

ntended to replace the U.S. military's current "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy, the "Military Readiness Enhancement Act", HR 1246, says, "sexual orientation will not be a bar to service unless manifested by homosexual conduct. The military will discharge members who engage in homosexual conduct..." It also prevents commanders from inquiring about a serviceperson's sex life and demands discharge of any who admit to being gay.

The MREA was originally proposed in 2005 by Congressman Marty Meehan (D-MA) and re-introduced in February of this year. Including Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Gwen Moore (D-WI), the bill has 124 co-sponsors. Meehan, also chairman of the House Armed Services Subcommittee, is set to resign from the House of Representatives this summer. Congresswoman Ellen Tauscher (D-CA) will replace him as the lead sponsor of this bill.

"Equality in our military is a vital part of equality in America. For too long the policy of 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' has prevented talented and otherwise qualified men and women from serving their country." said Rep. Tauscher. "It's a discriminatory policy that runs counter to the most fundamental American values of patriotism and equality. And, in today's threat environment, 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' is impacting the overall readiness and effectiveness of our Armed Forces,"

"Don't Ask" allows gays and lesbians to serve in the armed forces provided they don't reveal their sexual orientation or engage in homosexual acts. More than 11,000 troops have been dismissed as a result, a campaign promise of former President Bill Clinton and part of the 1994 Defense

Authorization Act. Many were in fields requiring extensive training, including code-breakers, translators, and intelligence specialists. The Government Accountability Office in February of 2005 reported that more than 800 persons let go as a result had abilities considered "critical" by the Pentagon, including 54 Arabic-language specialists. Discharges continued throughout this year, as one by one, soldiers (many Arabic-language specialists) were sent home from the Middle East for being gay or lesbian.

Before Clinton's term, the mandate against homosexuals serving was decided upon by the president. Upon his controversial proposal to remove the ban, Congress voted to write it into law.

The cost to American taxpayers has been somewhere between \$250 million and \$1.2 billion to remove these troops and train their replacements. As reported in the February 2006 issue of "Stars and Stripes", a paper published for U.S. military and Department of Defense personnel, there are presently about 65,000 gay service people actively involved or on reserve.

Prior to "don't ask", the Pentagon's stance was that 'homosexuality is incompatible with military service', and prospective recruits were questioned regarding their sexual orientation. Those who joined and were later thought to be gay or bisexual were subject to questioning and possible prosecution. They were also cautioned that they might be imprisoned if they refused to "out" other soldiers.

Alex, a former naval officer, remained in the closet from the time he





started his term in 1985 until he finished ten years later. "Things were opening up more and more around the time I left," according to him. "We weren't allowed to hold hands or show affection in public, but we could go to a gay bar, provided we weren't in uniform," Alex says. "A little bit of the problem is probably because we were living in such tight quarters...we want to be able to be comfortable with everyone around - thinking that they're not going to strip you, they're not going to go through your belongings or try to be perverted with you," he offered as an attempt to explain why this policy was implemented.

"I don't think a soldier's sexual preference would impact his or her effectiveness. It comes down to the relationship between the macho element in the military and a perceived "not macho"-ness of homosexuals," says
Barry, who was a cavalry scout from
August '91 to July '94 and in the National
Guard for nine years after. "I think it's
utterly ridiculous that we would put that
ahead of our national security, especially
in a time of war. I believe your sexuality
should have nothing to do with whether
you stay in the military or not as long as
you are able to follow the same military
guidelines as anybody else."

"I feel I could easily serve with someone who has a different sexual preference than I do, but that is because I am confident with my own sexuality and don't feel threatened by people of other preferences," he states.

Mike, a heterosexual man who was enlisted in the army from May of 1997 to May of 2001, when asked his opinion of opening the military to homosexuals and bisexuals, said "Honestly, the military, government, religion, any big

organization, is a method of control, and sex is one of the most liberating personal acts somebody can perform. By controlling that, you control lots of other things."

"I look at it like this: you don't want to sleep with everyone you work with. The fact that a man is gay doesn't mean he wants to sleep with every man he sees," says Mike.

"Don't Ask, Don't Tell" is as much, if not more, a political hot topic as it was in Clinton's time, and national polls suggest the vast majority of Americans favor the repeal. Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Peter Pace's comments to the "Chicago Tribune" in June of this year regarding the "immorality" of homosexuality, putting it in the same moral category as adultery, in part lead to his not being reappointed to a second term. As chairman, Pace was the premier military advisor to the President,

the National Security Council, and the defense secretary.

In the June 2007 New Hampshire Presidential debate, Senator Joe Biden (D – DE) made the point that 'nobody asked anybody else whether they're gay in those foxholes, number one. Number two, our allies – the British, the French, all our major allies – gays openly serve." During that debate, not one Republican candidate was in favor of repealing "Don't Ask, Don't Tell". In stark contrast, every Democratic candidate

John M. Shalikashvili, former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and former supporter of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," feels the lift of the ban is certain. "When that day comes, gay men and lesbians will no longer have to conceal who they are, and the military will no longer need to sacrifice those whose service it cannot afford to lose."

Cream City Foundation to Receive Grants for Youth

Cream City Foundation is one of four LGBT community foundations and funds selected to receive multi-year, matching grants as part of the FLGI + ADAM Queer Youth Initiative at Funders for Lesbian and Gay Issues, an initiative to support organizations and activities that serve or address the needs of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) youth.

"Too often, mainstream funders feel uncomfortable supporting LGBT youth organizations, because they are not familiar or understand the real problems LGBT youth face every day," said Maria Cadenas, Executive Director of the Cream City Foundation. "This initiate will help create resources for much needed programming and help us leverage and educate donors and Foundations about the very real needs of LGBT youth."

Other grantees include: the Berks County Community Foundation (Reading, PA), the Columbus Foundation (Columbus, OH), and the Pride Foundation (Seattle, WA).

In December 2006, public LGBT foundations and funds were invited to submit proposals. The four funded foundations will receive grants of \$22,500 that they will have to match over 3 years.

Preference was given to proposals that prioritized grant making to LGBT youthserving organizations and projects that: involved youth in leadership roles; addressed LGBT youth of color, young women, transgender and gender non-conforming youth, low-income youth, and youth in rural areas; and worked for systemic change, demonstrating an understanding of the interconnectedness of race, class, sexuality, and other issues.

ADAM is a funding collaborative of Ralph Alpert, Michael Dively and Weston F. Milliken, Ph.D.

The home is designed in the style of Frank Lloyd Wright, and owner Bonnie Joseph said, "offering this home for these fundraisers is what we live for."

For donation levels of \$300, \$500, and \$1000, guests were treated to first-class, music, food and drink – donated by several Milwaukee area business, or paid for by the ten Challengers' personal funds so that all tax-deductible proceeds go directly to the organizations of the donors' choices. Businesses contributing were: The Knick, North Shore Bistro, Harry's Bar & Grill for food, Signature Designs for flowers, Fluid, M's, Kruz, Pump House, Trysting Place,

and Walker's Pint for the bar supplies, Great Lakes Distillery for Rehorst Vodka, and music was by Matt Luther. Joseph said, "I've hosted many fund-raisers before, and never have I seen the spread of food like the one at this event!"

The charitable agencies, selected for 2007, provide services to Milwaukee's lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender communities. Recipients are: AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin - whose vastly expanded medical center now serves over 1250 HIV inflicted patients; The Alliance for LGBTQ Youth in Foster Care whose purpose to advocate for LGBTQ youth within the child welfare community;

and the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center, which plans to expand existing adult services to include on-site mental health services, massage therapy, tai chi and other wellness programming.

Dan Reidl, with ARCW stated that events like these are "where we shape our future."

Organizers were able to raise close to \$44,000 at this event.

Past years recipients have included Action Wisconsin Education Fund, SAGE, and Milwaukee's Alliance School.



Senate Passes Universal Health Care Plan

Madison - The Democratic-controlled state Senate cleared a universal health care plan that would cover nearly every state resident as part of the two-year budget.

The next step is the Assembly, where it is expected to be shot down

by the Republicans who hold the majority.

A special bipartisan committee with lawmakers from both the Assembly and Senate to work out a budget will have the final word, before sending it to Dem.Gov. Jim Doyle for signature.

The budget passed on a partisan 18-15 vote.

When the Assembly debates the budget, it is expected to be different, but Democrats plan to add in a new universal health care plan, domestic partner benefits for state workers and funding for a variety of construction projects at the University of Wisconsin.

Supporters said it will make Wisconsin a health-care leader. But

critics lament it is too expensive and will hurt businesses.

Doyle has been trying to get a partner benefits package for state workers for the past three years. Arguing in the House committee in support of the plan Rep. Mark Pocan (D) said the University of Wisconsin - Madison is losing key researchers as a result of being the only university in the Big Ten Conference not to offer the benefits. Since passage of the constitutional ban on gay marriage a number of professors, researchers and other staff have left the school and a spokesperson for the university said it has had trouble finding new staff.

House Affirms Basic Right to Marry

A resolution authored by Congresswoman Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) passed the House of Representatives June 11th by unanimous consent - commemorating the fortieth anniversary of the Loving v. Virginia decision that ended the ban on interracial marriage in the United States and recognizing that marriage is one of the "basic civil rights of man" at the heart of the Fourteenth Amendment protections.

In June of 1958, two residents of the Commonwealth of Virginia - Mildred Jeter, a Black/Native American woman, and Richard Perry Loving, a Caucasian man - were married in Washington, D.C. Upon their return to Virginia, Richard Perry Loving and Mildred Jeter Loving were charged with violating Virginia's anti-miscegenation statutes. They challenged their felony convictions, culminating in the June 12, 1967 Supreme Court opinion in Loving v. Virginia striking down the remaining anti-miscegenation laws that were still in effect in sixteen states. In the unanimous opinion, the Supreme Court rejected bigotry against interracial relations, recognizing an individual's right to marry under the Fourteen Amendment.

"The Loving decision marked an historic turning point in our nation's history," said Congresswoman Baldwin. "In affirming that marriage is a basic civil right, it brought an end to the statutes that criminalized interracial marriage. Today, once again, we are debating the marriage laws in this nation as same-sex couples seek the right to marry. I believe the Loving case informs this debate," Baldwin said.

State Assures Access to **Health Care for People with HIV**

Madison - The Joint Committee on Finance (state legislature's budget writing committee), on a bipartisan 15-1 vote, supported a motion by State Representatives Robin Vos (R-Burlington) and Mark Pocan (D-Madison) and State Senators Lena Taylor (D-Milwaukee) and Alberta Darling (R-River Hills) to restore a vital pilot program to more effectively spend state dollars in the fight against HIV and AIDS.

The pilot program will ensure that at least 100 low-income Wisconsinites with HIV enrolled in a state and federally funded drug-only program will have access

to health insurance at a lower cost to Wisconsin taxpayers.

"Wisconsin has been a leader in the fight against AIDS since the inception of the epidemic," said Michael J. Gifford, AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) Chief Operating Officer. "This bipartisan group of JFC members renewed that commitment and have helped assure access to care for everyone with HIV." Both the Wisconsin Senate and Assembly need to adopt the program as a part

of their particular budget plans in order for the pilot to begin.

"We are very grateful to Representative Pocan for his outstanding leadership in the Assembly and Joint Finance Committee on this important issue," said Gifford. "Throughout his long tenure in the state legislature, Rep. Pocan has been a compassionate and outspoken leader in the fight against HIV and AIDS."

Currently, low-income people with HIV who meet specific eligibility requirements may enroll in the Wisconsin AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP). This program ensures people with HIV get the medications they need but does not cover physician visits or check-ups. Due to high costs of HIV medications, some of the individuals in ADAP were receiving several thousands of dollars of drugs per month - more than the cost of the most expensive insurance policies with a prescription drug benefit.

"Access to medical care and HIV medications are the two most important factors necessary for people with HIV to live a long and healthy life," said Gifford. "Through this pilot program, the state is able to assure everyone in Wisconsin with HIV will have access to both medications and medical care through the ARCW Medical Center, regardless of where they live or their ability to pay."

ARCW is Wisconsin's largest ASO and has offices in Eau Claire, Appleton, Green Bay, Kenosha, La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, Superior and Wausau. ARCW provides medical care, dental care, mental health therapy, legal representation, housing services, food pantry and social work case management to 3,000 Wisconsin residents living with HIV/AIDS. Additionally, ARCW also reaches 150,000 people annually at risk of contracting HIV with life saving prevention information and resources.

N.Y. Assembly votes for marriage

New York - In a decisive 85-61 vote, a bill to legalize same-sex 'marriage' has passed the NY State Assembly.

Authored by openly gay assemblyman Daniel O'Donnell (D-Manhattan), brother of lesbian entertainer Rosie O'Donnell, and backed by New York Gov. Elliot Spitzer, the legislation stands almost no chance of passage in New York's Republican-led state Senate. However, four Republicans in the Assembly did vote for the bill, making it the first legislative chamber in the nation to pass a marriage equality bill with bipartisan support. The bill is one of several same-sex issues that have been dominating the state.

California is the only other state where legislators have voted to create marriage equality. In 2005, the vote passed both the Assembly and Senate but was vetoed by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, who vows to do it again.

A recent poll of NY registered voters, showed that 35 percent supported marriage equality while another 35 percent supported civil unions but not same-sex marriage. Twenty-two percent of voters said there should be no legal recognition of same-sex unions.

Currently, the New York legislation was contemplating legalizing homosexual 'civil unions,' which grants same-sex partners most of the same benefits that married heterosexual couples receive. O'Donnell says that is not enough, however.

"It will not provide equality for people like me," he said.

Although the same-sex marriage bill is important to Spitzer, the New York governor has explained that he will not force the Senate to act quickly on deciding its outcome. He feels that there are other more important issues that have a better chance of passing that need to be addressed first.

Republicans are conjecturing that some Democratic members who voted for the bill may lose their seats in the Assembly, though Democrats have a bulletproof 107-42 seat majority. The four Assembly Republicans who voted promarriage may also risk a challenge from the right in their primaries.

Conservative Opposes "Don't Ask, Don't Tell"

SANTA BARBARA, CA – In a recent Wall St. Journal Op-Ed, Former Republican Congressman Bob Barr called for the repeal of "don't ask, don't tell," the policy which prohibits gay men and lesbians from serving openly in the military.

Barr, who was a member of Congress from 1995 to 2003, opposes same-sex marriage as well as efforts to classify gays and lesbians as members of a constitutionally protected minority class.

However, Barr feels that allowing gays and lesbians to serve openly in the military would be consistent with conservative values such as saving money, promoting national security, and preserving individual privacy. He suggested that Republican presidential candidates who opposed the repeal of the policy show "a disturbing move away from conservative principles, in favor of what smells strongly of political expediency or timidity."

According to Dr. Aaron Belkin, Director of the Michael D. Palm Center, a research institute at the University of California, "Many Republicans agree with Barr's argument, but few party leaders have been willing to say so in public." Gallup has reported that a majority of Republicans support allowing gays and lesbians to serve openly in the military. Barr told Palm Center researchers that his support reflects a growing body of evidence, which shows that the ban is detrimental to military effectiveness.

Democratic candidates in support of gay rights

A recent survey by the Human Rights Campaign, reported that all of the leading Democrats running for president support extending federal rights to same-sex couples in states that recognize such unions. Participating in the survey were Sens. Joe Biden-DE, Hillary Clinton-NY, Barack Obama-IL, Christopher Dodd-CT, former Sen. John Edwards-NC, U.S. Rep. Dennis Kucinich-OH and Gov. Bill Richardson-NM.

"What these candidates are saying is that now, if you are a same-sex couple married in Massachusetts or in a civil union in New Hampshire, that if you file your taxes you should be recognized by the federal government," HRC spokesman Brad Luna said.

Besides Massachusetts and New Hampshire, eight states and the District of Columbia have laws recognizing same-sex partnerships to some degree. The other states are California, Connecticut, Hawaii, Maine, New Jersey, Oregon, Vermont and Washington.

Oregon Joins in on Domestic Partnerships

Salem-OR - In a bipartisan show of support, members of the Oregon state Senate approved the Oregon Family Fairness Act (H.B. 2007) by a vote of 21 to 9. The act would establish domestic partnerships for committed same-sex couples and provide all the same state-granted privileges, immunities, rights, benefits and responsibilities for same-sex couples entering a domestic partnership as are granted to married couples.

Passage of the domestic partner bill comes 2 1/2 years after Oregonians banned gay marriage at the ballot box via a statewide

reterendum.

When the governor signs the bill, Oregon will become the 10th state to provide significant protections to committed same-sex couples. Massachusetts provides equal marriage rights; Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey and California recognize civil unions or domestic partnerships that provide all the state-level protections of marriage to same-sex couples; Hawaii has a reciprocal beneficiaries law; and Maine and the District of Columbia provide registered domestic partners some level of critical protection. The Washington State domestic partnership law will go into effect on July 22, 2007, and New Hampshire will begin recognizing civil unions next year.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2008, same-sex couples in Oregon will be able to go to their county courthouse and enter into a legally binding contract that grants them rights and responsibilities. The benefits include nearly all those accorded to married couples under state law, covering the rights to jointly file state taxes, child custody, hospital visitation and

inheritance rights, among others.



Israeli Gay Pride Not without Incident

Jerusalem - While thousands of Israelis marched in support of gay rights, one Orthodox Jewish man was busy being detained by Israeli police for carrying a small homemade bomb into the mix. He was nabbed prior to the parade, and told police that he had planned to plant the explosive along the parade route. The estimated 2,000 marchers were protected by 7,000 police officers deployed inside and around Jerusalem. The protection was needed after threats from religious Jews, who take exception to the event being held in a city they hold sacred.

Among those walking the route under rainbow banners and balloons, was Judy Enteen, a mother from Jerusalem, who held aloft a sign that read: "My gay son is a gift from God." Alternately, many devout Jews, Muslims and Christians view homosexuality as an abomination. Most Jewish residents of

Jerusalem are religious.

Police arrested more than 130 ultra-Orthodox Jews after learning of plots to disrupt the march and during protests in Jerusalem and religious Jewish towns, where officers used water cannon to battle stone-throwing protesters.

A similar Gay Pride march in Israel's secular metropolis Tel Aviv passed without incident earlier this month.



Largest Gay Pride attracts 3 Million

SAO PAULO, Brazil - Millions of people packed the streets of Sao Paulo on June 10th for what organizers said was the world's largest gay pride parade. At least 3 million people filled the canyon-like Paulista Avenue surpassing last

year's count of 2.5 million.

Tourism Minister Marta Suplicy said, "This is the biggest parade on the planet.

Our city is showing, once again, its respect for diversity.

In comparison, recent gay pride parades in New York and San Francisco have drawn tens of thousands of people, and between 200,000 and 500,000 participants attended the 2004 world gay pride day celebrations in Berlin.

Parade organizer Nelson Matias Pereira said this year's participants are

Parade organizer Nelson Matias Pereira said this year's participants are appealing for a "world where racism, sexism and homophobia, in all their forms,

no longer exist."

Trucks blasting disco and electronic music rolled through the streets, in a carnival-like atmosphere, followed by marchers carrying banners with slogans such as "Dignity for All," and "All Forms of Love Bring Us Closer to God."

Colombia passes gay Rights Bill...or...Do They?

Bogota, Colombia – Last month, Colombia's legislative body voted 62–43 to extend health care, social security, and inheritance benefits to same-sex couples, making it the first South American country to give such rights to gay couples. And, at the last minute, for it's final vote, conservative senators knocked it down in an unprecedented move.

The Bill had been endorsed by conservative President Alvaro Uribe, and would have made Colombia the first nation in Latin America to grant gay couples in long-term relationships the same rights to health insurance, inheritance and social

security as heterosexual couples.

The initial vote was the result of a long lobbying effort by LGBT activists.

Canada is the only other nation in the Americas to offer such benefits to same-sex

couples on a federal level.

Colombia's Senate and House of Representatives had approved different versions of the bill, and the last vote on the final, reconciled version was expected to be routine. But Sen. Manuel Virguez Piraquive, from a small party closely linked to an evangelical Colombian church, called for an unusual floor vote on the bill. Other conservative lawmakers then broke ranks with the pro-Uribe faction backing the bill and it was defeated, 34-29, in the 102-member Senate. Many of the bill's supporters were absent.

Sen. Armando Benedetti, a sponsor of the bill, vowed to restart the legislative

process when Congress reconvenes on July 20.

Although states and cities have passed laws allowing gay couples to share assets, no other country in the overwhelmingly Roman Catholic region has done so at a national level.

While homosexuality is still taboo in much of Latin America, there has been increasing acceptance in many areas. Mexico City and the Mexican State of Coahuila recently joined the Argentine capital of Buenos Aires and the southern Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul in legalizing same-sex civil unions.

Anti-Gay Violence on the Rise in Europe and North America

New York - The 2007 Hate Crime Survey, a new survey of hate crimes in Europe by Human Rights First, finds a rising level of crimes committed against individuals on the basis of their sexual orientation.

The report was released at a meeting on combating discrimination held in Bucharest, Romania by the Organization for Security and Co-operation in

Europe

"The growing public presence of the lesbian, gay, bi-sexual and transgender (LGBT) community in many countries has resulted in a violent backlash," stated Maureen Byrnes, executive director of Human Rights First. "These crimes often go unreported because the bias and stigma against these groups remain high and many governments fail to offer sufficient protections for victims of anti-gay crime."

The survey examines hate-driven violence in the region from the Russian Federation and the Central Asian states across Europe to North America.

"In countries in which LGBT people have increased public presence has, in some cases brought with it a rise in violent backlash" the report finds.

"Only ten countries in Europe and North America currently have laws which enable a sexual orientation bias to be considered an aggravating circumstance in

the commission of a crime,' the study continues.

Although countries like Canada, the United Kingdom, Sweden and the United States are improving policies for the reporting of anti-gay crimes, the widespread lack of data on these crimes indicates that underreporting is still a major problem. Among other recommendations in its survey, Human Rights First urges governments to adopt stricter laws, provide more resources to law enforcement and establish official systems to monitor and report hate crimes on a regular basis.

Where's the 'Pride' in **PrideFest?**

enerally speaking, I go to Summerfest and other such festivals more for the people watching than the actual music

But every time PrideFest rolls around in early June, I find myself almost reluctant to attend. It's not that there aren't interesting people there; that most certainly isn't the case, but rather that observing the population and the things that go on there is somewhat dispiriting. Other gay friends of mine have expressed similar sentiment, commenting that they "wouldn't be seen" at PrideFest, or that just thinking about it was "depressing."

For example, the way that gaggles of gay men walk around together, shooting judgmental, or occasionally interested, looks at other gaggles. And there's the lesbians, who travel in pairs rather than large groups, and look down at such behavior with transparent disapproval.

I could go on and on, listing stereotypical appearances and behaviors (that I myself would be a part of), but that hardly seems necessary. Underneath all of this judging and comparing and analyzing that everyone seems to be doing is a layer of sexual tension so thick that it would make Linda Lovelace bow-legged for days.

As a result of this tension, PrideFest has become more of a Cruising-for-Sex-Fest or Who-can-be-the-Cattiest-Queen-fest than

anything else. This is most true of my own generation, and the one before: the two that have technically had more sexual freedom and acceptance than any generations prior. Yet from looking around, one might think they were in New York City in 1971. For example, I hear about more unnecessary drama going down during at PrideFest than any other time of year.

Just thinking about it was depressing.

And truth be told, it actually makes me ashamed to be gay. I immediately recognize the irony in this, of course-that PrideFest would instill something like shame, but it's true. It's like everyone is too caught up in what their hair looks like, or finding a 'hookup' for the evening, that we forget to have any pride at all. Quite the opposite, in fact. I even overheard a passerby refer to the infamous Dance Pavilion as the 'AIDS Pavilion.'

Apparently, I'm not the only one who's noticed, either. A friend of mine who works for Cedar Crest Dairy, which provides ice cream for all other festivals held at the Summerfest grounds, informed me that the company chooses to not sell their products at PrideFest because it is "not family oriented."

While I feel as though that should offend me... it's definitely true. I think that PrideFest has lost direction.

It's like PrideFest has become one big stereotype. I mean, I guess dancing around all over each other in our underwear to bad techno music is part of "gay culture" or whatever, but it feels like PrideFest should be more than that.

Now, if we're to look at this from an analytical perspective, perhaps that tension and cattiness is the result of all of the pent-up homosexual energy that people feel during the other 51 weekends of the year, and so when PrideFest comes around, and all of those people get together, it explodes into a big, flaming ball.

When I mentioned all of these thoughts I was having to a friend of the family, she replied, "Well that's how any gay pride celebration is going to be." In no way was she

intending to be homophobic or offensive, just honest. And you know what? She's probably right. But that isn't okay, either.

So what do we do? I say, make every weekend Pride Weekend. Get out there and celebrate your sexuality whenever you want. Be gay every weekend. So what if this isn't Amsterdam or San Francisco? Love it, and embrace it, which are all things that we should be doing anyway.

But this way, maybe next June PrideFest will more visibly stand for its intended purpose: A celebration of a community united, proud of both our similarities and differences.





Young Hearts Be Free

n October 2001, I attended a screening called "Fever in the Archive: AIDS Activist Video" at the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts in San Francisco. In the discussion afterward, an older gay white male commented in a proscriptive and pedantic tone about how it was good these videos were being aired again because he felt that "the kids today" were "not learning the lessons" he felt his peers had learned as a result of losing a significant portion of a generation to this devastating plague. It became increasingly clear that his generalities were upsetting a fair number of younger audience members, myself and my partner included. One young person succinctly challenged the man, and a heated exchange began in earnest.

In this microcosm, it became evident that the older man's condescension represented a problematic attitude in the queer community at large. Youth are treated with disrespect, their questions and experience dismissed out-of-hand. Worse yet is the fact that there are those who are sexually objectified or preyed upon by 'chicken hawks' with not so honorable intentions. All factors leading to young people missing out on opportunities to build friendships and bridges within the larger queer community. QZAP actively works to add zines to our collection that are peer-based, youth-oriented writing to foster a climate where queer youth of any background, and experience level get to add their voice and wisdom to the collective queer narrative.

Right here in Milwaukee, Project Q publishes Scratch [Issue 5, 2006, 16 pages]. Slick in design and layout, it provides opportunities for the community served by Project Q to show their creative colors while communicating vital information to Wisconsin's queer youth and their allies. Standouts in this issue include the winners of the pride essay contest, blurbs about Pride celebrations throughout the world, and "drama, drama, drama." The writing is informative and fun, touching on the serious as well as the sublime. There is a balanced approach to the topics such that history and health, advice and fluff all flow neatly together. In "are you a binge drinker" contributor Maureen White cuts to the chase and

The lovers shaving one another's bodies suggestion doesn't reference safety factors required when shaving - a nick in the wrong place quickly negates the "fluid free" aspect, and no mention of advice that each participant being shaved should have their own

ideas on developing good sexuality skills.

Chicago-area library to add transgender collection

Chicago- The Oak Park Public Library received a \$3,000 grant by the Illinois State Library enabling it to develop the country's first transgender resource collection. They will soon begin acquiring materials aimed at educating and serving transgender people. The collection consists mainly of nonfiction materials and includes medical and legal information as well as coverage of social issues. With its own resources, Oak Park Public Library has augmented the collection with popular and lesser-known fiction titles as well as films.

Crowd Stones Romanian Gay Rights Marchers

Bucharest, Romania – Police in the capital of Romania came to the aid of people marching in one of a number of gay rights parades. Officers using tear gas moved in when people started throwing stones at about 400 marchers. Nobody was hurt but about 100 people were detained for throwing stones and fireworks. A week prior to the parades, police moved in to stop an attack on two men who were leaving a Bucharest movie theater hosting an annual "Gay Fest."

Special Editorial:

Why We Need **LGBT** Pride in the 21st Century

For those of us who have been out for many years, including myself, it can be easy to slip into a self-satisfied cocoon of complacency and declare that Gay Pride is a passé, irrelevant fixture of a bygone era. But to do so would be to ignore a whole world of difference, and oppression, for the vast majority of our Lesbian, Gay, Bi and Trans brothers and sisters who don't share in our relative

In most areas of the world, the right of LGBT people to even assemble to demand rights is effectively banned by governments and extra-legal violence by thugs who attack Pride celebrations. The recent shut down of Moscow Pride, and the effective suppression of Pride celebrations in most of Eastern Europe should be testimony enough to this phenomenon. It is important to remember that right here in the United States; we have effectively been declared non-citizens by the anti-gay constitutional amendments passed in half of our states.

While national opinion polls have been gradually trending in a pro-gay direction for several years, it would be arrogant and complacent of us to extrapolate from these trends to necessarily predict a progay future for the United States.

The right of LGBT people to assemble and advocate for our rights is

increasingly under attack around the world. In most instances, right wing forces in the United States, who in a heartbeat would introduce repressive efforts here at home if given the opportunity, are funding these efforts.

God knows that we deserve to enjoy Pride Celebrations, but understand also that these constitutional amendments are an attempt to label us as non-persons, not deserving of pride, respect or rights. None of the leading Presidential candidates from either party endorse our FULL legal equality, let alone the many other things beyond legal equality that our community needs.

It is long past time that our LGBT movement began DEMANDING full rights from all politicians, regardless of party, and withholding support from these politicians who won't even endorse our full citizenship.

When we look at the suppression of Pride in places like Moscow, we shouldn't complacently congratulate ourselves about our relative freedoms here in the United States. Instead, we should salute the courage of our overseas compatriots (often in far more difficult circumstances) and resolve to finally win legal equality for our community here in the U.S. - full well understanding that mere legal equality is but a first step towards true acceptance, community, and LGBT liberation.





This Month in Wisconsin LGBT History JULY

35 years ago: 1972– Survey of the homosexual lifestyle in Milwaukee garners 120 responses. Juneau Park is a hot spot for cruising, both in the park and its "tea room", and in the surrounding blocks, and Milwaukee Police are making many arrests. The Nite Beat at 183 S. 2nd St. is renamed the Riviera Show Lounge, with a first production titled "The Dolly Review" featuring female impersonators Winnie Storm, Mel Powers, Mother Chris, Andretta and others, and produced by "Norma Jean" Baker.

30 years ago: 1977– Red Baron disco has its liquor license renewed after charges of discrimination against blacks and women are heard. Alyn Hess steps down as President of GPU. UW-Madison creates an Assistance Committee to discuss and act upon any case of discrimination against a gay student. Ex-Governor Patrick Lucey answers a question about Anita Bryant by saying "I think that sexual preference ought not to deny any American citizen of all the rights and privileges that other citizens enjoy". The Milwaukee Gay Guide publishes its first issue, listing 18 gay/lesbian bars, 4 restaurants, 2 bathhouses, and 2 bookstores.

20 years ago: 1987– The Society Club, an organization of black gays and lesbians, holds an AIDS Benefit Ball for MAP (Milw. AIDS Project). Cream City Foundation funds the first gay cable show in Milwaukee: Tri-Cable Tonight. Lambda Rights Network fights a state bill intended to exempt Rawhide Boys Ranch from the state's gay anti-discrimination law. The U.S. Supreme Court rules we cannot use the term "Gay Olympics".

15 years ago: 1992—19th annual MAGIC Picnic held in Madison on July 18th. Milwaukee Classic softball tournament estimated to have a positive economic impact of at least \$250,000 on the city. Eighty-three men are arrested in UWM restrooms over the course of a few weeks in July; reportedly, few of them are students or faculty.

Roadmaps

How do we get from where we are to where we are going without a map?

f we're going somewhere we've not been before, we almost always either ask directions (and typically write them down, so we have a clear reminder which we can refer to at every turn) or use technology like Yahoo! Maps to help chart our course.

Likewise, if we have a major project to undertake, it's often smart – if not absolutely necessary – to write out detailed notes about what needs to happen (and in what order), obtain appropriate tools for the job, and collect any useful resources so we don't re-invent the wheel. For most

of us, whether we're planning on moving to a new apartment, changing careers, landscaping our back yard, planning a trip to Hawaii, or writing a term paper, we have to think about where we are and where we want to be when we're done with the project.

If you want to paint your bedroom, it won't paint itself it you don't outline how you are going to get from the bedroom in its current state to one that is freshly painted. While it may be as simple as buying a gallon of paint, typically you need to think through things. Do you and your partner agree on the same color? Are you physically able to do the job yourself or do you need to hire someone? Is there is enough space to move the furniture in to the middle of the room? Do you have all the supplies you need, and are you willing to have your house in disarray for a couple of days in order to complete this project?

Some questions might be obvious. Some might be irrelevant. Some questions, too, might be dependent on how much experience you've had with painting.

When considering "projects" - that help you reach your desired gender destination - many of us don't have a lot of previous experience to draw on. We are often charting our own course, writing our own lives, and venturing into the unknown.

Even if we are moving into territory that is totally unfamiliar, we can still create a conscious, concrete (but flexible) plan of actions to help us reach our goal.

Most of us, though, don't consider our lives as projects — let alone projects that need to be broken down into manageable action steps that will ensure our success. Many people believe they don't need a plan when considering legally changing their name or gender, opting to start on hormones, pursuing surgery, or wishing others would interact with us in specific ways related to our gender.

It is no wonder that so many of us are depressed, since we are constantly wandering around aimlessly without a plan or any tangible ideas of how to get to where we want to go.

Action steps that are part of a larger

plan work best when they are small and achievable. For example, it is typically overwhelming to think about saving up \$15,000 for surgery. However, it might be very manageable to decide to forgo the convenience of Starbucks and save \$4 for every time you make your own coffee. In a year's time, you could have over \$1,000 saved by simply changing your coffee routine!

If you want to get somewhere specific in your gender journey, do you have a solid plan of how to get there? Can you travel only on paved roads, or do you have four wheel drive to go off on uncharted paths? Figure out what you can do today to start making a difference in living your life in ways that fulfill your dreams.

n the US we tend to believe we're in the forefront of things and way ahead of the rest of the world in our dedication to freedom. One good place to start finding out about what's going on in the rest of the world is the list of International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission's Felipa da Souza honorees.

Felipa de Souza was a Portuguese-born nun who was exiled to Brazil for lezzing up the convent, only to be convicted and tortured in 1591 by Brazil's arm of the

Portuguese Inquisition for "sodomy" (i.e., sexual relations) with women. This persistence in asserting queer identity is the basis for the present-day Felipa de Souza award.

This year's awardee is Israel-based, Palestinian lesbian activist Rauda Morcos. She is co-founder and coordinator of ASWAT ("Voices"), the first organization for Palestinian lesbians in the Middle East.

During her recent interview with Robert DiGiacomo for gay.com,

Morcos applauded the visibility that the international human-rights award gives LGBT people, "It's very good for gays and lesbians to know that we are also rewarded for our work," she said. "Lesbian life is not only about sex. It's also about activism... and...social change."

Morcos expressed disappointment that LGBT groups fail to "get" how they could be allies to other struggles for acceptance and equality. She laments the fact that "the LGBT community around the world has failed to be inclusive and to [make] the connections to other kinds of oppression around us."

For example, ASWAT boycotted an event called WorldPride in Israel, because it did not include the Palestinian and Arab queers. In her words, "We don't agree with having WorldPride in Jerusalem in Israel at the same time there is an occupation...in a place where there is war."

Morcos is not happy, either, with the recent change of focus of the LGBT movement. "I think that gay pride in the last couple of years really took a shift," said Morcos. "That shift is to run for marital rights and adoption and things that are not really radical. You don't have to get married in order to get rights. We need our rights as individuals as well." Of her and ASWAT's work, she says, "The thing we want to change is the system."

Another LGBT advocate on the world stage is Afro-French professor Louis-George Tin, who is lobbying

the UN to commit to universal decriminalization of homosexuality. He started the International Day Against Homophobia (IDAHO) on May 17, 2005, the 25th anniversary of the World Health Organization decision that homosexuality is not a disease. Tin recently told writer Doug Ireland, "Look, gays and lesbians around the world cannot wait any longer for their love to cease being made a crime. Many are in jail, or at risk of being jailed. Some are being killed. This has to stop now." You can sign the petition he is circulating worldwide at www. idahomophobia.org,

As San Francisco opens a major "Gays in the Military" exhibit, let's remember our homegrown heroes in the quest for our rights. Air Force Sargeant Leonard Matlovich came out while serving in Vietnam in 1975. Matlovich, who died in 1988, left an enduring valentine to equality on his tombstone: "When I was in the military they gave me a medal for killing two men and a discharge for loving one."



Strengthening Wisconsin's Nondiscrimination Protections

or decades, discrimination stunted the economy in severe ways. Redlining kept banks from lending and making money in the central city, keeping the dream of homeownership from African Americans and other people of color. The professions shut out women and people of color, no matter how innovative or educated, starving the country of talent. We still suffer the lingering effects of discrimination today in our economy, despite significant progress made possible by anti-discrimination laws and cultural shifts.

But there's a gap in state and local nondiscrimination laws in Wisconsin that could be easily fixed. It's a loophole that Governor Doyle publicly stated he wanted to fix when he ran in 2002. It's a serious form of discrimination that is already banned in 12 states, including Midwestern neighbors Iowa, Minnesota, and Illinois. It's a form of discrimination that Governors in Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania have issued executive orders to ban in state employment. Nearly one hundred local governments, including half the nation's biggest cities, and Dane County and Madison, have protected their citizens from it.

One-hundred-twenty-four Fortune 500 companies have declared this bigotry bad for business with policies expressly prohibiting it. Wisconsin businesses like Miller Brewing, SC Johnson, and Foley and Lardner do the same.

What is this invidious discrimination? It's the discrimination faced by transgender and gender nonconforming people. Transgender people and others who identify and express their gender in a way that is different than the gender assigned them at birth, face severe housing and employment discrimination - and even violence - in Wisconsin, yet are left unprotected by state nondiscrimination and hate crime laws. Research has shown that being transgender, like being gay, is deeply rooted, not a "choice;" but while Wisconsin was the first state in the nation to ban discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in 1982, twenty-five years later the "T" in LGBT remains excluded from legal protections.

How serious is the problem? Center Advocates, the Milwaukee-based equal





rights organization that I work for, has extensively surveyed the transgender community with allied organizations like FORGE. Many respondents told us they weren't hired for jobs they were qualified for, including a trans man who was told the job was filled by a betterqualified applicant, though the position was advertised as still vacant for months afterward. One trans woman told us about a temporary agency that told her only to "do it" at home, and another reported being passed over for a promotion for her own "safety." We heard from a transgender woman whose landlord told her not to dress like a woman outside of her home.

Discrimination in its most distilled form is hate violence, and here transgender people fare even worse. In September 2006, a transgender man and former Marine was beaten at a Wauwatosa George Webb restaurant by a man shouting antitrans statements, the fracas caught on security tape and broadcast widely on television news. Wisconsin's hate crime law didn't apply because like current nondiscrimination protections, gender identity and expression are excluded. This is a flaw made brutally clear by the stabbing of a transgender woman several years ago in Madison, soon after she left a rally against antigay violence. Local prosecutors lamented that the hate crime law didn't cover the crime.

People who want a Wisconsin where everyone can contribute to society no matter who they are or what they look like will want to rally behind emerging efforts to fix state and local non-discrimination laws so that transgender people receive the full protection of the law.









We have Come so Far Since 1969, but We Still Have a Long Way to Go

ith Milwaukee 's PrideFest 2007 now concluded, it's as good a time as any to examine pride celebrations, and gay pride in general. Once again this year, PrideFest set a record for attendance and income. Though the event was lucky to have the best possible weather and headline entertainment, there is always room for improvement - which looked at another way means there was some criticism.

For example, there is a lot of community dissatisfaction with canceling the fireworks for an extended Chaka Khan performance. My personal opinion: once something is promised/publicized and printed, it shouldn't be cancelled. It's also strange, in this year, celebrating the 20th PrideFest, to skip one of its signature attractions.

But let's keep an open mind and think of the bigger picture. A decent fireworks display on a caliber with that of 2006 would have cost the festival about \$15,000 - money that could be applied to entertainment, or saved for that all-too-often bad-weather year. The PrideFest Board weighed the options, and made the decision they thought would be best. Their good decision-making overall led to a 3-day schedule crammed with shows and quality performers. Even if there had been one day of bad weather, the entertainment alone could have carried the festival. So let's voice our opinions (mine, to bring back the fireworks), but respect and THANK the PrideFest Board for the overall quality of the event that their hard work has kept alive.

The Milwaukee Pride Parade is another subject. Resurrected two years ago by the bars after it was abandoned during PrideFest's dark years, it makes its run along south 2nd street. Common impressions are that there are several block-long gaps where there are virtually no observers on the didewalks, and not enough floats. In addition, the location is out of the way, and not really visible to the community as a whole. There is also some evidence that having the parade on the same Sunday as PrideFest takes away

from PrideFest attendance. Should our Pride parade be held a separate weekend from PrideFest, so neither event detracts from the other? Or should we push the city to allow the parade to run in a more visible location, either along Wisconsin Avenue, or to end at the PrideFest grounds to better tie the two

When all is said and done, our PrideFest outshines virtually every other celebration in the country. No other celebration has the concentration of things to do, the major headline acts, or the ability of the attendee to grab a beer and wander the grounds at will. The quality entertainment at PrideFest all around also draws even many "straight" people to attend, giving it a much more inclusive feel, while truly promoting an acceptance of diversity among and outside our community.

Madison's celebration is worthy of a capital city. Between its long standing traditional Saturday MAGIC picnic, and the Sunday parade starting at the Capitol and ending at the park for the day-two picnic, this city hosts a great celebration. Personally, I hope the Saturday MAGIC picnic makes a comeback to the "glory days" of the 80s in Brittingham Park, when a large turnout was typically followed by a laser light show on the patio of Rod's bar.

But what is it about gays and lesbians that we feel the need to have these annual pride celebrations? The Stonewall events of 1969 allowed more homosexuals to come out of the shadows and demand to be seen, as people with rights just like other "minorities." Milwaukee's first pride event

was as early as 1972; and in 1973, the GPU News reported that "Gay Pride Week in 1973's Milwaukee was the "most successful pride week ever held here" including a dance, rally, picnic, gay-in demonstration at the city fireworks, workshops and films. By 1981 GPU had a permanent committee to coordinate pride marches, parades, rallies, and events with other organizations. And Madison has had its MAGIC picnic most years since about 1973, and has had a parade every year since 1979: the "Dykes on Bikes" of Madison has been leading that parade since as early as

So what makes GLBT Pride celebrations in general different? Look at the other major festivals in Milwaukee: Festa Italiana, Mexican Fest, Indian Summer, many others: they are once-a-year events that pull together a particular ethnic group of people who, throughout the rest of the year, seldom have reason to congregate. In contrast, gays and lesbians gather together throughout the year at countless venues; we are a community onto itself, with our own publications, organizations, and businesses of all types that blanket entire geographical areas. Aside from working and living alongside "straight" people, many lesbians and gays shop, socialize, and relax primarily within their own "community".

Still, even within the LGBT community, there is a delicate balancing act between inclusion and exclusion. Many gay men don't want to frequent the same bars as lesbians (and vice versa); and lesbians often feel the need to have "their own" organizations, choruses, etc. Even beyond that, some gay

men look upon other gay men into leather, or drag, etc with disdain or contempt. How can we ever expect all of society to accept us, if we can't even accept the diversity within our own community?

The once-a-year Pride celebrations are great to keep the larger community aware of our existence and rights, but our "gay" bars and "LGBT" organizations keep us working and growing together as a community. I wish I could see us 50 years from now-hopefully in a better place. We all need to work to get us there. For some, it means attending pride celebrations, and participating in GLBT organizations. For others, it means simply living a life where they are free to be open with family and friends about who they are. Both of these are possible only by all of us through our combined effort in participation in whatever ways we choose to be "part" of "our community".

omyn's Music* transcends genre, time, and space. It is constantly evolving, yet rooted in the ambitious goals and uphill struggles of the 1970s
Lesbian Feminist movement. Lesbians fueled their political and social visions of creating safe, woman-centered, and Lesbian-affirming spaces with music that focused on the real lives and experiences of Lesbians and women that was also written, performed, mixed, produced, distributed and marketed by women.

Cris Williamson's The Changer and the Changed and Meg Christian's I Know You Know are must haves for any Lesbian interested in starting a collection of music that speaks to Lesbian experiences. These two albums kicked off the Women's Music movement, yet are still so relevant today. And all Lesbians should hear Meg's "Ode to a Gym Teacher" and be able to at least hum along with Cris's "Song of the Soul!"

Other albums to have in your Lesbian music collection, aside from Melissa and the Indigo Girls include Ferron's Impressionistic, a two-disk compilation of songs from her 1980 release Testimony to Still Riot, released in 1996. Ferron will be performing at Michigan this year with Bitch, another must-see Lesbian musician to add to your music collection, starting with cds from her days with Bitch and Animal. Their first album What's that Smell? will have you cheering, dancing, screaming, crying, and feeling very proud to be a woman and a Lesbian, which is the point of any form of Womyn's Music.

If you are into drums, introduce yourself to the music of drum-goddess Ubaka Hill. Her album, Dance the Spiral Dance is one-of-a-kind and so inspirational, even if, like me, you have yet to learn how to drum. She will put you in touch with the divine feminine and, for those of you who will be joining me and the thousands of other women this year, get you ready for all of the drumming that takes place at Michigan!

Other must-know Lesbian musicians and performers include Laura Love, Vicki Randle, Alix Olson, Ellis, God-des and She, Staceyann Chin and Doria Roberts. 



Choosing a Church

ecently I was talking with a friend about how he chose a church. He'd grown up in the Methodist Church but as a teenager became very involved in the conservative youth movement, Young Life. That led him to Wheaton College and work with various fundamentalist causes. But he'd come to realize he didn't fit there.

I think so many of us have spiritual journeys like that – wandering from one congregation to another, one branch of Christianity to another, even from one faith tradition to another. Certainly this is true for me: my parents belonged to a Disciples of Christ church, then we joined the Catholic Church, eventually, after coming out, I found a new home in the United Church of Christ.

My friend has also found a congregation – an Episcopal church outside of Chicago, one that is not particularly liberal and not especially conservative. He said that as he looked at churches he kept asking himself one question: "do I want these people to bury me?"

Now my friend is not near death, but what he meant was, "is this a church I can commit my life too? Can I be here for the long term? And when I am gone, are these the people I want to remember me?"

It's a good question to ask when looking for a community of faith, either Christian or part of another religious tradition. It's not about doctrine, or purity of life, or even how good the music program is at the congregation. Finding a church is about finding a community that is worthy of your commitment, that you can be part of for the long term, and that, when you die, that will faithfully remember your life.

But framing the question of church

membership this way — "Do I want these people to bury me?" — while it is a good question, is still a bit morbid. I think a better way to get at the same matter is to ask, "Can these people teach me about love?"

I joined a congregation, before I became a minister, because the congregation was one where we learn something together about love. There are two lessons about love that I learn as part of a congregation. The first is the lesson that God loves us; that no matter who you are, no matter what you have done, no matter what, God loves you. And the second lesson is that because we are loved, we can love others. I might come to realize God's love on my own, but I find it essential to be in a community in order to learn how to love others. It is in community that we learn how to love our brothers, how to love our sisters, how to love our neighbors.

Despite its imperfections, it is the lessons I learn about love that keep me involved in a community of faith. And in learning to love that I remember how to live.

He looked at churches he kept asking himself one question: "do I want these people to bury me?"

Erasure Returns to Milwaukee this Month

Interview with Vince Clarke

or Vince Clarke and his band mate Andy Bell, 2007 has been a big year for their group, Erasure. And there's still six months left to go.

The seminal synth pop band has been touring with other artists this past June in the True Colors Tour 2007, with proceeds benefiting The Human Rights Campaign as well as PFLAG and The Matthew Shepard Foundation. The duo released its 13th full studio album in May, the upbeat, danceoriented Light at the End of the World (Mute Records). The twosome then headline their own 15-city U.S. tour into early August, making a rare stop at the Pabst Theater on July 28. They're just getting started, given their big summer plans.

"Things are going very well," Clarke says in a phone interview during a True Colors stopover. "We're just warming up, even though this has been two years in the planning" he adds referring to the True Colors tour, which includes Cyndi Lauper, Debbie Harry, The Dresden Dolls, Indigo Girls, and Rufus Wainwright (also coming to the Pabst Theater Aug. 27), among others. (For Erasure fans, there's an inside nod during the True Colors' encore when Bell, Lauper and others cover ABBA's "Take a Chance on Me" a throwback to Erasure's 1992 ABBA-esque EP which scored the duo their first number one hit on the UK singles chart).

Erasure itself has been making music for 22 years - Clarke even longer as an original co-founder of Depeche Mode when DM formed in 1980. As chief songwriter, Clarke was responsible for much of the sound of DM's 1981 debut, Speak & Spell, marking its electronic terrain with the hit, "Just Can't Get Enough." Clarke left soon after and created Yazoo (Yaz in the U.S.) with singer Alison Moyet. Clarke's electronic pop songs

juxtaposed against Moyet's rich, blues-influenced vocals spawned two albums and a number of chart hits in two years, before the duo went their separate ways and Clarke created the short-lived The Assembly.

Clarke ended up finding Andy Bell by placing an advertisement in the British music paper, Melody Maker. Bell was

the 41st person to audition and by 1987
Erasure became the perfect platform for
Clarke's incessantly catchy pop songs coupled
with Bell's throaty singing rising above the
electronic dance floor beats. And the duo has
kept its electropop groove going on and off

the dance floor ever since.

"This is one of our most upbeat records in a long time and it show's where we're at these days," Clarke emphasizes with the World disk. "We're feeling very good about ourselves and [both tours] give us the opportunity to play to a wider, larger audience and play some places we haven't

played for a very long time." (Clarke recalls playing Milwaukee "in the very early days" when Erasure opened for Duran Duran).

The music is just as reflective of the duo's positive mood and their songs are created literally, in the moment. "Our writing works when it's completely spontaneous—upfront and on the

table," Clarke points out. "When we've tried to be political in our work, it doesn't work out. It sounds forced."

One area that Erasure does succeed in politically is their staunch support of gay rights. "Andy's always been open and

upfront about his sexuality. He's never tried to hide it," Clarke emphasizes. "We've tried to be upbeat and it's inspired our audiences. People will come up and say, 'you know, I listened to you when I was in college and learned such and such and it helped me through a rough time."

With Light at the End of the World a return to the classic electronic Erasure sound, concert goers can expect many of the classics as well as the new material. And Clarke and Bell have their own ways to keep it fresh and exciting for themselves night after night.

"We're constantly revising the set list since we rehearse more songs than we need," he says, adding, "I have the ability to rearrange the songs and change the sounds of the songs."

With Bell on vocals and Clarke covering computers, guitar and keyboards, Erasure will also have three additional backing vocalists backdropped by "futuristic" video screens featuring artwork from the new CD. What else can we expect on July 28?

"Lots of wigs," Clarke explains. "There's lots of costumes and hairpieces involved. We want a party atmosphere."

shopping mall homophobia. It's so sad.



Dear EarthTalk:

How is it that the Bush Administration is said to have "censored" climate scientists?

ord of the White House censoring federal climate scientists on global warming began leaking out to the press early in George W. Bush's first term in office, but only in the last few years have a few federal employees themselves been willing to go on record with such accusations.

A report released last January by two leading nonprofits, the Union of Concerned Scientists (UCS) and the Government Accountability Project (GAP), found that nearly half of 279 federal climate scientists who responded to a survey reported being pressured to delete references to "global warming" or "climate change" from scientific papers or reports, while many said they were prevented from talking to the media or had their work on the topic edited.

"The new evidence shows that political interference in climate science is no longer a series of isolated incidents but a system-wide epidemic," says UCS's Francesca Grifo. "Tailoring scientific fact for political purposes has become a problem across many federal science agencies."

The issue first bubbled to the surface when Rick Piltz, who worked for a decade coordinating federal research on global warming as part of the U.S. Climate Change Science Program—first under President Clinton and then Bush—quit in mid-2005 alleging that his superiors were misusing and abusing the scientific information he was providing.

Piltz told reporters that Phil Cooney, an official with the President's Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) who worked for an oil industry trade group before coming to the White House, had been editing and altering documents published by the program. "The changes created a greater sense of scientific uncertainty about observed climate change and potential climate change," said Piltz. Soon after Piltz's accusations became known, Cooney left CEQ to work for ExxonMobil, which has itself been accused of publicly misrepresenting the science of global warming.

Just when the brouhaha stirred up by Piltz appeared to be dying down, National Aeronautic and Space Administration (NASA) climate scientist James Hansen, who has been sounding alarms about global warming since the 1980s, rekindled the debate by telling reporters that NASA public affairs staff, under pressure from the Bush administration, were trying to censor his lectures, papers and website postings and keep him away from journalists. In response, NASA Administrator Michael D. Griffin vowed to support "scientific openness" on climate and other topics.

But openness is only a first step. Says Piltz: "Even if we succeed in lifting this heavy hand of censorship, there is still the problem of getting the political leadership to embrace the findings put forward by

the scientists."



Yikes!

We're going up in smoke!

n 2004, a staggering number of years of life were lost in Wisconsin through a completely preventable cause. By estimating that the average 35 year old can expect to live until age 77, the UW Comprehensive Cancer Center has calculated that the combined years due to premature death from tobacco use in that one year were 96,000. The direct health care costs for these lost lives and others living with tobacco-related illnesses during that same year were \$2.16 billion.

National studies and regional surveys of tobacco use by LGBT people have shown rates of tobacco use that are 40% to 60% higher than their heterosexual peers. In Wisconsin, that would suggest that between 31% and 35% of us smoke

tobacco given that the tobacco use rate for the general population in Wisconsin is 22%. The recent survey by Diverse and Resilient at Pridefest in Milwaukee on June 9 and 10 reflected a tobacco use rate of 33% for DAILY smokers and another 11% for occasional users.

The Pridefest survey is based on a convenience sample – people attending a Pride event may or may not reflect the average LGBT person in Wisconsin. Similarly, people who answer surveys while at Pridefest may not even reflect the average Pridefest attendee. Still, some credibility should be given these results because they comprise the responses of 600 LGBT people. Furthermore, these results are right on the money in comparison

to the national and regional surveys completed in recent years.

Speaking of "on the money," these survey results suggest that we are spending \$162 million per year on health care because of LGBT people smoking. We could calculate that cost in terms of iPods (405,000 of them) or really great houses (648) or S-Class Mercedes (1,884 of those). But the bigger issue, the harder calculation, is the years of life lost. Seven thousand two hundred years among LGBT people in Wisconsin this year. And every year until we make the necessary changes.

Another feature of these survey findings is who smokes most. We considered gender, sexual orientation, race, age, and degree of "outness.' Age was the significant variable. Younger people smoked much more (60%) than older LGBT people (35%). In the next year or two we will be able to get even more robust data on our health behaviors as the Behavioral Risk Factor Survey, produced by CDC and implemented by the State of Wisconsin, adds questions about sexual orientation and sexual behavior.

I can almost hear the chorus now:
"This guy must hate gay people. Doesn't he
have any pride? Was he ever any fun? Who
is he anyway?"

Well, to clarify things, I am not at all opposed to smokers. I look at this way – if

someone is a casualty of a multi-billion dollar campaign to smoke, who can possibly blame her or him? The cards are so stacked against smokers, especially if they came from a family that smoked, I am amazed that they do anything else but

Similarly, I am not opposed to accommodating smokers who are working to limit or stop their smoking. Nicotine replacement combined with group interventions have been shown to be very effective in assisting some LGBT smokers quit. I believe tax dollars should be devoted to assisting smokers who want to quit or limit their smoking.

What I am opposed to is pretending that tobacco use is not a really big issue for our community. I love my queer friends and acquaintances. I selfishly want them around for a very long time, instead of going up in smoke.



t is a well-known fact that many gay actors play it straight on the stage and screen. Years ago closeted actors feared losing their careers. Thankfully, today things are much different. The recent Tony award-winning Broadway play THE LITTLE DOG

LAUGHED deals with this issue. It is a play about a female agent trying to hide the fact the one of her male clients is gay.

On the other side of this issue, are the many straight actors who have successfully played gay roles. One of the first openly gay films is THE BOYS IN THE BAND, with gay roles played successfully by straight men.

In the movie THE CHILDRENS HOUR, straight Shirley McLaine and Audrey Hepburn played women accused of having a Lesbian affair.

More recent was the major hit BROKEBACK MOUNTAIN. While we may fantasize that both male leads were gay...they are both straight. As a local play director, I have directed many straight actors in gay roles, and just as many gay actors in straight roles. You may ask, "what difference does it make?" - but it does when it comes to being believable in a role, and doing your research for that character. Introducing Mr. Kirk Thomsen

Local actor Kirk Thomsen started acting when he was in High School. His dream of working professionally did not happen till he was in his early 30's. Looking several years younger than his age, was an advantage in this new career. Kirk has worked in JEFFREY, ROCKY HORROR SHOW,

CALIGULA, and RECKLESS to name a few shows. Several of the parts Kirk has played have been as gay men. Both men I cast in JEFFREY are straight. I have to admit that while directing them there were times I actually thought the two men might be seeing each other. The very open and intimate kissing scenes were so real that I wondered how they could feel so comfortable in these characters. But, after each performance they would return to their female partners. Over dinner recently I asked Kirk how he prepared for the role. He said the emotions he portrayed on stage were the same as he would feel for a woman in his personal life.

Kirk recently started a job as a bartender in one of our Walker's Point area gay bars. I asked him how it felt for a straight man to work in a gay bar. He told me it is all about customer service, and that there is no difference. But, he did notice that gay bars are much more open in their sexuality. Gay men will say alot more about their sexual feelings and desires. In this way it is a totally different World. He also works dealing at POTAWATOMIE Casino.

Kirk has some interesting shows coming up in the future. For OFF THE WALL Theatre he will perform in LADY IN QUESTION. This Charles Busch campyplay also features our favorite DEAR RUTHIE. My she gets around lately...what a STAR! Then Kirk will be in a production of WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOLFE. An interview with Carrie Hoelzer, artist.

arrie Hoelzer and Susan Retzer open a collaborative conceptual art installation, "points of (dis)location" July 7 at the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center.

Carrie Hoelzer is currently pursuing an MFA, as well as a Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies, at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. She spent several years teaching art in a high school setting, earning an MA in Education in 2001.

Susan Retzer earned her BFA in Electronic Art in 1993 from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. She is now turning to creating fine art; work in installation, lenticular imaging, and other digital media. Retzer is currently an instructor of Visual Communications at Milwaukee Area Technical College.

Paul Masterson, executive director of the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center, recently spoke with Carrie Hoelzer about the installation.

PM: Carrie, you are about to install a show with Susan Retzer, "points of (dis)location", at the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center. What issue will it address?

CH: "points of (dis)location" describes events or ways of isolation – of not fitting into the groove. Gender expectations in the heteronormative world create disengagement as a coping mechanism. The work addresses the unpleasantness, emotional anxiety and identity issues that come from not complying with the role fulfillment expected of us.

PM: Tell us about the show and the collaboration with Susan Retzer.

CH: Susan and I have a common perspective. We brainstormed and agreed on a focus with objects and images. It's easy to go off into other areas but we confined ourselves to the experience of disengaging from a situation – not wanting to be present in the environment that's set.

I work across media. The installation consists of large photos and objects. The images reflect an emotional obscurity – a body but the person is disengaged. The starched out

garments, dance costumes actually, are suspended so they appear as if someone is wearing them but the body is absent. They indicate performance and expectations in a gender

specific way.

The pairing of objects and photos reinforces the concept of gender expectation in the patriarchal and heteronormative society.

PM: Can you elaborate on "working across media?"
CH: The way I work, the concept and how materiality communicates are the most important. One medium is too limiting. So, in this case, the photos aren't enough. The garments confront by interrupting the space of the viewer—the space is shared and the dialogue takes place. I like work that requires interaction and experience.

PM: Is this strictly a woman's or feminist's perspective? CH: I don't know how it could not be. My work reflects my experience and my experience is female raised in a small town with Catholic schooling. The show talks about female gender norms and expectations – suitable interests. But, a male can relate.

Feminism is misunderstood. I hold a social feminist viewpoint that espouses identity politics. Sanctioning behavior is a turn off. But, I'm not opposed to celebrating womanhood.

The show's concept is open ended and isn't specifically feminist. It's the about the source and mood rather than the point or a narration - it's about a sense of absence.

The goal is to be universal so anyone can engage in it.

Points of (dis)location opens with an artists' reception on Saturday, July 7, 6-9pm and runs through August 23. Gallery hours 10am-4pm, Monday through Friday and by appointment. Special gallery hours from 6-10pm on Gallery Night, Friday, July

27.


