


Battle of the Ads

Far-Right Newspaper Ads Rankle Rights Groups

Washington, D.C. — Rights advocates say they're outraged about ads running in several major U.S. newspapers by far-right organizations claiming a virtual monopoly on "truth," calling on gays and lesbians to change their sexual orientation to heterosexuality, and charging the gay rights movement with a litany of bullying tactics ranging from "threats" to "blackmail."

The ads, which ran in the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post and USA Today, cost the groups at least \$200,000 and spotlight recent antigay remarks by Green Bay Packers star Reggie White, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, and gospel singers Angie and Debbie Winans. Under the headline "In defense of free speech," the ads, sponsored by the Christian Coalition, the Family Research Council, and 13 other far-right groups, say the recent anti-gay remarks "have brought a tidal wave of harsh language from homosexual activists, media pundits, and even a White House spokesman. They have branded Christian minister and pro-football player Reggie White as 'ignorant,' 'stupid,' and 'backward'."

The full-page ad that ran in USA Today featured White decked in his Packers uniform and quoting the defensive end as saying "I've been called homophobic. I've been called stupid. I've been called unintelligent, and I've been called a nigger by so-called gay activists."

The ads urged homosexuals to contact Exodus International, a Seattle-based religious organization that claims gays and lesbians can be "changed" to heterosexuality through what it calls "reparative therapy" and prayer. In some early editions of papers carrying the ads, however, instead of listing the Exodus phone number, they carried the number of an electrical contractor in Alabama.

Misprints or not, gay rights advocates say they're countering with an ad campaign of their own, calling the anti-gay ads damaging and part of election-year politics.

Winnie Stafelberg of the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) said the organization was "joined by a dozen organizations [and] will issue an ad in USA Today and the New York Times to tell the real story about gays and lesbians."

Stafelberg said, "The fact that these organizations say you can be changed is really quite a tragic message to be sending to people."

Elizabeth Birch, executive director of HRC, said respected medical and mental health organizations agree that homosexuality isn't a result of any personal choice and that last year the American Psychological Association overwhelmingly adopted a resolution saying that there was no sound scientific evidence that reparative therapy like that used by Exodus actually worked.

Instead, Birch said the ads were part of efforts by farright organizations to push their social agenda to the forefront of the Republican Party in upcoming elections. "They are using these very manipulative ads to throw red meat to the firebrand, extreme-right, grassroots wing of the Republican Party," Birch said. "It's nothing more than a crass political move in an election year. The Christian Coalition, whose leader Pat Robertson sought the GOP presidential nomination in 1988, and the Family Research Council, whose chairman Gary Bauer is considered a prospective Republican presidential contender in 2000, both denied that the campaign was aimed at supporting any election campaign. "It's a non-partisan message based on the mainstream concern about the decline of morality in America," said Arne Owens of the Christian Coalition. Owens said, however, that the ads would continue through "most of the remainder of the year" but declined to give any further details.

'No Fags'

Mayoral Candidate Wows Christian Coalition in Arkansas

Springdale, Ark. — During a trip to his home state in mid-July, President Clinton attended Sunday services at the Immanuel Baptist Church in Little Rock, Ark., where he heard a sermon about "leaving a legacy of being devoted to God."

But earlier in the week, in the northwest corner of the state, a group of Springdale mayoral candidates were espousing their own ideas about what a "Christian nation" means to them - and it doesn't mean allowing homosexual in the city limits at all. At times the candidates sounded more like they were addressing a "citizens militia" meeting rather than church-going Christians.

The five Springdale mayoral hopefuls - former Councilman Ray Dotson, Timothy Hill, state Rep. Louis McJunkin, Eddie Thomas and Alderman Wayne Vanhook - all told a forum sponsored by the local chapter of the Christian Coalition that they opposed any extension of the city's human rights laws to offer anti-bias protections based on sexual orientation.

In nearby Fayetteville, the city council there recently passed a resolution barring anti-gay discrimination that was vetoed by the mayor and which the council then overrode - only to find the question forced to a vote in November's election.

But all five Springdale candidates, with varying degrees of fierceness, said they were opposed to such a civil rights measure for their town.

Thomas was perhaps the least savage in opposing an anti-bias measure, saying that if wouldn't be "fair" to protect the civil rights of homosexuals without also protecting the rights of smokers or alcoholics. Adding a new class of protected individuals, Thomas said, "could have a snowball effect."

Hill was hands down the most rabid in not just his

opposition to gay rights and homosexuals generally, but the most vehement in a number of his responses to other, unrelated questions as well. He also was the only candidate to repeatedly drew applause from the local Christian Coalition foot-soldiers.

"Homosexuals are perverts," Hill began his remarks by saying. "This is a Christian nation. To put up with perversion like that, you're willing to put up with anything. They've spread their disease worldwide, and I'll do everything I can to keep them out of Springdale."

Hill said he would "enforce the sodomy law" as part of his efforts to make gays and lesbians unwelcome in the city and that he would put up two signs along the roads into town, one reading "Welcome to Springdale: Home of God-fearing, armed Christian citizens" and the other reading "No fags in Springdale."

His remarks drew standing applause from the audience at the forum.


In fact, Hill's responses to nearly every issue raised was usually not only the most extreme voiced, but it also typically elicited spontaneous applause from the audience.

He denounced all forms of taxation and equated it with communism, saying that "we need to start relying on ourselves" instead of government to solve community problems. He said he didn't think Springdale, with a population of some 25,000 people, needed 87 firefighters and they he would cut the number in half if elected. He had, he said, never even seen a fire in Springdale.

Sounding more like a militia survivalist ready to "head for the Ozark mountains," Hill also said the city could cut the police department staff in half by encouraging citizens of the town to arm themselves. In fact one of Hill's campaign promises of "100 goals" for Springdale calls for creating a "voluntary citizens' militia."

In comparison with Hill, the other candidates' calls for citizens "to elect good Christian people" to run the town seemed almost like far-left liberalism, but there was no question based on the audience's repeated applause, that Hill was their favorite.

Too Gay?

University, Churches and Daily Paper Web Sites Being Blocked Suit Charges

Alexandria, VA — It may be fit to print in Connecticut or California, but the board of the Loudoun County, Virginia, public library insists it has the right to use blocking software to prevent library patrons from using its computers to access a whole range of materials it considers harmful to young people under Virginia law — especially if the Internet sites contain words like "gay" or "lesbian" or a number of other words that trigger the software's filtering flags.

The library board installed X-Stop, an Internet blocking program that's intended to keep users from getting access to pornographic materials that are increasingly common on the WorldWide Web and elsewhere on the Internet.

The problem is that software like X-Stop, the creation of the Log-On Data Corp. of Anaheim, Calif., not only blocks sexually explicit materials, it also often ends up, as in this case, blocking web sites with material ranging from safer sex information to daily newspapers to church organizations to university departments.

So the American Civil Liberties Union is representing a Virginia group, Mainstream Loudoun, in a federal lawsuit against the library system's trustees, charging the use of the blocking program violates constitutionally guaranteed free speech protections.

Staffers at the Loudoun County Library say they're uncomfortable with the Internet blocking software, in part because it denies access of library patrons to material which is exactly the opposite of what librarians are intended to do, and partly because it makes library users "second-class citizens" unless they have access to the Internet at home.

But Richard Black, a state legislator and member of the library board who supports the use of the blocking software, insists that "99.9 percent" of the sites being restricted from the library computers are pornography. "Even if the software blocked some sites that didn't need to be blocked," Black said, "the fact is there is no other solution." He also said the library board had had "very few complaints" about the blocking software.

But now the library board will have to defend itself in federal court against the legal complaint filed for Mainstream Loudoun by the ACLU and a slew of others who have joined the suit against the trustees.

Rob Morse, a columnist with the San Francisco Examiner has joined the lawsuit because the newspaper he writes for as well as the city's other daily, the San Francisco Chronicle are blocked by the X-Stop software.

Also joining the suit against the trustees are Jonathan Troyer, who runs a "Safer Sex Page" aimed at advising gay and bisexual teens on how to avoid HIV infection; John Ockerbloom, who runs a site highlighting books that have been the target of censorship; the Maryland chapter of the American Association of University Women, whose web site promotes education and pay equity for women; Jeremy Myers, an 18-year-old who operates a web page with advice and reference materials for gay and lesbian teens dealing with their sexual orientation; Sergio Arau, a Mexican artist whose paintings are displayed on the Internet; the Renaissance Transgender Association, which runs a support web site for people dealing with gender identity issues; and Jonathan Wallace, who puts out an online publication called "The Ethical Spectacle" about Internet censorship.

Although they have not joined in the lawsuit, other web sites that X-Stop blocks at the Loudoun County Library include the anti-war religious group, the Society of Friends (Quakers), the Zero Population Growth web site, parts of the Mormon Church web pages, and Yale University Biology Department's web page.

Morse, a wry, well-liked *Examiner* columnist, said of the case recently, "It hurts to be told I'm purveying 'material deemed harmful to children' as Loudoun County put it. It's hard enough to get adults to read this stuff." Morse added that as far as he knows "this may be the first time that major newspapers have been banned from libraries."

Ann Beeson, the lead ACLU attorney in the suit, says there have been similar conflicts with library filtering software in the past — including libraries in Boston and Kern County, Calif. - but that they've been resolved fairly simply by the libraries giving patrons the option of using the filtering program or not. Loudoun County officials have refused to accept that solution, however.

Beeson says a basic problem is that public officials want to rely on technology to solve problems that it's not able to because "the technology is stupid."

She says blocking programs like X-Stop and others simply can't distinguish between a web site that discusses, for example, safer sex or masturbation and a pornographic story using more or less the same language.

"A professional librarian can make those distinctions," said Beeson. "Blocking software never could do that."

Beeson also said she was fairly sure the high level of news coverage of gay and lesbian issues by the *Examiner* and the *Chronicle* triggered the X-Stop warning flags that have ended up blocking access to the dailies.

Again, she says it's because the technology can't evaluate the nature of content, just what words are at the web site and how often they occur. So, Beeson says, the *Examiner* and the *Chronicle* and the Mormon Church and the Quakers and safer sex web sites all get blocked because the blocking software finds too many instances of certain "trigger words" at the sites and decides they're pornographic.

"If Supreme Court justices can't define pornography with any certainty or clarity," Beeson says, "how can some programmers in Anaheim do it? The answer is they can't."

Anti-Violence Groups Launch Abused Lesbian Ad Campaign

SAN FRANCISCO — Four San Francisco agencies — Community United Against Violence (CUAV), the Asian Women's Shelter, San Francisco Women Against Rape and WOMAN Inc. — have launched what they say is the first public service ad campaign aimed to reaching lesbians and other women who are being sexually abused by their female partners to find help.

Last year, a coalition of gay and lesbian anti-violence organizations released the first study of same-sex domestic violence, concluding that about a third of gay and lesbian couples experience some sort of abuse by one partner or the other. Earlier this year, a San Francisco supervisor proposed city funds to help shelter gay men trying to escape for abusive male partners.

But anti-violence advocates say same-sex partner abuse is "one of the last taboo subjects" in the gay and lesbian community, and something that many people - including men and women involved in such abusive relationships don't want to admit.

The ads, which appear in public transit subway cars and buses and appear in English, Spanish and Mandarin, are anything but subtle. One shows two women kissing with a bold headline reading, "Does she hit you?" Another ad says simply, "I never thought a woman could rape another woman."

Dawn Rudd of CUAV said, "The question was, should we air our dirty laundry? Do we want to put this out for all the straight folks to see or use to feed into people's homophobic attitudes? I say we have to, to move on. It is silence that kills us. It's the things that we don't say that ultimately map our demise."

Versace Killing Eyewitness Statement Released

MIAMI — Police have release a statement by the only eyewitness to the 1997 killing of fashion icon Gianni Versace.

The statement by Mersiha Colakovic says she was only about three yards away on July 15, 1997, when a man armed with a pistol approached Versace as he was about to enter his South Beach mansion, and fired two shots, killing the designer.

The woman had actually given police another statement under an fake name, saying she feared the shooting had been related to the Mafia. While police summarized her statements last year in material the released, they had never released the actual statement until now.

Colakovic described a younger-looking white male, dressed in a tank-top, shorts and a black baseball cap as the man who shot Versace. But ironically she was not able to later identify from a photo lineup Andrew Cunanan, who police say killed Versace and at least four other men in a killing spree.

Lott All But Kills Hormel Ambassadorial Nomination Vote

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott has finally said what everyone already knew - that he "would not support" the confirmation of openly gay philanthropist Jim Hormel to be the country's ambassador to the tiny nation of Luxembourg.


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Lott has refused to schedule a confirmation vote on President Clinton's nomination of the San Francisco businessman and longtime Democrat Party supporter even though a Senate committee unanimously approved his nomination.

Lott in June said that his reading of the Bible convinced him that homosexuality is a sin, but one that can be "treated," like alcoholism or kleptomania.

Ovadal's Surprise Fizzles "Sin Plane" Buzzes Madison Pride March

Madison (AP) — The banner that fluttered behind the small airplane clearly was meant as a rebuke to the roughly 2,500 people at last Sunday's Gay and Lesbian Visibility rally.

But when they saw the words "Homosexuality is sin" circling the bright sky above them, only a few people booed. Most just shook their heads. Others chuckled.

"That must be Ralph's surprise," one woman told her baffled neighbor.

The name of Ralph Ovadal, director of Wisconsin Christians United, was on the lips of many at the annual gay pride rally at the State Capitol steps on Sunday. Ovadal ended a controversial anti-homosexual billboard campaign last week — but not before promising a "surprise" at Sunday's rally.

As it turned out, however, Ovadal's challenge only brought Madison's LGBT community and its supporters together.

As Geoff Gyrisco, a member of the church group Integrity/Dignity Madison, explained: "This controversy gave me the push to show up — we can't let the radical right own the Christian faith."

Spirituality was a theme at this year's rally. Dozens of Christian groups attended with signs affirming their support for homosexuals, as did representatives of several area Jewish organizations.

• "This year, with everything that's been going on, we made an effort to get a lot of people out — both straight and gay," said Mimi Goldberg, of the Shaarei Shamayim Jewish Reconstructionist Community.

Individuals in the crowd echoed the theme on bright placards reading "My family values are love, honesty, respect, hard work and compassion" and "God lovingly created me gay."

The rally — one of the largest in recent years — also was well-attended by

local politicians. Mayor Sue Bauman and County Executive Kathleen Falk addressed the crowd, as did congressional candidate Tammy Baldwin and state Assembly candidate Mark Pocan. Others waved signs urging the crowd to remember liberal candidates Ed Garvey and Rick Phelps in the fall elections.


"Ralph, you've done more to organize lesbians, gays, bisexuals, transsexuals and their straight allies than anyone I know, and I thank you."

"This is Madison, Wisconsin, a city of tolerance," Bauman told the crowd. 'We love you, and we're glad you're here." Before the crowd marched down State Street and headed toward Brittingham Park, where a picnic awaited, Pocan jokingly expressed his appreciation for Ovadal's recent actions.

"Ralph, you've done more to organize lesbians, gays, bisexuals, transsexuals and their straight allies than anyone I know, and I thank you."

Others in the crowd, however, said the billboards and other offensives against homosexuals in recent months are something the community could have done without.

"This wastes energy that could be used to address people's needs, their hurts and fears, poverty ..." said Ken Scott. "I think we are forced to respond. But I think that's a pity."

AIDS Doctor Bernstein to Leave Medical College

Milwaukee —Dr. Barry Bernstein, a leading Wisconsin physican specializing in the treatment of persons with HIV/AIDS is leaving his position at the Medical College of Wisconsin in early August.

Bernstein leaves his post at Froedert Memorial Hospital as head of the Division of Infectious Diseases to take research position at Abbott Laboratoires in Gurnee Mills, IL where he will do AIDS research and drug development.

Bernstein first began seeing persons with HIV in the mid-eighties when very little could be offered except for diagonsis and supportive care. Since that time, Bernstein became well-respected in the AIDS community for his work with persons with HIV/AIDS with his case load estimated at over 400 persons.

Gay Youth More Likely To Be Threatened, Abuse Drugs

Winston-Salem (AP) —Teen-age boys who have had multiple homosexual partners are more likely than other teens to be threatened at school and to abuse drugs, says a study out of Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center.

Male students with five or more male sexual partners in the study were significantly more likely to receive threats or be the victims of physical violence than those with five or more female partners, said study team leader Robert H. DuRant.

As a result, those young men will be more likely to be absent from school out of fear or carry weapons both in and out of school, the study said.

The survey also indicated that substance abuse was higher among gay male students with multiple partners than others surveyed.

A team of pediatricians from Brenner's Children's Hospital at Baptist Medical Center analyzed the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, which was conducted in Vermont at 79 randomly selected public and private schools.

The analysis of the survey focused on the 3,886 boys who said they were sexually active. Of these, 8.7 percent reported one or more male sexual partners.

The researchers said a possible explanation for the study results was that male students with multiple same-sex partners are more likely to be identified as having a homosexual lifestyle.

The study can make clinicians aware that gay teens with multiple partners may be involved in more than one form of high-risk behavior, the researchers said.

Gender Identity May Be Malleable

Chicago, IL — A Canadian boy who was raised as a girl after his penis was irreparably damaged during circumcision continues to live as a woman, suggesting gender identity develops after birth, researchers say.

The case is only the second documented case of a boy being "assigned" a new gender after his genitals were mutilated during circumcision.

The study, released in the July issue of the jour-

which enabled them to develop breasts and other female traits.

The operation in the first case was done at 21 months, vs. seven months in the second case. Researchers say that may mean there's a "window" of time after birth — some say up to age 18 months — in which babies identify as neither boys nor girls.

"It suggests that, if you reassign a child early enough and tell them that they are whatever sex, then they probably believe you and tend to accept themselves," said Michael Bailey, a professor of psychology at Northwestern University who studies gender identity and sexual orientation.

In both cases, the patients studied had "tomboyish" characteristics. In the first case initially studied in 1973 at Johns Hopkins University — the patient rejected dolls, tried to urinate standing up and decided to return to life as a boy at age 14, after learning about the operation. He also reported exclusive attraction to women and has since married a woman. porch had been spray-painted with the sentence, "Jesus weren't born for you, faggot." In May, the 40-year-old Wolf told police her girlfriend found her again tied up and apparently beaten on the back with a whip.

But Lancaster County sheriff's officials said an unnamed male acquaintance of Wolf's had admitted to them that he was paid \$50 by Wolf and promised \$300 more to tie her up and inflict the beating. Police said they gave the man a lie detector test that he passed and that they had issued warrants for Wolf's arrest.

Sheriff's officials also said forensic evidence indicated that some of her injuries weren't consistent with her story of how she received them.

Police said the unnamed informant had told them "she said she wanted to get a hate crime reported."

The South Carolina ACLU, however, charged that police had not investigated Wolf's case fairly because she is a lesbian. "We are deeply concerned that law enforcement does not appear to have taken the attacks on Regan Wolf seriously," said Steven Bates of the state ACLU chapter.

Wolf's attorney, Joe McCulloch, said the woman stands by the report she filed with police.

Court Rules Against State in 'HIV POS' License Plate Case

SAN FRANCISCO — U.S. District Court Judge Susan Illston said the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) was wrong to refuse to give Kevin Dimmick, who is infected with HIV, a vanity license plate reading "HIV POS."

But Judge Illston also rejected Dimmick's \$5 million lawsuit claims against the state's motor licensing agency even if the department had discriminated against him, saying the agency had not purposefully inflicted any emotional distress on him.

The DMV had refused his request for the plate, saying some Californians might be offended by it.

Dimmick, 41, is the founder of a group known as Positive Support, which helps heterosexuals infected with HIV, said he is unsure if he will appeal the ruling or not.

"My original intent was to show people it was OK to be HIV-positive," Dimmick said. "Two years later, I've achieved a court ruling saying it's OK to say I'm positive however, they've done nothing against the discriminatory acts that have been done to me."

Former Top French Officials to Stand Trial in AIDS Scandal

PARIS — Former French Prime Minister Laurent Fabius and two former health ministers will face manslaughter charges for allowing HIV-contaminated blood to be used in transfusions for hemophiliacs in the mid-1980s.

Along with Fabius, who is the current speaker of the French National Assembly, Georgina Dufoix, former minister of social affairs, and Edmond Herve, the former secretary of state for health, will be charged with "manslaughter and causing accidental injury." Some 1,300 people, most of them hemophiliacs, contracted HIV as a result of such transfusions, and at least 500 of them have since died of AIDS-related illnesses.

Fabius's Socialist administration, in office in 1984-85, is accused of allowing the use of HIV-tainted blood products while delaying the introduction of a U.S. test for screening donors' blood in favor of one then being developed by France's Pasteur Institute.

French officials also said there was also evidence of a decision in the government chain of command to use up old blood stocks, even if they may have been contaminated.

Some 30 French health and blood-bank officials have

The Canadian who is living as a woman describes herself as bisexual. As of last summer, she was in a relationship with a woman.

To researchers, that suggests that sexual orientation may be determined in the womb, by genetics and prenatal hormones, but that gender identity may be determined months after birth.

"When you think about the fact that this person was an entirely normal biological male prior to the circumcision accident, this case may shed some insight of how malleable someone's gender identity is," said Kenneth Zucker, one of the study's authors and a researcher with the Clarke Institute of Psychiatry in Toronto.

"The outcome of our case — at least with regard to gender identity — suggests that it is pliable after all."

In both cases, the testicles and remainder of the penis were removed and a vagina created. The patients also were given female hormones, The Canadian patient has adjusted to life as a woman. She was not identified by researchers and did not respond to a request for an interview sent through her doctor.

She works in a blue-collar job almost always performed by men, Zucker said. When interviewed by researchers last year at age 26, she said she has had relationships with men but was in a relationship with a woman.

John Bancroft, director of the Kinsey Institute for Research in Sex, Gender and Reproduction at Indiana University, said the studies show "we are very much in the dark" when it comes to how gender identity and sexual orientation develop. already been tried and sentenced in the country's scandal over apparent. attempts to allow Pasteur to produce a screening test to rival that of U.S. drug company Abbott.

NY Gov. Signs HIV Notification Bill into Law

ALBANY, N.Y. — New York Gov. George E. Pataki has signed legislation mandating that people infected with HIV report the names of their sexual partners or drug needle sharers to physicians, who are then required to notify public health officials.

The law, sponsored by Assemblywoman Nettie Mayersohn, makes New York the 30th state to require partner notification of HIV-infected individuals.

Gov. Pataki said that the law would provide at-risk people with needed information. But many AIDS advocacy groups remain opposed to the measure and say it will simply discourage people from being tested.




PrideFest Moves to Reduce Underage Drinking

Milwaukee — Many festivals and fairs have experienced a growing problem with underage drinkers. Way-Gay Montreal

ontreal is vibrant, multiethnic, civilized, cultured, cheap, and very gay. The streets pulsate, the food is delicious, a U.S. dollar gets you \$1.41 Canadian, and a mile-long stretch Rue Sainte-Catherine E. (The Gay Village) may be the gayest place in North America apart from 18th and Castro.

The gay scene is highly developed with shops, bars, dance clubs, restaurants, hotels, more than 10 bathhouses, scads of video arcades, and a couple of gay megacomplexes that contain most of the above under one roof.

I like bears so I hung out at The Stud, La Track and the Black Eagle (Aigle Noir). These bars and scores of others on Rue Sainte-Catherine E. were packed on Saturday night, packed on Sunday night and busy on Monday night. Bars close at 3:00 a.m.

The Black Eagle is cruisiest, The Stud has a small dance floor and a karaoke machine, La Track is huge with a large dance area in the basement. Other clubs up and down Sainte-Catherine offer drag shows, dancing, strippers, live music, gym boys and any other gay subgroup that comes to mind. You really don't need a guidebook. Just start walking east at the UQAM Metro stop and soon you're in the thick of it. The Village continues all the way to the Papineau Metro stop.


The guys I chatted up were friendly and talkative. Most spoke English ranging from passable to very good. In general in Montreal, most folks address you in French first. About 90 percent of the time, they switch to English once you speak English. About 10 percent of the time, in my experience, you need to call upon whatever French you have. In my case, knowing Spanish combined with one six-month course of French 13 years ago got me out of both written and spoken French-only jams. But if I return for a longer stay, the polite thing to do will be to study French in the preceding months.

This visit was a journalistic junket sponsored by Idem Tours (a Montreal gay vacations company; 1-888-273-IDEM), Departures Canada (a San Francisco-

based company specializing in tours to Mon-1-800-546treal; 1793), Tourisme Montreal and Tourisme Quebec. We stayed downtown at the very pleasant and upscale Hotel du Fort (1-800-565-6333). Another option, where I stayed on my own after the junket ended, is Hotel Gouverneur at the west end of the Village.

Using the U.S. "Entertainment Card" program, I paid \$70 Canadian (\$49 U.S.) for first-class accom-

modations (1-514-842- 4881). There are plenty of other hotels around the west end of the Village ranging from \$25 to \$70 Canadian a night. The cheapest ones


Rouge and the Sucrerie de la Montagne as standouts. Located 45 minutes from the city, the Sucrerie (1-514- 451-5204) is a traditional maple grove (trees are tapped for maple syrup the old-fashioned way) combined with a woodfired bakery and a rustic restaurant (in restored barns) serving up a traditional Quebecois feast and folkloric music. The fixed menu featured pea soup, country potatoes, maple-smoked bacon, country sausages, traditional Quebecois tourtiere, meatballs,

maple- glazed smoked ham, wood-fired baked beans, souffle omelette, Canadian salted back bacon, and sugar pie. I passed out in the tour bus afterward.

When the junket ended I stayed on to explore Montreal a bit more on my own. Two of my favorite parts of town were the Quartier Latin along Rue Saint-Denis north of UQAM (the University of Quebec at Montreal). This is a great area for strolling and street life, and if you keep on walking north of beautiful Square Saint-Louis, you enter the equally engaging stomping ground of the city's Fran-cophone intellectual set.

Another great walking street is Boul. Saint-Laurent north of Rue Sherbrooke, a trendy (but not too trendy) jumble of ethnicities, street life and good, cheap food. Saint-Denis and Saint-Laurent are connected by the Rue Prince-Arthur pedestrian street, a perfect place for reasonably priced, good-quality restaurants and Euro-style sidewalk life.

If I had stayed longer, I have no doubt I would have discovered many more of Montreal's charms. I'm talking to my husband about the possibility of going back for a month in September. How's that for a recommendation?



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
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


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
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



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

Even Infrastructure Requires Cost Management

In Step recently published an opinion piece from Ralph Navarro regarding his concerns about the Gay Information Services (GIS) phone line not being funded through community-based groups, the Cream City Foundation (CCF) being one of the groups mentioned. Mr. Navarro contended that every community needs an infrastructure in order to grow and maintain itself. Examples of infrastructure can be freeways, a water supply or telephone service. From the perspective of the GLBT community, infrastructure can be community groups and organizations (such as CCF or the LGBT Community Center), social services, medical care, and sources of information.

In replying to Mr. Navarro, allow me to continue his infrastructure analogy. As infrastructure is planned, developed and maintained, an essential requirement is that there be a budget, a record of expenses and an accounting. While these tend to be :behind the scenes" items, they are expected by the people that fund the infrastructure. As taxpayers and consumers, we would be very skeptical of anyone that asks for funds without a plan to spend them. We would likely be even more skeptical of a vendor or a municipality that presented a total bill and asked for partial or full reimbursement without very detailed records to show how the expenses were incurred.

The Cream City Foundation recognizes and is proud of its role in supporting the infrastructure of the GLBT community. CCF has provided funds to a diverse range of groups and functions that have benefited the community including PrideFest, PFLAG, Gay Youth Milwaukee Hotline, and many more. Also, the focus of CCF is to fund groups and services that primarily benefit southeastern Wisconsin, thus the recognition that funds should be invested in the region where the residents provide the funding.

CCF appreciates the trust that its donors place in it by virtue of donating money. CCF also accepts the fiduciary responsibility to carefully review grant requests and allocate money. A thorough grant application and review process is in place to accomplish this including a requester submitting a grant application, providing thorough documentation of the program or service and planned expenses, review by a Grants Committee, and final recommendation and action by the full CCF Board of Directors. Once the funds are allocated, the recipient is expected to submit a follow-up report and documentation to demonstrate the funds were spent as requested.

This process is paper based; the forms, budgets and financial reports are provided in writing for committee and Board review. If additional information or clarification is needed, the

Grants Committee will contact 'the person submitting the' request by phone or by mail and explain what is needed. Failure to submit the requested information results in the request being put on hold because it is incomplete.

Complete written information provides required documentation for a request as well as the auditors, maintains objectivity, avoids the "politics" that can occur with personal presentations or appeals, and respects the time commitment of the volunteers, both from CCF and the requesting organization. In addition, in any financial transaction, personal meetings or discussion cannot substitute for the effectiveness of complete written materials.

While it is CCF's policy to not discuss any individual grant request, it must be noted that the above described process has consistently been followed with all requests. If sufficient documentation is not provided to support expenses (particularly in the case where the activity or service has already occurred) the Grants Committee and the CCF Board cannot justify providing funding. CCF feels that this position is in line with its fiduciary commitment to its donors.

Infrastructure is important in all walks of our lives, including the GLBT community. This infrastructure requires funding few things these days occur for free. However, budgets, records and complete financial documentation of incurred expenses should be part of any program. These records are especially important when funds from an external source are being requested, be it CCF, the new GLBT Community Center or others.





Stop the Lying

guess it was to be expected. The recent billboard campaign sponsored by Wisconsin Christian's United caused the "we're just like everyone else" crowd to come out in force at a recent hearing in Madison during which the city council was considering formally naming Madison a city of tolerance. As when the State Assembly considered the anti-same-sex marriage bill and a bill which would have denied funds to

municipalities providing domestic partnership benefits, they performed what they thought to be their civic duty and testified to their "normalness.

Indeed, many were quite eloquent and their statements, I'm sure, were heartfelt. They were also dishonest. The assertion that we - particularly gay men - are just like everyone else perpetuates a myth that is downright untrue and this myth perpetuation will ironically prevent us from ever really being just like everyone else. If we continue to testify not only to branches of government, but to our family, friends and colleagues that our lives are no different from straight people's lives while knowing full well that no straight people we know have been to bathhouses, had sex in parks, and compulsively surfed the net for third parties for sex, we participate in a dishonest conspiracy of silence which enables its participants to maintain one thing while doing another.

Until there is some sort of collective intervention, not unlike that kind which occurs in a family dealing with alcoholism or drug abuse, nothing will change. Until a loud chorus of gay people sings out "stop the lying," we will have to continue to watch men who cheat on their partners incessantly, cruise parks and other public places for sex, obtain third parties for sex, and host parties which inevitable turn into orgies maintain in public testimony that they are committed to their partners and have a "family" just like everyone else. And these will be the "values" and norms which will be passed on to our young people.

At a speech I gave to the Madison Rotary, I was asked why I thought there was so much promiscuity in the gay community and do you want to know what I did? I answered the question. I didn't deflect it by saying that there's no difference between you (straight question asker) and me. I didn't point out to the audience that I have been in a monogamous relationship for five years, own a home, pay taxes and help raise a child. I gave them some insights into why I thought it was the case that gay men are more promiscuous. And do you want to know what happened then? My audience and I moved into a dialogue which was highly respectful and insightful.

Contrary to what some "leaders" of the gay/lesbian community must think, we don't have to hide what those "leaders" must have concluded is the seamier side of our community from straight people for them to believe we are deserving of equal rights. And we shouldn't continue to pretend this seamier side doesn't exist if we truly want the community to mature into one which is truly "just like everyone else's.

Finally, a word to the unapologetic, Sex Panic types who might be reading this column. While I don't endorse your advocacy of unsafe sex, I applaud you for your honesty. At least I wont have to watch one of you telling members of the State Legislature that you are just like everyone else because you revel in the fact you are not.

New York — For its August/September episode *In the Life* take its third annual look at films from around the world which highlight and explore the gay and lesbian experience.

From documentaries to experimental works, and from industry features to independent films, gay men and lesbians as well as straight directors are producing works about gay life that are vastly different in scope and style. Each diverse project provides insight about same-sex love that is unprecedented in contrast to just a decade ago. Twenty years ago San Francisco introduced a new concept - develop a film festival which would promote and showcase the work of gay men and lesbians. Today there are nearly 100 gay and lesbian film festivals around the globe, from Bologna to Budapest and from Nashville to New York! This segment explores how gay and lesbian film festivals have grown, and more importantly, how theyive sustained and encouraged the work of gay film artists who are challenging and often changing the face of independent and mainstream film. Generations highlights three different documentaries which examine the gay experience through the perspective of age and gender. The first, Beauty Before Age reveals the complexities of growing

epublican Ron Greer's latest anti-gay attack on Democratic opponent Tammy Baldwin has put a nationwide focus on the campaign for Scott Klug's House seat. And while Greer's fund-raising letter attacking Baldwin has drawn sharp criticism from both Democrats and Republicans, ABC's World News Tonight recently profiled Greer in what some have termed "flattering and misguided" segment.

1988 could be the first time in American history that a left-wing lesbian is



elected to Congress!" Greer wrote in the letter, blasting Baldwin for her stances on gay marriage, affirmative action, taxes, "partial birth" abortion and welfare.

A Republican insider told the Capitol Times that Greer's appeal could bring in as much as \$125,000 if sent to the right mailing list. Greer also has the endorsement of James Dobson, leader of Focus on the Family, a national conservative Christian organization. The Greer campaign could afford to buy perhaps 50,000 names of contributors from the national Focus on the Family database, the source said.

The Greer letter also could help Baldwin in her fund-raising efforts. It has already generated numerous assurances of support since news of the attack broke, according to Baldwin campaigner Paul Devlin.

Feminists are likely to be energized by the campaign letter, which names the National Organization for Women among the "left-wing political allies" and "radical homosexual groups" who are backing Baldwin.

Baldwin tried to steer clear of direct engagement with Greer. However, in a recent three-way televised discussion with other Democratic candidates Baldwin said it would be a mistake to "stoop" to the level of Greer's rhetoric. Two of Baldwin's Democratic opponents, Rick Phelps and Joe Wineke, both blasted Greer's attack during the debate debate.

Certainly there is a segment that's putting up billboards and believes in things like intolerance," Republican analyst Bill Kraus said. "I have no idea how big it is or how rich it is.'

This recent Greer episode is just the latest in a series which has alienat-L ed Madison's lesbigay community, against whom he's been singularly outspoken. "If I was in a car accident or my house was on fire, would Ronnie Greer treat me like any other citizen?" wonders Michael Verveer, a gay alderman who lives near Greer's firehouse. "I'm not confident he would, and that's a widespread feeling in the gay community."

marines (with a bad-conduct discharge) and became a fire cadet in Madison.

In the summer of 1995 Greer caught word that Madison's Board of Police and Fire Commissioners was considering hiring Debra Amesqua, the fire-training chief in Tallahassee, Florida, to head the city's 280-person department. Amesqua, who's of Hispanic and Native American descent, would become Wisconsin's first female fire chief. "Everybody was upset," stated Greer. "She was an up-and-coming affirmative action star, and there was concern that she wasn't qualified. And the rumor was that she was homosexual.

Amesqua does not discuss her sexuality, and when Greer confronted her at a station meeting in December 1995, Amesqua said her private life was her business.

Greer, on the other hand, had a lot to say about Amesqua and her sexuality inside the firehouse, where he distributed a pamphlet called Homosexuality: The Truth, written by the Ralph Ovadal, direc-

president Conway says the case against Greer, especially as it concerns handing out the pamphlet, goes against the nature of the firehouse.

adison has had a gay rights ordinance on the books since the mid-1970s. A fair number of Madison's elected officials, including Verveer, are open about their sexuality. The Hotel Washington, an old railroad hotel was converted by Greg and Rodney Scheel into Madison's main gay gathering place. It housed a 24-hour cafe, a leather bar, a live-music club, and a combination over his head. In April he'd faxed out a "news release" that accused Amesqua of too lightly disciplining her training chief for the alleged abuse of a cadet. The reason, Greer suggested, was that both women are lesbians. In response, Amesqua told Greer, "Your public distribution of the scurrilous document entitled 'news release' is the equivalent of spitting in the department's face." She charged him with harassment and with showing disrespect for a senior officer.

"As an African-American, he's been fighting discrimination his whole life, and you'd think he'd be a little more sensitive,' says Verveer. Greer replies that homosexuality is a choice, while "being black is

immutable to a person." Assistant city attorney Rick Petri is harsher than Verveer. "Ronnie Greer is a chronic malcontent. He hasn't changed from the day he hit that guy in the marines. Oh, he's found God, but that old part of him is alive and burning."

Greer's struggles have turned him into a martyr in the eyes of right-wing Christians. According to Greer a Virginia-based conservative group he won't name who helped his wife Rosalyn, a school guidance counselor, craft a fund-raising letter. "Militant homosexuals are using the city government, with its unlimited funds and resources, to get at my husband," says the letter. "He can't possibly defend himself without your help." The dollars that have come back run well into six figures, according to Greer.

The firefighters local is now challenging Amesqua's training procedures, and a spokesman for the chief says she's in the process of revamping them.

Greer has been suspended for a year with pay from his \$45,000-a-year job as the five-member police and fire board weighs the outcome of his news-release case.

It's pretty hard to ignore that gauntlet," says Rick Petri. "If he'd have gotten away with that press release, there's nothing a municipal employee can't get away with. It may be old-fashioned, but you have to show some respect for your boss.' Greer's lawyer, Michael Dean, says that even though Amesqua couldn't point to anyone who'd been harmed by the document, he and Greer assume that the board will rule against him; in that event, Greer promises to take his case to federal court. Greer can't find a new job, he says, because he's notorious. And now he's running for Congress. In tinderbox atmosphere where politicians now feel free to openly criticize gays and lesbians, Ronnie Greer has no regrets about lighting a few matches.

same right-wing religious group which recently erected anti-gay billboards in Dane County.

The pamphlet asserts that "the bulk of entritic [intestinal] disease in America is carried by homosexuals," that gays "account for at least one third of all child sexual molestation," and that "the top six mass murderers in America's history were all homosexual." The fire department's personnel director, ordered Greer to stop handing out the pamphlet, but he did so at least once more, in a firehouse parking lot.

Amesqua, who took office in February 1996, and other city officials maintained that distributing the pamphlet on fire department property violated workplace rules forbidding harassment based on sexual orientation. That March, when Greer called in sick and yet was able to attend an antigay speech the same night, his superiors asked him for a doctor's note. Greer did not comply and Amesqua cited him for insubordination, adding these charges to others relating to the pamphlet, and asked the firefighter to submit to discipline - a three-month suspension coupled with diversity training. Greer refused and Amesqua forwarded the matter to the police and fire board.

hair salon and ersatz speakeasy entered through a secret door and was generally considered Madison's unofficial gay-andlesbian community center.

On February 7, 1996, the Hotel Washington was destroyed by fire. That afternoon a Methodist minister held an impromptu memorial service, and as it was breaking up Greer came by with his three young sons. "It's a tragic loss of a historical building," Greer commented to the press, "but I'm glad to see certain establishments in the place are gone. If it means the end to certain types of business, I don't have a problem with that."

Verveer, who'd been at the fire scene since 6 a.m., heard what Greer said. "It was amazing that he had the nerve to say that, and with a big-ass grin on his face, says Verveer. "People were totally appalled." In March, Greer went by the house he was building in Fitchburg, a southwest suburb, and found it decorated. A rainbow flag had been strung across the twocar garage, pink-and-black triangles on sticks had been stuck in the ground, and stickers had been slapped on windows announcing "Born Again Bigot" and Wisconsin Lesbians Against Greer." "I personally would draw the line at defacing private property," says De Ette Tomlinson, the executive director of the Outreach (formerly The United), Madison's umbrella gay and lesbian organization. 'But the methods used were nonviolent and expressive of some of the outrage felt against Ronnie Greer by the community." After four months of hearings, in June 1997 the police and fire board suspended Greer for two months for showing "disregard, disrespect, and disdain" for his bosses. By then he had other charges hanging

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

eff Krell is a bit nervous. With only 24-hours to go before the first preview of his new Off-Broadway musical "Jayson," based on the popular gay comic strip character, he's facing a writer's worst nightmare — adding a new song the day before opening.

The song, written by popular gay duo Ron Romanovsky and Paul Phillips, who scored the show, is a love song of sorts though not sexual — between gay Jayson and his "fag hag" best friend, who realize they'd rather be together as friends than apart.

"The message is that friendships out last lovers, so cherish your friends because they'll be there long after the break," says the author.

"It's the 11 o'clock number of the show, when Jayson and his former roommate (a woman) have a fallout and decide whatever the problem is, they're going to face it together. It's the VH-1, ready for love, theme," says the 39-year old Krell, on whose comic character the musical is based. "But it adds to the excitement of opening night, that's for sure."

"Jayson," which opened July 10 Off-Broadway in New York, centers on Jayson Callowhill, a wide-eyed bushy tailed boy from Farmville, U.S.A., who comes to the big city to find a man and the job of his dreams. But when he gets there, what he finds is disillusionment. Things don't go as planned and he finds himself on a selfrealizing journey, on which he find out a lot more about himself.


And along the way he meets Mr. Robyn Ricketts, a flamboyant pre-Stonewall crossdressing pornographic filmmaker and Miss Arena Stage, a self-described Jewish fag hag. He also bumps into a wide variety of colorful characters including wacky employers, dysfunctional family members and comically miserable dates.

"These people are these larger-than-life characters, who amuse him and provide a window to the world on this new urban gay character," says Krell, who quickly snaps back and asks, "Have I mentioned, it's also a very funny show too?" And funny it is. The early buzz on the

And funny it is. The early buzz on the show is that audiences can't get enough of these delicious and over-the-top characters, who by the end of the musical, endear themselves to you and pull on your heart strings and your musical chords.

Krell believed so much in the viability of the show that he is backing it with his own money, rather than try to find outside investors — a price tag that likely is in the mid-to-high five figure range. "By doing it myself, I'm not accountable to any outside investors," says the playwright, who sold his coop apartment and cashed in his 401K to finance the show.

"I'm rolling the dice on this one. But I wouldn't do it if I didn't believe in the show," he adds. "I have every indication and evidence that this show works for people and can succeed. Whether it does we'll have to see but you get what you get when you go for it, as my idol Barry



Manilow says."

Krell is very much like Jayson. Born and raised in smalltown, U.S.A. — he will not say which city, out of concern for his folks, who still live in the homophobic confines of the town — he did not come out until he was ready to go to college.

"One student was out in high school. He wrote a love note to another man and the other man beat him up in men's room and received no punishment for it. The young gay man was taken out of school. I decided then I was going to stay in the closet until after high school," says Krell.

"My parents are not very happy with what I'm doing or how I chose to broadcast my sexual orientation. I don't' want some-

one to torch their house," he adds. "People there are still small minded. Just because I'm out there making a name for myself and calling attention to those people, doesn't mean they have to suffer for it."

He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a degree in international marketing. (He was the first in his family to graduate from college.) And spent a year in Germany, studying.

In 1982, when he 23 year old, Krell went home to visit his folks for Christmas.

Things were not going particularly well for him at the time. He had just broken up with a boyfriend and his career was not taking off as he had hoped. After a rough

with a boytriend and his career was not taking off as he had hoped. After a rough Christmas day, Krell retreated to the basement and started to draw.

"All my life I had drawn and written. It was my retreat from reality," says Krell, who was a big fan of the Archie comic book series. That night he created Jayson, who like him, was someone who was intelligent, well educated and wanted to live in an urban setting away from Farmville. "I did a bunch of these drawings, and thought they were funny. I was putting on paper the kind of comic strip I wanted to read but never saw anywhere."

He soon approached the *Philadelphia* Gay News, which agreed to run the comic. But after a year, Krell longer wanted to draw a four to six panel strip, he wanted to expand it and tell complete stories in one sitting. So he bundled the series together and sent it off to the publisher of Gay Comix, who saw potential in Jayson as a comic book.

Since then, Jayson has lived on in syndication, comic books and now a paper book collection of the series called, "Jayson: A New Collection," on Ignite! Entertainment publishing.

In 1990, after earning an MBA in

marketing in finance and marketing, Krell moved to New York City where he worked for a marketing company. But in the mid-90s, he resigned to write full-time and work as an outside consultant, which he still does today.

"I wrote the cartoon on a lark. It was something I enjoyed, but not something I got paid for," Krell says. "When I came here (to New York), I found people actually pursing their dreams, especially in the creative realms, and it inspired me to try it myself."

In 1995, he came up with the idea for "Jayson: The Musical," and began the process.

"I've always been searching for another medium for Jayson. When I wrote it, I structured it as a sitcom. But I didn't have



the money or wherewithal or connections. A musical seemed like the ideal outlet,"

says the playwright. "The New York theatre scene is ready for Jayson," he adds. "It's nice that gay theatre can thrive. But it's either some AIDS dramas or something catering to gay men where everyone takes off their clothes, which makes me uncomfortable. It's commerce, but not art. Certainly you can make money at it, but I want to entertain in a more cerebral way. We have sexy performers, but no one takes their clothes off."

While Krell is aware people may assume that because the musical is based on a comic character it is kitchy or animated and not substantive. But he says that's far from the case.

"People may conclude that if they don't see it. The easiest thing to do is create look of the comic on stage. The hardest is to make people care, and I won't settle until I do. These are characters with heart. You're not human if you're not in tears in second act. I choke up every time I think about it," Krell says. "I hope a lot of people can relate to it. I think they will. People will be richly entertained and taken on a journey they can relate to. It's uplifting and ironic, and it's good."

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
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

here is a second second

there," says writer/director Thom Fitzgerald of his feature film debut. Sounds like a well-intentioned modus operandi. Or a twisted sense of a word



play. Like all things *Hanging Garden*, the meaning of a particular idea can spin out

into several divergent directions. Hang in there, eh? That's exactly what 350-pound, closeted teen Sweet William (an embarrassingly brave performance by newcomer Troy Veinotte) does to end his so-called life in a rural Nova Scotian town. But then, poof, like (queer) magic (realism), William is able to return to his hideously dysfunctional family as a lithe, sexy, openly gay man (Chris Leavins). The rotund body continues to sway au jardin in the mature present while the characters react to this poetic conceit as naturally as Marlon Brando at a Lee Strasberg acting class. It's clear that the corpse represents

William's attempt to kill off his former self for a mentally and physically healthier lease on life. Or is that so clear? Mature William reacts to his dead body along with everyone else and at one point he cuts it down

to bury it. So maybe the hanging self represents the fact that William's painful past still weighs him down and that his adult homecoming is needed to help him bury it, i.e. reconcile with his family.

Not that William's family is an easy bunch to reconcile with. In fact, The Hanging Garden is like an artier Stuart Saves His Family (the grossly ignored feature film expansion on Saturday Night Live's Stuart Smalley skits) which matches William's grisly family portrait. There's Mac, the abusive father who tends to his garden more affectionately than his family and presides over an ensemble of women on the verge whom Fitzgerald sprinkles with symbolically significant flower names (complete with unnatural color coding) like a mad Ophelia: the foul-mouthed sister Rosemary who marries William's teen love, Fletcher; the senile grandmother Grace who tragically witnesses William's first encounter with Fletcher; the teeth-gritting mother Iris who tries to set William straight by paying for him to have sex with an older woman; the equally foulmouthed, er, sister, Violet. Not exactly the snowbirds and shadows in the moonlight of Nova Scotian Anne Murray's songs.

I won't get into the correlations between each flower and character. Let the film equivalent of Cliff Notes expound on that. What I adore about The Hanging Garden is how tastefully, how subtly Fitzgerald handles what has to be the most hokily symbolic artifact I've encountered since dissecting A Separate Peace back in high school - a return to knights who play chess with death and flowery Tennessee Williamsesque motifs (a garden figures quite prominently in my fave Williams play, Suddenly Last Summer). Perhaps because the characters treat the hanging body as matter-of-factly as Pop's petunias, the

symbology never overwhelms. Instead, it makes for a self-consciously artsy aesthetic that screams gay, gay, gay and *The Hanging Garden* is the yummier for it.

But the film is even richer than that because maybe the death isn't so symbolic after all. Maybe it's very real. Maybe the adult years are a fantasy of confrontation; a fantasy of a happy ending. Seen in this light, *The Hanging Garden's* happy ending isn't happy at all simply because it doesn't exist.

If you can except such fluidity in your movie-going, you can except Iris' unexplained disappearance or Rosemary's bewildering marriage to Fletcher. That's because you know (like Fitzgerald knows so well) that as plastic an art as filmmaking is, nothing truly exists in a film. A great film like *The Hanging Garden* demonstrates how plasticity can lie. Or how it can just hang there.





Queer Beer

Can You Brew a Beer Just for Gays?

San Francisco (AP) — Since there's already a king of beers, Phillip Feemster wants his beer to become the queen.

The ale, called Q, is produced by Feemster's Queer Brewing Co. and comes in six-color, muted rainbow packaging. So its orientation, if beers can have one, is clear. But is there really such a thing as a gay beer?

Feemster acknowledges there's nothing about the product — beyond its marketing — that is gay. But he



wants Q not only to be a beer by and for the gay community but also to be recognized for its own merits and accepted by non-gays as well.

"There's such a glut of microbrews on the market," explained the 39-year- old Feemster. "So for anyone to get into the beer category at this moment, it would be foolish unless you had a certain category."

Though not the first, Q is possibly the only gay-oriented beer on the market right now. It comes on the heels of such other ethnic or minority-targeted microbrews as HE'BREW, obviously aimed at Jewish consumers, and Oakland-based Brothers Brewing Co., maker of BBC beer and the only African Americanowned microbrewery in the country.

The beer has started appearing in several outlets in California. Shop owners say the beer is selling, and customers seem to buy it as much for the taste as for the novelty or a show of community support.

Market owner Sami Bsisso said he went through about 15 cases of Q beer in the first two weeks, making it his second-best seller behind Sierra Nevada.

"If you don't like something, you won't buy it, even if it's coming from heaven," Bsisso said.

Reactions like that make Feemster slightly less nervous about quitting his \$165,000-a-year job as a marketing executive and putting \$30,000 of his own money into the one-man business. In a remarkably quick turnaround, Feemster left his job in January with little more than the idea and had the beer

on the shelves in six months.

It will be a long time before Feemster breaks even, a goal made even more distant by his commitment to donate 10 percent of all sales, starting with the very first case, to charities. Retailers and bar owners designate the charities to receive this bounty. So far they have picked such groups as Visual Aid, which benefits artists with AIDS, and the STOP AIDS Project.


"Besides just being a good beer, it pulls into an emotional benefit as well as a tangible benefit," he said of his product. "The fact that it gives back to the gay community makes it come full circle as fully entrenched in the gay community."


Three other gay beer companies in Atlanta, Austin and Denver — are all out of business. Feemster said he just hopes people who like good beer will like his.


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

Girljock: The Book edited by Roxxie

This is a hoot. Roxxie sure knows what *Funny* is! In her Introduction we learn that *Girljock Magazine* started after Roxxie had written her first sports article about a 51-year old female tennis player and "imagined a magazine that would discuss a mixture of questions about sports, questions about being a lesbian athlete, questions about being female in the masculine sporting universe, crushes on the field and more."

The initial publication (with a total run of 30), had a story by Roxxie written in 1990, called "To Go to the Gay Games or Not to Go?" This irreverent first issue was a small photocopied fanzine of drawings from all [her] cartooning women friends who accepted the challenge of making sports cartoons ... " for a magazine for athletic lesbians with a political consciousness. I love their motto: "Fuck *The Well of Loneliness*. Goodbye to all that. We're here to have fun."

After producing photocopies for friends, and then putting them in a couple of local bookstores, it caught on and was a hit. Soon a large production company was knocking at her door and the rest is history. Now there is a web site (http://www.girljock.com) and a section of America On Line - Keyword: Girljock. Not bad for something that was dreamed up as a joke by a young woman who wasn't sure what she wanted to do with her life.

This book contains some of the best stories, interviews, cartoons and photographs for the earliest issues onward. The writers range from Roxxie (no last name -- I guess she doesn't need one) to Heather Findaly, Paisley Braddock, and Lucy Jane Bledsoe who writes about "How to Pick Up a Cyclist, or ... If You Like Lycra." There is a sidebar with "The Cyclist's Vocabulary," as there are others on the subjects of Swimming, Martina, and Rugby. Some of the funny cartoons are by Joan Hilty. There are interviews with Martina Navratilova and Susie Bright. There are pieces about rugby, surfgirls, rock climbing, boxing, wrestling, basketball, volleyball, golf, ice skating, hockey, roller blading and you name it--there's also a lot cussin' and swearin'! There are pieces called "Girl Jock Eats Food," a funny one on about "Softball Wives," and there's even one on "Long-Haired Lesbians." In the section called "Sex and the Modern Girljock" there are more than a few pieces of erotic writing (I guess lesbians don't use the word porn like us guys do). This book will tell you what to do with your "Jogbras." "Notes for the Newly Single" will tell you, among other tid-bits of useful information, "Who Not to Date." Of the several question and answer columns, one called "Femme Jock Cor-

ner" is great fun to read. There is even an order form for the magazine. This entertaining book would look great on your coffee table, a bathroom shelf, or even on the dashboard of your pick-up truck so you can share it with that biker you learned how to pick up. Read this one and laugh a lot. (St. Martin's Press, ISBN: 0-312-15134-9, \$16.95 Softcover).

Surpassing the Love of Men by Lillian Faderman

R^{omantic} Friendship and Love Between Women from the Renaissance to the Present is the lengthy subtitle for this study "illustrating the changing status of romantic friendship, the elusive link between female same-sex love and shifting theories of female sexuality, and the ways in which feminist values have always played a role in women's passions for one another and in men's reactions to them, from revulsion to ridicule to admiration."

The author has penned a new introduction in which she tells us that it has been twenty years since she published the five historical articles on love between women that eventually became the basis of this book. She says that "Queer Theory had not been formulated" when she wrote those articles in 1976 and '77. She adds: "she wanted, most of all, to present love between women as historically universal, and wished to argue against the false homo/hetero divide created by sexologists, which minimized such love."

This book starts with discussions of same-sex love in the 16th through 18th centuries. Transvestism, in which women adopted manish clothing and ceased to be feminine and men, whose fashions had become more feminized, ceased to be masculine, is explained. One interesting quote is: "If fairly minor shifts in appropriate male and female clothing, caused such anxiety, one can imagine the horror that a full-fledged transvestite must have caused." I wonder what today's Drag Kings would say about all this.

In the late 19th century, with the feminist movement opening up new jobs for women, and allowing them independence, living situations which would have been impossible earlier, became likely and love between women could take on a new shape. In the very early 20th century, the difference between Freud and Kraft-Ebbing are discussed. Sigmund Freud maintained that inversion was caused by childhood trauma, while Kraft-Ebbing maintained that the true invert was born with his or her condition. It seems we've gone full circle. Lesbian writers are taken into consideration, as are romantic friendship and lesbian love in the later part of the 20th century. This very short section brings us up to the 1970s and the lesbian feminists who see their lifestyle not as just a personal choice, but also as a political choice which challenges sexism and heterosexism.
