

An AZT treatment for pregnant women, which usually lasts several months, can cost as much as a thousand dollars, health care specialists say. But Glaxo-Wellcome now says the cost will be cut up to 75 percent in developing nations, and that a shorter course of treatment, to be administered only for several weeks before birth, could be as low as just \$50 instead.

Earlier this year, researchers in Thailand reported that a short, 3-week course of treatment with AZT given to pregnant women daily, cut transmission rates by half.

6th Colo. City OKs Gay Rights Measure; Foes Vow Repeal

FT. COLLINS, CO — Ft. Collins became the sixth city in Colorado to pass an anti-bias ordinance when the city council unanimously voted on March 3 to enact the legislation.

But opponents of the new measure, which is slated to take effect March 13, immediately announced they would begin a petition drive to reverse the council's actions and repeal the ordinance.

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"We do not need the ordinance for a lifestyle which I believe is a chosen lifestyle," said Ken Stephens, pastor of the Front Range Baptist Church and a staunch foe of the new measure.

Opponents would have to collect only 1,783 valid signatures of registered voters in the city to force a referendum vote on the measure. Denver, Boulder, Aspen, Telluride and Crested Butte all have similar anti-discrimination protections.

Man Found Guilty in Stalking Steven Spielberg

LOS ANGELES — A jury found ex-convict Jonathan Norman guilty of stalking film producer/director Steven Spielberg. Because Norman has two previous felony convictions, he faces a mandatory sentence under the state's "three strikes" law of 25 years to life in prison.

Norman was charged after he made two attempts to break into Spielberg's home last year and police said he had

Schools and **Universities to Observe National Day of Silence**

Charlottesville, VA — The National Day of Silence, the largest national (US) lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (lgbt) awareness event run by and for youth, will take place on April 8, 1998. Already more than 100 high schools, colleges and universities have signed on to participate.

The first Day of Silence was held at the University of Virginia in April 1996 and has since spread nationwide.

On the National Day of Silence, supporters of lgbt rights take a nine-hour vow of silence (8 a.m. to 5 p.m.) to draw attention to the silence that homophobia causes.

Instead of speaking, participants hand out cards that read: "Please understand my reasons for not speaking today. I support lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender rights. People who are silent today believe that laws and attitudes should be inclusive of people of all sexual orientations. The Day of Silence is to draw attention to those who have been silenced by hatred, oppression, and prejudice. Think about the voices you are not hearing. What can you do to end the silence?"


After the silence hours, organizers hold events to further educate people about homophobia and other LGBT issues.

The National Day of Silence is organized by a volunteer staff of full time students. Jessie Gilliam and Maria Pulzetti, co-chairs of the event, are featured in the "Profile in Courage" in the March issue of Oasis Magazine (www.oasismag.com). They have also been invited to appear as keynote speakers at Youth Pride Day in Washington, D.C. on April 18.

National Day of Silence Co-chair Maria Pulzetti comments, "I have watched this event grow from a first-time event at a conservative university to a national and even international movement of youth working to end homophobia. The strength of this event lies in the fact that it fills a real need for solidarity among youth concerned about lgbt rights. The National Day of Silence is the only national event created and organized by youth. The collective statement we make is staggering.

Presbyterians Again Trying to Decide on Gay Clergy

Louisville, KY — The Presbyterian Church (USA) is once again in the midst of what to many seems like an endless debate over whether or not gays and lesbians can assume leadership roles in the 3.7-million member denomination while remaining sexually active.

Sometime in March, a majority of the denomination's 172 regional bodies or presbyteries will probably have voted to uphold a year-old amendment to the church's governing laws that affirms, once again, the church's refusal to accept non-celibate homosexual clergy and officers.

It is the second time in as many years that the country's largest Presbyterian denomination has debated a 1978 policy, that largely went unenforced. The current issue, however, would add the unwritten policy to the denomination's "Book of Order" and thereby make it an unavoidable obstacle for gays and lesbians in the church.

An amendment, initially approved last year, requires "fidelity within the covenant of marriage of a man and a woman, or chastity in singleness" among ordained ministers, elders and deacons. Since gays and lesbians cannot legally marry in the U.S. now, the amendment effectively amounted to a ban on homosexuals serving as clergy or holding office in the denomination.

The church's presbyteries approved those standards a year ago by a vote of 97-74. But, reflecting the divisive nature of the issue, the actual total votes cast within all the presbyteries were almost evenly divided for and against.

Then, proving that a vote actually settled nothing, the church's governing general assembly in June proposed the softer approach of what is known as Amendment A.

The slight but significant change in the current proposed Amendment A would soften the earlier rule to require instead "fidelity and integrity in marriage or singleness, and in all relationships of life."

The United Church of Christ is the only major Protestant denomination that encourages its 6,100 member churches to be "open and affirming" toward gay clergy and congregants, although only about 220 of its congregations have actually passed affirming declarations to that effect.

But for most denominations, the question is far from settled. The 5.2-million-member Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, for instance, has taken up the debate several times in recent years, yet it remains an ongoing issue of contention within the denomination. A Lutheran clergyman in Iowa had his ordination revoked in February because he believes gays and lesbians should be given a church blessing of their unions. In San Francisco, two ELCA congregations have been expelled for refusing to adhere to the ban on non-celibate gay clergy.

Supporters of the proposed "softer" Presbyterian amendment argue it would allow the denomination to continue examining of the role of gays and lesbians and increase the possibility of reaching a true consensus on what has been a deeply divisive issue.

"It gives our dear church the room and space we need to continue the conversation," argues the Rev. Ted Wardlaw, pastor of Atlanta's Central Presbyterian Church.

But opponents of the softer amendment charge that the change would undermine biblical teachings about sexuality and leave the Presbyterians more or less where they were 20 years ago on the issue — and no closer to consensus.

Theological differences over how literally the Bible should be interpreted is at the heart of much of the debate. But the Rev. Jerry Van Marter, director of the Louisville-based Presbyterian News Service, also sees other forces at work.

"The question is, to what extent does the church become captive to the culture?" said Van Marter. "We're engaged in the same kind of ambivalent struggle over homosexuality as American society at large."

And there's no question that the struggle is keenly watched. The results of the individual presbytery votes are revised almost daily on the church's Internet site.

In early March, Van Marter put the unofficial tally at 83-40 in favor of retaining the stricter "fidelity and chastity" amendment - just four votes

away from the 87 needed for a simple majority. The latest official count stands at 61-30.

Scott Anderson, who is co-moderator of Presbyterians for Lesbian and Gay Concerns and executive director of the California Council of Churches, attributes the likely imminent defeat to "amendment fatigue."

A decade or two ago, those who favored the ordination of non-celibate gay clergy would have been lucky to garner 15 percent of the vote, he believes. That 43 percent of the presbyteries came to their support in 1997 is proof that sentiments have changed, says Anderson, who refuses to be deterred by this year's setback.

"It took the Presbyterian Church 41 years to decide to ordain women," he says, referring to the church's final vote in 1954 on the issue. "We're about 25 years into this discussion. It's going to take a lifetime."

Village People Concert Opposed

KINGSTON, Jamaica — Church leaders are opposing a planned concert by the Village People, saying they shouldn't be allowed to play on Jamaica because they're popular among gays.

Gay sex is illegal in Jamaica, and debate over gay rights has flared recently because of a decision by the government of the nearby Cayman Islands to ban a cruise ship carrying homosexuals from entering its ports.

Jamaica Council of Churches leader Stanley Clarke said the concert at the Negril Music Festival will be an insult to Jamaicans.

"To promote a music festival of that nature which is going to highlight a behavior repugnant to the majority of people in this country is disrespectful," Clarke said.

Ronnie Nasralla, an organizer of the Negril show, said the church group was overreacting.

"(Band members) have never said they are gay," he said. "The Village People capitalized on their popularity in the gay community, that"s all."

Texas Agency to Continue Placing Foster Kids with Gays

ARLINGTON, TX — The child protective services in Texas, the state agency responsible for overseeing placement of children in foster care homes, says it plans to keep placing kids in gay and lesbian homes as long as the individuals are qualified.

"If the legislature takes up the issue, we will follow that direction," said Marleigh Meisner, of agency's regional office, where the question of homosexual foster parents became controversial last year. Otherwise, she said, "We are under no pressure to change our policy."

The statements were made at a news conference where Meisner released the results of an internal investigation into charges that some CPS officials were giving preferential treatment to homosexual foster parents to further a "gay social agenda."

In screening prospective foster parents, Meisner said, caseworkers do not "address sexual orientation," even though the agency prohibits unmarried heterosexual couples from adopting children.

There has been speculation that legislators might attempt to deal with the issue next year.

Teacher Who Described Gay Sex Ordered Reinstated

PIERRE, SD — The South Dakota state supreme court has ruled that Richard Collins must be reinstated as a teacher because the Faith School Board offered no evidence he was incompetent.

Collins, who has been a teach for 29 years in the district, was fired by the school board after he answered a student's question about homosexuality. He said he had been asked by community health nurse who showed a sex education film to answer questions by male students because she believed the boys would be more at least asking a male teacher than a female nurse.

When asked, Collins described male homosexual intercourse frankly. The school trustees heard about his discussion fired Collins, insisting his effectiveness as a teacher had been impaired by the frank talk.

The state's high court, however, disagreed and order Collins reinstated.

British MP Wants Condom

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Machines In Parliment

London — A Liberal-Democrat MP has called for condom machines to be installed in the "social" areas of Britain's parliament. Evan Harris, a former hospital doctor and his party's spokesman on HIV and health education, noted there were no machines on the premises.

"New, younger MPs of both sexes have, probably, brought more sex to parliament. But there is still no condom machine" he told the HIV Alliance's magazine. He said he did not want people to think there was a "whole lot of promiscuity going on ... And I don't want to imply it is happening in Parliament itself ... I just don't think all MPs are celibate. I can't believe it.

"It's surprising that in a place like Westminster where thousands of people socialise, not just MPs but staff as well, that the facility doesn't exist."

He said he thought there was probably a demand. "They wouldn't remain unused."



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Queen gets is equal to the dollars they collect. The participant who raises the most money becomes that year's Possum Queen and is crowned at a final show.

Past Possum Queen's are Jack E. O'gasm, 1997, from the M&M; Dinah Thirst, 1996, of the Ballgame; Althea Later, 1995, representing the Triangle; Wednesday Adams, 1994, sponsored by Club 219; DeeDee, 1993, from the Ballgame; and Victoria Maxwell, 1992, from Triangle bar. Charlotte Lorraine representing M&M Club was the very first Possum Queen in 1991.

"It started as a spontaneous effort in the bars. It's fun and people look forward to it," said Barnett. "Bars are the perfect place to reach out to the community and involve people who don't necessarily fill out a donation envelope but want to donate. We reach the real night owls."

The Possum Queen campaign sprang from a late night discussion in 1991, at the M&M Club, between Charlotte Lorraine and Lizzie Bordeaux. Remembering the "Possum Queen Celebration" featured on The Beverly Hillbillies, Lorraine and Bordeaux thought it would be fun to have a "mock" campaign with candidates parading around in ridiculous costumes to draw attention to their antics. The two organizers also saw it as a great opportunity to involve lots of people in raising money to support services for people with AIDS.

Nelson said that Charlotte Lorraine and Lizzie Bordeaux were brillant in originating the idea for the Possum Queen Campaign. "Great ideas always succeed and with the help of hundreds of supporters this one exceeded everyone's expectations."

"There are so many funny stories," said Barnett. "People have done their fundraising in wild ways. Possum Queen Campaign brings out the creative side of our community." Some of the more creative fundraisers have included mud wrestling outside in the cold and rain, wiener dog races complete with dachshunds wearing race numbers, a chili competition and car washes.

"The Dykes on Bikes Auction where people bid for motorcycle rides and Chicken Bingo were two very popular events," according to Barnett. "For Chicken Bingo a parking lot was turned into a huge grid of squares and people bet on where the chickens would poop. It was outrageous and the Campaign brought in lots of money."

In past years, Possum Queen fundraising has begun on April Fool's Day and run for six weeks. Last year, for the first time the final show was held at Pridefest. For the past several years there has been a Possum Queen float in the Pridefest parade. Barnett and other organizers are looking at the possibility of taking the effort statewide, involving bars in Madison, Green Bay or other communities where volunteers would be enthusiastic. They emphasize that all the money raised goes to AIDS serving organizations and could be designated locally. In Milwaukee money has been con-tributed to ARCW's housing program, dental clinic and food pantry, as well as to the Brady Clinic, St. Camillus' AIDS services and even the Cream City Foundation's grants to AIDS services.

"It doesn't matter if a candidate raises \$10 or \$1,000, what matters is that they care and they have fun," said Barnett. "In 1997 one person raised over \$10,000 and loved every minute of it." The average Possum Queen Candidate raises between \$500 and \$1,000.

The effort has also had its poignant moments. Tommy Polubinski, who as Wednesday Adams was the 1994 Possum Queen, died of AIDS in 1996. His family created the Tommy Polubinski



encountered after experiencing better health from the HIV drug treatments."

The second forum on Wednesday, March 25, "Long-term Effects of Drug Therapies" will help attendees understand the biological mechanisms of HIV and AIDS, how the new drug therapies, particularly the protease inhibitors, work to fight HIV, and the real hope behind the myths and hype of protease inhibitors.

Throughout the six-week series, speakers will include ARCW's Medical Director, Dr. Brian Buggy; Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Representatives; Social Security representatives; ARCW staff attorneys; area clinicians; and other local experts.



Is 'Ellen' Show 'Too Gay' ... or Just Not Funny?

It wasn't particularly surprising when the American Family Association criticized the TV sitcom "Ellen" for being preoccupied with gay issues and that things would have been better "if she'd just had her little coming-out party and then gone back to being a TV show." But it caught everyone a bit offguard when Chastity Bono, the entertainment media director for the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD), was quoted in *Variety* as saying that the program was "too gay" for TV.

"The show is so gay it's excluding a large part of our society. A lot of the stuff on it is somewhat of an inside joke," *Variety* quoted Bono as saying. "It's one thing to have a gay lead character, but it's another when every episode deals with pretty specific gay issues."

The Variety article, of course, immediately became the center of controversy over who said exactly what — and what they meant.

GLAAD issued a press release that tepidly said Bono's remarks represented her own views and not those of the organization and that her comments "were taken out of context."

Bono herself tried to clear things up by saying, "The show is not too gay for me. But we have to be realistic. This is network primetime. When a show treats gay issues over and over again, it becomes 'a gay show,' and the average viewer says,

'Hey, I'm not gay - I'm not going to watch it.'"

And on and on that particular she-said/she-said flap continued.

Ellen DeGeneres, the comic who plays the lead character in the show, may be wondering what's gone wrong.

Less than a year ago, 36 million Americans tuned in to watch what was probably the most spectacular coming-out since Cinderella showed up at the ball. The event was so hyper-hyped that it landed DeGeneres on the cover of *Time* magazine.

Since those heady days, however, ABC-TV has moved "Ellen" to a later time slot so fewer children would likely see the program. Then the network began prefacing episodes with TV warning notices, advising viewers they might be disturbed by the content - the sort of thing that usually is reserved for violent cops-and-robbers shows or programs about IV drug abuse in preschools.

Now, the show's ratings have plunged to around 10 million viewers and the star openly talks about the program being canceled by nervous executives at ABC-TV who've never been comfortable with a "gay show." And while the official word at the network is that no decision has yet been made about the future of "Ellen," unofficially the program is dead and buried. DeGeneres herself has all but read the show's last rites.

At a recent Los Angeles Gay and Lesbian Center banquet at the Beverly Hilton Hotel, DeGeneres said, "They may have won because we're not coming back and they have the power to cancel us."

Ironically, DeGeneres herself has said almost the same thing that Bono said about the program's problems. Before the *Variety* interview stirred up such a flap, DeGeneres said, "I'm gay, the character's gay, and that's the problem everyone has with the show — it's just too controversial."

What DeGeneres and others are disocovering is that coming out may be a whole lot easier than staying out — and staying on TV.

Although the vast majority of people in this country now doubtless believe that "Ellen" marks the first openly gay lead in a television series, that distinction probably belongs to Tony Randall's lead character in "Love, Sidney," the 1981-83 NBC show. But "Love, Sidney" was up to its eyeballs in coyness and was mercifully yanked after its second season proved even more demure than its first.



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But there may be another explanation. As a comedy, "Ellen" just isn't very funny and it never was.

The party line that a lot of people have been trying to promote is that if ABC cancels the program it will be the network's homophobia pure and simple in killing a "hit" comedy. The problem is the show's ratings were in serious trouble before the character Ellen Morgan came out. Before the "Puppy Episode" when all was revealed, "Ellen" was in 35th place in the TV ratings and was sinking - not because of homophobia, but simply because it wasn't a very funny show.

The 36 million people who tuned in for the coming out "Puppy Episode" wasn't the audience "Ellen" normally drew in and was about double the usual number of viewers following months of ultra-hype about the program. ABC was quick to catch on to the value of the wink-wink/nudge-nudge promotion and, even though regular advertisers like Chrysler, General Motors and Windy's canceled their spots that night, the network was busy selling ads for the episode at double its usual rate.

But as one perceptive critic asked before the much-hyped April 1997 episode, "Will coming out make her funny?"

Apparently not. Some 5 million fewer people now watch "Ellen" than watch the "Drew Carey Show," which precedes it on ABC. The show's ratings have quickly sunk back into yawnsville and Matt Roush, a critic with *TV Guide*, speaking of "Ellen" recently said, "I was hoping that maybe after she came out, she'd move to San Francisco and find funnier friends."



Domestic Bliss

Dear Editor:

Milwaukee's attempt to give domestic partner benefits to City employees was shot down because it was originally based on sexual orientation, and that was very rightly deemed discriminatory. The predicted high cost of allowing unmarried heterosexual couples into the program gave politicians a chance to kill it without seeming anti-gay.


Now, Ross Perot is thinking of killing a domestic partner benefits program at his company because it is "unfair" to heterosexual unmarried couples. In California, the City of Oakland is litigating a number of complaints because its domestic partners benefit program excludes heterosexual couples.

Those advocating domestic partner benefit programs should not be trying to limit them to same sex couples. The argument usually offered for doing so is that heterosexual couples have the right to marry, and therefore don't need domestic partner benefits.

If the root problem is that gays can't marry, then let all these domestic partner programs be reformatted to address the root problem : the inability to marry. Remove all language regarding sexual orientation from domestic partner programs, and instead require that those applying for benefits must have been denied a marriage license.

Anyone claiming domestic partner benefits should be willing to marry his or her partner in order to receive those benefits. Those not willing to marry shouldn't be claiming benefits, which should be restricted to those willing but not allowed to marry.

All who do the same work should be entitled to the same compensation for their work. Unmarried employees should



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be entitled to receive the same benefits as their fellow employees. It's simple: if they do the same work, they should receive the same pay, including benefits.

Those who are discriminated against and denied a license to marry should be entitled to benefits for their partners, just as those legally married receive benefits for their partners. Making domestic partner benefits contingent on denial of the right to marry is the way to provide them without discriminating against anyone.

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

Behind the Claims of Cures

heir claims of "curing" homosexuals raise hackles among civil rights activists and mental health professionals alike, but the oncequiescent "ex-gay" ministries say they're now on a roll and growing by leaps and bounds at churches around the country as the national battle over lesbian and gay rights spreads throughout the country and grows more intense.

Just over two decades old, the loose network of ex-gay ministries that was

"All I've seen of exgay ministries is disassertions of such large numbers or evidence of therapeutic successes. In fact, the American Psychological Association, in a survey of the "reparative therapies" touted by the exgay ministries, concludes: "No scientific evidence exists to support the effectiveness of any of the conversion therapies that try to change sexual orientation."

Underscoring the APA's scientific assessment are some high-profile cases of individuals who have been involved in the ex-gay movement and proved to be stunning failures at being "cured" — including the two men who started Exodus, Gary Busse and Michael Cooper.

After working closely together to promulgate the dubious gospel of Exodus for a few years, spread in pamphlets with titles like "Unhappy and gay? Join the Exodus," Busse and Cooper finally admitted to each other and to themselves that they had fallen in love, renounced the movement, and started preaching tolerance and self-acceptance instead. Busse and Cooper, whose story served as the core of the 1993 film "One Nation Under God" about various attempts by the religious right and the heterosexual medical establishment to "cure" homosexuality, became in fact the best-known "former ex-gays" and a major embarrassment of the movement spearheaded by Exodus. In talking about Exodus, Busse and Cooper said such "ex-gay" organizations have done little except appropriate the psy-chobabble terminology of other fashionable therapies - calling themselves a "recovery movement," for example - while actually doing little more than peddling Victorian values and the most restrictive and authoritarian kinds of gender stereotyping. At their most absurd, the two men said, these groups suggest that what gay men really ought need to do is play football and that a good manicure and some makeup will set lesbians "straight." It would, Busse, Cooper and others agree, all be hysterically funny if it weren't so destructive. "These groups prey on people who are unhappy," Cooper said. "What they can't see or won't admit is that the groups are themselves the source of this very unhappiness they claim to be treating."

They're not alone in this assessment. Bryant Welch, director for professional practice at the American Psychological Association, says of the "ex-gay" ministries, "Efforts to 'repair' homosexuals are nothing more than social prejudice garbed in psychological accouterments. [It] can do more damage to a person's psyche than good. and went back into the lifestyle — so what is that our fault? People come to us of their own free will."

Davies, in fact, claims Exodus is a tremendous success — sort of — although the organization refuses to allow any independent confirmation of its data and even though some of the group's claims don't seem to add up.

According to Davies, Exodus in 1990 had counseled more than 100,000 people nationally, for example. With 62 ministries then in the U.S. for the past 20 years, that means each ex-gay ministry would have had to counsel an average of at least 80 people a year. Yet Davies also says that just 41 people completed the ex-gay program during the five-year period from 1982 to 1987 at the organization's Northern California ministry — one of its largest — where he is based.

Equally problematic is any attempt to evaluate the success of ex-gay ministries since "success" is variously defined as changing homosexuals into heterosexuals or as simply eliminating any sexual behavior at all.

Exodus claims — but again refuses to allow any professional review of its records — that 70 percent of the lesbians and gay men who complete its year-long program are either celibate or living as heterosexuals. Its only long-term figures, however, are less impressive and indicate that less than 30 percent have stopped all homosexual behavior five years after completing the program. Seven years after entering the program, Exodus' figures indicate that just 3 percent are "successful heterosexuals" — an unimpressive result by any therapeutic standard.

For those who have to help the 70 percent to 97 percent who fail to achieve the "American heterosexual dream," the ex-gay ministries that are hell-bent on changing homosexuals are more like a nightmare.

The Rev. John Barbone of the Metropolitan Community Church in Kansas City says the people he has counseled after going through an ex-gay ministry are worse off because of the programs rather than better, including individuals who have become so desperate they've ended up verging on suicide.

"The [ex-gays] that I've worked with are dealing with tremendous guilt," Bar-

They do a lot of confrontational shouting, saying the person will go to hell. It can cause future need for psychiatric help."

It is, activists and mental health professionals warn, this kind of guilt-based approach that caused Jack McIntyre, who had enrolled in Love in Action, an Exodus program in Northern California, to commit suicide. "No matter how much I prayed and tried to avoid the temptation, I continually failed," McIntyre wrote only days before he took his own life. "It is this constant failure that has made me make the decision to terminate my life. But John Evans, one of the founders of Love in Action who now repudiates the organization, says it wasn't McIntyre's failure that was the problem but the ministry itself. McIntyre "wanted desperately to reconcile his spiritual side with his sexual side," Evans says. "I spent the last day of his life with him. He said he tried, but he couldn't. He would be alive today if he realized that God loved him as he was. All I've seen of exgay ministries is disappointment, suicide, tragedy. I know of no one who has been changed. No one is ever cured. Officials with Exodus ministries flatly reject any responsibility in such cases.

Today, evangelicals claim there are "hundreds" of ex-gay groups in the U.S., many of them unconnected with Exodus or any other groups, dragging lesbians and gay men from their "disordered life-style" into the pure light of heterosexual living by the tens of thousands.

The problem, most activists and social scientists agree, is that groups like Exodus and the other "ex-gay" ministries offer little or nothing to back up any of their

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



egend has it that King Louis XIV of France kept a prisoner hidden in the Bastille, his face enshrouded in iron. No one really knew who the poor guy was, but Alexandre Dumas turned that story into the classic adventure yarn *The Man in the Iron Mask*.

Unfortunately, time which could have been better spent exploring how the Man in Iron Mask was able to emotionally survive his six year prison ordeal, is spent instead on stock, period-piece flourishes.

We are treated to several pointless shots of Musketeers racing on horseback through Paris' cobblestone back alleys. We see dark, dank palace basements and dungeons looking as though the set designer used EuroDisney's "Pirates of the Carribean" for

brother Philippe) in the first post-Titanic test of his box office muscle.

The movie opens in 1660. Louis XIII has died and his merciless son sits on the throne in frivolous splendor while his people starve. The Three Musketeers who once loyally served his father are now collecting on their 501(k) plans, with the exception of d'Artagnan (Byrne), who serves as captian of the King's Musketeers. He stays at Louis' side, protecting him from assassins. He still has the grand swordsmanship of a great Musketeer, and even quells a Paris riot by dramatically shiskabobing a rotten tomato thrown by starving French citizens.

Athos (John Malkovich) lives the simple life, raising his son Raoul, Porthos (Gérard Depardieu), rounded at the middle, still eats lustily of life, though he misses the great battles of the past, and Armis (Jeremy Irons) has followed his faith and become a priest.

Only Depardieu is semi-delightful as the aging clown Porthos, who treats us to a pointless suicidal nude scene. The remaining Musketeers are stiff and dull. An overserious Malkovich fails to crack a smile or even a wink, and Jeremy Irons masterminds a paint-by-numbers plot to overthrow the evil King Louis, but more on that later.

Louis is a king of one night stands, who callously discards women once he's bedded them. On the palace grounds during an afternoon pig chase (that's right ... a pig chase), he spies young woman Christine, and moves her to the top of his "must boink" list. In an amazing coincidence, she turns out to be the fiancee of Athos' son, Raoul (Peter Sarsgaard), a young soldier. The king promptly dispatches Raoul to the front to fight the Dutch and meet certain death. Boy, is Malkovich pissed. Clearly, the King's tyranny must be stopped and France saved. The solution is hidden in the Bastille, in an iron mask. Athos, Aramis and Porthos (Depardieu) hatch a plan to replace the evil king with his twin brother. Standing in their way is d'Artagnan, who has a more personal agenda. Leonardo DiCaprio is clearly miscast as the evil young King Louis, a role that could have just as easily been executed by Jaye Davison (The Crying Game). DiCaprio drowns in gold trimmed, velvet costumes, and comes off as petty and spoiled, rather than truly pernicious or evil. I won't even go into the Marsha Brady hair-do or his Paula Cole impression.

The plot lumbers along with predicable, stiff twists and turns and even stiffer dialog. The Grand Masked Ball — at which Prince Philippe makes his palace debut — should have been the emotional, and cinematic climax of the film, and instead turns out to be a lightly attended

affair with rental costumes and only minor suspense and intrigue. After that, the film manages to limp along for another 20 minutes to an implausible finalé.

Randall Wallace, who wrote the screenplay for *Braveheart*, makes his directorial debut with *The Man in the Iron Mask*, which he also scripted. His work here, makes me appreciate — even more — the finely honed directorial genius of Mel Gibson.

According to the latest Hollywood gossip, Leo[nardo] will boycott next week's Oscar Awards in response to being snubbed by the Academy for his performance in *Titanic*. I suggest he's thinking of staying away to avoid the embarrassment of *The Man in the Iron Mask*.



The Venice Adriana by Ethan Mordden

f you love Venice, opera, and Maria Callas (not necessarily in that order), you'll love this new novel by Ethan Mordden. "The Venice Adriana marks yet another high point in Mordden's long and distinguished writing career." You may remember Mordden as a respected and expert commentator on opera and musical theater, or many of you may remember him as the creator of the popular "Buddies" series of gay fiction (Some Men Are Lookers was reviewed in In Step, June/July '97).

With this novel, Mordden combines his knowledge of both opera and gay life to create the fascinating story of Adriana Grafanas, "in whose character some might find a *slight* resemblance to reallife opera legend Maria Callas." This is the story of a young writer from New



York who is sent to Venice to (ghost) write the life of a Greek-American opera singer. The time is 1962, and Mark Trigger is out, but not in the way we are today. He struggles with being accepted for what he is - a human being who happens to be attracted to men. We're still struggling with that one!

Adriana Granfanas is "the superstar of her generation, her concerts are sold out for months in advance, her affairs are the stuff of headlines, her temper tantrums and cancellations are legendary." Trigger worships and adores this opera star and she, in her way, loves and trusts him with her life story ... sort of. But much remains hidden; it is Trigthe job of teaching Vieri English in his spare time; things eventually heat up between the two of them.


Granfanas' voice is failing, her reviews are horrible. She is sure everyone hates her--and a lot of people--do including the press. To rectify this, she has decided to make a movie, "The House of Atreus," with Giampalo Ercolani, an avant-guarde filmmaker famous for "his bits of rough, his rent boys". There's lots of fun here, especially during the filming of the movie, and later at a party when an American journalist gets nasty with Adriana and she decks him while the TV cameras are rolling.

Ercolani is accompanied by a sidekick referred to only as "lo Scenarista." He's a really ostentatious queen who wouldn't say shit if he had a mouthful. There is also a muscled American cowboy actor, of the Steve Reeves ilk, named Dave Ryatt, who gets into some interesting positions - I think he calls it double-dipping - with lo Scenarista. That whole chapter is a romp in the hay.

In the course of his search for the truth about Granfanas, Mark interviews lots of people and gets lots of conflicting stories. He meets and has a continuing affair with Hugh Drummond, the English representative from Adiana's record company. Mark goes to Greece and spends an afternoon with Adriana's psychoanalyst brother. Later he meets her voice teacher, Gilda da Conservo, who is very old and addled. She is attended by her maid who keeps slipping her spoonfuls of medications which she calls elixirs.

The book's title comes from an elusive bootleg recording of Granfanas singing the title role in Cilea's Ardiana Lecouvreur which was made in Venice in 1949. Mark goes to see a music collector in Rome, who turns out to be an American from Brooklyn; he's 50ish, has peestained trousers and smells bad. The tape he ends up getting in trade is a fake. Finding this tape recording becomes an obsession for Trigger, and eventually it literally falls into his hands.


This book fascinated me with it's full-blown characters and wonderful descriptions. We get to visit different parts of Venice, ride the vaparetto, and later, visit Rome, Pisa and Greece. There's lots of opera, names of opera divas, and references to who's who and who's not in that musical community. "With a plot that twists, turns and wraps around itself, Mordden brings the word Diva fully to life in this seductive story of the woman who defined opera for the world." It's great fun. I loved it. 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ger's job to sort through the legends, find out who the real Adriana Granfanas is, and to write the book.

Mark Trigger stays at Adriana's Venice home while he gathers material for the proposed book, and busies himself with organizing her press clippings. There are also some other people in residence, including Adriana's current lover, a hunky Greek film star named Nik Acropoli (Nik is sure he's Hollywood bound). There's a rather repuilsive character referred to as the "Gossip," who decamps and moves on to a Princess). And, finally there is Adriana's devoted housekeeper Deodota, who will give out no information on Granfanas--at all.

In the buildings surrounding the "giardano segredo" live Siora Varin, her aged, toothless mother, and Il Professore, who has the most "implausibly hand-some chap" named Vieri living with him. Il Professore passes Vieri off as his nephew, but Mark knows better and is instantly smitten with him. He is given
