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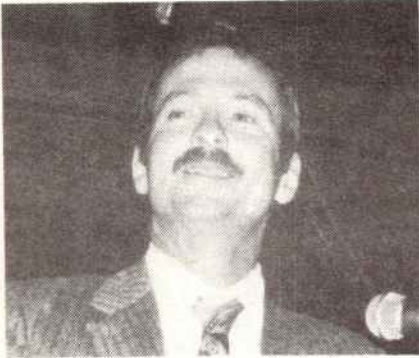
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CELEBRATION '81 — OUR CHALLENGE



Leonard Matlovich

"As long as you believe you are not good enough, society will put you down! We are our own worst enemy!" With that stated, Leonard Matlovich proceeded to encourage and challenge all those present and those not present in the Grand Ballroom at UWM during CELEBRATION '81.

Over 265 people participated in the event September 16th. Keynote speakers Matlovich and Karla Dobinski were joined by PANAMA, a Chicago Jazz group. 12 Milwaukee clubs and organizations set up tables of information for all guests to view prior to the opening.

Telegrams of support were read from Member of Congress Henry Reuss; National Gay Task Force Executive Director Lucia Valeska; Metropolitan Community Church founder, the Reverend Troy Perry; Gay Rights National Lobby Director Steve Endean and from Jean O'Leary, President of the National Association of Business Councils and Director of Gay Rights Advocates.

As part of the evenings activities \$600 was raised by those in attendance to help liquidate the remaining deficit for the over \$2,000 budgeted for the event.

All participants were asked to complete a survey which will be tabulated by volunteers. This information will be used to guide the potential development of a Coalition for Greater Milwaukee.

Karla Dobinski, a NGTF Board member and Madison lesbian/feminist lawyer reported that the often-spoken-of "Family Protection Act" is a "66 page oppression list of the new right." She went on to warn that while many groups in this country are complaining about this omnibus bill, many organizations seem willing to fight only for their positions and concerns and leave gays out! She stated: "Unless you organize among yourselves, like many of you are trying to do now, and then make certain that you effectively network with other non-gay groups, gay people will certainly be the sacrificial lambs to the new right!"

In Wisconsin, Dobinski urged listeners to actively support Assembly Bill 70, which will be brought forth in the Assembly in October. This bill, if passed, will be the first bill of its kind, to protect gays statewide! However, she continued, "unless you write to your area legislator and keep up on the issue, it won't have much of a chance."

Matlovich, who presently operates a business in the Russian River resort area of California, recalled a story that he had been told about an older lesbian woman who was part of a long protest march. A younger woman asked her, "Ann, after all this walking aren't you tired? Wouldn't you prefer to ride?" And to this the elder lesbian responded, "my feet may be very tired, and my hands are very sore, but my soul is rested because I am giving everything I have for gay liberation!"

Most significantly Matlovich challenged everyone in the room to "Come Out of the Closet! You have nothing to be ashamed of! You are good, moral, loving and deeply compassionate people." He went on to conclude, "what the people like Jerry Falwell are most worried about is your virtues. People like Falwell love to see the news stories about our bad side, but they don't want to see that we are bank presidents, doctors, editors, and valedictorian students, etc. gaining positive press because of our virtues. We must stand up and proclaim: I am GOOD and I have a right to be here."

Jean blues



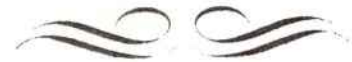

In addition, over 90% take one or more vacations each year. To add to the picture, over 55% order liquor by brand name. Nationally, 82% are readers of gay oriented publications and say they make a special attempt to patronize businesses and buy products

advertised in gay publications.

How do you spend your money? What per cent goes to eating out or entertaining in? What goes to support your alcohol, drug or other habits? How much is in your bank? Private investments? Auto? Vacations? Continuing education?

Perhaps the hardest question is: What per cent of your annual income goes to support Gay/Lesbian non-profit groups or churches who work to provide support for us?

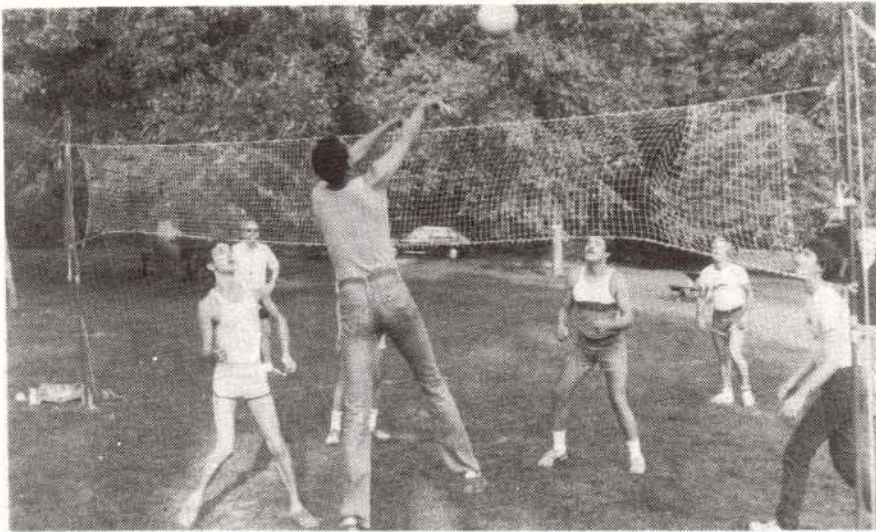

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Something Old, Something New

At one time or another almost everyone has wanted to save or collect something that is old and out of date. Many times the condition of the item is deplorable and the question of whether it is worth saving or not is to be considered.

Worth is, of course, first determined by the owner but to realize a profit at collecting it is important that others also share the same sense of value. An old coin could have value because of scarcity of mintage, monetary or historical value or because of personal significance but an agitator from an old washing machine could be of little appeal to anyone except those who might have the correct type of machine for which the part is needed. Thus, we have now defined "range of interest".

The wider the range of interest or appeal, the greater the value. Take the washing machine for example: If it were made of copper in 1910 and still

We can see that most machines didn't survive and chances are good that the demand will be far greater than the supply which will not only mean immediate value but investment value: this will be the topic in our next issue.

What could be more perfect?

I wouldn't wear one on Wisconsin Avenue on a bet, much less "down by" Mitchell Street but in a plum color with buff lettering, with chinos and a smart pair of loafers it could get you immediate seating in the Coffee Trader.

No, no, I take it all back. It is cheap and tasteless and will only cause red-neck fag bashers to dump on the less macho-looking among us. We need options, something subtle, something your mother could wash and not understand: small, white letters on camel, a la "All American Boy". How about "They don't call it Cream City for nothing." I know. It's not brilliant, but it's obscure. You could wear it to a family picnic and claim ignorance.

If there is any point to this rambling, it is that gentle and not so gentle, peaceful prodding is necessary if our cause is to advance. A Lambda lapel pin, a too-bright color, or perhaps just an honest grin and a wink as you pass a beautiful straight person of the same sex may be your small raindrop causing a gentle ripple on the pool of life.

The Underground Gourmet

Who would have thought that a southside bar-restaurant would make it big on the gourmet scene. But then, anything Tony Harvey is involved in inevitably succeeds.

Tony is the proprietor of Rent-A-Chef, the catering outfit that does so many of the eastside's poshest parties, not to mention Paul De Marcos' fifth anniversary party at the Club Baths (a smashing success).

Well, not knowing what else to do with his time or boundless energy, Tony Harvey has just redone a bar on South Eighth Street into Mike and Anna's — a very intimate pub and dining room. Open every day and serving until about midnight, one is apt to find any of several types of diners.

The locals enjoy the simpler dishes and generally eat early. The Eastsiders, in their designer-labeled outfits and their status-symbol cars line up in front, show up later in the evening, as well as Tony's die-hard fans and friends, many in very casual seasonal attire. Gays have already discovered Mike and Anna's and are very well represented in both clientele and staff.

The standard menu is very basic, obviously to please the neighbors and the very late night (supper) crowd. Expect to find the usual assortment of fried chicken, pasta, hamburgers, fish fry and barbecued chicken and ribs. Also expect to find them better prepared than at most places.

But the best selections are listed on a blackboard in the dining room and are truly creative. One recent visit fea-

tured entrees including Petrale (in the flounder family) flambayed with triple sec, Trout with Cashews, Chicken Vesuvio, Liver with Apricot Brandy and Rack of Lamb Provencale. Prices ranged from \$6.95 to \$10.00. Not bad for a good meal.

Quality is not yet consistent but has improved since the restaurant's opening. Don't go expecting too much (Milwaukee Journal's critic notwithstanding, this is not yet one of the city's finest). Plan on a relaxing, informal meal with some interesting dishes and you should go away pleased and not too poor either.

The wine list is the weakest link. Definitely not one of Tony's specialties, the list looks like it was put together by a wine supplier more interested in having his wines represented than in helping his client offer a variety of wines as good as the food.

Service is very casual. Don't go expecting liveried waiters, table-side service or any consistent practice in the art of American table service and you won't be disappointed. The staff is friendly and eager to please although unpolished.

The atmosphere is warm and cozy and tastefully done although the fluorescent glare from the kitchen was quite distracting and on busy nights the tables seem too close together.

All in all, Mike and Anna's is a nice operation run by a talented chef that should do very well. Give it time and support.

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MONEY TALK

Government Borrowing and High Interest Rates

In the last column, I indicated that the potential for a liquidity crisis before year end existed. Signs that it is developing are already beginning to appear. But, first, what is a liquidity crisis?

Simply, when the demand for money is greater than the supply, liquidity dries up. When this imbalance between supply and demand persists, the price of any commodity rises and stays high. In the case of money, interest rates go up and stay high. This will continue until the supply and demand relationship becomes balanced. For this to occur either the amount of money available for borrowing must increase or the demand must decline.

It is unlikely that the supply of money available for borrowing will increase dramatically soon. The Federal Reserve Board has repeatedly stated its intention to slowly **reduce** the money supply growth rate. So far, they have been good to their word. The monetary base has grown at a 6.4% annual rate over the last year. Bank reserves in the last year have grown 5.1%. Both of these growth rates are down 8% plus growth rates of last summer as the Federal Reserve Board responded to pressure from Jimmy Carter to force interest rates lower.

The demand for money has been exploding. Since April, 1981, business loans have been expanding at a 25% annual rate. When comparing this demand rate with the supply rate, it is

easy to see why interest rates have not declined as so many experts have been predicting.

Most experts have predicted interest rates would decline as the economy slowed and the demand for money would then be reduced. The economy has slowed down as measured by the drop in G.N.P. for the second quarter. However, in the beginning of a recession, demand for money increases. This occurs as businessmen do not cut production as quickly as sales begin to decline. The result is reduced cash flow as they must still pay for materials and labor even as revenues decline from lower sales.

Before laying off employees and reducing production, the business man goes to his banker to make up the difference. It is only after he has reduced production and inventory that his need for cash declines.

If his credit rating is ok, he could issue bonds. But, the bond market is a shambles. If the bond market believed that inflation had been whipped and that the government had control over its deficits, then this most important outlet would be viable. Why isn't it?

The markets do not believe the promises of reduced deficits. The result is that the government takes a bigger and bigger share of the capital raised each year. In 1970, the Federal, State, and Local governments absorbed 10% of the total capital raised. This year that will rise to 45%.

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The result is that there is not enough money to go around, if the Federal Reserve Board is to achieve their money supply targets. If they loosen to accommodate the demand, inflation will rise and the government will lose whatever credibility it has left.

It is imperative that the deficits be reduced now. If not, the present liquidity squeeze could develop into a liquidity crisis.

The signs of the squeeze are all around us. The best return available today is cash. Money Market Funds yield 18% on average. No one wants to commit money for more than 30 days. Why buy 30 year government bonds at 15% when 18% is available. Real estate is dead. Volume is less than half of what it was a year ago. Amazingly, 25% of the deals made fell through because the buyer either can't get financing or sell his own property. The stock market is plunging, reflecting the lack of confidence in the bond market plus the competition from Money Market Funds. Gold has been dull. Who needs gold as an inflation hedge when a dollar at 18% doubles in four years?

What should you do? Get liquid as much as possible. Do not buy real estate. One sign that the liquidity squeeze is turning into a crisis would be if 90-day treasury bills begin to yield more than 17%. At that point, it might even be wise to get into a Money Market Fund that buys only Government issues. My best guess is that the October/November period will be most critical. That is when the treasury will be doing the bulk of its borrowing for the fourth quarter and the pressure on the bond market will be the greatest.

GAY MEDICINE

The most common disease transmitted by gay men to one another is gonorrhea. Despite this fact, there is still much ignorance and misconception about this disease. It is not transmitted by lesbians. Oral and rectal infections are acquired by both men and women. This whole subject is really immense and it may take me from four to five articles to completely cover it. Yet I feel everyone should be equipped with this knowledge to take good care of their own health and the health of those they care enough about to share physical intimacy.

In this article I wish to concentrate not on the infections themselves so much as the feelings and attitudes the infection stirs up in us. For they frequently lead to delay in treatment and a lot of personal suffering which is unnecessary. The first group of feelings I wish to discuss is the guilt group. People feel shame and guilt when they get gonorrhea — almost as if they had been caught by mother that first time while having sex. Some say it makes them feel dirty.

Gonorrhea has nothing to do with being dirty but everything to do with having sex. The "dirty" inner city youth having the same amount and type of sex has no greater chance of getting gonorrhea than does the Fox Point youth. When guilt, shame, and feeling dirty come up, we need to look at where they came from for each of us. For some they came from religion and sex education, for some from mother, and for some from the general attitude of society. All of these feelings are inaccurate and need to be corrected. Sexual behavior is normal human behavior. Gonorrhea is an infection needing treatment as soon as possible.

The second feeling is anger — "that bastard gave it to me." Now I don't believe in swallowing anger but hold off a minute. Your partner is sexually active and obviously you are too. So what difference does it make who gave it to whom. I'll tell you what does make a difference — **not** telling someone whom you got it from or gave it to. Everyone must be told. So no one's health suffers the serious complications of the disease.

The third attitude is a nonchalant stand — "Oh, gonorrhea is just the sore throat of adult social interaction." Here the other extreme is seen. Gonorrhea is taken too lightly. Gonorrhea is still a dangerous infection and needs immediate treatment. Once one knows something is wrong, the infected part **must not** be used for penetrating or being penetrated. One may have sex with a gonorrhea infection, but it must be done intelligently so that it is not spread. If you have a drip, do not put your penis in a body opening — mouth, vagina, or rectum. And beware that secretions do not get into the eye. But you can still be fondled and you can still masturbate.

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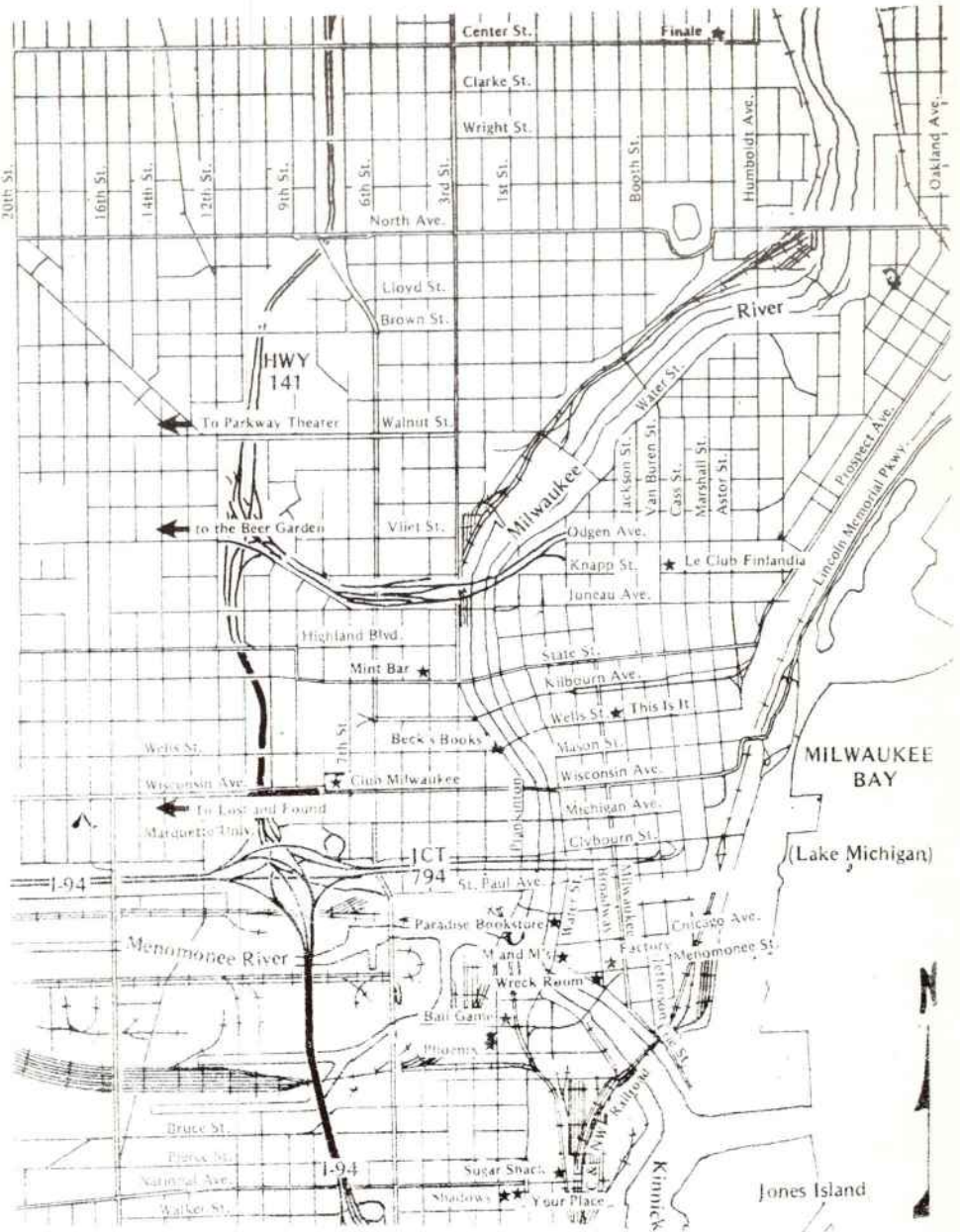
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
