



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
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Grand Opening Set for Milwaukee Community Center

Milwaukee — Two years of planning, 10 town hall meetings, 150 volunteers and 250 members later, the Milwaukee Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender Community Center will welcome the LGBT community, allies and public officials to its Grand Opening Ceremonies on Tuesday, Nov. 10, 1998 from 5:30 to 9 p.m.

"Community centers are the engine of our liberation. Milwaukee deserves a strong safe home for its LGBT community," said Carmen Vasquez, Director of Public Policy at the Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center of New York. "From the heart of the New York Center, we extend our best wishes and congratulations on your new home," Vasquez added.

Sheila Zelenski, Milwaukee LGBT Community Center co-president said, "We invite the local community, allies and our brother and sister centers across the country to join us as we celebrate this historic milestone. It is truly a significant moment we can all take pride in sharing."

"We have been motivated throughout this two year process by the support we have received from Milwaukee's LGBT community," said Neil Albrecht, Center co-president. "The efforts of many dedicated volunteers now come to fruition. Hundreds of people are coming forward to tell us 'This is great, this is what the community needs, thank you," said Albrecht.

The Grand Opening will be an opportunity for the community to explore the new facility, meet the Center Board of directors, and welcome public officials and local personalities. In addition, representatives from LGBT community social and service organizations will be on hand with information about their organizations.

Albrecht noted, "The formation of this Center will benefit the community in countless ways, including the expansion of supportive services for people newly out, youth services, and the establishment of one central access point for community members to learn about or become involved with other LGBT organizations."

The new facility supports the Center's mission to provide a home for organizations, businesses, culture and diversity, advocate for and provide programs and services to meet the needs of our communities and educate the public and our communities about our lives.

This Grand Opening has been made possible by the many pioneers in our com-munity who paved the way for this permanent home," said Albrecht. Albrecht added that historically, this is the third attempt to form a center for Milwaukee's LGBT community. In the 1970's, the Gay People's Union opened a site on Milwau kee's East Side. In the early 1990's the Cream City Foundation opened a site in Walker's Point, very close to the current Center location. These previous attempts were unable to maintain a facility due to lack of resources and volunteers. The Milwaukee LGBT Community Center is a community-based organization represented by more than 100 volunteers and over 250 members. Shortfall Leads to Cutbacks at ARCW

Milwaukee — A 4% decrease in revenue for 1998 and a projected deficit for 1999 has caused the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), the state's largest AIDS service provider, to implement a number of cost cutting measures, including the permanent elimination of seven administrative positions, in order to avoid budget deficits.

"Our commitment is to people with HIV and AIDS. We will not let them down, and I will do anything to assure we will always meet our commitment to the HIV/AIDS community," Doug Nelson, executive director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, told *IN Step*.

The decision on which positions to be eliminated was based on a functional assessment of whether the position would impair services and programs to clients, according to Nelson. Among

the positions eliminated are the Regional Director for the Northeast Region, the Director of Volunteer Resources for the Southeast Region and the Deputy Director of Community Relations. ARCW currently has 130 employees.

"The reductions in force will ensure that ARCW abides by the highest standards of cost effectiveness. Our administrative and fund-raising costs are going to be lean and mean. Our programs and services will not be affected," Nelson added.

According to Nelson, the force reduction will save ARCW \$300,000 in 1999. While other cost-cutting measures implemented earlier will assure that ARCW does not run a deficit in 1998. ARCW's budget for 1998 is \$8.5 million.

Nelson indicated to *IN Step* that a number of factors were responsible for the current shortfall. According to Nelson, AIDS Walk totals were down \$130,000 in 1998. Additionally, private sector and corporate donations also shrunk by 3.5%.

According to internal ARCW memos obtained by IN Step, a

until Jan. 1, 1999. Other cost cutting measures outlined in an

"We are in the midst of a change in the dynamics of AIDS funding," says Nelson. "But we have prided ourselves on sound financial management."

Nelson told *IN Step* that the agency has seen an increase in individual gifts and donations and expressed optimisim that ARCW would increase its fund-raising revenue in 1999. He also indicated a commitment to grow the AIDS Walk back to dollar levels achieved in previous years.

"I hope that the gay community is reassured by what we are doing to avoid a deficit without reducing our service level, says Nelson. "It is what the community expects of us."

Candace Gingrich Supports State Democrats at Milwaukee Rally

Milwaukee — Candace Gingrich, 32, nationally known gay activist and half-sister of Newt Gingrich, was devoting her energy in the last few days before the election to getting out the vote.

She plainly enjoyed her mission, her chats with like-minded peers, and urged her colleagues in the LGBT community to work for candidates friendly to gay and lesbian issues. Braun," she said.

On this tour her appearances are coordinated by the Democratic party, and she will spend the last three days before the election in Madison working for Tammy Baldwin. But her main job is as manager of the national Coming Out Project for the Human Rights League.

"You don't come out one day a year," she said earnestly, "because every day of our lives we face coming out or not.

"Of course, Coming Out Day, the 10th anniversary, is pretty big. In San Francisco we had thousands turn out, and Ellen DeGeneres was there.

"But we have to work at change all the time," she said emphatically.

She spoke of the agonizingly slow pace of the social change which lesbians, gays, bisexuals and transgendered persons need. "The change ... is glacial," she said. She

The change ... is glacial," she said. She recalled a quote from Dr. Martin Luther, Jr. King, to the effect that change does not happen overnight, but we must work as if it does.

"That's approximate, but that's the meaning," she said.

decision to come out because of what happened. And other people begin to understand when they know someone who is gay.

Then it was time for the endorsement talks, and the crowd, about 100 or so, filled the two rooms and pressed around the impromptu stage.

John Griffiths of the Human Rights League, made the introductions. First off Julia La Loggia, owner of the bar, wished to state her own endorsement of Jon Richards in his bid for an Assembly seat. Next came the HRL endorsement for Ed Garvey, running against Tommy Thompson.

Garvey recounted a tragic incident which, he said, changed his life.

Two of his Jewish friends, and their two children, were bludgeoned to death by a fanatic from the Aryan Nation. That forever changed his outlook, he said.

Then Garvey declared that his long and uphill campaign had its good side.

"I feel lucky, because through family support and friends, we have had a wonderful experience in going all over the state. And we're talking about the joy ... of taking back democracy from those who have the big checkbooks.

Garvey objected vigorously to Thompson's recent statement that desecration of the flag should be included in the bate grimes law.

She is accustomed to hearing people ask about her relationship with her half-brother, Newt Gingrich, the formidable speaker of the house. Of course, they are on opposite sides, but are polite to each other.

"We see each other once or twice a year, at family gatherings," Gingrich told *IN Step*.

On Oct. 22, in the midst of a lastminute electioneering tour, she was among the speakers at a rally sponsored by the Human Rights League and hosted by Julia La Loggia, owner of Dish, at her lesbian bar, 235 S. 2nd St.

"In California I worked for Barbara Boxer, and in Wisconsin I'm working for Russ Feingold, Tammy Baldwin, and Lydia Spottswood, and tomorrow, I'll be in Illinois working for Carol MoseleyShe also recalled that a federal district court ruled on interracial marriage in 1958, and that the Supreme Court did not rule on what was then a highly controversial issue until 1973.

Aware of the need to promote understanding, she declared that her personal focus is on coming out, over and over. She handles interviews, travels, makes speeches and summons resources for encouraging the coming out process.

Asked if the recent beating and death of a Wyoming youth had a devastating effect on the coming out process, she said the contrary seemed to be true.

"I don't think it was a setback for the movement. It helped raise awareness of what our lives are like, what risks we take by being honest about who we are," she said. Also, she added, people are making the the hate crimes law.

With the awareness that violence against gays is included in Wisconsin's hate crime law, Garvey said that Thompson's statement was "an insult to us all."

Candace Gingrich, when her turn came, reminded the enthusiastic audience that there was a time when blacks and women could not vote, and that was not so long ago.

"This is 1988. And it is about time that we stop thinking about voting as something we can do or not do. Now it is a duty, an obligation.


When a particular group is marginalized and demonized, you don't have the basic rights that others take for granted. And you have critical decisions to make on Nov. 3."

She urged her listeners get out the vote, and to volunteer for worthy candidates.

"You have a great chance to make history," she said. And her audience responded with shouts and applause.

Ousted Reverend Spreads Message at Milwaukee Church

Milwaukee - Coming Out Day at Cross Lutheran Church, 1831 N. 16 St., featured a sermon by a lesbian minister and spirited songs of celebration, including some with a gospel beat.

The guest speaker and lesbian minister was the Rev. Deborah Click, 37, of Granvlle. Ohio,

who was ousted from her parish about a year ago when her sexual orientation was discovered.

She had lived "in the closet" for Always years. wondering someone might notice something, or if she

might say one thing too many. And one day it happened.

She is not sure how, or who. But she was called in by her bishop, who noted that he had no fault to find with her work as a pastor, but that she was out of compliance with a U.L.C.A. church law, to the effect that gays and lesbians could be pastors providing they were celibate.

'He said that I could resign or he would press charges, (leading to) an eccle-siastical trial," Rev. Click said.

So, she was forced out.

She described what it was like to be ostracized, "In stores, people turned around and walked away.

And she had sat with these people in funeral homes, giving comfort. And she had celebrated the good events of their lives with them. And suddenly she was a nonperson.

But this day was a day of celebration. And a church full of people to celebrate with her. The occasion was the eighth annual Coming Out Day, with the theme, " The Road to the Rainbow -Celebrating our Lives Together." The ministers, Rev. Click and Rev. Joseph W. Ellwanger, pastor of the church, wore rainbow stoles over their robes

The service was planned by Brad Hauser, and a committee including representatives from Reformation, Pentecost, Incarnation and Village churches.

In her sermon, Rev. Click described her new ministry among gays and lesbians in east central Ohio.

Two Madison Institutions Reach

She now has an ecumenical ministry, which she calls "Prism," and which she began two weeks after her separation from her role as a Lutheran pastor.

Her focus is ecumenical because the need is there, and she does not have time to "quibble over theology."

Her work includes counseling and spiritual guidance, hospital visiting, crisis intervention, the full range of human relations issues, with outreach to two nearby towns and rural areas in five counties.

She and her partner, a Baptist minister, plan social activities such as cookouts and festivals for gays and lesbians, since nobody else in the area is doing it. She has observed a hunger for a sense of community. Other recent programming has included a seminar on thorny problems such as gay/lesbian financial planning, taking into consideration a partner's well being and a family's interests.

In Granville she has been accepted, after considerable discussion, into the Ministerium, a group of local ministers who meet once a month.

'It took nine months," she said. "And it was entirely cordial, although there were clearly different sides. The key issues were discrimination, violence and promiscuity. At the end of nine months, they issued a statement, a powerful statement."

Now she and her colleagues have reached a comfortable adjustment in her membership, although they do not agree on theology.

She does not conduct regular services for gays and lesbians because she does not wish to compete with the Baptist Church, which gave her an office after she lost her pastoral post.

"They gave us sanctuary," she said.

But she does work at some traditional ministerial services, such as memorial services every six months for AIDS patients who have died, a LGBT Sunday school class which she co-teaches, and a midweek study group devoted to the Bible and other readings.

"I feel like I am in the front trenches," she said.

She feels strongly that her present ministry is real, with the opportunity to reach out to people with a freedom she had never experienced before in a traditional setting.

CAIR Receives \$2 Million Grant for Youth HIV Prevention

Milwaukee — A new study by the Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) at the Medical College of Wisconsin will develop and evaluate a large-scale HIV prevention program for young men who have sex with men. The study is supported by a \$2,225,000 grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

"AIDS increasingly affects people who are younger and more disenfranchised than ever before," said Jeffrey A. Kelly, Ph.D., professor of psychiatry and behavioral medicine, director of CAIR and principal investigator of the study. "Young and gay men are among the people who are most at risk for HIV and AIDS."

The three-year study will be undertaken in Milwaukee and Detroit, and will involve largescale, community-level HIV prevention programs designed specifically for young gay men ages 15 to 25. CAIR has developed partnerships with HIV prevention service providers in each community to assist with field data collection and delivery of the intervention. In Milwaukee, CAIR is working with the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) and in Detroit, CAIR's partner is the Midwest AIDS Prevention Project (MAPP).

CAIR has also established collaborative relationships with other AIDS service organizations, community-based organizations and health departments in each of the two cities to provide a broad base of support for the intervention.

One of the challenges of working with at-risk young men is developing strategies to reach persons at higher risk. For nearly two years, CAIR and its community partners have identified venues in each community where young men meet. In addition, the researchers have gathered information from the men about their views on HIV prevention.

"We have talked with large numbers of young men and with representatives of service providers about what they thought is needed to improve HIV/AIDS prevention," said David W. Seal, Ph.D., assistant professor of psychiatry and behavioral medicine and co-investigator of the project. "Their recommendations are helping us tailor the intervention specifically to at-risk young men." The intervention will last for two years and will

The intervention will last for two years and will include five elements. A social marketing campaign will be developed to advocate risk reduction behavior change and establish the program as an attractive activity for young men. Key popular young people will be recruited to conduct peer outreach and advocate risk reduction to other young men. Social events, such as dances and music events, will be organized to provide opportunities for casual peer outreach. In addition, the program will offer workshops that incorporate risk reduction strategies into the discussion of other issues of interest to young men. These issues include dating, falling in love, school, and relationships with friends and parents.

Finally, the intervention will seek to strengthen



existing HIV prevention services for young gay men by engaging community organizations in the planning and carrying out of intervention elements. The researchers hope to build a network of community partners who can sustain comprehensive HIV prevention efforts for young men after the research program has ended.

Address of the terminant

The study is part of a CDC national research trial that includes seven sites, including the Medical College of Wisconsin. All sites will use the same methods throughout the trial and the findings from all sites will eventually be combined.

County Committee Approves Needle Exchange Funding

Milwaukee — "It's an investment that will save lives, get people off drugs, reduce crime and save taxpayer dollars," said ARCW Executive Director Doug Nelson as the Finance and Audit Committee of the Milwaukee County Board endorsed \$100,000 in county funding for Lifepoint, ARCW's clean needle exchange program.

The committee rejected an amendment that would have struck the \$100,000 from County Executive Tom Ament's 1999 proposed budget. The amendment offered by Supervisors Richard Nyklewizc and Mark Borkowski failed as supervisors Lynne DeBruin, Penny Podell, Lee Holloway and Jim McGuigan voted to maintain the funding.

Supervisors Karen Ordinans, Robert Krug and Daniel Diliberti voted to approve the amendment and eliminate the funding. The allocation will now go before the full board of supervisors on November 9.

DeBruin, chair of the Finance and Audit Committee, made an effective and impassioned plea urging members to support the funding. Comparing exchanging needles to taking car keys away from a drunk driver, DeBruin said the county must do all it can prevent lives from being claimed by HIV. Her support was buttressed by Supervisor Holloway's call for progressive and bold action in the face of the worsening HIV epidemic. Supervisor Podell commented that this funding was in the best interest of the taxpayers of Milwaukee Coun-

"The leadership of the four supporters of needle exchange from this committee will be powerful in opposition to attempts to eliminate this funding when the full board votes on Nov. 9," said Nelson.

ARCW has operated a needle exchange program since 1994. The one for one exchange of clean needles for used, possibly HIV contaminated ones, reduces the spread of HIV among injection drug users and works hard to get users off of drugs and into treatment. Annually, Lifepoint exchanges over 300,000 needles annually, reaches 1,500 active injection drug users and refers 150 users into treatment.

MCC Youth Programs Get \$100K Ford Foundation Grant

Los Angeles — The Ford Foundation has awarded a \$100,000 grant to the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) for its at-risk youth programs.

MCC officials said the Ford Foundation grant would be used to help underwrite the church's youth program in West Hollywood and to set up similar programs for at-risk young gays and lesbians in two other cities, which have not yet been determined.

South Africa's High Court Topples Sodomy Laws

Capetown, South Africa — The South African Constitutional Court has declared the country's same-sex sodomy laws unconstitutional, one of the most important steps forward the country was expected to take in recognizing the civil rights of gays and lesbians in the country in its post-apartheid era.

"Just as apartheid legislation rendered the lives of couples of different racial groups perpetually at risk, the sodomy offense [built] insecurity and vulnerability into the daily lives of gay men," the court declared.

Activists in the country said the court's decision paved the way for gays and lesbians in South Africa to achieve civil rights that have been denied in large part because of the country's anti-sodomy laws, which made them de facto criminals and was often cited as the rational for restricting civil rights.

'Ex-Gay' Ads Moving to TV


Washington — The coalition of far-right religious conservative organizations that backed a series of "ex-gay" ads in newspapers around the country earlier this year say they're now ready to run a series of four one-minute television spots urging gays to "turn straight."

Kristin Hansen of the Family Research Council said the TV spots would be airing on a number of stations around the country in October "and possibly longer."

The one-minute spots say homosexuals can change their sexual orientation — a fact fiercely disputed by rights activists and mental health professionals alike. The far-right ads promote church-sponsored "reparative therapy" that psychologists say simply doesn't work.

Activists say the TV campaign is simply a right-wing campaign aimed at influencing national elections in key campaigns.

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Measure Sidetracked

Paris — Using a parliamentary procedure, the French National Assembly declared a bill that would legalize domestic partnerships in the country an "inadmissible" measure, thereby cutting off all debate on the bill and derailing it — at least for the time being.

French Socialist members of the Assembly dismissed the move as a "prank" and said they would reintroduce it in a few weeks when passage would be more likely.

The parliamentary move had been possible because so many Socialist members were absent from the Assembly at the time the bill came up for debate.

UW System Fights For Diversity

LGBT Students Under Legal Attack

Madison - As one battle in its culture war, the religious right is now taking aim with litigation as its weapon at American universities and liberal arts colleges, where diversity and tolerance of different sexual orientations are both prominent cultural features and official policy.

In a decision that would affect all 26 UW System campuses, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit ruled Aug. 10 in the Southworth v. Grebe decision that students' mandatory activities fees may not be used to fund student groups such as those involved in assisting gays and lesbians on campus.

Five Evangelical Christian UW-Madison students are plaintiffs in the case, aided by two religious right legal foundations

Among the 18 groups objected to by the plaintiffs are the LGBT Campus Center, the Madison AIDS Support Center and the Ten Percent Society.

The UW Board of Regents is petitioning the Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit for a hearing en banc, a hearing before the full Seventh Circuit. Such petitions are rarely granted, but student LGBT leaders are optimistic that a hearing may be granted because of Southworth's social repercussions and significant legal questions.

For now, the current fee structure remains operative and student groups continue to function.

The religious right legal foundations aiding the Evangelical Christian are the Arizona-based Alliance Defense Fund and the Virginia-based Northstar Legal Center.

The Alliance Defense Fund (ADF) is closely aligned with the other major religious right organizations, including James Dobson's Focus On the Family and Don Wildmon's American Family Association's (AFA).

Wildmon has long been criticized for his anti-Semitic and right-wing stances he has taken in his capacity as head of the AFA, formerly the National Federation for Decency. And Dobson exercises virtual veto power over

national Republican congressional social policy.

The ADF states that it is a, " ... national alliance funding the legal defense and advocacy of religious freedom, the sanctity of human life, and family values." It boasts of a coordinated national legal strategy.

The plaintiffs argue that their First Amendment right to free speech and freedom of association is being violated because a portion of their tuition is allocated to a pool of money from which student groups are funded. But its ideological hatred of gays and lesbians appears

to be the compelling reason behind its litigation.

"I would rather not pay for someone who is working for something that is directly against my beliefs," said Southworth plaintiff Rebecka Vander Werf, a senior majoring in interior design. "It's clearly spelled out in the bible that homosexuality is wrong. Homosexuality is a sin, I am not going to condone homosexuality, murder, theft or any sin.

The A.C.L.U. of Wisconsin filed as an Amicus party to the Court against the Evangelical plaintiffs, and took issue with their First Amendment analysis.

"The students here are required to directly fund money to an organization they don't like. What they're doing is funding money to a funding pool, creating a public forum. Once you create this public forum of money, so long as the money is distributed to groups in an evenhanded way, the expenditure is appropriate, said attorney Jon Furlow, outside counsel for the A.C.L.U. of Wisconsin. "That's 'public forum analysis'. Once you fund the public forum, that public forum can be accessed without the funder being linked with a particular group's message. The whole point here is to encourage and facilitate more rigorous speech on all subjects, regardless of their political or ideological view."

Student leaders have expressed outrage at the Southworth decision, and the religious right's attack on their work.

"The LGBT Campus Center deserves the unequivocal support of the university. It is the only resource on campus for students in the coming out process. Knowing the statistics for suicide among LGBT youth, it would be criminal for the university not to fund support for this center," said Jason Rasmussen, co-president of UW's Ten Percent Society.

The LGBT community and other student groups on all UW campuses await the Court's decision. If the full Seventh Circuit refuses the petition for an en banc hearing, the UW may petition the U.S. Supreme Court to grant a writ of certiorari, to agree to hear the case.

Seratti Prepares Anti-gay Ad Against **Assembly Opponent**



Madison - State Rep. Lorraine Seratti (R-Spread Eagle) has reportedly prepared a radio ad that makes sinister implications about the support that her Democratic opponent, Pete Krolow, has received from openly gay Madison-area Assembly candidate Mark Pocan. Pocan faces no Republican opponent in the Nov. 3 election, and has been helping in other campaigns.

The Capital Times reported on Oct. 26 that the tape of Seratti's ad has been distributed to radio stations in the 36th Assembly District, which is in northern Wisconsin. The ad reportedly says, "Madison area Assembly candidate Mark Pocan, who is openly gay, may soon be knocking on your door. Why would a homosexual from Madison be supporting Pete Krolow?" The ad says the reason is that Seratti "had the courage to introduce a bill banning same-sex marriage in Wisconsin." The ad's title, which would not be broadcast with the ad, is reportedly "He's One of Them."

Neither Krolow nor Seratti could be reached by press time for comment, but Pocan said that Krolow's campaign got an advance tip about the ad from one of the radio stations that received the tape. Pocan said he offered not to help with Krolow's campaign, but that Krolow and his wife have said they are glad to have Pocan's support. Pocan joked that all Krolow campaigners were going to wear stickers saying, "Hello, my name is Mark.

Pocan said that he "felt a little guilty" about becoming the focal point of an attack against another candi-date, and that he is trying to collect \$104 checks on Krolow's behalf as a statement against Seratti's antisame-sex marriage bill, A.B. 104. 


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HRL Holds Public Officials Reception

Milwaukee - Representatives from segments of Milwaukee's LGBT community gathered on Monday, Oct. 19, to thank public officials for their support in the past and to encourage them to lend an appreciative ear in the future.

Co-sponsored by the Human Rights League and the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center, the reception gave public officials - elected and appointed -a chance to express their views to their constituents - and the public at large - through the media representatives present as well as to leaders in the gay community.

Among the public officials in a group as television lights flashed were County Supervisor Dorothy Dean, a consistent ally of gays and lesbians, as well as County Executive Tom Ament, who has supported gay rights issues which come up before

the county board, and Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist.

Sen. Russ Feingold, currently in a hotly contested race with Rep. Mark Neumann, told IN Step that he was in favor of the state of Wisconsin including and treating everyone equally.

"There should be no discrimination in this state, and that's one thing certain. It is not only right, but it is good for the business climate and the culture of our

state," Feingold said.

Norquist described seeing a Broadway version of "Cabaret," and the turmoil that resulted when people did not stand up for what they knew was right, "and then everything went to hell," as he put it. "And frankly," he added "I think the Mark Neumann candidacy is very scary

and I want everybody to vote for Russ (Feingold)," Norquist told the crowd.

Ament, speaking of the proposed \$100,000 in the budget for clean needle exchange, urged everyone to call his or her county supervisor and tell them that they believe the proposed clean needle exchange would do some good.

"I think it will pass, but it has some problems." Ament said.

John Griffiths spoke of a new project called "We are Everwhere."

At this point, he said, 985 persons have been registered as constituents or friends of gays, lesbians, bisexual or transgendered persons. In the three to five-year project, the aim is to have persons in every ward, perhaps 2,000 or 2,700.

"Then we will organize to have an impact on elections," Griffiths said.

Finally, Human Rights League awards were given to three volunteers who have been active in the community for three years or less.

The intent was to recognize people who are beginning their work in the community, HRL's Scott Gunkel said.

'We have seen too many people come and go without recognition," he said.

The award winners are Brigitte Vojcsik, for her work with PFLAG, fund-raising for billboards and a Pridefest trailer; Wendy Radish, representing her group, Gemini Gender; and Carol Ringo, for her group, Bi Definition.

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




to honor the trust she placed in people, even relative strangers, knows what a kind presence has passed from Wiscon-sin's rural gay and lesbian community.





Letters Betting on the Impossible

If I were a betting person, I might wager that State Sen. Tammy Baldwin will make history this November by becoming the first non-incumbent, openly gay person to be elected to Congress. The odds are good in her favor for several reasons: she's running in a largely liberal district; she has a solid track record as a state legislator; and the Democrats have targeted the 2nd Congressional District race as vitally important and have rolled out some very big guns to campaign for her — from Donna Shalala, the Health and Human Services Sec-retary, to motorcylcle-riding former Texas Gov. Anne Richardson, to First Lady Hillary Clinton. But to be honest, I wouldn't bet a dime on Baldwin winning.

The reason isn't that I'm not a gambling person (I'm not, but that's not the reason). The reason quite simply is that some Americans are so profoundly screwy that it's risky to underestimate their capacity for doing the improbable, unlikely and unthinkable --- no matter how improbable, unlikely or unthinkable it is.

For example, I would never have guessed that a jury would sentence Dan White to eight years in prison for walking into San Francisco's city hall and assassinating Mayor George Moscone and gay Supervisor Harvey Milk some 20 years ago. I would have bet dollars to donuts against it - and I would have lost.

And I'd never have bet that a cynical, manipulative, power-hungry snake-oil crank like Pat Robertson could ever be considered seriously enough to run for dog catcher, let alone president of the United States. But I'd have been dead wrong — and out some money to boot. And I'd never put a dime on the chances of nice, liberal newspapers like the Seattle Times

or the Los Angeles Times saying that "merely" because a homosexual was savagely beaten to death, strung up on a cross-hatch fence and left for dead in freezing cold Wyoming weather the country should "rush" to enact hate crime laws protecting homosexuals from anti-gay violence. But that's exactly what they did after the killing of Matthew Shepard, and I'd once again be out of the game.

I'd be the looser too if I bet that just days after Shepard's death, his brain so damaged by the gun-butt beating he received that doctors said they couldn't even operate, students at a Provo, Utah, school would cheer when a 13-year-old fellow student said his "wish" for the future would be that "gay men be crucified on Main Street and lesbians be burned at the stake."

I would also have bet that even 30 years ago two teen agers in Denver couldn't possibly strangle and kick to death a 21-year-old gay man and then play "patty-cake" on his lifeless body as they drove around town, showing his corpse to friends. But they did and nobody thought we should have hate crimes laws when Thomas J. Peters' body was found in a pond and the two teenagers who admitted the senseless killing said they picked Peters because he was a homosexual.

And I'd have lost my shirt if I had bet that one of the teens who murdered Peters so brutally would spend only 11 years in prison while the other would be sentenced to just two years in juvenile hall. Because that's all the jury thought these two monsters deserved.

It would also have taken incredible wagering skill to bet that the day before Shepard died in a Fort Collins, Colo., hospital of the massive brain injuries he suffered when he was lashed to a fence like a scarecrow, a joint fraternity-sorority float in nearby Colorado State University's homecoming parade would have included a real scarecrow with a vulgar and derogatory anti-gay sign attached to it. Again, I would have bet good money that such idiotic nonsense couldn't happen - and I'd have been thoroughly wrong.

Like most activists as well as legal observers, I'd certainly have bet that the U.S. Supreme Court would have tossed out Cincinnati's anti-gay ballot measure, Issue 3, as unconstitutional. After all, in 1996 the same court had declared an almost identical statewide Colorado measure was unconstitutional. But once more I'd have been dead wrong, because in fact the day Shepard died in Colorado, the court let the Cincinnati measure take effect, making it illegal for that city to extend any protections based on sexual orientation.


If I were a betting person, I'd probably also be inclined to think the two young men charged with first degree murder in the killing of Matthew Shepard will be convicted and either sentenced to life in prison or executed for the crime.

But frankly, like a growing number of gays and lesbians on the Internet are now suggesting, there's no real reason to think these two accused young men may not get extremely light sentences — if they're convicted at all. One woman in Laramie, who formerly worked with the prosecutor's office in a witness program, has already charged that the lead attorney who will be prosecuting the case was instrumental in getting her fired because she is a lesbian.

Others have also voiced their worst fears that any number of procedural errors in the case could end up resulting in the two getting off either Scott free or with very light sentences much as Dan White did 20 years ago after murdering Moscone and Milk and laying the blame on eating too many Twinkies.

So, much as I'd like to bet on Baldwin making history this November, and as much as all the indicators say she should win this important race, I'll pass putting any bets on it.

While I still think the overwhelming majority of Americans are basically decent and at least moderately sensible people, it's also clear that no matter how impossible or incomprehensible or downright insane something may seem when it comes to gays and lesbians, betting it couldn't possibly happen is still, sadly, a long shot at best.

Action Wisconsin Offers Voters Guide

ction Wisconsin, a nonpartisan organization that supports equal rights for Wisconsin's lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered citizens and their families, has released its 1998 voter guide for the Nov. 3 election. The guide, based on candidate answers to a series of eight questions about equality, sex education, HIV and women's health, contains a few surprises.

Perhaps the biggest is that most candidates did not bother to respond. Notably absent were responses from Gov. Tommy Thompson (R), U.S. Senate candidate Mark Neumann (R), and all but two Democrats and three Republicans running for Congress.

Action Wisconsin's survey asked questions such as "Does your definition of family include same-sex couples and their children?" "Do you support the proposed federal Employment Nondiscrimination Act (ENDA), which would ban job discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation?" and "Do you support inclusion of complete, objective, age-appropriate information on sexuality and sexual orientation in public schools?" For all questions, a "yes" answer indicated support for gay equality or for the measures being asked about. Additional comments were also welcomed.

In the race for governor, Democratic challenger Ed Garvey answered "yes" to all questions, and Mike Mangan (Independent) and Jim Mueller (Libertarian) also answered "yes" to most. Candidate Edward Frami of the U.S. Taxpayers Party answered "no" to all, and in his comments, Frami suggested that no additional funding for AIDS research is necessary because a "cure" in the form of "glyco-nutritional supplementation" has already been found. Gov. Thompson did not respond.

In the tight race for the U.S. Senate between Sen. Russ Feingold (D) and Rep. Mark Neumann (R), Feingold answered "yes" to most questions and provided detailed and supportive comments for all questions. Feingold said he was proud of

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
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his endorsement by the Human Rights Campaign, and added, "I have been consistent in opposing discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and, if re-hired, I will continue to protect the rights of *all* Wisconsin citizens." Libertarian candidate Tom Ender commented that his definition of family "includes any group wishing to live together and care for one another." Neumann did not respond.


In the Congressional race in Southeastern Wisconsin's 1st District, Lydia Spottswood (D) answered yes to most questions and noted that she has been endorsed by the Human Rights Campaign. Her Republican opponent Paul Ryan did not respond. In the 2nd District in and around

Madison, openly lesbian candidate Tammy Baldwin (D) answered yes to all questions, and her opponent, Jo Musser, (R) answered yes to all except the question which asked, "Do you support legal recognition of same-sex couples in long-term, committed relationships, with rights (and responsibilities) which recognize both the similarities and differences between such partnerships and heterosexual marriage?"

Musser did not explain her "no" answer. In the 5th and 7th Congressional Districts, Republicans Jack Melvin and Scott West offered a mix of "yes" and "no" answers. Their Democratic opponents did not respond.

The guide also lists the vote of all members of the Wisconsin state assembly on A.B. 104, the bill introduced last year by Lorraine Seratti (R-Spread Eagle), which would have banned same-sex marriage. The bill passed 78-20 in the Assembly, but died in Senate committee without a vote. Seratti is being challenged this year by Pete Krolow (D) in the predominantly rural 36th Assembly District in northern Wisconsin.



Are Hate Crime Laws **Really Necessary?**

he shocking and tragic death of Matthew Shepard, the young gay man from Wyoming who was kidnaped, bound to a fence, beaten and left for dead, has served as a catalyst for the resurgence of more exhaustive and expansive hate crime legislation.

The term "hate crime" is somewhat misleading. A hate crime in itself is not a

crime. Rather, hate crime legislation enhances the penalties of already established crimes (i.e. assault, battery, homicide). The idea behind these laws are that criminals will think twice before targeting a specific population for their victims.

Currently, 41 states have hate crime legislation. However, only 11 of these 41 states specifically include sexual orientation as a protected class.

Wisconsin is one of the eleven states that protects gays and lesbians. Under Wisconsin's hate crime statute, a person who commits a crime against a person in whole or in part because of the criminal's belief or perception regarding the race, religion, color,

disability, sexual orientation, national origin or ancestry of that person will face additional penalties. The criminal defendant may face additional penalties even if the defendant's belief or perception of the victim was incorrect (i.e. attacking a heterosexual man because the perpetrator believed that he was gay because of some effeminate characteristic).

Opponents of hate crime legislation argue that such laws are unnecessary and superfluous because sufficient penalties already exist for the underlying crime. Several conservatives on the airwaves can be heard alleging that if Wyoming had a hate crime law, it would have made absolutely no difference to the two men who have allegedly killed Matthew Shepherd. Under Wyoming law, a person who is convicted of first degree homicide may receive the death penalty. Given that these defendants may be facing a death sentence, conservatives argue, what difference would a penalty enhancement of five years make?

These conservative opponents are looking at the purpose of law in a very narrow and ignorant manner. Yes, under Wyoming law, if these two defendants are convicted of first degree murder, an additional five years would not make a difference. However, not all hate crimes are first degree homicides. The F.B.I. reported that there were 4,558 hate crimes in 1991 and 7,587 in 1993. Many of these crimes were not homicides, but less serious offenses such as assault and battery or disorderly conduct. Under Wisconsin's hate crime legislation, the fact that the victim of a disorderly conduct was a protected class could raise the offense from a Class A misdemeanor to a felony. This is only one of many examples of where hate crime legislation does make a concrete and direct impact on a criminal's life.


We chose the new location because of its high visibility in that area. There is a constant flow of pedestrian and auto traffic and we feel that relocating there will draw people's attention our way," he added.

Chicago and Minneapolis have begun to see the emergence of day spas," he said. "It seemed to be the right choice to expand Actaea to include day spa services as well."





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


Porn's Jack Wrangler Sues NYC for Wife's Accident

Jack Wrangler, a notable gay porn icon from the 1970s, has filed a \$2 million lawsuit against the city of New York for the loss of sexual services after his elderly wife, singer Margaret Whiting, tripped on a downtown street and broke her knee.

Wrangler, 52, said the city, along with Consolidated Edison and a paving firm, were jointly liable for the accident that left him without "conjugal fellowship and sexual fulfillment" with his wife.

Whiting, a popular Broadway singer who got her start with the big-band sound of the 1940s, and Wrangler married in the late 1970s, and Whiting eventually convinced Wrangler to abandon his gay porn career.

Wrangler appeared in several gay porn films, including "Raunch Ranch" and "Heavy Equipment." Whiting has continued to maintain her cabaret and Broadway career despite her age, and last year appeared in the musical "Dream."

McKellen

hile Oprah may be the front runner in the Best Actress category, for her role in "Beloved," odds are that Sir Ian McKellen, (knighted in 1991), one of the few openly gay actors working for Hollywood today, will be in the lead for the Best Actor category

The question does not seem to be if, rather, for which role and in which film will be nominated?

For quite some time, Ian McKellan, (not really a stranger to film) was known best for his roles in theater. McKellen's passion for and lead role on stage in "Richard III" led to him help create and produce one of 1994's most critically acclaimed films. McKellen's fantastic performance in "Richard III" solidified his career as an actor in Hollywood. He was recently seen in "Bent."

McKellen will soon be seen in not one, but two, films that are sure to catapult him to the top of every director's 'must work' with list.

In "God's and Monsters," (opening November 6), a biographical film, McKellen plays gay director James Whale, who was best known for his Bmovies, "Frankenstein" and "Bride of Frankenstein." Retired and slowly becoming incapacitated, he falls hard for his straight, albeit slightly mentally deficient, hunk of a gardener, played brilliantly by Brendan Frasier.

In director Bryan ("The Usual Suspects") Singer's "Apt Pupil," which opened on Oct. 23, McKellen stars opposite 16 year old Brad Renfro, and plays Kurt Dussander, a former Nazi who single-handedly was responsible for the exterminations of thousands of Jews and other unfortunates committed to his concentration camp. In "Apt Pupil," Renfro's character Todd uncovers the deadly secret which leads to a psychological war that spirals out of control. Speaking from his home in London recently, McKellen talked about "Apt Pupil," his extensive career in theater, and his aspirations of becoming a harder working movie actor. "Being cast in "Apt Pupil" came about pretty easily," says McKellen. "Bryan Singer [who also happens to be openly gay] and I met for a breakfast at the Four Seasons. He had just seen me in a Nazi uniform in "Richard III" and had a feeling that I might be right for his new film. He was a little hesitant though, wondering if I could convinc-

ingly play someone 30 years my senior. He asked me whether I had seen "Cold Comfort Farm," in which I answered yes. 'Do you remember the Hellfire preacher character?' he asked me," says McKellen, chuckling. "'I envision the role of Dussander in "Apt Pupil" to be somewhat like the character of the Hellfire preacher,' Singer went on. He wantbeing nominated for one of the roles is the talk of Hollywood at the moment. Such a question is like asking a mother which of her children she likes more.

'I'm not going to answer that, if you don't mind," he says politely, but with just enough surprise in his voice to let me know that it was probably the most foolish question I have ever asked any-

ed to know whether I thought I could one when interviewing them. play a role like that. When I told him that I was Hellfire preacher in "Cold

"I'll say this," he goes on, in his self-deprecating style. "Oscar, I think, is less important to the actor who wins it than to the film in which one wins for. I am in two films that are being released by two different studios and would be elated if either of them get a little boost from any nomination that comes either film's way. But really," he adds, "Nominations are not even announced until February. I would think that the film's fates will have been sealed by then." For those who see "Apt Pupil," one may wonder how McKellen was able to unleash such fury and evil into the role. The tip of the iceberg are the scenes in which he goes into gruesome detail about how he exterminated many in the camp. "I've played worse people," he says. "I have played Macbeth and Richard III. Although they are fictional characters they are pure evil. I had the most trouble, in "Apt Pupil" trying to play someone 30 years my senior. It was also difficult getting the accent to be

Dean Jensen has gained a reputation as an educated connoisseur and an aggressive dealer. When he helped pioneer Milwaukee's Historic Third Ward with an upscale gallery, Jensen demonstrated a foresight that at the time could only be called daring. The recent relocation of Dean Jensen Gallery to North Water St. has people wondering if Jensen is once again being shrewdly visionary.

For Jensen, a man never shy of financial reward, it's simply a matter of demographics. Not only is this new gallery in the heart of the city's financial district, it is nearer the convention center, the Riverwalk and gadzillions of new condominiums and apartments. What's more, he has increased exhibition space to include a lower gallery, making it possible to mount two completely different shows without visual confusion.

As multitudes searched for Dean at his former location this past Gallery Night, a smaller coterie of cognoscenti enjoyed the inaugural exhibition at Jensen's new location. For admirers of Chicago art star Ed Paschke, the opening was more than just another visual treat. Paschke was physically present: smiling, shaking hands, and eagerly discussing his art. As an artist of international renown, he greeted visitors with a humble, even shy, demeanor.

Paschke first came to national attention in the late 1960's. Heavily influenced by Pop Art, he developed his own unique style for energizing images drawn from print media and television. Employing subtle gradations of brilliant color, Paschke's work has the look of expertly sprayed aerosols and air-brushes. Surprisingly, these blurred boundaries of color are in fact created by painstaking application of oil paints. Paschke's brush creates images reminiscent of those viewed on malfunctioning video monitors. His work melds the pointilistic techniques of Seurat with the static-charged distortions of the electronic age.

Never totally abandoning his early themes of violence and aggression, Paschke's show is replete with gun imagery. A small ink and pencil handgun is simply titled Private Dick. In La Mondo Ponderosa two guns are aimed at completely random angles. A hand floats above the figure of a cowboy, with the title of the work spelled in lettering at the tips of its fingers. The hand evokes a chart used in palmistry. Gun violence and fate are inextricably linked.

More interestingly, Paschke blurs the boundaries between the sexes in paintings that delight in gender enigma. *Fishsticks* depicts a man kissing an androgynous looking being. On each side of the embracing couple, two fish make an obvious reference to the Pisces astrological sign. The opposing directions of the fish bring to mind the oriental philosophy of yin and yang. Sexuality becomes not only the meeting of male and female forces, but the inevitable merging of them.

Force of Nature weds the themes of violence and gender. A crouching figure, looking much like Grace Jones (it is not, according to the artist) is flanked on one side by a pistol. The gun is aimed straight through the androgynous figure's body to a rainbow-colored poodle on the other side. Above this frightening scenario the words "Natural Selection" might cause a shiver to run down your spine. The painting becomes more than a comment on race, gender, and violence. It questions the fragile condition of civility in a barbarous world.

The most technically interesting piece in this show is

Gordon Parks Retrospective

Half Past Autumn: The Art of Gordon Parks opens at the Milwaukee Art Museum on Nov. 20, 1998, and will remain on exhibit through Jan, 10, 1999. This retrospective has created a tone-poem that impressionistically tells Parks' own story, and will bring together for the first time more than 200 of his photographs along with his films, books and music.

Parks bought his first camera at a pawnshop for \$7.50. He had, he said "... bought what was to become my weapon against poverty and racism." By 1941 Parks became the first photographer to receive a fellowship from the Julius Rosenwald Foundation. He chose to work with Roy Stryker at the Farm Services Administration (FSA), a government agency designed to call attention to the plight of the needy during the Depression and to create an historical record of social and cultural conditions across the country.

In 1934, when the FSA was dissolved for political reasons, Stryker arranged for Parks to move with him to the Office of War Information, where he was assigned as a war correspondent to the 332nd Fighter Group, the first black air corps. He then followed Stryker to the Standard Oil Photography Project and made some of his most striking and influential work during this time.

In 1944, Parks was hired by Vogue magazine to shoot a collection of evening gowns and continued to work for the magazine for the next few years. He also photographed fashions for Glamour magazine. During this time Parks published his first two books on photography. By 1948 Parks approached Life magazine and asked for a job photographing the gang wars in Harlem as well as fashions in Paris. He was hired to do both. "Suddenly for me," remembers Parks, "two extremely diverse worlds were about to converge - one of crime, the other of high fashion."

In 1950 he moved to Paris as a European correspondent, where he was given access to celebrities,

Florentine Opens with 'Cavalleria Rusticana' and 'I Paglicacci'

The Florentine Opera begins its 1998-99 season with two highly dramatic one-act Italian operas, Mascagni's *Cavalleria Rusticana* and Leoncavallo's *I Pagliacci*. Performances will take place on November 13, 14, and 15 at Uihlein Hall of the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts. Friday and Saturday performances begin at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday's matinee performance begins at 2:30 p.m. Joseph Rescigno will lead an internationally acclaimed cast and the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, while Marc Verzatt of the Pittsburgh Opera makes his Florentine gained their trust and was able to shoot beautiful and touching portraits of them. In 1961 Parks ventured into the Deep South, where he photographed an eloquent story about segregation in the U.S. He did his first film, "Flavio" in 1964. This film is a documentary based on a photographic essay of Flavio Da Silva, a young boy he met in the slums of Brazil. Photographs were taken against the cosmopolitan backdrop of Rio de Janerio.

Parks has published numerous volumes of poetry combined with photographs. His films for MGM include, among others, "The Learning Tree" (1969); "Shaft" (1971); "Shaft's Big Score" (1972); and "The Super Cops" (1972). Other films include "Leadbelly" (1976); "Solomon Northrup's Odyssey" (1984); and "Martin" (1989).

There will be a Member Preview on Thursday, Nov. 19 at 5:30 p.m., and a Public Book Signing of "Half Past Autumn" on Friday, Nov. 20 from 1:30 to 3 p.m. The exhibition is accompanied by a 360 page book by Parks, published by Bullfinch Press/Little Brown and Company (\$65 HC, \$40 SC) available in the Museum Shops. Admission to the exhibit is \$5, \$3 for seniors (65+) and students. Members are free. Milwaukee County residents are admitted free on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to noon. 

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

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Jocks: True Stories of America's Gay Male Athletes by Dan Woog

few people sneer at Oprah and the talk shows, but many more watch them. This book is like a good talk show, with the guests being gay men who are athletes and athletes who are gay men; it is a look at the non-famous. And, because most athletes begin train-



ing when they are young, this is also a book about gay youth, of coming out, of gay coaches, and of anti-gay administrators, coaches and athletes.

Each individual's story is but five or 10 pages, so one encounters numerous individuals as they cope with common problems. Some of these athletes are out, some are not and some are in-between. Some have won acceptance from their teammates, some were so isolated that they quit sports altogether, while others changed from one activity to another sport they believed would be more tolerant.

Woog's sample of gay male athletes is not "representative" of all America, or of all gay male athletes in America. Instead, he centers, like athletics in general, on young, healthy people. Because he is a soccer coach in New England, that area of the country is over-represented; the South is under-represented, and most of the athletes included are white. Woog describes individuals in track, football, hockey, swimming, volleyball, basketball, soccer, etc. He is especially good when discussing the problems of gay male athletes in high school and college.

The author describes some brutal assaults by bigots on gay athletes - and even upon a straight one whose coach is gay. Woog notes two examples of boys who were forced to leave home when

their bigoted parents discovered they were gay (Such parents preach but don't practice family values). But more often, he presents the love of sports that enables gay men to develop their own esteem and prowess so they can better cope in a hostile environment. More impressive is the fact that some of these gay athletes have changed their environment so that it is not as hateful as it was.

Woog has chapters on Jason, who played tennis in Milwaukee and Noah, who wrestled at the University of Wisconsin. There are chapters on two members of the Boston Strikers (a gay soccer team). He might have included a chapter on Rich Tafel, who was a powerful defender on that team, but is better known as the founder of the Log Cabin Republicans. I used to play against all of them, for I was one of the original members of the New York Ramblers, the first gay soccer club in the world. There is coverage of the Gay Games from its inception in San Francisco, in 1982.

Woog should have included information on the gay softball leagues, which are so important in our community. He could have included gay bowling leagues and FrontRunners. He might have included more on the history and theory of the body, sex, gays and athletics. But even with the absence of such topics, he has produced a useful book.

In telling the stories of individual athletes, the author is not trying to force their stories into a particular ideological mold. True, he has his own views, and expresses them in a short afterword that includes recommendations for organizing. One senses that when Woog interviewed the numerous subjects for this project, he allowed them to speak for themselves. Undoubtedly to reduce the dulling repetition of the written interview, Woog presents the athletes' views and their life stories in a narrative format.

Woog has written a simple presentation of the difficulties gay athletes face - some within a homophobic athletic community, some with gays who deride all athletes. Each story included contributes to a cumulative effect. After reading this book one acquires a greater understanding of the courage displayed by gay athletes. This book should be required reading for all high school and college students. (Alyson Paperback, ISBN: 1-55583-399-3, \$12.95).







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Jen Benka

he stage set is small and spare, but the experience is rich. Told with poetry, songs and slides, "Tree Stories" by Jen Benka is for anyone who loves trees, and the sad and funny adventures of the human heart. The show runs 45-minutes, and offers uncommon glimpses from a woman's life.

On the stage at Pengalin, 808 E. Locust St., are three chairs and a stepladder.

Benka begins with a poem about her grandfather and his special tree, while tree slides flash and flicker on the screen which forms the backdrop of the stage.

My grandpa didn't go to church. He went to a tree, And old red maple Down the road from his house. ... And at night Grandpa said a breeze would come through the tree and carry his prayer Up to heaven. He hung his hopes, fears and thoughts On its branches like Grandma hung the Bed sheets and undershirts On her laundry line.

Other poetic and musical tree tributes follow, some read by Ms. Benka's colleagues. Jen Moore and Anina Bacon, both dancers with the Dance Works Performance Company, rising from their chairs to stand in the spotlight, or sit on the ladder. Among memorable fragments:

feel like a tree ..

Somehow I feel like a tree that's lucky to be a tree... I feel beautiful, like an undeveloped rain forest of trees...

Then come other glimpses and moods, inspired by memories first of a tree house; then, with the stepladder as a prop, of a woman "up a tree," just for the view; next, of a happy crafter, using wood in ingenious ways, carving for the joy of it.

But not all the tree stories are pleasant. One tells of a girl's terrible experience, being tied to a tree, arms pulled back, wrists bound, warned to keep her eyes shut. And being saved, somehow, from something not described, by some uncommonly kindly chance

And one poem wins audible recognition from the audience, as it did in one performance as part of Riverwest, when the poet read:

"I could be losing it. I could be falling apart."

Something like a sigh comes from the audience, as if in recognition and agreement.

Earlier, before the performance, Ms.

Benka described her two lives, her desire to keep them separate, and her experience as a poet, musician and performer.

Professionally she is director of development, a full time job, for Nine to Five, the National Association of Working Women.

"I like to keep that separate from my other work in the arts," she said.

Between the two, she works most of the time. And sometimes goes back and forth between poetry and music. She has not made up her mind which she prefers.

"It's something I discovered in adolescence," she said. "And it is something that has stayed with me.

She is tall, slender, 30 years old, and a 1990 graduate of Marquette University in journalism. Her poetry has been published in feminist journals and in small literary journals.

Most of her poetic themes, while not strictly autobiographical, so far have reflected the experiences she has had or the people she has known, evoking memories of times past.

She describes her music, which she composes on her guitar, as "mostly folk-pop." And she also uses slides in some performances, as in "Tree Stories."

"I do a lot of stuff," she said, and clearly enjoys all of it.



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
Another creative venture is her series of five comic books with a "Manya" theme, depicting the adventures of a character of the same name. The books, on which she works with a collaborating illustrator, so far have not been available in Milwaukee but have been popular in many other cities, including Madison. A university professor there has ordered a number of copies of Manya books to use in his classes.

For her full time job as director of development for Nine to Five, she writes grants, works with donors, and directs outreach programs

"I do my writing (of poetry) and music on evenings and weekends," she said.

Working in so many media, I have not decided which is primary. Is it music? Is it poetry? At times I work in one, alone, and not the others. Or I may start in one medium, and then involve the others.

'I do know that performance is important to me. I like the audience response. That's what make it interesting. If you're not trying to communicate, why write in the first place?"

just so. I had to be convincing enough that one would actually believe that I was a German who had been living in Southern California for 30 years. All the dialect credit certainly goes to my dialect coach. I also had a little difficulty trying to imagine this character's ordinary side."

For whatever the reason, many who have seen "Apt Pupil," which is based on the Stephen King novella of the same title, have detected a homoerotic theme in the film.

'Yes. I have heard people commenting about the alleged homoeroticism," McKellen says. If they see an undercurrent between a 16 year old boy and an 85 plus year old man, well, good for them," he laughs. "But, I don't see it anywhere in the film."

Speaking about his own openly gay career he is very forthcoming. "I don't think there is a problem per se," says McKellen when asked whether he thinks that Americans are a little more hung up on accepting openly gay actors. "There is an assumption in Hollywood that an audience will be unable to take seeing someone they know to be gay to play a straight role. When there is the reverse, an alleged straight actor playing a gay role, there is no blink of an eye. I think the problem, if it is one, is that everyone who goes to the movies has sexual fantasies about actors in film and people may not feel the attraction if they know someone is gay and therefore get somewhat turned off by the actor. Fortunately for me, I am beyond the age, for the most part, of playing a romantic lead, although I did have a kissing scene with Gretta Scachi in HBO's "Rasputin" and I won a Golden Globe Award for the role. I don't know," he goes on, contemplating. "Everyone knows where Anne Heche sleeps and she did not bankrupt Disney

with "Six Days, Seven Nights." It will be funny to see who will be the first American male movie star to take as bold of a step as Anne Heche. Everything happens slowly. It wasn't too long ago that Jews in Hollywood were changing their names in order to get work."


"I think," he goes on, "that much blame can be laid on the publicists and managers of up and coming stars; publicists and managers who they themselves may be openly gay but are trying to convince their clients that it is unwise to come clean for fear of not getting work. It is very prurient on their parts and much covering up needs to be done. The facade, of course, can be punctured at any time by an over-diligent journalist."

McKellen was born on May 25, 1939, in an industrial town north of England, first acted in high school and then at Cambridge University, where he studied English literature and appeared in 21 undergradu-ate productions. Without any formal training, he made his professional debut in 1961 at the Belgrade Theater and for three seasons worked his apprenticeship with other regional companies. In the United States, McKellen won the 1981 Best Actor Tony Award for his role in "Amadeus."

He has no plans of retiring any time soon. "I probably work far too hard," he says. "I have many contemporaries who are packing it up and retiring and who are excited about the prospect of being able to travel the world. What I would like is to be considered for parts in films that are closer to my own age or maybe a little younger. I think I'll be able to can pass off playing someone in their early 50s for a few more years," says the respected actor who has recently played a number of roles much older than him.

"I have a new lease on life," he says. "My energy level is higher than ever. I can't see myself retiring for at least 10 more years. Then, maybe I will be able to take a vacation." V



Pleasantville

Ross, *Pleasantville* stars Tobey Maguire as a teen-ager who escapes his dreary 90s existence through an addiction to 50s television. During a

marathon of his favorite rerun, "Pleasantville," a TV repair guy (an absolutely gorgeous performance by the great Don Knotts) comes to the door and gives him a magical remote that transports him and his sister (Reese Witherspoon) into the b&w television world of "Pleasantville." They get Ward and June Cleaver-type parents (Joan Allen and William H. Macy) and a perfect universe sans fire, subversive books and basketball game losses. But the '90s ways of the two transportees eventually seep into the town and those citizens influenced by the future get colorized. And soon the perfect balance of Pleasantville is upset by rampant prejudice and witch hunts.

Pleasantville is an undeniably riveting watch. The interaction between B&W and color characters is a marvel to regard. There are some nice messages about the need for tolerance and to feel pain and to break up soul-sucking habits and such. Best of all, cultural aptitude is rewarded above all other proficiencies. Maguire's character is a quintessential child of the 90's whose immersion in simulacra makes him a prime candidate for anomie and the unemployment line (or worse). Here, though, he uses his prodigious Nick at Nite knowledge to maneuver his way through the Twilight Zoney situation. Nothing on the SAT could have prepared him for it, which feels like a coup for this low scorer.

Yet something smells rotten in the

state of Pleasantville. Where The Truman Show (the mirror to which Pleasantville is most often held up) is "real life" desperately trying to masquerade itself as representation, Pleasantville is a representation desperately trying to be real life. That last is a much more problematic bit of sorcery to pull off, primarily because it has the effect of naturalizing representation. Thus where The Truman Show gets you thinking about constructed selfs and ideological state apparatuses, Pleasantville makes it seem as if the paths the awakened Pleasantvillians travel on from under 50's repression are their (often biological) destinies.

It's important to note that it's not the intrusion of some post-Kennedy headline or technological innovation that colors Pleasantville's world but rather female sexuality. Witherspoon plays a self-professed slut who can't resist fucking the hunky basketball team captain. Oh sure, he enjoys it for the duration but freaks out in disgust immediately afterward. The next day, he recounts this first instance of sex in town to his horrified teammates and whaddayaknow — not a single one of them makes a basket at practice seconds later, where before their record was perfect. Tsk, tsk!

And then mom, after questioning her daughter's practices, becomes flush with enough color to give Norma Desmond apoplexy. Unlike the basketball team captain, she accepts sexuality with no complexes. She discovers masturbation in the bathtub and submits her nude body to the impressionist strokes of budding artist Jeff Daniels. Maybe she could turn *The Truman Show* black and white.

Because Pleasantville oppressively insures that women stay tied to "natural," sexual selves, there's really nothing new or life-affirming in its metaphors. And that's not to mention the racial metaphors that are explored without the messy appearance of non-Caucasians. Or the inability for Hollywood screenwriters to imagine the '50s having a negative effect on the '90s. Whew! It's smelling worse and worse by the second.

That is how the photographer Lalli describes his provocative debut book recently published by Universe Publishing (\$35). Edgy and alluring, this book takes a look at a new generation of models at play. It an intimate and

seductive vision of male beauty and desire. The collect of images marks a new subversive stage in the development art of male portraiture.

In his forward, Brad Gooch describe Lalli as trangressive, "His photographs are full of taboos slyly wilted in a hothouse of puberty. A guy lolls on a bed in a fur jockstrap. Another fondles a real gun while his real brother rests his head lovingly on his shoulder. These scenes are dotted with charged objects which become emblematic props: guns, cigars, mirrors, cowboy hats, cop hats, beer bottles and cigarette butts."

By giving himself and his models permission to be edgy, Lalli has creative photographs which convey a weird and absorbing drama. They plunder the largely subterranean and critically shunned terrain of gay porn for some of their strongest effects: the empty apartment; the casting couch; the bare mattress.
