

The first issue of Queer Life News is released. On the cover – a story that continues across the country written today.

• "A Nationwide Assault on State Constitutions – is Wisconsin Next?" The proposed amendment to Wisconsin's constitution, which would ban marriage between same sex partners, and most likely outlaw civil unions and domestic partnerships is on the horizon. Two years later, that amendment sadly passed.

Several columns featured in QLife have changed throughout the years, and some have drifted away. But thankfully, many of the writers who helped QLife get off it's feet are still with us today.

Our look has changed. The size and type of newsprint changed. Cover Images and stories went from several, to just one main article. The offices moved uptown and "Queer Life News" was shortened to simply "QLIFE."

The tone of the paper shifted, and more 'human interest" pieces, and celebration of the history of the community were featured.

This month being our 4th anniversary of publishing, we thought we would take a brief look back on the last four years.

JAN 2005



"GAY BAR RAID" was the title splashed across the cover. The images,


captured from a security camera in Woody's bar on 2nd St, showed three officers from the Milwaukee Police Department dragging a bar patron outside. While the bar owners were happy to discuss the raids, the MPD pretty much remained mum.

• James Pennington became the newly appointed Executive Director of the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center. Today, Dr. Maggi Cage holds the position.

- Plans were underway to start the new gay-friendly MPS school, The Alliance School of Milwaukee. Organizers say the school will be a safe haven for students who are routinely harassed based on looks, dress, beliefs, or sexuality.
- "Far too often, the voices and actions of LGBT individuals are unrecorded, suppressed or erased." Michael Doylen, The Milwaukee LGBT Archives, University of Wisconsin-Madison. Doylen, who wrote the History column in the early days of QLife, became part of the story in June 2008, when the LGBT Archives at UWM were the feature story.

FEB 2005

Citizen Lobbyists Swarm Madison – Jan 27, 2005. More than 400 people jammed the Capital lobby in Madison in protest over the constitutional ban on civil unions and gay marriage. The event was



- PrideFest goes for Non-Profit
 Status, now allowing tax-deductible contributions to be made to PrideFest by foundations and individuals.
- A decade-long fight pays off, and Illinois passes a Gay Rights bill Jan 12.
- PBS got a tongue lashing from Education Secretary Margaret Spellings, for featuring lesbian characters in a cartoon, and Focus

on the Family founder James Dobson claimed cartoon Sponge Bob Squarepants "brainwashes" children because it is "prohomosexual."



MAY 2005

Homophobic zealots target the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center. Carrying signs that read, "Homosexuality is a Sin", four men stood on the sidewalk in front of MGAC trying to persuade Gallery Night attendees to take fliers on "what the bible says about homosexuality."

- MPD launches expanded "cultural competency" training – something many of the LGBT leaders pushed for expanded program. At the time, Captain Mary Hoerig said that the training "is going to be continuous and infinite."
- Then LGBT Center Director, James Pennington was at a three-month standoff with Alderman Michael McGee. All attempts to contact him for a one-on-one conversation with the Center were fruitless.
- Best D Clinic began running the "He's Hot. But what's he got?" ads.

NOV 2005

"DISCHARGED". Marquette university student and Army artilleryman Jeff Howe was honorably

discharged under the military's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy. The Army had uncovered Howe's online profile on Connexion.org, an LGBT Community site. The irony, said Howe, was that they extended his original 2-year stay in Iraq by another 2 years. "But once they found out I was gay, they say 'get your stuff and get out of Iraq. There's no place for you in this Army."

- CNN reports that American casualties in the war in Iraq have reached 2,000. Estimates are that more than 25 of those killed were gay or lesbian.
- PrideFest pays off \$150,000.00 debt three years ahead of schedule.
 President Scott Gunkel attributes the successful turnaround to "The tremendous outpouring of community support."

DEC 2005

QLife receives threats for publishing the issue. The mug shot of Milwaukee Alderman Michael McGee graces the cover, along with accusations of bigotry. QLife receives a bomb threat



for publishing the issue.

- A call was put out for women to join a newly formed SSBL for women teams only. It never materialized.
- HRC launches Transgender Equality Education Campaign
- Congress Passes Common-Sense HIV Treatment Bill



MAY 2006

"WHAT?" Screams the cover title

– plastered over a photo of a badly
beaten Frank Jude Jr., the young
Milwaukee man beaten by MPD
officers at a house party in Bay View.
All four officers involved are found not
guilty on 4 out of 5 charges, prompting
protests.

- The end of an era after 30 years in business, M & M's closes its doors.
- The Greater Milwaukee Visioning Project has been meeting to start building stronger LGBT communities. Scott Schmoller, a participant, said, "all of us can be better through collaboration and a stronger sense of community.

AUG 2006

Then Editor, and 1/3 owner of Queer Life News, Don Hoffman abruptly resigns, leaving the future of QLife in question. The remaining 2/3 owners take the month of September to regroup, and begin publishing again in Oct. 2006.

OCT 2006

"Fighting For Love". Patrick Flaherty's QPolitics column was moved to

the cover feature, and focused on the upcoming Wisconsin Marriage Amendment vote. Ray Vahey, and Richard



Taylor – two community members who had been together 50 years were profiled. They had "endured the brutal homophobia of a benighted era only to face this assault in their final years." Vahey and Taylor had become strong voices in the fight against the gay marriage ban.

- Gay marriage debate sparked a restaurant brawl in a Wauwatosa George Webb.
- Project Q won a \$100,000 three-year grant.
- QHistory, now written by Don Schwamb, looked at the importance of Print Media in the LGBT Community. (No wonder we've always liked Don!)

In the long run, this cover article helped to set the tone of the next two years of QLife. Several issues to follow focused more on the LGBT community, it's organizations, and it's people. Topics became lighter, and more celebratory of who we are as a community in the hopes to put back together what many labeled a "disjointed community." The "history"



of who we are, where we've come from, and what we are doing as we move forward towards equality became a steady theme.

DEC 2006

The results on WI Marriage Amendment are on the cover and the sad reality still stings. Fifty-nine percent of Wisconsin citizens favored discrimination and inequality.

 Under Iran's Islamic Penal Code, homosexuality between consenting adults is a capital crime. They hang a gay in public...ironically in an area called "Freedom Square."

APRIL 2007

Cream City Foundation's 25th anniversary is the hot topic. Founded in 1982 with a \$500 gift from Ed Jaworski, Cream City Foundation grew to become "the first and many times the only source of funding for emerging LGBT needs and organizations."

• One month prior to this issue, sadly a "true pioneer" in the gay civil



rights movement, Eldon Murray, passes away March 5, 2007. In 1994, Murray had founded SAGE Milwaukee – Wisconsin's first organization devoted

to issues surrounding aging in the community.

- The Milwaukee LGBT Film Festival and the Milwaukee Art Museum team up to present the 1969 "dykesploitation".classic, "That Tender Touch."
- Marine Gen Peter Pace, The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, calls homosexuality "immoral"

JUNE 2007

Local artist and designer, Maureen Kane designs the cover image for our Pride issue, asking the community what "Pride" means to them.



- History! The US House of Rep. Voted to pass the Local Law Enforcement Hate Crimes Prevention Act, H.R. 1592 in a vote of 237 to 180.
- The Transgender Aging Network (TAN) of FORGE announced the release of a new teaching tool, "Living memory LGBT History Timeline." Loree Cook Daniels, TAN Executive Director, said, "even those of us who do know our history can forget just how much change can take place."

AUGUST 2007

Direction, Focus, and a Mission: Diverse and Resilient is the latest organization to be featured. Their intent is to "aid the inception and continues success of various LGBT groups.

The 2008 **Community Center Survey Report**

Washington, D.C. - CenterLink, the Community of LGBT Centers, has released the results of the 2008 community center survey conducted jointly with the LGBT Movement Advancement Project (MAP). The in-depth overview of local LGBT community centers analyzes data on 71 LGBT community centers, covering approximately 97% of all LGBT community center revenue

This analysis looks at community centers' age and infrastructure, financial, fundraising, staff and board capacities, current programs and services, demographic overview of clients and patrons, technical assistance needs, and recommendations for strengthening the community center field's overall capacity.

Some of the findings show that the average center is 18 yrs old, with most being founded after 1990. The 71 centers are located in 29 different states and the District of Columbia. Most (53 percent) serve multiple counties and cities, 10 percent entire states and the remaining 37 percent focus on a single county or city. Nearly all (92 percent) are independent organizations while the remaining 8 percent are affiliates or programs of other organizations.

In 2006, LGBT community centers had combined budgets of \$83.5 million, which grew 11 percent to \$92.6 million in 2007. Growth between 2007 and 2008 is projected to be slightly slower (7 percent), with budgets increasing to \$99.3 million. This growth represents an increase of 19

percent from 2006 to 2008.

Most community center revenue (41 percent in 2008) comes from government sources, with 17 percent from state government, 15 percent from federal, and 9 percent from local public agencies. Individual donations are the next largest source of revenue, at 22 percent. Foundations and corporations make up just 10 and 5 percent of center revenue, respectively.

Centers spent most of their program budgets on information and education services and community outreach programs (29 and 22 percent, respectively), followed by mental/physical health at 20 percent.

In combination, LGBT community centers serve nearly 40,000 individuals in a typical week, and refer 17,300 people to other organizations or agencies. The average center serves 608 people in a typical week, while the median serves 150. Almost all centers (59 centers, 85 percent) offer services for LGBT youth, (with 39 % of program service dollars directed to youth programs) while 54 centers offer services for people who are transgender. Programs for LGBT seniors are the third most offered.






Winsome Panton, a Nurse Practitioner at the ARCW Medical Center, has received Marquette University's College of Nursing Distinguished Alumni Service Award.







Gay Youth Health Risks

Recent findings from the 2007 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) indicate that among sexually active youth in Wisconsin, seriously significant health disparities were found for lesbian, any and bisexual youth.

The 2007 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) was administered by the State of Wisconsin's Department of Public Instruction (DPI) in partnership with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to 2,094 students in 56 public schools in Wisconsin. It is part of a national effort by the CDC to monitor health-risk behaviors of the nation's high school students.

Behaviors monitored include traffic safety, weapons and violence, suicide, tobacco use, alcohol and other drug use, sexual behavior, and diet, nutrition and exercise.

These health disparities identify LGB youth as more vulnerable to violence at school, mental health problems, suicide attempts, alcohol, drug and tobacco use, and most alarming - having significantly fewer adult supports than their heterosexual peers.

The State of Wisconsin has long understood both the personal and public cost of youth risk behaviors in health care and the loss of years of productivity across the lifespan. With nearly 1 in 10 Wisconsin youth reporting same-sex sexual activity, these findings indicate a critical public health situation.

Findings include:

- For the first time, since 1993, the 2007 YRBS included a question about same-sex sexual activity in its sexual behavior questions.
 - 9% of the sexually active youth reported engaging in same-sex sexual activity.
- 36% of LGB youth reported having been harassed, picked on, or bullied compared to 20% of their heterosexual peers.
- 31.8% of LGB youth reported making a plan to die by suicide in the past 12 months vs.
 10.8% of their heterosexual peers.
- Wisconsin LGB youth report significantly higher rates of use of alcohol, marijuana, and street drugs than their heterosexual peers.

 Lesbian, gay, and bisexual youth have fewer adults they feel comfortable with seeking help from than their heterosexual peers.
 There are also lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning (LGBTQ) youth that are

thriving – with good family and community mentors, academic success, positive peer support, and good models of public health.

LGBTQ youth programs in Appleton, Eau Claire, La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, and Wausau belong to the Rainbow Alliance for Youth, a network coordinated by Diverse and

Wausau belong to the Rainbow Alliance for Youth, a network coordinated by Diverse and Resilient, Inc. which is a statewide capacity-building organization. In addition, many schools in the state of Wisconsin have Gay Straight Alliances (GSAs).

GSA for Safe Schools coordinates leadership activities for GSAs in south central Wisconsin.

Programming for parents of LGBTQ youth is also offered throughout the state by various chapters of Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG). Financial support for these organizations includes private funds, foundations, the Department of Health Services (DHS) AIDS/HIV Program and The Wisconsin Partnership Program of the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health.

The Wisconsin LGBT Youth Health Coalition is a membership group that is coordinated by Diverse and Resilient, Inc. which also serves as its fiscal agent.

Based on this runaway success, MGSA is now looking to take the show on the road! Inspired by similar traveling teams in New York, Seattle, and other cities, MGSA is now planning a traveling soccer team that will bring Milwaukee's star players to LGBT tournaments around the

The new organization, named the Brew City Rockets, hosted Open Call sessions in September and October to build an all-star team. After incorporation, the Brew City Rockets will pursue entries in International Gay and Lesbian Football Association (IGLFA) tournaments and similar soccer competitions.



Founded in 1992, the IGLFA now consists of over 50 LGBT teams that compete at worldwide tournaments, pride events, World Cups and Gay Games. The organization works to improve the self-respect of gay women and men throughout the world, and to gain respect and understanding from the non-gay world, by maintaining an international network of LGBT soccer teams. The next IGLFA World Championship will be held in Washington, D.C. in June 2009. Previous championships were hosted by Copenhagen, Buenos Aires, London and San Francisco.

Milwaukee - The ACLU of Wisconsin filed a lawsuit November 10th 2008 in federal court in Milwaukee charging that the Milwaukee Police Department violated the First Amendment by shutting down "Naked Boys Singing," a musical play with gay themes that has been produced around the country. The case seeks damages to compensate the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center, which staged the production in Milwaukee, for losses it suffered when the police shut down the play in 2005. City officials told the Center it needed a theater license and police officers threatened that people would be ticketed or arrested if the production went on. The ACLU charges that the theater licensing ordinance is unconstitutional, because it allows authorities to suppress free speech by withholding a license indefinitely, and that the police were illegally acting to suppress the play because they disapproved of its content.

lawsuit on behalf of MGAC. Porter said the case shows why licensing of plays and other art is dangerous. "When a theater director or other performer has to get a license before expressing herself, it's too easy for the authorities to just delay giving the permit to performances they don't like. In this case, the cast and crew were gearing up for a show when the police first brought up the need for a license, even though MGAC - and other nonprofit theaters - had done other shows without licenses for years. The only difference is those shows didn't have such provocative titles, so you have to suspect that disapproval of the content is what made the police act in this

here are numerous hotels in the city of Milwaukee. Yet only a few reach out to the LGBT community. One typically is a sponsor of PrideFest, offering room specials, but really only one hotel has consistently advertised to the community and opened its doors to events, parties, and commitment ceremonies held by LGBT community members.

The ceremony, as well as the reception can be hosted at the hotel, but it does not stop there. "Once

you've chosen the date, a food and beverage manager is assigned to look after your party from start to finish."

The Clarion can also provide a priest or minister. "We can be a one-stop stop," says Spillner. "We have DJ's we can recommend, places where you can go for cakes, a room to put guests up for the night, transportation to and from the airport and the ability to cater the entire event."

At the Clarion, they mean business; and your business is definitely welcome and appreciated.

The upscale Clarion Hotel Airport is conveniently located less than one mile from General Mitchell International Airport. Meeting and banquet space range anywhere from 624 to 8000 sq. feet and they have hosted parties from 10 to a thousand people for meetings, lunches and social events. Food is catered in-house by the Cork N Cleaver.

There's no judgement here. We have several samesex couples who visit for our Sunday Brunch and Friday Fish fry. They come because, one, it's good, and two, they don't get studied, or looked at and talked about."

During PrideFest, the hotel welcomes repeat guests in town specifically for Pride weekend. "Our location typically isn't one that PrideFest would look at to use us as a sponsor," says Spillner. "But, even though our location might be farther away, it's just as easy to get to the PrideFest grounds, in a shuttle on 794.

The next time you have family coming into town, or need to throw a party for all of your wonderful employees, why not consider the Clarion?

Judge Rules Against Florida Gay Adoption Ban

Miami - Frank Gill and his partner have been caring for two foster sons for the last four years. Last month, a Miami area judge ruled that state lawmakers overreached their authority when they banned child adoptions by Gay and Lesbian couples, thereby allowing the Gill family to make their family permanent.

Presiding child welfare Judge Cindy Lederman labeled Florida's 31-yearold ban as "not rational" and that from all the arguments presented in this case proves the Gill kids are doing fine in their present home environment. Florida allows gays to serve as foster parents; however the state's has the most restrictive adoption laws in the US when it comes to gay and lesbian parenting. The Florida Attorney General's offices say they will appeal.

Marrow Transplant cured AIDS?

Berlin - Last month, it was announced that twenty months after receiving a targeted bone marrow transplant normally used to fight leukemia, a 42year-old American man who suffered from AIDS seems to no longer have

The researchers and the doctors, are cautious however, and suggest the man's case could be no more than a fluke.

Dr. Gero Huettler said his patient had been infected with the AIDS virus for more than a decade. But 20 months after undergoing a transplant of genetically selected bone marrow, he no longer shows signs of carrying the virus and tests on his bone marrow, blood and other organ tissues have all been clean.

This isn't the first time marrow transplants have been attempted for treating AIDS or HIV infection. In 1999, an article in the journal Medical Hypotheses reviewed the results of 32 attempts reported between 1982 and 1996. In two cases, HIV was apparently eradicated, the review reported.





Between Hope and Change

he election of Barack Obama was a historic moment, one I will long savor. It will be an even more momentous time in January when we move from the observance of Martin Luther King Day – "I have a dream" to the inaugural the next day – "I, Barack Hussein Obama."

Still, there are bitter notes mixed in with this sweet moment. My own sense of the sweet and bitter of this election comes in the news of anti-gay propositions that passed in several states. It was hard to watch Californian voters turn out overwhelmingly for Obama and then also vote to end samesex marriage at the same moment. Or in Arkansas, where the bitter news came that the state outlawed adoptions by gay and lesbian people; I fear this sort of state referendum will be coming to more and more places in the future.

I find that I am living between hope for tomorrow and the need for profound change today. Hope in what our country can do; concerned about the anti-gay prejudice that demands change today.

It is my faith which allows me to stand in the midst of hope and the need for change. Spirituality nurtures hope within my heart, particularly in this season. The Jewish holiday of Hanukah celebrates the national liberation of the Jews from foreign occupation. It is based on the time when the Jews needed oil for their temple but they only had enough for one day; mysteriously the lamps burned for eight days, enough time to gather more oil.

I do not know how it is that we are going to reverse the damage of the latest round of anti-gay amendments that passed in four states, let alone how we are going to overturn the one in our state. Yet I hope that it can be done, a hope that is nourished when I remember other people who overcame tremendous odds, as at Hanukah, when darkness of oppression was overcome by the light of hope.


As the miracle of Hanukah would suggest, oil can be powerful symbol of God's grace. When I think of the oil in this story, my understanding of it is shaped by Paul's comment in Romans. There Paul said, "We have not received

a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but we have received a spirit of adoption that cries out with our spirit that we are children of God." To me the oil represents the grace of God that fills our hearts with holy pride.

The stories of this season also point me towards the need for change, especially stories like the Virgin Mary, pregnant and uncertain about her future, trudging towards Bethlehem, even singing on the way, "for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is God's name. God has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly." Mary sang not just because she had hope but because she was willing and ready to get to work to create change.

I find that I am motivated in new ways to find a way to create change. My priorities are universal healthcare, support for those affected by the downturn in our economy, and efforts to deal with the racism in our community. In the coming year these are the goals I will find ways to work for. They may seem like impossible changes. My spirituality reminds me that it was an impossible dream for Mary to think she could be part of changing the world; but she did.

And Martin Luther King's dream seemed impossible until suddenly on Nov. 4 it became real.

here are lots of things in life that we don't expect. Things like: when will we catch a cold, when will we need Viagra, and when we will listen to opera - in a bar.

Now, when I was in San Francisco in 1964 a friend took me to a bar that had nothing but opera on the juke box, all of the walls were covered with

photographs of opera stars and other opera memorabilia, and to my delight, customers regularly sang along with the arias from the juke box. It was a rare treat, but I couldn't tell you where that bar was or its name. I just know that I wasn't just high or dreaming.

However, the idea of going to a gay bar in Milwaukee on a Sunday evening to listen to opera seems highly impossible, definitely improbable and totally unbelievable. But on November 16th that is exactly what happened. Boom on South 2nd street welcomed members of the Florentine Opera Camerata for a Sunday Artist Social, presenting songs by two members of the company and a dialogue with Robin Follman who will be appearing in the upcoming production of Madama Butterfly. It was one of the most wonderful evenings I have had in a long time.

Soprano Greer Davis-Brown and tenor Rafael Luquis sang a total of 6 songs. They

are participants in the 2008-09 Florentine Opera Studio, a program, which offers a full season of artist-in-residence employment for talented singers. They sang in Italian – which, although I don't speak it, (although I should since I am Italian, but that's another story) it didn't matter - because the acoustics of the Room are so amazing. It was simply wonderful to hear such good voices singing well and not be sitting in a theatre.

They were followed by a dialogue with Robin Follman, an internationally known opera Diva (by her own admission.) She took questions from the audience while she sat on the bar (a lifelong dream of hers.) The questions were varied and she answered each of them with wit and intelligence,



making opera something that is for everyone, sharing professional terms and explaining those that we probably wouldn't have known. She told us that she truly enjoyed the evening and we believed her because she was clearly having as much fun as we were.

The Camerata, an LGBT friendly affinity group that presents a variety of opera-related social events with a focus on providing audience education generating enthusiasm for opera within the community also served a wonderful buffet of food that could easily have been a meal. "Camerata" comes from an old Italian word meaning fellowship society. Today it has come to mean an informal gathering, usually for the purposes of literary, philosophical, or artistic discussion.

The evening was put together by Mark Trevor Ranum, Michael Johnston and Scott Stewart and it could not have been better. They have scheduled two more 'Sunday Artist Socials' for February 22, 2009 and April 5, 2009, at the Room, 623 S. 2nd Street. This was a great event and just proves that there is a lot more to do in the Milwaukee LGBT community than you can even imagine.



ittle did we know when the Vets Do Ask Do Tell website came on line June 17th, 2008 the impact it would have on the LGBT community. From a little website we are now moving in the direction of a national organization. We incorporated under an LLC in the state of Wisconsin on August 17th, and are



5. Greet your friends with hello and goodbye hugs (and/or kisses). None of us get enough physical contact.

6. Go for a walk - even in the cold. Being in the sun, as well as just the pure exercise in the movement, helps reduce depression and stress. For an added bonus, say hello to the "strangers" who walk past you. A simple "hi" can perk up anyone's day and make the world far more

7. Cut your parents (or anyone else) some slack if they address you

by your old name. Recognize that change can take a long time. Try to see the love beneath their words, rather than judging their love by their words.


8. Tell your partner (or best friend, or family member) you love hir. Just like touch, most of us don't hear the "L" word often enough. If saying the word is hard, try leaving a post-it note on hir computer, or planting a chocolate kiss on hir

9. Invite a trans elder to your home to watch a movie. Add some popcorn and any kind of beverage even ice water or hot tea! It doesn't matter what movie or what kind of snacks, but the companionship may alleviate loneliness and isolation (for both of you).

10. Listen. Truly listen. Give the people in your life some quality time, some of your undivided attention. Spend time being with the people you care about. Those moments of quiet conversation or raucous laughter are far more valuable than any expensive gift.


WHAT WORKS?

hat an election we had! It truly was historic and stunning in so many ways, and yet, it was laced with a profound sadness for the families facing the prejudice of living in today's America as a loving same sex couple. I have never in 25 years seen an election like this one. Let's review the good and the bad; celebrate the victories and the regroup after the disheartening setbacks.

First and Foremost:

The state Government Accountability Board and the Milwaukee Election Commission were more determined than ever to have every eligible and willing voter cast a ballot. For two years, they studied issues such as access for people with disabilities, and revamped the rules to counteract those who would interfere with citizens casting votes. They worked closely with groups like ACORN, the Milwaukee LGBT Center, Disability Rights Wisconsin, Center Advocates, the AFL-CIO, Fair Wisconsin, the ACLU of Wisconsin, League of Women Voters, and in fact, any groups who wished to help to make sure registration was followed to

the letter of the law.

It was truly citizens, government officials and the non-profit community coming together to ensure our sacred right to vote was protected. They even beat back a ridiculous lawsuit by the Attorney General J.B. Van Hollen that could have disfranchised hundreds of thousands of voters in Wisconsin! **Stunning Results**

I have never seen an election run this smoothly in Milwaukee. Many

bilingual poll workers were available to assist voters with primary languages other than English. Hundreds of young people came out with encouragement from the Milwaukee Public School Board to work the polls. The results nationwide were similar. No



nationwide well-coordinated effort to disfranchise voters ever materialized. As a result, more people than ever in history exercised their right to vote and we now have the first African American first family, the Obamas.

This is historic. As woman of color, I can only say thank you to the millions who put aside their prejudices, their fears of people who are different than them and on November 4, 2008, judged a man on the "content of his character".

Setbacks Sidenote

At the same time Barack Obama was on the stage in Chicago accepting his election as the 44th President of the United States and specifically calling for equality for our LGBT friends, millions who had voted for him had also voted for bigotry, hatred and inequality.

Millions of Americans woke up and found their joy quashed by the

realization that they were left behind. In California, married loving couples found their marriages denied by their neighbors. In Arizona, the voters passed yet another ban on same sex marriage, and in a particularly upsetting move, Arkansas voters overwhelmingly voted to ban adoption rights for same sex couples.

The media immediately jumped on a story that African Americans

voted somewhere around 70% against marriage rights in California in a lame attempt to blame them for the loss of the legislation. Frankly, I believe it was designed to incite a divide and conquer battle between the African American community and the LGBT community nationwide.

It did not - and will not work. Bigotry knows no skin color, and millions more whites voted for the amendment than blacks in California. However, much more work does need to be done not only in the African American community, but in all of our communities to combat the negative myths of same sex families that have been propagated around this country for too long.

Ah, but all is not lost!


This is just one step backward in decades of forward progress. Remember this case: Strauss, et al, v. Horton, et al. Google it! The ACLU, NCLR and Lambda Legal have filed suit in California, and the CA Supreme Court has agreed to fast track the law suit, so this battle is not over yet...

Obama is not taking the setbacks for granted. He immediately appointed seven openly gay transition team members and we expect great things from our new president on the rights of all people in this country.

Saturday, November 15, 2008, Center Advocates was at the center of a rally where hundreds of fair minded people both straight and gay showed up at City Hall in downtown Milwaukee and at locations all over this country to say enough is enough! To declare their humanity and the respect, as one more group of Americans who have been marginalized for too long. It was a great day and more chances to stand for equality are coming.

Finally, we for the first time in decades have a state legislature and a governor in Wisconsin whom we expect to first do no harm, second, repair harm that has already been done and third, support positive legislation to better the lives of same sex families in Wisconsin.

All of this relies on accountability though and that's where you come in... Stay tuned folks the work is just getting started!





Well It's Our Birthday Too, Yeah!

Il it took was one little e-mail to start the ball rolling four years ago. The premiere issue of Queer Life News had just hit the stands, and editor Sura Faraj wrote to ask if QZAP, at that time celebrating its one year anniversary, wanted to have a monthly presence in future issues. I know Sura as a friend, neighbor, and tenacious activist who always connects good ideas with great people. I credit her initial editorial guidance in helping me craft a readable column each month, namely that I would cover classic and current queer zines as a way to highlight the on-line archive. QZAP has been proud to contribute to every edition of Queer Life News from issue two up to the issue you now hold in your hands.

Our association with Queer Life News has helped us achieve amazing things, not only in the greater Milwaukee area through grants from UWM and the Lesbian and Bisexual Women's 25/25 Venture, but also in the broader world as well. This column has evolved from a small. local voice into serving as references in academic dissertations here and internationally, as well as appearing as source citations for Wikipedia entries. We believe in the power of self-publishing and in creating media that breaks down barriers and builds community. Both Sura Faraj and current editor Kate Sherry have deftly

wielded the strength of this medium to provide space for diverse voices to be heard. All too often, LGBT newspapers serve little purpose other than to advertise bars and provide fluffy, vacuous trivia. While a few people in town may grouse about Queer Life News, there are far more readers who look forward to learning more

about politics, history, sports, health, religion and queer culture from authoritative local writers.

A community newspaper is not necessarily a panacea. Frankly, there were many times during that gray period between Sura's

and Kate's editorships where the cover stories served only to create capricious controversy. However profound my disagreements were back then, I persevered in submitting my writing contribution each month. I felt I could at least infuse my corner of the paper with minority and radical voices seldom heard in the mainstream. When Kate Sherry announced she would tackle the editor position I

sensed positive change was coming to the paper. Each new issue serves to reaffirm that feeling.

In four years the Milwaukee LGBT community has weathered many storms both internally and externally. I feel Queer Life News has been here to provide an open sounding board and Kate specifically strives to represent as

many views as possible. As she can attest to, I drop her an email when there is content in the paper that I find troubling or has me quizzically scratching my head. She responds in a timely fashion and addresses my concerns. She has been willing to take

risks to cover unconventional stories and expressed a bold desire to take on controversial issues in ways that rise above sensationalism. She has also granted me the freedom of selfdetermination, in that I, in conjunction with QZAP collective members, decide the content for each month's article. Unlike other outlets where my writing has appeared, I have never once been censored or unfairly edited.

Queer Life News needs your input not only to simply exist, but to thrive in a way that helps inform, entertain, and energize the Milwaukee LGBT community. The pages of this newspaper are open to one and all, especially if you represent a unique aspect of queer life. Invite folks who complain about the paper to instead write a letter, an article, or perhaps a monthly column. Create an ad for your business or a service you provide and commit to six months or a year of advertising. Clip out articles or copy and paste them from the website into e-mails. Send them to queer and non-queer friends around the state, the country, and the world to let them know that here in Milwaukee, we have a vibrant LGBT community and amazing writers. Most importantly of all, don't let this important anniversary go by without a commitment to help perpetuate this vital voice of the community. On behalf of The Queer Zine Archive Project, whose mission includes fostering independent queer media and which recently celebrated its fifth birthday, thank you for reading this column and Queer Life News every month.

Year in Review - Preview of 2009

s we celebrate the holidays and prepare for the New Year, the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center (MGAC) would like to take the opportunity to recognize and thank its supporters. Without the generosity of individuals, foundations and businesses, continuing our mission to promote and present LGBT relevant arts would not be possible.

In 2008, the MGAC hosted internationally acclaimed performance artists Tim Miller, Jade Esteban Estrada and Alistair McCartney. It presented national, regional and local talent in concerts from baroque to jazz and indie queer rock to indie queer folk. Yolanda Roth, Eric Himan, Jerrad Fenske, Coyote Grace, Scott Malcom, Keith Hampton, Jerry Grillo, Ryan Mintz and Women's Voices Milwaukee performed among with many, many others.

MGAC's stage was graced by dozens of belly dancers in Hafla dance extravaganzas and intimate monthly drop-in events. Alphabet Troupe produced a wonderful cabaret; the Tranny Roadshow made its second appearance; and LIVEWIRE, a youth open mic, introduced new poets and musicians.

Addressing LGBT health, MGAC offered low cost yoga and dance classes throughout the year. MGAC Scream, Saturday Softball League's only team not affiliated with a bar, fielded a comradely mix of LGBT and non-LGBT players: women and men, university professors, health care professionals, a barista, a bus driver, musicians and artists.

Seven art exhibitions, opening every six weeks, showcased artists of all ages, genders, hues and orientations. Themes addressed feminism, gender identity, urban youth experience, eroticism and gay aesthetics.

MGAC collaborated with LGBT and non-LGBT entities including Alverno College, MPS Alliance School, Boulevard Ensemble Studio Theatre, Saint Paul's Episcopal Church, the Milwaukee Art Museum, PrideFest, SAGE, Saturday Softball League (SSBL), Milwaukee LGBT Film/Video Festival, Woodland Pattern Book Store, the Art Bar and many others.

An NPR-WUWM Lake Effect interview and a mention in the Shepherd Express "Boris & Doris" column expanded MGAC's public horizon.

The Challenge Party, the Greater Milwaukee Foundation's Johnson and Pabst LGBT Humanity Fund, Cream City Foundation, the G/L Community Trust Fund, Riviera Maya and the Washington Heights Rainbow Association provided much needed funding. Many individuals generously made cash or in-kind donations. Others became supporting members. All helped maintain the MGAC venue and produce events.

COMING UP: A 2009 Preview

Programming for 2009 is equally diverse and ambitious. Music, theater and art will celebrate the Saint Joan of Arc Project in its multifold contexts of feminism, gays in the military, gender identity, idealism and social repression.

- It will open with The Vagina Monologues - a percentage of funds raised will benefit local women's shelters.
- A Milwaukee Gay Arts
 Center UWM theater department collaboration will address underserved LGBT populations with specific outreach to the African-American community.
- Its established PrideFest tradition continues with representation at the Health & Wellness area as well as belly dance, art and music on various stages and in the Arts and Culture Building.
- MGAC will house the SSBL Hall of Fame display during NAGAAA-Fest 2009, the Gay Softball World Series in late summer. MGAC Scream looks forward to playing in the series as well.

Next March, the Milwaukee Gay Arts Center celebrates four years of serving its patrons and audience. It continues to expand the horizons of both our own community and create a bridge to further understanding through dialogue with non-LGBT communities.
