
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

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

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More U.S. Men **Reporting Sex with Men Than Before**

New York - A recent nationwide survey shows that a larger proportion of men say they are having sex with other men than in the 1980s, although whether that trend stems from an increase in same-sex activity or an increased willingness to report it remains unclear.

Dr. John E. Anderson of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta and his co-author found that surveys collected since 1996 showed between 3.1% and 3.7% of men reported having sex with another man during the past year. This is a sizeable jump from 1988 estimates of between 1.7% and 2%, they note.

However, along with this increase in reported activity, Anderson noted that attitudes about the acceptability of same-sex activity have also changed. In fact, he and his colleague Ron Stall found that, between 1996 and 2000, up to 34% of survey respondents said they believed homosexuality was generally not wrong, while only 24% of people who completed the survey between 1988 and 1994 had similar attitudes toward same-sex activity.

As such, society is still far from being 100% accepting of homosexuality, Anderson noted, so even the current estimates of how many men have sex with men are likely too low.

"Male-to-male sex is still a sensitive, stigmatized behavior, and...is likely to be underreported to some unknown degree. Even though these recent estimates are somewhat higher than other surveys, they probably are still low," he said.

Australia's Gay **Black Widow**

Sydney - Like the black widow spider, Damian Anthony Peters had sex with his partners then murdered them.

His first victim was Andre Akai. The 50 year old Akai was killed, then dismembered, and parts of his body flushed down a toilet. The rest was disposed of in garbage bags.

The murder wasn't discovered for seven months when a sharp eyed civil servant found signatures didn't match on Akai's pension checks.

When suspicion fell on Peters, police didn't have to look far. He was living down the street with another gay man, Bevan James Frost, 57. When investigators went to question Peters, they found Frost's torso in the bathtub. The rest had been flushed away.

Under questioning Peters confessed to killing both men.

At his sentencing hearing he threw himself on the mercy of court.

Peters testified that Akai was abusive towards him and he believed Akai was responsible for him having HIV. He also told the court that he had killed Frost while on drugs, and was sick of being used for sex.

Justice James Wood sentenced Peters to 21 years in prison. He will be eligible for parole after 13 years.

Wood said that despite the great callousness displayed, there were exceptional circumstances which reduced the killer's overall criminality.

Lott Throws in

Washington - Sen. Trent Lott resigned his position as Senate majority leader on Dec. 20 after weeks of taking heat for racially charged comments the Mississippi Republican made at a birthday party for Strom Thurmond.

Lott praised Thurmond's 1948 segregationist campaign for the presidency saying the country would have been better off he Thurmond had won.

'In the interest of pursuing the best possible agenda for the future of our country, I will not seek to remain as majority leader of the United States Senate for the 108th Congress, effective Jan. 6, 2003, Lott said in a written statement."

Lott said he would remain in the Senate for the remainder of his term.

Both Lott and Thurmond had consistently opposed all gay rights legislation that came before the Senate. Throughout the week GLBT groups had called for him to step down.

"He did the right thing," said David Smith of the Human Rights Campaign in

'This issue has become much larger than just Trent Lott," Smith told said. "This is an opportunity for the Bush administration and the Republican controlled congress to back up their words of past week to demonstrate a committment to civil rights for all Americans.

Smith called on Republicans to back expanding hate crimes laws and job protections for GLBT Americans.

That was echoed by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

'NGLTF is concerned that replacement, Tennessee Senator Bill Frist, will not represent much of an improvement as his votes on the same issues were directly in line with Lott's," said NGLT executive director Lorri L. Jean.

"We call on Congress to take Bush's words to heart when he said, 'The founding ideals of our nation and, in fact, the founding ideals of the political party I represent was, and remains today, the equal dignity and equal rights of every American.'

Earlier this month, Equality Mississippi, the largest gay rights group in Lott's home state outlined his history.

In the 1960s, Lott helped lead a success-

ful battle to prevent his college fraternity from admitting blacks to any of its chapters.

In 1979, while representing Mississippi in the House of Representatives, Lott joined a bipartisan group that supported a constitutional amendment to prohibit school busing of African- Americans.

In the 1980s, Lott voted against extending the Voting Rights Act and against establishing Martin Luther King Day as a federal holiday. On the Voting Rights Act, in 1981, he was one of 17 Republicans and seven Democrats, including most of the Virginia delegation, voting against extending that law, which struck down obstacles between minorities and polling places. In 1983, Lott joined 97 other House members, most of them Republicans, in opposing the King holiday, including then-Reps. Phil Gramm (R-Tex.) and John McCain (R-Ariz.).

Also in 1981. Lott filed a friend-of-the-

court brief with the Supreme Court to support a tax exemption for Bob Jones University - an exemption that would have benefited hundreds of white "segregation academies" that were established in the wake of integration orders — despite the university's policies discriminating against minorities and prohibiting interracial dating.

In the late 1980s and early '90s, despite having said that he was unaware of what kind of organization that the Council of Conservative Citizens was, Lott appeared repeatedly before the white supremacist group, once telling members they held "the right principles and the right philosophy." Columns that he wrote often appeared in the CCC's publication "Citizens Informer". In spite of the fact that Lott renounced the CCC after it was discovered that he'd addressed the CCC meetings, as late as 1997 Lott was pictured smiling in the "Citizens Informer" along with the CCC's national officers, CEO Gordon Lee Baum, William D. Lord, Jr. and Tom Dover. A 1998 issue of the "Citizens Informer" contains Lott's column, side by side with offensive racial commentaries.

In 1998, Lott made remarks while taping an interview for "The Armstrong Williams Show" on the America's Voice television network, saying homosexuals should be helped "just like alcohol ... or sex addiction ... or kleptomaniacs."

This year, Lott led the rally for the nomination of Charles Pickering to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals. Numerous people and organizations around the country opposed Pickering's nomination because of his own racist past and anticivil rights record. Lott went so far as warning that Republicans would tie up the Senate unless Democrats approved President Bush's judicial nominees.

ARCW Volunteer Honored with 'Community Quarterback' **Award From Packers**

Green Bay — AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin volunteer Troy Tyloch of Milwaukee won the National Football League Community Quarterback Award from the Green Bay Packers in early December. The award, which honors outstanding local volunteers, comes with an \$11,000 contribution from NFL Charities to ARCW in Tyloch's name. Tyloch was among a group of 10 Packers finalists that included another top ARCW volunteer, Chris Root, who netted a \$1,000 contribution.

We're so proud of Troy and Chris, who exemplify the high quality of all our volunteers," said ARCW Director of Volunteer Services Richard Marano. "Of all the NFL cities, people might not expect Green Bay to choose an AIDS volunteer for its award.

It sends a great message that HIV is something everyone needs to be concerned about, big city or small.

Tyloch said, "I'm glad that something so good can come out of something so serious as the fight against AIDS."

Tyloch now moves on to a national competition featuring award winners named by all 32 NFL teams. The national winner nets an additional \$25,000 contribution from NFL Charities for his or her organization.

The contributions are wonderful and much needed," Marano said. "But the contribution Troy and Chris and our many other dedicated volunteers make every day are priceless."

Tyloch has been volunteering at ARCW for more than a decade, working as a person with HIV helping others with HIV cope with the ramifications of the disease. He performs a wide range of services such as holding support groups, speaking to high school classes, and training other volunteers. Root works in ARCW's Street Outreach Program, looking out for high risk indi-

> viduals and offering to test them for HIV and Hepatitis C. She has logged more than 500 volunteer hours in just over a year of service.

Volunteers are the heart and soul of our fight against HIV in Wisconsin," said ARCW Executive Director Doug Nelson. "The gift of one's time is irreplaceable, and we're delighted to see Troy and Chris get the recognition they and our other volunteers so greatly deserve. Now let's hope Troy and the Packers both go on to league championships."

Volunteers are a crucial component of ARCW's success in preventing and treating HIV/AIDS in Wisconsin. From the AIDSline hotline to the food pantry to the annual AIDS Walk Wisconsin, ARCW depends on almost 1,700 volunteers annually.



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
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
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JANUARY

Conservative Wisconsin legislators including a few Democrats — introduced an anti-marriage bill in late January. The bill, AB 753, would define marriage in the state of Wisconsin as a civil contract between one man and one woman, and would prohibit the recognition of same-sex marriages performed elsewhere. The bill's lead sponsor is Rep. Wayne Wood. Representing the 44th Assembly district, Wood is a Janesville-area Democrat. Most of the bill's other sponsors are Republicans, including some of the most consistently antigay members of the Legislature, such as Lorraine Seratti (R-Spread Eagle) and Steve Nass (R-Whitewater). The measure fails to pass.

Wisconsin IN Step names openly gay State Representative (now State Sen.) **Tim**

Carpenter and lesbian community activist Beverly Jenkins and as its Man and Woman of the Year.

A group of Wisconsin state employees petitions the Department of Administration to stop charities which discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation from participating in the state's workplace giving campaign. They want the department to interpret the administrative rule governing state payroll deduction programs in a non-discriminatory manner.

Not to be outdone by Summerfest with its celebrity director, **Bo Black**, PrideFest can now boast of its own "Bo" after **Bonita** "**Bo" Dyer** assumed the co-directorship

of Wisconsin's annual LGBT festival. Bo Dyer moved into the position after **Susan Cook** indicated that she needed to resign the position.

FEBRUARY

Wisconsin LGBTs celebrate the 20th anniversary of the signing of the nation's first statewide gay rights law. The law prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation in housing, employment and pub-

lic accommodations. Since the adoption of Wisconsin's pioneering statute, 12 other states have followed suit, most recently New York.

Madison activists turn up the heat on the United Way of Dane County for continuing to fund the Four Lakes Council of the Boy Scouts of America. Citing community pressure, the Four Lakes Council announces it will no longer accept funds from United Way.

Pablo Parilla is found guilty of first degree intentional homicide for the murder of Juana Vega, a Milwaukee lesbian. He is later sentenced to life in prison. LGBT activists lobbied the District Attorney's office to file hate crime charges against Parilla, brother of Vega's ex-lover, who reportedly had made anti-gay comments and threatened her in the past.

MARCH

The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin reveals that it will accept a \$91,000 federal planning grant for an "abstinence-only" AIDS prevention program aimed at 12-18-year-olds statewide. The news is greeted with sharp criticism by many LGBT community activists.

In an interview with *IN Step*, leaders of the United Way of Greater Milwaukee say that while they have adopted a policy forbidding discrimination based on sexual orientation, they will not stop funding the local Boy Scout Council but will continue to "dialogue" with them about their antigay policy.

Greg Scheel, the long-time organizer of The MAGIC Picnic in Madison announces he is cancelling the event which has raised over \$150,000 for local charities in its 28 year history. In the following weeks, Madison Pride and The MAGIC Picnic merge and reorganize under the umbrella of the Madison Pride Weekend. The event is held in July.

APRIL

More than a dozen high schools around Wisconsin participate in the national "Day of Silence" in support of LGBT students. Outside some of the schools, members of **Ralph Ovadal**'s Wisconsin Christians United picket with

anti-gay banners and chants. Their hostile presence turns off many observers and unintentionally reinforces the students' appeals for tolerance and understanding.

After a brief revival, The Wisconsin Light, an LGBT newspaper, again ceases publication after its April 11 issue.

Christine Klein's sudden departure as PrideFest's de facto festival director on April 19 left many in Wisconsin's LGBT

community scratching their heads. While PrideFest indicated that Klein resigned, she stated clearly that she did not.

MAY

IN Step interviews gubernatorial candidate Jim Doyle (elected governor in November), who says that Wisconsin should be a national leader in the area of LGBT rights: "We have done it before when we passed the first anti-discrimination employment act. We did it when we adopted the first hate crimes act, and we should be in the forefront of making sure that everybody in this state has the right to live decently and safely and have the opportunity to achieve their full potential."

The second annual Great Lakes Two Spirit Gathering of Native American LGBTs is held May 25-27 at the Abiinooji Aki Cultural Healing Center on the Lac Courte Orielles Ojibwe Reservation near Hayward.

JUNE

PrideFest draws a record crowd of 18,604 to Maier Festival Park on Milwaukee's lakefront June 7-9. Among the festival's highlights are a forum featuring the many candidates for governor, entertainers Suzanne Westenhoefer and Kinsey Sicks, and the hilarious Dragathon.

Rainbow Over Wisconsin holds its annual picnic on the Brown County Fairgrounds June 29. Comedian Vicki Shaw and Loretta Lamour's divas entertain. Community Leadership awards are presented to longtime Green Bay activist Lloyd Schaefer and Rev. Ken Hull of the Angels of Hope MCC congregation.


JULY

Action Wisconsin, the statewide nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting and advancing the civil rights of LGBT citizens, receives a grant of \$50,000 from Colorado's Gill Foundation for its education and organizing efforts.


Madison's Pride Weekend takes place July 19-21, with the annual OutReach Awards Banquet Friday evening, the MAGIC Picnic benefitting AIDS charities on Saturday, and the Pride March and a rally in the UW Library Mall on Sunday. At the OutReach event, longtime activist **Eric Boberg** is named Man of the Year and **Lisa Aarli**, an advocate for LGBT youth at Middleton High School, is named Woman of the Year.

Wisconsinite **Scott Evertz** is replaced as director of the President's Office of National AIDS Policy.

In Superior, a potent mix of alcohol and internalized homophobia led to a brutual attack of **Rev. David Rogge**, 47, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Anoka, Minn. Rogge was found covered in blood and unconscious on the floor of the Androy Hotel around 2:30 a.m. on July 18, said Capt. **Scott Campbell** of the Superior police. Superior police arrested **William James Reedy**, of Springdale, Ohio, after he admitted to hitting the Rev.

David Farris Rogge, putting him in the hospital. Reedy said he was asleep in his Superior hotel room and awoke to find the assistant pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Anoka, Minn., molesting him.

After a nearly three year stint, **Debbie Weill** was fired from her position as executive director of OutReach, Madison's gay and lesbian community center. No reasons were given for her termination. Local activists told *IN Step* that her strident activism may have conflicted with OutReach board member's vision for the the organization. Others stated that Weill had failed to meet fund-raising goals for the organization. Weill later took a job with the national office of **P-Flag**.

AUGUST


Wisconsin's first Black Pride Celebration, the "Livin' the Life Weekend," unfolds in Milwaukee Aug. 9-11. Later in the month, the Pride Along the Mississippi festival is held in La Crosse and Chippewa Valley Pride takes place in Eau Claire.

The Committee for a Fair United Way holds a Town Hall Meeting to update the LGBT community about the campaign to get the United Way of Greater Milwaukee to stand by its non-discrimination policy visa-s-vis the Boy Scouts.

After a bumpty seven year ride, a joint decision was reached to discontinue the Heartland AIDSRide. The AIDS Ride had was largely considered a risky fund-raising event and AIDS Network and ARCW had not been pleased with the amount of money raised in recent years.

SEPTEMBER

"NYPD Blue" actor **Bill Brochtrup** serves as celebrity chair of the annual AIDS Walk Wisconsin held in both Milwaukee and Madison Sept. 29. The event raises

\$552,107 for AIDS care and prevention around the state. Milwaukee County executive **Scott Walker**'s decision to cut all funds for ARCW's needle exchange program is the subject of protests.

The New Harvest Foundation holds a fundraising event and silent auction called "La Dolce Vita" at Olbrich Botanical Gardens in Madison Sept. 13 to raise funds for its grant-giving program which benefits LGBT groups in Dane County.

OCTOBER

David Fisk is picked to lead Medical Clinic at ARCW. Fisk. An experienced physician and HIV researcher Dr. David Fisk joins the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin to lead its HIV medical care clinic. He replaces

Under threat of legal action by students who promised to take their case to the ACLU, the Neenah School Board reverses earlier rulings by the principal of Neenah High and the district superintendent and gives official recognition to a student-led Gay-Straight Alliance, the first GSA in the Fox Valley.

Wisconsin IN Step runs an exclusive story about the plight of former Milwaukeean **Leon Rouse**, languishing in a Phillippines prison for a crime he says he did not commit. Rouse was one of the leaders of the campaign which succeeded in passing Wisconsin's gay rights law in 1982, the first of its kind in the nation.

Milwaukee's annual LGBT Film Festival expands to eight days, featuring more than 40 films and videos from 12 different countries

OutReach, Inc., Madison's LGBT community center, announces the hiring of **John Quinlan** as its new executive director. Quinlan, a Madison resident since 1978, has a long history of experience in the areas of civil rights advocacy, journalism, and community organizing.

NOVEMBER

Many LGBT-endorsed candidates win their election contests statewide, including **Tammy Baldwin**, who earns her third term in the U.S. Congress, and **Tim Carpenter**, the openly gay state representative who wins a seat in the State Senate. Pro-gay Democrats **Jim Doyle** and **Peggy Lautenschlager** win their races for governor and attorney general, respectively.

OutReach sponsors a well-attended "LGBT Town Hall Meeting" Nov. 23 at which activists discuss unmet needs of the Madison area LGBT community as well as opportunities for increased collaboration between organizations.

A historic funding opportunity and community partnership which could bring \$300,000 to Milwaukee's LGBT community was officially launched on November 12. The Greater Milwaukee Foundation, The Cream City Foundation and The National Lesbian and Gay Community Funding Partnership are the lead organizations on the Funding Initiative which has a goal of raising \$200,000 over a period of two years. The National Lesbian and Gay Funding Partnership would then contribute another \$100,000 to the Initiative.

DECEMBER

Action Wisconsin releases the first legal guide to the state's civil rights law for LGBT people. The new four-page guide explains the law and what to do about discrimination if it happens. It can be found online at: www.actionwisconsin.org/civil-rights.

Cheers & Jeers 2002

It was a year that saw the state Capitol's political landscape change shape but not substance, Milwaukee's political and religious leadership undone by their own poor judgments and the recognition of the LGBT community as a potentially potent force in Wisconsin politics. Many other events may not have been as earth-shaking but remain notable enough to compliment or criticize. That said, here's our list for cheers and jeers for 2002:

Cheers

Action Wisconsin, which in the last year and a half has morphed from an all-volunteer "kitchen table" civil rights organization into a full-time presence on the state political landscape with paid staff and media visibility. Special credit belongs to both board President Tim O'Brien and first-ever Executive Director Chris Ott for the group's makeover.

Men's Voice Milwaukee, which in a little over two years has grown to become Wisconsin's premiere LGBT performing group. Kudos for their vision.

Alliance for Equality et al., for making the right call to include all available gubernatorial candidates at the Pridefest debate earlier this summer. Seeing that many candidates for the state's top office openly supporting LGBT equality in one place was as inspiring as any of the rhetoric the followed during the forum.

ARCW and Doug Nelson in particular for their ongoing commitment to HIV/AIDS. Helming the agency for over 14 years, Nelson is an anomaly in a leadership field that typically sees top spots at ASOs around the country fill, empty and refill with the seeming frequency of a garbage can. Though some gripe about his "one stop shopping" and "never met a grant I didn't like" philosophies (remember the abstinence-only flap earlier this year?), Wisconsin's declining number of new infections and high quality of care for the seropositive show his ideas really work. No wonder the agency receives top honors in IN Step's annual Best of Queer Wisconsin polling.

GLSEN Chapters and GSA's around the state for fighting one of the toughest fight left in the LGBT equality arena: the toxic anti-gay atmosphere in Wisconsin's high schools. New chapters in northeast Wisconsin and Milwaukee have made strides in naming the hate and challenging those who purvey it. Events like last Spring's "Day of Silence" empower unlikely allies, like the soccer mom in the Fox Valley who tore up and collected picket signs of religious bigots protesting the event.

Log Cabin Republicans of Wisconsin for finding better ways doing the dirty job of eliminating

prejudice within the state's GOP. LCR types openly criticized the candidacies of on-the-record homohaters like Tom Reynolds and Ron Greer, rather than take wishy washy stances on anti-gay candidates out of party loyalty (you might recall their earlier "recommendation" but non-endorsement of Mark Neumann in the last senatorial election). IN Step will probably get heat for this commendation from liberal queers who cannot believe anyone in their right mind would ever vote Republican, but the voting statistics continue prove there's a lot more political diversity in our own community than they would like to admit.

Pridefest for their most successful year ever. Record attendance generated by the greater diversity of attractions proved the naysayers wrong, especially the drag queens who still would have bitched even if the main stage had been all chiffon all the time. But there's still room for improvement.

Jeers

Tom Ament, Chuck Chvala, Scott Jensen and the good ol' boy networks that have so sullied the political process both in Milwaukee and Madison. Whether you were lining your pockets with taxpayer-funded retirement plans, collecting "donations" to secure your votes or letting your staffs do partisan campaign work on the taxpayer's dime, you have succeeded in undermining the core of our democracy. Moderate voters of all stripes have completely abandoned the political process in droves thanks to your antics, leaving elections to the polarizing extremists on both left and right.

Roman Catholic Hierarchy for your handling of the sexual abuse scandals with the church. Your autocratic "pray, pay and obey" attitude toward the laity is the true scandal, not the sexual orientation of the perpetrators. By playing the gay card so often and so loudly, you allowed the subsequently revealed and almost exclusively heterosexually-driven sexual abuse scandals in the Mormon and Jehovah's Witness churches to go largely unnoticed by the media. Like all rape, the sexual abuse of the innocent is a misuse of power not a function of sexual orientation.

Playing politics with some people's lives may be bad enough but the longterm effect of your purely partisan decision will be higher taxes to pay for medical care of the new cases of HIV that will be spread by any curtailment of the needle exchange program locally. Milwaukee's two-thirds lower seroconversion rate among injection-drug using populations is literally living proof that ARCW's Lifepoint works.

MCC Founder Announces Plans to Retire in 2005

West Hollywood — In 1959, Rev. Dr. Elder Troy Perry, founder and moderator of Metropolitan Community Churches, was expelled from Midwest Bible College in Chicago for being gay.

"A fellow student had fallen in love with me. They told me I wasn't worthy enough to be educated by Christians." Perry told the Washington Blade.

This year, in the same city where he was expelled from school, Perry, 62, was named to the board of trustees of the Chicago Theological Seminary. This is just one of many honors bestowed on him during 34 years of ministry. Recently, he announced plans to retire as moderator of MCC in 2005.

"I'm a person of prayer," Perry said. In 1999, during a moment of prayer, he made the decision to retire. "I've watched so many gay and lesbian leaders come on the scene, make noise and burn out," he said. "I look forward to the future -- to new blood -- to keep the church strong."

Perry's life story is a fascinating, sometimes painful voyage through chapters of American history that weren't always kind to gay men and lesbians.

A native of Tallahassee, Fla., Perry grew up in Central Florida and moved to Winter Haven, Fla., when he was 12. His mother

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was Baptist, his father was Pentecostal and church was a big part of his life.

"I'd go to my mother's church on Sunday morning and my Dad's church on Sunday night," Perry said.

Perry started the first MCC church in Los Angeles in 1968 with just 12 congregants. Today, MCC has more than 56,000 members and adherents in 300 churches in 22 countries around the world.

Pa. School to be Named for Gay Aide to MLK Jr.

Philadelphia — Bayard Rustin was gay, a pacifist who refused to fight in World War II and a one-time Communist.

He was also the man who organized the 1963 rally where Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I have a dream" speech, and supporters of the late civil rights leader won a battle to name a school after him Dec. 16, according to the Associated Press.

The West Chester Area School Board voted 6-3 to name a new high school after Rustin, a 1931 graduate of West Chester High School who began his activism for racial equality while still a youth. The school board voted last spring to name the \$63 million school after Rustin, but reopened the discussion after some members said they were not fully aware of his past.

"My objection isn't simply that he was a homosexual, but he really had some serious problems with his homosexuality; he was promiscuous; he was thrown out of two colleges," said school board member June Cardosi.

N.Y. Becomes 13th State to Ban Anti-Gay Bias

Albany — Republican Gov. George Pataki signed a bill into law that outlaws discrimination against gays in New York state, 31 years after advocates began lobbying for it, according to the Associated Press.

The law protects people from abuse, harassment and discrimination in employment, housing, education and public services based on their sexual orientation. It made New York the 13th state to prohibit anti-gay bias. State senators passed the Sexual Orientation Non-Discrimination Act by a vote of 34-26.

The state Assembly approved the measure in January — as it has annually since 1993. But the measure didn't come without critics. The vote included 23 Republicans and three Democrats who opposed the legislation.

"The bill itself is a step in the wrong direction," said Sen. Serphin Maltese. "We cannot legislate politeness — the way people feel. That comes through mutual respect." A proposed amendment Tuesday to add protections for transgender residents failed 19-41.

GLBT Activists Take Out Full Page Anti-War Ads

Chicago — Full page ads begin appearing this week in the Illinois gay press criticizing the Bush administration for an impending war with Iraq.


The ads, signed by dozens of well known GLBT activists was proposed at a Chicago Anti-Bashing Network (CABN) meeting December 4, and within eight days fundraising was completed and the ads submitted.


Signers to the strongly worded ad include a cross-section of left and moderate community leaders including the state's only openly gay state representative, Larry McKeon, the state's foremost Transgendered activist, Miranda Stevens-Miller, the co-pastors of Church of the Open Door, the city's Black LGBT congregation, and leading activists with the state's main LGBT lobbying group, Equality Illinois, signing on in a personal capacity.

The ad not only denounces the loss of life a full-scale war would bring, but says LGBT people in particular would be hurt.

In part, the ad says:

"A new U.S. war will indirectly kill people in our community here at home by diverting necessary funds away from already scaled-back social service programs. For example, programs that prevent HIV+ people from losing their homes and provide other life-saving services are already facing severe cutbacks during the current recession as a bloated military budget is given precedence over everything else."






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

Youth Group Asks United Way to Keep Its Promise

Milwaukee - A coalition of youth groups and their supporters held a rally at the United Way of Greater Milwaukee Community Campaign's Closing Ceremony Dec. 9 at the Milwaukee Art Museum. The youth protested the United Way's refusal to implement its own non-discrimination policy. The rally included over 35 protesters, and four TV stations covered the event.

In response to community pressure, the United Way in May of 2001 amended its non-discrimination policy to include sexual orientation. The new policy states: "United Way funds shall not be used for any programs or agency that discriminates in the provision of services on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, handicap, age, sex or sexual orientation... Future funding decisions will be affected by failure to comply with the policy."

However, United Way donors, affected youth, and community members have expressed their disappointment that the United Way keeps donating money to groups like the Boy Scouts, which received nearly \$700,000 in United Way of Greater Milwaukee contributions this year.

I was going to donate money to the United Way this year thinking that since the United Way signed a non-discrimination policy, my donation would not go to fund racist, sexist or homophobic organizations," said Amy Kistner, co-organizer of the youth-led rally. "When I found out that the United Way is still funding an organization that openly and officially discriminates against gay people, I felt that the United Way was not keeping its promise to me about how my donations will be used."

The United Way has rebutted by stating that they made the Boy Scouts sign the non-discrimination policy. However, the United Way's non-discrimination policy stands in strong contradiction to the Boy Scouts' written policy, which continues to explicitly exclude gay youth and adult vol-

Michael Childers, the local Boy Scouts executive, has publicly defended the Boy Scouts anti-gay policy, telling the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel: "The Milwaukee County Council is part of the national organization of the Boy Scouts, and our policy is the same as theirs. We do not feel that avowed homosexuals are good role models for children." The National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts has also repeatedly affirmed this policy.

So how can the Boy Scouts continue to discriminate yet also sign the non-discrimination clause, all while the United Way turns a blind eye? This is why the youth group organized its rally to protest what they feel is a breach of trust between the United Way and its donors.

Emily Gardner, another organizer of the event, said: "In an environment where corporate scandals are being revealed every day, we need to know that we can trust the United Way to use our donations the way it has promised us it will.'

The United Way knows the right thing to do - that's why they changed their nondiscrimination policy," said Gardner. "The United Way knows that funding the Boy Scouts is wrong because the Boy Scouts policy tells people it's okay to discriminate based on sexual orientation. As the leader in non-profit gift-giving, the United Way needs to stand strong on its policy and its morals and state that discrimination against any group of people is wrong. The first step to doing this is to stop funding the Boy Scouts as long as they continue to discriminate."




Rehearsals in January

BRITAIN PLANS PARTNERSHIP LAW

London — The British government has announced plans to give same-sex couples marriage rights.

"I do think society has moved on, and I think that we recognize that there are very many people in gay relationships who are in very loving relationships ... but their partnership has no recognition in law." Barbara Roche, minister for social exclusion and equalities, told the BBC.

"You have people who have shared their lives, shared their homes, whose lives are entwined with each other. Why shouldn't their relationship be recognized as the loving and secure relationship that it is?

"We are not talking about marriage here." Roche said. "What we are talking about is the signing of a register."

Areas that could be covered by a partnership law include inheritance, pensions, tenancy, taxes, property and immigration.

tenancy, taxes, property and immigration. London Mayor Ken Livingstone welcomed the announcement.

"I am delighted the government has recognized the gross inequalities," he said.

Political parties expressed support across the board.

"Whilst we attach a huge importance to the institution of marriage, we do recognize that gay couples suffer from some serious particular grievances," said Oliver Letwin, the Tory spokesman on domestic issues.

The law, should it pass the House of Commons and the House of Lords, would apply in England and Wales. Scotland would consider the proposal separately.

BRITAIN PLANS TRANSSEXUAL RIGHTS

London — People who change their gender are set to have greater rights in Britain

The government said Dec. 10 it will introduce legislation allowing transsexuals to revise the gender listed on their birth certificates and then marry someone of the opposite sex.

The moves are a response to a ruling by the European Court of Human Rights in the case of a British transsexual bus driver who wanted to be legally recognized as a woman in order to obtain her retirement pension at an earlier age.

British women can get their pensions at age 60 while men must wait till age 65.

SWISS REGION NIXES PARTNER LAW

Zurich — The Swiss canton (region) of Valais rejected the national government's gay-partnership proposal Dec. 6.

"The local government ... has made a social decision to support the family, not the 'Civil Solidarity Pact'," canton spokesman Jean-Rene Fournier told local reporters

The vote was 64 to 51 with five abstentions.

The Federal Council, the cabinet, unveiled the legislation Nov. 29.

"The recognition by the state of the partnership between persons of the same sex will contribute to ending discrimination, which hits homosexual couples particularly hard, and to lessening prejudice against homosexuality," the government said in a press release.

"The picture of same-sex couples hugging and kissing on the street should become normal." Justice Minister Ruth Metzler told reporters.

Same-sex partners would register at the

Civil State office, where they would commit to living together and to mutual respect, assistance and economic life. A non-Swiss partner would be granted residency.

Registrees would acquire marriage rights in the areas of inheritance, social security and divorce. Adoption and assisted-procreation rights are not included.

Gay groups welcomed the measure but denounced the adoption and pregnancy restrictions, and the fact that same-sex couples are not simply being granted access to regular marriage.

CANADIAN TORY MP COMES OUT

Halifax — Canadian Tory Member of Parliament Scott Brison came out Dec. 7 to keep from being outed as he seeks the federal Tory leadership post.

Brison, 35, represents Nova Scotia's Kings-Hants district, a conservative, rural riding in the Annapolis Valley.

"As one who has never really been in the closet, it doesn't seem like a big event to come out," he told The Halifax Daily News. "It's the first time I ever spoke to media about it, but it certainly wasn't a secret.

"I didn't want there to be any misperception out there that I had any fear of dealing with this issue openly and honestly," he said. "[This] does eliminate the ability for anybody to participate in whisper campaigns."

Brison said he won't be changing his conservative politics.

"I'm a conservative, entrepreneur, investment-banking politician from rural Nova Scotia who drives a Volvo station wagon and has two Nova Scotia ducktolling retrievers; it's pretty hard to peg me as a radical," he said.

Canada has three other openly gay federal MPs, Svend Robinson and Libby Davies, who represent Vancouver-area ridings, and Réal Ménard, who represents a Montreal riding.

SPANISH ACTIVISTS STRATEGIZE

Madrid — About 150 activists from 30 organizations gathered in Madrid Dec. 6-8 for the second congress of the Lesbian and Gay State Federation.

Among other things they changed the association's name to the Lesbian, Gay, Transsexual and Bisexual State Federation.

Numerous politicians and union officials made appearances or spoke at the gathering.

Delegates unanimously passed a resolution expressing their "repulsion" and "condemnation" of "a few businesses' merchandising use of the symbols of the GLTB movement, as in the case of the commercial patent registration of the phrase 'gay pride."


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

Holiday Spirit Embodied By Wisconsinites Throughout The Year

s we approach the New Year it is traditional for us to reflect upon the past year, the year ahead, and the community in which we live. I love my job. One of the main reasons I do is because I get to travel all over the 2nd Congressional District and talk to people. I meet with people at listening sessions in places like Portage, Sauk City, Madison, Monroe, and Mt. Horeb. As I reflect upon the past year, the thing that strikes me, is the spirit, determination, thoughtfulness and caring of the people that I meet. It is what drives me to fight for Wisconsin values in Washington, DC.

At this time of year, we are reminded of the "spirit of the holidays." We are encouraged to be more generous to our neighbors, leave a little extra something for the child that delivers the newspaper, open doors for people at our local stores. But from my travels around Wisconsin's second Congressional district, I believe that the spirit of the holidays is embodied in Wisconsinites year round. At this time of year, my thoughts return to some of the people I have met over the last year, and the incredible stories of kindness and dedication that they show. I would like to share with you a few of these stories, stories that show that the spirit of the holidays live throughout the year here in Wisconsin.

One of those individuals is Jeremy Ryan. Jeremy is an 8th grader in Belleville, who wrote to me asking for help for one of his classmates who had just been diagnosed with cancer. The chemotherapy treatment that his fellow student goes through doesn't allow her to attend class, so she must do the schoolwork alone, at home. Jeremy figured that if this student had a computer with internet access and a webcam, then the class would be able to see the student and she would be able to follow along with her classmates back in school.

Jeremy is on a mission. He has spent over twenty hours on the phone contacting local businesses to ask them to donate a computer or webcam. He is so motivated by this project that he has told me of his desire to start an organization of his own that helps students in similar situations. The whole town of Belleville is coming together to help this girl through her chemotherapy and through her classes, a truly touching story that exemplifies the spirit of Wisconsin.

Another story shows us how in the face of repeated roadblocks and heartache, one woman perseveres in her quest to help our veterans. Janet Gordon of Madison first contacted my office seeking help for her husband, Dave Butcher. Dave was a Vietnam veteran who was desperately in need of a liver transplant as a complication of Agent Orange related health conditions. Despite being waitlisted for the transplant, his VA doctor refused to write a simple statement classifying Dave's case as terminal if he didn't receive a liver soon, thereby making it impossible to have his disability claim expedited. Sadly, Dave lost his battle only a few weeks later, with his claim never having even been reviewed.

To add insult to injury, Janet's claims for veteran's survivor benefits were then repeatedly lost and have only just been approved. Now most people in the face of such heartache, struggle and bureaucratic nightmare would walk away and never want to have anything to do with it again. Not Janet--despite such adversity, she is now volunteering with the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), driving veterans back and forth between the Madison VA and the Milwaukee VA hospitals for necessary medical treatment. Janet has turned

her energy and love for her Vietnam veteran husband into caring for countless other veterans. Her efforts truly embody the extraordinary spirit of those selfless people that I meet so often in Wisconsin.

Last, but not least I wanted to focus on a group of 21 volunteers who made up the Badger Reuse Committee, which was set up to be a hub for recommendations on what to do with the 7,354 acre Badger Army Ammunition Plant property. When I first was elected in 1998. I went to Sauk County to review the status of talks on the future of this site. What quickly became apparent was that the community was divided. There was the need for a committee that would represent the many voices of the community on what should happen to this amazing parcel of land, and so, we set up just such a committee. This group of 21 volunteers sorted through thousands of recommendations from community groups, environmentalists, historic preservationists, sportsmen, business groups, civic clubs, landowners, and officials from the Ho-Chunk Nation. and the Federal, State and local governments. After four years and countless hours of work, an agreement between all of these differing groups appears near, preserving this land for generations to come. This is a classic example of democracy and cooperation in action, of divergent groups coming together to discuss the future of their community. and through thoughtful debate and discussion, reaching a consensus. These volunteers and all the other people who have participated in this process have left Wisconsin with a great asset, something to be enjoyed for generations to come.

In this time of holiday spirit, joy and giving, and on the crux of the start of a new year, it is important that we reflect upon the true spirit of the people of our state. When we do that, we will realize that the spirit of the holidays lives in the hearts, minds and actions of Wisconsinites year round.

More on Creating Change & Race Dear Editor:

LGBT people have long sought safe refuge and respite from the daily insults and injuries of prejudice and discrimination. We have established countless social and cultural spaces for ourselves that we prefer, many times, to maintain for ourselves. Among these by/for/about LGBT spaces are community centers, bars and clubs, choruses and musical ensembles, athletic organizations, newspapers and magazines, and Internet sites.

The same can be said of political spaces for any group of people whose participation in politics has been undermined and thwarted: lesbians, gay men, bisexual people and transgender people, as well as Latinos, African-Americans and women, have found that joining together with others who share their life experiences can move forward their political goals and aspirations and win political voice and representation. Indeed, the concept of a "seat at the table" is entirely about representations of heretofore un-represented or under-represented groups in our society.

Because Richard J. Rosendall is the past president of a political organization formed to represent the aspirations of a people not typically represented in politics, the Gay and Lesbian Activists Alliance of Washington, DC, and because I suspect that he has appreciated the company of others of his kind in a relatively homogenous social situation (a bar, a party, a quasi-social political gathering such as a fundraising event). I am quite confused by his diatribe condemning the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Creating Change Conference for providing exactly that same kind of political space for LGBT people of color.

His diatribe begs the questions: What is good for Richard cannot be good for anyone else? Where Richard is not allowed to go cannot be fruitful for those who gather together to create a more powerful political voice for themselves? Where Richard is asked to let others lead no good leaders can possibly emerge? His presence and his participation and his annointing of a gathering of LGBT people is an absolute requirement for legitimacy of purpose and goal? This is not only absurd and impossible, it is a gross insult to others who work in and contribute to a movement for social justice in this country.

There are LGBT people of every color, ethnicity, class, age, race, condition of birth and gender who are joining together to make a stronger, more powerful and more fully representative movement for social justice, equality and freedom. Some of the work to build this movement will be accomplished when the voices of women, young people, people of color, old people, transgender people and intersex people can be heard more clearly, which logically requires that they be given the space, the time and respect to hear themselves first.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force will continue to respect and honor requests by people of color at the Creating Change Conference for work spaces unto themselves. Richard J. Rosendall, who did not attend the 2002 Creating Change Conference in Portland Oregon, is welcome to attend our annual event and we expect him to likewise respect such requests.


Theatre X Explores Racial Issues in "Talk"

Milwaukee – Milwaukee – From Jan. 9 through Feb. 2, Theatre X will present Carl Hancock Rux's "Talk," a new play about the meaning of race, at the Studio Theatre of the Broadway Theatre center, 158 N. Broadway.

"Talk" is structured as a panel conference assembled by a young Moderator to examine the life and work of a fictional character named Archer Aymes. Aymes, identified as African American, wrote one outstanding novel in the 1950s, which he turned into an avant-garde film. In the 1960s, he was a civil rights activist and spent time in jail in the South. He led a demonstration at the Museum of Antiquities in New York in which a woman was killed, went to jail again, and died there, probably a suicide. His novel, relegated to the dust bins, has been rediscovered by the Moderator who now seeks to unravel the secrets of its author's life.

Named for characters in Plato's Symposium, the multi-cultural panel consists of four authorities on Aymes, people who knew him at various stages of his life. As the conference opens, they are joined by a fifth, a performance artist who disrupts the panel with her unusual knowledge of Aymes. Each participant brings a part of Aymes to the panel: his celebrity, his identity, his artistry, his memory. Each has a different interpretation to argue and defend. The Moderator, who loves Aymes' novel to the point of identification with its author, is brought closer to total ignorance of the man he is seeking to understand more deeply.

According to Artistic Director John Schneider, "Talk" is "without question one of the most challenging and meaningful plays to have come along in a decade. The



panelists are recognizable, vulnerable, funny and scary. The things they say will excite your mind. As you play the role of conference audience, you will witness an astonishing theatrical battle to control the history and identity of a dead man."

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



Holiday Punch

verybody has their own unique, sometimes rather peculiar holiday traditions. Some folks bake cookies. Others will make an annual pilgrimage to "A Christmas Carol" or "The Nutcracker." Some will wonder around singing Christmas Carols in happy little sub-divisions. One of my favorite traditions is watching that fabulous episode from the "Dick Van Dyke" show where Rob, Laura and the gang put on a seemingly improvised holiday revue.

Another Milwaukee holiday season tradition is Dale Gutzman's annual "Holiday Punch," now in its 25th year. No, "Holiday Punch" doesn't have Buddy's obligatory cello solo or Sally singing to Santa for a "fella" but Dale does put a definite gay slant to his distinctive blend of topical humor and festive songs.

The 2002 edition of "Holiday Punch" begins in a suitably touch-in-cheek fashion with "The King of Wells Street," a wry original number highlighting — if that's the right word for it — Dale Gutzman's many accomplishments in his long association with theatre in Milwaukee.

What follows is hodge-podge arrangement of comedy sketches and songs, a few

wonderfully imaginative, most irreverent, some laying the proverbial egg but all in good fun. Many of Gutzman's usual company of players are on hand, including Larry Lukasavage, Beryl Brennen and Mary Henrickson

Although ostensibly a holiday show, Gutzman's "Punch" only occasionally turns to the season. Beryl Brennan and David Roper put a charmingly spin on their "A Traditional English Christmas" and Larry Lukasavage makes for a wonderfully befuddled Santa in another original skit. Monica Degnan Hobler does a hilarious turn in "Mother Angelica's Christmas CD" but it, like some of the other scenes, could use a bit of yuletide trimming.

When "Holiday Punch" veers away from the holiday season, anyone and everyone is fair game. Both TV Divas Oprah Winfrey and Martha Stewart are mercilessly skewered in "Oprah." Poor Liza suffers the same fate in "Liza's Wedding Day." And poor Ted Williams would probably be spinnin' in his grave over "Dead Yankees," except that he's in a 'fridge instead.

Probably the most successful and

enjoyable offering is "Custom's Line," which features Gutzman's entire ensemble. Utilizing a variety of the marvelous tunes from that classic musical, "A Chorus Line," this lengthy musical number puts a delightful spin on airport security.

Equally fine is a splendid "Wouldn't it Be Loverly" performed by the company's quartet of ladies. Less successful were two painful earnest original musical presentations by Todd Wellman and Rich Blaske.

Finally, some mention must be made of the evening's finale although mere words could not possibly do it justice. To wrap-up this year's "Holiday Punch" Gutzman takes on that bizarre Food Network's cult favorite, "Iron Chef." The result truly makes the mind reel — not to mention making the stomach turn. This critic's best advice is a stiff drink and a light dinner.

"Holiday Punch" continues at the Off-Broadway Theatre until Dec. 31st. For tickets call (414) 327-3552.



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
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

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Divas in Distress

fter her very public and hardearned Glitter-y meltdown following the failure of both her debut as a movie starlet and the silly accompanying soundtrack. I was hoping that Mariah Carey would emerge from her padded cocoon a new woman. I had hoped that she would abandon her urban Star Search theatrics and think Pink, but alas that hasn't happened. Indistinguishable from most of her last few releases, the much ballyhooed "Charmbracelet" (Monarc/Island) is more like a choker. Sometimes playing it safe (boring, redundant) works against an artist, as it does on this album. Other things that work against Carey include backing vocals by one of the Chipmunks ("You Got Me"), her breathy Marilyn Monroe cooing ("You Had Your Chance," "Lullaby") and clichéd ballads ("Through The Rain," "My Saving Grace"). (Monarc/Island)

I'm going to go out on a limb and offer up a few words of praise for "Just Whitney" (Arista), the uneven new album by dazed

diva Whitney Houston. Whitney spends a little too much time lashing out in song at those who criticize her (think Michael Jackson's "Leave Me Alone" times ten) and demands our pity. Yes, Whitney, poor you. all that money, all those dead brain cells. Next! Instead of that dim cover of "You Light Up My Life," you would have been better off covering Warren Zevon's "Poor Poor Pitiful Me." Whitney, honey, put down that Bible and pick up a sense of humor! Now, back to the words of praise -"One Of Those Days" (which puts "recycled elements" of The Isley Brothers' "Between



The Sheets" to good use) and "Tell Me No," get things started in an upbeat fashion. If you "Love That Man," as you declare in the vintage seventies soul-disco of the song of the same, than you ought to know better than to put a lifeless duet ("My Love") with him on your album. "Try It On My Own," is a pleasant Carole Bayer Sager (and four other writers!) ballad, and Whitney "keeps it real," and "Dear John Letter" allows her to explore her funkier side.

On Christina Aguilera's newest album, "Stripped" (RCA), the Britney-esque belter who looks like she's badly in need of a Silkwood shower, promises us that we will

hear her side of the story. With vocal support from Lil' Kim, Christina finds power in sisterhood and self-expression on "Can't Hold Us Down," and follows it up with an average Mariah Carey imitation on "Walk Away." The former Mouseketeer enlisted tattooed and pierced guitar god Dave Navarro for the quasi-rock number "Fighter," and attempts to remind us of her Latin roots (in case we forgot her 2000 Spanish-language album Mi Reflejo) with "Infatuation." Alicia Keys offers Christina encouragement to "speak on" what she has on her mind on "Impossible" (insert joke here), but the album takes a brief and unexpectedly pleasant turn on the lovely Linda Perry-

penned "Beautiful." Perry, who had a hand in the redesign of Pink's image, attempts to do the same with Aguilera, especially on the suitably titled "Make Over" (which they co-wrote), but it falls short. The only thing Aguilera demonstrates on the album's first single, "Dirrty," is that she could use a dictionary for Christmas. To think, we have Madonna to thank for this.

Barbra Streisand shares the spotlight with divas from the past (Judy Garland, Donna Summer and Johnny Mathis) as well as those who still have a firm grasp on

their divahood (Celine Dion, Josh Groban, and Barbra herself) on the compilation "Duets" (Columbia). Duets from the 1960s ("Get Happy/Happy Days Are Here Again," from 1963, with Garland and "Ding Dong The Witch Is Dead," from 1966, with the songs composer Harold Arlen) are a reminder of the purity of Streisand's vocals in her youth. Some of her biggest duets were released in the seventies ("You Don't Bring Me Flowers" with Neil Diamond and "No More Tears" with Summer) and paved the way for the 1980 duets with Barry Gibb on the Guilty album. Her other eighties duets, with Kim Carnes and

one-time lover Don Johnson are uninspired, at best. The two new duets recorded for the album "I Won't Be The One To Let Go" (with Barry Manilow) and "All I Know Of Love" (with Groban), sadly don't

live up to expectations.

Every time I hear Shania Twain sing, I have to wonder, other than Wal-Mart shoppers, who it is that is buying her CDs. Her latest "Up!" (Mercury) debuted in the number one position, so I know that someone, somewhere is buying her music. In fact, she seems to have enough supporters in both the country and pop music realms to justify releasing a double disc set, consisting of the same nineteen songs, performed in pop music arrangements (disc one) and new country settings (disc two). Mostly it sounds derivative to me, not particularly unique or fresh. There are no surprises. The album feels as if it is cloaked in a com-

mercial safety net. What makes all of this especially bizarre is that Twain's husband and co-songwriter is Robert John "Mutt" Lange, who made a name for himself as the producer of albums by Def Leppard, AC/DC, Foreigner, and even The Cars during the 1980s.

Folk-diva Tracy Chapman continues her move away from mainstream accessibility with "Let It Rain" (Elektra). Many of the songs, while lovely and soothing, suffer from a downbeat monotony that is distracting. Technically proficient, Chapman is a consummate singer and songwriter, but repetitious songs such as "Another Sun," "You're The One," "In The Dark," "Say Hallelujah," and the ironically titled "Happy," hint at lethargy and threaten to lose the listener's hard won attention. "Almost," with its restrained drums and haunting lap steel guitar and keyboards. was like a sunshower, in the midst of this all too quiet storm.

Broadway diva Betty Buckley's sensational mid-nineties and early 2000 discs were thoughtful combinations of standards, new and old (including compositions by Joni Mitchell and Mary Chapin Carpenter), and gave the listener an indication of Buckley's impressive musical taste. Her latest disc "The Doorway" (Fynsworth Alley/Varese Sarabande) has a more traditional feel to it, with her renditions of "With A Song In My Heart," "Autumn Leaves," and "God Bless America." In fact, the whole album has a 9/11 memorial quality (there is "an improvisation" titled "A Loss Of Heroes"), as well as a medley of "America The Beautiful"/"Bridge Over Troubled Water.'

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
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

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

Are you stupid or is he in denial? Maybe it's a little of both. Let's consider his side.



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
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
