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Madison Actor Featured in "Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss"

Madison — Taking his second principal role in a feature film, Madison-based actor Richard Ganoung traveled to Los Angeles for the premiere and national opening of Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss. The movie opened on July 24 in LA and features Ganoung in the role of Perry, a friend of the film's title character Billy Collier. The movie will open at Milwaukee's Oriental Theater on September 4th.

Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss centers around Billy Collier, a photographer who is shooting a photo series that recreates great screen kisses from Hollywood's Golden Age with an allmale/drag cast. Ganoung's character is an older, more successful photographer who tries to guide Billy through his travails in his relationship and his career. John Cooper of Sundance Film Festival says that the movie is "a smart film by a filmmaker who knows cinematic tradition and enlists it adeptly to tell an unconventional story."

The movie is independently produced by David Moseley and written and directed by Tommy O'Haver.



According to O'Haver, Ganoung was cast "to give the film a sense of history." In particular, because of his role in *Parting Glances*. In the film Ganoung's character is dealing with a declining sexual relationship, a friend dying with AIDS, and the gradual growth and separation of friends. It was a breakthrough film in the honest and forthcoming way it dealt with gay life.

Ganoung starred in Bill Sher-wood's 1986 award-winning feature Parting Glances that received awards at both the Sundance Film Festival and the Edinboro Film Festival in England. This spring Ganoung returned to Sundance with Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss, which was awarded an Honorable Mention. isconsin is indeed fortunate to be blessed with the cosmopolitan energy of Barbara Peterson. She has scuba dived the Caribbean and skied the French Alps. She is best known as a tireless worker for Pridefest, a graphic designer of exceptional ability, and a gallery representative who is also a sculptor.

I met Barb at her south side home. She gave me a quick tour of the jumbled metal and tools that clutter her studio. Peterson is as handy with an acetylene torch as she is a motorcycle. We talked of sport and art. Whatever the subject, Peterson maintains an insightful mind and a passionate heart.

Waswo: I was just in New York and I went to the Guggenheim museum where they had this wonderful show organized by BMW called The Art of the Motorcycle. I was really taken in by the beauty and design of the machines. I bought the catalogue and was impressed by the quality of the writing. Anyway, I was just all hyped-up about motorcycles when I discovered that you use to race them.

Barbara Peterson: I didn't really do any road racing in the strict sense of the term. I was the kind of kid that had the

opportunity to play with all that kind of thing. My experience was playing with dirt bikes pretty early, when I was around nine or ten years old. I did some scramble type motorcross racing. I did a lot of snowmobile racing also. I was probably more involved in that than I was with biking.

W. What age did you start the racing?

BP: I was riding snowmobiles when I was ten years old. We made some pretty wild trips. Yellowstone trails were not nearly as charted as they are now. Equipment was still in the early stages of development. We had quite a gang that would go and we'd rough

it. It was pretty exciting stuff.

W. Your family was real supportive? You had brothers and sisters who did this too?

BP: I had one older sister, and because she was quite a bit older she had her own thing, and racing wasn't part of her game. So most of this I did with my Dad and my uncles. And cousins who were my age. With other families we'd get a group of twenty people together and have these trips and these adventures.

W: Were you good at winning?

BP: In the motorcross I had a lot of fun, but I don't think I had a whole lot of success. In the snowmobiling, yeah, I was very successful. I raced in women's classes and then jumped into the men's classes because there just weren't that many offerings in women's racing at the time. I jumped stock classes into what they called "modified" classes. You accrued points, as is done in most racing, throughout the season.

I raced all over southern Wisconsin, Illinois, and Canada. According to the point standings you could race in the big races, like Eagle River or Ironwood Michigan. And finally in the world series which was held in different

parts of the country.

I was invited four years in a row to compete in all three of those big races. So that was really doing quite well.

W: Wow. That sounds really exciting. Were you out at this time?

BP: No, I was racing from age sixteen into my early twenties. I didn't come out until I was about twenty-three.

W. What did you pursue other than racing? I mean, what is your educational background?

BP. Racing was definitely a hobby. I always had an interest in art, but at the time I graduated from high school I pursued journalism. I was at the university in Boulder Colorado for two years and then came to Milwaukee, made a bit of a switch, and took a two year degree in commercial design at MATC. I've done continuing education things. I've completed a business degree.

W: You've done a wonderful job designing the Pridefest logo, not only this year but the past two years, correct?

BP: Actually I've been working

Pushing The Lid Off

Photographer and writer Deone Jahnke created ImageBox several years ago as an answer to Milwaukee's lack of an annual photographic survey. First manifesting itself as an eclectic, invitation-only showing in Jahnke's studio, ImageBox soon developed an aura of underground chic. It turned its back on mainstream gallery indifference by creating a thoughtful exclusivity of its own.

With this year's move to the Frederick Layton Gallery of the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design, the ImageBox show seems to have made the breakthrough that underground energy almost invariably wrecks upon the surface. Jahnke's annual photographic survey has flowered, and demands its rightful place among the city's cultural perennials.

A few of Milwaukee's supposed heavyweights are noticeably absent from this year's show (Tom Bamberger? Steven Foster?). But there are enough salty iron names to anchor the exhibit in familiar waters. Jim Brozek, Francis Ford, Ron Zabler and Shimon and Lindemann lend a sturdy base which helps support the experimental acrobatics of some of the other artists.

Of the fourteen regional fine art and commercial photographers exhibited, it is perhaps Fred Fischer whose artistic statement best captures the spirit of the show.

"Look!,"Fischer exhorts the viewer, "I could give you all the hogwash artspeak words and say nothing. But I don't work that way." Or better yet is the one line statement of Jennifer Novack: "I really can't think of a thing to say." The emphasis here is clearly upon the delights of seeing. For the most part this show concentrates on the rich possibilities of the visual. Over-conceptualized claptrap has been discarded.

Tom Fritz presents two luminous color images of a simple funnel and a common step-stool which he has printed on watercolor paper. He imbues the mundane familiarity of his subjects with a classical transcendence that takes the breath away. No words are needed here. These images glow with a visual impact that explanations only obscure.

Similarly, Ron Zabler's Type C color prints hold a lushness that is as moist and fresh as the woodland growth he photographs. Jennifer Novack's candy-colored studies of what appears to be doll house furniture is rendered all the more delectable by the fuzzy softness of the prints. Her images are at once sweetly seductive and mysteriously unsettling.


Photography's documentary tradition is represented by Jim Brozek's two year project recording the construction of the Calatrava addition to the Milwaukee Art Center. Francis Ford presents a small suite of portraiture which captures the concerned earnestness of five "activists." And Fred Fischer juxtaposes dramatic windswept skyscapes above the jagged rectilinear forms of urban environments.

Shimon and Lindemann continue their explorations of rural and small town Wisconsin with enduring images such as Angela with Kit/Prom Dress, and Cow Clipper. The former shows "Angela" in her high school evening gown standing next to her cow "Kit." The latter depicts a rural young man holding an electric clippers dangerously near a cow's ass. Amazingly, as in all Shimon and Lindemann work, the "cow clipper" is given a dignity which borders on the monumental.

Deone Jahnke is to be thanked for her efforts in pushing this annual photographic survey to the forefront. If curator and artists can resist the stagnation and inbreeding that too often accompanies mainstream success, each succeeding ImageBox is likely to be more and more anticipated.

20th Century Sculpture Exhibit at Milwaukee Art Museum

Milwaukee — From Figure to Floor, the second exhibition in a series of four marking the end of the 20th century, examines European and American sculpture over the past 100 years at the Milwaukee Art Museum. Although people usually look towards painting to explain the history of art, sculpture has always played an equal role in the development of artistic styles and movements. This was especially true in the 20th century, when rapid-fire evolutions of modern art accelerated artistic innovation.

Cubism, Dada, Surrealism, Abstract Expressionism and Pop Art all produced major sculptors whose works are inexorably linked to their retrospective movements. More recent movements such as Minimalism, post-Minimalism and Neo-Conceptualism were developed through the work of sculptors. Some of the most significant advances in 20th-century sculpture resulted from new processes and new materials such as iron, aluminum, fiberglass and plastic.

The presentation of sculpture has also changed over the last 50 years, from being attached to buildings, placed on pedestals or free-standing to be mounted on walls or set directly on the floor, challenging notions of sculptural space. Works in this exhibition, drawn primarily from the museum's collection, are by major European artists including Auguste Rodin, Alexander Archipenko, Alberto Giacometti, and Henry Moore, plus Americans Elie Nadelman, Gaston Lachaise, David Smith, Andy Warhol, Donald Judd, Carl Andre, Eva Hesse, Joel Shapiro, Martin Puryear and Kiki Smith.

MAM is located in downtown Milwaukee along the shore of Lake Michigan at 750 N. Lincoln Memorial Drive, and is open Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Thursday, noon to 9 p.m.; and Sunday, noon to 5 p.m. The museum is closed on Mondays. Admission is \$5 adults, \$3 students and senior citizens 65 or older. Children under 12 accompanied by an adult are free, as are MAM members. Milwaukee County residents are free from 10 a.m. to noon on Wednesday and Saturday. For more information call (414 224-3200.

The conference will explore new ideas about the role of art in public space and public life today, and introduce Wisconsin artists to the skills necessary to successfully compete for public art commissions.

Speakers, panels, workshops, tours, exhibitions and vendor displays will be directed toward celebrating and further educating Wisconsin artists, architects, city planners, contractors, educators and government representatives about the role and benefits of public art today. Featured speakers will be Jack Mackie and Nori Sato, Public Artists from Seattle and Kinji Akagawa, Pubic Artist and teacher from Minneapolis.

Other events include guided tours of recently completed artwork and evening receptions and tours highlighting some of the new public art sites in Milwaukee. A reception on Thursday, October 15 at the Midwest Express Center will showcase recently installed art projects

that make this one of Wisconsin's most innovative public art sites.





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


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Adventures in the (213)

he first thing we should straighten out about Dennis Hensley's debut novel is what (213) refers to: 'That's the area code for Hollywood, dahling." Now that we know that, we can go gaily forward, as the saying goes. The main character of this tale is Craig Clybourn, a struggling screenwriter who has written a script called Deck Games. As the story begins, Craig is having a bad dream on his flight from Phoenix to his new home in LA. A dream-character named Loretta has a shotgun aimed at his chest ... and then the flight attendant



wakes him for his pasta dinner.
As our hero gets off the plane he is met by the secondary character (there's really a question in my mind about that one), Dandy Rio, a college chum and TV star of her own sitcom That's Just Dandy who at twenty-six still tries to pass for a teenager. Dandy is more outrageous than Craig could ever think of being and she wears wild outfits and has a mouth on her that won't stop; she's sorta fun! She will also screw anything of the male gender that walks. We find out that Craig works a lot as a temp, and manages to Xerox copies of his script on the job so he can drop them on unsuspecting producers. He doesn't get laid much, but his friend Miles makes up for that lack of initiative.

We learn that really good-looking young men are specified as being "Cute Club" members. Godfrey Scott, a fellow extra waiter with Craig at a pool-party scene is referred to as a snack. "Snacks are different from Cute Club members in that they have a certain rough-aroundthe-edges quality that means they're not everyone's cup of tea. This particular one, however, happens to be [Craig's]."

Craig, or the author, I'm not sure which, drops the names of every B-

Movie star in Hollywood-living or dead—in passing conversation. He also seems to watch an awful lot of B-Movies on TV and there is a thing called Soft Porn Saturdays that he and Dandy watch as a sort of ritual. There's much talk about clothes and the wearing of same. His upstairs neighbor is Claudia; an aging waitress with a Celebrity Spotting Check List who is still trying to hit the big time. She can make a mean Rice Krispies Treat at the drop of a hat. She is credited with a wonderful remark in response to an invite to a 1980's party. "If you dress eighties, people won't know whether you're adhering to the theme or if you just really have bad taste."


Actually, Claudia has many good lines. Here's another in response to seeing a Disney movie: "If I wanted to see a teapot sing, I'd drop acid like a normal person." I liked her. She's also allergic to Calvin Klein's eau de CK, which is a plus as far as I'm concerned. Then we meet Ulysses, an unsuccessful musician from Craig and Dandy's college days who just has to play those celebrity death pools; stay tuned to see whether he wins.

The list of high-jinx these "unemployed tinsletown wannabes" gets up to is amazing. "Like making off with fish from Tina Louise's koi pond. Or calling Leeza Gibbons via Airfone to ask who does her headshots. Or harassing Alicia Silverstone with tales of watermelon-loving porn stars. Or auctioning off Andrew Shue's half-eaten chicken wing and Heather Locklear's lip print on a cocktail glass for charity." Just the usual fun stuff any youngster would get into.

Some how in this cavalcade of outrageous events, Claudia gets a one-woman show, Dandy meets a prince—a real prince—and gets married, Miles has liposuction, Craig finally gets his script made and Ulysses gets, oh well, you have to read it. One reviewer refers to this smart-alecky, bitchy romp as having as lovable a cast as Armistead Maupin's Tales of the City. Well, I don't know about that one. It's funny, but...

with Pridefest for nearly five years. I started working through a connection I made with Bill Menuier. And then went right on to help with different parts of Pridefest's needs.

W: So you're doing more for them than just designing the logo?

BP: I've had the opportunity to help with some of their national advertising. I've worked with them in doing the Prideguide covers the past couple of years. I've helped with their corporate logo and identity program. I've put standards together to help give them a little bit more of a unified image.

W: What is your take on the image of Pridefest? What sort of image do you think Pridefest ought to have?

BP: I like the idea that we've made some real gains considering where we started and where we are now. The ability to hold the festival at the Summerfest grounds and be recognized is very powerful and gives the community a very positive image. The festival should tell people that the gay and lesbian community is as much a part of Milwaukee as any other group.

Even though diversity is one of our communities greatest strengths, it can also make it difficult to harness energy and keep everybody moving in a unified front. That's a struggle that we continue to face, but I think there's been progress.

W: So you think there's been an improvement in Pridefest year to year and that we're headed in the right direction?

BP: We've gone through a lot of growing stages. That's brought on some concerns we've never had to deal with before. But in general everyone's been doing a really great job. Of course because it is a learning experience there will always be the bugs that creep up.

W: Tell me about the national ads. In Milwaukee we're really only aware of what we see locally.

BP: They've always advertised in the Chicago marketplace. But now they're doing some collaborative work in our neighboring states, the Twin Cities and St Louis and some of the bigger cities. There was an ad done for the Damron Guide and Instinct, the gay and lesbian magazine out of Florida.

W: I understand you have an art show coming up?

BP: Yeah, I have a show coming up in September. I'm working a lot with welded steel sculpture. But I'm integrating a lot of different mediums within that framework. There are sculptures that will be incorporating stained glass. Some will have textured glass and neon. There will be paintings where I have made the steel shadow-box frames. I'm incorporating 3-D structural elements into the paintings that tie into the frames. Some of my sculptures will have painterly elements such as canvas.

W: Sounds like a pretty big departure from your last show.

BP: Very big. The last show was called Perceptions and it had sort of a "slice of" feel to it. It was a flash on this and a flash on that. I think with my design background I have a real strong sense of using whatever medium is necessary to get my

idea or image across.

But this show will be a lot more unified in its scope. The show is called Below the Surface. It's meant to imply looking below the surface to discover the meanings that lie there. This show goes beyond the perceptions gotten at first glance. Most of the pieces are more abstract in nature, but some are a little more figurative.

W: Are some of the pieces going to be functional? I know at the last show you had some tables and things like that...

BP: There may be a couple of more utilitarian kind of pieces. But mostly I'm working on things that are meant to be wall or pedestal based sculpture. For instance, I'm working on a standing two piece mobile.

W: Does your love of welded metal and streamline form go back to your love of motorcycles and snowmobiles? Is your aesthetic a racing aesthetic? Or is that stretching it?

BP: (laughs) That'd be stretching it just a little bit. The tie in I see is that one reason bike riding is so exciting is because it involves so many of your senses. Not just the smells and the sounds but the whole sense of freedom. You're not in a capsule like you are in your car. You feel all the bumps. When I'm doing the welding it's also very sensual. I'm smelling it and feeling it. It's gritty and physical.

W: Your sculpture does seem sort of tough and streamlined like a bike would be.

BP: I do like that line. A sleek angular line. Working with metal allows you to play with different textures and finishes and colorations.

W: Where did you learn how to weld?

BP: Actually this is a somewhat new adventure for me. A took a class at MIAD to learn the basics of acetylene torch welding, so I wouldn't blow up my garage or myself. So far I've been successful at not doing that. It's been only about two and a half years that I've been welding.

But I've been surprisingly comfortable with the medium. I've improvised a lot. I'm good at machine shop kind of equipment. I do a lot of jerry-rigging. So far it's been working out.

W: Your last show was very successful. I remember one piece in particular, the piece with the ducks that sort of marched around like in a shooting gallery. The ducks had red hearts painted on their sides. The piece had a motor attached and also a cap gun. Can you tell me anything about that?


BP: That piece is called Bullet Proof Heart. It was whimsical at first take, but also more serious beyond that. Everybody takes a hit to the heart. Whether it's somebody you've lost or a relationship that has changed.

In my personal case I had just gone through the break-up of a fourteen year old relationship. It was obviously on my mind. It wasn't meant to imply bitterness, but rather the concept that everyone's been there at one time or another. You learn from it and grow from it.




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


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GEAT OUT!

Welcome to a brand-new column that will be making a regular appearance in IN Step. Every two weeks you, the reading public, will be able to find in the pages of this fine paper, a food and restaurant review entitled "EAT OUT!" Food establishments in the Milwaukee area will be reviewed with the goal being to critique, educate, and have some fun. So, lets get started!

Dancing Ganesha

1692-94 N. Van Buren • (414) 220-0202

Dancing Ganesha is a relatively new restaurant specializing in Indian food. Open less than a year, the restaurant already has quite a reputation. Owners and mother/daughter duo Usha and Ami Bedi present a well rounded dining experience with foods based on Ayurvedic principals—that is the ancient Indian tradition of holistic cooking that balances the energies within the body through food.

The full-out experience of Dancing Ganesha begins as soon as you enter the door. The tantalizing smell of mellow incense and exotic spices starts the salivary juices flowing. The decor is comfortable, elegant, and sexy. Fresh Irises and candles dot well-spaced tables. Dining music

ranges from ambient jazz to big band and swing. The whole presentation encourages you to sit back, relax, and enjoy your evening out.

Ordering from the printed fabric menus will take a few minutes since you have probably never heard of most of the items listed. But, don't let that scare you off since all the items have helpful descriptions and the waitstaff is very helpful and knowledgeable. My advice don't rush through it, order a glass of wine and take your time.

So, let's talk wine. Essentially, wine and food should enhance each other, both being better because of their compatibility. A theory that does not apply to any of my ex-girlfriends. But, it works with wine and the wine list at Dancing Ganesha is tailored to this principal. Many foods here are spicy, and bold and the wines are able to stand up to the challenge. We ordered a bottle one of my new favorites, Terra Vin (\$21). Produced by the Vigil winery in California, Terra Vin is a blend of three different types of grapes: Zinfandel, Cabernet, and the little-known Carignane. I love this wine big. It has a big yet soft flavor and goes perfectly with the full flavors of the items on the menu.

While pondering the wine, solving the problems of global economics, and encouraging world peace, I perused the menu. The main offerings are broken into sections: Appetizers, Entrees, and Accom-



paniments. The accompaniments section is a listing of 12 small items to help you fine tune your meal to meet all of your dreams and desires. One to three of these accompianments often appear as standard additions to the entrees. However, you can pick and choose some additions to tickle your or your dates fancy but this isn't the place to discuss your dates fancy.

Moving right along, deffinately begin with an appetizer. We had one of the specials, New Zealand Green lipped mussels (\$8). These were served open faced. Broiled in cilantro and lemon butter, these yummy morsels were fresh and tasty. We also had Behl (\$4). This is on the standard menu and is highly recommended. Behl is assorted

crisps and noodles with finely chopped boiled potatoes, and onions tossed with coriander and tamarind chutneys. Tamarind is a tropical fruit and a chutney is fresh fruits or vegetables which are shredded or diced to make a dip or sauce. Behl is complex blend of flavors that is very refreshing and a great way to get your pallet primed for the coming delights.

The main offerings are broken two sections; the animal based food group selections and the vegetarian selections. Both offer several fine options but if you are looking for beef don't bother because remember this is an Indian restaurant and cows are sacred in India, so you can't have one for dinner, but you can have one over for dinner. I ordered the vegetarian special-Vegetable Thali (\$16). Thali is the metal serving platter that this vegetarian sampler comes on. There were seven different items on the platter: Toovar Baingan (pigeon peas and egg plant), Aloo bundh gobi (pan fried cabbage and potatoes), Mango chut-ney, Sambar (lentil broth with vegetables). Cachumber (marinated chopped seasonal vegetables) and then two different types of unleavened breads. My favorite was Papad which is a spicy crisp lentil wafer. My lovely dinner companion had Tilapia (\$16) which is a South American fish similar to Orange Roughy. The Tilapia is marinated in pickling spices and pan seared. It was served with Daal (thick soup made with beans or lentils), Pulao rice (Basmati rice with peas, saffron, black mustard seed, and cumin which is a kind of toasted pepperlike spice), and Papad (that wafer thing). Are you hungry yet? Both entrees were excellent.

We were both almost stuffed to the gills, but there was a cutie petite bartender on duty so we decided to belly up to the bar for some desert. We had Mango cheesecake (\$5.50) and Halwa (\$3.50). The Mango cheesecake was light and fluffy and offers the perfect finish to the meal. It is not on the menu nor is it always available so be sure to ask the server. The back up plan would be the Halwa which is semolina wheat toasted in ghee (clarified butter) with sugar and saffron.

Dancing Ganesha is a place you should go when you want to go out for dinner which is different from eating dinner. At Dancing Ganesha customers enjoy the full dining experience. Everything about this place fosters the vanishing notion of the intimate dinner party. And you don't have to clean up. When you go to Dancing Ganesha Don't bring your cell phone, but do bring an open mind and an empty stomach. I highly recommend this restaurant as a great place to take a first date, out of town guests, or your lover of fifteen years. So raise a toast to your dinner companion and say, "Baby, please pass the Aloo Pyaj."

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




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
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

PrideFest Awards

Each year, PrideFest acknowledges a select number of individuals and organizations who have made significant contributions to the community. This year, the list of honorees reflects years of community service and achievement. The awards

will be given out after the Wisconsin Pride Parade on Sunday, Aug ust 30 at the Ben Johnson Stage.

Miller Brewing's Thomas Reed will be honored for his personal leadership and community commitment which helped focus the

resources of Miller Brewing Company to benefit countless LGBT organizations and events nationwide.

Locally, Reed's work has helped many organizations receive funding assistance from Miller including; Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee, PrideFest, GAMMA, The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, Saturday Softball League and Cream City Foundation among many others.




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Pridefest Shuttle Buses Are Back

Jamakaya to Speak on Women's Labor Movement

Milwaukee area writer and historian Jamakaya will appear at Pridefest on Sunday, August 30 to discuss and sign copies of her recently published book, "Like our Sisters Before Us: Women of Wisconsin Labor." She is scheduled to speak at the Rainbow Cafe at 11:15 that morning.

"Like Our Sisters Before Us" shares the compelling life stories of ten women who played prominent roles in the Wisconsin labor movement from the 1930's through the 1970's: organizing unions; breaking into jobs previously reserved for men; and fighting for better wages and

working conditions.

The book includes the inspiring stories of Alice Holz, the daughter of Milwaukee socialists, who played a pivotal role in creating the Office and Professional Employees International Union in the 1940's, and Catherine Conroy, a leader in the Communications Workers of America who became a founder of the National Organization for Women and a revered mentor to a generation of feminist and labor activists.

The stories of all ten pioneering women are based on oral history interviews conducted by Jamakaya for the Women of Wisconsin Labor Oral History Project, sponsored by the Wisconsin Labor History Society. Jamakaya has previously written a history of the feminist movement in Milwaukee and done research into the city's gay and lesbian history. 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
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

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




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film REVIEW

Henry Fool

The title character in Hal Hartley's "indie epic" Henry Fool (played by Thomas Jay Ryan) is a voluble freeloader who arbitrarily drops into the life of the glum, ornithologically-mannered Queens garbage man Simon Grim (James Urbaniak). A megalomaniacal scribe as well, Henry sees poetic potential in the dim Grim and convinces him to quit trash-shoveling and devote himself full-time to writing an epic poem.

Simon's opus turns out to be such an unspeakable meisterwerk that it has all kinds of wildly divergent effects on its readers: his sex-starved sister, Fay (Parker Posey), gets her period a week and a half early; his luded-out mother (Maria Porter) fatally slits her wrists; the mute girl at the local World of Donuts starts to sing; the Board of Education denounces it as scatological; a girl who once bullied him becomes a groupie as do eventually millions of others around the world. If Jesse Helms read it, we'd be seeing his withered carcass at La Cage every weekend. Too bad Stevie Wonder can't read it because it'd no doubt cure his blindness. Who knows what miracles might spring forth? Why if I ever got to read it, I might spring a bonafide boner for this film.

As it is, Henry Fool is a confused, absurdly over-praised bit of cinematic abstraction. Even its slobbering reviews are abstract. Most supporters claim that Hartley's refusal to let us hear Simon's poem is a shrewd conceit but no one has explained what's so darned shrewd about it. Because we are never allowed to specifically reference the poem's content throughout the film's dreary 138-minute length, the resultant miracles carry little emotional or expressive weight. Every epiphany, every gratuitous outpouring of vomit or shit (There's Something About Mary at least played its grotesqueries for laughs - played it for something, that is), every controversy (from right-wing politics to spousal/child abuse) that the film manages to reign in only refers back to itself and feels flat and arbitrary in a dramatic, narrative context.

Not that the context is all that revelatory either. Perhaps all the above vignettes would have worked better were they not put in the service of the sort of crisis of celebrity that frames the film's second half. For Simon's tome is not the only one that escapes our view. Henry has written an equally epic work which sucks according to Simon (who previously didn't know what iambic pentameter was but suddenly at the eve of his fame and notoriety has the critical acuity to deem Henry's work a failure). The irony here is that the garbage man becomes a literary sensation while the erudite drifter who weaned him becomes a literary fool.

And, precisely in accordance with indie romanticism, Simon's marriage with evil commerce has rendered him a sell-out to his family (his seven year old nephew has to ride the subway alone to find him) and the publishing community (he now lives with the secretary that previously rebuffed him). But he pays for these sins of success at film's end by letting Henry pose as him to accept his Nobel Prize for literature.

I'm sure there's some religious allegory in there as well that some Hartley obsessive could illuminate but it's clear that Simon's descent into media is meant to cast a punitive shadow across the film's end. Henry's accepting of the award is supposed to be the world's punishment for not recognizing his recognition of himself as a genius (or, one deduces, any genius at all). But this is just Hartley and his hip cult patting each other on the back. As one favorable critic summed it up, Henry Fool is "finally about being an artist in one's own eyes while being a fool in the eyes of a bankrupt world." I'd like to amend that: the world of Henry Fool is so minuscule, so self-congratulatory that no artist within it could ever possibly be accused of being bankrupt. Thankfully, I'm not part of that world.

She's Not Just Ellen's "Gal Pal"

he past year has, undoubtedly, been the most memorable in Anne Heche's life. She has gone from talented, yet practically obscure, actress to one of today's most talked about and recognized women working in film today.

Single-handedly, she has become the 'poster lesbian' theatrical actress. Of course, many say that her recent, new found fame can only be attributed to her relationship with television's 'poster lesbian', Ellen DeGeneres which they flaunted before the cameras at every opportunity even in front of President Clinton at a fund-raiser last year.

Whatever the reasons for her instant rise to superstardom, the one reason that she seems destined to last is, well, because of her talent.

Many wondered if movie going audiences would buy into the notion of an 'out' lesbian playing a straight role. Would people laugh when Harrison Ford kissed her in "Six Days, Seven Nights"? She hadn't 'realised' that she was a lesbian, let alone come out before she signed on to do the project, so all Disney could do was sit, wait, watch and cross their fingers.

Would people finally check their fears at the box-office window, go in and sit down and watch a movie for what it was?

The petite, five foot, three inch and very waifish (give the girl a donut) Heche was wearing a low cut black dress and sporting a "Return to Paradise" safari hat when she walked into the suite, puffing on a half smoked cigarette. "It's fucking freezing in here," she said, clasping her bare arms to her nearly naked chest. "Hold on a second while I call to have them turn the air conditioning off in here."

When the temperature had settled, a completely relaxed and very conversational, yet endearing Heche held back nothing when talking about her remarkable year gone by.

"You never know whether people will be comfortable or OK with an openly gay actor on screen playing a straight role," says Heche. "But," she rhetorically asks, "isn't it kind of redundant? So many 'straight' actors and actresses are falling over each other to play gay roles today. It has almost become the stylish thing to do.

"Thankfully with "Six Days, Seven Nights", at least, people have not had a problem with me. They don't seem to care or be bothered by my decision to some out," says Heche, seated comfortably in a suite at the Ritz Carlton in Marina Del Rey on a recent Sunday morning.

She was there to promote her

She was there to promote her second film of the summer, "Return to Paradise." In it she portrays, convincingly one might add, straight Beth Eastern, a frantic young attorney desperate to save her client Lewis's life (he is on death row, in Malaysia no less) by convincing his two friends to spend three years of their lives in a Malaysian prison.

Heche co-stars with two of Hollywood's hunkiest actors, Joaquin

Phoenix (Lewis) and Vince Vaughn (Sherriff) whom, at the moment she has just finished working with on Gus Van Sant's remake of "Psycho".

"I'd like to hope that through my performances people forget about my sexuality. The more people begin not to care about my sexuality; the better it will be for the next gay actor to come out and not feel compelled to stay in the closet for fear of not getting any work."

"I can't stand it when people in the media make up trash about me and or Ellen," she adds. "The rumors and nonsense that make up about us are unbelievable. They've gone from the not so evil 'I'm pregnant' to "Now I am straight and having an affair with Vince Vaughn'. Give me a break! The words that many people write are harmful. The stories should be laughable, but in essence show how stupid and insane some writers can be."

Heche is not one to mince words. She extinguishes the remainder of her second cigarette and picks up a bottle of Evian water.

"Everyone needs to understand one thing," says Heche, seemingly eager to make an important point. "I have a wife, and I love her dearly. We live together, and we love each other more than anything in the world. I am an entertainer as is Ellen, and we both push ourselves and strive to be the best that we can at what we do. I hope people stop writing about our sex life and start to concentrate on our acting abilities whether they like them or not. My challenge right now is to shock people with my creative ability on screen. That is my challenge."

Heche certainly gets the chance to try to convince the world that she is a capable actress in "Return to Paradise." It is not going to be an easy sell, yet anyone who goes to the film will undoubtedly be moved beyond belief by it's powerful story of a lawyer destined to do anything to save her client, who may be something more.

"Return to Paradise" comes in second only to "Saving Private Ryan" as tear jerker of the summer.

The film takes the non-Hollywood route and is certain to have audiences talking not about Heche's sexual proclivities rather, the ending.

The cast of the film had to endure unsavory conditions in many third world countries such as Thailand and in parts of Hong Kong.

"I got sick once during filming," said Heche. "I am convinced it was malaria," she says laughing, "But the translator told me that the doctor said it was only traveling flu."

Anne found at least a little comfort the few days that Ellen spent with her in Hong Kong while she was filming. "Ellen is great. She kept me going in Hong Kong. I am glad I had someone I knew with me. It helped make things a lot easier."

Taking off her hat, and running her fingers through her dyed blonde hair, Heche recalls (for the few who don't know) how the two met.

"I was at a Vanity Fair party and Ellen and my eyes just connected. I went up to her and we started talking. And talked all night. I had never thought about sleeping with a woman, let alone slept with one, but she brought whatever it was that was in me out. We kissed at the end of the night, and the rest is history."

"I think we make a good couple. I, at least at first, was the naive one. Before I became a familiar face, I thought nothing of leaving my doors unlocked in the house. Ellen has taught me to be on guard. We chose to live in a community rather than a big apartment complex and many people notice us."

She recalls a recent incident that is sure to go down as one of the funniest moments in both Ellen and her lives.

"Not too long ago our doorbell rang," she says trying to hold back a grin. "I answered it and when I opened it I saw this woman standing there. I had no idea who she was. I said 'Hi'. The woman went on to say 'Hi. I am a big dyke. Do you and Ellen want to come out and play?"

"Yes, we are open with our lives, but that does not mean that you can come up to our door and ring our bell and expect us to come out and play," she said, obviously amused at the incident.

"Thankfully we have not had any unfortunate or scary situations," she added.

Speaking of scary, Heche just finished filming "Psycho," which she says "Janet Leigh and Alfred Hitchcock's daughter both gave their support to."

"Filming the shower scene was a lot of fun," she says. "I am glad that the film is in Gus's hands though. There are many people who have said that it's a sin to remake "Psycho" but songs and plays are remade everyday. If they are done right, they can be just as good as or better than the original."

Heche like many Generation Xers had not seen the movie prior to being involved with the film. "I saw it the night before I was to meet Gus," she said. "And I loved it."

"Ellen doesn't like the fact that I have to get killed in "Psycho". She thinks it will give people ideas. I couldn't believe what she did the night before I was to shoot the shower scene though. We were both home, and I was upstairs taking a shower. The next thing I know is the glass shower door gets thrown open, and Ellen was there screaming like a psycho at me. I had my eyes closed and literally was scared almost to death. It was so unlike her but also very funny."

Next up for Heche? "I really want to get the role in "Cabaret" on Broadway," she said. "But, Sharon Stone wants it too. The good thing is that I don't think she can sing," she added with an evil grin. In addition, she will be seen in the upcoming Alan Rudolph film "Trixy". "Suffice to say, I play an inept security guard who is hell-bent on becoming a detective."

Heche is also writing a screenplay for the film "Fierce" she will be directing this coming winter. As if that is not enough she and Ellen are always on the lookout for a perfect script that the two of them can star in side-by-side.

For the present Heche will be spending the remainder part of the summer in Rockport, a quaint, romantic town on the north shore of Massachusetts while Ellen films "Love Letter."

"Ellen came to Hawaii when I was filming "Six Days..." and of course to Hong Kong. So now I can be the wife and be with her while she works," she says beaming.

"I'm very happy right now," she says. "I pray at night and thank God that I am in such a good place right now."

Milwaukee's **Crown Jewel?**

ne Saturday in late July, I met a friend on the corner of 4th Street and Wisconsin Avenue. We were going to the Grand Opening of the new Midwest Express Convention Center. We have been talking about this \$172 million pile since the hole was dug and we weren't expecting much in the way of good taste. As it took shape we both agreed that it looked like it was being made of Legos - some parts of the outside still do. Someone in the press has had the audacity to call this building Milwaukee's Crown Jewel. I get the impression that someone liked the 100 East Wisconsin building so much they made a copy of it and then sat on it.

A huge piece of suspended artwork is yet to be installed in the corner entrance. It is to be called Parenthesis, and of the six parts to come, the terrazzo floor is already in place. It's a great spiral of colored chips separated by brass strips. When this huge sculpture is brought into existence this fall it should put a dent in anyone's ideas of taking a plunge off of the third-floor railing. Until then, if you have any problems with vertigo, I'd stay away from

Overall, the inside of the building is good looking; but, as we all know, the world is not a perfect place and we found some really irritating elements; the most annoying being the "custom designed" carpeting. On the third floor, three different carpet patterns with modérne designs and backgrounds of gold, burgundy and turquoise were all sewn together in helter-skelter patches. Interior designer Lisa Kennedy reportedly said these designs were taken from the architectural elements of the building and would "integrate the entire facility." Yacoulda-fooled-me! It already looked very dated. It certainly wasn't pattern-on-pat-

We took the east escalator up to the third floor accompanied by live music and, as we stepped off, musicians wearing lederhoesen were oompahing away in what looked like a (fast) food court. At the Community Open House, we found the supposed "Six Pavilions of Interest," which were nothing more than areas of the floor allocated to things like sports, cultural arts, enterprise, etc. There was

no Pavilion about it!

We took a good look at the "Millennium Art Project," created by Riverwest artist Marina Lee ... and the entire community (from school children to senior citizens). The central focus was a very large, brightly painted fantasy vessel which was made of fiberglass and fabric over a steel frame. The whole thing was named "Journey," and in some of the literature I read there was a lot of mystical talk about spiral paths and spirit travel. I didn't get it - and I still don't! Much more interesting were the brightly colored self-portraits on fabric that were created by elementary students, and made a sail to fly this contraption. As we wandered around checking out the booths, we spotted a "wing-tip shoe" car in front of the Allen Edmonds booth. Someone should have swiped that idea for our Pride Parade. Can't you just picture a giant wedgie, filled with drag queens, going down the street?

We both liked the overall look of the

signage; it was clear and easy to read-with one exception — that being the tags that identified each artwork. These small fan-shaped pieces of brushed metal had information printed in pale green and were very hard to read. The much heralded portals and installations celebrating Wisconsin writing, by MIAD instructor Jill Sebastian, in conjunction with Woodland Pattern Book Center, looked great. Some of the letters that were used were the same color as the walls and others were done in brushed steel on wooden panels. I asked if there was something that would identify which Wisconsin writers were used, but alas, there was nothing available.

A brochure on the artworks was much easier to come by. There were photographs, paintings, etched glass, prints, sculptures, a tapestry and a resin sculpture of a security guard. A mosaic of com-

mercial and handmade tiles with brass, copper and aluminum inserts in the shape of the state of Wisconsin, makes up the floor at the 6th Street exit. Along the west escalator, going up the third floor, are a series of silver gelatin prints called "Polka Time" by Dick Blau. When you push a button you get recorded polka music and the voice of DJ Jerry Halkoski to listen to as you ride up.

We soon worked our way around the building and were at the Wisconsin Avenue Concourse - complete with (fake) palm trees. Real plants thrive (so far) under this phony tropical panorama. There is an artwork/installation called "Walkways Through the Wall" that ends in a giant tile covered thing at the outer sidewalk. I saw it one day and thought: "What's that orange thing that looks like a hooded cobra. Don't tell me it's a bus shelter?" Well, it is, and I still can't believe it.

That object goes directly under the really tacky segment of this column along with Sheila Klein's "Reliquary Garden. Located just outside the building on the plaza that was created along 4th Street, is what looks like a graveyard with individ-ual cemetery plots. These are filled with the likes of police call-boxes, stop signs, what looked like speed bumps, and other bits and pieces of old road junk. Each plot was surrounded by a wrought iron fence and planted with greenery.

To add insult to injury, Ms. Klien had the nerve to have one word of "Gone-But-Not-Forgotten" carved on each of the four sandstone panels beneath four lion masks that must have graced some long-gone building. Now they only decoate a dark-red brick lump resembling a chimney next to a stairway to nowhere.

It's a shame that "Beyond the Object: Art as Public Experience" wasn't running at MIAD when this whole project was being planned. This current conference and exhibit should be made compulsory for everyone who was involved in any way with the planning and decorating of this mess. When Milwaukee is spending millions of dollars to promote itself, why do the uninformed always get to make the decisions that use these unattractive ideas? Good taste doesn't cost that much - many times less is more - and my "art as public experience" wasn't that memorable!
