Wisconsin Assembly Votes on DOMA Slated for Oct. 23

Madison - The Wisconsin Assembly has scheduled a floor vote on AB475, the so-called "Defense of Marriage Act" (DOMA), for Thursday, October 23. Debate likely will precede the vote. The exact time the bill is expected to be up for consideration was unknown at IN Step's deadline.

No vote has been scheduled on SB233, the identical Senate version of the DOMA bill. That body's Committee on Judiciary, Corrections & Privacy voted to move the bill to the floor via a party line 3-2 vote, conducted privately by paper ballot on October 7. GOP strategists reportedly wished to avoid another public appearance by committee chair and DOMA cosponsor Sen. Dave Zein (R-Eau Claire), whose four marriages were revealed publicly prior to joint committee hearings on the bill last August.

Action Wisconsin, the statewide LGBT civil rights organization, continues to actively lobby against the bill's passage in both houses of the legislature.

Chicago Meningitis Outbreak May Hit Wisconsin's Gay Community

Madison — Chicago's gay community has been hit by an outbreak of bacterial meningitis — which may put some gay men at risk back here in Madison according to John Quinlan, Executive Director of Madison's LGBT Community Center, OutReach.

Three men are dead and a fourth is in critical condition, Chicago's Public Health Department reports. Thousands are being innoculated in a predominantly gay northside Chicago neighborhood.

"Given that many Madison gay community members travel to Chicago and visit its bars in the affected neighborhood on weekends, we want people here to be aware of the potential risks. This form of meningitis might be contracted with contact as casual as coughing and sneezing, sharing food or a drink, or sharing a kiss. While the risk is remote, we encourage gay community members to be cautious in avoiding behavior that might result in exposure to meningitis - especially if they're in a setting with others who may have recently traveled to Chicago, such as a local bar," Quinlan says.

"Chicago health officials have noted that contraction of meningitis is not connected to a person's sexual orientation," he continues. "However, small closed-in communities where there is likely to be close contact-whether a gay bar or a dormitory setting--are venues where the infection can spread quickly. We don't want to be alarmist. The risk is slight. However, the onset of meningitis is swift, and can potentially be fatal, so we want people to know about this potential risk right away so that they can exercise informed caution," Quinlan added.

Anglicans Wrangle Over Gay Issues

Dallas — Anglican conservatives are pressuring Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams to condemn recent gay-friendly actions by the Episcopal Church USA during an emergency meeting this month in London.

Pressure mounted in mid-October when 2,700 Episcopal clergy and lay leaders gathered outside Dallas for a meeting of the American Anglican Council, which called on Williams — the worldwide Anglican leader — and the 37 other primates in the Anglican Community to create a "new alignment for Anglicanism in North America."

Williams, according to The (London) Independent, is expected to side with conservatives reiterating the church's official view, reached five years ago, that "homosexuality is incompatible with scripture," a cleric claimed earlier in the during the meetings.

But supporters of change in the Anglican Church say that it is unclear what Williams will do and have expressed "optimism" and "encouragement" by the support they have received over this contentious debate.

In August, Episcopalians approved the confirmation of Rev. Gene Robinson as bishop-elect of New Hampshire, making him the church's first-ever openly gay bishop. The church also voted to recognize that its bishops are allowing blessing ceremonies for same-sex couples.

The Episcopal Church USA has 2.3 million members in 105 dioceses. It is one of 37 branches of the 70 million-member Anglican Communion, which also

includes the Church of England.

The 37 Anglican leaders, called primates, gathered in London Wednesday for a two-day meeting, ordered by Williams, to discuss the American situation and a similar dispute among Anglicans in Canada. An announcement of the meeting's outcome was not expected until late Thursday.

The Associated Press reported that Williams' spokesperson said that the mood of the closed meeting was "relaxed," beginning with prayers and Bible study and a five-minute speech given by each primate. The meeting is taking place in Lambeth Palace, the historic London building where the Anglican Communion was formed.

John Bradley, communications director for the gay Episcopal group Integrity USA, said that unlike the Catholic Church, there is no centralized authority in the Anglican Church since each province is autonomous. Additionally, primates have no collective legislative authority and cannot punish a member, like the Episcopal Church USA.

Church officials say that Williams, despite being limited in his powers, can decide whether a denomination can affiliate with the global communion.

The Anglican churches of Africa have been most vociferous in their condemnation of the Episcopal Church USA. The primate of Nigeria, Rev. Peter Akinola, said recently "homosexuality is a flagrant disobedience to God," and that "for us, therefore, adherence to Scripture is not only paramount, it is also nonnegotiable." Africa's sole liberal archbishop, Njongonkulu Ndungane, told Reuters on Tuesday that "it will be a sad day if the leadership of the church cannot find one another when we are supposed to set an example on how to resolve conflict."

Vituperations on both sides of the debate have reached extreme levels. Some conservatives called the election of Robinson a "Satanic attack on God's church," while some gay activists have compared threats from conservative Anglican leaders to Nazism.

The Lincolnshire Echo, an England newspaper, reported that a gay Christian activist accused conservative Anglicans of entering a "new era of persecution," saying that the present "theological purity" being waged is reminiscent of the "ethnic purity" conducted by Nazi Germany.

A gay British bishop likened Sydney Anglican Archbishop Peter Jensen to Adolph Hitler because of his opposition to gay clergy and same-sex marriages, according to the Sydney Morning Herald.

"Whenever a single group is singled out like [gays] have been for this type of opprobrium and hatred, it's nothing short of the evil that went on in the '30s," Bishop Martin Reynolds told ABC radio.

Bradley said that it is the job of Integrity USA, and likeminded "Christian people," to "emulate our lives after Christ ... even those who disagree with us."

"There is room in the Episcopal church and Anglican Communion for those with a variety of opinions and spectrum," Bradley said. "But for some conservatives, there is no room for us in their church. They appear to be saying that everyone must believe in what they say."

Gay Marriage Bill Ready For Massachusetts Legislature

Boston — On the eve of hearings for the most important gay rights legislation in Massachusetts history nearly 150 same-sex couples rallied at the State House on Oct. 22.

The Judiciary Committee will hear testimony tomorrow on two bills dealing with gay marriage and civil unions.

The gay rights advocates, many with their children, packed a meeting hall in the legislature to show their support for legislation recognizing gay and lesbian families.

Claire Humphrey attended with her daughter and infant son to demand equal treatment for the family she's built with her partner. Humphrey says she doesn't want to have to explain to her children why convicted murderers and child abusers can get married, but she and her partner can't.

"They don't have the right to visit their partners in the hospital. They don't have the right to make burial decisions when one of their partners passes away. We don't have the right of automatic inheritance. We are taxed very differently," Freedom To Marry Coalition Josh Friedes said.

The coalition also is also opposing conservative pressure to amend the state constitution to bar gay marriage. The leg-

islature is slated to vote next month an whether to allow the amending process to move forward.

Meanwhile, both sides in the marriage issue are awaiting a ruling from the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court on the constitutionality of preventing gays and lesbians from getting marriage licenses.

The state's highest court was to have rendered a decision in mid July but put off releasing its ruling. It now is expected sometime this winter.

Lawmakers in other states also are awaiting the Massachusetts court ruling. If it says the state cannot bar same-sex marriage, other states could be constitutionally be forced to recognize gay marriages. It is an argument Republicans are using to press for an amendment to the US Constitution to permanently stamp out any hope for recognition of same-sex couples throughout the country.

Gay Student Sues Private School

West Palm Beach — An 18-year-old student and his mother filed suit on Oct. 21 in Palm Beach County Circuit Court against a Christian private school they say expelled him two months ago after he told a teacher that he is gay.

Jeffrey Woodard said Jupiter Christian School expelled him three days after an instructor pulled him aside after Bible class on Aug. 15 and asked him in confidence if he was gay.

When Woodard answered "yes," a

school official called his mother, Carol Gload, and told her Woodard could not attend an upcoming school retreat unless he and Gload met with the school to talk about Woodard's sexual orientation.

"We were basically given three choices – to get counseling for his `problem,' to voluntarily withdraw him, or he would be expelled," said Gload, who has known for more than a year that her son is gay. "I didn't think Jeffrey needed therapy, ... so when I explained he doesn't need help for anything, he knows who he is, they ... expelled him."

Send this article to a friendSchool President Richard Grimm said last week he could not comment on the issue because it involves private information about a former student, but he said the school's policies are based on Biblical values. Legal experts said the private school was within its rights to discriminate.

"It was just completely wrong," said Woodard, who had attended the school for three years, adding that the teacher "outed" him before he was ready. "It's just a horrible thing. I just don't want this to ever happen to another student again."

Karen Doering, an attorney with the National Center for Lesbian Rights in Tampa, said the school broke no law.

"Unfortunately, in the state of Florida, discrimination based on sexual orientation is not specifically prohibited by any law," Doering said. "When it comes to public schools, it is clear the Constitution protects youth based on sexual orientation; however, that does not apply to private schools."

Feud Rocks Gay Games

Montreal — A bitter feud has placed the Montreal Gay Games in jeopardy. The Montreal Organizing Committee and the Federation of Gay Games are at loggerheads over financing and control of the 2006 event, says Mark Tewksbury, the co-president of the 2006 Organizing Committee.

Tewksbury, a three time Olympic gold medallist in swimming, accused the FGG of attempting to imperil the viability of the games.

The Montreal committee has planned what are to be the most ambitious games yet, but to carry it off it will need to attract 24,000 athletes. The FGG says there must not be more than 16,000. In addition, Tewsksbury charges, the FGG has ordered Montreal to cut its budget from an estimated \$20 million (Cdn) to 16 million dollars.

"To finance the Games a certain level of participation is necessary in order to attract the interest of major sponsors," the committee said in a statement.

'Our vision on this issue is not shared by the FGG: their contract requires Montreal Games be planned on the basis of 12,000 participants. We know this would be a financial disaster, and to operate the Games without deficit, we must aim for a minimum of 16,000 participants."

Athletes pay \$200 to compete in the Gay Games, so numbers do play a part in the operating budget, he pointed out.

"We've done the math and our breakeven point is 15,540 people," Tewksbury said.

The governments of Montreal. Quebec, and Canada have pledged over \$5 million in grants and services to the games. In addition, the Montreal committee has sold television rights to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for live coverage of events, the first time the games will be televised live.

The Montreal committee accuses the FGG of attempting a power play to take control of the funding.

"For Montreal 2006, it is unthinkable that financial decisions on the Games be made by anyone other than its Board of Directors, who are legally responsible for the outcome of the event. As well, the citizens of Montreal, Quebec and of Canada would never accept the use of their tax dollars being determined by a small group of people directing the FGG."

Tewksbury says attempts at mediation have been rebuked. He said the committee hopes to raise the issue at the annual meeting of the Federation next month in Chicago.

"We still hope," said Louise Roy. Director of the Montreal Games, "that the FGG and Montreal 2006 can come to an agreement and that we will be able to announce this in Chicago.

The FGG has not commented on the committee's allegations. No Gay Games

has made money. The Sydney 2002 games, which at the time were to have been the biggest in the 20 year history of the Gay Games, was scaled back several times and almost were cancelled over money problems. In 1976 Montreal hosted the Olympic Games. The games were to have brought millions into the city, but ended up losing money. Taxpayers are still paying the tab.

Streisand to Recieve HRC Award

New York — Barbra Streisand is to receive a Human Rights Campaign award for her support of gay and lesbian issues, religious freedom, and racial and gender

The group, which lobbies on behalf of gay, lesbian, bisexual and trans-gender people, will present Streisand with its Humanitarian Award on March 6.

The gay and lesbian "community and the nation have been enriched by Ms. Streisand," said Elizabeth Birch, the group's executive director. "Her passion and leadership are important to all

The group said Streisand, 61, took a stand against an anti-gay-rights proposal in Colorado in 1992 and has been a regular financial contributor to the Human Rights Campaign and other gay and lesbian organizations.

'I'm Not A Homophobe' Beyonce Says


New York — Pop star Beyonce says she is stunned by quotes attributed to her in a British newspaper that made her look like a homophobe.



ARCW Secures \$1.7 million Medical Care Funding

Milwaukee — Providing a substantial boost to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin's rapidly growing medical care program. ARCW recently was awarded a \$1.7 million grant from the Federal government to provide medical care to people living with HIV/AIDS in Wisconsin through 2006. This is a 40 percent increase over the previous grant, awarded in 2001.

"Our clinics serve hundreds of HIV+ people, many of whom have no other access to medical care. ARCW has an expert physician, and medical staff who specialize in HIV/AIDS care providing high quality medical care to anyone living with HIV/AIDS," said ARCW President and CEO Doug Nelson.

"This grant affirms the quality of care we provide and the ongoing need to expand medical care for people with HIV and AIDS.

"The patient load at our medical clinic is growing by as many as four patients each week. Within a year we expect to double the number of patients we are seeing,' noted ARCW Physician Dr. David Fisk. "HIV-specific care is crucial to maintaining a high quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS.

Dr. Fisk graduated from Johns Hopkins Medical School and completed his Infectious Disease and Internal Medicine residencies and fellowships at the University of Michigan. He has six years of experience in treating HIV/AIDS patients and provides medical care to all of ARCW's patients in southeastern Wisconsin, conducts day to day oversight on all ARCW medical services, and supervises all ARCW medical staff. ARCW's clinic provides outpatient services, including office visits, lab testing and diagnostic testing. Health care services span initial HIV diagnosis through comprehensive care and treatment.

ARCW also helps people remain on complicated medication regimens by providing adequate, nutritious food and nutritional supplements and the opportunity to join support groups and adherence programs, and provides one-on-one social work case management, rent and utility assistance, residential housing, financial assistance, legal representation, vocational counseling, benefits advocacy and transportation assistance all designed to assist people with HIV and AIDS in maintaining access to medical care.

"In the last year, we have developed a quality, state-of-the art medical clinic, and have served 200 patients with nothing but the best in HIV medical care," said Dr. Fisk. "Our staff takes pride in the work they do and we are pleased that the Federal government has recognized this work and continues to support it at an increased level."



VATICAN: CONDOMS DON'T WORK

A top Vatican official told the BBC Oct. 12 that condoms do not prevent HIV transmission.

The president of the Pontifical Council for the Family, Cardinal Alfonso Lopez Trujillo, told BBC1's Panorama program that all condoms contain tiny holes that HIV can pass through.

"The AIDS virus is roughly 450 times smaller than the spermatozoon," Lopez said. "The spermatozoon can easily pass through the net that is formed by the condom. ... These margins of uncertainty should represent an obligation on the part of the health ministries and all these campaigns to act in the same way as they do with regard to cigarettes, which they state to be a danger."

The World Health Organization and AIDS educators said the Vatican is confused. "These incorrect statements about condoms and HIV are dangerous when we are facing a global pandemic which has already killed more than 20 million." WHO said.

Condoms can break or slip off, the organization said, but they do not contain small holes that HIV can slip through.

The Catholic Church teaches that it is a deadly sin to engage in any sexual act that cannot lead to pregnancy, such as oral sex, masturbation, gay sex, and sex with condoms.

GAY WEDDING CHAPEL DESTROYED

The Russian Orthodox chapel in which the nation's first same-sex wedding was conducted has been demolished after local church leaders determined it had been desecrated.

The Chapel of the Vladimir Icon of the Mother of God, in Nizhny Novgorod, was torn down after Father Vladimir Enert accepted \$450 to marry Denis Gogolev, 27, and Mikhail Morozov, 23, on Sept. 1. Enert was defrocked over the incident.

Nizhny Novgorod, previously named Gorky, is 248 miles (400 km) east of Moscow. It is Russia's third-largest city.

85% OF SYDNEY GAYS SUFFER ANTI-GAY ABUSE

A new study by the New South Wales state attorney general finds that 85 percent of Sydney homosexuals have experienced homophobic abuse, harassment or violence, and half of them have experienced it in the past year.

Verbal abuse was the most common problem, followed by offensive gestures, threat of assault and assault. Gay teens reported feeling most vulnerable.

The report, Homophobic Hostilities and Violence Against Gay Men and Lesbians in NSW, questioned 600 gays and lesbians in Australia's largest city.

SWEDISH GAY PARENTS LEGALIZED

Swedish gay couples are being recognized as the parents of their children fol-

lowing a recent change in the law.

A lesbian couple in Umeå are now the legal parents of a girl who was born to one of the women, and two men in Stockholm are now the legal parents of a girl they previously adopted in the U.S.

ANGLICAN FAITHFUL OK GAY PRIESTS

A survey has found that 52 percent of people who belong to the Church of England think sexually active gays should be allowed to be priests. And 69 percent approve of gay priests if they're celibate.

The ICM Research survey for The Telegraph daily newspaper questioned 500 church members.

Earlier this year, the bishop of Oxford appointed a gay priest who lives celibately with his lover as bishop of Reading. England. But Jeffrey John was later forced to decline the job by Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, the head of the worldwide Anglican Communion, following a prolonged outcry from church conservatives.

MALTA PROTECTS GAYS

Under pressure from the European Union, which it is set to join, Malta banned anti-gay discrimination in the workplace Oct. 7.

A legal notice published in the Government Gazette stated: "In determining whether any treatment is treatment that is justified in a democratic society, the Industrial Tribunal shall take into account the provisions of any directive and/or regulation issued by the institutions of the European Union relating to discrimination and particularly Council Directive 2000/43/EC of 29th June 2000 and Council Directive 2000/78/EC of 27th November 2000 prohibiting discrimina-

tion on the basis of religion or belief, disability, age, sexual orientation, race or ethnic origin."

Gay activists welcomed the move but said they will be happier when the changes are written directly into labor law rather than merely published as subsidiary legislation.

Forty percent of Maltese gays and lesbians report workplace harassment based on their sexual orientation, according to the Malta Gay Rights Movement.

SOME WELSH GAYS AFRAID TO COME OUT

Twenty percent of gays and lesbians in Wales are afraid to come out at work, a survey by Stonewall Cymru and Cardiff University has found. And 25 percent say they've been fired for being gay.

A third of those questioned said they'd been bullied or physically attacked for being gay, and a quarter reported harassment or discrimination at the hands of police.


The survey was completed by 364 people.

CDC: THAI GAYS HOLD HIV RECORD


Seventeen of every 100 gay men in Thailand are HIV-positive, a study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has found.

The agency said that's the highest gay HIV rate in the world.

But some Thai AIDS experts believe the CDC study was flawed because it tested men who frequent gay bathhouses and cruisy parks, who may have a higher infection rate.

Julaine, Ralph & Sully — The DOMA Debate Drags On

y the time you read this column, the Wisconsin Assembly likely will have Dvoted on and passed the so-called "Defense of Marriage Act" (AB475) or DOMA. The vote was scheduled for the street date of this edition of IN Step.

Though I suspect the vote will be somewhat lopsided and bipartisan, I doubt it will be the 78-20 drubbing the gay community saw back in 1997 on a similarly hateful bill. Action Wisconsin's lobbying efforts certainly have had some effect, most notably in the number of straight allies contacting their legislators to oppose this unnecessary bill.

Even more interesting, however, has been the increasingly ineffective efforts to mobilize the hard-core religious right grass roots on gay issues. Even as the rhetoric of Wisconsin's two anti-gay groups becomes more strident, their impact lessens. Here are two cases in point:

First, Julaine Appling of the Family Research Institute of Wisconsin (FRI) contin-

ues to whine on the radio and online that her allies at the State Capitol are still report the electorate contacting legislators to oppose

the DOMA bill overwhelm those supporting it, despite two months of what appear to be under-funded efforts by the FRI.

Julaine also went so apoplectic over Governor Doyle's meetings with LGBT activists she even linked her website to IN Step's, which contains some not very pro-FRI rhetoric. Thanks for helping us get out our side of the story, darlin'!

Second, Ralph Ovadal's "International Conference on Homo-Fascism," the selfdescribed "firebell in the night" that has been touted for nearly a year on the Wisconsin Christians United website plays to a choir of fifteen or so at a "secret" location in Milwaukee on October 9-10. Dinner bell is more like it. This column is the first printed public mention of that little taffy

Ralph's one coup? He snagged a "state senator" to spend some time with his fellow bigots. My sources say that was freshman Republican Tom Reynolds, not exactly a new convert to the extremist right.

Of course Wisconsin's "real issue" -diverting drive toward DOMA is reflective of the national scene. The just completed "Marriage Protection Week" of October 12-18 saw a lot of gay-bashing but not a single, documented "save" of a troubled, tradi-

The week actually got off to a rocky start with the widespread reprinting of an op-ed by a widely read and respected rightwing journalist. In "The State of Our Unions," his pro-same sex marriage piece in the Wall Street Journal, gay conservative pundit Andrew Sullivan struggled mightily to "keep it civil". In other words, he focused solely on civil marriage equality.

Sullivan expressed amazement that social conservatives "oppose, for the most part, every single practical measure that brings gay citizens into the mainstream of American life" and asked if anyone could name another "legal, noncriminal minority in society toward which social conservatives have nothing but a negative social policy."

Multiple respondents to his piece pointed what he, as a devout Roman Catholic, should have already known. Organized Christianity, with minuscule denominational exception, officially considers homosexuals evil. As such, that evil should never be allowed to become mainstream. Sullivan's beloved Holy Mother Church, while claiming homosexual orientation is, of itself, morally neutral; considers any thought, word or deed related to understanding or expressing that orientation as venially or mortally sinful. At least the fundamentalists refuse to slice their baloney that thin.

By avoiding the religious underpinnings of the social conservative's opposition Sullivan merely begs his own question and deflects a greater one. The gay marriage debate is symptomatic of a much larger concurrent social development occurring both in American society and in human history. For American society the issues are the place of organized religious values in the dialogue developing social policy and the hierarchy of civil rights. For human history it is the very place of institutional religion as science continues to reveal the very nature of existence and the inner workings of the consciousness.

To address the core American social dilemma first: How do America's lawmakers and policy wonks uphold the Constitutional separation of church and state, yet reconcile the differences between. say, the Baptists and the Unitarians, whose attitudes toward homosexuals are directly opposite? The historians among us like to point out that the forefathers of the contemporary American social conservatives vilifying same-sex marriage also opposed abolition, women's suffrage, women's marital property rights, racial integration and interracial marriage on "deeply held religious" grounds.

As to the civil rights conundrum, ongoing independent scientific research - including a major California study released earlier this week -- continues to support the contention that sexual orientation is genetically

predisposed, and thus joining such other immutable identities such as race, gender, handedness and age. Do civil rights based on immutable identities trump civil rights based on personal choice, such as freedom of religious belief or political philosophy?

For humanity as a whole, the future of religion as we know it also is in flux. For 99% of the multi-millennial march of human progress, the world has been explained by shamans, priests and other holy men and women. (Don't forget, only the monotheists among that group thought a Supreme Being was talking directly to them.)

It's critical to comprehend that those explanations were not created in a vacuum. A terracentric cosmos, an agricultural understanding of human reproduction and sexuality, and a testosterone-dominated social hierarchy produce both world views and sacred texts that are at odds with that how we know the real world works today.

Only in the last 500 years - and especially in the last century and a half - has science corrected those core misconceptions, typically with sometimes-lethal dissent by organized religion. In the last 15 years alone scientists have even deciphered much of the brain chemistry and activity that produces so-called "religious experiences."

Organized religion has reacted accordingly. Darwin in essence begat 19th Century fundamentalism, whose "every Biblical word is true as written" tenet underpins the modern Christian evangelical movement and its pseudoscientific offspring such as "intelligent design" creationism and "reparative therapy" for homosexuals. Christian evangelicals may make up the overwhelming majority of the American social conservatives, but similar fundamentalist movements in organized Islam, Hinduism and other world religions also explain much of the muddle in the Middle East, the Indian subcontinent and perhaps even America's most recent day of infamy: 9/11.

As you may have noted, I have consistently referred to organized religion as opposed to personal philosophies of the primogenitors of the world's great religions (Abraham, Jesus, Mohammad, Buddha, Krishna, Confucius et. al.). There is a difference. History has clearly documented that religious institutions as a whole are more about power, control, influence and selfsustenance than they are about the genuine promotion of the philosophies that lie at the their foundations. Before you disagree, ask yourself this question: Do you really think the Roman Church needed more Cardinals, or was John Paul just stacking the deck for the next papal election?

Those who follow the Baha'i tradition like to point out that all of the world's great religions, from Wicca to New Age, hold within their various screeds one universal tenet: the Golden Rule. In that commonality, not in FRI or WCU propagandizing nor in Sullivan's civil catechizing, lays the ultimate resolution to not only the same-sex marriage issue, but also the future place of religion both in political dialogue and in the heart of all humankind. Sullivan and citizens of all political persuasions (not just social conservatives) should demand an answer to the question: what part of Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" don't you understand?"

Anyone up to asking Wisconisn's state senators, Tom Reynolds notwithstanding?





GBCT's "Glass Menagerie" Heralds Spate of Tennessee Williams Plays

t may seem hard to believe, but the genteel South is invading northeast Wisconsin just as the first snowflakes are set to fly. Theatrically, that is. Productions of four plays by Tennessee Williams in the Green Bay area in the next few months start with the Green Bay Community Theater (GBCT) production of "The Glass Menagerie" starting a 10-day run on November 5.

The Glass Menagerie is a classic of American drama, which premiered in Chicago in 1944. It marked the beginning of a 25-year period of great American dramas that form the core of our dramatic literature. It has been made into notable films, had Broadway revivals and has become a staple in the repertoire of theaters around the world.

The play captures the faded spirit of the old south with poetic dialogue that evokes a bygone era. The characters face the alienation of being lost in the increasingly urbanized America between the world wars.

In a Saint Louis tenement in the early 1930s, a family comes to grips with the limitations of their lives. Tom Wingfield, played by Bennett Reinhard, Abrams, is a would-be poet who works in a shoe warehouse but longs to travel the world. His handicapped sister Laura, Allie Klinker, Appleton, is afraid to venture out of their cramped apartment. Their domineering mother, Amanda, played by Terry Minor, Green Bay, dreams about her genteel past

on a southern plantation and frets over the lack of options facing her family. When Tom invites Jim, Adam Wills, Green Bay, an old friend from high school, to dinner, the visit leads to a disastrous family split.

The play is directed by Susan Currie. Willie Sabel is production designer, with costumes by Darrell George Wagner and Travis Lindburgh. L. Douglas Pire is stagemanaging.

Performances of the Glass Menagerie will be evenings at 7:30 p.m., with Saturday and Sunday matinees at 4 p.m. through November 15 at GBCT's playhouse, located at 122 North Chestnut Avenue, one block west of Broadway on Green Bay's near west side. Tickets are \$14 and can be purchased by calling the box office at (920) 435-6300. Opening night patrons are invited to a free reception catered by Kavarna and Wisconsin Public Radio after the performance on November 5.

The Green Bay Community Theater has been in operation for 68 years and at their current playhouse since 1996. However, the company has become highly visible since the hiring of Thom Yarnal as managing Executive Director of theater 1 _ years ago. IN Step recently spoke with Yarnal about the company, its heightened visibility into the northeast Wisconsin theater scene, the upcoming show and the mini-festival of Williams' plays.

IN Step: Are you the latest in a long line of directors?

Yarnal: There have been three others before me. One was for 37 years and one

was over eight. The GBCT mostly has had volunteers until recently.

What are the greatest accomplishments in your tenure thus far?

I think getting 22 new people on-stage in the last year — 22 making their stage debuts.

What is the Green Bay gay community's involvement with the GBCT at this point?

If we do a play about gays, they show up. If you don't they pretty much don't. (laughs)


You did do a gay-themed play this past summer, I know.

"The Benevolent Women's Craft

Society" had a gay male character. He was the only man (in the production). The play had an interesting twist: he was accused of sexually harassing a female student so he joined a woman's craft group to learn more about women. He felt isolated in his "bubble of homosexuality."

There was also an (independent) production of "The Laramie Project." The producers of that show were disappointed that there weren't that many people showing up. He thought that there would be an overwhelming response because it was a gay-themed play. He advertised the show in all the gay bars in the area. But I just don't think there's a theatergoing habit developed yet.

Even though there is LGBT support for the Weidner and the Fox





Cities Performing Arts Centers?

I think the theater habit for that kind of theater (exists). But the habit for the more intimate, more challenging - but ultimately more rewarding -- theaters that are on the fringe is not well established.

The biggest problem is what is called "barriers to entry." People who haven't done something are afraid to try something new. They're afraid to look silly or do something wrong. I think, without exception, once people come to this theater to see a show they come back. They find (the GBCT) is a very warm and inviting atmosphere. Plus the quality on stage is very good. At fourteen bucks, four of you can see a play here for what it would cost you to see a show at one of the big roadhouses.

Has the gay community been involved in the theater productions, or support the theater in other ways besides attending gay-themed productions?

Well, there are a lot of gay people who are in our plays, working backstage or working the theater.

Have there been any changes since you, as an openly gay director, have taken charge of the theater?

I think so. People pretty much didn't know about the organization. That's why I was hired: to get the name out there in the community.

So you're saying it was not just the gay community that was unaware of the GBCT?

(laughs) It was, pretty much, a wellkept secret. I was hired to change that. For example, our season this year is sponsored by four different sponsors. We're also working with the Oneida Nation to possibly do some original Naive American work in Fall, 2004.

We now have media partners, restaurant partners -- they didn't have any of that 18 months ago. The partner restaurant for the upcoming production is Kavarna, the vegetarian restaurant. They will cater the opening night party. We also work with the Coppertop. Titletown Brewery and Uprisings, all within walking distance of the theater

Are there other theater groups renting the GBCT facility?

Yes, this year we will have four different production companies renting space from us. Next year there will also be a poetry jam, and an art exhibition throughout the entire building. We also rent the theater out to community organizations.

Actually, we can rent to any producer who wants a 195-seat theater. This is a really great theater in which to see plays. At the Weidner Center, you need binoculars to see actors. Here you're up close and personal. It's a very nice, intimate setting.

Tell me a little bit more about theater, because it is a unique building.

Well, it used to be a Baptist church -I'm sure the founders are spinning in their graves! It was built in 1859. There was a community room built onto the side in 1910 where we have art exhibits. It's sort of semi-Gothic and it's really a warm and inviting environment to see a play.

The GBCT production is the first of four Tennessee Williams plays to be presented in northeast Wisconsin in the next few months.

The Montana Repertory Theater is coming in next spring at the Weidner with "A Streetcar Named Desire." (Prior to that) Evergreen Theater will be doing two shows

at St. Norbert College. "27 Wagons Full of Cotton" and "Suddenly Last Summer" are two of Tennessee Williams' more difficult plays. They're very rarely done, so it will be very interesting.

Suddenly Last Summer, of course, is a gay-iconic play made famous by the 1960s Elizabeth Taylor version. However, I suspect most readers don't know much about 27 Wagons Full of Cotton.

Its a dialogue between two adolescents sitting on a railroad track talking about life. It's more a character study.

Let's talk a little bit about the upcoming production of The Glass

A lot of high schools study the Glass Menagerie because it's an important work in the history of American theater. Tennessee Williams brought to the stage a lot of issues that had never been examined before.

It's a play that deals with loneliness, isolation, and maybe a little sexual frustration?

Absolutely. Each of the characters is searching. The mother is searching for a past that might possibly be made up. The young man, Tom, is searching for meaning. He works in a shoe warehouse and finds no meaning in his life. The daughter, Laura, is just searching for a way to get through life. She is afraid to even leave the apartment.

Both Tom and Laura have been considered by various theater scholars to be the "voice" of the playwright. Which would you pick?

I would pick Tom. Tom is the writer who writes poetry on shoe boxes and is about to be fired for doing that. Tennessee Williams had a younger sister who had health problems. I think he fashions the character Laura from his experiences with his sister.

The character of Amanda was his mother. I think Amanda is the center of the play. She will be played by Terry Miner. She's an actress who has worked all over northeastern Wisconsin. She has been seen before here, at Evergreen (Theater Company) and I think she's done things at the Attic (Community Theater in Appleton). She's a really seasoned performer and she'll do a great job.

All of the younger people are cast very young. They're all in their 20's (as Williams originally envisioned their ages). It will be interesting to see younger people doing the show. That kind of anxiety and wanderlust happens when you're in your 20's. Usually by your 30's, if you haven't followed that wanderlust, you're either an alcoholic or depressed! (laughs)


Anything final words that you'd like to add about the GBCT?

We do six shows a year during the regular season. What we try to do is to make sure that every single time that you come to the theater, your experience is completely different. We just did a musical comedy revue that had people laughing their asses off. The Glass Menagerie is a real tear jerker. We're doing a thriller later on this season and then a comedy. That will be the Wisconsin premiere of "Atomic Study" by the same author who wrote the Benevolent Women's Craft Society.

We're comparable to Off Broadway in New York. We want people to have an experience that will last longer than the two hours they're in the theater.

Lastly, we are a volunteer organization. People who are interested in working backstage, working on-stage should come - no experience is necessary. Experience helps, but it's not an absolute requirement. We are a community theater and we're very







Dan Boyle and Mark Zubro at Outwords Nov. 6

Milwaukee — It will be an evening of gay football and murdered boy band singers when authors Dan Boyle and Mark Zubro stop in at Outwords Books on Thursday, November 6 at 7 p.m.

"Huddle," a new novel by Dan Boyle, breaks all testosterone-charged gridiron stereotypes by confirming that football is a sport that not only can but is played by gay men and straight men alike. In his debut novel published this month by Haworth, Dan Boyle explores the lives of nine gay men as their team – the Quakes – vies for the West Los Angeles Flag Football Championship. The title, "Huddle," while describing the gathering of teammates on the field between plays, also depicts nine distinct, separate lives gathering together in camaraderie as a team.


Women Folk

n the last year of her life, the late June Carter Cash was the subject of much musical interest. Her 1999 album Play On was reissued and her final recording, Wildwood Flower (Dualtone) was also released. Husband Johnny Cash, who would follow her in death less than four months later, is one of a host of family members and friends who made guest appearances on this remarkable disc that like a field of wildwood flowers features a variety of blooms. Songs of hope ("Keep On The Sunnyside") and redemption ("Kneeling Drunkards Plea") are to be expected on a June Carter Cash album, but the real pleasures lie in the revelation of Ms. Cash's unique sense of humor, which we heard on Play On's "Tiffany Anastasia Lowe" (a song about her granddaughter whose parents are Carleen Carter and Nick Lowe). Here it surfaces on "Temptation" (featuring the "Little Junie Intro") and "Big Yellow Peaches" (with the "memories of Lee Marvin" intro). Every aspect of Ms. Cash's creativity will be greatly missed.

Something tells me that June Carter Cash would have appreciated The House Carpenter's Daughter (Myth America), the new album of traditional and contemporary folk music by Natalie Merchant. In fact, Merchant even covers "Bury Me Under The Weeping Willow," a Carter Family tune. Merchant's "long and hard" search for "a true definition of folk music"



led her to record this eleven track album which features songs from the twentieth century ("Sally Ann," "Which Side Are You One?," and "Crazy Man Michael") and also delves into the past for meaningful traditional numbers including "House Carpenter," "Owensboro," "Down On Penny's Farm," and "Poor Wayfaring Stranger."

Another Natalie, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia fiddler Natalie MacMaster is the cousin of out, gay fiddler Ashley MacIsaac. Like Natalie Merchant's disc, MacMaster's Blueprint (Rounder) features both traditional and contemporary compositions which ring out in a timeless manner via her sensational string work.

With the aid of Willie Nelson (and others), Carla Bozulich (of Ethyl Meatplow and The Geraldine Fibbers fame) recreates Nelson's acclaimed contemporary, yet traditional album 1975 album Red Headed Stranger (DiCristina Stair Builders). Her smoky and lived in voice is the perfect female counterpart to Nelsons's and her interpretations of these songs are definitely her own, giving the listener an opportunity to rediscover these songs (including "Time Of The Preacher," "Blue Eyes Crying In The Rain," "Can I Sleep In Your Arms?," and

Allison Moorer's sister Shelby Lynne has released one of the best studio albums of 2003. Moorer can also say that he has released one of the best live albums of 2003 with Show (Universal South). The live follow-up to her acclaimed 2002 studio disc Miss Fortune, Show contains five concert renditions of songs from that album including "Let Go," "Steal The Sun," "Yessirree," "Going Down" and "Dying Breed," as well as songs from both of her previous albums including the flawless "A Soft Place To Fall." A limited edition of Show also includes a DVD.

Speaking of things that are flawless, nearly thirty years into her major label recording career, Emmylou Harris remains at the forefront of female vocalists, and continues to reveal herself as a songwriter of note and depth. As on her 2000 album Red Dirt Girl, Harris rises to the occasion as both a singer and a songwriter on the tumbling, yet graceful Stumble Into Grace (Nonesuch). Stumble Into Grace is also something of a reunion album. Reunited with producer (and occasional co-songwriter) Malcolm Burn, Harris also works again with Daniel Lanois (producer of Harris's 1995 masterwork Wrecking Ball), Kate (Rufus Wainwright's mother) and Anna McGarrigle on "Little Bird" and "O Evangeline," Linda Ronstadt on "Strong Hand," and Jill Cunniff (formerly of Luscious Jackson). The addition of Jane Siberry on the songs "I Will Dream," "Time In Babylon," "Can You Hear Me Now," and "Lost Unto This World," only sweetens the pot. Stumble Into Grace is a career high in a career that has long been at a heavenly elevation.

Labelmates Claire Holley and Caitlin Cary are two more representatives of the female voice in the folk/Americana/insurgent country scene. Holley's Dandelion (Yep Roc) may open with the bluesy Southern rock belt of "6 Miles To McKenney," but a majority of the remaining tunes are smartly crafted pop songs that divulge a range of emotions. Outstanding cuts include the title track, "Henry's," "Waiting For The Whales," "Playground," "Tread Softly," and "Waving Goodbye."

Whiskeytown (and Ryan Adams) survivor Caitlin Cary received quite a compliment and boost when Joan Baez recorded her song "Rosemary Moore" (from her 2000 EP) for her new album Dark Chords On A Big Guitar. Cary herself also released an exceptional album in 2003 called I'm Staying Out (Yep Roc). Produced by ex-db and current LeTigre producer Chris Stamey, the album features appearances by Mary Chapin Carpenter (on "Empty Rooms," "The Next One," and "Lorraine Today"), Don Dixon ("Sleeping In On Sunday" and the title track) and Stamey and Dixon cohort Mitch Easter ("Cello Girl"). You would be wise to stay out with Cary.

CINEMA

"Mystic River"

e expect actor/director Clint Eastwood to understand the solitary nature of the panoramic plains of the old west but here turns his camera inward, into the souls of three lost boys in "Mystic River," just out this past weekend in theatres. The result is surprising; thoughtful, violent and painful.

The drama focuses on three former boyhood friends, Jimmy (Sean Penn), Dave (Tim Robbins) and Sean (Kevin Bacon). On one fateful day, the three lads were playing street hockey and engaging in such typical mischief as writing their names in some fresh sidewalk cement. They're caught by an angry man they believe is a policeman. While two of the boys are left to tell their parents of their misdeed, the man insists on driving home young Dave personally. Only the man is not a policeman and Dave was locked in a basement and presumably sexual abused before managing to escape after four days.

It is a moment that marked the rest of their lives, believes Jimmy

Jump thirty-some years and the three men are now merely nodding acquaintances. All have remained in their hometown of Boston and all are married, although

Sean's wife has disappeared. Jimmy appears to rule the old neighborhood from behind the counter of the little corner grocer he owns. Dave is the caring father to a cute little boy but continues to flash back to the day when he got into the stranger's car and everything changed.

The brutal murder of Jimmy pretty, vivacious daughter Katie (Emmy Rossum) bring together these former friends, proving to be another of those oh-so fateful moments where nothing can ever be the same again.

Although Brian Helgeland's screenplay based upon Dennis Lehane's novel is ostensibly a whodunit, director Eastwood is far more concerned his characters painful journeys than simply offering a puzzling murder mystery for his audience.

The business of "Mystic River" is all about the shattering of facades. Jimmy seems to have it all, his own business, a lovely wife (Laura Linney) and three daughters with Katie his favorite. Yet Katie was not the happy, perfect daughter Jimmy had believed. Secretly, she planned to elope with her boyfriend Brendan (Tom Guiry), a nice kid with whom Jimmy held some unusual grudge. Sean is a successful police detective but visibly crumbles whenever his wife calls - which she seems to do daily - yet always refusing to speak with him. Dave might have a nice family but is clearly a damaged soul, the way he ambles about, he is sure to be a suspect in any local murder case and is so in the death of Jimmy's daughter Katie.


While both Sean and Jimmy seek out Katie's killer, Eastwood paints a bleak picture of lives filled with grief, pain and regret. The reunion of the three childhood friends should be more emotionally charged but isn't. Eastwood leaves his youthful protagonists at the moment the car takes Dave away, leaving his three adult protagonists in something of a vacuum.

As harrowing an experience as is Dave's abduction, Eastwood clearly blames Dave's tortured life on the abuse at the hands of his abductors rather than find fault with the subsequent betrayal by his two friends the film dares only to hint at.


Fleshing out these characters is an extraordinary cast. Sean Penn dominates in the showy role of Jimmy Markum while Kevin Bacon does a nice job anchoring the film with his stalwart detective, Sean. Best of all are Eastwood's supporting players. Laura Linney easily holds her own against screen hubby Penn with a performance of pure steel. Eli Wallach is hilarious as a liquor store owner while Kevin Chapman and Adam Nelson are a strangely cuddy pair as the aptly named Savage brothers.


Only Eastwood's finale feels false. As if worried that moviegoers would leave the cinema too depressed, Eastwood throws in a parade. With the sun is shining, seemingly for the first time in the film, all the lives but one are shown back on track. Or are they?



"DATING THE GREEK GODS"



The author of Finding the Boyfriend Within has now written another self-help book about the qualities of the Greek gods. The temptation is to reach for this book hoping that one will be able to date god-like men. Sorry, guys. This book is about "empowering spiritual messages on sex and love, creativity and wisdom."

Gooch selects six of the gods and attributes to them qualities of wisdom, sensuality, communication, creativity, love and power. The last chapter concerns the Oracle Within. He writes a brief modernized background for each god and then discusses that god's particular quality and suggests relevant applications to one's life. Each chapter has one or two exercises in which to practice this quality.

For instance, the god Dionysius is portrayed as a kind of bad boy who inspires us to change our appearances to discover something new about ourselves. In one exercise Gooch suggests to dress, behave or think in a way that runs counter to what one would normally do. The suggestion is not to do dangerous things, but to find something that may have some relevance



in one's life. Gooch suggests that sometimes changes in behavior open up new experiences and thought processes that may affect positive change.

Gooch's take on the Oracle Within concerns an inner voice that represents a truth each of us experiences. He portrays the Socratic method of finding answers by asking questions. Through dialogue the oracle within each person becomes revealed. This can work for oneself; it can also work with a group of people. Imagine a Socratic Party. One could invite people to talk about anything they wanted to. Each person could offer comments without raining on anyone's parade. Maybe out of that mess an oracle could be speaking. Well, it might be fun anyway.

As in his previous book, Gooch's style is simple, but what he writes contains thought-provoking exercises, on-target insights and a modern way of appreciating the ancient gods. It may seem a reach to base one's spirituality on the mythologies of the ancient gods. What Gooch achieves is a contemporary version of these stories that is well within the ethics and personal morality of today's mainline religions. His take is just more fun.




Dear Rosie,




