LESBIANS DO GET AIDS

According to two lesbians from Minneapolis. (as reported by Susan Galeota in Equal Times, November 23. 1988) there are about 400 lesbians across the country who are HIV-positive. The Center for Disease Control says there are only nine. The article says the discrepancy in numbers comes from the way women are cat-"Statistically. egorized. women are known solely by their relationships with men--married or single. The identified lesbians nine are only known as such because the sexual preference information was somehow relaved to the CDC--it is never asked of women."

This concerns Carol La Favor and Cindy Zegers, two members of Spirits Alive, a Twin Cities network of people involved with AIDS prevention and helping those with AIDS. La Favor has AIDS. La Favor and Zegers have traveled extensively. and it was during these travels that they picked up the anecdotal information that led them to the conclusion that there are 400 lesbians with AIDS.

The article goes on to sav: "The CDC's denial of lesbian and bisexual women muddies the statistical waof ters woman-to-woman transmission. The CDC lists only one documented case of woman-to-woman transmission of the virus; it involved traumatic S/M sexual practices where blood was exchanged. Zegers and La Favor have heard of eight Cases of woman-to-woman transmission in their travels--and these did not involve traumatic sexual practices."

Gay/Lesbian Events 1989 is a book that makes available to the gay/lesbian community a listing of more than 400 events taking place across the United States in 1989, plus an almanac section to inform readers and preserve our growing gay/lesbian heritage. Publishers say the impetus for the publication came from the 1987 March on Washington, "After the way the straight press blatantly ignored our communities historic March on Washington D.C. in October 1987, it became obvious that the only way to ensure that our history is recorded and preserved is to do it ourselves," says Editorial Director Danni Munson. "And so we have begun with this edition to assemble an annual almanac of current gay/lesbian history.

The Almanac Section commemorates the 20th anniversary of the birth of the modern gay/leshian rights movement with a look at 1969 and the conditions that gave rise to the Christopher Street riots. Other articles include a discussion of books with a chart of the year's best sellers, a section of laws and legislation with tables of the status of state, county, and municipal laws affecting gays and lesbians, as well as articles summing up the year's major activities in politics and religion.

The section listing events has more than 400 upcoming activities ranging from





Kiki Zeldes' tape, Lifetime Commitment: A Portrait of Karen Thompson, is a chronicle of Thompson's struggle to maintain contact with her lover who has been declared legally incompetent after a car accident injury. Thompson's transformation from a non-political, closeted lesbian to an outspoken activist is a moving testament to the need for lesbian rights legislation. Just Because of Who We Are, documents violence targeted at Lesbians. Su Frederich's Damned If You Don't is a controversial film, which is an evocative portrait of a nun fighting a losing battle with her sexuality (Editor's note: or perhaps it is a winning battle).
