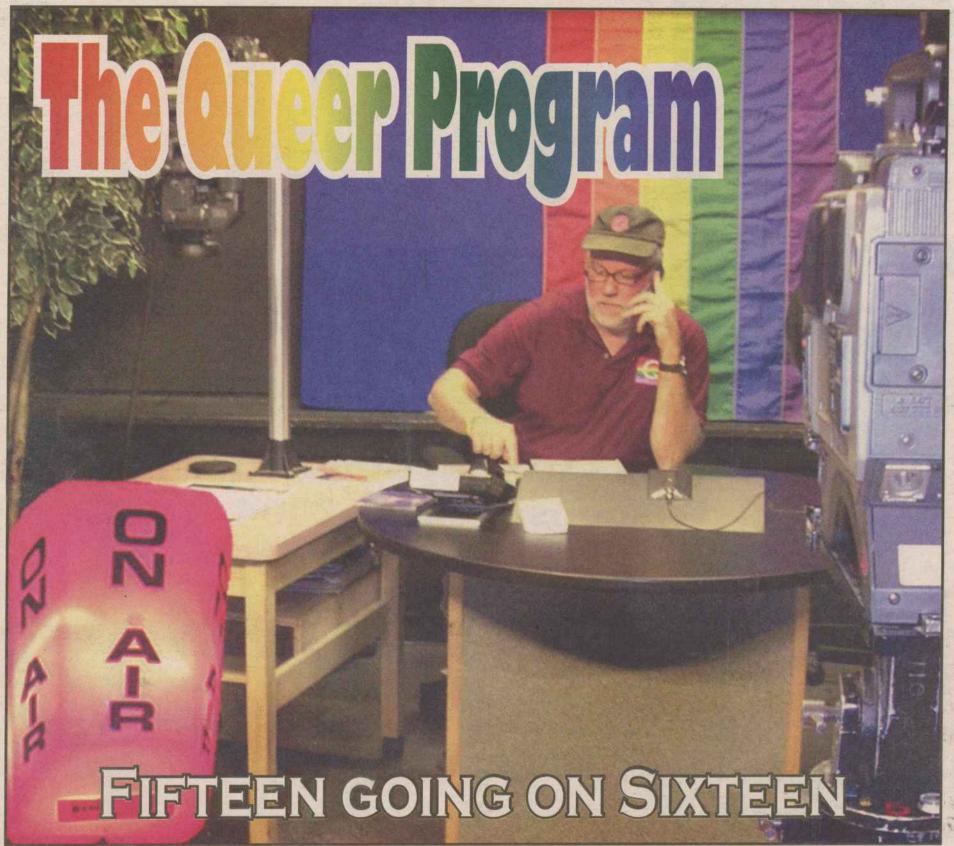

wenty years ago, a group of like-minded individuals got together to produce programming by, for, and about the LGBT community in Milwaukee. From their spirited ideas and visions, the Milwaukee Gay/Lesbian Cable Network was born.

With assistance from the Milwaukee Access Telecommunications Authority (MATA), a non-profit corporation providing citizens access to Milwaukee's cable system, the MGLCN had enough support to begin broadcasting. They were supplied with cameras, studios, and training, and were soon hitting the airwaves with a number of special programs.

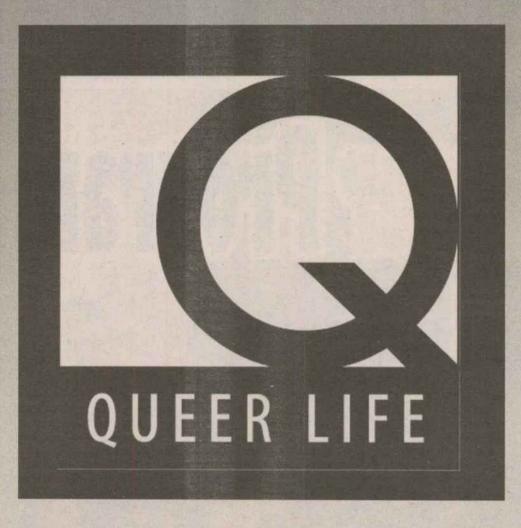
Financing for the first regular program, entitled, "Tri-Cable Tonight," came in May 1987 in the form of a \$3,000 grant from the Cream City Foundation, which would actually fund the first six episodes, and extend their promise for future funding.

In October of that year, Tri-Cable Tonight, founded by Mark Behar and Bryce Clark premiered its first thirty-minute news and entertainment program. Two years and 26 episodes later, after covering both local and national topics, and winning several awards, it aired it's last.

Next came "Yellow on Thursday," a comedy program airing on an irregular basis. It ended in 1991 after five episodes. The "New Tri-Cable" then ran from 1990 to 1992, and focused on specific issues, with a moderated panel discussion.

Although the Milwaukee Gay/Lesbian Cable Network is no longer in existence, and most of the people involved in the LGBT cable programming have moved on, there is one program that has withstood the test of time. The Queer Program.

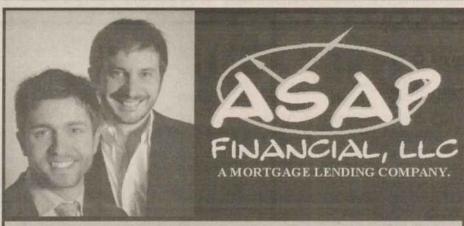

from Tri-Cable Tonight, and, an active member of Milwaukee's lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) community, since the 1970s has been the host of Milwaukee's long running Queer Program since 1992, and is now entering his 16th year behind the desk and in front of the camera.

We sat down with Lisowski to talk a bit about the history of the show, and where it's headed.

QL: We noticed that the Queer Program is sandwiched between two separate religious programs.

ML: I know! If you look at the schedule it's amazing, I think three-fourths of the programming are all these individual churches. One group just tapes their service then shows that every week. It's like fundamentalism for shut-ins.

QL: How did the Queer Program come about, when these other programs were going silent?

ML: When Jeffrey Dahmer hit the news in 1991, there were all these rumors flying around in the community, and at the time, we had been doing the New Tri Cable show with more single topic discussions. I thought what we needed was a TV show with current local gay news. And, a way to get a handle on rumor control. So, when this idea from MATA came up for non-profit organizations or individuals to have weekly shows in their MPACT studio, I thought it was perfect.

Lisowski explains that it would offer an opportunity to do a show on a smaller, more intimate scale. Efforts to work on the Tri-Cable series proved time consuming to most, and the crew of seven or eight eventually dwindled to three people. With the new program through MPACT, all they needed was one individual, and they'd have a show.

At the time, Lisowski was working in prevention at ARCW, where he approached a fellow employee, and local activist Dan Fons to join him on the new show. After pushing for involvement from ARCW, Lisowski and Fons went off on their own to start the Queer Program.

ML: Dan was a big 'ol activist with Queer Nation and Act up. We started in 1992, and would do the show every Tuesday for a half an hour. He did a lot of serious activist pieces, while I was more on the funny side. He left after about four years, and then Charles Daniels started coming on, in '93. And we invited Tim Hanson to join us after he had called into the show several times.

"The first time I sat in on the show was in 1993, but I started doing it full time in '94," says Charles Daniels, (Executive Director of HIV Prevention Services-Charles "D" Productions.)

"Mike and I are the only ones certified as producers, so if he needs a break he can ask me to fill in." Daniels expressed ideas for the future of the show, by having more involvement from younger LGBT community members.

"We need to have something new and exciting because our community is going in a different direction." Says Daniels. "We need to start targeting those younger gays and lesbians that are going to be taking over."

Such projects are already in the works. The Queer Program was recently awarded a \$2,228 grant from the Cream City Foundation in support of the creation of a Q-Youth Cable TV Training Project that will train LGBT youth on the techniques of basic cable access television production. Project Q, and the Alliance School are a part of that plan. The youths would be eligible for free TV production training, and are able to be a producer at MATA once they are eighteen years old.

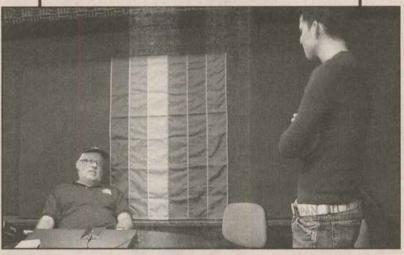
"Cream City Foundation recognizes the value of LGBT visibility, which is why we are proud of the work of the Queer Program," says Cream City Foundation Director, Maria Cadenas. "As the first funder of the former Tri-Cable network, one which Mike Lisowski helped host, we know the value of television coverage. This year were especially proud to fund a pilot youth program in partnership with Project Q and the Alliance School that utilizes the Queer Programs assets, including Mr. Lisowski, in aiming to provide real life skills and television programming experience to LGBTQ youth."

QL: Is it difficult to get feedback, or involvement from the community?

ML: It is. You want involvement, or feedback, but sometimes you can't win. Its funny, I've had people call me off the show, and say, 'are you still doing Queer Program?' and I said, 'yeah, for fifteen years, now.' So that's frustrating. And that was from people active in the community.

Trying to secure guest appearances is also a bit difficult at times, says Lisowski, who often times feels brushed off.

ML: I don't get it. I don't know if people are just naturally shy, or nervous, but it's not like they are making a dentist appointment. I mean, it's a chance for them to get on the show, and talk about what projects they are doing, or any upcoming events. That's why this

program with the kids is important.

"The Queer Program is probably one of the most organized gay programs on public access. Probably one of the most organized programs, period," said alternating co-host Tim Hanson. "We want these youths to become producers. It's a great training process."

Daniels agrees, "They should really take advantage of it. Mike has been doing so much for the community for so many years, but for the Queer Program to continue to prosper, we need to include our youth."

According to Lisowski, however, there have been difficulties in getting the program with Project Q and Alliance School off the ground. Two students had initially signed up for the training, and one has since dropped out. He hopes that they will soon become more involved, and eventually take over the show, or start their own show.

QL: What makes the Queer Program different from Tri-Cable?

ML: I'd say it's a less scripted form of community news. Tri-Cable was more talk show, news and scripts, and they were also once a month, whereas we are on every week.

QL: What is it like just before you go on air?

ML: The only thing you worry about once and a while is if the volume is up! Someone will come into the studio and say 'your sound isn't on.' Then we will start the show over and say 'oh hi, we just talked for five minutes and no-one could hear us.'

After all these years of doing the show, there is no nervousness on Lisowski's part. His questions come naturally, and although guests at times can be nervous, the atmosphere is pretty relaxed. Normally, any planned questions come only when a guest is on to speak of a specific issue. Other than that, he just follows the flow of conversation.

QL: Who do you have slotted to appear next?

ML: Well, (as of this interview) On Dec.3rd, we have Mike LaForrest. Dec.10th is Paul Masterson and Craig Bodoh, from Milwaukee Gay Arts Center and then you (Qlife) on the 17th. I'm trying to get my Doctor to come on and speak about blood pressure. I mean, we do talk about things outside of being gay on this show, and blood pressure is very important!

QL: Have you ever had any mishaps while on the air?

ML: There was the time I spilled Coke all over the controls.

QL: Were you live?

ML: No, oh my god! Then there would be evidence! And then there are those callers who curse us out, or call us names. But we have to watch how we respond. You can't just come out and say something about a person, or business, because they could sue you, and MATAs position is 'you're the producer, you're responsible."

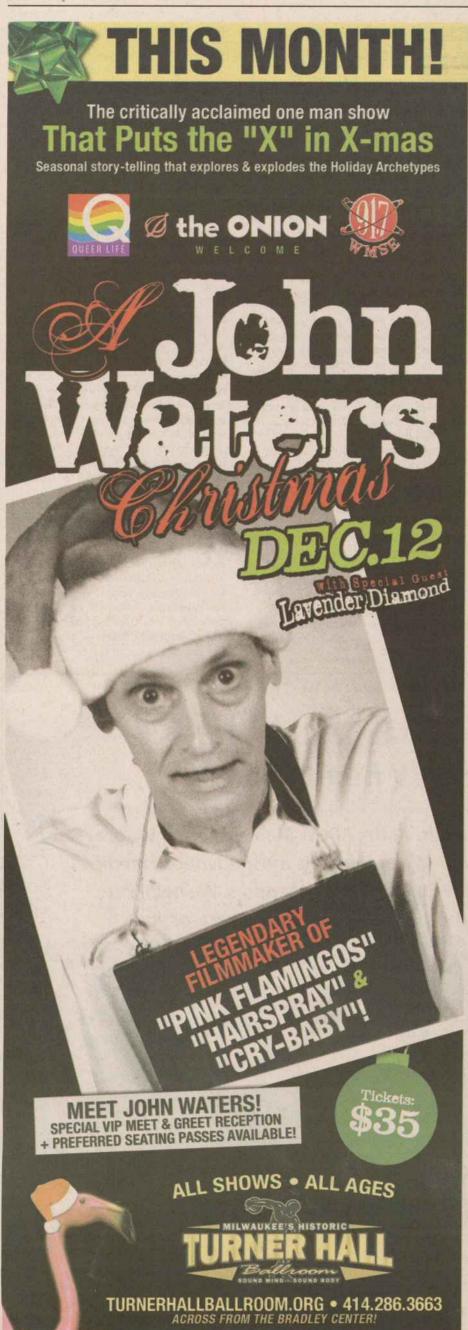
QL: Have people ever stopped you to comment on the show?

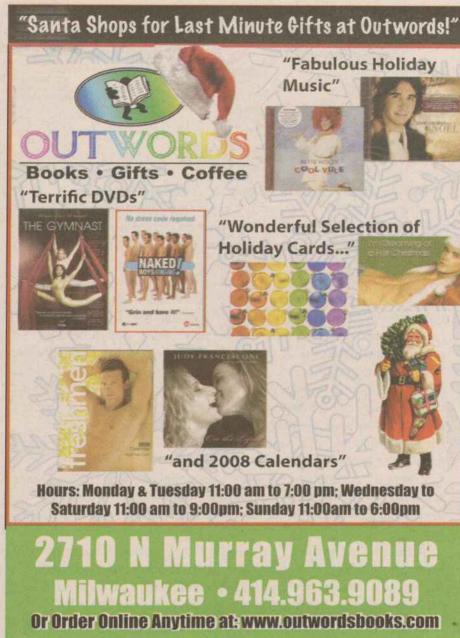
ML: The neatest one was this one black guy, who was so cute, and he came up to me at a Walgreens and said, "aren't you that guy that does the TV show?" and I thought, ooooh, alright, good, here we go! So I said, "yes I am" and he pauses and says, "have you ever accepted the Lord Jesus Christ into your heart?" And I'm thinking, ugh, what a let down. But my immediate response was "yes I did, many years ago!" He didn't know what to say, he was caught off guard! (laughs)

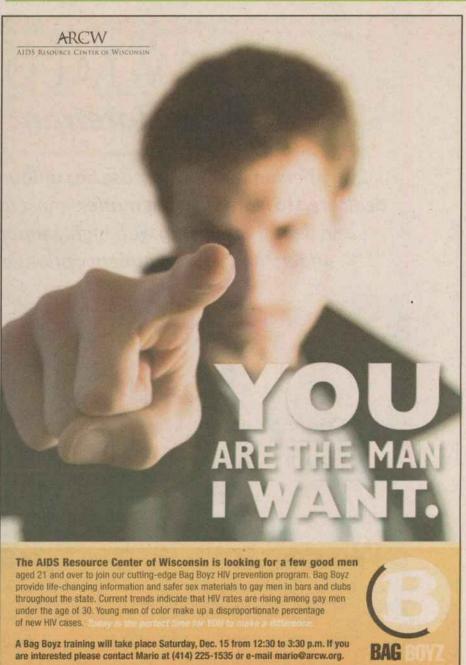
QL: Does your future include more of The Queer Program?

ML: As long as there is funding, and interest. The Gay People's Union, GLCommunity Trust Fund and Cream City Foundation have all funded us. I don't get paid, but I enjoy doing it. It's a way to get news out to many who don't get out, or are unable to bring home a gay paper, so we're getting the news out there to those who may not have the access otherwise. Our contract renews every six months, and MATA covers the production costs. Everything is pretty bare budget, and even though there was that cable television bill that would limit public access in Milwaukee, our contract is good until 2016. So, yes.

Congratulations to 'those guys who do that TV show", Mike, Charles, Tim, and all involved with the Queer program for bringing us LGBT news and events for the last fifteen years. ARCW Recruiting New Class of Bag Boyz

Milwaukee - The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin is currently recruiting new volunteers to join the cutting edge Bag Boyz HIV prevention program. Bag Boyz provide life saving safer-sex and HIV prevention education and materials to gay and bisexual men in bars and clubs throughout Milwaukee.

"I am excited to be recruiting a new class of young men who are dedicated to leading the fight against HIV/AIDS in local bars and clubs," ARCW Associate Director of Prevention Kurt Dyer said. "With current trends indicating that HIV infection rates are increasing for gay men under the age 30, now is a perfect time to get involved with this great program."

According to Dyer, ARCW is currently looking for young gay and bisexual men ages 21 and over to join the Bag Boyz HIV prevention program. Bag Boyz are trained volunteers who provide education, safer sex materials, and referrals to other gay men in bars and clubs throughout the Milwaukee area.

"There is no mistaking there is a substantial need for HIV and safer sex education in the LGBT community now," Dyer said. "Today is the perfect time for you to make a difference and give back to your community."

New State Program Expands Access to Health Care for People Living with HIV

Milwaukee - The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) is announcing a new state program to begin in January of 2008 that will provide people living with HIV who are currently enrolled in the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) with access to comprehensive health insurance.

ARCW was the architect of the new program that Governor Jim Doyle included in his budget proposal. During the drawn-out budget process, ARCW lobbied the legislature extensively on the program and was ultimately successful in garnering strong bi-partisan support from leaders of both the Wisconsin State Senate and Assembly.

The plan was included in the budget passed by the legislature and signed into law by Doyle in late October.

"With this new plan, Wisconsin will continue to be a national leader in the fight against HIV and AIDS," said ARCW Public Affairs Manager Bill Keeton. "The commitment of Governor Doyle as well as Democratic and Republican legislators to ensure access to health care for people living with HIV in our communities is to be applauded."

About 200 people with HIV and no

About 200 people with HİV and no health insurance enrolled in ADAP will potentially be eligible for the program. The new program will take funds now used to purchase medications for this

group of people and instead purchase health insurance policies for them when it is cost efficient to do so.

"This program is a great way to make sure people with HIV can get health insurance," Keeton said. "A lot of people with HIV may not visit their doctor because they do not have insurance and can not afford the costs of a doctor's appointment. This program will help eliminate this barrier for many people living with HIV."

Additionally, the program will provide insurance coverage for a broader selection of medications than does ADAP and will cover costs for doctor's appointments, check-ups, laboratory tests and necessary hospital

"People with HIV have the opportunity for a long and healthy life if they are able to get medications and regularly visit their doctors. Unfortunately, many lack insurance and therefore do not visit a doctor or clinic until their health is in serious jeopardy," Keeton continued. "The new program will be in place to help make sure people living with HIV without the ability to pay for insurance or medical bills still get the health care and medications they need to live a long and healthy life."

Center Advocates' DP benefits measure advances at MPS

Milwaukee - Milwaukee Public Schools Finance & Personnel Committee voted 4-1 on November 20 to approve Director Jennifer Morales' resolution to begin domestic partner benefits for non-union employees. The measure, which also recommends egual benefits for the vast majority of MPS employees represented by unions, was headed to a full board vote on November 29, after Q Life's press deadline, with the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel predicting final victory. Morales thanked Center Advocates supporters, saying in a statement, "The work of Center Advocates and

Oulahan, a domestic partner benefits supporter, mentioned in his testimony at the November 20 hearing that the union had in fact received more interest on domestic partner benefits than any other bargaining issue. Activism on this front recently won the appointment of a labor-management committee to study the issue of domestic partner benefits. The November 20 hearing on

the domestic partner resolution was the culmination of another tactic, supporting Board Director Jennifer Morales domestic partner benefits resolution. Advocates volunteers sent postcards, e-mail blasts, and phone

calls to hundreds of equal rights supporters, many gained over the years preparing for the marriage amendment.

"Despite an inflammatory front-page story by the daily paper that attacked the resolution because it was sponsored by a lesbian, as well as opposition from talk radio and conservative blogs, domestic partner benefits supporters

outnumbered opponents one-hundred to one," said Advocates Director Patrick Flaherty. "We are so grateful for all the Milwaukeeans of all walks of life who came to show support for

partner benefits according to its

benefits manager.

Andrekoupoulas, the district's top administrator who serves at the pleasure of the board, had opposed the domestic partner resolution, saying it would limit the ability of his negotiators to get the union trade away wages or benefits for domestic partner coverage. The superintendent's analysts testified at the November 20 hearing that 20% of MPS' workforce would enroll a domestic partner, drawing gasps and guffaws from the audience. By comparison, the City of Milwaukee, which has offered the benefit since 2001 to its 6500 employees, has only 30 families enrolled for domestic

fair-minded community members like yourselves is what won this issue at the committee level. I'm deeply thankful for the courage of your presence at the meeting and the eloquence of your testimony.

Center Advocates has been pursuing multiple strategies this year to win equal benefits at MPS, which currently provides family benefits to spouses but not the domestic partners of its 10,000 employees. One strategy has been to help interested MPS teachers, social workers and other employees win domestic partner benefits through collective bargaining in a labor agreement. The Advocates convened a kick-off organizing meeting in late March that attracted over 50 teachers who then circulated petitions among colleagues, collecting hundreds of individual requests that the Milwaukee Teachers Education Association (MTEA) bargain for the benefit. Federal Suit against **Police for Gay-Bashing Incident**

Chicago - Attorneys for a south suburban gay man filed suit in federal court over an alleged Memorial Day police gay bashing that included breaking into the man's home with shotguns drawn, followed by a prolonged public humiliation mixed with anti-gay epithets in front of his neighbors as he sat handcuffed to a chair at the home's entrance.

Without knocking or announcing that they were police officers, several plain-clothed Markham cops burst into the home of 47-yearold Frankie Brown on May 31st, according to the suit. They pointed assault rifles at Brown and forced him lie face down on the floor of his bathroom. They then cuffed him, dragged him into an adjacent room, and slammed him into a chair.

"I'll sleep better tonight knowing there is one less fag on the street," said one officer allegedly. (Other reported police comments included "We shouldn't be touching him, he takes it in the ass and sucks dick" and "What does a fag like you need with a lawyer.")

Brown says cops searching the residence picked up a photo of him with male relatives, found a gay pornographic video concealed in the home, and then brought both outside of the house along with Brown to show his neighbors and other police participating in the raid. While making comments alleging that Brown had sex with the people in the photo, they shined a police spotlight on him as he sat handcuffed to a chair at the entrance of the residence. The public humiliation in front of his neighbors lasted for more than an hour.

Eventually Mr. Brown's teenage nephew, who lives with him and is his legal ward, arrived at the home. According to the suit, "The Defendant Officers immediately began harassing the young man with extremely offensive and derogatory language insinuating that he was involved in sexual activity with his uncle...The Defendant Officers then informed Mr. Brown's neighbors that Mr. Brown was HIV positive, a fact that Mr. Brown had not previously shared with anyone, and which was only discovered by the Defendant Officers by examining the medications in his medicine cabinet."

After several hours police took Mr. Brown in handcuffs to Markham's police station. The following evening he was released without charges. During the course of the raid and search, police allegedly stole approximately \$150 cash that was in the residence.

The Status of Girls in Wisconsin

Milwaukee - The first Status of Girls in Wisconsin Report was released on

November 8, 2007 by Alverno College, Girl Scouts of Wisconsin; Wisconsin Women's Council and Women's Fund of Greater Milwaukee.

"Women contribute substantially to making Wisconsin a great place to live, work, and raise a family," Governor Doyle said. "While there are many positive notes highlighted in this study, it also points to challenges facing our young

The report draws upon a wide range of statistical materials to present an overview of how girls ages 10-19 across the state are faring. "It explores every pressing issue affecting the livelihood of Wisconsin girls, citing areas where girls have made gains as well as places where gaps exist," says Elaine Maly, Executive Director of the Women's Fund of Greater Milwaukee. "It's an invaluable resource - and a call to action - for policymakers, educators, youth workers, activists and funders, to think more deeply and strategically about the needs of girls.

Findings include:

 In the state's high schools, girls score lower than boys on standardized math tests, but higher than boys on reading tests. Girls are more likely to be enrolled in

Advanced Placement classes for college credit

• Wisconsin's teen birth rate is well below average, yet there are significant racial and ethnic disparities in birth rates, as well as high birth rates in several

large Wisconsin cities and some rural counties.

• Thirty-two percent of Wisconsin high school girls report being sexually active. Nearly half of girls, 15 or younger, report that their first sexual intercourse was not consensual.

High reported rates of depression; girls are more likely to participate in self-harm and more likely to attempt suicide. Girls are more likely than boys to be victims of abuse and neglect than boys, with rates rising steeply after the age of

Girls are more likely to use computers for social purposes compared to boys.

This report is one of the few studies in the nation to provide a comprehensive examination of the status of girls at the state level, and puts Wisconsin at the forefront of work in this area. It, along with an executive summary and additional background are available at www.womensfund.com.

Neighbor sets gay couple's apartment on fire

Wales – A man who apparently took offense to a gay couple's relationship, went to their Rhyl apartment with a three-foot long metal pipe intending to crack one of the men over the head. When that didn't work, he returned to their empty apartment and set several fires, causing around \$5,000 in damage, and the evacuation of other residents.

Alan Pollitt, told the court that he went to the couple's apartment in a drunken and angry state, and threatened one of the men with the metal bar. There was a struggle and the defendant was pushed to the floor. The victim was able to ward off the attack, and left to find his partner. The couple went to a local pub to discuss the incident, and while they were out, Pollit broke into their apartment, and set five fires.

He had previously told the caretaker of the apartment building that he was "going to kill them."

The victims, David Daniel, 39, and Stephen Taylor, 51, had been in a relationship for 18 years, had lived at the apartment for 11 years, and had previously had no trouble with Pollitt.

In a victim impact statement one of the men, Stephen Taylor, 51, said the incident had "totally ruined his life", he had since split up with his partner and moved away from Rhyl.

Although Pollitt denies being homophobic, he expressed no remorse for his actions, and received an indeterminate sentence, and will only be released when the parole board considers he is safe.

They did it with the help of queer fanzines that uproariously adored the off-beat and interesting people who populated our dense pop culture landscape. By juxtaposing clippings from newspapers and magazines with timely political, social, and sexual content, these editors brought some much needed humor and levity to a queer community struggling with social justice issues and fighting a pandemic. They occasionally also brought us back down to earth when a celeb went supernova and vanished into black hole obscurity.

Dey Dream Believer

The most recent donation to QZAP is a four-issue run of the adorably quirky Susan mini mag, sent in by editor Philip Bahr. Noteworthy for early adaptation of a color copy cover, made possible by the lowered cost and increased access to color copy technology, it's highly appropriate

for an homage to actress Susan Dev. She stepped off the nervous mother piloted psychedelic bus of The Partridge Family and into our hearts. Susan is a plausible queer hero for good reason. After her successful run as Laurie Partridge, that role and associated stereotype plagued her until she shook it off with a vengeance when she was cast as Grace Van Owen on L.A. Law in the mid 1980s. Queers of any stripe can easily identify at the prospect of being unfairly lumped into a singular identity with no basis in fact! Susan mini mag comes to the rescue as well, by elevating the campy Partridge Family imagery and iconography of Dey's big smile, beautiful eyes and gorgeous hair to transform it by pairing it with uplifting observation about the state of the queer nation at the time. It's déjà vu all over again, especially the eerily prescient commentary about a Clinton succeeding a Bush, with Al Gore guiding us in taking "responsibility for this fragile, ailing organism we call the United States [...] and the entire planet as well" [Issue 2, 56 pages 1992]. With contributors like the lovely artist Moon Trent, astrologer Alex Miller-Mignone, and erotica writer

Bill Barr, Susan mini mag has a positive attitude and never delves into despair despite addressing important issues of sexual health and personal well being. This is destined to be one of the standouts in the Archive's collection!

River Deep, Mountain High

Some observers were openly and vocally confused by the appearance of two references to the late actor River Phoenix in this summer's QZAP produced Queer Zine Art Show. First, through Fanorama and the legendary River Phoenix Memorial Edition and second as a bittersweet coda to comics artist Sina Shamsavari's "Sunday 31st October ~ c. 5pm" from Boy Crazy Boy [Issue 1, 16 pages, 1993]. Phoenix, in addition to inadvertently becoming a modern day James Dean style icon, became an idol to a generation of queer boys who were clued into Hollywood scuttlebutt at the time that Phoenix stood up to director Gus Van Sant whilst working on a crucial scene in the 1991 movie hit My Own Private Idaho. Ironically, a gay Van Sant had portrayed Phoenix's character, Mike, as ambivalent in terms of sexuality.

Phoenix insisted Mike was gay, and in the now infamous campfire scene, uttered the magical sentence "I just want to kiss you, man." This helped cement the adoration Phoenix received in queer fanzines where he crossed over into queer iconography. He doesn't exactly carry a camp quality like Susan Dey does, but reminds us that not all star-crossed stories have a happy ending.

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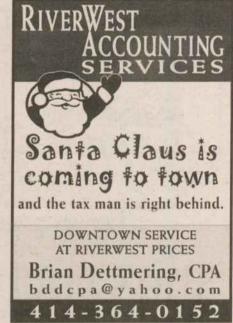
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New Year's Money Resolutions - Six sound moves for a fiscally fit future

fter the holiday celebrations are over, it's time to refocus on goals for the coming year. And while resolutions to lose weight, exercise more or give up caffeine are all worthwhile, it's the financial resolutions that you make and keep this year that can really make a difference come retirement time. Here are six worth implementing:

Get organized. Knowing where your receipts, investment statements and tax returns are is an essential component of your financial plan. Setting up a system now will keep you organized throughout the year. Create separate folders for all of your 2007 tax-deductible expenses, your banking and investment statements, insurance claims and pay stubs/W2s. This one simple step will get your financial year off to a good start.

Check your insurance coverage. Did you make home improvements this year? Have a baby? Change jobs? You may want to make changes to your insurance policies to make sure you are adequately covered. If you or your spouse have neglected to purchase life, long-term care or disability insurance, now is the time to meet with a qualified professional to discuss the benefits of these important financial safeguards.

Review your estate plan. While not something most people look forward to doing, documenting your wishes in the event of your death is essential. If you have not done so already, make plans to draw

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Slow and Steady

Did you ever walk into a room, and get the feeling that you were the last person people expected to see? Well, I was fortunate to experience such a thing when I attended one of The Greater Milwaukee Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Visioning Project breakfast meetings. I'm sure someone from QLife showing up was the last thing they expected. If I hadn't heard in advance about their plans from one of our advertisers, the congratulatory email announcing the Visioning Projects collaboration with the Shepherd Express and its new LGBT pages would have come as a bit of a shock.

The Visioning Project is a "unified collaboration among LGBT communities and allies with mutual respect, trust and inclusivity. And to mobilize and empower presence that fosters equality and well being for LGBT people."

Sounds great. And let me be clear here - I have worked with just about everyone sitting around that table that morning, and have the utmost respect for them and for the work that they do. I know

they only have the best intentions in mind when doing what they feel is right for Milwaukee's LGBT community. But if I'm to be honest about this, we did feel a bit "stung" for a while afterwards.

This meeting was held to discuss their "hard work and dedication" with Shepherd Express to start running a monthly "LGBT" section.

Monthly news about Milwaukee's LGBT community? Where have we seen that before?

But, seriously, we too are all for increasing LGBT visibility. We publish for that very same reason. The more visible we are, the better chances at mass acceptance, equal rights, etc, etc. So, they are right on the mark in that respect.

Obviously, we can't stop another publication, and let's face it, the largest free publication in Milwaukee, from covering gay issues; in fact, it's about time they did. They could have very well taken it upon themselves to do such a thing, even without the help/guidance of the Visioning Project.

I agree that in order to progress as a community, we need to branch out, even if it means going 'mainstream.' This is the very reason that we too, include "mainstream" news and topics in QLife, and use the talents of "allied" writers as well - even if it

leads to accusations from our own community of not being "Queer" enough (which it has.) A bit of a double standard, don't you think?

Sure, we are concerned about a loss of ad revenue - but that's a monthly given. All of the free local papers are constantly competing for ads. Nothing new there.

I told them that it feels like they've put QLife on the back burner, to which they responded, "It will only help QLife." Possibly. Perhaps the mass distribution of the Shepherd Express will provide more acceptance from the allied community towards Milwaukee's LGBT community, and, ultimately lead to more notice of QLife. Maybe that is our 'in' to all of the places that have previously denied us access to distribute.

But why were we not informed of this development in the first place? They are certainly under no obligation to tell us anything, and in all fairness, they DID NOT say that they WOULD NO LONGER support QLife anymore - for which we are appreciative. But somehow, it just would have sounded better finding out from them.

And, one more thought: Wouldn't increased LGBT visibility also come from "hard work and dedication" in helping the local LGBT paper increase its distribution?



Let's Talk

They say that if you wait long enough, the time will come ... again. And so the time for LGBT people to be respectable has come again. That annoys some Queers who resent any limits that society would place in individual freedom of expression. But that is the price that every group must pay for civic order. We want the "right" to serve in the military. We want the "right" to marry and raise children. We want to be recognized for the essentially equal human beings

that we are.

Yet these demands for equal civil

rights are denounced by some older LGBT veterans of the sexual revolution who refuse to admit that the revolution is over, the radicals lost, and the country has moved on. Moreover, new cohorts of LGBT young people have grown up with increasing acceptance, visibility and integration into all areas of our national life. A young gay person is more likely today to find his/her life partner in an LGBT-affirming church or synagogue than in a gay bar.

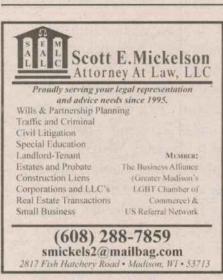
Still, young gays learn how to be gay from those of us who are older and are role models. In the '90s we taught them that they were "at risk" for drug abuse and sexually transmitted disease. We offered condoms and lube, harm reduction workshops and support groups. Only as an after thought did we add, "negotiated safety" to protect those with whom we intended to have relationships.

Meanwhile the times were changing. Cruising public sex environments was giving way to dating, not because the sex police were especially vigilant, but because it had become safer to be

OUT about one's homosexuality. With increased visibility especially of gay cultural icons like Elton John, Melissa Etheridge, Dan Savage and Rosie O'Donnell we became familiar to Middle America. In the process LGBT kids saw themselves as representative of America's diversity not as aliens or outlaws.

The question today isn't so much whether or not we will change the majority culture, we have already changed it, the question is - where do we go from here? Where and on what do people of differing sexual orientations agree and what values are unique to each? What can we learn from each other? When is it for the greater good that the self-serving interests of the individual should yield to the greater good of the community? We need to have these discussions because while conservatives battle radicals our own "silent moral majority" increasingly finds the culture wars either alienating or irrelevant. Either way, by refusing engagement the community will be the

Goodwill Among People

he First Unitarian Universalist
Congregation in downtown
Milwaukee is a gem of a sanctuary.
The building is stunning – a classic
example of Gothic architecture, with stainglass warmly defusing the light. Even more
stunning is the welcome the congregation
itself offers.

"Freedom, reason, and diversity are the core values of the Unitarian tradition," assistant minister Craig Schwalenberg explains. These core values led congregations like the First Unitarian Society to become passionate advocates of social justice. The congregation celebrated its first same-sex wedding in the mid 1980's and officially welcomed the LGBT community in the mid 1990's.

The congregation was particularly involved in the marriage amendment fight in 2006. Before the election a very large banner outside proclaimed its opposition to the ban on gay marriage. Interweave, an LGBT group within the congregation, organized the congregation's outreach and fundraising efforts. The ministers spoke out publicly.

The draw of Unitarian Universalism (UUism) is more than its commitment to social justice. Craig captures the essence of the tradition when he describes his first experience of a UU congregation. "It was an amazing feeling of being welcomed and challenged at the same time." For the first time he was in a congregation of people who thought like he did. Yet he was

hearing a sermon that would make him think all week. "And the next Sunday I was right back in church."

It can be hard to say what Unitarians believe. The UU tradition is not concerned with common doctrines or practices in the same way that Christianity or Buddhism is organized. UUs draw on all religious traditions for inspiration. They find meaning from a shared journey shaped by the belief in the importance of doubt, the call to grow and change, and the confidence that people are both the fundamentally the same and uniquely different.

The spirituality of UUism becomes evident at the holidays. The First Unitarian Society will hold Christmas Eve services. Yet, as Craig explains, "For us, Christmas is less about Jesus as the Savior and more about the birth of hope." UUs seek to honor the birth of Jesus but in a way that is not shaped by the faith commitments of Christianity.

In the midst of remembering the birth of Jesus the congregation will also commemorate Hanukah even as other members gather for a regular Buddhist Mediation Group or a Humanist Discussion Group. Other UU congregations might hold a celebration of the winter solstice.

UUs are able to make a meaningful faith out of this great mixture. As Craig says, "I experience the holy in connections and relationships." The embrace of



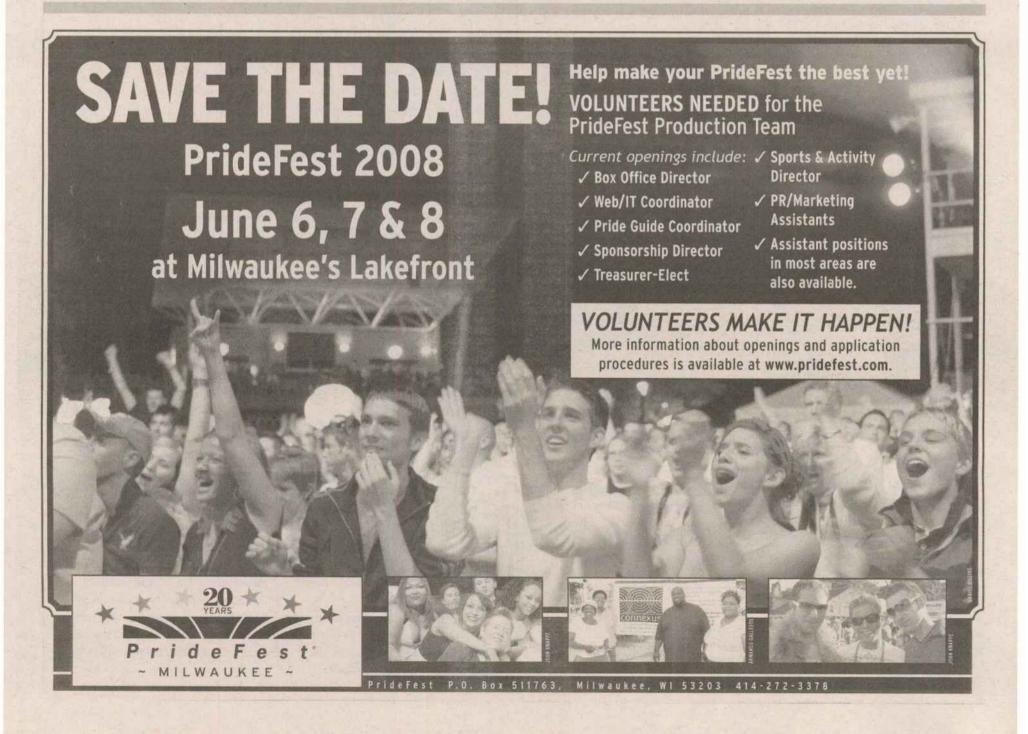

a profound religious diversity allows Unitarians to cultivate the broadest array of connections.

On Christmas Eve many will read the story of the angels announcing the birth of Jesus to the shepherds outside Bethlehem. They sing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward all!" The First Unitarian Society is a place where people find the glory of the divine in all sorts of ways and, through their life together, certainly find ways to promote peace and goodwill among all.

Unlearning Helplessness

mong the few vivid memories I have from school was studying the cruel experiment by psychologists researching "learned helplessness." A researcher shocked a restrained dog while chiming a tone. The dog learned that it was helpless to escape the shock accompanying the tone. Later, when unrestrained and free to escape, the dog would passively await the shock when it heard the tone. It had learned to be helpless.

Decades of oppression have certainly taught lesbian and gay people to be helpless. In 1999 I was working with other volunteers to create a domestic partner registry for the City of Milwaukee as part of the Domestic Partnership Task Force (later folded into Center Advocates). At that point, nothing much positive on LGBT public policy had happened since the 1982 passage of Wisconsin's gay rights law. In fact, in the intervening years, the scope of that law had been eroded with the so-called "Rawhide" amendment undermining protections for youth workers. Also, Milwaukee Public Schools had rejected an initiative to make it more gay-inclusive, Milwaukee police were disastrously late in detecting the Dahmer murders, AIDS had decimated leaders, Mayor Norquist had vetoed a grant to PrideFest, the Milwaukee

County Board had rescinded a simple pride resolution, and the Milwaukee Common Council had overwhelmingly rejected domestic partner benefits for its employees just two years earlier.

LGBT people had learned to accept that the police might not adequately charge a hate crime, that their boss could fire them with apparent impunity, and that their elected officials could ignore them, because it seemed that nothing could be done.

It was in that context that the volunteers working to establish the registry fanned out to garner support in the community. I remember approaching a player at Milwaukee's gay softball league to ask him to sign a postcard in support of the registry. He was acquainted with me, so it was hard for him to refuse, but while he signed the card with a sigh, he told me "this will never go anywhere. They'll never pass this." It is one of my proudest accomplishments to have proved him wrong, when we won the creation of the registry just weeks later by a 10-7 vote. Even today, nearly a decade later, when I'm invited into people's homes, couples often point out their certificate from the domestic partner registry, not because it conveyed any rights, but because it was finally an acknowledgement from their

government that their lives mattered. The years since have seen many victories statewide, perhaps most notably in expanded capacity as our community has grown from virtually all-volunteer kitchen table efforts to growing non-profits with paid staff providing services, advocacy and research.

Last month marked the one-year anniversary of the vote in Wisconsin to ban marriage for gay couples. The very real setback could easily return our community to its state of learned helplessness. That would be a mistake.

When our community has asserted itself in 2007, very real progress for gay, lesbian, and transgender citizens was made. La Crosse County extended health care benefits to the families of its employees with domestic partners, as did Milwaukee Area Technical College. The Milwaukee Common Council, previously the scene for contentious standing room only debates on gay rights, passed new employment and housing protections in August for transgender people unanimously, without a whisper of controversy. Center Advocates secured \$168,000 in the recently concluded state budget to address LGBT health disparities. Domestic partner benefits may soon

be available to the 10,000 employees of Milwaukee Public Schools. An LGBT issues in the workplace seminar was held at Deloitte in Milwaukee that attracted more than 20 senior HR executives from leading corporations, some of which have since added domestic partner benefits or are actively considering it.

Some would have us wait to press our demands for equality until the political environment is just so, and victory is assured. But positive change doesn't happen in tidy two-year election cycles, it happens over decades, with more losses than victories. It happens when people forget that sometimes what they undertake will fail, and remember that sometimes, just sometimes, when they seek to do what is right, they prevail.

Cambodia PM Severs Ties to Gay Daughter

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia - The Prime Minister of Cambodia has announced that he is severing ties with this adopted daughter because she is a lesbian, and married to another woman.

He made the announcement during a public speech, yet urged people not to discriminate against gays.

The Prime Minister and his wife Bun Rany have three sons and two other daughters. They adopted their third daughter in the 1980's and she has carried the family name "Hun" just like the other children. His next planned step is to prevent his adopted daughter from claiming any inheritance, by having her disowned. Although he is cutting ties with her, Hun Sen said he was not discriminating against gays and appealed to society to show respect for them.

Xbox Lesbian Scene gets Banned

Singapore – The Board of Film Censors, one part of Singapore's media watchdog, the Media Development Authority, has banned the sale of an Xbox video game that features an intimate scene involving two female characters.

"Mass Effect" is a futuristic space adventure available for Microsoft's Xbox gaming console, and is not the only game to be banned in Singapore, where strict censorship laws apply. Games containing "exploitative or gratuitous sex and violence" or ones that denigrate any race or religion" are not currently allowed, but could possibly get a second chance if the Media Development Authority (MDA) approves a new video games classification next year.









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Ever worry about keeping your family pet safe and stress free during the holidays? The helpful folks over at one of our favorite places, The Wisconsin Humane Society, sent us some great tips to help keep your pets safe and happy during the hectic planning, and parties this season. We also received some great tips from local dog trainer, and director of Amiable Dog Training, Amy Ammen. Thanks Amy!

You may not be aware that your pet can get just as stressed as you can with a house full of guests, and gifts.

Here are a few helpful tips to keep everyone, including Fido (or Fluffy) on an even keel:

"Keep holiday treats out of reach." Says WHS. "Chocolate, chicken bones and skin, greasy foods, grapes, onions, candies and bread dough can all cause serious health problems for your companion animal."

"Make sure you supervise your pet around gifts and decorations," says Ammen. WHS agrees, "Your cat may see your holiday tree as new territory to explore... and conquer. Avoid glass ornaments, tinsel and low-hanging decorations. Also, keep Fido out of the tree stand's water, which can cause gastrointestinal problems."



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More from the Wisconsin Humane Society:

- Don't allow electrical cords to dangle or run loosely across the floor. Keep all of them safely taped down and unplug them when you are away from home.
- Don't place holiday candles within reach of Fido. The pretty flame can be an enticement and candles can easily be knocked over. And never leave a candle burning while you are away or sleeping.
- Tinsel, string, ribbon and yarn will all be seen as delightful toys, especially to your cat. Keep these things out of reach. They can cause serious internal damage if swallowed.
- Be aware that some popular holiday plants can be toxic if ingested. These include, but are not limited to, holly, mistletoe, azalea, hibiscus, amaryllis and Christmas rose. The jury is still out on poinsettias, but it is advised to keep them out of reach just in case.
- With all the holiday traffic, provide a quiet oasis where your animals can retreat to if they become overwhelmed with all the commotion.

- Increase her exercise and access to fun toys.
- Ask your guests not to fuss over him.
- · Give and enforce commands to regain control.
- · Keep her leashed in new surroundings- indoors, too.
- · If you're too busy for him, get help!

eed a break from the Holiday hubbub? Having a diabetic attack from commercially manufactured saccharine sweetness? Then this book is for you.

Enter the world of power, passion and politics. Sex With the Queen, subtitled 900 years of Vile Kings, Virile Lovers, and Passionate Politics by Eleanor Herman is a fascinating telling of nine hundred years worth of royal marriages - and royal adulteries, well researched and told with wonderful dry wit and insightful understanding as well.

Uprooted from home, family, country, friends, all familiar surroundings, sent to a foreign land to be a brood mare for a complete stranger who married in many instances but grudgingly to carry out his political and dynastical duties, life in a palace usually wasn't a Cinderella fairy tale. Royal mistresses frequently had more power and influence than the queen, and a grander lifestyle, i.e. Madame de Pompadour. Royal "misters" to kings as well as to queens are also brought to light.

Royal adultery had political implications and Ms. Herman supplies the social and political milieu in which royal marriages took place.

The tales told are as varied as the royal princes and princesses (cum queens) of whom they tell, saucy, bawdy, bold, humorous, devious, colorful, and often sad. History buffs will be delighted as some little known facts are brought to light. There is the surprise to discover that Marie Antoinette's fate may actually have been kind.

A delightful, engaging, and spicy romp in history, Sex with The Queen is available online and in bookstores.

Meet Terence, fatally charming, as beautifully chiseled as Michelangelo's David and colder than marble, Edward, once an artist, who paid the price for love and immortality and now walks a sad, melancholy "life" and Maria, who thought herself beyond love, centuries old and stunningly beautiful with dark, dark, liquid eyes to draw you into a sensuous pleasure from which you may never emerge.

Elise Groneman lives a beyond bleak, loveless, netherworld existence of her own, drawing and painting grisly scenes of murder and accident victims by day and selling herself by night to society's leavings, a nightmare existence which will pale compared to the waking nightmare she will encounter.

In The Blood was released in the early autumn and this review was scheduled to appear in November while the earth was preparing to take its' winter slumber. Now that early winter has descended on us and it's cold, dark, and chill it still seems an appropriate time to enter into a dark and sensuous world of pleasure, but a world that is punctuated with bloody graphic scenes, not for the squeamish.

Like most works of fiction it does require you to suspend your disbelief, sometimes stretching that requirement with respect to some of the actions of Elise, who finds herself falling under the spell of Maria.

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We Are What We Eat: The True Costs of Food

n my last article I mentioned the importance of not buying needless junk. In this article my focus is on something that like it or not, most of us have to buy: food. And, most of us buy food without giving much thought to where it came from, how it was grown/ produced/created and the social, biological and environmental implications of what we eat. However, this is something that is quickly changing. It seems that no matter no matter who I am talking with, somehow the conversation always turns to food. Not just the "What are you having for dinner?" type of conversation, but something on a much larger scale - full of questions like "Why does this country produce so much genetically modified corn?" and "Do you know of a place where I can find locally grown organic food and grass-fed beef?"

Many of you are probably thinking: "Well, ok. But how is food a political issue or a woman's issue or a Lesbian or Gay issue?" to which I can only reply: we are people and we need to eat. What can be more basic, and more political than that?

What we put into our bodies matters more than how we identify ourselves, more than issues of sexuality or sexual orientation, and yes, more than even our rights to marry. Why? Because we biologically cannot survive without food. And by and large, most of the "food" we are eating as a country is currently some of the unhealthiest stuff in the world. Sure, food is relatively inexpensive, but its true costs are monumental in terms of our health and the environment. Thanks in part to high fructose corn syrup and processed foods, obesity and diabetes rates in the U.S are higher than ever. Industrial agriculture ignores the needs of biodiversity, sprays chemicals on everything, and keeps cows and pigs on feed lots that produce as much pollution as some cities (not to mention the consequences of feeding corn to cows, who are biologically designed to eat grass).

We have the power to make conscious, environmental, and healthy choices about what we eat. In thinking about who we are as women, as Lesbians, and as Gay people we need to think about how we are connected to the grander scheme of things as citizens of planet earth and as bodies with basic biological needs. I know that sometimes it is hard to put our bodies or our health first when we are struggling to be recognized as equal citizens. But we must. In order to keep our eyes on the prize, we have to take care of our bodies and work to stop all systems of oppression and exploitation - this includes being aware of how we impact the environment via the things we eat, the things we buy. We need to be aware of where the things we purchase come from and how the

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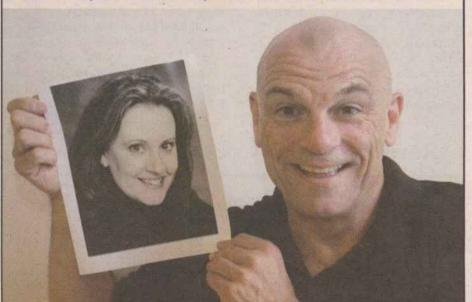
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LESBIAN VIEW

HIV Billboards Violate "decency policy"

Milwaukee - Billboards designed by Charles D. Productions, which promote HIV testing, have been stalled by Clear Channel Outdoor after deeming them "too offensive."

This past summer, The Cream City Foundation awarded Charles D. Productions an \$1800 grant for its Media Visibility Project. Geared towards targeting African American LGBTQ and heterosexual youth between the ages of 14-24 in Milwaukee, the project focuses on encouraging HIV testing and outreach.

Two billboards, one with an African American male, and one with an African American female, both with the slogan, "HIV never looked so good" were pulled from running.

"What is offensive about them? They went through four different review panels, and got great comments." Says Daniels. "Right now, the ad is in the Milwaukee Times, and we even took them to our conferences and everybody loved them, and said, 'this is what we need for our entire population."

"Testing has increased because of the ad campaign. "By not running them, all they are



doing is hurting our African American Communities." Says

According to Dan Pomeroy, Real Estate/Public Affairs Manager for Clear Channel Outdoor, the ads were rejected by the County Transit system as well as the management team in light of their company policies.

When Daniels pressed for an exact reason for the rejection, he received a copy of the Clear Channel Outdoor' "Decency Policy." According to Daniels, the Clear Channel declined to discuss their "decency policy",

but did finally admit that the ad featuring the woman in a swimsuit was the reason for the censorship.

"Those ads are doing what they need to do. At least five positive people have been found, that maybe we would not have found without these ads"

In an email obtained by QLife, Pomeroy explained that "edgy" ads were not a foreign concept to Clear Channel Outdoor.

Remember that the holidays may be a time to relax and indulge, but one should always keep healthy choices in mind.

- Do not starve yourself when trying to lose weight; this will only slow down your metabolism and cause you to gain weight. Eating smaller, more frequent meals such as 5 times per day (every 3 hours) is better for you to lose weight. This raises your metabolism, allowing you to burn fat as energy more efficiently. Starving yourself and binge eating only slows down one's metabolism.
- Remember to drink plenty of fluids, mainly water (min: 64oz). Other fluids such as coffee, tea, diet soda, skim milk, and juices are okay, but do not overdo these.
- Try to avoid white flour products, if possible; substitute whole wheat for white flour products.
- Min protein per meal (B,L,D) should be 20grams
- Min protein per day is 1gram per your muscle weight not (body weight)
- Goal is 1gram of protein per muscle weight pounds plus 40grams more.

Food should be baked, broiled, blackened, grilled, roasted or steamed.

"One that comes to mind is the "pregnant boy" ad for the teen pregnancy program sponsored by United Way. That ad was vetted by both the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors and the City Common Council before it went to production and display."

He goes on to explain that billboards are easy targets. "We know that the politicians hate getting related complaint calls out of the blue, so it's necessary to get them on board ahead of time."

For Daniels, it makes no sense. "The people who voted for these ads, and went through the review panels, were the target audience," says Daniels. "In our community, between

the ages of 24-35, seventy percent of all new HIV cases are African American women. And with men who have sex with men, it's forty-eight percent. And they're (Clear Channel) not seeing this."

Copies of the ads have been sent to several Aldermen for review, and [as of QLIFE press time] Daniels is awaiting another meeting with Clear Channel Outdoors to address (and hopefully resolve) the issue.



Holiday Madness

ant an instant end to holiday blues? Trim your excess.

In this spend as-you-go era in the U.S, many gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender people answer the call of the siren that beckons us to immoderation. Some of us overindulge in alcohol or food. Some become Christmas fairies for everyone on their shopping list. Others maintain a frenetic social schedule. A few – and you know who you are – create a holiday festival of decorations from table top to toilet tank.

A drink, a treat, gifts, socializing, and decorating. Not a bad list. Nothing unhealthy, sinful, wrong, disgusting or harmful. But when these generally positive behaviors move to overdrive, we seem to crash and burn, slumping into the aftermath of a sugar buzz or hangover. We feel the regret of our purchases in January, maybe even December 26th. We question the sanity of packing away 900 yards of wire ribbon and plastic garland.

(Lest someone wonder about all of these allusions to Christmas from a writer who doesn't identify as Christian, my experience suggests that many Muslims, Jews and atheists alike succumb to holiday hubbub in the U.S.)

What are the alternatives to the physical and emotional roller coaster of year-end celebrations? For these I personally relate a handful of perspectives Paul and I have adopted at home. These half-dozen behavior changes are not for

the weak of spirit; some friends and family members will not support changes that seem so extreme.

Buy in moderation. A decade ago I read a newspaper article in Jamaica that eschewed the U.S. pull towards wretched excess at Christmas. It suggested simple gifts that were thoughtful and inexpensive: pencils for a student, socks for an athlete. They urged that discretionary funds be spent in an annual large tip to a clerk or a gift to charity. The first time I gave \$20 each to Shannon at Stone Creek, she thought I lost a bean.

A \$30 nail clipper might seem excessive, but the recipient will remember it and you

Buy to last forever. A small book on 101 ways to simplify life suggested that we buy something with a mind to own it for the rest of our lives. A \$30 nail clipper might seem excessive, but the recipient will remember it and you for decades. We also significantly reduce the detritus of our lives.

Don't buy. Paul and I stopped exchanging gifts long ago. We no longer rush around for that special something that will measure our love, fill a childhood void, or mark status among friends. We work at being thoughtful to each other 365 and – believe it or not – we attribute

improvements in that arena to the cessation of holiday gift buying.

Give. On December 25, we sit at the kitchen table with a checkbook and make decisions about our annual charitable gifts. You'd be surprised how much available cash there is when you don't do holiday spending. We make our list and discuss each organization and their current efforts to improve our community, address needs of women and youth, and assure sexual health. We set an ambitious financial goal and divide the funds among the groups, usually not equally, but in keeping with our discussions.

Take charge of your schedule. Okay, we are quirky. We decide to stay home alone on the 25th and go out for Chinese on the 24th. We never leave the house on the 31st. But we are not hermits. We see family and friends at our place and at theirs. Just not at those dicey times.

Increase attention to healthy diet and exercise. I for one believe (erroneously) that I can no longer lose weight. The best I can do lately is not gain weight in the first place. Loads of green leafy vegetables and regular moderate exercise in the winter can produce wonders as we work to level out the effects of periodic overindulgence.

For many readers, these ideas may seem fanatic or overly rigorous. But, if you

have been uncomfortable for days or weeks in past years at this time, consider at least one of these changes. Evaluate your mental, financial, and physical health later and see how the experiment worked for you. If you try any of these and don't succeed in carrying it out, don't beat yourself up. There are hundreds of millions of dollars being spent during this season to confuse us and insist that joy comes at a price — your wallet and your health.

Stop the madness.

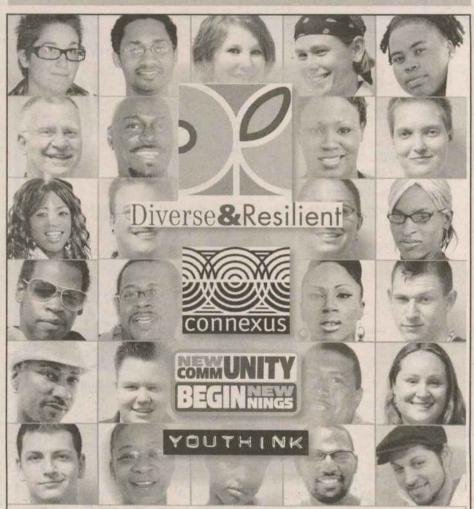

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Cut me some slack!

leader in our community has repeatedly asked me "Why do trans people get so angry when other people make mistakes?" Although I have tried to diffuse his question, noting that it is inherently prejudicial – implying that all trans people get upset when someone else doesn't use the right pronoun or language – he is sincere in wanting the answer to his own semi-existential question.

He wants to get it "right."

- We have a horde of angry people within the trans community, angry about injustice – on the micro, personal level or on the larger-scale, political level.

My coach Laura's best friend – perhaps her soulmate – is quadriplegic. I've known Laura for over four years and have had the pleasure of seeing her gradual (and sometimes profound) evolution. She is deeply committed to understanding her own internal world, as well as the world around her. She, by no means, takes the easy road. She asks hard questions – of others, and of herself. Her introspective nature has catapulted her into addressing issues around her friend's day-to-day life, the structure of how he lives and survives, the often-unspoken challenges for him in

the choices he makes, and the acuteness of his mind. She really "gets" him – both understanding the complexity of who he is, as well as understanding her emotions and reactions to the fact he may very well die before her.

On some days, though, I think, "Man, some of the disability rights activists I know would eat her alive." It's all very subtle. Her language may come across to someone who doesn't know her (or her friend) as diminutive or discordant. Some may view her comments as ablest - but I'm 100% certain she is not. I'm also 100% certain her friend is not offended by her language or her underlying beliefs about him. (If he were, he'd likely give her an earful, or, as he did not long ago, smash into her with his chair, initiating a rugby-style game of bumper cars, both of them in rolling chairs!)

It is easy to look at situations and interactions from the outside and deem them discriminatory or "old school." But is the issue about the language people use or how we treat each other?

People want to get it "right" but they simply may not know how. People may also find that there is not a one-size-

fits-all answer. Some of us who train on transgender issues want to give a consistent set of definitions for commonly used terms, which, in theory is a noble goal to minimize confusion. There is no universal agreement on the vast lexicon, what those words mean, how we piece language together, or the implication of syntax.

Trans language has rapidly emerged and morphed over the past 30 years.

How can we get angry with people when there is so much personal variation?

Some prefer disabled. Others physically challenged.

Some prefer Black. Others African-American.

Some prefer lesbian. Others prefer dyke.

Some prefer lover. Others prefer partner.

Some prefer transsensual femme. Others prefer trannychaser.

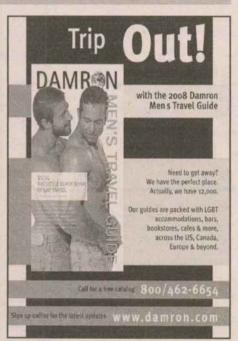
Some prefer bulldagger. Others prefer stud.

Some prefer MTF. Others prefer woman of transsexual experience.

The majority of people who know I'm trans call me a "transman" even though that is not at all how I identify. When I can see that someone is trying to be inclusive and their intent is not to overwrite my identity, I let it slide a lot more than I used to. I used to be a lot more righteous and indignant when people didn't get it "right" - but I have learned that my morphing identity meant that no one but me could keep up with what "getting it right" meant.









FBI Report Shows Gay Hate Crimes Increase 15%

8% Rise in Hate Crimes Overall by Michael S. Lisowski

Milwaukee -1,195 hate crime incidents based on sexual orientation bias were reported for 2006, according to the FBI Hate Crime Statistics Report released on November 19th. These incidents accounted for 15% of the national hate crime incidents overall. Of these, 1,085 were targeted toward individuals. In 2005, 1,017 (14% of the hate crime totals) were reported nationally. For 2006, nearly 32% (380) occurred in or near residences or homes. Incidents happening on highways, roads, alleys or streets followed with 24% (287). 130 (10.9%) were listed as other/unknown, 116 incidents (9.7%) were at a school or college, 87(7.3%) occurred in a parking lot or garage, 51 (4.3%) in a bar/nightclub and 28(2.3%) at a restaurant. In the "Offense Type by Bias Motivation" category for sexual orientation, there were 267 aggravated assaults and 395 simple assaults. Of the 1,415 cases where the offender's race was known, 44% were white, 17% were black. (For the total number of 7,722 hate crime incidents in 2006, this compares to the 7,330 known offenders, of which 58.6% were white and 20.6% were black).

Bias motivation incidents based on sexual orientation over the years has been reported in the following manner:

Wisconsin saw a 58% increase. Wisconsin reported 12 hate crime incidents by sexual orientation bias in 2006. Milwaukee reported 6 incidents, Fond du Lac-2, and Madison and Wausau -1 each. UW-Green Bay reported 1 incident, as well as Juneau Co. This compares to five incidents reported for Wisconsin in 2005: Milwaukee-2, Wausau-1, UW-Madison-1, and Juneau Co.-1.

Overall, hate crimes incidents rose almost 8% last year. In 2006 police nationwide reported 7,722 criminal incidents targeting victims or property as a result of bias against race, religion, sexual orientation, ethnic or national origin or physical or mental disability. That marked a 7.8% increase from 7,163 incidents reported in 2005. Wisconsin reported 103 incidents, ranking 25th in the nation; California led with 1,604 followed by New Jersey with 802 and Michigan with 739, according to the FBI.

The two most reported hate crimes in 2,006 were property damage or vandalism, totaling 2911 offenses and intimidation, at 2,046 offenses. There were three murders (none related to sexual orientation), six rapes, 860 aggravated assaults, 1,447 simple assaults and 41 arsons. Other offenses include robbery, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft.

The FBI Hate Crimes website: www.fbi.gov/page2/nov07/hatecrime111907.html lists statistics since 1995, although they have published hate crime statistics every year since 1992. Regarding sexual orientation bias incidents in Wisconsin, Madison reported anywhere from 1-12 incidents annually, save 2005 (none) and 1998 when there was no reporting data from Wisconsin.

Until 2006, Milwaukee has had either 1 or 2 reported incidents annually, save 2005 and '0' incidents for the years '96, '97, '00-'02, and '04. Of course, other cities have reported incidents as well. For example, in 2004, Brillion and Pewaukee Village each reported 1 incident.

Lack of full participation by the more than 17,000 police agencies around the country somewhat undermines yearly comparisons. In 2006, Wisconsin had 371 participating agencies, 25 of which submitted incident reports. These included 16 cities, 3 UW colleges, 2 metropolitan counties, and 4 non-metropolitan counties.

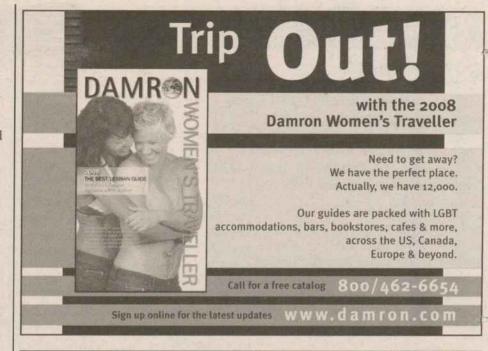
According to their website, the FBI collects data regarding criminal offenses that are motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias against the categories listed and are committed against persons, property or society. Because motivation is subjective, it can be difficult to know with certainty whether a crime resulted from the offender's bias. Moreover, the presence of bias alone does not necessarily mean that a crime can be considered a hate crime. If law enforcement investigation reveals sufficient evidence to lead a reasonable and prudent person to conclude that the offender's actions were motivated, in whole or in part, by his or her bias, then the incident should be reported as a hate crime.

Unfortunately, this had not happened in Milwaukee County under former district attorney Michael E. McCann's tenure.
