

ith the announcement of the national pride theme for 2006 "Pride Not

Prejudice," I started thinking about what it meant. Does it mean that we should show pride in spite of all the prejudices against us? ## **PrideFest Retires Debt from 2003**



PrideFest held their town hall meeting on October 20th to announce the net income of \$90,000 from the 2005 festival, and the retiremnet of the debt endured in 2003. About thirty people were in attendance at the meeting. The 2005 town hall meeting was held off until after the audit was completed, but no financial report was made availble.

Scott Gunkel, Presedent of PrideFest announced that a new stand-alone Board of Directors of 10 or 12 would be established this year, mostly consisting of Karen Gotziers, Transition Advisory Development Committee. This was a recommendation that was made in 2003.

In addition it was announced that the Cream City Foundation (C.C.F.) would no longer be acting as fiscal agent for PrideFest now that the debt has been satisified.

Future plans by the existing PrideFest committee/board is the possibility of merging with the LGBT Community Center to become a 501 C-3 tax-exempt organization.
