

Can We Come of Age in Milwaukee?

oming of age implies reaching a certain place of maturity where the entity has a sense of identity strong enough to recognize and relate to others as peers and partners. It is a growth process and necessitates going through infancy, childhood and adolescence.

Who is the we? It's the "community" that B.J. Daniels spoke about in last issue's guest editorial. A commonly accepted and identifiable name is still a work in progress. "Gay Community", "Queer Community", "LesBiGayTrans Community" are some attempts at inclusive labels. "We" includes *all* of us who identify in any way as lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, transgendered or transsexual persons.

Since coming to Milwaukee 13 years ago, we have seen our community go through various stages of childhood and adolescence. In fact, there have been a few moments of maturity, such as the post-Dahmer community response and some aspects of PrideFest. Unfortunately, these moments of maturity have been few and far between.

More often than not, responding to our adolescent need to self identify in fractious and egocentric ways, we have split ourselves into separatist groups. That alone is not enough, for we have also been combative and abusive of each other. We act like politicians who would rather tell us how terri-

ble their opponents are rather than who they are and what they can do. The very acceptance that we dream of and demand from others is in reality our own judgments about each other. All of this adolescent behavior is nurtured by those who work to deprive us of our rights and push us back in he closet! In addition, our lack of maturity has deprived us of a strong, solid, unified voice that cannot only be heard, but more important listened to.

It's time for us to grow up and come of age! It's a holiday gift that we can and should give to ourselves and also to society. How can we do it? First, by becoming more comfortable with ourselves as individuals and small groups. Second, by reducing the

amount of judgment we inflict upon each other. The Rainbow Flag that symbolizes our community is the model of diversity living in harmony. Third, by recognizing the value of each other and affirming that each unique part is necessary for the whole to function in a healthy and effective functional way.

Sacred writings have talked about parts which attempt to make over other parts in their own image. It doesn't make for a healthy body! Unique parts meshing and working as a whole, never losing their uniqueness is the ideal of maturity.

We are aware of an opportunity that will soon be placed before our community that will require lots of maturity to pull off. It's a chance for all of us to take some infant steps toward maturity and

real community. Nothing less will work. The choice will be ours as gay men, lesbians, bisexuals, transsexuals and transgendered persons, groups and factions. If we can pull it off, Milwaukee could be a rare model of what the gay community can be and accomplish. The united voice and power of our community will be heard and might even be an effective vehicle for positive change. it hasn't happened often, but it could happen here in Cream City! Can we come of age in Milwaukee?

The choice is not for someone else to make... it's a choice you and I must and can make if we want to grow up and come of age. If we don't, we can content ourselves with blaming others and complaining about our lack of acceptance, privilege and opportunity. Let's quit talking about it and simply do it!

JUSTICE FOR WUORNOS

To the Editor-

We are writing to remind you of the case of Aileen "Lee" Wuornos, a lesbian currently on Florida's death row for killing six men who attacked her. Recently four of her six appeals were denied; two still await judgment. The second set of appeals is being prepared now.

Lee was working as a highway prostitute when she was attacked. Prostitutes are much more likely to be raped than women in other jobs. In fact, prostitutes in one study testified that they were raped an average of thirty-three times a year.

The issues of violence against women and our right to self-defense were obscured in this case by sensational charges that Lee was a man-hating serial killer. Call her a serial killer, and you can sleep well at night knowing the highways are safe... for men.



Call her what she is, a woman who killed before submitting to rape and possible death, and you are forced to wonde whose life is valued? As Lee said, "Who's supposed to die? Am I supposed to die because I'm a prostitute?"

Unsurprisingly, Lee did not receive a fair hearing of her case. In her only trial, the dead man's history of sexual violence was not allowed as evidence. Her overworked public defender had never tried a capital case; sixty references to self-defense were deleted from her videotaped confession; Lee's background of chronic abuse was not acknowledged as a mitigating circumstance, and the list of injustices goes on.

As feminists, we feel it is important to raise our voices to demand that Lee receive justice, and that women have the right to freedom from violence and the right to protect ourselves when violence does occur.


We urge you to demand justice for Lee Wuornos.

ACROSS AMERICA

Gay Marriage a Revenue Base

Honolulu— If Hawaii becomes the first state to legalize same-sex marriages, \$4 billion in revenues would be generated in the next few years by couples coming to the Islands to marry and honeymoon. This means that a same-sex marriage tourist industry would eliminate Hawaii's current budget deficit.

This is the conclusion of Professor Jennifer Gerarda Brown (Quinnipiac College of Law) in an article published in the *University of Southern California's Law Review*.

In her study, Brown details how samesex marriages would boost tourism, generate a wealth of new jobs and businesses, and increase tax revenues in the state. Hawaii is geared to handle such a market and no additional governmental investment or infrastructure would be needed. All that would be required is that our state stop discriminating against same-sex couples.

Brown's conclusion is based on conservative estimates that gay men and lesbians are 1 percent to 3 percent of the general population, that gays and lesbians will marry at one-third the rate of the general population, and that each marriage would generate \$6,000 of in-state spending.

First Lesbian Credit Union in Pennsylvania

Philadelphia - Triangle Interests, a national non-profit organization concerned with lesbian's financial issues, is

in the final stages of opening the nation's first credit union exclusively for lesbians and their immediate families according to a report in *Philadelphia Gay News*.

Triangle Interests Federal Credit Union in Manayunk, Pennsylvania recently receive a charter from the National Credit Union Administration and will open for business in January.

MTV Plans Gay Date Show

New York— According to a report in the Akron Beacon Journal, Singled Out, MTV cable channel's relationship game show, will have an all-gay audience for one show, giving one man and one woman the chance to land a same-sex date.

Ruling on Boy Scouts to be Appealed

Trenton— The attorney for a gay former Boy Scout says he will appeal a state judge's decision to up hold the Boy Scouts of America's ban on admitted homosexuals.

Superior Court Judge Patrick J. McGann upheld the ban in a ruling against James Dale. The Scouts have won every legal battle challenging their exclusion of homosexuals.

The judge said the Dallas-based Boy Scouts of America is a private organization and has a constitutional right to decide who can belong.

Fired Gay Man Wins Appeal

Denver— A lawyer fired after his law firm learned he was gay may keep the \$90,841 lawsuit judgment he won in a Denver lawsuit, the Colorado Supreme Court recently ruled. Robert Borquez also won the attorney fees and court costs he was denied by the lower court.

GRIM AIDS PREDICTIONS FROM AFRICA

Washington— AIDS will dramatically reduce life expectancy in sub-Saharan Africa, says a new report from the U.S. National Academy of Science's National Research Council.

By 2010, the average lifespan in Zambia will have dropped from 66 to 33 years, in Zimbabwe from 70 to 40, in Kenya from 68 to 40 and in Uganda from 59 to 31, the report said.

Other hard-hit countries include Botswana, Burundi, Malawi, Rwanda and Tanzania. HIV infections in the region are 80 percent due to heterosexual sex and 20 percent due to male-male sex, the researchers said.

PORTUGAL'S LEADER SUPPORTS GAY MARRIAGE

Portugal— Portuguese Prime Minister Antonio Guterres, a Socialist, recently told reporters he has no problem with the concept of gay marriage and legalizing it "is not out of the question."

In other news, Portugal's first gay newspaper is scheduled to appear in January, independent from any gay organization.

And the Portuguese Quilt Movement has been launched –headed up by Jorge Almeida, whose lover died of AIDS.

CATHOLIC SCHOOL OFFERS RUBBERS

Leuven— Belgium's Catholic University of Leuven has sparked controversy by installing condom dispensers on campus.

Student Relations spokesman Prof. Dirk van Gerven called the move a responsible approach to AIDS, but others have noted that Catholic doctrine forbids any sex act that is not open to the possibility of pregnancy.

AUSTRALIAN PRISONS WILL DISPENSE CONDOMS

New South Wales— Three prisons in the Australian state of New South Wales will install condom-dispensing machines on a trial basis in February.

Corrective Services Minister Bob Debus told the Australian Associated Press, "Experts in communicable diseases are quite emphatic that condoms will help stop prisons becoming a pool for disease which then spreads through the community."

New South Wales is the first Australian state to make such a move.

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ACTIVIST NAILS THESES TO ABBEY DOOR

London- Gay activist Peter Tatchell of London's OutRage! group nailed "Four Theses Against Church Homophobia" to the door of Westminster Abbey last week during the Anglican Church General Synod.

"What's needed is a new Reformation to eradicate homophobia from the Church of England," Tatchell said. "Anglican endorsement of anti-gay discrimination is a corruption of morality and a violation of the dignity of lesbian and gay people."

The document demanded the church "stop persecuting openly gay clergy in honest and loving relationships, end the Children's Society ban on lesbian and gay foster parents, withdraw support from anti-gay cults which attempt to 'cure' queers of their sexuality, [and] sack the bishops in the House of Lords who voted against an equal age-of-consent" for gay and straight sex.

In 1517, the Protestant Reformation was launched when Martin Luther nailed "Ninety-Five Theses" to the Catholic cathedral in Wittenberg, Germany.

LATINAS STAGE LESBIAN PUPPET SHOW

Buenos Aires— Argentina's Lesbianas a la Vista group staged three outdoor lesbian puppet shows in Buenos Aires' historic San Telmo neighborhood Dec. 3.

"The public reacted mostly with surprise, interest and respect," the women reported. "A few people were indifferent but nobody was aggressive."

"Our two objectives -to bring lesbian created lesbian images to the streets for everyone to see and to raise the public's awareness about the rights we do not

enjoy as couples -were widely reached," the group said.

"The performance ended with the sunset and everyone dancing in the street: puppets, lesbians, gays, mothers, teenagers."

LATVIAN GAYS LAUNCH RIGHTS CAMPAIGN

Latvia— The gay Latvian Association for Sexual Equality says it is going to become more aggressive. Although Latvia legalized gay sex after splitting from the Soviet Union, the nation also has banned gay marriage and police are raiding gay bars and cafes, sometimes closing them down for minor infractions and often humiliating the patrons, LASE said.

People outside Latvia can help by writing letters calling for gay equality, including the right to marry, and for the addition of the words "sexual orientation" to Criminal Code Paragraph 69, an anti-hate crimes law.

AIDS SCARE AT RUSSIAN HAIR SALONS

Odessa— Officials in Odessa, Ukraine, have shut down 34 of the city's 133 hair salons charging that improperly sterilized scissors and razors could spread AIDS.

"Theoretically it is possible for people to get AIDS through pedicures, manicures and shaves," Ukrainian AIDS specialist Larysa Bochkova said Dec. 7.

"The instruments often become dull from the sterilizing fluid and for this reason [it is] not very popular with hairdressers."

Odessa's AIDS caseload jumped from 369 to 572 in November alone. None of the new cases were attributed to hair salons. 788 new cases of HIV have been registered nationally this year compared with 44 in all of 1994.

SWISS GAYS FIGHT FOR MARRIAGE RIGHTS

Bern- Swiss gays and lesbians will gather in Parliament Square in Bern in January to mark the one-year anniversary of their petition to Parliament demanding that same-sex couples be granted the rights of marriage. The petition contained 84,000 signatures.

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I'll take a Gallon... No, Make that Two Gallons

Pennsylvania researchers have discovered a topical application of synthesized male pheromones which increases the sexual attractivness of men to their partners according to a report in the Medical Tribune.

Researcher Winnifred Cultler, Ph.D, stated the odorless, clear alcohol-based liquid contains a chemical copy of natural substances given off by healthy virile men in their 20's.

In a study of 38 men, who added the new pheromone to their own after-shave for eight weeks reported they were busier sexually than before the study. Engaging in more hugging, kissing and sexual intercourse. Those who added a placebo to their after-shave reported no change in their sex lives.

The pheromone-alcohol solution comes in a small vial; one adds a few drops to regular aftershave. A companion product for women is also available. To order call 610/642-3073.

A film version of the 1979 Broadway play "Bent" is once again in the planning stages. The play featured Richard Gere as a gay man in a Nazi concentration camp, and the film version was to reunite Gere with his "Yanks" director, the openly queer John Schlesinger.

Now Movieline reports that Broadway director Sean Mathias is expected to direct the film with Tom Cruise and Brad Pitt sought to star.

Norman, Is That You?

Anthony Perkins, the late actor who became famous for playing sexually ambiguous nut cases in Psycho and scores of other films, was as kinky in real life as he was onscreen, according to a recent article in Honcho Magazine.

Although he married a woman later in life and produced offspring, Perkins



was secretly gay and took the "casting couch" route to advance his fledgling career, according to Brian O'Dowd, Perkins' dresser on Psycho II, Psycho III and others.

"Tony went down on everything but the escalator at William Morris," O'Dowd reported. "Tony himself told me that. He used to laugh about it."

O'Dowd revealed that Perkins was fond of the rough stuff: "He used to like to box with guys. When the blood would start to flow, that's when he'd get sexually stimulated."

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
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

Executive Director of Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project to Retire

Milwaukee— The executive director of the Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project (SEWAP), Bill Houtz, will retire at the end of December, ber after more than seven years of running the project which he helped to start. SEWAP, which serves the counties of Kenosha, Racine, and Walworth, was founded in early 1988 under the umbrella of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, Inc. (ARCW). With Houtz's leadership, SEWAP has grown from a one-person operation with about twenty clients to a project with 13 employees and approximately 130 clients.

"We face some of the same issues in our area now that we faced when we started," said Houtz, "Including the misperception that AIDS is not a problem in Kenosha, Racine and Walworth counties. In fact, it is a problem, and there is a great need for prevention education, particularly among the teenage population."

Houtz came out of an earlier retirement from his long-time job as president of the Kenosha Youth Foundation to start SEWAP. "I'm extremely proud of the way our staff has worked together to provide economical delivery of services to our clients," he reflected. "I hope the community and school boards will address the issues intelligently. We can't stick our heads in the sand." Houtz's replacement is anticipated to be hired in January of 1996. SEWAP offers life care services to people

living with HIV and AIDS and prevention education and outreach services through its office at 6927 - 39th Avenue in Kenosha. SEWAP's telephone number is 414-657-6644.

SAGE to Begin Telephone Reassurance Program

Milwaukee- The Board of Directors of SAGE/Milwaukee (Senior Action in a Gay Environment) recently announced that SAGE will offer its first service oriented program to members in the near future. There will be a telephone reassurance program consisting of a daily telephone call by volunteers to members who are shut in or live alone and wish to be contacted daily. Accordingly, SAGE is planning to hire, on a part-time basis, a person to recruit, train, and supervise volunteer callers. Milwaukee— St. Camillus To Hold Retreat For Persons Living With HIV/AIDS. St. Camillus AIDS Ministry invites persons living with HIV/AIDS to register early for "Embarrassing The Mystery: HIV/AIDS And The Spiritual Life;" a retreat experience designed to help participants to refrain their often negative experiences of living with HIV disease. 

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
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Doug Nelson Tackles the Tough Issues

Q: Do you remember what your first memory of AIDS was?

A: Right from the beginning I was aware of it. I think it's rare for a gay man not to remember the threat even as it came out in 1981. I can remember reading the first news accounts of it. I wasn't real connected in the gay community or certainly in the AIDS community back then, but I remember reading information as it developed in '82 and '83.

Q: What was your reaction?

A: It was a frightening prospect and, I think, debilitating for me. Personally, at that point in time I was fearful. I think I was overly restrictive in my sexual activity and think ultimately in my potential for relationships. In those early years, I don't think we were as knowledgeable or well organized in terms of getting messages out about how sex is still erotic and healthy and fun if you know how to protect yourself and remain HIV free.

t age 48, Doug Nelson has been the Executive Director of The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), for nearly eight years. During that time he has seen the AIDS case load explode. ARCW has grown from seven employees in 1988 to over 92 full time positions statewide serving close to 1,300 clients with nearly 1,000 of those in the Milwaukee area.

I sat down with him recently in the "Dan Gordon Conference Room" at his downtown office. We discussed recent criticism of MAP's Client Services, his personal losses to HIV and AIDS and his love of the Green Bay Packers.

Fourteen or fifteen years ago it was a fearful, socially restrictive kind of thing. I look at what I'm doing now, and it's like night and day in terms of an understanding and intelligent response to AIDS, rather than one that's a knee jerk reaction.


Q: So, your fear may have helped to kept you alive...

A: Fear and luck. The luck piece is what a lot of gay men can relate to. It also is a function of the injustice of AIDS. I think in almost any other human endeavor we always have this philosophy that everyone's entitled to one mistake. With AIDS, I've had several friends who have had one mistaken episode of unsafe sex and they became HIV infected. I've had many other friends who have had many



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mistakes of unsafe sex and are HIV free. That's the injustice of AIDS ... that one episode can launch you on a journey with HIV and AIDS. So, when I look myself back in those early days of the epidemic, I think that combination of fear and luck is why I'm here today.

Q: How did you get this job?

A: One of my great friends is David Clarenbach. I met David when he was in the State Legislature and I was a lobbyist.

David is someone who was a great mentor in my life. He certainly helped me come to grips with my sexuality and helped me understand how to affirm that. He was the one who called me up; I was at my cottage up north and he said, "Doug, the Milwaukee AIDS Project is looking for an Executive Director, I think this is the job for you." My initial reaction was, "That's health care, I've done enough of that and I just don't think it's what I need to do." Several days went by and he called back, he was the one that ultimately talked sense into me about what the opportunity

meant and he was right. What the Milwaukee AIDS Project was looking for at that time was someone who could step in and lead the agency and build it. They definitely were looking for someone with leadership capabilities and political savvy.

Q: Did you recognize that you could do that?

A: Yes, to me, the job as it was presented to me, was perfect. I had the health care background ... I knew the health care system well. I had the political background ... I knew what advocacy was. I had the deep personal interest in the issue of AIDS. What it came down to was I was pretty well suited for that, and what a tremendous opportunity to help gay men or my community, and to address the worst epidemic of the century. So, I really sat down and thought about it deeply, I thought there was not anything more important I could do.



Q: Did you have a vision of what you wanted MAP to be?

A: No. I had not been involved in anyway with volunteerism and AIDS. I was really disconnected from the whole AIDS community. I came into this much like I've come into many things in my career, and that is with an ardent feeling that in order to make any progress, there would have to be very strong and hard political work to get things done. That's something I've always been attracted to. Whether it was being attracted to and pulled into the protest movement of the Vietnam War or some of the political work I did. I was just always drawn into an advocacy role that I enjoy. My first few weeks on the job here ... there were about seven people on the staff and a budget of \$500,000. Primarily what the Milwaukee AIDS Project was doing back then was education. It was very much of an AIDS education and AIDS awareness type of thing. I think there was one social worker among the seven who was doing case management work, serving people who had AIDS. It became clear as a bell to me, that if MAP was to have meaning, if MAP was really going to make a difference here. that we would need to build a client services program. There was no money for that, so one of the first things I did was, which is sort of symbolic of how friendships and connections help you out, I went over to Madison and met with Clarenbach and said, "We've got to get a legislative initiative to fund these kinds of services." David and I formed an alliance on this and really through his leadership in the State Assembly we got passed a \$1.5 million initiative to support what we called "Life Care Services" for people with HIV. That enabled MAP to establish a

fundamental foundation in services and case management.


Q: MAP's Client Services have come under fire lately ... I'm thinking of criticism you received at MAP's Community Forums and a letter-to-the-editor recently published in In Step Magazine. Are you happy with MAP's Client Services?

A: We're not perfect here. The letter in the In Step is an example of an episode where the case manager did not work well. I would call it a failure of case management in this instance. We are addressing that with this individual. I think there is a tendency to focus in on a few areas where perhaps we know that we need to make some improvements. When you look at what we really have here, case management is a big foundation, but we literally have almost a small law firm with two lawyers and a paralegal. We have over 700 open law cases where we deliver excellent, free legal services to clients from two outstanding lawyers. We have a housing program where more than 130 people are provided with

housing on a permanent basis. We're constructing, thanks to a grant from the federal HUD Department, a six unit housing structure for families with HIV, which will meet another critical need.

Q: When will that be complete?

A: We are hopeful to break ground this coming summer and open probably in the beginning of 1997. That will add to the housing program. We have a huge rental assistance program. We'll be delivering over \$100,000 in rent assistance to clients this year and about \$25,000 in emergency financial assistance. In addition to that we have the food pantry where we're delivering over 100 tons of food to people. In this coming year, we're going to be doing hot meal delivery to people who are home bound. Come January, we are going to essentially rescue the HIV Dental Clinic out at Doyne Hospital, Doyne is closing down; it had become one of the primary sources of dental services for the AIDS community. Froedtert didn't want it, The Medical



College didn't want it, so we will be moving the Dental Clinic down here to MAP. One thing I think is so important that we don't publicize enough is that we have a Wisconsin Based Community Research Consortium. It's a clinical drug trial program here and it's the only one in the state. We have created that, we staff it. We essentially recruit drug trials from drug companies. The bottom line is that it brings experimental drugs into Milwaukee. It enables people with HIV and AIDS to access those experimental drugs. The approval a couple of weeks ago of 3-TC, the new anti retro-viral, that now the FDA has approved... we've had 3-TC in Milwaukee for the last two years. People with HIV and AIDS have been able to access it through the drug trials that we operate. So, when I look at the whole array of client services we have here it is profound. I interact a lot with my colleagues around the country and there is nothing like this in Detroit or even in Chicago. There's not any single agency that does as much as what we do here in Milwaukee. There are little agencies that take bits and pieces. In Chicago there are probably 17 or 18 organizations; they all compete for dollars; they all are duplicating some administrative services. But, in Milwaukee, we've kept it really sort of lean and mean in terms of not duplicating administrative expense, not duplicating services and broadening the base of services here.

Q: How do you respond to critics who say MAP has become a bureaucracy?

A: We are not a bureaucracy here. This place operates very efficiently. I've been in corporations and in government that are real bureaucracies and this is not a bureaucracy. If someone is trying to call their case manager and their case manager is the phone to another client and they get the voice mail recording, and

that can be frustrating. But is that bureaucratic? No, it isn't. We had someone say on our feedback forms, "We hate your voice mail system, we want to talk to someone real on the end of the phone." If we didn't have voice mail and you called and your case manager is talk-

ing with one of the 100 other clients that he or she has, you'd get a busy signal, and that would be even more frustrating. At least with voice mail you can leave a message and someone can get back with you.

Q: Is that part of the reason why you appointed Jerry Lishawa to the Client Advocate position, is that working out?

A: Yes it is. The Jerry Lishawa appointment was going that extra step to make sure that if someone really is aggrieved, if someone really feels that either a case manager or a nurse or whatever may not have responded well or in a timely way, that there is someone here who can be called, who will immediately see that action is taken. Our pledge was that within 24hours of that first call to Jerry Lishawa action will be taken. Now, the problem may not be resolved. It may taken longer to file an SSI application, for example. But, at least with-in 24 hours, Jerry will see to it that there is a plan of action and that action is going to occur. Our commitment has been first and foremost to the AIDS community and to people who are clients here. And to be honest with you, the calls that he's received have been very, very low. Extraordinarily low. So, what we need to do is publicize his availability and his phone number.

Q: Do you take the recent criticism of MAP personally?

A: I'll answer that in two ways. Professionally, we decided we had to go out into the community, get feedback and to get ideas. It wasn't that we had to do that, we wanted to do that. Perhaps it

goes back to that charge of bureaucracy. Real bureaucracies don't do that kind of thing. We know that we've gotten large. We're doing a lot of things here, so that there are a lot of people, a lot of volunteers. It's a big place. The strategy of going out and having community forums, of providing an opportunity for input and feedback is something we really wanted to do. We were prepared. We were psychologically prepared for the fact that anytime you do that primarily you'll get criticisms. Is it hard to do that personally? Yes it is. Everyone who works at this organization works extraordinarily hard, far beyond a traditional 40 hour work week. People are working very, very hard here. We're battling. AIDS is a crisis, and we're battling a crisis week-in and week-out. Everyone wants to do more. It's hard to find the time and resources to do more. And the death and dying; I think we all know in Milwaukee that we have arrived at a



point in this epidemic where the death rate is very high, we're all losing friends and loved ones and we deal with that every day here. The case managers in particular are on the front lines. When you go to a forum and get the intense criticism we received, personally its hard to take because you want to do the best that you can. On a personal level its difficult.

Q: How do you personally deal with the death and dying aspect?

A: This sounds melodramatic, but isn't there a line in Gone with the Wind, "I'll cry tomorrow" or something like that?

Q: Like healthy denial?

A: (Laughing) That's very good. Again I go back to the crisis, this siege, this epidemic. In my mind, the day will come when I can step back from this. I can take that deep breath and say I've done my part, I can't do anymore. At that point, I suspect my emotions will be profound. When you're in the middle of a battle, you really don't have time to do that. The other reality is that while its going on, I've lost some very close friends and you can't defer that or deny it. What I've found is ... my anger level is intensified when I've lost someone who's close to me and it charges me to try to do more and to be better and to work harder. Some of the staff here get pissed off at me at times when something bad has happened and someone has died that we've all known and my expectations and my demands go up. It's probably the way I respond to this, that has helped me maintain a certain amount of sanity.

Q: There's a picture of Christopher Fons on your office wall...

A: Well, I have Christopher's photo on the wall. Christopher and I were not close at all. He and I were more at odds with each other lots of times. He was a real effective leader of ACT-Up Milwaukee and I had many meetings with Christopher. He was on my back before we started the Needle Exchange Program. He would say, "Why are you waiting so long when people's lives are at stake?" and really aggressively criticizing me and the agency. But, I've always supported ACT-Up, and maybe it goes back to my protest days in Madison with the Vietnam War. ACT-Up Milwaukee and ACT-Up all over the country is critical to making progress against AIDS, I've

seen it time and time again. Even here in Milwaukee, with Christopher leading ACT-Up he kept this organization on it's toes and kept me on my toes and he made a big difference. When he died it was a real loss. A loss not so much personally to me, but it was a loss for all of us who are fighting the AIDS epidemic. This picture of him was a piece of art at the Art for AIDS Auction.

and I like having his portrait here because it reminds me to fight harder. So, did Christopher have a big impact on me? Absolutely ... I will never forget

and I bid on it and got it

him. And we miss him, we miss him terribly.

Q: Are there other clients or an individual with AIDS whose passing has made a

major impact on you?

A: There are other people with whom I've been more personally attached to. We're sitting in a conference room which I took the liberty of naming the Dan Gordon Room. Dan Gordon was the first director of finance here. I didn't

know him before I hired him but ... he was a sweetheart, just a sweetheart, and we became really good friends through his work here. I'll never forget when we Continued on page 46

y parents, who live in New York, visit my older brother, who lives in Miami Beach, once a month. My parents have visited me, their only daughter, who lives in Lesbianville, a northeast city which is a whole lot closer than Florida, once in the last twelve years. Not that I'd want my parents to drop in on me and Flash every time I get my period, mind you, but the discrepency seems a bit extreme. And when my parents did come to see us, it was only because they had a Bar Mitzvah

to attend in Hartford, so they figured

they'd come early and drive the extra 35

miles to say hello and have a little nosh.

So, what does my brother have that I don't have? Besides the obvious -that thing between his legs -and the onlyslightly-less-obvious -his six figure salary -my brother has produced the one thing that has rendered him God-like in my parents eyes forever: a grandchild. And not just any garden-variety type grandchild. A grandSON. Since everyone treats the little tyke like God, Flash and I have taken to calling him Moses. Not that we see him that often since I have visited my brother even fewer times in the last twelve years than my parents have visited me. But my mother, who can't imagine that

Flash and I are less than fascinated by every move her heir apparent makes, sends us videotapes every so often so we can monitor his development and growth.

Have you ever sat through a thirty minute video of a five month old infant swaving back and forth in one of those wind-up, musical swing-things planted on the floor of somebody's kitchen? And I thought David Letterman was boring. I wanted to send my mother a videotape of our two cats snoozing in the sun, but Flash thought that would be rude. Flash also thought it would be rude not to send the little messiah a birthday present when the occasion arose a few months later and every year thereafter as well.

The first couple of years were easy. Flash and I picked out a tiny playsuit, miniature sneakers, a cute little jacket. Last year when Moses turned four, Flash said he was getting too old for clothes. "You don't want to be his least favorite aunt, do you?" she asked. "Get him a toy."

"But I don't know what he likes," I whined.

"Guess who does?" Flash asked, handing me the phone.

So I called my mother, ever the expert, for advice. "He likes cars, trucks, anything with wheels," she said, her voice oozing with pride. God forbid my mother's grandson would like dolls, pocketbooks, anything with rhinestones. We sent him a set of one-hundred miniature vehicles which were a great success with him, though my sister-in-law made it clear she didn't appreciate having to pick them up from behind the couch, under the TV stand and between the stove and refrigerator on a daily basis. In a move that would

make Miss Manners proud, my brother broke a three year silence to call me and put Moses on the phone to say thank you. "Tell Aunt Lesléa how much you like your new cars" my brother said. After a few minutes of garbled baby talk, my brother got back on the phone. "Wait," I said to him, "Let Moses thank Auntie Flash."

"The rates are really high right now," my brother said, fooling no one since it was Sunday afternoon, "Some other time."

Flash and I finally met our nephew at my mother's 65th birthday party, which was quite a gala affair. There was enough food to feed all the lesbians in Lesbianville and Park Slope combined, as well as a one woman band, whose rendition of "Sunrise, Sunset" brought tears to everyone's eyes. We sat at a table with my parents and my brothers and their wives, and of course little Moses, who got even more attention than the birthday girl. He was very into dancing, and Flash and I were impressed at how he would ask anyone to dance, male or female, grown-up or child.

"When do you think he'll learn that it's not okay to dance with boys?" I asked Flash, right after a waiter had said to her, "Another beer, sir?"

"With your brother? I'd say before the night is over," Flash replied, taking another bite of Chicken Kiev.

"Oh c'mon, Flash, he's not that bad."

"Wanna bet? Stand up," she said, taking my arm.

"Where are you going?" my brother asked, looking up from his London broil.

"Out there," Flash gestured to the middle of the room. "To dance."

"With each other?" My brother dropped his fork. "You're not serious, are



you?" he asked, his eyes darting frantically, his complexion instantly pale.

"Cool your jewels, Brother. We're just going to the ladies room," Flash said, steering me away from the table. She had proven her point.

A few days later my mother called to discuss the party. "Your nephew can't stop talking about you," she said. "He keeps saying to your brother, 'Aunt Lesléa and Aunt Flash live together, just like Grandma and Grandpa, right?"

"Smart kid," I said to her. "So what should I get him for his birthday this year?"

"He's very into books right now," my mother said. "He won't go to sleep without two bedtime stories."

"Two, huh?" I asked, relieved that my problem was immediately solved. I didn't have to choose between *Heather Has Two Mommies* and *Gloria Goes To Gay Pride*. I could give him both.

Too bad, indeed.






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
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

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Report from NINTYOTRIS

[in which WASWO gives some rambling observations on the city, the food and Robert Mapplethorpe]

ewt Gingrich and crew have a tendency to dismiss New York as emblematic of all that is wrong with America. Like the campfire cowboys in that notorious barbecue sauce commercial who scream "get a rope!" when they discover they're eating a New York product, there are those who think the best thing for New York City is for it to be lynched out of existence. Remember that grade-B film, Escape from New York where Manhattan has literally been turned into one huge prison camp? This seems to be some people's fantasy. Let's just wall Sin City away from the rest of this God-fearing country.

As the cliche goes; you either love it or you hate it. Those who hate it tend to sight crime, graffiti, over-congestion, dirt and rude people as chief complaints. These days they are apt to mention foreigners as well. Walking in midtown Manhattan and being surrounded by a cacophony of Yiddish, Arabic, Chinese and Japanese, can make some people wonder where all the "Americans" have gone. It's not like this back in West Bend— or Waukesha for that matter. For some the whole thing about welcoming folks to our shores with the Statue of Liberty has obviously gone too far.

But there are those of us who love New York. We love it for many of the same reasons others hate it. We see vitality, competitiveness, and diversity, the amazing symbiosis of different cultures. We see not only graffiti, but incredible monuments, sculpture, architecture, museums, theaters

and restaurants. We hum to ourselves Frank Sinatra tunes and enjoy a city that never sleeps. Or we stroll Central Park and think we'd just adore a penthouse view. Like Eva Gabor says, it's not the chores, it's the stores!

If I can get to New York but once a year it is not really enough. Soho always beckons the artist in me, as does the Village. every part of Manhattan offers something unique. From the green expanses of Central Park to the upscale Upper East Side, or the still somewhat sleazy 42nd Street and Times Square, it seems that New York has it all. In the heart of Chinatown you will find Little Italy. Limousines cruise in sleek elegance past homeless beggars. If you can't find it in New York you have probably not looked hard enough. A million signs, posters, and flashing lights will attempt to guide you.

The East Village staunchly maintains its iconoclastic image, exhibiting little of the yuppification the Village proper has undergone. An advertisement for the Crow Bar defiantly proclaims "Fats, Fems, and Druggies Welcome". This East Village gay hangout features no sign to help the traveler find it; just pictures of crows painted on the side of the building. On Monday nights there is the live taping of The Hedda Lettuce Show for local access television. The live audience sits on an assemblage of thirty or so folding chairs in a room painted black. On this last visit I was treated to a stunning reenactment of Madonna's 1993 tour. It is not easy for a drag artist to do Madonna. Exposed waistlines and navels tell all. Raw energy and

skill is needed to master punishing choreography. But at the Crow Bar it was "pulled off" perfectly. Flanking Madonna were two healthy young muscle studs who were even more amazing in their gymnastic abilities. The whole event (a benefit for the Gay Men's Health Crisis) was a night to remember.

Another highlight was a play entitled 30,000 Pigs Roam the City. This was performed at the Wings Theater on Christopher Street. "Pigs" is a light-hearted

hristopher Park stands just outside the Stonewall Inn. This spot is without a doubt the symbolic epicenter of the gay liberation movement. What began with the riots at the Stonewall Inn in the summer of 1969, is now commemorated with a George Segal sculpture in white painted bronze. Two men stand, while two women sit on a park bench, representing open and unashamed gay and lesbian love. This little park has become a tourist destination for gay

restaurants, bars —it is all there. If you're planning a trip to New York, don't forget this other gay strip.

Tasty eateries and chic restaurants abound in New York. My favorites are found in the Village and Soho. When every slick Italian diner wants to call itself a "tratoria", Pesce Pasta on Bleeker Street truly lives up to the name. Marinated zucchinis, squid and fresh mozzarella with olive oil and basil beckon from the windows. It is the sort of restaurant run by family. Mom and dad work in the kitchen, sons and daughters waiting tables. The room is quaint, less expensive than most, and the food and atmosphere right out of Florence. If you want to spend a little bit more money, Raoul's on Prince Street in Soho is small, tasty and French. Ask to be seated in back. You will be walked right through the kitchen to an intimate back patio. For those who know French food is more than escargot, this is a must.

allery and Museum going is at its best in New York City. Suffice it to say that the Joel-Peter Witkin show at the Guggenheim blew my mind. Claes Oldenburg, the Dutch sculptor who made a career out of making monumental sculpture out of everyday objects was also at the Guggenheim. Viewers were treated to giant clothespins, meatballs, and a stick of lipstick that protruded like a missile from a tank. Oldenburg sarcastically proposes to replace the Statue of Liberty with a giant electric fan blowing out to sea: the answer to a xenophobes prayer.

But the highlight of this last visit was found at the International Center of Photography. The show *The Garden of Earthly Delights*, juxtaposed images by Robert Mapplethorpe side by side with images by Edward Weston. It is currently fashionable to speak disparagingly of Mapplethorpe's work. Critics and biographers alike have done an about-face. Whereas six years ago, in the aftermath of the Jesse Helms/NEA battles,




musical dealing with two roommates. One, a promiscuous young pretty boy forever searching for a new experience. The other a conservative and somewhat moralistic young man searching for the "Mr. Right" with whom he can begin a monogamous relationship. Strangely these two roommates have more in common than not. They form an odd couple relationship that by the play's end hints at becoming more than just roommates. The whole piece is cleverly done and well written, the acting superb. "Pigs" provided more than a little insight into the positives and negatives of the gay community.

people world-wide. There is seldom a moment when some couple is not posing for the video or snap shot with the sculptures. Sidewalk cafes and gay taverns are plentiful in the immediate area, and the whole atmosphere is at once charged and charming. As gay public sculptures the Christopher Park statues are rivaled only by Amsterdam's *Homomonument*.

While the heart of New York's gay community may still be Christopher Street according to tradition, in reality Eighth Avenue is becoming more and more the vortex of things gay. I have sometimes counted more rainbow flags on Eight Avenue than on Christopher Street. Shops,


Mapplethorpe was treated by the art community as a modern master, today he is presented as little more than a shrewd hustler with a talent for self-promotion. It is unfortunate that the pendulum of opinion swings to such extremes. Edward Weston is unanimously considered one of the greats of art photography. Living as a bohemian heterosexual in California during the '20's and '30's, Weston's images are every bit as erotic and sensual as Mapplethorpe's. The amazing thing is how well Mapplethorpe's work corresponds to Weston's. In the comparison, Mapplethorpe often comes out the better of the two. It seems to me the current bout of revisionist put-downs of Mapplethorpe stems not from aesthetic judgments, but from a cowardice in the art community to face down right wing politics. After all, if Mapplethorpe is judged a modern master, then he must be given museum shows and validation. Few museum directors in the United States seem to have the guts to mount Mapplethorpe shows in these puritanical times. It has become safer and easier to simply devalue his work. But, if the ICP show is any indication, the sheer strength of Mapplethorpe's imagery will eventually win him a respected and lasting place in photographic history.

Such is New York; controversial but chic, tasty, sensual, provoking and gritty. If you've never been there, don't believe the negative stories that have become Midwestern folk tales. See for yourself. Chances are you will love it.





MUSIC FOR A QUEER PLANET

ith the holiday season in full swing, I thought now might be a good time for some last minute gift giving ideas for those music lovers on your list. This month's featured albums will make thoughtful offerings for December's myriad celebrations.

Rock's Great White Lesbian Wonder. Melissa Etheridge, resurfaces with her fifth collection of soon-to-be heartland favorites, entitled Your Little Secret (Island Records). Although she has few secrets left since her big coming out a few years back, she does have plenty of blustery ballads and classic rock anthems left in her arsenal, ten of which are featured here on this fifty-two minute opus. With the title track already topping the charts, and cuts like the provocative "I Really Like You" ("I'll buy you mangos baby/Your favorite fruit/I'll shave everything baby/I'll press my suit"), and the confessional "I Could Have Been You" ("I'm scared of growin' old/I shiver when I'm cold/Don't you think I bleed the same blood?"), Melissa will certainly have little trouble retaining

her crown as the Sapphic Sovereign of American Rock-n-Roll.

Conspicuously missing since 1992's Matters of the Heart, Tracy Chapman launches New Beginning (Elektra Records), her fourth album of earthy folk-pop tunes. Despite mixed reviews, I think this album is her long-awaited return to greatness. Chapman gracefully covers the tough terrain of love and relationships in songs like the tender "Smoke and Ashes." showcases her gifted storytelling ability in the poignant "Cold Feet," and makes insightful social commentary in "The Rape of the World" and "New Beginning." Her strong suit has always been the straight-from-theheart personal confession, and here we get several, among them the brutally honest "At This Point In My Life," and the joyous "I'm Ready." Musically, Chapman record-

ed the album almost completely live in the studio with her own band, giving it a spontaneous crispness and a well-balanced production qualitynot too sparse and not too heavy-handed. Most tracks fall within her customary acoustic folkpop boundarieswith the occasional bluesy detour

("Give Me One Reason") –and are intermittently flavored with ethnic instrumental highlights (Scottish pipes, whistle, didjeridu, tamboura).


Speaking of world-flavored music, Global Divas (Rounder Records) is a new three-cd package featuring some of the planet's most accomplished and creative female singers, released in conjunction with the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women that took place recently in Beijing, China. The compre-

hensive collection pays tribute to the musical and social achievements of women worldwide, including over 40 artists representing more than 30 nations, while raising funds for the United Nations Development Fund For Women (UNIFEM).

Quick Notes: For the alternative pop/rock fan on your list, check out Britain's multicultural, new wavers **Echobelly**, and their second album **On** (550 Music/Epic); they're instantly compared to original New Wavers **Blondie**, the **Pretenders** and **the Smiths** for their eclectic alternapop sound.

If much harder fare interests your loved one, try San Francisco's dyke performance-punk quintet **Tribe 8** and their latest, the fierce *Fist City* (Alternative

> Tentacles Records). If a more mellow listening experience is desired, turn to Britain's jazzy folk-pop duo Everything But the Girl's Amplified Heart (Atlantic Records). Although released in late 1994, the album is just now picking up speed due to the enormous popularity of their current single and club hit "Missing." In search of a good laugh? Shamelessly queer folk troubadours Romanovsky and Phillips show off their quick wit on their live recording,

went out to the International AIDS Conference in San Francisco and he wasn't doing real well, this was probably a year and a half before he died and he had never seen The Quilt. So, we decided we would go together to see The Quilt. We walked in and of course it was a profound emotional circumstance and

I noticed that all of a sudden he had sort of drifted off, he had wanted to go by himself and he began having a real difficult time. When he came back, tears were running down his eyes and he just said we need to go, we need to go. So we walked out and he said, "This is all so unfair," and just burst into tears. I can hear him say it today. AIDS is unfair, its unjust. Why should all of us, particularly all of us in the gay community endure this tragedy? And there's not an answer to that. There's another person, Larry Plarerin who was a very close friend of mine. He was the interior designer who worked so hard on the the new building for AWRC and MAP. His last year of his life he dedicated himself totally to

helping us move in there and actually became homebound before we all got settled in and never saw us make that final move. His loss was very significant to me. Right now we have over 1,000 clients, and I don't know all of them, there are many, many people who in the course of their volunteering and their involvement as clients I get to know. I can see the faces of the people I've gotten to know who we've lost. There are just too many to even try to count.

Q: You were recently on BESTD Clinic LIVE! and a caller to the show asked, "Are you gay?" and you said the only other time you'd been asked that was by Mark Belling. When did he ask you that?

A: That was back at the beginning. I think that was probably six months or so after I'd come to MAP. I didn't know who Mark Belling was back then. He had a radio show even back then. I got on it and it was live at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. I don't know what we were talking about and all of a sudden he said, "Well,

Mr. Nelson, are you gay?" and I said, "What difference does that make based on what we're talking about?" and he said "I think my audience and Milwaukee needs to know if you're gay." and I said, "Sure I am." and that was it. It's really a symbol of how long I've been here. When I first took the job, someone came up to me and congratulated me on it said to me, "I really admire you for taking this job and I'd really thought about apply for it myself, but I decided that I didn't want to ever be put in a position while being interviewed by television or radio about whether or not I was gay." It struck me that when I decided to take it. I never thought about that, it never

crossed my mind that that would be an issue. I find it hard to imagine that anyone would think that I'm anything but... being a single guy in his 40's running an AIDS organization. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure that one out.

Q: What do you think people would be surprised to know about you?

A: That I am an ardent Green Bay Packer Fan.

Q: Are you?

A: I am (laughing)... I really love the Packers, it's a love affair. It's the Cinderella team always.

Q: Do you find it's the romance of it or that you grew up with it?

A: No, I didn't grow up with it... it wasn't until I finished college that I became interested. I grew up near Minneapolis-St. Paul and it was all Vikings over there. In fact, I didn't even know when I was growing up where Green Bay was. I wish . I had been into football back then because that's when they won all those championships. I enjoy sports... I don't have great athletic ability. I remember in school, when I went our for football in junior high school and I was just awful and I kept going out because it was the thing you were supposed to do. Finally, the football coach came to me after two years and said, "Doug, maybe you might want to consider doing something different." So, I did. I guess its always sort of a fantasy about being a great athlete. I love most sports. Part of it may be it's fun to see attractive men. Tennis is a great sport. I've got to get into soccer... I have to go some Wave games, I haven't been there yet. There's always this duality of interest.

Q: It's not just the joy of the sport?

A: I think it's frosting on the cake... I love



the sport. I love the strategy of it. But its fun to watch some of the men who are gorgeous... am I wrong?

Q: I'm not disagreeing with you. So, where do you hang out when you're not at work? Do you tend to more of homebody, watching reruns of the Packers?

A: I like to spend a lot of time at home or up at my cottage. In the summertime in particular ... and I enjoy going out to the gay bars. But, honestly the work is so draining that you almost have to get your energy up to go out. I enjoy spending time at friend's homes.

Q: Is there someone special in your life right now? A: I don't. No.

Q: Is that something you look for or hope would come along?

A: Absolutely. But I'm not really looking for it. I had a relationship very early in my life when I wasn't completely out at all and neither was my partner, at all. I think on those days, it was a wonderful, wonderful time. I admire people who connect in a relationship and commit to it and grow it and maintain it. I think an investment to protect a relationship is a very important thing. I sort of have a reputation of being a workaholic. That probably has impacted my person life. I know that I have missed opportunities to connect with people.

Q: How do you feel about that?

A: I feel sort of sad about that. I hate to use the sports analogy, but it's sort of Monday morning quarterbacking. One of the real downsides in AIDS is the extraordinary commitment of personal time to it. I think it is a struggle to maintain friend-ships outside of that arena, to say nothing of building a relationship.

Q: How do you avoid burnout?

A: I don't know. A combination of having really good people to work with who are understanding, supportive and sensitive. The people who work at MAP are tremendous. That support system with-in the work environment is very important, if that wasn't there I could survive it. My survival and my longevity is a function of the outstanding people around me.


Q: Is there a spiritual component to how you stay emotionally healthy?

A: I don't have the spiritual side of my life figured out. I'm not invested in a dogma. I know that I believe in a higher power and I probably drift toward some of the traditional explanations of that. It is a source of strength to know that when times get tough I can dig down to that. I like to say, when things get hard and difficult and the losses mount up, particu-

larly when you lose someone whose been very close to you, I like to think as difficult and painful as AIDS is, that all of us who are involved in fighting it are on the side of the angels. There's not anything I could right now in my life that would be more important... except maybe quarterback the Green Bay Packers. (laughing)

Q: Do you see any hope in the future for progress in the battle with HIV and AIDS?

A: It's really been over the past six months, in discussions with some of my colleagues ... there is a sense that we will be making significant progress in the next one to two years with the new combination drug therapies, the new Protese inhibitors and even with the implementation of a Salk vaccine trial, different approaches to this virus are going to extend life. I have never heard the kind of optimism on the treatment front in all my years, than I've heard in the last six months. If that manifests itself ... If we can begin, through these measures, to extend life ... then we can keep working on that and then jump to the ultimate goal here which is to stop the fatalities and make this a chronic disease and not a fatal disease.


Kelvin Hayden Has Designs on the Fashion World



Book Review

How Shy and Lonely Tom Became Celebrated Artist Tennessee

Tom: The Unknown Tennessee Williams by Lyle Leverich Crown Publishers. \$35.00

ennessee Williams was one of this century's greatest playwrights, and one of its most famous queers. He has been the subject of several biographies both before and after his death in 1983. The basic facts of his life are reasonably well known, and they are, of course, the source for much of his work.

Lyle Leverich was authorized by Williams to write a new and definitive biography. Lady Maria St. Just, Williams's literary executrix, became increasingly difficult to deal with, and managed to stall publication of Leverich's work. Her death last year has made it possible for the publication of Tom: The Unknown Tennessee Williams, the first volume of Leverich's biography. It is a massive work (672 pages) covering the first thirty-four years of Williams's life. Leverich has had access to correspondence and diaries that have not been used by previous biographers, and he has conducted numerous interviews with Williams's friends and colleagues.


Leverich's theses is fairly simple: "In

Tennessee Williams there was a psychic split between the gentle, poetic Dakin side of his nature and the hard, aggressive Williams side, an irreconcilable division that made him 'half-mad,' as he would say over and over again. Ironically, it was the strength he inherited from his hated father that gave him the will to succeed, while his insecurities and personal failures seem to come from his supportive and much loved maternal grandparents. Leverich rightly sees that in Williams, "the artist was the rational force and the man the irrational dissembler."

Although I can't say there is much depth to Leverich's analysis, nor much flair in his writing, he has succeeded in pasting together his sources in a way that finally makes for compelling reading. The voices of the key people in Williams's formative years –his grandparents, his mother, his sister –are vividly present. And Williams's own voice is heard more truthfully than ever before. His profound sense of isolation and loneliness is a constant torment for the young writer, In his 1936 diary, Williams noted: "Another decent thing about me is my tolerance and my love of people and my gentleness toward them. I think I have acquired that through suffering and loneliness." And three years later he wrote: "All my deep loves and friendships have hurt me finally –I mean have caused me pain, because I have felt so much more than the other person could feel."

Williams was ambivalent about his homosexuality through most of his life. He has been quoted as as saying, "All homosexuals have to live with a deep wound that never heals." This is very much the statement of someone who grew up in the 1930s, and a reflection on what it meant to be queer in America before gay liberation. Although Leverich does not analyze this idea, he provides enough material that the astute reader can begin to understand the personal torment Williams's world created for him. And, to some extent, in dealing with his "difference," shy and lonely Tom became the celebrated artist Tennessee.

In my own tortured adolescence, Williams was my hero: someone who spoke to me directly. I think his work has had this effect for many gay men of my generation. Leverich's portrait makes it possible to understand who Tennessee Williams was, and allows us to understand the very real differences and important connections between his life and his work.








For those gay men over forty, take heart, for somebody famous once said, "Life begins at forty". Unfortunately, I'm quite sure that person must be dead by now.

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
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
