



And as they left, the players and spectators passed on their thanks to Wayne Bernhagen and his Wreck Room staff for making this year's classic a success.



SHADOWS IN MILWAUKEE

Who would ever think that one of the best American restaurants serving old fashioned American food would be a small 45-seat, gay-owned, and operated restaurant and bar, located at 2nd and National in Milwaukee called Shadows.

Chicago has nothing like Shadows. San Francisco has nothing better than Shadows. And Boston, Philadelphia, Toronto, and New York have no gay restaurant to surpass Shadows.

When Frank Thalacker, the owner, last February took over the bar Shadows and added a restaurant, he thought he was going into a good business and doing something needed in Milwaukee.

He had no idea that he was setting up a restaurant that would be the talk of traveling gays throughout the network from San Francisco, to Toronto, New York and Chicago.

Why in Milwaukee? Why Shadows? Most gay restaurants are either too loose or too uptight.

When they are loose, everyone feels free to camp it up, party and be outrageous. But no one feels the food should be clean or hot.

Oh isn't that waiter cute dancing on the table. And because it is gay-owned and operated, and we are still cousins together, we are supposed to overlook the burnt toast, the overcpoked vegetables, and the worm crawling on our lettuce.

When they are uptight, you and your lover are never to hold hands for fear you will give away the owner's secret. And you are not to complain because you are in an award winning, nationally recognized Top 10 linen napkin restaurant: and so what if the food is as cold as the atmosphere, the portions are as thin as the waiter, and the price and time they let you eat are

a pure hustle.

Shadows in Milwaukee is just right: the atmosphere is open and loosely gay; the food is warm, American, and excellent in every detail, and the prices are a bargin for everybody.

Frank follows the tradition of Milwaukee bar owners: they live with their customers, they don't exploit them. In Milwaukee you have to stay friendly to stay in business: there are not that many tourists to rip off.

Shadows is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner, 7 days a week, 11 to 11, and the bar stays open til 2.

Ricky, the Milwaukee Mick Jagger, and Joe, the Milwaukee Clark Kent, are sweeheart bartenders. They are great guys to wait around with until there is a table for dinner, and great guys to have after-dinner drinks with.

Dale is a courteous waiter. And Mark and Jack are real down home cooks: you won't get better cooked eggs and hunks of ham, pork chops, and steaks, and broccoli in any restaurant,

That's the point. Shadows is a first rate restaurant first, and a first rate place for gays.

Guys come in business suits for a working lunch, or in softball uniforms and cleats for breakfast before the games and lunch and drinks after.

Breakfasts and lunches run around \$3; dinners between \$5 and \$9.

Frank realized that a lot of gays live semi-transient lives and he wants them to have a well-balanced meal they can afford.

He is generous with his blue cheese dressing and sour cream.

His desserts of hot apple pie or cheese cake will make you forget your last trick.

And if you go to Milwaukee as a visitor, you will probably find that Shadows will be your home base there too.

Lockner: "I'm just an average guy"

Recently, Dan Di Leo had the opportunity to interview Clint Lockner, one of the new Colt Studios models, while Lockner was in Chicago for a personal appearance at the MR. REDOUBT Contest, Lockner, 35, 6 feet, 175 lbs, has sandy brown hair, green eyes, and he admitted, nine inches. He grew up in Detroit, and joined the U.S. Navv when he was 18. After four and a half years in the Navy, he switched to the Marine Corps. Following his military career, he joined a police department in California. (Lockner asked that the name of the department be withheld for personal reasons). While a cop he worked uniform patrol duties, juvenile, narcotics, homocide, burglary, theft, auto theft and vice-specifically bookmaking. He resigned in September. 1979

DI LEO: Did you like the police department?

LOCKNER: I loved it. Fantastic. I met a lot of nice, hot people.

DI LEO: Why did you quit?

LOCKNER: I quit because of the attitude of the police department. The attitudes were prejudicial against just about every minority with gays being number one on the list.

DI LEO: Are you talking about the police department itself or the men in the department?

LOCKNER: The men themselves. The cops on the department were among the most honest you could find; however their attitudes toward minorities left a lot to be desired.

DI LEO: Why do you think that is?

LOCKNER: I think it's their own insecurity-the insecurity of their own masculinity. Being a cop, after all, is a macho trip, and I would say that the majority of the guys who go on a police department, whether they'll admit it or not-and they may never admit it, not even to themselves-do it because it is a macho trip. They get off on it; they like that macho image. And in fact, there's not a single cop that I worked with that didn't point out every girl walking down the street, saying how he would like to lay that specific girl. And it gets to be pretty annoying. No other person in any other profession that you meet anywhere does that to that extent. And it's nothing more than to prove their masculinity. So, it's my opinion that they are just expressing their own insecurities. Otherwise they wouldn't be taking out their hostilities on the weakest point they can focus on-the gays, who as far as the law is concerned, are almost defenseless.

Di LEO: Do they see in gays the exact opposite of what they are trying to be?

Yeah, in a lot of cases. But I would say, there might even be a form of identification there that makes them jealous. There's a freedom there, they (gay people) are enjoy-

belie people's image of a porn star; I mean, generally people think they have a hot body, and that's it.

LOCKNER: I went to Ventura College for two years and I majored in English. I tried very hard to get into college after I got out of high school, instead of going into the service, but I couldn't afford it, my parents couldn't afford it. So I had no other choice but to go into the service. While in the service. I went to night school and managed to accomplish two years of English and the rest was all done through correspondence courses. I do not have a degree, but I think it is important for people to be able to communicate at any level. When I was on the police department, for

example, I might have to deal with a kid from the slum who had a poor educational background. I would talk with him on a different level than I am right now with you. I look at people for what they are. If I meet somebody, I can tell instantly whether or not I like that person. If I don't like them, I just feel that this person, no matter what I say or do. is not going to try to be a friend. He'll be attacking me one way or the other because of the pornography or the police department connection or whatever.
