he title is just one of several inspirational messages found along the halls of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) building in downtown Milwaukee. Photographs highlighting several ARCW patients and clients show a more personal story in the fight against HIV/AIDS, and offer a glimpse into how, with ARCW's support, they are able to live healthy and productive lives as long term survivors of the disease. The newly renovated building is brighter, more welcoming, and much more equipped to handle the growing number of patients. When it comes to the various ARCW locations throughout the state, Milwaukee is the largest in terms of HIV cases, followed by Madison,

Green Bay, and Kenosha. Milwaukee is also half of the states AIDS caseload. Since the beginning of the epidemic there have been 10,153 confirmed cases of HIV infection in Wisconsin. Last year, 407 new cases of HIV infection were reported in Wisconsin. According to ARCW numbers, there are 6,481 people today who are living with HIV, and an estimated 1,600 more who are HIV-positive but do not know they are living

With such a high amount, it is no wonder that what once began as a special Best D Clinic project in the 1980's known as the Milwaukee AIDS Project, has evolved into one of the largest and most comprehensive AIDS service agencies in the country.

It is also the largest and fastest growing HIV clinic in the state, where a multitude of health and social services are provided to over 3,000 Wisconsin residents living with HIV disease. Over the last two years, ARCW has seen a sixty percent increase in patients, and over the last twelve months alone, they have seen more than one thousand medical patients, more than 1300 dental patients, and more than 340 mental health patients. They are also the most diverse, serving more gay and bisexual men, Hispanics and African-Americans than any other clinic in the state.

> 19th year! The 2008 AIDS Walk WI kicks off on Oct. 4th at the Miller Stage on the Henry Maier Festival Grounds, and hopes are high that a financial record will be set. In total, about 9.5 million dollars has been raised since the walks very first step nineteen years ago. Another five hundred grand and they will have reached a milestone. This will certainly come in handy, as nearly 40% of HIV patients have no health care coverage, and over 50% of HIV patients cannot afford their HIV medications - something ARCW is determined to change.

> "The AIDS Walk is definitely supporting our mission of making sure that everyone gets the health care that they need," says ARCW President and Chief Executive Officer Doug Nelson, who joined ARCW in the 1980's when there was "so much stigma, so much fear and discrimination and prejudice around this disease."

And that mission doesn't come cheap. Among other things, ARCW not only provides medical, dental and mental health services, they also distribute over a ton of food a day through their food pantry, provide legal aid, and pay out over \$800,000 in rent assistance. That is a far cry from the earlier days of the Milwaukee AIDS Project, when it was quite the accomplishment to raise a few thousand dollars. In 2007, ARCW's total revenue was over \$11 million.

Last years AIDS Walk brought in almost \$400,000. This year, if what Nelson predicts will happen, it is more important than ever to fund services to prevent, educate, and control

Milwaukee - Center Advocates, the longstanding voice of Wisconsin and Milwaukee's LGBT community, is reaching out to gay voters and their allies this Fall. Three new staff members have been hired to carry out an intensive outreach plan to inform members of the candidates' positions on our issues, and motivate them to vote.



For the Girls:

1"Finn's Girl," Finn's life would be busy even without her precocious 11-year old daughter Zelly - she's a doctor running a clinic and a single lesbian reentering the dating scene. But when controversy erupts over the clinic and Finn's life is threatened, "family" takes on a whole new meaning.

2"Itty Bitty Titty Committee," From the director of "But I'm A Cheerleader," is a dynamic, romantic, frequently funny and politically astute movie with a fabulous soundtrack and terrific ensemble cast that includes sexy young Melonie Diaz as the new dyke on the block who falls in with a great gang of Feminist troublemakers called Clits in Action (CiA), and then falls in love with leader of the pack, Nicole Vicius. Unfortunately, Nicole has a girlfriend - Melanie Mayron - and, as they say, drama ensues.

3."Affinity" In this sensual, atmospheric drama, Margaret Prior is a socialite who finds escape and purpose as a mentor who brings hope and comfort to the female inmates at the Millbank prison. For the Boys:

While Luke chases sex his coworker Zeke offers a running commentary on Luke's moral shortcomings. Then Luke falls hard for hottie Stephen (Charlie David). But everything is not as it may seem - and being true to oneself may be the best way to deal with the many complications of "A Four Letter Word"


2."Bangkok Love Story" Steamy Thai nights provide the backdrop for unbridled romance, crime and action. Maek, a cold-blooded assassin, is sent to knock off lht, a police informant. In a twist of fate the killer is shot for refusing to pull the trigger and the vulnerable assassin is nursed back to health by handsome, married lht. Soon their relationship is discovered and there's no turning back as enemies, friends and lovers are pitted against each other.

3. "Curiosity Of Chance" Openly gay teen Chance (Tad Hilgenbrink) confronts the horrors of high school in this wonderful queer throwback to such John Hughes classics as "The Breakfast Club." Also starring gorgeous Brett Chukerman ("Eating Out 2: Sloppy Seconds"), it's your homo high school wish-fulfillment fantasy featuring a great cast and a fun pop soundtrack.

4."Shelter" Forced to give up his dreams of art school, Zach (Trevor Wright) spends his days working a dead end job and helping his needy sister care for her son. In his free time he surfs, draws and hangs out with his best friend, Gabe, who lives on the wealthy side of town. When Gabe's older brother, Enter Shaun (Brad Rowe), Gabe's older brother who is drawn to Zach's selflessness and talent. Zach falls in love with Shaun while struggling to reconcile his own desires with the needs of his family.

5. HIV/AIDS. One of the most startling figures to hear during the interview with Nelson, was his prediction on the number of new HIV cases this year.

"We serve more gay men in the ARCW medical center than any other clinic in the state of WL" began Nelson. "What is very troubling to us as we look at the new HIV cases in WI, is that in 2008, we are on pace to have the highest number of new cases in ten years."

Typically, Wisconsin has between 380-400 new cases each year. And, in case you are wondering, they have always reported all HIV and AIDS cases in the state each year. Earlier last month, it was discovered that the Center for Disease Control had underestimated the number of those infected with HIV in the United States by 40 percent. "We've never underreported" says Nelson. "But we are on pace this year, probably for about 450 new cases, which will be the highest in over 10 years," he continues. "It is projected that about two thirds of those new cases, are gay and bisexual men. And, that most of them are under the age of thirty."

Last year, 18% of new HIV cases were among young people ages 15-24, and 69% of all new HIV cases were among gay men.

To those of us who were around for the earlier days of this epidemic, and the terrible toll it took on our community, this info is startling. ARCW, offers a wide variety of aggressive AIDS prevention programs and makes over 150,000 prevention contacts every year with people who are at risk for contracting HIV They spent close to 2.5 million dollars last year on prevention programs alone. So why such a high projected number of new cases?

While it is possible to live a long life with HIV / AIDS, the seemingly casual mentality towards safe sex as of late, is something that Nelson admits is challenging.

"This is a disease that no one wants," says Nelson. "It is extraordinarily difficult to live with. It is extraordinary

While the death toll has continued to decrease over the years, (2007 WI death toll to HIV/AIDS causes was 72) Nelson wants to stress that there is still no cure for this disease.

"People still die from it, and the side effects at times from some of these treatment medicines can be very unpleasant," says Nelson. "This is something you do not want to have. We are challenged by the fact that it is a new young generation of gay men who are leading the increase in cases - young men

who didn't witness how horrible it was in the eighties and nineties with lovers and partners and friends dying of AIDS. Very horrible deaths."

The challenge now, he says, is to have more aggressive prevention work, with help from partners across the state. More people on the ground doing outreach to every new generation at risk for HIV is the hope. The reality, is that ARCW has to be around to make sure those new cases have a chance - as young as they are - to be healthy and productive for the rest of their

What is no longer preventable, can still be Treatable

What makes ARCW unique, is that patients can walk into one building, and see their doctor, dentist, nurse, mental health therapist, lawyer, housing specialist, social work case manager and they can leave the building with several bags of food from the food pantry. Unlike many food pantries, ARCW delivers over 30% of the food to homebound individuals.

"We have worked hard to build this critically important system." Says Nelson. "The AIDS epidemic is different today than it was five years ago and ten years ago to be sure. Back then, it was about helping people on their journey to death. Today, it's about helping people on their journey in life. That is scientific progress in the fight against AIDS. The problem is when people can't afford health care, they have disease progression and death. Our mission is focused on providing the best medical care regardless of the ability to pay for these

The goal, says Nelson, is to "get patients to an undetectable viral load. When we think about the AIDS Walk, the monies raised from that AIDS Walk are making this possible."

The Walk supports all of that.

Another important purpose of this walk - solidarity. "You're taking your own power and you are helping us combat homophobia, racism, and sexism." Says Nelson. "I think it's a powerful message about the power that people have to fight discrimination, to change the AIDS epidemic, and to change the world. Yes, these dollars are critically important for all of these services, but you are also walking and marching for social justice and economic justice for people who are affected by HIV."

With monies raised from AIDS Walk donations, combined with various fundraising efforts throughout the year, as well continued on page 5







as donations from corporations, and the community, ARCW will be able to continue its mission to provide:

Medical/Dental/Mental Health Care

Four physicians from the faculty at the Medical College of Wisconsin do clinical work at ARCW. There are also two nurse practitioners and three registered nurses. "We are very grateful for our strong collaboration with The Medical College of Wisconsin says Nelson.

"We have a very integrated approach to health care," says Bill Keeton, Public Affairs manager for ARCW. "We are making sure to address all of the barriers, mental health, addictions, anything that will negatively impact someone's ability to live with and manage their HIV disease."

The ARCW dental health clinic is Wisconsin's only HIV dedicated dental clinic, serving more than 1300 patients, many who travel across the state just for an appointment. Three dentists and two dental hygienists provide direct patient care in state of the art dental facilities. For those who cannot travel to the Milwaukee (or Green Bay) ARCW Dental clinics, ARCW offers referrals to other dentists through it's dental reimbursement program."

The Mental Health Clinic in Milwaukee and Kenosha provides professional counseling and therapy to HIV/AIDS patients to help them meet the emotional challenges of living with HIV disease. There are approximately six mental health therapists available to offer screenings and diagnosis of mental health conditions, mental health therapy, and access to psychiatric and mental health medications.

Prevention/Education:

• The nation's leading statewide clean needle exchange program, Lifepoint is operated by ARCW.

 The Bag Boyz HIV Prevention program for gay men includes outreach in gay bars and other venues providing condoms, lube, HIV Counseling and testing.

 The IM Sex Ed program, an Internet intervention program, gives out safe sex information on different social gay networking sites.

 Youth and Women's HIV Outreach & Education. In 2007, 21% of new HIV cases were among women.

 ARCW staff helps to secure public and private assistance for income, and access social security disability, enroll in medical assistance and many other benefits and entitlements.

 Financial assistance for medical, dental, mental health rent and other costs. 40% of ARCW medical patients are uninsured. In 2007, ARCW provided \$1.055 million in uncompensated medical, dental and mental health care to people living with HIV/AIDS throughout Wisconsin.

Transportation assistance

 Financial assistance for costs associated with HIV disease.

 Family Services to focus on needs of families in which one or more members are living with HIV disease.

Legal/Housing Services

"In WI you cannot discriminate based on HIV status, or sexual orientation," says Nelson. "Those are wonderful laws to have, and we make sure they are followed." ARCW lawyers travel across the state to help clients win cases.

ARCW's comprehensive housing program provides residential housing, intensive housing counseling and financial assistance in the form of rent, utility and security deposit payments. Twice named Special Projects of National Significance by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

"We have two residential housing facilities," says Keeton. "One is a 27-bed single occupancy residential facility on the north side for people with HIV, and there is a 6-unit family complex. While they are living there, they have access to the other services at ARCW." The facilities are consistently full, with a waiting list for those in need.

Are they ever phased by critics who accuse ARCW of becoming "too big" or too "money hungry?"

Not really. Many resources are needed for those with HIV / AIDS to be long term survivors. Something that Nelson says "Does not just happen magically. I'm a believer in respecting everyone's viewpoint," says Nelson, "but it requires an infrastructure and an ability to raise money to pay for those high quality providers, so that they are available to the person with HIV."

According to Nelson, ARCW has never had a deficit. "We are well managed, we have a sound financial management. It enables us to do all that we do."

Nelson points to a portrait of the late Milwaukee (ACT UP) Activist Christopher Fons prominently displayed on his office wall.

"I can recall back to when we had a very active ACT UP Milwaukee, doing a lot of wonderful advocacy. They pushed us to start the much needed needle exchange program. And I appreciated that push" He says. "I knew where they

were coming from, where Christopher was coming from, and how important that was. And I keep his photo in this office to remind me that you've got to push, you've got to do more, you've got to help people."

Gay Neighbors and the construct of the "LGBT" Community

There has always been controversy over the issue of who is "in" and who is "out" of the group when defining what constitutes identity in the "homosexual" community. I use that now obsolete referent because it is from this descriptor of human character that present gay, lesbian and bisexual identities are derived. The Trans-sexual category has an entirely different history.

Back in the day when we were protesting against the discrimination and harassment that was then imposed on gays and lesbians we united in the cause of gay liberation. In this way we created a singular category of identity that came to replace the oppressive "homosexual". Thus they now refer to our issues as "the gay agenda", "gays in the military" and "gay marriage".

We are a construct-ed community of queer identities where the common bond is in our deviant-from-the-norm sexuality. Of course that problematizes gay, lesbian and bisexual identity too because some individuals who claim the identity are not sexually active in that category, for example, so called "political lesbians". But that is another discussion.

Until recently it has been strategically and financially [for the purpose of obtaining funding] useful for trans-gendered activists to affiliate with LGBs in pressing for equality and the end of "trans-phobic" discrimination. The alliance ruptured nationally over ENDA and a similar dis-connect between the greater "gay community" and the "trans community" has emerged in reaction to the current Gay Neighbor billboard campaign

Trans activists complain that they have been left out of the picture. Well, yes, they have been left out. They have been left out for the sake of simplicity in this campaign but in the larger argument because the construct identities of the two groups are essentially different. What to do?


This problem is not going to go away. We need to have a serious discussion of who and what exactly forms and constitutes gay community identity. Some trans folk may be LG or B but the essential issue is in the individual's perceived and performed gender. One recent study found that the numbers of individuals who identified as LGBT were relatively small and declined with the age of the cohort being sampled. One could argue that the under-count reflected a still pervasive homophobia that keeps people in the closet and thereby unwilling to openly admit their sexuality.

An alternative explanation is that "out and about" LGBTs are a small subset of individuals whose activism makes them visible and their "sexual orientation" undeniable while there is a much larger LGBT majority who do not necessarily prioritize their

Also, there are those who are comfortable with their preferences but who firmly reject what they perceive as "the gay lifestyle".

In real time we have to put aside the politically correct sticky-stuff that keeps this construct squabbling community together and regroup as representatives of separate politically identified groups.

We are gay men, lesbians, bisexuals, trans-sexuals, gender variant persons, and allies. In council then perhaps we can sort out where it is politic to speak as a united front, for example, as a political action coalition, and when it is more appropriate to separate out "trans" issues. If we are to survive as a community rather than to fade into history as a movement, which achieved most of its ends, we have to address our differences and commonalities. As a coalition, how do we help our Trans members gain acceptance and achieve equality under the law? In what way[s] is gender variance a community issue? As a coalition of diverse identity groups, how do we continue to build community within community?

How do LGBT families protect their children in Wisconsin?

am constantly amazed by how many folks do not know that Wisconsin does not allow same-sex couples to jointly adopt children, nor to adopt one another's children. In Wisconsin, appellate courts have ruled that the state adoption law does NOT permit second-parent adoption if the parents are a same-sex couple. Not being able to adopt children as co-parents for same-sex couples also prevents children from being insured as legal dependents.

Keep it Simple

As I mentioned in my last column, our child has only my name on his birth certificate. In no place does his biological father's name ever appear. We also paid our donor through our lawyer's office to further erase his rights. Our donor sought legal council to help protect himself in the process too. Buying sperm or paying a surrogate are ways that LGBT families can limit unwanted parental rights.

Guardianship

My partner and I have gone to children's court here in Milwaukee and had her named as our child's second legal, permanent guardian. I did not ever have to give up my legal guardianship of our son. She was simply added. This can be done for biological or adopted children. The guardianship route can be done right at children's court and has been granted in the nearby counties too.

If we would have named our known donor anywhere on any document, we never would have been able to get any rights for my partner, not here, nor in another state. Many think they can name the known donor at the beginning of the child's life and change it later. Changing it later is a difficult route to go because you are saying that the child had a father but now they don't. To get his name off the paperwork you will need him to go to court and declare that he doesn't want to know or support the child. Courts frown on a parent giving up their rights. You will probably have to prove that the biological father is unfit. That is all complicated, difficult, and expensive.

Names on Birth Certificate

Another little known fact is that at a birth, in Wisconsin, you are only allowed to list opposite sex married people as a child's parents. After the initial birth certificate arrives you can apply to have the biological father's name added, but you cannot list anyone but your married, opposite sex spouse at the time of birth. As this is an extra step in the process putting both names on the certificate would look very intentional and add a layer of difficulty if you later tried to change it.

If you foster a child in this state you can do so jointly as a LGBT couple. If you later adopt that child, however, only one of you will be able to be named as the legal parent. Adoptive families can also have the second parent named as a legal guardian in a separate court event.

Other Options

Some families go another route and use a law firm in Madison and then travel to another city in Wisconsin where the biological parent gives up their rights to the child. Five minutes later the child is adopted by two parents as two single unrelated people. Many like the fact that you get to have both parents named on the birth certificate. Some fear that method has not been tested in the courts.

Others still leave the child with just one legal parent. For some that is the right decision for their family. If something happens to the legal parent, the child may end up being awarded to a blood relative rather than to the partner who has acted as a second parent to that child.

Benefits of Protection: Peace of Mind

Having living wills, trusts and power of attorney documents drawn up as soon as possible can circumvent your child being raised by someone you didn't select. Cases exhist of religious rights groups trying to claim rights to a child when a parent dies my partner had power of attorney over me and our unborn child prior to his birth.

In our family, we have pulled out our guardianship papers when we applied for a passport for our son. We have often benefited from our child having two parents during trips to the emergency room at Children's Hospital where we must declare who each of us are and that we are both legal guardians. My partner insures our whole family on her health insurance and by being our son's legal guardian, she doesn't pay any extra federal tax on insuring him.

Hoping for Change:

None of this would be necessary if Wisconsin had fair laws protecting us all. "Children deserve to know that their relationships with both of their parents are stable and legally recognized. This applies to all children, whether their parents are of the same or opposite sex. When two adults participate in parenting a child, they and the child deserve the serenity that comes with legal recognition, according to American Academy of Pediatrics Policy statement issued Feb. 4, 2002.

I dream of the day Wisconsin lawmakers follow the advice of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Please note, I am not a lawyer. This is my interpretation of what I have experienced. Please seek your own legal council.

Last month, while attending a function in Walkers Point, I was pulled aside by my girlfriend/ partner/lover/pal/friend/ and introduced to a friend of hers who had just arrived.

'Scotty!" she called out, as she marched me across the floor in his direction.

"I want you to meet my..." she paused, "PERSON, Kate."

Person? What did you just call me?

She laughed. He looked at me and shrugged. And I didn't quite know what to make of it. I really wasn't upset, and she wasn't being serious in the least, and we all enjoyed a good laugh - especially when he replied with, "Well at least we've established you're a human."

But we've all been there, haven't we? We've all experienced those moments of introduction - when you're either going to introduce or be introduced by your "person" - to co-workers, brothers, neighbors... and it got me thinking. (Dangerous, yes)

I have my moments, I'll admit, where I flinch. Not many thank Goodness, but they happen. And not out of wanting to deny my partner at all - more like denying myself, which, in the long run, is no good either.

But something else happened that night. I got a lesson in what it's like to not even have the choice to call your partner anything other than what other people want to

I heard two stories. The first, of a woman whose 'wife' unexpectedly passed away. It was an incredibly moving account of her experiences when she suddenly was no longer valid in the eye of the law, and her community. They were legally married in Canada, but now, here in the states, she was not the 'widow." She was not the survived by her wife' description. She was not the 'next of kin' when pleading for possession of her wives body from the morgue. At the funeral home, they insisted on marking her on forms as 'friend' because, they told her, "there's

no place to put that' when she demanded to be listed as wife. She was not recognized as anything other than "friend" because others couldn't accept her reality - that she was the grieving widow. She had to go through the unbearable process of burying her wife - all the while having their relationship, love, and history degraded and dismissed.

The next story, was from a man who volunteers in our community, but is terrified of losing also his job he if they find out he is gay. The fact that he's been in a committed, loving relationship for nearly 18 years, doesn't exist in his 9-5 world, and his "normal-straight-world" job (his words, not mine) can't handle his reality. Apparently neither can

"It's a sad story, in this day and age, that you gotta feel like that," shaking his head.

I looked at him, and just gave an agreed, 'yeah, I know,' when what I really wanted to say was, "Well, then, change that story!"

Here was a man who has given up, constricted by what he felt would be negative reactions, and a woman doing everything she can to not let others decide who she is, and who she was to her wife. Hopefully one day, we won't feel the need to flip flop around who we are to one another, and more importantly we won't have to sit on the sidelines, molded into whatever and whoever society deems us as.

Ultimately, whatever you call one another depends on where you are in your relationship. I call her my partner, and sometimes I call her my girlfriend. Some day, I might call her something else. But mostly, I call her Rocky, and she calls me Monk. But that's another story.

11 Days - Milwaukee's LGBT Film/ **Video Festival**

This year's Festival has a lot to recommend - like the hilarious comedy BUTCH JAMIE (which is also a really great cat film) and some intense romantic drama, like SAVE ME and THE WORLD UNSEEN.

But there's something new in the films about youth. The Festival is wonderfully textured with films about a variety of remarkable young people. These films - like the opening night film WERE THE WORLD MIND, our Centerpiece screening WATER LILIES, the intersex drama XXY, the punk/street kid manifesto THE LOLLIPOP GENERATION - are all movies that are definitely interested in other things than simply coming out.

These movies are about what comes afterwards and the queer heroes of these films are all impressively defiant and assertive as they try to make a mark on the world, try to make the world let them be themselves. And these heroic young people are all at the center of a diverse range of films, of all genres - from the musical fantasia of WERE THE WORLD MINE, to EQUALITY U, the documentary of the Soulforce bus riders fighting homophobia on college campuses, to the antic and funny TRU LOVED, the best-afterschool-special-ever.

Not that these films only pay attention to young folk. We are presenting a program of films by the veteran experimental filmmaker Barbara Hammer and a new entry in the autobiographical trilogy by Jacques Nolot. His BEFORE I FORGET is about an aged hustler staring down the indignities of old age and in many ways he is as defiant and as radical as the youth we are presenting. Best of all may be CHRIS AND DON: A LOVE STORY, a really lovely film

about the 30-year relationship between British writer Christopher Isherwood and the much younger Don Bachardy.

The year is in fact a strong one of documentary overall, with a trio of great films about LGBT life in the Mideast. Two in fact explore the fraught intersection of homosexuality and Islam. A JIHAD FOR LOVE traveled to over 12 countries to portray the complex lives of lesbian and gay Muslims. And BE LIKE OTHERS depicts life under a fundamentalist regime as it follows a group of young men pursing sex change operations in the Islamic Republic of Iran. JERUSALEM IS PROUD TO PRESENT is a most engaging, even suspenseful film about the Jerusalem LGBT community center's attempts to mount a world pride celebration over fierce religious opposition.

And we are thrilled to be able to close the Festival with the newly restored print of the classic American independent film PARTING GLANCES, one of the first films to represent AIDS and still one of the best representations of American gay life. It is an added thrill because that landmark film had its premiere at a Milwaukee Gay and Lesbian Festival so many years ago thanks to then-Festival organizer Carl Szatmary, now of Outwords Books. And also, the film's lead actor Richard Ganoung will be on hand to introduce the film and take questions afterwards! (Richard is in town to star in Milwaukee Shakespeare Company's production of Love's Labours Lost.)

So there is a lot to see in the Festival's 11 days, which start September 4 at the Oriental with our screening of WERE THE WORLD MINE. Again the complete schedule is at http://arts.uwm.edu/lgbtfilm. I hope it proves to be of interest!

In the weeks and months that preceded our recent 25th anniversary, we have been asked for that secret recipe numerous times.

So, by popular demand, here it is: there is no secret and there is no recipe.

I want to express my sincere sympathy for all of us who hold on to a belief that life has its shortcuts to success. But Paul and I have found that our happiness and longevity have depended on hard work. So, that said, I am willing to share what we have successfully tested and what has worked for us. Most of these things appear in books and articles on healthy relationships; some of them are unique to us.

commitment. Believe it or not, we actually started with this assessment. We talked about our challenges with honesty, fidelity, and sex very early in our relationship. We set personal goals for ourselves and our relationship regarding these three vital components of love.

2. Tell the truth. There is nothing brutal about the truth. There is only something brutal about brutality. "I love you and I screwed up (or you did)" may be a tough conversation opener, but it works much better than "Why did you pack your bags?"

3. Let sleeping dogs lie. We avoid incessant revisiting of things about which we have struggled. That doesn't mean we give up on them; it just means we let them go until we can rationally think about them. If we can't think, we're more likely to just defend and stir up the pot without producing anything savory.

4. Don't use public venues to share private information. Here's one of our own favorites! Ever notice how tedious it is to be around people who fight in public? Notice how often one of the parties feels blindsided in the exchange? Decades ago we made a pledge to never say in public something sensitive we haven't spoken about in private. Even teasing each other is a tricky thing – be sure both parties are really laughing at something before proceeding.

5. Shamelessly appreciate your

spouse in private and in public. I'll bet that each of us gets a minimum of three appreciations every single day from the other. We usually do at least one in public as well, even when the other person isn't there. I can't express how delightful it is to hear people say, "Paul, I have been waiting to meet you

Gary thinks the world of you."

6. Figure out the finances again and again. Oy! At any given time, someone is doing better or worse than the other financially. We tried a zillion strategies and, honestly, the one that seems to work best is just making more money. But, short of that, keeping conversations about money real, and light, and frequent seems to work.

7. Decide to have big, interdependent lives. As a same-sex male couple, we have been simultaneously socialized to live big and to defer to others. Toxic. We have discovered that one of us doing big things does not require the other to step back. In fact, both doing big things seems to work much better.

8. Don't put all of your eggs in one basket. We count on each other absolutely, but not each other only. Each of us has trusted confidentes, mentors, and friends who love and support us individually and as a couple.

9. Decide to be a couple and then be one. Have we ever found anyone else attractive or interesting?

10. Make a home together and welcome others there. In preparing this article, I realized that we don't so much entertain as we do welcome. When we plan, clean, cook, and fuss for our guests, we do it as a team. We strive to let others know that a couple has thought about them personally. I believe our friends appreciate that; I know that our relationship with each other has grown from the discipline of thoughtfulness.

So, there are no secrets. There is no recipe. But there is enormous joy and boundless enthusiasm and real health benefits to be had from developing loving relationships.





Florida school district violates free speech of lesbian and gay students

Ponce De Leon, FL - A Holmes County School District principal banned students from wearing rainbow-colored clothing or other items that he said showed "support for homosexuality". This was after he told a high school senior that homosexuality is wrong – when she had come to him for advice. He also outed her to her parents and ordered her to stay away from children. In turn, her friends showed support by wearing clothes with gay pride symbols, and rainbow colored clothing. A few were suspended.

The American Civil Liberties Union sued, calling Principal David Davis's ban a "relentless crusade" against gay and lesbian students. After a two-day trial, a federal judge ruled that the district violated the students' free speech rights by banning the clothing. Holmes County School District was ordered to pay more than \$300,000 in damages, Davis was demoted, and school employees at Florida's Ponce de Leon High School must attend sensitivity

Even with all of that, many in that small conservative town don't understand what the problem is – they support Davis and feel outsiders are forcing their beliefs on them.







TRANSGENDER

ver the past few months, many people have asked me why I have never written about isolation or loneliness within the trans community.

The omission in my words has, in no way, attempted to invalidate the reality that many trans people and SOFFAs do, indeed, suffer from deep, sometimes devastating loneliness and isolation which can lead to paralyzing depression.

Many trans people and SOFFAs lose loved ones in the process of their trans exploration and evolution – this is an objective reality. Many trans people and SOFFAs believe that only "people like me" will understand who they are, so only seek out people who (on the surface) look like them – this, is a subjective reality. While we have no control over someone else's feelings or actions, we do have total control over our own.

I fully understand that many people within the trans community

have been wounded – hurt by rejection, prejudice, misunderstanding, and loss.

I also know that just as many people have internal reserves, resourcefulness, and resilience that are above average. If we can charge forward, strong in our identities, often able to take the bold steps of transitioning from one societally constructed gender to another (or live in the margins of a third gender, or have an androgynous appearance), we have the power within us to rally against our feelings of isolation and create a reality that we want to live in. That, of course, is easier said than done!

I can't count how many times a trans person or SOFFA has approached me - often angrily shouting - "you just don't understand" or "you've had it easy, you wouldn't get it." In addition to these global comments, many people continue on to create a hierarchy of how bad they have had it, somehow needing to be queen/ king of the hill of hardship. [I, of course, would have absolutely no idea what it's like to be trans, what it's like to be part of a stigmatized group with minimal legal protection, what it's like to navigate the world in a body that isn't fully aligned to social expectations, what it's like to continually need to explain my identity or body to total strangers in order to acquire appropriate medical

care. I just don't understand. I've had it easy.]

Reflecting back on these numerous and varied interactions, it's easy to see how these kinds of comments, accusations, and boastings would result in pushing people away, not drawing them in for increased communication and connection.

By playing "The Biggest Victim," people end up being "The Biggest Loser" – missing out on relationships, insights, connection, love, experiences, and just about everything. The role of victim often results in cutting off all experiences – good and bad.

It's difficult for those who have felt burned by others to take the risk to reach out again. Passivity, though, only leads to increased isolation. Taking the risk to reach out and to not assume that others are radically different – and to not assume that that difference is a barrier to connection – is hard, but not impossible.

If you never extend your hand, you'll never end up in a handshake. If you only extend your hand to those who have a similar purple thumb ring, you'll likely end up with a hand (and heart) that never touch another human being.

The next time you are sitting home alone watching TV, feeling lonely, consider picking up the phone or finding a (free) community event to attend. Take the initiative to reach out. Chances are, someone will reach back.

Retirement Planning: Using Traditional and Roth IRAs

here are many vehicles used for retirement planning. One of the most common is the traditional IRA (individual retirement account). Since the federal government does not yet recognize same sex couples, the following discussion centers on lifetime rules of IRAs. At the death of the individual, continuation rules are different for survivors who are spouses, rather than non-recognized same sex couples. With those parameters set, let's continue.

Contributions to IRAs are often tax deductible and distributions are often taxable as income. Another type of IRA is the Roth IRA in which contributions are made after tax and distributions can be tax-free. Tax-free withdrawals can be attractive which often prompts the question: Can a traditional IRA be converted to a Roth IRA?

The answer is yes, provided you meet the eligibility requirements below and understand how it works.

• The IRA owner must not have gross income in excess of \$100,000 in the year of the conversion. This income limit is repealed as of 2010.

 The conversion will be treated as a distribution from the Traditional IRA. Therefore, any deductible contributions and gain will be taxable to the owner and included in income in the year of the conversion. If the IRA being converted includes additional benefits, the actuarial value of those benefits is also taxable at conversion.

 The distribution is not subject to the 10% federal income tax penalty.
 And, for purposes of determining conversion eligibility, the conversion amount is not added to the individual's adjusted gross income.

• It is important to note that currently funds from an employer-sponsored retirement plan cannot be rolled directly into a Roth IRA. The money must first be rolled into a Traditional IRA and then may be converted to a Roth IRA. Beginning in 2008, employer-sponsored retirement plans will be able to be rolled directly to a Roth IRA. But the income limits on conversion will still apply.

• Withdrawals of earned dollars made in the five-year period following conversion will be taxable. And, for the Roth owner under 59 ½, withdrawal of the conversion portion will subject the amount previously taxed at conversion to the 10% tax

penalty. This prevents a Traditional IRA owner from avoiding the 10% penalty by first converting to a Roth IRA

IRA transfers and rollovers are powerful financial tools. If properly handled, these transactions allow funds to be shifted between IRAs or withdrawn without paying income taxes. The end result is often greater convenience and/or greater control of funds for the IRA owner. If you think a transfer or rollover might make sense for you or your partner, contact a qualified financial professional.



Dear EarthTalk:

My body doesn't tolerate cheese well. Are there dairy-free cheeses that will be easier on my constitution and better for the environment, too? Steve Sullivan, Seattle, WA

ith some 30 to 50 million Americans suffering from various degrees of lactose intolerance, and an estimated three million of us now eating animal-free (vegan) diets for humane, environmental and/or health reasons, the production of alternatives to dairy products has started to become big business.

But while substitutes for milks and ice creams abound, mostly soy- or ricebased blends that have come a long way since they first appeared on grocery shelves, finding satisfactory alternatives to the many varieties of cheese can be a challenge. But the choices are expanding rapidly.

The first place to look might just be your regular supermarket's produce section—that's often where you'll find Galaxy Foods' Veggie line of non-dairy cheeses. After all, they are made from soy, a crop. Galaxy's offerings come shredded, grated, in slices and in hunks. Fans swear they taste just like the real thing. And they are all excellent sources of calcium without cholesterol, saturated/trans-fats or lactose.

Galaxy also offers cheeses made from rice. And while some of both the Rice Brand and Veggie line contain small amounts of cultured milk salt, dried skim milk protein and trace amounts of lactose, Galaxy also make two purely vegan varieties, usually found in the dairy sections of grocery or health food stores.

A few other popular brands made with rice include Rice Slices and Lifetime Low Fat Jalapeno Jack Rice Cheese. Check the shelves of your local organic or natural food market to find one or more to sample.

Another leading producer of dairy-free cheeses is Scotland's Bute Island Foods. The company began making its own vegan hard cheese alternatives (sold under the Sheese brand name) in 1988, and has since expanded into cream cheese alternatives (Creamy Sheese) as well. From pizzas to sauces to sandwiches to spreads, Bute Island has vegan and lactose-intolerant cheese lovers covered.

Some other soy-based choices that get good reviews include Good Slice Cheddar Style Cheese Alternative (great for sandwiches), vegan-friendly Tofutti Soy Cheese Slices, Follow Your Heart's Vegan Gourmet (pizza, anyone?), and Teese (it melts with the best of them), among others.

Do-it-yourselfers might want to experiment with making their own non-dairy

cheese using ingredients such as tofu and yeast. A quick web search will yield many recipes for making cheese and for using non-dairy cheeses in favorite dishes. Many of the best are collected in Joanne Stepaniak's The Ultimate Uncheese Cookbook, available in some bookstores as well as

from Amazon.com and other online vendors.

With so many good choices, not to mention recipes for home cooked varieties, many a vegetarian may just make the leap into full-fledged vegan eating. And existing vegans can rejoice: French Onion Soup (dairy-free, of course) is back on the menu.

The show is a fundraiser for the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center. Tickets are \$10 at the door.



Deep in the Heart of Me

arlier this summer I went to visit another congregation here in the city. I like to do this when I can because it gives me a chance to see congregations I otherwise only know by reputation.

This particular Sunday followed the first granting of marriage licenses to same-sex couples in California. Still, I was not thinking about that as I settled into my pew in this historic black Baptist church.

So I was surprised when a deacon, opening the worship service, added to the regular prayers asking for God's help with this person's surgery and that person's travel the following petition, "God, deliver us from the homosexuals who want their special rights."

It was not the prayer I was expecting, and not just because I only want the regular rights of citizenship every straight person gets to enjoy. I'd come to that particular congregation because I knew of its advocacy on issues of justice. It spoke out against the economic problems in our city and named the hopelessness many feel. Yet despite all its good work, when it came to prayer what the deacon wanted most in that moment was deliverance from gays and lesbians. Forget the homeless, the hungry, the imprisoned, and the addicted; the real problem was two lesbians in Sacramento.

My own congregation has been welcoming gays and lesbians since before any of the youth in our congregation were born, but when I step beyond our community I run smack into the homophobia that is rife in so much of Christianity. Whether it is a deacon in a local church or some national gathering of a denomination debating LGBT ordination yet again, there is a pervasive prejudice.

In those moments I'm reminded of a poem by Langston Hughes, a gay black poet from the Harlem Renaissance, who wrote at a time when he would not be welcomed in much of America; doubly excluded, he captured his complex feelings on America by saying in part, "O yes, I say it plain, America never was America to me, and yet I swear this oath – America will be! An ever-living seed, its dream, lies deep in the heart of me."

Confronted by the failures of Christianity, the myopia that makes some see a wedding as an existential threat, and the prejudice that blinded a

deacon to the real problems in our city, I am moved to paraphrase Hughes, "O yes, I say it plain, the church never was the church to me, and yet I swear this oath – the church will be!"

I hear in Hughes' words the poignancy of pain mixed with hope, of disappointment tinged with longing, that I feel in the church today; for as angered and saddened as the homophobia of Christians makes me feel, I know to that the dream of Jesus lies deep in the heart of me.

eople always ask me what kind of supplements I take. So, I thought to myself where to begin? Supplements are just like eating and weight training - I always do something different. Below is one of the supplement stacks I take. Please understand that it's just one of many stacks I take to keep the body guessing. The best time I like to change things up a little would be between six to eight weeks. When I change things up it includes changing diet, workout routine and supplements. 
A boys' high school production of A Midsummer's Night Dream turns a whole town gay in this comic, musically adomed fantasia! Timothy can barely endure the hetero-drudgery of high school life—put upon by the jocks, an unrequited crush on rugby team star Jonathon, and generally isolated as the private school's resident fairy. But suddenly he is beset, as if spellbound, by intrusive fantasies, all (quite lovely) musical numbers wherein taunting dudes become beefcake

When the drama teacher (played by Wendy Robie, Twin Peaks's eye-patched Nadine in a Glinda the Good Witch turn) casts him as Puck in the school's musical version of A Midsummer's Night

Dream, Timothy discovers that he has the power to make the world his. It goes like this: as Puck, he conjures a love potion, directions courtesy of Shakespeare, and finds that—WTF!—it actually works! like a charm! Dispensed with an ejaculatory squirt, this potion allows Timothy to, uh, re-orient the world. How far will he go, and can a spell so sweet be sustained?

Were the World Mine is a similarly fantastical conjuring—a concoction mixing gay longing, antic comedic complications, romantic fantasy, and a certain John Waters naughtiness. Director Tom Gustafson bedecks the film with witty and stylish musical sequences, one part Busby Berkeley, one part homespun let's—put—on—a—show resourcefulness, and one part pop dreaminess. Casting a genuine spell, Were the World Mine proves that fairies can rule the world!

35mm, 85min, 2007) A special presentation of one of the year's best films—and one of the best films ever about teenage girls. First time filmmaker Céline Sciamma has made a film about synchronized swimmers that has a remarkable gravity. Her three heroines are 15 year olds of differing social standing in the strict hierarchy of the high school, each a secret agent or resident alien working alone on special assignments of desire. Ruthlessly opportunistic, and trying to avoid detection, they juggle loyalties as needed. But, please note, this isn't Mean Girls—these young women wear the recognizable ache of reality. Anne, buffoonish in spite of herself, but possessing many stealth weapons, confidence among them. Or, as the lesbian director of this intense, daring, at times shockingly funny, most empathetic, and ultimately quite sweet film says, "For me, the film is about what a tough job it is to be a girl."

G.B. Jonesin'

ZAP is excited to bring "The Lollipop Generation," the latest film by queer zine legend, punk rock queen, and underground filmmaker extraordinaire G. B. Jones, to the Milwaukee LGBT Film Festival on Saturday, September 6th at 11pm. Part tour diary, part punk sex voyeurism and all Super-8 goodness, this film was fifteen years in the making and brings together stars from her outrageous Toronto queercore crew like Jena Von Brucker, underground filmmaker and zinester Scott Treleaven, writer and lover to both Ginsburg and Burroughs Mark Ewert, as well as queer zinester punk rockers Anonymous Boy, Gary Fembot, and Vaginal Davis. Let's dig through G. B.'s zine work for clues to her artistic style and how she's managed to stay down-to-earth and super cool throughout a generation of print, musical, and cinematic explorations. Raise Your Femifist!

G. B. Jones was there from the beginning. Operating from Toronto, a "ground zero" site of queer zine culture, she was part of a group of dykes and fags who lived in craptacular housing, created art on shoestring budgets by day, and cruised the violent machismodriven punk rock scene at night. As a way to reach out to other queerdos, she collaborated with Bruce La Bruce to spill the seminal J. D. s zine in 1985. While some folks today look to Canada as progressive in terms of queer tolerance, this was not so at that time. Queers were the targets of violence on the streets and harassed by cops. For queer punks who lived on the fringes, the freaks and children of the night, there were precious few voices until J. D. s burst on to the scene.

G. B. set the tone of her approach and spelled out her politics from the get go in the inaugural issue. What begins innocently as a dyke-ified Tom of Finland style drawing ends up with a fascist pig feeling the lash of her own belt when she tries to ticket our motorcycling heroines. [Issue 1, 1985, 36 pages] Herein lies the G. B. Jones aesthetic. Take something innocuous, make it your own, and then turn it on its head to shift the paradigm into

radical terms. You can see it in those rare glimpses of G. B. in photographs where her 1960s style hair, makeup, and simple clothing style show her to be one hard ass femme with whom you don't want to mess!

Hints about G. B.'s other talents also come through from that first issue onward. Without stating it's her band, the number two slot on J. D. s' Homocore Top Ten is "The Fairview Mall Story" by Fifth Column. This song called attention to the fact that men who were being entrapped by Toronto vice cops in the toilets at a mall were having their names published in the newspaper after their arrests. Fifth Column's lineup were all women and for hardcore punk, they clearly cared about their sound. As Anonymous Boy puts it in Homopunk World [Issue 1, 1997, 22 pages] "Each musician in this group play their instruments off of each other and compliment each other beautifully." He goes on to say G. B.'s guitar style "... tends to have a stabbing, knife like sound with an echoey attack!" which is high praise from a guy who has been a fixture on the New York punk scene since the mid 1980s. If any more evidence is needed about the lasting influence Fifth Column had on Canadian punk, check out Montreal band Lesbians on Ecstasy or those awesome fun-loving Kids on TV from Toronto!

Tucked away in the corner of another J. D. s [Issue 4, 1988, 52 pages] "Tomboy of Finland" style drawing depicting a spiky haired, short tight

white t-shirt wearing dyke filming a leather clad J. D. dyke, there is a box of Ektachrome film. The passion for Super-8 filmmaking oozes from every pore of this issue. It includes ads not only for G. B.'s early "Troublemakers" film, but also her then soon-to-be a cult hit "The Yoyo Gang." This project united her with Leslie Mah (Tribe 8), and also featured Caroline Azar (Fifth Column), Donna Dresch (Team Dresch), Mark Freitas (The Rotten Fruits) and Deke Nihilson (Homocore co-editor). It's a rougharound-the-edges tale of two rival girl gangs, a continual undertone in G. B.'s work forward all the way to this year's The Lollipop Generation.

Don't miss this rare chance to see flickery, sexy images culled from fifteen years of queercore history savagely and frenetically edited together into an eighty minute orgy of queer punk spunk. To see the trailer and her other works, check out www.youtube.com/GBJonesTown.

"Life with My Sister Madonna" by Christopher Ciccone (with Wendy Leigh)

id you ever wonder what it would've been like to grow up with a different family? If you were an Only, you might have

dreamed about the fun you'd have with a houseful of kids to play with. Maybe you even gravitated toward friends with siblings, a little covetous of their raucous households.

If you had siblings, you might've wistfully thought about never having to share toys, the bathroom, or Mom.

Though you loved them, there were times, perhaps, when you would have happily shipped your brother or sister to another planet,

no questions asked.

Undoubtedly, Christopher Ciccone felt like that, especially when his sister was hot-and-cold with him over the years. In the new book "Life with My Sister Madonna" (written with Wendy Leigh), you'll read about a star's peccadilloes, her rise to fame, her demands, and the brother who loves her, always.

Born two years after his big sister, Ciccone says that he and Madonna weren't close as children. Motherless at three, he says he has few memories of his early childhood. He does recall, though, that Madonna was their father's favorite; even after their Dad re-married and there were more additions to the family, Madonna was singled out and treated specially.

Mythology says that Madonna went to New York for the first time with \$35 in her pocket. True or not, it didn't take her long to hone in on what she wanted, or to get it. Ciccone says she invited him along for the fame-ride, repeatedly yanking away the invitation and then extending it

again. Still, he went running when Madonna called, partly because he was awed by her but mostly because he loved

Just before her first tour, she asked him to be her dresser. Later, he decorated her homes, her sets, her clothes, and he protected her, both physically and mentally.

In this book, which takes readers from the beginning through to Madonna's latest tour, Ciccone has everything to say about his famous sister: her loves (thumbs down to Penn, thumbs up to Beatty, thumbs down to Ritchie) and her friends, both male and female; her passions, ego, tantrums, and embarrassments; the things she really did, that which she only pretended to do, and the truth behind the rumors and their spat.

I was a bit taken aback at this book. I was expecting another blah-blah-blah praise-filled star bio. Instead, what's inside "Life with My Sister Madonna" is a thoughtful, warts-and-everything, not-quite-tell-all from a brother

who alternates between adoration, gleeful tattling, outraged pain, snarkyness, and pouting. While this is definitely a book about Madonna, artist/designer and author Christopher Ciccone also seamlessly includes his own story of life as a gay man living in the shadow of the famous, beloved sister who infuriates him sometimes.

If you have a sibling, you may occasionally find yourself in this book (minus the billion\$, of course), but even if you don't, you'll enjoy this gossipy, starstudded, behind-and-in-the-scenes book. Not for the whole family, "Life with My Sister Madonna" is still high-living fun to read.


