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Legally Speaking by Ron Ehemann

I've met very few people who like war. Even ignoring the human suffering and loss of life, war (as they say) is hell. When asked why he fought WWI, my grandfather replied, "so my children wouldn't have to fight." Unfortunately, my father gives the same answer about WWII, and we've seen Korea and Vietnam since then. Their replies nonetheless say something about the concept of our understanding of military duty.

When you stop to think, the military is based upon a concept of giving of vourself for the protection of others . . . defense afterall requires something or somebody to be defended.

It is not surprising for me to read that a Sargeant Miriam Ben-Shalom or Leonard Matlovich, two products of the military system, have decided to

take that very system on . . . to fight a discharge based upon homosexuality. Just as they were prepared for war, they entered a battle certain to take its toll on both emotional and financial resources. I choose to believe they did so to defend their gay brothers and lesbian sisters who for one reason or another do not feel the ability to openly defend themselves.

In September (Matlovich) and again in November (Ben-Shalom), those two battles were won. We, as gay people, should celebrate those victories. At the same time, it is important to keep in mind that one can win a battle only to lose the war.

The same newspaper which brought me news of the settlement offer in Len Matlovich's case contained a story about eleven men and one woman who were discharged from their duties at the Defense Language Institute in California because their "homosexuality in a military environment seriously (impaired their combat readiness, efficiency, security, and morale." Eight enlisted men at Malmstrom AFB in Montana were discharged because the Air. Force states, "homosexuals cannot meet Air Force standards of conduct or the moral standards of the service." I had heard that sometimes one guy puts his cock inside another guy's asshole. But that's disgusting. How does it fit. An asshole is too small for a cock the size of George's. It must be

painful. A man and a woman, yes, Her hole is the right size. But a man and a man, nothing fits, and that's why it is unnatural.

It was a horrible night. George ended up beating me off, while he beat himself off. It was so mechanical. And I felt so dirty the next day.

It's not just your kind of sex that bothers me either. It's gay life that bothers me. What do two guys do together a whole lifetime?

I can see being roommates for a while. But two guys can't make a home. It's not like a man and a wife. You don't have children to raise, a home to make. What do you do a whole lifetime? How can you be just roommates with someone all your life?

There are some guys who think they are women, I know. And they wear



makeup and dresses and walk funny.

But they are definitely sick. Any psychiatrist will tell you that. They don't know who they are. A man who thinks he is a woman is sick. How could you have a stable life with someone like that?

I know you are not that kind, Jim, and you wouldn't run around with that kind. But you've got to think of your future. Who will live with you when you are 40. Gays are into all that young stuff. No one can live the gay life after 40.

Gay is supposed to be happy, but when you took me on your tour of gay bars all I saw was sad people. Fat old men with no one to talk to. And young guys so stuck on themselves no one would want to talk to them.

Sad, silly people, who mis-name themselves gay. That's what I saw.

There was that Timmy who thought he was so cool and so hot and so everything. He was going to Florida on Friday. He was going to San Francisco on Monday. He was in love with this one. He was in love with that one. It was all bullshit. He was already a drug and alcohol abuser at 20. Who would want him?

Then there was that Larry, the big construction worker who insisted I was going home with him because I had been with him a month ago. I had never been in a gay bar in my life, 'til I came in with you to see what thy were like. And this jerk insists I've had sex with him.

Jim, I've tried to understand your world—but it just seems to me that the gay world is a bunch of people going nowhere. Sure, they know their music, they know their drugs, they know how to party—but what else do they know? What else do they do? With their lives, I mean—I don't find a death trip very interesting.

I know that Anita Bryant has changed her tune and now says some gays—like you, Jim—the quiet ones are OK. And that we should live and let live.

But Jim, you are my older brother, they guy I have always looked up to and it hurts me to know you have taken on this lifestyle that is (1) unnatural, (2) unhealthy, (3) going nowhere but into suicide or loneliness. It's a downer life. With Dad's connections you could be a big lawyer in this city someday, maybe even governor of the state. It makes no sense to me that you would throw it all away for a frivolous life of selfish pleasure.

When you were sitting across the table from me at Thanksgiving, all I could think of was my brother is a queer. I have to be honest with you Jim, when you touch me now, it feels creepy.

It's not the same between us. And we can't pretend that it will be the same.

I'm telling you how I feel. I won't talk to anyone about it anymore. You still have time to change back. Think it over, Jim. Do you want to live your whole life that way?

Sure, I will always be your little brother. I will never turn you away, but it won't be the same. I'm really sorry. I can't accept it. You don't have to be that way. Why do you have to live wrong, when there is nothing wrong with you?

Well, that's how I feel anyway. I don't want to hurt you, but I also don't want you to think it can be the same between us when it won't.

Last night I prayed that my brother would come back to me like he was before. I love you a lot, but I cannot in my heart accept this strange lifestyle you have taken on.

God Jim, why do things have to be so difficult?

Q AND A ON MUSIC

Q: In your Music - Mystification article you say modern rock words show departures from the usual old themes. Then you quote from Psychedelic Furs', "we will dance alone and live our useless lives india stupid on the carpet floor . . ." But calling life useless is surely an old theme!

A: You have a point. However, the old theme I had in mind was mainly the lament over lost or impossible love. Almost all songs through the ages have been on this topic. When rock came along, protest was added as a theme. In later rock there is an expression of the mechanization of mankind. We find this in Kraftwerk and in Gary Newman, for example. In punk rock there is a lot of nihilism, including a negative view of love as in the Furs. which is a very good group by the way. This at least causes us to look into the whole matter.

Don't forget, sometimes negativity expresses positive energy. It's great to dance to the Sex Pistols' sarcastic song

"Emi," for instance. The energy in punk dance comes as a celebration of a breakthrough and should not be seen as destructive, at least not in essence. It's not the negativity of lying back and giving up.

When you dance to Cerrone's great "Supernature" you might think it's incongruous to be happily energetic about monsters taking over the earth. What gives you the power is that something exploitative, in this case pollution, has been identified - something out of the ordinary has happened. So you celebrate a victory.

Q: Are there any other kinds of lyrics, positive in a different way?

A: One example of the positive is a liberal view of sexuality and gender, as in the Kinks' "Lola" and Bowie's "Rebel, Rebel," There are also songs that contradict the usual depressed attitude about love; not enough credit is given to two big contributions of disco: celebration of eroticism and overcoming lost love. For example there are Donna Summer's "Love to Love You Baby," "Try Me, I Know We Can Make It," and "I Feel Love"; Gloria Gaynor's "I Will Survive"; and Patrick Hernandez' "Born To Be Alive."

Q: You also mentioned made-up words and wrote: "the more meaningless you can be the less reference there is to dead attitudes and nowhere values." Could you clarify this?

A: I said I wish someone would set Gertrude Stein to New Wave music. She uses simple sentences, incremental repetitions and variations on grammatical constructions, and references to everyday objects instead of to the

"great themes" of most literature. This her, and she was delighted. gives us something different, something out of the ordinary, which is always needed.

I mentioned the made-up words in Oldfield's "Ommadawn" and in some of the European electronic rock. This is going to be the next great advance in lyrics. There are several examples of coming out, of utterly baffling words with no depressing connotations some of the Residents' "words" on "Diskomo" are examples.

Q: What about all the violence in ding.

A: I don't like it. First, usually if no one interferes with the celebrants there is no violence. The cult of Dionvsus was like this. Second, people are trying to create something different and all some of them can think of is violence, which isn't really different at all, so they are mistaken. Third, some of the violence only looks like violence. Patti Smith gyrating on stage, shaking and moving and trashing is not Mother Kail trampling indiscriminately on the world destroying it for the sake of sheer dynamism. She is restoring energies, and it is bad forces, big money, bad taste, commercialism, designer styles, depressing attitudes, and so on that are being criticized and destroyed. It's energy to exercize violence, not to be violence.

THE ALTERNATIVE TO ERICA

A great scene on All My Children the other day keeps coming to my mind. Erica recently got a quickie divorce from her curly-haired suit-and-tie husband. He kept wanting her to have a baby while she was busy secretly reconstructing her modeling career after the failure of her disco. Eventually all the lies came out, he was through with

Just before one of those frequent weddings of some other characters, quest Erica is shown saying her usual utterly tactless things to the sweet bride as she "helps" her upstairs. The bride finally gets rid of her helper and, reduced to a nervous state, tells another character how unfeeling, uncaring, and insensitive Erica is. Meanwhile, Erica goes happily downstairs and lets in an elderly, white-haired, avuncular gentleman all dressed up for the wed-

She proceeds to tell him all about her modeling career, the latest fashions she is wearing, how important she is in New York. At one point, she exults about the money, squeezing her shoulders together, looking up toward heaven, and saying something like, "In fact, I don't think anybody is making as much money as I am!"

She seems perplexed when the gentleman expresses little memory of her disco, to which she says, "everybody



came!" He is utterly uninterested in her attempts to impress him with these "important" people. He nods his head politely with a little mugging aside in despair and boredom.

This classic Erica scene, topped off by her answering the door to admit some other woman and saying rudely, "What are you doing here!" Of course the truth is that Erica has only been invited out of some social necessity or decency, whereas the newcomer is a real friend! Erica never seems to have even the slightest idea that nobody likes her or wants to have anything to do with her, including her own mother.

Most people who watch All My Children live for the Erica and Phoebe (formerly Tyler) scenes (Phoebe is rich; spoiled, snobbish, rude, and often foolish monster played with savage brilliance by Ruth Warwick). The alternatives to Erica and Phoebe are boring

and dreary. And there are a few villians who come and go, but who are too brutish to be interesting.

Most of the alternatives are interested only in home and family. They have absolutely no interests in life other than how junior is doing, how the baby is, and isn't it too bad that everybody is getting a divorce, but maybe they'll find true love this time. Quite a few of them are promiscuous, but they don't approve of it; they only do it when they're drunk or depressed! They smugly celebrate virtues they aren't really interested in. They never do anything themselves; they only react to Erica and Phoebe and the villians. One hopes never to meet them in real life. but real life is filled with them.

Of course, one also hopes not to meet too many Ericas in real life, but they are interesting on the tube. Erica's utter selfishness and total disregard of others, her self-importance, arrogance, and unrealistic attitudes — and her beauty — are all things that the child in us can well identify with. And the child in us is the fun part. Besides, Erica has style, flair, and energy. No wonder we love Erica.

Most of the people who love to watch her are, however, more like the dull characters in their actual behavior and attitudes. What the soap operas have failed to do is introduce a character who, like Erica, could have something like a modeling career or other interest, and yet not be presented as evil if they weren't also interested in true love and/or babies.

Even a motherly type who also had a life aside from the usual would help. When such a character seems to come along she is usually shown as ultimately conforming. In short, the soap operas are failing to raise the consciousness of the very people who need it to come to life: those who are home all day.
