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Milwaukee GOP Calls For End To Military Ban On Gays

Wisconsin In Suca

Milwaukee — Members of Log Cabin Republicans of Wisconsin, a lesbian/gay Republican organization, praised Milwaukee Republicans for recently calling for an end to the ban on lesbians and gays in the military. At the 4th Congressional District Republican Caucus held at the Milwaukee Athletic Club, a resolution calling for an end to discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in the armed forces was overwhelmingly adopted.

The resolution called for "the elimination of the Clinton policy of 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell', and that all patriotic Americans be given the chance to serve their country regardless of sexual orientation." No one

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spoke against the measure during the caucus, which is organized annually by the various Republican clubs in the 4th Congressional District, consisting of the City of Milwaukee and the suburbs of St. Francis and Cudahy.

MAKING LOUD DEMANDS."

The resolution originated from the East Side Republican Club, where a non-gay member drafted the resolution and spoke in favor of it. It was adopted unanimously by the East Side Republican Club, and sent on to the 4th District Resolutions Committee, where a majority supported it and sent it on to the 4th District Caucus. It was adopted by the caucus on a voice vote with only a few votes cast against it.

Jim McFarland, Political Director of Log Cabin Republicans of Wisconsin, pointed to the fact that Log Cabin members did not have to introduce the resolution nor lobby on its behalf in obtaining its adoption.

"We've worked in the trenches for years with these Republicans and have gained their respect," McFarland said. "They know we are gay, we don't make a big issue of it, and in turn this has caused them to change their attitudes and realize that discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation is wrong, "added McFarland, who was one of several Log Cabin members at the caucus.

Another member who was present, Pat Prudlow, Secretary of the organization, stated, "This is the product of patient one on one education of members of the Republican Party." Prudlow continued, "We prefer the quiet education process rather than making loud demands, and we feel we have obtained better results."

McFarland urged lesbian and gay Republicans to get involved with their local Republican organizations throughout the state so that this education process can take place in the other Congressional districts. The resolution now goes to the Republican State Convention Resolutions Committee, where its fate is uncertain since Log Cabin members have not been as active in other parts of the state.

Anti-Gay Remarks Trips GOP Leader

Washington — National gay civil rights groups called on the Republican leadership to remove Pennsylvania

In an interview with the Associated Press, the third highest ranking Republican in the Senate was asked to comment on the Texas sodomy case currently before the U.S. Supreme Court,

Said Santorum: "If the Supreme Court says that you have the right to consensual (gay) sex within your home, then you have the right to bigamy, you have the right to polygamy, you have the right to incest, you have the right to adultery. You have the right to anything."

A spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign, the nation's largest gay rights advocacy group, dubbed Santorum's remarks "stunning," and compared them to Sen. Trent Lott's remarks in December praising Strom Thurmond's 1948 segregationist campaign for president. The ensuing controversy eventually forced Lott's resignation from his position as majority leader.

"We're calling on the Republican leadership to repudiate his remarks and reconsider his position," said the HRC's David Smith.

Santorum's spokeswoman said the comments "were specific to the Supreme Court case."

Several conservative organizations released statements supporting Santorum, while GOP leaders in the Senate remained silent, and White House officials declined to rebuke him. Strategists from both parties predicted that unlike the Lott controversy, which festered for weeks before leading to his demotion, a slap at the gay community is likely to be viewed as a problem only for a small segment of voters.

"Fact is, there is no debate in this country about whether African Americans should be treated as second-class citizens," said one Democratic strategist, comparing the Lott and Santorum cases. "The debate on homosexuals is still taking place."

Meanwhile, even the normally apologist Log Cabin Republicans took offense. "If we're going to condemn someone like Trent Lott for racial comments, then we certainly should be able to come out with disgust against Sen. Santorum," said John Partain, president of the Log Cabin Republicans of Philadelphia, a gay

Republican group.

And Stacy Sobel, executive director of the Center for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights in Philadelphia, agreed.

"What concerns me is that one of our elected officials is making a statement that supports stereotypes and detracts from the ability of lesbian and gay families to take care of themselves," she said. "He should be called onto the carpet for that."

Sen. Barbara Boxer called Santorum's comments "offensive and hurtful."

Sen. Dianne Feinstein said the remarks were "ill-advised" and "wrong-headed."

Both Senators said Santorum's position as Republican conference chair, the post after Majority Leader Frist and Majority Whip Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., was a matter for Republicans to decide.

The person the political parties choose to lead them "sends a message to America," Boxer said.

In an interview with Fox News on April 22, Santorum said he doesn't owe anyone an apology.

"I do not need to give an apology based on what I said and what I'm saying now — I think this is a legitimate public policy discussion," Santorum said. "This is what the state of Texas argued in their brief. ... These are not, you know, ridiculous you know comments, these are very much a very important point."

Among the groups condemning Santorum's remarks were the Center for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights, the Pennsylvania Log Cabin Republicans, OutFront, and the Pennsylvania Gender Rights Coalition.

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
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

Trans Dad Loses Round One

Chicago — A transgendered man has lost his fight to seek custody of his ten-yearold son, despite the fact that the neutral Public Guardian in the case came out on his side.

The father, known as Sterling in court records, married his wife in 1985. At the time, Sterling had transitioned, and no objection was raised to the marriage. In 1991, Sterling's wife had a baby via artificial insemination. Seven years later, the two divorced, and Sterling sought custody of their son.

Several courts have faced the issue of transgender marriages and custody, as well as the fundamental issue of how gender is defined as a matter of law. Activists were thrilled last February, when a judge in Florida ruled that FTM Michael Kantaras was legally married to his wife Linda, and then awarded him primary custody of their two children. After other victories, community court watchers had hope for this case, but they were disappointed when Judge Gerald Bender ruled the marriage was invalid in early April.

"The parties proposed marriage is invalid because the Legislature has determined that a marriage between two individuals of the same sex is prohibited in Illinois," Bender wrote. "This is not to say that there cannot be same sex relationships that may be more stable than those of married couples, but it is up to the Legislature and not this court to enact the law."

Bender's helplessness in the face of state law was arguably illusory. Although same-sex marriages are prohibited in Illinois, and to date, around the country, several courts have recognized the corrected genders of transsexual parents, just as we saw in Kantaras v. Kantaras. In addition, the best interest of the child is normally the watch phrase of the presiding judge in a family court. In this case, Public Guardian Patrick Murphy was clear. "From our perspective, the case was never about transgender rights," he said. "I don't know whether [Sterling] is a man or a woman. I just know he's a hell of a good father, the kid loves him and wants to live with him."

According to the Chicago Sun Times, the ruling will be appealed.

Use of "Gay" May Block AIDS Research

Washington — Federal health officials have given undocumented warnings to scientists who study AIDS and sexually transmitted diseases to keep words like "gay" and "transgender" out of their grant applications if they wish to receive funds, the New York Times reported on April 18.

An anonymous official at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) told the newspaper that grant applicants had been told by officers at the agency to avoid "sensitive language" when describing their research. The official added that the scrutiny for politically "delicate" words has become, under the Bush administration, "much worse and more intense."

Targeted words and phrases include "men who have sex with men," "needle exchange," "anal sex" and "sex workers."

Bill Pierce, a spokesman for the U.S.

Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) which oversees NIH, denied that federal health officers screen grant applications in that way.

The article's suggestion that research may be thwarted due to conservative politics distressed some GLBT rights activists and advocates for people with HIV/AIDS.

San Francisco AIDS Foundation spokesman Redge Norton said, "This is very alarming. If it's true, it seems like the (Bush) administration is turning its back on the people and communities who need the research the most."

David Smith, spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign, the largest GLBT political group in the country, called the news "outrageous." He said that HRC is investigating the matter.

"If it's true, we will take immediate action, and that may include involving Congress," Smith said.

A University of California researcher told the Times he was advised by an NIH staffer to delete words like "gay" and "transgender" from his grant proposal. The study, however, focused on HIV testing among gay men.

"It's hard not to mention them in your

abstract," he said.

In mid-April, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, another branch of HHS, released a revised national HIV prevention strategy aimed at making HIV tests more routine and channeling more prevention efforts toward HIV-positive people. The plan was praised by many, but several AIDS groups cautioned about removing counseling from testing programs.

First All-Gay Slasher Film Wraps

Hollywood — What is being claimed as the first "all-gay horror film" recently wrapped production in Los Angeles. The currently untitled film stars Dylan Fergus, Bryan "The Real World" Kirkwood, Hank "Pumpkin" Harris, Matt Phillips and Andrew "Psycho Beach Party" Levitas and is directed by newcomer Paul Etheredge-Ouzts.

"This is the first film of its kind," producer Steven Wolfe said, not counting the various lesbian vampire films and hardcore flicks. "[This] is not just a horror film with gay characters, but a horror film where all the primary characters are gay. What attracted me to the idea of developing this project was the lack of gay-themed films out there that are non-issue-related. This is simply a horror film that follows the standard genre formula, like a "Scream" kind of film. The twist is that all the lead characters are gay."

The plot goes something like this: On Halloween morning in a West Hollywood park, two guys' makeout session is interrupted by a serial killer with a fondness for severed heads. Later that night, a group of gay kids celebrate the holiday with a visit to the site of the murders.

Producer Wolfe and his Sneak Preview Entertainment company will be shopping the film around to distributors once postproduction finishes in the months ahead. The company also has other gay-themed horror films in the works.

Federal Funds Finance Gay Senior Center

Fort Lauderdale — The first federally funded day-care center tailored to serve the needs of gay and lesbian seniors will open this summer in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Opening this August, the center will annually receive \$200,000 and will offer day-care services for 20-30 seniors on weekdays in a local red-carpeted church hall.

Funding for the center was provided by the local Broward County Agency on Aging and will include federal funds provided under the Older Americans Act, the Los Angeles Times reported. The center is eligible to receive government funds through President Bush's program for faith-based initiatives.

The federal money will be given to the center to provide services for needy seniors while their primary caregivers, such as friends or relatives, take time off.

Although the center will be open to anyone, Edith Lederberg, the executive director of the Broward County Agency, said that as one of the country's largest gay communities there was a critical need that had to be met.

Tabloid: Saddam Starred in Gay Porn Films!

Kuwait City — Deposed Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein has been caught with his pants down — literally. At least according to a report in The Weekly World News.

The tabloid says that a shocking 1968 porn film has surfaced, in which "the flamboyant strongman appears performing raunchy homosexual acts!"

The image quality of the grainy 16mm film, reportedly uncovered by the Kuwaiti secret police, is poor — but Weekly World News experts who've taken a close look at the hairy-chested actor are "100 percent certain" it is a younger, trimmer Saddam according to story.

"There is no doubt in my mind that this is Saddam — there's no mistaking those eyes and that distinctive nose," Hussein biographer Sadiq al-Sabah of Kuwait told the tabloid.

"It may be hard to believe that a man who [once] led one of the most powerful nations in the Middle East once acted in blue movies, but not to anyone familiar with how reckless and sexually promiscuous Saddam was in his youth.

"Saddam appeared in as many as 85 of these films under a variety of stage names, most frequently Omar Studdif," the researcher said.

Still photographs from the sizzling XXX-rated film, La'iba al-Waladaani (The Two Boys Played), were leaked to a Kuwait news magazine after authorities found it amid a stash of illicit porn in the vault of a recently deceased sheik the story says.

Rumors that Saddam appeared in gay porn films in his younger days have dogged him for decades and almost torpedoed his political career when he was a rising star in the ruling Baath Socialist party.

"He was able to squelch the rumors in the past, but now it looks like the Kuwaitis have found the smoking gun," a State Department spokesman is quoted as saving.

Al-Sabah claims that Saddam, then a struggling law student, acted in porn to make ends meet — and because he was addicted to gay sex.

In the newly uncovered 86-minute prison flick, Saddam, then just 34, plays a naive young peasant who is wrongly convicted and sent to jail. He is initiated into homosexuality by a series of older and more experienced cons.

"Saddam's acting in the picture is actually quite good," al-Sabah told The Weekly World News. "One scene, in which he buries his face in a pillow and cries, is so touching you almost can forget you're watching a low-budget sexploitation film."

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Madison LGBT Campus Center to Become Dean of Students Unit

Wisconsin-Madison's Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual & Transgender Campus Center will formally partner with the Dean of Students office in a new plan by Dean Luoluo Hong and the campus center's stu-

Under the new arrangement, the LGBT Campus Center, currently a student organization located on the second floor of Memorial Union, will become an administrative unit of the dean's office. The change, which was agreed to jointly by the dean's office and center's student staff, is expected to take effect by summer.

Students will continue to provide leadership in setting the center's priorities and agenda and will help shape new services and programs that will now be possible with the addition of full-time professional

"It's important that the university shares responsibility for providing services and advocacy on behalf of LGBT students and their allies," Hong says. "Students should not have to do this alone. I'm very excited about this opportunity to provide improved support to both students and student organizations, as well as elevate our commitment to LGBT issues.

Additional support from the university has been a long-time goal of the center's student leadership, says Kris Johnson, LGBT Campus Center director, who adds that services to students will improve through greater continuity and efficiency.

"This is something that we, as a staff, have really been looking for," Johnson says.

"It's a good decision and we're excited to go forward with it and make it happen."


The center will follow a model similar to the McBurney Disability Resource Center and the Multicultural Student Center, both of which receive segregated fee funding, but also have full-time professional staff and are units of the dean's office.

The practical effect of the changes will redirect the LGBT issues coordinator position in the dean's office to serve as the LGBT Campus Center director. The director will oversee the campus center student staff and operations.

The mission of the LGBT Campus Center is to help foster a safe campus learning environment that supports the academic, personal, and interpersonal growth and development of students.

Likewise, the dean's office has been working on a parallel track, developing links between services and programs that support LGBT students. The dean's office and the LGBT Campus Center have worked closely on numerous issues, so the transition is not expected to be difficult, Hong says.

In the coming weeks, UW-Madison students will have the chance to ask questions or offer suggestions on how to make a smooth and effective transition and improve LGBT services. Discussion sessions are scheduled from 4-5:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 29 at Memorial Union and from 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m. Wednesday, May 7 also at Memorial Union. Union. ABC Daytime Debuts Lesbian Kiss on "All My Children"

New York - "All My Children's" Bianca Montgomery (played by Eden Riegel), the lesbian daughter of Erica Kane (Susan Lucci), is experiencing her first romance. The move, which fans of the show have been calling for ever since Bianca's character first appeared, made her first daytime drama gay or lesbian character to share a same-sex kiss on television.

"They will actually have a sexual relationship," promised Brian Frons, president of ABC Daytime. "We will see the

seduction." The kiss took place during the April 22 episode of the Emmyaward winning drama, in a scene featuring Riegel's character, who came out as a lesbian in 2000, and her new friend Lena (played by Olga Sosnovska) who "in a moment of truth and true love ... comes to terms with

"This is a watershed moment for daytime television," said GLAAD Entertainment Media Director Scott Seomin. "ABC and All My Children's producers are showing a lesbian character in a truer light. Had Bianca remained a lesbian in name only, it would have been unrealistic and unfair to viewers who expect to share in the lives of their favorite soap opera characters."

In the current issue of The Advocate, Seomin also notes that he hopes her romance is just as tumultuous as everyone else's love affairs on the show. "Frankly, if she has some happiness, I hope it's short-lived. The moment that Bianca settles into domestic bliss with another woman, that's the time viewers tune out."

World Briefs

PIM FORTUYN KILLER CONVICTED

Amsterdam — The man who killed Dutch gay politician Pim Fortuyn was convicted of murder and sent to prison for 18 years April 15.

Some of Fortuyn's supporters believed Volker van der Graaf, 33, should have been jailed for life. They stormed from the courtroom when the sentence was announced.

Van der Graff said he shot Fortuyn, who founded a very popular grass-roots political party, for the sake of The Netherlands' Muslim population. Fortuyn had proposed a ban on additional Muslim immigrants, saying the ones who were already there had failed to integrate into Dutch society.

Van der Graaf said, "I could see no other option than to do what I did."

Fortuyn, who may have had enough support to become prime minister, headed the new party Pim Fortuyn's List, which snagged 26 of Parliament's 150 seats nine days after the assassination, coming in second behind the Christian Democrats who won 43 seats. In addition to stemming immigration, the party stood for a crackdown on crime and increased attention to problems such as hospital waiting lists, train delays and education funding.

The List joined a three-way center-right governing coalition but infighting among List MPs prevented the three parties from working together and the cabinet disintegrated last October, becoming the shortest-lived Dutch government in 50 years.

Many media reports labeled Fortuyn a right-winger but he also was called a populist, a maverick, an independent and a libertarian.

BRIT TRANSSEXUAL LOSES MARRIAGE CASE

London — A British transsexual and her husband haven't been married for 22 years like they thought.

Five Law Lords from Britain's highest court, the House of Lords, ruled April 10 that Elizabeth and Michael Bellinger's marriage is invalid because gender is fixed at birth.

When the couple got married in 1981, the same year Elizabeth had a sex-change operation, no one requested proof of her gender. The Bellingers sought legal recognition as a test case.

"The man I have been married to all these years and been his wife, his dishwasher, cleaner and cook ... it means he has never existed," Elizabeth, 56, said after the ruling. "Everything was taken away from me today. ... I fear I am left with no choice other than to seek redress in the European courts."

The British government said in December that it hopes to change laws that prohibit transsexuals from marrying as a member of their post-operative gender. Only three other European nations -- Albania, Andorra and Ireland -- refuse to recognize sex changes.

CANADIAN CHILD CAN'T HAVE THREE PARENTS

London — A two-year-old boy in London, Ontario, Canada, can't have two moms and a dad, Family Court Justice David Aston ruled April 11.

Although the three adults share parenting of the boy, only the biological mother and father are his parents. Aston ruled.

and father are his parents, Aston ruled.

The judge said he wanted to rule otherwise, but the Children's Law Reform Act prevents him from naming more than two

people as a child's parents.

The boy "obviously [is] thriving in a loving family that meets his every need," Aston said.

The nonbiological mother told the London Free Press, "We are heartbroken that, in his honor's view, our lives cannot reflect the truth of our son's life."

REP. FRANK TACKLES EGYPT

Washington — Gay U.S. Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., is stepping up his campaign against Egypt over its recent treatment of gays.

Citing a "sustained, blatant and increasingly brutal crackdown against gay men," Frank April 14 urged gay organizations to start lobbying Congress against the Arab nation.

Frank also wrote Egypt's U.S. ambassador, Nabil Fahmy, accusing him of lying last year when he told Frank Egypt was not persecuting gay men.

"His fundamental dishonesty is now evident," Frank said.

On March 15, 21 men who were arrested in a gay-bar raid and in other anti-gay sweeps were sent to prison for three years for the crime of habitual debauchery. Numerous other men have faced the same fate in the past 20 months -- many after being entrapped on the Internet by police officers pretending to be gay cruisers.

Frank says it would be impractical for gay groups to pressure Congress to end all aid to Egypt, "particularly that aid we provide annually to Egypt for the constructive role it played in the late seventies when it signed a peace treaty with Israel."

"But the Egyptian government has other goals it is seeking that require Congressional approval, such as weapons sales, trade preferences and in other areas," Frank said. "Egypt must understand that it cannot continue to be so oppressive towards people's human rights and expect us to support these additional requests."

JAPAN OK'S GENDER-SWAP CANDIDATE

Tokyo — Japan's home affairs ministry ruled in mid-April that a transgender candidate could run for a local-government seat identified as her chosen gender.

News reports said the ministry's instructions to the Metropolitan Election Administration Commission may be the first time the government OK'd submission of a public document with a gender reference contrary to an individual's family register.

Aya Kamikawa, 35, will run for the Setagaya Ward Assembly as a woman even though she was born male. The election is April 27.

"I hope the decision will serve as a starting point for necessary legal reforms to allow one to live fully in accordance with one's preferred sex," she told the Japan Times.

25% OF N.Z. WOMEN HAVE HAD GAY FEELINGS

Auckland — Twenty-five percent of New Zealand women and 11 percent of men admit to having had gay sexual attractions, the University of Otago's Dunedin Multidisciplinary Health and Development Study has found.

Researchers questioned 980 26-yearolds all born in the city of Dunedin.

People with more education were more likely to acknowledge same-sex attractions.

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

The following films will be screened: "East Palace/West Palace," banned by the Chinese Government, it follows a young gay writer's life; "Plata Quemada (Burnt Money)," based upon a book and story inspired by a famous bank robbery in Buenos Aires in the 1960s; "Honored by the Moon," in which Native American lesbians and gay men speak of their life experiences; "Paradise Bent," one of the first explorations of the Samoan fa'afafines, boys who were raised as girls, who then fulfill their traditional role in Samoan culture; "Body of a Poet: A Tribute to Audre Lorde," a celebration of Lorde's life and work, going from birth to death; "Forbidden Fruit," which breaks taboos about sexual identity and lesbian love in African (particularly Zimbabwean) society; "Shinjuku Boys," a documentary following three onnabes (women who live as men and have girlfriends although they do not identify as lesbians) who work as hosts at the New Marilyn Club in Tokyo; and "Flesh and Paper," a film that deals with the life and writing of Indian lesbian poet and writer Suniti Namjoshi.

The Queer People of Color Film Festival was conceived to explore LGBT identity

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across cultures. We hope to create an environment conducive to sharing cultural experiences about our sexualities. It also offers a great chance to observe sociological differences at one level of observation and hopefully create a greater understanding of ourselves as well as our world-community.





AIDS is the cornerstone of Wisconsin's success in reducing the number of new HIV infections and serving thousands of people with HIV/AIDS," Nelson said.

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
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Dyer's Departure

Dear Editor-

This letter is in response to your article "57 Days & Counting" concerning PrideFest and questions regarding Bo Dyer's sudden departure.

Some of the information in the article with regard to myself was inaccurate. I'd like to take the opportunity to correct these errors and defend my reputation.

Although it is common knowledge that Bo Dyer did serve as PrideFest's Entertainment Director director during the 2001 festival year she was not my booking publicist. I did not perform as a solo artist during 2001, I performed as a member of the band ChixMix.

The article stated that "the investigation had turned up a second apparent conflict in Dyer's 2001 contracting of singer Melissa Beastrom. Dyer served both as PrideFest's local entertainment chair and Beastrom's publicist that year as well."

Dyer did not handle bookings for my personal appearances, so there was never a conflict of interest concerning my involvement. At no time did Do Dyer ever receive any commission or form of payment as my personal publicist. The only services Dyer was ever contracted for was photography for my solo CD, "Pieces of the Puzzle" and my website design.

The tone of the article suggests that there was information to be uncovered inclusive of unethical practices on the part of the artists. It shines a light of "guilty by association" on those mentioned in the article. I have personal relationships with people on the PrideFest counsel and they have always been aware of my dealings with Dyer due to the fact that they are in the same social circle. Both the local music scene in Milwaukee as well as the LGBT community tend to be small worlds. As both a lesbian and a musician, those associations overlapping are unavoidable. Unfortunately, Dyer ran in both of those circles and her indiscretions are starting to appear.

Before performing her sudden disappearing act, I had known Bo Dyer for the last two years and had considered her my friend. Along with the public, others that were close to her are only now becoming aware of some of her desperate measures. Unfortunately, I'm sure there will be more information to come.

As the mainstream paper for the LGBT community, IN Step has brought public attention to Dyer's misconduct. Because of this I hope Bo Dyer will be held accountable for her actions. PrideFest remains an organization full of people who work tirelessly, with only the best intentions in mind. As they have in the past, I am confident that the people involved with PrideFest will overcome these new obstacles and implement the policies and procedures that will ensure a smooth running organization for years to come.

Let us remember not to point a finger in an effort to deflect light off of ourselves and instead focus our attention on both the right and the left hand within the organizational structure that allowed Bo Dyer the freedom to misrepresent us all. We should try to put our energy into one another, working together to ensure that PrideFest remains out, loud and proud.

Best Today, Still Better Tomorrow

t was out in front of the company where my father worked, there beneath the name of his company, back in the late '40s. It was a sign I still remember. It read, "Best Today. Still Better Tomorrow." I liked that sign a lot when I was a little girl and I still like it a lot, even now when it so often looks like a striving for excellence and the vision required of excellence have gone by the boards. Why do we not ask where we are, and wonder what bold new place we want to head for? "What's a hand for," as Robert Browning put it, "if not to reach?"

I try to reckon why we have lost a sense of excellence and of vision, but I do not know. Is it because we are so involved in the deadening dailiness of our days that we are no longer very good, in George Bush Sr.'s words, "at the vision thing?" Is it because, as one self-appointed therapist to the human race has said, the demands of excellence are so intimidating that it is harmful to those who lack self esteem? Or are we too scared? Too unhappy? Too strung out? Too hopeless? Too narcissistic for the common good? So overwhelmed by events that we have become supine? Or is it because we have become so results-oriented that we can't see the vision for the rigidi-

ties required to measure results in numbers or ciphers or salaries?

Whatever, we are in a time and in a temper that runs counter to LGBT vision. In the absence of vision, we allow the demagogue, the bigot, and the hatemonger to take over. We have MSNBC carrying talk show host Michael Savage, the most notorious of the dangerous homophobes, who spews hate unimaginable. (So ugly are Savage's words that his major sponsors, including such stalwarts as Proctor and Gamble and Dell Computer, etc., have withdrawn.) Locally, we have our very own talk show bigots Charlie Sykes and Mark Belling.

Without a vision to hold on to for ourselves and to counter the demagogues as well, we are in a perilous place. We are in a William Butler Yeats place where "the best lack all conviction; the worst are full of passionate intensity."

Or in a hideous corruption of the majestic bald eagle symbol of this land, we are in a Muriel Rukeyser place where "freedom's eagles scream above our face, misleading, sly, perverse, and unprofound."

In our LGBT communities we are at high risk. We, as are people of Middle Eastern descent and the African diaspora, and as are women who are more violently set upon by rapists than is commonly acknowledged, the soft underbelly of the whale around and under which the hatemonger gathers for attack. Particularly is this true now, with Patriot Act Two waiting to be enacted, the legislation that would steal from us our rights to freedom of speech, and to the freedom to come togeth-

er in LGBT organizations without fear of arrest; that would put an end to the right to read books without being spied on by the government, and that would end our ability to obtain legal representation— along with allowing immediate incarceration — if our Attorney General, and infamous right wing ideologue, John Ashcroft so much as suspects us of something he does not like.

We must counter these attacks with legislative activity of course, and with participation in the electoral process. But it is clearly more than that. We must, in words still meaningful today, become — to refer to a highly popular book of the same name — an Aquarian Conspiracy of envisioners, articulating the best we know today, striving for still better tomorrow. Both inside our own souls and psyches, and outside in our institutions, we must meet the "passionate intensity" of the demagogues, hatemongers and bigots; and counter the scream of "freedom's eagles, misleading, sly, perverse and unprofound," with the boldness of our visions.

As a member of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee. I need LAMM to articulate a vision for the lesbian/woman in the 21st century. As a member of the Milwaukee LGBT Center, I need to see the Center do the same for the LGBT communities. As a member of SAGE, I need to see SAGE do the same for those of us old LGBT members of Milwaukee. As a participant in PrideFest, and someone who has set up and staffed tables, I need PrideFest to join in this community visioning. Else I am overcome by what the poets so feared, the "misleading, sly, perverse and unprofound;" "the worst," so "full of passionate intensity."

Our organizations also need to get beyond their internal troubles by rallying 'round a vision, a vision they believe in and

can say to themselves and others at each and every difficulty. It needs to be something more than a statement in a book, or on grant applications. It needs to be a lived reality. That, ideal as it may seem, is not beyond visioning, and is to my way of thinking extremely and essentially important.

We as individuals and as members of our community organizations also need to begin visioning separately, and then together, toward the best LGBT today, which shall be still better tomorrow. We do that best, I think, by beginning at the grass roots, right where each one of us lives and loves and finds our being, with ourselves. We do that by talking vision-making up, by making a suggestion or two, by writing a letter to the editor of IN Step to let others know what we vision for ourselves and for our communities.

It iss like what our gay brother Walt Whitman said of his poetry, "I sing the individual en masse." It was a poetry envisioning a brave and bold new America. Let's try it for the LGBT communities, making the best better, beginning with ourselves and then moving out to become a part of the whole, en masse.



The Truth About Wishy-Washy

here is a difference between being wishy-washy and being fluid. As a female I have been accused of being wishy-washy all my life. Thinking out loud, a common female trait, is often misconstrued as being wishywashy or inconsistent.

Talking, for me, is a journey. The first thing that comes out of my mouth is not necessarily my destination. I like to feel how something sounds out loud. I may decide it doesn't quite describe my inner landscape and try again. I may decide to add your words to mine and transform both thoughts.

None of this is wishy-washy. It is pictures of my process, snapshots that describe how I got from where I was to where I am now. Each picture is valid on it's own. And all the photos together make up a larger story.

As a bisexual, I often find myself facing the same wishy-washy charge-that I can't make up my mind between men and women. It is assumed that I can't be loyal or committed because I am confused.

Sexuality is a journey for me. The gender of my first love is not necessarily my destination. I am attracted to people who are compassionate and who listen intently. I am attracted to people who have

a passion for dancing. I am attracted to the earthy scent of freshly washed skin and a nice laugh. It is these things that define my attractions, not gender and not particular body parts.

This is not being wishy-washy. I am very clear about what I like and what I don't. I know what I am looking for and who I am. If you look at my life when I was 16 and madly in love with my best girlfriend, you might say I am a lesbian. If you look at my life when I was 25 and I married my best male friend, you might say I am straight. If you take a step back and look at my life as a whole, you will see the larger story.

To look at my life and say that sometimes I am homosexual and sometimes I am heterosexual is just trying to fit the whole of Me into only one part of the truth. It tells only part of the story and it mistakes the part for the whole.

The larger truth is that I am bisexual. I love all genders and I like and dislike people regardless of gender. I change as I experience new relationships, new people, new situations.

By staying true to my own unique pattern, I am able to navigate the flow of the larger world around me and avoid both stagnation and chaos. I am able to be committed and loyal to myself and my relationships. I am able to keep my balance and to honor the whole of who I am. My truth is not wishy-washy, it is fluid.

And my truth doesn't make anyone else's truth untrue.

Madonna's "American Life" is Bitchin'

merica's favorite 'Material Girl' is back! After a three year musical hiatus, pop music's chameleon hit stores earlier this week with the release of American Life (Warner Bros.), a surprisingly eclectic, funky mix of electronica laced odes that resonate with a subdued sense of metaphysical awareness and inner peace. Life is a tantalizing opus that shatters any illusions or preconceived notions she may have impressed upon friends and foes during her 23 year musical odyssey.

As with any Madonna album, two things can be assured. First, the album will be preceded by controversy; her video to the CD's titular first single was pulled and modified because the singer did not want the public to "misinterpret" its intent, especially while America was at war. Second, critics, for the most part, will pounce and brutally assail her efforts.

"American Life" finds Madonna sound-

ing more than a little bit tired, repetitive and all played out," writes Chicago Sun-Times critic, Jim Derogatis, who damningly panned Life. "Amazingly, after two decades in the business, the star still hasn't learned how to sing." Really? What a revelation. Derogatis, and his brethren, repeatedly miss the point in their criticism. Most of the biggest superstars in the world are not great singers - they are artists. Mariah, Whitney, Celine, Liza and Barbara are great singers. Madonna, Cher, Bette, Diana and Tina are artists. All are Icons. In fact, all three of the female singers reviewed in this article would, arguably, not be considered top notch singers, yet their music is undeniably catchy, encompassing and popular.
In all honesty, I have never been a

In all honesty, I have never been a Madonna devotee or enthusiast, however, to deny or denote her impact on pop culture and her ability to set the bar for trendsetting music would be foolhardy, not to mention ignorant. If the denizens of American Idol aspire to be more than the next Debbie Gibson or Paula Abdul, they would be wise to not only heed, but hone, the lessons of Rock's true survivors.

There is a reason why Madonna and Cher are so iconoclastic and continue to defy critics and intellectuals. They are bombastic beyond pale and they have imbedded themselves into the publics psyche to the point of being real-life caricatures. They are determined, self-righteous and bold, much to the chagrin of many, yet — like them or not — they are unforgettable. Where Cher has an uncanny knack for foreseeing a musical trend and jumping in the fray, Madonna ingeniously manages to set the direction pop music will trend too.

"American Life" is demonstrative of that musical brilliance and despite that fact that she will never be lauded as a great singer, Madonna, can take umbrage in the fact that it doesn't matter. The pulsating title song goes on a cathartic lyrical journey that lets the listener know Madonna has reached an epiphany in her life, which she is going to share with us. Apparently, the superstar has engrossed herself in the religious teachings of Kabbalah, based on a philosophical Jewish mysticism.

Much has been written in the press recently about Madonna's metamorphosis as though she was the only artist to evaluate her life. It only stands to reason that an individual, famous or otherwise, tends to evaluate and assess their life when they hit a certain age landmark, otherwise known as forty. Why should our favorite bad girl be any different? At 44, she is one of the most famous people in the world, the mother of two, a wife and, above all, a human being. Luckily, Madonna's probing of life's relevance is an infectious set of tunes that are insightful, reflective and uplifting.


The albums best cuts are the poetic and resonant Love Profusion, Nothing Fails and Intervention, the first of which is my personal favorite. Nobody Knows Me is an introspective and compelling song wherein this rock maven lets us in on her innermost spiritual contemplations, a familiar theme

that continues on Mother & Father and X-Static Process. In truth, there is not a song on this CD that does not infectiously invite you into her material world and subsequent evolvement into a mature artist of monumental proportions.

"There are too many questions, there is not one solution. There is no resurrection, there is so much confusion," she equates in Love Profusion, adding "There are too many options, there is no consolation. I have lost my illusions; What I want is an explanation." Truthful, personal and daring. That's Madonna and she's bitchin.



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



"Bea's Niece"

act or Fiction? The networks are filled with "reality television" programs that are laughably absurd while films are increasingly peopled with computer generated creatures that are uncannily lifelike. In today's curious world, discerning what is fact from what is not has become an increasingly difficult task.

Imagine, if you will, a writer, a novelist accustomed to picking and choosing bits from the real world and transforming it into fiction. Do this long enough, particularly if successful, and it seems possible

that the barriers separating the real world from the fictional might become blurred.

Such is the premise of playwright David Gow's "Bea's Niece," Next Act's current stage offering.

Anne Hirsch (Angela Iannone) might be an extremely popular and accomplished novelist but even popular and accomplished novelists are not expected to lose control in a bookstore, tearing up copies of books. Not even if the tattered books are those you've written. After one such episode. Anne lands in a mental health facility under the care of a brisk young psychiatrist, Beth (Tami Workentin).

Following an evening of far too many sleeping pills, morning finds Anne looking pretty shaky. Having your stomach

pumped can do that to a person. So can having visits from your husband who is supposed to be dead. Or from an eccentric Aunt who may or may not be dead as well.

Playwright David Gow certainly doesn't make things easy for the audience. In much the same fashion as Anne, we in the audience are constantly kept off balance, never quite sure what is real, if in fact Anne's visitors are flesh and blood or simply emerging from her imagination. As interesting a narrative device as this might initially appear, one result is that our relationship with Gow's protagonist proves problematic.

Nor is Tami Woekentin's Dr. Beth Otis exactly the audience's lifeline to some semblance of reality. Since Anne is clearly in some sort of facility, the audience is likely to believe Dr. Beth when she assures Anne that the pack of cigarettes is not actually from her Aunt Bea but the fruits of Anne's brief escape from the hospital. We have no reason not to believe her.

Or do we? Isn't that a gun that Dr. Beth seems to use to give Anne a shot? And don't we see Beth ushering into Anne's room the rather strange woman Rabbi who soon is transformed in Anne's Aunt Bea?

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lannone's Anne is wonderfully complex and contradictory, at one moment seemingly tough as nails, as vulnerable as a frightened child the next. A delightful dinner guest perhaps but not a person with whom one could feel comfortable sharing confidences. Certain allowances are to be made for those possessing genius, we've often been told, but even at the best of times Anne Hirsch must have been some handful for her poor husband.

Conversely, as Anne's eccentric Aunt Bea, Ruth Schudson steals our hearts and the show. Warm, funny as well as being a gifted storyteller, Schudson's Bea is an immensely appealing character. Not only does she immediately connect with the audience, she helps to make us understand and care for Anne.


Enigmatic as these proceedings are, a real slam-bang finish is needed. As if pulling a rabbit out of a hat, Gow provides a reasonable and satisfying resolution at the conclusion of "Bea's Niece," one which neatly ties up all of the loose ends.

Or does it? Perhaps it too is just imagined?


