



Ypsilanti Voters Keep Rights Ordinance Despite White's Speech

Ypsilanti, MI (AP) — Voters decided to keep the city's anti- discrimination law, which includes protection for homosexuals, ignoring opponents — including Green Bay Packer Reggie White — who called for its repeal. Unofficial results showed 56 percent voted to retain the law.

"We're thrilled and we're happy,' said Paul Heaton, a leading supporter of the law. "Ypsilanti has decided that it's going to be a place for everybody to live."

Opponents were not conceding defeat, but Judy Bloss of Ypsilanti's Bible Church said it would take a "miracle" to get the law repealed now.

"You just do the best you can, then you trust the Lord and then you go forward," she said.

The city council passed the ordinance in December, making it a crime to discriminate in 14 areas, including race, height, weight, disability and sexual orientation. Convictions carry a possible \$500 fine.

Opponents then petitioned to have the repeal measure placed on the ballot. At a rally last week, White backed the

At a rally last week, White backed the measure, saying homosexuality is a sin. "If there's anything that I'm anti-against, it's sin," said White, an ordained minister.

His speech came just a month after stirring up a controversy for attacking homosexuality and promoting what many considered racial stereotypes in a speech before the Wisconsin legislature.

White, who issued a vague apology after his hour-long speech to the Wisconsin lawmakers saying he was "sorry" if his speech offended anyone, made it clear his apology didn't extend to gays and lesbians, reiterating his view that homosexuals aren't good role models for young people.

For a small town, however, the anti-gay rally attracted other notables who have recently become vocal opponents of gay rights besides White. Also featured at the rally were Alveda Celeste King, niece of Dr. Mr. Luther King, Jr, and well-known gospel singers Debbie and Angie Winans.

Rights activists staged a silent protest

outside the auditorium where the anti-gay rally was being attended by more than 300 people.

Some gay rights activists threatened a protest of Campbell Soups, which uses White as a high-paid spokesman, following his speech before the Wisconsin legislature. The call for a Campbell's protest was dropped when White made his apology for offending people, but now activists are again urging people to contact Campbell Soups and voice their displeasure with the company's spokesman.

Same-Sex Commitment Costs Methodist Minister His Post

Omaha, NE — The Rev. Jimmy Creech, who narrowly survived a church trial for violating United Methodist rules by marrying two women, will not be reappointed as the pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Omaha, the largest in the city, after the end of June.

Creech attracted national attention after he performed a same-sex ceremony for two women last September. Performing the ceremony scandalized many Methodists, and some 300 members of First United's 1900-member congregation have been meeting for Sunday worship in a nearby school in protest.

Ultimately, Creech was charged with disobeying United Methodist Church rules by performing the commitment ceremony. Arguing that the Methodists' Social Principles which prohibit such ceremonies are not church law but are merely advisory, Creech was acquitted by a single vote in March.

But following a meeting with Nebraska Bishop Joel Martinez, Creech said he had been informed that he would not be reappointed as senior pastor of the church. He said the bishop told him the division within First Church has made him unable to lead the congregation.

Church officials declined to discuss Creech's reappointment, and Bishop Martinez issued a press release that said only that he regretted the story had become public. While the bishop confirmed Creech was not being reappointed, he insisted it was "a confidential personnel matter" and refused to give his reasons for not naming the minister to another one-year post as pastor of First United.

Creech said it was "a shock" to have such a decision made at "such a late date." Ministers in the Nebraska district where First United is located are appointed for one-year terms effective July 1 each year.

He said the bishop had told him his only options were to seek another appointment at a church in Nebraska, appointment in another regional conference, or to take a leave of absence.

Creech told the Lincoln (Neb.) Journal Star that he was "not prepared to make any kind of decision at this point" about his future. He said he doubted if he would be appointed to another Methodist church in the state because of the publicity surrounding the trial.

He said church officials had been working on the upcoming appointments for two months "and for this to be neglected to such a late date I think is very harmful to First Methodist Church."

Even so, Creech said he was still committed "to celebrate covenant services if asked" by same-sex couples.

The Rev. Doug Williamson, an assistant professor of religion at Nebraska Wesleyan University who served as counsel to Creech during the trial, said he was "very disappointed" at the news. "Apparently the bishop has only been listening to one side of the story," he said. "What the bishop and other seem to forget is that Jimmy was acquitted."

Thompson Signs Visitation Legislation

Madison — Governor Tommy Thompson has become the first governor to sign into law a piece of legislation (Assembly Bill 397) which protects gay men and lesbians who wish to visit their partners in the hospital. The "hospital visitation bill," as it is known, was drafted by Assembly Speaker Scott Jensen (R-Brookfield) after hearing stories of gay and les-

bian men and women being denied access to their loved ones in the hospital because they were not blood relatives.

Scott Everetz, Legislative Director of Log Cabin Republicans praised Thompson, saying: "Governor Thompson has just provided gay and lesbian couples with a right we previously did not have."

Mike Gifford, Director of Publicity for the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, was excited upon learning the Governor had signed AB-397, commenting from the Washington DC offices of the AIDS Action Council: "ARCW is please Governor Thompson has signed the hospital visitation bill. It reaffirms his commitment to people living with HIV and AIDS. The Log Cabin Republicans should be applauded for their leadership on this issue."

James McFarland, Treasurer and founding of Log Cabin Republicans of Wisconsin, disputed claims made by some that there has never been a case of a Wisconsin hospital refusing to allow a patient to determine who can or can't see him or her. He cited two specific situations where this had occurred including a situation involving a member of Log Cabin Republicans in Madison.

Asked what gay men and lesbians should do now that the Governor has signed this bill, McFarland urged all gay men and lesbians to inform their physicians either orally or in writing (although it would be best to put it in writing so one's partner has proof that the doctor was so informed) of his/her visitation wishes.

Everetz added: "Even if a gay or lesbian person has durable power of attorney for health care, this does not guarantee that the hospital would have to allow them to visit their partner if blood relatives wished otherwise. We urge you to take the added precaution of putting in writing who you wish to visit you if you should be hospitalized."

Milwaukee Lutherans Promise to Report on Welcoming Gays

Milwaukee — Representatives of the 142 member congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod (GMS) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) passed two gay-friendly resolutions at the 1998 synod assembly April 24-25 at the Archbishop Cousins Center. Passage of the two resolutions came only after delegates watered down the more controversial of the two.

The first resolution called upon ELCA congregations in the southeast Wisconsin area to report to the office of synod Bishop Peter Rogness and the synod council what actions each congregation plans to take, if any, toward becoming a "Reconciled In Christ" congregation. The resolution noted that the 1991 synod assembly had passed a resolution that the GMS become a Reconciled in Christ synod, but that since then, only six congregations and one campus ministry within the synod had declared themselves "Reconciled." Reconciled In Christ congregations are Lutheran congregations which

openly declare that they welcome and affirm gays and lesbians.

Debate focused partly on the question of the morality of homosexuality, but objections were also raised against individual congregations' agendas being set at the synodical level. The first resolution was passed after removal of a paragraph calling upon the church to put an end to "all human judgments and arrogance that devalue, separate or exclude any of God's children because of race, gender or sexual orientation."

The second resolution originally called upon the synod to petition the national ELCA to "permit homosexual pastors living in publicly covenanted relationships the same opportunity to serve Christ and the Church that heterosexual pastors have who are living in marital relationships" and to affirm congregations in which bless same-gender covenant relationships. This resolution was completely overhauled and replaced with a resolution asking congregations to conduct their discussions on becoming Reconciled In Christ in a civilized manner.

The ELCA was formed in 1988 through the merger of the American Lutheran Church, the Lutheran Church in America, and the American Evangelical Lutheran Church. It is generally considered to be more liberal on social and doctrinal issues than the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod and the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, but does include a vocal conservative faction. None of these three largest American Lutheran denominations recognizes same-sex unions; a proposed "social statement" which seemed to offer tentative affirmation of monogamous same-sex unions was withdrawn from consideration at the ELCA's 1995 national assembly.

Schools Cancel Free Indigo Girls Concerts - But Band Plays On

Columbia, SC - After having three appearances at high schools in South Carolina and Tennessee canceled, the Indigo Girls, a popular folk-rock group featuring open lesbians Amy Ray and Emily Saliers, played at an after-school concert attended by some 2,000 screaming

Most of the high-school age fans seemed pretty unconcerned about the sexual orientation of the singers,

but parents and administrators at three schools that the group had scheduled for performances at their own expense were concerned enough to nix the shows.

Principals at schools in Memphis and Knoxville and

at a Columbia suburb canceled the slated free concerts. The school officials said the women's sexual orientation wasn't the issue, but was because of concerns about profanity in a song at an earlier concert by the Grammy-win-

The cancellations of the school concerts, however, not only turned out Indigo Girls fans in the hundreds at their "alternative" concerts, they also spurred students to protest.

At Irmo High School in suburban Columbia, a dozen or so students walked out of classes in protest over the nixed concerts, and at Farragut High School in Tennessee, dozens of students "rallied round the flagpole" outside the school after classes to protest what they vocally denounced as "homophobia" by the school's administrators.

After the Irmo High School cancellation, Amy Ray told reporters their free high school concerts hadn't intended to be political, but she said, "A minority composed of homophobic narrow-minded parents and weak-kneed principals and school boards have successfully enforced a policy of hate." She said it was clear the shows had been canceled because the two women are lesbians, not because of an "offensive" word in one of their song lyrics.

The duo still have upcoming concert dates, among other venues, in San Diego as part of the Lilith Fair Tour (June 24, Del Mar Fairgrounds); in Los Angeles (June 27, Rose Bowl); in Phoenix (June 28, Desert Sky Pavilion); in Albuquerque (June 29, New Mexico Wine Festival); Oklahoma City (July 1, All Sports Stadium); Bonner Springs, Kan. (July 2, Sandstone Amphitheater); and Walhalla, Mich. (Aug. 12, Michigan Womyn's Music Festival).

Lesbian Group Wins Tax-Exempt Status

Providence, R.I. (AP) - A group in South Kingstown that helps lesbians and their families deal with cancer has won tax-exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service, after an initial rejection.

The lawyer for Kathys' Group, who called the initial denial "anti-gay discrimination", said the status will help the counseling group gather donations. Unless the group has tax-exempt status, donors must pay taxes on the money they donate.

'If you don't have tax-exempt status, it is very hard to attract donations," said David Buckel, a staff attorney for the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund in

Kathys' Group says it originally was told by the IRS that it would only be given a tax exemption if it extended its service from lesbians to all women.

After the rejection in February, Lambda sent a letter of complaint to the agency on behalf of Kathys' Group.

Buckel said plenty of other groups, including the American Association of Retired Persons and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, have been given tax-exempt status despite serving a distinct segment of the population.

He said the agency gave no reason for changing its mind in a letterdated April 30.

Kathys' Group provides free counseling to lesbians, their partnersand families. The group was founded in 1995 after one member of a lesbian couple - both named Kathy — became sick with breast cancer.

About 31 women have received the services of a therapist since the group's inception.

California's LIFE **Lobby Folds**

Sacramento, CA — It's the most populous state in the country where a tenth of all Americans live; it has more people than the entire nation of Canada; it's economy, if it were an independent country, would be the sixth largest in the world. From San Francisco in the north to Los Angeles and San Diego in the south, it also boasts what may arguably be the most extensive and politically vigorous activist community in the country.

But California now has no statewide lesbian and gay lobbying organization with the apparent demise of the LIFÉ (Lobby for Individual Freedom and Equality) Lobby which closed its doors in the midst of continuing financial troubles and internal infighting.

Some activists blamed the collapse of the LIFE Lobby

on the difficulty of raising money in an era when the state's gay and lesbian community is tapped-out fighting the AIDS epidemic. Some blamed it on LIFE's own awkward organization which they say is vague and cumbersome. Others said the lobbying group simply failed to effectively keep contact with grassroots activism and instead focused on issues of concern to larger, financially richer AIDS organizations.

The lobby reportedly was more than \$70,000 in debt when it folded, and some staffers and ex-staffers reportedly had not been paid for a month or more.

The timing of LIFE's collapse is particularly troublesome with state Sen. Pete Knight leading a statewide ballot campaign effort to prohibit California from recognizing same-sex marriages, even if legally performed elsewhere. Facing such a fight without a statewide organization could be highly problematic in the sometimes politically volatile state

Ironically, LIFE Lobby was created in 1986 specifically because of another anti-gay statewide ballot initiative, backed by extremist Lyndon LaRouche, in an effort to force the quarantine of people with AIDS. But it now appears destined to fall apart in the face of another

statewide anti-gay campaign.

Equally ironic, with national groups now agreeing on a Millennium March on Washington in the year 2000, activists in state capitals around the country are expected in 1999 to focus on their statewide political agendas. Of the 36 or so statewide lobbying organizations, California may find itself ill prepared for next year's "Equality Begins at Home" effort.

The collapse of LIFE has led some activists to raise profound questions about the political structure of activism and lobbying efforts. "California has some of the wealthiest openly gay and lesbian people in the country,' one activist wrote in a gay paper recently. "If we - the wealthy as well as those of us who only have average incomes - cannot support a statewide organization whose budget is only \$250,000 per year, how can we expect to fight off efforts by groups like the Christian Coalition, Focus on the Family and the Traditional Values Coalition with their multi-million dollar annual budgets?"

Meanwhile, community leaders in both Northern and Southern California say they're working to put together another lobbying organization. What is unclear, however, is whether they are "reinventing the wheel" or if they can put together a statewide group that can somehow avoid the same fate that befell the LIFE Lobby.

George Michael **Arraignment Postponed**

Los Angeles — The arraignment of pop star George Michael on a charge of lewd conduct has been postponed for 10 days to let prosecution and defense lawyers review the case further. The 34-year-old singer, whose hit song "I Want Your Sex" was banned by many radio stations, was arrested April 7 after undercover police allegedly watched him "engaging in a lewd act" in a public bathroom-in a Beverly Hills park. Asked how his client was feeling, Michael's attorney said, "He's in very good humor, in good spirits." But he says Michael wants to get the case over with. The charge carries a maximum sentence of six months and a \$1,000 fine.

Teen Boys at Higher Risk of AIDS

Three or four times the number of teenage boys reported male-male sex, injection drug use, and sexual contact with intravenous drugs users.

Washington, D.C. (AP) — A new, more private computer-aided survey technique of high risk behavior among teenage boys may have unmasked a far higher level of potential exposure to the AIDS virus than earlier polls have suggested.

Using this technique, researchers found that three or four times the number of teenage boys reported male-male sex, injection drug use, and sexual contact with intravenous drugs users, than other surveys have revealed. The report appears in the most recent issue of the journal *Science*.

The researchers looked at sexual behavior, drug use and violence, and included conduct, such as homosexual relationships that boys might be reluctant to tell an interviewer.

"Our findings indicate that this new technology encourages more complete reporting of these risk behaviors than traditional survey techniques," said Charles F. Turner, lead author for the article and Director of the Program in Health and Behavior Measurement for the Research Triangle Institute in Washington.

The number of boys reporting more accepted behavior, such as boy-girl sexual contact or drinking alcoholic beverages, was in line with what had been found in the past, Turner said.

They interviewed 1,729 black, white and Hispanic boys, ages 15 to 19 years old, about their sexual behavior, drug use and violence. The technique allowed the boys to listen to spoken questions over headphones and answer by pressing numbered keys on a laptop computer.

This was designed to both eliminate the potential embarrassment of telling an interviewer about their behavior, but also allowed responses from those who were not sufficiently literate to read, understand and follow directions on a written survey.

Results showed that reporting so-called stigmatized behavior, such as male to male sexual contact, use of needles with certain kinds of street drugs or sexual contact with intravenous drug users, correlated more closely with such reports by adults when asked about their own adolescence. Figures obtained using traditional face-to-face interviewing and paper and pencil written surveys usually were lower than those from polls of adults talking about their teenage years, Turner said.

"Our findings suggest there has been significant underreporting of these behaviors," Turner said. "We think wider application of this method could improve the reporting of stigmatized behaviors." Therapists in the field are not surprised that teenagers are more reluctant to talk about these subjects, but note that the findings show they will have to be more diligent and patient when interviewing patients.

"As a clinician we pay attention to these kinds of numbers in terms of reinforcing the idea that you can't sit back and wait for people to tell you," Dr. Henry Gault, a spokesman for the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and a psychiatrist in private practice in Northbrook, Ill., said. "You have to be more assertive in a gentle, sensitive way in getting these things out."

Ex-MD Guilty in Murder-for-Hire Case

San Francisco — A jury unanimously has found Gary Parkison, a former physician, guilty on six felony charges of insurance fraud and attempting to hire an undercover police officer to murder his ex-lover, James Swan.

The jury now moves on the consider Parkison's sanity defense, which is based on claims he suffers from an AIDS-related dementia that affected his judgment and was the basis of his not guilty plea in the case.

Police videotaped Parkison giving an undercover officer posing as a hit man \$2,500 to murder Swan after the former physician had tried to list himself as a beneficiary to Swan's \$860,000 life insurance policy.

The jury found Parkison innocent of six other charges, including attempting to set fire to his medical office to collect on insurance and trying to hire another hit man to kill Swan while he was in jail

HIV-Rape Measure Approved by State Senate

Madison — The Wisconsin state senate approved by an overwhelming voice vote a measure that would add five years to the prison sentence of anyone infected with HIV who commits rape, knowing of the infection at the time.

Three lawmakers tried, without luck, to derail the measure, arguing that if enacted it would discourage people from being tested for the virus. But the senate voted 29-3 against the move to kill the bill and then approved it by a voice vote.

The measure now goes to the state Assembly where it is also expected to pass.



Dead Man Identified as Suspect in 16 Killings of Gay Men

GREENFIELD, IN — Police officials say the deaths of at least 9 young men dumped in shallow streams over central Indiana and western Ohio in the course of a decade were the responsibility of Herbert Baumeister, who committed suicide in July 1996 in Canada, just two weeks after hundreds of human bones were discovered on his farm outside Indianapolis.

Police said they had unearthed the remains of 7 to 10 individuals at the farm and that Baumeister was the suspect in as many as 16 mysterious deaths dating from 1980. Authorities said all the victims were gay or had ties to the gay community and were between the ages of 15 and 29 years of age.

Authorities said Baumeister became their prime suspect when a witness identified him as the man seen leaving a theater with one of the victims.

In 1996, Baumeister's estranged wife let police search the farm where hundreds of human bones were found. Just weeks later, Baumeister killed himself in Canada where he had abruptly visited as the investigation narrowed in on him.

Authorities said all the bodies found had been partially nude, and they believe most or all had been strangled to death.

Although married and a respected member of his upperclass suburban community, police said they discovered in their investigation that Baumeister had led a secret life and was well known in Indianapolis gay bars. Several people who had met him told police the Baumeister had often talked about his sexual interest in strangulation.

AIDS Agencies Facing Back-to-Work Issues with Patients

CHICAGO — Programs at two Chicago organizations are trying to deal with the enormous change brought about by the effectiveness of new anti-AIDS medications that are helping more and more people infected with HIV live longer and healthier lives.

The Howard Brown Health Center and the Test Positive Aware Network work with HIV-positive patients who just a few years ago worried mainly about putting their estates in order but are now increasingly reentering the workforce as new protease inhibitors help many back to reasonably good health.

The agencies, like others in San Francisco, New York, Los Angeles and elsewhere, have set up programs to help infected individuals with career guidance, job skills and employment referrals.

The two Chicago organizations also help patients returning to the workforce deal with privacy rights and health care issues on the job.

Boy Scouts Dropped from Charity Drive

SAN FRANCISCO — The Boy Scouts of America will no longer be on the list of organizations in the San Francisco city employees' annual charity drive because of the youth group's policies excluding homosexuals.

The city charity program last year raised some \$563,000 dollars in donations from city employees.

One of the groups city workers could give to was the Local Independent Charities (LIC), which listed four California Boy Scouts councils on its recipient list.


But city officials have announced that Local Independent Charities has removed the Scouts from its recipient list after the city said it would drop LIC from the annual charity drive if it kept the Scouts on its list. LIC promptly complied.

Soccer's Official World Cup Condom

PARIS — Some 5 million official World Cup condoms will be sold or given away during the 1998 World Cup scheduled to start on June 10 in France.

FIFA, the world soccer governing body, arranged with a local condom firm, Laboratoire Soft, for the special packaging of the official condoms that are marked with the World Cup logo.

The manufacturer will donate a portion of its profits to AIDS services from sales of the condoms — amounting to 9 tons in all — during the month-long international competition.

More than 31 board members, staff and volunteers from nine community centers shared stories, participated in seminars and taught each other how to build successful community centers. Representatives from Horizons Community Services - Chicago, IL, Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center - New York, NY, Gay and Lesbian Community Center of the Ozarks - Springfield, MO, Out Front Minnesota - Minneapolis, MN, Gay Lesbian Resource Center -Des Moines, IA, Lesbian Gay Community Center of Greater Kansas City - MO, Central Minnesota Lesbian Center —

Cloud, MN, Aurora Lesbian Center — Duluth, MN and Milwaukee LGBT Community Center participated.

Stephanie Hume, Milwaukee LGBT Community. Center board of directors, assisted in organizing the conference and securing Milwaukee as the location. "In order to have our center be successful, it is important we utilize the strengths of other community centers in our region. Meeting people from the other community centers gives us a sense of the bigger picture," said Hume.

Seminars were designed to educate participants and provide a format for centers to share their experiences.

Fundraising and membership development were presented by Jen Benka from Nine to Five Working Women and Sheila Zelenski, Milwaukee LGBT Community Center Co-President.

During the seminars, participants shared their reasons for becoming involved with their local community centers. DeGroot works to "bring diversity together and build true community." One of the most popular reasons for becoming involved with a community center was to create a better coming out experience for youth.

Others became involved because they recognized a need in their community. Such was the case with Charles Ewing, who got involved when he and his partner were driving by to see where the Gay and Lesbian Community Center of the Ozarks was located. Upon seeing the appearance of the center, Ewing's partner, an interior decorator commented, "This is not going to work." Ewing's partner redecorated the community center and Ewing later became vice-president of the board.

Hume concluded, "The best thing about the weekend was hearing the stories about the other community centers—sharing the challenges, knowing we aren't alone and seeing where we are at in relationship to other centers." Participants agreed the experience was valuable and

agreed to meet again in four months.

Wisconsites Make HIV/AIDS Lobbying Trip D.C.

Milwaukee - Eleven Wisconsin residents just returned from Washington, D.C. where they lobbied their members of congress on HIV and AIDS issues. "A lot of people have the misperception that AIDS is over and that's not true," said Paul Lewis, a Merrill resident. Lewis and ten other AIDS advocates from across Wisconsin attended AIDSWatch '98, a three-day lobbying event to educate Congress about the need for expanded funding for HIV prevention, care, research and effective AIDS public policies. The Wisconsin delegation is organized by AIDS Action Wisconsin, a grassroots program coordinated by the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW).

"AIDS advocates took the local concerns of AIDS to Capitol Hill," said ARCW director of public policy Mike Gifford. "They brought a powerful message that the challenges of AIDS are still significant in Wisconsin."

According to Gifford, the annual AIDSWatch brings individuals from every U.S. congressional district to Washington, D.C. for the event. The Wisconsin advocates joined an estimated 400 others from across America.

"We met with all nine Wisconsin representatives and our two senators," said Gifford. "Our message was clear, 'Now is not the time to relax in the fight against AIDS." He added that constituents from six of nine Wisconsin congressional districts participated in AIDSWatch. The AIDS advocates asked their congressmen to do more, not less, to support HIV and AIDS.

"Hope is Not Victory," the 1998 AIDSWatch theme, stemmed from recent advances in the treatment of HIV that resulted in some unexpected consequences.

AIDS Action Wisconsin is a network of over 750 Wisconsin AIDS advocates from all nine congressional districts. "The advocates regularly work directly with their elected officials regarding local, state and national HIV/AIDS funding and policy issues," said Gifford. "Just last year, Wisconsin advocates worked with ARCW to rescue federal funding to help people with HIV/AIDS stay in their homes," he added.

The three days of AIDSWatch included education on the federal legislative process and an update on the 105th Congress. In addition to maintaining AIDS funding, one of this year's key issues was addressing the ban on federal funding for needle exchange programs.

"Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala recently decided not to lift the federal ban for needle exchange

funding despite scientific evidence that it reduces HIV infection, saves lives and actually reduces injection drug use," Gifford said. "Her decision is bad for Wisconsin. It will mean needless new HIV infections and more AIDS deaths."







The Right to Divorce?

By now, you probably have heard of many reasons why same-sex marriage should be legalized. A popular one is that same-sex couples are not entitled to same legal benefits as opposite sex couples who marry. Tax exemption status, wrongful death claims, sur-

vivorship rights, and inheritance rights are only but a few of legal benefits so readily given to married couples but out of reach for same-sex couples. I would like to discuss another right that is denied to same-sex couples but enjoyed by over half of the married non-gay couples — the right to divorce.

It may seem at odds to want the right to marry only so that we can have the right to get out of marriage. Yet, why?

Wisconsin has one of the most elaborate and extensive framework of property rights for divorcing couples. At the onset of a divorce there is a presumption that each spouse owns one-half of all the property acquired during the course of the marriage. We are not only speaking of tangible property like the home, cars, and furniture but also pension plans, mutual funds and life insurance policies. Each spouse may also seek maintenance (a.k.a. alimony) from the other spouse. Child custody, placement and visitation are also decided by statutory guidelines and a rich history of case law.

and a rich history of case law.

When a gay or lesbian couple break up they are left to fend for themselves.

Case and point. A non-gay couple have been married for twelve years. During the marriage the happy couple buy a nice house by Lake Michigan. The deed is in the husband's name only. They also buy a BMW for him and a Volvo station wagon for her. Both car titles are in the husband's name only. In the third year of marriage they have a beautiful bouncing baby boy. Lets also assume that the husband has spent a considerable amount of

years at his place employment and is looking at a sizeable pension. Wanting to surprise his wife one night, the husband returns home early from work and finds his wife in bed with the landscaper! The husband files for divorce. Who gets what?

The law starts with the presumption that all the property will be split equally between the husband and wife — regardless of the fact that the house and two cars are in the husband's name only. The wife may also be entitled to half of her husband's pension plan.

As to the bouncing baby boy, the law initially presumes that both parents are equally fit to care for the child and will first let the parents try to work out a custody-visitation arrangement between themselves. If that fails, there is a long history of case law and statutory guidelines that will assist the judge in deciding issues of custody, placement and visitation.


Now lets assume that the non-gay couple above was a lesbian couple and the "husband" was, lets say, "Julie" and the "wife" was named "Bonnie." Lets also assume that the bouncing baby boy was conceived by Julie through artificial insemination. Thirteen years into the relationship the couple separate. What result?


Julie would get the house, both cars and the entire pension plan. Julie would also have exclusive custody of the child. All of this would occur without Julie ever having to step into court or even hiring an attorney.

After a thirteen year relationship, Bonnie has lost her home, automobile, and quite possibly her child. Granted. There are some legal mechanisms and tools that may help Bonnie regain some of this back but these devices are certainly not equal to the egalitarian framework afforded to divorced heterosexual

The right to divorce is generally not discussed as a right the gay and lesbian community seeks because politically it seems to be too contradictory. This is ridiculous. Gay and lesbian couples are just as vulnerable to a breaking-up as heterosexual couples - in some ways even more (e.g. lack of family and societal support).

The protection of the law at the demise of a relationship is just as important as having it at its conception.

switch me to. It appears the VA muckity mucks have never heard of "expanded access" meds, and are dragging their feet giving my doctor approval to even approach the drug companies.



College Wrestles with Gay Rights

"Queer Issues" Rise to Surface at Vermont School

he TV is on in the living room of this gray house that has become a sort of mecca for gay, lesbian and bisexual students at Middlebury College in Middlebury, Vermont. The rented house sits off campus, separated from the college by a tall picket fence. On the other side of the fence looms Middlebury's science center; farther up the hill, preppy-looking students stride across greens and sidewalks carrying books, tennis rackets and Frisbees.

Here on this side of the fence - over the gray porch, through the cluttered kitchen, past a huge poster of Bjork, the bisexual rock singer from Iceland, and into the living room — four gay students are talking about a recent demonstration

"We're not asking him to understand what it's like to be gay," said Carolyn Ashby, a recent graduate who works in town. "That's not the point; the point is he has an obligation as the college president to respond to the needs of the students around our experience of being gay at this school.'

The students here are four of about 30 active members of MOQA _ Middlebury Open Queer Alliance, a group that has become increasingly vocal on campus. Those students are part of a larger gay community at Middlebury that is harder to estimate.

MOQA members presented a list of requests to college trustees that included creating an on-campus, residential house that would serve as a center for students and

headline: "Drug dealers, gang members, rapists and arsonists." Below the photo in smaller type was text saying that such individuals were admitted to "increase excitement" at "sleepy" Middlebury and counter the image of the typical students, described as a "pansy."

A retraction in the paper's April 3 issue was deemed insufficient by many members of the community. About 40 students and some faculty walked out of a Campus-sponsored forum held April 6 in response to the incident. The Student Government Association, the paper's publisher, held a special session to vote on whether the paper's editor-in-chief, Lela Moore, should step down from her position. The Student Government Association failed to get a two-thirds vote; Moore retains her position.

The advertisement galvanized campus minority voices of all stripes.

"It's important to stress that the rally was not just about race," said Russell Plato, a member of the SGA and MOQA who spoke at the rally.

Suzanne Minott, a black student from Jamaica, said that while race issues triggered the rally, "the emphasis right now is on "queer' issues.'

"People were waiting for the appropri-ate people to respond," Minott said. "If the administration won't say anything,

spurred by a racist ad in the April Fools' Day issue of the college newspaper. The students are watching a taped news broadcast of the rally, which was organized to protest not only racism on campus but many "isms," including sexism, heterosexism, classism and campus-wide oppression of all people who are different. The students laughed a little when the broadcast showed Middlebury President John McCardell reading a prepared statement to heckling students.

"We aspire to something better than the real world, and you're helping us in that aspiration," McCardell said. "Are we perfect? No. Do we engage in discussion here civilly and respectfully? Yes. And that will continue as long as I'm president."

What the broadcast didn't show was a confrontation spurred by Economics Professor Richard Cornwall, a gay man who has been at Middlebury more than 20 years and is finally quitting in frustration over what he says is a hostile campus climate around gay issues. Cornwall challenged McCardell at the rally for failing to respond to a letter he sent four years ago. The letter listed several homophobic incidents and suggestions for improving the atmosphere for gays at Middlebury.

"The heart of the issue is whether Middlebury can be a productive place for queer scholars," Cornwall wrote in the March 1994 letter. "We do not have much evidence on this, though the fact that only a small fraction of the faculty are out, and none of the lesbians, is a severe enough indicator."

Cornwall said in an interview that he confronted McCardell because he wanted to pressure him for not responding to his concerns. "I wanted it on the public record," he said.

Back at the house, students said they were frustrated with the contradiction between McCardell's "one-big-happyfamily" language and his lack of real support for gays and lesbians. Students would like to see the college institute several programs — a residential gender studies house, for example, and an office of minority affairs - and issue a statement declaring support of gay members of the community. They would rather not have to go off campus to find a house in which they can gather and hold meetings. Other students live in special interest houses, they say. They mention a minority student house, foreign language houses, and even an environmental house.

"There's no proactive anything (from McCardell)," said Donald Eggert, a senior. "Even when he comments, it's in a way that doesn't address the issue itself."

faculty interested in gender studies and "queer studies," a relatively new theoretic discipline that sprang out of gender and culture studies in the late '80s and early '90s.

The field, pioneered at the University

of California, Santa Cruz, and UC-Berkeley, studies gender and social construction of gender, as well as the history, literature and culture of homosexuality.

Several other colleges and universities now have gender or "queer" studies departments, including small Amherst College in Massachusetts. City University of New York, Duke University, and San Francisco State University all have similar programs.

Middlebury College, a school of about 2,300, has a women's studies program, but not a department, which means that students cannot major in it.

There has been a recent spate of hostile events on campus that concerns gay students and faculty. Stanley Bates, professor of philosophy, cites a lack of respect for diversity and a trend toward more destructive behavior. "We have significant and serious problems with the social life on this campus," Bates told trustees at a meeting Friday.

Last fall, for example, when MOQA members constructed a closet on campus to draw attention to the isolation gays and bisexuals can feel at Middlebury, the closet was promptly knocked down and hacked apart. The administration never found the culprits, nor did it respond with a swift and direct condemnation of the action, students say.

Why the issues have come to the surface now is a question McCardell struggles with. Many students and faculty say discontent has been simmering under the surface for some time.

"It is interesting that it has come to a head over a racial incident," McCardell said, referring to the recent ad in the school newspaper, The Middlebury Campus. "I think it is a reflection of the changing times we live in, and that a population does not always move at the same speed toward greater enlightenment."

The advertisement in the April Fools' issue of The Middlebury Campus carried a photo of three black men under the

McCardell frankly can't recall whether he respondéd to Cornwall's letter. He was angered by the confrontation, which he called "uncivil and unconstructive."

"The role of the university is not to insist upon or to impose a point of view," he said. "It is to create a climate in which competing points of view ... can co-exist with civility and respect."

Granted, sexuality, race and gender are "more than a point of view," he said. People are born the way they are. "But a community such as ours need not be expected to endorse or approve of any particular thing in order to create a climate in which that thing may be allowed to exist.

In other words, he said, Middlebury College need not endorse or approve of homosexuality simply so that homosexuals can live their lives with dignity and respect.

"My sexuality is my business, yours is yours and theirs is theirs," McCardell said more than once during the interview. The question of whether Middlebury should

support homosexuality is a complex issue, McCardell said. "It assumes that matters which, for a great many people, still lie within the realm of personal privacy ought somehow to be a matter of institutional concern."

everal hundred people gathered last week on the college green to hear students complain to McCardell about what they believe is the administration's inadequate approach to problems of racism, sexism and homophobia on campus.

McCardell pointed to the reinstatement of the Human Relations Committee to evaluate minority concerns on campus, upcoming diversity training for faculty and staff and the creation of a committee to evaluate campus security.

Members of the Student Coalition for Community gave McCardell a contract asking for a diversity affairs office and a statement saying that racism and sexism were problems on campus.

McCardell said he would read the contract before commenting on whether he would sign it.

Ironically, in the early '90s, Middlebury was one of the nation's first colleges to introduce domestic partner benefits to its employee insurance policy. McCardell supported this policy when he arrived in 1991.

But very few faculty are out about being gay, and discussion of gay issues "is done with white gloves on," Cornwall said. The environment either keeps gay students and faculty in the closet or forces them to leave, some faculty say.

In an attempt to change that, Russian Professor Kevin Moss sent an all-faculty email Feb. 26, inviting all faculty to that Sunday's MOQA meeting.

"Where are all the queer female profes-sors?" Moss wrote. "As long as any of us can remember, there has never been a visible lesbian presence on the faculty. This situation has decidedly taken its toll on the queer women students, who never see any faculty like them. And it is a situation mirrored neither at other institutions like ours nor in Vermont where more gender parity is the rule. Why is Middlebury particularly lesbian challenged?"

The e-mail brought out one lesbian staff couple willing to talk to any students

who needed support.

It also caught Moss some flack.



A female professor who is a member of the college's women's studies program and who wished to remain anonymous, said tension around gender and minority issues on campus "is very palpable."

"I'm not so sure a visitor would pick up on it," she said. "But under the surface, there are all kinds of things twisting and

She said she is one of many faculty who are "not just dissatisfied, but disgusted" with the administration's response to issues of diversity and community. She called McCardell's statement at the rally "too little, too late."

"His sights are on other priorities,"

Bailystock & Bloom Present "The Boys in the Band"

Milwaukee — Bailystock & Bloom has combined forces with some of Milwaukee's most talented actors and artists to create *The Boys In The Band*, a play by Mart Crowley. Crowley's play was a sensation when it first opened in 1968. His candid presentation of a group of men who reveled in a polished elocution of gay culture was unlike anything audiences had seen before.

On an evening in June of 1969, a gay revolution began in the streets of New York. When police raided the Stonewall Inn, a popular Greenwich Village gay men's bar, they got more than the arrests they expected to make that night. Indeed, what was to begin that night was an awakening of American gays calling out for an individual and respected voice.

A year prior to this revolt, Mart Crowley's landmark play *The Boys In The Band* opened off-Broadway in New York. What the play showed was a different side of homosexuality than that which would be displayed a year later on a hot summer night. This play takes a look at the lives of a group of gay men celebrating one of the reveler's birthday. But these "boys in the band" are not a vocal group. They hide their sexuality, lie to the world and loathe what they are. Liberation is near for "the boys" but not yet come.



BOOK REVIEW

Don't Get Me Started

by Kate Clinton

e all know Kate Clinton from her appearances as an open lesbian comedian on *Good Morning America*, *Nightline*, and above all on cable's Comedy Central *OUT There* specials. Since she has a way with words (Kate was originally an English teacher), she has written a book — a very funny book — filled with quotable remarks and other amusing anecdotes that range from her family life and her early career in comedy to her current life in Provincetown.

Nothing escapes her rapier wit: Lesbians, gays, politics, sports, family and friends. And, that includes herself and her career. Armistead Maupin, who wrote "Tales of the City" says, "For my money, Kate Clinton will always be the Founding Mother of queer comedy. If the shining example of her courage and candor — and sheer funniness — wasn't a huge inspiration to Ellen DeGeneres, I'll turn in my toaster oven."

Each chapter is titled with a variation of a word using Kate, and is followed by a dictionary description, such as in "aniKwate": (Var. Antiquate) 1. V. to get older and broader. 2. n. a BOBOLINK — Big Older Babe on Lesbian Income, No Kids. There are other titles such as "alloKate," "antieKate," "compuKate," "mediaKate," "rustiKate," and "vindiKate" to name but a few.

In "antiKwate," Clinton tackles the process of quitting smoking. She said that it helped to tell herself that she could start again when she was eighty. Also, the sight of the Joe Camel billboard was a visual incentive to quit. "The sight of that giant scrotum-looking camel with a cigarette hanging from its lips helped. Hey, she's a lesbian, that would be a turn-off. I just started using Zyban & nicotine gum to

get over the urge.

She gets into older women massing together in retirement motor home parks throughout the sunbelt and older women in bangs. She says, "It is pure mortification when June Allyson, in her bouncing and behaving bangs, must do Pampers, or Grampers ads. She just might as well be saying, 'Hi, I'm June Allyson and I'm peeing right now.' "

In an earlier chapter she says her gaydar has been ready to detect any signs of gayness in her nephew, Paul. When his new little sister came home from the hospital, the needle moved to "full purple alert" when, after a few months, he gave her a pop to the head and explained his actions by saying, "I didn't like her outfit." One day he said when he grew up he wanted to buy a town house. No mention was made of an apartment or track lighting, "...but he did say townhouse."

In a more political vein, she bashes DOMA, gays in the military and the big issue for gays: the freedom to marry, by calling it "Mad Vow Disease." She agrees with gays having the right to marry and getting the same benefits as straight people, but she prefers "living in sin." She says, "The freedom *not* to marry is one of the things I have enjoyed about being gay," as is "the freedom to *not* have children."

Her chapter on attending a women's music festival is a screech. She tells about the first time she met Amistead Maupin in San Francisco at the Great American Music Hall. Years later, it was payback time when he called to talk and ask about festivals. "...festivals were my middle name," she says, and goes on to describe the ones she has appeared at: the Southern Women's Music and Comedy Festival, the New England Women's Music Retreat, The National Women's Music Festival in Bloomington, Indiana, the Poconos Women's Festival in Pennsylvania, and the mother of all festivals, the Michigan festival.

In her Introduction, Kate says she "originally wanted to have a little computer chip laugh track in the back of the book, but apparently there have been some rogue computer chips that have gone off like a late-night car alarm and driven bookstore owners to distraction." She ditched that idea, and suggests reading the book out loud to friends. She wants you to stand up when you do it and use hand gestures! I didn't; I just sat there on the couch, and occasionally broke out into gales of laughter. You will too. This woman is not only funny, she can write! (Ballantine Books, ISBN 345-388887-9, \$22)
