



White to Appear at Anti-Gay Rally ABC Cancels

Ypsilanti, MI (AP) — Green Bay Packers lineman Reggie White, whose denouncement of gays during a speech to the Wisconsin State Assembly last month gained headlines nationwide, is coming to Ypsilanti, Michigan for a rally opposing the city's new non-discrimination ordinance.

White will join Alveda Celeste King, niece of slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, as well as gospel singers Debbie and Angie Winans for the April 30 rally.

The event, titled "Upholding Christian Values," is free and will take place at the Eastern Michigan University's Pease Auditorium.

The Rev. Levon Yuille, pastor of the Bible Church in Ypsilanti, said he hopes the rally will help others understand the message of groups that oppose the ordinance.

"I'm thinking that it will crystallize what we are trying to say. These people who are speaking all represent traditional Christian values," Yuille said. "Reggie White most certainly will be appealing to many young folk; and Alveda Celeste King will reach individuals whose attention we might not ordinarily get.'

The rally will benefit Citizens Opposing Special Treatment and the Ministers' Alliance of Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and Vicinity. Both groups oppose the ordinance.

On May 5, voters in Ypsilanti will go to the polls to determine the future of the ordinance, which would provide anti-discrimination protection based on 14 characteristics, including sexual orientation.

The ordinance, which was adopted by City Council in December, was suspended in January, after opponents collected enough petition signatures to force a ref-

During a March 25 speech before Wisconsin legislators, he said that homosexuals should not compare their situation to those of African Americans and other minorities.

"Homosexuality is a decision, it's not a race," he said. "People in all different ethnic situations live this lifestyle. But people from all different ethnic backgrounds also are liars and cheaters and

malicious and backstabbing."

Beth Bashert, co-chairwoman for the Campaign for Equality, a group that supports the Ypsilanti ordinance, said she was surprised that White was chosen to speak

'The press and overall response that he got to the things he said were so negative. He was completely inappropriate in his assessment of many different peoples. I didn't know that he would be perceived as a favorable speaker for this kind of event," she said.

Bashert said it's difficult to determine what impact, if any, the rally would have on undecided voters.

Our efforts have been focused on getting the votes of people who can see the forest for the trees, who can see that discrimination is wrong, and who will vote to keep discrimination out of our city," she said.

'Ellen' Sitcom

Los Angeles - "Ellen," the television sitcom that was the first with a gay leading character, has been canceled after five seasons.

The ABC show will not return for a sixth season, an network spokeswoman said last Thursday, declining further

The program became the subject of national debate when Ellen, played by comedian Ellen DeGeneres, announced her sexual orientation a year ago. Since then, however, the show's ratings have

been disappointing.

This year, "Ellen" averaged fewer than 11 million viewers, a 22 percent drop over the previous year.

The sitcom made its debut in 1994 with DeGeneres' character, Ellen Morgan, playing a young heterosexual. But the actress and her character both came out as lesbians last season.

DeGeneres and the network have since disagreed over the show's content, including whether a kiss between women could be aired.

More than 36 million people watched the April 30, 1997, episode



when Ellen revealed her sexual orientation, making it one of the most viewed moments in television history

But the episode and the series' content brought criticism from groups like the 15 million-member Southern Baptist Convention. The group urged members to boycott the Walt Disney Co., which produces the show and owns ABC, for its 'gay friendly" policies.

Joan Garry, executive director of the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, said the cancellation was a disappointment but not a surprise.

We're all disappointed ABC made a decision based on ratings. We really wish that they had seriously considered the impact of Ellen's work and looked at it from a broader perspective," she said.

The show may have been canceled, but I think she gave a gift to gay and straight Americans and that's a legacy that the cancellation cannot take from her," Garry said.

The show's one-hour finale is scheduled for May 13 and will take viewers through a satirical retrospective of her career. Guest stars will include Jennifer Aniston, Glenn Close and Phil Donahue.

Administration Extolls Needle Exchanges, **But Refuses Funding**

Washington, D.C. — AIDS activists, researchers and even congressional Democrats accused the Clinton Administration of "a lack of political will" and of "public health malpractice" for its decision Monday, April 20, not to permit federal funding for needle-exchange programs while agreeing with researchers that such needle swaps help prevent the spread of HIV without encouraging illegal drug use.

Donna Shalala, Clinton's Secretary of Health and Human Services, would have had the authority to authorize federal funding after a 10-year congressional ban, if she was convinced that such needle exchanges met both criteria of fighting new HIV infections without promoting illegal drug abuse.

Following more than a year of research studies of needleswap programs around the country that uniformly had all concluded they help stem the spread of the virus and didn't lead to increased drug abuse, Shalala impaneled a commission of public health experts and researchers to evaluate the studies.

The panel produced a 300-page report that concluded the

inevitable: needle exchanges work.

But the White House had apparently already decided on its course of action before receiving the panel's review and less than an hour after meeting with the commission and receiving its report, Shalala issued a lengthy press release praising the effectiveness of needle exchanges. In the same press release Shalala said the administration would not authorize spending federal funds to support the programs, however.

In the news release, Shalala said, "A meticulous scientific review has now proven that needle exchange programs can reduce the transmission of HIV and save lives without losing ground in their fight against AIDS." The release also said that "recent findings have strengthened the scientific evidence that needles exchange programs do not encourage the use of illegal drugs.

But with no explanation, Shalala simply said that there would be no federal funds made available for the programs and that the administration had "decided that the best course at this time is to have local communities use their own dollars to fund needle exchange programs."

Reaction to the surprising administration move among many supporters of needle exchanges was largely one of stunned disbelief and anger.

Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-San Francisco), who had been one

of the congressional leaders most pressuring the administration to end the funding ban, said it "defies logic to determine a program's efficacy, and then not fund the program — especially in the middle of an epidemic." The visibly angry Pelosi said the decision showed "a lack of political will in the midst of a public health emergency."

Daniel Zingale, head of the AIDS Action Council, said, "This is like acknowledging the world is not flat, then refusing

to fund Columbus' voyage.

When the news of the administration's decision broke at a global conference on HIV prevention going on at the University of California-San Francisco, Dr. Thomas Coates, the director of UCSF's AIDS Research Institutes, pounded his fists on a table where the news was being discussed. He accused Shalala of "public health malpractice" for concluding that needle exchanges "help save lives refusing to fund them.

When news reports in mid-April indicated that the administration was poised to end the funding ban, conservative lawmakers and right-wing organizations moved quickly to threaten both a congressional fight as well as election campaign battles if the White House tried to fund the needle exchanges.

Sen. Paul Coverdell (R-Ga.) introduced legislation the day Shalala made her announcement which would prevent the administration from ever providing federal funds for the

open their own needle exchange programs even as the federal government ducks for cover."

Lurie criticized President Clinton, saying the decision "made a mockery of the administration's purported commitment to HIV prevention. Republicans showed they were willing to play hardball, and the administration has never been able to take a principled stand on this issue when faced with a possible political fallout."

Doug Nelson, executive director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, (ARCW) called on Shalala to resign adding, "In Wisconsin, Shalala's decision is a lost opportunity to save lives. Applying only ten percent of the state's \$2.4 million in federal AIDS prevention funds to needle exchange would reach all of the drug users at risk for HIV. Shalala's decision means that without this federal financial support we will lose hundreds of lives in Wisconsin to AIDS"



More Same-Sex Harassment Complaints at Work

San Francisco - Early in March, the U.S. Supreme court unanimously ruled that the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits sexual harassment at the workplace, even when the individuals involved are of the same gender.

That ruling came in a lawsuit by Joseph Oncale, a Louisiana man who charged that he was sexually harassed and menaced by a male supervisor and two other male co-workers during his employment on an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico.

Attorneys for Sundowner Offshore Services, operators of the oil rig and Oncale's employer at the time, argued that the behavior was just male "locker-room horseplay" and that the Civil Rights Act of 1964 didn't cover such behavior involving members of the same sex.

But the Supreme Court justices said in the fairly short seven-page ruling that the act does apply in cases where the harasser and victim are the same gender. The ruling reinstated Oncale's suit and ordered a rehearing of the case.

But before that suit could even be scheduled for a rehearing, at least two new same-gender sexual harassment suits have been filed - and allegations involving a college women's basketball coach may well lead to another.

This sudden "rush" of same-gender sexual harassment accusations may simply be a blip following in the wake of the high court's ruling. But some civil rights advocates say the workplace harassment may simply have been there all along and is only now getting its day in court because of the publicity surrounding the decision by the justices.

In the most recent suit, Roger Mele charges that his former boss at KOFY-TV in San Francisco groped him, made obscene sexual suggestions and humiliated him in front of coworkers in what amounted to sexual harassment where he

Mele is seeking \$1 million in damages from KOFY owner Jim Gabbert. The suit will also be closely watched because, unlike Oncale's lawsuit where all the men involved said they were heterosexual, Gabbert and Mele are both open-

According to court documents in the case, Mele claims Gabbert showed up on Halloween in 1991, shortly after Mele started working at the TV station, wearing the kind of safety belt engineers wear when working on a transmission tower. Mele claims Gabbert buckled the belt around both of them and made a sexual suggestion in front of several other staff

Mele also charges that Gabbert had at other times grabbed his crotch and tried to fondle him.

Gabbert's attorney flatly denies the accusations and said Mele was simply trying "to get money for himself one way or another" and that "boyfriends and coworkers" of Mele will testify in the case that "these are vicious lies.'

Earlier in April, thirteen members of the San Francisco Giants farm team filed a federal lawsuit charging one of the professional baseball team's scouts sexually harassed them. The players are asking for \$1 million in total damages.

The suit charges that Luis Rosa, a 52year-old scout who has worked as a baseball scout for 21 years with a number of major league teams, made sexual remarks to the players as well as unwanted "sexual advances to which the penalty for refusal was suspension or termination" at the Giants' farm team headquarters in the Dominican Republic.

The Giants' management says it began investigating the players' complaints in 1997 and put Rosa on unpaid leave at the time. Rosa formally resigned from the Giants last year. He denied the accusations and said the farm team players were seeking vengeance against him because they "just weren't good enough to be major league players.

The third case, which is being investigated by school officials but has not yet led to any legal action, arose when four players at the University of Southern Colorado women's basketball team abruptly quit, charging that head coach Sherry Winn and assistant coach Lynne Fitzgerald had spread rumors that the players were lesbians in an attempt to get them "to adopt her gay lifestyle.

The four former players — Kristy Dufec, Carol Hayes, Timmy-Jo Miller and Heather Ludwick - allege that Winn and Fitzgerald spread the rumors in what amounted to a "campaign of sexual harassment.

When the charges first broke, Winn said only that the four players, who are among the team's top scorers, were lying and that she felt "total shock and disbe-

lief" at the allegations.

But Cynthia Goldstein of the Human Rights Commission in San Francisco says charges of same-gender sexual harassment aren't all that unusual. Some of the complaints the commission receives involve heterosexuals who feel sexually pressured or harassed by homosexuals at work, she says, but most samegender complaints the commission receives are gays or lesbians complaining that gay and lesbian supervisors at work are sexually harassing them.

"San Francisco has a large and visible lesbian and gay community," Goldstein said, "with many holding positions of authority in businesses here, and there are a lot of gay- and lesbian-owned companies in the city. As a result, there's probably more opportunity for situations that may be workplace sexual harassment to arise."

Goldstein said, however, that the number of same-gender harassment complaints it receives is "pretty much in proportion" to the size of the city's estimated gay and lesbian population compared to the heterosexual population.

What is new, she says, is that there's a growing willingness of gays and lesbians to talk about this sort of workplace harassment more than there ever was in the past.

"With the [Supreme] court ruling," Goldstein said, "we probably will see more same-gender harassment complaints because it seems to have a certain 'media novelty value.' But in fact there's nothing really new about these sorts of complaints. We just haven't had such a powerful legal resource available as the federal Civil Rights Act until now."

Gingrich Speech Banned at Catholic University

Washington, D.C. - Officials of the Catholic University of America refused to allow Can-



dace Gingrich, sister of House Speaker Newt Gingrich, to speak on campus last week despite the fact that she was invited by the Rev. Robert M. Friday, vice president for student life, and the university's Organization for Lesbian and Gay Student Rights.

"Religious disagreements do not justify suppression of free speech," said Elizabeth Birch, HRC executive director. "Apparently, administrators at Catholic University do not have enough faith in their students to allow them to hear different points of view. The students at the university are the big losers today."

Gingrich, who is HRC's associate manager of the National Coming Out Project, said she is disappointed that she was prevented from talking to the students.

"I'm surprised that this happened in our nation's capital, where major issues are freely debated every day," she said. "Catholic University has sent the message that they choose to be an island of ignorance in a sea of free speech."

In a one-paragraph state-ment, Catholic University President Brother Patrick Ellis, F.S.C. said. "I have concluded that the presentation could not be compatible with the Catholic identity of the Catholic University of

Ellis's statement contradicts the university's history of occasionally inviting speakers whose views are in opposition to those of the Roman Catholic church. These guests have included

speakers who favored abortion rights and supporters of the death penalty.

The decision sparked disagreement from some students and faculty members.


"My understanding was that Gingrich was going to speak about what life was like as a gay person in America," Friday told the Human Rights Campaign. "I do not think what she was going to say was incompatible with the Catholic identity or the university. This is a place where diverse points of view should be heard and the students can make up their own minds."

The school's decision follows a letter written earlier in the week by representatives of Graduates For Life, an anti-abortion student group, who asked the university president to rescind Gingrich's invitation. The letter said that Gingrich's message "directly contradicts the truth of Catholic moral doctrine.'

Gingrich's speech however, was not going to focus on religion, but on her own personal experiences as a spokesperson for the Human Rights Campaign. She has given similar talks at colleges and universities across the country, but this was the first time she was forbidden to speak at a university.

Judge Upholds S.F. Partners Law — But Not for Airlines

OAKLAND - In a complex ruling, U.S. District Court Judge Claudia Wilken ruled that San Francisco's landmark domestic partners law is valid, while limiting what kinds of businesses it can be applied to.

The San Francisco ordinance, which went into effect last year, requires firms that do business with the city to extend the same or comparable kinds of benefits to the domestic partners of their employees that they offer to the spouses of married couples.

But the Air Transport Association, prompted by United Airlines and Federal Express, challenged the ordinance in court. Attorneys for the association argued that the industry is federally regulated, and therefore local laws are preempted by federal authority.

Judge Wilken effectively agreed with the association's argument and ruled that the city cannot impose the regulation on the airlines industry because of it is federally

At the same time, Judge Wilken also ruled that the city ordinance is legal and that the law can in fact be applied to companies doing business with the city other than air carries, such as United and Federal Express. Legal experts said it is the first time that a federal court has actually ruled on the legal status of domestic partner-

Ironically, both sides in the case claimed they had won. The city says some 3,600 businesses have already complied with the new law.

More Protests in Caribbean Over Gay/Lesbian Cruises

NASSAU — Hundreds of people in the Bahamas staged a protest when a cruise ship carrying lesbian holidaymakers docked at the capital. The demonstrators from a group called "Save the Bahamas" screamed and chanted as the women came ashore.

Waving placards and chanting "No gay ships", the protesters greeted the arrival of the cruise liner SS Seabreeze, which had sailed from Miami with about 800 mainly female passengers on board.

The anti-gay group is campaigning for stricter laws on sodomy and is demanding a ban on gay and lesbian cruise ships visiting the island nation. Their members paced the wharf and shouted through loudspeakers "Keep your perversions in your bedrooms!"

The cruise was chartered by California-based Olivia Travel, a tour company that specializes in trips for lesbian and bisexual women. The company has organized 10 cruises to the Bahamas without incident, according to its travel representative, Judy Dlugacz.

In January, the Cayman Islands refused permission for a ship carrying hundreds of gay men to dock there. The action led to a stern rebuke from Britain, the islands' colonial ruler, and the Bahamian government later welcomed the ship, despite objections from religious groups.

In fact, Hubert Ingraham, Prime Minister of the Bahamas, has said his country will not discriminate against gay tourists.

Women's Basketball Players Charge Coach with Harassment



HUNOTIONLY BOCK IN BOLL

rom Elvis' pelvis to spicy Spice Girls, sex has been a conspicuous component of modern pop and rock music. And like other public figures — actors, writers politicians and so on — the off-stage lives of musicians have been as much an object of curiosity as their on-stage antics.

One of the first rockers to use this interest was Jim Morrison, the 1960s singer/songwriter/poet who studied filmmaking at the University of California at Los Angeles before forming The Doors, one of the most popular and influential bands of the era. Morrison had the dubious distinction of being the first major rock star to be arrested on obscenity charges during a performance.

Morrison, a kind of daredevil Liberace of the Love Generation hippie circus (minus the candelabra and rhinestone tuxedos), made his bisexuality an open secret. At a concert in Philadelphia, when crazed fans of both sexes rushed the stage on his appearance, remarked, "That's what I love about Philly — the guys rush the stage just like the chicks."

Despite his seeming openness and his leather-clad, bee-stung-lipped boyish flirta-

tion with both men and women in the audience, it remained several years after his death in 1971 before his bisexuality was actually written about. Morrison was one of the first rockers to use (consciously or intuitatively) his indiscriminate sexuality as a way of increasing his potential number of fans — without doing anything quite as messy as actually coming out.

He would not, as the recent misadventures of George Michael clearly show, be

In discussing his arrest, Michael told CNN that he had kept his sexuality ambiguous partly for professional reasons because a "borderline" performer can have a wider audience. "My sexuality was not cut and dry," the singer said.

Other performers before Michael, of course, incorporated their own sexual ambiguity into their on-stage personnas. David Bowie, the Kinks, T-Rex and Mick Jagger of the Rolling Stones all toyed with androgyny and Bowie and Jagger have both been described as bisexual. But they did not themselves publicly acknowledge anything.

Freddie Mercury of the British group Queen actually said he was bisexual at the height of the group's career without any apparent impact on Queen's popularity. But he made the acknowledgement only after he learned he was infected with HIV, the virus that eventually led to his death.

Unlike this pattern of quasi-silence or coming out in crisis, the late Kurt Cobain of Nirvana not only acknowledged his own bisexuality without any particular pressure to do so, his in-your-face attitude about his sexuality led to a slew of rock bands with members who, like Cobain, began appearing on stage in dresses.

Boy George, the quintessential '80s pop music star, made provocative play with gender a hallmark of his group Culture Club. But until his gender-bending career turned into a train wreck of heroin addiction, newspaper scandals and two close friends overdosing, Boy George remained technically in the closet. To his credit, the cleaning-up process he went through in the mid-1980s included not only facing his own substance abuse troubles, but also an honest acknowledgement



of his own homosexuality.

Another rocker — indeed one of the mega-stars of music - underwent a somewhat similar clean-up process. And there are arguably other similarities between the ex-Culture Club singer and Elton John.

But while Boy George's career as a headliner appears to be virtually over, John's career seems to have reemerged from a kind of torpor into a renewed vitality since he began dealing with his addiction problems — and came out.

tion problems — and came out.

One of rock's most flamboyant performers, John has been sobered in more ways than one by several years of rough times. He lives more quietly and simply, he rarely goes out to parties now, and his Elton John AIDS Foundation — to which he donates all profits from his singles has raised millions of dollars to provide care and education in battling the epidemic. His revised version of "Candle in the Wind" in honor of his friend Princess Diana now ranks as the all-time top-selling single record in history, and recognized for his contributions to British culture, he is now Sir Elton John, an honorary member of the Royal Academy of Music, an Officer of Arts and Letters in France, and a member of America's Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame.

Now 51 years old, John is experiencing a popularity with a new generation of fans, many of whom weren't even born when his songs started making the Top 40 charts year after year.

But male pop stars have generally been cautious about coming out — and some, like George Michael, have come out only after being more or less forced out by some unavoidable scandal. And one of pop's biggest stars, when named in a sex scandal a few years ago, responded instead simply by getting hastily married and adopting a much lower public profile.

Lesbian pop/rock stars have had fewer scandals prying them out of the closet and from Janis Ian to k.d. lang to Melissa Etheridge, they have come out it seems more as an act of conscience than anything else. Etheridge has rocked out about the "letter of the day — U" on "Sesame Street"; it's hard to imagine George Michael being asked to appear on the popular PBS children's TV show now.

The women's careers also seem to be less impacted by negative reactions perhaps. In fact, if k.d. lang is any indication, they may actually enhance their fan appeal by unflinchingly making their orientation so clearly a part of their on-stage person-

nas. And while lang is wildly popular with women, she also has a dedicated following among men — both gay and straight.

In addition to her lesbian fans, Etheridge continues to have a strong appeal for straight women who can identify with her raw-edged strength and nononsense power. Following a 1995 concert in Vancouver, one critic — a heterosexual woman — wrote: "Etheridge propels her lyrics right down into your invertebrate so that you're left thinking: 'God, I wish I was a lesbian."

One can speculate on why lesbian singers seem to handle their sexuality with greater grace and ease than their gay counterparts. Are their careers marginal so that it isn't important whether they're out or not? Etheridge and lang would seem to suggest this can't be the case. Do their straight male fans get turned on by the fact that they're lesbians the way heterosexual porn often includes a gratuitous "lesbian" scene for the amusement and arousal of the men? Seems pretty farfetched as well.

Perhaps the issue is easier to deal with by turning the question around: why do gay pop/rock stars have a harder time being honest about their sexuality than lesbian singers?

Much as we may want to rant and rave — as Boy George did not long ago — about George Michael remaining closeted for most of his career, he may well have been right that his "borderline" ambiguous sexuality boosted his career in a way that being openly gay would not. Heterosexual men are much more hung-up about orientation than most straight women are, social scientists have shown over and over. And it's fairly easy to imagine that Michael will indeed loose a lot of straight male fans worried that "someone might start wondering" because of the CDs in their collections.

But what about Elton? How can the British rocker's career seemingly be on the upswing after coming out if this male homophobia is at play?



The answer may be simply that John has never been "packaged" as a sex-symbol rocker. The glitter and sartorial outrage that are the hallmark of Elton John the performer, cover a fairly ordinary guy who likes football and whose home is decked with illustrations of great naval battles in British history. If he weren't enormously talented, John's stage act would probably be something buffoonish. But his vast talent — and the fact that he's never been presented as a rock-n-roll sex object — probably go a long way to defusing any possible threat straight male fans might feel. They can just enjoy "Bennie and the Jets" or "Philadelphia Freedom" without wondering if Sir Elton is hitting up on them.

But this isn't true for George Michael—or for any other male star whose popularity is based at least partly on sex-appeal. After all, as the Wham! song says, "Time can never mend the careless whispers of a good friend; to the heart and mind, ignorance is kind." And when straight men can no longer claim to be ignorant of a handsome male singer's sexual orientation, they might very well stay away in droves.

NY Court Upholds Lesbians' Separation Agreement

New York - New York state Judge Edward Greenfield has ruled that a non-marital separation agreement between two lesbians who ended their 14-year relationship in 1991 is legally valid.

The judge ordered Dr. Barbara Starrett to resume regular support payments to her ex-partner, Ann Silver, a doctoral student now living in Seattle, based on an agreement the women's attor-

neys reached when the pair broke up.

Starrett's attorneys had argued in court that the 1991 separation agreement was signed "under duress" and therefore not legally binding. Starrett had stopped making payments to Silver in 1994, although the agreement called for her to pay the difference between Silver's gross annual income

But Judge Greenfield said he found no evidence the split-up agreement had been signed under duress of any kind noting, among other things, that both women had been represented by attorneys in drawing up the agreement.

"Dr. Starrett was not a helpless pupper being manipulated by the wily Silver," the judge wrote in a 14-page decision. "She had a clear objective — to get Silver out of her life."

Attorneys for Starrett said she may appeal.

Mazomanie Nude Beach Crackdown Plan Criticized

Mazomanie, WI (AP) - The Mazomanie nude beach is an important meeting place for Midwestern gays who are being unfairly singled out in complaints about problems in the area says a man who is organizing against a planned state crackdown.

Brian Eikelberger, a Stevens Point technical college student, objected to reports of cruising and open sex at the beach, which is on the Wisconsin River between Mazomanie and Sauk City.

"Yes, things do happen, but we try to patrol ourselves as much as possible," said Eikelberger, who

said he camps regularly at the beach in the summer.

Other problems such as underage drinking and people who pitch tents for the entire summer are bigger problems on the heterosexual side of the beach, he said. The Department of Natural Resources said this week that it is considering stepping up enforcement and restrictions at the stateowned beach, following the complaints by nudists of men cruising the beach for gay sex.

"Cruising does happen," Eickelberger said. But he said that the gay men who frequent the beach caution others about open sex and try to keep their end of the beach neat and clean. He said the beach draws gays from Chicago, Minneapolis and northern Wisconsin who would object to plans to close the beach at night.

He said he has been contacting gay newspapers across the Midwest to alert them to possible changes at the beach and expects a large gay contingent to attend an April 30 public meeting on the proposed changes.

He said the beach is one of the few places gay men can meet that isn't a bar. "It's so scenic and so peaceful, to wake up in the morning with the fog lifting over the river, and the eagles soaring and the wildlife," he said. "You're not going to get that beauty anywhere else in Wisconsin."

Eickelberger said that he has been in contact with leaders of the Badger Naturists, some of whom have complained about gay sex on the beach, to see if the groups can cooperate in the face of the threatened closing of their shared favorite spot.

"Hopefully we can bridge the gap and try to work out a universal plan," he said. ""It's almost two separate beaches. For the most part, we stay on our side of the beach and they stay on theirs." Eickelberger said he would prefer that the DNR issue permits for camping so there would be

If You Go: A meeting to discuss enforcement changes at the Mazomanie nude beach on the Wisconsin River has been set for 7 p.m., April 30 at the Sauk City library, 515 Water Street. The Department of Natural Resources has invited nudist groups and others interested in the future of the beach to discuss options to deal with problems at the increasingly popular spot.

Some changes under consideration include: Closing Conservation Drive; Closing the drive to parking between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.; Stepping up enforcement in the area; and Banning camping

at the beach.

Gay Republican vs. Gay Democrat in Texas House Race

AUSTIN, TX - Just 615 voters bothered to voted in this year's Republican primary in Austin's southeast district, leading to what is a first in U.S. gay politics and an indicator perhaps of how mainstream gay and lesbian politicians have become.

The Austin district Republicans picked Fred Ebner to carry their party's standard against incumbent Glen Maxey in the battle for the state House of Representatives seat. Rep. Maxey of course is the first openly gay state lawmaker in Texas.

But Ebner is also openly gay and an active member of the Log Cabin Republicans of Texas - leading to what is believed to be the first "battle of the gays" for a state legislative seat with the official backing of both major parties.

Ironically, the 51st state house district that Maxey represents is considered one of the most liberal in Texas, which political observers say was probably why Republicans tend to turn out in such low numbers in the primary that Ebner won by 59 percent. But the district's liberal history also means, many agree, means Ebner has an uphill battle in his bid to unseat Maxey.

Lesbian Paula Vogel Awarded **Pulitzer Prize for Drama**

NEW YORK — Paula Vogel, an open lesbian who has headed the graduate playwriting program at Brown University since 1985, has been awarded the prestigious Pulitzer Prize for Drama for her play "How I Learned to Drive."

The drama that garnered the Pulitzer deals with remembrances of the sexual abuse by an uncle being recalled by the now-grown woman. Despite the grim subject matter, the play has won a string of important theater awards before being honored with the Pulitzer. Vogel is one of only a small group of women who have ever been awarded a Pulitzer Prize for Drama, and she is believed to be the only open lesbian to have done so in its 80-year history.

Report: Condoms at Schools Don't Increase Teen Sex

LOS ANGELES - A new joint RAND-UCLA study suggests that teenagers who have access to condoms through their school health services are no more sexually active than teens who don't.

The study examined the reported sexual behavior and attitudes of nearly 2,000 Los Angeles high school students before condoms were made available to them and then 1,110 students a year later.

The study found that before condoms were made available at the schools, 55.8 percent of male students and 45.4 percent of female students said they had had sex. In the follow-up a year later, the researchers reported that 55 percent of males and 46.1 percent of females told them they had had sex, indicating no significant changes in sexual behavior as a result of the condoms being made available.

IRS holds Back Tax Exemption of Lesbian Cancer Agency

WAKEFIELD, RI — For the second time in the past year, the IRS is resisting once more giving tax-exempt status to a homosexual services organization.

This time, the federal tax agency is insisting that Kathys' Group, a Rhode Island organization that offers support services to lesbians with cancer and their families, must instead offer its services to all women with cancer, not just lesbians.

The New York-based Lambda Legal Defense & Education Fund has taken up the case for Kathys' Group against the IRS and the legal advocacy group has told IRS it has no basis from demanding the change.

David Buckel, the Lambda attorney handling the case, told reporters that "evidence is building that the IRS is infected with anti-Gay bias" and that the agency "needs some kind of policy directive or internal education of its agents to make sure there isn't this kind of anti-Gay discrimination."

Last year the IRS finally agreed to give tax-exempt status to GLASS (Gay & Lesbian Adolescent Support System) in Greensboro, N.C., after it initially insisted that the youth support group outline "procedures and safeguards ... to assure that counselors and participants do no encourage or facilitate homosexual practices or encourage the development of homosexual attitudes and propensities by minor individuals attending" the group's programs.

The IRS has declined to comment on the tax-exemption application of Kathys'.

Community Center Works Toward Goal

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center's "A Home of Our Own" membership campaign says it all; the community wants a home for organizations, businesses, culture and diversity. Many wonder what's taking so long to open the doors.

According to Marianne Burish, co-chair of the Center's Facilities Committee, "Significant and meaningful progress is being made toward establishing a home of our own."

The Center's new board of directors has met weekly since January to rejuvenate the Center's momentum. The momentum slowed during the board's recent transition from an Interim Board to an elected Board of Directors. However, it is heartening to recall that over 240 people financially support the Center with membership contributions and donations. In addition, over one hundred people have volunteered time and energy to make the Center a reality. Many are waiting to contribute and get involved until a site is announced, and there is much work to be done before that happens.

"The Center's Board of Directors asks for the community's patience in allowing the site search and transaction to evolve. It is slow-going, but will assure results of which we can all be proud," said Neil Albrecht, Board Co-President.

"The Center's Facility Search Com-

mittee, along with the board, is responsible for selecting a suitable site for the Center," explained Burish. "It's a group of real estate and commercial property experts," she added. At a recent board of directors meeting, Burish brought the new board up to speed on the committee's progress. However, actual information on sites currently being considered cannot be revealed to the community, since public awareness or support could negatively impact negotiations with prospective landlords.

Burish explained that the committee began a facility search in early 1997. At that time, it identified over 40 potential sites. In the summer, the Sander's Bowl building in Brewer's Hill topped the list of potential sites for the Center. The unfortunate November fire sent the committee back into action.

"Finding a suitable site is only the first step in a long process," said Burish. "The Center is about to get involved in a commercial real estate transaction. This is inherently more time-consuming and complicated than a residential search, like finding an apartment or house," she added.

According to Burish, commercial and business property transactions involve large amounts of space, great sums of money and all the parties involved; landlord, tenant, buyer, seller, developer, environmental issues, site, building inspectors and the lenders. "Each of these parties are meticulous and comprehensive in doing their financial and property homework," Burish said.

"Not only does the site need to be located and a real estate deal negotiated, but sources of financial backing, solid operation plans and strong community support must be in place before we can open our doors," said Albrecht.

Burish said that in an ideal transaction, a group can move into a building in six to twelve months. "However, if the use is specialized, such as an LGBT community center, and things don't go smoothly, like a fire burns the first building you liked, a group can expect to spend upwards of 18 to 26 months of advance work before opening the doors!" she added.

"We hope to identify a site by early summer," Albrecht said. "But it is going to take some time. We all need to be patient, and it will be worth it!"



H.I.T. to Host



Bay View High School Brings "La Cage aux Folles" to Life

gay musical at Bay View High School? This must be a first, for the school and for high schools in the community. As one young musician queried. "You mean gay as gay, light hearted? Or gay as in gay?

Gay as in gay, that is, and with a drag

club setting. Also, gay as in fun.

Theater goers will recognize the name," La Cage aux Folles," and probably the movie adaptation, "Birdcage.

The Bay View High School students put on "La Cage" last weekend, a project they had been working on since February. This was how it seemed to one, uninitiat-



ed viewer who stopped in several times in the last week of rehearsals.

For the young actors and dancers, it's mostly fun. At their ages, perhaps It has to be. But for Michael VanPelt, it's unrelenting, sometimes impossible, often painfully hard work, with an uncertain outcome.

For as of April 16, cast members and volunteers are still painting scenery, standing back at intervals and consulting each other about this or that effect.

Kris Strnad, an educational assistant and volunteer artist, is adding roses to the painted greenery of window boxes on the cafe, for example. From a distance, they work.

A veteran volunteer scenery builder, and all around stage genius, Chuck Werkowsrki, is yelling at everyone to stay out from under his current project, which swings precariously from on high.

Yet nobody seems worried. Nor hurried. Music rocks from a boom box, on the edge of the stage, and young actors zigzag back and forth in rhythm, occasionally dipping into a sack of hard candies nearby. Lunch time comes and goes and nobody notices. Work continues.

And where is Michael VanPelt, the music and chorus director on whose shoulders the production's responsibility rests? He is out getting shoes for the dancers. Heels and taps for both genders. No show-related task too big or too small.

Even so, if everything is finished and polished on time, how will La Cage play on the South Side of Milwaukee? That is ever present, unanswered question.

Finally, here comes a big, bearded, burly man thumping down the aisle, bearing stacks of boxes, barking orders. Yes, that is VanPelt. But he can't talk right now, he says, the distribution of shoes has to come first. And even now, he is a few pairs short.

But in due course he does talk, fast and well. He comes from a small town he calls Rosendale, which he refers to as a hick town, west of Fond du Lac. He had a different attitude toward homosexuality then. His views have changed but the outlook of his old home town probably has not, he guesses.

"And this show will not play in Rosendale," he says, in a one-liner flung over his shoulder. "Possibly," he adds, The south side of Milwaukee may not be all that different from Rosendale.

VanPelt was graduated from the Uni-

versity of Wisconsin - Milwaukee with a music major and has been at Bay View High School for four years. He hopes to build a strong theater program, such as the school once had, but admits it's an uphill struggle.

"Kids don't have the work ethic they once did, and now their (interests) are diversified, and it's hard to get a commitment out of them," he says.

Why La Cage? It was not his first choice, it seems.

We wanted to get "Grease," but it was not available," he recalls, "and you have to get something the kids can connect to." In the process of looking at everything that was available, he came back again and again to "La Cage," and finally settled on it. He admits he was "a bit nervous" when he went in to speak to the school principal about the choice.

"But after the initial shock," the verdict was that "This is a really great play," bolstered by the recognition that it was rated the best of its season on Broadway, with the book by Harvey Fierstein and music and lyrics by Jerry Herman.

VanPelt reports that he has encountered less flack than he thought he would.

The humor helps, and there are some "hilarious one-liners," he notes. True, the kids don't get all of them, because they are written for a slightly older audience, but enough do come through. Overall, he's pleased by the attitudes of students so far.

The reaction from the kids has been good, and the gay community has been supportive, with the donation of drag costumes and ten feather head dresses," he says. "Of course, "he adds, "kids are kids, and there are bound to be some off-color

David Katlewski, a travelling string instructor, leads the pit orchestra, mostly travelling teachers, and works with VanPelt and the dancers and singers to assure that performers and musicians come out even.

That, incidentally, is a process that goes on every day of rehearsal right up to and including the dress rehearsal. And so does outfitting of the actors and dancers.

'Getting some of these big guys in heels and getting them dancing is something," he said. Everything added - costumes, wigs, undergarments - means extra complications.

"Some of this is a little iffy, but we can

Also, part of the iffy nature of things in high school theater is the competition tor the students' time.

'We' ve lost a few to sports. "

One drops out at the last minute, because of a tournament. Several coaches, on the other hand, have been helpful, excusing from some events the young athletes who have theatrical roles to play.

And the other part of the iffy nature of things is the sheer magnitude of the showproducing task and the details involved, with Van Pelt trying to keep a hand on each and all of them. He takes the show

'To me, it's a play where the son, through thoughtlessness, almost destroys his father's twenty-year relationship,"

It is the music which lifts the mood of the musical to sheer joy, from the lilting "With Ann on My Arm," to the rousing "We Are What We Are", from "Life is a Celebration" to "The Best of Times is Now" and once the balance is achieved between orchestra and vocals the musicis splendid, so that audiences can take it home with them, in their heads and hearts.

And VanPelt has his own voice, early and late, cutting through conversation. It is at first loud, to get attention from stage and piit, and then very soft, so they will stop to listen. His variation of pitch and his high energy style work. Even the most bumptious subside.

And while some of the young actors are veterans of last year's show, "Little Shop of Horrors," and their confidence is contagious, others have little or no experience singing or dancing, and they need extra attention. And they get it.

When necessary, he makes a sharp, cutting gesture, stops the show to make a point, cut a few bars or lines, move the stage action along, or get dancers on or off the stage, with appropriate gestures.

"Never stop moving," he counsels. Each of the students has his own view of the show. One says "La Cage" was chosen because it was "something different." Another says some might not like the musical because it has some "gay people" in it, but that reaction does not interfere with the production. A third says, somewhat determinedly, "I'm always having fun. This is a high school production, and it's supposed to be fun. Some people act like it's

going to ruin their lives if we screw up." A fourth student reports that he was initially hesitant about going out for the

"I am a homosexual," he says. But then he thought about it for a long time, finally decided to go out for it, and was surprised to win a good part, with "mil-

Monique Patterson, 18, is a dancer and also acting as Mme. Renaud. And Michael Villwock, 16, who plays Jean Michael, the son, is serious about theater as a career. He had a role last year in "Little Shop of Horrors" and this time has been working on the show since January, and also helps out with the painting and scene shifting. Anything that needs doing, he seems to be there..

"I have a solo, 'With Ann on My Arm,' and I've never sung before a large audience before, so I may be a little nervous about that," he says.

Michael Budziszewski, whom his peers call "Buddha," because his name is hard to pronounce, reports that he plays the role of Georges, the father, a key role.

'I 'm trying to lower my voice, " he said, " and it's a little hard."

Day by day, things begin to come together. Dance segments look snappier, and cast members begin to look their parts, with wigs and heels.

One, struggling with fishnet stock-ings, says, "I'm tired of being a woman, all they go through."

Tim Lybek, with a real boa and a painted-on mustache, peers gleefully around a stage curtain. Two actors, exotically clad, pose, giggling, for an amateur photographer on the steps of the drag club.

Mark Musa, who plays Albin, is one of several actors wearing too small shoes. He says he found them at Payless after a long afternoon of looking. Backstage he slips one off and wriggles his toes because he should have size 16, instead of 13, the largest women's shoes he could find. But, in the showiest of the show's singing and acting roles, when he dons mascara, wig and flowing gown, and throws his head back for a lusty song, nobody knows that

To all, actors and musicians alike, VanPelt listens when the request seems urgent, but also issues general alerts. When dancers begin to bump into scenery, he moves the rehearsal outside the auditorium, leaving the stage free for final touches by the crew.


"One thing," he says in an aside to a reporter, "The choreographer didn't show, so I'm going to do it (the choreography) myself. It will be simpler, but it will work."

In front of the line of ten dancers, he demonstrates the "step two three kick, stork, stork," and then watches them do it, over and over as he calls the directions, until he is satisfied, and the dancers are moving with the music and each other.

The total effect, it must be said, is quite wonderful.

To each of the student actors, to the director and the musicians and the stage crew, the musical play may have a different meaning, one which they have helped to create. And indeed those in the audience will find the meaning they wish.

But all, it seems to one viewer who saw the musical in snatches, and had bits of conversations here and there with participants in the ambitious effort, it seems that "La Cage" in this version can send all in the audience and on the stage, out into the spring night with a lighter heart. Perhaps humming songs, celebrating life, and enjoying this glimpse of the talent, vitality and energy of the young assembled on stage for the stirring finale, "The Best of Times is Now.'

his should be an exasperating column... I'm in the middle of my first day not smoking. My official Quit Day on the Zyban program. Zyban is supposed to suppress your desire to smoke, but contains no nicotine, so I have nicotine withdrawal to look forward to for the next several weeks. I'll be happy to get through the first day!

One day at a time is the old saying, and I guess that will prove true with quitting a nasty habit I started when in was 16 years old. I'm 46, so that's 30 years of tar and nicotine. I just had a chest x-ray done last week because of an upper respiratory infection and nasty cough I had, and luckily it came out good and clear... no pneumonia, anyway. I'm sure if a little camera was lowered into those old lungs, it would need an awfully powerful light to cut through the tar!

I started taking the Zyban 11 days ago, and the company presents an entire program and system for quitting. You continue to smoke up until your 11-12th day and make that your pre-ordained Quit Day. As I was taking the Zyban for those first 11 days, I gradually noticed I was smoking a little less often, except in "trigger" situations. Triggers being the times you smoke the most out of habitual behavior or circumstances.

Wish me luck!

I guess AIDS activists can stop placing the burden of more HIV infections on the back of Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala for not allowing needle exchanges. Up until just hours before announcing that there was now enough scientific evidence in place to make state and local governments feel confident in spending their own money on needle exchange programs; Shalala had planned to announce that federal money could be used for such programs.

HHS had arranged for a big press conference on April 20, and had hinted to activists to expect good news. Shalala had planned to defend the administration's hesitancy in approving the program as being solely about science and *not* about politics.

In a matter of a few hours time, and last minute political maneuvering, politics won out. Once again, Clinton caved into conservatives who fear approval of such programs saying they appear to condone IV drug use.

Three days after that announcement stunned the AIDS community, the Centers for Disease Control cautioned that despite a historic drop in AIDS cases and deaths in the last two years, the rate at which people are becoming infected with HIV had held relatively steady. Government AIDS numbers do not include people infected with HIV, just those with fully diagnostical AIDS.

People just aren't heeding the warnings about unsafe sex and IV drug use. That underlines the need for continued prevention programs, with new ones designed to reach each new generation. People are living longer with HIV thanks to Highly Active Anti Retroviral Treatments (HAART), and are getting less deadly opportunistic infections. HAART delays the onset on AIDS, prolongs the lives of PWAs, and reduces the number of AIDS deaths; even while there is little change in the rate of new infections.

Reggie White's appearance at a UW Madison sports fund-

raiser last weekend drew a steady throng of protesters who condemned White for his remarks about gays and minorities last month in the State Assembly.

The National "W" Club, UW's sports alumni club, had invited White to speak at the event prior to his speech to the Assembly. They refused numerous student groups efforts to rescind the invitation and a club representative stood by White's right to freedom of speech.

A student newspaper reported that White received \$60,000 for his appearance, which his wife strongly denied. The day after the fund-raiser, White and his wife were in Milwaukee for another appearance, and she harshly rebuffed the media for sensationalizing her husband's appearance, and downplayed the appearance of protesters the night before.

I'm going to be a shill for the cable network, Showtime, and urge you to sign up for it by June if you don't already do so.

Because Showtime had the courage and the insight to step in and produce "Armisted Maupin's More Tales of the City" after the Public Broadcasting System (PBS) backed down to religious pressure over the initial airing of the first series in 1993. Britain's Channel 4, Propaganda Films and Montreal's Production La Fete joined with Showtime to bring this second mini series of the highly acclaimed and delightful series of books by gay writer Armisted Maupin.

If you remember back to that first mini series, or if like me, purchased a video of the first "Tales of the City" you too probably can't wait to set your VCR's come June. The original series earned PBS some of its highest numbers ever, but riled oppositions of the company of

tion against funding such a "decadent" series.


Maupin's "Tales" started out as a series of columns in the San Francisco Chronicle, that eventually were compiled into a zany series of books depicting gay life in San Francisco in the heady 70's. You'll fondly remember the story teller, "Mouse" (who everyone fell in love with) and all the other whimsical characters that inhabited Barberry Lane. You'll revel in the aura of the 70's when gay people seemed friendlier and had less attitude, when being gay gave you something in common. A time of heady exhuberance and celebration of gay lib with love, sex, pot and music.

The original series was set in the mid 70's and the June series is set in the late 70's, still prior to the awareness of the lurking evils of the AIDS pandemic.

Years after the publication of the books, and the first miniseries, gay people still can thank Maupin for helping us reminisce about the era, and giving us such wonderful characters that so many of us grew attached to.

After the June series, I'll probably feel the same as I did in '93... "Please, give us more!"... Well, there IS always "Further Tales of the City"!

Damn, I could use a cigarette! But I've made it, and it's now the second day as I'm proof reading this before sending it off via e-mail to be typeset. Enjoy the Spring, for once we are actually having one!

Keeping Milwaukee Community Center On Track

"Above all, this [community center] project is to be designed as a vehicle to bring the LesBiGay community together; to organize it; to foster harmonious relations among its various parts; to allow individual parts to maintain integrity and uniqueness while cooperating with mutual respect and dignity; to encourage the community in civil, social and economic matters to speak with a unified, powerful and effective voice."

—Erv Uecker and Ross Walker February 1996

s spirited as those words were when Erv Uecker and Ross Walker first announced their pledge challenge to the community, they remain today as the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center endeavors to move past last year's fire which devasted a previous proposed site, and the recent bumpy transition from an Interim Board of Directors to an elected Board.

As reported in the last issue of *In Step*, the shift from an interim board to an elected board was not as smooth as anticipated with Uecker and Walker "temporarily suspending" their monthly \$1,000 donation.

Some have claimed this has all been the proverbial "tempest in a teapot" and is a private matter between Uecker and Walker and the Board, while others contend it was an appropriate "wake-up call" for the new Community Center leaders. Either way, I believe it has only helped to refocus attention on the important issues of surrounding the selection of an appropriate site for the center.

The newly-elected, volunteer Community Center Board clearly has much hard work and many challenges ahead. I believe the Board now understands the need to improve its communication with the community, and with the center's major supporters. It also understands the necessity to move forward with the entire process of finding a home for the center.

We live in a goal orientated world. Clearly, nothing short of officially naming a site for a Milwaukee community center will quiet all current anxieties. Despite concerns leveled by some, I believe the site selection process is moving forward, albeit slowly. And while it is easy to become impatient and restless with the process, it is just as easy to forget that answers will come simply by waiting.

Clearly, the generous "founding gift" pledge of \$1,000 per month by Erv Uecker and Ross Walker was the catalyst which refocused Milwaukee's LesBiGay community on the goal of opening and successfully maintaining a community center, and there are strong indications that Uecker and Walker will eventually resume their donations. Their courage and personal sacrifice is to be acknowledged and respected.

However, for any community center to successfully sustain itself in the long haul, it must not be dependent upon only a few large income sources. To paraphrase a simple business principle; it is usually better to receive \$1 from 1,000 people, than \$1,000 from a single source.

That concept applies not only to money, but to personal commitment as well. It is especially apt in this case since a community center will hopefully reflect the wide range of faces that make up our multi-faceted community.

I believe patience is the buzzword of the moment as we all wait for the process of selecting a site to unfold. For those who remain anxious and can't bear to sit on their hands any longer, I encourage you to pick up the phone and invest your services as a volunteer, or write a check. If you have not yet pledged membership to the Community Center, do so now.

Hopefully, all good things will come to a community which waits.

BOOK REVIEW

A Flame For The Touch That Matters

Poems By Michael Lassell

These are poems to read while you think of someone you love, have loved, or wanted to love--or even if you want to think about yourself and your life. When you pick up this book and open it you'll find poems; no introduction, no forward, just poems. And, they are poems of gay male love: desire, yearning, heartbreak, and the pleasures of the body.

On the back cover, James Manrique says, "... I know of no other poet since [P.F.] Cafavy who has written so insistently and so eloquently about homosexual desire." Richard Labonté adds, "... Each poem, every line, is a look at an honest man's heart, a wise man's soul."

There are poems on love and lust such as There aren't enough poems about fucking and I want my dick sucked that are highly charged pieces of erotic writing. There are poems that describe places such as the garden of the Museum of Modern Art and other areas of the city ... I particularly liked the following ones.

End of summer: Christopher Street Pier

Something's in flames in New Jersey, as it so often is (last night it was fireworks for Labor Day), and now black billows of smoke head across the Hudson with the weather (as fine as any this summer). The men and boys are here (in various states of exposure), and I am wanting this one or that in familiar degrees of futility. I do not harbor delusions of reciprocity. My flawed admiration is my exposure to indiference, ridicule . . . disgust. Yet I am tanned by it. My frozen heart still knows to seek this necessary thaw.

That boy on the pier

I want to kiss that boy on the pier, but he stares at the olive river, peacock sky, anywhere but in my direction. (He is angling for fresher game than me.) Below us, inch-long fish, invisible except for enormous eyes, swim upstream and leap each drifting stick in sport, it seemsor is it desperation multiplied by years of pursuing the baited prize? And what's that floating by-that bag of pale gray bloat? the gas-filled torso of a poet past his prime, perhaps, who wanted to kiss a boy's sweet lips one last time, but fell in love with a river that did not say no?

Each poem, creates a mental picture for the reader. Some are pages long, and some are very short. There are poems that reflect on loved ones lost to AIDS. All of them are beautiful to read and heartbreaking to think about.

Dressing for work

Today I put on loose-fit, button-fly jeans from the Gap, a jungle-green shirt from Eddie Bauer on Third, and scuffed-up loafers from L.L. Bean (by catalog from Main). I topped it off with a safari jacket that's equators too big, but served me well in Europe, Asia, Africa, and the tropics of L.A.

Saying good-bye to myself in the mirror, I saw I'd pulled on Robert's face like a mask--who I dreamed last night was alive again, and gray--and over that slipped Clark's sweet face, who came the night before and curled into my arms, his nipples harder than ever, and I wore them heavily down.

No one on the Broadway local seemed to care, or on the cross-town shuttle. No one said a word on a rush-hour diagonal through Grand Central station. No one on Lex was the least bit concerned to see a three-faced man on his way to cubicle hell, and two of his faces, at least, already stiff with death.

Michael Lassell, whose previous books of poetry include *Poems for Lost and Un-Lost Boys* (Winner of the first Amelia Chapbook award, 1985) and *Decade Dance* (Alyson 1990), a finalist in the Gregory Kolovakos Award Competition for writing about AIDS, and winner of a Lambda Literary Award, was born in 1947.
