National LGBT Equality Campaign to Host Event in Madison

Madison - Soulforce (the creators of the Equality Ride) and Atticus Circle (The creators of the "Gay? Fine by Me" T-shirt campaign) two nationally recognized LGBT Rights organizations have teamed up to host a new campaign to be held in state capitol cities around the country, including Madison, WI. The campaign, entitled "Seven Straight Nights for Equal Rights" will aim at giving a new voice and empowerment to LGBTQ Allies everywhere.

By launching an international internet campaign at www.sevenstraightnights.org and hosting local candle light vigils and rallies at state capitols from October 7th-13th, Seven Straight Nights (7SN) hopes to transform the LGBT rights issue into a human rights issue. They also hope to attract local and national media attention surrounding the oppression of LGBT

individuals and the Allies that work so hard to support them.

Transgender Aging Network seeks Survey Participants

As part of its ongoing training and technical assistance work, the Transgender Aging Network (TAN) of FORGE is conducting a survey to document the extent of violence and abuse against trans elders, and the level of fear of abuse trans and SOFFA elders feel.

Transgender individuals aged fifty and over (and those who love or work with them) are encouraged to participate. The online survey, available at http://www.surveymonkey.com/s.aspx?sm=19T85nQICQ PzN92d5isx8g_3d_3d, can be answered both by those reporting their own experiences, or by those reporting the experiences of someone they know.

Stories of neglect, sexual or emotional abuse, financial exploitation, abandonment, health care discrimination, and elder housing discrimination of transgender people age 50 and older can be documented there.

SOFFAs (Significant Others, Friends, Family, or Allies) of trans people who were targeted because of their ties to one or more transgender elders can also be reported.

We use the broadest possible definition of "trans," and especially encourage responses from butch women and feminine men.

TAN, an international, 9-year-old organization providing education and training on transgender aging issues supports trans elders through a free, online peer support email list (ElderTG); and networks professionals and researchers through its Transgender Aging Network email listserve.



QProfile: Activist Kim Sharp "If you want something to happen - you make it happen"

An activist in the Milwaukee community for well over 20 years, self proclaimed "little noisemaker" Kim Sharp was thrust into AIDS activism after the 1985 passing of a friend with the virus - and a promise to him to "do something."

"I had no idea what to do at that time. But I became a "buddy' and befriended someone with AIDS, going to movies,

dinner, just hanging out being a friend."

When that friend died, Sharp began volunteering with the Milwaukee AIDS project, (now ARCW) working on education and fundraising, even working on a consortium to oversee new AIDS medicine

As his activist work progressed, he soon began traveling the country, speaking about safer sex techniques, and bringing back knowledge to teach his own community here in Milwaukee.

"Its just something natural" Sharp says about being an activist. "To stand up and fight for my people. Gay people."

Sharp, also involved with Connexus, says "We're looking forward to bringing the African American community together.

the African American community together to build something. I have friends from out of town who ask me 'well what do you do in Milwaukee?' I always tell them, 'you gotta make your own party."

Part of Connexus is expanding visibility, and Sharp feels that LGBT people should go into all sorts of groups to participate. Along with monthly dining out parties with groups of gay men in "straight" establishments, to show "we're just like everybody else," he feels infiltrating organizations like the NAACP, or church boards and being

openly gay will help squash stereotypes.

"They want our skills, but they don't want our open-ness" he says. "We're no different from them, except for what happens in bed.

And they might even be doing the same things!" he laughs.

As the conversation turns to the topic of coming out, Sharp mentions how difficult the added pressure can be to African

You've already got issues that society puts on you, and to add being gay on top of that, it's a lot to deal with. A lot of people like to keep it quiet, but, what good is that doing to yourself? I believe in coming out." These days, along with talks, and

lectures in homes, churches, and schools, Sharp is working with ARCW on a project to promote safer sex in the African American community, by distributing literature, condoms, and informational videos to barbershops throughout the city. "Its based on a program started years ago, discussing colon and prostate cancer in the barbershops." He says.

"Start conversations with your partner. to back to dating again. Going to these bath clubs, or sex parties, what is that? Russian roulette?" he asks. "People are out there, still being risky. Protection is important, but get to know your partner."

His work is serious and extremely important. It doesn't mean he doesn't have a sense of humor, however. When asked for any final comments, he laughs, "I'm single and looking for a good baby daddy." I laugh, and he continues, "put that down." I told him, its on record now.

people in Milwaukee. The organization officially formed in March of 2007 and made a huge splash at Pridefest earlier this year.

Due to the confusion and outrage created by Milwaukee Alderman Michael McGee Jr's homophobic remarks surrounding the Oct. 2004 beating of Frank Jude Jr. by off-duty Milwaukee police officers, a group of

People of Color who identified as LGBT gathered to bring clarity and help craft the approach of the **LGBT Community** regarding those remarks. The group felt it was important to voice the concerns of people who experienced life through the intersections of race, gender and a sexual orientation.

"We were unhappy with the black community

for ignoring McGee's homophobic comments" Says Brenda Coley, Director of Adult Services with Diverse & Resilient. McGee had refused to apologize for using the word "faggot" when describing the off-duty cops charged with beating Jude.

'We were also upset with the way the larger LGBT community reacted with racism." Coley takes particular aim at a Queer Life News cover image

a year later (Dec. 2005) featuring the mug shot of Michael McGee Jr.- claiming that McGee's image was "blackened."

"He is not public enemy number one, nor is he the cause of Homophobia in our lives," states Coley. "His comments do, however, affect the climate and the safety of LGBT people and particularily those of African descent." Coley then goes on to say that McGee is responsible

for "creating an unsafe or hostile atmosphere to people coming out."

The group also wanted to interrupt the myths that people of color and in particular African American people are more homophobic then whites, are not visible, nor sufficiently active and involved in the LGBT Community.

"There is no evidence or reliable research present that says this is

true." Says Coley. "Black folks, we are overwhelmingly against discrimination."

Janice Warren, Connexus cochair, agrees. "I've been out in this community all my life, and I've never been attacked, or any other negatives you hear on any other levels."

"So where does that come from? Its racism. Connexus interrupts these myths." Coley states.

Connexus co-chairs Jamin Mahon,

and Warren alone are a testament to the absurdity of the myth of inactivity by the AALGBT Community.

"This is just one of many organizations I've been a part of AND in a leadership position." Mahon points out. "I've been volunteering for different causes since college. I was on the LGBT Center board, Men's Voices Milwaukee, Fair Wisconsin... I mean, don't participate? Sometimes, I even go line dancing!" says Mahon with a laugh.

Warren adds, "I was a representative of Action WI back in the mid eighties, worked with Tammy Baldwin, I was with the Lesbians of Color...many, many

At the African American LGBT Leadership Meeting held at UWM in June of 2005, one wall (Coley calls it "The Wall of Wonder") was filled with images of AA LGBT people and organizations that have contributed to

QProfile: SHEBA girl, Nicole Taylor "We're all we have"

Formed in 2000, Milwaukee based SHEBA girls, is a group of transgendered MTF individuals who are speaking out against AIDS, promoting safe sex, and discussing "Harm Reduction" in the community. Nicole Taylor, one of the "Sisters Helping Each other Battle AIDS" (SHEBA), says "We are out there in the world with people who may not see us as "people" so we are learning how to reduce harm, or how to avoid certain situations.

Situations like gay bashing. Taylor, herself, is not immune to such things, and points to her lip where stitches had just been removed earlier in the day.

"Little ol' me," she says, about her experience with three male attackers." It was unavoidable." she adds, feeling her lip, before quickly changing the subject, still clearly upset.
"I think talk shows like Jerry Springer's really portray transgender people in the wrong way, because everybody's not like those people that are on TV. You have to really get to know transgender people. You

can't just stereotype."

Part of her work with SHEBA includes seminars, meetings, and community outreach.

"SHEBA really brings the transgender girls together. We meet every two weeks down at the Diverse and Resilient offices. Brenda (Coley) has really helped us out a lot" Taylor grins.

"There was a lot of bickering between the transgender community and the community as a whole. A

lot of people don't accept transgender people. And for Brenda to work with us to help us all further our education and really do something with ourselves is really lovely."

Taylor hopes that SHEBA's outreach will soon include school seminars, where they can discuss coming out and accepting yourself. She speaks highly of her own high school experience, where several teachers and students were openly gay, and who were able to be her mentors.

"I wouldn't be sitting here healthy, alive and just vibrant if it wasn't for those people. Today, there are a

lot of kids that are coming out more and more now, at 11, 12, and 13, and when they don't know how to deal with coming out, it can lead to suicide, and just risky behavior, because there is nobody there to tell them that its okay to be you."

I noticed the tattoo on her right wrist. "Yes, it says 'Honey'" she says giggling. Then laughing harder, she points to the tattoo on her other wrist "this one says, 'Number one bitch." To which, we both break out in a

"SHEBA has helped us all grow to appreciate each other, and to love one another and to look out for one another, more so than anything else, because we're all we have. We get to know each other for who we are, not who we appear to be." Taylor explains.
"We are all the same people. Some of us look like girls, some look like boys, but we're all the same."

She then points out the window at the Gay Pride flag flying in the breeze outside the D&R Window. "That flag represents us all"

improving black LGBT life in the city of Milwaukee. Connexus is building upon the successes of that history.

Chosen because of their work with capacity building, and leadership development, Diverse and Resilient "gave us the space, and gave us the capacity to be able to look at things in a new way, and build upon our history." Says Coley.

Director of Diverse and Resilient, Gary Hollander's initial suggestion was to discuss issues present in the African American community, and survey the community's needs, wants, and desires in regards to the infrastructure of an AALGBT organization.

Connexus knew they wanted to create a place where one doesn't have to choose between any identity.

"We don't experience any of our identities as separate, and when one is stigmatized or forced or expected to choose one identity over another is when they might cope with the stress in maladaptive and unhealthy behaviors," says Coley.

Noting that LGBT people alone already cope with the stress of being discriminated against, Connexus recognizes that People of Color, and African American people who also identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual or Transgender are coping with multiple stressors- all of which can lower selfesteem and the ability to engage in consistently healthy behaviors.

By fall of that year, and with D&R's assistance, Connexus went to the community for the answers. They conducted surveys, both online, and in paper handouts; participated in numerous focus groups; had group meetings in one another's homes, and attended events held by other AA LGBT focused organizations such as Charles D. Productions. This gave members of the infrastructure planning committee the opportunity to speak directly with community members and discover what type of infrastructure they would want in an organization.

"Would want AND support" stresses Mahon.

The response was overwhelming. Over 500 participants (a small percentage according to Coley, who puts the actual number of African American LGBT in Milwaukee County around 2600-3000) told of the need for help with prevention isolation, family issues, HIV prevention, disclosure issues, health issues and avenues outside of drinking establishments where they would feel comfortable socializing.

"Everyone I had talked to in particular were anxious to get started, and anticipating something to happen in the African American LGBT community," says Warren.

"We also assumed that they would insist on programs being part of an AALGBT organization." Says Coley.

Turns out, it didn't matter. "They didn't care who did it, basically. They wanted it culturally competent, and absent of racism.

Whoever could do that the best is where they wanted to go." Coley stated.

Recently, Connexus held a forum at the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center, regarding "coming out" and found that "quite a number of people were interested in joining us," says Warren. "The more that we do, and present ourselves, the more we get quite a following. We have a pretty good

Mahon agrees, "We want to become so visible that people don't have any thing but to recognize us and challenge their own stereotypes. And we're finding that people want to be part of it in different ways. Some want to volunteer, in putting an event together. Some just want to show up and support, and some just want to give money, or moral support. We'll take it all!"

Funding for Connexus first came in the form of a minority health grant from the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services, in recognition that infrastructure deficits result in ongoing health disparities.

They've since pooled funds from amongst themselves, and were also awarded a grant as part of the Joseph Pabst/ Cream City Foundation's 25/25 Venture. However, Connexus is not a membership organization, nor do they collect dues from participants.

"You need the capacity and the infra structure to apply for grants and solicit donations," explains Coley. "We do need financial support, and resources, and our ability to raise funds, tells us how much the community supports our leadership and activities by both our allies and the AALGBT Community."

First, however, they ask for support within the AALGBT Community and from the infrastructure planning

"That's how committed we all are," Coley, Mahon, and Warren state in

Committed, indeed. Several events are slotted for Connexus's near future, including a December 4th 2007 Holiday party where AA LGBT folk's invite their families and loved ones to share in the culture of the Gay community, as well as events for February's "Black History" month.

Their hope is that it will also be in collaboration and partnership with the larger LGBT Community - their natural allies. To the members and leaders of Connexus, it is important that they not only become influential in the LGBT community, or African American LGBT community, but also in the city of Milwaukee, the state of Wisconsin, and the country as a whole.

People like us belong, everywhere we go. The world needs our perspective." Coley say with a big smile.



UWM Libraries Acquires Collection of Eldon Murray

The UWM Libraries is pleased to announce its acquisition of the personal papers and library of Eldon Murray, a nationally recognized figure in the gay rights movement. Murray was active in virtually all of the major issues involving gays and lesbians from the 1970s to the present day.

In the 1970s, he became involved with the Gay Peoples Union (GPU), the first gay rights organization in Milwaukee and arguably the most important one in Wisconsin during this decade. Murray edited the organization's newsletter, GPU News, from 1971 to 1981; participated in the production of Gay Perspective, a half-hour radio program broadcast locally from 1971 to 1972; and spoke eloquently on the topic of gay rights at countless public events.

Following the first reported cases of AIDS in Wisconsin in the early 1980s, Murray worked to raise funds for the Milwaukee AIDS Project, which was later reorganized as the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. In 1993, he founded SAGE/Milwaukee, the first organization in Wisconsin dedicated to serving the needs of older gays, lesbians, and bisexuals. He served one the board chair 1993 to 2003 and represented SAGE on an advisory board to the Commissioners of the Milwaukee County Department on Aging

Murray's commitment to gay and lesbian equality was recognized by many local and national organizations. In 1998, ONE Institute and the International Gay and Lesbian Archives recognized him as one of 31

pioneers of the gay rights movement.

Murray passed away on March 5, 2007, at the age of 77.

Murray's personal papers document his activity in the early gay rights movement in Milwaukee, the effort to support HIV+ individuals and eliminate discrimination and prejudice based on HIV-status, and to support senior gays and lesbians. The collection includes correspondence, photographs, records of the organizations in which

Murray participated, and ephemera.

With the personal papers, the UWM Libraries acquired Murray's own library. Of particular interest in this collection are scores of "beefcake" magazines from the 1950s and 1960s. Published in the oppressive pre-Stonewall era, the magazines (barely) disguised their homoerotic

intention behind a posing strap of masculine athleticism. The library also includes examples of pulp fiction from the same period.

As a related collection, the Gay Peoples Union generously donated its library of LGBT books and serial publications, which had been stored in Murray's home since the early 1980s. GPU developed the library from items purchased with organization funds, donations by private individuals, and review and exchange copies. According to a GPU annual report, the collection amounted to approximately 1,500 volumes in 1974 and was "probably the largest library collection about homosexuality in the state."

Murray's personal papers are housed in the Archives Department, and his library and the GPU library are available for research in Special Collections. For more information, please contact Michael Doylen, Archives Dept. Head, at 229-6980 or Max Yela, Special Collections Head, at 229-4345.

MD Denies Same-Sex Marrage

Washington - The Maryland Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, recently ruled that same-sex couples do not have a constitutional right to marriage equality. The decision actually reversed a lower-court ruling that Maryland's ban on marriage for same-sex couples violated the states Equal Rights Amendment.

This is a setback in the fight for equality, but we remain confident that, ultimately, same-sex couples in Maryland who form committed relationships and build loving families will receive the same protections that the state provides to married opposite-sex

couples," said Human Rights Campaign Joe Solmonese.

On July 7, 2004, the ACLU, working with Equality Maryland, filed the Conaway v. Deane and Polyak case in Maryland State court on behalf of nine same-sex couples and one gay man seeking the equal right to marry in Maryland. The plaintiffs argued that denying same-sex couples the right to marry violates the state constitution's

guarantee of equality.

On January 20, 2006, the Baltimore City Circuit Court ruled in favor of the plaintiffs, agreeing that Maryland's bar on marriage by same-sex couples violated the Equal Rights Amendment to the state constitution. That court's decision was appealed to the Maryland Court of Appeals, Maryland's high court, which has now reversed the Circuit Court's decision and ruled against marriage equality for same-sex couples and

Massachusetts remains the only state to recognize civil marriage for same-sex

Same-sex couples do not receive federal rights and benefits in any state.

It's now in Arnold's hands - AGAIN

California - Lawmakers have once again approved legislation that would legalize marriage for same-sex couples in the state. For the second time in two years, the measure heads to Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's desk, where despite being urged the sign the bill by gay rights groups such as the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and the Human Rights Watch, it is expected to be vetoed like the previous measure in 2005.

The California Assembly approved the measure, authored by openly gay Assemblyman Mark Leno, on a 42-34 vote on June 5. The state Senate passed the measure, 22-15, on

Schwarzenegger said he vetoed the 2005 measure to uphold the will of the voters who had passed Proposition 22 in 2000 to restrict marriage rights to opposite-sex couples. He has until Oct. 14th to act on the current bill.

Teena Killer Claims Full Responsibility

Lincoln, NE - John Lotter, convicted in the 1993 shooting death of Teena Brandon, and serving time on death row, has long maintained that he is innocent. Now, because the other man convicted in the murder claims full responsibility - Lotter is asking for a new trial.

Marvin Nissen's new account that he was the lone killer in a murder that spawned the movie "Boys Don't Cry" could re-ignite a case that drew national attention to the issues of transgendered people.

Brandon, 21, born a female but living for a time as a man in rural southeast Nebraska, was killed in a farmhouse near Humboldt after reporting being raped by Lotter and Nissen.

During the trial, Nissen said he had stabbed Brandon but that Lotter fired all the shots

that killed Brandon.

"He has finally admitted that the testimony that secured John Lotter's conviction was all a lie," said Paula Hutchinson, attorney to Lotter

Nissen, who is serving a life sentence, says he initially testified that Lotter pulled the trigger to avoid the death penalty

Lotter is seeking complete exoneration, saying he had no role in the crime. The double-jeopardy rule against trying people for the same crime twice will presumably keep Nissen from being tried again and conceivably receiving a death

Nissen has claimed that the idea for the murder was initially Lotters, but because his gun jammed, Nissen proceeded to shoot Brandon, and two others.

Mayor Wants to Overturn State Ban

San Diego - Love trumps injustice, when a Mayor changes his ideas on same sex marriages, because he cannot fathom denying his own daughter, who is a lesbian, the

San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders made a tearful explanation as to why he can no longer oppose same sex marriages, and will now back a City Council decision to support them before the state Supreme Court where California's ban on it awaits review.

'I decided to lead with my heart," said Sanders, before he revealed his daughter's

sexual orientation.

Previously, Sanders vowed to use his veto power to block the council's move. At the time, he repeated his preference for civil unions, partnerships between same-sex couples that offer some but not all of the legal protections given to those who marry.

He said his thoughts on same-sex marriage began to change when he received word of

Sanders, who had never discussed his daughters personal live publicly, began choking back tears just seconds into his five-minute statement.

When mentioning his daughter, and several friends who are part of the LGBT Community, Sanders explained, "In the end, I couldn't look any of them in the face and tell them that their relationships, their very lives, were any less meaningful than the marriage I share with my wife, Rana,

Nearly 62,000 San Diegans are part of households led by a same-sex couple, according to a U.S. Census Bureau survey conducted two years ago.



Justice Ministry urges crackdown on hate crimes

Norway - Police have begun registering all episodes of so-called "hate crimes," involving violence against certain groups of people.

According to a recent survey conducted by the Justice Ministry for the police directorate. Crimes against certain races, homosexuals, the elderly or other specific groups have been on the rise in Norway. Gay men especially have been targets of violence; Justice Minister Knut Storberget wants the punishments for such crimes to be stiffer.

The survey was a result of concern over an apparent rise in violence against homosexuals.

Police are encouraging victims to press charges when suspects are apprehended

Storberget said the government would propose tougher punishment for suspects convicted of hate crimes, especially if the crime was linked to the victim being gay.

et's take this opportunity to review the evolution of zine fests that were specifically about queer zines. Several years have gone by since the last one, but with larger regional zine fests happening on a regular basis, some of which devote workshop time for queer zinesters and their fans, it's hard to have noticed that an all queer zine fest hasn't happened in a few years.

New Spew Review

Despite queer zines, in the form we know them today, evolving in the mid

1980s, it took over five years for the first queer zine fest to take place. The event was billed as Spew and was held at the Randolph Street Gallery in Chicago. Featuring luminaries like Vaginal Davis, Joan Jett Blakk, Elvis Herselvis, and writer Dennis Cooper, the event melded together the scene that J.D.s had created by the words, images, and films produced by the Toronto gang. In fact, G.B. Jones' band Fifth Column played. Spew kick started the Homocore Chicago community and also helped to cement the notion that queer zines didn't exist in a vacuum, that they could be tied to real world events and bring together radical queers in social, political, musical and cultural settings.

Spew II in 1992 happened on Dennis Cooper's home turf, the cultural wasteland

we know as Los Angeles. Coming quickly on the heels of the first Spew event, this zine fest drew a larger audience than the first one, and again featured Joan Jett Blakk and Elvis Herselvis entertaining the throngs. According to a contemporary report in QFM [Issue 4, 1992, 34 pages],

the promised band, Hole, were no-shows and which ever band replaced them on the bill was so lackluster that the editors couldn't remember their name!

The final part in the trilogy, Spew III, happened in one of the ground zero cities for queer zines, Toronto, in 1993. Organized mainly through the tireless efforts of Alan O'Connor, editor of Homocore Toronto, this Spew event was designed to give more emphasis to the workshops, discussion groups, as well as the band performances. Gone were all of the folks associated with past Spew events and in came Match, the awesome music project of long-time zinesters Charlie Nash and Carol Schneck, and Toronto based Ignatz and Chicken Milk. People such as queer British filmmaker Isaac Julien popped in to the after parties. Ironically, this event marked Bruce La Bruce's final offering to the queer punk zine world, the brilliant Monstar.

Beginning of The End

The success of Spew III inspired a group of radical anarcho queers in Minneapolis to take a stab at hosting a similar event, generically named The Queer Zine Gathering. Part queer zine fest, punk show, and Radical Faerie gathering in nature, there were good intentions behind this event but it never quite got off the ground in its projected scope. Yet despite the scathing critique of Bundle of Sticks editor TEG, participants such as long-time zinesters Anonymous

Boy, Reb of Fanorama, and others pitched in and made up for the gaps when plans fell apart. San Francisco folks stepped up to the plate in 1996 and offered up a week long music festival called Dirtybird that managed to be global in scope and take full advantage of the queer punk groundswell to get bands like Tribe 8, Sta-Prest, Sleater-Kinney, and Dyke Van Dick. Dirtybird also saw the triumphant return of Ms Vaginal Davis as Saint Salicia Tate. This set the stage for the final mashup of queer zines and punk rock in the legendary Scutterfest series in L.A. in the early 2000s through the efforts of Rudy Scutter, who brought together perhaps the largest lineup of queercore bands ever and set the bar high for anyone brave enough to attempt to rock out with their zines out!



LGBT Rights in Bloom

Chicago - Equality Illinois, a statewide advocacy organization working for equal rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals, has appointed Amy Bloom executive director. With 10 years of experience in non-profits, Bloom has spent the last three years working as a senior manager of special events at Howard Brown Health Center, an LGBT health-care facility.

As part of her new position, Bloom will head up fundraising and oversee organizational operations. In conjunction with board members and volunteers, she will coordinate the "Justice for All" gala, an annual fundraiser that attracts about 1,000 supporters, the group said.

Equality Illinois, founded in 1982, promotes state, county and municipal legislation to eliminate prejudice and discrimination against lesbians, gays, bisexuals and transgender individuals.

Corporate Equality on Rise

Washington - The Human Rights Campaign Foundation has released its sixth annual Corporate Equality Index showing an unprecedented 195 major U.S. businesses earned the top rating of 100 percent, up from 138 last year - a 41 percent increase. The Index rates employers on a scale from 0 to 100 percent on their treatment of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender employees, consumers and investors.

Today, at least 282 cities and towns, and 19 states, across the country have added workplace protections that protected against discrimination based on sexual orientation. More than 93 local jurisdictions, and 11 states, have laws that include protections based on gender identity.

Come out, come out, wherever you are!

ctober 11th, 2007 will mark the 19th anniversary of National Coming Out Day since its birth in 1988 to celebrate the Second National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights that had taken place one year prior.

National Coming Out Day is not only a day on which closeted gays are encouraged to come out of the closet, but also to raise awareness about equality. In terms of making a positive statement and betting the LGBT community, it is perhaps only second to the Day of Silence.

But given that October 11th is just around the corner, it seems appropriate to discuss a very important question that every LGBT person must face: When is the right time to come out?

Let's make the assumption that most of the individuals faced with this question are adolescents, and rightly so, because the longer one hides his/her sexuality from the rest of the world (and perhaps him/herself), the more complicated matters become.

For me, the entire process was a piece of cake. In fact, I was the *last* person to know I was gay- all I really had to do was tell myself. I suppose there was some definitive point where I sat down and told my mother and my father, though their reactions are probably the best any kid could ask for. My dad said something along the lines of, "Oh, that's cool." And my mother told me that "as long as [I was] using condoms," she couldn't care less about my sexuality. Then she asked me if I wanted to go shoe shopping with her (I did, of course).

Admittedly, there were probably a few things that tipped them off- my extensive *Barbie* collection, my insistence on wearing skirts to kindergarten, the continual theft of my mother's lipstick and pleading for my own make-up kit...not exactly your typical All-American Male behavior.

Unfortunately, most kids probably aren't so lucky. Coming out to your parents is a really big deal, more so than your friends and peers. Not only do adolescents tend to be generally more accepting of alternative sexualities, but realistically, if one isn't-you can always find new friends. It's true. And if someone you thought you were close to is so deeply traumatized by your sexuality that they no longer wish to be your friend, good riddance. Nobody should have to deal with that sort of callowness.

Parents, however, are an entirely different story- they're the only ones you've got. They are your protectors, your nurturers, and the only two people who have watched every single step of your life. And even just

the thought of possible rejection makes one's stomach turn over- not to mention facing the situation head-on. So what's the best way to go about it?

First of all, you have to be comfortable with yourself and your sexuality before anyone else will be able to. When I was experiencing confusion about my sexuality I found it very helpful to go online or go to the library and read about others' experiences; see what they have to say, and how they coped with things.

It's also good to have some sort of support system, however minimal, before telling your parents. Whether this is your best friend, sibling, or school guidance counselor, having someone to fall back on is extremely comforting.

And lastly, go easy on your parents. Especially if you think they're completely oblivious to the situation (though you may be surprised-most aren't) or if they happen to be particularly socially or politically conservative. Reassure them that you love them; that they haven't done anything wrong, and neither have you-that you are still you. A very bad way to go about it would be by introducing them to your new boyfriend or girlfriend. That's a lot to process all at once, and the results could be disastrous. And don't feel like you have to do it all by yourself-having a confidante with you can be very helpful, especially if either party begins to get emotional.

Coming out can be rough; it can be emotional and it can be stressful, but it is also absolutely necessary for your own inner peace and happiness. In a rather dramatic example, you can think about it this waywhich is scarier? Facing your parents now, as an adolescent, or waking up one day, 30 years from now, with a wife/husband and two kids and being forced to reveal a secret that will tear that family apart?

So come out of the closet, it's dark in there. You owe it to yourself.

Bodies of the Patriarch or Embodied Feminism?

atherine Crouch's controversial, pro-lesbian, anti-body-altering film, Gendercator, has received a great deal of attention - connecting how the religious right, the patriarchy, and the medical community are coercing "lesbians" to hormonally and surgically alter their bodies to become men. Although she notes that transsexuality exists (albeit in small numbers), she asserts that "more and more often we see....lesbian women altering themselves into transmen. Our distorted cultural norms are making women feel compelled to use medical advances to change themselves, instead of the world."

Discussions stemming from her controversial views have resulted in strong stances about who is aligned with the people who oppress those in the LGB and T community, intimating that gender non-conforming people are or might be (sub)consciously collaborating with the right-wing to force a binary heterosexual norm upon everyone. Yet, ironically, Crouch, won't allow trans+ individuals to align with feminism if we choose to change our bodies. She forces us to be either oppressors (aligned with the right wing) or traitors (no longer feminists, if we alter our

Gender theorists recognize that millions of people in the United States not just "transsexuals," but a wide variety of people who may overtly identify as gender non-conforming, and those who subconsciously break the "rules" of gender - need to simultaneously be able to have the right to make individual choices about our bodies AND need to live in a culture that is accepting of an expanding (or erased) boundary of gender identity and

The LGBT community prides itself on promoting free speech and opposing oppression. However, when freedom of speech is persuasively hateful in intent, there is a fine line between the expression of personal opinions and outright bigotry (especially when rooted in blatant and oversimplified untruths). How can we support everyone's right to express their personal opinions and also minimize the promotion of oppressive and prejudicial attitudes and behaviors?

There are ways to value female masculinity without belittling or demonizing transgender people. There are ways to embrace and honor lesbians, butches, and masculine women without blaming the patriarchy or female-born individuals who use hormones and/or surgery. Gender-questioning individuals often spend years agonizing over the paradox of not wanting to reinforce the gender binary, but also feeling unnervingly uncomfortable in their own skin.

I would far rather work with Catherine Crouch to dismantle gender-based stereotypes and support the limitless ways gender can be expressed - honoring butches and masculine women (and also holding space for those who wish to transition and/or alter their bodies) - than battle with her to protect the rights of my tribe to exist and not be maligned with inaccuracies and fear-based hostility.

The feminism many of us grew up with fought hard for the rights of all individuals to not have our bodies controlled by others. (Let's not forget Roe v. Wade.) Isn't it antifeminist to ostracize people of any gender

for altering their body and/or living in the body they feel most comfortable in?

For Crouch, though, the right to chose one's gender (and expression) is less important than deconstructing the patriarchal political movement. She stresses that individual choice should not be celebrated as the highest good, but rather can and should be criticized.

In my version of feminism, personal choice is always at the center. Choice is the heart that leads the way to self-actualized, empowered individuals. Choice results in a stronger community of non-conforming, self-defining people who know what they believe and can boldly take the steps to get there - changing themselves and changing the world along the way.



PrideFest Attendees Donate 15,000 Pounds of Food

Milwaukee, WI - PrideFest attendees donated 15,000 pounds of canned and nonperishable food to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin and its network of statewide food pantries this summer during the fourday-long event. The record amount of food collected is 50% more than the previous record set last year of around 10,000 pounds.

'The food collected at Pridefest will help stock all four ARCW food pantries across the state as well as the shelves at Wisconsin House - the ARCW transitional housing facility for people living with HIV," said Randy Bash, ARCW Director of Food Services. "ARCW is truly grateful to the hundreds of people who attended Pridefest and made a donation to our food pantries."

PrideFest attendees can receive vouchers for tickets by donating canned and nonperishable food to ARCW during the festival. This year, the food donated is enough to feed three hundred families with a family member living with HIV for a month.

"ARCW food pantries support more than 1,000 people across Wisconsin by providing nutritious and appropriate food for HIV-positive people who have unique dietary concerns," said Bash. "In addition to providing food, ARCW food pantries also provide nutritional education.'


People living with HIV face chronic wasting and the loss of lean body mass (muscle) as a result of HIV infection. Often people living with HIV also face high cholesterol and heart disease as side effects of their HIV medications. Moreover, many single adults without families have difficulty receiving food from traditional food pantries that place greater emphasis on addressing the needs of families, especially those with children.

'Members of the gay community were truly the first responders to the fight against AIDS," said Bash. "We are so grateful for their ongoing support more than 25 years

To ensure that people with HIV are not forced to choose between buying food or purchasing their medications, ARCW operates four food pantries across Wisconsin in Eau Claire, Green Bay, Kenosha and Milwaukee providing more than one ton of food each day to people living with HIV. By the end of 2007, ARCW will also open food pantries at its locations in Wausau and La

ARCW is Wisconsin's largest AIDS service organization and has offices in Eau Claire, Appleton, Green Bay, Kenosha, La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, Superior and Wausau. With the support of the Mike Johnson life care and early intervention services grant and other funding sources, ARCW provides medical care, dental care, mental health therapy, legal representation, housing services, a food pantry and social work case management to 3,000 Wisconsin residents living with HIV/AIDS. Additionally, ARCW also reaches 150,000 people annually at risk of contracting HIV with life saving prevention information and resources.





This I Believe

n the 1950s the great radioman Edward R. Murrow recorded such notable people as Helen Keller talking about their deepest beliefs. In recent years National Public Radio has revived the tradition of capturing people's philosophies in short audio essays.

I have always been a zealous collector of quotations, as if one pithy statement could transform my life. It sounds corny, but some of these sayings have catapulted me to new understandings that in a way nothing else does.

In my 30s I discovered the quote, "Resentment is like taking poison and expecting the other person to die." This started me on a path of forgiveness toward my parents, who had not always been as kind or as emotionally attentive as I would have liked. As an angry teenager who managed to stretch her rebellion out an extra decade or so, this insight thrust me into a period of personal growth. As Josh Billings puts it, "It's not only the most difficult thing to know one's self, but the most inconvenient."

After getting stuck again a few years later, a health newsletter in a doctor's waiting room jolted me into action. My excuses all melted away as I read Abraham Lincoln's words: "Most folks are about as happy as they decide to be." I mean, time stopped. I can still remember the lightning bolt in my head screaming out, "What?!?!? I have choices on how to view my circumstances?" That notion, along

with the anti-depressants I was discussing with my doctor on that visit, empowered me to overcome a lingering sense of rage, emotional deprivation and alienation from myself.

Then I started noticing how much of life is consumed in fear-based reactions and people-pleasing. I questioned my reactions that smacked of "If I act this way, will you like me?" or "If I never challenge myself, I won't risk looking like a fool." I guess about that time is when I discovered the nugget by William Shedd, "A ship is safe in harbor, but that's not what ships are for." I started believing in myself, finally drowning out those ingrained voices of defeat and discouragement. I changed jobs and got into a relationship after many years of being alone.

I learned to see challenges as opportunities. (Let's hear it for growing pains! Ouch!) The old me used to wonder what the right thing to do was. I was like an actor without a script in a bad movie that never turned out my way. No matter how old you are, if you still feel like an abandoned child inside, you will not be able to find satisfaction in anything.

Nowadays I just seem to tap into a humming inside that launches me into the next right thing. I cannot be rattled or put off easily when I know I'm doing what I was meant to. Even a recent diagnosis of Type-2 diabetes has turned into a second chance to develop healthy habits and to go back to belly dance class.

The People's Campaign

early thirty years ago the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the organization behind the work of Martin Luther King, launched "The Poor People's Campaign" in an effort to advance the cause of economic justice, especially for America's poorest communities. The justice so clearly imagined then is still sorely missed today.

That is why MICAH (Milwaukee Inner-City Congregations Allied for Hope) is launching "The People's Campaign" aimed at addressing the issue of quality jobs and meaningful opportunities for Milwaukee's

For me there is a spiritual imperative to join in a campaign to help Economic Justice. poor people

poorest citizens. One of the cornerstones of the campaign is a list of Ten Commandments of which echo the needs of our city's poorest residents

for jobs, job training, transportation, and development that is not only profitable to the developer but also beneficial to all our residents.

At this phase of the campaign MICAH leaders are focused on achievable goals such as requiring construction projects that receive public funds to have 30% of work hours performed by unemployed or underemployed city residents in hiring. To achieve its goals MICAH is working to mobilize its grassroots constituency, train new leaders, and engage politicians and

developers around its issues.

Dr. Floyd Prude, President of the WI General Baptist State Convention, spoke at the rally launching the campaign. He identified a key motivation, "We believe that what affects one directly affects all indirectly." To that he added, "We believe we will not look down on anyone unless we are lifting them up."

The People's Campaign will be the major focus of MICAH, and because many congregations that welcome queer people are part of MICAH, it is a campaign whose work we ought to consider. Is it a gay campaign? Certainly not in the way the marriage amendment was, but it ought to be a queer concern.

Simply at a personal level, the issue of quality economic opportunities for the unemployed and the underemployed directly affects queer people. The poorest members of our community are certainly not the most visible, but our people live in every part of the city at every income level. There are gay and lesbian people who will be positively helped by this campaign. As Joe Jackson, Pastor of Evergreen Missionary Baptist, succinctly says, "For our city to be vital, everyone needs the opportunity to work and have a family sustaining job whether they are gay or straight.'

Thinking pragmatically, there is a close connection between the expansion of civil rights and economic vitality. Places of increasing job stagnation and rising disparity in wages are not communities




that expand rights. One could say that a vibrant community for gays and lesbians rests on a vibrant economy for all.


Most importantly, the People's Campaign makes a moral claim: our neighbors need economic opportunities. Too many are unemployed or underemployed in too many neighborhoods of our city and this reality places a claim on my heart. For me, I can't read the Bible without running into Jesus helping poor people. I can't go through Milwaukee without running into poor people who need help. So for me there is a spiritual imperative to join in a campaign to help poor people get the jobs and the opportunities they need.



Interview With Bitch

alented and outspoken, Bitch is a Radical Feminist role model for this generation. The first time I saw her play, as part of the duo Bitch and Animal, I could feel how well she connected with the audience of thousands of womyn, and I knew that I was

witnessing the next phase of the not-yet-over Feminist Revolution. Bitch, who took the name to reclaim it from its stereotypes against women, was gracious enough to take some time off from her tour and production schedule to answer a few questions.

JC: When did you get started in music?

B: When I was four, I saw an episode of Sesame Street that featured a man who played the fiddle. I was hooked. I begged and begged my parents, and finally they got me a violin and lessons to go with it. That was a little unusual in our house, because my mom is very musical, but not with instruments. She is a tap dancer and ran a tap-dancing school out of our basement. Also, my parents and sisters were always singing. My dad listened to jazz all the time. I stuck with my violin lessons (although they were far from what I had seen that man on Sesame

Street doing, because my lessons were classical music!) until I graduated from high school. Then I went off to acting school, which shocked everyone around me, because they just assumed I would go to music school. In hindsight, though, this was the last detail in helping me towards a career in music. In acting school, I learned how to inhabit my body in a really deep way. I started to expand my ideas of theater. I started to think in the context of 'shows,' and I met my first band-mate, Animal. We developed our own kind of theater, which we later realized was what other people would label a 'band.'

JC: Describe your introduction to Feminism.

B: I didn't really even hear the word until I got to college. It was like figuring out what a tattoo that had been on my body all my life, one that I had no idea where it came from-what it meant and how it got there. Is that a good metaphor? Finding feminism was like somebody took a mask off of me. I was no longer having to live in a false world, where a huge social dynamic that I had been living with was finally being acknowledged and named.

JC: What do you make of the 'generation gap' within the Feminist and Lesbian communities and what are some of the ways you work to jump it on both sides?

B: The generation gap in our community is intense and real. So many women my age are completely unaware of the movements and work of the women who came before us. I attribute this to misogyny through and through. The way that we are not taught to learn from our elders, the way our herstory does not get passed down, and the way that our society is so ageist.

I happened to learn about the Women's Music Movement, for example, from this film, Radical Harmonies, I got such an education about where this whole culture of Women's Festivals come from! And I realized that I had grown up with an image of a woman wearing purple beating a drum, calling someone sister, as the ultimate nerdiness. In my evolution as a feminist, I realized how many voices in my life had supported that. Then I had to go deeper and realize and empathize with WHY those voices exist. Of course those women are a huge threat to our misogynist

society, and so of course we are going to be trained from early on, in very subtle ways, that they are freaks or man-haters or nerds or unfxxkable or uncool, and so on and so on.


Seeing Radical Harmonics also made me realize how rebellious these gatherings and festivals were in nature. I started to see how Punk and DIY it all was, done from dreams and common visions and sweat and righteousness of young rebellious women. These women are now my elders, and ones that I want to learn from. I think acknowledging that is the beginning of me 'jumping the gap.'

I got to start taking my elders in as humans, artists, sexy radical activists, organizers, etc. Meeting Ferron, hearing her songs, and working with her has been a mind and heartexpanding experience. I think it is doubly rewarding, because I see her as my peer. One that I respect and can poke fun and play with.

JC: Will you be making another trip to Milwaukee any time soon?

B: Yes, I will come through there in the spring, with my band, Bitch and The Exciting Conclusion. I'm currently working on this Ferron record. I want my friends to be able to hear her songs like they're sitting next to her, and I just happened to pick up my fiddle. I want to make a record of her that is not as 'produced' as a lot of her past stuff. I want to hear her...naked!

I'm also hoping to get into the studio this winter and make a record with my band. I've been writing a movie for two years and want to finish that this winter too!



A Real Restaurant Health Inspection

"Hi, Paul!" It's the young host at a local chain restaurant. She had spotted us at a table where we were seated while she was on break.

riendly, courteous, enthusiastic

- everything you'd want in a person with her job. After returning the greeting, my partner of 24 years, using the host's first name, said, "I'd like you to meet my partner Gary." Not missing a beat, she replied, "What kind of business are you in?"

Ah, there it was.

There was the reason she had never noticed me with him. I had witnessed their warm greetings many times, but I

was invisible to her. But I won't be again. Paul corrected her. Her smile froze. She swung slowly, stiffly to her right and picked up speed as she sought the shelter of her station near the door.

Soon Paul and I were hypothesizing about her sudden loss of charm and poise.

We quietly joked about the business we'd been up to for over two decades. Keep in mind that we're the same guys who are so clearly a couple that even agents at airports ask us how long we've been together.

Lately I've taken to selecting some clothes that make even casual passers-by take note of my sexual identity. Still something small clicked in my brain at this incident over our salads at a local eatery. I was reminded and resolved to make my sexual orientation even more apparent. My current plans are to try out some of these methods:

- "Would you mind shifting over one seat? My partner and I want to sit together."
- "I'm unsure about how to fill out this part of the form. I'm neither married nor single."
- Oh, I see. Well, these days while we still cant' marry in Wisconsin, 'partner' is the best way we've figured out how to let you know we're committed to one another."
- "Hi, this is my spouse Paul."
 Close friends and family might be
 surprised that I continue to find more
 contexts in which to be out. Neighbors,

grocery store checkers, contractors, government workers, health care providers, pool attendants, admirers of our garden, readers of area press – they all know I'm gay. But if this young restaurant host missed this fact around which so much of my life is organized, an important bridge

to others – my sexual identity – remains linked to societal oppression rather than to human acceptance and appreciation.

I was pretty clear she was not generally some jerk, and was more likely misinformed and sheltered from reality by rigidly enforced filters of bias. Two public health issues were at play here as well. The host, as an employee of a company that is highly regulated by health departments, failed at the cultural competence expected in legitimate accommodation. Paul and I, pretty tough old birds in these misunderstandings, still likely experienced some subtle assault to self-esteem, a critical factor associated with making a number of health decisions.

No, we weren't victimized by this woman young enough to be our daughter. But that is because we refuse to be. Still, the minor incident was a little death. I'm glad to say that fifteen minutes later we got the traditional "Are your meals to your liking?" from her. A bit later still, we heard her say, "See you later, guys – thanks for stopping."


I think all three of us will be working on this incident in the next couple of weeks before we go back to the restaurant again. She'll be trying to get a hand with her homophobia. We'll be doing the same with the places we internalize it. And Paul and I will be coming out more.

Please join us in doing the same. It is important to our health as a community and as individual transgender, bisexual, lesbian, and gay people.







Dear EarthTalk:

I want to give my baby fresh, organic food but I don't have the time to make her special meals. What options are out there?

- Marie L., via e-mail

abies deserve the best-possible start in life, so giving them nutritious food is a must, not only for good health but also to establish positive eating habits as early as possible.

According to Consumers Union (CU), publisher of Consumer Reports magazine, commercial baby foods, many of which are made up of condensed fruits and

vegetables, can contain high concentrations of pesticide residues. "A lot of these pesticides are toxic to the brain," says Philip Landrigan, a professor of pediatrics and preventative medicine at Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York City. Citing studies that have linked smaller head

circumference and reduced intelligence in babies to in utero exposure to pesticides consumed by their mothers, Landrigan says it is best not to gamble when it comes to baby food.

The study concluded: "An organic diet provides a dramatic and immediate protective effect" against pesticide exposure.

PFLAG Allies Support ENDA

Washington, DC - On Monday, September 24, the National Staff of Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) National delivered more than 12,000 pro-equality postcards from constituents across the country to both the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate. The individually written cards were collected from 40 states across the country as part of PFLAG's campaign, "People Don't Get Fired for Being Straight" to support the passage of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA).

"Lawmakers can not ignore the thousands of constituent demands for workplace equality," said John Cepek, PFLAG President. "From Georgia to Ohio and Indiana, from New York to California, the time has come to pass this bill and protect all American workers."

ENDA, if passed, would extend federal employment discrimination protections that are currently provided on race, religion, gender, national origin, age, and disability to also cover sexual orientation and gender identity.

The Employment Non Discrimination Act was introduced in the House by a bipartisan group of legislators including Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA), Rep. Deborah Pryce (R-OH), Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Rep. Chris Shays (R-CT). As of press time, the bill was in committee.

Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) is the nation's premier grassroots organization committed to the civil rights of gays, lesbians, bisexual and transgender (GLBT) persons. Founded in 1973 by heterosexual mothers and fathers, PFLAG has 500 chapters and over 250,000 members and supporters throughout the United States.

This Month in Wisconsin **LGBT History OCTOBER**



35 years ago: 1972- GPU to be broadcast over WOKY radio; Lesbians hold seminar in Waukesha; Back Room bar in Madison opens; new Miss Gay Milw, Billie Shepard, is crowned.

30 years ago: 1977 - ECOM holds Halloween show, and contests for Miss Gay WI and Mr. Groovy Guy; Jamie Gay and Paul Zinthefer win respectively.

20 years ago: 1987 - Madison sends 2 buses of people to October 11 March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights (Milwaukee cancels their bus due to "lack of interest"); Beer Town Badgers holds a Club Night with a telephone answering machine as prize; Lavendar Hill IV announces results of August event: over \$3,600 raised for Milwaukee AIDS Project; Milwaukee Mayoral candidate Martin Schreiber said that he did "not understand how two people of the same sex could live together in such a relationship. I don't agree with it and I don't accept it". Schreiber made his remarks at a September 30 forum sponsored by CCBA, Lambda Rights Network, BWMT, and In Step. On October 28, cable TV show "Tri-Cable Tonight", sponsored by the Cream City Foundation, debuts; the program goes on to run for 26 episodes over as many months, and wins several major national and local cable programming awards. At the first Miss Your Place contest, Mr. Gay Wisconsin David Rogers, and Dorris DeLago, crowned Venessa winner. Joe won as Mr. Y.P.; Legendary drag performer Holly Brown holds her Bon Voyage party; and Wayne Bernhagen, owner of both Wreck Room and Your Place bars, and a founder of SSBL/ Saturday Softball League, and founder of the Milwaukee Classic (which started as the Wreck Room Classic), passes away, a victim of AIDS

he authors, Scott Aylward and Patteye Moore, have a combined fifty years of experience and each is highly successful in their own right. Patteye Moore is the former president of SONIC Corp. the largest drive-in restaurant chain in the U.S. and Scott Aylward is the former Chairman and CEO of Barkley, Evergreen, and Partners, the largest employee owned advertising corporation in the U.S. They achieved their success by relying on their instincts.

Confessions from the Corner Office is

primarily directed at those aspiring to corporate success but easily transfers to those involved with civic, church, and volunteer organizations or to simply managing a family.

Confessions from the Corner Office is not your standard business leadership book. Much of what is discussed likely runs counter to the actual practices in existence in many corporations. The

attitudes of responsibility, confidence, being open and passionate about your career as well as being open to the world around you, observing and taking inspiration from your observations, and motivating those around you with your passion.

Practical career guidance is offered also which ties into attitudes, *listening* to subordinates and customers, making yourself available and approachable, no cocooning behind a closed door in your ivory tower or in this case corner office. Taking ownership


> for mistakes, asking for help when it is needed, evaluating talent, recharging and reenergizing and, refreshingly, making your personal life a priority.

sexual orientation has nothing to do with it but your soul mate needs to be someone that you can be honest with. The corporate soul mate is more than just simply a mentor. It would be someone who will inspire, challenge, debate and encourage you, consult with you, and hold you to honesty and accountability. Someone in whom you have complete trust and has the same for you.


